THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ▶ According to the NFL, Green Bay with a win would clinch a playoff berth, regardless of any other NFC outcome.
- ▶ Jacksonville makes its first franchise visit to Lambeau Field, including preseason. The early forecast calls for a 30 percent chance of snow.
- ▶ On his 50th birthday Sunday, Mike Sherman could surpass No. 4 Bart Starr (53, 1975-83) on the team's all-time victory list. With a victory Sunday, Sherman would have 54 overall wins, more than any Packers coach other than Curly Lambeau (212), Vince Lombardi (98) and Mike Holmgren (84).
- ▶ The Packers can take the division by winning their next two games — vs. Jacksonville Sunday and at Minnesota Friday, Dec. 24.

NATIONAL TELEVISION: CBS Sports, with play-by-play man Dick Enberg, color analyst Dan Dierdorf, sideline reporter Armen Keteyian, producer Mark Wolff and director Bob Fishman. The broadcast is expected to be available to approximately 92 percent of the country.

LOCAL RADIO: Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and Larry McCarren (color). The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on packers.com.

NATIONAL RADIO: Westwood One/CBS Radio Sports, with Ted Robinson (play-by-play) and Rick Walker (color).

LONE APPEARANCE ON CBS: For the second straight season, the Packers make just one appearance on CBS. In 2003, the network aired the memorable Dec. 28 game vs. Denver, in which the Packers won the NFC North at the wire.

- ▶ Green Bay has won its last five games on CBS, the last two of which have been at home in December. The streak includes a 2000 win vs. Indianapolis, 2001 wins vs. Baltimore and Cleveland, a 2002 victory vs. Buffalo, and last year's Denver game.
- ▶ The last time Green Bay lost on the network was Sept. 3, 2000, 20-16 at home to the N.Y. Jets in Mike Sherman's debut as a head coach.

TEAM TOUCHDOWN RECORD IN JEOPARDY: By scoring a touchdown in a 75th consecutive regular-season game Sunday, Green Bay would tie a franchise record. The last time an opponent held the Packers without a TD was Sept. 17, 2000, Mike Sherman's first career win, a 6-3 victory over Philadelphia at Lambeau Field. PENALTIES ARE UP ACROSS THE LEAGUE: Packers players will work with officials this week at practice, hoping to cut down on penalties. However, the issue isn't exclusive to Green Bay. In 2004, NFL teams are averaging 93.2 penalties and 760.8 yards penalized. Entering Week 15 in 2003, teams averaged 87.2 flags and 728.1 yards. Packers opponents also are seeing more flags (81-643 in 2003, 92-750 in 2004).

PRO BOWL SEASON: Notable among those expected to challenge for a spot in Honolulu:

- ▶ Quarterback Brett Favre could earn a ninth selection, matching the franchise record held by Hall of Famer Forrest Gregg.
- ▶ Do-everything starting receiver Robert Ferguson, also a strength on special teams, ranks second among NFC kick returners (26.4-yard average).
- ▶ Cornerback Al Harris has broken up 24 passes, 10 better than his previous career best. With three games left, Harris has a strong shot at breaking Doug Evans' 1995 team record, 27.
- ▶ The Packers owe three of their eight wins to Ryan Longwell field goals. The kicker hasn't missed an extra point in three years. He's hit 44 in a row from less than 40 yards.
- ▶ Guard Marco Rivera, owner of a 96-game starting streak, could become the first Packers offensive linemen with three consecutive Pro Bowl appearances since Gale Gillingham (1969-71).
- ▶ Guard Mike Wahle, a pillar in the team's signature running game and strong pass protection the last two years, is having one of his best seasons. He's played in 94 straight and started the last 61 in a row.
- ▶ Breakout receiver Javon Walker, bidding for his first Pro Bowl, is among NFC leaders in receptions (70), receiving yards (1,058), TD catches (10) and average per catch (15.1).





OFFICIAL PLAYOFF SCENARIOS: According to the NFL, one of nine permutations this week could put the Packers in the playoffs.

- ▶ A trip to the 2004 playoffs would mark Green Bay's 10th since the 1993 collective bargaining agreement introduced the salary cap and unrestricted free agency. No other club has more than eight, including Pittsburgh's 2004 berth.
- ▶ The scenarios (the first of which is the easiest ticket):
 - 1) GB win
 - 2) GB tie + STL loss
 - 3) GB tie + CAR loss or tie
 - 4) CHI loss or tie + STL loss + CAR loss + DAL loss or tie
 - 5) CHI loss or tie + STL loss + CAR loss + TB loss or tie + SEA win
 - 6) CHI loss or tie + STL loss + NYG loss or tie + DAL loss or tie
 - 7) CHI loss or tie + STL loss + NYG loss or tie + TB loss or tie + SEA win
 - 8) CHI loss or tie + NYG loss or tie + DAL loss or tie + CAR loss
 - 9) CHI loss or tie + NYG loss or tie + CAR loss + TB loss or tie + SEA win

FAVRE TO SURPASS McDANIEL: Brett Favre Sunday will start a 203rd consecutive game, surpassing No. 7 Randall McDaniel on the all-time list of recorded streaks. An offensive lineman, McDaniel started 202 straight for Minnesota and Tampa Bay from 1989-2001. Gene Upshaw (207, 1967-81) is next on the list.

HOME FINALES: Sunday marks the last regular-season game at Lambeau Field. The Packers have enjoyed consistent success in home finales.

- ▶ Brett Favre is 12-0 in regular-season home finales (1992-2003; 1994 contest was in Milwaukee).
- ▶ The last time Green Bay lost such a game was Dec. 15, 1991, 21-17 vs. Detroit.

LAMBEAU-SWEET-LAMBEAU: Since a rough start, the Packers have rebounded for their home fans, winning four straight games.

- ▶ Green Bay's offense at Lambeau Field has allowed only one sack over its last 112 passing plays. Favre over that span, since early in the Oct. 24 Dallas game, owns a 119.1 passer rating (72-for-111, 64.9 percent, 796 yards, 11 TD, no INT).
- ▶ Brett Favre hasn't thrown an interception at Lambeau Field since Oct. 11 vs. Tennessee, or over his last 149 home pass attempts. Over that span, Favre has a 118.3 rating (99-for-149, 66.4 percent, 1,136 yards, 13 TD, no INT).
- ▶ Takeaways are like gold to the Packers in 2004, and over their four-game home winning streak, Green Bay has three takeaways and one giveaway.

MORE TEAM & INDIVIDUAL TRENDS:

- ▶ Green Bay has outscored opponents 67-19 in the second half over the last four games.
- ▶ The Packers defense has allowed just one rushing TD over the last six games. Over a longer stretch, the defense has allowed two rushing TDs in its last games, or 32 quarters.
- ▶ Green Bay's offense has at least 400 yards in three of its last five contests, and six of the last nine.
- ▶ Opponents have not scored a TD in their last three goal-to-go situations (nine snaps).
- ▶ In the red zone, the Green Bay defense has allowed only five third-down conversions in 20 attempts (.250). That's tied for second in the league with Philadelphia (5-for-20), behind Miami (3-for-14, .214).
- ▶ Over its last two games, Green Bay has held the lead for 2 seconds, and trailed 92 minutes, 26 seconds.
- ▶ Under Mike Sherman when trailing after three quarters, the Packers are 4-20. Two of those wins have come in 2004, Sunday vs. Detroit and Nov. 21 at Houston.
- ▶ The Packers are now 6-3 in kickoffs 3:15 CST or later. They're 2-2 in early Sunday kickoffs.
- ▶ Bryan Barker has pinned an opponent inside its own 20 at least once per game over the last seven contests. During that span, he has eight 'inside the 20' and two touchbacks. (continued on next page)

COACHES CAPSULES

Mike Sherman: 53-29-0, .646, fifth NFL season, fifth with Packers
Jack Del Rio: 12-17-0, .414 second NFL season, second with Jags
Head to Head: First meeting
vs. Opponent: Sherman 1-0 vs. Jaguars; Del Rio 0-0 vs. Packers

MIKE SHERMAN...Is in his fifth year as Packers head coach, and fourth as executive vice president and general manager. Sherman also:

- ▶ Earned his 50th career win Nov. 14, tied with Mike Martz for 18th fastest in NFL history and second in Green Bay annals to Lombardi.
- ▶ Inspired his players with a passionate speech on the eve of an Oct. 17 win at Detroit. The Packers, 1-4 at the time, then won six in a row.
- ▶ After Tom Rossley underwent a heart angioplasty Oct. 12, stepped forward and has served as primary play caller since.
- ▶ A Red Sox fan since his youth, is hoping Green Bay can rebound from an early deficit the way Boston did in climbing out of a three-game hole to defeat the Yankees, and eventually win the World Series.
- ▶ Became the last active head coach (minimum one season) to experience a three-game losing streak, on Oct. 3.
- ▶ Since 1970, only George Siefert, Chuck Knox and Joe Gibbs have posted a better regular-season mark over their first four years.

JACK DEL RIO...Is the second head coach in Jacksonville history, following Tom Coughlin. He also:

- ▶ Played four seasons (1992-95) for the Vikings. In that span, Del Rio's Vikings were 6-2 against the Packers (4-0 in Minnesota).
- ▶ Spent six seasons as an assistant before earning his current post, including 2002 as Carolina's defensive coordinator. He won a Super Bowl as a Baltimore assistant in 2000.
- ▶ Played 11 seasons with the Saints, Chiefs, Cowboys and Vikings.
- ▶ Is the NFL's second-youngest head coach, behind Jon Gruden.

THE PACKERS-JAGUARS SERIES: The Packers have played the Jaguars twice overall, both times in Jacksonville (1995, 2001). Green Bay played the Jags' fourth franchise game, Sept. 24, 1995, a 24-14 Packers win. The victory gave 3-1 Green Bay sole possession of first place in the NFC Central for the first time in 17 years. In 2001, Favre's late touchdown run gave Green Bay a 28-21 win.

- ▶ **Notable connections**...The late Mark Hatley helped to scout Del Rio for the Saints, before New Orleans drafted the future Pro Bowl line-backer in 1985...Jaguars CB Juran Bolden played three games for the Packers in 1998...G Marco Rivera and Jacksonville TE Kyle Brady played together at Penn State...DE Aaron Kampman and Jags C Brad Meester are products of fertile Aplington-Parkersburg (Iowa) High School...Special teams coordinator John Bonamego was on the Jags' staff from 1999-2002.

LAST MEETING: Monday night, Dec. 3, 2001, at Jacksonville; Green Bay won, 28-21.

- ▶ Brett Favre threw for three TDs and ran for the game-winning score with 1:30 left — his first rushing TD in 51 games (and last entering '04). Favre's season-high 362 passing yards helped rally the Packers from a 21-7 deficit in the final 18 minutes.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.



- The Packers have 23 touchdown drives of at least 70 yards, nine of at least 80 yards and, including Sunday vs. Detroit, three of at least 90.
- Overall, in five of his last eight games (home and road), Favre has thrown zero interceptions.
- **Javon Walker** has caught at least one pass in 30 straight games and 40 of the last 41. The last time he went without a reception was vs. Buffalo, Dec. 22, 2002, a 10-0 win dominated by defense.
- Physical, aggressive **Al Harris** has 16 passes defended in his last six games.

CONDOLENCES: The Green Bay Packers organization extends its sympathies to Nick Barnett, whose father passed away earlier this month, and to Donald Driver, who lost his father-in-law last week.

SECOND-HALF TEAM: One of the league's best at making halftime adjustments, the Packers have outscored opponents in the second half, 186-120, a 66-point margin that ranks first in the NFC and fourth in the league.

FERGUSON FINDS ANOTHER NICHE: Robert Ferguson is bidding to become only the second Packers player in the last 25 years to lead the NFL in kickoff-return average (Robert Brooks, 1993).

- Ferguson (26.4) enters this week third in the NFL, but inches from the league lead, behind Detroit's injured Eddie Drummond (26.6) and Buffalo's Terrence McGee (26.5).
- In that trio, Ferguson is the only returner without a TD. The last time a player led the NFL without a TD return was 1997 — Carolina's Michael Bates (27.3).

LONGWELL QUIETLY AMONG TEAM'S TOP WEAPONS: Kicker Ryan Longwell on Sunday nailed his third game-winning kick of 2004, and eighth of his career.

- In the fourth quarter, Longwell has hit seven in a row, dating to the 2003 playoffs.
- What makes Longwell so impressive is not how he kicks, but where he kicks. At Lambeau Field, the league's toughest venue, weather hounds kickers even early in the season, when challenging wind and rain like to make themselves at home. Longwell's .843 career field-goal percentage at Lambeau Field compared to other kickers in Green Bay during his career (1997-2004):

- Even more impressive is his performance in home games Dec. 1 and later (including playoffs) — 86.0 percent (37/43). Opponents Dec. 1 and later have hit just 68.0 percent (17/25).

LONGWELL CONVERSIONS AUTOMATIC SINCE 2001: Ryan Longwell Nov. 29 eclipsed Chris Jacke's franchise record for consecutive PAT conversions. Jacke hit 134 straight from 1990-94. Longwell, 336-for-339 over his career, hasn't missed a PAT since the Browns blocked an attempt at Lambeau Field, Dec. 23, 2001. Entering this weekend, only Tennessee's Gary Anderson (42) has a comparable active streak (courtesy Elias Sports Bureau). Mike Vanderjagt saw his 34-kick streak end Nov. 14.

FAVRE IN THE COLD: Brett Favre Sunday improved to 38-1 in all home games (regular season and playoffs) in which kickoff temperature is 34 or colder.

- That season also was the last year in which Green Bay started more than two centers.
- In 2004, Grey Ruegamer replaced Mike Flanagan in the lineup beginning with Week 4, after debilitating knee tendinitis put Flangan on injured reserve. Wells started Sunday for Ruegamer, who rolled his ankle Dec. 5 at Philadelphia.
- In 1986, the Packers started Cherry, Mark Cannon and Karl Swanke.

10TH ANNIVERSARY, MILWAUKEE FINALE: This week marks 10 years since Brett Favre led the Packers to a dramatic 21-17 win over Atlanta as the Packers closed a 62-year stay in Milwaukee.

- On Dec. 18, 1994, a 25-year-old Favre lunged for a 9-yard game-winning touchdown with only 14 seconds remaining, bringing to their feet nearly 55,000 fans, who had welcomed the team as their own since 1933.
- Head coach Mike Holmgren paid a final tribute to Milwaukee as he left the field, blowing the crowd a kiss, then bringing his hands together and bowing in appreciation for the city's long-standing support.
- Early in the game, the Packers moved out to a 14-3 advantage, but the persistent Falcons took the lead with 5:53 remaining in the fourth quarter when Bobby Hebert found Terance Mathis for a 5-yard TD, and Atlanta converted the ensuing two-point try.
- With time running out, Favre launched a decisive, 9-play, 67-yard drive with a 25-yard strike to Mark Chmura. Five plays later, with 21 seconds left and the Packers at the Atlanta 9, Favre rolled out looking for a post, then scrambled under pressure and pierced the end zone.
- The Packers were 105-61-3 over 62 seasons in Milwaukee, playing at Borchert Field (1933), State Fair Park (1934-51), Marquette Stadium (1952) and County Stadium (1953-94).

FROM PRESEASON TO SEASON: Ironically, the Packers will play a preseason opponent that also appears on their regular-season schedule for the

BIRTHDAY WISHES: In addition to GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman, two other individuals celebrate birthdays this week. Kurt Fielding, a fixture in the Packers' training room for more than 16 years, also marks a birthday on game day, Dec. 19. In addition, wide receiver Robert Ferguson turns 25 on Friday.

400-YARD GAMES: The Packers' offense has produced 400 total yards in three of its last five games.

- ▶ The Packers have eight total 400-yard games in 2004. They had nine over the previous three seasons (2001-03).
- ▶ The team is on pace for 6,235 yards, which would break the 1983 franchise record, 6,172.
- ▶ Green Bay needs 733 yards to surpass its 2003 total (5,798), the second-most yards in team annals.
- ▶ Most total yards gained, season:

SACKS HAVE COME BACK: The Packers have awakened their pass rush in recent weeks. In fact, Green Bay has 20 sacks over its last six games.

FAVRE AT LAMBEAU: Brett Favre this week makes his 101st consecutive start at Lambeau Field (including playoffs).

- ▶ At his home stadium, the quarterback has thrown for 176 regular-season TD passes. That's second in NFL history and only four shy of tying

the NFL record, 180 by John Elway at Mile High Stadium. Dan Marino threw 155 at Pro Player/Joe Robbie Stadium.

JAGUARS KICKOFF MOVED: The NFL Nov. 29 granted FOX and CBS requests to move three December kickoffs on the league schedule, and two of them involve the Packers.

- ▶ The moves called Green Bay to anchor the key late-afternoon half of the FOX doubleheader last Sunday vs. Detroit. That game moved back to 3:15 CST, from noon.
- ▶ This week vs. Jacksonville, the Packers-Jaguars contest also will kick off at **3:15** CST, serving as the marquee late-afternoon game in the CBS doubleheader.
- ▶ The moves mean that in 12 of their first 15 games, the Packers will have played in front of a network's No. 1 audience in its particular time slot, including the critical late-season kickoffs the league just moved. FOX could assign its "A" crew to Green Bay's Jan. 2 season finale, at Chicago, meaning 13 Packers of 16 Packers games would be available to the largest national audience possible.
- ▶ Since 1996, the league has now moved four Packers kickoffs — all from noon to 3:15 p.m. CT (also Cleveland at Green Bay, Dec. 23, 2001; and Green Bay at Tampa Bay, Nov. 24, 2002).

THE STRETCH RUN: Since Mike Sherman became head coach in 2000, the Packers own one of the NFL's best records over the crucial second half.

- ▶ Green Bay's .857 winning percentage (18-3) Dec. 1 and later ranks first in the NFL since 2000. One of the prime contributors to that record? Turnover ratio. Green Bay is plus-31 in 21 regular-season games under Sherman Dec. 1 and later. Top records, 2000-04.

TOUGH AFTER THE BYE: Counting the single games immediately following bye weeks, the Packers have won eight of their last nine, including crucial victories over Minnesota the last two years.

A PAIR OF DEFENSIVE SCORES: The Packers Nov. 29 posted multiple defensive touchdowns in the same game for the first time since Oct. 2, 1983. The Packers have researched defensive scores since 1950 and can't find another game in which the team returned multiple fumbles for TDs.

THE STREAK, BY THE NUMBERS: Over his first 202 starts in his NFL-record quarterback streak, Brett Favre has completed 4,207 of 6,846 passes for 48,444 yards, 367 TDs and 219 interceptions, and compiled a 133-69 record.

► During the streak, he has completed TD passes to 36 different targets, including 57 to Antonio Freeman, a franchise-record for a quarterback-receiver combination.

► He has started in 39 stadiums, including regular-season debuts at FedEx Field (Oct. 31), Reliant Stadium (Nov. 21) and Lincoln Financial Field (Dec. 5) in his last three road games. Of those 39, 15 are either no longer standing or no longer in use by an NFL team. He's thrown for a regular-season TD in 33 of the venues.

► Eleven former backups have gone on to start for another NFL team.

► Including Luke McCown and John Navarre Dec. 5, 181 quarterbacks have started for the other 31 NFL franchises. The Bears have used 19, including four this season.

► Ben Steele Nov. 21 became the 69th player to catch a pass from Favre during the quarterback's streak.

INCREDIBLE COMEBACK: The Packers Nov. 21 rallied from a fourth-quarter deficit of at least 10 points to win a road game for the first time in 14 years. On Nov. 18, 1990, Anthony Dilweg replaced an injured Don Majkowski and erased a 21-10 deficit to win at Phoenix, 24-21.

LAST WEEK: Postgame notes from Green Bay's 16-13 win over Detroit at Lambeau Field:

► Ryan Longwell kicked his third game-winning field goal of 2004, and the eighth of his career. He has now kicked 44 consecutive field goals from less than 40 yards, the longest active streak in the NFL.

► Favre registered a 13th **overall** 3,000-yard season, tying Dan Marino (13) for most all-time. John Elway also had 12. Favre extended his NFL record for **consecutive** 3,000 yard seasons to 13.

► Ahman Green's five receptions gave him 275 in a Packers uniform, surpassing No. 2 Dorsey Levens (271) and No. 1 William Henderson on the Packers' all-time list among backs. Henderson (274), now No. 2 on the list, entered the game with 273 Packers catches.

► The Packers defense surrendered a rushing touchdown for the first time in more than a month, or 21 quarters.

► Punter Bryan Barker's season-long 64-yard punt was critical in the fourth-quarter field-position game.

► Ryan Longwell's field goal with 10:36 remaining in the third quarter gave him 200 for his career. Already the team's all-time leader, he now has 202 career field goals. Longwell has now scored in 125 consecutive games, extending his franchise record (every game of his career).

► Paris Lenon made his first career NFL start. He started in place of Na'il

Best tenures since 1993

In 1993, the NFL adopted its current collective bargaining agreement. That CBA has given pro football more labor peace and prosperity than any major league sport. The compromise gave the owners a salary cap and the players unrestricted free agency. But that agreement has also created parity, challenging front offices and coaches more than any era in history.

Since 1993, NFL teams have experienced 83 coaching moves. And since the dawn of the salary cap and unrestricted free agency, Mike Sherman's winning percentage represents the league's third-most successful tenure. - Will play in a 205th consecutive game (224 including playoffs) and make his 203rd consecutive start (222 including playoffs), 87 more than the next-closest streak on the all-time quarterbacks list, 116 by Ron Jaworski (1977-84).
- Needs 520 yards passing to top No. 3 Warren Moon (49,325) on the all-time list. Favre enters the weekend with 48,806.

KABEER GBAJA-BIAMILA:

- With 1.5 sacks, would reach 10 and extend his franchise record for double-digit sacks in consecutive seasons to four (2001-04). Simeon Rice (9.0 entering the weekend) and Leonard Little (6.0) are the only NFL players who could join Gbaja-Biamila among those with double-digit sacks each year since 2001.

AHMAN GREEN:

- Needs 8 yards rushing to post a fifth 1,000-yard season and tie Jim Taylor's franchise record (both overall and consecutive, Taylor also did it five straight years, 1960-64).
- Needs 12 carries for 1,500 career.
- Needs two rushing TDs for 50 career.
- Needs four rushing TDs to surpass No. 2 Paul Hornung (50) on the all-time Packers list. Green enters the week with 47.
- Needs two overall TDs to tie No. 4 Paul Hornung (62) on the all-time Green Bay list. Green enters the week with 60.

WILLIAM HENDERSON:

- If Ahman Green gains 8 yards rushing, Henderson would break Howard Griffith's NFL record among fullbacks by blocking for a 1,000-yard rusher in a seventh overall season. Griffith blocked for Terrell Davis, Olandis Gary, Mike Anderson, Anthony Johnson and Jerome Bettis.

RYAN LONGWELL:

- With two points, would reach 100 and become one of three players to reach the century mark in each of his first eight NFL seasons. Jason Elam (11 to date, 1993-2003, has 96 in 2004) and Adam Vinatieri (nine to date, 1996-2004) own the longest strings.

DARREN SHARPER:

- Needs one touchdown to surpass both Bobby Dillon and Doug Hart (five) for second on the team's defensive TD list. Herb Adderley leads with seven defensive TDs. Sharper enters the week with five.

JAVON WALKER:

- Needs 440 receiving yards to surpass Robert Brooks' 1995 club record. Walker (70 catches, 1,058 yards) has already this season surpassed his career numbers entering the year (64 catches, 1,035 yards).

* * * *

STRETCHING THE FIELD AT UNPRECEDENTED PACE: Brett Favre from Oct. 11-Nov. 21 connected on a pass of at least 44 yards in six consecutive games, by far the longest streak of his career.

CONSECUTIVE LAST-SECOND KICKS: Ryan Longwell won two straight games, Nov. 14 vs. Minnesota and Nov. 21 at Houston, with field goals at the gun. The last time Green Bay won two straight contests on field goals as time expired, 9-year-old Longwell was in elementary school.

- Near the end of 1983, eventual Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud turned away consecutive opponents with last-second field goals.

- His 19-yarder beat the Bears, 31-28, at Lambeau Field Dec. 4. Lynn Dickey's improbable 67-yard pass to James Lofton, another Hall of Famer, set up that win.
- One week later, Dec. 12 at Tampa Bay, Stenerud booted a 23-yarder in overtime to sink the Bucs, 12-9. Dickey took the extra period's opening kickoff and drove 65 yards in 11 plays before the field goal.
- According to Elias Sports Bureau, the last NFL team to win consecutive games on last-second field goals was Philadelphia, Nov. 5-12, 2000.

BEIGHTOL'S LINE & 1,000-YARD RUSHERS: Larry Beightol's offensive line, if Ahman Green gains 8 yards rushing, will have blocked for a 1,000-yard rusher in six consecutive seasons, and establish a franchise record (five, 1960-64). The next comparable streak was three (1971-73).

- The Packers offensive line helped Dorsey Levens to the barrier in 1999, and Green over the last four seasons (2000-03).
- Beightol would break Bill Austin's Packers record among O-line coaches; Austin's unit, which executed the "run to daylight" Lombardi Sweep, recorded five individual 1,000-yard rushing seasons (Jim Taylor, 1960-64).

WITH AN 11-POINT LEAD: The Packers under Sherman are 36-2 with a lead of at least 11 points, at any point in the game, including five of their seven wins in 2004.

ANOTHER TWO NAMES JOIN THE QB LIST: John Navarre and Luke McCown Dec. 5 became the eighth and ninth quarterbacks to make their first NFL start this season, joining the Cowboys' Drew Henson (Nov. 25),



the Giants' Eli Manning (Nov. 21), Chicago's Craig Krenzel (Oct. 31), Tampa Bay's Chris Simms (Oct. 10), Pittsburgh's Ben Roethlisberger (Sept. 26), the 49ers' Ken Dorsey (Sept. 19) and Cincinnati's Carson Palmer (Sept. 12).

► McCown and Navarre became the 180th and 181st quarterbacks to start an NFL game since Brett Favre launched his current starting streak, Sept. 27, 1992.

WALKER HONORED: *Pro Football Weekly* named Javon Walker and Terrell Owens its annual mid-season All-Pro wide receivers.

KEEP AN EYE ON THESE DEVELOPMENTS DOWN THE STRETCH:

- The Packers bid to become only the ninth team in NFL history to make the playoffs after opening 1-4. Each of the eight clubs won its division. Carolina could also join this list in 2004.
- Offensively, Green Bay could establish franchise records in five categories: first downs, third-down percentage, total offense, net passing yards and fewest sacks allowed during a 16-game season.
- Javon Walker (1,058) and Donald Driver (924) are on pace to become the first set of 1,000-yard Packers receivers since 1999 (Antonio Freeman, Bill Schroeder) and only the third overall (also Freeman and Robert Brooks in 1997).

STONEWALL JACKSON: Since Mike Sherman claimed Grady Jackson on waivers Nov. 4, 2003, the Packers are 13-3 in Jackson's games.

- In those 16 games, Green Bay has allowed 4.0 yards per carry (368 rushes, 1,459 yards).
- Since Jackson joined the club, in five games without him (all in 2004), the Packers are 1-4, allowing 5.2 yards per carry (138-for-711).

ANOTHER ELECTION PUTS STREAK IN PERSPECTIVE: Since Brett Favre launched his 200-game starting streak Sept. 27, 1992, people have moved from cassettes to CDs and 1 billion people went "on-line." The streak has encompassed the rise and fall of Martha Stewart, Beanie Babies, Ross Perot, Celine Dion and Y2K. Over the last 12-plus years, *The Bridges of Madison County*, *The Client* and *Cold Mountain* have gone from the best-seller list to the big screen to the video rental store. And, sandwiched within the streak are the O.J. Simpson trial, the first and last episodes of NBC's hit series *Friends* and Bill Clinton's two terms in office.

- In fact, Nov. 2 marked the fourth time during Favre's streak Americans have gone to the polls to vote for President. Clinton defeated George Bush (1992), won a second term over Bob Dole and Ross Perot (1996), George W. Bush beat Al Gore (2000) and won another term Nov. 2 (2004), defeating John Kerry.

LONGWELL & BARKER: Ryan Longwell since Oct. 11 when Bryan Barker began holding for the injured Doug Pederson, is 17-for-18 on FGs and 29-for-29 on PATs, including 50- and 53-yard field goals.

SPEAKING OF BARKER: The veteran has 817 straight punts without a block (his last was with Kansas City, Dec. 12, 1993, at Denver, by Reggie Rivers). That's the second-longest streak in league annals:

ONE PLAY CAN TURN AROUND SEASON: Ultimately, the Packers' four-game losing streak began with one play. And, the season turned around with another play in the Oct. 17 win at Detroit, launching a six-game streak.

- On Sept. 19 vs. Chicago, with Green Bay poised to take a 10-7 lead on first-and-goal from the Bears' 2, Brian Urlacher pierced the Packers' blocking scheme, stripped Ahman Green and Mike Brown returned the fumble 95 yards for a touchdown. Green Bay never recovered, and lost, 21-10, launching a four-game slide.
- On Oct. 17, Darren Sharper picked off Joey Harrington and, knowing already that defensive scores usually win NFL games, leaped over

Dominic Raiola on a passionate return to the end zone. The play, at a crucial time in the third quarter, gave the Packers a 24-10 lead.

PUNT PROTECTION: The Packers haven't had a punt blocked in more than nine years, since Sept. 11, 1995, at Chicago, where the Bears' Anthony Marshall blocked Craig Hentrich. The streak spans 711 punts.

- Josh Bidwell, who signed in March as an unrestricted free agent with Tampa Bay, left with the team's longest individual streak without a block: 308, from 2000-03.

SANDLOT FOOTBALL: Najeh Davenport says he has the best arm among Green Bay's backs, but only Ahman Green (Oct. 17 at Detroit) and Tony Fisher (Oct. 24 vs. Dallas) have thrown passes this season, both for TDs.

- Including Green and Fisher, four players have thrown for TDs, the most by a Packers team since the 1987 strike year. The last time four Packers threw TDs in a non-strike season was Bart Starr's first year as head coach, 1975 — QBs John Hadl, Don Milan and Carlos Brown, and rookie RB Willard Harrell.

THE TD-PASS STREAK: Favre saw his streak of games with a TD pass end at 36 on Dec. 5 at Philadelphia. Over a longer stretch, he actually threw for a TD in 43 of 44 games, since Jan. 6, 2002. On Oct. 20, 2002, LaVar Arrington sacked him and sprained the quarterback's lateral collateral ligament, forcing him from that game. Had Favre remained and thrown for a TD, he could've challenged Unitas late this year. Instead, his recent streak began when he shrugged off the torn ligament in his knee two years ago and returned for Green Bay's next game. Longest all-time streaks:

FAVRE'S MAGIC NUMBER — 100.0: Elias Sports Bureau, the NFL's official statistician for half a century, never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis. The company implemented the system to reflect efficiency over an entire season, or an entire career.

- Nonetheless, in games when Brett Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 66-7 (.904). They're 38-0 at home (1.000) and 28-7 (.800) on the road.

LAST PLACE FOR FIRST TIME IN 16 YEARS: Earlier in October, the Packers were alone in last place for the first time since 1988.

- The last time Green Bay was alone in last place after at least three games was Dec. 18, 1988, after a season-ending road win over the Phoenix Cardinals. Ironically, that win cost the Packers the No. 1 draft choice in 1989, and instead of Troy Aikman, the team took Tony Mandarich second overall. Had Aikman guided Green Bay rather than Dallas, the Packers may never have acquired Brett Favre.

TURNOVERS TAKE AWAY WINS: The Packers under Mike Sherman are now 35-3 (22-0 at home) when committing one or fewer turnovers.

- Including five of their eight 2004 wins, they're also 14-0 under Sherman in turnover-free games. Over a longer stretch, the team has won 20 straight zero-turnover contests, dating to a loss at Minnesota, Dec. 1, 1997.
- Since an Oct. 21, 2001, loss at Minnesota, the Packers have won 25



straight when ahead in turnover margin. Overall under Sherman, the Packers are 35-1 under the same criteria.

SHERMAN SINCE 2001: Since he earned the added responsibilities of executive vice president and general manager before the 2001 season, Mike Sherman owns a better mark than all but two other teams:

'STRANGERS' COMPETITIVELY, PACKERS AND JAGUARS HAVE MET ONLY TWICE; BRETT FAVRE MADE HISTORY IN FIRST ENCOUNTER

The Packers and the Jacksonville Jaguars, who Sunday come together in Lambeau Field for the first time on Tittletown turf, are virtual strangers - competitively speaking.

Officially, they have met only twice since the Jaguars became members of the National Football League's AFC Central Division (now AFC South) in 1995. For the record, there also was a preseason Packers visit to Jacksonville's ALLTEL Stadium earlier this year (Aug. 27), won by the Jaguars, 9-7.

Yet, both regular-season games set themselves apart from the average NFL contest, historically speaking - aside from the fact that the Green and Gold were successful on each occasion, posting a 24-14 win in their first meeting ('95) and a 28-21 victory in a 2001 encounter, both in the ALLTEL venue.

In the former (on Sept. 24, 1995) for prime example, Favre threw two touchdown passes for the 12th straight game, joining Johnny Unitas, Dan Marino and Don Meredith in pro football's record book in this exclusive category.

The recipients of those historic throws were wideouts Robert Brooks and Anthony Morgan, Brooks scoring on a 6-yard toss in the second quarter and Morgan on a 29-yard strike in the fourth quarter, the latter putting the Packers up 24-7 with 5:52 remaining in the game.

(Said record, incidentally, was eclipsed only last weekend when Peyton Manning extended his streak of having thrown two or more touchdowns in a game to 13 contests).

Favre also punctuated his performance by reeling off a 40-yard run in the third quarter, an excursion that remains the longest run from scrimmage in his remarkable, 14-year career.

The '95 matchup, which found the Packers pitching a 17-0 shutout at the end of three quarters, was noteworthy for another reason. Punter Craig Hentrich had to pinch-hit as the Packers' placekicker on that occasion, one which saw incumbent Chris Jacke forced to sit out for only the second time in his career - because of a strained left hamstring.

Hentrich responded effectively. After being wide left on a 47-yard field goal attempt in the first quarter, he provided the first points of the evening in the second period, drilling home a 49-yarder.

Hentrich also was successful in all three of his conversion attempts and averaged an imposing 49.0 yards for four punts, with a long of 55 yards.

Additionally, he kicked a 22-yard field goal in the third quarter but the Jaguars' Harry Colon was penalized for roughing Hentrich and the penalty gave the Packers the football at the Jacksonville 2-yard line, from where running back Dorsey Levens scored on the next play.

In the overall process, a tightfisted Green Bay defense moved into the NFC lead by limiting the Jaguars to 201 net yards of offense, including just 76 yards rushing, linebacker Wayne Simmons spearheading the effort with eight solo tackles. He also was credited with two quarterback sacks for 14 yards in losses.

In a sidelight to the evening's proceedings, Wisconsin Gov. Tommy Thompson, a devout Packerphile, was on the ALLTEL Stadium scene on this occasion, lobbying Jaguars officials to keep their training camp at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point, where they had held their initial camp in what was then their first NFL season.

The teams' second and most recent regular-season meeting was a prime time matchup - on "Monday Night Football" Dec. 3, 2001 - and it was marked by a substantially different scenario.

With former Packers quarterback Mark Brunell under center for the

Jaguars, Jacksonville was out front 13-7 at halftime, the result of a 29-yard Brunell touchdown pass to wide receiver Elvis Joseph and a pair of field goals by Mike Hollis.

The Packers, meanwhile, avoided a halftime shutout by scoring with 25 seconds remaining in the second quarter on a 13-yard Favre pass to running back Ahman Green.

Jacksonville, however, expanded its lead early in the third quarter when Favre was sacked by the Jaguars' Tony Brackens and safety Ainsley Battles, pouncing upon the loose football, returned it 60 yards for a touchdown. Brunell then worked a 2-point conversion with wide receiver Keenan McCardell, padding the Jaguars' lead to 21-7.

Favre promptly set about turning things around following the succeeding kickoff, which William Henderson returned 14 yards to the Green Bay 45, providing the Packers with prime field position.

Three plays later they had scored, Favre firing a 43-yard touchdown pass to wideout Bill Schroeder and Ryan Longwell adding the conversion.

One minute and 40 seconds later, the Packers again were in the end zone - and tied with the Jaguars. Joseph fielded Longwell's kickoff and fumbled when hit by linebacker Chris Gizzi, who recovered at the Jacksonville 32.

Favre set up the next score with a 29-yard bullseye to flanker Antonio Freeman, tackled at the Jacksonville 3-yard line by cornerback Fernando Bryant. Two plays later, Favre hit tight end Bubba Franks with a 1-yard touchdown pass and Longwell provided the extra point to forge a 21-21 tie with 58 seconds left in the third quarter.

The deadlock remained in force for most of the fourth quarter, which saw no fewer than four changes of possession until the Packers made a decisive breakthrough in the last two minutes.

Taking over at his own 44, Favre launched the winning drive with a 10-yard toss to Donald Driver, then hit running back Ahman Green in the flat at the Jacksonville 46, whereupon Green streaked 42 yards to the Jaguars' 4 before being run out of bounds by cornerback Jason Craft.

Green was thrown for a 2-yard loss on a first-down thrust up the middle but Favre then proceeded to settle the issue, bootlegging into the left corner of the end zone from 6 yards out. Longwell's conversion then sealed a 28-21 victory.

Held to a mere 37 yards rushing by a miserly, run-oriented Jacksonville defense, the Packers made their passing game pay decisive dividends, Favre completing 24 of 42 passes for 352 net yards and 3 touchdowns while closing out the night with a glossy 109.4 passer rating.

Schroeder and Freeman, his prime targets, both emerged with 100-yard games, Schroeder making 6 catches for 106 yards and Freeman 3 for 104 yards. Green also was a major contributor to the passing game, making 5 catches for 74 yards.
