THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ► Victimized by a perilous streak of unfortunate circumstances, the Packers continue the search for their second win.
- ► Green Bay makes its first trip to the Georgia Dome in 13 years, ending the Packers' longest active stretch without an appearance in an NFC city.
- ► The last time the Packers played at Atlanta, Oct. 4, 1992, the Georgia Dome was brand new and Brett Favre was 22 years old. Green Bay sustained a 24-10 loss to the coach that had traded Favre the previous February, Jerry Glanville. It marked start No. 2 in his current 213-game starting streak.
- ► Had Green Bay defeated Minnesota in the 2004 NFC Playoffs, the Packers would have traveled to Atlanta for the Divisional round.
- ► Green Bay and Atlanta meet for the first time since the 2002 playoffs, when Dan Reeves' Falcons avenged his Ice Bowl loss with a stunning, 27-7 win, the Packers' first-ever home playoff defeat.

TELEVISION: FOX Sports will air the contest to a regional audience. Play-by-play man Dick Stockton, now in his fourth decade as a professional broadcaster, joins former Pro Bowler Daryl "Moose" Johnston in the booth. Tony Siragusa, a key cog in Baltimore's 2000 Super Bowl title, is on the sideline. And, veterans Bob Stenner (producer) and Sandy Grossman (director) are in the truck.

PACKERS RADIO: Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with versatile Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler Larry McCarren (color). Spanning five states, the network covers 50 markets in the upper Midwest. The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on packers.com.

FAVRE IN DOMES: Perception says that Favre has struggled in domes. In reality, especially of late, Favre has played very well under roofs. He's compiled a 95.6 passer rating over his last nine starts in domes:

1-7 COMPARISONS: Green Bay, according to Elias Sports Bureau, is the first 1-7 team in NFL history to outscore its opponents (168-159).

- ▶ The last time the Packers were 1-7, 19 years ago in 1986, the team's morale and outlook were much different. That season, Green Bay had already been blown out four times, including a disheartening season opener vs. Houston and a 42-7 loss at Minnesota. In '86, opponents through eight games had outscored Green Bay 222-108, and there was little discussion of several close losses hinging on 1-2 plays, like '05.
- ► This year, the Packers may have lost Pro Bowlers Javon Walker and Ahman Green to season-ending injuries, but those two are the only starters on injured reserve. In 1986 at the season's halfway point, Green Bay listed 12 on injured reserve, including six starters.
- ► The Packers enter the second half four games out of first place, with two still to play against division-leading Chicago. In 1986, the Packers were well out of the race, seven games behind the Bears (7-1).
- ▶ And in 1986, the Packers' defense was giving up points and yards at a much more alarming rate than the 2005 club, and the field general was Randy Wright, who even on his best day was not Brett Favre. Favre refuses to quit in hoping to steer Green Bay out of its current situation.

MIDSEASON PROJECTIONS: At the season's halfway marker, notable "on pace" forecasts, both as a team and individually over the next eight games:

- ▶ Brett Favre already has completed passes to 16 targets, the most players to record a catch since 1998 (also 16). If Andrae Thurman catches a pass, the 17 receivers will become the team's most since 1987 (19).
- ► Favre is on pace for 592 attempts (would be second-most ever; he had 595 in 1999), career-highs in completions (388), completion percentage (65.5) and interceptions (28), and a second straight season with 4,000 yards passing (4,128) and at least 30 touchdowns (30). He already owns the NFL record for 30-TD seasons (8).
- ▶ Despite their large amount of passes, the Packers have allowed just 10 sacks and with 2,009 net passing yards, are on pace to top 4,000. After a franchise-record 4,449 net passing yards in 2004, the team would accomplish consecutive 4,000-yard seasons for the first time ever a remarkable feat considering the toll of free agency and injuries on their

offensive line. Net passing yards are gross yards minus yards lost on sacks allowed.

- ▶ Punter B.J. Sander is on pace to record the team's highest gross average (42.3) since Josh Bidwell (42.5) in 2001. **However, Sander's 38.9 net average** would represent the team's best figure in 42 years, since Jerry Norton compiled a 39.2 net average in 1963.
- ► Antonio Chatman's 9.0-yard punt-return average would mark the Packers' highest since 1998 (Roell Preston, also 9.0).
- ▶ Nick Barnett is on pace to post 218 total tackles, which would shatter the team's known single-season record, 180 by Mike Douglass in 1981. The Packers have recorded tackles since 1975.
- ► The defense has allowed just 296.4 yards per game, which would be its fewest since 1998 (281.7).
- ► That season, 1998, also marked the last year Green Bay did not have a 1,000-yard rusher. The team's current six-year streak of seasons with a 1,000-yard carrier is a franchise record.

THE DIAMOND RECEIVER: Walt Williams in the third quarter Sunday vs. Pittsburgh became the 75th player to catch a pass from Brett Favre since Favre launched his 213-game starting streak, an NFL record among quarterbacks. Earlier in that same drive, on which the Packers opened the second half with an impressive 7-minute, 34-second march for a touchdown, Samkon Gado became No. 74 on Favre's list.

► Others to join the group this season are Vonta Leach and Terrence Murphy (both Sept. 18). Donald Lee added himself with a 16-yard TD catch in the team's valiant comeback attempt Oct. 3 at Carolina.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN: Dusting off the bleachers, the Packers on Sunday hosted a game at Lambeau Field for the first time in 28 days. Green Bay is traveling this week for its third road game in a four-game stretch. The Packers are in the midst of playing one home game (Sunday vs. Pittsburgh) over a 42-day period.

ROOKIE SUPPLIES BADLY NEEDED PUNCH: In less than four weeks, Samkon Gado went from unemployed to the Packers' practice squad, to the role of featured back — the fifth individual to carry that torch this season — Sunday vs. Pittsburgh.

- ► The humble rookie responded, and against one of the league's premier defenses, posted 26 carries for 62 yards — Packers season highs along with his first career touchdown.
- ► Gado, who hails from nearby Columbia, S.C., turns 23 years old in Atlanta on Sunday.

BET ON A CLOSE GAME SUNDAY: Since the beginning of the '04 season, each of these clubs has played nine regular-season contests in which the final margin was a field goal or less. Most games played, 2004-05, decided by three points or less:

10-PLAY DRIVES: On 19 occasions this year, the Packers have kept the ball for at least 10 plays. That's tied with Buffalo for most in the NFL.

ROOKIES PLAYING PLENTY OF ROLES: Jeremy Thornburg Sunday became the 11th rookie used in a game by the Packers this season.

COACHES CAPSULES

Mike Sherman: 56-38-0, .602, sixth NFL season, sixth with Packers **Jim Mora:** 18-8-0, .692, second NFL season, second with Falcons

Head to Head: First meeting

MIKE SHERMAN...Is in his sixth year as the Packers' 13th head coach.

- ► Is no stranger to adversity, having overcome several hurdles each of the past three seasons to win a trio of NFC North titles. Adversity is again in the Packers' path this season.
- ► Since the 1993 collective bargaining agreement, teams have made 84 coaching changes and only Sherman's tenure has produced winning records in each of its first five seasons.
- ▶ Over their first five regular seasons as an NFL coach, since 1970 only Chuck Knox, George Seifert, Joe Gibbs and Mike Ditka produced better records than Sherman (53-27, .663).
- ►In 2004, his team became only the ninth in NFL history to reach the playoffs after a 1-4 start.
- ► Has led the Packers to three straight division titles and four consecutive playoff appearances.
- ▶ Is 6-0 against teams in the Super Bowl the previous season.

JIM MORA...Hired by the Falcons Jan. 9, 2004.

- ► Set franchise record for the most wins by a first-year head coach and became 11th rookie head coach in NFL history to capture a division title. Directed team to second NFC championship game in franchise history, as Atlanta led the NFL in rushing offense (167 yards per game) and quarterback sacks (48).
- ► In 2003, in his fifth season as defensive coordinator of the San Francisco 49ers, Mora's unit finished fourth in the NFC in total defense and ninth in the NFL in rushing defense. San Francisco's 42 quarter-back sacks tied for fourth in the NFL.
- ➤ Served as the 49ers' secondary coach (1997-98), after five years in New Orleans (1992-96), where the Saints twice led the NFL in fewest passing yards allowed (1992-93). Spent seven seasons in the Chargers' organization as a member of the pro personnel department (1985) and coaching staff (1986-91).
- ▶ Played defensive back in college at Washington (1980-83), appearing in two Rose Bowls, then served as an assistant for one season (1984) on Don James' staff, helping the squad earn a berth in the Orange Bowl.
- ► Turns 44 next week.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program of the "Acme" Packers from 1921-24.

THE PACKERS-FALCONS SERIES: For a series that began with the Packers cruising to a 56-3 victory over the then-expansion Falcons in their first meeting in 1966, it has evolved into a closely contested rivalry. The Packers hold a modest 11-10 advantage. They're dead-even in postseason play (1-1).

- ► Over the last decade-plus, Atlanta-Green Bay clashes have proven memorable. In 1994, the Packers defeated Atlanta in the final NFL game in Milwaukee (Dec. 18). Brett Favre's lunging, 9-yard TD scramble on the game's final play sealed the 21-17 victory.
- A scant year later, the Packers and Falcons crossed paths in the postseason for the first time — on Dec. 31, 1995, in Lambeau Field. With Edgar Bennett rushing for 108 yards, the NFC Central Division champion Packers pulled out a 37-20 victory with the aid of a 76-yard scoring punt return by rookie Antonio Freeman.
- Six years later, Atlanta led all the way in a tight struggle, posting a 23-20 victory with the support of a 352-yard passing performance by Chris Chandler, ending Green Bay's nine-game home winning streak.
- ▶ In the '02 regular season opener (Sept. 8), Favre and Michael Vick fought into overtime. Favre guided the Packers to four TDs and three field goals in a 37-34 sudden-death victory. The Falcons, however, delivered a reverberating, 27-7 win in the '02 playoffs.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS: Falcons college scout Boyd Dowler played in Green Bay from 1959-69, helping the Packers to five NFL championships and two Super Bowl titles under Vince Lombardi...Ed Donatell served as Green Bay's defensive coordinator from 2000-03...Jeff Jagodzinski, Falcons offensive line coach, was Green Bay's tight ends coach from 1999-2003...Atlanta's Ty Detmer, selected by the Packers in the ninth round of the '92 draft, is one of 11 NFL quarterbacks who've left Green Bay to start for another team after backing up Brett Favre...The Falcons' Emmitt Thomas served as the Packers' defensive coordinator in 1999, when the Packers selected Falcons safety Antuan Edwards in the first round of the NFL Draft...Allen Rossum served as the Packers' return man from 2000-01...Atlanta offensive lineman Barry Stokes played in Green Bay from 2000-01...Falcons defensive back Leigh Torrence spent the 2005 preseason in Green Bay...The Falcons' Jason Webster used to cover Green Bay's Robert Ferguson at Texas A&M practices...Green Bay O-line coach Larry Beightol and Falcons head coach Jim Mora were on the Chargers staff in 1989...Green Bay cornerback Ahmad Carroll is an Atlanta native and resident; he earned All-America honors at Atlanta's Frederick Douglass High School.

LAST MEETING, GEORGIA DOME: Oct. 4, 1992, Falcons won, 24-10.

- ▶ Brett Favre made his second career start and completed 33 of 43 passes for 276 yards and a touchdown, but Green Bay couldn't overcome a 17-0 deficit.
- ► Favre guided the Packers to within seven points early in the final quarter, but Jerry Glanville's defense stiffened in the end.
- ► Mike Pritchard and Andre Rison caught TD passes from Chris Miller. Favre countered with a scoring toss to Sterling Sharpe.
- A missed Chris Jacke field goal, with Favre as his holder, as well as a 48-yard kickoff return by Deion Sanders, kept momentum in the Falcons' hands most of the afternoon.

LAST MEETING, LAMBEAU FIELD (AP): Jan. 4, 2003 (2002 NFC Wild Card playoff), Falcons won, 27-7.

- Atlanta and the gifted Vick swept to a 24-0 halftime lead en route to a 27-7 victory against a Packers team minus Pro Bowl running back Ahman Green and starting wide receivers Donald Driver and Terry Glenn, sidelined by injuries.
- ► Vick personally accounted for 191 yards of Atlanta offense, completing 13 of 25 passes for 117 yards and adding 64 rushing yards in 10 attempts. It was the first home playoff loss ever for the Packers, who were the NFLs' only 8-0 home team in 2002 and had tied for the league's best record (12-4).

DON'T LOOK FOR MANY BIG PLAYS: Both the Packers and Falcons

are among NFL leaders in preventing long gains. Atlanta and Green Bay each rank among the Top 10 defenses in limiting gains of 20-plus yards:

ANOTHER STARTING RB: With Tony Fisher inactive last Sunday, the Packers in only their eighth game started a fourth player at running back. Ahman Green (quadriceps tendon) and Najeh Davenport (broken ankle) are both on injured reserve. Fisher sustained a freak rib injury Oct. 30 at Cincinnati, Samkon Gado could be starter No. 5 Sunday at Atlanta.

- ► ReShard Lee against the Steelers made his first career start.
- ► The last time Green Bay started as many as four backs in a season was 1998, when Dorsey Levens (4), Raymont Harris (3), Travis Jervey (5) and Darick Holmes (4) drew starting assignments.

DEUCE IS LOOSE: Reliable and kinetic Antonio Chatman in one game Sunday jumped from sixth to fourth on the club's all-time punt-return list.

► Chatman, whose nickname is Deuce because he wore No. 2 upon signing as a free agent in 2003, also recorded a career-long 36-yard punt return against Pittsburgh Sunday.

- The veteran enters the weekend ranked third in the NFC and seventh in the league with a 9.0-yard average. The Packers haven't had a player finish the season seventh or higher in the league since eventual Super Bowl MVP Desmond Howard led the NFL with a 15.1-yard average in 1996.

THIRD DOWN DEFENSE: The Packers' defense against Pittsburgh Sunday gave up just 13 points, 213 total yards and zero third-down conversions (0-for-8). The last time the Packers did not allow an opponent to convert on third down was Dec. 20, 1997, when Green Bay held Buffalo to 0-for-12 in a 31-21 win.

- ► Actually, the Packers haven't allowed a third-down conversion in six full quarters, since the first half at Cincinnati Oct. 30.
- ▶ Opponents are 0-for-their-last-13 on third down.

BETWEEN THE YARD LINES: Postgame notes and plays not necessarily in the boxscore from Sunday's 20-10 loss to Pittsburgh at Lambeau Field:

- ► Over a stretch that covered nearly 19 minutes from the second-third quarter, the Packers ran 30 plays and the Steelers ran one.
- ► The last time the Packers gave up 59 or fewer net passing yards and lost was Nov. 12, 1989, at Detroit (54 yards).
- ► The Packers have outgained opponents in six of eight games this season, including Sunday.
- ► The Green Bay defense allowed season lows in first downs, snaps, total yards, net passing yards, passing attempts and completions
- ► B.J. Sander's 44.7-yard net punting average marked a career and season high.
- ► Nick Collins recorded a forced fumble on special teams, adding to the one he already had on defense.
- ► Donald Driver extended his streak of games with a reception to 56. The stretch is the fourth longest in Packers history.
- ► With a first-quarter field goal, Ryan Longwell became the first player in Packers history to score 1,000 points. He is the 35th player in league annals to reach the milestone. Longwell needed two points coming into the contest.
- ► Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila now has sacked Charlie Batch five times. Only Daunte Culpepper (six) and Brad Johnson (five) have been sacked as many times by the defensive end.
- ► Brett Favre's streak of 24 games (27 including playoffs) at Lambeau Field with a touchdown pass came to an end.
- ► Chatman had a career-long 36-yard punt return in the fourth guarter.
- ▶ DT Cullen Jenkins deflected a Pittsburgh field goal attempt at the start of the fourth quarter. It marked the third time he put his hands on a kick this year, including his two blocked PAT attempts.
- ► RB Samkon Gado scored his first NFL touchdown on a 1-yard rush in the third quarter.
- ▶ LB Robert Thomas made his first career interception in the first quarter.
- ▶ RB Walt Williams notched his first career catch, a 19-yard reception, in

the third quarter.

A GENERATION OF WINNING RECORDS: Forgive Packers fans if they tend to come down harder on their team than fans in other cities. The club hasn't had a losing record since 1991. And, figuring that an entire generation of fans aren't old enough to remember 1991, the team's start is tough to swallow.

▶ But don't count out the Favre-led Packers, who have never grouped themselves in the "most teams" category when facing adversity.

INJURIES: Rest assured, no one in the Packers' building will use injuries as an excuse for losses, even though Green Bay players have missed 27 combined starts due to injury. The Packers' notable injuries to date in 2005:

Chronology of the Packers' 1992 deal for Brett Favre

April 21, 1991 — On Day 1 of the '91 NFL draft, the Philadelphia Eagles strike a deal with Green Bay to move up. Eveing Tennessee T Antone Davis, the Eagles ship their '91 first-round choice (19th overall) to Green Bay for the Packers' first-rounder (eighth overall). Philadelphia gets Davis, and the Packers use the Eagles' No. 19 to snag CB Vinnie Clark from Ohio State. The Packers' Tom Braatz and Lindy Infante don't consummate the trade until Philadelphia agrees to throw in its first-round pick in the 1992 draft...

Later, in Round 2, the Falcons select Brett Favre 33rd overall, breaking the hearts of several teams, including the Jets...Ron Wolf, heading the Jets personnel department, chooses QB Browning Nagle with the next choice, 34th.

Nov., 1991 — Braatz is relieved on Nov. 20. One week later, the Packers hire Wolf and give him full control of Green Bay football operations.

Dec. 1, 1991 — Green Bay's first game after Wolf's hiring is a trip to Fulton County Stadium. Before a 35-31 loss, in pregame warmups, Wolf scouts Favre, the player he missed by one pick in the draft seven months earlier with the Jets.

Feb. 10, 1992 — In his second trade as Packers general manager, Wolf takes the choice acquired in '91 from Philadelphia (17th overall, the Eagles were 10-6 in 1991) and sends it to Atlanta for Favre...

The Falcons later traded that 17th pick to Dallas for the Cowboys' firstround position (19th) and fourth-round choice (104th) in the same draft; Dallas chose CB Kevin Smith from Texas A&M with its pick acquired from Atlanta, through Green Bay; the Falcons chose Favre's former Southern Mississippi teammate Tony Smith (RB) at No. 19 and selected CB Frankie Smith from Baylor at No. 104.

THREE GAMES STAND OUT IN ATLANTA SERIES, INCLUDING MILWAUKEE '94

The Green Bay Packers' association with the Atlanta Falcons, now in its 40th year, has been something of a mixed bag, although the won-lost record would not suggest it.

The Packers own a one-game overall advantage heading into Sunday's encounter with the Falcons in the Georgia Dome, having won 11 of the previous 21 meetings while losing 10.

But the won-lost record is highly deceiving. Particularly with respect to the "anatomy" of the series.

The Packers, benefiting from the fledgling Falcons' initial status as an expansion team, won the first five games in the series by an average of 25 points per game.

As often is the case of rivalries, however, things have changed to a significant degree over time. In the interim, in this instance, the Falcons have won 10 of the last 16 meetings, including three of their five most recent matchups.

From the Packers' point of view, three games stand out in their four-decade relationship with the Falcons, all for different reasons.

Noteworthy among those early Green Bay triumphs, from the standpoint of sheer productivity, was a 56-3 romp in their very first meeting, which occurred at Milwaukee County Stadium on Oct. 23, 1966. The 53-point differential remains the largest margin of victory by the Packers in their National Football League history, which dates back to 1921.

Packers Head Coach Vince Lombardi became exceedingly irate following that contest when, during his press conference, a reporter suggested that he had deliberately run up the score on the overmatched Falcons.

There were at least three reasons why the implication was off target.

One, the Packers, en route to their fourth NFL championship in six years and their first Super Bowl victory, were clearly that superior to the youthful Falcons of that early day.

Two, it was not Lombardi's style to embarrass an opponent.

And, three, he would have been particularly sensitive to avoid running up the score on that occasion because the Falcons' rookie head coach, Norb Hecker, had been the defensive backfield coach on Lombardi's staff the previous seven seasons and was a friend.

Plus, in fairness to Lombardi, he had played everybody but the equipment manager before the game was over.

Twenty-eight years later, the Falcons helped the Packers make another kind of history. The Green and Gold were playing their final game in Milwaukee on Dec. 18, 1994, ending a 62-year tenure in the state's largest city, that afternoon.

The Packers, in a third down-and-2 situation at the Atlanta 9-yard-line, were trailing 17-14 with only 21 seconds to play — and had just spent their third and final timeout.

Quarterback Brett Favre, taking the snap from center, presumably was preparing to pass. But, not finding anyone legitimately "open," he took off to his right. In full flight, he scrambled into the very corner of the end zone as the time clock registered 14:46.

When, Favre later was asked, had he made the split-second decision to run the ball?

"I have no idea," he said. "Half the things I do out there just happen.

"I used to make bad decisions and get into trouble. This was one where I felt I could get in."

After Favre's head-long lunge into the end zone, Chris Jacke came on to kick the extra point and the Packers thus bid farewell to County Stadium and Milwaukee with a 21-17 victory.

Coach Mike Holmgren was so moved following the game that he paused to salute and blow kisses to the crowd.

"I don't usually get a chance to look up in the stands," he said. "To see



those people and acknowledge them, it was very emotional for me. I'm a little corny that way anyway. Just glancing around, in every section I looked at, the people jumped up. It was really something. I'll never forget it."

Favre, meanwhile, said of the fans, "I hope they really enjoyed it, because I really did. It seemed like every game we played here was that kind of game. I think this was the most thrilling game I've been in in a long time. I hope they accept it (as a gift) because I definitely will."

Just a year later, the Packers were involved with the Falcons in another historic encounter — when the Green and Gold found Atlanta athwart their 1995 postseason path in an NFC Wild Card playoff at Lambeau Field.

Exhibiting a balanced offensive tack, including a franchise playoff record 108 rushing yards by Edgar Bennett, the Packers forged past the Falcons, 37-20, on a foggy, 30-degree afternoon and thus acquired their first NFC Central Division championship in 23 years.

Things did not go well at the beginning, however. Quarterback Jeff George's 65-yard touchdown pass to Eric Metcalf gave Atlanta a 7-0 advantage 3 minutes into the game, stunning the crowd of 60,453.

Fortuitously, the Packers shortly regained control, posting a pair of first-quarter touchdowns — one on an 8-yard run by Bennett and the other on a 14-yard pass from Favre to wide receiver Robert Brooks.

The Packers subsequently broke the game open midway through the second quarter when rookie Antonio Freeman became the first Green Bay player ever to return a kick for a postseason touchdown, running back a punt 76 yards.

Then, with less than a minute remaining in the first half, Favre fired a 2-yard scoring pass to tight end Mark Chmura, parlaying the Packers' lead to 27-10 heading into the intermission.

With just under 8 minutes remaining, Favre's third touchdown strike of the afternoon — a deftly arched, 18-yard spiral to running back Dorsey Levens — sealed a Green and Gold success.

Skilfully distributing the football throughout, Favre completed passes to no fewer than nine different receivers, seven of them to team leader Robert Brooks, four to Anthony Morgan and three each to Bennett and Keith Jackson.

In painful contrast to that enjoyable occasion, the Packers have unpleasant memories of their most recent experience with the Falcons.

Led by the gifted Michael Vick, Atlanta came to Green Bay on Jan. 4, 2003, and pulled off the unthinkable, stunning the Packers — and 65,358 witnesses — in an NFC Wild Card Playoff at storied Lambeau Field, 27-7.

The Green and Gold not only had been the NFL's only team to post an 8-0 record at home during the '02 season but had never lost a home playoff, having carried a perfect 13-0 postseason record into the contest.

Injuries were contributing factors to the unhappy outcome, the Packers losing Pro Bowl running back Ahman Green (knee) and top receivers Donald Driver (shoulder) and Terry Glenn (concussion) in an unsuccessful second half comeback bid. They also were without Pro Bowl safety Darren Sharper, sidelined by a knee problem.

Favre, victim of two interceptions and a fumble, found Driver with a 14-yard touchdown on the first drive after halftime, ending a 24-0 drought with Green Bay's only score of the game. But the Packers' misadventures continued. Driver re-injured his dislocated shoulder on the play and was sidelined for the balance of the game.

For Falcons head coach Dan Reeves, an NFL veteran, the outcome represented something akin to revenge. He had been on the losing side — as a member of the Dallas Cowboys — in the "Ice Bowl" on the same turf 35 years earlier.
