## PACKERS, LIONS RENEW HOLIDAY RIVALRY

Green Bay renews a Thanksgiving rivalry as it takes on division foe Detroit in the annual holiday contest for the first time since 2003.

- ▶ Green Bay comes into the contest winners of 13 of its last 14 games and tied for the NFC's best record.
- ▶ With a win this past Sunday over the Panthers, the Packers are off to their best start since 1962, when Vince Lombardi led Green Bay to a 10-0 start en route to a 13-1-0 record and the eighth world title in franchise history. The team also started 10-0 in 1929 and went on to capture its first NFL title under team founder Curly Lambeau.
- ▶ The Packers carry a six-game road winning streak into Thursday's contest. A victory would establish the third-longest road winning streak in franchise history.
- ▶ Green Bay has won seven of its last eight games against NFC North opponents, dating back to last season. Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** has yet to lose a division game on the road (4-0).
- ▶ Thursday's game has playoff implications for both clubs. The Packers own a three-game division lead over Detroit.
- ▶ Including a pair of playoff clashes early in quarterback **Brett Favre's** career, this marks Game No. 156 in the venerable Detroit-Green Bay series. Favre has more career passing yards against the Lions (7,774) than any opponent.
- ▶ The Packers have enjoyed recent success against the Lions. Winners of three straight, they have won 11 of the last 13 meetings between the longtime rivals. No other NFL teams have played every year since 1932, when the Packers first met the Lions, then known as the Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans.



## GREEN BAY ON THANKSGIVING DAY

Thursday marks the 32nd Thanksgiving NFL game in Packers history.

- ▶ The Packers first played a league game on Thanksgiving in 1923, a 19-0 victory over the Hammond Pros. They last played on Thanksgiving against the Lions in Detroit in 2003, a 22-14 Lions victory.
- ▶ Thursday marks 56 years to the day when Green Bay first played at Detroit on Thanksgiving, a 52-35 Detroit victory on Nov. 22, 1951. The two rivals played for 13 consecutive seasons, from 1951-1963, before the league began rotating opponents for the Lions.
- ▶ Green Bay's 9-1 record marks its best start since 1962. Incidentally, the Packers headed into Detroit for a Thanksgiving showdown in '62 with a 10-0 record, a game also played on Nov. 22. That day, the Packers suffered their only blemish on the season.
- ▶ The Packers next played on the holiday in 1970, when they traveled to Dallas. They also played the Cowboys on Thanksgiving in a 1994 matchup.
- ▶ This will mark the third Thanksgiving contest between the Lions and Packers this decade. The Packers won a 29-27 contest against the Lions in 2001 behind two Favre touchdown passes, their last appearance in the Pontiac Silverdome.



- ▶ The clubs last met on Thanksgiving in 2003, a 22-14 Lions victory. Green Bay could not overcome five turnovers, and Lions kicker Jason Hanson connected on five field goals, including three in the fourth quarter to seal the victory for Detroit.

## WITH THE CALL

**FOX Sports** enters its 14th season as an NFL network television partner and will air the contest to a national audience. Play-by-play man **Joe Buck** joins color commentator **Troy Aikman** in the broadcast booth with **Pam Oliver** serving as the sideline reporter.

- ▶ Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The network covers 47 markets in six states.
- ▶ For out-of-town listeners, the broadcast is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on [www.packers.com](http://www.packers.com) as well as on Sirius Satellite Radio (channel 125 WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.
- ▶ Westwood One will air the game across the country. **Mark Champion** (play-by-play) and **Kevin Kiley** (analyst) will call the action, while **Tommy Tighe** hosts the pregame and halftime shows.

## THIS WEEK AT LAMBEAU

### PACKERS AMONG NFL'S BEST AWAY FROM LAMBEAU

Green Bay has now won six straight games on the road, something the franchise has not accomplished since Vince Lombardi's final two seasons (1966-67) in Green and Gold.

- ▶ The six-game road winning streak, a feat accomplished twice before (1928-29 and 1935-36), matches the third-longest mark in franchise history. The Packers have won eight consecutive road games twice (1941-42 and 1966-67), the best mark in their history.
- ▶ One of the most impressive accomplishments of Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**'s first year as head coach was the way his club performed on the road. The Packers finished 5-3 away from home in 2006, recording the most road wins in franchise history for a coach in his first season.
- ▶ McCarthy and the Packers have picked up right where they left off, winning their first four road games of the season.

#### Note of the Week

### GOOSE EGG

The Green Bay Packers are the only NFL team that has not allowed a single touchdown on any type of return – fumble, interception, punt or kick-off – this season.

### DEFENSE BEGINS TO DOMINATE

Defensive coordinator **Bob Sanders** and his unit have steadily climbed the league rankings this season, finally playing the dominant football it showed signs of in 2006.

- ▶ During the team's four-game win streak to close the 2006 season, the unit climbed from 29th overall to 12th.
- ▶ In Week 10 against the Vikings, the defense posted the first shutout since Dec. 10, 2002, a 10-0 victory over Buffalo. The Vikings had previously owned the league's longest active scoring streak at 260 games. Minnesota's 260-game streak without a shutout also was the third-longest in NFL history.
- ▶ The defense has allowed 159 points thus far, tied for fifth-lowest in the NFL. Tennessee, which plays Monday night, ranks third with 152 points.
- ▶ Its 28 sacks are tied for fifth in the league, paced by the NFL's top sack duo. Defensive end **Aaron Kampman**, the NFC Defensive Player of the Month for October, has posted nine sacks, tied for third in the NFL. Fellow end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** has tallied eight-and-a-half sacks.
- ▶ 26½ of those sacks have come courtesy of the defensive line, which forms one of the deepest rotations in all of football. Their ability to pressure the quarterback while rushing just four frees up linebackers **Nick Barnett** and **A.J. Hawk**, two of the team's leading tacklers, to make plays.
- ▶ Not to be forgotten is perhaps the top cornerback duo in the NFL – **Charles Woodson** and **Al Harris**. No cornerback duo is as physical at the

line of scrimmage, while Woodson continues to display his knack for the big play with four interceptions and two defensive scores on the season.

- ▶ Backed by a stout run defense ranked ninth in the NFL, the defense tends to make its big plays defending the pass. In a streak that dates back to last season, Green Bay has picked off at least one pass in 15 of the last 16 games. During the streak, the unit has 26 interceptions. Woodson has 10 of the interceptions during the streak.

### NOBODY'S BETTER AFTER THE CATCH

The league's No. 2-ranked passing offense has been bolstered by its receivers' ability to run after the catch.

- ▶ Big plays have served as a catalyst to the success of the Packers offense. Despite having the league's 30th-ranked rushing attack, the unit still ranks fourth overall thanks in large part to its dominance through the air.
- ▶ Wins over San Diego, Denver and Kansas City have all been highlighted by long touchdowns passes by Favre. Not to be overlooked is who he is throwing to, and what they are able to do once the ball is in their hands.
- ▶ Led by wide receivers **Donald Driver**, **Greg Jennings**, **James Jones** and tight end **Donald Lee**, Green Bay has amassed 1,488 yards after the catch, tops in the NFL.
- ▶ Behind the Packers at No. 2 is a team with a much more publicized group of receivers – the New England Patriots.
- ▶ The big-play ability of the Packers offense shouldn't come as a total surprise. Green Bay finished second in yards after the catch, behind New Orleans, in 2006.

### 'BIG 5' A NIGHTMARE MATCHUP

For the second consecutive week, Green Bay displayed its new 'Big 5' formation with receivers Driver, Jennings, Jones, **Ruvell Martin** and **Koren Robinson** all split out wide.

- ▶ Again the Packers were successful in the formation, converting third downs and setting up scoring plays.
- ▶ Their third touchdown on the day was actually a variation of the formation, with the tight end Lee split wide and Favre again with an empty backfield. Lee found space in the middle of the field for a 26-yard scoring play shortly before halftime.
- ▶ "It's mismatches versus time (to throw) is what we're playing against," Favre said after the game. "If I was a defensive coordinator, I don't know who you stop or who you go in saying, OK, this is what we (have to prepare for) ... And for us that's a good thing. We have enough diversity to present its own set of problems."
- ▶ "It's important because our game is about match-ups," McCarthy said about the formation. "To me that's one of the most important aspects of game-planning. When you get to this point in the season you're looking at the injuries and different packages. Being able to take advantage of that is even more important. I think it's more evident when you watch the way that defenses react to four wide receivers or five wide receivers. There's a lot of respect and cautiousness in the way defenses approach it. I'm sure there will be a time when people challenge us (with) those particular sets, but it's definitely a weapon for us."

### IN THE DIVISION

The Packers under McCarthy have been extremely successful in the NFL's 'black and blue' division and currently boast a three-game lead.

- ▶ McCarthy is 7-2 in NFC North games since taking over in Green Bay and has yet to lose on the road in the division (4-0).
- ▶ Last season, the Packers finished tied for the NFL's best division record at 5-1, losing only to Chicago in the season opener.
- ▶ No other head coach in team annals had a better division mark in his rookie season than McCarthy.

**MIKE MCCARTHY...**Is in second year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Has won more games (16) in his first 25 contests than any other coach in franchise history.
- ▶ Spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- ▶ Began his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

**ROD MARINELLI...**Is in his second year as the Lions' 24th head coach.

- ▶ Named Lions head coach on Jan. 19, 2006, after 10 seasons (1996-2005) with Tampa Bay as defensive line coach; additionally was the Bucs' assistant head coach his last four seasons.
- ▶ In that 10-year tenure in Tampa Bay, the Buccaneers recorded 416 sacks, with 328½ coming courtesy of the defensive line, the most among all NFL defensive lines during that span.
- ▶ The Bucs' defensive front four garnered Top 5 rankings in sacks during six of the 10 seasons under Marinelli. That line also played a major role in setting an NFL record for consecutive games with a sack (69) from 1999-2003, a streak ended by the Packers on Nov. 16, 2003.

### THE LIONS-PACKERS SERIES

No other NFL teams have played every year since 1932, when the Packers first met the Lions, then known as the Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans.

- ▶ Including a pair of playoff clashes early in Brett Favre's career, this week marks Game No. 156 in the venerable Detroit-Green Bay series.
- ▶ The Packers have won 16 consecutive contests over Detroit in Wisconsin, including the '94 playoffs. The streak includes seven Lions head coaches: Wayne Fontes (1992-96), Bobby Ross (1997-99), Gary Moeller (2000), Marty Mornhinweg (2001-02), Steve Mariucci (2003-04), Dick Jauron (2005) and Rod Marinelli (2006-Present).
- ▶ Before the '03 Thanksgiving loss at Ford Field, the Packers had won six straight over Detroit, the longest series winning streak by either team since the Lions won 11 straight from 1949-54.
- ▶ The Packers have scored more points (3,145) against the Lions than any other franchise.

### NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Packers DE Cullen Jenkins (Belleville), WR Greg Jennings (Kalamazoo) and WR Ruell Martin (Muskegon) are all Michigan natives...Packers WR Shaun Bodiford played three games with Detroit in 2006 before he was acquired on waivers by Green Bay...Lions LB Paris Lenon (2002-05) and QB J.T. O'Sullivan (2004) previously played for the Packers...Detroit LB Alex Lewis played at the University of Wisconsin, while CB Tony Beckham played at Wisconsin-Stout...Green Bay DT Colin Cole spent one week on Detroit's 53-man roster in 2003, and all of the 2004 preseason with the Lions...Packers secondary coach Kurt Schottenheimer spent two seasons (2002-03) on staff with the Lions...Packers offensive quality control coach Ty Knott served a minority coaching internship in Detroit in 2001...Detroit receivers coach Kippy Brown was the Packers' running backs coach in 2000...Lions offensive coordinator Mike Martz was DT Ryan Pickett's head coach in St. Louis.

### INDIVIDUALLY VS. DETROIT LIONS

Quarterback Brett Favre's career totals of 669 completions, 1,075 attempts and 7,774 yards against Detroit are his highest against any opponent, and his 21 wins rank second, one behind Chicago (22)...Donald Driver matched his career high with 11 receptions against the Lions on Nov. 10, 2002...Aaron Kampman has four career sacks...Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila, the franchise leader in sacks, has 5½ sacks against the Lions...Koren Robinson had an 80-yard TD reception on the Vikings' first play from scrimmage at Detroit in 2005 (Dec. 4), the longest TD catch of his career.

### LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Dec. 17, 2006, at Lambeau Field; Packers won 17-9.

- ▶ Two rushing touchdowns by Vernand Morency lifted the Packers to a sweep over Detroit in the season series.
- ▶ Green Bay overcame four turnovers thanks to a defense that yielded just 142 yards and a 2-for-12 third-down conversion rate.
- ▶ The Packers pounded out a 12-play, 78-yard drive that took 6 minutes, 45 seconds off the fourth-quarter clock, culminating in Morency's second TD run of the day, a 21-yard gallop.
- ▶ Aaron Kampman and Corey Williams each collected sacks on Detroit's final drive, two of the Packers' six on the day, to seal the victory.

### LAST MEETING, AT DETROIT

Sept. 29, 2006, at Ford Field; Packers won 31-24.

- ▶ Favre completed 25 of 36 passes for 340 yards and three TDs for a season-high 127.1 passer rating. He hit Greg Jennings on a hitch route that the rookie receiver turned into a 75-yard touchdown — the 400th of Favre's career — midway through the first quarter, and the Packers never trailed to record McCarthy's first win as an NFL head coach.
- ▶ Jennings registered his first 100-yard game, finishing with three catches for 101 yards. Ahman Green had 131 yards from scrimmage (63 rushing, 68 receiving) and caught a 10-yard TD pass in the fourth quarter.
- ▶ Marquand Manuel's 29-yard interception return for a touchdown gave the Packers a 14-7 lead, but Detroit responded with a 42-yard TD pass from Jon Kitna to Roy Williams, tying the game at 14 after one stanza.
- ▶ After a Green fumble with 54 seconds left gave the Lions one last chance to tie the score, Kitna's Hail Mary to the end zone on the game's final play fell incomplete.



## PACKERS TEAM NOTES

### FAVRE ON PACE TO ECLIPSE OWN MVP NUMBERS

Quarterback **Brett Favre** compiled a passer rating over 100.0 for the seventh time this season, all seven of which have been in victory.

- ▶ Favre compiled a passer rating over 100.0 for the fourth consecutive week. He had three such games in Weeks 2-4.
- ▶ This marks the sixth time in his career that Favre had recorded at least three straight games with a passer rating over 100.0. He did it twice in 1995 (Nov. 12 – Dec. 3, 4 games; Dec. 16 – Jan. 6, 4 games) and twice again in 1996 (Sept. 1 – Sept. 15, 3 games; Dec. 22 – Sept. 1, 1997, 5 games). Favre was voted the league's MVP in both seasons.
- ▶ The last time he accomplished the feat prior to this season, Favre had five straight games with a passer rating over 100.0 during the team's Super Bowl XXXI run. The streak began with the final regular-season game against Minnesota (Dec. 22, 1996) and culminated in the first regular-season game the following season (vs. Chicago, Sept. 1). It included three playoff victories, most notably a 35-21 victory over New England in the Super Bowl.
- ▶ Elias Sports Bureau never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis, but rather to measure the effectiveness of a quarterback over an entire season, or an entire career.
- ▶ Nonetheless, in games when Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 80-7 (.920).
- ▶ The Packers are a perfect 43-0 (1.000) at Lambeau Field when Favre hits the century mark. The team is 37-7 (.841) on the road when Favre eclipses the mark.

▶ What's more, Favre is on pace to set new career highs in a number of statistical categories, including completions, attempts, passing yards and completion percentage.

### MCCARTHY OFF TO BEST START IN CLUB HISTORY

Notching his 17th victory in his 26th game since taking over head coaching duties at the offices on Lombardi Avenue, McCarthy has now won more games through his first 26 than any coach in franchise history.

▶ Mike Sherman had previously topped the list with a 16-10 record to open his coaching career in Green Bay. Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren both went 15-11 through their first 26.

### ANOTHER WEEK, ANOTHER INTERCEPTION

Cornerback **Charles Woodson**, who has seen a resurgence to his Pro Bowl level since arriving in Green Bay, picked off a pass for the third consecutive game Sunday. The 10-year pro also has two defensive touchdowns on the season and three defensive scores since coming to Green Bay.

- ▶ When he signed as a free agent prior to the 2006 season, many around the league thought Woodson's days as an elite corner were over. Already, his three defensive touchdowns in Green and Gold surpass his total (two) in eight seasons as a Raider. What's more, the former

Heisman Trophy winner has 12 interceptions in 26 games with Green Bay. He had 17 interceptions in 106 games with Oakland.

- ▶ Despite the fact he is a four-time Pro Bowler, Woodson won just the first Defensive Player of the Week honor of his career for his performance in Week 6 against Washington. He picked off a Jason Campbell pass and also returned a fumble 57 yards for the go-ahead touchdown.
- ▶ Historically speaking, Woodson is only the fourth Packers player since 1940 with a fumble recovery for a touchdown and an interception in the same game. The other three Green Bay Packers to do that were Charley Brock (10/4/1942, at CHI), Tom Brown (11/17/1968, vs. NO) and Ahmad Carroll (11/29/2004, vs. STL).

### LONG TOUCHDOWNS CONTINUE FOR FAVRE, OFFENSE

Favre continues to lead a big-play offense which has already seen five touchdown passes of 40 yards or longer through only 10 games.

- ▶ On the receiving end of four of the five long touchdowns has been the second-year pro Jennings, who connected on two such scoring plays as a rookie last season.
- ▶ "I think Brett and the receiver group have done an excellent job in the three- and five-step drops," McCarthy said. "With that we've been given some opportunities to go vertical, go deep, whether it's inside or outside. We have been productive in the last three or four weeks."
- ▶ Favre's game-winning 60-yard touchdown pass to Jennings in Kansas City, the duo's second such play in as many weeks, was the quarterback's 56th career touchdown pass of 40 yards or more. A look at Favre's most productive seasons with the big play:

## PACKERS VS. PANTHERS - W, 31-17

### ALL PHASES ROLLING IN NINTH WIN

Looking more and more like a team undaunted by the rising pressure that comes with its status as one of the NFC's top teams, the Packers dispatched the Carolina Panthers in rather matter-of-fact fashion on Sunday, 31-17, in front of 70,805 fans at Lambeau Field.

- ▶ With the win, Green Bay improved to 9-1, the team's best start since 1962 and extended its lead in the NFC North to three games over Detroit.
- ▶ On offense, it was yet another strong outing by quarterback **Brett Favre**. His 47-yard bomb to **Donald Driver** early in the second quarter set up the first of his three touchdown passes on the day.
- ▶ It marked the 62nd time in his career Favre has thrown for three or more TD passes, tying the NFL record held by Dan Marino. Favre finished 22-of-30 for 218 yards with no interceptions and was sacked once. His 126.8 rating was his seventh of 100-plus this season.
- ▶ The efficient passing was once again complemented by a productive ground game, with **Ryan Grant** rushing 20 times for 88 yards. Grant now has 366 rushing yards in the last four games, an average of 91.5 per contest.
- ▶ On defense, the Packers got interceptions from rookie safety **Aaron Rouse** and veteran cornerback **Charles Woodson**, his fourth of the season. The defense also stood tall at the end of the first half with Carolina on the Green Bay 7-yard line, as **Corey Williams** sacked Vinny Testaverde and forced a fumble that **Aaron Kampman** recovered with 9 seconds left in the half.
- ▶ The Panthers (4-6) managed two long touchdown drives in the second half, but they took more than half the third quarter (7 minutes, 41 seconds) on one of them, running the ball 12 times in 14 plays, so the lead was never really in jeopardy.
- ▶ On special teams, there were two returns that made big contributions. With the Panthers in field-goal formation in the first quarter, kicker John Kasay instead pooched a punt that the Packers were ready for. **Tramon Williams** picked it up and ran it back 94 yards for the game's first touchdown.
- ▶ More from the special teams came on **Koren Robinson's** 67-yard return of the second-half kickoff. That set up Favre's third TD pass and second of the day to tight end **Donald Lee**, a 12-yarder for a 28-3 lead early in the third quarter.
- ▶ Players afterward insisted the win wasn't easy despite the score and the focus was already shifting to Detroit on the short week. And judging by the team's play the last two weeks during which it has outscored its opponents 65-17, it appears to be sensing what it might be able to accomplish this season, and taking advantage of every opportunity it has.
- ▶ "I thought we played well in all three areas," Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** said following the game. "With a short week, we don't have much time to enjoy 9-1 because it is time to move on to Detroit, which will be a big division battle on Thanksgiving. I'm pleased with the progress of our football team because I think we made progress again this week."



- ▶ Williams lined up around the 10-yard line off to the right side where Kasay, a left-footed kicker, would aim his pooch. That forced Kasay to kick the ball to the middle of the field, and as it bounced inside the 10-yard line, Williams was able to run it down.
- ▶ And when he got a big block from **Johnny Jolly** on lineman Justin Hartwig near the goal line, suddenly Williams had a convoy of blockers down the right sideline and he ran 94 yards for the game's first touchdown, managing to keep his balance near midfield when he ran into one of his teammates, **Jason Hunter**.
- ▶ Williams' big return, his first career touchdown, tied for the second-longest punt return in franchise history. Mark Lee also returned a punt 94 yards for a score, against the New York Giants on Nov. 8, 1981. The team's longest is Steve Odom's 95-yard return against the Chicago Bears on Nov. 10, 1974. Williams' return is also the longest by a Packers player at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ "It was something we practiced all week," McCarthy said. "(Special teams coordinator) **Mike Stock** felt that he has something on the alignment of the kicker. Tramon did a very good job fielding the ball. That's what happens. I've been on the other side of that before. When you have your field goal placement team on the field and you have to cover the kick. Our guys just did a great job finishing the play and it was an excellent run by Tramon."

### LEE, WILLIAMS CONTINUE TO MAKE DIFFERENCE

With a bevy of playmakers on both sides of the ball, it might be easy to overlook Donald Lee and Corey Williams when glancing up and down the roster.

- ▶ Take Sunday's dominating performance against the Panthers. Lee notched the first two-touchdown game of his career, while Williams twice forced fumbles on quarterback sacks.
- ▶ "He's been tremendous," Kampman said of his fellow defensive lineman. "He continues to help draw attention so that we don't get chipped on the edge and we don't get so much attention. They've got to work on the inside. Guards can't leave (their positions) now and try to clean us up. It all works out together and it's kind of like pick-your-poison right now. So we'll just keep rolling with it."
- ▶ Meanwhile, what Williams has done for the defense, Lee seems to be doing for the offense in much of the same way, which is under the radar. After Sunday's game, the 6-foot-4, 248-pound tight end has 38 receptions for 458 yards and four touchdowns.
- ▶ "He's meant a great deal," Favre said of Lee. "I don't know if there's a harder worker on this team. I don't know if there is a more determined player on this team. And that pays off. I see him work over and over again at things he feels he needs to get better at. Most importantly, he catches the ball when it's thrown to him. He's handled checks, he's handled blocking well and the trust factor comes when you see guys making plays or being in the right place. And for guys that know Donald down in the locker room they can tell you the same thing. He's determined to be really good. Some of those plays he made today were outstanding. He's definitely making my game better."

### PACKERS PREPARED FOR POOCH

When Carolina kicker John Kasay took a direct snap on a 52-yard field-goal attempt in the first quarter on Sunday, the Packers were prepared.

- ▶ Having seen Carolina execute a pooch punt from a field-goal formation on film two weeks ago against Tennessee, the Packers worked on that very scenario during the special teams portion of practice on Friday, and the preparation allowed them to pull off the biggest play in Sunday's 31-17 victory at Lambeau Field.

### POSTGAME NOTES

Testaverde (44 years, 5 days old) and Favre (38 years, 39 days old) combined to make NFL history – the oldest starting QB duo (82 years, 44 days) ever.

- ▶ The paid attendance was 70,805.
- ▶ Driver now has caught a pass in 90 consecutive games.





## PACKERS TEAM NOTES

### MCCARTHY NOW A HALL-OF-FAMER

Though the bye week is meant for rest for players and coaches alike, Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** did take a detour to Baldwin City, Kan.

- There on Oct. 20, McCarthy was inducted into Baker University's Athletic Hall of Fame, where he was an all-conference tight end and senior captain in 1986. That season, the team made a run all the way to the NAIA title game.
- McCarthy became the 103rd member of Baker's Hall of Fame, which was founded in 1977. Baker, the oldest university in Kansas, is celebrating its 150th anniversary in 2007-08.
- McCarthy has been taking home some hardware for his performance with the Packers as well. He was honored as Motorola NFL Coach of the Week honors after a Week 10 shutout victory over the Minnesota Vikings. It was the second such honor of the season for McCarthy, who is certainly among the early candidates for Coach of the Year honors.

### CLOSING IN ON MARINO...AGAIN

Quarterback **Brett Favre** threw for three touchdowns in Week 11, the 62nd game of his career with at least three TD passes.

- Favre stands tied with Dan Marino's (62) NFL record.
- He also needs 887 passing yards — a number he is on pace to eclipse this season — to break Marino's record (61,361) for career passing yards. Favre enters play Thursday with 60,475.
- He is also chasing Marino in 300-yard passing games. Favre has six already this season and could break his own record of seven 300-yard passing games established in 1995.

### TOUGHEST ROAD VENUES? NO PROBLEM

Green Bay now faces two difficult road games — at Detroit and at Dallas — and will have to do so coming off a short week. Counting Sunday's victory at home over Carolina, the Packers will play three games in the span of 12 days. Earlier this season, the league's youngest club proved it was up to such a task.

- In the span of six days, the Packers went into two of the NFL's most hostile stadiums — Denver's INVESCO Field and Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium — and came away with victories.
- Kansas City (104-37-0, .737) and Denver (103-38-0, .730) own the best home records in the NFL since 1990. Green Bay (100-42-0, .704) has the fourth-best home record in the league since the '90 season.
- What's more, Green Bay faced a rested Kansas City club coming off a bye week, while the Packers had an abbreviated week thanks to the Monday night showdown in Denver. Facing a Chiefs defense that had yet to yield 20 points to a single opponent in 2007, the Packers put up 33 points.
- "I think our players realize, young and old, that (K.C.) was a tough game going into and a tough place to play," McCarthy said following the victory over the Chiefs. "This group works hard, stays focused. I tell them every day: smart, tough, fundamentally sound. They're in tune with that. That's the way we grade them every day. You make smart decisions, you play tough and you're fundamentally sound. We try to keep it as simple as possible."
- The Packers have now won five straight against the AFC West and eight of their last 10 against the division, dating back to a 1996 victory over Denver. They wrap up their games against the AFC West this season when Oakland comes to Lambeau Field on Dec. 9.

### PACKERS SEEM TO MAKE HISTORY ON MONDAY NIGHT

In Denver, Green Bay won its first overtime game on the road since Dec. 12, 1983, at Tampa Bay, also a game on *Monday Night Football*. Jan Stenerud's 23-yard field goal sealed the 12-9 Packers win in Howard Cosell's final broadcast.

- Also in the game, **James Jones** and **Greg Jennings** became the first Packers' duo to record 100 yards receiving each since Donald Driver and Javon Walker on Oct. 11, 2004 vs. Tennessee, also a game on *MNF*.
- Favre's 82-yard strike to Jennings tied for the second-longest TD pass to end an overtime in NFL history. The longest was the 99-yard play from Philadelphia's Ron Jaworski to Mike Quick on Nov. 10, 1985, vs. Atlanta. New England's Tom Brady connected with Troy Brown on an 82-yard pass play to beat Miami on Oct. 19, 2003.
- Jones' 79-yard touchdown catch in the first quarter was the team's longest touchdown reception by a Packers rookie since Max McGee's 82-yard reception in the 1954 season.

### TURNOVERS THE NAME OF THE GAME

Though its turnover margin stands at plus-five, Green Bay has nine early wins thanks in large part to its ability to turn turnovers into points. On defense, the Packers have been able to clamp down after turnovers, not allowing opponents to capitalize on scoring opportunities.

- Green Bay has 72 points scored off turnovers. On the other side of the ball, the defense has allowed only 23 points off turnovers.
- The Packers have won the turnover battle in seven of their nine wins this season. They came out even in their wins at Minnesota and at Kansas City and finished minus-four in their only loss, against Chicago.
- Green Bay did not have a giveaway in the victory over Carolina last week, a feat the club accomplished against Minnesota, Denver and San Diego this season. The team was 3-0 last season in games without a giveaway.
- Over a longer stretch, the team has won 30 of 31 games playing turnover-free football, since a loss at Dallas, Nov. 18, 1996. Green Bay's only loss in such games during that stretch was a 23-20 defeat at Minnesota, Oct. 23, 2005.
- Including playoffs, the Packers have won 33 of their last 34 games without a giveaway.

### SIMPLY THE BEST

The Packers own more NFL championships (12) than any other franchise, but it's not all about past glory for the Green and Gold.

- Talk of unrestricted free agency in the early '90s led many to believe Green Bay would be the first to fold.
- Since the advent of free agency in 1993, the Packers own the best W-L record in the NFL.

- Ringo played 11 seasons at center for Green Bay (1953-63), including the Packers' NFL championship teams in 1961 and 1962.



## PACKERS TEAM NOTES

### "SPECIAL" TEAMS

Having always been a key ingredient to the success of the Packers, Green Bay's special teams unit has seen a remarkable improvement this season.

- In Rick Gosselin's annual *Dallas Morning News* rankings, which objectively grades teams by their rankings in 22 kicking-game categories, Green Bay finished seventh both in 1996 and 1997. The Packers reached the Super Bowl both seasons.
- More recently, the Packers ranked 8th in 2003 and 9th in 2004. Both years they made the playoffs.
- For the past two seasons, Green Bay has ranked last in the NFL in Gosselin's rankings.
- The coverage units have been excellent thus far. Through 10 games, the Packers rank second in the league in opponent punt return average and third in opponent kickoff return average.
- An area of emphasis all offseason, the unit got things going early in Week 1 by accounting for all 16 points.
- Their own return game is much improved from last season as well. The return of **Koren Robinson** has paid immediate dividends as the wideout had the team's longest kick return on the season, 67 yards, to open the second half against Carolina. Also in that game, cornerback **Tramon Williams** returned a punt 94 yards, tied for the second-longest punt return in team annals.

### FAVRE TURNING BACK THE CLOCK THIS SEASON

Quarterback **Brett Favre** has surpassed some of the NFL's greatest milestones so far this season, but not lost on the rest of the league is just how well he has been playing through the first 10 games.

- For the first time in his career, Favre threw for 300 yards-or-more in three consecutive games (Weeks 3-5). What's more, he's now done it twice this season, completing his third straight 300-yard game against the Vikings.
- The 1,042 passing yards Favre had in Weeks 8-10 are the most passing yards over a three-game stretch in his 17-year career.
- On Wednesday, Oct. 10, Favre turned 38 years old.
- Much of the Packers' offensive success can be traced to Favre's precision passing. Between a second-quarter interception against the Giants (Week 2) and a third-quarter interception against the Bears (Week 5), Favre had attempted 142 consecutive passes without an interception – the third-longest streak of his career. During the interception-free streak, he threw nine touchdown passes. Favre enters play against Detroit on Thursday with 91 consecutive passes without an interception.

### MORE MCCARTHY - EXCERPTS FROM SUNDAY

- "You have to acknowledge any time you accomplish something that's part of your base plan, your base vision. I am proud of the way our players are improving and staying focused. We are playing to who we are. We don't get outside of ourselves too often. We need to continue that mindset as we move forward."
- "It (the defensive line) is definitely one of the keys to our defense. It is the key to football in my opinion. You have to win at the line of scrimmage. I think the defense has been our most consistent position since I have been here. You'd like to have that depth across the board at every position. It's a position that I point to time and again to our football team. They're the catalyst. It starts up front. To play our style of defense and to play our scheme, you have to have the corners that we have in Charles Woodson and Al Harris. It all feeds off that defensive line."

- "We need to do a better job of finishing the games. When you're up 28-3, we can learn from that experience to put the opponent away. There was some sloppiness in our play down the stretch that we can learn from."
- "Having two games back-to-back the way we do with the short week coming up it's something we were very conscious of as far as reps with our football team. It's something that we talked about on the sideline. It's the reason **Johnny Jolly** and **Ryan Grant** did not go back in the game. Those are all decisions that you're definitely conscious of."

### UPON FURTHER REVIEW – A CLOSER LOOK AT THE STATS

Some things that jump out about the Packers after a second glance at the statistics:

- The Packers defense has yielded only three rushing touchdowns on the season, the second lowest total in the NFL.
- To keep an eye on this weekend: the Packers boast the league's second-ranked passing attack, while the Lions pass defense ranks 30th.
- Favre ranks second in the NFL in a number of passing categories: completions, attempts, passing yards and completion percentage.
- Three Packers wide receivers (Driver, Jones and Jennings) rank in the top 20 in the NFC in receiving yardage.
- A spectacular effort against Minnesota (0-for-8 on third down) and solid effort against Carolina (5-for-14) helped Green Bay's defense rise in the third-down rankings. The Packers now rank first in the NFC and second in the NFL.
- Crosby's 11 touchbacks are tied for fifth in the NFL.

## PACKERS TEAM NOTES

### WITH THE GAME ON THE LINE, PACKERS DELIVER

A major catalyst in the Packers' quick start has been their ability to get out to an early lead, as evidenced by their plus-31 scoring differential in the opening frame. More importantly, however, has been their ability to deliver in crunch time. Seven of their nine wins have been decided in the final frame or overtime.

- In their seven close wins, Green Bay has entered the fourth quarter down four points (San Diego), tied (Philadelphia), up one (New York Giants), up four (Minnesota), up six (Kansas City) and up three twice (Washington and Denver). In their only loss on the season to Chicago, Green Bay also entered the fourth quarter up three points.
- Defense has been a major catalyst for the strong fourth-quarter play, allowing just 45 fourth-quarter points. In their only blemish thus far, Chicago outscored Green Bay, 10-0, in the fourth quarter.
- Green Bay's plus-33 mark in the final frame is the fifth-best differential in the league.

### 433 TOUCHDOWN PASSES AND COUNTING...

After a moment now etched in NFL history, Brett Favre stands alone atop the all-time touchdown passes list.

- 43 different Packers have been on the receiving end of a Favre touchdown pass, beginning with **Sterling Sharpe's** grab in the fourth quarter against the Bengals on Sept. 20, 1992.
- Favre's two fourth-quarter touchdown throws in that game not only sealed the come-from-behind, 24-23 victory, but also earned him the start the following week, a job he hasn't relinquished since.
- In a three-touchdown performance at New England on Oct. 13, 2002, Favre became just the fourth NFL player to throw for 300 touchdowns. On his final TD pass of the day, a 2-yard toss to tight end **Bubba Franks**, Favre surpassed John Elway to move into third place on the all-time list.
- He moved into second place on the list in one of the most memorable performances of his career – and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – when he threw four touchdown passes in the first half against Oakland just one day after the sudden death of his father, Irvin. Favre's second touchdown pass of the night, a 23-yard strike to Javon Walker, pushed him past Fran Tarkenton on the league's all-time list with 343 career TD passes.
- A first-quarter strike to **Greg Jennings** made NFL history at Minnesota in Week 4. The game was stopped briefly, and a videotaped message from Dan Marino was played on the Metrodome's scoreboard.

### A CHRONOLOGY OF THE RECORD

Eight players – all members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame – have held the NFL career touchdown pass record throughout the history of the league. Thanks to research provided by Elias Sports Bureau, the one-time record holders were:

- **Benny Friedman** had 66 career TD passes and held the record from 1930 until 1943.
- **Arnie Herber**, a former Green Bay signal caller, reached 66 touchdown passes in 1940 and shared the record with Friedman until 1943.
- **Sammy Baugh** passed Friedman and Herber in 1943 and threw 187 career touchdowns. He held the record until 1962.
- **Bobby Layne** tied Baugh in 1961 and passed him during the 1962 season. Layne finished with 196 touchdown passes and held the record until 1963.
- **Y.A. Tittle** passed Layne in 1963 and finished his career with 212 touchdown passes. Tittle held the record until 1966.
- **Johnny Unitas** passed Tittle in 1966 and ended his playing days with 290 TD passes. He held the record until 1975.
- **Fran Tarkenton** surpassed Unitas in 1975 and became the first NFL player with 300 career TD passes. He finished with 342 touchdown passes and held the record until 1995.

- **Dan Marino** passed Tarkenton on Nov. 26, 1995, at Indianapolis with a second-quarter touchdown pass and finished his career with 420 touchdown passes. He held the record until surpassed by Brett Favre in 2007.

### MORE THAN JUST A SACK

Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila**, who earlier this season surpassed Hall of Famer Reggie White on the franchise's all-time career sack list, has seen a return to form this season with 8½ sacks through 10 games.

► This season, many more are cheering on 'KGB' with each sack for what it will mean towards the greater Green Bay community.

► More than \$10,000 goes to Freedom House, a Green Bay homeless shelter, with each KGB sack. The pledge for each sack comes from Gbaja-Biamila, teammates **Ryan Pickett** and **Bubba Franks**, and local donors.

► One of the decade's most-feared pass rushers, KGB recorded 10-plus sacks four consecutive seasons (2001-04). The eight-year pro, along with many others, is hoping he can once again reach that plateau this season.

### PACKERS ONCE AGAIN LEAGUE'S YOUNGEST TEAM

Green Bay has the distinction of being the NFL's youngest team for the second straight season.

► Since taking over general manager duties in 2005, Ted Thompson has vowed to build the team's foundation through the draft. Of the 53 active roster players, 19 have been drafted by Thompson.

► Each team's average age is based upon its opening-day roster. A look at the five youngest teams in 2007:

**MILESTONES COME ON THE ROAD FOR FAVRE**

**Brett Favre** had one of the league's most coveted milestones in his sights and again made history away from Lambeau. Taking a look back at some of Favre's milestone touchdown passes throughout his career, all have a common theme – they came in road victories.

- Only touchdown pass No. 100 came in front of the home crowd at Lambeau Field, though it still came in a winning effort.
- Touchdown pass No. 301 pushed Favre ahead of John Elway (300) to third on the league's all-time touchdown passes list.
- No. 343 – coming in one of the most memorable performances of his career and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – placed Favre No. 2 on the all-time list, surpassing Fran Tarkenton.

**NO ONE WINS MORE THAN NO. 4**

In what has been a record-breaking year for Favre thus far, certainly one of the most meaningful accomplishments, both from a team and individual standpoint, came early. With his 149th win in Week 2, Favre surpassed John Elway on the all-time quarterback wins list. Heading into the contest

at Detroit, Favre now has 156 career wins.

- Simply put, Favre was spectacular in the record-breaking victory over the New York Giants. He completed 29-of-38 passes for 286 yards and three touchdowns and earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors.
- "We gave him the game ball after the game," McCarthy said after the win. "The 'all-time' in anything in this league is such a monumental achievement. 149 victories - I think that speaks for itself. When you go out and win over that long of a period of time, I think that's the ultimate compliment a quarterback can have. To me, if you asked me what is the biggest record that he will achieve, I think he just accomplished it."

**TACKLE DUO AS STEADY AS THEY COME**

Tackle **Chad Clifton** has made 105 career starts for the Packers, while fellow tackle **Mark Tauscher** has started 101 career games.

- A second-round pick in 2000, Clifton was inserted into the starting line-up in Week 7 as a rookie and has been a mainstay on the line since then.
- Tauscher started 14 games as a rookie in 2000, earning his first start at right tackle in Week 3, a position he has yet to relinquish. Tauscher saw his own consecutive starts streak come to an end as well in 2006 (57 games) because of a groin injury.
- Favre's blind-side shield, Clifton has started 73 of 74 games since returning from a pelvic injury that ended his 2002 season after a blind-side hit from Warren Sapp. Only a bout with the flu last season in Miami (Oct. 22) could snap the streak.
- The duo has provided a steady influence to many of their younger teammates along the line. Already this season, five different players have started along the interior of the offensive line (**Daryn Colledge, Junius Coston, Tony Moll, Jason Spitz and Scott Wells**).
- Elite pass blockers that rarely receive the credit they deserve, Clifton and Tauscher have anchored an offensive line that has allowed the second fewest sacks in the NFL since they became fixtures in the starting line-up in 2000.

**FAVRE'S MOST IMPRESSIVE STAT?**

Not to be overlooked as he breaks nearly ever career passing record is just how durable Brett Favre has been since being inserted into the starting lineup. Despite playing one of the most susceptible positions in the game, Favre has answered the bell time after time for the Packers.

- Favre made his 241st consecutive start against Minnesota in Week 4, surpassing former Vikings center Mick Tingelhoff (240) and now owns the second-longest recorded streak in NFL history at 247.
- Only Minnesota's Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more regular-season games in consecutive fashion.
- Favre has played in 249 straight games (269 including playoffs) and his 247 starts in a row (267 including playoffs) is the NFL's record among quarterbacks.
- Including a one-week stint earlier this season (finger), Favre has appeared on the injury report an amazing 49 times during the streak.



## PACKERS TEAM NOTES

### GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Packers will host a season-long celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of Lambeau Field. The crown jewel of the National Football League remains the most historic stadium in football.

- Dedicated as City Stadium Sept. 29, 1957, with a 21-17 victory over the archrival Chicago Bears, the team renamed the facility Lambeau Field in 1965 following the death of E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach. It is the NFL's longest-tenured facility.
- To mark the occasion, an anniversary logo was created and is featured on the team's home uniforms, *Gameday* program, the media guide and the Packers Yearbook.
- Lambeau Field also features the special logo in the north end zone. Both end zones have been painted to reflect the way they were in Lambeau Field's first season in 1957.
- Renowned 3-D pop artist Charles Fazzino was commissioned by the Packers to create an art piece celebrating the 50th anniversary. Fazzino, the official artist of the Super Bowl and Major League Baseball's All-Star Game, spent nine months on the project. The piece is available in a limited edition 3-D format, as well as on T-shirts, helmets and assorted items in the Packers Pro Shop.
- Packers ticket holders will enjoy images of Lambeau Field through the years on their tickets as well.



### TRAVELING LIGHT IN 2007

NFL teams will cover 566,650 miles this season – about 75,000 more miles than a round trip flight from the earth to the moon.

- No team will cover more mileage than the St. Louis Rams (34,352), while the N.Y. Jets will travel the fewest (9,186).
- In the preseason and regular season, Green Bay will fly a total of 10,738 miles, over 6,000 miles less than the team traveled in 2006.
- Most of the miles will be covered following the bye week, as the team plays six of its final 10 remaining games on the road.

### SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Four coaches have new titles this season, though all four were with the team during the 2006 season. Former offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski left to become the head coach at Boston College in January, leaving a major opening on the staff.

- McCarthy tabbed **Joe Philbin** as offensive coordinator. Entering his fifth season with the Packers, Philbin most recently served as offensive line

coach in 2006 where he implemented a new zone-blocking scheme and successfully integrated three rookie starters.

- **Winston Moss** was promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers after serving as linebackers coach in 2006. As the assistant head coach, the 41-year-old Moss will be McCarthy's right-hand man with regard to administrative duties and team dynamics. Moss will continue to coach the linebackers as well.
- Promoted to offensive line coach, **James Campen** moves up from his position as assistant offensive line coach in McCarthy's first season at the helm. The center for Brett Favre's first career start in 1992, Campen begins his fourth season on the Packers staff.
- **Jerry Fontenot** will serve as assistant offensive line coach in 2007. A 16-year NFL veteran (1989-2004), Fontenot joined the Packers as a coaching intern last summer and remained with the team throughout the 2006 season as an offensive assistant.

### PUNT BLOCKS

Jon Ryan was 13 years old the last time the Packers had a punt blocked. It happened Sept. 10, 1995, at Chicago, when the Bears' Anthony Marshall got to Craig Hentrich.

### QUITE THE DEBUT FOR CROSBY

According to Elias Sports Bureau, rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** on Sept. 9 became the first player in NFL history to kick a 50-plus yard field goal and a game-winning field goal in the final minute of his first NFL game.

- What a whirlwind couple of days it had been for Crosby. First, he found out on Sept. 1 that he had won the kicking job after what had been perhaps the most intense positional battle in training camp. Two days later, he celebrated his 23rd birthday, and just days after that the rookie was lining up for his first-ever professional game.
- Crosby was 3-for-3 on field goals against the Eagles. He hit a 53-yarder, one yard shy of the team record, in the first quarter, a 37-yarder in the third quarter, and a 42-yarder with 2 seconds left to break a 13-all tie and give the Packers the three-point win. He was later awarded NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his efforts.

### ROOKIES IN THE BACKFIELD

Green Bay became the first NFL team to open the regular season with two rookie starters in the backfield since 1996. That season, both St. Louis (Derrick Harris and Lawrence Phillips) and Miami (Stanley Pritchett and Abdul-Karim al-Jabbar) used an all-rookie backfield on opening day.

- Rookie running back **Brandon Jackson**, a second-round pick from Nebraska, became the first rookie to start at running back on opening day for the Packers since John Brockington in 1971.
- Fullback **Korey Hall**, a linebacker at Boise State last season, was the first Packers rookie to start on opening day at fullback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

- Needs 15 receptions to surpass No. 3 Don Hutson (488) and 57 to surpass No. 2 James Lofton (530) on the Packers' franchise list. Driver enters with 474 catches, having surpassed Boyd Dowler (448) in Week 5.
- Became one of four players in team annals to produce as many as six seasons with 50 receptions, joining James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe (both seven) and Antonio Freeman (six).
- Stands 92 Lambeau Field receiving yards from surpassing No. 2 James Lofton (3,330) and 239 from becoming the stadium's all-time leader ahead of Antonio Freeman (3,477). Driver (3,239) enters at No. 3.
- Could become only the second Packers player with four 80-catch seasons, joining Sterling Sharpe (four). Driver has three entering 2007.
- Could become only the second Packers player with multiple 90-catch seasons, joining Sterling Sharpe (four). Driver had his first 90-reception campaign in 2006.
- Could tie a franchise record with 1,000 yards in a fifth overall season.



Only James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe have five 1,000-yard campaigns.

- Needs 26 receptions to become the third player in team annals to reach 500, joining Sharpe (595) and Lofton (530). Driver enters with 474.
- Needs two TD receptions to become only the eighth player in franchise annals to reach 40 career, joining Don Hutson (99), Sterling Sharpe (65), Antonio Freeman (57), Max McGee (50), James Lofton (49), Billy Howton (43) and Boyd Dowler (40). Driver enters with 38.

► Joined Dan Marino as the only players ever to reach 60,000 career passing yards.

► Needs 887 passing yards — a number he is on pace to eclipse this season — to break Marino's record of 61,361. Favre enters with 60,475.

► Threw his 200th TD pass at Lambeau Field in Week 10 to extend the league's single-stadium record. He enters with 205.

► Needs 471 passing yards at Lambeau Field to surpass John Elway (27,889 at Mile High Stadium) for the single-stadium record. Favre has 27,419.

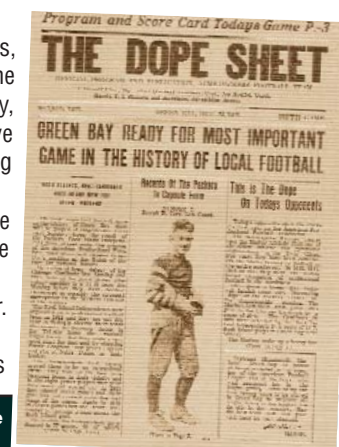
