PACKERS FACE BRONCOS ON MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL

Green Bay comes off the bye week with a primetime contest against the Denver Broncos.

- The Packers have never won in Denver, a streak that extends beyond their 0-5 regular-season record. They also are 0-5 in preseason play in the Mile High city, including a 1946 loss to the Washington Redskins. The team makes its first-ever appearance at INVESCO Field.
- Green Bay comes into the Monday night contest winners of nine of its last 10 games, including four straight road victories.
- Winners of their last three games against AFC West teams, the Packers have won six of their last eight against the division, dating back to a 1996 victory over Denver.
- For the 15th straight season (1993-2007), the Packers make an appearance on *Monday Night Football*. In the NFL, only Monday night's opponent, Denver (16, 1992-2007), has a longer streak.
- Green Bay stands in first place in the NFC North, but still has a long way to go in the race for the division crown – four division games remain.

TOUGH AFTER THE BYE

In games immediately following the bye, the Packers have won eight of their last 11, including a hard-earned victory at Miami last season. McCarthy called the win in scorching temperatures a turning point of the 2006 season.

- Recent history shows that the Packers have been an improved club after the bye. The much-needed time off has provided valuable rest and recovery, as well as a refocus on fundamentals.
- "The bye week emphasis, number one, was to get healthy," McCarthy said regarding the schedule he created for the bye week. "And number two, to make sure we're totally detailed on the things we need to improve on and the direction that we're going to go as we move forward. And we'll highlight those. When we come back, Monday and Tuesday's practices we'll have a little more individual time than normal so we can work those fundamental things."
- In 2003, Green Bay went 7-2 (.778) after the bye. Only three teams posted better marks, including the Super Bowl champion Patriots.
- Last season, seven of their eight wins were after the bye.
- This decade (since 2000), the Packers over the balance of their season after the bye are a combined 43-24 (.642).

WITH THE CALL

ESPN enters its second season as host of the most successful series in sports television history, *Monday Night Football*. Play-by-play man Mike Tirico is joined by analysts Ron Jaworski and Tony Kornheiser. Suzy Kolber and Michele Tafoya serve as the sideline reporters.

- The contest also will air as a simulcast locally on WBAY (Ch. 2) in Green Bay and WISN (Ch. 12) in Milwaukee.
- ESPN Deportes, with Alvaro Martin, Raul Allegre and John Sutcliffe, will

broadcast in Spanish. ESPN International will air the contest in three languages to over 180 countries.

- Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station Packers Radio Network, with Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler Larry McCarren (color) calling the action. The network covers 47 markets in six states.
- Westwood One will air the game across the country. Dave Sims (play-by-play) and Bob Trumphy (analyst) will call the action. Jim Gray hosts pregame and halftime shows.
- For out-of-town listeners, the broadcast is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on www.packers.com as well as on Sirius Satellite Radio (channel 123 WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.
- DIRECTV subscribers can watch the game on channel 206 (HD ch. 73).

PICKS JUST KEEP COMING

A second-quarter interception against Washington quarterback Jason Campbell – courtesy of Charles Woodson – marked the 12th straight game the Packers have intercepted at least one pass.

- The 12-game interception streak is the longest current streak in the NFL.
- Over the course of the streak, the Packers have intercepted 21 passes. Woodson has a team-high 7 interceptions during that period.

WHAT A WEEK 6 FOR WOODSON

After a game that featured his first interception of the season and a 57-yard fumble return for the go-ahead touchdown, cornerback **Charles Woodson** took home some hardware for his stellar performance.

► Despite the fact he is a four-time Pro Bowler, Woodson won just the first Defensive Player of the Week honor of his career.

► Fans on NFL.com also awarded the Michigan product GMC Defensive Player of the Week honors.

► Historically speaking, Woodson is only the fourth Packers player since 1940 with a fumble recovery for a touchdown and an interception in the same game.

► The other three Green Bay Packers to do that were Charley Brock (10/4/1942, at CHI), Tom Brown (11/17/1968, vs. NO) and Ahmad Carroll (11/29/2004, vs. STL).

ROBINSON REINSTATED

Wide receiver **Koren Robinson** was reinstated by NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell last week and joined his teammates Monday for his first practice in more than a year.

► The wide receiver joined the Packers in September 2006 but was suspended shortly thereafter for a repeat violation of the league's substance abuse policy. In four games last season, Robinson served as the Packers' primary kick returner and as a reserve wide receiver.

► Whether the wideout plays Monday night in Denver remains to be seen. If he were to play, the Packers would need to move him to their active roster. Robinson is currently practicing with the team under an NFL roster exemption which expires the day after the Denver contest, on Oct. 30.

► Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** was pleased with what he saw Monday afternoon at practice: "Koren had a good practice. He's in good shape. He seems to have excellent recall. I really want to watch him go through the week of practice. Everybody is excited he's back. I'm more excited for what he's accomplished and the track that he's on for his personal and professional life as he moves forward. But I'm just going to watch him every day, and we'll make an educated decision at the end of the week. He's been here since Thursday. He came in here Thursday and worked out. I had three people call me and tell me how well he worked out, so like I said everybody is excited he's back here."

Mike McCarthy: 13-9-0, .591; second NFL season

MIKE MCCARTHY...In second year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Led the Packers to an 8-8 finish and near playoff berth, losing a tiebreaker with the New York Giants, who also finished 8-8.
- ▶ Spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- ▶ Began his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

MIKE SHANAHAN...In 13th year as the Broncos' 11th head coach.

- ▶ Has guided the Broncos to two World Championships, seven trips to the postseason and nine winning seasons in his tenure as head coach.
- ▶ Entered the 2007 campaign with the 17th most career wins (139) by a head coach in NFL history.
- ▶ Spent three seasons as offensive coordinator for the San Francisco 49ers (1992-94), including a victory in Super Bowl XXIX, before being hired by Denver.
- ▶ Previously served as head coach for the Oakland Raiders (1988-89) and as an assistant with the Broncos (1984-87, 1989-91).

THE PACKERS-BRONCOS SERIES

The Packers first met the Broncos in 1971, Denver's 12th year of existence as an NFL franchise. A Week 2 showdown, Green Bay defeated Denver, 34-13, at County Stadium in Milwaukee.

- ▶ Green Bay is undefeated in the series in games played in Wisconsin (4-0-1) but has yet to win a game in the series outside of its home state.
- ▶ The Packers make their first appearance at INVESCO Field at Mile High, as Green Bay makes its first trip to the city since 1999. Hoping a change of scenery will change their luck, the Packers bid for their first win in the Mile High City. Winless in 10 all-time excursions to Denver, Green Bay is 0-5 in the regular season and 0-5 in preseason, including a 1946 loss to the Washington Redskins.
- ▶ Four-time Super Bowl loser Denver recorded its first-ever win in the NFL's title game with a dramatic 31-24 victory over Green Bay in Super Bowl XXXII in what many call the greatest quarterback match-up in Super Bowl history.
- ▶ This marks the third game in the series played on *Monday Night Football*. Denver has won the two previous meetings, including a 17-14 victory in 1984 played in blizzard conditions.
- ▶ Green Bay has won three of the four regular-season games against Denver with Brett Favre under center. Their only loss came in 1999.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Packers cornerbacks coach Lionel Washington spent two of his 15 NFL seasons playing cornerback for the Broncos (1995-96)...Four current Denver assistants previously coached in Green Bay: Jim Bates, Bob Slowik, Joe Baker and Charlie Jackson...Bates served as defensive coordinator for the Packers in 2005, while Slowik spent five seasons in Green Bay (2000-04), his final season as defensive coordinator...Baker was a secondary/safeties coach for the Packers in 2005, and Jackson served as quality control/defensive assistant in Green Bay that same season...Baker also spent five seasons on the New Orleans coaching staff (2000-04) along with Packers Head Coach Mike McCarthy, assistant head coach/linebackers coach Winston Moss, tight ends coach Ben McAdoo, offensive quality control coach Ty Knott and wide receivers coach Jimmy Robinson...Broncos special teams coordinator Scott O'Brien coached with McCarthy at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-90)...Packers assistant special teams coach Shawn Slocum spent several seasons with Broncos defensive line coach Bill Johnson on the Texas A&M coaching staff (1992-97)...Packers wide receiver Greg Jennings and Broncos linebacker Ian Gold are first cousins; Jennings' mom and Gold's mom are sisters...Jennings was drafted by the Packers in the second round in the 2006 NFL Draft, nine selections before the Broncos drafted his teammate at Western Michigan, tight end Tony Scheffler...Broncos wide receiver Javon Walker spent four seasons (2002-05) in Green Bay...Packers kicker Mason Crosby spent the past four years at the University of Colorado (2003-06)...Packers guard/center Jason Spitz was teammates at the University of Louisville with Broncos defensive lineman Elvis Dumervil...Rookies DeShawn Wynn (Green Bay) and Jarvis Moss (Denver) led Florida to the BCS National Championship last season.

INDIVIDUALLY VS. DENVER BRONCOS

In four regular-season games against Denver, Favre is 3-1 in his career despite his struggles; his 51.8% completion percentage and 57.3 quarterback rating are his lowest career numbers against any NFL team...Favre has passed for 751 yards, six touchdowns and nine interceptions in his previous regular-season games against the Broncos...Perhaps his best performance against Denver came in the postseason, when he threw for 256 yards and three touchdowns in a heartbreaking loss in Super Bowl XXXII...Cornerback Al Harris intercepted a pass in the 2003 meeting...Tight end Bubba Franks also caught a touchdown pass in that meeting.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Dec. 28, 2003, at Lambeau Field; Packers won 31-3.

- ▶ Ahman Green reeled off a team-record 98-yard TD run and Favre threw a touchdown pass the same week he buried his father as the Packers captured the NFC North title.
- ▶ An unmistakable roar came from the crowd at the 2-minute warning as the Arizona Cardinals completed an amazing comeback to beat Minnesota, handing Green Bay the division title.
- ▶ Green established a new franchise record for rushing yards (1,883) and touchdowns (20) after finishing the day with the 98-yard scamper.

LAST MEETING, AT DENVER

Oct. 17, 1999; Broncos won 31-10.

- ▶ A defensive battle in the first half, the teams traded field goals before Denver erupted for four second-half touchdowns.
- ▶ Ed McCaffrey caught two touchdown passes in the third quarter, the second from 78 yards out, as the Broncos took a commanding lead.
- ▶ The Packers got a rushing touchdown from Dorsey Levens to keep the game within reach, but two rushing touchdowns from Olandis Gary and Brian Griese sealed the victory for Denver.
- ▶ The loss moved Green Bay to 3-2 in a year it eventually would finish 8-8 and miss the playoffs for the first time in seven years.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

SIMPLY THE BEST

The Packers own more NFL championships (12) than any other franchise, but it's not all about past glory for the Green and Gold.

- ▶ Since the advent of free agency in 1993, the Packers own the best W-L record in the NFL.
- ▶ This week's opponent, the Denver Broncos, are the third-winningest club in the free-agency era.
- ▶ A look at the most successful teams in the free-agency era:

ARE YOU READY FOR SOME FOOTBALL?

Under the bright lights of Monday night, the Packers are 24-25-1 all-time.

- ▶ On *Monday Night Football* for a **15th consecutive season**, the Packers make another appearance in 2007.
- ▶ The Packers own the **NFC's longest MNF appearance streak** — 15 seasons (1993-2007). Minnesota (15, 1987-2001) and Dallas (11, 1991-2001) both ended long stretches in 2002. Miami (15, 1990-2004) saw its streak end in '05. In the NFL, only Denver (16, 1992-2007) now has a longer streak.
- ▶ Prior to the current 15-year string, Green Bay didn't appear for six straight years, 1986-92.
- ▶ **Brett Favre** is 17-15 in 32 Monday night starts (1993-2006). He was 6-1 during his three consecutive MVP seasons, 1995-97.
- ▶ Favre and **Robert Brooks** own the *MNF* record for longest pass completion, a 99-yard touchdown strike at Chicago, Sept. 11, 1995 (Packers franchise record, tied NFL record).
- ▶ During a memorable Oct. 17, 1983, Redskins-Packers game, still the **highest scoring game in MNF history** — Green Bay won a 48-47 track meet. Facing the defending Super Bowl champions, the Packers prevailed in a contest featuring 11 touchdowns, 11 extra points and six field goals.



MCCARTHY NOW A HALL-OF-FAMER

Though the bye week is meant for rest for players and coaches alike, Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** did take a detour to Baldwin City, Kan.

- ▶ There on Oct. 20, McCarthy was inducted into Baker University's Athletic Hall of Fame, where he was an all-conference tight end and senior captain in 1986. That season, the team made a run all the way to the NAIA title game.
- ▶ McCarthy became the 103rd member of Baker's Hall of Fame, which was founded in 1977. Baker, the oldest university in Kansas, is celebrating its 150th anniversary in 2007-08.

TURNOVERS THE NAME OF THE GAME

Though its turnover margin stands at an even zero, Green Bay has five early wins thanks in large part to its ability to turn turnovers into points.

- ▶ Green Bay is tied for fourth in the league with New England, with 48 points scored off turnovers. On the other side of the ball, the defense has allowed only 16 points off turnovers, also fourth best in the league.
- ▶ The Packers have won the turnover battle in four of their five wins this

season. They came out even in their win at Minnesota and finished minus-four in their only loss, against Chicago.

- ▶ Green Bay did not have a giveaway in the victory over San Diego. The team was 3-0 last season in games without a giveaway.
- ▶ Over a longer stretch, the team has won 25 of 26 games playing turnover-free football, since a loss at Minnesota, Dec. 1, 1997. Green Bay's only loss in such games during that stretch was a 23-20 defeat at Minnesota, Oct. 23, 2005.
- ▶ Including playoffs, the Packers have won 28 of their last 29 games without a giveaway.

FAVRE TURNING BACK THE CLOCK THIS SEASON

Quarterback **Brett Favre** has surpassed some of the NFL's greatest milestones so far this season, but not lost on the rest of the league is just how well he has been playing through the first six games.

- ▶ For the first time in his career, Favre threw for 300 yards-or-more in three consecutive games (Weeks 3-5). With a 322-yard effort against Chicago in Week 5, Favre now has 51 career 300-yard passing games.
- ▶ The 1,035 passing yards Favre had over those three contests were the most passing yards over a three-game stretch in his 17-year career.
- ▶ On Wednesday, Oct. 10, Favre turned 38 years old. One day earlier, starting halfback **DeShawn Wynn** turned 24.
- ▶ Much of the Packers' offensive success can be traced to Favre's precision passing. Between a second-quarter interception against the Giants (Week 2) and a third-quarter interception against the Bears (Week 5), Favre had attempted 142 consecutive passes without an interception — the third-longest streak of his career. During the interception-free streak, he threw nine touchdown passes.

DEFENSE PROPELS PACKERS PAST REDSKINS

With the defense coming up big seemingly countless times, including **Charles Woodson's** game-changing 57-yard fumble return for a touch-down, to foster an intense 17-14 victory, the Packers are now 5-1 and alone in first place in the NFC North.

- ▶ The defense did so on a drizzly day in front of 70,761 at Lambeau Field, beginning with a momentous turnover late in the third quarter.
- ▶ Just two plays after the Packers had pulled within 14-10 on a **Mason Crosby** field goal, the Redskins ran a reverse to speedy wide receiver Santana Moss. But Green Bay defensive lineman **Corey Williams** split two blockers to get a hand on the ball, stripping it from Moss.
- ▶ Woodson leaped over Moss to recover the ball and, having not been touched while on the ground, jumped up and raced 57 yards - with the help of an **Al Harris** block on quarterback Jason Campbell - for the go-ahead score.
- ▶ The defense survived, if not thrived on, several big moments while protecting that three-point lead the rest of the way. The Redskins dropped a few passes to help out, including a deep one to an open Moss in the third quarter, but nonetheless on each of the next three possessions, one key play was made.
- ▶ Safety **Atari Bigby** broke up a third-down pass deep over the middle to tight end Todd Yoder, forcing a punt on Washington's final drive of the third quarter.
- ▶ Bigby and linebacker **Nick Barnett** combined to stuff running back Clinton Portis (20 carries, 64 yards) on third-and-1 early in the fourth quarter.
- ▶ Bigby forced a Portis fumble that linebacker **A.J. Hawk** recovered, giving the Packers a first-and-goal, though the offense failed to score after a sack and missed field goal.
- ▶ Midway through the fourth quarter, Washington passed on a 51-yard field goal attempt and decided to go for it on fourth-and-2 from the Green Bay 33. Running back Ladell Betts slipped into the right flat to catch a short pass from Campbell (21-of-37, 217 yards), but Barnett ran him down and made the tackle at the line of scrimmage.
- ▶ Thanks to Sean Taylor's second interception of **Brett Favre** (19-of-37, 188 yards) and a Green Bay punt, the defense needed two more stops down the stretch.
- ▶ This time Pro Bowl defensive end **Aaron Kampman** emerged, tackling Portis for a 4-yard loss on a short pass and then sacking Campbell on third down to force a punt. On Washington's final possession, Kampman sacked Campbell again on second down and then chased down Betts after an 11-yard reception on fourth-and-17, sealing the win.
- ▶ The offense did sputter, gaining just 225 yards on the day. Sixty of them came on a nice catch-and-run by tight end **Donald Lee**, setting up a 3-yard TD run by **DeShawn Wynn** (13 carries, 37 yards) to give the Packers an early 7-0 lead.
- ▶ The Redskins countered with two long scoring drives in the first half, getting touchdowns on a 6-yard run by Campbell and a 14-yard pass to tight end Chris Cooley, who was Washington's offensive star with nine catches for 105 yards.
- ▶ But from there the Packers' defense ruled the day. In pitching the second-half shutout, Green Bay yielded just 96 yards and four first downs. The Redskins were 0-for-7 on third downs in the second half.

- ▶ McCarthy listed four players that missed time in the game due to injury, but only **Bubba Franks** didn't return. The tight end left the game in the fourth quarter with a knee injury and McCarthy said Franks could be sidelined for a few weeks with a knee sprain.
- ▶ **Vernand Morency** (ribs), **DeShawn Wynn** (hand), and **Cullen Jenkins** (knee) all returned to finish the game, although Jenkins admitted he initially received a scare near the end of the first half when his leg was trapped between two Washington linemen.
- ▶ "I always look at byes from a medical standpoint," Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** said following the game. "I think byes are a good time to get healthy. We're a particularly healthy team if you look at us as opposed to everyone else around the league. I think it's a good opportunity to

have a bye whenever it comes because there's always certain aspects of your football team that you'd like to clean up and improve. And I think this is a good time for our football players to get away and to get rested."

ANOTHER NFL RECORD; CROSBY STRUGGLES IN WEATHER

With his two interceptions, Favre broke George Blanda's NFL record for career interceptions, which stood at 277.

- ▶ The record-breaker came on the Packers' first drive of the third quarter, when Favre ran play-action, rolled to his left and saw **James Jones** running wide open down the left sideline. But it appeared to take Favre a little too long to release the throw, allowing safety Sean Taylor to get over and outjump Jones for the ball.
- ▶ "I could care less, we won the game," Favre said about the record. "I'm glad it's over, just like the other records. We're 5-1. It feels a heck of a lot better than having no picks and being 1-5."
- ▶ **Mason Crosby**, the rookie kicker out of Colorado, had a chance to see just how difficult and unpredictable the conditions can be inside Lambeau Field on a dreary, drizzly day.
- ▶ At the end of the first half, Crosby lined up to attempt a 46-yard field goal, which if it had been good would have allowed the Packers to enter halftime down 14-10. However, the kick sailed a little to the left, even though distance wasn't a factor.
- ▶ Crosby also missed a 38-yard field goal in the fourth quarter, which hit the upright and bounced away, something he didn't expect when the ball came off his foot.
- ▶ "It's great being part of a team where I kind of had an off day and everyone can back me up and get the win," Crosby said. "That's a positive, but it's not something that I plan on happening again. I've got to go out there and do my job. I have two weeks to get back on track and get ready."

OTHER POSTGAME NOTES

- ▶ Tight end **Donald Lee's** 60-yard reception in the first quarter was the longest of his career and marked the longest play from scrimmage for the Packers this season.
- ▶ With his two sacks Oct. 14, defensive end **Aaron Kampman** surpassed No. 7 Vonnie Holliday (32) and No. 6 Bryce Paup (32½) on the Packers' all-time sack list. Kampman now sits at No. 6 with 34 career sacks.
- ▶ As part of the 21st annual Packers Women's Association Food Drive, 14,400 non-perishable food items and \$13,523 were collected.
- ▶ The paid attendance was 70,761.

PACKERS TO ENJOY A GOOD BYE

The Packers have played six games and despite various injuries to a few key players, they have been relatively healthy in the first portion of their

WORLD SERIES, MNF TO MEET IN DENVER

Thanks to the Colorado Rockies making their first-ever appearance in the World Series, both the fall classic and *Monday Night Football* will coincide in the Mile High city.

- ▶ Game 4 of the World Series is set to be played at Coors Field on Sunday, Oct. 28 – the day the Packers arrive in Denver.
- ▶ Game 5 – if necessary – will be played on Monday, Oct. 29, the same night as the Packers–Broncos primetime contest.

In memory of Max McGee, 1932-2007

Green Bay Packers Hall of Famer Max McGee passed away at age 75 this past weekend. A legendary wide receiver and radio announcer for the Packers, McGee was among the most revered players in team history.

- ▶ A fifth-round selection by the Packers in 1954, McGee came to Green Bay from Tulane University.
- ▶ After his rookie season, McGee spent two years in the U.S. Air Force before returning to the Packers.
- ▶ A member of the most storied dynasty in NFL history, McGee went on to win five NFL championships. His lone Pro Bowl selection came in 1961.
- ▶ McGee became the stuff of NFL legend in the first Super Bowl in 1967. Having caught only four passes all season, McGee figured he would see little if any action in the championship game. Reportedly staying out until the wee hours of the night, McGee was summoned into the huddle after wideout Boyd Dowler was injured early in the first quarter.
- ▶ Only a few plays later, McGee reeled in a 37-yard touchdown catch, the first touchdown in Super Bowl history.
- ▶ McGee would catch another touchdown in the third quarter and finished the day with seven catches for 138 yards and two scores.
- ▶ He would retire one year later after another victory in Super Bowl II.
- ▶ In 1975, McGee was inducted into the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame.
- ▶ His association with the team continued in 1979, when he teamed with play-by-play man Jim Irwin on the Packers Radio Network. McGee called Packers games for 20 seasons, retiring in 1998.
- ▶ McGee and his wife, Denise, founded the Max McGee National Research Center for Juvenile Diabetes at the Children's Hospital of Wisconsin in Milwaukee in 1999.

PACKERS ONCE AGAIN LEAGUE'S YOUNGEST TEAM

Green Bay has the distinction of being the NFL's youngest team for the second straight season. Coincidentally, the two youngest teams in the NFL have the two longest active winning streaks in the league.

- ▶ Since taking over general manager duties in 2005, Ted Thompson has vowed to build the team's foundation through the draft. Of the 53 active roster players, 21 have been drafted by Thompson.
- ▶ Each team's average age is based upon its opening-day roster. A look at the five youngest teams in 2007:

MORE MCCARTHY - EXCERPTS FROM MONDAY

- ▶ "We had a very spirited, physical practice. It was probably one of our better practices of the year. I'm very pleased with the way our guys practiced today. We went with a large emphasis in the run game, as far as the reps, the way we spread out the reps. Probably a little too physical in some spots, but it was a good day's work."
- ▶ "I thought the self-scout (during the bye) was good. The three areas I worked on on offense were the run game, play-action pass and quarterback movements, and like a lot of times when you go through this experience it's more what you do than what's been used against you from a scheme standpoint. We're just highlighting some fundamentals for particular players, particular concepts that we're in, both run, pass, protection from the offensive standpoint, and we had a chance to work some of that today. Defense was a little more positive as far as the time going through their quality control. Obviously there's some pressure things that we can improve on. And special teams was just more multiple-player rotation, just making sure you're giving a number of players the opportunity to play on certain teams. It was more on matchups and things like that, but we felt pretty good about the fundamentals and the things schematically we've done to this point."
- ▶ "The pass game against the Redskins was not (Favre's) best game of the year. Philadelphia I thought he played a solid half, and I would say the other four games he played very well. I think there are some things, particularly in the Washington game, that we just flat need to do better, and it starts with running the football. The biggest thing off that film is the finish. We need to do a better job with the finish, particularly on the back side, and I think that will help us in the play-action pass. When you're dropping back throwing it, we've turned into a little of a drop-back team, and there's nothing wrong with that. People have made a living that way. That's not the way I envision our football team, and I think some of that does affect the quarterback when you're putting it on his plate every single play, and I think we've leaned pretty heavy to that side as far as how we're using our quarterback."
- ▶ "I think Bubba (Franks) is having an excellent year, and he'll hopefully be back as quick as possible. But once again, it's an opportunity for Ryan Krause. He had a good day today, too. He had a couple nice catches. It's an opportunity for him to step up. But Bubba is very experienced. There are particular things I think he does very well, and frankly I think we as coaches, myself in particular, have done a better job of putting him in those positions, so we need to do the same thing with Ryan Krause."
- ▶ "Ball security for the offense and ball awareness for the defense is something that's part of our daily practice structure. We have a particular period that's assigned to that. I do not like the fact that our turnover ratio is at zero. I think we've given the ball away too much. Six fumbles and six interceptions is too high, and we need to do a better job of taking the ball away. So it's an everyday focus. We look at it as a fundamental of football, no different than blocking, tackling and all the other basics."
- ▶ "They (players) had lifting responsibility here in the morning. We met as a team at noon, and then we went special teams, and then we went offense and defense individual, and then we had 2:30 practice. It was a highly energized practice. The team periods were excellent today."
- ▶ "Frankly this is probably the perfect week for him (Robinson) to come back just because of the way we're spreading out the installation. Tomorrow we'll put in screens and deceptives, the drop-back game, and third down, and then he'll have Wednesday to kind of sort through all that, and then we won't do the red zone until Thursday. So this is probably a good week for someone like Koren to be in this situation."
- ▶ "I know he's (Franks) spent a lot of time on the rehab. I'll meet with (Dr.) Pat McKenzie in the morning, and get a more accurate update on a couple of those guys. Frank (Walker) said he could play this week, so once again I've got to talk to the doctor. But he's off to a fast recovery."



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

THE IMPORTANCE OF A QUICK START

There's no secret that early success increases an NFL team's chance to earn a playoff berth.

- ▶ Maintaining the confidence and momentum built during the four-game win streak to close 2006 has been a major focus of the offseason program for Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** and his team.
- ▶ One of McCarthy's early goals this season – getting off to a quick start – was accomplished with the 4-0 and 5-1 start.
- ▶ Slow starts have plagued the Packers the past three seasons, only one of which resulted in a postseason appearance (2004). That season, the team started 1-4 but won nine of its last 11 games.
- ▶ In 2005, injuries contributed to a 1-7 start while a 1-4 start in 2006 proved too much to overcome.
- ▶ A look at how important fast starts have become to eventual playoff success in the NFL, compiled from 1990-2006:

“SPECIAL” TEAMS

Having always been a key ingredient to the success of the Packers, Green Bay's special teams unit has seen a remarkable improvement this season.

- ▶ In Rick Gosselin's annual *Dallas Morning News* rankings, which objectively grades teams by their rankings in 22 kicking-game categories, Green Bay finished seventh both in 1996 and 1997. The Packers reached the Super Bowl both seasons.
- ▶ More recently, the Packers ranked 8th in 2003 and 9th in 2004. Both years they made the playoffs.
- ▶ For the past two seasons, Green Bay has ranked last in the NFL in Gosselin's rankings.
- ▶ The coverage units have been excellent thus far. Through six games, the Packers rank second in the league in opponent punt return average and fourth in the NFL in opponent kickoff return average.
- ▶ An area of emphasis all offseason, the unit got things going early in Week 1 by accounting for all 16 points.
- ▶ Rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** has connected on 9-of-12 field goal attempts on the season and has displayed a powerful kickoff leg. He already has seven touchbacks on the season.
- ▶ Though the team has been unable to put cornerback Will Blackmon on return duties, fellow defensive back Tramon Williams has filled in nicely. His 65-yard kickoff return in Week 5 against Chicago was the longest return by a Packer since Robert Ferguson's 71-yard kickoff return at Indianapolis (Sept. 26, 2004).

WHEN FAVRE HITS THE CENTURY MARK

In Weeks 2-4, quarterback **Brett Favre** compiled a passer rating over 100.0 for three consecutive weeks, something he has not done since the 1996 season. Not surprisingly, the Packers won all three contests (at N.Y. Giants, San Diego, at Minnesota).

- ▶ In fact, it was only the fifth time in his career that Favre had recorded three straight games with a passer rating over 100.0. He did it twice in 1995 (Nov. 12 – Dec. 3, 4 games; Dec. 16 – Jan. 6, 4 games) and twice again in 1996 (Sept. 1 – Sept. 15, 3 games; Dec. 22 – Sept. 1, 1997, 5 games). Favre was voted the league's MVP in both seasons.
- ▶ The last time he accomplished the feat, Favre had five straight games with a passer rating over 100.0 during the team's Super Bowl XXXI run. The streak began with the final regular-season game against Minnesota (Dec. 22, 1996) and culminated in the first regular-season game the fol-

lowing season (vs. Chicago, Sept. 1). It included three playoff victories, most notably a 35-21 victory over New England in the Super Bowl.

- ▶ Elias Sports Bureau never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis, but rather to measure the effectiveness of a quarterback over an entire season, or an entire career.
- ▶ Nonetheless, in games when Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 76-7 (.916).
- ▶ The Packers are a perfect 41-0 (1.000) at Lambeau Field when Favre hits the century mark. The team is 35-7 (.829) on the road when Favre eclipses the century mark.

UPON FURTHER REVIEW – A CLOSER LOOK AT THE STATS

Some things that jump out about the Packers after a second glance at the statistics:

- ▶ Monday night poses an interesting matchup between the strengths and weaknesses of the Packers and Broncos. The league's second-ranked passing offense, Green Bay, goes up against Denver's second-ranked passing defense.
- ▶ Something has to give in the running game – the Packers rank last in the league in rushing (65.7 ypg), while Denver's rush defense (176.2 ypg) is worst among all 32 teams.
- ▶ Green Bay's defense ranks second in the NFC and fifth in the league in third-down defense. Moreover, the defense has forced 18 three-and-out drives in 71 series (25.4%), the ninth-best percentage in the league.
- ▶ Crosby's seven touchbacks are tied for fifth in the NFL.
- ▶ **Nick Barnett's** crucial fourth-down stop against Washington epitomizes the Packers' fourth-down defense. It ranks tied for fourth in the league.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

WITH THE GAME ON THE LINE, PACKERS DELIVER

A major catalyst in the Packers' quick start has been their ability to get out to an early lead, as evidenced by their plus-20 scoring differential in the opening frame. More importantly, however, has been their ability to deliver in crunch time. Each of their five wins has come thanks to some strong fourth-quarter play. In Week 6 against Washington, strong defensive play held off a comeback attempt by the Redskins.

- In their five wins, Green Bay has entered the fourth quarter down four points (San Diego), tied (Philadelphia), up one (New York Giants), up four (Minnesota) and up three (Washington). In their only loss to Chicago, Green Bay entered the fourth quarter up three points.
- Washington and Green Bay were both scoreless in the fourth quarter in Week 6. Chicago outscored Green Bay, 10-0, in the Packers' only loss of the season.
- Only Carolina and New England have outscored their opponents by a bigger margin in the fourth quarter than the Packers.

423 TOUCHDOWN PASSES AND COUNTING...

After a moment now etched in NFL history, Brett Favre stands alone atop the all-time touchdown passes list.

- 43 different Packers have been on the receiving end of a Favre touchdown pass, beginning with **Sterling Sharpe's** grab in the fourth quarter against the Bengals on Sept. 20, 1992.
- Favre's two fourth-quarter touchdown throws in that game not only sealed the come-from-behind, 24-23 victory, but also earned him the start the following week, a job he hasn't relinquished since.
- In a three-touchdown performance at New England on Oct. 13, 2002, Favre became just the fourth NFL player to throw for 300 touchdowns. On his final TD pass of the day, a 2-yard toss to tight end **Bubba Franks**, Favre surpassed John Elway to move into third place on the all-time list.
- He moved into second place on the list in one of the most memorable performances of his career – and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – when he threw four touchdown passes in the first half against Oakland just one day after the sudden death of his father, Irvin. Favre's second touchdown pass of the night, a 23-yard strike to Javon Walker, pushed him past Fran Tarkenton on the league's all-time list with 343 career TD passes.
- A first-quarter strike to **Greg Jennings** made NFL history at Minnesota in Week 4. The game was stopped briefly, and a videotaped message from Dan Marino was played on the Metrodome's scoreboard.

A CHRONOLOGY OF THE RECORD

Eight players – all members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame – have held the NFL career touchdown pass record throughout the history of the league. Thanks to research provided by Elias Sports Bureau, the one-time record holders were:

- **Benny Friedman** had 66 career TD passes and held the record from 1930 until 1943.
- **Arnie Herber**, a former Green Bay signal caller, reached 66 touchdown passes in 1940 and shared the record with Friedman until 1943.
- **Sammy Baugh** passed Friedman and Herber in 1943 and threw 187 career touchdowns. He held the record until 1962.
- **Bobby Layne** tied Baugh in 1961 and passed him during the 1962 season. Layne finished with 196 touchdown passes and held the record until 1963.
- **Y.A. Tittle** passed Layne in 1963 and finished his career with 212 touchdown passes. Tittle held the record until 1966.
- **Johnny Unitas** passed Tittle in 1966 and ended his playing days with 290 TD passes. He held the record until 1975.
- **Fran Tarkenton** surpassed Unitas in 1975 and became the first NFL player with 300 career TD passes. He finished with 342 touchdown passes and held the record until 1995.
- **Dan Marino** passed Tarkenton on Nov. 26, 1995, at Indianapolis with a second-quarter touchdown pass and finished his career with 420 touchdown passes. He held the record until surpassed by Brett Favre in 2007.



MORE THAN JUST A SACK

Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila**, who earlier this season surpassed Hall of Famer Reggie White on the franchise's all-time career sack list, has seen a return to form this season with 4½ sacks through six games.

- This season, many more are cheering on 'KGB' with each sack for what it will mean towards the greater Green Bay community.
- More than \$10,000 goes to Freedom House, a Green Bay homeless shelter, with each KGB sack. The pledge for each sack comes from Gbaja-Biamila, teammates **Ryan Pickett** and **Bubba Franks**, and local donors.
- One of the decade's most-feared pass rushers, KGB recorded 10-plus sacks four consecutive seasons (2001-04). The eight-year pro, along with many others, are hoping he can once again

reach that plateau this season.

OLD RIVALRY RENEWED

Former NFC Central rivals Favre and Broncos safety John Lynch – who spent 11 seasons in Tampa Bay – meet for the first time since 2003.

- Both Favre and Lynch have been to eight Pro Bowls, placing them with the leaders in Pro Bowl selections among active NFL players.

NO ONE WINS MORE THAN NO. 4

In what has been a record-breaking year for Favre thus far, certainly one of the most meaningful accomplishments, both from a team and individual standpoint, came early. With his 149th win in Week 2, Favre surpassed John Elway on the all-time quarterback wins list. Heading into the contest at Denver, Favre now has 152 career wins.

- Simply put, Favre was spectacular in the record-breaking victory over the New York Giants. He completed 29-of-38 passes for 286 yards and three touchdowns and earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors.
- "We gave him the game ball after the game," McCarthy said after the win. "The 'all-time' in anything in this league is such a monumental achievement. 149 victories - I think that speaks for itself. When you go out and win over that long of a period of time, I think that's the ultimate compliment a quarterback can have. To me, if you asked me what is the biggest record that he will achieve, I think he just accomplished it."

MILESTONES COME ON THE ROAD FOR FAVRE

Brett Favre had one of the league's most coveted milestones in his sights and again made history away from Lambeau. Taking a look back at some of Favre's milestone touchdown passes throughout his career, all have a common theme - they came in road victories.

- Only touchdown pass No. 100 came in front of the home crowd at Lambeau Field, though it still came in a winning effort.
- Touchdown pass No. 301 pushed Favre ahead of John Elway (300) to third on the league's all-time touchdown passes list.
- No. 343 - coming in one of the most memorable performances of his career and in the history of *Monday Night Football* - placed Favre No. 2 on the all-time list, surpassing Fran Tarkenton.

TACKLE DUO AS STEADY AS THEY COME

Tackle **Chad Clifton** has made 101 career starts for the Packers, while fellow tackle **Mark Tauscher** has started 97 career games.

- A second-round pick in 2000, Clifton was inserted into the starting lineup in Week 7 as a rookie and has been a mainstay on the offensive line since then.
- Tauscher started 14 games as a rookie in 2000, earning his first start at right tackle in Week 3, a position he has yet to relinquish. Tauscher saw his own consecutive starts streak come to an end as well in 2006 (57 games) because of a groin injury.
- Favre's blind-side shield, Clifton has started 68 of 69 games since returning from a pelvic injury that ended his 2002 season after a blind-side hit from Warren Sapp. Only a bout with the flu last season in Miami (Oct. 22) could snap the streak.
- The duo has provided a steady influence to many of their younger teammates along the line. Already this season, five different players have started along the interior of the offensive line (**Daryn Colledge, Junius Coston, Tony Moll, Jason Spitz and Scott Wells**).
- Elite pass blockers that rarely receive the credit they deserve, Clifton and Tauscher have anchored an offensive line that has allowed the second fewest sacks in the NFL since they became fixtures in the starting lineup in 2000.

ONLY MARSHALL REMAINS

Favre made his 241st consecutive start against Minnesota, surpassing former Vikings center Mick Tingelhoff (240) and now owns the second-longest recorded streak in NFL history at 243.

- Only Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more in consecutive fashion.
- Favre has played in 245 straight games (265 including playoffs) and his 243 starts in a row (263 including playoffs) is the NFL's record among quarterbacks.
- Including a one-week stint earlier this season (finger), Favre has appeared on the injury report an amazing 49 times during the streak.

OTHER PACKERS BREAKING RECORDS

Though Favre's assault on numerous records has garnered most of the attention this season, a number of other Packers have records and milestones in their sights.

- **Donald Driver** became the seventh player in team history to surpass the 6,000-yard mark and also moved into fifth place in the franchise's all-time receptions list. Driver, who has caught a pass in 86 straight games, became Lambeau Field's all-time leader in receptions.
- **Bubba Franks** became the 11th player in Packers history to record 30 career touchdown receptions.
- Defensive end **Aaron Kampman** recorded his 30th career sack in a Packers uniform earlier this season, becoming the eighth player in team history to do so.
- Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** surpassed Reggie White's franchise record for sacks (68½). Gbaja-Biamila enters the Denver contest with 69 career sacks, having tallied back-to-back, multi-sack games in Weeks 3 and 4.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Packers will host a season-long celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of Lambeau Field. The crown jewel of the National Football League remains the most historic stadium in football.

- Dedicated as City Stadium Sept. 29, 1957, with a 21-17 victory over the archrival Chicago Bears, the team renamed the facility Lambeau Field in 1965 following the death of E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach. It is the NFL's longest-tenured facility.
- To mark the occasion, an anniversary logo was created and is featured on the team's home uniforms, *Gameday* program, the media guide and the Packers Yearbook.
- Lambeau Field also features the special logo in the north end zone. Both end zones have been painted to reflect the way they were in Lambeau Field's first season in 1957.
- Renowned 3-D pop artist Charles Fazzino was commissioned by the Packers to create an art piece celebrating the 50th anniversary. Fazzino, the official artist of the Super Bowl and Major League Baseball's All-Star Game, spent nine months on the project. The piece is available in a limited edition 3-D format, as well as on T-shirts, helmets and assorted items in the Packers Pro Shop.
- Packers ticket holders will enjoy images of Lambeau Field through the years on their tickets as well.



TRAVELING LIGHT IN 2007

NFL teams will cover 566,650 miles this season – about 75,000 more miles than a round trip flight from the earth to the moon.

- No team will cover more mileage than the St. Louis Rams (34,352), while the N.Y. Jets will travel the fewest (9,186).
- In the preseason and regular season, Green Bay will fly a total of 10,738 miles, over 6,000 miles less than the team traveled in 2006.
- Most of the miles will be covered following the bye week, as the team plays six of its ten remaining games on the road.

SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Four coaches have new titles this season, though all four were with the team during the 2006 season. Former offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski left to become the head coach at Boston College in January, leaving a major opening on the staff.

- McCarthy tabbed **Joe Philbin** as offensive coordinator. Entering his fifth season with the Packers, Philbin most recently served as offensive line

coach in 2006 where he implemented a new zone-blocking scheme and successfully integrated three rookie starters.

- **Winston Moss** was promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers after serving as linebackers coach in 2006. As the assistant head coach, the 41-year-old Moss will be McCarthy's right-hand man with regard to administrative duties and team dynamics. Moss will continue to coach the linebackers as well.
- Promoted to offensive line coach, **James Campen** moves up from his position as assistant offensive line coach in McCarthy's first season at the helm. The center for Brett Favre's first career start in 1992, Campen begins his fourth season on the Packers staff.
- **Jerry Fontenot** will serve as assistant offensive line coach in 2007. A 16-year NFL veteran (1989-2004), Fontenot joined the Packers as a coaching intern last summer and remained with the team throughout the 2006 season as an offensive assistant.

PUNT BLOCKS

Jon Ryan was 13 years old the last time the Packers had a punt blocked. It happened Sept. 10, 1995, at Chicago, when the Bears' Anthony Marshall got to Craig Hentrich.

- Only one other team has a longer active stretch of punts without a block than Green Bay:

QUITE THE DEBUT FOR CROSBY

According to Elias Sports Bureau, rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** on Sept. 9 became the first player in NFL history to kick a 50-plus yard field goal and a game-winning field goal in the final minute of his first NFL game.

- What a whirlwind couple of days it had been for Crosby. First, he found out on Sept. 1 that he had won the kicking job after what had been perhaps the most intense positional battle in training camp. Two days later, he celebrated his 23rd birthday, and just days after that the rookie was lining up for his first-ever professional game.
- Crosby was 3-for-3 on field goals against the Eagles. He hit a 53-yarder, one yard shy of the team record, in the first quarter, a 37-yarder in the third quarter, and a 42-yarder with 2 seconds left to break a 13-all tie and give the Packers the three-point win. He was later awarded NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his efforts.

ROOKIES IN THE BACKFIELD

Green Bay became the first NFL team to open the regular season with two rookie starters in the backfield since 1996. That season, both St. Louis (Derrick Harris and Lawrence Phillips) and Miami (Stanley Pritchett and Abdul-Karim al-Jabbar) used an all-rookie backfield on opening day.

- Rookie running back **Brandon Jackson**, a second-round pick from Nebraska, became the first rookie to start at running back on opening day for the Packers since John Brockington in 1971.
- Fullback **Korey Hall**, a linebacker at Boise State last season, was the first Packers rookie to start on opening day at fullback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

- Has a reception in 86 consecutive games, the franchise's second-longest streak behind Sharpe's 103 (1988-94).

- With his first catch against the Giants in Week 2, became only the seventh player in Packers history to reach 6,000 career, joining James Lofton (9,656), Sterling Sharpe (8,134), Don Hutson (7,991), Boyd Dowler (6,918), Antonio Freeman (6,651) and Max McGee (6,346).

- Needs 32 receptions to surpass No. 3 Don Hutson (488) and 74 to surpass No. 2 James Lofton (530) on the Packers' franchise list. Driver enters with 457 catches, having surpassed Boyd Dowler (448) in Week 5.
- With 50 receptions, would become one of three players in team annals to produce as many as six such seasons, joining James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe (both seven) and Antonio Freeman (six). Driver has at least 50 catches in five seasons.
- Stands 238 Lambeau Field receiving yards from surpassing No. 2 James Lofton (3,330) and 385 from becoming the stadium's all-time leader ahead of Antonio Freeman (3,477). Driver (3,093) enters at No. 3.

- Could become only the second Packers player with multiple 90-catch seasons, joining Sterling Sharpe (four). Driver had his first 90-reception



campaign in 2006.

- Could tie a franchise record with 1,000 yards in a fifth overall season. Only James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe have five 1,000-yard campaigns.
- Needs 43 receptions to become the third player in team annals to reach 500, joining Sharpe (595) and Lofton (530). Driver enters with 457.
- Needs two TD receptions to become only the eighth player in franchise annals to reach 40 career, joining Don Hutson (99), Sterling Sharpe (65), Antonio Freeman (57), Max McGee (50), James Lofton (49), Billy Howton (43) and Boyd Dowler (40). Driver enters with 38.

- Needs 2,147 passing yards — a number he is on pace to eclipse this season — to break Marino's record. Favre enters with 59,215.
- Needs one TD pass at Lambeau Field to extend the league's single-stadium record to 200. He enters with 199.
- Needs 1,040 passing yards at Lambeau Field to surpass John Elway (27,889 at Mile High Stadium) for the single-stadium record. Favre has 26,850.

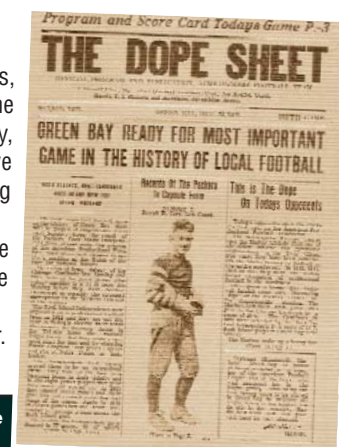
