THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ► Brett Favre makes historic start No. 200 in his streak, longest ever by an NFL quarterback.
- ► The Packers, controllers of their own destiny as leaders of the NFC North, bid for a sixth straight win. Green Bay opened 1-4.
- ► Green Bay gets the Rams on grass for the first time since St. Louis exploded into the offensive record books under Mike Martz in 1999. The last time the Rams visited Green Bay was 1997, a 17-7 Packers win on the road to Super Bowl XXXII. On turf in their last two meetings (2003 regular season, and 2001 NFC Divisional playoff), St. Louis outscored Green Bay 79-41, capitalizing on 12 Packers turnovers. The Rams compiled a plus-nine turnover ratio in the two contests.
- ► The NFL's top coaches from the Class of 2000 meet. On Nov. 14, both Mike Sherman and Martz registered career win No. 50, tied for 18th fastest in NFL history with Mike Shanahan (78 games).

NATIONAL TELEVISION: ABC continues its 35th season of *Monday Night Football*, the nation's longest-running primetime series. Al Michaels and John Madden are in their third season together. Innovative producer Fred Gaudelli joins director Drew Esocoff in the truck, while highly regarded Michele Tafoya is in her first year on the sidelines.

LOCAL RADIO: Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and Larry McCarren (color). The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on packers.com.

NATIONAL RADIO: CBS Radio Sports/Westwood One, in English from Green Bay with Marv Albert (play-by-play), Boomer Esiason (color), Kenny Albert (sideline), Jim Gray (pregame/halftime host) and Howard Deneroff (producer), and in Spanish, from New York City studios, with announcers Clemson Smith Muñiz and David Crommett, and producer Armando Talavera. The Albert father-son combination will broadcast an NFL game for the first time.

CONSECUTIVE LAST-SECOND KICKS: The last time Green Bay won two straight contests on field goals as time expired, 9-year-old Ryan Longwell was in elementary school.

- ► Near the end of 1983, eventual Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud turned away consecutive opponents with last-second field goals.
- ► His 19-yarder beat the Bears, 31-28, at Lambeau Field Dec. 4. Lynn Dickey's improbable 67-yard pass to James Lofton, another Hall of Famer, set up that win.
- One week later, Dec. 12 at Tampa Bay, Stenerud booted a 23-yarder in overtime to sink the Bucs, 12-9. Dickey took the extra period's opening kickoff and drove 65 yards in 11 plays before the field goal.
- ► According to Elias Sports Bureau, the last NFL team to win consecutive games on last-second field goals was Philadelphia, Nov. 5-12, 2000.

FAVRE APPROACHES MOON: Favre enters Monday needing just 12 pass attempts to take over Warren Moon's No. 3 spot on the NFL's all-time list:

THE STREAK, BY THE NUMBERS: During Brett Favre's streak of 199 regular-season starts:

- ► He has completed TD passes to 36 different targets, including 57 to Antonio Freeman, a franchise-record for a quarterback-receiver combination.
- ► He has started in 38 stadiums, including debuts at FedEx Field (Oct. 31) and Reliant Stadium (Sunday) in his last two road games. Of those 38, 15 are either no longer standing or no longer in use by an NFL team. He's thrown for a TD in 33 of the venues.
- ► He has completed 4,156 of 6,754 passes for 47,910 yards, 363 TDs and 217 interceptions.
- ► He has compiled a 131-68 record. That .658 winning percentage is the fourth-best record among QBs since the 1970 merger (min. 100 starts).
- ► Eleven former backups have gone on to start for another NFL team.
- ▶ Including the Giants' Eli Manning Sunday, 178 quarterbacks have started for the other 31 NFL franchises. The Bears have used 18, including Craig Krenzel and Jonathan Quinn.

LONGEST WINNING STREAKS: The Packers bid for a sixth straight win, which would surpass their longest 2003 streak (regular season Games 13-16 and a Wild Card playoff win).

► In 2002, the club won seven straight, its longest winning streak within a season since 1963, when it won eight in a row.

- ► Green Bay's defense has forced a punt on six consecutive possessions, including three straight "three-and-outs." Over the six series, the Packers have allowed just 58 yards.
- ▶ During the team's five-game winning streak, the Packers have a minus-four turnover ratio. They're minus-5 in their last three wins, at Washington (-2), vs. Minnesota (-1) and at Houston (-2).
- ► The Packers have 13 sacks over their five-game winning streak. During their four straight losses (Sept. 19-Oct. 11), they had five sacks.
- ► Green Bay's top-ranked offensive line hasn't allowed a sack over its last 85 passing plays, and one over its last 130. On third down, the unit hasn't allowed a sack since 2003.
- ► Green Bay's 38 points scored on its opening second-half possessions ranks first in the NFL.
- ► The Packers have scored a touchdown in 71 consecutive games; the team could tie the franchise record of 75 games (1992-97) in Game 14. The last team to hold Green Bay without a touchdown was Philadelphia, Sept. 17, 2000 Mike Sherman's first NFL victory, 6-3.
- ▶ Brett Favre during the five-game winning streak has completed 68.0 percent of his passes (121-for-178), for 1,423 yards with 10 touchdowns and five INTs.
- ▶ Javon Walker has caught at least one pass in 27 straight games and 37 of the last 38. The last time he went without a reception was vs. Buffalo, Dec. 22, 2002, a 10-0 win dominated by defense.
- ► Physical, aggressive Al Harris has 12 passes defensed in his last three games (four in each contest).

INCREDIBLE COMEBACK: The Packers Sunday rallied from a deficit of at least 10 points to win a road game for the first time in 14 years. On Nov. 18, 1990, Anthony Dilweg replaced an injured Don Majkowski and erased a 21-10 fourth-guarter deficit to win at Phoenix, 24-21.

COACHES CAPSULES

Mike Sherman: 51-28-0, .646, fifth NFL season, fifth with Packers Mike Martz: 50-29-0, .633, fifth NFL season, fifth with Rams

MIKE SHERMAN...Is in his fifth year as Packers head coach, and fourth as executive vice president and general manager. Sherman also:

- ► Earned his 50th career win Nov. 14, tied with Martz for 18th fastest in NFL history and second in Green Bay annals to Vince Lombardi.
- ► Inspired his players with a passionate speech on the eve of an Oct. 17 win at Detroit. The Packers, 1-4 at the time, haven't lost since.
- ► After Tom Rossley underwent a heart angioplasty Oct. 12, stepped forward and has served as primary play caller since.
- ► A Red Sox fan since his youth, is hoping Green Bay can rebound from an early deficit the way Boston did in climbing out of a three-game hole to defeat the Yankees, and eventually win the World Series.
- ▶ Became the last active head coach (minimum one season) to experience a three-game losing streak, on Oct. 3.
- ► Is now 6-0 against teams that played in the Super Bowl the previous season, including Sept. 13 at Carolina.
- ► Since 1970, only George Siefert, Chuck Knox and Joe Gibbs have posted a better regular-season mark over their first four years.

MIKE MARTZ...Replaced Dick Vermeil, who retired following the Rams' win in Super Bowl XXXIV to conclude '99 season.

- ► Has guided St. Louis to a pair of division titles and three playoff berths in his first four seasons as head coach, including Super Bowl XXXVI.
- ► In 2002, became only the second coach in NFL history to lead a team to five straight wins after an 0-5 start.
- ▶ Offensive mastermind behind one of most explosive offenses in NFL history. Under Martz, St. Louis became first in league annals to score 500 points in three seasons.
- ► Since he rejoined St. Louis as offensive coordinator in 1999, the Rams racked up more points, total yards and passing yards than any NFL team during any five-year span ever.
- ► Helped Rams produce three straight NFL MVPs (Kurt Warner, 1999, 2001; Marshall Faulk 2000).
- ▶ Before returning to Rams, spent two seasons as Redskins quarter-backs coach. Began NFL career with Rams (1992-96).
- ► A former tight end, has nearly 20 years college coaching experience.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24. THE PACKERS-RAMS SERIES: These club first met in 1937, when the NFL launched its long relationship with the city of Cleveland. Green Bay, the defending league champion, swept that season's series with a 35-10 win at Municipal Stadium and a 35-7 win at Green Bay City Stadium.

- ► St. Louis has the upper hand of late, winning two in a row and three of the last five, including a 2001 NFC Divisional playoff.
- ► These clubs met every year from 1937-71 except 1943, when the Rams didn't field a team.
- ▶ Beginning in 1946, when the Rams moved from Cleveland to Los Angeles, these foes consistently played their Wisconsin games early in the year (before cold weather set in) and their warm West Coast games late in the year.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS: St. Louis safety Antuan Edwards was drafted by Green Bay in the first round of the 1999 NFL Draft; he played in Green Bay from 1999-2003, before signing with Miami this past offseason...Rams punter Sean Landeta spent one year, 1998, punting in Green Bay...St. Louis offensive lineman Adam Timmerman was a stalwart guard for Green Bay from 1995-98, helping the Packers to consecutive Super Bowls...Rams running backs coach Wilbert Montgomery was the star pupil for Johnny Roland, now the Packers' running backs coach, when the two were with the Eagles, under Dick Vermeil, from 1977-78...Defensive assistant Gill Byrd headed up the Packers' player development department from 1999-2001, until Edgar Bennett took over the role in 2001...Rams defensive coordinator Larry Marmie is one of several former assistants under Vince Tobin, now with the Packers, who went on to become an NFL coordinator; the list also includes Dave McGinnis, Dom Capers, Jim Johnson and Vic Fangio...St. Louis assistant head coach Joe Vitt coached the Packers' defensive backs in 1999...Rams assistant Matt Sheldon spent the 1997-2000 seasons at the University of Wisconsin...Packers coaches Larry Beightol (1983-84) and Frank Novak (1988) spent time at the University of Missouri.

LAST MEETING (AP): Oct. 19, 2003, Edward Jones Dome, St. Louis, Rams won, 34-24:

- ► The Rams won largely on defense, as they focused on stopping Ahman Green rather than Brett Favre, and forced four turnovers. Green entered the contest with three consecutive 100-yard rushing games. St. Louis held him to a season-low 35 yards on 20 carries. He broke free only once, on a 21-yard screen pass for a touchdown in the second quarter.
- ► Favre, who broke his thumb early in game, threw two touchdown passes for Green Bay (3-4), but his effort at a comeback fizzled after a 1-yard TD toss to William Henderson pulled Green Bay to 21-17 in the third quarter.
- ► The Rams won without running back Lamar Gordon, who left in the first half with a left ankle injury, leaning instead on undrafted third stringer Arlen Harris. They did the job on defense without linebacker Tommy Polley, who left with a dislocated left elbow.
- ► Isaac Bruce had nine catches for 129 yards. He topped 10,000 career yards in the fourth quarter. Marc Bulger and Dane Looker also hooked up on a 20-yard scoring play in the third quarter with Looker somehow tight-roping down the sideline the last 10 yards.

LAST MEETING, GREEN BAY: Nov. 9, 1997, Lambeau Field, Packers won, 17-7:

- ► In Mike Holmgren's 100th game as head coach, Green Bay improved to 8-2 with a fifth straight win, this one in ugly fashion.
- ► St. Louis dropped a sixth straight game, but not before the blitz-minded Rams held the Packers to only 3 first-half points. The teams combined for 15 points and 24 penalties.
- ► After halftime, Green Bay scored on its first two possessions.
- Antonio Freeman had seven catches for 160 yards, and Favre hit 18of-27 for 306 yards, one TD and two INT, and ran for a score.

LIKE A FINE WINE: Brett Favre has connected on a pass of at least 44 yards in six consecutive games, by far the longest streak of his career.

THE CHALLENGER: Including the Packers' 2003 Divisional playoff at Philadelphia, Mike Sherman has overturned officials' calls on four of his last six challenges. Sunday at Houston, he successfully reversed an incompletion, netting 11 yards and a key first down for a diving Robert Ferguson. Sherman is 3-for-5 in 2004.

► Opponent head coaches, including playoffs, are 2-for-their-last-11, dating to Opening Day 2003 vs. Minnesota. They're 1-for-4 in 2004.

KGB ON STREAK OF HIS OWN: Persistent Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila has a three-game sack streak, with four sacks in his last two games.

► With a sack Monday night, he can match the longest streak of his career, when he began turning heads with a four-game sack streak, Sept. 9-Oct. 7, 2001.

RED-ZONE, THIRD-DOWN OFFENSE: Even as early as the May mini-camp, Mike Sherman stresses the importance of winning battles in the red zone and on third down. Those preparations are continuing to pay off, as they did in 2003. Green Bay ranks second in the NFL in third-down offense (69-for-134, .515) and fifth in red-zone offense (20-for-31, .645).

NFC'S LONGEST WINNING STREAK: Green Bay is the hottest team in the NFC with a five-game winning streak. Only Pittsburgh (eight) has a longer streak.

TWO-MINUTE DRILL: When forced into the two-minute drill the last two contests, the Packers' offense has posted points on all three drives.

BIRTHDAY WISHES: To linebacker Paris Lenon (Friday), receivers coach Ray Sherman (Saturday) and defensive end Aaron Kampman (Tuesday, Nov. 30).

BEIGHTOL'S LINE & 1,000-YARD RUSHERS: Larry Beightol's offensive line, if Ahman Green gains 121 yards rushing, will have blocked for a 1,000-yard rusher in six consecutive seasons, and establish a franchise record (five, 1960-64). The next comparable streak was three (1971-73).

- ► The Packers offensive line helped Dorsey Levens to the barrier in 1999, and Green over the last four seasons (2000-03).
- ▶ Beightol would break Bill Austin's Packers record among 0-line coaches; Austin's unit, which executed the "run to daylight" Lombardi Sweep, recorded five individual 1,000-yard rushing seasons (Jim Taylor, 1960-64).

LAST WEEK: Postgame notes from Green Bay's 16-13 win over Houston Sunday night at Reliant Stadium:

- ► Ryan Longwell booted his seventh career game-winning field goal, converting a game-winning kick for the second straight week. Before this month, his last game-winning FG was Sept. 8, 2002, vs. Atlanta.
- ► Green Bay's defense forced a punt on the last six Houston possessions, including three straight "three-and-outs" to end the game. Over the last six series, the Packers allowed just 58 yards and three first downs.

FAVRE REACHES ANOTHER 200 MILESTONE: Kendall Gammon, Kansas City's long snapper, is the only non-kicker who owns a longer active games-played streak than Brett Favre. A closer look at Favre's streak numbers:

- ► Favre topped 300 yards passing for the 39th time (42nd including playoffs). He's on pace to throw for 4,201 yards, his most since 1998.
- ► The victory also marked the 32nd time Favre guided the Packers to a win in the fourth-quarter or overtime (and the second in as many weeks).
- ► For the first time in the Mike Sherman era, and only the second time under Brett Favre, the Packers won a road game in which they trailed after three quarters. Sherman on the road with a deficit entering the fourth quarter is now 1-14. Favre on the road with a deficit entering the fourth quarter is now 2-41.
- ► Flags hounded the Packers all night. Four penalties came after offensive gains, costing Green Bay 40 yards and three first downs. Officials in the Packers' previous nine games had stripped them of only five first downs.
- ► Green Bay has now won its last six regular-season games playing for the first time in unfamiliar stadiums (Nov. 21 at Reliant Stadium, Oct. 31 at FedEx Field, renovated Soldier Field 2003, Ford Field 2002, Memorial Stadium in Champaign 2002, Gillette Stadium 2002). Over a longer regular-season stretch, the Packers have won nine of their last 11 (wins at Jacksonville in 1995, St. Louis in 1996 and Carolina in 1997, losses at Tampa Bay in 1998 and Tennessee in 2001).
- ► The Packers marked their seventh consecutive win in Sunday night games.
- ► Green Bay launched a series with a 61st NFL opponent.
- ► The Packers improved to 10-0 in their first meeting against all-time NFL expansion franchises.
- ► Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila surpassed No. 3 Ezra Johnson (41.5, 1982-87) on the all-time Packers sacks list. Kabeer now has 43.5.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR MONDAY & IN COMING WEEKS —

BRETT FAVRE:

- ► Will play in a 202nd consecutive game (221 including playoffs) and make his 200th consecutive start (219 including playoffs), 84 more than the next-closest streak on the all-time quarterbacks list, 116 by Ron Jaworski (1977-84).
- ▶ Needs one TD pass to reach 20 on the season and surpass Dan Marino's NFL record for most consecutive seasons with at least 20. Marino did it 10 straight years, from 1983-92. Favre's also done it 10 straight years (1994-2003).
- ► Can extend his streak of games with a TD pass to 36, the NFL's second-longest streak behind Johnny Unitas' 47-game stretch (1956-60), one of the most revered marks in sports history.

BUBBA FRANKS:

- ▶ Needs one reception to surpass No. 4 Rich McGeorge (175) on the team's all-time tight ends list. Franks enters the week with 175.

- ► Needs 20 receiving yards for 2,000 career.
- ► Needs 55 yards to record his first career 1,000-yard season. Would become only the second 1,000-yard receiver in Green Bay under Mike Sherman (also Donald Driver in 2002).

ANOTHER NAME JOINS THE QB LIST: Eli Manning Nov. 21 became the sixth quarterback to make his first NFL start this season, joining Chicago's Craig Krenzel (Oct. 31), Tampa Bay's Chris Simms (Oct. 10), Pittsburgh's Ben Roethlisberger (Sept. 26), the 49ers' Ken Dorsey (Sept. 19) and Cincinnati's Carson Palmer (Sept. 12).

Manning became the 178th quarterback to start an NFL game since Brett Favre launched his current starting streak, Sept. 27, 1992.

WALKER HONORED: *Pro Football Weekly* last week named Javon Walker and Terrell Owens its annual mid-season All-Pro wide receivers.

KEEP AN EYE ON THESE DEVELOPMENTS IN THE SECOND HALF:

- ► The Packers bid to become only the ninth team in NFL history to make the playoffs after opening 1-4. Each of the eight clubs won its division.
- ► Offensively, Green Bay is on pace to establish franchise records in five categories: first downs, third-down percentage, total offense, net passing yards and fewest sacks allowed during a 16-game season,
- ► Favre could post a fourth 4,000-yard passing season. And, Favre stands 1,054 passing yards from overtaking No. 3 Warren Moon on the NFL's all-time list.
- ▶ Javon Walker (945) and Donald Driver (719) are on pace to become the first set of 1,000-yard Packers receivers since 1999 (Antonio Freeman, Bill Schroeder) and only the third overall (also Freeman and Robert Brooks in 1997).
- ► Walker is on pace to snap Brooks' 1995 single-season franchise record of 1,497 receiving yards.

STONEWALL JACKSON: Since Mike Sherman claimed Grady Jackson on waivers Nov. 4, 2003, the Packers are 11-2 in Jackson's games.

- ► In those 13 games, Green Bay has allowed just 3.9 yards per carry (291 rushes, 1,126 yards).
- ► Since Jackson joined the club, in five games without him (all in 2004), the Packers are 1-4, allowing 5.2 yards per carry (138-for-711).

TOUGH AFTER THE BYE: Counting the single games immediately following bye weeks, the Packers have won eight of their last nine, including crucial victories over Minnesota the last two years.

- ► In 2003, Green Bay went 7-2 (.778) after the bye. Only three teams posted better marks, including the Super Bowl champion Patriots.
- ➤ Since 2000, when Mike Sherman began coaching the Packers, only one franchise owns a better record over the balance of its respective season following bye weeks:

SCHEDULE BREAKDOWN: The midseason bye week was another bonus the Packers received from the schedule makers. Green Bay has made up ground after a 1-4 start, capitalizing so far on its gift of an early schedule that did not include many games with playoff tiebreaker implications. The club's remaining six games look like this:

- Three of their six head-to-head contests against division foes, including a rematch with the Vikings, remain in front of the Packers. Green Bay is 2-1 against the division.
- Five of the 12 games within the conference remain. The Packers are 5-2 against the NFC.
- Two of their four AFC contests were played in the first five weeks.

WITH AN 11-POINT LEAD: The Packers under Sherman are 35-2 with a lead of at least 11 points, at any point in the game, including four of their six wins in 2004.

ON THE ROAD: The Packers (4-1) don't have a team mom on the road, like the Eagles in the Chunky Soup commercial, but they are tied with Philadelphia, New England and Atlanta for the league's top road record. Top road records over the last two, three and four seasons:

ANOTHER ELECTION PUTS STREAK IN PERSPECTIVE: Since Brett Favre launched his 199-game starting streak Sept. 27, 1992, people have moved from cassettes to CDs and 1 billion people went "on-line." The streak has encompassed the rise and fall of Martha Stewart, Beanie Babies, Ross Perot, Celine Dion and Y2K. Over the last 12-plus years, *The Bridges of Madison County, The Client* and *Cold Mountain* have gone from the best-seller list to the big screen to the video rental store. And, sandwiched within the streak are the 0.J. Simpson trial, the first and last episodes of NBC's hit series *Friends* and Bill Clinton's two terms in office.

▶ In fact, Nov. 2 marked the fourth time during Favre's streak Americans have gone to the polls to vote for President. Clinton defeated George Bush (1992), won a second term over Bob Dole and Ross Perot (1996), George W. Bush beat Al Gore (2000) and won another term Nov. 2 (2004), defeating John Kerry.

SANDLOT FOOTBALL: Najeh Davenport says he has the best arm among Green Bay's backs, but only Ahman Green (Oct. 17 at Detroit) and Tony Fisher (Oct. 24 vs. Dallas) have thrown passes this season, both for TDs.

▶ Including Green and Fisher, four players have thrown for TDs, the most by a Packers team since the 1987 strike year. The last time four Packers threw TDs in a non-strike season was Bart Starr's first year as head coach, 1975 — QBs John Hadl, Don Milan and Carlos Brown, and rookie RB Willard Harrell.

LONGWELL CONVERSIONS AUTOMATIC SINCE 2001: Ryan Longwell stands just one PAT from breaking Chris Jacke's franchise record for consecutive conversions. Jacke hit 134 straight from 1990-94. Longwell, 327-for-330 over his career, hasn't missed a PAT since the Browns blocked an attempt at Lambeau Field, Dec. 23, 2001. Entering this weekend, only Tennessee's Gary Anderson (41) has a longer active streak (courtesy Elias Sports Bureau). Mike Vanderjagt saw his 34-kick streak end Nov. 14.

THE STREAK COULD BE 43: Favre has actually thrown for a TD in 42 of his last 43 games, since Jan. 6, 2002. On Oct. 20, 2002, LaVar Arrington sacked him and sprained the quarterback's lateral collateral ligament, forcing him from that game. Had Favre remained and thrown for a TD, he could've challenged Unitas late this year. - **ONE PLAY CAN TURN AROUND SEASON:** Ultimately, the Packers' fourgame losing streak began with one play. And, the season turned around with another play in the Oct. 17 win at Detroit.
- ▶ On Sept. 19 vs. Chicago, with Green Bay poised to take a 10-7 lead on first-and-goal from the Bears' 2, Brian Urlacher pierced the Packers' blocking scheme, stripped Ahman Green and Mike Brown returned the fumble 95 yards for a touchdown. Green Bay never recovered, and lost, 21-10, launching their four-game slide.
- ▶ On Oct. 17, Darren Sharper picked off Joey Harrington and, knowing already that defensive scores usually win NFL games, leaped over Dominic Raiola on a passionate return to the end zone. The play, at a crucial time in the third quarter, gave the Packers a 24-10 lead.

LONGWELL & BARKER: Ryan Longwell since Oct. 11 when Bryan Barker began holding for the injured Doug Pederson, is 12-for-13 on FGs and 20-for-20 on PATs, including 50- and 53-yard field goals.

SPEAKING OF BARKER: The veteran has 799 straight punts without a block (his last was with Kansas City, Dec. 12, 1993, at Denver, by Reggie Rivers). That's the second-longest streak in league annals:

FAVRE'S MAGIC NUMBER — 100.0: Elias Sports Bureau, the NFL's official statistician for half a century, never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis. The company implemented the system to reflect efficiency over an entire season, or an entire career.

- Nonetheless, in games when Brett Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 65-6 (.915). They're 37-0 at home (1.000) and 28-6 (.824) on the road.
- Seven of his last nine 100-plus games have come on the road. And, 10 of his last 13 have come in enemy environments.
- Including Sept. 26, four of his six career losses have come in domes. In other words, Favre played well enough to win, and had more bounces gone Green Bay's way, the quarterback could have been just 17-18 in domes (rather than 13-22).
- In 2003, Favre totaled six 100-plus games, and two of them were in domes, a loss at St. Louis and a critical win at Minnesota.
- Two of his six career losses have come in Indv. including Nov. 16. 1997, when he hit 120.4 (18-of-25, 363 yards, three TDs, two INTs) in a 41-38 loss to the Colts.

LONGEST PLAYING STREAKS: Cornerback Al Harris played in his 100th consecutive NFL game Oct. 3. Meanwhile, Mike Flanagan's 82-game streak came to an end when the club placed him on injured reserve Oct. 2 with debilitating knee tendinitis. Longest active Packers playing streaks entering the week:

LAST PLACE FOR FIRST TIME IN 16 YEARS: Earlier in October, the Packers were alone in last place for the first time since 1988.

► The last time Green Bay was alone in last place after at least three games was Dec. 18, 1988, after a season-ending road win over the Phoenix Cardinals. Ironically, that win cost the Packers the No. 1 draft choice in 1989, and instead of Trov Aikman, the team took Tony Mandarich second overall. Had Aikman guided Green Bay rather than Dallas, the Packers may never have acquired Brett Favre.

TURNOVERS TAKE AWAY WINS: The Packers under Mike Sherman are now 33-3 (20-0 at home) when committing one or fewer turnovers.

- ▶ Including three of their six 2004 wins, they're also 12-0 under Sherman in turnover-free games. Over a longer stretch, the team has won 18 straight zero-turnover contests, dating to a loss at Minnesota, Dec. 1, 1997.
- ► Since an Oct. 21, 2001, loss at Minnesota, the Packers have won 24 straight when ahead in turnover margin. Overall under Sherman, the Packers are 34-1 under the same criteria.

GREATEST COMEBACK IN PACKERS HISTORY, KEY WESTERN CONFERENCE PLAYOFF HIGHLIGHT 7-DECADE SERIES WITH

The Packers and the St. Louis Rams, who will make mutual history next week when they meet on the "Monday Night Football" showcase for the first time, have forged more than a few historic adventures over the course of their seven-decade "association"

Curiously, two of the most memorable occurred in Milwaukee - at County Stadium, the Packers' second home from 1953-1994, which since has fallen to the wrecking ball.

Chief among them, without question, was a critical 28-7 victory over the Rams in a 1967 Western Conference playoff which propelled the Packers into the fabled "Ice Bowl" against the Dallas Cowboys, played in Lambeau Field just eight days later.

Close behind, from the historical perspective, was a salutary happening on Sept. 12, 1982.

The Green and Gold, down 23-0 at halftime, proceeded to execute the most dramatic comeback in team annals, erupting for 35 consecutive unanswered points in the second half to depart County Stadium with a 35-23 victory.

From the overall standpoint, the Packers dominated the early years of the series, launched in 1937 when the Rams were based in Cleveland, winning 12 and tying one of the first 14 games (they also have won five of the last seven meetings). But the Rams caught up during the '50s and today lead the series, having won 44 games to the Packers' 39.

There also have been two ties - the most recent a 24-24 standoff at the Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum in 1964 (the Rams became the NFL's first West Coast team when they moved to Los Angeles in 1946).

In addition, there recently has been a second playoff game, a divisional showdown in which the Rams posted a 45-17 victory at St. Louis on Jan. 20, 2002 (The Rams had moved to St. Louis in 1995).

The '67 playoff contest matched the Packers, champions of the NFL's Central Division (9-4-1) and the Rams, the Coastal Division champions (11-1-2), to determine the winner of the Western Conference title. The survivors would advance to the NFL Championship Game against Dallas in what became the "Ice Bowl."

On that occasion, things were more than somewhat chancy for the Packers in the early going, which saw the Rams move out to a 7-0 first quarter lead by way of a 29-yard Roman Gabriel scoring pass to Bernie Casey.

To compound the problem, the Rams again threatened to score early in the second quarter when defensive back Chuck Lamson waylaid a Bart Starr pass and returned it to Green Bay's 10-yard-line.

Fortuitously, premier pass rusher Henry Jordan sacked Gabriel for a 7-yard loss on third down, forcing Los Angeles to attempt a field goal by Bruce Gossett, an effort which was blocked by linebacker Dave Robinson.

One exchange later, rookie running back Travis Williams, who had become a sensation at mid-season, broke into the open over the right side and streaked 46 yards to the end zone, Don Chandler adding the extra point to tie the score at 7.

The Rams also came up empty on their next possession, Gossett's 46-yard field goal attempt falling short, and the Packers' Willie Wood staked the Green and Gold to prime field position, returning the failed kick 44 yards to the Green Bay 45.

From there, Starr had the Packers in the end zone in 7 plays, firing a 17-yard, third-down strike to wide receiver Carroll Dale for the score. Chandler's conversion made it 14-7 at the intermission.

Taking over the game in the second half, the Packers scored on a 4-yard run by running back Chuck Mercein in the third guarter and a 2-yard run

by Williams in the fourth quarter while a tightfisted defense continued to hold the Rams scoreless the rest of the way.

One of the most significant victories in team annals, it set the stage for the Packers to make NFL history by becoming the only team to win three consecutive league championships since the advent of the playoff system in 1933 by defeating the Cowboys for the '67 title in the "Ice Bowl," 21-17.

Behind the scenes, the scheduling of the back-to-back post-season contests spoke volumes about Lombardi's confidence in himself and his football team. As the Packers' general manager, he had assigned the first playoff to Milwaukee, sure in his own mind that the Green and Gold would be in the NFL Championship Game - in Green Bay - eight days later.

The subsequent "comeback classic" in '82 was much like two very different games, with the Rams converting three first half turnovers into 13 points en route to that 23-0 intermission lead.

Overall, two lost fumbles and two Rams interceptions contributed substantially to the Packers' scoreless state at halftime, a point at which they had a modest 66 net yards to show for their efforts.

But things were dramatically different in the second half. Quarterback Lynn Dickey began to hit his receivers with admirable frequency and the defense collaborated by restricting the Rams to "three-and-out" on their first two third-quarter possessions.

After the first such defensive intervention, Dickey guided the Packers 55 yards to their first touchdown of the afternoon, hitting tight end Paul Coffman with a 4-yard strike for the score.

The Green and Gold were even more expeditious on the second possession of the period, winging 47 yards in three plays for the touchdown, set up by Dickey's 42-yard "bomb" to Coffman, which positioned the Packers at the 3-yard line. From there, halfback Eddie Lee Ivery burst into the end zone over right tackle on the next play. And. after Jan Stenerud's second conversion, it was a more reassuring 23-14, but still a long way to go.

A series of four "three-and-outs," two by each team, and a third Dickey interception subsequently intervened before the Packers engineered a decisive breakthrough early in the fourth quarter.

Taking over at their own 34 after Rams placekicker Mike Lansford 's 51-yard field goal attempt veered wide left, Dickey had the home forces in the end zone in four plays, the score coming on a 15-yard pass to wide receiver James Lofton. Stenerud's conversion pared the Rams' lead to two points, 23-21.

Then, right on the heels of that highly favorable development, Rams returner Kermit Alexander fumbled the succeeding kickoff and the Packers' Guy Prather recovered at the Los Angeles 10-yard line.

Dickey needed only one play from there, finding Coffman in the heart of the end zone for the score and sending the Packers into the lead for the first time at the 3:48 mark of the final period.

The suddenly embattled Rams responded with a pair of first downs following the next kickoff but an 8-yard Mike Butler sack of L.A. quarterback Bert Jones stalled the drive.

One exchange later, Packers linebacker George Cumby intercepted a Jones pass and the Packers promptly set about the finishing touches.

Ivery opened the 66-yard drive modestly enough with a 2-yard gain, after which Dickey hit Coffman with a 10-yard pass and running back Mike Meade broke through the middle for a 19-yard advance, "improved" by a 5-yard face mask penalty on the Rams.

Meade next hit left tackle for 3 yards, setting the stage for Ivery to bolt up the middle on a 27-yard draw for the game's final touchdown with 3:06 remaining in the game.

Stenerud then added the Packers' 35th consecutive, unanswered point with his fifth conversion, completing the most remarkable comeback in team annals.
