GREEN BAY HEADS TO K.C. AFTER THRILLING VICTORY

After a dramatic overtime victory in Denver on the highest-rated *Monday Night Football* broadcast of the season, Green Bay stays on the road for another AFC West opponent: Kansas City.



- ▶ The two clubs famously met in the first-ever Super Bowl, a 35-10 Packers victory. Since, the series has been all Kansas City; the Chiefs have a better regular-season record against the Packers (6-1-1) than any NFL team.
- ▶ Green Bay comes into the contest winners of 10 of its last 11 games, including five straight road victories.
- ▶ Winners of their last four games against AFC West teams, the Packers have won seven of their last nine against the division, dating back to a 1996 victory over Denver.
- ▶ Green Bay last visited Kansas City in 1996, when Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** served as quarterbacks coach on the Chiefs' staff.
- ▶ With a win over Kansas City, quarterback **Brett Favre** would join Tom Brady and Peyton Manning as the only quarterbacks in NFL history to defeat all 31 teams.

PACKERS SEEM TO MAKE HISTORY ON MONDAY NIGHT

Green Bay won its first overtime game on the road since Dec. 12, 1983, at Tampa Bay, also a game on *Monday Night Football*. Jan Stenerud's 23-yard field goal sealed the 12-9 Packers win in Howard Cosell's final broadcast.

- ▶ **James Jones** and **Greg Jennings** became the first duo to record 100 yards receiving since Donald Driver and Javon Walker on Oct. 11, 2004 vs. Tennessee, also a game on *MMF*.
- ▶ Favre's 82-yard strike to Jennings tied for the second-longest TD pass to end an overtime in NFL history. The longest was the 99-yard play from Philadelphia's Ron Jaworski to Mike Quick on Nov. 10, 1985, vs. Atlanta. New England's Tom Brady connected with Troy Brown on an 82-yard pass play to beat Miami on Oct. 19, 2003.
- ▶ Jones' 79-yard touchdown catch in the first quarter was the team's longest touchdown reception by a Packers rookie since Max McGee's 82-yard reception in the 1954 season.

MCCARTHY, STAFF RETURN TO COACHING ROOTS

McCarthy returns to the city where he launched his NFL coaching career in 1993 under Marty Schottenheimer.

- ▶ Beginning his career as a quality control assistant, McCarthy worked with Joe Montana before moving up to quarterbacks coach from 1995-98. He worked with starters Rich Gannon, Steve Bono and Elvis Grbac, helping guide Bono to the Pro Bowl in '95.
- ▶ More importantly, McCarthy and the Chiefs made four postseason appearances in his six seasons in Kansas City.
- ▶ McCarthy won't be the only member of the coaching staff experiencing déjà vu when walking into Arrowhead Stadium – four other members of the coaching staff have spent time on the Chiefs' staff.
- ▶ Three of the four coached with McCarthy during his tenure in Kansas City. Special teams coordinator **Mike Stock** spent six seasons with the

Chiefs (1995-2000) in the same capacity, while defensive ends coach **Carl Hairston** served two stints in Kansas City (1995-96 and 2001-05) coaching the defensive line.

- ▶ Secondary coach **Kurt Schottenheimer** spent the longest tenure with the Chiefs (1989-2000), where he coached special teams, defensive backs and served as defensive coordinator. Also, quarterbacks coach **Tom Clements** spent one season at Kansas City (2000) in the same capacity.

WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports enters its 14th season as an NFL network television partner and will air the contest to a regional audience. Play-by-play man **Joe Buck** joins color commentator **Troy Aikman** in the broadcast booth with **Pam Oliver** serving as the sideline reporter.

- ▶ Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The network covers 47 markets in six states.
- ▶ For out-of-town listeners, the broadcast is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on www.packers.com as well as on Sirius Satellite Radio (channel 110 WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.
- ▶ DIRECTV subscribers can watch the game on channel 706 (HD ch. 723).

THIS WEEK AT LAMBEAU

PACKERS AMONG NFL'S BEST AWAY FROM LAMBEAU

One of the most impressive accomplishments of Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**'s first year as head coach was the way his club performed on the road. The Packers finished 5-3 away from home last season, recording the most road wins in franchise history for a coach in his first season.

- ▶ McCarthy and the Packers have picked up right where they left off, winning their first three road games of the season.
- ▶ This week, they face a daunting challenge in one of the NFL's toughest venues: Arrowhead Stadium. Dating back to 1990, no NFL team owns a better regular-season home winning percentage than Kansas City.
- ▶ A look at the top road teams in the NFL since 2006:

Note of the Week

FAVRE GOES THE DISTANCE

Brett Favre's 82-yard, game-winning strike to Greg Jennings was the quarterback's 13th TD pass of 75 yards or more, most of any player in NFL history.

- ▶ Favre also becomes the first Packers player to throw two touchdown passes of 75 yards or more in the same game. Only three quarterbacks have accomplished the feat since 1990.

TOUGH AFTER THE BYE

In games immediately following the bye, the Packers have won nine of their last 12, including Monday night's dramatic victory over Denver.

- ▶ Recent history shows that the Packers have been an improved club after the bye. The much-needed time off has provided valuable rest and recovery, as well as a refocus on fundamentals.
- ▶ Since 2001, Green Bay is 6-1 in games played after its bye week, tied for the second-best record in the league over that period.
- ▶ Success also comes for the Packers in the second half of their schedule.
- ▶ In 2003, Green Bay went 7-2 (.778) after the bye. Only three teams posted better marks, including the Super Bowl champion Patriots.
- ▶ Last season, seven of their eight wins were after the bye.
- ▶ This decade (since 2000), the Packers over the balance of their season after the bye are a combined 44-24 (.647).

TOUGH AFTER THE OPPONENT'S BYE, TOO

The Packers face a rested club this weekend when they travel to Kansas City. The Chiefs also bring a two-game winning streak into Sunday.

- ▶ Green Bay had perhaps its most heartbreaking loss last season to a team coming off a bye (at Buffalo), but over the past decade the Packers have been an especially tough opponent for teams coming off the bye week.
- ▶ Green Bay has won five of its last six and six of its last eight over opponents coming off bye weeks. Before last season's disappointing loss, 24-

10, Nov. 5 at Buffalo, the Packers had not lost such a game since Oct. 15, 1998, at Detroit.

- ▶ The five wins during the current streak were at Arizona (Sept. 24, 2000), vs. Miami (Nov. 4, 2002), at Chicago (Sept. 29, 2003), vs. Seattle (Oct. 5, 2003) and at Washington (Oct. 31, 2004).
- ▶ Two weeks before that '98 Detroit loss, Green Bay also won at Carolina (Sept. 27, 1998), one week after the Panthers' bye.

GRANT GETS NOD AT RUNNING BACK

First-year running back **Ryan Grant** notched the Packers' first 100-yard rushing performance since Ahman Green eclipsed the century mark in Week 13 last season against the New York Jets.

- ▶ Grant rushed 22 times for 104 yards and also caught three passes out of the backfield against Denver – all career-highs.
- ▶ Coupled with an injury to **DeShawn Wynn**, who left the Denver contest with a shoulder injury in the first half, McCarthy named Grant the starter this weekend against Kansas City.
- ▶ "I thought Ryan Grant put his foot down, it was one cut, north and south, the way you're supposed to," McCarthy said following the game. "I was pleased with the progress we made in the run game. Clearly Ryan Grant's running style is what you're looking for with his forward lean. He just really needed the opportunity. I think it's safe to say Ryan Grant will be the starter when we go to Kansas City."
- ▶ The Packers acquired Grant Sept. 1 from the Giants for an undisclosed draft pick after the Notre Dame product enjoyed a strong training camp in New York. He spent the 2005 season on the Giants' practice squad and the 2006 season on injured reserve.

ROBINSON SIGNED, WYNN PLACED ON I.R.

Wide receiver **Koren Robinson** was reinstated by NFL Commissioner Roger Goodell last week and was signed to the Packers' roster Tuesday. Rookie running back **DeShawn Wynn** was placed on injured reserve.

- ▶ The wide receiver joined the Packers in September 2006 but was suspended shortly thereafter for a repeat violation of the league's substance abuse policy. In four games last season, Robinson served as the Packers' primary kick returner and as a reserve wide receiver.
- ▶ The wideout had been practicing with the team since Oct. 22 under a league roster exemption. He is expected to contribute immediately on special teams and brought along more slowly on the offensive unit.
- ▶ Wynn had been the team's leading rusher through the first seven games. A seventh-round draft choice from Florida, he battled injuries throughout training camp before asserting himself as the starter. He had just one carry Monday night in Denver before leaving the game with a shoulder injury.
- ▶ The team will now look to Grant, **Vernand Morency** and rookie second-round pick **Brandon Jackson** to fill the void. All three have seen action in the backfield so far this season. Though it found its first 100-yard rusher of the season Monday night, the Packers' rushing unit still ranks last in the league.

PICK STREAK SNAPPED

With no interception against Denver, Green Bay snapped a 12-game interception streak, the longest current streak in the NFL.

- ▶ Cornerback **Charles Woodson** intercepted Jason Campbell in Week 6, the last interception in the streak for the defensive unit.
- ▶ Over the course of the streak, the Packers intercepted 21 passes. Woodson had a team-high 7 interceptions during that period.

MIKE MCCARTHY...In second year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Led the Packers to an 8-8 finish and near playoff berth, losing a tiebreaker with the New York Giants, who also finished 8-8.
- ▶ Spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- ▶ Began his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

HERM EDWARDS...In second year as the Chiefs' 10th head coach.

- ▶ In 2006 became the first head coach in franchise history to guide the Chiefs to the playoffs in his initial season with the club. He is one of five coaches in NFL history to guide two different squads (N.Y. Jets, 2001) to a playoff berth in their debut campaign.
- ▶ Is in his 28th NFL season as either a player, scout, assistant coach or head coach. He played cornerback during his 10-year playing career.
- ▶ Previously served as head coach for the New York Jets (2001-05) where he led the team to three postseason appearances.
- ▶ Began his coaching career with stops in Kansas City (1992-94) and Tampa Bay (1996-2000).

THE PACKERS-CHIEFS SERIES

The first meeting between the two clubs was undoubtedly the most memorable game in the series. In January 1967, NFL champion Green Bay met AFL champion Kansas City in the first-ever Super Bowl.

- ▶ Bart Starr's two touchdown passes to Max McGee led the Packers to victory, 35-10, over the Chiefs in Los Angeles Memorial Coliseum.
- ▶ Though the two clubs collected the largest single-game shares in the history of team sports at the time, the inaugural Super Bowl was hardly the international event it has since become. More than 30,000 seats remained empty.
- ▶ Kansas City has dominated the series ever since. In fact, the Chiefs have a better regular-season record against the Packers (6-1-1) than any NFL team. The Jets are 8-2 all-time against Green Bay.
- ▶ Green Bay's only victory in the regular-season series came in 1987, a 23-3 victory in Kansas City.
- ▶ The Packers make their first trip to Kansas City since 1996. The only other active city in which Green Bay has waited longer to visit during the regular season is Cleveland (1995).

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Packers Head Coach Mike McCarthy began his NFL coaching career in

Kansas City, first as quality control/offensive assistant (1993-94) and later as quarterbacks coach (1995-98); McCarthy and Herm Edwards coached on the same staff in Kansas City for two seasons (1993-94), both of which resulted in playoff appearances...McCarthy also spent time in Kansas City with Chiefs defensive coordinator Gunther Cunningham (1995-98) and offensive coordinator Mike Solari (1997-98)...Other members of the Green Bay coaching staff who have coached in Kansas City include Mike Stock (1995-2000), Tom Clements (2000), Carl Hairston (1995-96; 2001-05) and Kurt Schottenheimer (1989-2000)...Clements coached two seasons in Buffalo (2004-05) with Chiefs linebackers coach Don Blackmon and defensive line coach and Wisconsin native Tim Krumrie...Packers personnel analyst John Schneider spent three seasons (1997-99) in Kansas City as director of pro personnel...Packers defensive end Aaron Kampman and Chiefs center Casey Wiegmann both attended Aplington-Parkersburg High School in Parkersburg, Iowa (population 1,887) before starring at the University of Iowa...Rookies Justin Harrell (Packers) and Turk McBride (Chiefs) played on the defensive line together at Tennessee...Packers defensive end Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila went up against Chiefs tackle Kyle Turley in practice at San Diego State...Packers rookie guard Allen Barbre from Missouri Southern State was raised in Granby, Mo., less than three hours from Arrowhead Stadium.

INDIVIDUALLY VS. KANSAS CITY CHIEFS

Quarterback Brett Favre is 0-3 lifetime against the Chiefs, the only NFL team Favre has yet to defeat...Favre has the opportunity to become one of three quarterbacks in NFL history to defeat all 31 teams; Tom Brady and Peyton Manning accomplished the feat in Week 8...In those three contests, Favre has thrown for 799 yards, five touchdowns and five interceptions...Cornerback Charles Woodson, a former AFC West rival of the Chiefs, has picked off five career passes against Kansas City...Tight end Bubba Franks caught a touchdown pass in the 2003 meeting...Also in that game, linebacker Nick Barnett tallied 14 tackles.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Oct. 12, 2003, at Lambeau Field; Chiefs won 40-34 OT.

- ▶ Kansas City overcame a 17-point fourth-quarter deficit to force overtime, then won after a crazy sequence of plays.
- ▶ The Packers had blocked a field goal attempt, but an ensuing Ahman Green fumble on first down gave possession back to the Chiefs.
- ▶ On the very next play, quarterback Trent Green found Eddie Kennison for a 51-yard game-winning touchdown pass.
- ▶ Green Bay built a commanding 31-14 lead heading into the fourth quarter but saw an end to their NFL record of 56 consecutive victories when leading by double digits at home.
- ▶ Kansas City safety Jerome Woods returned an interception 79 yards for a touchdown and also forced Green's fumble in overtime, setting up the winning pass.

LAST MEETING, AT KANSAS CITY

Nov. 10, 1996; Chiefs won 27-20.

- ▶ Green Bay came into the game riding high with an 8-1 mark but suffered one of only three blemishes during their Super Bowl run in Kansas City.
- ▶ The Chiefs got out to an early lead behind two Greg Hill touchdowns and took a 20-6 lead into halftime.
- ▶ Hill burned the Packers' defense once again – this time with a 24-yard touchdown run – for his third score on the day.
- ▶ Two Brett Favre touchdown passes, one each to Don Beebe and Derrick Mayes, brought the Packers within striking distance in the fourth quarter but were not enough to overcome the home side.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

SIMPLY THE BEST

The Packers own more NFL championships (12) than any other franchise, but it's not all about past glory for the Green and Gold.

- Talk of unrestricted free agency in the early '90s led many to believe Green Bay would be the first to fold.
- Since the advent of free agency in 1993, the Packers own the best W-L record in the NFL.
- This week's opponent, the Kansas City Chiefs, are also one of the winningest clubs in the free-agency era.

MCCARTHY NOW A HALL-OF-FAMER

Though the bye week is meant for rest for players and coaches alike, Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** did take a detour to Baldwin City, Kan.

- There on Oct. 20, McCarthy was inducted into Baker University's Athletic Hall of Fame, where he was an all-conference tight end and senior captain in 1986. That season, the team made a run all the way to the NAIA title game.
- McCarthy became the 103rd member of Baker's Hall of Fame, which was founded in 1977. Baker, the oldest university in Kansas, is celebrating its 150th anniversary in 2007-08.

WHAT A WEEK 6 FOR WOODSON

After a game that featured his first interception of the season and a 57-yard fumble return for the go-ahead touchdown, cornerback **Charles Woodson** took home some hardware for his stellar performance.

- Despite the fact he is a four-time Pro Bowler, Woodson won just the first Defensive Player of the Week honor of his career.
- Fans on NFL.com also awarded the Michigan product GMC Defensive Player of the Week honors.
- Historically speaking, Woodson is only the fourth Packers player since 1940 with a fumble recovery for a touchdown and an interception in the same game.
- The other three Green Bay Packers to do that were Charley Brock (10/4/1942, at CHI), Tom Brown (11/17/1968, vs. NO) and Ahmad Carroll (11/29/2004, vs. STL).

TURNOVERS THE NAME OF THE GAME

Though its turnover margin stands at plus-one, Green Bay has six early wins thanks in large part to its ability to turn turnovers into points. On defense, they have been able to clamp down, not allowing opponents to capitalize on scoring opportunities.

- Green Bay is sixth in the league with 51 points scored off turnovers. On the other side of the ball, the defense has allowed only 16 points off turnovers, tied for third-best in the league.
- The Packers have won the turnover battle in four of their six wins this season. They came out even in their win at Minnesota and finished minus-four in their only loss, against Chicago.
- Green Bay did not have a giveaway in the victory over Denver, a feat they matched in the win against San Diego. The team was 3-0 last season in games without a giveaway.
- Over a longer stretch, the team has won 26 of 27 games playing

turnover-free football, since a loss at Minnesota, Dec. 1, 1997. Green Bay's only loss in such games during that stretch was a 23-20 defeat at Minnesota, Oct. 23, 2005.

- Including playoffs, the Packers have won 29 of their last 30 games without a giveaway.

WHEN FAVRE HITS THE CENTURY MARK

Nearly perfect after halftime (13-of-14), quarterback **Brett Favre** compiled a passer rating of 142.4 against the Broncos in Week 8. It was the quarterback's highest single-game passer rating since the 2004 regular-season finale in Chicago.

- In Weeks 2-4, Favre compiled a passer rating over 100.0 for three consecutive weeks, something he had not done since the 1996 season. Not surprisingly, the Packers won all three contests (at N.Y. Giants, San Diego, at Minnesota).
- In fact, it was only the fifth time in his career that Favre had recorded three straight games with a passer rating over 100.0. He did it twice in 1995 (Nov. 12 – Dec. 3, 4 games; Dec. 16 – Jan. 6, 4 games) and twice again in 1996 (Sept. 1 – Sept. 15, 3 games; Dec. 22 – Sept. 1, 1997, 5 games). Favre was voted the league's MVP in both seasons.
- The last time he accomplished the feat, Favre had five straight games with a passer rating over 100.0 during the team's Super Bowl XXXI run. The streak began with the final regular-season game against Minnesota (Dec. 22, 1996) and culminated in the first regular-season game the following season (vs. Chicago, Sept. 1). It included three playoff victories, most notably a 35-21 victory over New England in the Super Bowl.
- Elias Sports Bureau never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis, but rather to measure the effectiveness of a quarterback over an entire season, or an entire career.
- Nonetheless, in games when Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 77-7 (.917).
- The Packers are a perfect 41-0 (1.000) at Lambeau Field when Favre hits the century mark. The team is 36-7 (.837) on the road when Favre eclipses the century mark.

PACKERS VS. BRONCOS - W, 19-13

PACKERS PULL OUT SOME MILE-HIGH MAGIC

The Green Bay Packers didn't score the entire second half on Monday night but then needed just one play in overtime to beat the Denver Broncos.

- ▶ **Brett Favre** stunned the 77,160 fans at INVESCO Field at Mile High and a national television audience with a breathtaking 82-yard touchdown pass to **Greg Jennings** on the first snap of overtime, lifting the Packers to 19-13 victory that will rank as one of Favre's most thrilling and only add to his Hall of Fame legacy.
- ▶ Having just watched the Broncos drive 89 yards in the final 2:27 of the fourth quarter and tie the game at 13 with a run-on field goal on the final play of regulation, the Packers won the overtime coin toss and wasted no time going for the win.
- ▶ The touchdown set off a wild celebration on the Green Bay sideline that spilled out onto the field. The Packers improved to 6-1 with certainly the most dramatic finish of the **Mike McCarthy** era, and Favre even said off the top of his head it ranked in the top two for him.
- ▶ The game-winning play was designed to get tight end **Donald Lee** open down the seam in the middle of the field, according to Favre. But when the Broncos broke their huddle, Favre knew he would stay in the middle and the opportunity for a deep ball would be to the outside, so he took the shot rather than change the play at the line.
- ▶ "Obviously making a good throw is critical, but that's one you just have to make a play on the ball from the receiver standpoint," Favre said. "Maybe it's underthrown, maybe it's overthrown, maybe it's a little to the left or inside. But fortunately for me it fell in the right place."
- ▶ It was one of two picture-perfect deep balls thrown by Favre in the game. He also hit Jones for a 79-yard touchdown in the first quarter when the rookie receiver got behind Champ Bailey along the right sideline, made the catch, cut back across the field and picked up a key block from Jennings on Bly on his way to the end zone.
- ▶ That answered Denver's early touchdown and tied the game at 7. The Packers added two long field-goal drives by halftime, the first one covering 98 yards after **Nick Barnett** pounced on a fumbled snap by Broncos quarterback Jay Cutler at the Green Bay 1-yard line, for a 13-7 lead.
- ▶ Denver cut the deficit to three points with a field goal in the third quarter, and then needed a long drive of their own in the final two minutes to force overtime. Starting on their own 7, Denver picked up one first down via penalty and then faced a fourth-and-2 on its own 32. Cutler hit Brandon Stokley for a 7-yard gain to keep the drive going and, with the help of a 35-yard catch-and-run by Brandon Marshall, eventually moved inside the Green Bay 5.
- ▶ The Packers defense was clearly tired but somehow found a way to stop the Broncos, who called their last timeout with 25 seconds left. Cutler threw incomplete to Marshall in the front corner of the end zone and then was stopped for no gain by Ryan Pickett on a quarterback draw on third-and-1 from the 4.
- ▶ Fortunately the exhausted defense didn't have to take the field again. The Packers won the toss with a call of heads, and 16 seconds into the extra session the game was over.



the second quarter against the Denver Broncos, and the youngster out of Notre Dame earned himself a starting role in the offense with his productive play in the 19-13 overtime victory.

- ▶ Taking over for an injured DeShawn Wynn, Grant rushed 22 times for 104 yards, jump-starting what had been the league's lowest-ranked rushing attack and giving the Packers their first 100-yard rusher in 11 games.
- ▶ On Green Bay's first drive of the second quarter, the Packers were backed up to their own 1-yard line when Wynn injured a shoulder on a first-down carry for 1 yard. In stepped Grant, and he proceeded to rip off seven carries for 53 yards on a 98-yard drive.
- ▶ Grant took over again on the Packers' next possession, carrying five straight times for 23 yards to open the drive. Two of those runs went for 9 and 8 yards.

▶ Grant, acquired in a trade with the New York Giants at the roster cutdown deadline, had 14 carries for 81 yards in the first half alone, as the Packers took advantage of Denver's league-worst rushing defense to get their previously stagnant running game going.

▶ The effort came with another re-shuffled offensive line to boot. With center Scott Wells unable to play because of a lingering sinus infection and guard Junius Coston out with an ankle injury, Jason Spitz stepped in at center and Tony Moll took over for Coston, creating the same starting line the Packers had two weeks ago against Washington.

ROUGH NIGHT FOR FLAGS; ANOTHER THREE-SACK EFFORT FOR KAMPMAN

Penalties were probably the biggest black mark on the victory, as the Packers committed 13 infractions for 103 yards.

- ▶ The Packers cost themselves a potential touchdown late in the second quarter with a pair of false start penalties inside the Denver 5-yard line that forced the offense to settle for a field goal.
- ▶ The first false start was against Tony Moll on second-and-goal at the 1. Two plays later it was third-and-goal on the 2, and Chad Clifton jumped. The ensuing third-down pass to Donald Driver was incomplete.
- ▶ For the fourth time in his career, defensive end **Aaron Kampman** recorded three sacks in one game. Kampman leads the team with eight sacks this season, halfway to topping his career-high 15 1/2 sacks from last year.
- ▶ Kampman sacked Cutler twice, once for a 10-yard loss late in the second quarter and again for a 7-yard loss late in the third quarter. The second sack came on third-and-long and forced the Broncos to kick a field goal.
- ▶ His third sack was the toughest. Denver tried an option pass in the fourth quarter, with Marshall taking a handoff on an end-around and looking to throw. Kampman missed the shifty receiver twice along the sideline for potentially big losses but then finally ran him down near the middle of the field for a 3-yard sack.

LONE TURNOVER IS A BIG ONE

- ▶ With the score tied at 7, the Broncos had just moved the ball to the Green Bay 1-yard line when the first quarter expired. After marching the length of the field to begin the second quarter, Denver promptly fumbled when quarterback Jay Cutler didn't get the center exchange cleanly.
- ▶ Green Bay linebacker Nick Barnett recovered at the 1, thwarting what had been a 71-yard drive by the Broncos and keeping the game tied.
- ▶ The offense responded by putting together a 14-play, 98-yard drive that took more than half of the quarter (7 minutes, 42 seconds) and resulted in the go-ahead field goal.

GRANT HELPS GROUND GAME TAKE OFF

Opportunity can knock in the NFL at any time, and it was **Ryan Grant's** turn to be ready on Monday night.

- ▶ The Packers' No. 2 running back went from substitute to workhorse in

PACKERS SET TO HONOR MCGEE

Packers flags flew at half staff this weekend to honor Packers Hall of Famer Max McGee, who died suddenly last weekend on Oct. 20.

- ▶ “Max was a prominent member of the Packers family for decades - as a player, a broadcaster, member of the Packers Hall of Fame and beloved alumnus,” Packers Chairman **Bob Harlan** said. “We felt this was an appropriate way to honor his memory and contributions to the organization.”
- ▶ In addition to the flags, which include a large Packers flag on top of the northeast corner of the stadium and two Packers flags on Harlan Plaza (U.S. flags are unaffected), the team will broadcast a brief video tribute to McGee on Lambeau Field's TundraVision video boards during the club's next home game, Nov. 11 vs. the Minnesota Vikings.
- ▶ The organization also will make a contribution to the Max McGee National Research Center for Juvenile Diabetes at the Children's Hospital Foundation in Milwaukee.
- ▶ Former players, including Bart Starr and Paul Hornung, shared their favorite memories of McGee this past weekend at his funeral service.

In memory of Max McGee, 1932-2007

Green Bay Packers Hall of Famer Max McGee passed away at age 75 last weekend. A legendary wide receiver and radio announcer for the Packers, McGee was among the most revered players in team history.

- ▶ A fifth-round selection by the Packers in 1954, McGee came to Green Bay from Tulane University.
- ▶ After his rookie season, McGee spent two years in the U.S. Air Force before returning to the Packers.
- ▶ A member of the most storied dynasty in NFL history, McGee went on to win five NFL championships. His lone Pro Bowl selection came in 1961.
- ▶ McGee became the stuff of NFL legend in the first Super Bowl in 1967. Having caught only four passes all season, McGee figured he would see little if any action in the championship game. Reportedly staying out until the wee hours of the night, McGee was summoned into the huddle after wideout Boyd Dowler was injured early in the first quarter.
- ▶ Only a few plays later, McGee reeled in a 37-yard touchdown catch, the first touchdown in Super Bowl history.
- ▶ McGee would catch another touchdown in the third quarter and finished the day with seven catches for 138 yards and two scores.
- ▶ He would retire one year later after another victory in Super Bowl II.
- ▶ In 1975, McGee was inducted into the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame.
- ▶ His association with the team continued in 1979, when he teamed with play-by-play man Jim Irwin on the Packers Radio Network. McGee called Packers games for 20 seasons, retiring in 1998.
- ▶ McGee and his wife, Denise, founded the Max McGee National Research Center for Juvenile Diabetes at the Children's Hospital of Wisconsin in Milwaukee in 1999.

MCCARTHY EXCERPTS FROM POST-GAME

- ▶ “Anytime you're going for a vertical route, you're going for broke. It was very similar to the play that we scored on earlier in the game. We were actually sliding Donald Lee on the line to attack the middle of the field. They gave us a three-deep. It's a much better play to go to Donald on a two-deep but they gave us three-deep and Brett went to the individual cut on the go route. Excellent read by Brett, excellent throw and excellent catch. Greg did a great job by finishing it.”
- ▶ “We had two big go routes today. I think their corners are outstanding. I think they anticipate and jump routes as good as anybody that we've played. It was important for us to go over top of Dre Bly and Champ, and we obviously had a lot of success at that today.”
- ▶ (*On the play call*) “We put the play in for a two beater. I told him if you do get three beat to keep the play on because we used to check out of that particularly play versus two when we insert Donald Lee for the route. It's much better to insert him from the line of scrimmage than from the backfield. We decided to go at the three-deep and they did a great job of executing it on the outside.”
- ▶ “I really didn't have time to ride the emotional roller coaster. I thought our sideline was excellent. I liked the way we responded to the overtime because it was electric in the stadium. This is a tough place to play. I have the utmost respect for Mike Shanahan and the great football teams that he puts in here year in and year out. To win that game at the end is a credit to our football team.”
- ▶ “The players have been working hard at it. We had a change at the offensive line today, Scott Wells with his illness. The commitment by the players and the play-caller, I gave those guys a chance to run the football today. We didn't do anything scheme-wise that we haven't done since Day 1. I thought the execution was better. I thought the offensive line did an excellent job of capturing the line of scrimmage. I thought Ryan Grant put his foot down, it was one cut, north and south, the way you're supposed to. I was pleased with the progress we made in the run game.”
- ▶ “We felt that they were going to squat on us. If you watch us on film, we've been very productive in our three-step game. We just felt that we needed to make sure we got those corners off of us. We needed to play a hard, inside technique. We see a lot of that with the West Coast system, with a lot of slants. We thought it was important to go over top of them.”
- ▶ (*On high number of penalties*) “The couple on kicking the ball, there's no room for that. The competitive penalties, we're a match man-to-man team. That's who we are. You'd like to see not as many flags thrown against us but I refer to those as combative penalties, as long as they don't have lack of discipline in your technique and fundamentals. That's the way we play. When you have penalties where you're hitting people out of bounds, that's lack of discipline and I have a problem with that.”
- ▶ “I'll be honest with you, I think they're more game-specific. You have to look at what's called. If we haven't thrown any passes then that's a concern. But if we're throwing vertical routes and he's checking the ball down, then I'm fine with it. I like our passing game and I liked our running game today. I hope you guys liked our running game today too.”
- ▶ (*Concede at the end of the half?*) “Sure did. I knew we had the ball in the second half. I was a little frustrated in the first half. I thought some things were sloppy. I wanted to get into the half and get it over with. That's why I watched the second down call. I was comfortable with where we were and with the two time outs. We went and got the two holding penalties. I think we had four penalties on the last five plays on offense. I thought it was more important to get into the locker room.”
- ▶ “I just didn't think that Koren (Robinson) was ready. He needs another week of work. He had some inflammation in his knee. He had the surgery done a number of months ago. It surprised him a little bit. He wasn't comfortable out there. He kind of went through his first week of training camp. We'll visit it tomorrow and make some decisions there.”



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

THE IMPORTANCE OF A QUICK START

There's no secret that early success increases an NFL team's chance to earn a playoff berth.

- ▶ Maintaining the confidence and momentum built during the four-game win streak to close 2006 has been a major focus of the offseason program for Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** and his team.
- ▶ One of McCarthy's early goals this season – getting off to a quick start – was accomplished with the 4-0 and 6-1 start.
- ▶ Slow starts have plagued the Packers the past three seasons, only one of which resulted in a postseason appearance (2004). That season, the team started 1-4 but won nine of its last 11 games.
- ▶ In 2005, injuries contributed to a 1-7 start while a 1-4 start in 2006 proved too much to overcome.
- ▶ A look at how important fast starts have become to eventual playoff success in the NFL, compiled from 1990-2006:

"SPECIAL" TEAMS

Having always been a key ingredient to the success of the Packers, Green Bay's special teams unit has seen a remarkable improvement this season.

- ▶ In Rick Gosselin's annual *Dallas Morning News* rankings, which objectively grades teams by their rankings in 22 kicking-game categories, Green Bay finished seventh both in 1996 and 1997. The Packers reached the Super Bowl both seasons.
- ▶ More recently, the Packers ranked 8th in 2003 and 9th in 2004. Both years they made the playoffs.
- ▶ For the past two seasons, Green Bay has ranked last in the NFL in Gosselin's rankings.
- ▶ The coverage units have been excellent thus far. Through seven games, the Packers rank sixth in the league in both opponent punt return average and opponent kickoff return average.
- ▶ An area of emphasis all offseason, the unit got things going early in Week 1 by accounting for all 16 points.
- ▶ Rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** has connected on 12-of-15 field goal attempts on the season and has displayed a powerful kickoff leg. He already has nine touchbacks on the season.
- ▶ Though the team has been unable to put cornerback Will Blackmon on return duties, fellow defensive back Tramon Williams has filled in nicely. His 65-yard kickoff return in Week 5 against Chicago was the longest return by a Packer since Robert Ferguson's 71-yard kickoff return at Indianapolis (Sept. 26, 2004).

FAVRE TURNING BACK THE CLOCK THIS SEASON

Quarterback **Brett Favre** has surpassed some of the NFL's greatest milestones so far this season, but not lost on the rest of the league is just how well he has been playing through the first seven games.

- ▶ For the first time in his career, Favre threw for 300 yards-or-more in three consecutive games (Weeks 3-5). With a 322-yard effort against Chicago in Week 5, Favre now has 52 career 300-yard passing games.
- ▶ The 1,035 passing yards Favre had over those three contests were the most passing yards over a three-game stretch in his 17-year career.
- ▶ On Wednesday, Oct. 10, Favre turned 38 years old. One day earlier, half-back **DeShawn Wynn** turned 24.
- ▶ Much of the Packers' offensive success can be traced to Favre's precision passing. Between a second-quarter interception against the Giants (Week 2) and a third-quarter interception against the Bears (Week 5),

Favre had attempted 142 consecutive passes without an interception – the third-longest streak of his career. During the interception-free streak, he threw nine touchdown passes.

UPON FURTHER REVIEW – A CLOSER LOOK AT THE STATS

Some things that jump out about the Packers after a second glance at the statistics:

- ▶ The Packers defense has yielded only two rushing touchdowns on the season, tied for second lowest in the NFL.
- ▶ Despite their first 100-yard rushing effort of the season, the Packers remain 32nd in rushing offense.
- ▶ Conversely, the Packers boast the league's second-ranked passing offense. Favre ranks second in the NFL in yards passing and third in completions.
- ▶ Three Packers wide receivers (Driver, Jones and Jennings) rank in the top 20 in the NFC in receiving yardage.
- ▶ A solid effort in Denver helped Green Bay's defense rise in the third-down rankings. The Packers now rank first in the NFC and fourth in the NFL.
- ▶ Crosby's nine touchbacks rank fifth in the NFL.

- RCB 31 Al Harris (6-1, 188, Tenth Year, Texas A&M-Kingsville)** — Regularly assigned to shadow the opponent's top receiver...Has not missed a game since 1998 (161 contests)...Rarely comes off the field, having played in 98.5 percent of the defensive snaps last year.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

WITH THE GAME ON THE LINE, PACKERS DELIVER

A major catalyst in the Packers' quick start has been their ability to get out to an early lead, as evidenced by their plus-20 scoring differential in the opening frame. More importantly, however, has been their ability to deliver in crunch time. Each of their six wins has been decided in the final frame, or in the case of Monday night, overtime.

- In their six wins, Green Bay has entered the fourth quarter down four points (San Diego), tied (Philadelphia), up one (New York Giants), up four (Minnesota) and up three twice (Washington and Denver). In their only loss on the season to Chicago, Green Bay also entered the fourth quarter up three points.
- Defense has been a major catalyst for the strong fourth-quarter play. In their only blemish thus far, Chicago outscored Green Bay, 10-0, in the fourth quarter.
- Green Bay's plus-25 mark in the final frame is the seventh-best differential in the league through Week 8.

425 TOUCHDOWN PASSES AND COUNTING...

After a moment now etched in NFL history, Brett Favre stands alone atop the all-time touchdown passes list.

- 43 different Packers have been on the receiving end of a Favre touchdown pass, beginning with **Sterling Sharpe's** grab in the fourth quarter against the Bengals on Sept. 20, 1992.
- Favre's two fourth-quarter touchdown throws in that game not only sealed the come-from-behind, 24-23 victory, but also earned him the start the following week, a job he hasn't relinquished since.
- In a three-touchdown performance at New England on Oct. 13, 2002, Favre became just the fourth NFL player to throw for 300 touchdowns. On his final TD pass of the day, a 2-yard toss to tight end **Bubba Franks**, Favre surpassed John Elway to move into third place on the all-time list.
- He moved into second place on the list in one of the most memorable performances of his career – and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – when he threw four touchdown passes in the first half against Oakland just one day after the sudden death of his father, Irvin. Favre's second touchdown pass of the night, a 23-yard strike to Javon Walker, pushed him past Fran Tarkenton on the league's all-time list with 343 career TD passes.
- A first-quarter strike to **Greg Jennings** made NFL history at Minnesota in Week 4. The game was stopped briefly, and a videotaped message from Dan Marino was played on the Metrodome's scoreboard.

A CHRONOLOGY OF THE RECORD

Eight players – all members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame – have held the NFL career touchdown pass record throughout the history of the league. Thanks to research provided by Elias Sports Bureau, the one-time record holders were:

- **Benny Friedman** had 66 career TD passes and held the record from 1930 until 1943.
- **Arnie Herber**, a former Green Bay signal caller, reached 66 touchdown passes in 1940 and shared the record with Friedman until 1943.
- **Sammy Baugh** passed Friedman and Herber in 1943 and threw 187 career touchdowns. He held the record until 1962.
- **Bobby Layne** tied Baugh in 1961 and passed him during the 1962 season. Layne finished with 196 touchdown passes and held the record until 1963.
- **Y.A. Tittle** passed Layne in 1963 and finished his career with 212 touchdown passes. Tittle held the record until 1966.
- **Johnny Unitas** passed Tittle in 1966 and ended his playing days with 290 TD passes. He held the record until 1975.
- **Fran Tarkenton** surpassed Unitas in 1975 and became the first NFL player with 300 career TD passes. He finished with 342 touchdown passes and held the record until 1995.
- **Dan Marino** passed Tarkenton on Nov. 26, 1995, at Indianapolis with a second-quarter touchdown pass and finished his career with 420 touchdown passes. He held the record until surpassed by Brett Favre in 2007.

MORE THAN JUST A SACK

Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila**, who earlier this season surpassed Hall of Famer Reggie White on the franchise's all-time career sack list, has

seen a return to form this season with 4½ sacks through seven games.

► This season, many more are cheering on 'KGB' with each sack for what it will mean towards the greater Green Bay community.

► More than \$10,000 goes to Freedom House, a Green Bay homeless shelter, with each KGB sack. The pledge for each sack comes from Gbaja-Biamila, teammates **Ryan Pickett** and **Bubba Franks**, and local donors.

► One of the decade's most-feared pass rushers, KGB recorded 10-plus sacks four consecutive seasons (2001-04). The eight-year pro, along with many others, are hoping he can once again reach that plateau this season.

PACKERS ONCE AGAIN LEAGUE'S YOUNGEST TEAM

Green Bay has the distinction of being the NFL's youngest team for the second straight season.

Coincidentally, the two youngest teams in the

NFL have the two longest active winning streaks in the league.

- Since taking over general manager duties in 2005, Ted Thompson has vowed to build the team's foundation through the draft. Of the 53 active roster players, 20 have been drafted by Thompson.
- Each team's average age is based upon its opening-day roster. A look at the five youngest teams in 2007:

NO ONE WINS MORE THAN NO. 4

In what has been a record-breaking year for Favre thus far, certainly one of the most meaningful accomplishments, both from a team and individual standpoint, came early. With his 149th win in Week 2, Favre surpassed John Elway on the all-time quarterback wins list. Heading into the contest at Denver, Favre now has 153 career wins.

- Simply put, Favre was spectacular in the record-breaking victory over the New York Giants. He completed 29-of-38 passes for 286 yards and three touchdowns and earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors.
- "We gave him the game ball after the game," McCarthy said after the win. "The 'all-time' in anything in this league is such a monumental achievement. 149 victories - I think that speaks for itself. When you go out and win over that long of a period of time, I think that's the ultimate compliment a quarterback can have. To me, if you asked me what is the biggest record that he will achieve, I think he just accomplished it."

MILESTONES COME ON THE ROAD FOR FAVRE

Brett Favre had one of the league's most coveted milestones in his sights and again made history away from Lambeau. Taking a look back at some of Favre's milestone touchdown passes throughout his career, all have a common theme - they came in road victories.

- Only touchdown pass No. 100 came in front of the home crowd at Lambeau Field, though it still came in a winning effort.
- Touchdown pass No. 301 pushed Favre ahead of John Elway (300) to third on the league's all-time touchdown passes list.
- No. 343 - coming in one of the most memorable performances of his career and in the history of *Monday Night Football* - placed Favre No. 2 on the all-time list, surpassing Fran Tarkenton.

TACKLE DUO AS STEADY AS THEY COME

Tackle **Chad Clifton** has made 102 career starts for the Packers, while fellow tackle **Mark Tauscher** has started 98 career games.

- A second-round pick in 2000, Clifton was inserted into the starting lineup in Week 7 as a rookie and has been a mainstay on the offensive line since then.
- Tauscher started 14 games as a rookie in 2000, earning his first start at right tackle in Week 3, a position he has yet to relinquish. Tauscher saw his own consecutive starts streak come to an end as well in 2006 (57 games) because of a groin injury.
- Favre's blind-side shield, Clifton has started 68 of 69 games since returning from a pelvic injury that ended his 2002 season after a blind-side hit from Warren Sapp. Only a bout with the flu last season in Miami (Oct. 22) could snap the streak.
- The duo has provided a steady influence to many of their younger teammates along the line. Already this season, five different players have started along the interior of the offensive line (**Daryn Colledge, Junius Coston, Tony Moll, Jason Spitz and Scott Wells**).
- Elite pass blockers that rarely receive the credit they deserve, Clifton and Tauscher have anchored an offensive line that has allowed the second fewest sacks in the NFL since they became fixtures in the starting lineup in 2000.

ONLY MARSHALL REMAINS

Favre made his 241st consecutive start against Minnesota, surpassing former Vikings center Mick Tingelhoff (240) and now owns the second-longest recorded streak in NFL history at 244.

- Only Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more in consecutive fashion.
- Favre has played in 246 straight games (266 including playoffs) and his 244 starts in a row (264 including playoffs) is the NFL's record among quarterbacks.
- Including a one-week stint earlier this season (finger), Favre has appeared on the injury report an amazing 49 times during the streak.

OTHER PACKERS BREAKING RECORDS

Though Favre's assault on numerous records has garnered most of the attention this season, a number of other Packers have records and milestones in their sights.

- **Donald Driver** became the seventh player in team history to surpass the 6,000-yard mark and also moved into fifth place in the franchise's all-time receptions list. Driver, who has caught a pass in 87 straight games, became Lambeau Field's all-time leader in receptions.
- **Bubba Franks** became the 11th player in Packers history to record 30 career touchdown receptions.
- Defensive end **Aaron Kampman** recorded his 30th career sack in a Packers uniform earlier this season, becoming the eighth player in team history to do so.
- Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** surpassed Reggie White's franchise record for sacks (68½). Gbaja-Biamila enters the Denver contest with 69 career sacks, having tallied back-to-back, multi-sack games in Weeks 3 and 4.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Packers will host a season-long celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of Lambeau Field. The crown jewel of the National Football League remains the most historic stadium in football.

- Dedicated as City Stadium Sept. 29, 1957, with a 21-17 victory over the archrival Chicago Bears, the team renamed the facility Lambeau Field in 1965 following the death of E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach. It is the NFL's longest-tenured facility.
- To mark the occasion, an anniversary logo was created and is featured on the team's home uniforms, *Gameday* program, the media guide and the Packers Yearbook.
- Lambeau Field also features the special logo in the north end zone. Both end zones have been painted to reflect the way they were in Lambeau Field's first season in 1957.
- Renowned 3-D pop artist Charles Fazzino was commissioned by the Packers to create an art piece celebrating the 50th anniversary. Fazzino, the official artist of the Super Bowl and Major League Baseball's All-Star Game, spent nine months on the project. The piece is available in a limited edition 3-D format, as well as on T-shirts, helmets and assorted items in the Packers Pro Shop.
- Packers ticket holders will enjoy images of Lambeau Field through the years on their tickets as well.



TRAVELING LIGHT IN 2007

NFL teams will cover 566,650 miles this season – about 75,000 more miles than a round trip flight from the earth to the moon.

- No team will cover more mileage than the St. Louis Rams (34,352), while the N.Y. Jets will travel the fewest (9,186).
- In the preseason and regular season, Green Bay will fly a total of 10,738 miles, over 6,000 miles less than the team traveled in 2006.
- Most of the miles will be covered following the bye week, as the team plays six of its ten remaining games on the road.

SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Four coaches have new titles this season, though all four were with the team during the 2006 season. Former offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski left to become the head coach at Boston College in January, leaving a major opening on the staff.

- McCarthy tabbed **Joe Philbin** as offensive coordinator. Entering his fifth season with the Packers, Philbin most recently served as offensive line

coach in 2006 where he implemented a new zone-blocking scheme and successfully integrated three rookie starters.

- **Winston Moss** was promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers after serving as linebackers coach in 2006. As the assistant head coach, the 41-year-old Moss will be McCarthy's right-hand man with regard to administrative duties and team dynamics. Moss will continue to coach the linebackers as well.
- Promoted to offensive line coach, **James Campen** moves up from his position as assistant offensive line coach in McCarthy's first season at the helm. The center for Brett Favre's first career start in 1992, Campen begins his fourth season on the Packers staff.
- **Jerry Fontenot** will serve as assistant offensive line coach in 2007. A 16-year NFL veteran (1989-2004), Fontenot joined the Packers as a coaching intern last summer and remained with the team throughout the 2006 season as an offensive assistant.

PUNT BLOCKS

Jon Ryan was 13 years old the last time the Packers had a punt blocked. It happened Sept. 10, 1995, at Chicago, when the Bears' Anthony Marshall got to Craig Hentrich.

- Only one other team has a longer active stretch of punts without a block than Green Bay:

QUITE THE DEBUT FOR CROSBY

According to Elias Sports Bureau, rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** on Sept. 9 became the first player in NFL history to kick a 50-plus yard field goal and a game-winning field goal in the final minute of his first NFL game.

- What a whirlwind couple of days it had been for Crosby. First, he found out on Sept. 1 that he had won the kicking job after what had been perhaps the most intense positional battle in training camp. Two days later, he celebrated his 23rd birthday, and just days after that the rookie was lining up for his first-ever professional game.
- Crosby was 3-for-3 on field goals against the Eagles. He hit a 53-yarder, one yard shy of the team record, in the first quarter, a 37-yarder in the third quarter, and a 42-yarder with 2 seconds left to break a 13-all tie and give the Packers the three-point win. He was later awarded NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his efforts.

ROOKIES IN THE BACKFIELD

Green Bay became the first NFL team to open the regular season with two rookie starters in the backfield since 1996. That season, both St. Louis (Derrick Harris and Lawrence Phillips) and Miami (Stanley Pritchett and Abdul-Karim al-Jabbar) used an all-rookie backfield on opening day.

- Rookie running back **Brandon Jackson**, a second-round pick from Nebraska, became the first rookie to start at running back on opening day for the Packers since John Brockington in 1971.
- Fullback **Korey Hall**, a linebacker at Boise State last season, was the first Packers rookie to start on opening day at fullback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

- Has a reception in 87 consecutive games, the franchise's second-longest streak behind Sharpe's 103 (1988-94).

- Could become only the second Packers player with multiple 90-catch seasons, joining Sterling Sharpe (four). Driver had his first 90-reception campaign in 2006.



- Could tie a franchise record with 1,000 yards in a fifth overall season. Only James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe have five 1,000-yard campaigns.
- Needs 40 receptions to become the third player in team annals to reach 500, joining Sharpe (595) and Lofton (530). Driver enters with 460.

- Needs one TD pass at Lambeau Field to extend the league's single-stadium record to 200. He enters with 199.

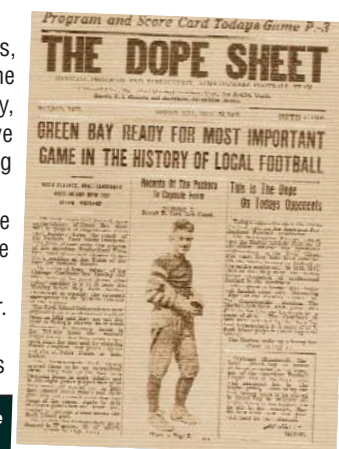
