THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ▶ The Packers hope for a 14th consecutive win over Detroit in Wisconsin (three wins at Milwaukee County Stadium Green Bay has taken the last 10 at Lambeau Field)...The streak includes five Lions head coaches: Wayne Fontes (1992-96), Bobby Ross (1997-99), Gary Moeller (2000), Marty Mornhinweg (2001-02) and Steve Mariucci (2003)...Green Bay last lost at home to Detroit on Dec. 15, 1991, 21-17 at Lambeau Field; Mike Tomczak and the Packers couldn't keep a 10-7 fourth-quarter lead in 18-below wind chill, and Mel Gray returned a punt 78 yards for a TD.
- ► Green Bay gets its first look at Roy Williams. Detroit's No. 1 draft pick this past spring, Williams suited up but didn't play in the teams' last meeting, Oct. 17, with a sprained ankle. Williams, who faced off against Ahmad Carroll in college, is tied for the lead among NFL rookies in touchdown receptions (5) and points (30) despite missing two games due to injury.
- ▶ The Packers can win an eighth game and guarantee a non-losing season for a 13th consecutive season (1992-2004), a significant accomplshment in the current era of parity, the salary cap and unrestricted free agency. Their current streak of 12 years is the longest active in the NFL, after Miami lost its ninth game Nov. 21 and ended a streak of 15 seasons without a losing record.
- ► The Packers, controllers of their own destiny as leaders of the NFC North, hope to stay inches ahead of the Vikings in Green Bay's quest for a third straight division crown. Minnesota hosts Seattle.

NATIONAL TELEVISION: FOX Sports, with play-by-play man Dick Stockton, color analyst Daryl Johnston, sideline reporter Tony Siragusa, producer Bob Stenner and director Sandy Grossman. The broadcast will go to approximately 80 percent of the country.

LOCAL RADIO: Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and Larry McCarren (color). The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on packers.com.

400-YARD GAMES: Despite struggling Sunday at Philadelphia, the Packers' offense has produced 400 total yards in three of its last four games.

- ►The Packers have eight total 400-yard games in 2004. They had nine over the previous three seasons (2001-03).
- ► The team is on pace for 6,353 yards, which would break the 1983 franchise record, 6,172.
- ► Green Bay needs 1,034 yards to surpass its 2003 total (5,798), the second-most yards in team annals.
- ► Most total yards gained, season:

6,172 1983 (1,807 rushing, 4,365 passing) 5,798 2003 (2,558 rushing, 3,240 passing) 5,780 1989 (1,732 rushing, 4,048 passing) 5,750 1995 (1,428 rushing, 4,322 passing) 5,636 1998 (1,526 rushing, 4,110 passing)

GREEN BAY'S STREAK VS. DETROIT: Take away Green Bay's 1994 playoff win over Detroit, and the Packers' 12 straight regular-season home wins over the Lions ranks tied for second among active NFL streaks (Elias Sports Bureau):

► Longest active streaks, consecutive home wins vs. a single opponent, regular season only:

- 13 *Dallas over Arizona
- 12 *Pittsburgh over San Diego
- 12 Green Bay over Tampa Bay
- 12 Green Bay over Detroit

*—Arizona defeated Dallas at Texas Stadium in 1998 playoffs; San Diego defeated Pittsburgh at Three Rivers Stadium in 1994 playoffs.

WHAT A DIFFERENCE TWO MONTHS MAKE: The last time these clubs met, Oct. 17:

- ▶ Green Bay had lost four straight, and stood in the NFC North cellar at 1-4, its worst start in 13 years. This week, the team is in first place, having won six of its last seven to claim control of its own fate.
- ► The Packers had lost three straight games at Lambeau Field, but since have won three straight.
- ► Green Bay's defense ranked 30th against the run. It enters this week ninth. Green Bay's rushing offense ranked 23rd. It enters this week 10th.

LONGWELL BIDS FOR ANOTHER MILESTONE: Ryan Longwell stands just one field goal from extending his franchise record to 200.

▶ What makes Longwell so impressive is not how he kicks, but where he kicks. At Lambeau Field, the league's toughest venue, weather hounds kickers even early in the season, when challenging wind and rain like to make themselves at home. Longwell's .843 career field-goal percentage at Lambeau Field compared to other kickers in Green Bay during his career (1997-2004):

SACKS HAVE COME BACK: The Packers have awakened their pass rush in recent weeks. In fact, Green Bay has 18 sacks over its last five games. Only two other clubs have more sacks per game since Oct. 31:

FAVRE AT LAMBEAU: Brett Favre this week makes his 100th consecutive start at Lambeau Field (including playoffs).

► At his home stadium, the quarterback has thrown for 175 regular-season TD passes. That's second in NFL history and only five shy of tying the NFL record, 180 by John Elway at Mile High Stadium. Dan Marino threw 155 at Pro Player/Joe Robbie Stadium.

IN THE RED ZONE: Green Bay has captured the NFC's top red-zone touchdown percentage, .658 (25 touchdowns, 38 possessions).

- ► The Packers have scored a touchdown on five of their last six trips inside the red zone.
- ► In the NFL, only the Colts (37-for-52, .712) and Chargers (34-for-50, .680) have enjoyed more success inside the opponent's 20.
- ► Last season, the Packers (34-for-52, .654) ranked first in the NFC and second in the NFL, behind the Chiefs.

ON THIRD DOWN: The Packers (76-for-155) continue to rank second in the league on third down, entering this week with a .490 percentage.

▶ Only the Vikings (.534, 78-for-146) own a better mark.

GOAL-TO-GO: The Packers' defense on Sunday allowed only one touchdown on 13 goal-to-go snaps (three possessions).

► Green Bay on Sunday staged two of its three goal-line stands this season. The Packers have now held opponents out of the end zone on three of 15 goal-to-go series.

Mike Sherman: 52-29-0, .642, fifth NFL season, fifth with Packers Steve Mariucci: 70-61, .534, eighth NFL season, second with Lions

MIKE SHERMAN...Is in his fifth year as Packers head coach, and fourth as executive vice president and general manager. Sherman also:

- ► Earned his 50th career win Nov. 14, tied with Mike Martz for 18th fastest in NFL history and second in Green Bay annals to Lombardi.
- ► Inspired his players with a passionate speech on the eve of an Oct. 17 win at Detroit. The Packers, 1-4 at the time, won six in a row.
- ► After Tom Rossley underwent a heart angioplasty Oct. 12, stepped forward and has served as primary play caller since.
- ► A Red Sox fan since his youth, is hoping Green Bay can rebound from an early deficit the way Boston did in climbing out of a three-game hole to defeat the Yankees, and eventually win the World Series.
- ► Became the last active head coach (minimum one season) to experience a three-game losing streak, on Oct. 3.
- ► Is now 6-0 against teams that played in the Super Bowl the previous season, including Sept. 13 at Carolina.
- ► Since 1970, only George Siefert, Chuck Knox and Joe Gibbs have posted a better regular-season mark over their first four years.

STEVE MARIUCCI...Is in his second season directing the Lions' on-field fortunes, after six years (1997-2002) as head coach of the 49ers. He also:

- ► Served as Brett Favre's first Green Bay position coach (1992-95).
- ► Guided the 49ers to a 60-43 mark and four playoff berths, including his first year at the helm, 1997, when he won 11 consecutive games, most ever by a rookie head coach.
- ▶ Is a native of Iron Mountain, Mich., about two hours from Green Bay.

THE PACKERS-LIONS SERIES: No other NFL teams have played every year since 1932, when the Packers first met the Lions, then known as the Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans. This week marks Game No. 149 in the venerable series. Green Bay has won seven of the last eight meetings, and eight of the last 10.

- ► The Packers look for a 14th consecutive win over Detroit in Wisconsin. The streak includes five Lions head coaches: Wayne Fontes (1992-96), Bobby Ross (1997-99), Gary Moeller (2000), Marty Mornhinweg (2001-02) and Steve Mariucci (2003).
- ►The Lions' three top coaches, head coach Steve Mariucci, defensive coordinator Dick Jauron and offensive coordinator Sherman Lewis, are former Packers assistants. Meanwhile, the Packers' staff includes the last two Lions defensive coordinators: Defensive backs coach Kurt Schottenheimer and special assistant Vince Tobin.
- ► Last Thanksgiving, the Lions held Green Bay to 14 points, the Packers' fewest in the series since Sept. 8, 1991, when Detroit beat Green Bay at the Silverdome, 23-14.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.

- ► The Packers have scored more points against the Detroit franchise than any opponent (3,062). The Packers in 2003 were believed to be the first team to score 3,000 against a single opponent.
- ▶ Before the '03 loss, the Packers had won six straight over Detroit, the longest series winning streak by either team since Detroit won 11 straight from 1949-54.
- ▶ Brett Favre in 25 regular-season games against Detroit is 17-8 with a 90.4 passer rating (570-of-878, 6,701 yards, 45 touchdowns, 31 interceptions). He's also 8-2, including postseason, vs. Mariucci.
- Notable single-opponent career highs vs. Detroit: Donald Driver 32 receptions, 417 receiving yards; Brett Favre 891 attempts, 557 completions, 6,701 yards; Bubba Franks 32 receptions, 320 yards, four TDs.
- Notable single-game career highs vs. Detroit: Donald Driver 11 receptions, 11/10/02 at Lambeau Field; Bubba Franks nine receptions, 62 yards, both 9/22/02 at Ford Field, AND 31-yard reception, 11/22/01, Silverdome; Ryan Longwell nine kickoffs, 11/10/02, Lambeau Field; Torrance Marshall 10 tackles, 11/27/03, Ford Field; Darren Sharper two interceptions (tied), 9/9/01, Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Other notable connections...Defensive line coach Larry Brooks and special teams coach Chuck Priefer were previously assistants on Green Bay staffs...Defensive assistant Johnny Holland played and coached for the Packers...Packers special teams consultant Frank Novak coached the Lions' special teams from 1995-96...Green Bay DT Colin Cole spent one week on Detroit's 53-man roster in 2003, and all of the 2004 preseason with the Lions.

LAST MEETING: Oct. 17, Ford Field, Packers won, 38-10:

- ▶ Brett Favre threw two TD passes and Darren Sharper returned an interception for another score as the Packers launched a six-game winning streak that resurrected their season.
- ▶ On the night before the game, Mike Sherman delivered an emotional team speech that several players, including Sharper, said inspired them to answer their coach's challenge.
- ► Sharper put momentum permanently in Green Bay's hands, returning a third-quarter interception 36 yards for a TD that gave the Packers a 24-10 lead.
- ► Favre, who played in his 197th Packers game and passed Bart Starr for the team record, led the Packers on four touchdown drives.
- ▶ Bob Slowik's defense turned in one of the finest efforts in recent franchise history. Its 125 total yards and five first downs allowed were Green Bay's fewest since the "Snow Bowl," Dec. 1, 1985, vs. Tampa Bay (65 yards, five first downs). Its 40 plays allowed were Green Bay's fewest since Dec. 3, 1972, vs. Detroit (34). The Packers didn't allow a first down in the second half, and didn't allow the Lions inside the Green Bay 30 over Detroit's final nine possessions.
- Donald Driver caught nine passes for 110 yards and tied a career high with two TD catches, one of which came from halfback Ahman Green.

JAGUARS KICKOFF ALSO MOVED: The NFL Nov. 29 granted FOX and CBS requests to move three December kickoffs on the league schedule, and two of them involve the Packers.

- ► The Packers now highlight the key late-afternoon half of the FOX doubleheader **Sunday vs. Detroit**. That game moved back to **3:15** CST, from noon
- ▶ One week later, **Dec. 19 vs. Jacksonville**, the Packers-Jaguars contest also will kick off at **3:15** CST, serving as the marquee late-afternoon game in the CBS doubleheader.
- ▶ The moves mean that in 12 of their first 15 games, the Packers will have played in front of a network's No. 1 audience in its particular time slot, including the critical late-season kickoffs the league just moved. FOX could assign its "A" crew to Green Bay's Jan. 2 season finale, at Chicago, meaning 13 Packers of 16 Packers games would be available to the largest national audience possible.
- ► Since 1996, the league has now moved four Packers kickoffs all from noon to 3:15 p.m. CT (also Cleveland at Green Bay, Dec. 23, 2001; and Green Bay at Tampa Bay, Nov. 24, 2002).

THE STRETCH RUN: Since Mike Sherman became head coach in 2000, the Packers own one of the NFL's best records over the crucial second half.

► Green Bay's .850 winning percentage (17-3) Dec. 1 and later ranks first in the NFL since 2000. One of the prime contributors to that record? Turnover ratio. Green Bay is plus-31 in 20 regular-season games under Sherman Dec. 1 and later. Top records, 2000-04.

A PAIR OF DEFENSIVE SCORES: The Packers Nov. 29 posted multiple defensive touchdowns in the same game for the first time since Oct. 2, 1983. The Packers have researched defensive scores since 1950 and can't find another game in which the team returned multiple fumbles for TDs.

TEAM & INDIVIDUAL TRENDS:

- ▶ During their six-game winning streak that ended Sunday, the Packers trailed for just 35 minutes and 22 seconds. They did not trail in four of the six contests.
- ► Green Bay's offense has at least 400 yards in three of its last four contests, and six of the last eight.
- ► The Packers have 22 touchdown drives of at least 70 yards, and eight of at least 80 yards.
- ► The Packers have scored a touchdown in 73 consecutive games; the team could tie the franchise record of 75 games (1992-97) with TDs this week and next. The last team to hold Green Bay without a touchdown was Philadelphia, Sept. 17, 2000 Mike Sherman's first NFL victory, a 6-3 decision
- ▶ Brett Favre during the six-game winning streak that ended Sunday completed 67.8 percent of his passes (139-for-205), for 1,638 yards with 13 touchdowns and five INTs a 132.0 passer rating
- ► Javon Walker has caught at least one pass in 29 straight games and 39 of the last 40. The last time he went without a reception was vs. Buffalo, Dec. 22, 2002, a 10-0 win dominated by defense.
- ▶ Physical, aggressive Al Harris has 13 passes defensed in his last five games.

DAVENPORT'S EFFORT RANKS HIGH: According to Elias Sports Bureau, over the last 20 seasons (1985-2004), Najeh Davenport's 178 yards rushing Nov. 29 were the third-most by a player in his first NFL start:

THE STREAK, BY THE NUMBERS: Over his first 201 starts in his NFL-record quarterback streak, Brett Favre has completed 4,188 of 6,810 passes for 48,256 yards, 366 TDs and 219 interceptions, and compiled a 132-69 record.

- ▶ During the streak, he has completed TD passes to 36 different targets, including 57 to Antonio Freeman, a franchise-record for a quarterback-receiver combination.
- ► He has started in 39 stadiums, including regular-season debuts at FedEx Field (Oct. 31), Reliant Stadium (Nov. 21) and Lincoln Financial Field (Dec. 5) in his last three road games. Of those 38, 15 are either no longer standing or no longer in use by an NFL team. He's thrown for a regular-season TD in 33 of the venues.
- ► Eleven former backups have gone on to start for another NFL team.
- ▶ Including Luke McCown and John Navarre Sunday, 181 quarterbacks have started for the other 31 NFL franchises. The Bears have used 19, including four this season.
- ▶ Ben Steele Nov. 21 became the 69th player to catch a pass from Favre during the quarterback's streak.

INCREDIBLE COMEBACK: The Packers Nov. 21 rallied from a deficit of at least 10 points to win a road game for the first time in 14 years. On Nov. 18, 1990, Anthony Dilweg replaced an injured Don Majkowski and erased a 21-10 fourth-quarter deficit to win at Phoenix, 24-21.

KGB ON STREAK OF HIS OWN: Persistent Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila Sunday ended a four-game sack streak.

► Nov. 29 vs. St. Louis, he matched the longest streak of his career, when he began turning heads with a four-game streak, Sept. 9-Oct. 7, 2001.

CONSECUTIVE LAST-SECOND KICKS: Ryan Longwell won two straight games, Nov. 14 vs. Minnesota and Nov. 21 at Houston, with field goals at the gun. The last time Green Bay won two straight contests on field goals as time expired, 9-year-old Longwell was in elementary school.

- ► Near the end of 1983, eventual Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud turned away consecutive opponents with last-second field goals.
- ► His 19-yarder beat the Bears, 31-28, at Lambeau Field Dec. 4. Lynn Dickey's improbable 67-yard pass to James Lofton, another Hall of Famer, set up that win.
- ► One week later, Dec. 12 at Tampa Bay, Stenerud booted a 23-yarder in overtime to sink the Bucs, 12-9. Dickey took the extra period's opening kickoff and drove 65 yards in 11 plays before the field goal.
- ► According to Elias Sports Bureau, the last NFL team to win consecutive games on last-second field goals was Philadelphia, Nov. 5-12, 2000.

STRETCHING THE FIELD AT UNPRECEDENTED PACE: Brett Favre from Oct. 11-Nov. 21 connected on a pass of at least 44 yards in six consecutive games, by far the longest streak of his career.

BEIGHTOL'S LINE & 1,000-YARD RUSHERS: Larry Beightol's offensive line, if Ahman Green gains 84 yards rushing, will have blocked for a 1,000-yard rusher in six consecutive seasons, and establish a franchise record (five, 1960-64). The next comparable streak was three (1971-73).

- ► The Packers offensive line helped Dorsey Levens to the barrier in 1999, and Green over the last four seasons (2000-03).
- ► Beightol would break Bill Austin's Packers record among O-line coaches; Austin's unit, which executed the "run to daylight" Lombardi Sweep,

recorded five individual 1,000-yard rushing seasons (Jim Taylor, 1960 64).

LAST WEEK: Postgame notes from Green Bay's 47-17 loss at Philadelphia Sunday at Lincoln Financial Field:

- ► The Eagles snapped a handful of impressive Packers streaks, including the NFC's longest winning streak (six games), Brett Favre's 36 consecutive games with a TD pass (second-longest in NFL history), Green Bay's three straight games without allowing a sack and Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila's four-game sack streak (tied career high).
- ► Favre's 32.4 passer rating marked his lowest in more than 10 years. On Oct. 20, 1994, at Minnesota, he posted a 25.8 rating in a 13-10 loss.
- ▶ Officials awarded 10 first downs by penalty (four to Green Bay, six to Philadelphia), tying the Packers' franchise record. On Oct. 20, 2002, flags also gave the teams Washington (four) and Green Bay (six) 10 first downs.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR SUNDAY & IN COMING WEEKS — BRETT FAVRE:

- ► Will play in a 204th consecutive game (223 including playoffs) and make his 202nd consecutive start (221 including playoffs), 86 more than the next-closest streak on the all-time quarterbacks list, 116 by Ron Jaworski (1977-84).
- ➤ Needs 28 passing yards to register a 13th **overall** 3,000-yard season and tie Dan Marino (13) for most all-time. John Elway also had 12. Favre would extend his record for **consecutive** 3,000-yard seasons to 13.

AHMAN GREEN:

- ► Needs 84 yards rushing to post a fifth 1,000-yard season and tie Jim Taylor's franchise record (both overall and consecutive, Taylor also did it five straight years, 1960-64).
- ▶ Needs 35 carries for 1,500 career.
- ► Needs two rushing TDs for 50 career.
- Needs four rushing TDs to surpass No. 2 Paul Hornung (50) on the alltime Packers list. Green enters the week with 47.
- Needs two overall TDs to tie No. 4 Paul Hornung (62) on the all-time Green Bay list. Green enters the week with 60.
- Needs two receptions to surpass No. 2 Dorsey Levens (271) on the Packers' all-time list among backs. Green enters the week with 270. William Henderson, now No. 1 on the list, enters with 273.

► If Ahman Green gains 84 yards rushing, Henderson would break Howard Griffith's NFL record among fullbacks by blocking for a 1,000-yard rusher in a seventh overall season. Griffith blocked for Terrell Davis, Olandis Gary, Mike Anderson, Anthony Johnson and Jerome Bettis.

RYAN LONGWELL:

- ▶ Needs one field goal for 200 career.
- ► With one point, would score in a 125th consecutive game, extending his franchise record (every game of his career).

DARREN SHARPER:

► Needs one touchdown to surpass both Bobby Dillon and Doug Hart (five) for second on the team's defensive TD list. Herb Adderley leads with seven defensive TDs. Sharper enters the week with five.

ANOTHER TWO NAMES JOIN THE QB LIST: John Navarre and Luke McCown Sunday became the eighth and ninth quarterbacks to make their first NFL start this season, joining the Cowboys' Drew Henson (Nov. 25), the Giants' Eli Manning (Nov. 21), Chicago's Craig Krenzel (Oct. 31), Tampa Bay's Chris Simms (Oct. 10), Pittsburgh's Ben Roethlisberger (Sept. 26), the 49ers' Ken Dorsey (Sept. 19) and Cincinnati's Carson Palmer (Sept. 12).

► McCown and Navarre became the 180th and 181st quarterbacks to start an NFL game since Brett Favre launched his current starting streak, Sept. 27, 1992.

WALKER HONORED: *Pro Football Weekly* named Javon Walker and Terrell Owens its annual mid-season All-Pro wide receivers.

KEEP AN EYE ON THESE DEVELOPMENTS DOWN THE STRETCH:

- ► The Packers bid to become only the ninth team in NFL history to make the playoffs after opening 1-4. Each of the eight clubs won its division.
- ▶ Offensively, Green Bay could establish franchise records in five categories: first downs, third-down percentage, total offense, net passing yards and fewest sacks allowed during a 16-game season.
- ► Favre could post a fourth 4,000-yard passing season. And, Favre stands 708 passing yards from overtaking No. 3 Warren Moon on the NFL's all-time list.
- ▶ Javon Walker (1,032) and Donald Driver (837) are on pace to become the first set of 1,000-yard Packers receivers since 1999 (Antonio Freeman, Bill Schroeder) and only the third overall (also Freeman and Robert Brooks in 1997).
- ► Walker could snap Brooks' 1995 single-season franchise record of 1,497 receiving yards.

WITH AN 11-POINT LEAD: The Packers under Sherman are 36-2 with a lead of at least 11 points, at any point in the game, including five of their seven wins in 2004.

STONEWALL JACKSON: Since Mike Sherman claimed Grady Jackson on waivers Nov. 4, 2003, the Packers are 12-3 in Jackson's games.

- ► In those 15 games, Green Bay has allowed just 3.8 yards per carry (329 rushes, 1,266 yards).
- ► Since Jackson joined the club, in five games without him (all in 2004), the Packers are 1-4, allowing 5.2 yards per carry (138-for-711).

SCHEDULE BREAKDOWN: The midseason bye week was another bonus the Packers received from the schedule makers. Green Bay has made up ground after a 1-4 start, capitalizing so far on its gift of an early schedule that did not include many games with playoff tiebreaker implications. The club's remaining four games look like this:

- Three of their six head-to-head contests against division foes, including a rematch with the Vikings, remain in front of the Packers. Green Bay is 2-1 against the division.
- Three of the 12 games within the conference remain. The Packers are 6-3 against the NFC.
- Two of their four AFC contests were played in the first five weeks.

ANOTHER ELECTION PUTS STREAK IN PERSPECTIVE: Since Brett Favre launched his 200-game starting streak Sept. 27, 1992, people have moved from cassettes to CDs and 1 billion people went "on-line." The streak has encompassed the rise and fall of Martha Stewart, Beanie Babies, Ross Perot, Celine Dion and Y2K. Over the last 12-plus years, *The Bridges of Madison County, The Client* and *Cold Mountain* have gone from the best-seller list to the big screen to the video rental store. And, sandwiched within the streak are the 0.J. Simpson trial, the first and last episodes of NBC's hit series *Friends* and Bill Clinton's two terms in office.

► In fact, Nov. 2 marked the fourth time during Favre's streak Americans have gone to the polls to vote for President. Clinton defeated George

Best tenures since 1993

In 1993, the NFL adopted its current collective bargaining agreement. That CBA has given pro football more labor peace and prosperity than any major league sport. The compromise gave the owners a salary cap and the players unrestricted free agency. But that agreement has also created parity, challenging front offices and coaches more than any era in history.

Since 1993, NFL teams have experienced 83 coaching moves. And since the dawn of the salary cap and unrestricted free agency, Mike Sherman's winning percentage represents the league's third-most successful tenure. Among those tenures that began 1993 or later, only 30 have posted at least a .500 record over more than one season. The Top 10:

INSIDE 40 YARDS: Ryan Longwell has missed three field goals this season and two have hit the goalpost. But under 40 yards, he's hit 41 in a row, since a miss Oct. 7, 2002. Entering this weekend, only Tennessee's Gary Anderson (41) has a comparable active streak (courtesy Elias Sports Bureau). Mike Vanderjagt saw his 34-kick streak end Nov. 14.

LONGWELL & BARKER: Ryan Longwell since Oct. 11 when Bryan Barker began holding for the injured Doug Pederson, is 14-for-15 on FGs and 28-for-28 on PATs, including 50- and 53-yard field goals.

ONE PLAY CAN TURN AROUND SEASON: Ultimately, the Packers' fourgame losing streak began with one play. And, the season turned around with another play in the Oct. 17 win at Detroit.

- ► On Sept. 19 vs. Chicago, with Green Bay poised to take a 10-7 lead on first-and-goal from the Bears' 2, Brian Urlacher pierced the Packers' blocking scheme, stripped Ahman Green and Mike Brown returned the fumble 95 yards for a touchdown. Green Bay never recovered, and lost, 21-10, launching a four-game slide.
- ▶ On Oct. 17, Darren Sharper picked off Joey Harrington and, knowing already that defensive scores usually win NFL games, leaped over Dominic Raiola on a passionate return to the end zone. The play, at a crucial time in the third quarter, gave the Packers a 24-10 lead.

PUNT PROTECTION: The Packers haven't had a punt blocked in more than nine years, since Sept. 11, 1995, at Chicago, where the Bears' Anthony Marshall blocked Craig Hentrich. The streak spans 704 punts.

▶ Josh Bidwell, who signed in March as an unrestricted free agent with Tampa Bay, left with the team's longest individual streak without a block: 308, from 2000-03.

SANDLOT FOOTBALL: Najeh Davenport says he has the best arm among Green Bay's backs, but only Ahman Green (Oct. 17 at Detroit) and Tony Fisher (Oct. 24 vs. Dallas) have thrown passes this season, both for TDs.

▶ Including Green and Fisher, four players have thrown for TDs, the most by a Packers team since the 1987 strike year. The last time four Packers threw TDs in a non-strike season was Bart Starr's first year as head coach, 1975 — QBs John Hadl, Don Milan and Carlos Brown, and rookie RB Willard Harrell.

THE TD-PASS STREAK: Favre saw his streak of games with a TD pass end at 36 on Dec. 5 at Philadelphia. Over a longer stretch, he actually threw for a TD in 43 of 44 games, since Jan. 6, 2002. On Oct. 20, 2002, LaVar Arrington sacked him and sprained the quarterback's lateral collateral ligament, forcing him from that game. Had Favre remained and thrown for a TD, he could've challenged Unitas late this year. LAST PLACE FOR FIRST TIME IN 16 YEARS: Earlier in October, the Packers were alone in last place for the first time since 1988.

▶ The last time Green Bay was alone in last place after at least three games was Dec. 18, 1988, after a season-ending road win over the Phoenix Cardinals. Ironically, that win cost the Packers the No. 1 draft choice in 1989, and instead of Troy Aikman, the team took Tony Mandarich second overall. Had Aikman guided Green Bay rather than Dallas, the Packers may never have acquired Brett Favre.

TURNOVERS TAKE AWAY WINS: The Packers under Mike Sherman are now 34-3 (21-0 at home) when committing one or fewer turnovers.

- ► Including four of their seven 2004 wins, they're also 13-0 under Sherman in turnover-free games. Over a longer stretch, the team has won 19 straight zero-turnover contests, dating to a loss at Minnesota, Dec. 1, 1997.
- ► Since an Oct. 21, 2001, loss at Minnesota, the Packers have won 25 straight when ahead in turnover margin. Overall under Sherman, the Packers are 35-1 under the same criteria.

SHERMAN SINCE 2001: Since he earned the added responsibilities of executive vice president and general manager before the 2001 season, Mike Sherman owns a better mark than all but two other teams:

'55 THRILLER AT 'OLD' CITY STADIUM, PAIR OF '62 BATTLES STAND OUT IN PACKERS' 148-GAME RIVALRY WITH DETROIT

Inevitably, over the 74-year history of the Packers' rivalry with the Detroit Lions, one of the National Football League's oldest and most storied series, there has been a substantial collection of noteworthy battles.

Such as:

- ► A 1993 Wild Card playoff game which saw the Packers pull out a victory in the closing seconds by way of a 40-yard Brett Favre bullseye to wide receiver Sterling Sharpe;
- ► A 1994 Wild Card playoff in which the Packers limited the incomparable Barry Sanders to a minus 1-yard rushing in 13 attempts, one of the most spectacular defensive performances in NFL postseason history; and
- ► Any number of Thanksgiving Day classics, particularly during the '50s and '60s when their holiday collisions in the Motor City were an annual Turkey Day highlight for 13 seasons on national television (1951-63).

But with their 149th meeting on the horizon - in Lambeau Field Sunday - few if any of those matchups linger in the memory like the Green and Gold's last minute, 20-17, comefrom-behind victory in their mutual, 1955 season opener at "old" City Stadium on Green Bay's East Side.

As euphoric as the Packers faithful can get in victory, rarely has there been an eruption of such unbridled joy as the one that swept through the venerable structure on that September afternoon.

Major underdogs to the reigning Western Conference champion Lions, the Green and Gold trailed, 17-13, as the final minute continued to tick away. Quarterback Tobin Rote, dropping back from center, fired an 18-yard strike to Gary Knafelc for the winning touchdown as only 20 seconds remained.

Hit just inside the 1-yard line, Knafelc turned around and, eluding Detroit defensive backs Jack Christiansen and Karl Karilivacz on the play, dived into the end zone.

What happened next had to be seen to be believed.

Elated fans swept onto the field before Fred Cone could kick the extra point and proceeded to lift Rote and Knafelc to their shoulders, then carried Knafelc to the sidelines before order could be restored.

Knafelc, signed during the 1954 season after being released by the then-Chicago Cardinals, subsequently delivered the "quote" of the day.

Taking note of the fact that he would be receiving a suit of clothes from a local haberdasher as a reward for his game-winning catch, he quipped, "They should give out 33 suits for this one," a reference to the 33-man team roster then in effect.

The Packers' 1962 home-and-home showdowns with the Lions in 1962 also occupy a unique place in series annals - for contrasting reasons.

Their first '62 encounter, which brought the Lions to City Stadium (now Lambeau Field), was another last minute "save," later to become celebrated because that week's Packers preparations for the contest were featured in Vince Lombardi's first book, "Run to Daylight," written in collaboration with W.C. Heinz and subsequently a best-seller.

It was the fourth week of the season and the Packers, then en route to a 10-0 start, found themselves in a tightfisted struggle - one which saw the unbeaten Lions leading 7-6 with less than 2 minutes to play.

With Detroit facing third-and-8, the Packers' Herb Adderley intercepted a Milt Plum pass intended for Terry Barr in the right flat, and returned it 40 yards, setting the stage for Paul Hornung's game-winning 21-yard field goal with only 33 seconds left.

The Lions, openly chagrined over the outcome and how it had come about, let it be known in their post-game comments that they would be awaiting revenge in a Thanksgiving Day rematch seven weeks later at

sprawling Tiger Stadium, then the home of baseball's Detroit Tigers as well as the Lions.

And, regrettably for the Green and Gold, the Lions did not forget. Clearly on a mission, they charged to a prohibitive, 26-0 halftime lead in Detroit's Tiger Stadium. Spearheaded by Roger Brown and Alex Karras, Detroit's defense literally had quarterback Bart Starr running for his life, sacking the Packers' field general 9 times for 93 yards in losses during the course of a long afternoon.

One of the latter saw Brown fell Starr in the end zone for a second-quarter safety as the aroused Lions, who forced five turnovers along the way, went up, 23-0.

Guard Fuzzy Thurston, one of Green Bay's "Guardian Angels" in company with Jerry Kramer, later wryly jested, "That was the day we invented the

'lookout block'...'Look out, Bart!'"


The victory lifted the Lions, then 9-2, to within one game of the Packers, who had appeared en route to the only undefeated season in their history coming into the Thanksgiving Day contest.

Lombardi, philosophical in defeat, took what amounted to a positive approach.

"From now on," he said, "we'll be a lot better ball club...I think we're all a little relieved."

He proved to be prophetic. The Packers went on to sweep their last three games - defeating the Los Angeles Rams at Milwaukee and the San Francisco 49ers and the Rams on the road to finish with a 13-1 record, which remains the best in Packers history.

(The Packers also posted 13-victory seasons in 1996 and 1997, but also had three losses in each of those campaigns under the 16-game format implemented by the NFL in 1978).
