THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ▶ Two of the NFC's top four teams meet in a late-season battle that now means more to Green Bay, after Philly clinched its division Sunday.
- ▶ The Packers, controllers of their own destiny as leaders of the NFC North, hope to stay inches ahead of the Vikings in Green Bay's quest for a third straight division crown. Minnesota travels to Chicago.
- ▶ Green Bay returns to the site of its 2003 NFC Divisional playoff, a contest it lost, 20-17, in overtime. After leading more than half of regulation, Green Bay gave up a handful of heart-breaking plays, including allowing Philadelphia to convert a fourth-and-26 that arguably prevented a Packers berth in the NFC Championship at Carolina.
- ▶ The Packers bid for a seventh straight win, which would match their longest streak within a season since 1963 (the Packers also won seven in a row in 2002). Green Bay opened this season 1-4.
- ▶ Andy Reid and Mike Sherman, two of the league's few "full-power" head coaches — and two of its most successful since they earned those responsibilities — meet again. In 2000, Sherman got his first NFL win by beating Reid, but the Eagles' coach has taken the last two contests. Sherman and Reid, both former Green Bay tight ends coaches under Mike Holmgren, remain good friends.

NATIONAL TELEVISION: FOX Sports, with play-by-play man Joe Buck, color analysts Troy Aikman and Cris Collinsworth, sideline reporter Pam Oliver, producer Richie Zytontz and director Artie Kempner, will air the game to approximately 83 percent of the country. The crew produces a Packers game for the fifth time this season.

LOCAL RADIO: Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and Larry McCarren (color). The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on packers.com.

NATIONAL RADIO: The Sports USA Radio Network, with Josh Lewin (play-by-play), Gino Torretta (color) and Ari Wolfe (sideline).

LIONS, JAGUARS KICKOFFS MOVED: The NFL Monday granted FOX and CBS requests to move three December kickoffs on the league schedule, and two of them involve the Packers.

- ▶ The Packers will now highlight the key late-afternoon half of the FOX doubleheader **Dec. 12 vs. Detroit**. That game will now kick off at **3:15 CST**, rather than noon.
- ▶ One week later, **Dec. 19 vs. Jacksonville**, the Packers-Jaguars contest also will kick off at **3:15 CST**, serving as the marquee late-afternoon game in the CBS doubleheader.
- ▶ The moves mean that in 12 of their first 15 games, the Packers will have played in front of a network's No. 1 audience in its particular time slot, including the critical late-season kickoffs the league just moved.

SOMETHING'S GOTTA GIVE: Sunday's game pits the NFC's second-ranked red-zone offense (Green Bay, 65.7 percent) against the conference's No. 1 red-zone defense (Philadelphia, 37.5 percent).

THE STRETCH RUN: Since Mike Sherman became head coach in 2000, the Packers own one of the NFL's best records over the crucial second half.

- ▶ Green Bay's .895 winning percentage (17-2) Dec. 1 and later ranks first in the NFL since 2000. One of the prime contributors to that record? Turnover ratio. Green Bay is plus-32 in 19 regular-season games under Sherman Dec. 1 and later. Top records, 2000-03.

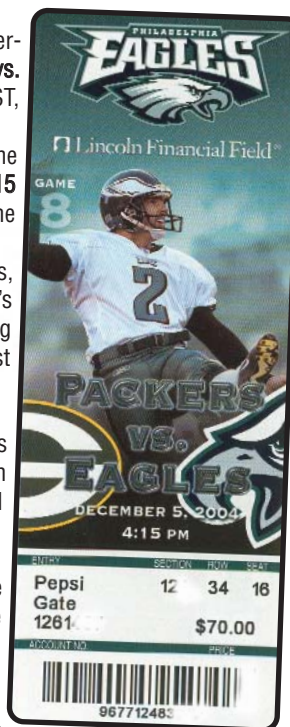

GREEN BAY AVENGERS: Over the last two years (2003-04), the Packers are 4-0 when given the opportunity to avenge a painful loss from the previous season. This week, Green Bay again has the opportunity to erase fresh memories of a disappointing decision.

- ▶ In 2003, the NFL sent the Packers back to Tampa Bay, where they lost a heated 2002 battle, 21-7, in which Warren Sapp blindsided Chad Clifton. The Packers won the much-anticipated 2003 rematch, 20-13.
- ▶ Given a chance to redeem themselves after a 2002 loss that may have cost them home-field advantage in the '02 playoffs, the Packers returned to Minnesota in 2003 and posted an all-important 30-27 win.
- ▶ This season, the Packers avenged painful 2003 losses by winning at Detroit (Oct. 17) and vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14). Detroit upset Green Bay on Thanksgiving, 2003, and the Vikings ruined Lambeau Field's 2003 rededication game.





PACKER AVENUE: No doubt, Green Bay's road runs through Philadelphia — literally.

- ▶ A stone's throw north of the Eagles' NovaCare Complex and their game-day home, Lincoln Financial Field, is a street precariously named Packer Avenue. Just outside the stadium on I-95, a large green sign directs drivers to the exit.
- ▶ No question, diehard Eagles fans who live and work on the street have to feel somewhat awkward every day this week. And the torture might have been worse had Green Bay pulled off an upset in last season's play-offs.
- ▶ Not knowing that more than a century-and-a-half later, their hometown football team would battle a fledgling conference rival named "Packers," the city of Philadelphia named the street after William Fisher Packer, a former newspaper publisher, railroad president, canal commissioner and governor of Pennsylvania.
- ▶ Mr. Packer, whose ancestors were Quakers, denounced the secession of South Carolina in his final address as governor in 1861.
- ▶ In 1865, another Packer — Asa Packer — founded Lehigh University in Bethlehem, Pa., the Eagles' summer training-camp home for several years.

A PAIR OF DEFENSIVE SCORES: The Packers Monday night posted multiple defensive touchdowns in the same game for the first time since Oct. 2, 1983. The Packers have researched defensive scores since 1950 and can't find another game in which the team returned more than one fumble for a touchdown.

SHORT-WEEK RECORD: Even more than his solid record on *Monday Night Football*, GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman said earlier this year he feels better about his team's record the week after; Green Bay has won nine of its last 10 after playing Monday night.

- ▶ Under Mike Sherman (2000-04), the Packers are 9-2; their only losses were a 2000 setback at Tampa Bay and this year, Sept. 19 vs. Chicago.
- ▶ Brett Favre (1992-2004) is 20-6, including a 10-2 mark at home, the week after playing Monday night.
- ▶ The Packers launched their current winning streak with a short-week victory, Oct. 17 at Detroit.

TEAM & INDIVIDUAL TRENDS:

- ▶ During their six-game winning streak, the Packers have trailed for just 35 minutes and 22 seconds. They have not trailed in four of the six.
- ▶ Green Bay's offense has at least 400 yards in three straight contests, and six of the last seven.
- ▶ The Packers have 21 touchdown drives of at least 70 yards, and eight of at least 80 yards.
- ▶ In road games, the Packers have won eight consecutive games when scoring first. Under Mike Sherman on the road, the Packers are 16-3 when drawing first blood, and 36-8 overall.
- ▶ In regular-season road games on grass, the Packers have won seven straight. Their last loss was Sept. 21, 2003, at Arizona.
- ▶ Green Bay's defense **on the road** has forced a punt on six consecutive possessions, including three straight "three-and-outs." Over the six series, the Packers have allowed just 58 yards.
- ▶ The Packers have 17 sacks over their six-game winning streak. During their four straight losses (Sept. 19-Oct. 11), they had five sacks.
- ▶ Green Bay's top-ranked offensive line hasn't allowed a sack over its last 112 passing plays, and one over its last 157. On third down, the unit hasn't allowed a sack since 2003.
- ▶ Green Bay's 38 points scored on its opening second-half possessions is tied with Minnesota for first in the NFL.
- ▶ The Packers have scored a touchdown in 72 consecutive games; the team could tie the franchise record of 75 games (1992-97) in Game 14. The last team to hold Green Bay without a touchdown was Philadelphia, Sept. 17, 2000 — Mike Sherman's first NFL victory, 6-3.
- ▶ **Brett Favre** during the six-game winning streak has completed 67.8 percent of his passes (139-for-205), for 1,638 yards with 13 touchdowns

MIKE SHERMAN...Is in his fifth year as Packers head coach, and fourth as executive vice president and general manager. Sherman also:

- ▶ Earned his 50th career win Nov. 14, tied with Mike Martz for 18th fastest in NFL history and second in Green Bay annals to Lombardi.
- ▶ Inspired his players with a passionate speech on the eve of an Oct. 17 win at Detroit. The Packers, 1-4 at the time, haven't lost since.
- ▶ After Tom Rossley underwent a heart angioplasty Oct. 12, stepped forward and has served as primary play caller since.
- ▶ A Red Sox fan since his youth, is hoping Green Bay can rebound from an early deficit the way Boston did in climbing out of a three-game hole to defeat the Yankees, and eventually win the World Series.
- ▶ Became the last active head coach (minimum one season) to experience a three-game losing streak, on Oct. 3.
- ▶ Is now 6-0 against teams that played in the Super Bowl the previous season, including Sept. 13 at Carolina.
- ▶ Since 1970, only George Siefert, Chuck Knox and Joe Gibbs have posted a better regular-season mark over their first four years.

ANDY REID...Clinched a fourth consecutive division title Sunday. Locked up the division in his 11th game, tied with Mike Ditka (1985 Bears) and Steve Mariucci (1997 49ers) for fastest since the advent of the 16-game schedule in 1978. The Packers did it in a 12th game in 2002.

- ▶ Sunday also marked Reid's 66th career win, tying him with Greasy Neale for No. 1 among Eagles coaches.
- ▶ Spent seven seasons as a Green Bay assistant under Mike Holmgren (tight ends/assistant offensive line 1992-96, quarterbacks 1997-98). One of six current head coaches who previously coached in Green Bay (also Detroit's Steve Mariucci, Green Bay's Mike Sherman, the Giants' Tom Coughlin, Seattle's Mike Holmgren and Tampa Bay's Jon Gruden).
- ▶ Two-time NFL Coach of the Year (2000, 2002).
- ▶ During his 13-year coaching career, his teams have clinched playoff berths 10 times, including 2004. Has coached in two Super Bowls (both with Green Bay) and six NFC Championship games.
- ▶ First met Holmgren at BYU when Reid was an offensive tackle and Holmgren a Cougars assistant. After 10 seasons as a college coach, Reid received his first NFL coaching job from Holmgren in 1992.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.



THE PACKERS-EAGLES SERIES:

- ▶ Streaks: Philadelphia has taken the last two, and three of the last five.
- ▶ The Packers have not won in the City of Brotherly Love since 1962. They've lost six straight, including the 2003 playoffs.
- ▶ These clubs first met in 1933, the Eagles' inaugural year in the NFL.
- ▶ Mike Sherman earned his first NFL victory against the Eagles, a 6-3 decision, Sept. 17, 2000, at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Philadelphia was the only team to defeat Lombardi in a postseason game. The Eagles edged the Packers, 17-13, at Franklin Field for the 1960 NFL championship. The legendary coach won a league-record nine straight playoff games after that loss.
- ▶ Before that 1960 game, the Packers had won 13 of the teams' first 14 meetings, including the first nine in a row (1933-46).
- ▶ Including the 2003 NFC Divisional playoff, Brett Favre is 4-5 career against Philadelphia. He's 0-3 on the road.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS: The Packers acquired Al Harris and the Eagles' fourth-round pick in 2003 for Green Bay's second-round selection in the same draft...Philadelphia assistant head coach Marty Mornhinweg spent two seasons (1995-96) on Green Bay's coaching staff...Eagles defensive coordinator Jim Johnson is one of several former assistants under Vince Tobin, now with the Packers, who went on to become an NFL coordinator; the list also includes Dave McGinnis, Dom Capers, Larry Marmie and Vic Fangio...Tobin also coached for the Philadelphia-Baltimore Stars of the USFL...Offensive coordinator Brad Childress spent 1991-98 on the University of Wisconsin coaching staff, where he tutored Darrell Bevell, now Green Bay's quarterbacks coach...Eagles quarterbacks coach Pat Shurmur is the nephew of the late Packers defensive coordinator, Fritz Shurmur...Philadelphia college scout Terry Mickens played four years with the Packers...Running back Dorsey Levens spent his first eight seasons (1994-2001) in Green Bay...Linebacker Nate Wayne played three years (2000-02) for the Packers...Green Bay running backs coach Johnny Roland spent three seasons (1976-78) on the Eagles' staff.

LAST MEETING (AP): Jan. 11, 2004, Lincoln Financial Field, 2003 NFC Divisional playoff, Eagles won in overtime, 20-17.

- ▶ Donovan McNabb and the Eagles prevailed as Brian Dawkins' interception of a high Brett Favre pass set up David Akers' winning field goal.
- ▶ With the Eagles trailing 17-14 and 1:12 left in regulation, McNabb breathed life into his team with a 28-yard completion to Freddie Mitchell on a fourth-and-26. That, in turn, led to a 37-yard field goal by Akers that sent the game into overtime.
- ▶ McNabb set a playoff record for quarterbacks by rushing for 107 yards, throwing for 248 yards and two touchdowns — 355 total yards.
- ▶ The win put the Eagles into their third straight NFC title game. The Packers headed back to Green Bay after winning seven of eight, including three straight since Brett Favre's father died just before Christmas. This was the Packers' second straight playoff overtime game; the week prior they beat Seattle at home on Al Harris' interception return.
- ▶ The Packers led 14-7 at halftime, but the Eagles had the momentum after stopping Green on fourth down from the 1-yard line late in the second quarter.
- ▶ Green Bay scored twice in the first quarter on passes of 40 and 17 yards from Favre to Robert Ferguson, the first set up by McNabb's fumble.
- ▶ The Eagles countered midway through the second quarter on McNabb's 7-yard TD pass to Duce Staley.
- ▶ Favre's 180 yards moved him ahead of Dan Marino into third on the career playoff passing list. He also extended his NFL record, throwing for a TD in a 15th straight playoff game.

- ▶ **Javon Walker** has caught at least one pass in 28 straight games and 38 of the last 39. The last time he went without a reception was vs. Buffalo, Dec. 22, 2002, a 10-0 win dominated by defense.
- ▶ Physical, aggressive **Al Harris** has 12 passes defended in his last four games.

TOUGH AFTER THE BYE: Counting the single games immediately following bye weeks, the Packers have won eight of their last nine, including crucial victories over Minnesota the last two years.

- ▶ In 2003, Green Bay went 7-2 (.778) after the bye. Only three teams posted better marks, including the Super Bowl champion Patriots.
- ▶ Since 2000, when Mike Sherman began coaching the Packers, only one franchise owns a better record over the balance of its respective season following bye weeks:

Eagles got ball rolling in Favre trade chronology

April 21, 1991 — On Day 1 of the '91 NFL draft, the Philadelphia Eagles strike a deal with Green Bay to move up. Eyeing Tennessee T Antone Davis, the Eagles ship their '91 first-round choice (19th overall) to Green Bay for the Packers' first-rounder (eighth overall). Philadelphia gets Davis, and the Packers use the Eagles' No. 19 to snag CB Vinnie Clark from Ohio State. The Packers' Tom Braatz and Lindy Infante don't consummate the trade until Philadelphia agrees to throw in its first-round pick in the 1992 draft...

Later, in Round 2, the Falcons select Brett Favre 33rd overall, breaking the hearts of several teams, including the Jets...Ron Wolf, heading the Jets personnel department, chooses QB Browning Nagle with the next choice, 34th.

Nov., 1991 — Braatz is relieved on Nov. 20. One week later, the Packers hire Wolf and give him full control of Green Bay football operations.

Dec. 1, 1991 — Green Bay's first game after Wolf's hiring is a trip to Fulton County Stadium. Before a 35-31 loss, in pregame warmups, Wolf scouts Favre, the player he missed by one pick in the draft seven months earlier with the Jets.

Feb. 10, 1992 — In his second trade as Packers general manager, Wolf takes the choice acquired in '91 from Philadelphia (17th overall, the Eagles were 10-6 in 1991) and sends it to Atlanta for Favre...

The Falcons later traded that 17th pick to Dallas for the Cowboys' first-round position (19th) and fourth-round choice (104th) in the same draft; Dallas chose CB Kevin Smith from Texas A&M with its pick acquired from Atlanta, through Green Bay; the Falcons chose Favre's former Southern Mississippi teammate Tony Smith (RB) at No. 19 and selected CB Frankie Smith from Baylor at No. 104.

- ▶ "Packers 5th Quarter," also to be archived on packers.com, features Wayne Larrivee, the team's radio play-by-play voice, and WFRV's Burke Griffin, who will recap the day's highlights and interview one of the Packers players inside Curly's Pub in the Lambeau Field Atrium. Keep checking back as packers.com is currently building an archive for both "The Mike Sherman Show" and the "Packers 5th Quarter."
- ▶ "G-TV" is a weekly in-season television program produced by the Green Bay Packers designed especially for kids. Some "G-TV" highlights include: player profiles, exclusive player interviews, up close looks at trainers & equipment managers.
- ▶ The most recent video clips can be accessed directly from the home page by clicking on the "VIDEO" tab in the middle of the page, or by visiting the packers.com video archive by clicking on "Multimedia" and then "Video" on the left-side navigation bar. A pull-down menu is available at the top of that page to direct fans to different video categories.

IT'S A PACKERS QB-COACH REUNION: Sunday's game features four of the six individuals who've ever held the title of Brett Favre's Packers quarterbacks coach. Comparing Favre's numbers under each of the coaches shows how he has improved over time, and continues to improve, despite his age.

MORE ACCURATE WITH AGE: Brett Favre played nine NFL seasons and won three MVPs and a Super Bowl before he worked with Tom Rossley and Darrell Bevell. However, Green Bay's passing offense was never more consistently accurate than it has been over the last five seasons under the two coaches.

- ▶ In Bevell's first year as QB coach, 2003, Green Bay established a franchise record for completion percentage.
- ▶ In 2004, Favre could finish above 65 percent in two consecutive seasons for the first time in his 14-year career.

REID IS MOST SUCCESSFUL GRANDKID AGAINST GREEN BAY: Mike Holmgren's former Packers coaches who've gone on to earn head coaching posts are nicknamed "the grandkids."

- ▶ In that family tree, which traces its roots to Bill Walsh and Paul Brown, only Andy Reid has a winning record against the Packers.
- ▶ Including playoffs, Reid is 2-1, Jon Gruden is 1-2, Steve Mariucci is 2-8, Dick Jauron was 2-8 and Marty Mornhinweg was 0-4.
- ▶ Holmgren himself is 1-2 against Green Bay since leaving for Seattle in 1999.
- ▶ Since 1997, former Packers coaches (including Tom Coughlin) are 8-27 against Green Bay.

THE STREAK, BY THE NUMBERS: Over his first 200 starts in his NFL-record quarterback streak, Brett Favre has completed 4,174 of 6,781 passes for 48,125 yards, 366 TDs and 217 interceptions, and compiled a 132-68 record (continued, next page).

- ▶ During the streak, he has completed TD passes to 36 different targets, including 57 to Antonio Freeman, a franchise-record for a quarterback-receiver combination.
- ▶ He has started in 38 stadiums, including debuts at FedEx Field (Oct. 31) and Reliant Stadium (Nov. 21) in his last two road games. Of those 38, 15 are either no longer standing or no longer in use by an NFL team. He's thrown for a TD in 33 of the venues.
- ▶ Eleven former backups have gone on to start for another NFL team.

ONCE EVERY 60 YEARS: What were the chances that Sherman's decision to punt in the fourth quarter of the Packers' Divisional playoff loss was not the "correct" call? Well, David Dolan, assistant professor of mathematics at the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay, using available NFL data estimated the odds of converting a fourth-and-26 play at that time were 1 in 339. Dolan and his colleagues estimate a play like that would occur once every 60 years.

REBOUND PERCENTAGE: Since 1993, no other team has proven more resilient after playoff losses. Over the previous 10 seasons (1993-2002), the lifetime of the salary cap and free agency, the Packers have the best postseason "rebound percentage:"

- ▶ Only once in seven opportunities during that period have the Packers failed to answer a playoff loss with a return to the postseason — an .857 percentage, best in the NFL.

- ▶ Green Bay has compiled that rebound percentage during an era when nearly half of postseason clubs miss the playoffs the following season. Of the 120 playoff teams from 1993-2002, 56 (46.7 percent) didn't reach the playoffs the next year. Even the Patriots missed the playoffs following their Super Bowl XXXVI championship.

GET WELL SOON, BUD: The Green Bay Packers organization sends get-well wishes to Bud Lea of the *Milwaukee Journal Sentinel*. Lea, released last week from Columbia St. Mary's Hospital-Ozaukee, was treated several weeks for an illness. He is in his 50th season covering the Packers.

CONSECUTIVE LAST-SECOND KICKS:

The last time Green Bay won two straight contests on field goals as time expired, 9-year-old Ryan Longwell was in elementary school.

- ▶ Near the end of 1983, eventual Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud turned away consecutive opponents with last-second field goals.
- ▶ His 19-yarder beat the Bears, 31-28, at Lambeau Field Dec. 4. Lynn Dickey's improbable 67-yard pass to James Lofton, another Hall of Famer, set up that win.
- ▶ One week later, Dec. 12 at Tampa Bay, Stenerud booted a 23-yarder in overtime to sink the Bucs, 12-9. Dickey took the extra period's opening kickoff and drove 65 yards in 11 plays before the field goal.

▶ According to Elias Sports Bureau, the last NFL team to win consecutive games on last-second field goals was Philadelphia, Nov. 5-12, 2000.

INCREDIBLE COMEBACK: The Packers Nov. 21 rallied from a deficit of at least 10 points to win a road game for the first time in 14 years. On Nov. 18, 1990, Anthony Dilweg replaced an injured Don Majkowski and erased a 21-10 fourth-quarter deficit to win at Phoenix, 24-21.

STRETCHING THE FIELD AT UNPRECEDENTED PACE: Brett Favre from Oct. 11-Nov. 21 connected on a pass of at least 44 yards in six consecutive games, by far the longest streak of his career.

KGB ON STREAK OF HIS OWN: Persistent Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila has a four-game sack streak, with five sacks in his last three games.

▶ With a sack Monday night, he matched the longest streak of his career, when he began turning heads with a four-game sack streak, Sept. 9-Oct. 7, 2001.

NFC'S LONGEST WINNING STREAK: Green Bay is the hottest team in the NFC with a six-game winning streak. Only Pittsburgh (nine) has a longer streak.

BEIGHTOL'S LINE & 1,000-YARD RUSHERS: Larry Beightol's offensive line, if Ahman Green gains 121 yards rushing, will have blocked for a 1,000-yard rusher in six consecutive seasons, and establish a franchise record (five, 1960-64). The next comparable streak was three (1971-73).

▶ The Packers offensive line helped Dorsey Levens to the barrier in 1999, and Green over the last four seasons (2000-03).

▶ Beightol would break Bill Austin's Packers record among O-line coaches; Austin's unit, which executed the "run to daylight" Lombardi Sweep, recorded five individual 1,000-yard rushing seasons (Jim Taylor, 1960-64).

LAST WEEK: Postgame notes from Green Bay's 45-17 win over St. Louis Monday night at Lambeau Field:

- ▶ The Packers posted a season-high three takeaways and forced a season-high three fumbles, recovering two of them (both for touchdowns). The fumble recoveries were their first since Week 2.
- ▶ Brett Favre made his 200th consecutive start and reached 20 TD passes on the season and surpassed Dan Marino's NFL record for most consecutive seasons with at least 20. Marino did it 10 straight years, from 1983-92. Favre's now done it 11 straight years (1994-2004).
- ▶ Favre earned Monday night victory No. 17, surpassing No. 2 Steve Young (16) on the all-time list. Dan Marino had 20.
- ▶ All six of Donald Driver's catches were for first downs.
- ▶ Favre also claimed Warren Moon's No. 3 spot (6,823) on the NFL's all-time pass attempts list. Favre enters the week with 6,839.
- ▶ Bubba Franks surpassed No. 4 Rich McGeorge (175) on the team's all-time tight ends reception list. Franks enters the week with 177.
- ▶ Franks also surpassed No. 2 Ed West (25) on the team's all-time tight ends TD list. Franks enters the week with 26.
- ▶ Ryan Longwell's current PAT streak surpassed No. 1 Chris Jacke (134, 1990-94) in Packers history. Entering the week, Longwell has hit 140 straight, dating to Dec. 23, 2001.
- ▶ Darren Sharper made career start No. 100.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR SUNDAY & IN COMING WEEKS —

BRETT FAVRE:

- ▶ Will play in a 203rd consecutive game (222 including playoffs) and make his 201st consecutive start (220 including playoffs), 85 more than the next-closest streak on the all-time quarterbacks list, 116 by Ron Jaworski (1977-84).
- ▶ Can extend his streak of games with a TD pass to 37, the NFL's second-longest streak behind Johnny Unitas' 47-game stretch (1956-60), one of the most revered marks in sports history.
- ▶ Needs 159 passing yards to register a 13th **overall** 3,000-yard season and tie Dan Marino (13) for most all-time. John Elway also had 12. Favre would extend his record for **consecutive** 3,000-yard seasons to 13.

AHMAN GREEN:

- ▶ Needs 121 yards rushing to post a fifth 1,000-yard season and tie Jim Taylor's franchise record (both overall and consecutive, Taylor also did it five straight years, 1960-64).
- ▶ Needs 46 carries for 1,500 career.
- ▶ Needs two rushing TDs for 50 career.
- ▶ Needs four rushing TDs to surpass No. 2 Paul Hornung (50) on the all-time franchise list. Green enters the week with 47.
- ▶ Needs two overall TDs to tie No. 4 Paul Hornung (62) on the all-time Green Bay list. Green enters the week with 60.
- ▶ Needs five receptions to surpass No. 1 Dorsey Levens (271) on the Packers' all-time list among backs. Green enters the week with 267. William Henderson enters with 270.

WILLIAM HENDERSON:

- ▶ If Ahman Green gains 121 yards rushing, Henderson would break Howard Griffith's NFL record among fullbacks by blocking for a 1,000-yard rusher in a seventh overall season. Griffith blocked for Terrell Davis, Olandis Gary, Mike Anderson, Anthony Johnson and Jerome Bettis.
- ▶ Needs two receptions to surpass No. 1 Dorsey Levens (271) on the Packers' all-time list among backs. Henderson enters the week with 270. Ahman Green enters with 267.

RYAN LONGWELL:

- ▶ Needs two field goals for 200 career.

DARREN SHARPER:

- ▶ Needs one touchdown to surpass both Bobby Dillon and Doug Hart (five) for second on the team's defensive TD list. Herb Adderley leads with seven defensive TDs. Sharper enters the week with five.

JAVON WALKER:

- ▶ Needs 5 receiving yards for 2,000 career.
- ▶ Needs 40 yards to record his first career 1,000-yard sea-

son. Would become only the second 1,000-yard receiver in Green Bay under Mike Sherman (also Donald Driver in 2002).

ANOTHER NAME JOINS THE QB LIST: Drew Henson Nov. 25 became the seventh quarterback to make his first NFL start this season, joining the Giants' Eli Manning (Nov. 21), Chicago's Craig Krenzel (Oct. 31), Tampa Bay's Chris Simms (Oct. 10), Pittsburgh's Ben Roethlisberger (Sept. 26), the 49ers' Ken Dorsey (Sept. 19) and Cincinnati's Carson Palmer (Sept. 12).

▶ Henson became the 179th quarterback to start an NFL game since Brett Favre launched his current starting streak, Sept. 27, 1992.

WALKER HONORED: *Pro Football Weekly* named Javon Walker and Terrell Owens its annual mid-season All-Pro wide receivers.

KEEP AN EYE ON THESE DEVELOPMENTS DOWN THE STRETCH:

- ▶ The Packers bid to become only the ninth team in NFL history to make the playoffs after opening 1-4. Each of the eight clubs won its division.
- ▶ Offensively, Green Bay could establish franchise records in five categories: first downs, third-down percentage, total offense, net passing yards and fewest sacks allowed during a 16-game season.
- ▶ Favre could post a fourth 4,000-yard passing season. And, Favre stands 839 passing yards from overtaking No. 3 Warren Moon on the NFL's all-time list.

Best tenures since 1993

In 1993, the NFL adopted its current collective bargaining agreement. That CBA has given pro football more labor peace and prosperity than any major league sport. The compromise gave the owners a salary cap and the players unrestricted free agency. But that agreement has also created parity, challenging front offices and coaches more than any era in history.

Since 1993, NFL teams have experienced 83 coaching moves. And since the dawn of the salary cap and unrestricted free agency, Mike Sherman's .667 winning percentage represents the league's third-most successful tenure. Among those tenures that began 1993 or later, only 30 have posted at least a .500 record over more than one season. The Top 10:

Non-losing season streaks, NFL history

With Miami assured of its first losing season since 1988, Green Bay has the opportunity to record an eighth win this week and assume the NFL's longest active streak of non-losing seasons. In 2001, the Packers captured the NFC's longest active streak, now 12. Green Bay's last sub-.500 campaign was 1991 (4-12). The Packers, who've now accomplished it three times, are the only team ever to do it more than twice (and that does not include the Lombardi era)...

- ▶ Javon Walker (960) and Donald Driver (804) are on pace to become the first set of 1,000-yard Packers receivers since 1999 (Antonio Freeman, Bill Schroeder) and only the third overall (also Freeman and Robert Brooks in 1997).
- ▶ Walker could snap Brooks' 1995 single-season franchise record of 1,497 receiving yards.

STONEWALL JACKSON: Since Mike Sherman claimed Grady Jackson on waivers Nov. 4, 2003, the Packers are 12-2 in Jackson's games.

- ▶ In those 14 games, Green Bay has allowed just 3.8 yards per carry (308 rushes, 1,173 yards).
- ▶ Since Jackson joined the club, in five games without him (all in 2004), the Packers are 1-4, allowing 5.2 yards per carry (138-for-711).

SCHEDULE BREAKDOWN: The midseason bye week was another bonus the Packers received from the schedule makers. Green Bay has made up ground after a 1-4 start, capitalizing so far on its gift of an early schedule that did not include many games with playoff tiebreaker implications. The club's remaining five games look like this:

- ▶ Three of their six head-to-head contests against division foes, including a rematch with the Vikings, remain in front of the Packers. Green Bay is 2-1 against the division.
- ▶ Four of the 12 games within the conference remain. The Packers are 6-2 against the NFC.
- ▶ Two of their four AFC contests were played in the first five weeks.

WITH AN 11-POINT LEAD: The Packers under Sherman are 36-2 with a lead of at least 11 points, at any point in the game, including five of their seven wins in 2004.

ON THE ROAD: The Packers (4-1) are tied with New England, Pittsburgh and Atlanta for the league's second-best road record, behind Philadelphia (5-1). Top road records over the last two, three and four seasons:

ANOTHER ELECTION PUTS STREAK IN PERSPECTIVE: Since Brett Favre launched his 200-game starting streak Sept. 27, 1992, people have moved from cassettes to CDs and 1 billion people went "on-line." The streak has encompassed the rise and fall of Martha Stewart, Beanie Babies, Ross Perot, Celine Dion and Y2K. Over the last 12-plus years, *The Bridges of Madison County*, *The Client* and *Cold Mountain* have gone from the best-seller list to the big screen to the video rental store. And, sandwiched within the streak are the O.J. Simpson trial, the first and last episodes of NBC's hit series *Friends* and Bill Clinton's two terms in office.

▶ In fact, Nov. 2 marked the fourth time during Favre's streak Americans have gone to the polls to vote for President. Clinton defeated George Bush (1992), won a second term over Bob Dole and Ross Perot (1996), George W. Bush beat Al Gore (2000) and won another term Nov. 2 (2004), defeating John Kerry.

SANDLOT FOOTBALL: Najeh Davenport says he has the best arm among Green Bay's backs, but only Ahman Green (Oct. 17 at Detroit) and Tony Fisher (Oct. 24 vs. Dallas) have thrown passes this season, both for TDs.

▶ Including Green and Fisher, four players have thrown for TDs, the most by a Packers team since the 1987 strike year. The last time four Packers threw TDs in a non-strike season was Bart Starr's first year as head coach, 1975 — QBs John Hadl, Don Milan and Carlos Brown, and rookie RB Willard Harrell.

LONGWELL CONVERSIONS AUTOMATIC SINCE 2001: Ryan Longwell Nov. 29 eclipsed Chris Jacke's franchise record for consecutive PAT conversions. Jacke hit 134 straight from 1990-94. Longwell, 333-for-336 over his career, hasn't missed a PAT since the Browns blocked an attempt at Lambeau Field, Dec. 23, 2001. - ▶ Including four of their seven 2004 wins, they're also 13-0 under Sherman in turnover-free games. Over a longer stretch, the team has won 19 straight zero-turnover contests, dating to a loss at Minnesota, Dec. 1, 1997.
- ▶ Since an Oct. 21, 2001, loss at Minnesota, the Packers have won 25 straight when ahead in turnover margin. Overall under Sherman, the Packers are 35-1 under the same criteria.

FAVRE'S MAGIC NUMBER — 100.0: Elias Sports Bureau, the NFL's official statistician for half a century, never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis. The company implemented the system to reflect efficiency over an entire season, or an entire career.

- ▶ Nonetheless, in games when Brett Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 66-6 (.917). They're 38-0 at home (1.000) and 28-6 (.824) on the road.
- ▶ Seven of his last 10 100-plus games have come on the road. And, 10 of his last 14 have come in enemy environments.
- ▶ Including Sept. 26, four of his six career losses have come in domes. In other words, Favre played well enough to win, and had more bounces gone Green Bay's way, the quarterback could have been just 17-18 in domes (rather than 13-22).
- ▶ In 2003, Favre totaled six 100-plus games, and two of them were in domes, a loss at St. Louis and a critical win at Minnesota.
- ▶ Two of his six career losses have come in Indy, including Nov. 16, 1997, when he hit 120.4 (18-of-25, 363 yards, three TDs, two INTs) in a 41-38 loss to the Colts.

LONGEST PLAYING STREAKS: Cornerback Al Harris played in his 100th consecutive NFL game Oct. 3. Meanwhile, Mike Flanagan's 82-game streak came to an end when the club placed him on injured reserve Oct. 2 with debilitating knee tendinitis. Longest active Packers playing streaks entering the week:

LAST PLACE FOR FIRST TIME IN 16 YEARS: Earlier in October, the Packers were alone in last place for the first time since 1988.

- ▶ The last time Green Bay was alone in last place after at least three games was Dec. 18, 1988, after a season-ending road win over the Phoenix Cardinals. Ironically, that win cost the Packers the No. 1 draft choice in 1989, and instead of Troy Aikman, the team took Tony Mandarich second overall. Had Aikman guided Green Bay rather than Dallas, the Packers may never have acquired Brett Favre.



TITLE GAME 'FALL' AT PHILLY SET STAGE FOR PACKERS' DYNASTY OF '60s: 9 PLAYOFF WINS IN ROW (5 NFL TITLES, 2 'SUPER' VICTORIES)

It was the day after Christmas in 1960 and Vince Lombardi was addressing the Packers in the capacious visitors' locker room at Philadelphia's Franklin Field only minutes after their NFL Championship Game against the Eagles had ended.

At that moment, Lombardi was in the process of making a profound promise to his players, who had barely come up short when fullback Jim Taylor was felled at the Philadelphia 8-yard line by Chuck Bednarik as time expired, thereby closing out a 17-13 victory for the Eagles.

"We will never lose another championship game," he vowed.

And thus, in effect, was launched what was to become the greatest post-season dynasty in professional football history.

For Lombardi, never one to make such commitments lightly, was as good as his word.

Fulfilling his Franklin Field "proclamation," he subsequently led the Packers to nine playoff victories - five NFL titles in a seven-year span, beginning with back-to-back championships the next two years (1961-62) and three more in 1965-66-67, two Western Conference triumphs (1965 and 1967) and victories in Super Bowls I and II following the '66 and '67 seasons.

Interspersed among these considerable achievements were a pair of Western Conference playoff triumphs in '65 and '67, successes which enabled the Green and Gold to advance in those postseason tournaments and win two of the five NFL titles captured during that remarkable span.

It remains a decade of dominance without equal in the annals of professional football.

During this memorable stretch, Lombardi also was to preside over what represented revenge of sorts for that '60 championship loss to the Eagles, escorting the Packers to a 49-0 dismantling of the Birds in a 1962 regular season encounter - poetically on the same Franklin Field Turf - and punctuating that triumph by amassing a team-record 628 yards of offense.

Those 49 points remain the most ever scored in one game by either team in the 70-year history of their series, which they will renew in Philadelphia's Lincoln Financial Field next Sunday afternoon.

Although the Packers hold a substantial lead in the all-time rivalry, having won 22 of their 32 meetings, they have not found good fortune in Philly of late, their most recent success in the series having come in that '62 run-away.

Over the 42-year interim, the Eagles have won on home turf on six occasions, including last January's divisional playoff, which saw them pull out a 20-17 victory in sudden death overtime with a 31-yard field goal by David Akers.

Historically, in terms of frustration and competitive importance, however, that near-miss in the '60 title game remains the Green and Gold's biggest disappointment in the 66-year annals of their "association" with the Birds.

Although it clearly was not the result he had anticipated, Lombardi could find no fault with his team's performance. In fact, he assured the Packers had lost no stature in his eyes.

"I'm very proud of our ball club," he said during the quiet dressing room aftermath. "I think they played a great football game. They stayed in there all the way."

At the same time, Vince said he was "happy for Buck," his Eagles coaching opponent, silver-haired Buck Shaw. "Seeing he's going to retire, that's a nice note for him to go out on."



With respect to the outcome, Lombardi asserted, "We just ran out of time," also quipping, "If we could have added a couple of seconds at the end of each half, we would have been all right."

The latter was a reference to the fact that, with fourth down at the Eagles' 2-yard line and only seconds remaining on the clock in the second quarter, Lombardi had followed football logic and opted for a Paul Hornung field goal attempt, rather than gamble on a run for a touchdown, but Hornung's kick had failed.

"Our big trouble was we couldn't cash in our breaks," Lombardi said. "We played well enough defensively to win. We just couldn't bring the ball in and score."

He pinpointed Ted Dean's 58-yard runback of a Hornung kickoff early in the fourth quarter - at which point the Packers led 13-10, as "the big play of the game."

"If it hadn't been for that," he said, "we might have held 'em. That gave them their last score."

Statistically, the Packers had all the better of it, running off 77 plays to the Eagles' 48 offensively and out-yarding them, 401 to 296.

Defensively, the Green and Gold also were more successful, intercepting two passes, recovering two fumbles and forcing six punts. The Eagles, meanwhile, had no interceptions, recovered one fumble and caused five Packers punts.

Two years prior to that '60 misadventure, in fortuitous contrast, the Eagles had unintentionally spared the Packers the ultimate embarrassment - what could have been the lone winless season in their long history.

They had no way of knowing it at the time, since it was only the fifth week of the '58 season, but the Packers' 38-35 win in then "new" City Stadium (Oct. 26) was to be their only victory in a 1-10-1 season, worst in team annals.

From the purely statistical perspective, Green Bay's '62 rout of the Birds was a performance apart. The greatest offensive display in team history, it saw the Green and Gold amass 294 yards rushing and 334 passing in surpassing the 600-yard plateau for the only time in team annals to date.

En route, they scored on seven touchdown drives of 86, 89, 85, 76, 71, 66 and 65 yards. In the process, they ran off 86 plays to Philadelphia's 41 and registered 37 first downs, including 21 rushing, both of the latter totals all-time team records.

The Packers' defense also was in complete control on that remarkable occasion, restricting the Eagles to just 54 net yards, including 30 yards rushing and 24 passing.

Quarterback Bart Starr, the on-field architect of this awesome display, had one of the most productive outings of a distinguished career, completing 15 of 20 passes for 274 yards - 7 each to ends Max McGee and Boyd Dowler for 174 and 101 yards, respectively.

Meanwhile, fullback Jim Taylor, then on his way to a Packers single-season rushing record, ground out 141 yards in 25 attempts while scoring four of Green Bay's seven touchdowns.

Most recently, Packers coach Mike Sherman made personal history by posting his first head-coaching victory in the NFL at the Eagles' expense, presiding over a 6-3 win in Lambeau Field on Sept. 17, 2000.

A claw-and-scratch struggle from start to finish, the Packers ultimately shaded their guests by way of Ryan Longwell's 38-yard field goal with only three seconds remaining in the game.
