THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ▶ In a postscript to a rivalry that seemingly reached its peak two weeks ago, Green Bay hosts Minnesota in the teams' first-ever playoff meeting. The Packers won both regular-season tilts, but won each on a game-ending field goal, 34-31.
- ▶ The Packers play their 38th postseason contest, a 10th playoff appearance since the 1993 collective bargaining agreement, most in the NFL. A win would send them to Atlanta and the Divisional round. A loss would give them only their third ever postseason losing streak, which would tie for fewest in NFL history.
- ▶ Green Bay is 14-1 (.933) all-time in home playoff games, the best mark among NFL teams who've hosted at least three postseason contests. In Green Bay, the Packers are 12-1. In Milwaukee, they're 2-0. The early forecast calls for a mix of sun and clouds, with highs in the low 30s and lows in the upper teens.

NATIONAL TELEVISION: FOX Sports, with play-by-play man Joe Buck, color analysts Troy Aikman and Cris Collinsworth, sideline reporters Pam Oliver and Chris Myers, producer Richie Zrontz and director Artie Kempner, will air the game to 100 percent of the country. The crew produces a Packers game for the eighth time this season. It's the 15th time this year, including preseason, that the televising network broadcasts a Packers game to its largest national audience.

LOCAL RADIO: Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and Larry McCarren (color). The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on packers.com.

NATIONAL RADIO: CBS Sports/Westwood One will air the game in two languages. In English, Brad Sham (play-by-play), Jack Ham (color), Kenny Albert (sideline) and Mike Eaby (producer) will describe the action from Lambeau Field. In Spanish, Clemson Smith-Muniz and Roberto Abramowicz will broadcast from their New York studio.

REPORTS OF THEIR DEMISE GREATLY EXAGGERATED: With Carolina and Buffalo attracting much of the spotlight in recent weeks, the Packers quietly overcame a difficult start to earn a playoff berth. Green Bay this year became the ninth NFL team to reach the postseason after a 1-4 start, and the 13th team to earn a playoff berth after beginning with one or fewer wins after five games.

OFF ON THE RIGHT FOOT IN 2002: In the 2002 draft, Mike Sherman's first as a general manager, he traded up to select Javon Walker in the first round. Walker earned his first Pro Bowl selection this season. Sherman's aggressiveness with his first career No. 1 pick proved pivotal in one of the most talented first rounds in recent memory. In 2004, Walker emerged as the leading receiver for the most prolific passing offense in Packers history — and not the offense of another club. Pro Bowlers from the first round of the '02 draft:

HALFTIME LEAD IS HUGE: The Packers in 2004 were 7-0 with a halftime lead, 3-0 at Lambeau Field and 4-0 on the road.

- ▶ Green Bay has won its last 12 when ahead at intermission.
- ▶ Under Mike Sherman, the Packers have finished off 39 of 43 halftime leads.

ON OFFENSE: Green Bay this season racked up more total net yards (6,357) and net yards passing (4,449) than any Packers team in the franchise's previous 83 NFL seasons.

- ▶ The Packers became one of few, if any, teams in NFL history to break their franchise records in rushing and passing in consecutive seasons. Green Bay in 2003 rushed for a team-record 2,558 yards.
- ▶ The only 2003 starter no longer on the active roster is center Mike Flanagan, who went on injured reserve Oct. 2 with debilitating knee tendinitis. All other starters go with the team into the playoffs.
- ▶ Green Bay in 2004 ranked third among NFL teams in both total offense (397.3 yards per game) and passing offense (278.1). The last time a Packers offense ranked that high in total yards was 1983, when the club finished second (385.8). The Packers in 2001 also ranked third in passing (235.6).

SCORING CHANGE: Elias Sports Bureau has changed one play in the Dec. 24 Vikings game. The change affects several offensive categories.

- ▶ On the game's first offensive series, Lance Johnstone sacked Favre and forced a fumble. After review, the bureau ruled Favre should have been sacked for only 7 yards, rather than the 15 he was charged.
- ▶ Essentially, the ruling gave Green Bay 8 more total net yards and net yards passing. The final numbers are reflected in this release, but not in the league statistics included in the Green Bay playoff guide.

COACHES CAPSULES

Mike Sherman: 55-30-0, .647, fifth NFL season, fifth with Packers
 Mike Tice: 23-26-0, .469, third NFL season, third with Vikings

MIKE SHERMAN... Is in his fifth year as Packers head coach, and fourth as executive vice president and general manager.

- ▶ Counting only regular-season games since 1970, only Chuck Knox, George Seifert, Joe Gibbs and Mike Ditka have posted a better record over their first five seasons as an NFL coach.
- ▶ With a win Dec. 24, surpassed No. 4 Bart Starr (53, 1975-83) on the team's all-time victory list. His overall wins are more than any Packers coach other than Curly Lambeau (212), Vince Lombardi (98) and Mike Holmgren (84).
- ▶ Inspired his players with a passionate speech on the eve of an Oct. 17 win at Detroit. The Packers, 1-4 at the time, are 9-2 since.
- ▶ After Tom Rossley underwent a heart angioplasty Oct. 12, stepped forward to serve as the team's primary play caller.
- ▶ Now has more wins at Minnesota (3-2) in five trips than Mike Holmgren (1-6) had in seven seasons as Green Bay head coach. Also has more wins against Minnesota (7-3) than Holmgren (5-9).
- ▶ Is 25-9 against division foes.
- ▶ Is now 6-0 against teams that played in the Super Bowl the previous season, including Sept. 13 at Carolina.

MIKE TICE... A highly regarded former NFL player, is in his third full season at the helm of the Vikings.

- ▶ Tice guided Minnesota to nine consecutive wins from 2002-03, tied for the third-best stretch in team history.
- ▶ Association with Vikings began in 1992. He lined up as a tight end from 1992-93 and in 1995, then coached the position in 1996 and coached Minnesota's offensive line from 1997-2001. In those five seasons as line coach, he produced five Pro Bowlers and 10 total Pro Bowl appearances.
- ▶ First Vikings alumni player to serve as head coach. Played 14 NFL seasons overall, the most by any active NFL head coach. Also played for the Seahawks and Redskins.

THE PACKERS-VIKINGS SERIES: Few, if any, rivalries in sports have exhibited more parity. These clubs have nearly split 86 meetings overall (44-42-1).

- ▶ Of late, the Packers have held a slight edge, 7-3 since Mike Sherman took Green Bay's reins in 2000.
- ▶ In 2003, the home clubs in the series were 0-2. The last time that happened was 1991.
- ▶ Over the last 11 seasons (1994-2004), these teams have accounted for nine division championships (NFC Central 1994-2001, NFC North 2002-04).

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.



NOTABLE CONNECTIONS: Vikings receivers coach Charlie Baggett (receivers coach, 1999) and secondary coach Chuck Knox Jr. (defensive assistant/quality control, 1999) were on previous Green Bay staffs... Ben Steele recently played for the Vikings... Meanwhile, four individuals in the Packers organization have previously worked or played for the Vikings: Receivers coach Ray Sherman (quarterbacks coach, 1995-97 and O-coordinator, 1999); director of research and development Mike Eayrs (similar capacity, 1985-99); college scout Lee Gissendaner (player, 1996); and PR director Jeff Blumb (PR intern 1985 in Bud Grant's return season)... College teammates: Bryant McKinnie (Vikings), Nick Luchey and Bubba Franks (Packers) at Miami (Fla.)... Brian Russell (Vikings) and Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila (Packers) at San Diego State... Antoine Winfield (Vikings) and Na'il Diggs (Packers) at Ohio State... Minnesota's head trainer Chuck Barta and Packers assistant trainer Kurt Fielding were classmates at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse... Vikings running back Michael Bennett rushed for 1,681 yards in his only season as a Wisconsin starter, 2000, second in Badger history; a former Milwaukee Tech High School star, Bennett's uncle is former Packer Tony Bennett... Dean Dalton, Minnesota's running backs coach, was a coach at the University of Wisconsin (1986-87)... John Schneider, Green Bay's personnel analyst to the general manager, attended St. Thomas College in St. Paul, Minn. ... Packers Pro Hall of Famer Johnny (Blood) McNally attended St. John's University in Collegeville, Minn.

LAST MEETING, LAMBEAU FIELD (AP): Nov. 14, Packers won, 34-31:

- ▶ Former Viking Ben Steele recovered a fumble at midfield in the closing minutes, and the Packers drove for Ryan Longwell's 33-yard field goal as regulation expired. The Packers claimed a share of first place with Minnesota, who had rallied to tie with two touchdowns in a 93-second span.
- ▶ Both Brett Favre and Daunte Culpepper threw four touchdown passes without an interception. It was Favre's 18th game with four or more TD tosses, second only to Dan Marino's 21. Favre hit receiver Javon Walker, tailback Tony Fisher, tight end Bubba Franks and fullback William Henderson in the end zone as the Packers built a seemingly safe 31-17 lead.
- ▶ Culpepper, working without star receiver Randy Moss (strained hamstring) for the second successive game, passed for 363 yards, connecting with Nate Burleson 11 times for 141 yards and a score.
- ▶ Ahman Green rushed for 145 yards on 21 carries despite injuring his left kneecap when he was leg-whipped in the first half.
- ▶ Culpepper was sacked four times.

LAST MEETING, METRODOME (AP): Dec. 24, Packers won, 34-31.

- ▶ Brett Favre guided a 76-yard drive to set up Ryan Longwell's game-ending 29-yard field goal, lifting the Packers to a 34-31 victory and clinching a third consecutive NFC North crown.
- ▶ The Packers trailed 31-24 with 8:18 left after Favre's third-down throw from his end zone was intercepted by Chris Claiborne and returned 12 yards for a touchdown. But Green Bay answered when Donald Driver — who had 11 receptions for 162 yards — made a nifty, falling-down catch of Favre's pass on fourth-and-goal at the 3 to tie it at 31 with 3:34 remaining after an 80-yard drive.
- ▶ Minnesota appeared on its way to retaking the lead. But a holding penalty wiped out a 16-yard run by Michael Bennett that would have given them the ball at the Green Bay 40 right before the 2-minute warning.
- ▶ After a punt, Favre got the ball at his 13 with 1:35 left. Twelve plays later, Longwell's kick sailed through the uprights, sending the Packers into celebration on their biggest rival's home field.
- ▶ Favre finished 30-for-43 for 365 yards, three touchdowns and the interception.
- ▶ Favre is now 4-9 at the Metrodome, with victories in three of his past five games.

REBOUND PERCENTAGE: Since 1993, no other team has proven more resilient after playoff losses. Over the previous 11 seasons (1993-2003), the lifetime of the salary cap and free agency, the Packers have the best postseason "rebound percentage."

- ▶ Only once in eight opportunities during that period have the Packers failed to answer a playoff loss with a return to the postseason — an .875 percentage, best in the NFL.
- ▶ Green Bay has compiled that rebound percentage during an era when nearly half of postseason clubs miss the playoffs the following season. Of the 132 playoff teams from 1993-2003, 61 (46.2 percent) didn't reach the playoffs the next year.

ON THE ROAD: The Packers (6-2) established their best road record since 1972, when they were 6-1 in a 14-game season.

- ▶ Over a longer stretch, Green Bay has won 10 of its last 13 regular-season road contests.
- ▶ The Packers finished with a road record (6-2) better than their home record (4-4) for the first time since 1987, when they were 2-5-1 at home and 3-4 on the road.
- ▶ Green Bay finished with winning records on artificial surfaces (2-1) and in indoor stadiums (3-1). That dome record matched the best mark by any previous Packers team, equalling the 3-1 record of the '96 squad, who won Super Bowl XXXI.
- ▶ With a 300-yard passer on the road, the Packers under Mike Sherman are now 8-1.

- ▶ Needs 279 yards passing to overtake No. 2 John Elway (4,964) on the all-time postseason list. Favre enters the weekend with 4,686.
- ▶ Needs 314 yards passing for 5,000 career in the postseason. Would join Joe Montana (5,772) as one of two passers in NFL history to reach the 5,000 barrier.
- ▶ Needs seven completions to surpass No. 2 Dan Marino (385) on the all-time postseason list. Favre enters the weekend with 379.
- ▶ Needs 22 attempts to surpass No. 3 John Elway (651) on the all-time postseason list. Favre enters the weekend with 630 career attempts.
- ▶ Needs one TD pass to extend his NFL-record streak of playoff games throwing for a TD to 16. The last time Favre did not throw a TD pass in a playoff game was in the 1994 playoffs, Jan. 8, 1995, at Dallas.

Well, beginning last season, the *Minneapolis Star Tribune* assigned Judd Zulgad to the Packers beat, and he provides daily coverage in the enemy market. In pro sports, there isn't another known, similar arrangement — a beat writer in a division rival's market.

Packers among best in postseason

The Packers own the best postseason winning percentage in NFL history among teams with at least eight games. They have won 24 of 37 playoff games since their first-ever postseason contest — the 1936 NFL championship (a 21-6 victory over the Boston Redskins). ► What's more, since the Packers won their last Super Bowl in 1996, the Vikings' flagship radio station, KFAN Sportsradio 1130, has aired a weekly one-hour preview show devoted to the Packers. Dave Sinykin, a Whitefish Bay, Wis., native hosts the program, which this season expanded into the Duluth, Mankato and St. Cloud markets. Again, there isn't a known, similar situation in sports — exclusive programming on a division rival's flagship radio network.

SHARPER & CULPEPPER GO WAY BACK: Darren Sharper has intercepted Daunte Culpepper five times, more than any other quarterback. But that figure counts only NFL games.

- On Aug. 29, 1996, Sharper and Culpepper met for the first time, at Orlando's Florida Citrus Bowl. Culpepper and his Central Florida Golden Knights hosted Sharper and his William & Mary Tribe.
- Sharper recorded his first of a nation-leading 10 interceptions by picking off Culpepper that night. The quarterback, however, had the last laugh as Central Florida won, 39-33.
- Including that game, Culpepper has started against Sharper nine times, and gone 5-4.
- The Packers are 3-1 when Sharper intercepts Culpepper, and 1-2 when he does not.

CHAVOUS WAS THORN LAST SEASON: Minnesota strong safety Corey Chavous intercepted Brett Favre three times in 2003.

- Detroit's Dre Bly also pulled off the Favre "hat trick" in 2003.
- Before Chavous and Bly, the last player to intercept Favre at least three times in a single season was Minnesota's Vencie Glenn. Glenn did it in one game, Dec. 27, 1992, at the Metrodome.

JUST GETTING LEAD IS IMPORTANT AGAINST VIKINGS: Over their last 10 meetings with Minnesota (2000-04), the Packers are 7-0 when gaining the lead at any time. In the other three contests, the Vikings never trailed (at Minnesota 2001-02, Lambeau Field 2003).

PROMOTIONS: In a credit to the Packers' pro and college scouting departments, last month Andrae Thurman became the eighth Green Bay practice squad player promoted to the 53-man roster this season. To gauge just how amazing that figure is, consider that in 2003 the Packers promoted just two practice-squad players: Terdell Sands and Erwin Swiney. 2005 OPPONENTS DETERMINED SUNDAY, TOO: In addition to the 2004 playoffs, next season's non-NFC North Green Bay opponents were finalized after Sunday's games.

Non-losing season streaks, NFL history

With Miami finishing with its first losing season since 1988, Green Bay with an eighth win Dec. 12 assumed the NFL's longest active streak of non-losing seasons. In 2001, the Packers captured the NFC's longest active streak, now 13. Green Bay's last sub-.500 campaign was 1991 (4-12). The Packers, who've now accomplished a streak of at least 10 years three times, are the only team ever to do it more than twice (and that does not include the Lombardi era)...

- ▶ Henderson, in his 10th season, Dec. 19 broke Howard Griffith's NFL record among fullbacks by blocking for a 1,000-yard rusher in a seventh overall season. The University of North Carolina product has paved the way for 1,000-yard seasons for Green (2000-04) and Dorsey Levens (1997, '99).
- ▶ Walker's honor comes during a superb third NFL season. Walker was GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman's initial first-round pick; the Packers traded up to select the Florida State player in the 2002 NFL Draft.
- ▶ Green, meanwhile, becomes only the second Packers back to be named to as many as four consecutive seasons, joining Jim Taylor, who was named to five straight contests (1960-64).
- ▶ Rivera, a seven-year starter, is the first Green Bay offensive lineman to be named to the Pro Bowl three consecutive seasons since Gale Gillingham in 1969-71. One of the most durable performers in Packers history, Rivera has maintained a 99-game starting streak, second on the team to only Brett Favre (203).
- ▶ Eight other Packers were named as alternates on the NFC squad, including Favre, guard Mike Wahle and cornerback Al Harris. The others include tight end Bubba Franks, wide receiver Donald Driver and tackle Chad Clifton on offense, linebacker Nick Barnett on defense and place-kicker Ryan Longwell.
- ▶ Franks, Barnett and Longwell also were named alternates last season, with Franks eventually getting called up to play in the game. Two other alternates last season, center Mike Flanagan and defensive end Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila, played in the contest as well.

LAST WEEK: Postgame notes from Green Bay's 31-14 victory Sunday at Soldier Field.

- ▶ Unlike other playoff-bound teams, Green Bay played most of its starters and earned important momentum entering the playoffs.
- ▶ In a rivalry that spans nine decades, the Bears still never have swept the Packers in a year when Chicago finished with a sub-.500 record...Green Bay hasn't lost consecutive games to the Bears since 1991-92. The last time Chicago swept the season series was 1991.
- ▶ The Packers haven't lost a road game to the Bears since 1993. The 11-game streak includes 10 contests at Soldier Field and one at Champaign Memorial Stadium (2002)...Only two times in NFL history has one team won more consecutive games over a road opponent — the L.A. Rams won 12 straight in San Francisco from 1969-80, and the 49ers won 12 straight at the Rams from 1987-98. Favre extended the NFL record for consecutive road wins by a quarterback over one opponent (11).
- ▶ Brett Favre cleared both the 4,000-yard and 30-touchdown milestones in the same season for a third time (also 1995 and 1998). He posted his eighth season of 30-plus TDs, extending his NFL record, now four more than No. 2 Dan Marino (1984-86, 1994).
- ▶ With two TD passes, reached 51 career against the Bears and surpassed

- Dan Marino's 50 against Buffalo for the third-most all-time by a quarterback against an opponent.
- ▶ Favre also recorded his 24th TD pass at Soldier Field, moving into sole possession of fourth on the stadium's all-time list, behind three Bears quarterbacks.
- ▶ Craig Nall, who in five previous NFL games had entered no earlier than the fourth quarter, came out of the bullpen in the second quarter. Nall threw for 131 yards, including a 48-yard strike; both figures marked the best respective performances ever by a Brett Favre backup (1992-2004). What's more, Nall's 33 attempts in 2004 were the most ever by a Packers quarterback without an interception.
- ▶ Darren Sharper became one of four players to lead the team in interceptions at least five seasons: Bobby Dillon (seven), Willie Wood (five) and LeRoy Butler (five).
- ▶ With a touchdown, Sharper tied two club records: Herb Adderley's career record of seven, and the single-season mark of three, held by Adderley (1965) and Sharper (1997).
- ▶ The Packers matched their single-game record with nine sacks. Green Bay recorded nine sacks on two previous occasions, Oct. 24, 1965, vs. Dallas (Milwaukee), and Nov. 1, 1998, vs. San Francisco (Green Bay).
- ▶ Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila established a career high with four of those sacks. The quartet allowed him to match his single-season career high of 13½ in 2001. It also gave him 49 since 2001, more than any Packers player ever over four straight seasons (Tim Harris had 48 from 1986-89).
- ▶ The Packers have won their season finale in 10 of the last 11 years. Their only loss was 2002 at the N.Y. Jets; they exited the playoffs one week later, their only home playoff loss ever.

THREE STRAIGHT DIVISION CROWNS: Green Bay has won a third straight division crown for the fourth time in its history (also 1960-62, 1965-67 and 1995-97). Each of its three previous streaks has included at least one world championship.

▶ Since the merger, the Packers' division (NFC Central 1970-2001, NFC North 2002-04) has produced three consecutive winners on only four occasions:

LONGWELL QUIETLY AMONG TEAM'S TOP WEAPONS: Kicker Ryan Longwell on Dec. 24 nailed his fourth game-winning kick of 2004, and ninth of his career.

► In the fourth quarter, Longwell has hit eight in a row, dating to the 2003 playoffs.

► What makes Longwell so impressive is not how he kicks, but where he kicks. At Lambeau Field, the league's toughest venue, weather hounds kickers even early in the season, when challenging wind and rain like to make themselves at home. INCREDIBLE COMEBACK: The Packers Nov. 21 rallied from a fourth-quarter deficit of at least 10 points to win a road game for the first time in 14 years. On Nov. 18, 1990, Anthony Dilweg replaced an injured Don Majkowski and erased a 21-10 deficit to win at Phoenix, 24-21.

STRETCHING THE FIELD AT UNPRECEDENTED PACE: Brett Favre from Oct. 11-Nov. 21 connected on a pass of at least 44 yards in six consecutive games, by far the longest streak of his career.

CONSECUTIVE LAST-SECOND KICKS: Ryan Longwell won two straight games, Nov. 14 vs. Minnesota and Nov. 21 at Houston, with field goals at the gun. The last time Green Bay won two straight contests on field goals as time expired, 9-year-old Longwell was in elementary school.

- ▶ Near the end of 1983, eventual Hall of Famer Jan Stenerud turned away consecutive opponents with last-second field goals.
- ▶ His 19-yarder beat the Bears, 31-28, at Lambeau Field Dec. 4. Lynn Dickey's improbable 67-yard pass to James Lofton, another Hall of Famer, set up that win.
- ▶ One week later, Dec. 12 at Tampa Bay, Stenerud booted a 23-yarder in overtime to sink the Bucs, 12-9. Dickey took the extra period's opening kickoff and drove 65 yards in 11 plays before the field goal.
- ▶ According to Elias Sports Bureau, the last NFL team to win consecutive games on last-second field goals was Philadelphia, Nov. 5-12, 2000.

BEIGHTOL'S LINE & 1,000-YARD RUSHERS: Larry Beightol's offensive line has blocked for a 1,000-yard rusher in six consecutive seasons, and established a franchise record (five, 1960-64). The next comparable streak was three (1971-73).

- ▶ The Packers offensive line helped Dorsey Levens to the barrier in 1999, and Green over the last five seasons (2000-04).
- ▶ Beightol broke Bill Austin's Packers record among O-line coaches; Austin's unit, which executed the "run to daylight" Lombardi Sweep, recorded five individual 1,000-yard rushing seasons (Jim Taylor, 1960-64).

WITH AN 11-POINT LEAD: The Packers under Sherman are 37-2 with a lead of at least 11 points, at any point in the game, including six of their 10 wins in 2004.

ANOTHER NAME JOINS THE QB LIST: Sage Rosenfels Jan. 2 became the 11th quarterback to make his first NFL start this season, joining Matt Schaub (Dec. 26), John Navarre and Luke McCown (Dec. 5), Drew Henson (Nov. 25), Eli Manning (Nov. 21), Craig Krenzel (Oct. 31), Chris Simms (Oct. 10), Ben Roethlisberger (Sept. 26), Ken Dorsey (Sept. 19) and Carson Palmer (Sept. 12).

▶ Rosenfels became the 183rd quarterback to start an NFL game since Brett Favre launched his current starting streak, Sept. 27, 1992.

STONEWALL JACKSON: Since Mike Sherman claimed Grady Jackson on waivers Nov. 4, 2003, the Packers are 15-4 in Jackson's games.

▶ Since Jackson joined the club, in five games without him (all in 2004), the Packers are 1-4.

ANOTHER ELECTION PUTS STREAK IN PERSPECTIVE: Since Brett Favre launched his starting streak Sept. 27, 1992, people have moved from cassettes to CDs and 1 billion people went "on-line." The streak has encompassed the rise and fall of Martha Stewart, Beanie Babies, Ross Perot, Celine Dion and Y2K. Over the last 12-plus years, *The Bridges of Madison County*, *The Client* and *Cold Mountain* have gone from the best-seller list to the big screen to the video rental store. And, sandwiched within the streak are the O.J. Simpson trial, the first and last episodes of NBC's hit series *Friends* and Bill Clinton's two terms in office.

▶ In fact, Nov. 2 marked the fourth time during Favre's streak Americans have gone to the polls to vote for President. Clinton defeated George Bush (1992), won a second term over Bob Dole and Ross Perot (1996), George W. Bush beat Al Gore (2000) and won another term Nov. 2 (2004), defeating John Kerry.

LONGWELL & BARKER: Ryan Longwell since Oct. 11 when Bryan Barker began holding for the injured Doug Pederson, is 21-for-23 on FGs and 39-for-39 on PATs, including 50- and 53-yard field goals.



SPEAKING OF BARKER: The veteran has 828 straight punts without a block (his last was with Kansas City, Dec. 12, 1993, at Denver, by Reggie Rivers). That's the second-longest streak in league annals:

ONE PLAY CAN TURN AROUND SEASON: Ultimately, the Packers' four-game losing streak began with one play. And, the season turned around with another play in the Oct. 17 win at Detroit, launching a six-game streak.

- ▶ On Sept. 19 vs. Chicago, with Green Bay poised to take a 10-7 lead on first-and-goal from the Bears' 2, Brian Urlacher pierced the Packers' blocking scheme, stripped Ahman Green and Mike Brown returned the fumble 95 yards for a touchdown. Green Bay never recovered, and lost, 21-10, launching a four-game slide.
- ▶ On Oct. 17, Darren Sharper picked off Joey Harrington and, knowing already that defensive scores usually win NFL games, leaped over Dominic Raiola on a passionate return to the end zone. The play, at a crucial time in the third quarter, gave the Packers a 24-10 lead.

PUNT PROTECTION: The Packers haven't had a punt blocked in more than nine years, since Sept. 11, 1995, at Chicago, where the Bears' Anthony Marshall blocked Craig Hentrich. The streak spans 722 punts.

- ▶ Josh Bidwell, who signed in March as an unrestricted free agent with Tampa Bay, left with the team's longest individual streak without a block: 308, from 2000-03.

SANDLOT FOOTBALL: Najeh Davenport says he has the best arm among Green Bay's backs, but only Ahman Green (Oct. 17 at Detroit) and Tony Fisher (Oct. 24 vs. Dallas) have thrown passes this season, both for TDs.

- ▶ Including Green and Fisher, four players threw for TDs, the most by a Packers team since the 1987 strike year. The last time four Packers threw TDs in a non-strike season was Bart Starr's first year as head coach, 1975 — QBs John Hadl, Don Milan and Carlos Brown, and rookie RB Willard Harrell.

THE TD-PASS STREAK: Favre saw his streak of games with a TD pass end at 36 on Dec. 5 at Philadelphia. Over a longer stretch, he actually threw for a TD in 43 of 44 games, since Jan. 6, 2002. On Oct. 20, 2002, LaVar Arrington sacked him and sprained the quarterback's lateral collateral ligament, forcing him from that game. Had Favre remained and thrown for a TD, he could've challenged Unitas late this year. Instead, his recent streak began when he shrugged off the torn ligament in his knee two years ago and returned for Green Bay's next game. Longest all-time streaks:

FAVRE'S MAGIC NUMBER — 100.0: Elias Sports Bureau, the NFL's official statistician for half a century, never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis. The company implemented the system to reflect efficiency over an entire season, or an entire career.

- ▶ Nonetheless, in games when Brett Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 68-7. They're 38-0 at home and 30-7 on the road.

LAST PLACE FOR FIRST TIME IN 16 YEARS: Earlier in October, the Packers were alone in last place for the first time since 1988.

- ▶ The last time Green Bay was alone in last place after at least three games was Dec. 18, 1988, after a season-ending road win over the Phoenix Cardinals. Ironically, that win cost the Packers the No. 1 draft choice in 1989, and instead of Troy Aikman, the team took Tony Mandarich second overall. Had Aikman guided Green Bay rather than Dallas, the Packers may never have acquired Brett Favre.

TURNOVERS TAKE AWAY WINS: The Packers under Mike Sherman are now 37-3 (22-0 at home) when committing one or fewer turnovers.

- ▶ Including six of their 10 2004 wins, they're also 15-0 under Sherman in turnover-free games. Over a longer stretch, the team has won 21 straight zero-turnover contests, dating to a loss at Minnesota, Dec. 1, 1997.
- ▶ Since an Oct. 21, 2001, loss at Minnesota, the Packers have won 26 straight when ahead in turnover margin. Overall under Sherman, the Packers are 36-1 under the same criteria.

SHERMAN REACHES NO. 50: Mike Sherman Nov. 14 posted career win No. 50, including playoffs. Curly Lambeau (1929) and Mike Holmgren (1996) won NFL championships the year they recorded their 50th win (Vince Lombardi had already won two). Sherman was 50-28-0 (.641) in 78 games.

WHAT TOOK PACKERS, VIKINGS SO LONG TO MEET IN PLAYOFFS? SIMPLY PUT, FOOTBALL FATES DID NOT 'COOPERATE' UNTIL NOW

It was bound to happen...sooner or later.

That the Green Bay Packers would meet the Minnesota Vikings in the National Football League playoffs, that is.

Now that such a confrontation is finally at hand — with the long-awaited pairing becoming a reality in Lambeau Field Sunday afternoon — it prompts the obvious and inevitable question: What took so long?

The Vikings, after all, have been in the NFL since 1961, the year they entered the league as an expansion team — and joined the Packers in the Western Conference.

Simply put, the primary reason such a meeting has never taken place is directly traceable to the teams' success — or lack thereof — in reaching the playoffs simultaneously — or the luck of the draw while advancing in the post-season.

It just hasn't happened.

From 1970 to 1990, there was a league rule which decreed that two teams within a given division could not meet in the first round of the playoffs, which would have tended to limit the chances of such a postseason meeting. But it never has been necessary to apply the rule in the case of the Packers and Vikings.

There have been two significant opportunities, however, for a postseason face-off between the Green and Gold and the Purple Gang...in back-to-back situations.

And, they occurred during the Packers' successive trips to Super Bowls XXXI and XXXII following the 1996 and 1997 seasons, when the neighborhood rivals were one game away from squaring off.

In the former, the Packers drew a first-round bye as NFC Central champions (13-3) and Minnesota was a Wild Card qualifier but fell to the Dallas Cowboys, 40-15. If the Vikings had won, they would have faced the Packers in the following week's divisional playoffs.

The Packers, meanwhile, went on to defeat the New England Patriots in Super Bowl XXXI, 35-21.

There was a somewhat similar scenario in '97, when the Vikings qualified as a Wild Card and defeated the New York Giants, 23-22, in their opening assignment and the Packers, as division champions, had the opening weekend off.

Then with a potential meeting with the Purple for the NFC Championship in the offing, the Green and Gold defeated the Tampa Bay Buccaneers in the Divisional Playoffs, 21-7, but the Vikings fell by the wayside, losing to the San Francisco 49ers, 38-22.

That year, the Packers went on to defeat the 49ers for the NFC title on a windy, rain-swept afternoon in San Francisco, 23-10, to advance to Super Bowl XXXII against John Elway and the Denver Broncos.

* * *

In addition to Sunday's matchup being the first-ever postseason showdown between the Packers and Vikings, it will find the Green and Gold coming full circle against the so-called "Black and Blue Division" in the playoffs.

Translation: The Packers, after meeting the Vikings in a postseason game, will have faced all three of their current NFC North Division rivals in playoff competition.

In terms of time, this "process" has taken decades to complete.

The Packers and their feisty neighbors to the south, the Chicago Bears, were the first members of the foursome to meet in a playoff, clashing in the very first divisional playoff in NFL history — at Chicago's Wrigley Field in 1941 — before there was a designated "Black and Blue Division."

The playoff was necessitated when the Packers and the defending NFL champion Bears tied for the Western Division championship during the '41 regular season with matching 10-1 records.

The teams had split during the regular season, the Bears prevailing, 25-17, in their initial '41 meeting in Green Bay's "old" City Stadium, and the Packers returning the favor in a rematch at Chicago's Wrigley Field, 16-14.

The latter was considered a major upset, the Bears having demolished the Washington Redskins, 73-0, in the 1940 championship game and gone undefeated in '41 until they encountered the Packers in their Nov. 2 rematch.

The Green and Gold were unable to match the Midway Monsters' firepower in the playoff contest, played in Wrigley Field on Dec. 14, the Bears carrying the day, 33-14.

The Bears then went on to dispatch the New York Giants, 37-9, the following Sunday to capture the NFL championship.

The Packers have faced their other current division rivals, the Detroit Lions, twice in postseason play — and won both games, coming from behind to post a 28-24, last-minute victory in a Wild Card playoff in the Pontiac, Mich., Silverdome following the 1993 season, and a 16-12 win in another Wild Card playoff in Lambeau Field following the 1994 season.

In the former, Brett Favre's 40-yard touchdown pass to wide receiver Sterling Sharpe in the final minute gave Green Bay one of the most dramatic victories in its highly successful postseason history, which has seen the Packers win 24 of 37 playoff games.

Favre's pass, a scrambling, across-the-body throw from extreme left to extreme right, found Sharpe wide open in the end zone with 55 seconds remaining.

Favre's heroic climaxed a see-saw struggle with the NFC Central Division champion Lions.

Earlier, rookie safety George Teague returned an Erik Kramer interception 101 yards for a touchdown, thus recording the longest such runback in NFL playoff history and giving Green Bay a 21-17 lead.

Sharpe also invaded the record book, tying an NFL playoff mark with three touchdown receptions, his first coming on a 12-yard Favre strike in the second quarter and the second on a 28-yard bolt in the third period.

The Lions' Barry Sanders, meanwhile, rebounded from a knee injury in spectacular fashion, rushing for 169 yards in the Lions' losing effort to treat a Silverdome house of 68,479 fans.

A Wild Card "rematch" with the Lions the following December — punctuated by a classic defensive performance from the Green and Gold — turned out to be one for the Packers' memory book...as well as the NFL record book.

The Packers outlasted the Lions in Green Bay's first playoff game since 1982. With a defense directed by coordinator Fritz Shurmur, the Packers held the Lions' redoubtable Barry Sanders to a career-low minus 1-yard on 13 rushing attempts, and limited the Lions collectively to a minus-4 yards on the ground — wiping out a 31-year-old league playoff record.

Offensively, Brett Favre directed several long scoring drives, including a 76-yard excursion on the game's opening series, climaxed by a 3-yard touchdown run by Dorsey Levens.

The Packers, controlling the football for 37-plus minutes, played turnover-free football throughout, to the pleasure of 58,125 fans. Veteran placekicker Chris Jacke contributed three field goals to the cause, including a Packers postseason-record 51-yard effort.

The Lions moved to within a field goal in the fourth quarter (13-10), on Dave Krieg's 3-yard touchdown pass to Brett Perriman, and reached the Packers' 11-yard line on their final drive in the game's closing moments.

But Shurmur's Green Bay defense settled the issue, recapturing the ball on downs before Packers punter Craig Hentrich took an intentional safety to run the day's final seven seconds off the clock.

CHARLOTTE, N.C. (AP) — Ahman Green ran for 119 yards and scored three touchdowns to lead Green Bay to a 24-14 win over the defending NFC champion Panthers on Monday Night Football.

Green scored on touchdown runs of 3 and 6 yards and rushed for 119 yards against a Carolina defense that gave up only four individual 100-yard rushing games last season.

Although he had to receive intravenous fluids after the game, he ran with ease during the game and gave no indication this was the first time this year Green Bay's entire offensive unit was on the field together.

Carolina, meanwhile, lost three of its 2003 starters on the offensive line. Behind 35-year-old Matt Willig, who last started a game at right tackle in 1997, and 33-year-old Rich Tylski, who was out of football the past two years, the Panthers managed only 38 yards on the ground.

Green Bay also capitalized on two Carolina turnovers, cashing them in for 14 points.

Brad Hoover fumbled at the start of the second half, giving Green Bay the ball at the Carolina 31. Although Robert Ferguson's touchdown catch was negated by offensive pass interference, the Packers still converted the turnover into points when Green ran nearly untouched into the end zone for a 17-7 lead.

The Panthers then put together their own drive, only to turn the ball over again just as they got into scoring position. Delhomme threw a pass to Smith, who bobbed it twice before it squirted up and into Nick Barnett's hands.

Green Bay took possession of the ball and handed off to Green, who steadily pounded away at Carolina's defense. Running through gaping holes late in the third quarter, he gained 43 yards in the period then scored his third touchdown of the game on a 3-yard catch at the edge of the end zone to give the Packers a 24-7 lead.

Green Bay defensive tackle Grady Jackson dislocated his left knee and running back Najeh Davenport strained his hamstring...Favre moved into third place all-time with his 126th career victory, passing Fran Tarkenton. Favre also passed Tarkenton for fourth in career passing attempts with 6,486.

GREEN BAY (AP) — Lovie Smith didn't take long to fulfill his No. 1 goal of beating Green Bay. Mike Brown's 95-yard fumble return for a touchdown sparked the Bears' 21-10 victory over the Packers, Chicago's third victory in its last 21 games against their archrivals.

When Smith was hired as Bears coach on Jan. 15, he declared his top priority was knocking off the Packers, the two-time defending division champs. Not only did Smith declare the Packers his top prize, but said he knew just how to beat them. The last two times he'd faced Green Bay was as the St. Louis Rams' defensive coordinator and the Packers committed a combined 10 turnovers in those games.

Brett Favre threw two interceptions, but the killer was Ahman Green's fumble just before halftime. On first down from the 2 just after the 2-minute warning, linebacker Brian Urlacher stormed into the backfield and stripped Green. Brown scooped it up and rumbled 95 yards down the Bears' jubilant sideline to give Chicago a 14-3 halftime lead instead of a 10-7 deficit.

It was Brown's fifth defensive score, a team record, and the second-longest fumble return in Bears history, surpassed only by team founder George Halas' 98-yard return in 1923. It was also the second-longest fumble return for a score ever given up by Green Bay.

The Packers weren't demoralized by the 14-point swing, linebacker Nick Barnett insisted, but Green Bay never recovered in losing its second straight home opener.

"I was just trying ... to get a fumble and return one for a touchdown, too," Barnett said. He nearly did after recovering David Terrell's fumble with four minutes remaining, but right tackle John Tait saved the score with a lunging tackle at midfield. "I just got tripped up," Barnett said. "If he would have missed me, it would have turned the whole game around, that's how close it was."

With nose tackle Grady Jackson (knee) out and James Lee making his first NFL start, Thomas Jones carried 23 times for 152 yards and a touchdown as the Bears (1-1) evened their record after allowing Detroit to end the longest road losing streak in the NFL a week ago.

With that, Favre broke Dan Marino's NFL record of 24 touchdowns against a single opponent. Green also tied Jim Taylor's franchise record with a 26th career 100-yard rushing game.

The Packers had 234 yards and just three points in the first half. After Ryan Longwell banged the ball off the right upright on a 45-yard field goal attempt, Chicago's Rex Grossman hit fullback Bryan Johnson, who bullied his way over cornerback Michael Hawthorne for an 11-yard touchdown and a 7-3 lead the Bears would never relinquish.

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — Peyton Manning and Brett Favre threw nine touchdown passes between them and weren't even the heroes. That role went to Jason David, a rookie defensive back who stole the ball from Javon Walker to clinch a 45-31 win.

The superstar quarterbacks certainly did their jobs. Manning threw for 393 yards and five first-half touchdowns. Favre threw for 358 yards and four TDs and the Packers rallied from an 18-point halftime deficit to within a touchdown.

But the play of the game was made by David and Nick Harper. David, burned all game by Favre, stripped Walker after he caught Favre's pass just across midfield and Harper returned it to the Green Bay 36. That set up Edgerrin James' 1-yard touchdown run with 1:49 left.

The game started with five touchdown passes in the first 11 minutes, three by Manning and two by Favre, a pace that would have added up to 175 points between them if they had kept going. Indianapolis threw 22 passes and did not have a running play in the first quarter as Manning and Favre aired it out.

The game inevitably slowed down. The Colts (2-1) gained just 96 yards total in the second and third quarters and scored just 10 points in the second half after leading 35-17 at intermission.

Green Bay (1-2) scored on its first possession of the second half, a 65-yard drive capped by Favre's 12-yard pass to Walker, who had the game of his life with 11 catches for 200 yards and three TDs.

Mike Vanderjagt's 45-yard field goal early in the fourth quarter made it 38-24. But Robert Ferguson's 71-yard kickoff return set up Favre's fourth TD pass, a 27-yarder to Donald Driver and it was 38-31. The Packers got the ball again and were moving when David and Harper made the big defensive play.

Favre and Manning, the NFL's most durable quarterbacks, had met just once, a 26-24 Packers win in Green Bay four seasons ago. This was Favre's 192nd consecutive start, most in NFL history, and the 99th straight for Manning, the second-longest current streak.

Favre's first TD pass made it his 28th straight game with one, tying him for third-longest streak with Dave Krieg. He also became the third quarterback with 4,000 completions; only Dan Marino and John Elway have more.

Favre had his 50th career game with three or more touchdown passes and 17th with four.

Never before in NFL history has there been a game in which the quarterbacks each threw for 350 yards, at least four TDs and no INTs.

GREEN BAY (AP) — Tiki Barber rushed for 182 yards and scored on a 52-yard touchdown run, and Kurt Warner threw a touchdown pass to Jeremy Shockey in a 14-7 victory at Lambeau Field, where Brett Favre was knocked from the game with a concussion.

The Giants improved to 3-1 despite a series of missed opportunities, including three errant field goal attempts by Steve Christie. The Packers fell to 1-3 for the first time since 1993 and have their first three-game losing streak under fifth-year coach Mike Sherman.

Favre sustained a concussion when defensive lineman William Joseph knocked him to the ground in the third quarter and missed the next two plays. Favre, against medical clearance, went back on fourth-and-5, waved backup Doug Pederson to the sideline and floated a 28-yard touchdown pass to Javon Walker for a 7-0 lead. Doctors would not allow Favre to return.

Favre, who extended his NFL quarterbacks record to 212 straight starts, counting playoffs, didn't speak to reporters afterward. Several teammates said they doubted his starting streak was in jeopardy.

Warner said that when they spoke on the field afterward, Favre was fuzzy.

Two plays after Favre's TD, Barber beat the blitz with a 52-yard touchdown run to tie it at 7. Warner appeared to have made a costly mistake when he did a hook slide 18 inches shy of the goal line, but Shockey juked cornerback Michael Hawthorne and grabbed a 4-yard TD pass on third-and-goal to give New York a 14-7 lead with 12 minutes left.

Pederson hurt his side on a hit near the sideline but stayed in until the final play, when third-stringer Craig Nall threw a 24-yard pass to Robert Ferguson to the Giants 32. But the clock expired before he could spike the ball and take a shot at the end zone.

Neither team did much offensively in a scoreless first half, the first time since Oct. 6, 1980, that the teams had gone into their locker rooms at Lambeau Field without any points.

Warner's streak was ended at 127 passes without an interception when he threw into triple coverage from the 2 in the first half and Darren Sharper picked it off...The Packers have lost six of their last 12 home games after going 22-3 in their first 25 under Sherman...Favre has thrown a TD pass in 29 straight games, third-longest streak in NFL history.

GREEN BAY (AP) — Chris Brown ran for 148 yards and two long touchdowns, and Tennessee cruised to a 48-27 rout of the stumbling Packers, scoring more points than any visitor ever at the famed stadium.

The Titans (2-3) snapped a three-game losing streak and sent the Packers (1-4) to their fourth consecutive loss, Green Bay's first four-game losing streak since 1991 and its first 0-3 start at home since 1988.

From 1996 to 2002, Green Bay was 53-7 at home, including the postseason. The Packers lost to Atlanta in a playoff game in January 2003, starting a Lambeau slump that reached 6-7 with the loss to Tennessee.

Only eight teams in NFL history have overcome a 1-4 start to reach the playoffs, including the Titans two years ago.

Tennessee scored on five of its first six possessions with Brown, who had 27 carries, going in on its first two series, from 37 and 29 yards out. The Packers had six turnovers, including four in the second half. The Titans didn't turn the ball over at all.

Steve McNair (chest, ankle) returned after missing Tennessee's previous game, and threw two touchdown passes, including an 11-yarder to Eddie Berlin in the third quarter after Brett Favre's third interception.

Favre extended his NFL record with his 213th consecutive start, including playoffs, despite numerous injuries, including a mild concussion he suffered the prior week. Favre also played after the death of his 24-year-old brother-in-law in an ATV accident at the family home in Mississippi.

Both teams had lost three straight, and much of the blame went to poor run defense, which showed up right away again for Green Bay as Brown carried nine times for 90 yards in the first quarter. The early deficit altered Green Bay's plan to give the Titans a steady diet of Ahmad Green, who finished with only 10 carries for 33 yards.

The Packers had only 5 yards rushing on five carries in the first half.

Green fumbled the ball at the Green Bay 34 with nose tackle Kevin Carter recovering for Tennessee, the fourth 2004 fumble for the Packers' running back. Anderson converted Green's turnover into a 36-yard field goal that made it 17-0 with 6 minutes left in the first quarter. At that point, the Titans had outgained the Packers 145 yards to 4.

Favre completed all five of his passes for 70 yards, capping the drive with a 1-yard toss to tight end Bubba Franks that made it 24-10 with 6½ minutes left in the first half. After Anderson was good from 38 but missed from 42, Longwell's 53-yard field goal with 2 seconds before half-time made it 27-13.

Packers' backup QB Craig Nall threw his first career touchdown pass on a 1-yarder to Javon Walker with a minute left.

DETROIT (AP) — Brett Favre and Darren Sharper have forgotten more motivational speeches than they can remember. If the Green Bay Packers bounce back this season from their 1-4 start, the pep talk head coach/GM Mike Sherman delivered the night before playing at Detroit will be memorable.

That did the trick. Favre threw two touchdown passes, and Sharper scored off an interception to lead the Packers to a 38-10 win over the Lions. But the lopsided game was close until Sharper stepped in front of Joey Harrington's forced pass early in the third quarter and returned it 36 yards -- with a juke move and a hurdle into the end zone -- to give the Packers a 24-10 lead.

Favre was effective despite missing Robert Ferguson (calf, ankle) for the whole game and Javon Walker (ribs, shoulder) for much of it. Donald Driver made up for the losses with nine receptions for 110 yards and two TDs.

Favre extended his streak with a TD pass to 31 games, passing Dan Marino and trailing only Johnny Unitas' record run of 47 straight. Favre played in his 197th game with the Packers, passing Bart Starr for No. 1 in franchise history. With 165 yards passing in the first half, Favre surpassed Fran Tarkenton for fourth place on the NFL career list with 47,106.

Ahman Green ran for 81 yards, the most against Detroit this season, and threw a 20-yard TD pass to Driver to put Green Bay ahead 38-10 early in the fourth. Najeh Davenport added 62 yards rushing and a touchdown. The Packers (2-4) hope this win will get them back into the play-off race in the NFC. Just eight teams have reached the postseason after a 1-4 start.

Bob Slowik's defense turned in one of the finest efforts in recent franchise history. Its 125 total yards and five first downs allowed were Green Bay's fewest since the "Snow Bowl," Dec. 1, 1985, vs. Tampa Bay (65 yards, five first downs). GREEN BAY (AP) — With their coach-general manager Mike Sherman directing the offense for the second straight game, the Packers scored on their first seven possessions to thrash the Dallas Cowboys 41-20.

The Packers (3-4) snapped a three-game losing streak at Lambeau Field and Brett Favre beat the Cowboys (2-4) for just the second time in 10 tries despite jamming his right wrist early in the game.

Sherman called the game with offensive coordinator Tom Rossley, still weak from heart surgery, offering advice from the coaches box.

Just about everything he called caught the Cowboys off-guard. Favre threw two touchdown passes, Ahman Green ran for his first two TDs since the season opener, Ryan Longwell kicked two field goals and the halfback option pass produced points for the second straight week.

"It's not easy, it's a grind," said Sherman, who directed the Packers to 31 points and 343 yards last week at Detroit when they snapped a four-game losing streak. "It helps that Tom Rossley did a great job in a supporting cast. The halfback pass was his call."

It was another masterpiece as Green Bay gained 480 yards and punter Bryan Barker wasn't needed until 9½ minutes were left.

Green ended a monthlong funk by rushing for 163 yards, including a 90-yard score in the third quarter that was the longest Dallas had ever surrendered. He became the second player in NFL history with two career touchdown runs of at least 90 yards, joining Bo Jackson, who did it in 1987. Green, who had a 98-yarder last December, also set a franchise record with his 27th 100-yard game, breaking Jim Taylor's record.

In between Longwell's first-half field goals of 26 and 40 yards, Green scored on a 1-yard run and Javon Walker (eight catches for 129 yards) caught a 5-yard TD pass as the Packers took a 20-6 halftime lead.

Tony Fisher's first NFL toss found Bubba Franks alone in the end zone to make it 27-6 in the third quarter.

Tight end Jason Witten (eight catches for 112 yards) blew past cornerback Al Harris and caught a 42-yard touchdown pass from Vinny Testaverde that made it 27-13 and gave the Cowboys hope for their first win at Lambeau Field in five tries.

But the Packers quickly responded with Favre's 33-yard TD toss to Donald Driver to make it 34-13.

Darren Sharper sprained his left knee. The Packers, who turned the ball over 14 times in their first five games, didn't have a turnover for the second straight week.

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — Al Harris' interception, one play after a fourth-quarter Washington penalty nullified the go-ahead touchdown, set up an insurance score to cap a 28-14 victory that pulled Green Bay (4-4) back to .500 after a 1-4 start.

Clinton Portis scored on a 43-yard reception from Mark Brunell with less than three minutes left, apparently tying the game at 20, but an illegal motion penalty on James Thrash erased the play, and the Packers capitalized shortly after.

Brett Favre had an erratic game, playing with a sprained hand, a banged thumb and the distraction of his wife undergoing breast cancer treatment. He completed 20 of 32 passes for 289 yards and a touchdown and three interceptions.

Favre was brilliant early and out-of-sync late. The Packers scored on their first three possessions to take a 17-0 lead, but two interceptions by Shawn Springs set up Washington's two touchdowns, and Fred Smoot's interception set up the penalty-negated touchdown pass to Portis.

Favre grimaced at times as he grabbed the throwing hand he sprained the previous week in a victory against Dallas, and he banged his thumb somehow in the third quarter, but he downplayed the injuries.

"I'm pleased with the win, but I can't be satisfied with the way I played," said Favre, who extended his streak to 33 games with at least one TD pass, in his 199th consecutive regular-season game. "It would be nice to sit here and blame it on something else, but I'm not going to do that."

Since learning of his wife's breast cancer three weeks ago, an ordeal that became public in the week before the game, Favre has completed 68 of 100 passes and the Packers have outscored their opponents 107-44. They headed into a bye week to get several players healthy.

The Packers gained 361 yards, becoming the first team this season to tally more than 300 yards on the Redskins, whose defense entered the game ranked No. 1 in the NFL.

The Packers' first three drives included completions of 41, 48 and 48 yards, equaling the number of 40-plus passing gains by the Redskins all season. Favre picked on a secondary missing two starters.

Favre passed John Elway at No. 2 on the all-time completions list, giving him 4,133 to Elway's 4,123. Dan Marino is the all-time leader with 4,967.

GREEN BAY (AP) — Shootouts usually come down to who has the ball at the end. This one came down to who had it at the bottom. Minnesota's Derek Ross and Green Bay's Ben Steele, who had been cut by the Vikings in training camp, each claimed ownership of Robert Ferguson's fumble at midfield in the closing minutes.

The officials eventually ruled Green Bay had possession, and the Packers drove for Ryan Longwell's 33-yard field goal as time expired for a 34-31 victory, their fourth straight.

The Vikings, who had rallied to tie with two touchdowns in a 93-second span, lost their third straight and fell into a tie with the Packers atop the NFC Central at 5-4.

Ferguson, returning a kickoff, broke into the open at midfield and thought he had a clear shot at the end zone when Antoine Winfield swooped in and forced the fumble.

Both Brett Favre and Daunte Culpepper threw four touchdown passes without an interception. It was Favre's 18th game with four or more TD tosses, second only to Dan Marino's 21. Favre hit receiver Javon Walker, tailback Tony Fisher, tight end Bubba Franks and fullback William Henderson in the end zone as the Packers built a seemingly safe 31-17 lead.

Culpepper, working without star receiver Randy Moss (strained hamstring) for the second successive game, passed for 363 yards, connecting with Nate Burleson 11 times for 141 yards and a score.

So, just a month after being left for dead, the Packers have won four straight in their quest to become the ninth team to overcome a 1-4 start to reach the playoffs. The Vikings are in the midst of another dive that threatens to ruin a strong start.

Ahman Green rushed for 145 yards on 21 carries despite injuring his left kneecap when he was leg-whipped in the first half. It was his fourth 100-yard game this season and team record 28th of his career.

Culpepper was sacked four times.

HOUSTON (AP) — Brett Favre led the Packers back from a 13-3 fourth-quarter deficit and Ryan Longwell kicked a field goal as time expired for the second straight week, sending the Packers to their fifth straight win, 16-13.

It marked the first time in 14 years a Green Bay team climbed out of a fourth-quarter hole of at least 10 points. Favre completed 6 of 7 passes for 42 yards on the final drive -- the only incompletion came when he spiked the ball to stop the clock -- to complete Green Bay's rally. He finished 33 of 50 for 383 yards with two interceptions and a touchdown to Houston native Donald Driver in the fourth period. Driver had quite a homecoming, catching 10 passes for 148 yards.

The Packers sputtered on offense throughout the first three quarters and clearly missed injured star tailback Ahman Green, who was knocked out of the game with a rib injury in the second quarter. He finished with 15 yards on only five carries.

Relying on a third-string tailback (Tony Fisher) and a guy called up from the practice squad (Walter Williams), Favre was forced to shoulder much of the offensive burden. Favre finally got going in the fourth quarter, leading the Packers on a seven-play, 81-yard drive he capped with a 24-yard touchdown pass to Driver. Favre made a deft pump fake on the play, fooling rookie cornerback Dunta Robinson and giving Driver a wide-open path into the end zone. It also extended Favre's streak of games with a touchdown pass to 35 games, second in NFL history to Johnny Unitas' 47 games.

The Packers scored again on Longwell's 38-yard field goal midway through the quarter, tying the game at 13. But the Texans went three plays and out for the third straight time, and Favre predictably came through in the clutch.

Before a record crowd of 70,769 at buzzing Reliant Stadium, the Texans hoped to summon a little more prime-time magic.

The Packers hadn't visited Houston since 1992, Favre's first year as a starter with Green Bay...Bhawoh Jue started at free safety for Green Bay in place of Darren Sharper (knee) for a second straight game...Packers DE Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila had two sacks Sunday, moving past Ezra Janson for third in franchise history with 43½ in his career.

GREEN BAY (AP) — Brett Favre celebrated his 200th straight regular-season start with three touchdown passes and yet another record in the Green Bay Packers' 45-17 rout of the St. Louis Rams. Favre topped 20 touchdown passes for the 11th straight season, breaking a tie with Dan Marino on a 7-yard toss to tight end Bubba Franks in the second quarter. He also threw touchdown passes to Javon Walker and Donald Driver as the Packers (7-4) got two defensive touchdowns and won their sixth straight to keep pace with Minnesota atop the NFC North.

Favre didn't have his co-star, Ahman Green, who was out with injured ribs. But Najeh Davenport came up with a strong imitation, gaining 178 yards on 19 carries in his first NFL start even though he had two sore hamstrings. Davenport's total, the fifth-highest in franchise history overall, marked the third-best by an NFL player in his first start over the last 20 seasons (1985-2004).

Marc Bulger threw for more yards — 448 — against Green Bay than any quarterback ever had, completing 35 of 53 passes, but he was overshadowed by Favre and St. Louis (5-6) missed a chance to tie Seattle atop the NFC's woeful West.

Isaac Bruce caught nine passes for 170 yards and a touchdown but his two fumbles were returned for touchdowns, one by rookie Ahmad Carroll to start the scoring and one by Michael Hawthorne to cap the rout in the final minute.

Bruce's 4-yard TD catch just before halftime brought St. Louis to 21-10, and in the third quarter the Rams benefited from a new rule this year that allows the coach to call a timeout from the sideline when Mike Martz's timeout negated a lost fumble by Steven Jackson.

But Martz followed up with a questionable call -- a fake field goal when a 42-yarder by Jeff Wilkins would have made it a one-possession game. Wilkins was stuffed 12 yards shy of the first down on fourth-and-7. Not only did the Rams get nothing out of a nearly eight-minute drive, but the Packers went 71 yards in four plays, capped by Driver's leaping 16-yard touchdown catch that gave Green Bay a 28-10 lead.

Davenport capped his night with a 40-yard touchdown run on fourth-and-1 with 1:52 left to make it 38-17.

Favre's record streak of starts moved to 219, counting playoffs, and is almost 100 more than Ron Jaworski's previous NFL quarterback mark of 123.

Joey Thomas forced a fumble on the Rams' first possession, and Carroll, a fellow rookie cornerback, picked it up and ran 40 yards for his first career touchdown. It was the Packers' first recovery of an opponent's fumble since Sept. 19 against Chicago, and the first contest in which Green Bay recorded multiple defensive scores since Oct. 2, 1983. Carroll also posted his first career interception on a pass in the end zone that was intended for Bruce early in the third quarter.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Donovan McNabb threw a career-high five touchdown passes in the first half and finished with a team-record 464 yards passing, leading the Philadelphia Eagles to a 47-17 victory over the Green Bay Packers on Sunday.

Brian Westbrook had 11 catches for 156 yards and three TDs and Terrell Owens caught eight passes for 161 yards and one score. McNabb set a team record by completing his first 14 passes and finished 32 of 43.

Meanwhile, Brett Favre threw two interceptions that led to Philadelphia's first two scores. His streak of games with a TD pass was snapped at 37, second in NFL history to Johnny Unitas' 47 straight.

The four-time NFC East champion Eagles (11-1) matched the best start in team history. Since losing to Pittsburgh 27-3 last month, the Eagles have won four in a row by at least 20 points, outscoring their opponents 151-50.

The Packers (7-5) snapped a six-game winning streak, but remained tied with Minnesota for first place in the NFC North.

A rematch of a thrilling playoff game 11 months ago, this one never lived up to its hype. The Eagles scored four TDs in the second quarter, led 35-3 at halftime and rested most of their starters with 8:18 left.

The Packers were 72 seconds away from going to the NFC championship game last January, before the Eagles converted a fourth-and-26, tied the game in regulation and won in overtime. Philadelphia then lost the NFC title game for the third straight year, while Green Bay fired its defensive coordinator and agonized over the loss throughout the offseason.

For one quarter, this game was competitive. McNabb lost a fumble inside Green Bay's 25 on Philadelphia's opening possession, but Favre was intercepted by Brian Dawkins on the ensuing drive. Three plays later, McNabb and Owens connected on a 41-yard catch-and-run TD. Owens caught the ball at the 26, streaked down the left sideline, broke one tackle and leaped into the end zone for his 14th touchdown, breaking the team's single-season record.

Favre drove the Packers to Philadelphia's 15 early in the second quarter, but was intercepted by Sheldon Brown at the 7. McNabb then led the Eagles 93 yards, tossing a 9-yard pass to Westbrook for a 14-0 lead.

McNabb threw a 41-yard TD pass to Westbrook on Philadelphia's next drive, giving the Eagles a 21-0 lead. McNabb executed a perfect play-fake to fullback Josh Parry, and hit a wide-open Westbrook in the flat.

Packers backup quarterback Craig Nall threw TD passes of 1 yard to William Henderson and 17 yards to Javon Walker in the fourth quarter. Favre finished 14 of 29 for 131 yards. Running back Ahman Green wasn't a factor in his first game after sitting out with bruised ribs last week.

GREEN BAY (AP) — Ryan Longwell's 23-yard field goal gave Green Bay a 16-13 victory against the Lions and lifted the Packers (8-5) into first place in the NFC North by a game over Minnesota, which lost at home to Seattle. It was Longwell's third game-winner in five weeks and his 44th consecutive conversion from 40 yards in.

Brett Favre led Green Bay back from a 13-0 halftime deficit with four scoring drives, including a 90-yarder into the flag-whipping wind for the Packers' only touchdown after Ahman Green's 79-yard TD catch was negated by a debatable holding call on rookie center Scott Wells. Favre, who is 14-0 at home against the Lions, completed only 3 of 15 passes for 28 yards in the first half but he was an amazing 16-for-21 in the swirling winds for 160 yards and a touchdown in the second half.

Snow flurries dampened the field into what Longwell called a "swampy mess" and swirling winds with gusts up to 35 mph wreaked havoc on passes, punts and long snaps and caused a slew of drops.

The Lions wasted a prime chance to get into the playoff picture in the muddled NFC, falling to 5-8. Their quarterback, Joey Harrington, completed only 5 of 22 passes for 47 yards as the Lions relied on rookie running back Kevin Jones, who rushed 33 times for 156 yards and a touchdown. The Packers hadn't held an opponent to so few completions since Oct. 29, 1978, against Tampa Bay.

Longwell's game-winner capped a 10-play, 37-yard drive after the Packers got the ball back at the Detroit 42 with 3:27 left and the wind at their backs. The Packers had a terrible first half. Favre entered the game needing 28 yards to tie Dan Marino's NFL record of 13 consecutive 3,000-yard seasons, and he had exactly that amount at halftime. Jason Hanson's 31-yard field goal was the only scoring either team managed in the first quarter. Jones made it 10-0 when he deked safety Darren Sharper, slipped behind center Dominic Raiola and shook off Kabeer Gbajaj-Biamila on his way to scoring the first rushing touchdown Green Bay had allowed in 22 quarters. Hanson added a 36-yard field goal into the wind for a 13-0 halftime lead.

After Green's 79-yard touchdown catch-and-run was negated by head linesman Paul Weidner's holding call on Wells, the Packers were pushed back to their 13. Favre then drove the Packers downfield against the wind, capping the drive with a 23-yard touchdown toss to Donald Driver that made it 13-10 late in the third quarter.

GREEN BAY (AP) — Byron Leftwich threw two touchdown passes, Fred Taylor rushed for 165 yards and a touchdown and Rashean Mathis picked off Brett Favre twice, helping the Jaguars (8-6) stay in the thick of the AFC playoff race with a 28-25 victory over the Green Bay Packers. Temperatures were in the single digits and the wind chill was well below zero.

Jaguars safety Donovin Darius was ejected for a helmet-stripping, clothesline hit that sent wide receiver Robert Ferguson to the hospital with 4:41 remaining. Ferguson temporarily lost feeling in his legs, but regained feeling in an ambulance.

Favre turned over the ball four times and fell to 31-4 at home after Dec. 1, losing for just the second time in 40 cold-weather games at home.

Nevertheless, the Packers (8-6) became the ninth team in NFL history to reach the playoffs after a 1-4 start. They clinched before kickoff because Chicago, Dallas, Carolina and New York all lost in the run-of-the-mill NFC.

Favre hit Antonio Chatman with a 6-yard touchdown throw and found Donald Driver for the 2-point conversion to pull Green Bay to 28-25 with 1:08 left. But Jacksonville safety Nick Sorensen recovered the onside kick and the Jaguars handed Green Bay its fourth loss at Lambeau Field this season.

Leftwich was battered all afternoon, bruising his left wrist in the second quarter on a hit by Cullen Jenkins, but he hung in to guide the Jaguars to a season-high points total. Favre was also hurt in the second quarter and played with tape on his left wrist and thumb after jamming it into the ground.

Driver's 32-yard catch gave Green Bay a 17-14 lead in the third quarter, but Taylor put the Jaguars ahead for good 90 seconds later with a 32-yard run. Then Mathis intercepted in the end zone on first-and-goal from the 3.

Then, Del Rio went on fourth-and-goal from the 1 and rookie Greg Jones rewarded the risk with a touchdown that gave Jacksonville a 28-17 lead with 10 minutes left.

It was typical Green Bay winter weather: 12 degrees at kickoff with a wind chill of minus-3. But it was the Packers who looked completely out of their element. Green Bay committed 12 penalties for 101 yards, Ryan Longwell's streak of 45 straight field goals inside 40 yards ended and Ahman Green fumbled at the Jaguars 10, one of four Packers turnovers inside the Jacksonville 23.

About the only thing that went right for the Packers was safety Darren Sharper's heads-up touchdown. Kabere Gbaja-Biamila pummeled Leftwich and the ball squirted loose for what appeared to be an incompleton. While linebackers Hannibal Navies and Nick Barnett walked away from the ball, Jacksonville guard Vince Manuwai nonchalantly picked it up. Sharper came rushing in, poked it away, scooped it up and scampered 15 yards into the end zone.

Green posted his fifth straight 1,000-yard game, tying Jim Taylor's franchise record. Longwell became one of three players to reach 100 points in each of his first eight NFL seasons. Sharper has scored six TDs in his career, one shy of Herb Adderley's team record for a defensive player. The Packers hadn't lost a home finale since Favre's arrival in 1992.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Facing a seven-point deficit midway through the fourth quarter, Brett Favre brought Green Bay back again. For a Packers team that lost four of its first five games this season, this probably didn't seem like all that much trouble.

Favre guided a 76-yard drive to set up Ryan Longwell's game-ending 29-yard field goal, lifting the Packers to a 34-31 victory against the Minnesota Vikings — and clinching a third consecutive NFC North crown.

The Packers (9-6) trailed 31-24 with 8:18 left after Favre's third-down throw from his end zone was intercepted by Chris Claiborne and returned 12 yards to a touchdown. The Vikings (8-7), though, couldn't get what they needed from a pass defense that has struggled all season. Donald Driver — who had 11 receptions for 162 yards — made a nifty, falling-down catch of Favre's pass on fourth-and-goal at the 3 to tie it at 31 with 3:34 remaining after an 80-yard drive.

Minnesota appeared on its way to retaking the lead. But a holding penalty on Birk — the Vikings were flagged nine times for 78 yards — wiped out a 16-yard run by Michael Bennett that would have given them the ball at the Green Bay 40 right before the 2-minute warning.

After a punt, Favre got the ball at his 13 with 1:35 left. Twelve plays later, Longwell's kick sailed through the uprights, sending the Packers into celebration on their biggest rival's home field.

Favre finished 30-for-43 for 365 yards, three touchdowns and the interception. Ahman Green, who left briefly with a head injury, carried 19 times for 64 yards and a score.

Nate Burleson, who had a career day against the Packers last month, caught two passes for 110 yards and a score. Randy Moss had a touchdown among his two catches and 30 yards, and Bennett finished with 159 total yards on 20 touches.

The Packers secondary has had problems all season, and tackling was a major first-half deficiency. Burleson caught a short pass over the middle on third-and-5, shed Darren Sharper and raced 42 yards to the Green Bay 26. Later on that drive, Moss caught a 12-yard scoring pass from Culpepper when Al Harris slipped and couldn't stay with him near the edge of the end zone.

After Green bulled in for a tying touchdown on fourth-and-goal at the 1, Burleson escaped from Ahmad Carroll's arms near midfield following a catch and sprinted for a 68-yard score to make it 14-7.

That's when the game really got crazy. After using their final timeout of the half — Green Bay coach Mike Sherman went 0 for 2 on challenges — the Packers tied it again when Favre found a wide-open Bubba Franks for a 22-yard touchdown with 1:23 left.

Kelly Campbell returned the kickoff 55 yards, and Culpepper promptly threw a screen pass to Bennett — who sidestepped Nick Barnett at the line of scrimmage and scampered for a 38-yard score to make it 21-14 with 1:08 remaining. Bennett blew by Carroll inside the 10.

Antonio Chatman answered with a 59-yard kickoff return, giving Longwell a chance to make a 42-yard field goal as the half ended. A livid Vikings coach Mike Tice chucked his clipboard and pencil to the turf when an official clock stoppage for a measurement allowed Green Bay time to gather on fourth-and-1 for the kick with four seconds left. Those three points proved to be the winning margin.

Favre is 4-9 at the Metrodome, with victories in three of his past five games.

CHICAGO (AP) — Brett Favre worked up a sweat, threw two touchdowns passes in a short work day and got the Green Bay Packers tuned up for the playoffs. Green Bay's defense wasn't bad, either, tying a team record with nine sacks — four by Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila — and the Packers routed the Chicago Bears 31-14.

Now the Packers (10-6), who were already locked in as the No. 3 seed in the NFC, can get ready for an opening-round playoff game next weekend at home against the Vikings. Minnesota backed into a spot despite losing to the Redskins.

The Packers had no intention of completely resting their starters because they wanted to be sharp before the playoffs. Favre played the first quarter and one series in the second, going 9 of 13 for 196 yards and two touchdowns, helping the Packers beat the Bears (5-11) for the 21st time in the last 26 meetings — including 11 straight on the road.

Instead there was another milestone performance in an abbreviated afternoon: Favre went over 4,000 yards passing in a season for the fourth time in his career and reached 30 TD passes for an NFL-record eighth time before backup Craig Nall took over.

Trying to avoid injuries before the postseason, the Packers got a major scare late in the third quarter when Pro Bowl receiver Javon Walker caught a 43-yard pass and then hit his head on the turf as he was being tackled by Bobby Gray and Charles Tillman at the 21. Walker stayed on the ground for a couple of minutes before walking off with a trainer at his arm. He did not return to the game but was not seriously injured.

Wearing '92' on their helmets in memory of former teammate Reggie White, the Packers gave up an early touchdown before roaring to a 28-7 halftime lead against their oldest rival. Their defense played a White-like game.

"You can see the effect of pressure on the quarterback. It just helps us as a total defense," said Packers safety Darren Sharper, who returned an interception 43 yards for a TD to make it 21-7.

Favre went to work early and didn't stop before leaving the game. He completed five straight passes in an 84-yard drive, capping it with a game-tying 17-yard TD toss to Bubba Franks. Ahman Green, who also played sparingly, had the big play in the drive with a 23-yard catch-and-run on a third-and-17. Early in the second quarter, Favre made quick work of the Bears' defense for a go-ahead score. He hit Donald Driver on a 48-yard pass and then passed to a wide-open William Henderson for a 38-yard TD after Bears defensive back Mike Green fell down.

Nall entered the game with 9:02 left in the second quarter and immediately completed three straight passes, hitting Walker for a 25-yard TD. It marked the first time in six NFL appearances that Nall had entered a game earlier than the fourth quarter.

Gbaja-Biamila finished with 13½ sacks, matching his 2001 career high, and giving him double digits for a fourth straight season (only Simeon Rice in the NFL can match that feat). His 49 sacks over four straight seasons broke Tim Harris' franchise record. Sharper's interception return was his seventh career defensive TD, tying Herb Adderley's team record.

BARKER, BRYAN - A 15-year NFL veteran, was signed as a free agent late in training camp (Aug. 23) to add experience to the Packers' punting game. Opened the regular season as the starting punter.

► Took over the role as the holder for kicker Ryan Longwell starting with the team's fifth game after incumbent Doug Pederson went on injured reserve with a back/rib injury.

► Now has hit 828 punts without a block (his last block was with Kansas City, Dec. 12, 1993, at Denver: Reggie Rivers).

► Punted 66 times for 2,644 (40.1 avg.), including a 33.4-yard net average, 16 'Inside the 20' and a long of 64 yards.

► Had a punt of at least 50 yards in seven consecutive games, a streak that began while with Washington, Dec. 14, 2003, vs. Dallas, until string was snapped in the Packers' fifth game, vs. Tennessee.

► In the opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), punted five times for 157 yards, giving him gross and net averages of 31.4 yards; his first punt of the game was 31 yards, forcing Steve Smith to call for a fair catch and pinning Carolina at its 7, he later punted a 51-yarder out of the Packers' end zone early in the second quarter.

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19), punted four times for 192 yards, (48.0 avg., 36.5 net); had two punts of over 50 yards (covering 56 and 53 yards).

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), punted four times for 169 yards, with a long of 53 yards.

► At home vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3), had six punts for 225 yards (37.5 avg., 34.8 net), working with swirling winds.

► Against Tennessee (Oct. 11), punted twice for 68 yards (34.0 avg., 30.5 net), with one punt 'Inside the 20.'

► Averaged 43.4 yards on five punts at Detroit (Oct. 17).

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), punted twice for 78 yards and one punt 'Inside the 20.'

► At Washington (Oct. 31), punted three times for 132 yards (44.0 avg., 31.7 net), including a 56-yarder.

► Followed up at home vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14) with three punts for 91 yards (30.3 avg. 30.7 net), with one punt 'Inside the 20.'

► At Houston (Nov. 21), punted three times for 120 yards (40.0 avg., 27.3 net), with one punt 'Inside the 20.' Also handled a difficult snap on Longwell's game-winning 46-yard field goal, catching the ball on its side and putting it in position an instant before Longwell's foot reached the ball.

► Monday night vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), notched three punts for 121 yards (40.3 avg., 32.3 net), including a long punt of 52 yards and one punt 'Inside the 20.'

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), punted a season-high eight times for 361 yards (45.1 avg., 36.5 net) with two punts 'Inside the 20.' In the first quarter, booted a 51-yard punt to pin the Eagles on the Philadelphia 7-yard line.

► Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), notched seven punts for 281 yards (40.1 avg.; 36.7 net). His season-long 64-yard yard punt in the fourth quarter forced Detroit to start its drive from the Green Bay 27, a possession that would end with a Lions punt. Late in the game, kicked a 48-yard punt, causing Detroit start its drive at its own 10.

► Vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), had three punts for 114 yards (38.0 avg., 24.7 net.), with a long of 43 yards.

► Next, at Minnesota (Oct. 24), punted three times for 132 yards (44.0 avg., 43.0 net). His long of 46 in the fourth quarter resulted in Minnesota starting the drive on its own 15, a series ultimately ending with a punt.

► Finished at Chicago (Jan. 2) with five punts for 186 yards (37.2 avg., 27.0 net) with a long punt of 43 yards.

BARNETT, NICK - Coming off a stellar rookie campaign when he led the team in tackles, is in the midst of his second year as the starter at the 'Mike' (middle) linebacker position. Selected as an alternate to the Pro Bowl for the second time in his career.

► Replaced Na'il Diggs as the defensive play-caller in '04, taking command of the defense, relying on him even more than in 2003.

► Started all 16 games in the regular season and lead the team in tackles with 162 (116 solo), including three sacks, plus one interception, one fumble recovery and eight passes defended.

► At Carolina (Sept. 13), led the team in tackles with 11 (eight solo), including a sack that dropped Jake Delhomme for an 11-yard loss. Later intercepted Delhomme deep in Packers territory; Green Bay subsequently drove 67 yards for a TD to put it up 24-7 in the eventual 24-14 triumph over the defending NFC champion. His performance earned him 'NFC Defensive Player of the Week' honors for Week 1.

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19), notched 11 tackles (seven solo) and also recovered a fourth-quarter fumble by Bears WR David Terrell near midfield.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), was second on the team with seven tackles (six solo), adding one stop on special teams.

► Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), amassed a season-high 17 total tackles (nine solo).

► The following game vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11), amassed an impressive tackle total with 16 (12 solo) and had one pass defended. In the first quarter, on a Titans third-and-5 at the Green Bay 17, knocked running back Chris Brown back for a 1-yard loss, forcing a fourth down and a Tennessee field goal.

► Had an early sack of Joey Harrington among nine tackles (six solo) at Detroit (Oct. 17) as Green Bay limited the Lions to 125 net yards, including only 33 yards on 16 rushing attempts (2.1 avg.). On Detroit's first offensive series of the game, made back-to-back plays to halt the drive. On second-and-8, stopped RB Artose Pinner for no gain; the following play, penetrated the interior of the offensive line and chased down Harrington for a 9-yard sack loss.

► Vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), made five tackles (four solo) and had two passes defended.

► On the road vs. Washington (Oct. 31), notched seven tackles (six solo) and two passes defended.

► Came up with four stops (three solo) and one pass defended vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14). Teamed with Grady Jackson to limit QB Daunte Culpepper to 1 yard on a Viking third-and-2, leading to a punt.

► At Houston (Nov. 21), made six tackles (three solo).

► Vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), racked up eight tackles (five solo). Knocked down Marc Bulger, disrupting his pass that was intercepted by Ahmad Carroll.

► In Week 13 at Philadelphia (Dec. 5) in an emotional contest, was tops on the team in tackles with a career-high 14 solo stops, and added one pass defended; had learned that morning that his father had passed away after a battle with cancer. In the third quarter, knocked Brian Westbrook back for a 1-yard loss. On the Eagles' next drive, took Westbrook down for a 4-yard loss on a Philly pass play. Also in the third, stopped Dorsey Levens for a 1-yard loss and two plays later stopped Westbrook again for a 2-yard deficit.

► Led the team with 16 tackles (14 solo) the following week in rematch vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), including one sack. Made his third sack of the year in the second quarter; tracking down Joey Harrington as he tried to run outside of the pocket; resulted in a 7-yard loss. Again played with emotion as he dedicated contest to late father.

► Against Jacksonville (Dec. 19), once again produced a team high in tackles with nine (five solo).

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), made nine tackles (five solo).

► Wrapped the season at Chicago (Jan. 2) with a team-leading 13 tackles (11 solo). Stopped Thomas Jones for a 1-yard gain on a Bears' third-and-2, leading to a Chicago punt. Recognized by Sherman as one of his better games in terms of reading and reacting to the offense.

BARRY, KEVIN - Wisconsin native who reprised his role as the team's primary backup at right tackle, with occasional duty as an extra tackle/tight end, after making strong contributions to the club's franchise-record 2,558 rushing yards in 2003. Also worked some this past offseason and during training camp at right guard.

► Played in 13 games, including three starts as an extra tight end in Packers' U-71 package. Inactive for three others due to injury.

► Saw action for 29 plays in the Packers' U-71 package in win at Carolina (Sept. 13), playing a large role as Green Bay rushed for 152 yards, on 47 carries, against the Panthers' vaunted defense.

- ▶ Also played a number of snaps vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), assisting Green to a 128-yard day, as well as at Indianapolis (Sept. 26), vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3) and in the Monday night game vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11).
- ▶ Against the Titans, blocked DE Carlos Hall on an 18-yard run by Ahman Green.
- ▶ Helped Green Bay to 157 yards rushing in win at Detroit (Oct. 17).
- ▶ The following week vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), was part of a 220-yard rushing effort.
- ▶ At Washington (Oct. 31), was part of an offensive line unit that helped rack up 361 yards of total offense and three touchdowns.
- ▶ Vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), was key in several crucial short-yardage rushing conversions while assisting club in a 206-yard rushing day, including 145 from Green. In the second quarter, pinned DE Kenny Mixon inside, allowing Green to run by and pick up a game-high 35 yards. The Packers scored on a Frank's touchdown reception two plays later.
- ▶ At Houston (Nov 21), aided the offensive line in providing excellent pass protection for Favre's 383-yard passing performance, allowing no sacks.
- ▶ Against St. Louis (Nov. 29), helped the Packers to 231 rushing yards. Combined with Mark Tauscher to seal defenders inside and spring Davenport for his 40-yard scoring run.
- ▶ Started as a blocking tight end in contest at Philadelphia (Dec. 5). Suffered an injured quadricep and subsequently was inactive for ensuing contests vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19) and at Minnesota (Dec. 24).
- ▶ Returned for the final regular season game at Chicago (Jan. 2). Started as the blocking tight end in the U-71 package. With Rivera out resting in the fourth quarter, played at right tackle as Tauscher moved inside to play guard. Part of offensive line that allowed no sacks and allowed for 327 yards passing yards and three touchdowns.

BEDELL, BRAD - Backs up Chad Clifton at left tackle. Acquired by Green Bay in a trade with Miami on Sept. 5, for a conditional 2006 draft choice.

- ▶ Packers GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman compared him to former Packers lineman Barry Stokes, but stronger and tougher.
- ▶ Is capable of playing left guard and left tackle.
- ▶ Saw action in four games total on the season, dressed but did not play in two and inactive for 10. His first action of the campaign was against Detroit (Dec. 12); utilized at Kevin Barry's usual extra tackle/tight end spot.
- ▶ Resumed the role vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19). Assisted the Packers to 444 yards of total offense.
- ▶ At Minnesota (Dec. 24), helped provide pass protection for Favre's 363 yards passing in the come-from-behind win and blocked for the team's 102 rushing yards.
- ▶ Saw action late in game at Chicago (Jan. 2).
- ▶ Designated as inactive for Week 1 contest at Carolina (Sept. 13) and Week 2 vs. Chicago (Sept. 19). Was active, but did not play, at Indianapolis (Sept. 26), marking the first time he had dressed since 2001 with Cleveland. Once again suited up vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3), but did not play. Subsequently was inactive for Weeks 5 -13.

CARROLL, AHMAD - The Packers' first-round pick in the 2004 NFL Draft (25th overall), assumed the starting left cornerback position beginning with Green Bay's sixth game, at Detroit.

- ▶ Hindered by an early-season groin injury, had begun his rookie year backing up Michael Hawthorne at LCB, while playing as the Packers' 'nickel' back and on special teams.
- ▶ Played in 14 games overall, including 11 starts, and finished with 53 tackles (49 solo), one touchdown, one interception, one fumble recovery, two sacks and 10 passes defended. Inactive for two other contests due to injury.
- ▶ Had a breakout game vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), notching his first career touchdown, fumble recovery and interception; additionally made three tackles (two solo). Recovered an Isaac Bruce fumble and returned it 40 yards for his first NFL touchdown to give Green Bay a 7-0 lead with 12:23 remaining in the opening quarter. In the third quarter, went stride for stride

with Bruce and launched into the air and pulled down his first career interception in the end zone. His performance earned him Week 12 'Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Week' honors.

- ▶ Made first NFL start Oct. 17 at Detroit, where he tied for the team lead in tackles with six and helped Green Bay to limit the Lions to only 92 yards of net passing.
- ▶ Prior to Lions contest, had seen his most extensive action to date as a pro when he filled in for an injured Hawthorne (concussion) for the majority of Monday night contest with Tennessee (Oct. 11), registering five tackles (four solo), along with one pass defended.
- ▶ Earlier, in the opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), he had notched two passes defended while playing primarily as an extra defensive back. Came up with key plays on two consecutive Panthers drives; first got in the way of a third-and-16 Jake Delhomme pass intended for Muhsin Muhammad, forcing Carolina to punt on their first offensive possession, he then broke up a third-and-10 pass to Steve Smith on the ensuing Panther drive, nearly intercepting the ball.
- ▶ Against Chicago (Sept. 19), playing as a 'nickel' back and on special teams, he also returned two kickoff returns for 31 yards (his first such returns in the NFL).
- ▶ Was inactive for Week 3 game at Indianapolis (Sept. 26) after suffering a groin strain three days earlier in practice; subsequently missed Oct. 3 contest vs. the New York Giants as well.
- ▶ Returned to the field for MNF game with Tennessee (Oct. 11).
- ▶ On Oct. 24 vs. Dallas, made four solo tackles, with one pass defended.
- ▶ Followed up at Washington (Oct. 31) with a five-tackle-performance that included one sack; also contributed one pass defended. Made his first career sack in the second quarter; shed a Clinton Portis block and sacked Mark Brunell from behind, resulting in a loss of 7 yards.
- ▶ In Lambeau vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), finished second on the team with eight tackles (seven solo), also breaking up one pass.
- ▶ At Houston (Nov. 21), was responsible for five solo tackles, also knocking away one pass. On a third-quarter reverse attempt by WR Andre Johnson, sniffed out the play, bolting into the backfield and stopping Johnson for a 9-yard loss to force a long third down and eventual punt.
- ▶ At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), made seven solo tackles, including a sack, and had one pass defended. In the first quarter, came on a corner blitz from the left and sacked Donovan McNabb for a 1-yard loss.
- ▶ Recorded one solo tackle and one pass defended in rematch vs. Detroit (Dec. 12).
- ▶ Followed up against Jacksonville (Dec. 19) with two solo tackles. On a second-quarter third-and-6, stopped WR Troy Edwards 2 yards short of the first down, forcing Jacksonville to punt on the next play.
- ▶ Made two solo tackles at Minnesota (Dec. 24).
- ▶ Followed up at Chicago (Jan. 2) with five tackles (four solo). In the second quarter, on second and two, stopped Thomas Jones for a loss of 5 yards, forcing a third-and-7.

CHATMAN, ANTONIO - A former Arena League standout, returned to the Packers roster for his second season as the team's starting punt returner. This year, he additionally won the role as Green Bay's No. 4 receiver on the depth chart and has become more of an offensive threat.

- ▶ Played in all 16 games, including two starts when the club opened in multiple wide-receiver sets.
- ▶ Finished eighth in the NFC with a 7.7-yard average on punt returns (32 for 245 yards).
- ▶ On kickoff returns, averaged 22.6 yards per runback (25 for 565 yards), including a career-long 59-yarder at Minnesota (Dec. 24). Additionally, has made 22 receptions for 246 yards and a touchdown and rushed four times for 36 yards.
- ▶ At Minnesota (Dec. 24), was the primary kickoff returner with Robert Ferguson out due to injury. Returned four kickoffs for 137 yards, including a career-long 59-yarder. Also made two receptions for 19 receptions; added one punt return for 7 yards. Ran a comeback route on the first drive of the second quarter, making the catch and gaining 14 yards. In the second quarter, made a leaping 5-yard catch on third-and-2. Ran back a

career-long 59-yard kick return in the waning moments of the first half, avoiding a tackle and reversing field to go up the left sideline for the extra yardage. Set up a 42-yard Longwell field goal to bring the Packers within four points, 21-17.

► The week before vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19, snagged four receptions for 48 yards and one touchdown, the first of his career. Also returned five punts for 54 yards, including a season-long 28-yard return. In the second quarter caught a 17-yard pass on third-and-18, just short of a first down, setting up a Longwell field goal to make the score 7-3, Jaguars. Late in the first half, got open in the middle of the field to make a 21-yard completion, his longest of the season. In the fourth quarter, caught a 6-yard TD, the first of his NFL career, closing the Packers' deficit to 28-25 following a Driver two-point conversion.

► Enjoyed career highs in both receptions (five) and yards receiving (50) in role as No. 3 receiver at Detroit (Oct. 17) with Robert Ferguson (calf) inactive; got a significant number of second-half snaps when Javon Walker (ribs/shoulder) was forced out of the game. Additionally averaged 10.7 yards on three punt returns in Lions contest, along with four fair catches. In the third quarter, ran an out pattern, caught the ball short of the first down marker, turned and squeezed between two defenders for a 12-yard gain and the first down.

► In Monday night opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), returned three punts for 26 yards with a long of 16, calling for fair catches twice.

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19), returned two punts for 25 yards, with a season-long 18-yard return; also ran a kickoff back for 18 yards.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26) had an impressive all-around showing. Had a kickoff return of 50 yards with a total of three returns for 89 yards; added 14 yards on two punt returns. Notched a 50-yard kickoff return early in the second quarter, leading to an eventual 38-yard field goal by Longwell. Made his first two receptions of the season and NFL career in Colts contest, snagging two passes for 14 yards. Also made a key block on Ferguson's 71-yard kickoff return in the fourth quarter.

► Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), had two kick returns for 41 yards and one punt return for 1 yard (additional yardage gained, but nullified by penalty); also notched one reception for 9 yards and one rush for 4 yards.

► In Week 5 vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11), tied the team single-game record with eight kickoff returns (for 163 yards, long of 35); also made two receptions for 32 yards and returned two punts for 1 yard. Returned a second-quarter kickoff 35 yards. His 18-yard catch in the second quarter put the ball on the Titans' 1-yard line, resulting in a TD pass to Bubba Franks on the next play.

► Two games later vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), made one reception for 12 yards and returned one kickoff for 11 yards. He also added a 18-yard rush around the right end, bringing the ball to the Dallas 8, setting up a Walker TD three plays later; earlier in the drive, made a catch for 12 yards on third-and-7.

► At Washington (Oct. 31), returned three punts for 30 yards.

► Returned home against Minnesota (Nov. 14) and caught one ball for 14 yards, rushed once for 8 yards, returned two punts for 17 yards and had two kickoff returns for 27 yards. His lone catch came in the clutch, converting a third-and-10 in the second half; he broke CB Antoine Winfield's tackle to gain 14 yards, reach the first-down marker and preserve an eventual TD drive. In the first quarter, had one rush for eight yards, positioning the ball at the Vikings' 28; the Packers scored on a Tony Fisher receiving TD five plays later.

► At Houston (Nov. 21), made two receptions for 17 yards, returned four punts for 23 yards and returned two kickoffs for 39 yards. Both catches were key down the stretch. On the last drive caught a pass toward the left sideline, a 6-yard gain on third-and-1. On the following play, grabbed an 11-yard pass, taking the near midfield. The Packers won the game on a Longwell field goal four plays later.

► Against St. Louis (Nov. 29), returned two kickoffs for 40 yards and rushing once for 6 yards; also made two fair catches on punt coverage.

► Followed up at Philadelphia (Dec. 5), with one reception for 19 yards. Additionally, returned one punt for 11 yards. Toward the end of the first quarter, caught a 19-yard pass on third-and-6, starting in the slot and catching the ball on an inside route.

► Served as the team's primary punt returner and No. 4 receiver vs. Detroit (Dec. 12).

► On Jan. 2 at Chicago, returned three punts for 4 yards, adding one catch for 12 yards. Caught a 12-yard pass on third-and-7 in the third quarter. The drive ended with a 20-yard Longwell field goal.

CLIFTON, CHAD - Athletic Tennessean completed his fifth year as the starter at left tackle. Signed a six-year contract extension March 2, minutes before hitting the unrestricted free agent market. Favre's blindside shield, he didn't allow a single 2003 sack and led the entire offense in playtime (all 1,031 snaps). Selected as an alternate for the Pro Bowl.

► Started all 16 games for the second consecutive season and for the second time in his career. On Sept. 19 vs. Chicago, made his 50th start for the Packers, along with teammate Mark Tauscher.

► Member of unit that paved the way for 6,349 offensive yards, a team record, surpassing the 6,172 of the 1983 Packers; also part of unit that surrendered just 14 sacks, bettering the 1972 and '74 squads' 17 QB fells.

► All but neutralized the Colts' cat-quick Dwight Freeney in game at Indianapolis (Sept. 26), in spite of the noise and fast surface associated with playing inside the RCA Dome, holding the Pro Bowl DE to just one solo tackle.

► Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), was part of an offensive line that held the Giants to no sacks.

► Helped Green Bay to 157 yards rushing in win at Detroit (Oct. 17).

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), helped team to 220 yards rushing and 486 yards of total offense.

► On the road at Washington (Oct. 31), was part of an offensive line unit that helped rack up 361 yards of total offense and three touchdowns.

► Followed up at home against Minnesota (Nov. 14) as part of an offensive line that helped gain 206 yards on the ground.

► At Houston (Nov 21), aided the offensive line in providing excellent pass protection for Favre's 383-yard passing performance, allowing no sacks.

► Vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), made a key-block on Tony Fisher's 24-yard run, putting a pancake block on safety Adam Archuletta. The Packers ran for 231 yards on the day.

► Started contest at Philadelphia (Dec. 5).

► Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) was part of an offensive line that opened holes for 116 yards and allowed only one sack to a outstanding Detroit front four.

► Assisted the Packers to 444 yards of total offense against Jacksonville (Dec. 19).

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), provided pass protection for Favre's 363 yards passing in the come-from-behind win and blocked for the team's 102 rushing yards.

► Started season finale at Chicago (Jan. 2). Part of offensive line that allowed no sacks and allowed for 327 yards passing yards and three touchdowns.

COLE, COLIN - A 6-2, 320-pound tackle who signed to the Packers practice squad, Sept. 16. Was promoted to the active roster on Nov. 30 after tight end David Martin was placed on injured reserve. Officially a first-year player, spent the last two training camps in the NFC North, with Minnesota in 2003 and Detroit in 2004. The Vikings signed him as a non-drafted free agent on May 2, 2003, and kept him on their 53-man roster for separate, one-week stints last season. Detroit signed him Dec. 23. All told in 2003, he was inactive for three NFL contests.

► Finished the regular season with seven tackles (six solo), playing in three games, including one start. Inactive for two other contests while with club.

► Saw his first action as a professional vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), coming away with three solo tackles. Registered his first NFL tackle in the first quarter, dropping Fred Taylor after a 2-yard gain.

► Followed up with one solo tackle at Minnesota (Dec. 24).

► At Chicago (Jan. 2), made his first career start, playing nose tackle. Finished the game with three tackles (two solo).

► Listed as inactive for contest at Philadelphia (Dec. 5) and vs. Detroit

(Dec. 12).

CURTIN, BRENNAN - Primed for an enhanced role this year after being inactive for all 18 games in 2003, sophomore season never really get off the ground before coming to a premature end. Missed the first two weeks of training camp on the non-football illness list with a boil on his thigh; treated by doctors for staph infection. Passed his physical and returned to practice Aug. 19, but then tore the anterior cruciate ligament in his right knee just 10 plays into his first preseason game, vs. New Orleans Aug. 21. Sustained the injury on a 12-yard pass from Tim Couch to Scottie Vines as he engaged Saints defensive end Tony Bryant in pass protection. Officially placed on season-ending injured reserve on Aug. 30.

DAVENPORT, NAJEH - A powerful runner, is the top backup to Pro Bowler Ahman Green. Has had his contributions limited by injury for much of the year. Also serves as a kickoff returner.

► Played in 11 games, with one start, and was inactive for five others due to injury. Finished second on the team in rushing with 359 yards on 71 carries (5.1 avg.) and two touchdowns; also made four catches for 33 yards and 14 kickoff returns for 286 yards (20.4 avg.).

► Aggravated a training camp hamstring injury in Green Bay's opening game, causing him to miss the ensuing three contests before he was able to return to the field in a limited role in Week 5.

► Had the top performance of his career vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), rushing 19 times for 178 yards and a touchdown; output ranked as NFL's third-highest total over the last 20 years for a player in his first league start. Ran for 37 yards on a counter in the third quarter, breaking two tackles; the run put him over the 100-yard mark (101). Donald Driver caught a 16-yard scoring pass three plays later. On fourth-and-1, darted through the Rams' defensive line, broke a tackle and cruised for a 40-yard score. Earlier, in the second quarter, ran 31 yards to the left side of the field; Walker scored on a 10-yard catch two plays later.

► At Detroit (Oct. 17), barreled into the line 10 times for 62 yards (6.2 avg.), including a 13-yard touchdown run around left end late in the third quarter that gave Green Bay a 31-10 lead in the eventual 38-10 victory, though by his own admission he still was not at 100-percent health. Made a 9-yard run on the Packers' first drive, bulling his way by a group of defenders; the Packers scored five plays later. Also returned one kickoff for 16 yards in Lions contest.

► Had run four times for 2 yards in MNF opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), in addition to returning two kickoffs for 43 yards, before leaving the game in the second half after pulling his right hamstring on a runback.

► Initially had injured the hamstring in an Aug. 24 training camp practice, causing him to miss the third preseason game.

► Was inactive for regular-season games against Chicago (Sept. 19), at Indianapolis (Sept. 26) and vs. the N.Y. Giants (Oct. 3).

► Returned to action in Monday night game against Tennessee (Oct. 11), though he was limited to special teams action; made two key blocks, bulldozing a pair of defenders, on Antonio Chatman's 35-yard kickoff return up the right sideline vs. the Titans.

► During the next home contest vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), took 12 carries for 37 yards, made two catches for 37 yards and had two kickoff returns for 20 yards. Made a 12-yard catch and then a 3-yard rush to set up a 1-yard Green score.

► Followed up at Washington (Oct. 31) with 18 rushing yards on four attempts. Had consecutive runs of 11 and 5 yards, respectively, bringing the ball to the Redskins' 9, setting up a Favre-to-Walker TD on the following play. Also returned two kickoffs for 49 yards.

► Vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), ran for 5 yards on two carries and returned one kickoff for 27 yards. Exited the game in the first half with a left hamstring injury (opposite hamstring from one injured in Carolina contest). Injury forced him to miss contest at Houston (Nov. 21).

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), rushed four times for 4 yards.

► Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), contributed 12 yards on three carries, one reception for 5 yards and returned one kickoff for 12 yards in a 16-13 victory.

Made a 5-yard reception, and runs of 9 and 5 yards on the Packers' third quarter drive that capped with a 23-yard Favre-to-Driver scoring throw. On third-and-1, busted up the middle and dragged defenders for a gain of 9 yards.

► Against Jacksonville (Dec. 19), rushed twice for 1 yard; returned one kickoff for 16 yards.

► On the road, at Minnesota (Dec. 24), had 11 carries for 40 yards and one kickoff return for 13 yards. Following a penalty in the first quarter, ran for 11 yards on second-and-11, making a move past LB E.J. Henderson for the first down.

► Was listed as inactive at Chicago (Jan. 2), to rest shoulder injury initially suffered vs. St. Louis.

DAVIS, ROB - Is in his seventh season as the Packers' long snapper. Owns the team's third-longest streak of games played, 118, behind only Brett Favre and Ryan Longwell.

► Has recorded 39 career special teams tackles, including three this year.

► Ran downfield to tackle the Lions PR Eddie Drummond after a 21-yard gain in the second quarter of victory at Detroit (Oct. 17).

► Vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), followed a group of teammates downfield, ultimately coming up with a tackle on Nate Burleson, a 1-yard loss.

DIGGS, NA'IL - A key starter each of his first four seasons, is in his second year as the No. 1 'Will' (weak-side) linebacker.

► A leader on defense, finished the season second on the team in tackles with 116 (91 solo), including one sack, also knocking down two passes. Had started 14 games and was inactive for two others due to injury.

► Notched six tackles (four solo) at Carolina (Sept. 13).

► Had an impressive showing vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), collecting 10 tackles (eight solo) and one sack. Stopped RB Thomas Jones for a 1-yard loss in the first quarter, forcing the Bears into third-and-long and an eventual punt. Later in the quarter, dropped QB Rex Grossman for a 7-yard loss; on the same series, once again stopped Jones in his own backfield for a loss of 2 yards.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), made four solo tackles.

► Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), led the team with a career-high 19 tackles (15 solo); blew up a Jeremy Shockey block in the second quarter and threw Tiki Barber for a 4-yard loss (the Giants missed a 49-yard field goal on the next play).

► In the Monday night game vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11), made a club-high 15 tackles (10 solo) and blocked a second-quarter Gary Anderson field goal try. Also combined with DE Aaron Kampman to drop Titans RB Chris Brown for a 2-yard loss on a first-quarter third-and-1.

► Contributed six tackles (five solo) in win at Detroit (Oct. 17) as Green Bay limited the Lions to 125 net yards, including only 33 rushing on 16 attempts (2.1 avg.).

► Vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), collected four stops (three solo).

► At Washington (Oct. 31), made a team-high 10 tackles (nine solo). Thwarted an attempted Redskins screen play, bursting into the backfield and stopping RB Clinton Portis for a 7-yard loss. On the Packers' next defensive series, pressured Mark Brunell, forcing him into an errant pass that was intercepted by Bhawoh Jue.

► Recorded five stops (four solo) and one pass defended against Minnesota (Nov. 14).

► Notched a team-leading 12 tackles (10 solo) at Houston (Nov. 21).

► Followed up with eight tackles (six solo) vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29). Three of his tackles were for loss, stopping RB Marshall Faulk on two of his runs for -1 and -2 yards, also stopped Faulk for a loss of 5 yards on a dump-off pass from Marc Bulger.

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), came away with two solo tackles. On Philly's second offensive drive, stopped Brian Westbrook for no gain on third-and-1. The Eagles punted on the next play. Left the game in the second quarter with a kidney contusion and missed the next two contests, vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) and Jacksonville (Dec. 19).

► Returned as a starter at Minnesota (Dec. 24). Made seven tackles (three

solo).

► In Week 17 at Chicago (Jan. 2), logged eight solo tackles. In the second quarter, stopped Thomas Jones for a loss of 3 yards. On a fourth-quarter second-and-3, swallowed up Thomas Jones for a 7-yard loss.

DRIVER, DONALD - The veteran of the Packers' receiving group, is in his sixth season, making contributions at both flanker and split end. Reported to camp a few pounds heavier (192) after working hard in the weight room during the offseason. Selected as an alternate for the Pro Bowl.

► Played in all 16 games, with 11 starts; did not start in five contests when club opened in other than base personnel.

► Authored stellar season, establishing career highs in receptions (84, good for second on the club) and receiving yards (1,208, also good for second on the club) and tying his previous season high in TD receptions (nine, also in 2002); it marked his second 1,000-yard season (1,064 in 2002). Also had three rushes for 4 yards.

► Teamed with Javon Walker to register the most combined receiving yards in a single season in team history with 2,590 combined yards, surpassing Antonio Freeman and Robert Brooks' 2,253 yards in 1997 (Driver and Walker accomplished the feat vs. Minnesota on Dec. 24). Also became the first set of 1,000-yard Packers receivers since 1999 (Freeman, Bill Schroeder) and only the third overall (also Freeman and Brooks in 1997).

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), had a clutch performance with 11 catches (tying a career high) for a career-high 162 yards and a touchdown. On the opening play of the Packers' second drive, caught an 18-yard pass. Also went over 1,000 yards on the season. On a second quarter third-and-6, went over the middle and snagged a difficult ball for a gain of 12 yards. Later in the drive, caught a pass for 8 yards on third-and-9 to the Minnesota 1. Ahman Green ran for a TD on the next play. Picked up 25 yards, finding himself wide open in the middle of the field. Green Bay scored four plays later on a Bubba Franks 22-yard reception. Went over 100 yards in the third quarter on a 34-yard gain on third-and-9; the series finished with a Walker 9-yard touchdown catch. In the fourth quarter, caught a clutch, 20-yard Favre fastball on third-and-10. Four plays later, snatched a 12-yarder on first-and-15 and capped the drive with a tough catch TD on fourth-and-3, tying the score at 31 apiece. On the Packers' last drive, with the score tied, finished off his impressive showing with a reception for an 18-yard gain to the Minnesota 38. Walker made a long reception of his own and the Packers won on a 29-yard Longwell field goal as time ran out.

► Had a spectacular homecoming to his native Houston (Nov. 21), with 10 catches for 148 yards and one touchdown. In the second quarter, got into the Texans' secondary and caught a season-long 50-yard bomb from Brett Favre and out fought safety Marcus Coleman for the ball. Longwell would kick a 23-yard field goal to cap the drive. On his fourth quarter TD reception, faked an inside route, then went outside to beat CB Dunta Robinson to the end zone, catching the ball off of his fingertips for a 24-yard touchdown, bringing the Packers within three points. Later in the quarter, made a 15-yard catch on third-and-16 to bring his team to the Houston 21, setting up the game-tying Longwell kick on the following play. With time running down in the game, caught a 12-yard pass on the right sideline, advancing the ball to the Houston 28; Ryan Longwell kicked a 46-yard field goal on the next play for the 16-13 victory.

► At Washington (Oct. 31), went over 200 receptions for his career, finishing the contest with a career total of 201; currently has 244.

► Made a team-leading 10 receptions for 150 yards in Monday night contest with Tennessee (Oct. 11), including a 47-yard catch.

► Followed that up by catching a game-high nine passes for 110 yards in 38-10 victory at Detroit, including a pair of touchdowns (only his second two-TD game as a pro; also Sept. 29, 2002, vs. Carolina). Caught a 7-yard bullet from Brett Favre at the back of the end zone to give Green Bay an early 7-0 lead over the Lions, he later pulled in 20-yard pass from halfback Ahman Green for the game's final points, reaching up over CB Dre Bly to make the grab before getting his feet down just inbounds. With halftime approaching, made receptions of 23 and 14 yards to put Green Bay within field goal range, setting up a 50-yard conversion by Longwell.

► In the opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), also led the team in receiving with three grabs for 39 yards. Late in the second quarter, on second-and-8 at the Carolina 19, snagged a short pass from Favre and broke a tackle attempt by Panthers CB Chris Gamble for an 8-yard gain, also drawing a 5-yard facemask penalty on Gamble; Green ran for a TD on the next play. On Green Bay's first drive of the third quarter, he converted a pair of crucial third downs, gaining 15 yards on a third-and-10 on a crossing pattern, putting the Packers on the Carolina 16, he later made a 16-yard reception on third-and-13 to get the ball down to the 3-yard line and position Green for a TD run on the following play.

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19), he pulled in five passes for 49 yards. Caught a pass right before the second half's two-minute warning of Bears contest, gaining 16 yards on the play.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), caught six passes for 64 yards. Snagged a 14-yard bullet from Favre on the first series of the game to convert a third-and-11, advancing the ball to the Colts' 42 and setting up a 36-yard Walker score three plays later. In the fourth period, ran a deep out and caught the ball short of the goal line, then tight-roped along the right sideline for the final yards into the end zone for his first TD of the season, cutting the Packers' deficit to 38-31 after the extra point by Longwell.

► At home vs. the N.Y. Giants, (Oct. 3), made a club-leading four catches for 31 yards. Set up a field goal with his 47-yard reception vs. the Titans (Oct. 11), he also had a pair of catches (4 and 14 yards) to help position Green Bay for a second-quarter TD by Bubba Franks.

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), hauled in three receptions for 52 yards and a touchdown. Scored on a 33-yard reception in the third quarter, coming from the right side of the field, moving to the other side of the field and sprinting past CB Terrence Newman to the end zone. On the last play of the second quarter, caught a pass for 15 yards on third-and-8, with the drive ending in a Longwell field goal.

► In the next game, at Washington (Oct. 31), pulled in two receptions for 41 yards. In the first quarter, ran past CB Shawn Springs and caught a Favre pass for a gain of 41 yards, bringing the ball to the Washington 35 and setting up a 37-yard Longwell field goal.

► Vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), registered three catches for 28 yards, adding one rushing attempt for 14 yards with one lost fumble.

► In the Packer's next home game vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), made six catches for 85 yards and one touchdown. On the Packers' second touchdown drive, made a 12-yard catch and then an 18-yard snare on third-and-11, with the drive capping with a 7-yard Franks reception. In the third quarter, made a one-handed grab for 15 yards, plucking the ball from behind him. On the very next play, caught a 16-yard TD pass.

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), caught three passes for 33 yards, with a long reception of 16 yards. On Green Bay's final touchdown drive, caught a 16-yard pass, bringing the ball to the Eagles' 17. Walker caught a 17-yard scoring pass on the ensuing play.

► Followed up vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) with four receptions for 87 yards and the lone TD of the game. Caught a 23-yard touchdown reception in the third quarter to narrow the Packers' deficit to 13-10. In the fourth quarter, made a key, 39-yard catch to the Detroit 15; ran a drag route, caught the ball in the middle of the field and sprinted up the left sideline. Green Bay scored on a Longwell field goal four plays later to tie the score at 13. Also made catches of 11 and 14 yards earlier in the drive.

► Against Jacksonville (Dec. 19), brought in four passes for 74 yards with a third-quarter touchdown reception and two more points on a successful two-point conversion in the fourth quarter. Was on the receiving end of an outside slant route pass from Brett Favre for a 32-yard touchdown with 11:44 remaining in the third quarter. The score occurred on the Packers' opening possession of the half, culminating a six play, 76 yard drive. In the fourth quarter, snared a 17-yard gain, advancing the ball to the Jacksonville 37. Four plays later, the Packers scored on a 6-yard TD catch by Antonio Chatman. Driver then caught a pass for a successful two-point conversion to narrow the Jacksonville lead to 28-25.

► Finished the season at Chicago (Jan. 2) with one reception for 48 yards. On the opening play of the Packers first second quarter offensive drive, ran a fly pattern down the left side for a 48-yard gain. Henderson caught a 38-

yard touchdown on the next play for 14-7 lead the Packers would not relinquish.

FAVRE, BRETT - In his 13th Green Bay season (more than any current player or coach), he shows no signs of rust. Now stands alone at third on the all-time QB wins list with 135, behind only John Elway (148) and Dan Marino (147), after moving past Fran Tarkenton (125) in the opening week. Selected as an alternate for the Pro Bowl.

► Currently, has played in 207 consecutive games (226 including play-offs), with 205 consecutive starts (224 including playoffs), 89 more than the next-closest streak on the all-time quarterbacks list, 116 by Ron Jaworski (1977-84).

► On the season, completed 346 of 540 passes for 4,088 yards (64.1%) and 30 touchdowns with 17 interceptions, for a passer rating of 92.4. His 30 scoring throws ranked third in the NFC, behind only the Vikings' Daunte Culpepper (39) and the Eagles' Donovan McNabb (31). Authored eight games with a passer rating above 100.

► At Chicago (Jan. 2) surpassed the 4,000-yard passing mark for the fourth time in his career, his first since 1999. Needed 108 yards entering the contest.

► Also vs. the Bears, reached the 30-TD plateau for an eighth overall season. In addition, achieved 51 career passing TDs against the Bears and surpassed Marino's 50 against Buffalo for the third-most all-time by a quarterback against an opponent. With three contests of at least three TD passes this season, pushed his career total to 53 (second to only Marino's 62); two of those contests featured four TD passes, pushing that career sum to 18 (behind only Marino's 21).

► Directed offense that set team records in total yards (6,349) first downs (354), completions (382) and fewest sacks allowed (14).

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), surpassed No. 3 Warren Moon (49,325) on the all-time passing yards list. Favre entered the weekend with 49,173 and currently has 49,734 career passing yards.

► Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), went over 3,000 yards (finished game with 3,160), registering a 13th overall 3,000-yard season, tying Marino (13) for most all-time. Favre extended his NFL record for consecutive 3,000-yard seasons to 13.

► Had thrown for at least one touchdown in 36 consecutive games, a franchise record and the second-longest streak in league history, behind only the 47-game string of Johnny Unitas (1956-60), with the streak ending at Philadelphia (Dec. 5).

► Has thrown for a TD in 47 of his last 49 games; the streak began in Week 17, 2001, and during that stretch the only clubs to hold Favre without a TD pass were Washington (Oct. 20, 2002) and Philadelphia (Dec. 5, 2004); vs. Washington, LaVar Arrington sacked Favre and sprained the quarterback's lateral collateral ligament, forcing him from the game.

► Also has 34 career fourth-quarter or overtime comebacks, with four coming this season: vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), at Houston (Nov. 21) vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) and at Minnesota (Dec. 24).

► Against St. Louis (Nov. 29), made his 200th consecutive start and played in his 202nd consecutive game. Also vs. the Rams, reached 20 TD passes on the season with his second-quarter scoring throw to Bubba Franks, surpassing Marino's NFL record for most consecutive seasons with at least 20. Marino did it 10 straight years, from 1983-92, and Favre now has done it 11 straight years (1994-2004). Was 18 of 27 for 215 yards and three TDs.

► At home against Minnesota (Nov. 14), made good on 20 of 29 attempts for 236 yards and four touchdowns for a passer rating of 133.0. His fourth touchdown throw marked the 18th single-game four-touchdown performance of his career. On his first TD throw, found Javon Walker down the right side of the field on a jump ball, Walker adjusted and took the ball in for the 50-yard score. Completed passes to nine different receivers in the contest. Also marked the 31st time he guided the Packers to a comeback win in the fourth-quarter or overtime.

► At Houston (Nov. 21), passed for 201 yards in the fourth quarter. On the Packers' only TD drive, completed four of six passes for 81 yards on the drive, capping it with a 24-yard TD pass to WR Donald Driver. On the

game-winning drive, completed six passes for 41 yards, setting up the 46-yard game-winner by Ryan Longwell. It marked the 32nd time in his career he's lead the Packers to a comeback win in the fourth-quarter or overtime. Also in the fourth, had a season-long 17-yard rushing attempt, picking up a first down on third-and-7 (marked his longest rushing attempt since Dec. 1, 2002, vs. Chicago, also 17 yards.)

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), played in his 200th career NFL game, and his 100th career NFL home contest (including 1991 with Atlanta). There are only 21 other active NFL players who've accomplished the feat. The only other quarterback who has played 200 or more games is Dallas' Vinny Testaverde, who played in his 207th contest vs. Green Bay.

► Against Washington (Oct. 31), surpassed Elway (4,123) for No. 2 on the all-time completions list, finishing the contest with a career total of 4,133.

► At Indy (Sept. 26), he became the third quarterback in league history with 4,000 career completions - joining Marino (4,967) and Elway. Also tied Unitas for the second-most four-touchdown games in league record books (17).

► Established a number of milestones at Detroit (Oct. 17): Surpassed Bart Starr for No. 1 on the Packers' all-time games-played list with 197 (now 207). Also moved ahead of Tarkenton (47,003) into fourth place in career passing yards. Currently, has 46 career TD passes against the Lions, giving him the fifth-most TD passes against one opponent in league history.

► During camp, Favre said the broken thumb, which he used to throw 19 of his NFL-leading 32 TD passes in 2003, won't bend at the tip but does not affect how he grips the ball.

► In the Monday night opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), completed 15 of 22 passes for 143 yards and one TD, with no interceptions (101.1 passer rating), leading Green Bay to a 24-14 triumph over the defending NFC champion Panthers. On Green Bay's first drive of the third quarter, threw a 15-yard pass to Driver on third-and-10 to the Carolina 16. Following a penalty, converted on third-and-13, delivering a bullet to Driver to the 3-yard line; Ahman Green followed up with a 3-yard scoring run on the next play. Also in the third quarter, on third-and-goal, rolled right, pump-faked and found Green between two defenders at the front of the end zone for a 3-yard score.

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19), was 24 of 42 for 252 yards, one touchdown and two INTs; his passer rating was 62.8. Found Robert Ferguson wide open in the end zone for an 18-yard TD in the third quarter, the only Packers touchdown of the game. Was the lead blocker on a 25-yard Green run, impeding Bears defenders Mike Brown and Tommie Harris. Has thrown for a TD in 25 consecutive Bears games, the longest streak ever against one opponent, topping Marino's previous streak of 24 straight vs. the New York Jets.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), had a monstrous game in head-to-head matchup with the Colts' Peyton Manning, throwing for 360 yards and four touchdowns on 30-of-44 passing, with no interceptions, for a passer rating of 123.1. Connected with Walker on three touchdowns, the first time he has thrown a trio of TDs to one receiver since Dec. 20, 1998 vs. Tennessee, when he found Antonio Freeman on three occasions. His 79-yard scoring throw to Walker was his longest scoring completion since Nov. 17, 2002, at Minnesota, when he hit Driver for an 84-yard score. Found Walker open on fly patterns on two of the touchdowns and wide open in the end zone for a 12-yard score. In the fourth, placed a ball perfectly for Driver to catch up to it on a deep route and tip-toe into the end zone (27 yards).

► Against New York (Oct. 3), completed 12 of 18 passes for 110 yards and one touchdown. Playing with a softball-sized bruise on his left hamstring, late in the first half scrambled around the pocket for 18 seconds before finding Bubba Franks for a 14-yard gain. Suffered a concussion on the first drive of the third quarter after Giants defensive linemen William Joseph and Keith Washington fell on him. Returned two plays later to throw a 28-yard TD strike to Walker on fourth-and-5, the Packers' only score of the game. Team doctors ruled he was not healthy enough to return to the game and he subsequently was sidelined for the remainder of the contest.

► In the Monday night game vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11), completed 24 of 44 passes for 338 yards and two TDs with three interceptions. Both of his scoring strikes were caught by tight end Franks, moving Franks to No. 4

on Favre's all-time receiving touchdown targets with 20 career TDs. On the Packers' first TD drive of the Titans contest completed five-of-five passes for 70 yards, then in the third period led a 13-play, 98-yard drive that resulted in another touchdown.

► Had his third game of the year with a passer rating above 100 (102.6), when he completed 25 of 38 passes for 257 yards and two touchdowns, without an interception, in leading Green Bay to a 38-10 victory at Detroit (Oct. 17).

► Followed up vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), completed 23-of-29 passes for 258 yards and two touchdowns. Found Walker on a slant for a 5-yard touchdown in the second quarter. Later, in the third, found Driver for a 33-yard score. On the second-quarter TD drive, completed eight passes for 60 yards.

► At Washington (Oct. 31), completed 20 of 33 passes for 289 yards, with one touchdown and three INTs; had three passes for 40-plus yards. On the team's first TD drive, a 1-yard Green scoring rush, completed three passes for 73 yards, including a 48-yard pass to Ferguson. On the Packers' next offensive drive, threw for 60 yards on three completions, with a 48-yard Green catch-and-run bringing the ball Washington 25; after two Davenport runs, found Walker open in the end zone for a 9-yard TD.

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), completed 14 of 29 passes for 131 yards and two interceptions.

► Dealing with difficult wind conditions vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), completed 19 of 36 passes for 188 yards and one touchdown. Sixteen of his completions came in the second half. On the Packers' only touchdown drive, completed six passes for 59 yards, including a 23-yard strike to Driver for the score. Victory marked the 33rd time he's rallied the Packers from a fourth-quarter deficit or tie to win.

► In the ensuing contest vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), completed 30 of 44 passes for 367 yards and two touchdowns, with three interceptions. On the Packers' first TD drive, completed four passes for 67 yards and a touchdown. His first two completions of the drive were for 14 and 18 yards to Walker and he capped the march with a 32-yard throw to Driver for the score. In the fourth, orchestrated the other Green Bay touchdown series, completing four passes for 46 yards and a 6-yard scoring toss to Antonio Chatman, the No. 4 receiver's first NFL touchdown. Then found Driver for the successful two-point conversion try, narrowing the score to 28-25, Jacksonville.

► On Christmas Eve Day at Minnesota (Dec. 24), connected on 30 of 43 passes for 365 yards and three touchdowns, with one interception, for a 109.2 passer rating. Led an impressive fourth quarter comeback, trailing 24-31, his fourth comeback of the season. On the first drive, found Driver for a clutch, 20-yard gain on third-and-10. On a second-and-six, hit Walker for 17 yards. Capped the series with a completion to Driver in the end zone on fourth-and-3. The Packers began their last drive on their own 13 with 1:35 left in the game. After a completion to Driver and Walker, respectively, threw a short pass to Fisher that went for 21 yards. His next completion was to Driver, an 18-yard gain to the Minnesota 38. Then, completed to Walker for 31 yards, bringing Green Bay to the Minnesota 7. After a few kneel downs, Longwell made the game-winning FG as time expired. His three scoring throws in Vikings contest marked the fourth game of the season with three or more TDs, giving him 53 on his career; only Marino (62) had more such outputs.

► In the regular-season finale at Chicago (Jan. 2), connected on nine of 13 attempts for 196 yards and two touchdowns in less than two quarters of play. On first scoring drive, was five of five for 84 yards and touchdown, finishing with a 17-yard throw to Franks to tie the score, 7-7. In the second quarter, easily led his team into the end zone with a two-play drive that began with a 48-yard throw to Driver and ended with a 38-yard catch-and-run from Henderson for the score and a 14-7 lead. Favre did not return after that drive.

FERGUSON, ROBERT - Lines up at split end, opposite Donald Driver, in the starting unit. Also is a contributor as a kickoff returner and on the special teams coverage units. Poised for a bright future, signed a four-year extension this past June 28.

► Played in 13 games, with five starts, and was inactive for three other contests due to injury. Made 24 catches for 367 yards and one TD, he also registered 21 kickoff returns for a 25.0 avg., good for fourth in the NFC; added four special teams tackles.

► Packers are 7-1 in regular season games when Ferguson either leads the team in receptions and/or catches at least one touchdown.

► Was inactive for game at Detroit (Oct. 17) after suffering a calf/ankle strain in the special teams portion of practice on Oct. 14.

► Had started at split end at Carolina (Sept. 13), catching one pass for five yards.

► On Sept. 19 vs. Chicago, caught a season-high four balls for 50 yards and scored the Packers' lone touchdown, in addition to returning one kickoff for 25 yards. In the red zone during the third quarter, made a quick move against CB R.W. McQuarters at the line of scrimmage and blazed by his defender, to be found wide open in the end zone by Brett Favre for an 18-yard score.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), had a career-long 71-yard kickoff return to help set up a fourth-quarter Driver touchdown that brought the Packers to within 38-31. Added one reception, an 11-yard gain, on the Packers' final drive of the Colts contest, playing though an injured hamstring he suffered in practice Sept. 23.

► At home vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3), started at split end and made a single reception for 24 yards. Caught the pass from Craig Nall with time running out to put Green Bay in striking distance at the Giants' 32-yard line, but time then expired in the 14-7 New York victory.

► Vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11), recorded one catch for 11 yards and one kickoff return for 9 yards.

► Two weeks later vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), made one catch for 8 yards, resulting in a Packers first down. On Green's 90-yard TD run, blocked CB Terrence Newman down field, the last defender who had a chance to stop Green.

► At Washington (Oct. 31), caught one pass for a career-long 48 yards; ran past safety Ryan Clark catching the pass and positioning the Packers at the Washington 12, with the drive resulting in a Green TD.

► In Week 10 vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), notched one catch for 2 yards and returned three kickoffs for 109 yards. Toward the end of the third quarter, caught a kickoff and darted past defenders and on his way to a 55-yard return. He brought the ball to the Minnesota 35, with the drive eventually resulting in a Henderson TD reception.

► Followed up at Houston (Nov. 21), making four grabs for 44 yards. Made a key catch on the Packers' first drive of the fourth quarter. Ran past CB Aaron Glenn on the right sideline, jumped to receive a pass and held onto the ball, despite a jarring hit delivered by safety Marlon McCree. Picked up 23 yards on the play and the Packers would score on a Driver TD three plays later.

► Grabbed four balls for 53 yards vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), adding two special teams stops. In the first quarter, stretched out and snared a Favre pass in front of Travis Fisher for a 13-yard gain. Reeled in a crucial 27-yard pass along the Packers' sideline on a third-and-10 in the third quarter; went up and made the catch over Antuan Edwards who pushed him out of bounds.

► In Week 13 at Philadelphia (Dec. 5), made three grabs for 68 yards and returned five kickoffs for 115 yards, with a long return of 36 yards. With time running down in the first half, jumped for a pass on the left sideline, juggling the catch and pulling it into his body for a 31-yard gain. Drew an illegal contact penalty two plays later. Longwell converted a field goal four plays later. On the Packers' second touchdown drive, caught a 24-yard pass on third-and-16, bringing in the ball between two defenders. Walker caught a 17-yard touchdown pass three plays later.

► Played receiver and returned one kickoff for 15 yards against Detroit (Dec. 12).

► Made two catches for 43 yards vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19); added four kickoff returns for 78 yards. Caught a pass for 12 yards on a third-and-10 in the second quarter. In the fourth quarter, caught a 31-yard pass and was leveled by a forearm from safety Donovan Darius (Darius was later fined \$75,000 by the NFL for the hit). Was carted off the field and taken by ambulance to Bellin Hospital in Green Bay. Sensation and movement existed in

all four extremities by Monday; was eventually released Tuesday, Dec. 21. Subsequently was inactive at Minnesota (Dec. 24) and at Chicago (Jan. 2).
▶ Earlier had sustained a hyperextended knee in practice on Aug. 14 and missed the first two preseason contests; returned to practice Aug. 23. At Jacksonville (Aug. 27), started and scored the Packers' first offensive TD, a 52-yard reception from Favre; flashed his speed on the play, outrunning Darius on a post. At Tennessee (Sept. 3), continued to prove himself as a deep threat, scoring on a 53-yard catch-and-run.

FISHER, TONY - Is the Packers' No. 3 running back behind Ahman Green and Najeh Davenport, though early in the year he often served as the primary backup to Green with Davenport sidelined by a hamstring injury. Holds down a regular role for Green Bay as a single back in third-down and other obvious passing situations; owns some of the best hands on the team and is excellent at picking up blitzing rushers. Also is a top special teams contributor - he's fourth on the team with 13 coverage tackles.

▶ Played in all 16 games and finished as Packers' fourth-leading receiver with 38 catches for 277 yards and two touchdowns; ranked third on the team in rushing with 224 yards on 65 attempts (3.4 avg.).

▶ Vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), had one of the most clutch performances of his career. Rushed eight times for 31 yards and grabbed three passes for 36 yards. On Green Bay's last drive of the first half, accounted for 43 of the Packers' 63 yards on the possession, which resulted in a Ryan Longwell field goal; ran six times for 34 yards, with a long of 13, and had one reception for 9 yards. On the final drive of the contest, started in the slot, ran downfield and leaped for a Brett Favre pass, getting both feet down on the right sideline, bringing the ball to the Minnesota 29; Longwell kicked the game-winning field goal three plays later as time expired.

▶ In the Monday night opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), with Davenport out for most of the second half, accounted for 32 yards on nine carries (3.6 avg.) and caught two balls for 18 yards. On a first-quarter third-and-9, caught a pass after popping through the center of the offensive line and ran to his right past LB Dan Morgan for a gain of 11 yards and a first down.

▶ Against Chicago (Sept. 19), ran for 15 yards on six carries, while catching four passes for 22 yards; also made a team-high three special teams coverage stops. Saw increased action from scrimmage vs. the Bears with Davenport inactive; had a 12-yard rush on the first drive of the game, a series ultimately ending in a field goal.

▶ At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), grabbed four passes for 16 yards and had one rushing attempt for 5 yards, adding one special teams stop. In the third quarter, on a third-and-5, caught a ball from Favre short of the first-down marker, side-stepped a linebacker and ducked ahead for an 8-yard gain.

▶ Against the Giants (Oct. 3), caught two passes for 13 yards.

▶ Vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11), made three catches for 22 yards.

▶ Gave the Packers a 14-7 lead that they would not relinquish in eventual 38-10 victory at Detroit (Oct. 17), catching a short Favre pass in the flat, then outrunning Lions LB Alex Lewis around the right edge for a 13-yard touchdown. On the team's first offensive series, caught a swing pass and burst ahead for a 17-yard pickup to the Lions' 7; Favre threw a TD pass to Donald Driver on the next play. Finished Motown contest with two receptions for 30 yards and four carries for 11 yards.

▶ Followed up against Dallas (Oct. 17) with an 8-yard TD pass to Franks, his first career passing attempt and first career completion. Additionally, caught one pass for 4 yards.

▶ At Washington (Oct. 31), made one catch for 3 yards, good for a first down on third-and-3.

▶ On the Packers' next road contest against Houston (Nov. 21), made four catches for 18 yards and rushed seven times for 14 yards, serving as the team's primary back due to a banged up backfield.

▶ Returned home vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29) to post one reception for 11

yards and ran for 42 yards on six carries. In the fourth quarter, reeled off a 24-yard run which kept alive the drive resulting in a Longwell field goal; the rush was his longest run from scrimmage for the season. Earlier in the game, took a Favre pass in the flat 11 yards for a first down.

▶ At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), notched two rushes for 10 yards and two receptions for 10 yards.

▶ Against Detroit (Dec. 12), ran twice for 20 yards and made one catch for 10 yards. On the Packers' second drive of the third quarter, made runs of 7 and 13 yards. On his 13-yarder, the Packers' longest run of the game, came off left tackle and hit a pile of defenders, kept his balance and advanced upfield and past the first down marker. Three plays after his run, Donald Driver scored on a 23-yard reception to narrow the Lions' lead to 13-10.

▶ Registered one catch for 10 yards and two special teams stops vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19).

▶ Followed up at Minnesota (Dec. 24) with four receptions for 31 yards and one rush for 2 yards. Picked up 2 yards on a second quarter third-and-1. Later in the drive, caught a swing pass and followed blockers for a 9-yard gain on second-and-8. The Packers finished the series with a TD pass to Franks. On the last series of the game, caught a screen and sped ahead for 21 yards. Moments later, the Packers won on a 29-yard Longwell FG.

▶ At Chicago (Jan. 2), led the team with 42 yards on 19 carries (2.2 avg.); caught three passes for 23 yards. On the Packers' second drive, caught a 16-yard pass to the Chicago 17. Bubba Franks hauled in a TD pass on the ensuing play.

FLANAGAN, MIKE - Began campaign as the Packers' starting center for the fourth consecutive year. Recurring tendinitis that had plagued him since the team's June mini-camp was reevaluated after Green Bay's third regular-season game (Sept. 26 at Indianapolis) and it subsequently was decided corrective surgery was necessary, both to alleviate his current pain and to protect the balance of his playing career. Had surgery on his left knee Oct. 7, faces an expected six-month rehabilitation period; had been placed on season-ending injured reserve five days earlier. Had played in 82 consecutive games (87 including postseason) before his 2004 season was cut short after three games. Earlier, had gone on the physically unable to perform list Aug. 1, causing him to miss the first four weeks of training camp. Returned to practice Aug. 30 and made his preseason debut in the final non-league matchup, at Tennessee (Sept. 3). Started at center in the regular-season opener, a Monday night game at Carolina (Sept. 13). On Ahman Green's third-quarter TD run, blocked LB Dan Morgan to the outside to give his running back space to cut back and cross the goal line. On the lone scoring pass for the Packers in their 24-14 triumph over the Panthers, he sprinted right from his center position and got his hands on Julius Peppers to prevent him from getting to QB Brett Favre. Against Chicago (Sept. 19), started the game, but missed a parts of the final two Packers' offensive series as a result of knee discomfort, stemming from his preseason condition. Returned at Indianapolis (Sept. 26) to anchor an offensive line that allowed Favre to throw for 360 yards, finishing the game in spite of incredible pain on the hard artificial surface of the RCA Dome.

FRANKS, BUBBA - Dependable player who is in his fifth season as the No. 1 tight end. With his TD catch vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), surpassed Ed West (25) for No. 2 on the team's all-time tight ends touchdown list. He entered the game with 25 and now has 28 for his career. Selected as an alternate for the Pro Bowl.

▶ Also vs. the Rams, surpassed No. 4 Rich McGeorge (175) on the team's all-time tight ends reception list. Franks entered the week with 175 and finished the contest with 177 career receptions (now 188).

▶ Hasn't missed a game during his four-plus NFL seasons (2000-04) - 80

total contests (85 including playoffs).

► In the regular season, made 34 receptions for 361 yards and seven touchdowns, playing in 16 games, including 14 starts; did not start in two contests when offense lined up in packages other than base personnel.

► At Carolina (Sept. 13), logged two catches for 27 yards. Made a key block on Ahman Green's first scoring run, of 6 yards, standing up Panthers defensive end Julius Peppers. In the fourth quarter, ran for a 14-yard gain on second-and-2, making CB Ricky Manning miss and taking on a slew on Carolina defenders for extra yardage.

► In the second game of the season, vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), caught one ball for 9 yards.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), made a season-high four catches for 35 yards. Grabbed an 11-yard pass in the second quarter, taking the ball to the Colts' 14 to help set up a field goal.

► Vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3), made three catches for 21 yards.

► Next, in Monday night contest with Tennessee (Oct. 11), grabbed two balls - both for touchdowns (covering 1 and 11 yards). His performance against the Titans marked the third two-TD game of his pro career.

► Followed that up with a three-reception performance at Detroit (Oct. 17).

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), made one catch, an 8-yard TD reception from Tony Fisher. Later in the game, on Green's 90-yard score, made a key block on LB Dexter Coakley to allow Green to get through the hole.

► Followed up next game at Washington (Oct. 31) with one reception for 7 yards.

► Vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), caught two passes for 24 yards and one touchdown. In the second quarter, stood up LB Keith Newman to spring Green for a 35-yard run. Two plays later, ran up the middle of the field and caught a Brett Favre pass in the end zone, a 17-yard TD reception. Did not start vs. Vikings as Packers started game with four WRs.

► At Houston (Nov. 21), made two receptions for 43 yards. Made a key catch on the Packers' first drive of the fourth quarter. Ran up the seam and found himself open, catching the ball and running for additional yardage, for a total of 27 yards on the play. Green Bay would score on a 24-yard Driver TD on the next play.

► Next, vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), made two receptions for 36 yards and one touchdown. Caught a 7-yard touchdown in the second quarter, putting Green Bay up 14-3. On the following drive, was open in the middle of the field, taking a pass 29 yards to the St. Louis 10. The Packers scored the next play on a 10-yard Javon Walker receiving TD.

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), did not start at tight end as team lined up with Kevin Barry as a blocking tight end; saw usually extensive action, but was held to no receptions.

► At home against Detroit (Dec. 12), made four receptions for 29 yards. In the third quarter, caught a 9-yard pass on first-and-10 to bring the ball to the Detroit 12. Longwell kicked a 36-yard field goal three plays later for the Packers' first points of the game. Later, in the third quarter, caught a 6-yard pass two plays before Donald Driver's 23-yard TD reception.

► In Week 15 vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), caught two passes for 10 yards.

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), made one catch, good for 22 yards and a touchdown; came in the second quarter as he ran up the left seam and glided in for the score.

► On Jan. 2 at Chicago, notched four catches (tying season high) for a season-high 59 yards. Caught a 17-yard pass on the Packers' first offensive play of the game. Later in the quarter converted a first down on second-and-4, with a 13-yard catch. Capped the drive with a 17-yard touchdown, running a corner route to the end zone and leaping over safety Mike Green to tie the score at 7. Made a 12-yard catch from Craig Nall in the second quarter on a second-and-6, setting up a 25-yard Walker score three plays later.

► Had missed the first week of training camp and the Aug. 7 scrimmage with a chest injury, but returned to practice Aug. 9; Packers GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman compared practice without Franks to a nocturnal eclipse because Franks never misses.

GBAJA-BIAMILA, KABEER - Supersonic pass rusher is the full-time starter for the third consecutive season at the 'Elephant' (right) defensive

end position. Led the team in sacks with 13½ (tying his career high, 2001). Moved past the 50 milestone for his career (50½). Also matched his 2001 career high, and, with 48½ from 2001-04, established a team record for sacks over four straight seasons (Tim Harris, 48, 1986-89). Also became first Packers player to record double-digit sack totals four years in a row.

► Played in 16 games, with 15 starts, and recorded 52 tackles (34 solo) to finish second among Packers defensive linemen.

► Accounted for two sacks vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), among four total tackles. Sacked QB Daunte Culpepper on consecutive fourth-quarter plays. First came inside and pushed his way past LG Chris Liwienski, dropping Culpepper for a 2-yard loss; then came from the left side, untouched by RT Nat Dorsey, and made the sack for an 8-yard loss on second-and-12, forcing a long third down and eventual punt. He also ended a first-quarter Vikings drive, disrupting a Culpepper pass, and threw Moe Williams for a 3-yard loss late in the game.

► Tied his season-high two sacks at Houston (Nov. 21), among six total tackles (four solo). His two sacks give him 43½ for his career, moving him past Ezra Johnson (41½) for No. 3 on the Packer's all-time list. On Houston's first drive of the second half, got by OT Seth Wand and dropped David Carr on a Texans' third-and-6, leading to a punt. Later in the quarter on third-and-19, tracked down Carr as he was flushed out of the pocket and stopped him for an 11-yard loss, again forcing Houston to punt.

► Started in the season opener at Carolina (Sept. 13).

► Vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), assisted on two tackles.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), had four tackles (three solo). Although he did not have any sacks against the Colts, drew holding call vs. the offensive line.

► Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), finished with five tackles (two solo), including 1½ sacks. Registered his first sack of the season in the second quarter, running Kurt Warner out of bounds, resulting in a fourth-down punt. On the last play of the first half, combined with R-Kal Truluck to drop Warner again.

► Subsequently posted three solo tackles at Detroit (Oct. 17) after making one stop six days earlier against Tennessee (Oct. 11). In the second quarter of Lions contest, stopped RB Shawn Bryson for a 3-yard loss on a screen pass, shedding a block to get to record the tackle.

► Recorded four tackles (two solo) and one pass defended vs. Dallas (Oct. 24).

► At Washington (Oct. 31), came away with four tackles (two solo) and one sack. Sacked Mark Brunell for a 12-yard loss in the second quarter, getting a jump on T Chris Samuels and going right around him to drop the QB.

► Nov. 29 vs. St. Louis, made one sack and three solo tackles.

► Followed up on the road at Philadelphia (Dec. 5) with one assisted tackle.

► Next, vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), totaled five tackles (four solo), including a sack. On a Detroit second-and-8 in the first quarter, used a swim move to get inside LT Jeff Backus and took down Joey Harrington for a loss of 5 yards. The Lions failed to convert on a long third down and opted to kick a field goal.

► Vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), made two tackles (one solo), including one sack and one forced fumble. Came from the right and hit QB Byron Leftwich on his blindside, causing him to fumble the ball (credited with a sack) before he could get his throwing arm moving forward. Jacksonville guard Vince Mauwai nonchalantly picked the ball up, but Packers safety Darren Sharper took it away and returned it 15 yards for a TD to give the Packers a 10-7 lead in the second quarter.

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), posted one assisted tackle.

► Finished the season at Chicago (Jan. 2) with career single-game high four sacks and eight total tackles (six solo). On the first play of the second quarter, took down QB Chad Hutchinson for an 8-yard loss, resulting in a long third down and eventual Bears punt. Then, in the fourth quarter, got to Hutchinson again for a loss of 3 yards. Made two more sacks on the Bears final offensive series, first pulling down Hutchinson for no gain on a first-and-10 forcing a fumble recovered by the Bears. Five plays later, sacked Hutchinson again for a loss of 7 yards on a second-and-4.

GREEN, AHMAN - Now is in his fifth year as the Packers' featured back.

Led the team in rushing (finishing fourth in the NFC) with 1,163 yards and seven touchdowns on 259 carries (4.5 avg.). Also has made 40 receptions for 275 yards and one TD. Elected to his fourth-consecutive Pro Bowl.

► Started 15 games and was inactive one contest due to injury. Played in his 100th career NFL game at Washington (Oct. 31).

► Key component of offense that set team record with 6,349 total yards.

► Against Jacksonville (Dec. 19), surpassed the 1,000-yard mark for a fifth consecutive season and tied Jim Taylor's franchise record (both overall and consecutive, Taylor also did it five straight years, 1960-64), finishing the contest with 1,086 yards on the year. Additionally, with his 17 carries, went over 1,500 for his career with a current total of 1,573.

► With a season-high five receptions vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), moved to 275 (now 281) for his Packer career, passing now No. 3 Dorsey Levens (271) and No. 2 William Henderson (currently 276) on the Packers' all-time list among backs.

► Recorded a multitude of accomplishments vs. Dallas (Oct. 24): Ran for 163 yards and two TDs on 15 carries. His 90-yard TD run is the third longest run from scrimmage in team history. He holds the record with a 98-yard TD run against Denver on Dec. 28, 2003. Andy Uram ran for a 97-yard score vs. Chicago on Oct. 8, 1939. The run was named the 'Levitra Play of the Week' for Week 7. He is now just the second player in league history to have two touchdown runs of 90 yards or more. Bo Jackson is the other, with both of his runs occurring during the 1987 season. The 90-yard rush is the longest run in NFL history against the Dallas Cowboys. He now has 27 career 100-yard games, breaking Hall of Famer Jim Taylor's previous franchise record of 26. With his two touchdowns, moved into No. 5 on the all-time Green Bay TD list with 58, passing Antonio Freeman (57). He moved past No. 3 Don Hutson in all-time team total offense with his 8,345 yards and also passed 10,000 career all-purpose yards. He had 1,438 kickoff return yards with Seattle from 1998-99 and now has 10,805 total yards for his career. On his 90-yard TD run in the third quarter, on a toss sweep, Franks (Dexter Coakley) and Ruegamer (Dat Nguyen) provided key blocks, then he out-sprinted safety Tony Dixon to the goal line. On the Packers' first touchdown in the second quarter, set up his own TD, on a 32-yard run. Picked up a Nick Luchey block, and beat four defenders at the line, using a great cut. Three plays later, Green got lower than DE Greg Ellis at the goal line to propel himself into the end zone.

► Vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), ran 21 times for 145 yards (6.9 avg.). Marked his fourth game this season with 100-or-more rushing yards and the 28th of his Packers career. Got 52 yards on consecutive second-quarter carries. The first came to the right side, a game-best 35-yard burst. Followed up with a 17-yard sweep on the following play. Favre hit Franks for a 17-yard TD on the next snap, concluding the three-play drive. Then, immediately after returning in the second half from a minor knee injury, posted 30 yards on consecutive carries, including a 21-yard run. On Green Bay's final offensive play, crushed CB Antoine Winfield in a head-to-head collision on a 7-yard gain, setting up Longwell's final kick.

► In the season-opening Monday night game at Carolina (Sept. 13), had a career-high 33 carries for 119 yards (3.6 avg.) and two TDs, adding another score on a 3-yard reception, for only the second three-touchdown game of his pro career (also Oct. 20, 2002, vs. Washington). His 33 attempts also tied for the second most in one game in team history. With 3:30 remaining in the first half, waited for play to develop, following blockers' path to the end one for a 6-yard score that put Green Bay up 10-7. Added another scoring run in the third quarter, this time cutting back to the left of the interior line and putting his head down toward two defenders to squeeze past the goal line. Later in the third period, caught a 3-yard TD along the far right side of the end zone after running four times for 33 yards on the drive, picking up two first downs in the process. His performance against the Panthers earned him the 'Snickers Hungriest Player' award for Week 1.

► Facing Chicago (Sept. 19), tied Taylor's club record of 26 lifetime 100-yard games when he racked up 128 yards rushing on 24 carries, including 103 yards (in 17 attempts) during the first half; also had two catches for 7 yards. Accounted for 35 yards rushing on the Packers' first drive of the

game, leading to a Ryan Longwell field goal.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), ran for 67 yards on 17 attempts, ending a string of consecutive 100-yard rushing games at four, which had matched his own team record. On the Packers' first offensive series, ran right on the first play for 11 yards. Two plays later, he picked up 10 yards on second-and-4, keeping the drive alive and leading to a Javon Walker TD. Made key runs of 8 and 11 yards on the first Packers' drive of the second quarter, leading to a Longwell field goal.

► Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), ran for 58 yards on 15 carries and also caught three balls for 48 yards. One of the NFL's most effective back-field blockers, was a major reason why the Packers did not allow a sack against the Giants as he picked up several blitzes. Surpassed John Brockington (1,293) for No. 2 on the all-time Packers rushing attempts list; behind only Taylor (1,811) in club record books (Green's current total: 1,467).

► Next, against Tennessee (Oct. 11), notched 10 carries and 33 yards and two catches for 5 yards. On the team's first touchdown drive of the fourth quarter, scampered for an 18-yard gain.

► Churned out 81 yards on 21 carries in 38-10 victory at Detroit (Oct. 17), in addition to catching three passes. Also threw a 20-yard touchdown pass to Donald Driver for the game's final points on a left-handed, halfback option pass up the left sideline early in the fourth quarter; it marked his first NFL TD throw in two pass attempts as a pro. On a third-and-3 in the third quarter, caught a short pass in the flat and slipped back inside past LB Earl Holmes, breaking two arm tackles to pick up the first down; Green Bay went on to score a TD on the drive. Made two key plays on the Packers' final, fourth-quarter TD. On third-and-8, picked up a first down on a 9-yard run to the Detroit 20. Two plays later, rolled left and threw a pass to Driver for a score.

► At Washington (Oct. 31), rushed 24 times for 70 yards, with two touchdowns. Additionally, was second on the team with four receptions for 73 yards. Scored on a 1-yard run in the beginning of the second quarter, the Packers' first TD. On the next offensive series, came out of the backfield and caught a short pass and hustled down the right sideline and past defenders for a career-long 48 yard reception; Walker caught a touchdown three plays later. In the fourth quarter, following a Harris interception, had four rushes for 36 yards (long of 17), including an 11-yard touchdown run off right tackle to give the Packers a 28-14 lead and secure the win.

► At Houston (Nov. 21), had five rushes for 15 yards. Went out after his first attempt, good for 7 yards, with an injury to his ribs. He later returned, but re-injured his ribs and subsequently missed the rest of the contest.

► The injury sidelined him (inactive) for the following contest vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29).

► Returned at Philadelphia (Dec. 5), to rush for 37 yards on 11 carries (3.4 avg.) and make three receptions for 17 yards. Caught a pass and took it upfield for 17 yards in the first quarter, snaring the ball in the flat and following blockers to gain the yardage.

► In Week 14 vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), rushed 23 times for 76 yards and also made a team-high five receptions for 20 yards. Ran for 4 yards on a third-quarter third-and-2. Green Bay scored four plays later on a Longwell field goal. On the Packers' final drive, ran six times for 17 yards, including a powerful 5-yard run on third-and-3.

► Followed up vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19) with 94 yards on 17 carries and two receptions for 11 yards. In the third quarter, broke through the middle of the line for a team-long 27-yard gain, almost going all the way before being brought down by Dewayne Washington. Ran for 12 yards on the previous play.

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), ran for 64 yards on 19 carries, adding four catches for 26 yards. Ran off left tackle for 10 yards on a first-and-10 on the Packers first drive of the second quarter; overall on the drive ran five times for 22 yards, including a TD. Scored his first TD in since Oct. 31 (Washington), fighting through a defender for a one-yard score on fourth-and-1. Made a 14-yard reception in the third quarter, catching the Favre pass close to the line of scrimmage and bolting the ball ahead to the Minnesota 10; Walker caught a 9-yard TD two plays later.

► Played sparingly at Chicago (Jan. 2), running four times for 13 yards

with one reception for 23 yards. On a first quarter third-and-17, caught a short swing pass and followed blocker for a gain of 23 yards and the first down.

HARRIS, AL - The elder statesman of a young group of cornerbacks, returns for his second season as the starter at right cornerback. A physical, bump-and-run corner, has followed the opponent's best receiver all over the field in several games this year.

Packers GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman thinks Harris is quicker than 2003, and is very pleased by the example he sets for younger players with his work ethic and professionalism. Selected as an alternate to the Pro Bowl.

► Signed a multi-year contract extension with the Packers on Sept. 11.

► With his three passes defended at Minnesota (Dec. 24), has now totaled 28 for the season, surpassing the single-season record held by Doug Evans (27, 1995).

► Led the team in passes defended with 28, including 1 INT, in addition to making 67 tackles (62 solo). Started all 16 games.

► Recorded six tackles (all solo) and one pass defended at Carolina (Sept. 13). Hit Panthers WR Steve Smith as he juggled the ball, forcing it into teammate Nick Barnett's hands for a third-quarter interception that led to a Green Bay touchdown and a 24-7 lead; also covered the speedy Smith for much of the contest, following the Carolina wideout to either side of the field.

► On Sept. 19 vs. Chicago, made three solo stops and one pass defended. Knocked a ball away from tight end Desmond Clark on a Bears' second-and-9 in the second quarter; he later impressively chased down RB Thomas Jones from behind after a 54-yard run to the Green Bay 16, saving a touchdown.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), came away with three solo tackles.

► At home against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), registered four tackles (three solo) and broke up two passes. In the first quarter, on third-and-13 in Packers territory, knocked away a Kurt Warner pass intended for Amani Toomer, forcing a punt. In the third quarter, batted down another Warner pass on third-and-15, halting another Giants drive.

► Against Tennessee (Oct. 11), made four tackles (three solo).

► Had a pair of pass breakups, plus one stop, at Detroit (Oct. 17). Broke up a Harrington pass, intended for Tai Streets, on third-and-7 in the third quarter, with the Lions ultimately turning the ball over on downs after the next play.

► Also notched three passes defended against Dallas (Oct. 24), adding eight tackles (seven solo). On Dallas' second drive, knocked down a pass in the end zone after blanket coverage on Johnson. The Cowboys settled for a field goal.

► In the next contest at Washington (Oct. 31), made a season-high four passes defended, including one interception, adding three solo tackles. His interception came on a Redskins third-and-13; stepped in front of a Mark Brunell pass intended for Rod Gardner, snagging the ball and returning it 29 yards to the Washington 36. Green scored four plays later to seal the victory. His three passes defended were one short of his career high and the most by a Packers defender this season.

► Matched his season-high four passes defended the next game vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14). Prevented three potential TD passes to Marcus Robinson, and in the third quarter, he nearly intercepted QB Daunte Culpepper.

► Matched up against top receiver Andre Johnson in Houston (Nov. 21), making five solo tackles and four passes defended.

► Vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), made eight tackles (seven solo). On a Rams fake field goal attempt, combined with Mark Roman to sniff out the play and force a turnover on downs.

► Playing against his former team at Philadelphia (Dec. 5), registered five solo tackles and one pass breakup.

► Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), recorded three passes defended and two tackles; held Lions' rookie WR Roy Williams to one catch.

► Made three solo tackles and one pass defended vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19).

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), made three passes defended, with one solo

tackle, holding Vikings WR Randy Moss to two catches. On Minnesota's first drive, defended a pass intended for Randy Moss on third-and-8, forcing the Vikings to punt.

► Made eight tackles (seven solo) at Chicago (Jan. 2).

HAWTHORNE, MICHAEL - Long-armed defender who began the season as the Packers' starter at left cornerback before ceding the position to first-round draft choice Ahmad Carroll in Week 6. Initially had won the spot over Carroll and another rookie, Joey Thomas, with a steady training camp performance.

► Sustained a strained lower back injury in the team's third preseason game, at Jacksonville (Aug. 27), forcing him to miss the final week of training camp practice and non-league contest at Tennessee (Sept. 3).

► Played in all 16 games, with five starts, and tied for the team lead in forced fumbles with two (Hannibal Navies), adding one fumble recovery for a TD. Recorded 36 tackles (26 solo) with seven passes defended. Is also the team leader with 19 special teams tackles.

► In the Carolina opener (Sept. 13), returned from preseason injury to make two tackles (one solo) and knock two passes down. On a first-and-20 early in the second quarter, blanketed receiver Ricky Proehl stride-for-stride down the right sideline, batting the pass away with his left hand. With time running out in the first half, came on a blitz on the left side of the defensive line, forcing Jake Delhomme into an errant throw and an intentional grounding penalty.

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19), contributed a season-high seven tackles (five solo), including a career-high two forced fumbles. In the fourth quarter, forced a fumble by Bears WR David Terrell that teammate Nick Barnett scooped up near midfield.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), tallied five stops (four solo) and one pass defended.

► On Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants, made six tackles (five solo).

► Next, against Tennessee (Oct. 11), made one solo tackle before sustaining a blow to the head in the first half that limited him to the 'dime' package after halftime.

► Broke up a pass at Detroit (Oct. 17) in first '04 game as a reserve, seeing regular duty in the 'dime.'

► Made two tackles (one solo) vs. Dallas (Oct. 24).

► At Washington (Oct. 31), tallied a pair of special teams tackles.

► Returned to Lambeau vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14) and contributed one tackle and two special teams tackles.

► At Houston (Nov. 21), came up with one pass defended.

► Followed up vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29) with a fumble recovery for a TD, along with three solo tackles and two special teams stops. After Darren Sharper stripped Isaac Bruce, scooped up the fumble and returned it 34 yards for a touchdown, the final score of the game and his first career TD.

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), accounted for two tackles from scrimmage (one solo), adding a team-high three special teams stops. Played at free safety for most of the second half after Bhawoh Jue left with a concussion in the third quarter.

► Made one solo tackle vs. Detroit (Dec. 12).

► Followed up vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19) with three tackles (two solo) and three special teams stops. Also recovered a fumble by the Jaguars' David Allen on a punt return in the first quarter.

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), saw action in Green Bay's 'dime' defense.

► In Week 17 at Chicago (Jan. 2), made eight tackles (seven solo) and one special teams stop. In the second quarter, jarred the ball loose from Desmond Clark on third-and-15, resulting in an incomplete pass and a Bears punt on the following play.

HENDERSON, WILLIAM - A consummate professional, started at fullback for the ninth consecutive season, having played 10 seasons overall. With Ahman Green's 1,163 rushing yards on the season, eclipsing the 1,000 yard mark for the fifth time, Henderson broke Howard Griffith's NFL record among fullbacks by blocking for a 1,000-yard rusher in a seventh overall season. Griffith blocked for Terrell Davis, Olandis Gary, Mike

Anderson, Anthony Johnson and Jerome Bettis. Elected to his first career Pro Bowl.

► Played all 16 games, with eight starts, and split fullback snaps with Nick Luchey, seeing most of his duty in the 'base' offense. As in other recent seasons, also plays a prominent role on special teams.

► Played in his 150th career NFL game at Washington (Oct. 31).

► Registered 34 catches for 239 yards and three touchdowns as well as 12 special teams stops, good for fifth on the team.

► Made two grabs for 7 yards at Carolina (Sept. 13). Midway through the third quarter of Panthers contest, on a third-and-2, caught a play-action pass in the flat and ran 9 yards up the left sideline, picking up the first down.

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19), caught one pass for 13 yards; the reception was made off of a Brett Favre flip pass, followed by a tough run by Henderson.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), saw action on offense and special teams. Caught two balls for 20 yards, both good for first downs on third-down situations on the same drive; also returned two kickoffs for 16 yards.

► Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), snagged two passes for 28 yards. In the third quarter, took a swing pass and broke an attempted tackle of CB Will Allen before hurdling SS Gibril Wilson for a 24-yard gain.

► Against Tennessee (Oct. 11), logged three catches for 11 yards.

► Posted two receptions for 3 yards in win at Detroit (Oct. 17).

► In home victory vs. Dallas (Oct. 24) made three grabs for 23 yards.

► On the road at Washington (Oct. 31), made four catches for 17 yards. On an 11-yard Davenport run, blocked LB Antonio Pierce, who was in a position to stop Davenport in the Green Bay backfield.

► Next, vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), led the team and tied a season-high with four receptions for 16 yards and one touchdown. On his first catch, late in the second quarter, he leaped over cornerback Antoine Winfield to earn a first down, a 6-yard gain on second-and-6; the Packers went on to kick a field goal right before halftime. In the second quarter, made a lead block on a 13-yard run to the left by Fisher, getting out ahead and smothering CB Brian Williams. In the fourth quarter, caught a pass in the flat to the left, waiting patiently for the Favre throw and trotted in 6 yards for the score, giving the Packers a 31-17 lead after the Longwell extra point.

► His lone catch at Houston (Nov. 21) went for 20 yards. Caught a swing pass to the right and advanced upfield; stiff-armed LB Jamie Sharper and then jumped over and through two defenders. Longwell kicked the tying field goal four plays later.

► Vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), made two receptions for seven yards. His 7-yard reception went for a first down. On Najeh Davenport's 31-yard run, blew up safety Antuan Edwards to give Davenport room to run.

► Followed up at Philadelphia (Dec. 5), with three catches for 7 yards and one touchdown. On the Packers' first TD, occurring in the fourth quarter, went in motion to the right, ran straight and turned to face the QB. Nall found him in the end zone for the 1-yard score.

► Made one reception for 11 yards and two special teams tackles in a 16-13 win over Detroit (Dec. 12). His 11-yard catch came on second-and-9 on the Packers' last drive that resulted in a 23-yard Longwell field goal to win the game.

► Vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), made one catch for no gain, along with one special teams tackle.

► In the ensuing game at Minnesota (Dec. 24), made one reception for 3 yards. Caught a ball on third-and-2 and jumped between two defenders for 3 yards and the first down. Green would score a TD four plays later.

► Wrapped up the season at Chicago (Jan. 2) with two catches for 53 yards and one touchdown. In the first quarter, took a short pass up field for 15 yards on second-and-7. On his second quarter TD reception, came out of the backfield, made the catch and scooted to the end zone, a career-long 38-yard score.

HORTON, JASON - Listed as the No. 3 right cornerback. Spent the previous two seasons in the CFL. Coaching staff was impressed with the coverage ability he displayed during training camp. Notched five tackles (three solo) on the season, while also contributing 16 special teams stops, good

for third on the team. Played in 14 games overall; inactive for two contests.

► Designated as inactive for Week 1 contest at Carolina (Sept. 13).

► Saw initial NFL action vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), making one special teams stop.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), played a majority of the game due to practice week injuries to Mike McKenzie (hamstring) and Ahmad Carroll (groin) and the Colts' heavy use of three-receiver packages; recorded four tackles (three solo) for his initial NFL stops from scrimmage.

► Followed up with some action against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), recording one assisted tackle.

► Was inactive vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11), then played primarily on special teams at Detroit (Oct. 17).

► Registered two special teams tackles against Dallas (Oct. 24); stopped KR Quincy Morgan at the Dallas 13-yard line, on a return in the second quarter.

► Made one special teams coverage stop at Washington (Oct. 31).

► Over the next four games, racked up eight special teams stops, with two made in each contest.

► Came away with one special teams coverage stop vs. Detroit (Dec. 12).

► Next, vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), made one special teams tackle.

► Registered two special teams stops at Minnesota (Dec. 24). Following a 46-yard Bryan Barker punt, zoomed down field and pulled PR Nate Burleson down for no gain, leaving the Vikings to start the drive on their own 15.

u At Chicago (Jan. 2), made one special teams tackle.

HUNT, CLETIDUS - In his third year as the team's full-time starter at the 'Eagle,' or three-technique, tackle; until the Dallas game (Oct. 24), spent four games at nose tackle (Weeks 3-6) due to injuries suffered by Grady Jackson (kneecap) and James Lee (knee).

► Played in all 16 games, with 14 starts, and recorded 37 tackles (21 solo) over the course of the season, along with two sacks, one forced fumble and three passes defensed.

► Spent the first two regular-season games at the 'Eagle' tackle position, making one stop vs. Chicago (Sept. 19).

► Posted three tackles in each of the next three contests.

► Made his first-ever start at nose tackle in loss at Indianapolis (Sept. 26) with both Jackson and Lee sidelined, responding with three tackles (one solo) and one pass defensed.

► Also made three tackles the following week against the New York Giants (Oct. 3). Collapsed the pocket in the second quarter of Giants contest, causing a third-down sack that led to a punt, keeping Green Bay in the game; later, in the fourth quarter, dropped Tiki Barber just shy of the first-down marker on third-and-4, and Steve Christie missed a field goal.

► Vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11), made three tackles (two solo). Hurried the Titans' Steve McNair into a throw on third-and-6, leading to a field goal attempt that was blocked by teammate Na'il Diggs.

► Helped limit the Lions to only 33 yards on 16 rushes (2.1 avg.) in win at Detroit (Oct. 17). Provided a key block on Darren Sharper's third-quarter interception return, pummeling T Stockar McDougale to clear the way for the 36-yard defensive touchdown that broke the game open at 24-10 in the eventual 38-10 victory.

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), returned to start at his normal 'Eagle' tackle position, as Grady Jackson returned to start at nose tackle, tallying one assisted tackle.

► At Washington (Oct. 31), made three tackles (two solo) and was effective in pressuring QB Mark Brunell. Stopped RB Clinton Portis for a 4-yard loss in the second quarter.

► Started at his usual 'Eagle' position vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14).

► Made five tackles (three solo) at Houston (Nov. 21).

► Vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), made four tackles (three solo) including his first sack of the season; added one forced fumble. Hit Marshall Faulk for a 3-yard loss in the third quarter. Three plays later, on fourth down, kicker Jeff Wilkins faked a field goal which the Packers read and stopped. In the fourth, got to QB Marc Bulger and forced a fumble. St. Louis recovered, but Hunt was credited with a sack.

- ▶ In the ensuing contest at Philadelphia (Dec. 5), made two tackles (one solo) and had one pass defended.
- ▶ Next, vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), made four tackles (one solo). In the first quarter, pummeled running back Kevin Jones for a loss of 4 yards.
- ▶ Posted four stops (two solo) vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19). In the first quarter, stopped RB LaBrandon Toefield on a third-and-6 for a 1-yard gain to force Jacksonville into a punting situation.
- ▶ Made one assisted tackle at Minnesota (Dec. 24).
- ▶ Followed up at Chicago (Jan. 2) with three tackles (two solo) including one sack; also batted down one pass. Pulled down Chad Hutchinson for a loss of 6 yards and his second sack of the season, resulting in a Chicago third-and-16 and punt on fourth down.

JACKSON, GRADY - A mid-season acquisition last year, entered '04 as the starting nose tackle. Was kept out of practice for the first week of training camp as he came back from arthroscopic knee surgery during the off-season. Returned to the practice field on Aug. 9.

- ▶ At Washington (Oct. 31), played in his 100th career game.
- ▶ Started 10 games and finished with 36 tackles (25 solo), on the season, including one sack, with two passes defended. Inactive six other contests due to injury.
- ▶ In the regular-season opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), had his leg rolled up in a group of linemen early in the game, suffering a dislocated left kneecap on the Panthers' third play from scrimmage, an injury that sidelined him for better than a month. Inactive for Weeks 2-6.
- ▶ Returned to start at nose tackle vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), collecting five tackles (four solo). The Packers immediately felt his impact. Making his first start since Week 1, the big nose tackle made four plays on the first two defensive series. On the game's third play, Jackson threw Richie Anderson for a 1-yard loss. Later in the same drive, he tied up several linemen, allowing Na'il Diggs to stop Eddie George for no gain. On the Cowboys' second drive, he tackled George on a 1-yard play and clogged up the line on the ensuing running play. In the second quarter, he deflected a third-and-4 pass, but a delay-of-game penalty wiped it out.
- ▶ At Washington (Oct. 31), notched three tackles and one pass defended. On a first-quarter third-and-1, stopped WR Taylor Jacobs in the backfield for a 1-yard loss, forcing the Redskins to punt.
- ▶ Vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), made three solo tackles. Combined with Barnett to limit QB Daunte Culpepper to a 1-yard gain on a Viking third-and-2, leading to a punt. Teamed with Roman to preserve an important first-half lead, on third-and-2 from the Packers' 3-yard line. Blew up the play at the line of scrimmage and Roman's tackle held RB Onterio Smith to no gain, forcing the Vikings to settle for a field goal.
- ▶ At Houston (Nov. 21), collected six tackles (five solo), also batting down one pass. On a fourth quarter Texan's third-and-9, tipped a David Carr pass intended for Domanick Davis, with the pass falling to the ground and Houston punting on the next play.
- ▶ Against St. Louis (Nov. 29), logged three tackles.
- ▶ In the next game at Philadelphia (Dec. 5), made three tackles (two solo), including his first sack of the season, felling Donovan McNabb in the third quarter for a 5-yard loss.
- ▶ At home against Detroit (Dec. 12), led the defensive line with seven tackles (three solo).
- ▶ Recorded two tackles (one solo) against Jacksonville (Dec. 19).
- ▶ At Minnesota (Dec. 24), came away with four tackles (two solo). Stuffed RB Michael Bennett for a 3-yard loss in the third quarter.
- ▶ Was made inactive at Chicago (Jan. 2) to rest knee that was injured in season-opener.

JENKINS, CULLEN - Returned from a 2004 stint in NFL Europe to win a roster spot with the Packers in his second attempt to do so. Is able to play at virtually every position across the defensive line. Was one of the stand-out defensive players of training camp. Contributed 28 tackles (18 solo) over the course of the season, including 4½ sacks (tied for second on the team), plus one fumble recovery, one forced fumble and two passes

defended. Played in all 16 games, with six starts.

- ▶ Started four early-season games (Weeks 3-6) at the 'Eagle' tackle position when the usual starter, Cletidus Hunt, shifted over to nose tackle to replace an injured Grady Jackson (kneecap).
- ▶ In the opener at Carolina (Sept 13.), made two tackles (one solo), playing a significant number of snaps after Jackson was sidelined early in the contest. Snatched RB Stephen Davis from behind late in the first quarter of Panthers contest, holding him for no gain. Played against older brother, Kris, a DT for the Panthers, in his own NFL debut.
- ▶ In the next game, vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), made two solo tackles. In the fourth quarter, pushed guard Steve Edwards into his backfield and then tackled Thomas Jones for a 4-yard loss, with the drive eventually resulting in a punt.
- ▶ At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), made his first NFL start with Hunt's move to the nose.
- ▶ Again started vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3), recording one assisted tackle, then made two solo tackles in Monday night contest with Tennessee (Oct. 11).
- ▶ Also started the following week's game, in his hometown of Detroit (Oct. 17), helping to limit the Lions to 33 yards on 16 rushing attempts (2.1 avg.). Additionally, pressured Joey Harrington on the play of the game, forcing the Lions QB into an interception that Darren Sharper returned 36 yards for a touchdown to put Green Bay up 24-10 in an eventual 38-10 victory. Had one assisted tackle.
- ▶ Vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), tallied one assisted tackle, splitting a sack with Aaron Kampman.
- ▶ Next, at Washington (Oct. 31), collected two tackles, including one sack. On a long Redskins third down, sacked quarterback Mark Brunell for a loss of 7 yards, forcing a Tom Tupa punt.
- ▶ Against Minnesota (Nov. 14), chipped in two tackles and one sack. Early in the game, stopped RB Michael Bennett for no gain. In the third quarter, came up the middle and sacked QB Daunte Culpepper on third-and-5, forcing the Vikings to punt. It marked the third time in three games he has gotten to the quarterback.
- ▶ At Houston (Nov. 21), on Gbaja-Biamila's sack in the third quarter, penetrated the middle of the Texans' O-line, forcing David Carr to run left and where KGB took him down. Additionally, had one solo tackle.
- ▶ At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), came away with four tackles (three solo), including one sack; also credited with a forced fumble and a fumble recovery. On the Eagles' first drive, came around Donovan McNabb's backside and swatted the ball out of his hand, falling on the ball to recover for the Packers.
- ▶ Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), made one solo tackle and deflected two passes. On a first-quarter Lions' third-and-13, tipped a Joey Harrington pass, with the ball falling incomplete; Detroit was forced to kick a field goal on the next play. In the second quarter, stopped running back Shawn Bryson for a three-yard loss on a pass play. In the fourth, tipped another ball that the Lions could not haul in on a long third down, forcing a punt.
- ▶ Had one assisted tackle vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19) and consistently applied pressure to Jaguars' QB Byron Leftwich.
- ▶ Posted two stops (one solo) at Minnesota (Dec. 24).
- ▶ At Chicago (Jan. 2) made five tackles (three solo), including one sack. On third-and-16 in the third quarter, following a Cletidus Hunt sack, dropped Chad Hutchinson for a sack of his own and a 4-yard loss, leading to a Bears punt on fourth down.

JOHNSON, CHRIS - Timed by most NFL scouts as the fastest player drafted in 2003, had a strong rookie training camp. But surgery on his kneecap, compounded by an off-season stress fracture in the same leg, wiped out his rookie year and virtually all of this past off-season. Ultimately ended up on the reserve/physically unable to perform list on Aug. 30, necessitating that he miss at least the first six regular-season games. Returned to practice on Oct. 20 and was activated to the 53-man roster on Nov. 10.

- ▶ Listed as inactive Weeks 11-17.

JOSUE, STEVE - Signed to the Packers roster on Dec. 10 to help a banged up Green Bay linebacking corps. Had spent the previous five weeks on the 49ers practice squad. Waived by the Packers Sept. 5, spent two weeks (Sept. 21-Oct. 5) on the Redskins practice squad, before joining the 49ers practice squad Nov. 3.

▶ Saw action in four games and finished the season with five solo tackles and five more on special teams.

▶ Saw his first action of the season vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) playing primarily on special teams but also at linebacker for a handful of snaps when Paris Lenon exited the game with injury.

▶ Resumed his special teams role vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), posting three coverage stops.

▶ Made one special teams tackle at Minnesota (Dec. 24).

▶ At Chicago (Jan. 2), made his first stops from scrimmage, playing at linebacker and finishing the game with five solo stops and four assisted tackles. Played at a couple of linebacker spots and was on the field for 31 defensive snaps. Made one special teams tackle.

JUE, BHAWOH - Backs up at both safety positions, in addition to a role on many of the special teams units. Was switched in the offseason from cornerback, his primary position the last two years, to safety, which the Green Bay coaches think is his more natural position. As a 2001 rookie, he had replaced LeRoy Butler at strong safety when the Packers icon suffered a career-ending injury.

▶ Has played in every game this season, both on special teams and as a contributor in the 'dime' defense. Posted season totals of five passes defended with one interception and 34 tackles (31 solo) from scrimmage. Also has recorded 11 special teams stops.

▶ In the opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), played at safety in 'dime' situations. Made a stop on kickoff coverage, dropping DeShaun Foster (after a muffed catch) on the Panthers' 8-yard line. Defensed two passes on Carolina's last drive of the game.

▶ Against Chicago (Sept. 19), saw action in 'dime' packages and on special teams.

▶ Resumed a similar role at Indianapolis (Sept. 26), collecting two tackles (one solo) from scrimmage and one stop on special teams.

▶ On Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants, played in the 'dime' package and on special teams.

▶ Against Tennessee (Oct. 11), started at strong safety for Roman; collected two solo tackles.

▶ Returned to reserve role at Detroit (Oct. 17).

▶ In his next game, vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), filled in as the primary free safety after Sharper left the game with an injury; led the team in tackles with seven. On a Cowboy third-and-10 on the Green Bay 11, stopped Detric Ward for a 5-yard gain to force a field goal.

▶ At Washington (Oct. 31), made seven solo tackles and recorded his first pick of the season. In the second quarter, intercepted a Mark Brunell pass at center field and returned it 23 yards, his first interception since 2001 and third of his career.

▶ Led the team with a career-high nine tackles (career-high seven solo) vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), making his second straight start for an injured Sharper. Dropped a potential fourth-quarter touchdown; he stepped in front of Culpepper's pass at the Vikings 40 and could've made it a 38-17 game with less than eight minutes left.

▶ At Houston (Nov. 21), contributed three solo tackles and one pass defended. On a fourth quarter Houston drive, with the score tied 13-13, stopped WR Andre Johnson for a one-yard receiving gain on third-and-5, forcing the Texans to punt.

▶ Recorded three solo stops and one special teams coverage tackle vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29).

▶ At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), made one solo tackle, playing for Sharper at the free safety spot in base defense. Left in the third quarter after suffering a concussion.

▶ With a healthy Sharper taking a majority of snaps, played on passing downs vs. Detroit (Dec. 12). Made two special teams tackles.

▶ Played a limited number of snaps at Minnesota (Dec. 24) as an extra defensive back.

▶ Registered one special teams stop at Chicago (Jan. 2), also playing in the 'dime' package.

KAMPMAN, AARON - Steady defender who for the first time entered the year as a starter, at 'Power' (left) end. Quietly among the team's most dependable defenders, he came off the bench to start 16 total games during his first two NFL seasons.

▶ For the '04 season, started all 16 games for the first time in his career and led the team's defensive linemen with a career-high 77 tackles (53 solo, also a career high) and tied for second on the team with 4½ sacks. Also has recovered one fumble and forced one; had three passes defensed.

▶ Made a pair of stops, in addition to a fumble recovery, at Carolina (Sept. 13). On the second play of the second half, recovered an aborted handoff from Panthers QB Jake Delhomme to FB Brad Hoover, returning it 3 yards to the Carolina 31; seven plays later the Packers scored a touchdown for a 17-7 lead in the eventual 24-14 triumph over the defending NFC champions.

▶ Picked up one tackle in each of the next two games, against Chicago (Sept. 19) and at Indianapolis (Sept. 26).

▶ Registered career highs in total (11) and solo (eight) tackles the following week against the New York Giants, including a sack of Kurt Warner where he dropped the Giants' QB in the backfield for a loss of 7 yards on a second-and-7, forcing New York into a long third down and eventual punt.

▶ Followed that up with a seven-tackle effort in Monday night contest with Tennessee (Oct. 11); made an assisted stop (with Na'il Diggs) to stop RB Chris Brown for a 1-yard loss on third-and-1, forcing a punt.

▶ Helped limit the Lions to only 33 yards on 16 rushing attempts (2.1 avg.) in win at Detroit (Oct. 17), chipping in with three tackles.

▶ Posted three tackles, ½ sack and one forced fumble against Dallas (Oct. 24).

▶ At Washington (Oct. 31), made six tackles (four solo), including one sack.

▶ Followed up vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14) with a two-tackle outing (one solo).

▶ Led all defensive linemen in tackles with five (four solo) at Houston (Nov. 21), with one pass defensed.

▶ Next, vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), was tied for second with six tackles (four solo), including one sack. In the second quarter, sacked Marc Bulger on a second-and-5 for a 10-yard loss; the Rams punted two plays later.

▶ At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), tallied seven tackles (five solo), including a sack of Donovan McNabb. On the next play, stopped Brian Westbrook for a 2-yard loss, forcing a third-and-long. The Eagles were forced to kick a field-goal two plays later.

▶ Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), logged six tackles (two solo). On Detroit's first drive of the game, combined with Paris Lenon to stop RB Kevin Jones for no gain on third-and-1. The Lions subsequently punted.

▶ Against Jacksonville (Dec. 19), came away with six tackles (three solo), with one pass defensed. In the first quarter, tipped a Byron Leftwich pass at the line of scrimmage intended for WR Reggie Williams to force a Jaguars' third-and-8, with a Jacksonville punt occurring on fourth down.

▶ Led all defensive linemen with five tackles (four solo) at Minnesota (Dec. 24). In the first quarter, stopped RB Michael Bennett for no gain.

▶ Started at Chicago (Jan. 2) and recorded one tackle.

LEACH, VONTA - A 6-0, 246-pound rookie out of East Carolina, whose first name is pronounced "von-TAY," was promoted from the practice squad to the active roster on Nov. 29. Originally signed with the Packers as an undrafted free agent, April 30. Waived in the final preseason roster reduction Sept. 6, he re-signed to the practice squad Sept. 8 and had spent the entire season in that role. Played in six games overall in '04 with four special teams tackles.

▶ Made his NFL debut vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), playing on special teams and accounted for one tackle on a Rams kickoff return.

- ▶ Played again on special teams at Philadelphia (Dec. 5) and vs. Detroit (Dec. 12).
- ▶ Resumed special teams role vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), recording one special teams tackle. In the waning moment of the first half, partially deflected a Chris Hanson punt, limiting the punt to 14 yards.
- ▶ Saw his career action at FB at Minnesota (Dec. 24), playing the position for two snaps in the second quarter. Also, resumed his special teams role.
- ▶ Played again on special teams at Chicago (Jan. 2), coming away with two special teams coverage tackle.

LEE, JAMES - Entered '04 as the No. 2 nose tackle after missing last season with back/leg injuries. After conditioning hard in the offseason, surprised many doubters with a strong showing in training camp. Packers GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman said Lee is much more mature than in his rookie season.

- ▶ Was placed on injured/reserve on Dec. 23. Suffered a lateral cartilage tear in his left knee in the Bears contest (Sept. 19); subsequently underwent arthroscopic surgery Sept. 21 and was inactive for Weeks 3-6. Played the ensuing seven contests before the surgically repaired knee ultimately wore down, causing him to be inactive vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19).
- ▶ Made 10 tackles (eight solo) on the season, playing in nine games overall, with one start.
- ▶ His lone tackle vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14) was also his first career sack.
- ▶ Took on a more sizeable role after starter Grady Jackson suffered a dislocated kneecap in the season opener, before being forced to the sidelines himself.
- ▶ Accounted for one solo tackle at Carolina (Sept. 13) in his first professional outing.
- ▶ Subsequently made his first NFL start on Sept. 19 vs. Chicago, taking Jackson's spot in the lineup at nose tackle. Finished Bears contest with three tackles (two solo) and received a positive grade from the Green Bay coaching staff, despite the fact that he played much of the game injured after tearing the lateral cartilage in his left knee on the Bears' first series. Subsequently underwent arthroscopic surgery Sept. 21; he was inactive for the ensuing four games (Weeks 3-6).
- ▶ Returned vs. Dallas (Oct. 24) and played behind Jackson at nose tackle.
- ▶ Made two solo tackles at Washington (Oct. 31).
- ▶ Saw reserve action vs. Houston (Nov. 21), posting one assisted tackle.
- ▶ Resumed similar role vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), helping limit the Rams to under 47 yards rushing.
- ▶ Followed up at Philadelphia (Dec. 5) with two solo tackles.
- ▶ Against Detroit (Dec. 12), played as a reserve lineman.
- ▶ Was listed as inactive vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19).

LENON, PARIS - Special teams dynamo, serves as the primary backup at the 'Will' (weak-side) and 'Buck' (strong-side) linebacker positions. On the season, had a career-high 28 tackles (17 solo) from scrimmage. Also contributed eight special teams stops. Played in all 16 games, with four starts.

- ▶ Started against Detroit (Dec. 12), substituting at the 'Will' linebacker spot for an injured Na'il Diggs. Made a career-high 12 tackles (eight solo). On Detroit's first drive of the game, combined with Aaron Kampman to stop RB Kevin Jones for no gain on third-and-1. The Lions subsequently punted.
- ▶ In the opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), played at linebacker in addition to covering kicks; broke his right thumb against the Panthers, requiring him to play with a cast for the next five games.
- ▶ Got his first career start, playing as the fourth linebacker when Green Bay opened in a 3-4 alignment, against Chicago (Sept. 19); secured a season-best three stops (two solo) in Bears contest.
- ▶ Was responsible for three stops in ensuing contest at Indianapolis (Sept. 26), then picked up one tackle against the New York Giants (Oct. 3).
- ▶ Started for an inactive Hannibal Navies (shoulder) at strong-side linebacker in Monday night contest with Tennessee (Oct. 11) and matched his season high with three stops.

- ▶ Returned to reserve role for game at Detroit (Oct. 17), went out in the second half after banging his left knee on the Ford Field turf.
- ▶ At home vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), contributed two special teams tackles.
- ▶ Resumed special teams role at Washington (Oct. 31) and vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14).
- ▶ Logged one special teams tackle at Houston (Nov. 21) and played again on special teams vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29).
- ▶ At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), spent nearly two-and-a-half quarters filling in for Diggs at the 'Will' linebacker spot, after Diggs left in the second quarter with a kidney contusion. Tallied four tackles (two solo).
- ▶ Two weeks later vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), started for Diggs at the 'Will' linebacker position for the second straight week.
- ▶ With Diggs return at Minnesota (Dec. 24), played on special teams, posting one tackle.
- ▶ Saw time as reserve LB at Chicago (Jan.2), making two assisted tackles and two stops on special teams.

LONGWELL, RYAN - Is in his eighth season as the Packers' kicker. Had converted 45 consecutive field goal attempts inside of 40 yards before missing a 31-yard attempt in the second quarter on Dec. 19 vs. Jacksonville (his previous miss of 39 yards-or-less was Oct. 7, 2002, vs. Chicago in Champaign, when he failed to hit a 36-yarder). The streak was the longest among active players. Was selected as an alternate to the Pro Bowl.

- ▶ With 120 points on the season (good for second in the NFC among kickers), led the Packers in scoring for an eighth season, taking the record from Don Hutson (seven); became one of three players to reach the century mark in each of his first eight NFL seasons. Jason Elam (11 to date, 1993-2003, has 96 in 2004) and Adam Vinatieri (nine to date, 1996-2004) own the longest. He needed two points coming into the contest vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19).
- ▶ Hit on 24 of 28 field goal attempts overall in 2004, an 85.7 percent success rate that tied for third (with Detroit's Jason Hanson) among conference kickers. Maintained his career 84.2 percent conversion rate within the tricky confines of Lambeau Field, while opponents have hit on only a 73.4 percent success rate.
- ▶ Was named the special teams 'NFC Player of the Month' for October; during the month, was seven-of-seven on field goals, including two-of-two from 50 yards and beyond, and 16-of-16 on extra points for 37 total points.
- ▶ Has nailed four game-winning kicks this season, giving him nine for his career.
- ▶ His field goal with 10:36 remaining in the third quarter vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) gave him 200 for his career. He now has 206 career field goals.
- ▶ Already the franchise's all-time leader, earned his 900th career point vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), accomplishing the feat on a PAT, following Tony Fisher's touchdown.
- ▶ Has scored a point in 128 consecutive games (every contest of his pro career). Maintains a streak of 153 straight successful PAT attempts, dating to Dec. 23, 2001, the NFL's fourth-longest active streak.
- ▶ Also against Minnesota, converted both field goal attempts, as well as punching through all four PAT attempts. Made the 43-yarder with time winding down on the first half, putting the Packers up 24-10. His second came with three seconds remaining in the match, a 33-yard conversion to give his team a 34-31 victory and possession of first place in the NFC North. It marked his sixth career game-winning field goal, his first since Sept. 8, 2002, vs. Atlanta.
- ▶ Followed up with another game-winner at Houston (Nov. 21), booting a 46-yard field goal as time expired, his seventh career game-winner. Earned 'NFC Special Teams Player of the Week' for his performance. Halfway through the fourth, converted a 39-yarder to tie the game at 13-13. Made three-of-four attempts in the game.
- ▶ Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), his game-winning field goal with two seconds remaining was his third of the season and eighth of his career. Dealing with swirling winds, made field goals of 36, 28 and 23 yards, also converting one PAT.
- ▶ Made his ninth career game winner at Minnesota (Dec. 24), a 29-yard

conversion as time expired. Also made a 42-yard attempt to end the first half; made all four PAT tries.

► With his first PAT vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), surpassed No. 1 Chris Jacke (134, 1990-94) among the team's all-time streaks. He needed one PAT conversion coming into the game.

► Through 16 games, made two field goals of 50-plus yards - only his second season as a pro that he has had multiple 50-yarders (also: three in 2000).

► Became the Packers' career leader in field goal attempts (248) and points after touchdown (343), surpassing Chris Jacke in each category. Has made 24-of-28 field goal attempts this season; two of the four misses have bounced off the goal post. He has connected on all 48 PAT attempts.

► At Carolina (Sept. 13), punched home a 41-yard field goal for an early 3-0 lead. Finished the game with one field goal made/attempted and was three-of-three on extra points.

► In the home opener vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), kicked a 25-yarder for the Packers' first points and later connected on a PAT.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), made all four PAT tries and made one-of-two field goal attempts.

► At home vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3), kicked one PAT.

► The following game vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11), booted field goals of 39 and 53 yards; also converted three PATs. His 53-yard field goal at the end of the first half was the second longest of his career (he made a 54-yarder at Tennessee on Dec. 16, 2001, the last time the Packers and Titans played in the regular season).

► Nailed a field goal of 50-or-more yards for the second straight week when he drilled home a 50-yarder on the last play of the first half at Detroit (Oct. 17), giving the Packers a 17-10 advantage heading into the locker room in their eventual 38-10 victory; the kick marked his ninth career field goal of 50-plus yards.

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), made field goals of 26 and one 40 yard field goal, also converting five PATs.

► Followed up at Washington (Oct. 31), with two field goals and three PATs.

► Against St. Louis (Nov. 29), made a 27-yard field goal and all six PATs.

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), made a 40-yard try and two PATs.

► Vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), was one of two, with his make coming from 35 yards out, while converting two PATs.

► In the regular season finale at Chicago (Jan. 2), made all four PAT tries and made a 20-yard field goal.

LUCHEY, NICK - Serves as the No. 2 fullback behind William Henderson for the second straight season. Sees substantial playing time in the Packers' two-tight end package as well as in short-yardage situations. Was an unrestricted free agent signee last year, brought in to challenge Henderson; he did not carry in 2003 but did open noticeable holes for the franchise's best rushing offense. Reported to camp in shape, more determined and more comfortable than last year, according to GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman.

► Played in all 16 games, with six starts, and registered 10 rushes for 24 yards and two receptions for 20 yards.

► Was a key cog in the blocking game at Carolina (Sept. 13) as Packers ran for 152 yards against the vaunted Panthers defense; his personal highlight came when he smashed LB Brandon Short, leading to a 12-yard gain by Ahman Green on a counter sweep to the left side of the field.

► The next game vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), split time with Henderson at fullback; on a 12-yard Tony Fisher run to the right, picked up a dominant block on Bears LB Joe Odom.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), had one rush for 2 yards, playing halfback for the first time since 2002.

► Followed up against the New York Giants (Oct. 3) with one run for 4 yards.

► Against Tennessee (Oct. 11), made a key block on an 18-yard run by Ahman Green.

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), on Green's 32-yard run, cracked LB Dexter Coakley to allow a hole for Green to cut back to and advance up field.

► Made one reception for 11 yards at Washington (Oct. 31), his first catch of the season; catch came on a third-and-3. Caught the ball in the flat, bounced off a Shawn Springs tackle, lost his helmet, then continued upfield for the rest of the yardage.

MARSHALL, TORRANCE - Backed up Nick Barnett at the 'Mike' (middle) linebacker position, in addition to contributing on the special teams units, before injury landed him on injured reserve. Is capable of manning all three LB positions. Packers GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman said earlier that Marshall enjoyed the best training camp of his four-year NFL career after reporting in excellent shape. Missed the last two weeks of training camp due to a left hamstring injury suffered in Aug. 21 preseason game against New Orleans. Had attempted to return to practice on Aug. 30, but aggravated the injury and went back to the sideline.

► On Nov. 27, was placed on the injured reserve list with a hamstring injury.

► Recorded four tackles (three solo) from scrimmage, plus eight special teams stops, tied for seventh among Packers.

► Designated as inactive for Week 1 contest at Carolina (Sept. 13).

► Returned to play against Chicago (Sept. 19) on special teams.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), led Green Bay in special teams tackles with three.

► Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), spelled Navies (shoulder) at strong-side linebacker and also played special teams.

► Split time with Paris Lenon in Monday night contest vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11) with Navies inactive due to shoulder injury; notched three tackles against the Titans.

► Was limited to special teams duty in ensuing win at Detroit (Oct. 17).

► Vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), made one tackle. Pounced on Davenport's fumble on a first-quarter kickoff return. Trailing 6-3, his quick thinking saved field position and possession. The Packers went on to score a TD and take a lead they would not relinquish.

► At Washington (Oct. 31), made a pair of special teams tackles.

► Saw action on special teams vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), making a key block on Ferguson's 55 yard kickoff return.

► Tied for the team lead in special teams stops with two at Houston (Nov. 21).

MARTIN, DAVID - Prior to being placed on injured reserve Nov. 30, had returned to role as the primary backup to three-time Pro Bowl pick Bubba Franks at tight end after sharing the No. 2 job with 15-year veteran Wesley Walls in '03. A wide receiver in college, the speedy Martin made several

downfield catches in training camp.

- ▶ Was placed on injured reserve on Nov. 30 with a knee injury.
- ▶ In nine regular-season games, made five receptions for 88 yards and contributed three special teams tackles.
- ▶ Posted one catch for 13 yards in Monday night opener at Carolina (Sept. 13). Caught a pass in the flat in the second quarter, speeding ahead for 13 yards down the left sideline for a first down and positioning Green Bay at its 41.
- ▶ Started each of the next two games, vs. Chicago (Sept. 19) and at Indianapolis (Sept. 26), when the Packers opened in a double-tight end set.
- ▶ Made one reception for 9 yards in the ensuing contest against the New York Giants (Oct. 3).
- ▶ Picked up a pair of special teams tackles in Monday night game with Tennessee (Oct. 11); he also played on the coverage units at Detroit (Oct. 17). On a 9-yard, first-down run by Ahman Green in the fourth quarter of Lions contest, he got to the outside and made a key block on LB Teddy Lehman.
- ▶ Against Dallas (Oct. 24), made a single catch for 6 yards.
- ▶ At Washington (Oct. 31), notched one reception for a season-long 25 yards; lined up in the slot and caught a pass and advanced downfield.
- ▶ Vs. Minnesota, flashed his speed and athleticism in hauling in a career-long 35-yard reception in the first quarter, lining up at wide receiver and running past safety Brian Russell and making an over-the-shoulder grab.
- ▶ Was inactive at Houston (Nov. 21) and vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29) with a knee injury.

McHUGH, SEAN - Promoted on Dec. 21 from the practice squad to the active roster. A 6-5, 262-pound tight end who originally joined Green Bay on waivers from Tennessee, Sept. 6. Made his NFL debut at Carolina Sept. 13, and then was waived Sept. 22, (eventually signing back to the practice squad) to make room for cornerback Mike McKenzie on the 53-man roster.

- ▶ Listed as inactive at Minnesota (Dec. 24) and at Chicago (Jan. 2)

MORLEY, STEVE - Newcomer, the No. 1 overall choice in the 2003 CFL Draft, took most of the snaps at left guard for the first three weeks of training camp with Mike Wahle (knee bone bruise) sidelined. Began the regular season as Wahle's backup. Though listed at guard, also spent some of the offseason working at left tackle behind Chad Clifton. Designated as inactive for all 16 games.

NALL, CRAIG - Now serves as the Packers' No. 2 quarterback. Had begun the year as the team's No. 3 quarterback, a position he also had held the past two seasons, after holding off challengers Tim Couch and Scott McBrien in the preseason.

- ▶ Moved up on the depth chart starting in Week 5 after long-time backup Doug Pederson went on season-ending injured reserve with a rib/back injury.
- ▶ Has completed 23 of 33 passes (69.7%) for 314 yards and four touchdowns for a passer rating of 139.4.
- ▶ Had been hurt himself for much of the first two weeks of training camp, having suffered a right hamstring strain on the first day of full-squad workouts (Aug. 2). Made a limited return to practice on Aug. 11 and sat out the first two preseason games.
- ▶ Was listed as inactive third quarterback for each of the first four games.
- ▶ At Chicago (Jan. 2), entered the game in the second quarter, completing seven of 13 passes for 131 yards and one touchdown. On his TD drive in the second quarter, went three of three for 64 yards. His first completion went to Bubba Franks for 12 yards, followed by a tough, 27-yard throw to Ben Steele. Put an exclamation point on the drive with a 25-yard pass to Walker at the back of the end zone.
- ▶ Was pressed into action vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3) on what turned out to be the last play of the game, coming in for Pederson, who could not continue due to rib/back injury; completed a 24-yard pass to Robert Ferguson (Nall's first career completion), though Ferguson could not get

out of bounds and, with no timeouts remaining, time ran out before the Packers could stop the clock. The stint marked only the second game action of his pro career, his first having come Dec. 22, 2003, at Oakland, when he kneeled down on the final two snaps.

- ▶ As the No. 2, saw his then-most extensive playing time as a pro eight days later against Tennessee (Oct. 11), coming in late in blowout loss. Completed seven of eight passes for 64 yards with one touchdown (139.6 passer rating) to close out Titans contest. All of his completions came on the final drive of the contest, with four going for 10-or-more yards. Threw a 1-yard TD pass to Javon Walker for his first touchdown pass in the NFL.
- ▶ Against Dallas (Oct. 24), made two kneel downs to end the game.
- ▶ Dressed, but did not play at Washington (Oct. 31), Minnesota (Nov. 14) at Houston (Nov. 21) and vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29).
- ▶ At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), came into the game in the fourth, in relief of Favre, with the win out of reach. Completed eight of 11 passes for 95 yards and two touchdowns for a passer rating of 138.3. Found William Henderson for a 1-yard TD, the Packer's first of the game. On Green Bay's final scoring drive, completed six passes for 84 yards including passes of 24, 12, 16 and 17 yards, the 17-yard completion going to Walker in the end zone.
- ▶ Dressed, but did not play vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19) and at Minnesota (Dec. 24).

NAVIES, HANNIBAL - Starts for the second consecutive year at the 'Buck' (strong-side) linebacker position. A 2003 unrestricted free agent, replaced Na'il Diggs at 'Buck' linebacker last season and excelled. The largest of the three starters at 249 pounds, GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman calls him one of team's most underrated players. Played in 15 games, with 14 starts, and finished sixth on the club with 73 tackles (49 solo), including one-half sack. Inactive one contest due to injury.

- ▶ At Carolina (Sept. 13), was a leader in stops with 12 (seven solo), including a shared sack of Jake Delhomme. On the Panthers' first drive, stopped RB Stephen Davis for a 1-yard loss after coming unblocked from the left side, forcing Carolina into a long passing situation and, eventually, leading to a punt. In the third quarter, came up the middle past center Jeff Mitchell to drop Delhomme for a loss on a third-and-long play, splitting the sack with Mark Roman and forcing the Panthers to punt. Did suffer shoulder injury in Carolina contest that has bothered him for much of the year.
- ▶ Vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), made four stops (two solo).
- ▶ At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), came away with three tackles (three solo), including a stop on third-and-short, lining up at the line of scrimmage and pushing RB Edgerrin James into his own backfield, leading to a punt on the next play.
- ▶ Saw limited action vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3) after he aggravated his injured shoulder early in the game.
- ▶ Was made inactive for Monday night game with Tennessee (Oct. 11) to help rest shoulder.
- ▶ Returned to start at Detroit (Oct. 17), he made five stops as Green Bay limited the Lions to only 125 net yards, including 33 on 16 rushing attempts (2.1 avg.).
- ▶ Followed up against Dallas (Oct. 24) with three solo tackles.
- ▶ At Washington (Oct. 31), made six tackles (five solo).
- ▶ Made four tackles (three solo) against Minnesota (Nov. 14).
- ▶ At Houston (Nov. 21), made six stops (three solo).
- ▶ Contributed six stops (four solo) on Monday night vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29).
- ▶ Followed up at Philadelphia (Dec. 5) with a six-tackle performance (four solo). Stopped Brian Westbrook for a 2-yard loss in the third quarter.
- ▶ In Week 14 against Detroit (Dec. 12), made four tackles (three solo).
- ▶ Came away with three tackles (two solo) vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19).
- ▶ Was a bright spot on defense for the Packers at Minnesota (Dec. 24), leading the team with 11 tackles (nine solo). In the third quarter, pulled down TE Jermaine Wiggins on a reception for a loss of 6 yards.
- ▶ Started at Chicago (Jan. 2), but did not record any tackles. Took only four snaps in the ball game; rested by the coaching staff.

O'SULLIVAN, J.T. - Is the Packers' No. 3 quarterback after being acquired from New Orleans in the Oct. 4 trade that sent CB Mike McKenzie to New Orleans (Green Bay also received the Saints' second-round draft choice in 2005). Has been the inactive third quarterback for each of the 12 games since his acquisition, but did see action on two kneel-down plays to finish game at Chicago (Jan. 2). Earlier had been inactive for the Saints' first four contests of the '04 season.

PEDERSON, DOUG - Served as the team's No. 2 quarterback for the first four games until a rib/back injury landed him on injured reserve. Continues to assist starter Brett Favre with adjustments during games and the practice week. Also had served as the reliable holder for placekicker Ryan Longwell until time of injury. Finished the season with 11 completions in 23 passing attempts (47.8%) for 120 yards, a passer rating of 27.4. Was the No. 2 QB at Carolina (Sept. 13), holding for Longwell on all field goal and PAT tries; resumed same role vs. Chicago (Sept. 19). With Favre hobbled by a charley-horse in his left hamstring, came in at quarterback for the Packers' final series at Indianapolis (Sept. 26); threw for 34 yards on four-of-six passing before being intercepted, in what was his first extended action since the 2002 season. Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), played a majority of the second half in relief of Favre (concussion), who went out after the Packers' first offensive series of the third quarter. Completed seven of 17 passes for 86 yards with one interception. Sustained three injuries vs. the Giants: a cracked bone (called the transverse process) in his back, a torn muscle in his side and a broken rib. Despite sustaining the injury in the third quarter, after a Giants player hit him just before he went out of bounds, Pederson stayed in the game, his 100th career NFL contest, until leaving just before the final snap. Was placed on season-ending injured reserve on Oct. 7.

PETERSON, KENNY - Strong and agile, has been used all along the defensive line. Primarily serves as the backup to Cletidus Hunt at the 'Eagle' defensive tackle position. Having worked hard this offseason, he now weighs 295, down from 300-plus his rookie year.

► Saw reserve action in a handful of games since missing the first two contests after suffering a preseason knee/ankle injury. Suffered a right knee bone bruise and sprained ankle in the final preseason game, Sept. 3 at Tennessee. Injury made him inactive for the first two games of the regular season, at Carolina (Sept. 13) and vs. Chicago (Sept. 19).

► Saw action in nine games overall and recorded 12 tackles (10 solo) since his return to the field. Inactive for seven other contests.

► Came back for the team's third game, at Indianapolis (Sept. 26).

► On Oct. 3 vs. the New York Giants, notched his first two tackles of the season, both solo stops.

► The following game vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11), notched three solo tackles, including a stuff of RB Chris Brown for 1-yard loss.

► Rotated in at Detroit (Oct. 17) as Green Bay limited the Lions to 33 yards on 16 rushing attempts.

► Listed as inactive vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), at Washington (Oct. 31) and vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14).

► Returned to action at Houston (Nov. 21), assisting on one tackle.

► Was a reserve defensive lineman vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29); on a short kick, made his first career kickoff return for 6 yards

► Saw extensive action as a reserve lineman at Philadelphia (Dec. 5), coming away with one solo tackle.

► Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), tallied two solo tackles. Stuffed RB Kevin Jones for a 1-yard loss in the first quarter.

► Listed as inactive vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19) and at Minnesota (Dec. 24).

► Returned at Chicago (Jan. 2), making three tackles (two solo).

RIVERA, MARCO - Anchor on the offensive line, now is in his seventh straight season starting at guard; since 1958, the year before Vince Lombardi arrived, just one other Packers guard has started more consecutive years (Jerry Kramer, nine from 1958-66). Became the first Green Bay O-lineman in 33 years to make three straight Pro Bowls (Gale Gillingham,

1969-71). His current 99-game starting streak is second longest on the team, behind only ironman Brett Favre (205). Named as Packers' 2004 Walter Payton NFL Man of the Year. Elected to his third-consecutive Pro Bowl.

► Member of unit that paved the way for 6,349 offensive yards, a team record, surpassing the 6,172 of the 1983 Packers; also part of unit that surrendered just 14 sacks, bettering the 1972 and '74 squads' 17 QB fells.

► In the season opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), sealed DT Brentson Buckner to the inside to allow Ahman Green to cut back on a 6-yard TD run in the second quarter, he also stymied the Panthers' Pro Bowl DT Kris Jenkins, limiting him to three tackles and a sack.

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19), on a 25-yard Green run pulled from his right guard position and came left, first blocking DE Alex Brown and then LB Lance Briggs.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26) was the lead blocker on Green's first run of the game, an 11-yard gain; pulled right and pummeled LB Rob Morris.

► Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), was part of an offensive line that held the Giants to no sacks.

► Helped the Packers gain 157 yards rushing against a tough Lions front in win at Detroit (Oct. 17); he also was able to neutralize powerful DT Shaun Rogers for much of the contest. Did leave Detroit game for two snaps early in the fourth quarter after suffering a severe laceration on his right biceps.

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), was part of Green Bay's 220-yard rushing performance.

► At Washington (Oct. 31), was part of an offensive line unit that helped rack up 361 yards of total offense and three touchdowns.

► Vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), was part of an offensive line that helped gain 206 yards on the ground. On Green Bay's final offensive play, opened a hole for Green, who barreled ahead for 7 yards, setting up a 33-yard Longwell field goal to win the game.

► At Houston (Nov 21), aided the offensive line in providing excellent pass protection for Favre's 383-yard passing performance, allowing no sacks.

► In the Monday night contest vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), helped the Packers to a season-high 231 yards rushing.

► Started at right guard at Philadelphia (Dec. 5) and in rematch vs. Detroit (Dec. 12).

► Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) was part of an offensive line that opened holes for 116 yards and allowed only one sack to a outstanding Detroit front four.

► Assisted the Packers to 444 yards of total offense against Jacksonville (Dec. 19).

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), provided pass protection for Favre's 363 yards passing in the come-from-behind win and blocked for the team's 102 rushing yards.

► In the season finale at Chicago (Jan. 2), was part of offensive line that allowed no sacks and allowed for 327 yards passing yards and three touchdowns.

ROMAN, MARK - Won the starting strong safety spot over the since-traded Marques Anderson with a strong training camp performance. Joined the Packers as an unrestricted free agent March 24. As a former cornerback, gives Green Bay great coverage skills in the deep secondary.

► Has made 85 tackles (62 solo) - third on the team and first among defensive backs - and has 3½ sacks and three passes defensed, while playing in all 16 contests (15 starts).

► Started at Carolina (Sept. 13), he finished second on the team in tackles with a season-high eight stops (six solo), including one-half sack. In the third quarter, he sprinted around the left edge past tight end Kris Mangum to pick up a shared sack of Jake Delhomme (with Hannibal Navies) on a third down, resulting in a Carolina punt.

► In the following game, vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), posted three tackles (two solo).

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), logged five tackles, three solo. Knocked a pass out of WR Reggie Wayne's hands, resulting in a Colts incompleton on third-and-2 in the third quarter and forcing a punt.

► Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), contributed six tackles (five solo),

including one sack; came on a first-quarter blitz, dropping Kurt Warner for a 10-yard loss.

► Did not start vs. Tennessee (Oct. 11) after limited practice late in the week due to chronic knee pain; he did play throughout the Titans contest in the team's 'dime' package as well as seeing action in the base defense for much of the night; finished with seven tackles (five solo).

► Returned to the starting lineup for victory at Detroit (Oct. 17), making one assisted helping to limit the Lions to only 125 net yards.

► Vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), made six tackles (five solo) and one sack. On a Dallas third-and-4; came unblocked from the left side and sacked Vinny Testaverde for a 5-yard loss, forcing a Cowboy field goal.

► Came away with two tackles at Washington (Oct. 31)

► Against Minnesota (Nov. 14), had seven tackles (four solo). Stopped running back RB Onterio Smith for no gain on a Viking third-and-2 on the Packers' 3, forcing Minnesota to kick a field goal.

► Made four tackles from scrimmage at Houston (Nov. 21).

► Collected six tackles (three solo) vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29). On a Rams' fake field goal attempt, helped to sniff out the play and force a turnover on downs.

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), recorded eight tackles (three solo) and two passes defended.

► Paced the defensive backfield with six solo stops vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), adding one pass defended. On a third-quarter Lions' third-and-1, came from the right side and pulled RB Kevin Jones down for a 1-yard loss. The play before, combined with Aaron Kampman to stop Jones for no gain. Detroit punted on fourth down.

► Vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), was third on the team in tackles with six (four solo). In the second quarter, teamed with Corey Williams to plant Fred Taylor for no gain and force a Jaguars' third-and-6. The Jaguars punted on fourth down.

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), racked up four solo tackles.

RUEGAMER, GREY - Has served as the Packers' starting center since Week 4. Versatile, he had entered the year as the backup to Pro Bowl center Mike Flanagan, in addition to backing up Marco Rivera at right guard. Moved into the lineup after Flanagan was placed on season-ending injured reserve Oct. 2 due to knee tendinitis that subsequently would require surgery. Had won the backup center job over Scott Wells, the Packers' seventh-round draft choice last April, with a strong training camp performance.

► Started at center for the first three preseason games with Flanagan sidelined by same knee tendinitis. Played in 15 games, with 11 starts, and dressed, but did not play in one contest.

► Member of unit that paved the way for 6,349 offensive yards, a team record, surpassing the 6,172 of the 1983 Packers; also part of unit that surrendered just 14 sacks, bettering the 1972 and '74 squads' 17 QB fells.

► Replaced Flanagan late in Monday night opener at Carolina (Sept. 13) to give the starter some rest with the game seemingly in hand.

► Against Chicago (Sept 19.), spelled Flanagan for parts of the final two Packers' offensive series.

► Made his first start for Green Bay (and the fourth as a pro) against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), stepping in for Flanagan, who had been placed on IR a day earlier.

► Helped the Packers to rush for 157 yards rushing in win at Detroit (Oct. 17), also holding firm against the monstrous middle of the Lions' defensive front.

► Vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), on Green's 90-yard score, ran into the second tier of the defense and blocked LB Dat Nguyen, to allow Green to get through the hole.

► At Washington (Oct. 31), was part of an offensive line unit that helped rack up 361 yards of total offense and three touchdowns.

► Followed up vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14) as part of an offensive line that

helped gain 206 yards on the ground.

► At Houston (Nov 21), aided the offensive line in providing excellent pass protection for Favre's 383-yard passing performance, allowing no sacks.

► In the Monday night contest vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), blocked defensive tackle Jimmy Kennedy on Najeh Davenport. The Packers rushed for a season-high 231 yards on the game.

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), started the game at center, but left toward the end of the second quarter with a sprained left ankle.

► Was active, but did not play in the following home contest vs. Detroit (Dec. 12).

► Vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), played one snap for Scott Wells, who was out with a right shoe problem.

► Returned at Minnesota (Dec. 24), redirected LB Chris Claiborne for a 9-yard Fisher gain on second-and-8. On Fisher's 21-yard screen catch and run, blocked LB Dontarrious Thomas, allowing Fisher to get up field. Provided pass protection for Favre's 363 yards passing in the come-from-behind win and blocking for the team's 102 rushing yards.

► At Chicago (Jan. 2), on Green's 23-yard catch and run on third-and-17 in the opening quarter, smashed LB Lance Briggs to allow Green to get to and past the first down marker. Part of offensive line that allowed no sacks and allowed for 327 yards passing yards and three touchdowns.

SANDER, B.J. - Left-footed punter who was the Packers' third-round draft pick last April, is listed as the No. 2 punter behind veteran Bryan Barker. Struggled in the preseason, but GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman hasn't written him off and still expects him to be a quality NFL punter in time. Booted a 54-yarder Aug. 21. vs. New Orleans. Punted 23 times in the preseason for a gross average of 36.0 yards and a net of 30.8. Has been inactive for every game during the regular season.

SHARPER, DARREN - Starts at free safety for the sixth consecutive year. A two-time Pro Bowler who is one of the league's top safeties, continues to exhibit the big-play ability that has been a trademark of his career. Now stands fifth on the Packers' all-time interceptions list with 36, having moved past Irv Comp (33) in Oct. 3 game against the New York Giants.

► Became one of four players to lead the team in interceptions at least five seasons: Bobby Dillon (seven), Willie Wood (five) and LeRoy Butler (five) are the others.

► With his touchdown at Chicago (Jan. 2), tied two club records: Herb Adderley's career record of seven defensive TDs, and the single-season mark of three, held by Adderley (1965) and Sharper (1997). Sharper had two entering the weekend.

► Played in 15 games, with 13 starts, and registered 77 tackles (68 solo). Also snared four interceptions among eight passes defended and two forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

► Made arguably his biggest play of the season in eventual 38-10 victory at Detroit (Oct. 17). Stepped in front of a Joey Harrington pass intended for Tai Street early in the third quarter, picking off the ball, then used his athleticism to weave 36 yards for a touchdown to extend the Packers' tenuous 17-10 lead to 24-10 and seemingly break the game open. Also contributed five solo stops in Lions contest.

► In season opener at Carolina (Sept. 13), had accounted for eight tackles (seven solo).

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19) in the team's home debut, made seven solo stops, as well as one interception and one pass defended. On fourth-and-11 on the Bears' first drive, Chicago faked a field-goal try with kicker Paul Edinger punting the ball; Sharper alertly dropped back, fielded the punt and advanced it up the left sideline for 9 yards. Later in the opening quarter, he intercepted a Rex Grossman pass intended for Bobby Wade.

► On the road at Indianapolis (Sept. 26), led the team in tackles with a season-high nine stops (eight solo).

► Vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3), made seven tackles (five solo), one interception and one pass defended. In the first quarter with the Giants at the Green Bay 2-yard line, stole a pass on the goal line intended for Amani Toomer and returned it 18 yards; the pick ended Kurt Warner's streak of

127 passes without an interception, the NFL's longest active streak at the time.

- ▶ On Oct. 11 vs. Tennessee, registered seven tackles (five solo).
- ▶ Against Dallas (Oct. 24), before leaving in the second quarter, made a smart play in the Cowboys' end zone. On a pass from WR Terry Glenn, probably could've intercepted the ball, but instead swatted it away from WR Keyshawn Johnson. Sustained a sprained left posterior cruciate ligament and was subsequently inactive at Washington (Oct. 31).
- ▶ Returned vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), contributing one tackle; play was limited to passing situations.
- ▶ Still limited to passing downs at Houston (Nov. 21), made one solo tackle vs. his brother's (LB Jamie Sharper) Texans.
- ▶ Vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), registered his first forced fumble of the season to go along with six solo tackles. After Marc Bulger completed a pass to WR Isaac Bruce, came in and stripped the ball. Michael Hawthorne scooped up the fumble and returned it 34 yards for the touchdown, the final score of the game.
- ▶ Started at free safety at Philadelphia (Dec. 5), but was relegated to playing mostly in the 'dime' package. Recorded three solo tackles.
- ▶ Earlier, he had returned an interception 90 yards for the Packers' only touchdown in Aug. 21 preseason win over New Orleans.
- ▶ Was second on the team with two passes defensed against Detroit (Dec. 12), adding four solo stops.
- ▶ Finished second in tackles vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19) with seven (six solo); also forced one fumble and returned it for a TD. On a Jacksonville second-and-eight, Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila came from the right and hit QB Byron Leftwich on his blindside, causing him to fumble the ball before he could get his throwing arm forward. Jacksonville guard Vince Mauwai nonchalantly picked the ball up, but Sharper took it away and returned it 15 yards for a TD to give the Packers a 10-7 lead in the second quarter.
- ▶ Made five solo tackles at Minnesota (Dec. 24).
- ▶ In Week 17 at Chicago (Jan. 2) registered six tackles (four solo) with one pick for a touchdown. Stepped in front of Hutchinson pass intended for Bobby Wade and returned the interception 43 yards for the Packers third score and a 21-7 lead. With the TD, tied a team record with seven career defensive touchdowns.

STEELE, BEN - Serves as the Packers' No. 3 tight end after being promoted from the club's practice squad early in the year. Spent training camp with Minnesota each of the last two years, was signed to Green Bay's practice squad on Sept. 7 following his preseason release by the Vikings. Subsequently was promoted to the Packers' 53-man roster on Sept. 15, and has played in every game since (a total of 15), primarily in a special teams role.

- ▶ Is second on the team with 17 coverage tackles and has four receptions for 42 yards.
- ▶ At Houston (Nov. 21), made his first professional reception for 5 yards. Additionally, made one special teams tackle.
- ▶ Against Minnesota (Nov. 14), made a potentially-game saving special teams play. Fought at the bottom of a kickoff scrum to recover a Ferguson fumble and set up the Packers' game-winning drive. The verdict remained in doubt for 39 seconds as Steele fought with Kevin Ross beneath the bodies. Added one special teams tackles.
- ▶ Saw brief action at tight end, as well as special teams duty, in NFL debut Sept. 19 vs. Chicago.
- ▶ At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), collected two coverage stops.
- ▶ Again picked up a pair of special teams tackles in Monday night game with Tennessee (Oct. 11), dropping KR Troy Fleming at the Titans' 16.
- ▶ Added a coverage stop at Detroit (Oct. 17).
- ▶ At home against Dallas (Oct. 24), made one special teams tackle.
- ▶ Resumed special teams role at Washington (Oct. 31).
- ▶ Vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), saw extensive playing time as the club's second tight end. Chipped in two stops on special teams.
- ▶ Served as the Packers' No. 2 tight end at Philadelphia (Dec. 5). Tied for a team high with three special teams coverage tackles.
- ▶ Followed up at home vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) playing as the second tight

end; also made one special teams tackle.

- ▶ Made a season-best two catches for 10 yards vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19); also chipped in one special teams tackle. Caught a 7-yard pass for a first down in the first quarter for his second reception of the year.
- ▶ Played tight end at Minnesota (Dec. 24); also made one special teams stop.
- ▶ Made one catch for 27 yards and one special teams tackle at Chicago (Jan. 2). Made a leaping, career-long 27-yard reception, his lone reception of the game; Walker caught a 25-yard touchdown two plays later. Posted one special teams tackle.

TAUSCHER, MARK - Popular Wisconsin product begins his fifth year as the starter at right tackle. Chad Clifton's classmate in the 2000 draft, also returned last year in strong fashion from an injury that ended his 2002 campaign. Can play right guard in an emergency situation. Has started every game this year.

- ▶ During the week leading up to the Giants game (Oct. 3), GM/Head Coach Mike Sherman described him as a player who rises to every occasion, a statement Tauscher backed up with a solid performance vs. Michael Strahan, holding the Pro Bowl DE without a sack.
- ▶ Member of unit that paved the way for 6,349 offensive yards, a team record, surpassing the 6,172 of the 1983 Packers; also part of unit that surrendered just 14 sacks, bettering the 1972 and '74 squads' 17 QB fells.
- ▶ Had helped the Packers to 152 yards on the ground in the season opener at Carolina (Sept. 13).
- ▶ Along with Clifton, made his 50th NFL start in the same game, Sept. 19 vs. Chicago.
- ▶ At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), threw a second-quarter block on Colts DT Josh Williams, allowing Ahman Green to pick up 8 yards on a third-and-2, with the drive eventually resulting in a Ryan Longwell field goal.
- ▶ Helped Green Bay to 157 yards rushing in win at Detroit (Oct. 17), he was called upon to move to right guard for two plays early in the fourth quarter after starter Marco Rivera briefly went to the sideline due to an arm laceration.
- ▶ Against Dallas (Oct. 24), helped team to 220 yards rushing and 486 yards of total offense.
- ▶ At Washington (Oct. 31), was part of an offensive line unit that helped rack up 361 yards of total offense and three touchdowns.
- ▶ Followed up vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14) as part of an offensive line that helped gain 206 yards on the ground. On Green Bay's final offensive play, opened a hole for Green, who barreled ahead for 7 yards, setting up a 33-yard Longwell field goal to win the game.
- ▶ At Houston (Nov 21), aided the offensive line in providing excellent pass protection for Favre's 383-yard passing performance, allowing no sacks.

- ▶ Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) was part of an offensive line that opened holes for 116 yards and allowed only one sack to a outstanding Detroit front four.
- ▶ Assisted the Packers to 444 yards of total offense against Jacksonville (Dec. 19).
- ▶ At Minnesota (Dec. 24), on Najeh Davenport's 11-yard run in the first quarter, sealed Kenny Mixon to the outside, allowing Davenport to make the initial burst. Provided pass protection for Favre's 363 yards passing in the come-from-behind win and blocking for the team's 102 rushing yards.
- ▶ Next, at Chicago (Jan. 2), with Rivera out resting in the fourth quarter, moved inside to right guard and Kevin Barry came in to play right tackle. Part of an offensive line that allowed no sacks and allowed for 327 yards passing yards and three touchdowns.

THOMAS, JOEY - A third-round pick of the Packers in 2004, is slotted as the No. 2 right corner behind Al Harris. Was slowed somewhat by injury at the start of the year. Missed roughly a week of practice and the team's Aug. 7 scrimmage with a knee bruise, sustained Aug. 4. Returned to the

field Aug. 10, though he didn't make his preseason debut until 11 days later against New Orleans.

- ▶ Owns six coverage stops and 15 tackles (13 solo) from scrimmage, with two passes defended and one forced fumble.
- ▶ Picked up a special teams tackle in season opener at Carolina (Sept. 13).
- ▶ Designated as inactive for Week 2 contest with Chicago (Sept. 19).
- ▶ Posted one special teams tackle in ensuing game at Indianapolis (Sept. 26).
- ▶ Dressed, but did not play, vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3).
- ▶ Saw special teams duty in each of the next two games, Oct. 11 vs. Tennessee and Oct. 17 at Detroit, picking up one solo stop on coverage in Titans contest.
- ▶ Against Dallas (Oct. 24), saw the first defensive action of his career, picking up one solo tackle and one pass defended.
- ▶ Was again utilized on defense and special teams at Washington (Oct. 31) and vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14).
- ▶ Made two solo tackles at Houston (Nov. 21), including a shoestring tackle on WR Andre Johnson, catching him from behind after a 49-yard gain and preventing a Texans TD.
- ▶ Next, vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), made five solo tackles and one forced fumble. Forced a fumble on Isaac Bruce, the first of his career, on a third-and-5. Ahmad Carroll recovered and returned it 40 yards to give Green Bay a 7-0 lead with 12:23 remaining in the opening quarter.
- ▶ At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), served as an extra defensive backs in passing situations, filling in for Carroll at LCB for one play when the regular player went out with injury.
- ▶ Against Detroit (Dec. 12). Played a significant number of snaps in passing situations as an extra DB, making one solo tackle.
- ▶ Made two tackles (one solo) vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19), with one pass defended. Knocked down a third-down pass intended for Reggie Williams to force Jacksonville to punt. It was his second pass defended of the season, his first since contest vs. Dallas (Oct. 24).
- ▶ At Minnesota (Dec. 24), posted two solo tackles.
- ▶ Finished his rookie campaign at Chicago (Jan. 2) with two tackles (one solo).

THURMAN, ANDRAE - Wide receiver promoted from the practice squad to the active roster on Dec. 23. A 5-11, 192-pound rookie out of Southern Oregon, initially joined the Packers' practice squad Sept. 8. Undrafted this spring, originally signed with the New York Giants May 7 and later was waived June 22. Then was claimed by Houston July 1 and spent training camp with the Texans until being waived Aug. 31.

- ▶ Made his professional debut at Minnesota (Dec. 24) and caught two balls for 12 yards. His first reception as pro came early in the first quarter, a 9-yard gain on first-and-10.
- ▶ At Chicago (Jan. 2), returned three kickoffs for 59 yards, the first returns of his career. Returned his first career kickoff in the first quarter, a 15-yard return to the Green Bay 32-yard line. To begin the second half took a kick off return 28 yards to the 30.

TRULUCK, R-KAL - Situational pass rusher who backs up Kaber Gbaja-Biamila at the 'Elephant' (right) defensive end position. Was acquired from Kansas City Sept. 5 in exchange for fifth- and sixth-round picks in the 2005 draft. Mostly has been used as an outside rusher in third-down and other long-yardage situations.

- ▶ Played in 14 games, with one start, and totaled 14 tackles (11 solo), including 2½ sacks, over the course of the season.
- ▶ At Carolina (Sept. 13), was successful in putting pressure on Panthers QB Jake Delhomme; finished the game with one tackle, a from-behind ankle grab of RB Stephen Davis, holding him for no gain.
- ▶ Vs. Chicago (Sept. 19), made his first start in a Packers uniform, when he opened at right end on a five-man line. Applied pressure on Bears QB Rex Grossman, including a key blitz on a third-and-9 in the second quarter, resulting in an incomplection. At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), contributed two tackles. At home vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3), made a season-high

three tackles, including a shared sack. Combined with Gbaja-Biamila to sack Kurt Warner for minus-12 yards on the final play of the first half. Logged a pressure on a second-quarter sack of Warner that kept New York out of field-goal range and forced a punt.

- ▶ Recorded one solo tackle in ensuing contest against Tennessee (Oct. 11), then was inactive for victory at Detroit (Oct. 17) and again vs. Dallas (Oct. 24).
- ▶ Returned at Washington (Oct. 31), resuming his role as a situational pass rusher.
- ▶ Served a similar duty vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), registering one tackle.
- ▶ Played on defense and kickoff coverage at Houston (Nov. 21).
- ▶ Made his first full sack as a Packer vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29). Sacked Rams QB Marc Bulger for an 8-yard loss on a third-and-6, to force a fourth-and-14, stalling the St. Louis drive. Rams kicker Jeff Wilkins missed the ensuing 42-yard field goal.
- ▶ In Week 13 at Philadelphia (Dec. 5), made two assisted tackles.
- ▶ Next contest vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), made one solo tackle.
- ▶ Made one solo tackle against Jacksonville (Dec. 19).
- ▶ At Minnesota (Dec. 24), was a situational pass rusher.
- ▶ Next, at Chicago (Jan. 2), made one solo tackle, a sack; felled quarterback Chad Hutchinson for a loss of 9 yards on the Bears' final offensive play, a fourth quarter fourth-and-16.

WAHLE, MIKE - Starts at left guard for the fourth straight year. Has played in 97 straight games (102 including postseason), including a few starts late in 2003 with a club on his hand after he broke a finger. Only Packers player who hadn't missed a practice due to injury over the 2002-03 seasons. Missed the first three weeks of training camp this year after suffering a left knee bone bruise July 2 during a workout in his offseason home of Las Vegas. Returned to the practice field on Aug. 23, and played in Green Bay's final two preseason games. Selected as an alternate to the Pro Bowl.

- ▶ Member of unit that paved the way for 6,349 offensive yards, a team record, surpassing the 6,172 of the 1983 Packers; also part of unit that surrendered just 14 sacks, bettering the 1972 and '74 squads' 17 QB fells.
- ▶ Started at Carolina on Sept. 13. Helped up teammate Javon Walker on heads-up play to advance fumble in Panthers contest; the play resulted in an 11-yard gain and led to the Packers' first points.
- ▶ Against Chicago (Sept. 19), sprung Tony Fisher on a 12-yard run, pushing Brian Urlacher out of the play. At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), took DT Montae Reagor to the ground, allowing Green to squeeze by for a 10-yard gain on the Packers' first offensive series, leading to a Walker TD. Later in the second quarter, moved LB David Thornton out of the way, allowing Green to pick up 8 yards on a third-and-2, eventually resulting in a Ryan Longwell field goal.
- ▶ Against the New York Giants (Oct. 3), was part of an offensive line that held the Giants to no sacks.
- ▶ Helped the Packers to 157 yards rushing in victory at Detroit (Oct. 17), holding up the middle against the Lions' sizeable Dan Wilkinson.
- ▶ Against Dallas (Oct. 24), on Green's second-quarter 32-yard run that lead to a TD, sealed off the Cowboys linemen to open up the running lane.
- ▶ At Washington (Oct. 31), was part of an offensive line unit that helped rack up 361 yards of total offense and three touchdowns.
- ▶ Followed up at home against Minnesota (Nov. 14) as part of an offensive line that helped gain 206 yards on the ground.
- ▶ At Houston (Nov. 21), provided the key block on Walter William's 28-yard run, pulling and delivering a block on LB Jamie Sharper. Additionally, aided the offensive line in providing excellent pass protection for Favre's 383-yard passing performance, allowing no sacks.
- ▶ Against St. Louis (Nov. 29), helped the Packers to a season-high 231 yards rushing. On Davenport's 37-yard run, ran ahead and pushed cornerback Jerametrious Butler backward out of the way and then took out Antuan Edwards. Later, combined with Nick Luchey to seal defenders outside and spring Davenport for his 40-yard scoring run.
- ▶ At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), on a first-quarter 17-yard screen pass to Green, ran upfield and blocked Mark Simoneau. Later, recovered a Craig Nall fum-

ble on Green Bay's second touchdown drive.

► Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) was part of an offensive line that opened holes for 116 yards and allowed only one sack to a outstanding Detroit front four.

► Assisted club to 444 yards of total offense vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19).

► At Minnesota (Dec. 24), provided pass protection for Favre's 363 yards passing in the come-from-behind win and blocked for the team's 102 rushing yards.

► Finished at Chicago (Jan. 2), was part of an offensive line that allowed no sacks and allowed for 327 yards passing yards and three touchdowns.

WALKER, JAVON - In his third season, has become one of the NFL's top downfield threats though he sometimes officially is listed as Green Bay's No. 3 receiver. Continues to take his personal game to new levels after a rigorous offseason training program that came on the heels of a breakout '03 campaign. Selected to his first Pro Bowl.

► Teamed with Donald Driver to register the most combined receiving yards in a single season in team history with 2,590 combined yards, surpassing Antonio Freeman and Robert Brooks' 2,253 yards in 1997 (Driver and Walker accomplished the feat vs. Minnesota on Dec. 24). Also became the first set of 1,000-yard Packers receivers since 1999 (Freeman, Bill Schroeder) and only the third overall (also Freeman and Brooks in 1997).

► Played in all 16 games, making 12 starts and finished third in the NFC in receiving yards with 1,382 on 89 receptions (tied for fifth in the NFC). His production includes 11 touchdown catches - fifth in the conference.

► At home vs. Dallas (Oct. 24), moved over 100 career receptions and now has 145. He finished the game with 129 receiving yards and had five 100-yard performances this season, in 16 games.

► Has caught at least one pass in 33 straight games (his last game without a reception was Dec. 22, 2002, vs. Buffalo in a 10-0 win dominated by defense on a blustery day).

► Registered only the 10th 200-yard receiving day in Packers history - and the first in eight years (Don Beebe, 220 vs. San Francisco on Oct. 14, 1996) - in breakout performance at Indianapolis (Sept. 26). Enjoyed career highs in receptions (11), receiving yards (200) and touchdown receptions (three) in Colts contest; it marked the first time a Green Bay player made three TD catches since Antonio Freeman also had three in a 1998 win over Tennessee.

► Began the year with two catches for 37 yards at Carolina (Sept. 13). Also fell on an Ahman Green fumble in the first quarter of Panthers contest and had the presence of mind, not hearing the whistle stop play, to pick up the ball and advance it for an additional 11 yards and a first down, with the drive eventually leading to the game's first points on a Ryan Longwell field goal. In the second quarter, caught a pass on an out route for 24 yards from Brett Favre, bringing the Packers to the Carolina 21; Green scored on a 6-yard run three plays later. Late in the fourth period, ran a post on a third-and-12 and caught a pass for a first down.

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19), led the team in receiving, catching seven balls for 102 yards, his second career regular-season 100-yard receiving game. Made a 44-yard reception in the second quarter, racing past Bobby Gray and Charles Tillman to pull in an over-the-shoulder catch. On the Packers' only TD drive, accounted for 67 of the 89 yards, including a quick slant and catch that brought Green Bay to the Chicago 16, setting up a Robert Ferguson TD reception.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), posted a spectacular performance, catching 11 passes for 200 yards and three touchdowns. On his first score, midway through the first quarter, outran the defender down the right sideline and cruised in for a 36-yard TD. The second TD occurred on the first offensive play of the Packers' second drive; once again used his speed to get by the cornerback, this time down the left sideline, before weaving back across the field to score on a career-long, 79-yard catch-and-run. Added a 12-yard TD in the third quarter, taking advantage of a blown Colts coverage and getting the ball wide open in the back of the end zone.

► The following week vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3), made three grabs for 38 yards and the Packers' lone touchdown. In the third quarter, on a fourth-and-5, ran a corner route and caught the ball at the 4-yard line, then muscled his way past two defenders into the end zone.

► Made eight catches for 159 yards and one TD in Monday night game with Tennessee (Oct. 11). In the second quarter, caught a 33-yard reception over the middle, leading to a Bubba Franks TD four plays later. In the third period, caught a game-high 57 yard reception on third-and-6. Pulled in three catches for 49 yards on a fourth quarter Packers drive to set up Franks' second touchdown. On a later drive in the same quarter, made three receptions for 20 yards, including a 1-yard scoring grab from Craig Nall. Beat CB Fernando Bryant up the right sideline for a 50-yard grab to the Lions' 17-yard line early in the second quarter at Detroit (Oct. 17); Green Bay scored three plays later to take a 14-7 lead in the eventual 38-10 victory. Sidelined by a second-quarter rib injury, he returned to the Lions contest midway through the third period to make a 12-yard reception on third-and-9, before leaving the game for good due to a shoulder sprain.

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), made eight catches for 129 yard yards and one touchdown. Caught a 44-yard reception in the first quarter, blowing by CB Terrence Newman on a fly pattern and setting up a Longwell field goal to tie the score 3-3. Made a 5-yard TD catch in the second quarter, running a quick slant and giving the Packers a 17-6 advantage; earlier in the drive caught a 9-yarder on third-and-9. In the third quarter, made a 31-yard reception; Fisher completed a touchdown pass to Franks on a halfback option four plays later.

► At Washington (Oct. 31), caught five passes for 57 yards and one touchdown. In the first quarter, made an 18-yard gain on a Packers third-and-10. Scored on a 9-yard catch in the second quarter, running a flat route and finding himself wide open in the end zone. In the third converted on third-and-11, catching a 21-yarder and holding onto the ball after taking a tough hit from safety Ryan Clark. Was a key player in Green's career-long 48-yard reception, first speeding downfield to clear space for Green and then blocking a defender to give Green additional yardage.

► Scored the Packers' first touchdown vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14), pulling in three passes for 74 yards on the day. On his first-quarter 50-yard touchdown reception, out-jumped CB Brian Williams for the ball, came down, made a cut to his left and muscled past SS Corey Chavous for the score. Later, in the fourth quarter, converted a vital third-and-8 in the red zone. On that play, he stretched out to snag the pass, then turned and twisted past four defenders before reaching the sticks. The Packers scored two plays later.

► Came up with nine receptions for 88 yards at Houston (Nov. 21), making several clutch grabs. Three of his catches went for first downs on third down situations, including a 15-yard gain in the second quarter, with that drive resulting in a Longwell field goal to put the Packers up 3-0.

► Against St. Louis, made two catches for 15 yards. Hauled in his first reception of the day which was a 10-yard scoring strike from Favre, catching the ball at the 3-yard line and pivoting leaning into the end zone.

► Followed up at Philadelphia (Dec. 5) with a team-best seven receptions for 77 yards and a 17-yard touchdown. On the Packers' second touchdown drive, caught a 12-yard pass to bring the ball to the Philadelphia 33. Two plays later, caught a 17-yard scoring pass, running a corner route and catching the ball at the front of the end zone and keeping both feet in bounds for the score.

► Registered three receptions on 26 yards vs. Detroit (Dec. 12). Five plays before Longwell kicked his game-winning 23-yard field goal, caught a 10-yard pass on third-and-8 to keep the drive going.

► Against Jacksonville (Dec. 19), tied a career-high with 11 receptions for 152 yards, his fifth 100-yard receiving game of the season. Gained 19 yards on his first reception of the game, though the Packers would turn the ball over on the following play. Made another 19-yard grab on the next Green Bay drive, which also stalled. Toward the end of the first quarter, hauled in a pass on a third-and-6, broke a few tackles for a 23-yard gain and a first down. The drive would result in a Longwell field goal for the Packers' first point of the contest. On the Packers' first drive of the third quarter caught back-to-back passes of 14 and 18 yards. Three plays after his 18-yarder, Driver would score on a 32-yard pass reception. On a fourth quarter third-and-10, caught a pass for 13 yards and a first down. Three plays later, grabbed another pass for 10 yards; the Packers scored on the

following play on a 6-yard Antonio Chatman TD catch.

► Collected five catches for 90 yards at Minnesota (Dec. 24). Made his first catch of the game in the third quarter, going in motion and gaining 25 yards on a slant pattern. Capped the drive with a 9-yard TD catch, grabbing the ball while falling to the turf; gave the Packers a 24-21 lead. In the fourth, made a 17-yard reception on second-and-6; the Packers scored a TD on fourth-and-3, tying the score at 31-31. On the Packers last drive, made a 31-yard reception with 25 seconds on the clock, catching the ball and making a move past CB Terrance Shaw for additional yards. Longwell kicked the game-winning 29-yard FG as time ran out for the 34-31 victory.

► Capped an impressive season with three catches for 82 yards at Chicago (Jan. 2). Ran a fly pattern past CB Jerry Azumah and caught the 25-yard Nall pass for a touchdown and a 28-7 Packers lead. In the third quarter, on second-and-12, caught a 14-yard pass for a first down. On a second-and-12 later in the drive, snagged a pass and wrestled past two defensive backs to pick up a 43 yards. The drive ended with a 20-yard Longwell field goal. Missed part of the third and all of the fourth quarter after banging his head on the turf (coaches' decision).

WASHINGTON, DONNELL - A third-round pick in April, moves well for a big man and possesses long, powerful arms and the strength to stand up opponents across the line. A foot/arch injury sidelined him on Aug. 6, forcing him out of all four preseason games. Eventually was placed on injured reserve Sept. 1.

WELLS, SCOTT - A seventh-round selection in the 2004 draft, now backs up Grey Ruegamer at center after beginning the season on the Packers' practice squad. Waived in the final roster reduction Sept. 5 after losing his bid to supplant Ruegamer as the backup to then-starter Mike Flanagan, he was signed to the club's practice squad two days later. After three games on the practice squad, he was promoted the 53-man roster on Oct. 2 when Flanagan was placed on season-ending injured reserve due to surgery for knee tendinitis. Played in five games overall, with two starts.

► Filled in for Grey Ruegamer vs. Detroit (Dec. 12), making his first professional start in the 16-13 Packers victory.

► At Philadelphia (Dec. 5), saw his professional action at center, substituting for an injured Ruegamer. Played at center for Green Bay's last drive of the first half and the remainder of the game

► Dressed, but did not play Weeks 4 - 10.

► At Houston (Nov. 21), played his first NFL snaps on special teams.

► Dressed, but did not play vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29).

► Vs. Detroit (Dec. 12) was part of an offensive line that opened holes for 116 yards and allowed only one sack to a outstanding Detroit front four.

► Assisted the Packers to 444 yards of total offense against Jacksonville (Dec. 19).

► Dressed but did not play at Minnesota (Dec. 24).

► Played second half at Chicago (Jan. 2), was part of an offensive line that allowed no sacks and allowed for 327 yards passing yards and three touchdowns. Played most of the second half in place of Ruegamer.

WILLIAMS, COREY - The second defensive lineman drafted by Green Bay in 2004 (sixth round), has been utilized as a backup to Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila at 'Elephant' end, to Aaron Kampman at 'Power' end and as the third 'Eagle' tackle. Stood out the first week of practice; excited, reported to his first workout July 31, forgetting to sign his contract (shuttled back to the offices, then returned).

► Saw action in 12 games and recorded 24 tackles (11 solo), including a forced fumble. Also has contributed four special teams stops. Inactive for four other contests.

► After being listed as inactive for the previous four weeks, returned to play vs. Jacksonville (Dec. 19). He led all defensive linemen in tackles with six (four solo). In the second quarter, teamed with Mark Roman to plant Fred Taylor for no gain and force a Jaguars third-and-6. The Jaguars punted on fourth down.

► Accounted for one tackle at Carolina (Sept. 13), making his first NFL

stop when he dropped RB Stephen Davis after a four-yard gain. Received a significant number of snaps in the defensive line rotation against the Panthers with starting nose tackle Grady Jackson having departed the contest due to injury after Carolina's third play from scrimmage.

► Against Chicago (Sept. 19), assisted on one tackle and made two special teams stops.

► At Indianapolis (Sept. 26), notched one assisted tackle.

► Played vs. the New York Giants (Oct. 3).

► Forced a fumble by Titans RB Chris Brown among a season-high seven tackles (two solo) against Tennessee (Oct. 11).

► Played often at 'Elephant' end on early downs in victory at Detroit (Oct. 17), helping to limit the Lions to only 33 yards on 16 rushing attempts (2.1 avg.) while posting one stop.

► Against Dallas (Oct. 24), saw reserve action on defense.

► Registered one tackle at Washington (Oct. 31).

► Saw action as a reserve defensive lineman and on special teams vs. Minnesota (Nov. 14). Made a key block to spring Ferguson for a 55-yard kickoff return.

► Made four tackles (three solo) against Minnesota (Nov. 14).

► Was listed as inactive at Houston (Nov. 21), vs. St. Louis (Nov. 29), at Philadelphia (Dec. 5) and vs. Detroit (Dec. 12).

► Returned at Minnesota (Dec. 24), posting one assisted tackle.

► At Chicago (Jan. 2), made five tackles (two solo), including one sack, while also recording two special teams tackles. On the Bears' second drive of the game, authored his first career sack, on Chad Hutchinson on third-and-3, dropping him for a 6-yard loss and forcing a punt.

WILLIAMS, WALTER - The second-year running back from Grambling had spent 2004 training camp with Green Bay until the club released him in the final regular-season roster reduction, Sept. 4. He re-signed to the team's practice squad Sept. 15, where he'd spent the past two months. Was promoted from the practice squad to the active roster on Nov. 20.

► Was placed on injured reserve on Nov. 29 with a high-ankle sprain suffered at Houston.

► At Houston (Nov. 21), made his professional and Packers debut, rushing six times for a team-leading 42 yards. On the first play of Green Bay's second drive, made a game-long 28-yard run to the right side, the longest of his career. Later left the game with a sprained ankle.
