**GREEN BAY (2-9) at CHICAGO (8-3)**  
**Sun., Dec. 4 • Soldier Field • 12 noon CST • FOX**

**THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:**

- ▶ Facing an uphill battle against the league's top-ranked defense, Green Bay bids for a win in the NFL rivalry with the richest history. The team's meet for the 169th time (170th contest, including playoffs).
- ▶ With a 12th consecutive road win at Chicago, the Packers can match the NFL record, shared by the L.A. Rams (at San Francisco, 1969-80) and San Francisco (at L.A./St. Louis Rams, 1987-98). Green Bay hasn't lost on the road to the Bears since Dec. 5, 1993. Brett Favre is 12-1 in road games with Chicago; he's 11-1 at Soldier Field.
- ▶ The Packers play their last noon kickoff of 2005, and their last game. Networks will broadcast their final four contests to a national audience, including a Christmas Day rematch with Chicago at Lambeau Field.

**TELEVISION: FOX Sports** will air the contest to a regional audience. Play-by-play man Dick Stockton, now in his fourth decade as a professional broadcaster, joins former Pro Bowler Daryl "Moose" Johnston in the booth. Tony Siragusa, a key cog in Baltimore's 2000 Super Bowl title, is on the sideline. And, veterans Bob Stenner (producer) and Sandy Grossman (director) are in the truck.

▶ The contest also is available to DIRECTV® subscribers on Channel 710.

**PACKERS RADIO:** Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with versatile Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler Larry McCarren (color). Spanning five states, the network covers 50 markets in the upper Midwest. The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on [packers.com](http://packers.com).

▶ The broadcast also is available to NFL Sirius Radio subscribers on Channel 125.

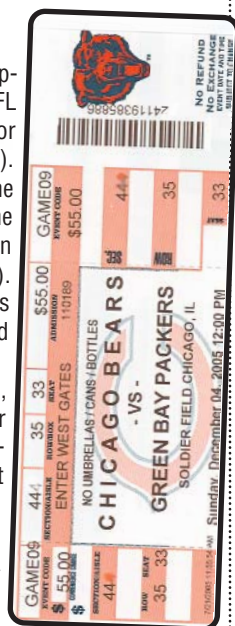
**NFL RECORD WITHIN REACH:** The Packers, with what would surely be a well-earned victory against the NFL's top-ranked defense, can tie the NFL record with a win 12th consecutive win on the road against Chicago.

▶ The streak includes a 2002 win on a Monday night at Memorial Stadium in Champaign, Ill., on the University of Illinois campus, where Chicago played while Soldier Field underwent renovation.

▶ In league annals, only two teams, the Rams and 49ers, have managed to sustain a longer streak of road success against one opponent.

**A LONG WAIT TO PLAY THE BEARS:** While not frequent, this isn't the first time league has waited until December to pit the Packers against the Bears.

- ▶ In 1998, the clubs didn't meet for the first time until Dec. 13, then finished off the season series two weeks later.
- ▶ It also happened in 1983 (Dec. 4, Dec. 18).

**FAVRE'S FAVORITE ROAD STADIUM:** Brett Favre is 11-1 lifetime at Soldier Field, having won there on 10 consecutive trips. His last loss at the historic venue was on Dec. 5, 1993.

- ▶ The only other stadium in which Favre has won more games is Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Favre's 11 wins at Soldier Field are more than the seven he had in three seasons at Milwaukee County Stadium, one of his home venues from 1992-94, before Green Bay moved all of its games to Green Bay.

▶ The Packers do close their schedule with three of their last four at home.

**EAGLES TO RETIRE NO. 92:** The Philadelphia Eagles at halftime of their game Monday vs. Seattle will formally remove No. 92, worn in Philadelphia by Reggie White from 1985-92, out of circulation.

- ▶ White will become the first player in NFL history to have his number retired by more than one team. The Packers, who had made plans to retire his number before White's tragic death last Dec. 26, did so Sept. 18 vs. Cleveland.
- ▶ In addition, the University of Tennessee on Oct. 1 vs. Mississippi, retired White's 92. The school chose to honor White as the first former football player to have his number retired in more than 60 years.
- ▶ Other than Jackie Robinson and Wayne Gretzky, White is believed to be the first athlete in sports history to have his number retired by three teams in the same year (Philadelphia Eagles, Green Bay Packers, Tennessee Volunteers).
- ▶ On the opponent sideline Monday night, White's former head coach in Green Bay, Mike Holmgren, and his former defensive coordinator, Ray Rhodes, will be on hand.

**EXCITEMENT BUILDING FOR FROZEN TUNDRA HOCKEY:**

University of Wisconsin men's hockey fans anxiously awaiting February's Frozen Tundra Hockey Classic at Lambeau Field were no doubt excited to see the Badgers climb to No. 1 in two national polls Monday after a week-end sweep of Michigan State and Michigan.

- ▶ Wisconsin will face Ohio State at 3 p.m., Feb. 11, in the Frozen Tundra Hockey Classic, Lambeau Field's first hockey offering. The game also will serve as the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Game, with a portion of the proceeds supporting the Hall of Fame.

**COACHES CAPSULES**

Mike Sherman: 57-40-0, .588, sixth NFL season, sixth with Packers  
 Lovie Smith: 13-14-0, .481, second NFL season, second with Bears

**MIKE SHERMAN**...Is in his sixth year as the Packers' 13th head coach.

- ▶ Is no stranger to adversity, having overcome several hurdles each of the past three seasons to win a trio of NFC North titles.
- ▶ Since the 1993 collective bargaining agreement, teams have made 84 coaching changes and only Sherman's tenure has produced winning records in each of its first five seasons.
- ▶ Over their first five regular seasons as an NFL coach, since 1970 only Chuck Knox, George Seifert, Joe Gibbs and Mike Ditka produced better records than Sherman (53-27, .663).
- ▶ In 2004, his team became only the ninth in NFL history to reach the playoffs after a 1-4 start.
- ▶ Has led the Packers to three straight division titles and four consecutive playoff appearances.
- ▶ Is 6-1 against teams in the Super Bowl the previous season.

**LOVIE SMITH**...like Sherman is the 13th head coach in his franchise's history, officially joining the Bears Jan. 15, 2004. He has 22 years experience as a coach, combined at the college and pro levels.

- ▶ Smith joined the Bears from the St. Louis Rams, where he spent three seasons (2001-03) as defensive coordinator and molded one of the league's top units. He helped the club return to the Super Bowl in 2001. Last season, his unit was among league leaders in takeaways, defensive TDs and sacks.
- ▶ The Texas native has coached on playoff teams four of the last six years, and five of his nine NFL campaigns.
- ▶ Brett Favre and the Packers know Smith from his five seasons (1996-2000) as linebackers coach in Tampa Bay, where he helped turn around a defense that hadn't finished above 12th in the four seasons before his arrival. In Tampa, Smith coached under highly regarded defensive minds Tony Dungy and Monte Kiffin.
- ▶ A former All-American safety, Smith coached collegiately at Tulsa, Arizona State, Kentucky, Tennessee, Ohio State and Wisconsin, where he tutored linebackers in 1987.

**THE PACKERS-BEARS SERIES:** These teams mark meeting No. 169 in another chapter of one of sports' greatest rivalries.

- ▶ The Packers' recent run against Chicago (21 wins in last 25 meetings) has sent shockwaves through the history of the series. Before the run, the Bears led the NFL's richest rivalry by 23 games, 80-57-6. Now, Chicago's lead is only six, 84-78-6. The last time the gap was closer? The end of World War II and the Don Hutson era, 1945, when the Packers trailed 27-20-5.
- ▶ The last time Green Bay led the series? On the heels of its three straight NFL championships, 1932, when the Packers led 11-10-5. Two months after Babe Ruth allegedly called his shot at Wrigley Field in the '32 World Series, the Bears stole from Green Bay a fourth straight title (which at the time was determined by league standings).



Chicago barely finished atop the league standings, which unlike today did not count ties. Had the league counted ties in standings, the Packers would have won. The next year, 1933, the NFL began determining its champion with postseason games.

- ▶ On the Bears' home turf, the Packers have won 11 straight and 12 of their last 13.
- ▶ The Packers meet Lovie Smith for the third time as Bears head coach. Smith on Jan. 15, 2004, elevated one of sports' richest rivalries to another level, saying his No. 1 goal, ahead of winning the division and Super Bowl, was to beat Green Bay. He won on Sept. 19, 2004.
- ▶ The Packers went 18-2 against Chicago from 1994-2003. On only four occasions in NFL history has a team enjoyed a better 20-game stretch against a single opponent.
- ▶ Green Bay against Smith during his career as an NFL coach is 9-6 (all Brett Favre starts).
- ▶ **Other notable connections...** Green Bay running backs coach Edgar Bennett finished his playing career in Chicago (1998-99)... Bears running backs coach Tim Spencer played with the late Reggie White, the Packers' all-time sacks leader, with Memphis of the USFL in 1985... Offensive coordinator Tom Rossley spent two seasons (1997-98) as a Bears assistant... The late Mark Hatley, the Bears' top personnel executive from 1998-2001, also coached Lovie Smith in 1976 at Tulsa... Smith was a Wisconsin assistant in 1987... Long-snapper Rob Davis held that role for the Bears in 1996... Antonio Chatman played for the Arena League's Chicago Rush... Bears LB Hunter Hillenmeyer was taken by Green Bay in the fifth round of the 2003 NFL Draft... Rookies Samkon Gado (Green Bay) and Airese Currie (Bears) are products of Columbia, S.C., high schools; Gado graduated from Ben Lippen High School, Currie from Richland Northeast... Bears quarterbacks coach Wade Wilson joined the Falcons in 1992, after Atlanta dealt Brett Favre to Green Bay.

**LAST MEETING (AP):** Jan. 2, 2005, Soldier Field, Packers won, 31-14:

- ▶ Brett Favre worked up a sweat, threw two touchdowns in a short work day and got the Green Bay Packers tuned up for the playoffs. Green Bay's defense wasn't bad, either, tying a team record with nine sacks — four by Kaber Gbaja-Biamila — and the Packers defeated the Chicago Bears 31-14.
- ▶ The Packers (10-6), who were already locked in as the No. 3 seed in the NFC, had no intention of completely resting their starters because they wanted to be sharp before the playoffs. Favre played the first quarter and one series in the second, going 9 of 13 for 196 yards and two TDs, helping to beat the Bears (5-11) for the 21st time in the last 26 meetings — including 11 straight on the road.
- ▶ Instead there was another milestone performance in an abbreviated afternoon: Favre went over 4,000 yards passing in a season for the fourth time in his career and reached 30 TD passes for an NFL-record eighth time before backup Craig Nall took over.
- ▶ Wearing "92" on their helmets in memory of former teammate Reggie White, who'd passed away the week of the game, the Packers gave up an early touchdown before roaring to a 28-7 halftime lead against their oldest rival. Their defense played a White-like game.
- ▶ Darren Sharper, who returned an interception 43 yards for a TD to make it 21-7, tied Herb Adderley's team record with his seventh career defensive TD, Nall entered the game with 9:02 left in the second quarter and immediately completed three straight passes, hitting Javon Walker for a 25-yard TD. It marked the first time in six NFL appearances that Nall had entered earlier than the fourth quarter.
- ▶ Gbaja-Biamila finished with 13½ sacks, matching his 2001 career high, and giving him double digits for a fourth straight season.

*Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program of the "Acme" Packers from 1921-24.*

**FIELD POSITION:** The Packers are 2-0 this season with better average field position than their opponents. Green Bay is 0-9 in the other contests.

- ▶ Turnovers and voids in the kickoff-return role, created by injuries to Najeh Davenport, Terrence Murphy and Robert Ferguson, have combined to consistently give opponents a short field this year.

**PADDING ANOTHER NFL RECORD:** Brett Favre needs one TD pass to extend his NFL-record streak of consecutive 20-TD-pass seasons to 12.

**BETWEEN THE YARD LINES:** Postgame notes and numbers not necessarily in the boxscore from Sunday's 19-14 loss at Philadelphia:

- ▶ The Packers lost for only the fourth time in a "short week" under Mike Sherman. After playing on Monday night, the team is now 10-4 since Sherman took over as head coach in 2000.
- ▶ Brett Favre is now 0-6 in the state of Pennsylvania, including playoffs. He's 0-5 in Philadelphia.
- ▶ Ahmad Carroll posted five passes defended, a career high.
- ▶ Mike Sherman lost to a defending Super Bowl finalist for the first time. He's now 6-1 in such games.
- ▶ The Eagles held FB William Henderson without a catch, snapping his personal 26-game streak (29 including playoffs). The last time Henderson played without a catch was Dec. 28, 2003, that year's memorable regular-season finale vs. Denver.
- ▶ Green Bay held a lead at the end of the third quarter and lost. That's only

the fourth time in Sherman's six seasons the Packers have lost such a contest on the road. Green Bay is now 21-4 under Sherman in those games on the road, and 47-7 overall.

- ▶ Samkon Gado delivered the Packers' longest 2005 run, a 33-yard touchdown, and the team's most rushing yards in one game (111). He became only the second rookie to post multiple 100-yard efforts, the first since John Brockington had four in 1971.
- ▶ The contest marked the first road game in the Mike Sherman era in which Green Bay lost with a 100-yard rusher. They're now 11-1 in such games away from home.

**NOT ANY EASIER TO SWALLOW, BUT:** According to Elias Sports Bureau, Green Bay is the only team in the 86-year annals of the NFL to open a season 2-9 or worse and score more points than its opponents.

- ▶ The Packers have outscored opponents 232-223, thanks in large part to a 52-3 win over New Orleans Oct. 9.
- ▶ However, to the Packers' credit, their average margin of defeat in nine losses is only 5.3 points. In other words, they've had legitimate opportunities to win every game.

**THE NINTH LOSS:** The Packers at Philadelphia Sunday sustained their ninth loss, ensuring that they will finish with their first losing record since 1991. Icked in the stomach all season, the Packers on Sunday will seek to avoid their ninth loss. The loss ended the NFL's longest streak, a stretch that was tied for eighth in league history. From 1992-2004, the Packers' lowest winning percentage was .500, an 8-8 finish in 1999.

- ▶ To put the Packers' 13-year streak in perspective during the current era of parity, unrestricted free agency and the salary cap, consider that Denver now inherits the NFL's longest active streak, only six seasons (2000-05). Philadelphia needs three more wins in its final five games to also extend its current streak to six.

**OVERSHADOWED:** Packers defensive end Aaron Kampman is having a career season, probably worthy of a Pro Bowl, but many of his contributions are likely lost in the team's 2-9 record.

- ▶ Kampman has three forced fumbles in his last two games.
- ▶ The fourth-year lineman on Nov. 21 vs. Minnesota recorded eight tackles, three sacks, two forced fumbles and one pass broken up.
- ▶ Elias Sports Bureau reviewed film of a first-quarter play that night originally ruled a team sack because Brad Johnson appeared to have fumbled without Packers contact. However, a closer look at the play showed Kampman's hand on the Johnson's arm.
- ▶ Kampman has established his single-season best with 6.5 on the year. His previous best was 4.5 last season.
- ▶ The consistent pass rusher the Packers have long sought to take pressure off Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila has surfaced from their own locker room.
- ▶ And, with 71 tackles through 11 games, he's on pace for 103, which would shatter the team record by a defensive lineman. Most tackles ever by a Packers lineman (recorded from 1975-2004):

**REGGIE TAKES ANOTHER STEP:** Former Dallas Cowboys quarterback Troy Aikman and perennial All-Pro defensive end Reggie White are among the six first-year eligible players who head the list of 25 semifinalists for the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Class of 2006, the Hall announced in Canton Nov. 22. The Hall of Fame's Board of Selectors chose the 25 semifinalists from the recently announced list of 112 preliminary nominees.

- ▶ The list of 25 semifinalists will be reduced by mail ballot to 13 modern-era candidates. That list will then increase to 15 finalist nominees with the inclusion of the two recommended candidates of the Hall of Fame's Seniors Committee. This year's Seniors Committee nominees, who were announced in August, are former Oakland Raiders coach John Madden, and Cowboys tackle Rayfield Wright. The Seniors Committee reviews the qualifications of those players, coaches and contributors whose careers took place more than 25 years ago. The list of 15 finalists for the Class of 2006 will be announced in mid-January.

- ▶ To be considered for election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, a nominated player must have been retired at least five years. For a non-player, there is not a mandatory retirement period, but a coach must be retired before he may be considered. A contributor, who is a nominee who has made outstanding contributions to pro football in capacities other than playing and coaching, may still be active in his pro football career.
- ▶ The Class of 2006 will be determined at the Selection Committee's annual meeting on Saturday, Feb. 4, 2006, in Detroit (the day before Super Bowl XL). The election results are announced immediately following the

meeting at a press conference at the media headquarters. Hall of Fame bylaws stipulate that between three and six new members will be selected each year.

**WALK-OFF FIELD GOALS:** Green Bay and Minnesota have decided their last four regular-season games with a field goal at the end of the fourth quarter.

► According to Elias Sports Bureau, since 1990, only one other series has experienced such late-game dramatics as often (game-ending field goal in either overtime or with no time left in regulation).

**NOT UP FOR THE CHALLENGE:** Opponent head coaches in 2005 are 0-for-4 on instant-replay challenges, and 0-for-their-last-5 dating to last year. Jack Del Rio was the last coach to successfully challenge a call, taking an interception and touchdown away from Darren Sharper, Dec. 19, 2004, vs. Jacksonville. Over a longer stretch, opponents are 1-for-their-last-7.

**IN GADO WE TRUST:** The Packers are 27-4 since 2000 with a 100-yard rusher, 16-3 at home and 11-1 on the road. Samkon Gado Nov. 13 at Atlanta became the first Green Bay rookie to top 100 yards rushing since De'Mond Parker, Dec. 5, 1999, at Chicago (113 yards on 19 carries). Prior to Parker, the last rookie to do it was Gado's position coach, Edgar Bennett (in 1992).

- However, Gado is the team's first nondrafted rookie to reach the mark since Kevin Wilhite (16-100), Oct. 18, 1987, vs. Philadelphia.
- Before Gado, the last Packers rookie with multiple 100-yard games was John Brockington, who had four such efforts in 1971.
- In Packers history, 42 players now have rushed for 100 yards. The franchise has 160 such individual efforts.

**ROOKIE RUSHING RECORDS:** Dre Barnes and Eugene Goodman. Those were the two running backs at Liberty University *ahead* of Samkon Gado on the depth chart last season. One year later, Gado needs just one rushing touchdown to *surpass* the most by a Packers rookie since running back John Brockington and quarterback Scott Hunter posted five in 1971. Gado also is within reach of ranking among all-time leaders in other single-season rookie rushing categories:

**LONGWELL IN THE FINAL STANZA:** Ryan Longwell in the fourth quarter has hit 13 of his last 14 field goals. His only fourth-quarter miss during the stretch, which includes playoffs dating to the 2003 postseason, came Oct. 23 at Minnesota.

**PLENTY OF KINETIC ENERGY:** Including Jerron Wishom, 13 rookies have played this season for Green Bay. Breaking down the current 53-man roster entering this week:

- 17 players were never drafted, including six potential starters this week — Samkon Gado (RB), Antonio Chatman (WR), Vonta Leach (FB), Roy Manning (LB), Paris Lenon (LB) and Cullen Jenkins (DT) — and kicker Ryan Longwell.
- Two starters — Kabere Gbaja-Biamila (DE) and Scott Wells (G) — were “Day 2” draft picks waived at the end of their rookie preseasons who cleared waivers and re-signed to the Packers’ practice squad before their promotions to the active roster.
- Three other seventh-round draft choices — Mark Tauscher (T), William Whitticker (G) and Donald Driver (WR) — play important starting roles on the Packers’ offense.
- So, of the Packers’ 22 starters, as many as half were either undrafted, taken in the seventh round, or didn’t make the opening day roster their rookie year.
- 14 players are rookies, including potential starters Samkon Gado (RB), William Whitticker (G), Nick Collins (S) and Roy Manning (LB). Nearly half of the 53-man roster has two years or less of NFL experience.

**JOIN THE CLUB:** Brett Favre has thrown touchdowns to 39 players over his career, including Samkon Gado and Donald Lee this season. The 40th player could be Andrae Thurman, Vonta Leach or ReShard Lee.

► Counting overall receptions, on Nov. 13 at Atlanta Thurman became the 17th player to catch a pass from Favre this season. Never before has Favre completed passes to more teammates. Prior to 2005, Favre's single-season high was 16 in 1998.

**SPOTLIGHT RECEIVER:** During Brett Favre's 13-year-old starting streak, 76 players have caught at least one pass from the future Hall of Famer. You'd be hard-pressed, however, to find a more reliable receiver in that group than Donald Driver.

- ▶ A seventh-round draft choice in 1999, Driver has again shrugged off extra on-field attention created by injuries — this year to Javon Walker and Robert Ferguson — to rank among the league's leading receivers (56 catches, 794 yards).
- ▶ And Nov. 27 at Philadelphia, Driver joined exclusive company. He extended his streak of games with a reception to 59 and surpassed the third-longest stretch in Packers history (Hall of Famer James Lofton). Next up is current running backs coach Edgar Bennett (60) and all-time leader Sterling Sharpe (103).
- ▶ The last time Driver did not catch a pass was Dec. 30, 2001, vs. Minnesota. Driver did, however, score his only career rushing touchdown that day.
- ▶ Driver also stands just one catch from 300 career (all in a Packers uniform). The team's all-time leaders in receptions:

**SPEAKING OF DRIVER:** The receiver Nov. 13 made 2005 his fourth career 50-reception season. Only four other players in team history (James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe with seven, and Antonio Freeman and Ahman Green with six) have as many.

- ▶ Driver also is attempting to become only the fourth player in Packers history with three career 1,000-yard receiving seasons. He would join James Lofton (5), Sterling Sharpe (5) and Antonio Freeman (3).

**LONGWELL SOLID FROM LONG RANGE:** In a 33-25 win at Atlanta Nov. 13, Ryan Longwell for the first time in his career hit multiple field goals of at least 50 yards. In one game, the veteran nailed more 50-yarders than he had during every season of his career except 2000 (three) and 2004 (two).

- ▶ This season, Longwell has established a career-best with four field goals from that distance, edging his 2000 best. He's hit four of five from 50-plus this season.
- ▶ With 13 career field goals of 50-plus yards, Longwell stands four behind franchise leader Chris Jacke (17). Longwell needs two more this year to match Jacke's single-season record, six in 1993.

**ANOTHER STARTING RB:** With Tony Fisher inactive Nov. 6 and Nov. 13, the Packers have started five running backs. Ahman Green (quadriceps tendon) and Najeh Davenport (broken ankle) are both on injured reserve. Fisher sustained a freak rib injury Oct. 30 at Cincinnati. Samkon Gado was starter No. 5 Nov. 13 at Atlanta, following ReShard Lee's starting debut Nov. 6 vs. Pittsburgh.

- ▶ The last time Green Bay started as many as four backs in a season was 1998, when Dorsey Levens (4), Raymont Harris (3), Travis Jervey (5) and Darick Holmes (4) drew starting assignments.

**THIRD-DOWN DEFENSE:** The Packers' defense against Pittsburgh Nov. 6 gave up just 13 points, 213 total yards and zero third-down conversions (0-for-8). The last time the Packers did not allow an opponent to convert on third down was Dec. 20, 1997, when Green Bay held Buffalo to 0-for-12 in a 31-21 win.

- ▶ Actually, the Packers didn't allow a third-down conversion over six full quarters, since the first half at Cincinnati Oct. 30. The streak (0-for-14) ended on Atlanta's third possession Nov. 13, with about 5 minutes left in the first stanza.
- ▶ Opponents are 14-for-their-last-55 (25.5 percent) on third down.

**INJURIES:** Rest assured, no one in the Packers' building will use injuries as an excuse for losses, even though Green Bay players have missed 41 combined starts due to injury. The Packers' notable injuries to date in 2005:

**A GENERATION OF WINNING RECORDS:** Forgive Packers fans if they tend to come down harder on their team than fans in other cities. The club hasn't had a losing record since 1991. And, figuring that an entire generation of fans aren't old enough to remember 1991, the team's start is tough to swallow.



**UNANSWERED:** Lost in the aftermath of a heartbreaking loss Oct. 23 at Minnesota was the Packers' streak of 69 unanswered points (52 vs. New Orleans Oct. 9, and 17 at Minnesota).

- ▶ Elias Sports Bureau research indicates that the Packers' streak was the longest in the NFL since 2000.
- ▶ Tennessee was the last club to reach 69, scoring 76 unanswered points from Dec. 10 to Dec. 25, 2000. Also that year, Jacksonville put up 75 straight points from Nov. 26-Dec. 10.
- ▶ No NFC team had as long of a streak since Detroit also scored 69 nine years ago.

## WHAT TO LOOK FOR SUNDAY & IN COMING WEEKS —

### NICK BARNETT:

- ▶ With 141 tackles in just 11 games, is on pace to break the team record, since coaches first began recording tackles in 1975, 180 by Mike Douglass in 1981. From 1984-2004, the two highest totals for the club's leading tackler were 162 by Barnett in 2004 and 145 by Johnny Holland in 1993.

### DONALD DRIVER:

- ▶ With a catch, can extend his streak of games with a reception to 60 and tie the third-longest stretch in Packers history, held by current running backs coach Edgar Bennett (60). Next up would be all-time leader Sterling Sharpe (103).

### BRETT FAVRE:

- ▶ Needs one TD passes to extend his NFL-record streak of at least 20 TD passes to 12.
- ▶ Needs five touchdown passes to become the second in NFL history with 400, joining Dan Marino (420). Favre enters with 395 in 220 NFL games. Marino reached the landmark in his 227th contest.

# FAVRE RETURNS TO CHICAGO ON ANNIVERSARY OF 400-YARD GAME

Even in these days of monster numbers in the NFL's collective passing game, most notably those being amassed with great frequency by the highly productive Peyton Manning, the 400-yard passing performance is hardly commonplace.

For pertinent example, there has been only one such effort recorded in the first 12 weeks of the current season--covering nearly 200 games--that by the St. Louis Rams' Marc Bulger back in the fourth weekend of the campaign.

A performance of those majestic dimensions has been even more of a rarity in Packers history. In point of fact, there have been just three 400-yard passing performances in the team's 85-year annals, spanning 1,100-plus games--or an average of one for every 350 games they have played to date.

The first was recorded by Don Horn, a first-round draft selection (1967) who threw for 410 yards against the then St. Louis Cardinals in 1969 en route to a 45-28 victory in the Packers' regular season finale that season.

The second was fashioned by Lynn Dickey, considered to be the premier long passer in team history, who passed for what remains a club record 418 yards against Tampa Bay on October 12, 1980 in a contest which ended in a 14-14 overtime tie.

And the third, which is the focal point of this essay because of the related circumstances, was forged by none other than the Packers' resident field general, Brett Favre.

A feat he accomplished a dozen years ago this weekend--December 5, 1993--it is particularly pertinent at the moment because it came against the Bears in Chicago's venerable Soldier Field, where on Sunday the immemorial rivals collide for the 169th regular-season time in professional football's most storied rivalry--with Favre again at quarterback for the Green and Gold.

Then nearing the end of his first full season as the Packers' starting quarterback, Favre amassed 402 passing yards in a losing but record-setting venture against the Monsters of the Midway.

In the process, the freewheeling field general completed 36 of 54 attempts, thus establishing a club mark for the former, eclipsing the existing record of 35 completions, set by Dickey at Tampa Bay October 12, 1980, en route to his club-record, 418-yard production against the Buccaneers.

Unfortunately for Number 4 and the Green and Gold, the Packers left Soldier Field empty-handed on that occasion, falling to Mike Ditka's Bears, 30-17, in part because two interceptions and a Favre fumble were returned for three touchdowns by the Chicagoans along the way.

Favre, characteristically, did not celebrate his statistical accomplishment.

"The 400 yards means nothing," he asserted following the game. "They didn't stop us. We stopped ourselves."

The Packers' 466 yards in total offense--against the league's fifth-ranked defense--was the most in Coach Mike Holmgren's 28-game tenure.



Since that '93 loss in the Windy City, Favre has led the Packers to 10 consecutive wins in Soldier Field, plus a 2002 victory in the University of Illinois Stadium at Champaign, Ill., the year that Soldier Field was being renovated.

\* \* \*

Speaking of Packers "moments" in Soldier Field, two years after that 402-yard effort, Favre launched the longest completion in Packers annals, a 99-yard hookup with wide receiver Robert Brooks in Green Bay's season opener (September 11, 1995).

In addition to establishing a Packers record, the Favre-Brooks collaboration tied the NFL record for longest completion--one that obviously can never be broken.

\* \* \*

--Record Rivalry: With 168 regular-season encounters to date behind them, the Packers and Bears are "partners" in the most prolific rivalry in NFL history, having met more often than any other two teams in league annals.

The Bears--who still lead the series (84-78-6) despite Green Bay's 19-3 advantage over the past 11 seasons--also are involved in the second most prolific series in NFL history.

The Monsters of the Midway and the Detroit Lions have clashed on 152 occasions, the Bears having won 85 of those, the Lions 62 and there have been 5 ties.

Next up numerically are the New York Giants and Washington Redskins, who have met 145 times, followed by the Redskins and Philadelphia Eagles, who have squared off in 141 games.

Just for the record, the Giants lead their series with the Redskins, 82-59-4...and their series with the Eagles 74-65-2.

The Bears, incidentally, own a share of the oldest rivalry in NFL annals. They launched their series against the then Chicago (now Arizona) Cardinals in 1920, the year the league was founded as the American Professional Football Conference.

It, however, has not been a continuous series. The teams, for example, have met only 5 times in the last 15 years.

\* \* \*

--On the subject of numbers, there is one figure which underscores the intensity of the Packers-Bears rivalry beyond all others. After 84 years of competition and 168 games, only 99 points separate them.

The Bears have scored 2,847 points, the Packers 2,748 since they began skirmishing in 1921. The minuscule average differential? Just under six-tenths of one point per game.
