## GREEN BAY (1-5) at CINCINNATI (5-2)

Sunday, Oct. 30 • Paul Brown Stadium • Noon CST/1 p.m. EST • FOX

### THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ▶ Faced with their most significant adversity in 14 years, the Packers will put lesser-known players in spotlight roles during a character-building week.
- ▶ While the Packers lost two more offensive starters Sunday at Minnesota, this week they hope to get one back in Pro Bowl center Mike Flanagan.
- ▶ The contest features two of the league's youngest teams. Each club's roster averages 26.3 years.
- ▶ The Packers, who have several connections to the state of Ohio, make their debut at Paul Brown Stadium. It's Green Bay's first trip to the city since 1998, when Fritz Shurmur's defense rattled Neil O'Donnell in a 13-6 win at Cinergy Field.
- ▶ Brett Favre will play a regular-season game in his 40th stadium. Of those 40, 14 are either no longer standing or no longer in use by the NFL, including Cinergy Field/Riverfront Stadium.

**TELEVISION: FOX Sports**, now in its 12th season as an NFL network television partner, will air the contest to a regional audience. Play-by-play man Sam Rosen joins color commentator Bill Maas, who also serves as the Packers' preseason television analyst after closing his 10-year NFL career on the Green Bay defensive line in 1993. Jay Glazer is on the sidelines while producer Mike Burks teams up with director Rich Russo in the truck.

**PACKERS RADIO: Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM)**, airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with versatile Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler Larry McCarren (color). Spanning five states, the network covers 50 markets in the upper Midwest. The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on [packers.com](http://packers.com).

**FAMILIAR WITH UNFAMILIAR TERRITORY:** The Packers make two more trips to new stadiums — or stadiums new to them — in 2005.

- ▶ Their first is Sunday, Green Bay's first appearance at Paul Brown Stadium, the club's first trip to the city since Sept. 20, 1998.
- ▶ Then, on Dec. 19, the Packers make their first regular-season appearance at Baltimore's M&T Bank Stadium. It's the first Green Bay trip to that city in 23 years, since a 1982 tie with the Colts at Memorial Stadium.
- ▶ Green Bay has won six of its last seven regular-season games playing for the first time in unfamiliar stadiums (wins at FedEx Field and Reliant Stadium in 2004, renovated Soldier Field in 2003, Ford Field, Memorial Stadium in Champaign and Gillette Stadium in 2002). The only loss in the stretch was in 2004, their regular-season debut at Philadelphia's Lincoln Financial Field.
- ▶ Over a longer regular-season stretch, the Packers have won nine of their last 12 (wins at Jacksonville in 1995, St. Louis in 1996 and Carolina in 1997, losses at Tampa Bay in 1998, Tennessee in 2001 and Philadelphia in 2004) in unfamiliar territory.



**FAVRE SETS SIGHTS ON NO. 2:** Brett Favre stands just 26 attempts and 171 yards from the respective No. 2 rankings in NFL history, both held by John Elway.

▶ Favre already holds the No. 2 all-time rankings in touchdown passes (390) and completions (4,454). Dan Marino is the NFL's all-time leader in both categories (420 TD passes, 4,967 completions).

**IT'S FOOTBALL, NOT HORSESHOES:** The Packers' last four losses have come by a combined margin of nine points. This past weekend in the NFL, eight of 14 games were decided by more than nine points.

▶ The Packers are no stranger to close games; they're just not too comfortable with being on the short end. Including four of six contests in 2005, nine of their last 14 games have been decided by a field goal or

less. They were 4-1 in those games last year. This season, they're 0-4.

- ▶ Only three other teams — Carolina (2-2), Washington (3-1) and Dallas (2-2) — have had four such games this season.
- ▶ Cincinnati last season tied for the league's best record (3-0, with Pittsburgh) in games decided by three points or less.
- ▶ Green Bay under Mike Sherman (2000-05) is still 13-8 in such games.

**WALK-OFF FIELD GOALS:** Green Bay and Minnesota have decided their last three regular-season games with a field goal at the end of the fourth quarter.

▶ According to Elias Sports Bureau, since 1990, only three series have experienced such late-game dramatics as often (game-ending field goal in either overtime or with no time left in regulation).

### COACHES CAPSULES

**Mike Sherman:** 56-36-0, .609, sixth NFL season, sixth with Packers

**Marvin Lewis:** 21-18-0, .538 third NFL season, third with Bengals

**Head to Head:** first meeting

**vs. Opponent:** first meeting, both coaches

**MIKE SHERMAN...** Is in his sixth year as the Packers' 13th head coach.

▶ Is no stranger to adversity, having overcome several hurdles each of the past three seasons to win a trio of NFC North titles. Adversity is again in the Packers' path this season.

▶ Since the 1993 collective bargaining agreement, teams have made 84 coaching changes and only Sherman's tenure has produced winning records in each of its first five seasons.

▶ Over their first five regular seasons as an NFL coach, since 1970 only Chuck Knox, George Seifert, Joe Gibbs and Mike Ditka produced better records than Sherman (53-27, .663).

▶ In 2004, his team became only the ninth in NFL history to reach the playoffs after a 1-4 start. In 2005, is attempting to steer his club to the playoffs after an 0-4 start; since 1990, only the 1992 Chargers have accomplished that feat.

▶ Has led the Packers to three straight division titles and four consecutive playoff appearances.

▶ Is 6-0 against teams in the Super Bowl the previous season.

**MARVIN LEWIS...** Named the ninth head coach in Bengals history Jan. 14, 2003.

▶ Has re-established the Bengals as a playoff contender with clubs that have attracted record fan support. The club sold out every regular-season home game in '04 for the first time since 1992.

▶ In 2003, the Bengals were the NFL's most improved team (six-game increase), and Lewis finished second in *Associated Press* voting for NFL Coach of the Year while also being named Rookie Coach of the Year by *Football Digest*.

▶ Prior to his arrival, Lewis directed the NFL's fifth-ranked defensive unit with the Washington Redskins (2002).

▶ He spent six seasons (1996-2001) as defensive coordinator with the Baltimore Ravens, a tenure that included a Super Bowl victory following the 2000 season. In the 2000 regular season, Lewis' Baltimore defense set the NFL record for fewest points allowed in a 16-game campaign (165).

▶ Prior to joining Baltimore, he spent four seasons (1992-95) with Pittsburgh as linebackers coach.

▶ Lewis played linebacker at Idaho State for three years (1978-1980) and also saw action at quarterback and free safety.

**THE PACKERS-BENGALS SERIES:** These clubs have met just nine times. That's less than all but three teams among the league's older franchises (seven meetings against Kansas City and New England, eight vs. San Diego).

▶ The Packers own a three-game winning streak in the series (24-23 in 1992 and 24-10 in 1995, both in Green Bay, and 13-6 in 1998 at Cincinnati).

▶ The series launched at Lambeau Field in 1971, when the legendary Paul Brown was head coach of the Bengals, a team he had founded three



years earlier as a member of the then American Football League. The Packers got off to a winning start in the rivalry, posting a 20-17 victory in their first meeting, with a Lou Michaels field goal providing the victory margin.

- ▶ Perhaps the most memorable game in the series came in 1992 when Brett Favre, summoned to replace an injured Don Majkowski at quarterback in the first period, proceeded to direct the Packers to an electrifying, 24-23 come-from-behind victory, forged when he hit wide receiver Kitrick Taylor with a 35-yard scoring pass as only 13 seconds remained in the game. Chris Jacke's subsequent conversion settled the issue.

**NOTABLE CONNECTIONS...** Packers S Mark Roman, the Bengals' second-round draft choice in 2000, spent his first four seasons in Cincinnati...Linebackers coach Mark Duffner served on the Bengals staff from 1997-2002, the last two seasons as defensive coordinator...Bengals FB Nick Luchey and LB Hannibal Navies each played the previous two seasons with the Packers...Another former Duffner pupil, LB Marcus Wilkins, originally signed as a rookie free agent with Green Bay in 2002, and played his first two seasons with the Packers...Green Bay P B.J. Sander, a Cincinnati native, won the Ray Guy Award as the nation's top punter in 2003 at Ohio State; All-State at Cincinnati's Roger Bacon High School, he once booted a state-record 60-yard field goal...Other Ohio State products include LB Na'il Diggs and DE/DT Kenny Peterson (Canton McKinley High School)...Green Bay offensive coordinator Tom Rossley, a Painesville, Ohio, native, was an All-American WR at Cincinnati and launched his coaching career at Ohio high schools...Packers WR/KR Antonio Chatman led the Cincinnati Bearcats in receiving as a senior in 2000, including a career-best 10 receptions in a 28-25 overtime loss at Wisconsin...RB Tony Fisher is from Euclid, Ohio...FB William Henderson (Green Bay) and RB Rudi Johnson (Cincinnati) are cousins...Packers public relations coordinator Sarah Quick is a native of Middletown, Ohio, and graduated from Ursuline Academy...Cincinnati S Kevin Kaesviharn also originally signed as a rookie free agent with Green Bay, in 2001, and returned an INT that year for a touchdown in the Family Night scrimmage.

- LAST MEETING:** Sept. 20, 1998, Cinergy Field; Packers won, 13-6.
- ▶ The Packers dominated the statistics and the time of possession, out-gaining the Bengals by a 2-to-1 margin during the course of the afternoon in Cincinnati's Cinergy Field, but the final score did not reflect the disparity — largely thanks to three Green Bay turnovers.
  - ▶ They scored the game's only touchdown in the ninth minute of the first quarter — on a 16-yard pass to flanker Robert Brooks, who made a leaping catch in the right corner of the end zone — and thereafter had to be content with two Ryan Longwell field goals the rest of the way and, eventually, a 13-6 victory.
  - ▶ Fortunately, Fritz Shurmur's defense took a large hand in the proceedings, responding to every challenge while limiting the Bengals to a paltry 28 yards rushing and 160 net yards on a sweltering afternoon which saw the field temperature register 95 degrees at the opening kickoff.
  - ▶ The defense's efforts were highlighted by a stout goal-line stand in the final minute of the first half. Green Bay twice stopped the Bengals at the 1-yard line; Brian Williams dropped backup quarterback Jeff Blake on third down to force a 19-yard field goal by Doug Pelfrey, which accounted for Cincinnati's final points of the day.
  - ▶ The defense had to make another 'stand' in the last 2 minutes of the game, after Cincinnati sacked Brett Favre on fourth-and-3 from the Bengals 33-yard line. Taking over at his own 45, the Bengals' Neil O'Donnell launched four consecutive passes but the last three were incomplete. The Packers took over with 1:21 left and ran out the clock.
  - ▶ The offense, meanwhile, put up 328 total yards with the aid of Raymont Harris and held the ball for 35 minutes, 19 seconds. Harris, making his first game appearance since suffering an leg injury the previous season with Chicago, rushed for 76 yards in 24 attempts, stepping in for the injury-idled Dorsey Levens.
  - ▶ Favre completed 23 of 35 passes for 274 yards and one touchdown, with one interception - his first of the season.

- ▶ Elias Sports Bureau research indicates that the Packers' streak was the longest in the NFL since 2000.
- ▶ Tennessee was the last club to reach 69, scoring 76 unanswered points from Dec. 10 to Dec. 25, 2000. Also that year, Jacksonville put up 75 straight points from Nov. 26-Dec. 10 (continued on next page).

harder on their team than fans in other cities. The club hasn't had a losing record since 1991 (also the last year Green Bay opened 1-5). And, figuring that an entire generation of fans aren't old enough to remember 1991, the team's start is tough to swallow.

▶ But don't count out the Favre-led Packers, who have never grouped themselves in the "most teams" category when facing adversity. There are still 10 games to play and Favre leads the league in TD passes.

**STILL A NO-SACK ZONE:** The Packers may be struggling with their rushing offense, but despite losing both starting guards to free agency, and Pro Bowl center Mike Flanagan for most of three games due to injury, the team has done extremely well protecting Brett Favre, who enters the week as the NFL's leading touchdown passer. The Packers have not given up a sack over their last 111 passing plays, since their first possession Oct. 3 at Carolina. Only two NFL teams have allowed fewer sacks in 2005:

- 7 New England
- 8 Green Bay**
- 9 Denver

**IT'S ABOUT TIME:** Former AFC Central clubs Cincinnati and Pittsburgh are on the Packers' schedule for the first time since 1998, snapping Green Bay's longest active series droughts, respectively.

**WHEN IN THE WORLD?:** The Packers still haven't met the newest version of the Cleveland Browns in Cleveland. Green Bay has gone there twice in preseason, but won't play a regular-season game at Cleveland until 2009, 10 years after the franchise resurfaced as an expansion club.

- ▶ The Super Bowl champion New England Patriots haven't been to Green Bay since Oct. 1, 1979, a classic Monday night matchup won by the Packers, 27-14. The Patriots, who played in Milwaukee in 1988, will end their Green Bay drought next season.
- ▶ The Steelers opened their new stadium, Heinz Field, in 2001. The facility will be eight years old before the Packers see it, in 2009.
- ▶ San Diego will next travel to Lambeau Field in 2007, 11 years after their most recent regular-season visit, 1996.
- ▶ Brett Favre and Reggie White hadn't yet won a Super Bowl the last time the Packers played at Seattle, in 1996. However, including preseason and postseason, Seattle this New Year's Day makes its fourth trip to Green Bay in three years. Incidentally, the Seahawks will host Green Bay in 2006.

**WELCOME TO THE 21ST CENTURY:** For the first time since 1969, the Packers will not play a regular-season game on "AstroTurf."

- ▶ In 2005, Green Bay still plays four games on fake grass, but they're on the softer, more realistic "FieldTurf" (at Cincinnati, Atlanta, Detroit and Minnesota), the same surface that covers two of the Packers' three practice fields.
- ▶ Green Bay played its first game on the hard, abrasive AstroTurf Dec. 6, 1970, a 20-12 win over the pre-dynasty Pittsburgh Steelers at Three Rivers Stadium.
- ▶ Brett Favre and the Packers are 4-3 all-time on FieldTurf (since 2002): 2-2 at Ford Field, 1-0 at Memorial Stadium in Champaign, Ill., and 1-1 at the Metrodome.

**POINTS CAN'T BE PRORATED:** For all the Packers' 52-3 win over New Orleans did for the team's morale, it still only counted for one win in the standings.

- ▶ Despite their 1-5 record, the Packers have outscored opponents 144-118 (including 46-33 in the fourth quarter and 94-35 over the last 10 quarters).
- ▶ Across the league, 18 of 32 teams have a .500 record or below. In that group, only the 3-4 Chargers, 1-5 Packers and 3-3 Bears have outscored their opponents.

**PASS RUSH STEPS UP:** Mike Sherman challenged his defense last month to put more pressure on the quarterback, and looking at the unit's recent production, that challenge was answered from both the inside and the edge of the defensive line.

- ▶ The Packers have 13 sacks in their last four games (17 quarters).
- ▶ Aaron Kampman during the span has 1½ sacks and 10 quarterback hurries.
- ▶ Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila over the last four contests has six hurries, two sacks, one forced fumble (Jake Delhomme, on a sack) and two fumble recoveries.
- ▶ Cullen Jenkins during the period has four hurries, a fumble recovery and two passes broken up.
- ▶ Kenny Peterson over the last two contests alone has two sacks, two hurries, one pass broken up and one forced fumble (Todd Bouman, sack).
- ▶ Against Tampa Bay Sept. 25, Kampman's immediate pressure contributed to Brian Griese's fumble, a turnover recovered by Gbaja-Biamila on his way to the end zone. An inadvertent whistle, however, ruled the play an incomplete pass and cost the Packers a touchdown during a critical juncture in that game, a 17-16 loss.

**MARGIN OF VICTORY:** None of the current Packers were alive the last time Green Bay was fortunate to win by as many as 49 points. In fact, the Packers haven't been able to enjoy so much success on both sides of the ball since Vince Lombardi presided over their sideline. **FAVRE CAN RUN:** Opposing teams have never really assigned a "spy" to Brett Favre, but one thing is for certain: His 36-year old legs are in better shape than in recent years. Early in the Saints game, down 3-0 and facing third-and-4 from the Saints 35, his legs helped him escape the pocket and embark on a 9-yard gain. Without the play, one of those game-changing moves Favre said he wasn't capable of in recent years, the drive would've stalled and Green Bay was probably out of field-goal range.

- ▶ Through six games this season, Favre has 46 rushing yards. Even before the Saints game, he had more than his 36 all of last season. Favre's 2005 carries:

  - 20 Sept. 18 vs. Cleveland . . . . .longest carry since 1999

**THE HARD-LUCK 0-4s:** Many, many teams have opened 0-4, including the last Packers team to do it, in 1988 under first-year head coach Lindy Infante. Since 1990 alone, 53 teams have lost their first four (including the '05 season).

► However, most teams that open 0-4 don't have a very healthy outlook on the rest of their season. Not in Green Bay, though. That's partly because the Packers lost three of those games by three points or less. They haven't been blown out, have had legitimate opportunities to win each of the five losses, and are still only one game out of first.

► According to Elias Sports Bureau, only five clubs in 86 NFL seasons have lost their first four with three of those losses by a field goal or less:

**WHAT'S AT STAKE:** The Packers need to go at least 7-3 over their final 10 contests, starting Sunday, to keep alive the league's longest active streak of non-losing seasons. Longest stretches in NFL history:

**OTHER QUARTERBACKS DURING THE STREAK:** Since Sept. 27, 1992, when Brett Favre launched his starting streak, 187 other quarterbacks have started an NFL game. The 49ers' Alex Smith joined the list Oct. 9.

► During the 2005 season, four quarterbacks have made their first NFL starts: Brooks Bollinger (N.Y. Jets), Kyle Orton (Chicago), Alex Smith (San Francisco) and J.P. Losman (Buffalo).

► Also, 20 NFL teams during the period have started at least 10 quarterbacks. During the '05 campaign, the following have made a starting debut with their respective teams: Jeff Garcia (Detroit), Trent Dilfer (Cleveland), Kyle Orton (Chicago), J.P. Losman (Buffalo), Gus Frerotte (Miami), Drew Bledsoe (Dallas), Kurt Warner (Arizona) and Brooks Bollinger (N.Y. Jets). Orton became the 20th quarterback to start a Bears game, most in the NFL, during Favre's streak.

**PACKERS REMAIN AMERICA'S TEAM:** For the fourth straight season, a Harris poll has dubbed Green Bay the league's most popular football team. The company in early September surveyed 2,242 adults who say they follow pro football, and asked them to name their two favorite football teams. The Dallas Cowboys finished second in the poll.

**CATCHES DURING THE STREAK:** Since Brett Favre launched his 211-game starting streak, an NFL record among quarterbacks, 73 players have caught at least one pass from him. Vonta Leach and Terrence Murphy joined the list Sept. 18. The latest, Donald Lee, joined the group with a 16-yard TD catch in the team's valiant comeback attempt Oct. 3 at Carolina.

**THE INFIRMARY:** The Packers' training room in the days leading up to the Saints game looked like a busy ER, with every available bed taken. In all, 13 players appeared on the club's official injury report before the New Orleans game. Not since Week 6 of the 2000 season, when the club listed 15 before a game at Detroit, has the team's injury report been so long.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR SUNDAY & IN COMING WEEKS —

### **ANTONIO CHATMAN:**

► Needs six punt returns to surpass No. 5 Johnnie Gray (85) on the Packers' all-time list, Chatman enters with 80.

### **DONALD DRIVER:**

► With a catch, can extend his streak of games with a reception to 55. The stretch is the fourth longest in Packers history. Next up on the list are Hall of Famer James Lofton (58), current running backs coach Edgar Bennett (60) and all-time leader Sterling Sharpe (103).

### **BRETT FAVRE:**

► Needs 26 **attempts** to surpass No. 2 John Elway (7,250). Favre enters with 7,225.

► Needs 171 **passing yards** to surpass No. 2 John Elway (51,475). Favre enters with 51,305.

### **BUBBA FRANKS:**

► Needs two receptions for 200 career.

► Needs six receptions to surpass No. 2 Ed West (202) on the team's all-time tight ends list. Franks enters with 197.

### **KABEER GBAJA-BIAMILA:**

► On Green Bay's all-time sacks list, needs 2.5 to surpass No. 2 Tim Harris (55). Gbaja-Biamila enters with 53 career sacks, 15.5 shy of Reggie White's franchise record, 68.5.

# BENGALS HAVE SHARED SIGNIFICANT MOMENTS IN PACKERS HISTORY

The Packers are not nearly as well-acquainted with the Cincinnati Bengals as they are with, say, the Chicago Bears...or the Minnesota Vikings...or, for that matter, the New York Giants...

In fact, their engagement in Cincinnati's Paul Brown Stadium Sunday will find them meeting in a regular season game for only the 10th time — and for the first time since 1998.

Yet, historically, they have shared one of the most somber and meaningful moments in the Green and Gold's distinguished annals.

And, beyond that, the rivalry has been highlighted by one of the most significant developments in the Packers' storied history—the impromptu launching of quarterback Brett Favre on a Hall of Fame career.

Their very first encounter, in a preseason contest, occurred two days after the passing of the Packers' legendary former coach, Vince Lombardi, who had succumbed to cancer in Washington D. C., Sept. 3, 1970.

Lombardi was vice president, head coach and general manager of the Redskins at his death, having left Green Bay early in 1969 for Washington.

But, even though he had not been associated with the Packers at the time of his passing, Lombardi's former players in Tiletown were moved to pay tribute to his memory.

Accordingly, when they stood at attention for the singing of the national anthem prior to the teams' first meeting ever—at Milwaukee County Stadium the night of Sept. 5, 1970—all of them were wearing black arm bands in Lombardi's memory.

It seemed appropriate that the also legendary Paul Brown happened to be on the sideline as head coach of the Bengals.

Back in Green Bay the following night, the Packers arranged and took a significant part in a public memorial service for the fallen coach at the Brown County Veterans Memorial Arena, across from Lambeau Field.

Quarterback Bart Starr spoke on behalf of the team and then-Commissioner Pete Rozelle also flew in from New York to pay tribute to Lombardi on the program.

Under the circumstances, the game itself was somewhat secondary. For the record, it ended in a 10-10 tie in the regulation four quarters (the NFL had not yet adopted the overtime rule designed to avoid ties).

The Packers did have an opportunity to win with 1:19 remaining in the game but Dale Livingston's 45-yard field goal attempt was blocked by the Bengals' Ken Riley—the same Ken Riley who was later to serve as the Packers' defensive backfield coach in 1984-85 under Forrest Gregg.

The Bengals also had a chance to prevail with only 23 seconds remaining, but the center of Green Bay's defensive line rose up to block a 33-yard field goal attempt by Cincinnati's Horst Muhlmann, and the Packers' Bob Jeter recovered the ball at the 1-yard line as the game ended.

\* \* \*

The Packers and the Ohioans “officially” met for the first time in regular season play the following year—although not until after they had faced off in a preseason game for a second time, this one in Cincinnati's Riverfront Stadium.

The latter encounter, on Sept. 4, 1971, was essentially a “showcase” for the Bengals' Austrian-born placekicker, Horst Muhlmann. The lead-footed ex-bricklayer did not permit the Packers a single kickoff return yard in the game, launching each of his six kickoffs over the crossbar into the end zone at Green Bay's end of the field and booting field goals



of 52 and 43 yards, the second of which proved to be the ultimate difference.

Muhlmann's heroics overshadowed an impressively productive rushing performance by the Packers, who amassed 279 yards in 47 attempts, a robust 5.9-yard average, Dave Hampton leading the way with 99 yards in 19 attempts. Fellow running back Donny Anderson also weighed in with 83 yards in 11 attempts, his production including a 59-yard run.

The Packers had an opportunity for a tie, with 1:19 remaining in the game, but Livingston was off-target with a 52-yard field goal attempt.

\* \* \*

A month later (Oct. 3, 1971), the Bengals were in Lambeau Field for their first-ever regular season showdown with the Packers—and again it was a tightfisted affair, with a 10-10 tie prevailing as the combatants headed into the fourth quarter.

But not, it turned out, for long. Six seconds into that final period, quarterback Scott Hunter put the Packers up with a 19-yard scoring strike to tight end Rich McGeorge.

Six minutes later, left-footed Packers placekicker Lou Michaels gave the Green and Gold some additional breathing room with a 14-yard field goal, swelling the Packers' lead to 20-10.

The Bengals, however, declined to “fold their tent” and mounted an 8-play, 69-yard scoring drive climaxed by a 5-yard Ken Anderson pass to wide receiver Eric Crabtree with just under 4 minutes remaining.

To additionally complicate matters for the Packers, Cincinnati promptly had a glittering opportunity to pull out a victory, recovering a Dave Hampton fumble at the Green Bay 15-yard-line following the ensuing kickoff.

The Packers' defense, however, was equal to the unexpected challenge. With the Bengals in a fourth-and-2 at the 7 immediately following the 2-minute warning, defenders Willie Wood and Kenny Ellis collaborated in stopping Anderson for no gain on a rollout to save the day.

\* \* \*

Fast-forwarding 22 years, it appeared to be a typical game-time development when Packers starting quarterback Don Majkowski suffered an ankle injury in the first quarter of Green Bay's encounter with the Bengals in Lambeau Field on the Sunday afternoon of Sept. 20, 1992.

Yes, Brett Favre replaced Majkowski at that point—and has been under center for the Green and Gold ever since. So it was a historic changing of the guard and the birth of one of the most remarkable careers in the history of professional sports.

As No. 4 has done so many times over the 14-year interim, he pulled out a breathtaking victory with the first of his many last-minute heroics.

With the Packers trailing 23-17, and only 1 minute, 7 seconds left to play, Favre quickly moved them into Bengals territory with a 42-yard strike to Sterling Sharpe, who was felled at the Cincinnati 35.

Only 19 seconds then remained when, on the next play, he retreated with arm upraised and lofted an unerring “bomb” to wide receiver Kitrick Taylor, streaking down the right sideline into the end zone with the first of Favre's 390 touchdown passes in his arms.

Placekicker Chris Jacke then kicked the winning point, sealing a 24-23 Green Bay victory with 13 seconds left on the stadium time clock.
