NFC'S TOP TEAMS MEET FOR SHOWDOWN IN DALLAS

Green Bay travels to Dallas for the first time since 1999 for a primetime contest between the NFC's top two clubs.

- ▶ The Packers come into the matchup winners of 14 of their last 15 games and stand tied with the Cowboys for the NFC's best record at 10-1.
- ▶ Green Bay carries a seven-game road winning streak into Thursday's contest. A victory would tie the longest road winning streak in franchise history.
- ▶ With a win this past Thursday over Lions, the Packers are off to their best start since 1962, when the team also started the year 10-1. That season, Vince Lombardi led Green Bay to a 13-1-0 record en route to its eighth world title in franchise history. The best start in franchise history came in 1929, when a 10-0-1 record led Green Bay to its first NFL title under team founder Curly Lambeau.
- ▶ The Packers and Cowboys represent two of the proudest and most popular clubs in the NFL. They have combined for 17 NFL championships (Green Bay 12, Dallas 5) and eight Super Bowl titles.
- ▶ There is no disputing the most memorable game between the two clubs. This year marks the 40th anniversary of the Ice Bowl, the 1967 NFL Championship, played between Lombardi's Packers and Tom Landry's Cowboys. It is widely considered the greatest NFL game of all-time.
- ▶ The two clubs hooked up for some memorable games in the 1990s, including three playoff contests won by Dallas.
- ▶ Green Bay has lost eight straight and 11 of the last 12 games against the Cowboys in Dallas. Its lone win during that time came on Christmas Eve in 1989, a 20-10 Packers victory.
- ▶ Quarterback **Brett Favre**, enjoying one of the finest seasons of his legendary career, makes his 249th consecutive start (269 including playoffs) Thursday night in Dallas. Texas Stadium represents one of nine current NFL stadiums at which Favre has played but never won. His five losses at the venue represent his most at any stadium at which he hasn't won. Opposing Favre is Wisconsin native Tony Romo.



A RARITY IN NFL HISTORY

In a game that has been circled for weeks, two teams 10-1 or better meet for the eighth time in league history. Thursday night marks just the second such game since 1970.

- ▶ The last meeting between two 10-1 teams was also a primetime contest between San Francisco and the N.Y. Giants.
- ▶ Neither Dallas nor Green Bay has ever been involved in such a game. A look at the previous games involving opposing teams 10-1 or better:

WITH THE CALL

NFL Network enters its second season as a league television partner and will air the contest to a national audience. Play-by-play man **Bryant Gumbel** joins color commentator **Cris Collinsworth** in the broadcast booth.

- ▶ Over-the-air stations in Green Bay (WFRV, Ch. 5) and Milwaukee (WISN, Ch. 12) will simulcast the NFLN feed.
- ▶ Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The network covers 47 markets in six states.
- ▶ For out-of-town listeners, the broadcast is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on www.packers.com as well as on Sirius Satellite Radio (channel 123 WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.
- ▶ Westwood One will air the game across the country. **Dick Enberg** (play-by-play) and **Dennis Green** (analyst) will call the action, while **Tommy Tighe** hosts the pregame and halftime shows.
- ▶ DirecTV subscribers can watch the game on channel 212.

THIS WEEK AT LAMBEAU

PACKERS AMONG NFL'S BEST AWAY FROM LAMBEAU

Green Bay has now won seven straight games on the road, something the franchise has not accomplished since Vince Lombardi's final two seasons (1966-67) in Green and Gold.

- ▶ The seven-game road winning streak is the third-longest mark in franchise history. The Packers have won eight consecutive road games twice (1941-42 and 1966-67), the best mark in their history.
- ▶ One of the most impressive accomplishments of Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**'s first year as head coach was the way his club performed on the road. The Packers finished 5-3 away from home in 2006, recording the most road wins in franchise history for a coach in his first season.
- ▶ McCarthy and the Packers have picked up right where they left off, winning their first five road games of the season.

Note of the Week

HISTORIC RUN FOR MCCARTHY

Mike McCarthy has coached 27 games in the NFL. Since 1970, only two head coaches had a stretch of 14 (or more) wins in 15 games earlier in their careers: George Seifert (1989-90 49ers, in his first 19 games) and Ted Marchibroda (1975-76 Colts, in his first 20 games).

AMERICA'S TEAM(S)

Since Harris Interactive began its poll asking fans to identify their favorite NFL team in 1998, the Green Bay Packers and Dallas Cowboys have routinely shown to have the two largest fan bases in the country.

- ▶ Both clubs have owned the title of the NFL's 'most popular team' four times, including in 2003 when both clubs shared the honor.
- ▶ Neither club has ever finished outside of the top four in the poll.
- ▶ In a recent *Sports Illustrated* poll on SI.com rating the game day atmosphere for each NFL team, the experience of seeing the Green Bay Packers at Lambeau Field ranked first. Fans were asked to grade every aspect of the game day experience, including ticket prices, team performance, tailgating, stadium atmosphere and the surrounding neighborhoods.

DEFENSE BEGINS TO DOMINATE

Defensive coordinator **Bob Sanders** and his unit have steadily climbed the league rankings this season, finally displaying the dominant brand of football it showed signs of in 2006.

- ▶ During the team's four-game win streak to close the 2006 season, the unit climbed from 29th overall to 12th.
- ▶ In Week 10 against the Vikings, the defense posted the first shutout since Dec. 10, 2002, a 10-0 victory over Buffalo. The Vikings had previously owned the league's longest active scoring streak at 260 games. Minnesota's 260-game streak without a shutout also was the third-

longest in NFL history.

- ▶ A defense that has collected 32 sacks is headlined by the NFL's top sack duo. Defensive end **Aaron Kampman**, NFC Defensive Player of the Month for October, has posted 11 sacks, tops in the NFL. Fellow end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** has tallied 9½ sacks, tied for second in the NFL.
- ▶ 30% of those sacks have come courtesy of the defensive line, which forms one of the deepest rotations in all of football. Their ability to pressure the quarterback while rushing just four frees up linebackers **Nick Barnett** and **A.J. Hawk**, two of the team's leading tacklers, to make plays.
- ▶ Not to be forgotten is perhaps the top cornerback duo in the NFL – **Charles Woodson** and **Al Harris**. No cornerback duo is as physical at the line of scrimmage, and over the past 24 games, only two wide receivers have gone over 100 yards receiving.
- ▶ Backed by a stout run defense, the unit tends to make its big plays defending the pass. In a streak that dates back to last season, Green Bay has picked off at least one pass in 16 of the last 17 games. During the streak, the unit has 27 interceptions. Woodson has 10 of the interceptions during the streak.

NOBODY'S BETTER AFTER THE CATCH

The league's No. 2-ranked passing offense has been bolstered by its receivers' ability to run after the catch.

- ▶ Big plays have served as a catalyst to the success of the Packers offense. Despite having the league's 30th-ranked rushing attack, the unit still ranks third overall thanks in large part to its dominance through the air.
- ▶ Wins over San Diego, Denver and Kansas City have all been highlighted by long touchdowns passes by Favre. Not to be overlooked is who he is throwing to, and what they are able to do once the ball is in their hands.
- ▶ Led by wide receivers **Donald Driver**, **Greg Jennings**, **James Jones** and tight end **Donald Lee**, Green Bay has amassed 1,577 yards after the catch, tops in the NFL. The league average is 996 yards.
- ▶ Behind the Packers at No. 2 is a team with a much more publicized group of receivers – the New England Patriots, with 1,292 yards after the catch.
- ▶ The big-play ability of the Packers offense shouldn't come as a total surprise. Green Bay finished second in yards after the catch, behind New Orleans, in 2006.

'BIG 5' A NIGHTMARE MATCHUP

For the third consecutive week, Green Bay displayed its new 'Big 5' formation with receivers Driver, Jennings, Jones, **Ruvell Martin** and **Koren Robinson** all split out wide.

- ▶ Again the Packers were successful in the formation, converting third downs and setting up scoring plays.
- ▶ The offense also displays a variation of the formation, with the tight end Lee split wide and Favre again with an empty backfield. Lee found space in the middle of the field for a 26-yard scoring play against Minnesota.
- ▶ "It's mismatches versus time (to throw) is what we're playing against," Favre said when asked about the 'Big 5'. "If I was a defensive coordinator, I don't know who you stop or who you go in saying, OK, this is what we (have to prepare for) ... And for us that's a good thing. We have enough diversity to present its own set of problems."
- ▶ "It's important because our game is about match-ups," McCarthy said about the formation. "To me that's one of the most important aspects of game-planning. When you get to this point in the season you're looking at the injuries and different packages. Being able to take advantage of that is even more important. I think it's more evident when you watch the way that defenses react to four wide receivers or five wide receivers. There's a lot of respect and cautiousness in the way defenses approach it. I'm sure there will be a time when people challenge us (with) those particular sets, but it's definitely a weapon for us."

COACHES CAPSULES

Mike McCarthy: 18-9-0, .667; second NFL season

MIKE McCARTHY...Is in second year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Has won more games (16) in his first 25 contests than any other coach in franchise history.
- ▶ Spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- ▶ Began his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

WADE PHILLIPS...Is in first year as the Cowboys' seventh head coach.

- ▶ Named Cowboys head coach on Feb. 8, 2007, after three seasons (2004-06) with San Diego as defensive coordinator.
- ▶ Served as head coach for the Denver Broncos (1993-94) and Buffalo Bills (1998-2000), including three trips to the postseason.
- ▶ Has 30 years of NFL coaching experience, including stops in Atlanta (2002-03), Philadelphia (1986-88) and New Orleans (1981-85). Phillips began coaching in the NFL under his father, Bum Phillips, in Houston from 1976-80.
- ▶ Began his coaching career at his alma mater, the University of Houston, before moving on to Oklahoma State University and the University of Kansas.

THE COWBOYS-PACKERS SERIES

These clubs squared off in the most famous game in league history, the 1967 NFL Championship, dubbed the 'Ice Bowl.' Kickoff temperature was recorded as 13 below zero with a minus-46 wind chill, the coldest game in league annals. Bart Starr's game-winning touchdown, a 1-yard dive with 13 seconds left, sealed Green Bay's third straight championship en route to its second consecutive Super Bowl title.

- ▶ Green Bay won 10 of the first 15 in the series, in which Tom Landry and Vince Lombardi — former assistants on the same New York Giants staff in the 1950s — turned into one of the NFL's preeminent rivalries.
- ▶ The Packers have never lost to the Cowboys in Green Bay (5-0 all-time), but the series is almost as one-sided in games played in Dallas. Green Bay has lost 11 of the last 12 games against the Cowboys in Dallas, including three postseason games. Their lone win during that time came on Christmas eve in 1989, a 20-10 Packers victory.
- ▶ Only three Packers players remain from the team that lost at Dallas eight years ago, the last time these clubs met in Dallas — LS Rob Davis, WR Donald Driver and QB Brett Favre. It was Driver's first game as a pro.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Wade Phillips first coached in the NFL as linebackers coach in Houston, where he coached Packers GM Ted Thompson, who played 10 seasons at linebacker (1975-84) for the Oilers...Thompson is a native of Atlanta, Texas, about 175 miles east of Dallas, and attended Southern Methodist University in Dallas...Among Packers players, native Texans include K Mason Crosby (Georgetown), WR Donald Driver (Houston), TE Bubba Franks (Big Spring), DT Johnny Jolly (Houston), DE Michael Montgomery (Center) and S Charlie Peprah (Plano)...Cowboys QB Tony Romo is a Burlington, Wis., native, while OT Doug Free is from Manitowoc, Wis. ...Cowboys wide receivers coach Ray Sherman spent five seasons in Green Bay (2000-04) at the same position...Linebackers A.J. Hawk (Green Bay) and Bobby Carpenter (Dallas) played together at Ohio State...Packers RB Ryan Grant succeeded Cowboys RB Julius Jones as the starting running back at Notre Dame; also teammates with Grant and Jones was Cowboys TE Anthony Fasano...Packers C Scott Wells and Cowboys TE Jason Witten were college teammates at Tennessee.

INDIVIDUALLY VS. DALLAS COWBOYS

Quarterback Brett Favre is 2-8 in 10 career starts against the Cowboys, 2-5 in regular-season games...Texas Stadium represents one of nine current NFL stadiums at which Brett Favre has played but never won. His five losses at the venue represent his most at any stadium at which he hasn't won...His career totals in 10 games against the Cowboys include 18 touchdowns, nine interceptions and 2,490 passing yards...Donald Driver made his professional debut in Dallas in 1999 but did not make a catch; he did catch a touchdown pass in his only other game against the Cowboys...Tight end Bubba Franks also caught a touchdown pass in the '04 meeting...Defensive end Cullen Jenkins recorded his first career sack, one that was split with defensive end Aaron Kampman, in 2004.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Oct. 24, 2004, at Lambeau Field; Packers won 41-20.

- ▶ Green Bay scored on its first seven possessions to defeat the Cowboys and snap a three-game losing streak at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Despite jamming his wrist early in the game, Favre beat the Cowboys for just the second time in 10 tries.
- ▶ Favre threw two TD passes, Ahman Green ran for his first two scores since opening day and the halfback option pass produced points for the second straight week.
- ▶ Green Bay produced 480 yards of offense and didn't punt until midway through the fourth quarter. Green ended a month-long funk by rushing for 163 yards, including a 90-yard score that was the longest Dallas had ever surrendered.
- ▶ Tony Fisher's first NFL toss found Bubba Franks alone in the end zone to make it 27-6 in the third quarter. For the second straight week, the Packers did not turn the ball over.

LAST MEETING, AT DALLAS

Nov. 14, 1999, at Texas Stadium; Cowboys won 27-13.

- ▶ Former Packer George Teague returned an interception 95 yards for a touchdown, cementing the Dallas win in the final minute. Teague's theft ended a valiant Green Bay comeback, as the Packers' slowly chipped away at a 20-3 deficit, and stood on the Cowboys' doorstep.
- ▶ Dallas, minus three starters, handed the Packers (4-5) their third straight loss.
- ▶ Favre hit Antonio Freeman for a 28-yard touchdown in the fourth quarter, cutting Dallas' lead to 20-10. Ryan Longwell's 31-yard field goal then brought Green Bay within a touchdown, 20-13, before Teague's interception.
- ▶ Favre, playing in considerable pain with a bruised thumb and hand, had two touchdown passes evaporate when Corey Bradford dropped an early 47-yard bomb, and Donald Driver couldn't corral an overthrown pass in the end zone that would've tied the game in the last minute.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

FAVRE ON PACE TO ECLIPSE OWN MVP NUMBERS

Quarterback **Brett Favre**, who turned 38 in October, is turning in a season that is beginning to defy description. The league's only three-time MVP (1995-97), Favre is on pace to set new career highs in a number of statistical categories, including completions, attempts, passing yards, passer rating and completion percentage.

- ▶ A national TV audience saw Favre pass for a season-high 381 yards against the Lions on Thanksgiving en route to his eighth game of the season with a passer rating over 100.0. All eight have come in victory.
- ▶ Favre compiled a passer rating over 100.0 for the fifth consecutive week, tying his own career high and marking the first time he's accomplished the feat in a single season. He had three games with a passer rating over 100.0 in Weeks 2-4 earlier this season.
- ▶ This marks the sixth time in his career that Favre has recorded at least three straight games with a passer rating over 100.0. He did it twice in 1995 (Nov. 12 – Dec. 3, 4 games; Dec. 16 – Jan. 6, 4 games) and twice again in 1996 (Sept. 1 – Sept. 15, 3 games; Dec. 22 – Sept. 1, 1997, 5 games). Favre was voted the league's MVP in both seasons.
- ▶ The last time he accomplished five consecutive games with a passer rating over 100.0 was during the team's Super Bowl XXXI run. The streak began with the final regular-season game against Minnesota (Dec. 22, 1996) and culminated in the first regular-season game the following season (vs. Chicago, Sept. 1). It included three playoff victories, most notably a 35-21 victory over New England in the Super Bowl.
- ▶ Elias Sports Bureau never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis, but rather to measure the effectiveness of a quarterback over an entire season, or an entire career.
- ▶ Nonetheless, in games when Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 81-7 (.921).
- ▶ The Packers are a perfect 43-0 (1.000) at Lambeau Field when Favre hits the century mark. The team is 38-7 (.844) on the road when Favre eclipses the mark.

GOOSE EGG

The Green Bay Packers are the only NFL team that has not allowed a single touchdown on any type of return – fumble, interception, punt or kick-off – this season.

IN THE DIVISION

The Packers under McCarthy have been extremely successful in the NFL's 'black and blue' division and currently boast a four-game lead.

- ▶ McCarthy is 8-2 in NFC North games since taking over in Green Bay and has yet to lose on the road in the division (5-0).
- ▶ The Packers have won eight of their last nine division games and aim to win their first NFC North title since 2004.
- ▶ Last season, the Packers finished tied for the NFL's best division record at 5-1, losing only to Chicago in the season opener.
- ▶ No other head coach in team annals had a better division mark in his rookie season than McCarthy.

WOODSON AGAIN AMONG THE GAME'S ELITE

Cornerback **Charles Woodson**, who has seen a resurgence to his Pro Bowl level since arriving in Green Bay, will be a question mark heading into Dallas. He missed the final three quarters against Detroit due to a toe injury, and his playing status won't be known until later in the week. The 10-year pro so far has four interceptions and two defensive touchdowns on the season.

- ▶ When he signed as a free agent prior to the 2006 season, many around the league thought Woodson's days as an elite corner were over. Already, his three defensive touchdowns in Green and Gold surpass his total (two) in eight seasons as a Raider. What's more, the former Heisman Trophy winner has 12 interceptions in 27 games with Green

Bay. He had 17 interceptions in 106 games with Oakland.

- ▶ Despite the fact he is a four-time Pro Bowler, Woodson won just the first Defensive Player of the Week honor of his career for his performance in Week 6 against Washington. He picked off a Jason Campbell pass and also returned a fumble 57 yards for the go-ahead touchdown.
- ▶ Historically speaking, Woodson is only the fourth Packers player since 1940 with a fumble recovery for a touchdown and an interception in the same game. The other three Green Bay Packers to do that were Charley Brock (10/4/1942, at CHI), Tom Brown (11/17/1968, vs. NO) and Ahmad Carroll (11/29/2004, vs. StL).

LONG TOUCHDOWNS CONTINUE FOR FAVRE, OFFENSE

Favre continues to lead a big-play offense which has already seen five touchdown passes of 40 yards or longer through only 11 games.

- ▶ On the receiving end of four of the five long touchdowns has been the second-year pro Jennings, who connected on two such scoring plays as a rookie last season.
- ▶ "I think Brett and the receiver group have done an excellent job in the three- and five-step drops," McCarthy said. "With that we've been given some opportunities to go vertical, go deep, whether it's inside or outside. We have been productive in the last three or four weeks."

FAVRE PUTS ON HOLIDAY SHOW

Quarterback **Brett Favre** was nothing short of spectacular in his team's 37-26 victory over Detroit on Thanksgiving Day at Ford Field. The veteran quarterback and team leader added to a potential MVP resume with 31 completions - including a franchise-record 20 in a row - in 41 attempts for 381 yards and three touchdowns with no interceptions as the Packers improved to 10-1 and all but wrapped up the NFC North title, taking a four-game lead on the Lions (6-5) with just five to play.

► "I wasn't with him in his MVP years, but it's impressive the way he's playing right now," Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** said following the win.

► Favre threw at least three TD passes in a game for the 63rd time, breaking Dan Marino's NFL mark of 62. He posted his seventh 300-yard passing game of the season, tying his own team record set in 1995, the first of his three straight MVP years.

► He also posted a passer rating of 128.2, the eighth time in 11 games this season he's been over 100. That was due primarily to his flawless play from the tail end of the second quarter through the opening moments of the fourth, when Favre utilized four- and five-receiver formations to set a new franchise mark with 20 straight completions.

► That perfect stretch gave the Packers some breathing room in what had been a very tight game. Green Bay erased an early 6-0 deficit when rookie **Aaron Rouse**'s interception and 34-yard return to the Detroit 11-yard line set up a TD pass to **Greg Jennings**. On the Packers' next possession, deep passes to **Donald Driver** for 38 yards, **James Jones** for 18 yards, and Driver for 19 more led to **Ryan Grant**'s 5-yard TD run and a 14-6 lead.

► After Detroit cut the deficit to 14-9, Favre went on his rampage beginning with the 2-minute drill at the end of the second quarter. He completed seven straight throws to lead to a field goal on the final play of the first half. He then opened the second half with seven straight completions, including a 43-yarder to **Koren Robinson**, on a seven-play, 80-yard drive capped by Jennings' second score. And then he added four more completions on six-play, 80-yard drive that was finished off with a 3-yard TD to **Ruvell Martin**.

► Two more completions on the next possession pushed the streak to 20, the last a 41-yard catch-and-run by Driver. The streak ended on an incomplete pass to Robinson in the end zone when he just missed getting his feet down in bounds. But the ensuing field goal gave the Packers a 34-12 lead early in the fourth quarter.

► Detroit didn't fold, rallying for two touchdowns in the fourth quarter to pull within one score at 34-26, but the Lions never got the ball back with a chance to even things up.

► The Packers put together one more scoring drive, highlighted by runs of 12 and 27 yards by Grant, who finished with 15 carries for 101 yards to go over the century mark for the third time in five games. Grant had 94 of his yards in the second half.

► **Mason Crosby**'s third field goal, from 26 yards, made it 37-26 with 1 minute, 44 seconds left and sealed the game, giving the Packers their best record through 11 games since the championship season of 1962.



goals by the Lions in the first half when the results could have been much worse.

► On the opening drive of the game with the Lions facing third-and-long, defensive end **Aaron Kampman** capitalized on an illegal chop block penalty with a 6-yard sack of Jon Kitna, forcing a long field goal.

► The defense was put on the spot again right away. Immediately after the opening field goal, the Packers fumbled the ball back to the Lions at the Green Bay 25. Again the defense responded, holding the Lions to just 2 yards in three plays and forcing another field goal. The key was good coverage by **Jarrett Bush** on a deep pass to Calvin Johnson, breaking it up near the goal line on second down.

► The Packers offense was able to regain the lead thanks to a heady play by Rouse. The rookie safety jumped a route and returned an interception 34 yards, setting the offense up at the 11-yard line.

► Detroit was in field-goal range again on its next possession, poised to re-take the lead and facing third-and-3 at the Green Bay 32. But Kampman notched his second sack of the game, pushing Detroit out of scoring range and forcing a punt.

► Detroit's third field goal of the first half came after the offense had tremendous field position once again. A 74-yard kickoff return put the ball on the Green Bay 24, but the defense didn't allow a first down, and **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila**'s 6-yard sack on third down forced another field goal.

► Starting cornerback **Charles Woodson** left the game for good in the second quarter with a toe injury, forcing the secondary to elevate Bush, **Frank Walker** and **Tramon Williams** into more prominent roles to go along with their special teams work.

► In addition, Gbaja-Biamila hurt an ankle on his sack and fellow defensive lineman **Colin Cole** went down with a forearm fracture, which led to more

playing time for reserve defensive ends **Jason Hunter** and **Michael Montgomery**. And Rouse left the game for a period in the second half with a knee injury and was replaced by **Charlie Peprah**. The experience gained by those further down the depth chart could prove valuable both in the short term and the long term, but most importantly they found a way to hang in there.

► "It was a true gut check for our football team," McCarthy said.

MOVING UP THE RANKS; HARRIS LOCKS DOWN AGAIN

With his 10 catches for 147 yards, Driver moved into fifth place on the Packers' all-time list for receiving yards, surpassing Antonio Freeman.

► Driver eclipsed Freeman's 6,651 receiving yards with a 38-yard reception over the middle in the second quarter, after which he took a vicious hit while struggling for extra yards, but stayed in the game. Driver now has 6,761 receiving yards for his career.

► Middle linebacker **Nick Barnett** stands at 500 solo tackles in his five-year career.

► Cornerback **Al Harris** was matched up against Detroit's leading receiver, Roy Williams, one-on-one for most of the game, and like he did at Lambeau Field last December, Harris essentially shut Williams down.

► Williams had just three catches for 32 yards on Thursday, and one of those (for 5 yards) didn't even come against Harris. Williams' only catch of consequence against Harris came early in the fourth quarter on a 19-yard gain over the middle.

► Harris ended the game in fitting fashion, breaking up a deep pass over the middle on fourth down intended for Williams, giving the ball back to the Packers to kneel down and run out the clock. The effort was similar to the second matchup with Detroit last season, when Harris had an interception and held Williams to just one catch for 11 yards.

DEFENSE HANGS TOUGH, BATTLES INJURIES THROUGHOUT

The Green Bay Packers' defense might not have had its best day on Thursday, with multiple players dropping out with injuries and substitutions having to be made liberally. But the unit held together remarkably well, no better than in the first half when several key stops kept the Lions out of the end zone.

► Despite poor field position, the defense rose up and forced three field



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

FAVRE TURNING BACK THE CLOCK THIS SEASON

Quarterback **Brett Favre** has surpassed some of the NFL's greatest milestones so far this season, but not lost on the rest of the league is just how well he has been playing through the first 11 games.

- For the first time in his career, Favre threw for 300 yards-or-more in three consecutive games (Weeks 3-5). What's more, he's now done it twice this season, completing three straight 300-yard games in Weeks 8-10.
- The 1,042 passing yards Favre had in Weeks 8-10 are the most passing yards over a three-game stretch in his 17-year career.
- Much of the Packers' offensive success can be traced to Favre's precision passing. Between a second-quarter interception against the Giants (Week 2) and a third-quarter interception against the Bears (Week 5), Favre had attempted 142 consecutive passes without an interception – the third-longest streak of his career. During the interception-free streak, he threw nine touchdown passes. Currently, Favre is in the midst of another long interception-free streak. He enters play against Dallas on Thursday with 132 consecutive passes, including eight TD passes, without an interception.

CLOSING IN ON MARINO...AGAIN

Quarterback **Brett Favre** threw for three touchdowns in Week 12, the 63rd game of his career with at least three TD passes.

- With the effort, Favre surpassed Dan Marino's (62) NFL record.
- He also needs 506 passing yards to break Marino's record (61,361) for career passing yards. Favre enters play Thursday with 60,856.
- He is also chasing Marino in 300-yard passing games. Favre has seven already this season, tying his own record of seven 300-yard passing games established in 1995.

TURNOVERS THE NAME OF THE GAME

Though its turnover margin stands at plus-five, Green Bay has 10 early wins thanks in large part to its ability to turn turnovers into points. On defense, the Packers have been able to clamp down after turnovers, not allowing opponents to capitalize on scoring opportunities.

- Green Bay has 79 points scored off turnovers. On the other side of the ball, the defense has allowed only 26 points off turnovers.
- The Packers have won the turnover battle in seven of their 10 wins this season. They came out even in their wins at Minnesota, at Kansas City and at Detroit. They were minus-four in their only loss, against Chicago.
- Green Bay did not have a giveaway in the victory over Carolina in Week 11, a feat the club accomplished against Minnesota, Denver and San Diego this season.
- Over a longer stretch, the team has won 30 of 31 games playing turnover-free football, since a loss at Dallas, Nov. 18, 1996. Green Bay's only loss in such games during that stretch was a 23-20 defeat at Minnesota, Oct. 23, 2005.
- Including playoffs, the Packers have won 33 of their last 34 games without a giveaway.

"SPECIAL" TEAMS

Having always been a key ingredient to the success of the Packers, Green Bay's special teams unit has seen a remarkable improvement this season.

- In Rick Gosselin's annual *Dallas Morning News* rankings, which objectively grades teams by their rankings in 22 kicking-game categories, Green Bay finished seventh both in 1996 and 1997. The Packers reached the Super Bowl both seasons.
- More recently, the Packers ranked 8th in 2003 and 9th in 2004. Both years they made the playoffs.
- For the past two seasons, Green Bay has ranked last in the NFL in Gosselin's rankings. Neither year resulted in a postseason appearance.
- The coverage units have been excellent thus far. Through 11 games, the Packers rank second in the league in opponent punt return average and sixth in opponent kickoff return average.
- An area of emphasis all offseason, the unit got things going early in Week 1 by accounting for all 16 points.
- Their own return game is much improved from last season as well. The return of **Koren Robinson** has paid immediate dividends as the wideout had the team's longest kick return on the season, 67 yards, to open the second half against Carolina. Also in that game, cornerback **Tramon Williams** returned a punt 94 yards, tied for the second-longest punt return in team annals.

Bart Starr's game-winning touchdown, a 1-yard dive behind Jerry Kramer and Ken Bowman with 13 seconds remaining, clinched a third straight Green Bay championship and ended the "Ice Bowl."

Starr's score, on third down with no timeouts left, climaxed a 68-yard, 12-play drive which began with 4:50 on the clock. In all, 50,861 watched the coldest game in league annals. Kickoff temperature was 13 below zero and wind chill was minus-46.

Like the year before, the Packers grabbed an early 14-0 advantage. But this time the Cowboys came back, gaining a 17-14 edge on the first play of the fourth quarter, when Lance Rentzel caught a 50-yard touchdown from halfback Dan Reeves. The contest was later voted the greatest game in pro football history.

- Starr's touchdown play, "35 wedge," called for Chuck Mercein to get the ball. No one expected Starr to keep it.
- Officially, the field's \$80,000 heating system failed due to cold. Unofficially, some say, Lombardi turned it off.
- The play before Starr's TD, Donny Anderson actually broke the plane, but Lee Roy Jordan knocked the ball from his hands, and Anderson had to retrieve it on the other side.
- Officials could not use whistles to stop play. They froze.
- The team canceled marching band performances after noticing blood on a few of the musician's faces.
- Packers fans several times during the contest leaned over the front row to unplug the Cowboys' heated benches.
- After the game, several fans passed out soon after warming up. Their thawed systems finally registered the alcohol they'd consumed to keep warm during the game.
- One fan, an elderly gentleman, died due to exposure.

McCARTHY NOW A HALL-OF-FAMER

Though the bye week is meant for rest for players and coaches alike, Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** did take a detour to Baldwin City, Kan.

- There on Oct. 20, McCarthy was inducted into Baker University's Athletic Hall of Fame, where he was an all-conference tight end and senior captain in 1986. That season, the team made a run all the way to the NAIA title game.
- McCarthy became the 103rd member of Baker's Hall of Fame, which was founded in 1977. Baker, the oldest university in Kansas, is celebrating its 150th anniversary in 2007-08.
- McCarthy has been taking home some hardware for his performance with the Packers as well. He was honored as Motorola NFL Coach of the Week honors after a Week 10 shutout victory over the Minnesota Vikings. It was the second such honor of the season for McCarthy, who is certainly among the early candidates for Coach of the Year honors.

TOUGHEST ROAD VENUES? NO PROBLEM

Green Bay now faces another difficult road game – at Dallas – and will have to do so after coming off a short week. Counting victories over the Panthers and Lions, Thursday at Dallas marks the third game in 12 days for the Packers. Back-to-back road games in the NFL are tough enough, let alone on short rest. Earlier this season, the league's youngest club proved it was up to such a task.

- In the span of six days, the Packers went into two of the NFL's most hostile stadiums – Denver's INVESCO Field and Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium – and came away with victories.
- Kansas City (104-37-0, .737) and Denver (104-38-0, .733) own the best home records in the NFL since 1990. Green Bay (100-42-0, .704) has the fourth-best home record in the league since the '90 season.
- What's more, Green Bay faced a rested Kansas City club coming off a bye week, while the Packers had an abbreviated week thanks to the Monday night showdown in Denver. Facing a Chiefs defense that had yet to yield 20 points to a single opponent in 2007, the Packers put up 33 points.
- "I think our players realize, young and old, that (K.C.) was a tough game going into and a tough place to play," McCarthy said following the victory over the Chiefs. "This group works hard, stays focused. I tell them every day: smart, tough, fundamentally sound. They're in tune with that. That's the way we grade them every day. You make smart decisions, you play tough and you're fundamentally sound. We try to keep it as simple as possible."
- The Packers have now won five straight against the AFC West and eight of their last 10 against the division, dating back to a 1996 victory over Denver. They wrap up their games against the AFC West this season when Oakland comes to Lambeau Field on Dec. 9.

McCARTHY OFF TO BEST START IN CLUB HISTORY

Notching his 18th victory in his 27th game since taking over head coaching duties at the offices on Lombardi Avenue, McCarthy has now won more games through his first 27 than any coach in franchise history.

- Mike Sherman had previously topped the list with a 17-10 record to open his coaching career in Green Bay. Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren both went 16-11 through their first 27.

UPON FURTHER REVIEW – A CLOSER LOOK AT THE STATS

Some things that jump out about the Packers after a second glance at the statistics:

- To keep an eye on this Thursday: third downs. The Cowboys' third-down offense ranks first in the NFC (third NFL), while the Packers' third-down defense is tops in the NFC and second in the league.
- Green Bay has allowed only 14 sacks for a plus-18 sack differential. That mark is tied with the NY Giants (plus-18) for second-best in the league. Only New England (plus-19) has a better differential than the Packers and Giants.
- Three Packers wide receivers — Driver (third), Jennings (15th) and Jones (16th) — all rank in the top 20 in the NFC in receiving yardage.
- Favre ranks first in the NFL in attempts, completions, passing yards and second in completion percentage.
- Running back Ryan Grant has already amassed three 100-yard rushing games in four starts thanks to his 4.6 yards-per-rush average.
- Punter Jon Ryan's 38.5 net punting average ranks fourth in the NFC.
- Kicker Mason Crosby's 11 touchbacks are tied for seventh in the NFL.

- LDT 79 Ryan Pickett (6-2, 322, Seventh Year, Ohio State)** — Key run stopper surpassed 500 career tackles last season...Started all 16 games in his first season in Green Bay and amassed 92 tackles...Previously spent five seasons in St. Louis.
- RDT 99 Corey Williams (6-4, 313, Fourth Year, Arkansas State)** — Enjoyed a breakout season in 2006, setting career highs in sacks (7) and tackles (47)...Also has the ability to slide over and play some defensive end...Started 11 games in 2006.
- RDE 77 Cullen Jenkins (6-2, 303, Fourth Year, Central Michigan)** — Signed to an extension in the offseason, one of the defense's emerging stars...Recorded 48 tackles (28 solo) and 6½ sacks in '06...Brother Kris is a three-time Pro Bowl selection with Carolina.
- SAM 51 Brady Poppinga (6-3, 245, Third Year, BYU)** — Passionate, energetic playmaker has had the benefit of a full, healthy offseason...Started 12 games last season and totaled 76 tackles...Played defensive end at BYU.

- LGB 21 Charles Woodson (6-1, 200, 10th Year, Michigan)** — Four-time Pro Bowler recorded career-high eight interceptions and 26 pass breakups last season...Fought through numerous injuries to start all 16 games in his first season in Green Bay...Also serves as the team's primary punt returner.
- RCB 31 Al Harris (6-1, 188, Tenth Year, Texas A&M-Kingsville)** — Regularly assigned to shadow the opponent's top receiver...Has not missed a game since 1998 (165 contests)...Rarely comes off the field, having played in 98.5 percent of the defensive snaps last year.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

PACKERS SEEM TO MAKE HISTORY ON MONDAY NIGHT

In Denver, Green Bay won its first overtime game on the road since Dec. 12, 1983, at Tampa Bay, also a game on *Monday Night Football*. Jan Stenerud's 23-yard field goal sealed the 12-9 Packers win in Howard Cosell's final broadcast.

- Also in the game, **James Jones** and **Greg Jennings** became the first Packers' duo to record 100 yards receiving each since Donald Driver and Javon Walker on Oct. 11, 2004 vs. Tennessee, also a game on *MNF*.
- Favre's 82-yard strike to Jennings tied for the second-longest TD pass to end an overtime in NFL history. The longest was the 99-yard play from Philadelphia's Ron Jaworski to Mike Quick on Nov. 10, 1985, vs. Atlanta. New England's Tom Brady connected with Troy Brown on an 82-yard pass play to beat Miami on Oct. 19, 2003.
- Jones' 79-yard touchdown catch in the first quarter was the team's longest touchdown reception by a Packers rookie since Max McGee's 82-yard reception in the 1954 season.

436 TOUCHDOWN PASSES AND COUNTING...

After a moment now etched in NFL history, Brett Favre stands alone atop the all-time touchdown passes list.

- James Jones became the 43rd different Packers player on the receiving end of a Favre touchdown pass. The start of the streak, touchdown pass No. 1, began with **Sterling Sharpe's** grab in the fourth quarter against the Bengals on Sept. 20, 1992.
- Favre's two fourth-quarter touchdown throws in that game not only sealed the come-from-behind, 24-23 victory, but also earned him the start the following week, a job he hasn't relinquished since.
- In a three-touchdown performance at New England on Oct. 13, 2002, Favre became just the fourth NFL player to throw for 300 touchdowns. On his final TD pass of the day, a 2-yard toss to tight end **Bubba Franks**, Favre surpassed John Elway to move into third place on the all-time list.
- He moved into second place on the list in one of the most memorable performances of his career – and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – when he threw four touchdown passes in the first half against Oakland just one day after the sudden death of his father, Irvin. Favre's second touchdown pass of the night, a 23-yard strike to Javon Walker, pushed him past Fran Tarkenton on the league's all-time list with 343 career TD passes.
- A first-quarter strike to **Greg Jennings** made NFL history at Minnesota in Week 4. The game was stopped briefly, and a videotaped message from Dan Marino was played on the Metrodome's scoreboard.

A CHRONOLOGY OF THE RECORD

Eight players – all members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame – have held the NFL career touchdown pass record throughout the history of the league. Thanks to research provided by Elias Sports Bureau, the one-time

record holders were:

- **Benny Friedman** had 66 career TD passes and held the record from 1930 until 1943.
- **Arnie Herber**, a former Green Bay signal caller, reached 66 touchdown passes in 1940 and shared the record with Friedman until 1943.
- **Sammy Baugh** passed Friedman and Herber in 1943 and threw 187 career touchdowns. He held the record until 1962.
- **Bobby Layne** tied Baugh in 1961 and passed him during the 1962 season. Layne finished with 196 touchdown passes and held the record until 1963.
- **Y.A. Tittle** passed Layne in 1963 and finished his career with 212 touchdown passes. Tittle held the record until 1966.
- **Johnny Unitas** passed Tittle in 1966 and ended his playing days with 290 TD passes. He held the record until 1975.
- **Fran Tarkenton** surpassed Unitas in 1975 and became the first NFL player with 300 career TD passes. He finished with 342 touchdown passes and held the record until 1995.
- **Dan Marino** passed Tarkenton on Nov. 26, 1995, at Indianapolis with a second-quarter touchdown pass and finished his career with 420 touchdown passes. He held the record until surpassed by Brett Favre in 2007.

MORE THAN JUST A SACK TO KGB, COMMUNITY



Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila**, who earlier this season surpassed Hall of Famer Reggie White on the franchise's all-time career sack list, has seen a return to form this season with 9½ sacks through 11 games.

► With another ½ sack, Gbaja-Biamila can reach double digits in sacks for the fifth time in his career. He stands tied with White with four seasons with 10 or more sacks.

► This season, many more are cheering on 'KGB' with each sack for what it will mean towards the greater Green Bay community.

► More than \$10,000 goes to Freedom House, a Green Bay homeless shelter, with each KGB sack. The pledge for each sack comes from Gbaja-Biamila, teammates **Ryan Pickett** and **Bubba Franks**, and local donors.

► One of the decade's most-feared pass rushers, KGB recorded 10-plus sacks four consecutive seasons (2001-04). The eight-year pro, along with many others, is hoping he can reach that

plateau again this season.

PACKERS ONCE AGAIN LEAGUE'S YOUNGEST TEAM

Green Bay has the distinction of being the NFL's youngest team for the second straight season.

► Since taking over general manager duties in 2005, Ted Thompson has vowed to build the team's foundation through the draft. Of the 53 active roster players, 19 have been drafted by Thompson.

MILESTONES COME ON THE ROAD FOR FAVRE

Brett Favre had one of the league's most coveted milestones in his sights and again made history away from Lambeau. Taking a look back at some of Favre's milestone touchdown passes throughout his career, all have a common theme – they came in road victories.

- ▶ Only touchdown pass No. 100 came in front of the home crowd at Lambeau Field, though it still came in a winning effort.
- ▶ Touchdown pass No. 301 pushed Favre ahead of John Elway (300) to third on the league's all-time touchdown passes list.
- ▶ No. 343 – coming in one of the most memorable performances of his career and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – placed Favre No. 2 on the all-time list, surpassing Fran Tarkenton.

NO ONE WINS MORE THAN NO. 4

In what has been a record-breaking year for Favre thus far, certainly one of the most meaningful accomplishments, both from a team and individual standpoint, came early. With his 149th win in Week 2, Favre surpassed John Elway on the all-time quarterback wins list. Heading into the contest at Dallas, Favre now has 157 career wins.

- ▶ Simply put, Favre was spectacular in the record-breaking victory over the New York Giants. He completed 29-of-38 passes for 286 yards and three touchdowns and earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors.
- ▶ "We gave him the game ball after the game," McCarthy said after the win. "The 'all-time' in anything in this league is such a monumental achievement. 149 victories – I think that speaks for itself. When you go out and win over that long of a period of time, I think that's the ultimate compliment a quarterback can have. To me, if you asked me what is the biggest record that he will achieve, I think he just accomplished it."

TACKLE DUO AS STEADY AS THEY COME

Tackle **Chad Clifton** has made 106 career starts for the Packers, while fellow tackle **Mark Tauscher** has started 102 career games.

- ▶ A second-round pick in 2000, Clifton was inserted into the starting lineup in Week 7 as a rookie and has been a mainstay on the line since then.
- ▶ Favre's blind-side shield, Clifton has started 74 of 75 games since returning from a pelvic injury that ended his 2002 season after a blind-side hit from Warren Sapp. Only a bout with the flu last season in Miami (Oct. 22) could snap the streak.
- ▶ Tauscher started 14 games as a rookie in 2000, earning his first start at right tackle in Week 3, a position he has yet to relinquish. Tauscher saw his own consecutive starts streak come to an end as well in 2006 (57 games) because of a groin injury.
- ▶ The duo has provided a steady influence to many of their younger teammates along the line. Already this season, five different players have started along the interior of the offensive line (**Daryn Colledge, Junius Coston, Tony Moll, Jason Spitz and Scott Wells**).
- ▶ Elite pass blockers that rarely receive the credit they deserve, Clifton and Tauscher have anchored an offensive line that has allowed the second fewest sacks in the NFL since they became fixtures in the starting lineup in 2000.

FAVRE'S MOST IMPRESSIVE STAT?

Not to be overlooked as he breaks nearly ever career passing record is just how durable Brett Favre has been since being inserted into the starting lineup. Despite playing one of the most susceptible positions in the game, Favre has answered the bell time after time for the Packers.

- ▶ Favre made his 241st consecutive start against Minnesota in Week 4, surpassing former Vikings center Mick Tingelhoff (240) and now owns the second-longest recorded streak in NFL history at 248.
- ▶ Only Minnesota's Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more regular-season games in consecutive fashion.
- ▶ Favre has played in 250 straight games (270 including playoffs) and his 248 starts in a row (268 including playoffs) is the NFL's record among quarterbacks.
- ▶ Including a one-week stint earlier this season (finger), Favre has appeared on the injury report an amazing 49 times during the streak.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Packers will host a season-long celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of Lambeau Field. The crown jewel of the National Football League remains the most historic stadium in football.

- Dedicated as City Stadium Sept. 29, 1957, with a 21-17 victory over the archrival Chicago Bears, the team renamed the facility Lambeau Field in 1965 following the death of E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach. It is the NFL's longest-tenured facility.
- To mark the occasion, an anniversary logo was created and is featured on the team's home uniforms, *Gameday* program, the media guide and the Packers Yearbook.
- Lambeau Field also features the special logo in the north end zone. Both end zones have been painted to reflect the way they were in Lambeau Field's first season in 1957.
- Renowned 3-D pop artist Charles Fazzino was commissioned by the Packers to create an art piece celebrating the 50th anniversary. Fazzino, the official artist of the Super Bowl and Major League Baseball's All-Star Game, spent nine months on the project. The piece is available in a limited edition 3-D format, as well as on T-shirts, helmets and assorted items in the Packers Pro Shop.
- Packers ticket holders will enjoy images of Lambeau Field through the years on their tickets as well.



TRAVELING LIGHT IN 2007

NFL teams will cover 566,650 miles this season – about 75,000 more miles than a round trip flight from the earth to the moon.

- No team will cover more mileage than the St. Louis Rams (34,352), while the N.Y. Jets will travel the fewest (9,186).
- In the preseason and regular season, Green Bay will fly a total of 10,738 miles, over 6,000 miles less than the team traveled in 2006.
- Most of the miles are covered following the bye week, as the team plays six of its final 10 remaining games on the road.

SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Four coaches have new titles this season, though all four were with the team during the 2006 season. Former offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski left to become the head coach at Boston College in January, leaving a major opening on the staff.

- McCarthy tabbed **Joe Philbin** as offensive coordinator. Entering his fifth season with the Packers, Philbin most recently served as offensive line

coach in 2006 where he implemented a new zone-blocking scheme and successfully integrated three rookie starters.

- **Winston Moss** was promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers after serving as linebackers coach in 2006. As the assistant head coach, the 41-year-old Moss will be McCarthy's right-hand man with regard to administrative duties and team dynamics. Moss will continue to coach the linebackers as well.
- Promoted to offensive line coach, **James Campen** moves up from his position as assistant offensive line coach in McCarthy's first season at the helm. The center for Brett Favre's first career start in 1992, Campen begins his fourth season on the Packers staff.
- **Jerry Fontenot** will serve as assistant offensive line coach in 2007. A 16-year NFL veteran (1989-2004), Fontenot joined the Packers as a coaching intern last summer and remained with the team throughout the 2006 season as an offensive assistant.

PUNT BLOCKS

Jon Ryan was 13 years old the last time the Packers had a punt blocked. It happened Sept. 10, 1995, at Chicago, when the Bears' Anthony Marshall got to Craig Hentrich.

- Only one other team has a longer active stretch of punts without a block than Green Bay:

QUITE THE DEBUT FOR CROSBY

According to Elias Sports Bureau, rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** on Sept. 9 became the first player in NFL history to kick a 50-plus yard field goal and a game-winning field goal in the final minute of his first NFL game.

- What a whirlwind couple of days it had been for Crosby. First, he found out on Sept. 1 that he had won the kicking job after what had been perhaps the most intense positional battle in training camp. Two days later, he celebrated his 23rd birthday, and just days after that the rookie was lining up for his first-ever professional game.
- Crosby was 3-for-3 on field goals against the Eagles. He hit a 53-yarder, one yard shy of the team record, in the first quarter, a 37-yarder in the third quarter, and a 42-yarder with 2 seconds left to break a 13-all tie and give the Packers the three-point win. He was later awarded NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his efforts.

ROOKIES IN THE BACKFIELD

Green Bay became the first NFL team to open the regular season with two rookie starters in the backfield since 1996. That season, both St. Louis (Derrick Harris and Lawrence Phillips) and Miami (Stanley Pritchett and Abdul-Karim al-Jabbar) used an all-rookie backfield on opening day.

- Rookie running back **Brandon Jackson**, a second-round pick from Nebraska, became the first rookie to start at running back on opening day for the Packers since John Brockington in 1971.
- Fullback **Korey Hall**, a linebacker at Boise State last season, was the first Packers rookie to start on opening day at fullback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.
