### PACKERS MOVE TO 2-0

Green Bay recorded its second win of the preseason in convincing fashion Saturday night with a 48-13 victory over the visiting Seattle Seahawks.

- The Packers' 48 points marked the most points scored by Green Bay in a preseason game since Sept. 5, 1938, a span of 69 years. Head Coach Curly Lambeau and the Packers defeated the Cedar Rapids (Iowa) Crush, 75-0, in Ironwood, Mich.
- Statistically speaking, the 48-point effort was the most points scored against an NFL opponent in preseason action in team history.
- The Packers also opened the preseason 2-0 for the first time since 1999, when they recorded victories in each of their four preseason games.
- Jacksonville defeated Tampa Bay, 31-19, Saturday night.

### ALL PHASES WORKING IN BLOWOUT VICTORY

After a sluggish start in a 13-9 win at Pittsburgh, the Packers got significant contributions from each phase of the team Saturday night to send the 69,761 rain-soaked fans home happy.

- Saturday's effort also went a long way in answering many of the training camp questions, including concerns about the No. 1 offense. After not recording a first down in four drives in Pittsburgh, **Brett Favre** led the offense on three straight scoring drives and finished 7-of-12 for 74 yards and one touchdown.
- "I think we executed better," Favre said. "Last week we didn't execute very well. Guys made some plays. We had a better tempo. We just made plays. There's no secret to it."
- Special teams was an area of emphasis in the offseason, and second-year cornerback **Will Blackmon** provided a major spark against Seattle. His 83-yard kickoff return set up the Packers' first touchdown, while a 16-yard punt return initiated a 51-yard drive ending in a Favre touchdown pass to rookie **James Jones**.
- "I think he's really showing what he can do when the ball's in his hands," Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** said. "We're excited about Will Blackmon."
- To put it simply, the Packers' defense continues to dominate. After recording five sacks at Pittsburgh, the unit combined to collect seven sacks, force six turnovers and score two touchdowns on fumble returns.
- "We definitely took a step forward as a football team," McCarthy said following the game. "There are a number of positives that we can build on. I'm a little sour with the way the fourth quarter went."
- "I'm very happy with the progress that we're making. We had a number of objectives heading into this football game, as far as being physical, finishing plays. Ball security on offense was clearly the one negative that we need to fix. I thought our group came out ready to play tonight. We had a significant lead at halftime. I'm pleased with the progress that we've made as a football team."

### GREEN BAY MAKES NATIONAL TELEVISION DEBUT

Packers fans around the country will get their first look at the 2007 team as Green Bay hosts Jacksonville in a nationally televised game on FOX.

- **Kenny Albert** and **Daryl Johnston** call the action in the booth with **Tony Siragusa** and **Chris Myers** serving as sideline reporters.

- The Packers are currently scheduled to make four appearances on national TV in 2007. The defending NFC champion Chicago Bears travel to Lambeau Field (Oct. 7) for a Sunday night contest on NBC, while the Packers travel to Mile High Stadium to take on Denver (Oct. 29) on ESPN *Monday Night Football*. The Packers also have back-to-back Thursday contests, starting with Thanksgiving Day in Detroit on FOX. On Nov. 29, Green Bay heads to Texas Stadium to take on Dallas on NFL Network.

### BISHOP'S CHARITIES GAME

The Bishop's Charities Game was first played in 1961 after **Vince Lombardi** was approached by the Diocese of Green Bay about playing a charitable contest in Green Bay (the Shrine contest was a fixture in Milwaukee).

- For more than 30 years, the church handled much of the game's business-related tasks, including game program and advertising sales, using a network of volunteers covering 14 Northeastern Wisconsin counties. The Packers assumed many of those tasks in 1994.
- The series enjoys its 47th contest on Thursday and has raised approximately \$3.25 million.
- The Packers are 24-21-1 all-time in the series and look to end a four-game losing streak in the annual contest.

## PACKERS NEWS OF THE WEEK - TEAM NOTES

### THIS WEEK'S SCHEDULE

With two-a-days and dorm life behind them, the Packers now practice in a schedule that will more closely resemble the regular season. Four other practices open to the public remain.

- After a day off Sunday, the Packers will hit the practice field at 6:30 p.m. Monday, the last of nine night practice sessions during training camp. The team will be in full pads.
- Tuesday's practice begins at 10:45 a.m., with team and positional meetings both before and after practice. Wednesday's practice is closed in preparation for Jacksonville.
- The team will have both Friday and Saturday off following the game before returning to the practice field on Sunday at 10:45 a.m.

### STARTERS SHOULD SEE PLENTY OF ACTION

Customary for Week 3 around the NFL, projected regular-season starters are expected to see their most action of the preseason.

- **Brett Favre** and the No. 1 offense rebounded nicely against Seattle after a slow start to the preseason. The group saw four series of action in both games, but was limited to just 12 plays in Pittsburgh after failing to record a first down. Favre led the offense to scores on three successive drives Saturday as the group had 22 plays from scrimmage.
- The defense looked strong again, limiting Seattle to just three points. A standout performance from safety **Atari Bigby** – two sacks and a forced fumble – means he may push former high school teammate **Marquand Manuel** for time at strong safety with the starting unit.

### INJURY REPORT

No position has been hit harder by injuries than the backfield, which took yet another hit Saturday night against Seattle.

- Running back **Vernand Morency**, who is expected to compete for the starting job, has been sidelined after injuring his knee on the first day of training camp. Morency has yet to see any action in the preseason.
- In his absence, **Brandon Jackson**, a second-round pick from Nebraska, has been seeing reps with the first team, while veteran **Noah Herron** has continued his role from last season as a third-down back. In addition to Herron and Jackson, rookie **Corey White** has been the only other running back to carry the football.
- Second-year pro **P.J. Pope** was injured in the team's 'Family Night' scrimmage Aug. 4 and is expected to be out several weeks, while seventh-round selection **DeShawn Wynn** has missed both preseason games due to a quad injury sustained in practice.
- Fullback **Brandon Miree**, who entered camp as the No. 1 fullback on the depth chart, has been held out of both preseason games.
- Saturday, rookie fullback **Ryan Powdrell** went down with an MCL injury. Also injured Saturday during the game were wide receiver **Shaun Bodiford**, defensive end **Michael Montgomery** and tackle **Orrin Thompson**. McCarthy said each player sustained an MCL injury and would be out "at least a couple of weeks."
- In addition to Morency, Miree, Pope and Wynn, defensive end **DeVon Hicks**, tackle **Tony Moll** and guard **Tony Palmer** were held out of the game Saturday. Moll and Hicks each missed the Pittsburgh game as well.

### VETERAN WR FERGUSON RELEASED

The Packers released veteran wide receiver **Robert Ferguson** on Aug. 17.

- General Manager **Ted Thompson** said, "We thank Robert for everything he has given to the Packers. In addition to his contributions on the playing field, Robert has been a positive influence in our locker room and a good teammate. As with any veteran player who has been here, we wanted to make this move early because this gives him the best chance to catch on with another organization in the NFL."
- The Packers' second-round pick in the 2001 NFL Draft, Ferguson played in 60 games for Green Bay over the past six seasons, catching 116 passes for 1,577 yards and 12 touchdowns.

### ROSTER CUTS LOOMING

As training camp comes to a close, Thompson and his personnel staff will have to make some of their toughest decisions yet.

- The first NFL-mandated roster reduction, to 75 players, must be made Tues., Aug. 28, by 3 p.m. CDT. Each NFL team will have played three preseason games.
- The final roster reduction is four days later, Sat., Sept. 1, by 3 p.m. CDT.
- With competitive battles on both sides of the ball – not to mention special teams – still underway, Thompson's goal of improvement from within seems to be taking shape.
- That doesn't mean Thompson won't watch the waiver wire. Last year, the team claimed three players on waivers after roster cuts – **Jarrett Bush**, **Charlie Peprah** and **Tony Palmer** – all of whom are still with the club.
- On making the tough decisions, Thompson said Aug. 16, "You kind of look at general scenarios, and go through the scenarios. You can't get too wrapped up in it because things do change. We're constantly going through different combinations of players and looking at the board and seeing how it looks. But there's not that many decisions already made."

### BOWLING NIGHT BREAKS UP CAMP SCHEDULE

As players gathered for evening meetings Monday in preparation for Seattle, Coach McCarthy decided the team would be better fit meeting away from the classroom – more specifically, the local bowling lanes.

- The team piled into three buses to the new Pro Bowl lanes in Howard, Wis., for a competitive couple of hours of team-building.
- All the players and coaches were divided into 35 teams of three players each, and everyone bowled two games to determine two finalist squads.
- The trio of strength and conditioning assistant **Mark Lovat**, rookie tight end **Clark Harris** and linebacker **A.J. Hawk** met the other top squad – cornerbacks coach **Lionel Washington**, tight end **Bubba Franks** and rookie quarterback **Paul Thompson** – in the finals.
- With the rest of the squad gathered around and watching intently, Harris lifted his team to victory in the 10th frame.
- Cornerback **Jarrett Bush** bowled the high score of 212 and translated that success to the football field Saturday against Seattle, when he recorded two interceptions.
- "They were very physical at practice today, so I thought it was a good time to get away and build group dynamics," McCarthy said.

### PACKERS ON TELEVISION, RADIO

FOX Sports, in its 14th season as an NFL network television partner, will air the game to a national TV audience.

- The top-notch broadcast team includes **Kenny Albert** calling the play-by-play alongside fellow FOX broadcaster **Daryl Johnston** providing the analysis.
- **Tony Siragusa** and **Chris Myers** serve as the sideline reporters.

- Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station **Packers Radio Network**, with **Wayne Larivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The network covers 47 markets in six states.

**Mike McCarthy:** 8-8-0, .500; second NFL season

**MIKE McCARTHY**...Begins second year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- Led the Packers to an 8-8 finish and near playoff berth, losing a tiebreaker with the New York Giants, who also finished 8-8.
- Spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- Began his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

**JACK DEL RIO**...Begins fifth year as the Jaguars' 2nd head coach.

- Named the second head coach in Jaguars' history on Jan. 17, 2003.
- Now in his 22nd year in the NFL and 11th in coaching.
- Led the Jaguars to a 34-31 record since taking over, including a 29-19 regular season mark over the past three seasons. The 29 wins ties for seventh-most regular season wins during that stretch.
- A former linebacker, played four seasons for the Minnesota Vikings (1992-95). During that span, Del Rio's Vikings were 6-2 against Green Bay (4-0 at Minnesota). In all, played 11 NFL seasons with the Vikings, Saints, Chiefs and Cowboys.
- Previously served as defensive coordinator in Carolina (2002) and linebackers coach in Baltimore (1999-2001).

## THE PACKERS-JAGUARS SERIES

Jacksonville and Green Bay will meet for the second time in the preseason, with the Jaguars edging the Packers, 9-7, on Aug. 27, 2004, in the first meeting at Alltel Stadium.

- The Packers and Jaguars have met only three times in the regular season since Jacksonville's inception in 1995. The Packers won the first two meetings in 1995 and 2001, while the Jaguars won the most recent contest in 2004.
- Neither team has been victorious at home during the series. Green Bay won the first two games in Jacksonville, 24-14, Sept. 24, 1995, and, 28-21, Dec. 3, 2001. The '95 victory gave Green Bay sole possession of first place in the NFC Central for the first time in 17 years.
- The Jaguars won in their only appearance in Lambeau Field, 28-25, Dec. 19, 2004.

## NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Jacksonville head coach Jack Del Rio coached with Packers quarterbacks coach Tom Clements in New Orleans from 1997-98...Jaguars quarterbacks coach Mike Shula (2000-02) coached alongside defensive coordinator Bob Sanders ('01-'04) and defensive tackles coach Robert Nunn

('00-'02, '04) with the Miami Dolphins...Jaguars linebackers coach Mark Duffner held the same position with the Packers in 2003-05...Green Bay running backs coach Edgar Bennett is a Jacksonville native and was an all-state running back at Robert E. Lee High School; also on that team at Robert E. Lee H.S. was LeRoy Butler, the former Pro Bowl safety who was inducted into the Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame this summer...Packers offensive quality control coach Ty Knott was the offensive assistant/quarterbacks coach in Jacksonville in the 2002 season...Jaguars assistant head coach/tight ends Mike Tice was formerly the head coach of the Minnesota Vikings (2002-05), compiling a 5-4 record against Green Bay...11 members of the Packers are Florida natives, but only offensive lineman Jason Spitz is from Jacksonville; Spitz attended The Bolles High School...Packers LB Tracy White played for the Jaguars in 2005 before signing with Green Bay, playing in 15 games and recording six special teams tackles...Jaguars TE Richard Angulo and S Nick Sorensen and Packers DT Ryan Pickett played together in St. Louis (Pickett in 2001-05; Angulo in '03; Sorensen in '01-02)...Playing with the New York Giants, CB Frank Walker (2003-06) lined up alongside Jaguars LB Nick Greisen ('02-05) and CB Terry Cousin ('04)...Speaking of Greisen, the sixth-year pro is a Sturgeon Bay, Wis., native - 50 miles northeast of Green Bay - and graduate of the University of Wisconsin...RB Brandon Miree and Jacksonville DE Reggie Hayward suited up with the Denver Broncos in the 2004 season...Jaguars C Brad Meester and Packers DE Aaron Kampman are both products of Aplington-Parkersburg (Iowa) High School.

## INDIVIDUALLY VS. JACKSONVILLE

QB Brett Favre has faced the Jaguars three times in his career, compiling 74 completions on 112 attempts (.661) for 931 yards, seven touchdowns and four interceptions...Favre has passed for over 360 yards in the past two meetings (367, 362 respectively)...WR Donald Driver has grabbed five balls for 84 yards (16.8 avg.) and a touchdown in two games against the Jaguars...DE Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila recorded one sack in each of the two contests he played against Jacksonville...Of the 22 players who started against the Jaguars in 2004, only 10 (6 offense, 4 defense) still remain with the Packers.

## LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Dec. 19, 2004, Lambeau Field; Jaguars won 28-25.

- A back-and-forth battle on frozen Lambeau Field (12° F) ended in a 28-25 Jacksonville victory.
- Brett Favre hit Antonio Chapman with a 6-yard touchdown throw and found Donald Driver for a 2-point conversion to pull Green Bay to 28-25 with 1:08 left.
- However, Nick Sorensen recovered the onside kick to close out the game.
- Favre, who played with tape on his wrist and thumb after jamming it into the ground in the second quarter, finished the game by completing 30 of 44 passes (.682) for 367 yards and two touchdowns
- Fred Taylor ran 22 times for 165 yards (7.5) and a third-quarter touchdown for the victors.
- Though the offense compiled 444 net yards, the Packers could not overcome five turnovers and 12 penalties.

## LAST MEETING, PRESEASON

August 27, 2004, Alltel Stadium; Jaguars won 9-7

- Robert Ferguson caught three passes for 83 yards and a 52-yard touchdown, but the Packers couldn't overcome three turnovers in a 9-7 setback.
- Favre finished 9 of 14 (.643) for 127 yards and a touchdown with a quarterback rating of 77.7
- Ahman Green rushed nine times for 39 yards (4.3 avg.)
- Jaguars RB Greg Jones finished with 79 yards on 18 carries (4.4 avg.) and the Jacksonville defense collected three interceptions
- Josh Scobee accounted for all of Jacksonville's points, connecting on field goals from 23, 32 and 43 yards.

### WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2007

#### 56 NICK BARNETT

- Needs 73 solo tackles for 500 career. Barnett enters 2007 with 427.
- Bids for a fifth consecutive 100-tackle season.

#### 76 CHAD CLIFTON

- Needs five starts for 100 career. Clifton enters with 95.

#### 60 ROB DAVIS

- Needs two games played at Lambeau Field to surpass No. 3 LeRoy Butler (77) on the stadium's all-time list. Davis has played 76 career games on the Packers' home field.
- Having played in 151 consecutive games in a Packers uniform, needs 12 more to surpass No. 4 Larry McCarren (162), and 16 to surpass No. 3 Willie Wood (166).
- Has the opportunity to advance to No. 7 on the team's all-time list of overall games played (currently 16th, 151 games).

#### 80 DONALD DRIVER

- Has 34 career TD receptions from Brett Favre. The duo needs one to match No. 3 Lynn Dickey-Paul Coffman (35).
- Needs one 100-yard game to tie No. 6 Billy Howton and Max McGee (17), three to match No. 5 Boyd Dowler (19), four to reach No. 4 Antonio Freeman (20) and eight to equal No. 3 Don Hutson (24) on the team's all-time list. Driver enters with 16 career 100-yard receiving games.
- Has a reception in 80 consecutive games, the franchise's second-longest streak behind Sharpe's 103 (1988-94).
- Stands just seven Lambeau Field receptions from surpassing the stadium's all-time leader, Antonio Freeman (213). Driver enters with 207.
- Needs 71 receiving yards to become only the seventh player in Packers history to reach 6,000 career, joining James Lofton (9,656), Sterling Sharpe (8,134), Don Hutson (7,991), Boyd Dowler (6,918), Antonio Freeman (6,651) and Max McGee (6,346).
- Needs 11 receptions to surpass No. 5 Antonio Freeman (431), 28 to surpass No. 4 Boyd Dowler (448), 68 to surpass No. 3 Don Hutson (488) and 110 to surpass No. 2 James Lofton (530) on the Packers' franchise list. Driver (421) enters No. 6 in team history.
- With 50 receptions, would become one of three in team annals to produce as many as six such seasons, joining James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe (both seven) and Antonio Freeman (six). Driver has at least 50 catches in five seasons.
- Stands 519 Lambeau Field receiving yards from surpassing No. 2 James Lofton (3,330) and 666 from becoming the stadium's all-time leader ahead of Antonio Freeman (3,477). Driver (2,812) enters at No. 3.
- Could become only the second Packers player with four 80-catch seasons, joining Sterling Sharpe (four). Driver has three entering 2007.
- Could become only the second Packers player with multiple 90-catch seasons, joining Sterling Sharpe (four). Driver had his first 90-reception campaign in 2006.



- Needs 418 receiving yards to surpass No. 6 Max McGee (6,346), 723 to surpass No. 5 Antonio Freeman (6,651) and 990 to surpass No. 4 Boyd Dowler (6,918) on the Packers' all-time list. Driver (5,929) enters No. 6 in team history.
- Could tie a franchise record with 1,000 yards in a fifth overall season. Only James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe have five 1,000-yard campaigns.
- Needs 79 receptions to become the third player in team annals to reach 500, joining Sharpe (595) and Lofton (530). Driver enters with 421.
- Needs four TD receptions to become only the eighth player in franchise annals to reach 40 career, joining Don Hutson (99), Sterling Sharpe (65), Antonio Freeman (57), Max McGee (50), James Lofton (49), Billy Howton (43) and Boyd Dowler (40). Driver enters with 36.

#### 4 BRETT FAVRE

- Has played in 239 straight games (257 including playoffs) and started 237 in a row (257 including playoffs), the NFL's record among quarterbacks. By starting the season's first four games, would surpass Mick Tinglehoff's stretch of 240 straight starts (1962-78), the second-longest recorded streak in NFL history. Only Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more in consecutive fashion.
- Needs six TD passes to match Dan Marino's NFL record, 420. Favre enters with 414.
- Needs one win to tie No. 1 John Elway (148-82-1, .643). Favre enters tied with No. 2 Dan Marino (147-93-0, .613) on the all-time quarterback wins list.
- Needs 136 passing attempts to break Dan Marino's career record, 8,358. Favre enters with 8,223.
- Needs 2,500 passing yards to become the second ever to reach 60,000, joining Dan Marino (61,361).
- Needs 3,862 passing yards — or less than his totals in each of the past three seasons — to break Marino's record. Favre enters with 57,500.
- Needs five TD passes at Lambeau Field to extend the league's single-stadium record to 200. He enters

with 195.

- Needs 2,125 passing yards at Lambeau Field to surpass John Elway (27,889 at Mile High Stadium) for the single-stadium record. Favre has 25,765.

#### Favre also:

- By playing a 16th season in a Packers uniform, will surpass Ray Nitschke (1958-72) and tie Bart Starr (1956-71) for most in Packers history.
- Needs 676 passing yards in road games to reach 30,000. He enters with 29,324.
- Needs 71 scoring drives for 1,000.

#### 88 BUBBA FRANKS

- Needs one TD reception to reach 30 career. In team history, only 11 previous players have reached the milestone, including Driver in '06.
- Needs seven starts for 100 career. Franks enters with 93.
- Needs 12 receptions for 250 career. Franks enters with 238.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called *The Dope Sheet*, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.

- Needs 11 games to surpass No. 3 Rich McGeorge (116) and 14 to surpass No. 2 Paul Coffman (119) on the team's all-time tight ends list. Franks enters No. 4 with 106, having eclipsed Marv Fleming (95) in 2006.
- Needs 86 receiving yards to surpass No. 5 Mark Chmura (2,253), 154 to surpass No. 4 Ed West (2,321), 203 to surpass No. 3 Rich McGeorge (2,370) and 427 to surpass No. 2 Ron Kramer (2,594) on the team's all-time tight ends list. Franks enters with 2,168.

### 94 KABEER GBAJA-BIAMILA

- On Green Bay's all-time sacks list, needs four to match Reggie White's career record, 68½. Gbaja-Biamila enters with 64½.

### 31 AL HARRIS

- Carries into 2007 a streak of three games with an interception. With an INT in the season opener, would extend the stretch to four games, longest since John Symank in 1961. Irv Comp holds the team record, with five in 1943.
- Needs five interceptions for 30 career.
- With nine punt returns, would reach 50 and qualify for the Packers' all-time leaders in average return. Woodson averaged 8.9 yards on 41 returns during his first season, 2006. Steve Odom, No. 5 on that list, averaged 8.9 yards from 1974-79.
- Needs 47 punt returns to surpass No. 5 Walter Stanley (87) on the Packers' all-time list. Woodson had 41 in his first Green Bay campaign.

## GAME REVIEW - PACKERS VS. SEAHAWKS - W, 48-13

### FAVRE, NO. 1 OFFENSE REGAIN FORM

Just as the backups had done a week prior, quarterback **Brett Favre** led the No. 1 offense on three successive scoring drives to open up an early lead vs. Seattle.

- ▶ After a three-and-out on their first series, Favre led the offense on a 12-play, 47-yard drive that ended in a 37-yard field goal by rookie **Mason Crosby**. Favre twice hit tight end **Bubba Franks** for first downs.
- ▶ Favre and the offense needed just seven yards for their first touchdown of the game, thanks to a long kickoff return by **Will Blackmon**. **Brandon Jackson** needed two rushes to cover the distance.
- ▶ Another nice return from Blackmon, this time on a punt, gave Favre a short field to work with once again. A beautifully placed ball between three defenders was good for a 22-yard reception by **Donald Driver**, followed by a 16-yard touchdown pass to **James Jones**.
- ▶ Jones' grab was the opening play of the second quarter – the last for the first-team offense – which left with a 17-3 lead.

### DEFENSE SHOWS NO SIGNS OF SLOWING

Building off a strong effort in Pittsburgh, the Packers' defense continues to show signs it may be a dominant force in 2007.

- ▶ Over the final 10 weeks of 2006, the defense went from 32nd in total yards allowed to finish 12th. What's more, all 11 starters return.
- ▶ Saturday, the unit collected seven sacks, forced six turnovers and returned two fumbles for scores against the Seahawks.
- ▶ The Packers' No. 1 defense racked up three sacks and two other tackles for loss, along with a touchdown, in just over one quarter of play to give Green Bay a commanding 21-point lead.
- ▶ Defensive end **Cullen Jenkins** – coming off a two-sack, forced fumble performance in Pittsburgh – made another sack on the opening to drive to force a Seattle punt.
- ▶ **A.J. Hawk** burst into the backfield and engulfed quarterback Seneca Wallace for another first-quarter sack.
- ▶ In the second quarter, defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** came off the edge to record his second sack of the preseason, this time forcing a fumble that was returned by linebacker **Nick Barnett** for a 62-yard score.
- ▶ Later in the quarter, safety **Atari Bigby** forced another fumble off a sack, this time returned for a touchdown by **Tracy White**. Bigby proved disruptive all night, collecting another sack before the half as well as a third-down pressure that forced a punt.
- ▶ "I thought Atari, with just the two sacks and the big plays that he made, really stood out," McCarthy said after the game. "I'm just excited for the whole defense and the big plays that they made, especially the point production that we made off of those plays. The defense is playing with a lot of confidence. It starts up front. They're doing an excellent job of controlling the line of scrimmage. The guys on the back end are just flying around. The communication and continuity is where it needs to be. I'm excited with where we're at on defense."

### BLACKMON SPARKS SPECIAL TEAMS

It's never too early for a player to separate himself from the pack, and it appears that's exactly what cornerback Will Blackmon did as a returner for the Packers special teams units Saturday night.

- ▶ Kickoff return was a point of emphasis all offseason for the Packers, as the team's longest kickoff return in 2006 was 35 yards.
- ▶ Additionally, the Packers would like to utilize **Charles Woodson**, the punt returner in 2006, primarily on defense.
- ▶ Blackmon took a first-quarter kickoff return 83 yards down the left sideline, side-stepping a number of Seahawks defenders in the process, to set up the Packers' first touchdown.
- ▶ Three minutes later, the second-year pro returned a punt 16 yards to set up another touchdown.
- ▶ The fourth-round draft choice in 2006 also forced a fumble on defense.

▶ Kickoff returns aren't exactly new to the Boston College product. He finished his collegiate career with 2,700 kickoff return yards, 222 yards shy of the Division I-A all-time mark.

▶ Perhaps the most publicized positional battle in camp, the one between kickers **Crosby** and **Dave Rayner**, remains deadlocked. Crosby (37 yards) and Rayner (24 yards) both made their only field goal attempts Saturday, and each continued to display a strong leg on kickoffs.

### ODDS AND ENDS

The Packers won the Upper Midwest Shrine game for the fourth consecutive year and have won eight of the last nine games in the series.

- ▶ James Jones led the team in catches once again with four receptions for 58 yards and two touchdowns.
- ▶ Wide receiver **Carlyle Holiday** has a nose for the end zone, collecting his second touchdown catch of the preseason.
- ▶ The Packers defense collected three interceptions – two from **Jarrett Bush** and one from **Charlie Peprah**.
- ▶ Green Bay only held a slight advantage statistically – 18 to 15 in first downs, 276 to 239 in total yardage and only won the time of possession battle by 26 seconds – but its ability to capitalize on big plays made the difference.

### COACH MCCARTHY SAYS...

McCarthy was pleased with how the No. 1 offense rebounded Saturday.

- ▶ "I just thought they finally got into a rhythm. When you're running the football it makes your play-action game more successful. I thought Brett (Favre) was sharp on third down. The best-available play selection at the line, I thought he did a nice job of that."
- ▶ "I thought he (Brandon Jackson) ran with body lean under his pads better than he did against Pittsburgh for the whole game. That's something he's working hard on. His blitz pick up will continue to improve. He's a tough kid. He works hard. He's very talented. I'm happy with the way he attacked training camp and has taken full advantage of his opportunities."
- ▶ "Aaron (Rodgers) is at the point in his career he needs to play. You play behind Brett Favre – we were just talking to Matt Hasselbeck about it before the game – you don't get any opportunities to play during the season. He has paid the price in the offseason with the quarterback school development. I think the game has slowed down for him. You can see that in his footwork. He plays under control. He's a gifted young man. He can make all the throws. He can play in space. He's patient in the pocket and I just can't get him enough reps."
- ▶ "When you stand up here and say this to your football team, what you want the football team to look like, we refer to it as ball command. When the defense is on the field, that's ball extraction from the offense. The offense is ball security, protecting the football. We have a ball-security drill every day. It's a major emphasis for us. We did not accomplish that tonight offensively. We definitely accomplished it with six takeaways defensively. When you practice it and it shows up in the game, that's what you're looking for."
- ▶ "We have a lot of work to do. I'm excited about the win. I think our team is gaining confidence. I've already stated that we've made progress but we still have a lot of work to do."

### INJURIES

- ▶ Wide receiver **Shaun Bodiford**, defensive end **Michael Montgomery**, fullback **Ryan Powdrell** and tackle **Orrin Thompson** all went down with MCL injuries during the game. McCarthy said each player would be out "at least a couple of weeks."
- ▶ Not suiting up Saturday were running backs **Vernand Morency**, **P.J. Pope** and **DeShawn Wynn**, fullback **Brandon Miree**, defensive end **DeVon Hicks**, tackle **Tony Moll** and guard **Tony Palmer**.



## GAME REVIEW - PACKERS AT STEELERS - W, 13-9

### DEFENSE DOMINATES IN PITTSBURGH

Despite missing starting cornerbacks **Charles Woodson** and **Al Harris**, the No. 1 defense didn't miss a step Saturday, holding Pittsburgh to just one first down in three drives.

- ▶ Defensive end **Cullen Jenkins**, the recipient of a new contract in the off-season, exploded in the first quarter. On just the third play from scrimmage, Jenkins came off the edge to sack Ben Roethlisberger, forcing a fumble in the process. Jenkins recovered the loose football, turning possession back over to the offense.
- ▶ Later on a third-and-1, Jenkins combined with linebacker **A.J. Hawk** to stop Najeh Davenport for no gain, forcing a Pittsburgh punt. Just before the end of the first quarter, Jenkins sacked backup quarterback Charlie Batch for his second of the night.
- ▶ The defensive line, praised by both McCarthy and **Ted Thompson** as the deepest position on the team, consistently overpowered Pittsburgh's offensive line throughout the night.
- ▶ **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamilia** recorded a sack in the second quarter, while rookies **Justin Harrell** and **Larry Birdine**, who each tallied a sack, put constant pressure on the quarterback.
- ▶ "Our goal this year is to be the best defensive line and the best defense in the league," said Jenkins. "We want to try to carry this team with our play, so we're just trying to get off to a good start."

### RODGERS RESCUES OFFENSE

**Brett Favre** and the No. 1 offense never got in a rhythm against Pittsburgh, failing to produce a first down in four drives.

- ▶ Backup quarterback **Aaron Rodgers** got things moving on offense with three consecutive scoring drives, one to close the first half and then two to open the second half.
- ▶ Rodgers used his feet early and often to elude the Pittsburgh rush, buying time and finding holes in the secondary.
- ▶ He finished 18-of-27 passing for 168 yards and one touchdown in one of his most impressive performances in a Green Bay uniform.
- ▶ "I thought he did a lot of good things with his feet, thought he was composed in the pocket, thought his ball accuracy and decision-making for the most part was good," said McCarthy. "I was impressed with him in the two-minute drill."
- ▶ Just before the half, Rodgers led the team on a 12-play, 75-yard drive that ended in a **Dave Rayner** field goal. He twice converted on third down, first with a 21-yard pass to rookie **James Jones** and later a 17-yard strike to **Ruvell Martin**.
- ▶ After the defense held Pittsburgh to a three-and-out, Rodgers and the offense continued its solid play in the second half with a 71-yard drive, culminating in a 3-yard touchdown to **Carlyle Holiday**.
- ▶ Backed up against their own end zone, Rodgers and the offense managed to cross midfield with little resistance, thanks to some big runs from **Brandon Jackson** and smart play from Rodgers. The Packers capped their scoring with a **Mason Crosby** 52-yard field goal.
- ▶ "The biggest thing with Aaron is the tempo getting in and out of the huddle, handling different situations," McCarthy said of his third-year quarterback. "I think you see a young man that is getting an opportunity to play, and I thought he had a nice night."

### ROOKIES HAVE STRONG SHOWING

Rookies Brandon Jackson and James Jones headlined the contributions of the rookie class in their professional debuts Saturday.

- ▶ Jones led the receiving corps with six catches for 58 yards, while Jackson was the workhorse for a shorthanded backfield, churning out 57 yards on 16 carries.
- ▶ Jones' best play came during the two-minute drill to close the first half. On third-and-5, he caught a short pass and then made a nifty open-field move to break into daylight along the sideline for a 21-yard gain.

- ▶ Like the offense in general, Jackson started slow, with just one carry for more than 3 yards through the first 2 1/2 quarters. But then he broke loose as well, busting out runs of 16 and 14 yards in a span of four plays.
- ▶ First-round pick **Justin Harrell** proved to be disruptive in the backfield as he continues to work himself into football shape. In his first live action in nearly a calendar year, Harrell consistently beat the Pittsburgh offensive line and finished with three tackles, including a sack.
- ▶ Crosby, drafted in the sixth round, proved his reputation as a strong-legged kicker was accurate. The rookie boomed a kickoff into the end zone, while also connecting on a 52-yard field goal that had plenty of distance. His competition with incumbent kicker **Dave Rayner** seems as even as any position battle on the team.

### THE OTHER SPECIALIST COMPETITION

Punters **Jon Ryan** and **Ryan Dougherty** shared the punting duties, and both performed well.

- ▶ Ryan took six punts, averaging 46.8 yards, with a net average of 38.2. Meanwhile Dougherty had four punts for 47.3, with a net average of 36.5.
- ▶ Both punters had one touchback and two downed inside the 20, but Ryan did the better job at pinning the Steelers deep. He hit one coffin-corner punt perfectly, as it bounced out of bounds on the 3. And one of his pooch punts was downed at the 5.
- ▶ Dougherty's two inside the 20 were at the Pittsburgh 17-yard line.

### COACH MCCARTHY SAYS...

With a host of younger players fighting for playing time and roster spots, McCarthy opted to rest many of his veterans in Pittsburgh.

- ▶ "We wanted to take a good long look at the younger guys. I think we accomplished that. We had some targets we wanted to hit, particularly at safety and corner, and I think we accomplished that."
- ▶ "We talked about ball command, ball extraction with the defense with the turnover ratio. Offense did not give the ball up, and I thought that was the key to the game."
- ▶ "Winning is important – that was obviously our goal when we came here. The focus for our football team was to come out and play a physical football game against a physical football team. I think we accomplished that."
- ▶ "I saw a lot of positive things out there by our football team, but we still have a lot of work to do. We have to continue to get our pad level down. At times I felt our pad level was up on both sides of the ball, so those are some things we need to work on."

### INJURY UPDATE

The Packers had eight players who did not dress for the game.

- ▶ They were cornerbacks **Charles Woodson** (hamstring) and **Al Harris** (back), running backs **Vernand Morency** (knee), **P.J. Pope** (knee) and **DeShawn Wynn** (quad), fullback **Brandon Miree** (neck/stinger), defensive end **DeVon Hicks** (groin) and offensive lineman **Tony Moll** (neck/stinger). Safety **Marviel Underwood** (hamstring) and quarterback **Ingle Martin** (blow to the head) sustained injuries during the game.
- ▶ With Woodson and Harris out, that meant **Patrick Dendy** and **Jarrett Bush** started at the cornerback spots. The defense opened in nickel coverage, so cornerback **Will Blackmon** got the start for linebacker **Brady Poppinga**. On offense, Jackson started at tailback, and **Korey Hall** was the starter at fullback.



## PACKERS TRAINING CAMP NOTES

### MOVEMENT ALONG OFFENSIVE LINE

Starting left guard **Daryn Colledge** got some work in at his collegiate position, filling in for left tackle **Chad Clifton** who rested leading up to the game at Pittsburgh.

- ▶ With Colledge sliding over to tackle, rookie **Allen Barbre** worked with the first unit at left guard. Colledge started at left tackle in Week 7 at Miami last season when Clifton missed the game due to illness.
- ▶ Also along the offensive line, **Tony Palmer** has begun taking snaps at center. Previously, Palmer worked exclusively at guard.
- ▶ Offensive guard **Travis Leffew** worked at defensive tackle against Pittsburgh in the final defensive series.

### MCCARTHY PLEASED WITH 'FAMILY NIGHT' EFFORT

59,362 fans filled Lambeau Field for the team's annual 'Family Night' scrimmage Aug. 4, which included the team's first live action during training camp.

- ▶ McCarthy came away impressed with the No. 1 offense, as quarterback **Brett Favre** directed two flawless 75-yard scoring drives on the first two possessions against the No. 2 defense.
- ▶ Favre was 9-for-9 for 128 yards on the two drives, including an 11-yard touchdown strike to **Donald Driver**.
- ▶ McCarthy also praised the work of the offensive line – which returns all five starters from 2006 – in both the run game and pass protection.
- ▶ "Last year we had three rookies competing for two positions, and we put in a new scheme," McCarthy said. "I think our guys are very comfortable. They've had a full year of training. I thought the tempo and the way they get off the ball, the wedge attack, those are the things you're looking for in a zone scheme. We're clearly way ahead of where we were last year."
- ▶ Defensively, standout performances from the team's stable of young cornerbacks, including **Will Blackmon** and **Tramon Williams**, only heightened the competition in the fight for roster spots.
- ▶ "I've never been a part of anything like this," said first-round pick **Justin Harrell** of his Lambeau Field debut. "For a practice to have over 50,000 people, how loud it was, the fly over - it was a great feeling."

### ROSTER MOVES

- ▶ Center **C.J. Blomvall** was signed July 27, one day before the team began training camp. Blomvall is a native of Boras, Sweden, and has played the last two seasons with the Hamburg Sea Devils of NFL Europa. He played two seasons at Temple University, where he served as team captain as a 2004 senior. Blomvall wears No. 71.
- ▶ Tight end **Tory Humphrey** injured his ankle in the opening practice of training camp and was subsequently placed on Injured Reserve. The team signed free agent **Joe Werner**, a former basketball player at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse. A 6-foot-6, 252-pound tight end, Werner was a two-time Division III All-American on the hardwood and hasn't played organized football since his sophomore year of high school. Werner wears No. 47.
- ▶ Punter **David Lonie** was placed on Injured Reserve with a foot injury, and the team signed punter **Ryan Dougherty**. A non-drafted rookie free agent from East Carolina, Dougherty was a three-time All-Conference USA selection. He wears No. 8.

### TRAINING CAMP IN GREEN BAY - LIKE NO OTHER

Green Bay Packers training camp – in its 62nd year – is the most anticipated family event of the summer. A tradition that first began under Curly Lambeau in 1946, it remains one of the most intimate preseason settings in the NFL.

- ▶ Newer traditions – such as night practices under the lights and the team's intra-squad scrimmage in Lambeau Field – blend with the old as

players continue to ride kids' bicycles to practice, a tradition started under Vince Lombardi, and live in the dorms at nearby St. Norbert College, the NFL's longest camp relationship between a team and school.

- ▶ According to the Packer Country Visitor and Convention Bureau, training camp attracts an estimated 115,000 visitors from across the nation and as many as 20 foreign countries. With an economic impact estimated at more than \$60 million, training camp brings a financial boost to many area businesses. The Packer Country VCB partnered with the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay's Professional Programs in Business Administration for a survey in 2005 to provide an updated economic study of training camp.

### REST AND RECOUP

One major adjustment to this year's camp made by McCarthy was three off days built into the schedule.

- ▶ Three successive Wednesdays (Aug. 1, 8, 15), the team met in the morning for meetings and film review, with players given the afternoon and evening off to recover for two practices the next day.
- ▶ Said McCarthy, "The number of things we were able to get done this spring gave us the ability to have those three Wednesdays where we only meet and have walk-throughs in the gym at the end. It's clearly (based) on the rest and recovery. I feel it will really help our football team particularly at the end of the year."
- ▶ "When you see the importance of rest and recovery happen on an individual basis like I've watched it throughout the spring, it's obviously very important for our football team," McCarthy stated. "To do it on Wednesday, right in the middle of the workload, I think is smart, and we're still able to get everything done."

### '2-1-2' SCHEDULE

McCarthy one again instituted a '2-1-2' training camp schedule that was first implemented in 2006, highlighted by night practices under the lights.

- ▶ Head Coach Mike McCarthy stated before his first training camp in 2006 that the night-time practices would draw bigger crowds and produce a game-like atmosphere, increasing the intensity and competition in practice. Used by a number of teams around the NFL, he first experienced night practices as offensive coordinator in New Orleans.
- ▶ In between "two-a-days", the team breaks down film of the morning practice. On days with one practice, they hit the film room twice – night practices are broken down the following morning while the afternoon session is studied after dinner.

### SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Four coaches have new titles this season, though all four were with the team during the 2006 season. Former offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski left to become the head coach at Boston College in January, leaving a major opening on the staff.

- ▶ McCarthy tabbed **Joe Philbin** as offensive coordinator. Entering his fifth season with the Packers, Philbin most recently served as offensive line coach in 2006 where he implemented a new zone-blocking scheme and successfully integrated three rookie starters.
- ▶ **Winston Moss** was promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers after serving as linebackers coach in 2006. As the assistant head coach, the 41-year-old Moss will be McCarthy's right-hand man with regard to administrative duties and team dynamics. Moss will continue to coach the linebackers as well.
- ▶ Promoted to offensive line coach, **James Campen** moves up from his position as assistant offensive line coach in McCarthy's first season at the helm. The center for Brett Favre's first career start in 1992, Campen begins his fourth season on the Packers staff.
- ▶ **Jerry Fontenot** will serve as assistant offensive line coach in 2007. A 16-year NFL veteran (1989-2004), Fontenot joined the Packers as a coach-

ing intern last summer and remained with the team throughout the 2006 season as an offensive assistant.

### COMPETITION BREEDS EXCELLENCE

20 of 22 starters return from the league's youngest team in 2006, ensuring what has been one of the most competitive training camps in recent memory.

- ▶ Executive Vice President/General Manager **Ted Thompson** has compiled a roster of 87 players, 27 of which were drafted since he took over as GM in January 2005.
- ▶ Thompson knows all about training camp battles. Signed as a non-drafted free agent linebacker by the Houston Oilers, Thompson annually held off younger players brought in by Bum Phillips in his 10-year career.
- ▶ The Packers GM may face his toughest decisions yet towards the end of training camp, but it's all a part of his philosophy: building a solid foundation through the draft.
- ▶ Nothing attracts attention and headlines during training camp like the fight for playing time. Here are the positions drawing the most interest:

### IN THE BACKFIELD

- ▶ All eyes have been on the running back position, where a stable of backs will contend for carries. The zone blocking scheme calls for a 'one-cut' runner, and veterans Vernand Morency and Noah Herron know the system. Both had 100-yard efforts last season. The 2007 draft brought more competition in the form of Brandon Jackson and DeShawn Wynn, but injuries so far may play a major role in roster decisions.

### ALONG THE DEFENSIVE FRONT

- ▶ No position on the roster is as deep as the interior defensive line, where run-stopper Ryan Pickett will hold down one starting spot. Corey Williams enjoyed a breakout season in 2006 while Colin Cole and Johnny Jolly both proved capable of contributing. Thompson also added 6-foot-4, 310-pound Justin Harrell, a first-round pick, to the mix.

### LAST LINE OF DEFENSE

- ▶ Strong safety Marquand Manuel will have to hold off hard charges from third-year pro Marviel Underwood, second-year pro Atari Bigby and rookie Aaron Rouse. Manuel will benefit from a full training camp – something a calf injury kept him from in 2006 – while Underwood was an early star of training camp last season before going down with a knee injury. Third-round pick Rouse brings a linebacker's size and mentality to the position, while Bigby has shown a knack for the big play.

### LACES OUT

- ▶ Undoubtedly the easiest battle to chart, where every kick is scrutinized and measured. Incumbent kicker Dave Rayner enjoyed a solid first season in Green Bay. He connected on 26-of-35 field goals while recording the most touchbacks by a Packers kicker in nearly a decade. Sixth-round choice Mason Crosby, who established a host of records at Colorado, will look to transfer his success from college to the pros.

### ALL ABOUT MOMENTUM

The momentum of four straight wins to close the 2006 season – coupled with missing the NFC's final playoff berth by mere percentage points – produced record attendance in the offseason program.

- ▶ The Packers enter 2007 with the longest winning streak in the NFC. Only the Super Bowl champion Indianapolis Colts enter the season with more consecutive victories (5).
- ▶ Green Bay's 5-1 record in divisional games tied for the best in the NFL. After losing the home opener vs. Chicago, the Packers swept through

the division and carry a five-game divisional winning streak into 2007. They were one of five NFL teams – the Bears, Eagles, Giants, Jets and Panthers the others – to win all three of their divisional road games.

- ▶ Every player on the roster participated in the offseason program, many working under the supervision of the strength and conditioning staff beginning in mid-March.
- ▶ There is no adjustment to new coaches, new schedules or new schemes this summer, as installations on both sides of the ball took place during mini-camp and OTAs.
- ▶ "We're clearly a lot further ahead than we were at this time last year," McCarthy said upon the conclusion of the offseason program June 18. "Over and over again we've talked about the individual improvement, and that's something that's very obvious as you look out there on the football field, the improvement that a number of our players have made since last year."
- ▶ "Just the way we practice – our practices are better, and I think that's part of where we are as a football team and how much of the offense, defense and special teams we have in," McCarthy explained. "As of today we have everything in; everything that we're going to use next year is in. The continuity to me breeds confidence. We need to carry this into training camp."

## PACKERS TRAINING CAMP NOTES

### ROSTER BREAKDOWN

Here's a position-by-position look at the roster breakdown as it is unfolding during training camp. The first number indicates the number of players at that position entering camp, while the number in parentheses represents how many players from that position made the opening-day roster in 2006.

#### Quarterback – 4 (3)

- **Brett Favre** and **Aaron Rodgers** form the clear 1-2 punch here. Favre enters 2007 with the chance to rewrite the record books, while Rodgers will once again have all eyes on him in the preseason as he continues his maturation as an NFL quarterback. Rodgers has been excellent thus far, while Favre and the No. 1 offense continue to gel.
- The battle for the No. 3 spot between second-year pro **Ingle Martin** and rookie **Paul Thompson** has been closer than many expected. The experience factor, and the fact that he got a full dose of McCarthy's quarterback school in the offseason, gives Martin the edge, but Thompson's athletic ability and rapid development since joining the squad in May have intrigued the staff.

#### Running back – 9 (5)

- All indications are third-year pro **Vernand Morency** and second-round draft pick **Brandon Jackson** are the top two backs and will share the load, but Morency's injury has clouded the picture. Jackson at this point will line up with the No. 1 offense.
- **Noah Herron** is the most experienced in the third-down role, while rookie seventh-round pick **DeShawn Wynn** has been unable to stay on the practice field for an extended period. Second-year holdover **P.J. Pope** was injured Aug. 4 in the intra-squad scrimmage.
- How many fullbacks make the team could depend on how many of the above halfbacks warrant a spot, as well as how many tight ends the coaching staff decides to keep.
- Returning starter **Brandon Miree** has the inside track on the No. 1 job, but an injury has forced him to miss the first two preseason games. Rookie **Korey Hall**, a linebacker in college, has made the transition to offense quicker than expected. **Ryan Powdrell** suffered an MCL injury against the Seahawks, while rookie **Corey White** serves as a combo back looking to earn a roster spot.

#### Tight end – 5 (4)

- Keeping four tight ends last year was a bit of a surprise, and it's difficult to say whether the Packers will do that again or revert to keeping the more traditional three at this position.
- This may be as wide open as any position on the roster, not only in terms of who will make the team, but who will earn the starting job.
- Veterans **Bubba Franks** and **Donald Lee** have been solid with their blocking thus far, with Franks returning to form as a receiver against Seattle. The duo will be pushed by second-year pro **Zac Alcorn**, who often flashes great hands in practice, and rookie seventh-round draft pick **Clark Harris**.

#### Wide receiver – 11 (4)

- With the depth and competition here, it's difficult to imagine only four players making the opening day roster. Five, or perhaps even six, is more likely, and that numbers decision will have an impact on how many running backs and tight ends are kept as well.
- After starters **Donald Driver** and **Greg Jennings**, nothing is set in stone. There simply isn't room for everyone, which may present the coaching staff with some of its more difficult decisions as camp concludes.
- **Carlyle Holiday** and **Ruvell Martin** were strong contributors at the end of last season and both have enjoyed solid camps. They also have the ability to contribute on special teams.
- Rookie draft pick **James Jones** has made a seamless transition from the college game and leads the team in receiving after two games. He seems

to have the inside track for the No. 3 position and gives the team a physical presence at the position. **David Clowney**, another 2007 draft pick, and **Carlton Brewster**, who is coming off a banner spring in NFL Europa, will have opportunities to make their mark in the return game. Both **Calvin Russell** and **Chris Francies** were with the team in 2006.

#### Offensive line – 14 (9)

- Barring an injury, there's perhaps the least drama here, with the starting five of **Mark Tauscher**, **Jason Spitz**, **Scott Wells**, **Daryn Colledge** and **Chad Clifton** returning and looking to maximize on the chemistry developed throughout 2006.
- **Tony Moll** is a versatile backup who gained starting experience as a rookie as well. After that, it's simply a matter of vying for backup spots.
- **Junius Coston** and **Tyson Walter** can play multiple positions, which could help their chances. Fourth-round draft pick **Allen Barbre**, who has worked at left guard, has shown a lot of fire and seems to be grasping the zone blocking scheme. **Tony Palmer** had begun to take a few practice snaps at center but an injury currently has him observing from the sidelines.

#### Defensive line – 13 (10)

- The experience and depth here are perhaps as strong as anywhere on the roster. **Aaron Kampman**, **Cullen Jenkins** and **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** are the top three defensive ends and seem to be in midseason form. Jenkins has collected three sacks thus far, while 'KGB' has two.
- Amongst returnees **Michael Montgomery** and **Jason Hunter**, and rookies **DeVon Hicks** and **Larry Birdine**, there's no telling the pecking order or how many ends will be kept. Montgomery suffered an MCL injury against Seattle, while Birdine has been active in the backfield in game action.
- On the inside at tackle, the veteran group of **Ryan Pickett**, **Corey Williams**, **Colin Cole** and **Johnny Jolly** is joined by rookies **Justin Harrell** and **Daniel Muir**. Few teams around the league have as much depth on the inside as the Packers.
- The defensive line has dominated in the preseason, collecting eight sacks in just two games. Whether or not there's room for five defensive tackles remains to be seen, and Williams' ability to move outside if needed, as well as Jenkins' ability to move inside, could factor into the final roster decisions.

#### Linebacker – 10 (6)

- Barring injury, it's hard to imagine **Nick Barnett**, **A.J. Hawk** or **Brady Poppinga** losing his starting job, but the backup spots are far from determined and most likely will come down to special teams contributions.
- Second-year pro **Abdul Hodge** has been limited because of tendinitis in the knees but led the team in tackles against Seattle. Rookie sixth-round pick **Desmond Bishop**, who has seen time in the middle with the second unit in Hodge's absence, will look to be the tackling machine he was in college.
- **Tracy White** is a special teams veteran, **Tim Goodwell** is coming off a solid season in NFL Europa, and youngsters **Spencer Havner**, **Juwan Simpson** and **Rory Johnson** all have shown enough promise to deserve a chance. Their ability to play on special teams coverage units will likely determine who from the group stays.

#### Defensive back – 16 (9)

- The nine on last year's opening day roster consisted of five cornerbacks and four safeties.
- If that holds true again, then some combination of the cornerbacks fighting for the nickel job – **Will Blackmon**, **Frank Walker**, **Jarrett Bush** and **Patrick Dendy** – could make the team behind starters **Al Harris** and **Charles Woodson**. It will just be a question of what role each will play.



## PACKERS TRAINING CAMP NOTES

- Blackmon enjoyed a breakout game against Seattle as a return specialist but also saw plenty of action at cornerback. Bush also starred Saturday with two interceptions.
- The safety spot isn't nearly so clear-cut, however. Third-year pro **Nick Collins** is the only one whose job isn't on the line. Collins finished strong in 2006, and who earns the starting spot opposite him will be one of the most-watched camp battles.
- With last year's starter **Marquand Manuel** looking to get off to a better start, second-year player **Atari Bigby** enjoying a breakout camp, third-year pro **Marviel Underwood** returning from a knee injury, and rookie third-round draft pick **Aaron Rouse** able to hit like a linebacker, the competition could last well into the preseason.
- At times against Seattle, the team used three safeties in the lineup on third downs. Bigby's play-making ability sparked the defense with two sacks and a forced fumble.
- Add 2006 reserves like **Charlie Peprah** and **Tyrone Culver** to the mix, both of whom have flashed during camp, and there are numerous bodies for only a handful of spots.

### Specialists – 5 (3)

- Long snapper **Rob Davis** will keep his job for a 12th season, but competition was brought in for second-year pros **Jon Ryan** at punter and **Dave Rayner** at kicker. They both earned their jobs with strong training camp performances a year ago, and now they'll have to fend off challenges from punter **Ryan Dougherty** and rookie kicker **Mason Crosby**.
- Crosby and Rayner have been going back and forth throughout camp, and both have been accurate. Through two preseason games, the battle for the kicking job appears even.
- Ryan has been solid in his second camp with the team and has made the switch to a three-step delivery to a two-step in the offseason. He is averaging nearly 49 yards per punt.



### GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Packers will host a season-long celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of Lambeau Field. The crown jewel of the National Football League remains the most historic stadium in football.

- Dedicated as City Stadium Sept. 29, 1957, with a 21-17 victory over the archrival Chicago Bears, the team renamed the facility Lambeau Field in 1965 following the death of E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach. It is the NFL's longest-tenured facility.
- To mark the occasion, an anniversary logo was created and will be featured on the team's uniforms, Gameday Program, the media guide and the Packers Yearbook.
- Lambeau Field also will feature the special logo in both end zones.
- Renowned 3-D pop artist Charles Fazzino was commissioned by the Packers to create an art piece celebrating the 50th anniversary. Fazzino, the official artist of the Super Bowl and Major League Baseball's All-Star Game, spent nine months on the project. The piece is available in a limited edition 3-D format, as well as on T-shirts, helmets and assorted items in the Packers Pro Shop.
- Packers ticket holders will enjoy images of Lambeau Field through the

years on their tickets as well.
