THIS WEEK'S NOTABLE STORYLINES:

- ▶ Brett Favre will play his 100th game at Lambeau Field, already a record for the legendary stadium.
- ▶ With his 400th TD pass on the horizon, Favre needs just 9 passing yards to reach 3,000 for a 14th season and break a tie for the NFL record with Dan Marino (13, 1984-92, 1994-95, 1997-98). Favre's 13 consecutive 3,000-yards seasons are already the league standard.
- ▶ At home, Green Bay has won 13 straight games over Detroit (14 including the 1994 playoffs). The 13-game streak is tied for the NFL's longest active stretch (Dallas over Arizona).
- ▶ Sunday marks the latest in the season the NFL has ever scheduled a prime-time game in Wisconsin. Previously, the latest was Dec. 8, 2002, a Sunday night contest vs. Minnesota. The early forecast calls for an overnight low of 25 degrees, light winds and a 30 percent chance of snow. The sun sets at 4:12 p.m. local time.
- ▶ Hoping to finish strong, the Packers kick off the final quarter of their season. Three of their final four are at home.



NATIONAL TELEVISION: ESPN, with play-by-play man Mike Patrick, color analysts Paul Maguire and Joe Theismann, sideline reporter Suzy Kolber, producer Jay Rothman and director Chip Dean, will air the game to a national cable audience.

- ▶ Per the NFL's continuing commitment to make every game available on free, over-the-air stations, two Wisconsin outlets will simulcast the contest to their respective markets: Green Bay's WFRV-TV (Ch. 5) and Milwaukee's WISN-TV (Ch. 12).
- ▶ Including preseason and postseason, this marks the 23rd time in the Packers' last 38 games that a network has assigned its 'A' crew, airing the contest to the largest possible national audience.

SPANISH TELEVISION: ESPN Deportes will produce the telecast, splitting off the main ESPN show with Spanish graphics and commentary. Alvaro Martin (play-by-play), Raul Allegre (analyst) and John Sutcliffe (sideline reporter) will call the action from Green Bay.

PACKERS RADIO: Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 62-station Packers Radio Network, with versatile Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler Larry McCarren (color). Spanning five states, the network covers 50 markets in the upper Midwest. The broadcast also is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on packers.com.

▶ Plus, NFL Sirius Radio subscribers can hear the game on Channel 127.

NATIONAL RADIO: CBS Radio Sports/Westwood One will air the game from Green Bay, with Joel Meyers (play-by-play), John Riggins (color) and Rick Walker (sideline). Tommy Tighe hosts pregame and halftime shows. Mike Eaby is the on-site producer.

13 STRAIGHT: Take away Green Bay's 1994 playoff win over Detroit, and the Packers' 13 straight regular-season home wins over the Lions ranks tied for first among active NFL streaks (Elias Sports Bureau):

▶ Earlier this season, Tampa Bay ended the Packers' 12-game winning streak over the Bucs in Wisconsin.

▶ Longest active streaks, consecutive home wins vs. a single opponent, regular season only:

- 13 *Dallas over Arizona
- 13 **Green Bay over Detroit**
- 12 *Pittsburgh over San Diego
- 11 Washington over Detroit

*—Arizona defeated Dallas at Texas Stadium in 1998 playoffs; San Diego defeated Pittsburgh at Three Rivers Stadium in 1994 playoffs.

NO. 1 AGAINST THE PASS: The Packers enter this week with the league's top-ranked passing defense, allowing on average only 167.6 net yards per game.

- ▶ Over the last two games, the Packers have given up only 137 net yards through the air (88 at Philadelphia, 49 at Chicago).
- ▶ The team has a legitimate shot at finishing the season first. Three of its final four games are in frigid Lambeau Field. And, entering this week, three of its final four opponents rank 25th or below in passing offense: Baltimore (25th), Detroit (26th) and Chicago (32nd).
- ▶ The last time Green Bay finished first against the pass was 1996, when it won Super Bowl XXXI.
- ▶ Under the leadership of Vince Lombardi, Green Bay ranked first in the NFL defending the pass for five consecutive seasons (1964-68). Over a longer stretch, over seven straight years, the Packers ranked no lower than second. They were first in 1962 and second in 1963.

30 POINTS: The Packers this season are 2-0 when reaching 30 points and 0-10 in the other contests.

- ▶ Over a longer stretch, the team has won eight consecutive games when reaching 30, and 13 of its last 14.
- ▶ Its only loss in that 14-game stretch was Sept. 26, 2004, a 45-31 shootout at Indianapolis.

ON DEFENSE: Green Bay has not allowed an offensive touchdown in six quarters. The last offensive player to reach the end zone was Brian Westbrook, who ran for a 33-yard touchdown on a one-play drive after a turnover, Nov. 27 at Philadelphia.

► Counting the previous game, Nov. 21 vs. Minnesota, the Packers have allowed one offensive TD in the past nine quarters, and two over their last 12.

IN THE RED ZONE: The Packers over their last five games have improved their red-zone defense from 28th in the NFL (entering Week 9) to ninth (entering this week).

- Before the Packers lined up against Pittsburgh Nov. 6, they were allowing touchdowns in the red zone at a 60-percent clip. Little more than a month later, Green Bay has dropped the number to 47.1 percent.
- Over the last five games, Green Bay has allowed just four TDs in 14 red-zone penetrations (28.6 percent). Nine of those drives ended in field goals and one with a fumble recovery.

ON THIRD DOWN: Green Bay's defense has not allowed a third-down conversion in 12 consecutive attempts, dating to Nov. 27 at Philadelphia. Chicago (0-for-10) did not convert against the Packers Sunday.

- Over a longer stretch on third down, opponents are 1-for-their-last-19 and 2-for-their-last-24.
- In their last five-plus games, including an 0-for-8 performance vs. Pittsburgh Nov. 6, the Packers have allowed only 14 conversions in opponents' last 65 attempts (21.5 percent).
- Before this season, the last time the Packers did not allow an opponent to convert on third down was Dec. 20, 1997, when Green Bay held Buffalo to 0-for-12 in a 31-21 win (continued on next page).

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program of the "Acme" Packers from 1921-24.

COACHES CAPSULES

Mike Sherman: 57-41-0, .582, sixth NFL season, sixth with Packers

Dick Jauron: 35-47-0, .427, sixth NFL season, first with Lions

Head to Head: Sherman 7-1 vs. Jauron

vs. Opponent: Sherman 8-3 vs. Lions; Jauron 2-8 vs. Packers

MIKE SHERMAN...Is in his sixth year as the Packers' 13th head coach.

- Overcame several hurdles each of the past three seasons to win a trio of NFC North titles.
- Since the 1993 collective bargaining agreement, teams have made nearly 90 coaching changes and only Sherman's tenure has produced winning records in each of its first five seasons.
- Over their first five regular seasons as an NFL coach, since 1970 only Chuck Knox, George Seifert, Joe Gibbs and Mike Ditka produced better records than Sherman (53-27, .663).
- In 2004, his team became only the ninth in NFL history to reach the playoffs after a 1-4 start.
- Has led the Packers to three straight division titles and four consecutive playoff appearances.
- Is 6-1 against teams in the Super Bowl the previous season.

DICK JAURON...Named Lions interim head coach Nov. 28.

- Named Detroit defensive coordinator in 2004 after five seasons as head coach of the Chicago Bears.
- Earned 2001 *Associated Press* Coach of the Year after leading Chicago to its first division title since 1990 and a 13-3 record. Two of the Bears' losses that year were to Green Bay.
- From 1995-98, served as defensive coordinator in Jacksonville, where the Jaguars appeared in the playoffs three times, including the 1996 AFC Championship.
- Also coached defensive backs for both the Buffalo Bills (1985) and Green Bay Packers (1986-94).
- Selected in the fourth round of the 1973 NFL Draft by Detroit, he played five seasons for the Lions. Started at free safety as a rookie and went to the Pro Bowl one year later after leading the NFC in punt-return average (16.8).

THE LIONS-PACKERS SERIES: No other NFL teams have played every year since 1932, when the Packers first met the Lions, then known as the Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans. This week marks Game No. 151 in the venerable series. Green Bay has won eight of the last 10 meetings, and nine of the last 12.

- The Packers have won 14 consecutive contests over Detroit in Wisconsin, including the '94 playoffs. The streak includes five Lions head coaches: Wayne Fontes (1992-96), Bobby Ross (1997-99), Gary Moeller (2000), Marty Mornhinweg (2001-02) and Steve Mariucci (2003-04).
- The Packers have scored more points against the Detroit franchise than any opponent (3,083).
- Before the '03 Thanksgiving loss at Detroit, the Packers had won six straight over Detroit, the longest series winning streak by either team since Detroit won 11 straight from 1949-54.
- Brett Favre in 27 regular-season games against Detroit is 18-9.





NOTABLE CONNECTIONS... Detroit LBs Nate Wayne and Donté Curry, and WR Scottie Vines, all played previously for Green Bay... Jauron coached with Ray Rhodes, Jon Gruden and Andy Reid under Mike Holmgren in Green Bay during the 1990s... Defensive line coach Larry Brooks and special teams coach Chuck Priefer were previously assistants on Green Bay staffs... Linebackers coach Johnny Holland played and coached for the Packers... Green Bay DT Colin Cole spent one week on Detroit's 53-man roster in 2003, and all of the 2004 preseason with the Lions... Offensive coordinator Ted Tollner coached Packers DE Kabere Gbaja-Biamila at San Diego State... The Packers mined several players from the state of Michigan, seventh-round pick William Whitticker (Michigan State), rookie free agent Roy Manning (Michigan), 2003 undrafted free agent Cullen Jenkins (Central Michigan) and newly acquired RB Noah Herron (Mattawan, Mich.).

LAST MEETING, GREEN BAY: Dec. 12, 2004, Lambeau Field; Packers won, 16-13:

- ▶ Ryan Longwell kicked a 23-yard field goal with two seconds left, moving the Packers (8-5) into first place in the NFC North by a game over Minnesota, which lost at home to Seattle. It was his third game-winning kick in five weeks.
- ▶ Trailing 13-0 at half, Brett Favre led Green Bay back with four scoring drives, including a 90-yard march into the wind for the Packers' only touchdown (after Ahman Green's 79-yard TD catch was negated by a debatable holding call on rookie center Scott Wells). Favre, who moved to 14-0 at home against the Lions, hit just 3 of 15 passes for 28 yards before intermission but went 16-for-21 for 160 yards and a TD in the second half.
- ▶ Snow flurries turned the field into what Longwell called a "swampy mess" and swirling winds with gusts up to 35 mph wreaked havoc on passes and punts.
- ▶ Longwell's decisive kick came after the Packers got the ball back at the Detroit 42 with 3:27 left and the wind at their backs.

LAST MEETING (AP): Sept. 11, 2005, Ford Field, Lions won, 17-3:

- ▶ The Lions capitalized on 14 Packers penalties and three turnovers, and Joey Harrington threw two touchdown passes, including one to rookie Mike Williams with 4:13 left, in a season-opening win.
- ▶ The game marked the fewest points Green Bay scored with Brett Favre as its starting quarterback. Tampa Bay beat the Packers 31-3 on Sept. 13, 1992, two weeks before Favre began his record streak of starting 226 consecutive games, including the playoffs. The Packers were shut out of the end zone for the first time since Sept. 17, 2000, ending a franchise-record 77-game streak, the longest in the NFL at the time.
- ▶ Favre fumbled on the opening possession of the second half, leading to Jason Hanson's 21-yard field goal. His interception midway through the fourth quarter, snagged by a diving Kenoy Kennedy, whose fumble was caught by teammate Holt, led to Williams' 3-yard TD catch. Then Green Bay drove to Detroit's 12 before Favre was sacked twice and suffered his second interception.
- ▶ Among Green Bay's 14 penalties (its most since Nov. 1, 1987), four offensive flags wiped out 75 yards in gains, including a 55-yard play in which Javon Walker was called for pass interference, two third-down defensive flags kept crucial Lions drives alive, and one special-teams whistle erased a 47-yard Antonio Chatman punt return. Ahman Green was held to 58 yards rushing, but penalties wiped out 32 yards. Cornerback Ahmad Carroll was flagged for illegal use of hands three times, including twice on one drive.
- ▶ In a game expected to be high-scoring, both teams struggled offensively. Green Bay's offense took a hit when Walker, Favre's favorite target, injured his right knee in the third quarter on the 55-yard catch in which he was penalized. An MRI the next day confirmed a torn anterior cruciate ligament, ending Walker's season before it really had a chance to start.
- ▶ Green Bay got to the Lions' 4 on the ensuing drive, but trouble with the snap aborted a field-goal attempt. On the Packers' next possession, Ryan Longwell kicked a 50-yard field goal (his 10th career of 50-plus).

- ▶ Earlier, the Packers didn't allow a third-down conversion over six full quarters, since the first half at Cincinnati Oct. 30. The streak (0-for-14) ended on Atlanta's third possession Nov. 13, with about 5 minutes left in the first stanza.

SUNDAY NIGHT: *Sunday Night Football* became a reality in 1987, when ESPN purchased rights to launch the prime-time series. A landmark in television history, it was the NFL's debut on the cable medium.

- ▶ From 1987-97, for 11 years, ESPN held the Sunday night slot for only the last half of each season. In 1998, the network began airing Sunday night games exclusively, virtually every week.
- ▶ TNT held rights to air Sunday night games, mostly over the first half of each season from 1990-97.
- ▶ ESPN aired its 200th broadcast late in 2003.
- ▶ Since it began in 1987, *Sunday Night Football* has annually finished as the highest-rated series on ad-supported cable (excluding premium networks, such as HBO, etc.).
- ▶ The Packers own a **seven-game winning streak** in Sunday night games. Green Bay's first franchise win on a Sunday night came in 1992 on the road against the Houston Oilers. Since its first appearance in the time slot 13 years ago, the team owns the league's best mark, 11-2-0, .846.

LAMBEAU & FAVRE REACH NO. 100: Future Hall of Famer Brett Favre on Sunday will play his 100th regular-season game in the league's most historic venue, Lambeau Field. The stadium's all-time list of most games:

AGAINST DICK JAURON: The Packers this week meet Dick Jauron for the first time since he coached the Chicago Bears from 1999-2003.

- ▶ Overall against Jauron, who coached the Packers defensive backs from 1988-94, are 8-2.
- ▶ Green Bay has won seven straight over Jauron and eight of their last nine.

DEC. 1 AND LATER: Mike Sherman is 20-5 (.800) in six career seasons (2000-05) Dec. 1 and later. One of the prime contributors to that record? Turnover ratio. Green Bay is plus-26 in 25 regular-season games under Sherman Dec. 1 and later.

ROSTER MOVE: The Packers on Monday reached an injury settlement with RB ReShard Lee and waived him from injured reserve.

AVENGING DIVISION LOSSES: The Packers under Mike Sherman are 8-1 with an opportunity to avenge a division loss from earlier in the season. This week the team will attempt to repay Detroit for a 17-3 loss in the Sept. 11 season opener at Ford Field. Sherman's Packers had been 8-0 until Nov. 21, when Green Bay failed to answer an earlier loss at Minnesota with a victory. The list:

ONLY REGGIE WHITE REMAINS: Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila on Dec. 4 at Chicago surpassed No. 2 Tim Harris (55) on the Packers' all-time sacks list. With 55½ career sacks, he stands just 13 from tying Reggie White's franchise record, 68½.

BETWEEN THE YARD LINES: Postgame notes and numbers not necessarily in the boxscore from Sunday's 19-7 loss at Chicago:

- Green Bay's 26 overall first downs, 19 passing first downs, 358 total yards, 258 net passing yards were all season highs by a Chicago opponent. The Bears' defense remains ranked No. 1 overall.
- Offensive penalties wiped out two first downs and 33 yards in potential gains, off-setting a spirited Packers effort against the league's No. 1 defense. A tough holding call on WR Donald Driver erased a 23-yard run by Samkon Gado in the first quarter that would've given Green Bay possession at the Bears' 20.
- Brett Favre's 58 attempts were the second most in his career. He had 61 vs. San Francisco on Oct. 14, 1996.
- Tony Fisher established a career best with seven catches, one better than the six he had earlier this year, Oct. 9 vs. New Orleans.
- TE Bubba Franks has gone two consecutive games without a catch, the longest stretch of his career. He departed each of the last two contests in the first half due to injury.
- Chicago had 140 yards on interception returns as a defense. The Bears

had 68 gross passing yards as an offense.

- Al Harris and the Packers' defense held Chicago's leading receiver, Mushin Muhammad, without a catch. Green Bay ended Muhammad's 47-game reception streak (51 including playoffs).
- All eight of Donald Driver's receptions were for first-down yardage.
- Michael Montgomery recorded his first career sack.
- Of the Packers' 31 turnovers this year, 18 have come in opponent territory, including three of their four at Chicago Sunday. Five this season have come inside the enemy's 10-yard line.

FRANKS & POLLARD SQUARE OFF: In a battle of tight ends that will preview their teams' contest at Lambeau Field, the Packers' Bubba Franks will compete against the Lions' Marcus Pollard today in a Salvation Army kettle contest.

- In a similar 2002 contest, Franks "out rang" the Minnesota Vikings' Byron Chamberlain while raising nearly \$2,000 during his one hour of ringing.

EAGLES RETIRE NO. 92: The Philadelphia Eagles at halftime of their game Monday vs. Seattle formally removed No. 92, worn in Philadelphia by Reggie White from 1985-92, from circulation.

- ▶ White became the first player in NFL history to have his number retired by more than one team. The Packers, who had made plans to retire his number before White's tragic death last Dec. 26, did so Sept. 18 vs. Cleveland.
- ▶ In addition, the University of Tennessee on Oct. 1 vs. Mississippi, retired White's 92. The school chose to honor White as the first former football player to have his number retired in more than 60 years.
- ▶ Other than Jackie Robinson and Wayne Gretzky, White is believed to be the first athlete in sports history to have his number retired by three teams in the same year (Philadelphia Eagles, Green Bay Packers, Tennessee Volunteers).

IN GADO WE TRUST: The Packers are 27-4 since 2000 with a 100-yard rusher, 16-3 at home and 11-1 on the road. Samkon Gado Nov. 13 at Atlanta became the first Green Bay rookie to top 100 yards rushing since De'Mond Parker, Dec. 5, 1999, at Chicago (113 yards on 19 carries). Prior to Parker, the last rookie to do it was Gado's position coach, Edgar Bennett (in 1992).

- ▶ However, Gado is the team's first nondrafted rookie to reach the mark since Kevin Wilhite (16-100), Oct. 18, 1987, vs. Philadelphia.
- ▶ Before Gado, the last Packers rookie with multiple 100-yard games was John Brockington, who had four such efforts in 1971.
- ▶ In Packers history, 42 players now have rushed for 100 yards. The franchise has 160 such individual efforts.

ROOKIE RUSHING RECORDS: Dre Barnes and Eugene Goodman. Those were the two running backs at Liberty University *ahead* of Samkon Gado on the depth chart last season. One year later, Gado needs just one rushing touchdown to *surpass* the most ever by a Packers rookie. Gado also is within reach of ranking among all-time leaders in other single-season rookie rushing categories:

- ▶ Wisconsin will face Ohio State at 3 p.m., Feb. 11, in the Frozen Tundra Hockey Classic, Lambeau Field's first hockey offering. The game also will serve as the U.S. Hockey Hall of Fame Game, with a portion of the proceeds supporting the Hall of Fame.
- ▶ Tickets are available and can be purchased online, by phone or in person. For more information, log onto www.packers.com. Prices are as follows for the stadium bowl: \$24 for adults, \$16 for students (including college), \$14 for children (under 12). Indoor and outdoor club seats are \$45 for all ages. A Lambeau Field Atrium 'Tailgate Party Package' is available by contacting the Packers' special events department at 920/569-7136.

FIELD POSITION: The Packers are 2-0 this season with better average field position than their opponents. Green Bay is 0-10 in the other contests.

- ▶ Turnovers and voids in the kickoff-return role, created by injuries to Najeh Davenport, Terrence Murphy and Robert Ferguson, have combined to consistently give opponents a short field this year.

PADDING ANOTHER NFL RECORD: Brett Favre needs one TD pass to extend his NFL-record streak of consecutive 20-TD-pass seasons to 12.

THE NINTH LOSS: The Packers at Philadelphia Nov. 27 sustained their ninth loss, ensuring that they will finish with their first losing record since 1991. The loss ended the NFL's longest streak of non-losing seasons, a stretch that was tied for eighth in league history. From 1992-2004, the Packers' lowest winning percentage was .500, an 8-8 finish in 1999.

- ▶ To put the Packers' 13-year streak in perspective during the current era of parity, unrestricted free agency and the salary cap, consider that Denver now inherits the NFL's longest active streak of .500 or better records, only six seasons (2000-05). Philadelphia needs three more wins in its final five games to also extend its current streak to six.

OVERSHADOWED: Packers defensive end Aaron Kampman is having a career season, probably worthy of a Pro Bowl, but many of his contributions are likely lost in the team's 2-10 record.

- ▶ Kampman had three forced fumbles in two games, Nov. 21-27.
- ▶ The fourth-year lineman on Nov. 21 vs. Minnesota recorded eight tackles, three sacks, two forced fumbles and one pass broken up.
- ▶ Elias Sports Bureau reviewed film of a first-quarter play that night originally ruled a team sack because Brad Johnson appeared to have fumbled without Packers contact. However, a closer look at the play showed Kampman's hand on Johnson's arm.
- ▶ Kampman has established his single-season best with 6.5 sacks on the year. His previous best was 4.5 last season.
- ▶ And, with 76 tackles through 12 games, he's on pace for 101, which would shatter the team record by a defensive lineman. Most tackles ever by a Packers lineman (recorded from 1975-2004):

REGGIE TAKES ANOTHER STEP: Former Dallas Cowboys quarterback Troy Aikman and perennial All-Pro defensive end Reggie White are among the six first-year eligible players who head the list of 25 semifinalists for the Pro Football Hall of Fame's Class of 2006, the Hall announced in Canton Nov. 22. The Hall of Fame's Board of Selectors chose the 25 semifinalists from the recently announced list of 112 preliminary nominees.

- ▶ The list of 25 semifinalists will be reduced by mail ballot to 13 modern-era candidates. That list will then increase to 15 finalist nominees with the inclusion of the two recommended candidates of the Hall of Fame's Seniors Committee. This year's Seniors Committee nominees, who were announced in August, are former Oakland Raiders coach John Madden, and Cowboys tackle Rayfield Wright. The Seniors Committee reviews the qualifications of those players, coaches and contributors whose careers took place more than 25 years ago. The list of 15 finalists for the Class of 2006 will be announced in mid-January.
- ▶ To be considered for election to the Pro Football Hall of Fame, a nominated player must have been retired at least five years. For a non-player, there is not a mandatory retirement period, but a coach must be retired before he may be considered. A contributor, who is a nominee who has made outstanding contributions to pro football in capacities other than playing and coaching, may still be active in his pro football career.
- ▶ The Class of 2006 will be determined at the Selection Committee's annual meeting on Saturday, Feb. 4, 2006, in Detroit (the day before Super

WALK-OFF FIELD GOALS: Green Bay and Minnesota have decided their last four regular-season games with a field goal at the end of the fourth quarter.

NOT UP FOR THE CHALLENGE: Opponent head coaches in 2005 are 0-for-5 on instant-replay challenges, and 0-for-their-last-6 dating to last year. Jack Del Rio was the last coach to successfully challenge a call, taking an interception and touchdown away from Darren Sharper, Dec. 19, 2004, vs. Jacksonville. Over a longer stretch, opponents are 1-for-their-last-8.

LONGWELL IN THE FINAL STANZA: Ryan Longwell in the fourth quarter has hit 13 of his last 14 field goals. His only fourth-quarter miss during the stretch, which includes playoffs dating to the 2003 postseason, came Oct. 23 at Minnesota.

PLENTY OF KINETIC ENERGY: Including Noah Herron, 14 rookies have played this season for Green Bay. Breaking down the current 53-man roster entering this week:

JOIN THE CLUB: Brett Favre has thrown touchdowns to 39 players over his career, including Samkon Gado and Donald Lee this season. The 40th player could be Andrae Thurman, Vonta Leach or Noah Herron.

- ▶ Counting overall receptions, on Nov. 13 at Atlanta Thurman became the 17th player to catch a pass from Favre this season. Never before has Favre completed passes to more teammates. Prior to 2005, Favre's single-season high was 16 in 1998.

SPOTLIGHT RECEIVER: During Brett Favre's 13-year-old starting streak, 76 players have caught at least one pass from the future Hall of Famer. You'd be hard-pressed, however, to find a more reliable receiver in that group than Donald Driver.

- ▶ A seventh-round draft choice in 1999, Driver has again shrugged off extra on-field attention created by injuries — this year to Javon Walker and Robert Ferguson — to rank among the league's leading receivers (67 catches, 908 yards).
- ▶ And Dec. 4 at Chicago, Driver joined exclusive company. He extended his streak of games with a reception to 60 and tied the second-longest stretch in Packers history (current running backs coach Edgar Bennett (60). Next up is all-time leader Sterling Sharpe (103).
- ▶ The last time Driver did not catch a pass was Dec. 30, 2001, vs. Minnesota. Driver did, however, score his only career rushing touchdown that day.

SPEAKING OF DRIVER: The receiver Nov. 13 made 2005 his fourth career 50-reception season. Only four other players in team history (James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe with seven, and Antonio Freeman and Ahman Green with six) have as many.

▶ Driver also is attempting to become only the fourth player in Packers history with three career 1,000-yard receiving seasons. **With only 92 more yards**, he would join James Lofton (5), Sterling Sharpe (5) and Antonio Freeman (3).

LONGWELL SOLID FROM LONG RANGE: In a 33-25 win at Atlanta Nov. 13, Ryan Longwell for the first time in his career hit multiple field goals of at least 50 yards. In one game, the veteran nailed more 50-yarders than he had during every season of his career except 2000 (three) and 2004 (two).

▶ This season, Longwell has established a career-best with four field goals from that distance, edging his 2000 best. He's hit four of five from 50-plus this season.

▶ With 13 career field goals of 50-plus yards, Longwell stands four behind franchise leader Chris Jacke (17). Longwell needs two more this year to match Jacke's single-season record, six in 1993.

ANOTHER STARTING RB: With Tony Fisher inactive Nov. 6 and Nov. 13, the Packers have started five running backs. Ahman Green (quadriceps tendon) and Najeh Davenport (broken ankle) are both on injured reserve. Fisher sustained a freak rib injury Oct. 30 at Cincinnati. Samkon Gado was starter No. 5 Nov. 13 at Atlanta, following ReShard Lee's starting debut Nov. 6 vs. Pittsburgh.

▶ The last time Green Bay started as many as four backs in a season was 1998, when Dorsey Levens (4), Raymont Harris (3), Travis Jervey (5) and Darick Holmes (4) drew starting assignments.

UNANSWERED: Lost in the aftermath of a heartbreaking loss Oct. 23 at Minnesota was the Packers' streak of 69 unanswered points (52 vs. New Orleans Oct. 9, and 17 at Minnesota).

▶ Elias Sports Bureau research indicates that the Packers' streak was the longest in the NFL since 2000.

▶ Tennessee was the last club to reach 69, scoring 76 unanswered points from Dec. 10 to Dec. 25, 2000. Also that year, Jacksonville put up 75 straight points from Nov. 26-Dec. 10.

▶ No NFC team had as long of a streak since Detroit also scored 69 nine years ago.

A GENERATION OF WINNING RECORDS: Forgive Packers fans if they tend to come down harder on their team than fans in other cities. The club hasn't had a losing record since 1991. And, figuring that an entire generation of fans aren't old enough to remember 1991, the team's start is tough to swallow.

PACKERS REMAIN AMERICA'S TEAM: For the fourth straight season, a Harris poll has dubbed Green Bay the league's most popular football team. The company in early September surveyed 2,242 adults who say they follow pro football, and asked them to name their two favorite football teams. The Dallas Cowboys finished second in the poll.



WHAT TO LOOK FOR SUNDAY & IN COMING WEEKS —

NICK BARNETT:

- ▶ With 151 tackles in just 12 games, is on pace for 201. Since coaches first began recording tackles in 1975, the team record is 180 by Mike Douglass in 1981. From 1984-2004, the two highest totals for the club's leading tackler were 162 by Barnett in 2004 and 145 by Johnny Holland in 1993.

ANTONIO CHATMAN:

- ▶ Needs one punt return to surpass No. 2 Al Carmichael and Phillip Epps (100) on the team's all-time list. Chatman enters with 100 career punt returns, all in a Packers uniform. The franchise leader is Hall of Famer Willie Wood, who racked up 187 from 1960-71.
- ▶ Needs 14 punt-return yards to surpass No. 4 Phillip Epps (819) and 29 to surpass No. 3 Billy Grimes (834) on the all-time list. Chatman enters with 806.

DONALD DRIVER:

- ▶ With a catch, can extend his streak of games with a reception to 61 and surpass the second-longest stretch in Packers history, held by current running backs coach Edgar Bennett (60). Next up would be all-time leader Sterling Sharpe (103).
- ▶ Needs 92 receiving yards to become only the fourth player in Packers history with three career 1,000-yard receiving seasons. He would join James Lofton (5), Sterling Sharpe (5) and Antonio Freeman (3).

BRETT FAVRE:

- ▶ Needs one TD pass to extend his NFL-record streak of at least 20 TD passes to 12.
- ▶ Needs five touchdown passes to become the second in NFL history with 400, joining Dan Marino (420). Favre enters with 395 in 220 NFL games. Marino reached the landmark in his 227th contest.
- ▶ Needs 9 yards passing to reach 3,000 for a 14th season and break a tie for the NFL record with Dan Marino (13, 1984-92, 1994-95, 1997-98). Favre's 13 *consecutive* 3,000-yard seasons are already the league standard.
- ▶ Including playoffs, Favre has 47 career 300-yard passing games and needs three for 50.

BUBBA FRANKS:

- ▶ Needs 64 receiving yards for 2,000 career. He enters with 1,936.

SAMKON GADO: On the Packers' all-time rookie rushing list:

- ▶ Needs one carry to surpass No. 5 Bob Monnett (108 in 1933) and seven to surpass No. 4 Kenneth Davis (114 in 1986). Gado enters with 108 carries.
- ▶ Needs 48 yards rushing to surpass No. 5 Bob Monnett (413 in 1933) and 80 to surpass No. 4 Cecil Isbell (445 in 1938). Gado (2) is already the only rookie other than John Brockington (3 in 1971) with multiple 100-yard games.
- ▶ Needs one rushing TD to take sole possession of the rookie record. Gado (five) currently shares the mark with Brent Fullwood (1987) and Gerry Ellis (1985).

AL HARRIS:

- ▶ Needs two passes defended for 100 career. Harris, who owns a team-leading 14 on the year, enters with 98.

AARON KAMPMAN:

- ▶ Needs one tackle to match his 2004 career high (77) and 11 to establish the team record by a defensive lineman, surpassing Ezra Johnson's 86 in 1983. Kampman enters with 76 stops.



BACK-TO-BACK PLAYOFF SHOWDOWNS HIGHLIGHT 150-GAME RIVALRY

As might be expected in a venerable rivalry which has spanned 75 years and 150 games, the Packers and the Detroit Lions have conspired to spawn some of the most memorable moments in the history of professional football.

Take, for example, their initial Thanksgiving Day meeting in 1951, a contest which saw the Lions prevail 52-35 in what remains the highest scoring Thanksgiving Day contest (87 points) in the annals of the holiday series dating back to 1934.

Or their 1945 meeting at State Fair Park in Milwaukee, when the Packers scored 41 consecutive unanswered points in the second quarter—29 of them by the fabled Don Hutson—to set what still is an NFL record for the most points ever scored by one team in one quarter of an NFL game—a record that has been tied (once) but never broken.

Or, of painful memory for the Green and Gold, their 1962 Thanksgiving Day encounter in Detroit's Briggs Stadium, one which saw the Lions deal the 10-0 Packers their only defeat in what became a 13-1 season for a team subsequently acclaimed as the greatest in the organization's history.

But for the neighborhood rivals—who Sunday night clash for the 151st time—the series may have been most dramatically punctuated by back-to-back Wild Card playoff confrontations following the 1993 and 1994 seasons.

In the first of these, played at the Pontiac, Mich., Silverdome (the Lions' former home) on Jan. 8, 1994, the Green and Gold came from behind to shade Detroit, 28-24, by way of a Brett Favre touchdown pass to wide receiver Sterling Sharpe with only 55 seconds remaining.

Although Favre has unleashed and completed hundreds of additional passes in the 11-year interim, his throw under those critical circumstances has to rank among the most remarkable of his Hall of Fame career.

A scrambling, cross-the-body strike from extreme left to extreme right, Favre's 40-yard missile found Sharpe wide open in the end zone, capping a see-saw struggle with the NFC Central Division champion Lions.

Earlier, in the third quarter, rookie safety George Teague had weighed in with a record-breaking heroic, returning an Erik Kramer interception 101 yards for a touchdown, the longest such runback in NFL postseason annals, thus providing Green Bay with a 21-17 lead.

Sharpe likewise invaded the record book that afternoon, equaling an NFL record with three touchdown receptions among five catches for 101 yards.

En route, Detroit's Barry Sanders—returning to action from a knee injury—enlivened the Silverdome crowd of 68,479 with 169 yards rushing in 27 attempts, a 6.3-yard average.

It was an entirely different playoff just a year later (Dec. 31, 1994)—this one in Lambeau Field.

On that occasion, the Packers carried the day with one of the premier defensive performances in the postseason history of professional football.



Playing their first home playoff game since 1982, they smothered Detroit from start to finish and mustered sufficient offense en route to forge a 16-12 victory.

Coordinator Fritz Shurmur presided over a stifling defense that limited the NFL's leading rusher, Barry Sanders, to a career-low minus 1-yard in 13 attempts and restricted the Lions collectively to minus-4 yards, an NFL playoff record.

Meanwhile, quarterback Brett Favre directed several long drives, among them a 76-yard march on the game's opening series, climaxed by a 3-yard touchdown run by Dorsey Levens.

Controlling the ball for 37-plus minutes overall, the Packers complemented the classic defensive performance by playing turnover-free football throughout before 58,125 fans, at the time a Lambeau Field playoff record attendance.

Placekicker Chris Jacke contributed three field goals to the cause, including a 51-yarder which also set a Packers postseason record.

The Packers faithful endured some anxious moments when the Lions closed to within 13-10 in the fourth quarter on Dave Krieg's 3-yard touchdown pass to Brett Perriman and subsequently reached Green Bay's 11-yard-line on their final drive in the game's closing moments.

But the Packers' defense tightened, regaining possession on downs, before punter Craig Hentrich took an intentional safety in the end zone to run out the game's final seven seconds.

Shurmur, in tribute to his platoon, said, "I've been around a lot of great defensive performances in my career but none any better than this one, considering it was against probably the greatest player—at his position—to ever play the game."

Linebacker Bryce Paup emerged from the record effort as the statistical leader of the Packers' defense with seven tackles, five of them unassisted, cornerback Doug Evans and free safety LeRoy Butler each weighing in with six stops.

The redoubtable Sanders subsequently retired following the 1998 season as the second-ranking rusher in pro football history (15,269 yards).

Technically, Sunday night's contest will mark the 145th meeting between the Packers and the Detroit franchise. The league dates the series origin to 1930, when the team was founded as the Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans. The Spartans, Packers opponents in six games from 1930 through 1933, were sold to G. A. "Dick" Richards prior to the 1934 season and moved to Detroit.
