2006 NFL DRAFT

THOMPSON PREPARES FOR SECOND PACKERS DRAFT: Ted Thompson doesn't want history to remember him the way fans remember Harry Glickman.

- ► Faced with a Top 5 draft selection, each general manager Thompson and Glickman — was given a choice: Draft for obvious need or take the best player available, regardless of position?
- Twenty-two years ago. Glickman assessed his roster, reviewed trusted feedback from his scouting and personnel staffs, and came to a highly logical conclusion. The team had an obvious void in the middle of its lineup. Plus, it already had all-stars at the position in which the best player available happened to play. So, with the No. 2 overall pick, Glickman drafted for need.
- ► He drafted Sam Bowie and passed on Michael Jordan.
- ► Like the Portland Trailblazers in 1984, the Packers in 2006 have obvious starters at assorted positions, and obvious needs at others. But while Thompson may not uncover a five-time MVP destined to lead his club to six world championships, rest assured, Thompson believes in drafting the best player available.
- "You have to do what you think is best for the organization." Thompson said. "You have to take the best player available. And I think history will bear me out in that when you stray from that, that's when you make mistakes."

A WEEKEND TO SOLIDIFY THE FOUNDATION: Ted Thompson, a former NFL linebacker, serves as the engineer for a seventh NFL draft this week. And to Thompson, the 18 hours in which teams are on the clock Saturday and Sunday represent the 18 most important hours of the league year.

- ▶ Are the Packers in rebuilding mode? Every NFL team who believes that its nucleus is built on draft weekend is in rebuilding mode.
- ► While every team approaches the draft as an opportunity to land impact players. Thompson heads into the weekend looking to build depth, too. The Packers set a goal to develop depth because, in the era of free agency and the salary cap, starter turnover happens every year.
- The search for players who not only fit, but also can contribute, is a neverending process.

CLASS OF 2005 PLAYERS, WHERE ARE THEY NOW?: Well, they're in the Lambeau Field weight room.

- Many fans wonder how their financial support of the Lambeau Field businesses can help the team win. One example is the \$200,000 in which new strength and conditioning coach Rock Gullickson recently received to renovate the stadium's weight room.
- ► The result is record attendance in the Packers' offseason workout program. averaging numbers in the 50s. Red Batty's equipment staff has put in more hours than any previous offseason in keeping up a locker room that many have observed feels like it's in regular-season mode. That's because there aren't just more players, they're showing up earlier, too, some as early as 6:45 a.m.
- ▶ And of the nine players still on the roster who were drafted in 2005, all nine have been active in the program, including first-round choice Aaron Rodgers, starting free safety Nick Collins and starting guard William Whitticker.
- ▶ The team will never stop developing young players. One year from now, the draft class of 2006 will be working up to and through draft weekend, thanks to a big assist from the team's fans and stockholders.

THEY HAVE TO GET AN ANSWER FROM BRETT, RIGHT?: Actually, no. Before Brett Favre and after Brett Favre, Thompson always has and always will view the draft as a tool to build for the future more than the present. Therefore, he honestly feels fine entering the draft without knowing whether the future Hall of Fame quarterback will be under center Sept. 10. That unknown will not affect the Packers' decisions this week.

- ► "I don't think it can or it should," Thompson said. "Now, you might think about it, but the draft as I've said before, it's a long-term thing. It's a long-term process for your organization. It's an investment in the future and I don't think you can look at it from a short-term point of view. You have to look at it from a long-term point of view.
- ▶ "The way I look at this is, Brett is an outstanding player. We want him to be our quarterback. There will come a day and it probably won't be too far from now when he will decide he doesn't want to play anymore, he wants to retire. We know that day is coming. So, again, draft decisions are based on what's best long-term for the organization, so it doesn't have an effect on what we're going to do Saturday and Sunday."

COACHES AREN'T SHUT OUT: Imagine school teachers empowered to not only pick their curriculum, but also provide feedback on students most likely to succeed in those lessons.

- ▶ Because the Packers believe their teachers should have a seat at the superintendent's table, assistant coaches are involved in assembling the team's draft board.
- ▶ "We value our coaches' opinions," Thompson said. "I think it's important that you get the coaches' input on anything because they're the ones who are going to have to coach them. They know the exact kind of player they want for a particular scheme or for a particular defense or offense."
- ► Thompson also accounts for feedback from his respected player personnel staff. Good, healthy discussion is encouraged. He considers everyone's opinion, even those who disagree with him.
- ► "They don't get as much consideration, but they get some," he said, smiling, explaining that in the end there's a reason why the team has just one general manager. But overall, the goal especially in these days leading up to the draft is to come together.
- ► "It never gets all the way where everybody's exactly OK with every name on the board," he said. "But we do work it as a group process and I think everybody feels part of the process. I think there's some value to that."

DON'T GET CAUGHT IN THE MIDDLE OF A BRATWURST: Wisconsin is known as America's Dairyland. And as any local in the agriculture business knows, red sky in the morning, farmer take warning. The rising sun that bounces off western clouds usually means rain.

- ► As sure as those red clouds over Minnesota are to bring at least one shower, any Packers draft weekend is sure to bring at least one trade.
- ► In fielding trade offers, Green Bay can consider the value of one impact player against multiple players of combined equal value.
- "It depends on how you have the players rated," Thompson said. "In my view, if you have a chance to get a remarkable player, you take the player. If you have an opportunity to get a similar player moving backward, then that makes it a little bit easier, but it's our view that we're going to have a chance to get a pretty good player no matter how it falls."
- ▶ Thompson wouldn't comment on specific offers, including whether the Packers have taken calls regarding WR Javon Walker, but he did say he expects to speak to each of the 31 other clubs up to and throughout this draft. Circumstances play an obvious role in any potential trade, including who is still on the board when the Packers are on the clock with the fifth overall choice at approximately noon Saturday. But at this point, Thompson expects to keep that selection.
- ▶ "I do, for a couple of reasons," he said. "No. 1, I think there's a high probability, in fact it's almost a certainty, that there's going to be a really good player there for us at No. 5. The second is, people that want to trade when they're at the top of the draft and want to trade backward, it's difficult to do because you have to have somebody that really wants to come up there and to come up there, you have to realize that the price of playing poker has gone up, the salary and the pressure and that sort of thing. So, there's not that many people that want to come up."
- ▶ But once that fifth-overall card is at the podium, the price of poker becomes a little more affordable.
- "I think with most teams, the more picks they have, they would feel better," Thompson said. "There are several teams that have a lot of picks right now and they're happy that they have them. There are some teams like us, or teams that have fewer picks than us, and wish they had more. Yeah, in a perfect world you would wind up with more picks, but I would think more times than not, we would probably just pick right where we pick."
- ► Whether they're successful or not, the Packers will at least attempt to increase their selections (they went from seven to 11 in 2005). So to all those media and fans new to following draft weekend at Lambeau Field, a friendly word of warning: Don't let your hair down after a Green Bay selection. Keep your eyes and ears open for trade alerts.

HEADLINES DON'T WIN CHAMPIONSHIPS: "I think our philosophy, our way of approaching the building of a team, is trying to be consistent by using the draft as a foundation. I don't think you can build a team through free agency. You can plug a hole here and there, but the foundation has to be to built through the draft and to try to bring in the kind of player, not only talent-wise, but character-wise, that can come in and contribute to the team and be a positive influence in the locker room. Those are the keys for us."

- ▶ Ted Thompson was not the source of that quote. It was Pittsburgh's Art Rooney II last month after winning *The Sporting News* 2005 George Young Executive of the Year award. That consistent Steelers philosophy, also shared by the New England Patriots under Bill Belichick, has reaped obvious rewards.
- ► Earlier in this decade, the Packers were as aggressive in free agency as most any team in the league.
- ▶ Now, they're following the Steelers and Patriots examples. Thompson subscribed to that school before he came to Green Bay. In fact, his build-through-the-draft philosophy while orchestrating the Seahawks' drafts from 2000-04 provided Seattle its foundation for a berth in Super Bowl XL opposite Rooney's Steelers.

ON THE RECORD ON FREE AGENCY: Green Bay is among league leaders in available room under the salary cap. So why does Thompson refuse to sign big-name free agents?

"That's a mischaracterization of my view on free agency," he said. "I think free agency is a very interesting tool to use to help you patch some

holes and do some things.

- "There's no reluctance on our part. We do try to make certain that what we do is not just fantasy football. We're investing in a player that's got to come in and play a particular role. If we don't think that player can perform to that contract, then it doesn't make sense for us to do it just to say, 'Look what we've spent."
- ► In other words, the team won't spend money just because it can. Compare that philosophy to buying a house. Packers fans wouldn't pay \$150,000 for a home in which the market values at only \$130,000. Similarly, Thompson isn't willing to overspend on free agents.
- ► However, when used properly, he does see free agency as a valuable tool. The team has high hopes for unrestricted free agents Marquand Manuel, whose premature Super Bowl XL departure played a role in the Steelers' success, and Ryan Pickett, who led NFL defensive linemen in tackles last year.

THEY'RE NOT SITTING ON THEIR FLIPPERS: This offseason, the Packers were aggressive financially in the stakes for Adam Vinatieri, regarded by many as the top clutch kicker in league annals. Likewise, Green Bay pursued LB LaVar Arrington. In the end with both players, the team lost out probably for reasons out of its control. The Colts offered Vinatieri an indoor home field, ideal for kickers, and the Giants offered Arrington the opportunity to live close to his hometown and twice a year play familiar foes from the NFC East.

- ► Thompson said the Packers are still in discussions with CB Charles Woodson and that no one in Arrington's camp told him that Favre's status had anything to do with the linebacker's decision to sign with the Giants.
- ► "There's all kinds of reasons why people will come to a team or stay with their original team," Thompson said. "I haven't gotten that indication,

ON THE TUBE: ESPN.com conducted a sportsnation poll earlier this month in which fans were asked, given choices of the NCAA basketball tournament, Opening Day in Baseball, the NFL Draft or the Masters, what April sporting event did they anticipate most.

- ▶ To no one's surprise, NCAA basketball won out. But the NFL Draft finished second, well ahead of MLB's Opening Day. The Masters tournament was last.
- ► The fans have stated their demand for information. Television is adding to the supply.
- ► In addition to **ESPN**'s always outstanding coverage of draft weekend, programming that in 2006 includes Packers FB **William Henderson** on a player panel, viewers for the first time will have a choice.
- ► This year will go down in history as a year of firsts for **NFL Network**. First live regular-season games, first Super Bowl pregame show and now, first live coverage of the NFL Draft.
- ► NFL Network will cover Day 1 Saturday from beginning to end, featuring three live sets including one on the floor of the site of the event, Radio City Music Hall. Day 2, Sunday, will receive three hours of live coverage and a one-hour wrap-up show.
- ► From Green Bay, the Packers' team cam will broadcast from the Lambeau Field locker room.

TELEVISION COVERAGE HAS CHANGED IN OTHER WAYS, TOO: This weekend, the Packers will fly their first-round pick into Green Bay. He'll meet Ted Thompson, Mike McCarthy and maybe a few other coaches. And many fans will get their first impression of him in a press-conference setting on the local newscasts throughout the state. But that routine hasn't always been routine.

► Fans always have thirsted for draft information, and media always have attempted to bring it to them. Two decades ago, before ESPN took draft coverage to a national level, local television went to great lengths to

- bring fans information. And the competition was fierce.
- ► On April 29, 1980, Green Bay with the fourth overall selection chose DT Bruce Clark from Penn State. Minutes after the choice, Green Bay station WLUK, then an ABC affiliate, went to work.
- ► Within the hour, the station had booked Clark on the next flight. Upon his arrival, WLUK reporters picked him up at his Austin Straubel Airport gate and whisked him on a tour of the city. Then, with cameras rolling, they sat him down at Kroll's West, a restaurant across the street from Lambeau Field, and ordered Clark a Wisconsin delicacy, the Butterburger.
- ► "There was intense competition among stations to get the No. 1 draft choice on the air first," said Bob Schulze, WLUK's sports director from 1970-83.
- ► That night, WLUK got the No. 1 draft choice on the air first, documenting his initial "tastes" of Green Bay on its 6 p.m. newscast. One of the viewers was Bart Starr, head coach and general manager of the Green Bay Packers, who six hours earlier had drafted Clark.
- ► "At 6:30 at the end of the news," Schulze said, "Bart called and asked me tongue-in-cheek if he could talk to his first-round draft choice now that we were done with him."
- ▶ One year later in 1981, WLUK had another gameplan, and Starr was on the same page this time (after all, the station did carry the Bart Starr Show). The Packers drafted sixth overall, taking QB Rich Campbell from Cal. Soon after the announcement, Schulze and his photographer hopped on a west-bound flight. Another adventure was brewing.
- ► Schulze planned to rendezvous with Campbell and his agent, Bob Lamonte, in Los Angeles. After the player flew in from the San Francisco Bay Area, the station used rented space from CNN to make history. Only hours after his selection, Campbell served as the subject for the first-ever satellite feed back to Green Bay. Starr was able to speak to Campbell on a split-screen broadcast.
- ► Later in the day, the group flew together back to the Bay Area and were playing basketball in the driveway at the home of Campbell's parents when WLUK competitors WFRV and WBAY drove up.
- ► Schulze also worked for WFRV from 1963-69, and earlier for WLUK from 1962-63.

DRAFT COVERAGE EVOLUTION: In the decade before Schulze's station began competing with other stations — and the Packers — for time with drafted players, coverage wasn't as intense. Lee Remmel, now the Packers' team historian, was there in 1968 when Vince Lombardi conducted his final Green Bay draft.

- ► "There were only 8-10 writers, maybe a few cameras," recalled Remmel, who at the time wrote for the *Green Bay Press-Gazette*. "He told us, 'Gentlemen, we've just selected the finest athlete in the 1968 draft."
- ►That choice was LB Fred Carr, taken fifth overall, ironically where the Packers are slotted to draft in 2006. But despite how excited Lombardi

was, his message didn't penetrate then as much as any messages will Saturday. This weekend, Ted Thompson and Mike McCarthy will speak to fans not only through several television formats, but also on the Internet, on the radio, in print and even on cell phones on ESPN Mobile.

- ▶ "I think it's overkill," Remmel said. "It's above and beyond. But let's face it, there's a compelling reason to do it. The fans are demanding information and you have to feed them. That's always been the defining factor."
- ▶ In Lombardi's era, fan interest was more manageable, Remmel said.
- ► "There wasn't the level of detailed minutia there is today. We didn't know how fast the guy ran his 40 or what he ate for breakfast."

THE ALL-TIME SIX AT FIVE: After Lombardi took Carr, the Packers drafted fifth overall only once in the ensuing 37 seasons. Their fifth-overall choice Saturday marks their first choice in that slot since 1992. The team's six alltime No. 5 choices:

...AND THE THREE AT 36: Ted Thompson's philosophy of building through the draft isn't a new concept. Nearly 50 years ago, the Packers had the same thoughts in building their nucleus, and that was before anyone, including the man himself, knew that Vince Lombardi would coach in Green Bay.

- ► Two years before Lombardi's arrival, the Packers dedicated new City Stadium (later renamed Lambeau Field), drafted Golden Boy Paul Hornung and made a handful of trades to acquire draft picks.
- ▶ One of those deals, consummated by head coach Lisle Blackbourn in September 1957, sent DE John Martinkovic to the Giants, where Lombardi ironically was an offensive coordinator. With the third-round choice they acquired from the Giants, Green Bay that December selected a fullback from Illinois named Ray Nitschke.
- ▶ Nitschke, converted by Lombardi into a Hall of Fame linebacker, was one of only three players ever drafted 36th overall by the Packers. Green Bay expects to add another player to that group Saturday. The list:

ACCORDING TO THE MOCKS: The Packers know all about mock drafts. Like most teams, they even conduct their own.

- ► The Packers' mock drafts aren't the full-fledged guessing games fans can find on the Internet. Rather the Packers' predictions of other clubs' selections are more focused toward their upcoming picks. And in the draft room, they're not called mock drafts, they're called scenarios.
- ▶ With the fifth choice in the 2006 draft, compared to the 25th selection in the 2005 draft, one would think Green Bay will have fewer scenarios to debate. Not so, Thompson said.
- ► "No, you have to prepare for whatever. What if all the sudden we're picking at 25? You just never know. I'm not saying how that could happen. You try to rate the players. First-round players are first-round players, and obviously as you get closer, and obviously in my own mind I've been whittling down that group that we might consider at five."
- ► While the Packers' official mock drafts, or scenarios, are about as topsecret as any government document involving national security, there are countless unofficial mock drafts all over the Internet.
- And according to the vast majority of those Internet mock drafts, the Packers will select either Ohio State LB A.J. Hawk or N.C. State DE Mario Williams in the first round.
- ▶ If it's **Hawk**, all indications point to the Packers getting one of the most humble players they've ever drafted. Just look at the his rules. Hawk:
 - Instructed his parents not to cheer for him in high school (Centerville. Ohio), although they could clap for team touchdowns.
 - Never wore his high school varsity jackets. Did not want to seem "big time."
 - Refused to let Buckeyes photographers take a new media guide headand-shoulders of him after his freshman year because he did not want to give up precious rest time between two-a-day August practices. Photos don't matter!
 - Requested that an inch be taken off his Ohio State roster height (from 6-2 to 6-1). "I don't ever want to meet somebody and they go, 'You're not as tall as I thought you'd be," he told his father, Keith.
 - On Senior Day, was the only Buckeye to greet his parents with his helmet on. That was the rule in high school - helmets stay on! "He doesn't like anything false," says his father. "Nothing false. He wants it all

to be better. He wants to give something better than anyone expects."

- ▶ If it's **Williams**, the Packers won't be getting the first incredible athlete out of North Carolina. But they will be getting one of their most decorated athletes in recent memory. After a career in which his high school (Richlands, N.C.) retired his number (82) and his N.C. State team voted him MVP after the '05 season, he knows things are about to change.
- ►"I really have to face the fact that I'm leaving a great family here," he says of his college teammates. "I'm going to be in the real world now."

A PICK IN THE FIRST FIVE ROUNDS: Incredibly, the Packers have an opportunity to do that for the first time since 2000, when Ron Wolf assembled one of his best draft classes.

► That year, the team actually selected eight players in the first five rounds, including eventual Pro Bowlers Bubba Franks and Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila, and perennial Pro Bowl candidate Chad Clifton.

THOMPSON'S FIRST DAY IN THE NFL: This weekend, as Thompson and his staff welcome several players into the professional ranks, the GM might recall his own transition from college to the NFL.

► A workhorse linebacker at SMU, he went undrafted in 1975, but not unnoticed. Bum Phillips, just hired to head the Houston Oilers, had coached Thompson in college. But that hadn't earned the young linebacker anything, not a job, not even a penny.

► "It was my first negotiation," Thompson told NFL Network, remembering his first phone call with Phillips 30 years ago. "He called me and said, 'Would you like to come to camp and try out with the Oilers?' I said, 'Yeah.' I was thrilled. So he sent me a contract.

- "Well, I got the contract and I called him back, and said that maybe I wanted a little signing bonus. It wasn't in there. I was talking \$100, \$200. He said, 'If you don't want to sign it, then forget it.' I said, 'No, no. I'm signing it as we speak."
- ► A key contributor for the Oilers from 1975-84, Thompson played in 146 of 147 games over his 10-year NFL career. His teammates included Hall of Famers Earl Campbell, Mike Munchak and Elvin Bethea.

COMPENSATORY SELECTIONS: Green Bay received a pair of compensatory selections this season, after getting shut out in 2005 for the first time in 10 years.

- ▶ Before 2005, the only two previous drafts in which the Packers did not own compensatories were 1995 and 1993, when the league began awarding these choices. Including 2006, only one team has received more compensatories than Green Bay (24). Dallas has 25.
- ► Notable compensatory choices include CB Tyrone Williams (1996), G Marco Rivera (1996), QB Aaron Brooks (1999), David Martin (2001), Najeh Davenport (2002) and Scott Wells (2004).
- ► Teams cannot trade these picks.
- ► The NFL Management Council in March awarded 32 total compensatory draft choices to 19 teams.
- ► Under terms of the NFL Collective Bargaining Agreement, a team losing more or better compensatory free agents than it acquires in a year is eligible to receive compensatory draft picks.
- ▶ The number of picks a team receives equals the net loss of compensatory free agents up to a maximum of four. The 32 compensatory choices will supplement the 223 choices in the seven rounds of the draft. This year, the compensatory picks will be positioned within the third through seventh rounds based on the value of the compensatory free agents lost.
- ► Compensatory free agents are determined by a formula based on salary, playing time and postseason honors. The formula was developed by the NFL Management Council. Not every free agent lost or signed by a club is covered by this formula.
- ▶ Three clubs this year (Buffalo, Seattle and Washington) will receive a compensatory pick even though they did not suffer a net loss of compensatory free agents. Under the formula, the compensatory free agents these teams lost were ranked higher than the ones they signed (by a specified point differential based upon salary and performance).

SPEAKING OF TRADES: Aside from compensatory choices, the league allows teams to trade any of their original seven picks. Commissioner Paul Tagliabue can proceed with the selection process if a club can't complete a trade during its time on the clock.

RECRUITING HAPPENS IN THE PROS, TOO: The NFL allows each team to bring in 20 prospects for physicals. The Packers use that opportunity to show those players the team's first-class facilities and first-class people, and present philosophies and reasons why the Packers believe in their quality of football. Many players have reported back that the people in Green Bay are the nicest they've ever met. Obviously, the Packers don't have a lot of control over how the draft falls, but the team capitalizes on this opportunity to make a lasting first impression. The hope is that when these players become free agents, or when their close friends become free agents, they will remember their pre-draft experience in Green Bay.

COMMON MISCONCEPTIONS: From the Packers' scouting department:

- ▶ Myth 1, scouts don't work the whole year: During the "offseason" members of Green Bay's scouting department usually take vacations, but that's about all the time they have off. During the season, each scout annually puts tens of thousands of miles on his car. The scouts are busy 12 months out of the year.
- ▶ Myth 2, low Wonderlic scores are a red flag: Today's game is much more complicated than previous eras. However, unless a player can't read, a low Wonderlic score can be overshadowed by quality characteristics the Packers have discovered during interviews. Plus, the team won't hesitate to call anyone close to a player, including his high-school coach, to overlook a low Wonderlic. Classroom intelligence doesn't necessarily translate into football intelligence.
- ▶ Myth 3, intangibles are easy to gauge: The Packers have so many methods to determine why a player should ascend their draft board. Just because a player has put up head-turning statistics, and outstanding speed and strength scores, doesn't necessarily mean he'll have the heart and work ethic needed to make the transition to the NFL. That's why the Packers invest so much time talking to the people around each prospect.
- ► Myth 4, never evaluate speed at night on AstroTurf: Myth or not, some scouts don't grade players at night on turf, thinking those conditions exaggerate speed.

- ► Myth 5, stock can rise/drop dramatically at combine: The Packers devote more than four weeks visiting pro days at colleges after the combine. If a player unexpectedly tests poorly in Indianapolis, Green Bay will seek him out at his pro day for another evaluation.
- ▶ Myth 6, the consensus: Despite media reports every year of a consensus among NFL teams, all 32 clubs rarely if ever agree on one player. Like pollsters during elections, many draft experts in the press consult only a handful of teams to determine a player's worth, then portray that opinion as common thinking league-wide. The Packers do their own homework over a 12-month period, and aren't fazed by media concerns. The Packers draft players based on their views of the team's best interest, not that of the media.
- ▶ Myth 7, players are only evaluated at games: Even players themselves fail to realize the Packers are scouting them before gameday, talking to their coaches, watching their practices and intensively grading film. In the days before the 2006 draft, the Green Bay scouting department already has paperwork on players expected to become eligible for the '07 draft.
- ▶ Myth 8, reports on non-drafted players are trash: The Packers have files on about 1,100 players but they have only seven selections. What happens to files of the players they don't draft? Two things. First, the team uses them to recruit the 12-plus non-drafted free agents, which as recent years testify, is paramount. Second, most files get transferred to pro personnel. By 2009, most of those players will become free agents, and the team at the appropriate time will revisit insights into their personalities to learn how they might fit into a Packers uniform.

ATTENTION FANS: PLAN ACCORDINGLY, NFL IMPLEMENTS FLEX SCHEDULING

The NFL this season will implement for the first time in its history a primetime "flexible scheduling" element on Sundays in Weeks 10-15 and in Week 17.

Flexible scheduling will ensure quality matchups on Sunday night in those weeks and give surprise teams a chance to play their way onto primetime.

The 2006 NFL schedule will list start times for all Sunday games during the "flex" weeks as noon CT, except for games played in the Mountain or Pacific Time zones, which will be listed at 3:05 p.m. CT or 3:15 p.m. CT. The NBC Sunday night time slot for "flex" weeks will list teams as "TBD."

Only Sunday afternoon games are eligible to be moved. Flexible scheduling will not be applied to games airing on Thursday, Saturday or Monday nights.

Just as the six major college football conferences have done for many years, the NFL now will have additional flexibility to move the start times of games on Sundays, using a 12-day notice format.

For example, a game scheduled for Sunday, Nov. 26, could move from a noon CT kickoff to a 7:15 p.m. CT start, but the change would be made and announced no later than Tuesday, Nov. 14.

The NFL has commonly moved games between noon CT and 3:15 p.m. CT (eight times last season) on Sunday afternoons. The new practice allows the NFL to employ flexible scheduling to include one of its primetime package of games – on Sunday evenings. Sunday afternoon games, as in the past, can still move between noon and 3:05 or 3:15 CT.

In Week 17, in order to ensure a Sunday night game with playoff implications, the decision to move the start time may be made on six days notice. CBS and FOX will each be able to protect five games in the seven weeks of flex scheduling, but not more than one in any week.

During the 2005 regular season, the NFL conducted a study with mock flexible scheduling. An eight-person task force consisting of team executives, one from each division and including a Packers representative, was consulted on a weekly basis. In addition, television network partners and the NFL's broadcasting department participated weekly in the process.
