FIRST PRESEASON GAME

SAN DIEGO (0-0) at GREEN BAY (0-0)
Thursday, Aug. 11 • Lambeau Field • 7:05 p.m. CDT

THIS WEEK'S NOTABLES:

- ▶ Green Bay and San Diego kick off the league's first full preseason weekend (the third overall 2005 NFL game), with a mid-summer clash on national television. The Packers won't play again for nine days, their longest preseason stretch without a game since 2001.
- ▶ While starters for either team aren't expected to see more than a quarter of action, the Packers look for their first Week 1 preseason win since 2000. That year, Green Bay beat the Jets at Lambeau Field, 37-24.
- ▶ First-round draft pick Aaron Rodgers, expected to see significant action, gets his first taste of NFL speed.

NATIONAL TELEVISION: ESPN, with play-by-play man Mike Patrick, color analysts Paul Maguire and Joe Theismann, sideline reporter Suzy Kolber, producer Jay Rothman and director Chip Dean, will air the game to a national cable audience.



LOCAL TELEVISION: Per the league's continuing commitment to make every game available on free, over-the-air stations, the contest will be simulcast locally in Green Bay on **WFRV** (Ch. 5) and in Milwaukee on **WISN** (Ch. 12).

LOCAL RADIO: Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and Larry McCarren (color). Spanning five states, the network covers 50 markets in the upper Midwest. The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on packers.com.

LONGEST ACTIVE WINNING STREAKS: The Packers haven't lost to San Diego in a regular-season tilt since 1984. Their longest active winning streaks over one foe:

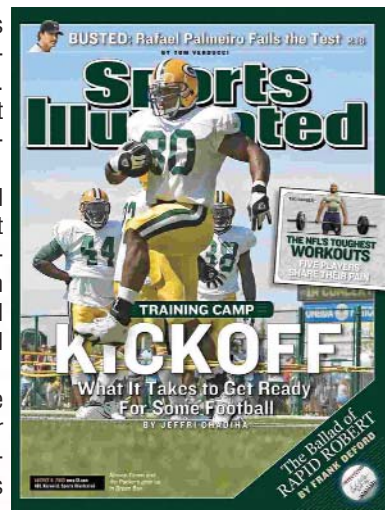
OLDEST FRANCHISE CHARITY GAME: Thursday marks the 56th annual Upper Midwest Shrine Game, one of the NFL's oldest team traditions.

- ▶ Each season, the Packers donate a percentage of the gate to the Shriners' Hospitals for Children.
- ▶ The Shriners' facilities provide specialized medical services, helping children with birth defects and other injuries, at absolutely no cost.
- ▶ To date, the series has raised more than \$3.25 million for the Midwest Shrine's burn centers and hospitals for crippled children. Designated proceeds from this week's contest will go to the Shriner's Children's Hospital in Chicago. The facility specializes in helping children with orthopedic needs.
- ▶ The Packers are 27-25-3 all-time in the series.
- ▶ The series is so old, three stadiums have hosted a Shrine game, two of which are no longer standing: Milwaukee's State Fair Park (1950-51), Milwaukee County Stadium (1952-82, 1984-94) and Lambeau Field (1983, 1995-present).
- ▶ In 1959, Vince Lombardi's first season as an NFL head coach, the Packers and George Halas agreed to play in the Shrine game annually; Green Bay and Chicago played each preseason at County Stadium from 1959-73.



THE SI COVER: This week the Packers are represented in the feature photo on the cover of *Sports Illustrated*.

- ▶ According to the magazine, this marks the 30th time *SI* used a Packers individual as part of its feature cover photo. Bart Starr made the franchise's first appearance, Sept. 25, 1961. The magazine's first issue was Aug. 16, 1954.
- ▶ Ahman Green makes his second overall appearance on the cover. In college at Nebraska on Sept. 16, 1996, the publication also featured Green. The caption read "Red Alert; Ahman Green and Nebraska set their sights on a third straight national title."
- ▶ Earlier this summer starting defensive end Aaron Kampman got a small corner of the cover, riding a kid's bike to practice, joining Honus Wagner, Venus Williams, Bill Murray and Jennie Finch.
- ▶ In addition to Green, this week's issue also features Donald Driver, describing his intense offseason workout.



REVERSING THE COVER JINX?: The infamous Tony Mandarich cover aside, *SI* covers have generally been good to the Packers.

- ▶ Four times before it won the Super Bowl at the end of the '96 season, Green Bay appeared on the cover.
- ▶ Also, eight times during their five world championship seasons of the 1960s, the magazine featured the Packers.
- ▶ The magazine actually wrote a story on its own "jinx" in 2002, and mentioned that its most frequent cover athletes — Michael Jordan,





Muhammad Ali, Kareem Abdul-Jabbar, Magic Johnson and Jack Nicklaus — weren't negatively affected by the exposure.

- The 2002 story also mentioned that two researchers spent six months determining that of the 2,456 cover subjects up to that issue, 913 — 32.7 percent — were victimized soon after their appearances, a high figure, but not as astonishing as most people would think.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY, PACKERS: Thursday marks the 86th "birthday" of the Green Bay professional football franchise.

- On Aug. 11, 1919, a score or more husky young athletes, called together by Curly Lambeau and George Calhoun, gathered in the dingy editorial room of the old *Green Bay Press-Gazette* building on Cherry Street and organized a football team. They didn't know it, but that was the beginning of the incredible saga of the Green Bay Packers.
- Lambeau and Calhoun struck the initial spark a few weeks before, during a casual street-corner conversation. It was apparently a "Why not get up a football team?" remark, but once they were interested they wasted no time. Tonsillitis had kept Lambeau home in Green Bay after his freshman 1918 season playing for Knute Rockne at Notre Dame.
- First they talked Curly's employer — a war-time industry called the Indian Packing Company, where he worked as a shipping clerk for \$250/month — into putting up money for jerseys.
- Because the company provided jerseys and permitted the use of its athletic field for practice, the club was identified in its early publicity as a project of the company. With this tie-in the name "Packers" was a natural, and Packers they have been ever since, although the Indian Packing Co. had practically faded out of the picture before that first season was half over.
- Two years later, the Packers joined the organization that would become the NFL.

HOT STUFF: Thursday's forecast calls for 81-degree temperatures and isolated thunderstorms, incomparable to what these teams endured in 1978 at Jack Murphy Stadium. The contest stood for 25 years as the hottest road game in Packers annals, until a 2003 game at Sun Devil Stadium matched the 102-degree kickoff. Hottest recorded road games, Packers history:

LOFTON IN RANGE: Ahman Green in 2005 stands just 866 yards from breaking Hall of Famer James Lofton's all-time Packers total offense record.

- Green (9,036 in a Packers uniform entering '05) needs 677 yards from scrimmage to surpass No. 2 Jim Taylor (9,712).
- Lofton (9,901), San Diego's wide receivers coach, has held the Packers career mark since 1986, his last of nine years in Green Bay. Chosen sixth overall in the first round of the 1978 NFL Draft, Lofton became the first NFL player to score a touchdown in the 1970s, 1980s and 1990s. He is the first Pro Hall of Famer from Green Bay without direct ties to Curly Lambeau or Vince Lombardi.

Mike Sherman: 55-31-0, .640, sixth NFL season, sixth with Packers
M. Schottenheimer: 177-117-1, .602, 20th NFL season, fourth with Chargers

MIKE SHERMAN...Is in his sixth year as the Packers' 13th head coach.

- Has led the Packers to three straight division titles (2002-04) for only the fourth time in team history, joining Vince Lombardi's three-time winners of 1960-62 and 1965-67, along with the 1995-97 division champs of Mike Holmgren. This season will attempt to do what no Green Bay head coach ever has done: lead his team to a fourth consecutive division championship.
- First tenure with Packers came as tight ends/assistant offensive line coach over the 1997-98 seasons, following 16 years as an assistant in the college ranks; coached in Green Bay's Super Bowl XXXII loss to Denver.
- In 2004 became the second-fastest head coach in team history to reach 50 career victories, doing so in his 78th contest; only Lombardi, with 50 wins in 66 games, did so quicker.

MARTY SCHOTTENHEIMER...Entering his fourth season as the head coach of the San Diego Chargers.

- He was named the NFL Coach of the Year by the *Associated Press* in 2004 after leading the Chargers to a 12-4 record and their first AFC West title since 1994.
- In 18 full seasons as a head coach in the NFL, Schottenheimer has led his teams to 13 winning seasons. He is eighth on the NFL's all-time list with 177 regular-season wins.
- Schottenheimer is 24-25, including playoffs, in three seasons as head coach of the Chargers.
- He spent 2001 as the Washington Redskins head coach.
- In his 10 years as head coach of the Kansas City Chiefs (1989-1998), he had a record of 104-65-1 and advanced to the playoffs seven times.
- The Cleveland Browns went to the playoffs all four full seasons (1985-88) he was the head coach. In 1986, Schottenheimer was the consensus AFC coach of the year.

THE PACKERS-CHARGERS SERIES: The Packers' have won seven of their eight regular-season meetings with San Diego; that .875 winning percentage marks Green Bay's best against any NFL opponent it has played at least three times (2-0 against the Baltimore Ravens and 1-0 against the Houston Texans).

- The Packers have taken the last four meetings; their only loss was in 1984, a 34-28 decision in San Diego, when Dan Fouts passed for 376 yards (Lynn Dickey had 384 in a losing cause). Kellen Winslow posted 15 catches for 157 yards. Green Bay's James Lofton (now on San

Diego's coaching staff) had 158 yards on five catches.

- The clubs first met in 1970, the merger year, when Green Bay pulled out a 22-20 win at San Diego.
- In the clubs' only preseason meeting, the 1980 Hall of Fame Game at Canton, Ohio, severe lightning ended a scoreless game with 5:29 left in the contest; ironically, 23 years later, weather also ended a Packers Hall of Fame appearance against Kansas City (in 2003).

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS: Chargers receivers coach James Lofton is a Packers Hall of Famer; the team's No. 1 draft choice in 1978, he left Green Bay (1978-86) as the franchise's all-time total offense leader, a mark Ahman Green can eclipse in 2005...San Diego center David Brandt was in Green Bay camp two years ago...Chargers safety Bhawoh Jue left Green Bay (2001-04) this spring to sign as an unrestricted free agent...San Diego cornerback Jamar Fletcher played collegiately at Wisconsin...Packers offensive line coach Larry Beightol spent one season (1989) as the Chargers' offensive coordinator/O-line coach.

LAST MEETING (AP): Dec. 14, 2003, Qualcomm Stadium, Packers won, 38-21.

- Brett Favre threw a season-high four TD passes and Green Bay beat the Chargers to remain alive in the NFC North title race. With thousands of Cheeseheads in the crowd of 64,978, Favre, Ahman Green and kicker Ryan Longwell all set franchise records.
- Favre threw three of his TD passes in the fourth quarter after the Packers fell behind the Chargers (3-11). LaDainian Tomlinson gave San Diego a 21-17 lead with a spectacular 68-yard catch-and-run. But Favre notched his 28th fourth-quarter comeback and erased that lead 52 seconds later. Najeh Davenport returned the kickoff 45 yards to the Chargers' 42 and Favre threw a 40-yard TD to Robert Ferguson two plays later. With Longwell's record-setting PAT, the Packers led 24-21. Favre added a 1-yard TD pass to Green, one play after Grady Jackson sacked Drew Brees and forced a fumble, and a 16-yarder to Ferguson with 3:58 to play for a 38-21 lead.
- Green broke the oldest team single-season rushing record in the NFL, eclipsing Hall of Famer Jim Taylor's mark of 1,474 yards set in 1962. Green rushed for 75 yards and one TD on 19 carries, plus the TD catch.
- Favre threw at least one TD pass in his 23rd straight game to set the franchise mark. He had been tied with Cecil Isbell, who threw TD passes in 22 straight games during the 1941-42 seasons.
- And Longwell had eight points to break Don Hutson's career scoring record. Longwell got his 824th career point on a PAT following Ferguson's 40-yard TD catch. Hutson had 823 points in his Hall of Fame career.

LAST MEETING, LAMBEAU FIELD: Sept. 15, 1996, Lambeau Field; Packers won, 42-10.

- The Packers, en route to a Super Bowl title, launched a season 3-0 for the first time since 1982.
- Green Bay mounted a 7-0 lead on its first possession, spotted the Chargers a field goal, then scored the next 21 points.
- Favre engineered second-quarter scoring drives of 80 and 88 yards, culminated by TD passes to Antonio Freeman (19 yards) and William Henderson (8). The quarterback was 22 of 33 for 231 yards, with three touchdowns and one INT.
- After Edgar Bennett lost a fumble, his first miscue after 726 consecutive carries, LeRoy Butler intercepted a Stan Humphries pass five plays into the ensuing series and returned it 90 yards for a touchdown, giving Green Bay a 35-10 lead.
- Then, with less than five minutes remaining, Desmond Howard scored the final points with a 65-yard punt return.

THE TOP 15: Green Bay in 2004 also broke its 1983 franchise record for total offense with 6,357 yards.

- The effort, during a season in which offensive coordinator Tom Rossley underwent Oct. 12 emergency heart surgery — and saw Sherman take over play calling — led the NFC, ranked third in the NFL and 15th overall in league history. DON'T BEAT YOURSELF: The Packers have won 53 games and lost 27 over the last five years. This offseason, the coaching staff examined each of those 27 losses and concluded that on only a handful of occasions they were dominated beyond hope of victory. They beat themselves in the large majority of those 27 defeats.

- So, the team added a large scoreboard to its Clarke Hinkle practice field and has devoted much of the early part of camp to specific situational drills, attempting to simulate down-and-distance and clock variables in which they were unable to overcome in most of those 27 losses.

TRANSACTION: The Packers Thursday moved Chris Robertson to injured reserve. The running back broke his kneecap at morning practice the previous Monday, apparently sustaining the hit in a collision with James Lee.

LAST WEEK: Believed to be first time in broadcast history that a practice sports game was televised to a national audience, the Packers and Bills culminated two days of combined workouts with the annual Family Night scrimmage.

- Commissioner Paul Tagliabue conceived the idea to air Family Night on NFL Network. The league's top executive saw firsthand Green Bay's training camp fan enthusiasm while attending Bob Harlan's 2004 induction into the Packers Hall of Fame.
- For the first time in 14 years, the Packers hosted another team for combined training camp practices.
- Family Night (an intrasquad affair until this season), sold every available seat in Lambeau Field for the second straight year. The 2005 event sold out in three hours June 4.
- Many of the event-record 62,492 in attendance were age 10 or younger.



Evidence of that fact came midway through the night when the stadium played "Sponge Bob Square Pants" and much of the crowd sang along.

ANOTHER COLOR IN CAMP: In addition to the scrimmage, Buffalo practiced against the Packers twice on Clarke Hinkle Field: Thursday afternoon and Friday morning. The Green Bay organization also hosted Bills head coach Mike Mularkey and his team for dinner in the Lambeau Field Legends Club Thursday night.

► Earlier Thursday, Jerry Parins and his Packers security staff estimated that 5,000 fans stood up to 10 deep outside the Clarke Hinkle Field fences for the early-evening workout, which closed Oneida Street. Parins, who started working with the team in the 1960s as a policeman, said Thursday was the largest attendance he'd ever seen at a practice.

NEW MAN IN THE BOOTH: In 1925 at old City Stadium, the Packers became the first NFL team to install a public address system. They haven't had too many P.A. announcers in the 80 years since.

► On Family Night, for the first time since 1964, Lambeau Field had a new P.A. announcer. The Packers welcomed Bill Jartz, lead news anchor on Green Bay's WBAY-TV, channel 2, to the role.
► Jartz replaced Gary Knafelc, a former Packers receiver who caught the game-winning touchdown in the stadium's 1957 dedication game vs. Chicago. Knafelc, hired by Vince Lombardi in 1964, retired.

FAVRE ON ANOTHER WHO'S WHO LIST: To celebrate its 25th anniversary, CNN has come up with a list of the top 25 sports personalities of the last quarter century.

► Favre is No. 20, one spot below Anna Kournikova and three below William "The Refrigerator" Perry.
► The network airs an hour-long program, including its secret No. 1 personality, tonight at 7 CDT.

THAT'S WHY THEY PLAY THE GAMES: Most preseason prognosticators have written off Brett Favre and the Packers, predicting their finish anywhere from the middle to the bottom in the NFC North (*The Sporting News* picked them to finish last).

► That's fine with the Packers, who shy away from the spotlight. In fact, most of the players and coaches prefer the underdog role. Don't miscount the team's confidence, though.
► Three years ago, most of the same publications picked the Bears to defend their 2001 division title. And, few magazines picked the Packers to string together three NFC North crowns.

ON THE OFFENSIVE FRONT: Ironically, the Packers' offensive line didn't receive consensus national respect until free agency took two of its starters — guards Mike Wahle (Carolina) and Marco Rivera (Dallas) — in March.

► The Packers have dealt with similar situations before. In 2002, Green Bay played without two of the same five starters (tackles Mark Tauscher and Chad Clifton) for most of the year, and finished with a share of the NFL's best record, 12-4. And last year, Green Bay lost Pro Bowl center Mike Flanagan (knee) after just three games and still managed to win the division with the NFC's best offense.
► This year, Green Bay gets Flanagan back, and new General Manager Ted Thompson landed unrestricted free agent guards Adrian Klemm and Matt O'Dwyer. Tauscher and Clifton are in the primes of their careers. And, perhaps most importantly, the Packers return veteran position coach Larry Beightol, whose lines have paved the way for a club-record six consecutive 1,000-yard rushers, and protected Favre better than any period in the quarterback's career.

ON DEFENSE: While other NFC clubs made headlines with their free-agent acquisitions, Green Bay's most significant move was adding Jim Bates, hired by Mike Sherman as defensive coordinator Jan. 31.

► Bates served as the Dolphins' interim head coach last year and rallied Miami to a 3-4 finish, including an upset over the eventual Super Bowl champion Patriots. During his tenure as Miami defensive coordinator (2000-04), his units allowed the NFL's fifth-fewest yards per contest over that five-year span.
► The Packers also opted to release starting safety Darren Sharper and let Bhawoh Jue leave as an unrestricted free agent (San Diego). And, the Packers drafted three talented DBs (Nick Collins, Marviel Underwood, Mike Hawkins), and brought in veterans Arturo Freeman and Earl Little.

ANNUAL FRANCHISE RECORDS: Using virtually the same personnel, Green Bay set a single-season record for rushing yards in 2003 and a single-season record for passing yards in 2004.

► The Packers are the first NFL team to set franchise records for rushing yards and passing yards in back-to-back seasons since the 1988-1989 49ers (excluding expansion teams).
► San Francisco set a franchise record for rushing yards in 1988 and for passing yards in 1989.

TOTAL YARDS, TOO: Green Bay in 2004 also broke its 1983 franchise record for total offense with 6,357 yards.

► The effort, during a season in which offensive coordinator Tom Rossley underwent Oct. 12 emergency heart surgery — and saw Sherman take over play calling — led the NFC, ranked third in the NFL and 15th overall in league history.

NO-BLOCKING ZONE: Kicker Ryan Longwell, a Pro Bowl alternate last season, could reach 200 consecutive kicks without a block early in 2005.

► Since his last blocked kick, a 2002 win over Chicago in Champaign, Longwell has hit 194 kicks — 65 field goals and 129 PATs — without a block.

SACKS IN BUNCHES: Ask anyone who has tried, sacking an NFL quarterback is akin to crossing an interstate highway, then tying up an evasive bull, all within 4-7 seconds.



- Despite the fact that Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila is one of just two NFL players with double-figure sacks each of the last four seasons, joining Simeon Rice, critics have said he doesn't produce when the game's on the line and that his sacks only come in bunches.
- Well, consider that in games when 'KGB' records at least a share of a sack, the Packers are 27-8 (.771). Compare that to first-ballot Hall of Famer Reggie White, whose Packers teams were 39-12 (.765) when he posted at least one-half sack.
- Gbaja-Biamila's sacks may have come in bunches last season, but he still matched his career high and ranked third in the NFL with 13½. And that was against constant double-team blocking for the third straight year. Last year he went three straight games without a sack for the first two times in his five-year career. White, meanwhile had five such droughts over his six seasons in Green Bay.

ANOTHER STREAK ALIVE IN 2005: In addition to Favre's already legendary consecutive starts streak (205 entering the year), the team has a shot at a significant league record in 2005. Most consecutive team games with a touchdown pass, league history:
