SECOND PRESEASON GAME

SEATTLE (1-0) vs. GREEN BAY (1-0)

Saturday, Aug. 18 • Lambeau Field • 7:00 p.m. CDT

PACKERS RETURN HOME 1-0

Green Bay opens the home portion of its preseason schedule Saturday night at Lambeau Field when it hosts the Seattle Seahawks.

- The Packers opened the preseason with a 13-9 victory at Pittsburgh, the first time the team had won a preseason opener on the road (excluding neutral site games) since 1981.
- Both teams head into the contest 1-0, as Seattle opened its preseason slate Sunday night in San Diego with a 24-16 victory. Seventeen fourth-quarter points helped seal the victory for the Seahawks, who went ahead for good on kicker Josh Brown's 36-yard field goal. Seattle's No. 1 offense only saw one series of action.
- Saturday marks the 58th annual Upper Midwest Shrine Game, an old-standing preseason tradition. Green Bay has won seven of the last eight Shrine contests, including a 38-10 victory over Atlanta in 2006.

GREEN BAY REBOUNDS FROM SLOW START

The Packers' first offensive unit never got going Saturday night, failing to record a first down in its four possessions of action.

- Conversely, Green Bay's No. 1 defensive unit appeared in midseason form, holding the Steelers to just one first down on three drives. The defense also created an early turnover on a **Cullen Jenkins** sack when the defensive end forced and recovered a fumble.
- Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** got strong efforts on both sides of the ball, particularly from his defensive line, for the win in his hometown. Though he had coached against the Steelers previously in his NFL career, McCarthy had to wait until his 15th NFL season to play in his native city.
- Backup quarterback **Aaron Rodgers** led the offense on three consecutive scoring drives, including one touchdown, as the Packers overcame an early 9-0 deficit to record the victory.
- Rodgers executed the two-minute drill just before the half, leading the offense 75 yards in 12 plays. Kicker Dave Rayner opened the scoring with a 32-yard field goal.
- The third-year quarterback directed two more scoring drives to open the second half and put Green Bay ahead. The defensive reserves used two more second-half sacks, bringing the team's total to five, to stifle any thoughts of a Pittsburgh comeback.

FAMILIAR FACES RETURN TO LAMBEAU

Two former Packers, Seattle Head Coach **Mike Holmgren** and quarterback **Matt Hasselbeck**, return to Lambeau Field for a preseason showdown.

- Holmgren first returned to Lambeau Field in 1999, while Hasselbeck made his first career start in Lambeau Field in 2003.
- Holmgren joined the Seahawks after a seven-year tenure as head coach in Green Bay (1992-98), during which he led the Packers to three straight NFC Championship Games, two Super Bowl appearances and one Super Bowl victory (XXXI).
- Hasselbeck, who continuously impressed in preseason action while with Green Bay, spent three seasons in Green Bay (1998-2000). A sixth-round pick in the 1998 NFL Draft, he spent one season on the practice squad before serving as Favre's backup for two seasons.

MIDWEST SHRINE GAME

One of the NFL's longest team traditions, the Upper Midwest Shrine Game kicks off its 58th installment Saturday.

- Each season, the Packers donate a percentage of the gate to the Shriners' Hospitals for Children.
- The Shriners' facilities provide specialized medical services, helping children with birth defects and other injuries, at absolutely no cost.
- To date, the series has raised more than \$3 million for the Midwest Shrine's burn centers and hospitals for crippled children.
- Green Bay is 29-25-3 all-time in the series and has never played Seattle in the annual contest.
- The series has called three separate stadiums home: Milwaukee's State Fair Park (1950-51), Milwaukee County Stadium (1952-82, 1984-94) and Lambeau Field (1983, 1995-present).
- In his first season leading the Packers, Vince Lombardi made an agreement with George Halas to play in the Shrine game annually. Green Bay and Chicago played each preseason in County Stadium from 1959-73.
- The Packers annually designate the Shrine game as the first 'Gold package' game for season-ticket holders primarily from the Milwaukee area. The team created the three-game package after moving all of its home games to Green Bay in 1995.

PACKERS NEWS OF THE WEEK - TEAM NOTES

CAMP ROLLS ALONG

The Packers hit the practice field five times this week, including two sessions on Tuesday and Thursday, in anticipation of their second contest.

- ▶ Three of those five practices will be in full pads.
- ▶ While there were plenty of positives Saturday night, McCarthy made it clear there is still plenty of work to do, especially on the offensive side of the ball.
- ▶ "We have a lot of positive things to build off of and plenty of things to work on, and that'll be our focus," McCarthy said following the victory Saturday night. "Offensively, I think everything that happened out there in the negative category is definitely fixable."
- ▶ This marks the last week of the regular training camp schedule. Two games in six days means the team will have a short week following the Seattle game, with a nationally televised game against Jacksonville the following Thursday.

INJURIES IN THE BACKFIELD

A number of injuries in the backfield forced Green Bay to start two rookies behind 17-year pro Favre Saturday night. **Brandon Jackson** got the call at tailback while **Korey Hall**, a linebacker in college, made the start at fullback.

- ▶ Running back **Vernand Morency**, who is expected to compete for the starting job, has been sidelined after injuring his knee on the first day of training camp.
- ▶ "Vernand's injury is a little more serious than we anticipated so it may be a couple weeks for him," McCarthy said on July 30.
- ▶ In his absence, veteran **Noah Herron** and Jackson, a second-round pick from Nebraska, have been sharing reps with the first team. In addition to Herron and Jackson, rookie **Corey White** was the only other running back to carry the football Saturday.
- ▶ Second-year pro **P.J. Pope** was injured in the team's 'Family Night' scrimmage and is expected to be out several weeks, while seventh-round selection **DeShawn Wynn** also missed the Pittsburgh game due to a quad injury sustained in practice.
- ▶ Fullback **Brandon Miree**, listed as the No. 1 fullback on the depth chart, was held out Saturday with a neck/stinger injury.

MOVEMENT ALONG OFFENSIVE LINE

Starting left guard **Daryn Colledge** got some work in at his collegiate position, filling in for left tackle **Chad Clifton** who rested leading up to the game at Pittsburgh.

- ▶ With Colledge sliding over to tackle, rookie **Allen Barbre** worked with the first unit at left guard. Colledge started at left tackle in Week 7 at Miami last season when Clifton missed the game due to illness.
- ▶ Also along the offensive line, **Tony Palmer** has begun taking snaps at center. Previously, Palmer worked exclusively at guard.
- ▶ Offensive guard **Travis Leffew** worked at defensive tackle against Pittsburgh in the final defensive series.

JUGGLING THE QUARTERBACKS

As second-year pro **Ingle Martin** and rookie **Paul Thompson** battle for the No. 3 quarterback job, McCarthy had planned to play Martin for the fourth quarter in Pittsburgh and Thompson for the fourth quarter vs. Seattle.

- ▶ "I've always felt, particularly with the quarterback, every series it's so hard to get in a rhythm and things like that," McCarthy said. "It's beneficial to give that third slot a quarter, hopefully get something established and get rolling. I've found the results to be better that way."
- ▶ Martin took a blow to the head in just his second play from scrimmage Saturday when the quarterback delivered a shoulder to Steelers cornerback Grant Mason as he was running out of bounds.
- ▶ Martin stayed in to finish the drive but was replaced later in the quarter by Thompson. It remains to be seen what McCarthy's plan will be for Seattle.

ANOTHER YEAR AT ST. NORBERT COMES TO A CLOSE

A training camp rite of passage, NFL players revert back to their college days and bunk up with a teammate in dorms for nearly a month.

- ▶ This Friday, Aug. 17, the Packers will move out of Victor McCormick Hall, a 60-room dormitory that has a long tradition of hosting players and staff.
- ▶ In fact, no NFL team enjoys a longer training camp relationship than the one between the Green Bay Packers and St. Norbert College. Formed in 1958 between Packers coach Scooter McLean and the private school in nearby De Pere, Wis., the relationship entered its 50th year this summer.
- ▶ While all on-field activities and football meetings take place at the team's home facility, the college serves as the base for living arrangements. Players also eat dinner at the college.

TRAINING CAMP ROSTER MOVES

- ▶ Center **C.J. Blomvall** was signed July 27, one day before the team began training camp. Blomvall is a native of Boras, Sweden, and has played the last two seasons with the Hamburg Sea Devils of NFL Europa. He played two seasons at Temple University, where he served as team captain as a 2004 senior. Blomvall wears No. 71.
- ▶ Tight end **Tory Humphrey** injured his ankle in the opening practice of training camp and was subsequently placed on Injured Reserve. The team signed free agent **Joe Werner**, a former basketball player at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse. A 6-foot-6, 252-pound tight end, Werner was a two-time Division III All-American on the hardwood and hasn't played organized football since his sophomore year of high school. Werner wears No. 47.
- ▶ Punter **David Lonie** was placed on Injured Reserve with a foot injury, and the team signed punter **Ryan Dougherty**. A non-drafted rookie free agent from East Carolina, Dougherty was a three-time All-Conference USA selection. He wears No. 8.

PACKERS ON TELEVISION, RADIO

The **Green Bay Packers Broadcast Partners** will air the game to a nine-station network throughout the state of Wisconsin, Upper Michigan and Northeastern Minnesota, with CBS Network production, personnel and the latest network-quality technology.

- ▶ The top-notch broadcast team includes CBS's **Kevin Harlan** calling the play-by-play alongside fellow CBS broadcaster **Rich Gannon** providing the analysis. 2007 marks Harlan's fifth year calling Packers preseason games, his 23rd doing play-by-play for CBS, while Gannon returns for his second preseason alongside Harlan.
- ▶ WTMJ's **Jessie Garcia** serves as the sideline reporter and WFRV's **Larry McCarren** joins the crew for pregame segments. In addition to WFRV-TV (Green Bay) and WTMJ-TV (Milwaukee), the game will be televised

over WKOW/ABC, Madison, Wis.; WAOW/ABC, Wausau/Rhineland, Wis.; WXOW/ABC, La Crosse, Wis.; WQOW/ABC, Eau Claire; WYOW/ABC, Eagle River, Wis.; WJMN/CBS, Marquette, Mich.; and KQDS-TV/FOX, Duluth, Minn.

- ▶ Out-of-state fans can catch the game live on satellite, transmitted via C-Band satellite on AMC 6, transponder 23.
- ▶ The contest will re-air on **NFL Network** Saturday at 11 p.m. CDT.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station **Packers Radio Network**, with **Wayne Larivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **McCarren** (color) calling the action. The network covers 47 markets in six states.

Mike McCarthy: 8-8-0, .500; second NFL season

Mike Holmgren: 159-103-0, .607; 16th NFL season

MIKE MCCARTHY... Begins second year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Led the Packers to an 8-8 finish and near playoff berth, losing a tiebreaker with the New York Giants, who also finished 8-8.
- ▶ Spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- ▶ Began his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

MIKE HOLMGREN... Begins ninth year as the Seahawks' 6th head coach.

- ▶ Earned a postseason berth in 2006 for the fourth consecutive season.
- ▶ Joined the Seahawks after a seven-year tenure as head coach in Green Bay (1992-98), during which he led the Packers to three straight NFC Championship Games, two Super Bowl appearances and one Super Bowl victory (XXXI).
- ▶ Previously served first as quarterbacks coach and then as offensive coordinator in San Francisco (1986-91).

THE PACKERS-SEAHAWKS SERIES

The Packers and Seahawks will meet for the third time in the preseason, with Seattle holding a 2-0 advantage.

- ▶ Saturday marks the second time that the teams will meet at Lambeau Field during the preseason (2004 the other).
- ▶ The two clubs have met just 12 times, including the regular season and playoffs, since Seattle entered the National Football League in 1976.
- ▶ Other than the fact that they simply haven't played very often, which has changed with Seattle's shift to the NFC in 2002, most differences stop there. Much of Seattle's front office, their coaching staff and even their starting quarterback inaugurated their NFL careers or built their reputations with a stop at 1265 Lombardi Avenue.
- ▶ The movement west, beginning with Mike Holmgren in 1999, has reversed itself in some respects, as Packers GM Ted Thompson and personnel men John Dorsey and John Schneider have returned to Green Bay after stops in Seattle.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Packers GM Ted Thompson spent five seasons (2000-04) as the Seahawks' vice president of football operations... Packers personnel analyst John Schneider (2000) and director of college scouting John Dorsey (1999) both worked in Seattle's front office... Green Bay assistant head coach/linebackers Winston Moss played his final three seasons in Seattle

(1995-97) and began his coaching career with the Seahawks as defensive quality control in 1998... Seahawks assistant head coach/offensive coordinator Gil Haskell (1992-97), defensive coordinator John Marshall (1980-82), wide receivers coach Nolan Cromwell (1992-98), tight ends coach Jim Lind (1992-98), offensive assistant/quality control Gary Reynolds (1996-98) and special projects/defense coach Ray Rhodes (1992-93, 1999), coached previously in Green Bay; Rhodes (1999) was the 12th head coach in Packers history, succeeding Holmgren, who coached the Packers from 1992-98... Former Packers GM Ron Wolf selected Matt Hasselbeck in the sixth round of the 1998 draft; the quarterback spent his first three seasons in Green Bay, including his rookie campaign on the Packers' practice squad... Packers S Marquand Manuel played two seasons (2004-05) in Seattle and was a defensive starter in Super Bowl XL... Packers WR Shaun Bodiford is a Federal Way, Wash., native... Seattle vice president Lance Lopes worked in the Packers' front office from 1993-2000... Seahawks head athletic trainer Sam Ramsden worked six seasons in the Packers training room... Packers safety Alvin Nnabuife and Seahawks quarterback Erik Meyer, running back A.J. Harris and offensive tackle Jonathan Alston played for the Cologne Centurions of the defunct NFL Europa League in 2007.

INDIVIDUALLY VS. SEATTLE

Brett Favre is 3-2 in his career against Seattle. His 122.9 passer rating on Oct. 5, 2003, was his highest that season until the Monday night game at Oakland after the passing of his father (154.9)... A.J. Hawk posted a career-high 20 tackles (16 solo) in the Nov. 27, 2006, matchup... Fellow rookie linebacker Abdul Hodge recorded 12 tackles and returned a fumble for a touchdown in his first career start... Also in the 2006 game, Charles Woodson recorded his second career two-INT game... Al Harris returned a Matt Hasselbeck INT 52 yards for a TD in the only NFL postseason game ended by a sudden-death defensive score, Jan. 4, 2004.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Nov. 26, 2006, Qwest Field; Seahawks won 34-24

- ▶ Four first-half takeaways, a defensive score, and a big pass play for a touchdown to open the second half gave Green Bay a tremendous chance to knock off the defending NFC champion Seattle Seahawks on a Monday night.
- ▶ However, missed opportunities, costly penalties, and a surprisingly porous run defense took away that chance as Seattle posted a 34-24 decision at a snowy and noisy Qwest Field.
- ▶ Charles Woodson collected two of three Packers interceptions, the first leading to the game's opening touchdown (Ahman Green 5-yard run).
- ▶ Rookie linebacker Abdul Hodge scooped a fumble and returned it 29 yards for a score to give the Packers a 14-9 lead.
- ▶ Matt Hasselbeck, who threw three touchdown passes, combined with running back Shaun Alexander (201 yards) to lead the Seahawks in a second half comeback.

LAST MEETING, PRESEASON

August 16, 2004, Lambeau Field; Seahawks won 21-3

- ▶ Seahawks backup quarterback Seneca Wallace led the offense on two long scoring drives to defeat the Packers in Green Bay's preseason opener.
- ▶ Green Bay opened the scoring in the first quarter after Favre led the Packers on a 10-play drive, culminating in a Ryan Longwell field goal.
- ▶ Seattle's first offensive unit responded with scoring drive to make the score 7-3. Neither first unit figured in any scoring for the remainder of the night.
- ▶ Two touchdowns by Seattle's backup unit, one before halftime and another in the fourth quarter, closed out the scoring.
- ▶ Both the Packers (10-6) and Seahawks (9-7) would go on to earn NFC postseason berths in 2004, with each bowing out in the NFC Wild Card round.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN 2007

56 NICK BARNETT

- Needs 73 solo tackles for 500 career. Barnett enters 2007 with 427.
- Bids for a fifth consecutive 100-tackle season.

76 CHAD CLIFTON

- Needs five starts for 100 career. Clifton enters with 95.

60 ROB DAVIS

- Needs two games played at Lambeau Field to surpass No. 3 LeRoy Butler (77) on the stadium's all-time list. Davis has played 76 career games on the Packers' home field.
- Having played in 151 consecutive games in a Packers uniform, needs 12 more to surpass No. 4 Larry McCarren (162), and 16 to surpass No. 3 Willie Wood (166).
- Has the opportunity to advance to No. 7 on the team's all-time list of overall games played (currently 16th, 151 games).

80 DONALD DRIVER

- Has 34 career TD receptions from Brett Favre. The duo needs one to match No. 3 Lynn Dickey-Paul Coffman (35).
- Needs one 100-yard game to tie No. 6 Billy Howton and Max McGee (17), three to match No. 5 Boyd Dowler (19), four to reach No. 4 Antonio Freeman (20) and eight to equal No. 3 Don Hutson (24) on the team's all-time list. Driver enters with 16 career 100-yard receiving games.
- Has a reception in 80 consecutive games, the franchise's second-longest streak behind Sharpe's 103 (1988-94).
- Stands just seven Lambeau Field receptions from surpassing the stadium's all-time leader, Antonio Freeman (213). Driver enters with 207.
- Needs 71 receiving yards to become only the seventh player in Packers history to reach 6,000 career, joining James Lofton (9,656), Sterling Sharpe (8,134), Don Hutson (7,991), Boyd Dowler (6,918), Antonio Freeman (6,651) and Max McGee (6,346).
- Needs 11 receptions to surpass No. 5 Antonio Freeman (431), 28 to surpass No. 4 Boyd Dowler (448), 68 to surpass No. 3 Don Hutson (488) and 110 to surpass No. 2 James Lofton (530) on the Packers' franchise list. Driver (421) enters No. 6 in team history.
- With 50 receptions, would become one of three in team annals to produce as many as six such seasons, joining James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe (both seven) and Antonio Freeman (six). Driver has at least 50 catches in five seasons.
- Stands 519 Lambeau Field receiving yards from surpassing No. 2 James Lofton (3,330) and 666 from becoming the stadium's all-time leader ahead of Antonio Freeman (3,477). Driver (2,812) enters at No. 3.
- Could become only the second Packers player with four 80-catch seasons, joining Sterling Sharpe (four). Driver has three entering 2007.
- Could become only the second Packers player with multiple 90-catch seasons, joining Sterling Sharpe (four). Driver had his first 90-reception campaign in 2006.

- Needs 418 receiving yards to surpass No. 6 Max McGee (6,346), 723 to surpass No. 5 Antonio Freeman (6,651) and 990 to surpass No. 4 Boyd Dowler (6,918) on the Packers' all-time list. Driver (5,929) enters No. 6 in team history.
- Could tie a franchise record with 1,000 yards in a fifth overall season. Only James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe have five 1,000-yard campaigns.
- Needs 79 receptions to become the third player in team annals to reach 500, joining Sharpe (595) and Lofton (530). Driver enters with 421.
- Needs four TD receptions to become only the eighth player in franchise annals to reach 40 career, joining Don Hutson (99), Sterling Sharpe (65), Antonio Freeman (57), Max McGee (50), James Lofton (49), Billy Howton (43) and Boyd Dowler (40). Driver enters with 36.

4 BRETT FAVRE



- Has played in 239 straight games (257 including playoffs) and started 237 in a row (257 including playoffs), the NFL's record among quarterbacks. By starting the season's first four games, would surpass Mick Tinglehoff's stretch of 240 straight starts (1962-78), the second-longest recorded streak in NFL history. Only Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more in consecutive fashion.
- Needs six TD passes to match Dan Marino's NFL record, 420. Favre enters with 414.
- Needs one win to tie No. 1 John Elway (148-82-1, .643). Favre enters tied with No. 2 Dan Marino (147-93-0, .613) on the all-time quarterback wins list.
- Needs 136 passing attempts to break Dan Marino's career record, 8,358. Favre enters with 8,223.
- Needs 2,500 passing yards to become the second ever to reach 60,000, joining Dan Marino (61,361).
- Needs 3,862 passing yards — or less than his totals in each of the past three seasons — to break Marino's record. Favre enters with 57,500.
- Needs five TD passes at Lambeau Field to extend the league's single-stadium record to 200. He enters

with 195.

- Needs 2,125 passing yards at Lambeau Field to surpass John Elway (27,889 at Mile High Stadium) for the single-stadium record. Favre has 25,765.

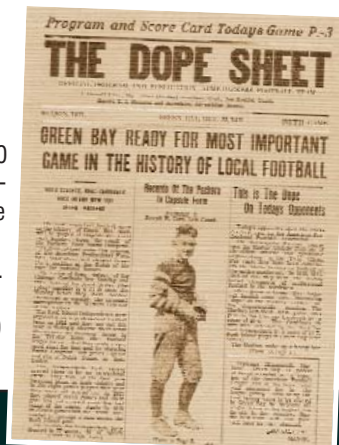
Favre also:

- By playing a 16th season in a Packers uniform, will surpass Ray Nitschke (1958-72) and tie Bart Starr (1956-71) for most in Packers history.
- Needs 676 passing yards in road games to reach 30,000. He enters with 29,324.
- Needs 71 scoring drives for 1,000.

88 BUBBA FRANKS

- Needs one TD reception to reach 30 career. In team history, only 11 previous players have reached the milestone, including Driver in '06.
- Needs seven starts for 100 career. Franks enters with 93.
- Needs 12 receptions for 250 career. Franks enters with 238.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called *The Dope Sheet*, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.





INDIVIDUAL NOTES

- Needs 11 games to surpass No. 3 Rich McGeorge (116) and 14 to surpass No. 2 Paul Coffman (119) on the team's all-time tight ends list. Franks enters No. 4 with 106, having eclipsed Marv Fleming (95) in 2006.
- Needs 86 receiving yards to surpass No. 5 Mark Chmura (2,253), 154 to surpass No. 4 Ed West (2,321), 203 to surpass No. 3 Rich McGeorge (2,370) and 427 to surpass No. 2 Ron Kramer (2,594) on the team's all-time tight ends list. Franks enters with 2,168.

94 KABEER GBAJA-BIAMILA

- On Green Bay's all-time sacks list, needs four to match Reggie White's career record, 68½. Gbaja-Biamila enters with 64½.

31 AL HARRIS

- Needs to return one interception for a touchdown to tie No. 5 Charley Brock, Doug Hart and Ken Ellis (all with three) on Green Bay's all-time career list. With a second TD on an interception, would match No. 4 Johnny (Blood) McNally, who returned four. Harris enters with two.
- Needs six games for 150 career.
- Needs 15 starts for 100 career.

74 AARON KAMPMAN

- Needs one sack to become just the eighth player to record 30 in a Packers uniform. Kampman, who had five sacks over his last three games, enters with 29.
- Needs 3½ sacks to surpass No. 7 Vonnice Holliday (32), four to surpass No. 6 Bryce Paup (32½), 7½ to surpass No. 5 Tony Bennett (36) and 13 to surpass No. 4 Ezra Johnson (41½).
- Needs 41 total tackles for 400 career. He enters with 359.

22 MARQUAND MANUEL

- Needs 78 tackles for 300 career. He enters with 222.

34 VERNAND MORENCY

- Needs 382 rushing yards for 1,000. Morency enters with 618, having averaged 4.4 yards per carry over his first 142 career attempts.
- Needs 45 kickoff returns to surpass No. 5 Tony Canadeo (75) on the team's all-time list. Morency enters with 31.

79 RYAN PICKETT

- Needs nine games for 100 career. He enters with 91.

16 DAVE RAYNER

- Needs only two field goals of at least 50 yards to tie No. 3 Chester Marcol (3) on the team's all-time list. Rayner tied the franchise record with a 54-yarder, his only official field goal of at least 50 yards in 2006. Chris Jacke (17) and Ryan Longwell (13) own the most 50-yard field goals in team annals.

12 AARON RODGERS

- Could become the first quarterback other than Brett Favre to start a Packers game since Don Majkowski, Sept. 20, 1992.

9 JON RYAN

- Needs 66 punts to reach 150 and qualify for the Packers' all-time lead in gross punting average. Ryan averaged 44.5 yards on 84 punts in his first Packers season, 2006. The franchise leader is Craig Hentrich, who averaged 42.8 yards on 289 punts from 1994-97.

65 MARK TAUSCHER

- Needs seven games played and nine starts for 100. He enters with 93 games and 91 starts.

21 CHARLES WOODSON

- Carries into 2007 a streak of three games with an interception. With an INT in the season opener, would extend the stretch to four games, longest since John Symank in 1961. Irv Comp holds the team record, with five in 1943.
- Needs five interceptions for 30 career.
- With nine punt returns, would reach 50 and qualify for the Packers' all-time leaders in average return. Woodson averaged 8.9 yards on 41 returns during his first season, 2006. Steve Odom, No. 5 on that list, averaged 8.9 yards from 1974-79.
- Needs 47 punt returns to surpass No. 5 Walter Stanley (87) on the Packers' all-time list. Woodson had 41 in his first Green Bay campaign.

GAME REVIEW - PACKERS AT STEELERS

DEFENSE DOMINATES IN PITTSBURGH

Despite missing starting cornerbacks **Charles Woodson** and **Al Harris**, the No. 1 defense didn't miss a step Saturday, holding Pittsburgh to just one first down in three drives.

- Defensive end **Cullen Jenkins**, the recipient of a new contract in the off-season, exploded in the first quarter. On just the third play from scrimmage, Jenkins came off the edge to sack Ben Roethlisberger, forcing a fumble in the process. Jenkins recovered the loose football, turning possession back over to the offense.
- Later on a third-and-1, Jenkins combined with linebacker **A.J. Hawk** to stop Najeh Davenport for no gain, forcing a Pittsburgh punt. Just before the end of the first quarter, Jenkins sacked backup quarterback Charlie Batch for his second of the night.
- The defensive line, praised by both McCarthy and **Ted Thompson** as the deepest position on the team, consistently overpowered Pittsburgh's offensive line throughout the night.
- **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamilia** recorded a sack in the second quarter, while rookies **Justin Harrell** and **Larry Birdine**, who each tallied a sack, put constant pressure on the quarterback.
- "Our goal this year is to be the best defensive line and the best defense in the league," said Jenkins. "We want to try to carry this team with our play, so we're just trying to get off to a good start."

RODGERS RESCUES OFFENSE

Brett Favre and the No. 1 offense never got in a rhythm against Pittsburgh, failing to produce a first down in four drives.

- Backup quarterback **Aaron Rodgers** got things moving on offense with three consecutive scoring drives, one to close the first half and then two to open the second half.
- Rodgers used his feet early and often to elude the Pittsburgh rush, buying time and finding holes in the secondary.
- He finished 18-of-27 passing for 168 yards and one touchdown in one of his most impressive performances in a Green Bay uniform.
- "I thought he did a lot of good things with his feet, thought he was composed in the pocket, thought his ball accuracy and decision-making for the most part was good," said McCarthy. "I was impressed with him in the two-minute drill."
- Just before the half, Rodgers led the team on a 12-play, 75-yard drive that ended in a **Dave Rayner** field goal. He twice converted on third down, first with a 21-yard pass to rookie **James Jones** and later a 17-yard strike to **Ruvell Martin**.
- After the defense held Pittsburgh to a three-and-out, Rodgers and the offense continued its solid play in the second half with a 71-yard drive, culminating in a 3-yard touchdown to **Carlyle Holiday**.
- Backed up against their own end zone, Rodgers and the offense managed to cross midfield with little resistance, thanks to some big runs from **Brandon Jackson** and smart play from Rodgers. The Packers capped their scoring with a **Mason Crosby** 52-yard field goal.
- "The biggest thing with Aaron is the tempo getting in and out of the huddle, handling different situations," McCarthy said of his third-year quarterback. "I think you see a young man that is getting an opportunity to play, and I thought he had a nice night."

ROOKIES HAVE STRONG SHOWING

Rookies Brandon Jackson and James Jones headlined the contributions of the rookie class in their professional debuts Saturday.

- Jones led the receiving corps with six catches for 58 yards, while Jackson was the workhorse for a shorthanded backfield, churning out 57 yards on 16 carries.
- Jones' best play came during the two-minute drill to close the first half. On third-and-5, he caught a short pass and then made a nifty open-field move to break into daylight along the sideline for a 21-yard gain.

- Like the offense in general, Jackson started slow, with just one carry for more than 3 yards through the first 2 1/2 quarters. But then he broke loose as well, busting out runs of 16 and 14 yards in a span of four plays.
- First-round pick **Justin Harrell** proved to be disruptive in the backfield as he continues to work himself into football shape. In his first live action in nearly a calendar year, Harrell consistently beat the Pittsburgh offensive line and finished with three tackles, including a sack.
- Crosby, drafted in the sixth round, proved his reputation as a strong-legged kicker was accurate. The rookie boomed a kickoff into the end zone, while also connecting on a 52-yard field goal that had plenty of distance. His competition with incumbent kicker **Dave Rayner** seems as even as any position battle on the team.

THE OTHER SPECIALIST COMPETITION

Punters **Jon Ryan** and **Ryan Dougherty** shared the punting duties, and both performed well.

- Ryan took six punts, averaging 46.8 yards, with a net average of 38.2. Meanwhile Dougherty had four punts for 47.3, with a net average of 36.5.
- Both punters had one touchback and two downed inside the 20, but Ryan did the better job at pinning the Steelers deep. He hit one coffin-corner punt perfectly, as it bounced out of bounds on the 3. And one of his pooch punts was downed at the 5.
- Dougherty's two inside the 20 were at the Pittsburgh 17-yard line.

COACH MCCARTHY SAYS...

With a host of younger players fighting for playing time and roster spots, McCarthy opted to rest many of his veterans in Pittsburgh.

- "We wanted to take a good long look at the younger guys. I think we accomplished that. We had some targets we wanted to hit, particularly at safety and corner, and I think we accomplished that."
- "We talked about ball command, ball extraction with the defense with the turnover ratio. Offense did not give the ball up, and I thought that was the key to the game."
- "Winning is important – that was obviously our goal when we came here. The focus for our football team was to come out and play a physical football game against a physical football team. I think we accomplished that."
- "I saw a lot of positive things out there by our football team, but we still have a lot of work to do. We have to continue to get our pad level down. At times I felt our pad level was up on both sides of the ball, so those are some things we need to work on."

INJURY UPDATE

The Packers had eight players who did not dress for the game.

- They were cornerbacks **Charles Woodson** (hamstring) and **Al Harris** (back), running backs **Vernand Morency** (knee), **P.J. Pope** (knee) and **DeShawn Wynn** (quad), fullback **Brandon Miree** (neck/stinger), defensive end **DeVon Hicks** (groin) and offensive lineman **Tony Moll** (neck/stinger). Safety **Marviel Underwood** (hamstring) and quarterback **Ingle Martin** (blow to the head) sustained injuries during the game.
- With Woodson and Harris out, that meant **Patrick Dendy** and **Jarrett Bush** started at the cornerback spots. The defense opened in nickel coverage, so cornerback **Will Blackmon** got the start for linebacker **Brady Poppinga**. On offense, Jackson started at tailback, and **Korey Hall** was the starter at fullback.



PACKERS TRAINING CAMP NOTES

MCCARTHY PLEASED WITH 'FAMILY NIGHT' EFFORT

59,362 fans filled Lambeau Field for the team's annual 'Family Night' scrimmage Aug. 4, which included the team's first live action during training camp.

- ▶ McCarthy came away impressed with the No. 1 offense, as quarterback **Brett Favre** directed two flawless 75-yard scoring drives on the first two possessions against the No. 2 defense.
- ▶ Favre was 9-for-9 for 128 yards on the two drives, including an 11-yard touchdown strike to **Donald Driver**.
- ▶ McCarthy also praised the work of the offensive line – which returns all five starters from 2006 – in both the run game and pass protection.
- ▶ "Last year we had three rookies competing for two positions, and we put in a new scheme," McCarthy said. "I think our guys are very comfortable. They've had a full year of training. I thought the tempo and the way they get off the ball, the wedge attack, those are the things you're looking for in a zone scheme. We're clearly way ahead of where we were last year."
- ▶ Defensively, standout performances from the team's stable of young cornerbacks, including **Will Blackmon** and **Tramon Williams**, only heightened the competition in the fight for roster spots.
- ▶ "I've never been a part of anything like this," said first-round pick **Justin Harrell** of his Lambeau Field debut. "For a practice to have over 50,000 people, how loud it was, the fly over - it was a great feeling."

TRAINING CAMP IN GREEN BAY - LIKE NO OTHER

Green Bay Packers training camp – in its 62nd year – is the most anticipated family event of the summer. A tradition that first began under Curly Lambeau in 1946, it remains one of the most intimate preseason settings in the NFL.

- ▶ Newer traditions – such as night practices under the lights and the team's intra-squad scrimmage in Lambeau Field – blend with the old as players continue to ride kids' bicycles to practice, a tradition started under Vince Lombardi, and live in the dorms at nearby St. Norbert College, the NFL's longest camp relationship between a team and school.
- ▶ According to the Packer Country Visitor and Convention Bureau, training camp attracts an estimated 115,000 visitors from across the nation and as many as 20 foreign countries. With an economic impact estimated at more than \$60 million, training camp brings a financial boost to many area businesses. The Packer Country VCB partnered with the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay's Professional Programs in Business Administration for a survey in 2005 to provide an updated economic study of training camp.

'2-1-2' SCHEDULE

McCarthy one again institutes a '2-1-2' training camp schedule that was first implemented in 2006, highlighted by night practices under the lights.

- ▶ Head Coach Mike McCarthy stated before his first training camp in 2006 that the night-time practices would draw bigger crowds and produce a game-like atmosphere, increasing the intensity and competition in practice. Used by a number of teams around the NFL, he first experienced night practices as offensive coordinator in New Orleans.
- ▶ In between "two-a-days", the team breaks down film of the morning practice. On days with one practice, they hit the film room twice – night practices are broken down the following morning while the afternoon session is studied after dinner.

REST AND RECOUP

One major adjustment to this year's camp made by McCarthy was three off days built into the schedule.

- ▶ Three successive Wednesdays (Aug. 1, 8, 15), the team meets in the morning for meetings and film review, with players given the afternoon and evening off to recover for two practices the next day.

- ▶ Said McCarthy, "The number of things we were able to get done this spring gave us the ability to have those three Wednesdays where we only meet and have walk-throughs in the gym at the end. It's clearly (based) on the rest and recovery. I feel it will really help our football team particularly at the end of the year."
- ▶ "When you see the importance of rest and recovery happen on an individual basis like I've watched it throughout the spring, it's obviously very important for our football team," McCarthy stated. "To do it on Wednesday, right in the middle of the workload, I think is smart, and we're still able to get everything done."

ALL ABOUT MOMENTUM

The momentum of four straight wins to close the 2006 season – coupled with missing the NFC's final playoff berth by mere percentage points – produced record attendance in the offseason program.

- ▶ Every player on the roster participated in the offseason program, many working under the supervision of the strength and conditioning staff beginning in mid-March.
- ▶ There is no adjustment to new coaches, new schedules or new schemes this summer, as installations on both sides of the ball took place during

mini-camp and OTAs.

- "We're clearly a lot further ahead than we were at this time last year," McCarthy said upon the conclusion of the offseason program June 18. "Over and over again we've talked about the individual improvement, and that's something that's very obvious as you look out there on the football field, the improvement that a number of our players have made since last year."
- "Just the way we practice - our practices are better, and I think that's part of where we are as a football team and how much of the offense, defense and special teams we have in," McCarthy explained. "As of today we have everything in; everything that we're going to use next year is in. The continuity to me breeds confidence. We need to carry this into training camp."

SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Four coaches have new titles this season, though all four were with the team during the 2006 season. Former offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski left to become the head coach at Boston College in January, leaving a major opening on the staff.

- McCarthy tabbed **Joe Philbin** as offensive coordinator. Entering his fifth season with the Packers, Philbin most recently served as offensive line coach in 2006 where he implemented a new zone-blocking scheme and successfully integrated three rookie starters.
- **Winston Moss** was promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers after serving as linebackers coach in 2006. As the assistant head coach, the 41-year-old Moss will be McCarthy's right-hand man with regard to administrative duties and team dynamics. Moss will continue to coach the linebackers as well.
- Promoted to offensive line coach, **James Campen** moves up from his position as assistant offensive line coach in McCarthy's first season at the helm. The center for Brett Favre's first career start in 1992, Campen begins his fourth season on the Packers staff.
- **Jerry Fontenot** will serve as assistant offensive line coach in 2007. A 16-year NFL veteran (1989-2004), Fontenot joined the Packers as a coaching intern last summer and remained with the team throughout the 2006 season as an offensive assistant.

COMPETITION BREEDS EXCELLENCE

20 of 22 starters return from the league's youngest team in 2006, ensuring what promises to be one of the most competitive training camps in recent memory.

- Executive Vice President/General Manager **Ted Thompson** has compiled a roster of 87 players, 27 of which were drafted since he took over as GM in January 2005.
- Thompson knows all about training camp battles. Signed as a non-drafted free agent linebacker by the Houston Oilers, Thompson annually held off younger players brought in by Bum Phillips in his 10-year career.
- The Packers GM may face his toughest decisions yet towards the end of training camp, but it's all a part of his philosophy: building a solid foundation through the draft.
- Nothing attracts attention and headlines during training camp like the fight for playing time. Here are the positions drawing the most interest:

IN THE BACKFIELD

- All eyes will be on the running back position, where a stable of backs will contend for carries. The zone-blocking scheme calls for a 'one-cut' runner, and veterans Vernand Morency and Noah Herron know the system. Both had 100-yard efforts last season. The 2007 draft brought more competition in the form of Brandon Jackson and DeShawn Wynn, but injuries so far may play a major role in roster decisions.

ALONG THE DEFENSIVE FRONT

- No position on the roster is as deep as the interior defensive line, where run-stopper Ryan Pickett will hold down one starting spot. Corey Williams enjoyed a breakout season in 2006 while Colin Cole and Johnny Jolly both proved capable of contributing. Thompson also added 6-foot-4, 310-pound Justin Harrell, a first-round pick, to the mix.

LAST LINE OF DEFENSE

- Strong safety Marquand Manuel will have to hold off hard charges from third-year pro Marviel Underwood, second-year pro Atari Bigby and rookie Aaron Rouse. Manuel will benefit from a full training camp - something a calf injury kept him from in 2006 - while Underwood was an early star of training camp last season before going down with a knee injury. Third-round pick Rouse brings a linebacker's size and mentality to the position.

LACES OUT

- Undoubtedly the easiest battle to chart, where every kick is scrutinized and measured. Incumbent kicker Dave Rayner enjoyed a solid first season in Green Bay. He connected on 26-of-35 field goals while recording the most touchbacks by a Packers kicker in nearly a decade. Sixth-round choice Mason Crosby, who established a host of records at Colorado, will look to transfer his success from college to the pros.

ROSTER BREAKDOWN

Here's a position-by-position look at the roster breakdown. The first number indicates the number of players at that position entering camp, while the number in parentheses represents how many players from that position made the opening-day roster in 2006.

Quarterback - 4 (3)

- **Brett Favre** and **Aaron Rodgers** form the clear 1-2 punch here. Favre enters 2007 with the chance to rewrite the record books, while Rodgers will once again have all eyes on him in the preseason as he continues his maturation as an NFL quarterback.
- The battle for the No. 3 spot will be between second-year pro **Ingle Martin** and rookie **Paul Thompson**. The experience factor, and the fact that he got a full dose of McCarthy's quarterback school in the offseason, gives Martin the edge, but Thompson's athletic ability was promising enough to warrant an extended look.

Running back - 9 (5)

- All indications are third-year pro **Vernand Morency** and second-round draft pick **Brandon Jackson** are the top two backs and will share the load, but it's always possible one will emerge as the mainstay.
- **Noah Herron** is the most experienced in the third-down role, while rookie seventh-round pick **DeShawn Wynn** is expected to make an impact in camp after recovering from spring injuries and finally putting the pads on. Second-year holdover **P.J. Pope** was injured Aug. 4.
- How many fullbacks make the team could depend on how many of the above halfbacks warrant a spot, as well as how many tight ends the coaching staff decides to keep.
- Returning starter **Brandon Miree** has the inside track on the No. 1 job, but a trio of rookies in **Korey Hall**, **Ryan Powdrell** and **Corey White** will look to push Miree and/or land a roster spot of their own.

Tight end - 5 (4)

- Keeping four tight ends last year was a bit of a surprise, and it's difficult to say whether the Packers will do that again or revert to keeping the more traditional three at this position.
- This may be as wide open as any position on the roster, not only in terms of who will make the team, but who will earn the starting job.
- Veterans **Bubba Franks** and **Donald Lee** will be pushed by second-year

pro **Zac Alcorn**, who often flashes great hands in practice. Rookie seventh-round draft pick **Clark Harris** will look to make his mark as well.

Wide receiver – 11 (4)

- ▶ With the depth and competition here, it's difficult to imagine only four players making the opening day roster. Five, or perhaps even six, is more likely, and that numbers decision will have an impact on how many running backs and tight ends are kept as well.
- ▶ After starters **Donald Driver** and **Greg Jennings**, nothing is set in stone. There simply isn't room for everyone, which may present the coaching staff with some of its more difficult decisions as camp concludes.
- ▶ **Carlyle Holiday** and **Ruvell Martin** were strong contributors at the end of last season, rookie draft picks **James Jones** and **David Clowney** are being seen in pads for the first time, veteran **Robert Ferguson** looks to be healthy again, **Shaun Bodiford** is an intriguing prospect because of his punt and kick return abilities, and **Carlton Brewster** is coming off a banner spring in NFL Europa.

Offensive line – 14 (9)

- ▶ Barring an injury, there's perhaps the least drama here, with the starting five of **Mark Tauscher**, **Jason Spitz**, **Scott Wells**, **Daryn Colledge** and **Chad Clifton** returning and looking to maximize on the chemistry developed throughout 2006.
- ▶ **Tony Moll** is a versatile backup who gained starting experience as a rookie as well. After that, it's simply a matter of vying for backup spots.
- ▶ **Junius Coston** and **Tyson Walter** can play multiple positions, which could help their chances. Former defensive tackle **Orrin Thompson** progressed well during the offseason, and the coaches like the potential of rookie fourth-round draft pick **Allen Barbre**, who showed a lot of fire during mini-camps and OTAs.

Defensive line – 13 (10)

- ▶ The experience and depth here are perhaps as strong as anywhere on the roster. **Aaron Kampman**, **Cullen Jenkins** and **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** are the top three defensive ends.
- ▶ Amongst returnees **Michael Montgomery** and **Jason Hunter**, and rookies **DeVon Hicks** and **Larry Birdine**, there's no telling the pecking order or how many ends will be kept.
- ▶ On the inside at tackle, the veteran group of **Ryan Pickett**, **Corey Williams**, **Colin Cole** and **Johnny Jolly** is joined by rookies **Justin Harrell** and **Daniel Muir**.
- ▶ Whether or not there's room for five defensive tackles remains to be seen, and Williams' ability to move outside if needed, as well as Jenkins' ability to move inside, could factor into the final roster decisions.

Linebacker – 10 (6)

- ▶ Barring injury, it's hard to imagine **Nick Barnett**, **A.J. Hawk** or **Brady Poppinga** losing his starting job, but the backup spots are far from determined and most likely will come down to special teams contributions.
- ▶ Second-year pro **Abdul Hodge** hopes to be healthy again and make the impact he did in his rookie training camp, while rookie sixth-rounder **Desmond Bishop** will look to be the tackling machine he was in college.
- ▶ **Tracy White** is a special teams veteran, **Tim Goodwell** is coming off a solid season in NFL Europa, and youngsters **Spencer Havner**, **Juwan Simpson** and **Rory Johnson** all have shown enough promise to deserve a chance.

Defensive back – 16 (9)

- ▶ The nine on last year's opening day roster consisted of five cornerbacks and four safeties.
- ▶ If that holds true again, then some combination of the cornerbacks fighting for the nickel job – **Will Blackmon**, **Frank Walker**, **Jarrett Bush** and

Patrick Dendy – could make the team behind starters **Al Harris** and **Charles Woodson**. It will just be a question of what role each will play.

- ▶ The safety spot isn't nearly so clear-cut, however. Third-year pro **Nick Collins** is the only one whose job isn't on the line, and who earns the starting spot opposite him will be one of the most-watched camp battles.
- ▶ With last year's starter **Marquand Manuel** looking to get off to a better start, third-year pro **Marviel Underwood** returning from a knee injury, and rookie third-round draft pick **Aaron Rouse** able to hit for real, the competition could last well into the preseason.
- ▶ Add 2006 reserves like **Atari Bigby**, **Charlie Peprah** and **Tyrone Culver** to the mix, and there are numerous bodies for only a handful of spots.

Specialists – 5 (3)

- ▶ Long snapper **Rob Davis** will keep his job for a 12th season, but competition was brought in for second-year pros **Jon Ryan** at punter and **Dave Rayner** at kicker. They both earned their jobs with strong training camp performances a year ago, and now they'll have to fend off challenges from punter **Ryan Dougherty** and rookie kicker **Mason Crosby**.

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Packers will host a season-long celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of Lambeau Field. The crown jewel of the National Football League remains the most historic stadium in football.

- ▶ Dedicated as City Stadium Sept. 29, 1957, with a 21-17 victory over the archrival Chicago Bears, the team renamed the facility Lambeau Field in 1965 following the death of E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach. It is the NFL's longest-tenured facility.
- ▶ To mark the occasion, an anniversary logo was created and will be featured on the team's uniforms, Gameday Program, the media guide and the Packers Yearbook.
- ▶ Lambeau Field also will feature the special logo in both end zones.
- ▶ Renowned 3-D pop artist Charles Fazzino was commissioned by the Packers to create an art piece celebrating the 50th anniversary. Fazzino, the official artist of the Super Bowl and Major League Baseball's All-Star Game, spent nine months on the project. The piece is available in a limited edition 3-D format, as well as on T-shirts, helmets and assorted items in the Packers Pro Shop.
- ▶ Packers ticket holders will enjoy images of Lambeau Field through the years on their tickets as well.
