GREEN BAY HOSTS SEATTLE IN FAMILIAR PLAYOFF MATCHUP

Playoff football returns to Green Bay as the Packers host the Seahawks Saturday at Lambeau Field in the Divisional round.

- ▶ Green Bay matched a club record with 13 regular-season wins, a feat it accomplished in 1962, '96 and '97. It played for the NFL championship each of those previous times.
- ▶ Winners of the NFC North, the Packers collected their 18th division title in club history. The team makes its 24th postseason appearance in club history, this year as the NFC's No. 2 seed. It marks the first time since 1997 the Packers have earned a first-round bye.
- ▶ Saturday marks the 267th consecutive sellout at Lambeau Field (253 regular season, 14 playoffs), the league's longest-tenured stadium.
- ▶ Familiar faces return to Lambeau Field this weekend as Mike Holmgren and Matt Hasselbeck lead the NFC West champion Seattle Seahawks into Green Bay. Holmgren coached in Green Bay for seven seasons (1992-98), while Hasselbeck was a sixth-round draft pick by the Packers in 1998 who spent his first three seasons in Green Bay. Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** served as his position coach with the Packers in 1999.
- ▶ The Packers last playoff win came against the Seahawks at Lambeau Field in the 2003 Wild Card round. **Al Harris'** 52-yard interception return for a touchdown in overtime remains the only NFL postseason game ended by a sudden-death defensive score.
- ▶ A dominant Week 17 performance highlights a club entering the playoffs on a roll. Green Bay has won 17 of its last 20 games and has not lost back-to-back games in over one year. Its last losing streak came in Weeks 12-13 (Nov. 27 - Dec. 3) in 2006.



THE PACKERS IN THE PLAYOFFS

Green Bay made the postseason for the 11th time in 15 seasons

- ▶ Its 24-14 (.632) W-L record in the playoffs is the second-best winning percentage in National Football League history.
- ▶ Also second-best in NFL postseason history is the Packers' 14-2 (.875) record at home. Only the New England Patriots (9-1, .900) own a better home record (min. 10 games).
- ▶ In the Divisional round, the Packers are 3-5 all-time. However, they are 2-0 in the Divisional round coming off a first-round bye (1996 and '97). The two wins also are the only Divisional round games Green Bay has hosted.
- ▶ In NFL history, teams coming off a first-round bye are 83-29 (.741) in the Divisional round. NFC teams are 45-11 (.804).
- ▶ This season, the Packers were 3-1 against playoff teams, including 2-1 vs. Divisional round participants.
- ▶ McCarthy makes his debut as a head coach in the postseason. He has coached in eight playoff games previously as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Quarterback **Brett Favre** will start his 21st playoff game Saturday, his 274th consecutive start overall. He owns an 11-9 (.550) career W-L record in the postseason and has thrown a TD pass in an NFL-record 16 consecutive playoff games.



WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports is in its 14th season as an NFL network television partner and will air the contest to a national audience. Play-by-play man **Kenny Albert** joins color commentator **Daryl Johnston** in the broadcast booth with **Tony Siragusa** serving as the sideline reporter.

- ▶ Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The network covers 47 markets in six states.
- ▶ Westwood One will air the game across the country. **Dave Sims** (play-by-play) and **Bob Trumpy** (analyst) will call the action with **Tim Van Vooren** as the sideline reporter. **Tommy Tighe** hosts the pregame and halftime shows.
- ▶ **Univision Radio**, with **Rafael Hernandez Brito** (play-by-play) and **Eduardo Martell** (color), will broadcast in Spanish to a national audience.
- ▶ For out-of-town listeners, the broadcast is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on www.packers.com as well as on Sirius Satellite Radio as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

WHERE THE '07 OFFENSE RANKS

In addition to tying the franchise record with 13 wins, the 2007 Packers ranked high in a number of league rankings and club records.

- Finishing as the league's No. 2-ranked offense, Green Bay accomplished its highest league ranking since 1983, when the unit also finished No. 2. It is the second consecutive top-10 finish for McCarthy's unit, and the 11th top-10 finish in quarterback **Brett Favre's** 16-year tenure with the club.
- The NFL's fourth-highest scoring offense put up 435 points in 2007, third on the Packers' all-time single-season list.
- The 2007 total of 5,931 net yards (1,597 rushing, 4,334 passing) ranks third in club annals.
- Its net yards passing (4,334 yards) also ranks third in team history.
- Along with Favre, quarterbacks **Aaron Rodgers** and **Craig Nall** combined for 383 completions (tied for first) while compiling a 66.3 completion percentage, the highest in Packers history.

AN ALL-PRO SINCE MIDSEASON

While it struggled to get production out of its run game through the first half of the season, Green Bay has seemed to uncover a gem in first-year running back **Ryan Grant**.

- Grant assumed running back duties in the second quarter against Denver and responded with his first 100-yard performance.
- A powerful runner with the requisite open-field speed, Grant totaled five 100-yard performances on the season.
- Acquired in a trade with the New York Giants, Grant arrived in Green Bay just before Week 1 and made an early mark with his play on the special teams coverage units.
- Grant earned his first career start in Week 9 at Kansas City and has started every game since. A dual threat out of the backfield, the Notre Dame product also caught 30 passes.

NOBODY'S BETTER AFTER THE CATCH

The league's No. 2-ranked passing offense was bolstered by its receivers' ability to run after the catch.

- Led by wide receivers **Donald Driver**, **Greg Jennings**, **James Jones** and tight end **Donald Lee**, Green Bay led the league in yards after the catch. The Packers amassed a league-best 2,294 yards after the catch, 51.4% of their total passing yards. The NFL average in 2007 was 1,596 yards.
- The only other teams to surpass 2,000 yards after the catch were New Orleans (2,112) and New England (2,052).
- The big-play ability of the Packers offense shouldn't come as a total surprise. Green Bay finished second in yards after the catch, behind New Orleans, in 2006.

MAKING HIS POINT

Rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** led all NFL players with 141 points.

- He becomes only the seventh rookie in NFL history to lead the league in scoring and the first since Kevin Butler in 1985. The last Packers player to lead the league in

points was Chester Marcol (94, 1974).

- Crosby surpassed Ryan Longwell's franchise record for points in a season by a kicker (131 in 2000).
- He finished just shy of the NFL record for points in a season by a rookie kicker, established by Butler (144 points) in '85.

BIG PLAYS HIGHLIGHT '07 NUMBERS

Whether it was a long strike from Favre to one of his receivers or a long scamper from running back **Ryan Grant**, big plays served as the catalyst to Green Bay's high-powered offense.

- The Packers finished the season with 67 plays of 20 yards or more, second only to Dallas (68). Fifteen of those big plays came on the ground, and 52 came through the air.
- The offense had a number of memorable long touchdowns on the ground and through the air. Favre connected on eight touchdown passes of 40 yards or longer this season. Never in Favre's career has he hit for so many long touchdowns in one season.
- On the receiving end of six of the eight long touchdowns was the second-year pro Jennings, who connected on two such scoring plays as a rookie last season. Three this season have been quite memorable, providing the go-ahead touchdown in the fourth quarter or overtime against San Diego, at Denver and at Kansas City.
- "I think Brett and the receiver group have done an excellent job in the three- and five-step drops," McCarthy said about the team's success with the long ball. "With that we've been given some opportunities to go vertical, go deep, whether it's inside or outside."
- The last Favre-to-Jennings connection, a 44-yarder in St. Louis, was the quarterback's 59th career touchdown pass of 40 yards or more. A look at Favre's most productive seasons with the big play:

MIKE McCARTHY... Is in second year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Won more games (16) in his first 25 contests than any other coach in franchise history.
- ▶ Spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- ▶ Began his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

MIKE HOLMGREN... In ninth year as the Seahawks' sixth head coach.

- ▶ Earned a postseason berth in 2007 for the fifth consecutive season.
- ▶ Posted his seventh winning season in Seattle this season, including his fifth division title.
- ▶ Joined the Seahawks after a seven-year tenure as head coach in Green Bay (1992-98), during which he led the Packers to three straight NFC Championship Games, two Super Bowl appearances and one Super Bowl victory (XXXI).
- ▶ Previously served first as quarterbacks coach and then as offensive coordinator in San Francisco (1986-91).

THE PACKERS-SEAHAWKS SERIES

Saturday marks the second time that the teams will meet at Lambeau Field during the postseason, including a 2003 Wild Card meeting.

- ▶ The two clubs have met just 12 times, including the regular season and playoffs, since Seattle entered the National Football League in 1976.
- ▶ Other than the fact that they simply haven't played very often, which has changed with Seattle's shift to the NFC in 2002, most differences stop there. Much of Seattle's front office, their coaching staff and even their starting quarterback inaugurated their NFL careers or built their reputations with a stop at 1265 Lombardi Avenue.
- ▶ The movement west, beginning with Mike Holmgren in 1999, has reversed itself in some respects, as Packers GM Ted Thompson and personnel men John Dorsey and John Schneider have returned to Green Bay after stops in Seattle.
- ▶ Green Bay owns a 4-1 advantage in the five games in the series played at Lambeau Field. Seattle's only win at the NFL's longest-tenured stadium came in 1999, Holmgren's first year coaching in Seattle.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Packers GM Ted Thompson spent five seasons (2000-04) as the Seahawks' vice president of football operations...Packers personnel analyst John Schneider (2000) and director of college scouting John Dorsey

(1999) both worked in Seattle's front office...Green Bay assistant head coach/linebackers Winston Moss played his final three seasons in Seattle (1995-97) and began his coaching career with the Seahawks as defensive quality control in 1998...Seahawks assistant head coach/offensive coordinator Gil Haskell (1992-97), defensive coordinator John Marshall (1980-82), wide receivers coach Nolan Cromwell (1992-98), tight ends coach Jim Lind (1992-98), offensive assistant/quality control Gary Reynolds (1996-98) and special projects/defense coach Ray Rhodes (1992-93, 1999), coached previously in Green Bay; Rhodes (1999) was the 12th head coach in Packers history, succeeding Holmgren, who coached the Packers from 1992-98...Former Packers GM Ron Wolf selected Matt Hasselbeck in the sixth round of the 1998 draft; the quarterback spent his first three seasons in Green Bay, including his rookie campaign on the Packers' practice squad. McCarthy was his positional coach during the 1999 season...Packers WR Koren Robinson was taken as the No. 9 overall selection in the 2001 NFL Draft by Seattle, where he spent his first four (2001-04) seasons...Packers LB Tracy White made the Seahawks roster as a non-drafted free agent in 2003 and spent two seasons in Seattle...Packers WR Shaun Bodiford is a Federal Way, Wash., native...Seattle vice president Lance Lopes worked in the Packers' front office from 1993-2000...Seahawks head athletic trainer Sam Ramsden worked six seasons in the Packers training room.

INDIVIDUALLY VS. SEATTLE

Brett Favre is 4-2 in six career starts against Seattle. His career numbers against the Seahawks include 1,418 yards on 122-of-205 passing with 10 TDs and 8 INTs...Donald Driver has caught 22 passes for 345 yards and two scores in four games against Seattle...A.J. Hawk posted a career-high 20 tackles (16 solo) in the Nov. 27, 2006, matchup...Also in the 2006 game, Charles Woodson recorded his second career two-INT game.

LAST MEETING, POSTSEASON

January 4, 2004, at Lambeau Field; Packers won 33-27 OT.

- ▶ Al Harris returned a Matt Hasselbeck INT 52 yards for a TD in the only NFL postseason game ended by a sudden-death defensive score.
- ▶ Green Bay jumped out to a 13-6 halftime advantage thanks to a Favre TD pass to Bubba Franks and two Ryan Longwell field goals.
- ▶ Two Shaun Alexander touchdown runs in the third quarter gave Seattle a 20-13 lead before Packers running back Ahman Green responded with two fourth-quarter TD runs of his own.
- ▶ Alexander's third rushing touchdown of the day, with 51 seconds remaining, tied the score, and Ryan Longwell's 47-yard field goal attempt as time expired fell short.
- ▶ Both teams were forced to punt on their first possession of overtime. After Seattle got the ball back, it was Harris who scored on the game's only turnover.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Nov. 26, 2006, Qwest Field; Seahawks won 34-24.

- ▶ Four first-half takeaways, a defensive score, and a big pass play for a touchdown to open the second half gave Green Bay a tremendous chance to knock off the defending NFC champion Seattle Seahawks on a Monday night.
- ▶ However, missed opportunities, costly penalties, and a surprisingly porous run defense took away that chance as Seattle posted a 34-24 decision at a snowy and noisy Qwest Field.
- ▶ Charles Woodson collected two of three Packers interceptions, the first leading to the game's opening touchdown (Ahman Green 5-yard run).
- ▶ Rookie linebacker Abdul Hodge scooped a fumble and returned it 29 yards for a score to give the Packers a 14-9 lead.
- ▶ Matt Hasselbeck, who threw three touchdown passes, combined with running back Shaun Alexander (201 yards) to lead the Seahawks in a second-half comeback.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

WHERE THE '07 DEFENSE RANKS

Green Bay's defense finished just yards away from being a top-10 unit and finished the season at No. 11.

- ▶ Perhaps more telling is where it finished in scoring defense – No. 6. It surrendered just 291 points.
- ▶ It was a top-10 unit in two very important categories: third-down defense (No. 3) and red-zone defense (No. 8).
- ▶ Quarterbacks had a hard time against the Packers defense, completing just 55.2% of their passes. Only Pittsburgh (54.5%) held opponents to a lower completion percentage.

"SPECIAL" TEAMS MUCH IMPROVED

Having always been a key ingredient to the success of the Packers, Green Bay's special teams unit has seen a remarkable improvement this season.

- ▶ An area of emphasis all offseason, the unit got things going early in Week 1 by accounting for all 16 points. Against Oakland in Week 14, it accounted for two more TDs, bringing its 2007 total to four.
- ▶ In Rick Gosselin's annual *Dallas Morning News* rankings, which objectively grades teams by their rankings in 22 kicking-game categories, Green Bay finished seventh both in 1996 and 1997. The Packers reached the Super Bowl both seasons.
- ▶ More recently, the Packers ranked eighth in 2003 and ninth in 2004. Both years they made the playoffs.
- ▶ For the past two seasons, Green Bay has ranked last in the NFL in Gosselin's rankings. Neither year resulted in a postseason appearance.
- ▶ The coverage units were drastically better in 2007. The Packers ranked fourth in the league in opponent punt return average and seventh in opponent kickoff return average.
- ▶ Another sign of the coverage units' improvement: their ability to take the ball away. They had just one forced fumble in 2006, but totaled three forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries this season.
- ▶ Their own return game is much improved from last season as well, having scored on multiple returns (two punts) for the first time since 1998. Ranked 24th in punt return average last season, the unit ranked seventh thanks to **Will Blackmon**, **Tramon Williams** and **Charles Woodson**. Their kick return game, ranked 31st last year, has been bolstered by the addition of **Koren Robinson**, who exploded in St. Louis for 130 yards on three returns. It ranked 23rd.

THE POINT OF NO RETURN

The Green Bay Packers allowed just two touchdowns on any type of return – fumble, interception, punt or kickoff – this season, second in the NFL behind Seattle (1). Both scores allowed came in Week 16 at Chicago.

- ▶ Conversely, the Packers were 5-0 when either their defense or special teams scored a touchdown. Special teams scored in three victories (Phi., Car., Oak.) while the defense scored twice (Was., K.C.).

LOOKOUT, QUARTERBACKS

A defense that collected 36 sacks is headlined by one of the top sack duos.

- ▶ Defensive end **Aaron Kampman**, NFC Defensive Player of the Month for October, posted 12 sacks, tied for 11th in the NFL. Fellow end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** tallied 9½ sacks, tied for 17th.
- ▶ 31½ of those sacks came courtesy of the defensive line. Defensive tackle **Corey Williams** accounted for seven of the sacks, tying his career high established last season.

STATISTICAL ODDITIES FROM 2007

Stats and facts one can find that upon a closer look at the league statistics:

- ▶ Lambeau Field set a single-season home attendance record in its 50th anniversary season as 566,443 Packers fans made their way through the

turnstiles. That bested the previous high, 565,749, set last season.

- ▶ Including road games, the Packers played in front of 1,120,775 NFL fans this season, breaking the record of 1,112,569 established in 2004.
- ▶ The Packers have a takeaway in 23 of their last 24 games.
- ▶ The Packers were one of two teams not to attempt a two-point conversion all season. In fact, they have never attempted a two-point conversion in the **Mike McCarthy** era.
- ▶ Green Bay allowed just 19 sacks on the season, tied for third in the NFL. Favre was only sacked 15 times this season, which is the second lowest total of his career (12 in 2004).
- ▶ Want efficiency? You don't need to look further than Packers wideout **Ruvell Martin**. Fifteen of his 16 receptions on the year went for first downs. His percentage of first downs per reception (93.75%) led all NFL players with at least 10 catches.

TOPS THROUGH TWO

Honored by the NFL Alumni as 2007 Coach of the Year and runner-up for AP Coach of the Year, Head Coach Mike McCarthy keeps piling up victories.

- ▶ With 21 regular-season wins, McCarthy ties Mike Sherman for the most wins by a Packers coach in his first two years.
- ▶ McCarthy captured the NFC North crown in his second campaign, something Sherman did not accomplish until his third season. Holmgren won his first division title in Green Bay in his fourth season.
- ▶ In his second season with the Packers in 1960, Vince Lombardi captured the Western Conference title before losing to Philadelphia, 17-13, in the NFL Championship.
- ▶ A look at the most successful coaches in Packers history through their first two seasons in Green Bay:

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

PERHAPS HIS BEST?

The NFL's only three-time MVP, quarterback **Brett Favre** may have just completed the finest season of his career at age 38.

- It was a monumental year for Favre, who broke some of the league's most hallowed records.
- At the N.Y. Giants in Week 2, Favre recorded his 149th career win, surpassing John Elway as the winningest quarterback in league history. Favre now has 160 career wins.
- In Week 4 at Minnesota, he surpassed Dan Marino as the NFL's all-time leader in touchdown passes with his 421st TD. He now has 442.
- In Week 15 at St. Louis, again he surpassed Marino as the all-time leader in passing yards. He has 61,655 career passing yards.
- But it wasn't all about breaking records for Favre in 2007. In leading the Packers to the division title, he turned in one of the finest statistical seasons of his 17-year NFL career. A look at where some of his 2007 numbers rank over his brilliant career:

WHEN THE TEMPERATURE DROPS

Winning the right to host a January playoff game, Saturday afternoon will almost assuredly bring typical Wisconsin winter temperatures. Forty years ago, the 'Ice Bowl' became the coldest game in league annals during the playoffs, and Green Bay owns a decided advantage at home on the 'Frozen Tundra' when the thermometer drops.

- The Packers have always been known as a cold-weather team, and this year is no different. They are 2-1 in games played in 34° or below temperatures, including two December wins at Lambeau Field.
- Mississippi native Brett Favre has fared much better on the 'Frozen Tundra' than foreign turf. He owns a remarkable 42-5 record at home including playoffs in cold weather, but is just 1-6 on the road when the temperature is 34° or below.
- His 92.16 passer rating at home in cold weather is supplemented by 10,607 passing yards and 83 touchdowns in those 47 games at Lambeau Field.

DECEMBER IS TIME TO REMEMBER

The importance of the NFL's final month cannot be understated. Whether it involves clinching division crowns, jockeying for playoff positioning or building momentum for next season, every game in December matters.

- For the Packers, December has always proved successful. They finished the month with a 3-1 mark this season, with their only blemish coming in Chicago in gusting winds and sub-zero wind chills.
- Since 1997, they own the league's best mark in games played in the final month (including regular-season games played in January) at 38-13-0. New England's 36-13-0 mark ranks second in the NFL during that time.
- Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** certainly has continued the tradition of December success. He is 7-2 in the month since coming to Green Bay.

SECRET TO SUCCESS? GET AHEAD AND STAY THERE

Favre has given a lot of credit for his performance to the Packers ability to play with the lead. Playing ahead, he says, means he does not have to take as many shots downfield or get points in a hurry.

- The statistics back up Favre's claims. In 16 regular season games, the

Packers led their opponents for 535 minutes and 51 seconds. They trailed in just 188 minutes and 12 seconds of play.

- They trailed for the majority of the game in two of their losses. At Dallas, they were behind for 48:15, and trailed at Chicago for 46:55. The only other game in which they spent more time trailing was the win over San Diego (19:54 in lead; 32:13 trailing).

SIMPLY THE BEST

The Packers own more NFL championships (12) than any other franchise, but it's not all about past glory for the Green and Gold.

- Talk of unrestricted free agency in the early '90s led many to believe small-town Green Bay would be the first franchise to fold.
- Since the advent of free agency in 1993, the Packers own the best W-L record in the NFL. They have captured seven division titles in that time.
- The Packers have won 10 or more game in nine seasons since 1993.
- A look at the most successful teams in the free-agency era shows eight of the last 11 Super Bowl champions, beginning with Green Bay's '96 title:

ACCORDING TO THE COACH

COACH SAYS - SUNDAY EXCERPTS FROM MIKE MCCARTHY

- *(Did Seattle winning give you a jump on preparation?)* "Well, we were able to break down a number of games, actually I think we had between eight and 10 in the computer. We're actually still waiting on yesterday's game. There's been a delay in the plane coming through Chicago, so we're still waiting for the film."
- *(Is that the best you've seen their defense play?)* "I thought their defense played very well, just watching the TV copy. The way they flew to the ball. The one thing that's constant throughout the film study, I think their secondary has very good ball skills. They do a good job of reacting to the football. Their linebacker play is a strength of theirs. I thought Kerney was a big factor in the game yesterday. Those are the type of things we've seen from their defense."
- *(What else jumps out about them?)* "I think Matt Hasselbeck does an excellent job as far as the tempo that he brings to the offensive side of the ball. I thought the way they started the game, they started very fast, up-tempo and was able to get in front of Washington. He had the turnovers in the second half. I thought they ran the ball in spurts, and special team play had the big play with the wind there. I was impressed with their football team. I thought they played at a very high level of energy and did what they needed to do to win the football game. There's big plays, big momentum swings throughout the football game, and Seattle did a nice job."
- *(See any similarities between the two clubs?)* "I think if you look at numbers, if you look at the statistics, the breakdowns of the teams there's a lot of similarities. Their defense looked to have a high number of pressures early in the game. I think they pressure more than we do overall. There are some similarities in pass attempts in their offense compared to our offense, built around making the quarterback successful. And I think their special teams look to be pretty good too. They have the big returner in Bursleson. I think it will be an excellent matchup."
- *(Is the familiarity a good thing or bad thing?)* "I haven't even thought about it. I think that's part of playoff football, because most of the time, or a lot of the times you play an opponent in playoff football that you've already played during the course of the year or have played, whether it's preseason or last year. Having an opportunity to play on Monday Night Football up there, it was a big game, a snow game, and those are things you can look back on and draw from as far as your preparation for your football team. I had a chance to go back and look at that game again today and just revisit some of the objectives and things that we had going into that game. So we look at everything."
- *(Is the tape from this preseason worth anything?)* "They sat down a lot of guys on defense, as I recall, and I think their two tackles also on offense. I went back and watched the first quarter. Just more personnel match-ups was what I was looking for out of the preseason game."
- *(How well do you know Mike Holmgren and do you look forward to matching wits with a coach like that?)* "On a personal level, I really don't know Mike Holmgren. I had an opportunity to visit with him when they were here for the preseason game. He was here visiting with Ted (Thompson) and Mark Schiefelbein and some of the people that have been here a long time. I guess he had not had the opportunity to see the new facility and spent quite some time in the building that day of the game, so I had a chance to meet with him then. Professionally, I think he's clearly one of the greats in our business. I think what he's done speaks for itself, and anytime you have an opportunity to compete against a coach like Mike Holmgren, it's something you look forward to."
- *(Is it an unusual situation to go against a coach who has a street named after him in this town?)* "Unusual? I think it's probably the most unique situation in pro football. I don't know if anybody else has had to do that."



I haven't thought about it. Maybe I'll stay off Holmgren Way for a while, for at least the week."

- *(Can you talk about the relationship you had with Hasselbeck in '99 and relay that story about him diving in the end zone?)* "It was in Minnesota. I think Matt's playing at a very high level. He was a young quarterback at the time and I was only able to coach him for one year. He's a wonderful person. I think a lot of him on a personal level, and professionally, he's done a great job with his career. Those are the type of players you root for. Obviously I won't be rooting for him this week. I'm proud of what he's accomplished so far. The story in Minnesota? I think it was a Monday night game, and there was a fake field goal and if I recall, he threw the touchdown to Jeff Thomason. Matt went in to celebrate and he jumped up and missed the pile and landed on his face. So, I'm sure you could dig it (the footage) up. It was pretty comical."
- *(What did you think about his overtime proclamation in the last playoff game?)* "Jeff and I were talking about it earlier. I was actually watching the game on TV, so I do remember it. I personally thought it was funny. Just knowing Matt, I thought it was funny that it came across the TV the way it did. And if I recall, I think Ryan Longwell might've been out there, so I just took it as, he was amongst friends and was having some fun with it. So it didn't surprise me, but I thought it was humorous."
- *(What kind of difference has Kerney made to their defense?)* "I just think with his production No. 1 is a huge difference. Just being around Patrick when he was in Atlanta and I was in New Orleans, he's a player that brings it every single down. So he brings a lot of energy, and I would think he's probably a good leader in their locker room. He reminds me a lot of Aaron Kampman. I think they're similar players. But he's definitely been a positive acquisition for them."
- *(Favre admitted after the '99 game that playing against Holmgren got in his head - do you remember what he was like and is he over that?)* "I remember the '99 game. I remember the six turnovers in the game. I think it was a Monday Night Football game also. And I think Brett really pressed in that game, because I can remember the first interception he threw. It was on 22 X Shallow Cross, and they were playing cover 4, and Billy Schroeder was the shallow cross, he was the primary receiver, and Brett tried to throw the post and about three of their players intercepted the ball. He was really pressing. It was really early in the game. And then he had some things go the other way, but he definitely pressed in that game. But I think he's definitely a lot more mature today than he was back in the '90s, last decade."
- *(Can Ted Thompson give you any insight on Seattle?)* "Ted gave his two cents today. We had a little personnel meeting, I had a chance to sit down with Ted. He knows a lot of their players and has been around Holmgren and that staff, so I had a chance to visit with Ted about it."
- *(What does the practice schedule look like this week?)* "Well, we've had the two padded practices Friday and Saturday, so Monday, tomorrow, we'll come in at noon and we'll do some film. They'll have some strength and conditioning work in the morning prior to that, and then we'll have a film session from probably 12 to 2, and Tuesday will be a Wednesday schedule for us. And we'll go shells on Wednesday and pads on Thursday, then a normal Friday."
- *(Has Al Harris reminded you about his play in the last game yet?)* "Has Al? No, not yet. It's a long week. I think that's a perfect illustration of playoff football. You talk about big plays and the momentum swings in a game, your key players making those plays. I think that's a perfect example that you've already seen so far. I mean, you watched the Pittsburgh-Jacksonville game last night and the Seattle-Washington (game), the big plays in that game that factored into the outcome. So I think that's an excellent parallel."



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

WHEN FAVRE HITS THE CENTURY MARK

Quarterback **Brett Favre**, the league's only three-time MVP (1995-97) who turned 38 in October, turned in a season that almost defied description.

- ▶ His Week 17 performance against the Lions was his 10th game of the season with a passer rating over 100.0. All 10 have come in victory and mark a single-season career high for the quarterback. His previous career high was nine games with a passer rating of 100.0 or better, established in the 1995 season.
- ▶ Favre compiled a passer rating over 100.0 for five consecutive weeks (Weeks 8-12), tying his own career high and marking the first time he's accomplished the feat in a single season. He had three games with a passer rating over 100.0 in Weeks 2-4 earlier this season.
- ▶ It marked the sixth time in his career that Favre has recorded at least three straight games with a passer rating over 100.0. He did it twice in 1995 (Nov. 12 – Dec. 3, 4 games; Dec. 16 – Jan. 6, 4 games) and twice again in 1996 (Sept. 1 – Sept. 15, 3 games; Dec. 22 – Sept. 1, 1997, 5 games). Favre was voted the league's MVP in both seasons.
- ▶ The last time he accomplished five consecutive games with a passer rating over 100.0 was during the team's Super Bowl XXXI run. The streak began with the final regular-season game against Minnesota (Dec. 22, 1996) and culminated in the first regular-season game the following season (vs. Chicago, Sept. 1). It included three playoff victories, most notably a 35-21 victory over New England in the Super Bowl.
- ▶ Elias Sports Bureau never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis, but rather to measure the effectiveness of a quarterback over an entire season, or an entire career.
- ▶ Nonetheless, in games when Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 83-7 (.922).
- ▶ The Packers are a perfect 45-0 (1.000) at Lambeau Field when Favre hits the century mark. The team is 38-7 (.844) on the road when Favre eclipses the mark.

PACKERS AMONG NFL'S BEST AWAY FROM LAMBEAU

Green Bay has enjoyed remarkable success on the road, winning eight of its last 10 contests. Its recent seven-game road winning streak, which was snapped at Dallas, was something the franchise had not accomplished since Vince Lombardi's final two seasons (1966-67) in Green and Gold.

- ▶ The seven-game road winning streak was the third-longest mark in franchise history. The Packers have won eight consecutive road games twice (1941-42 and 1966-67), the best mark in their history.
- ▶ One of the most impressive accomplishments of Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**'s first year as head coach was the way his club performed on the road. The Packers finished 5-3 away from home in 2006, recording the most road wins in franchise history for a coach in his first season.
- ▶ McCarthy and the Packers did one better in 2007, finishing their regular-season road record at 6-2.

IN THE NFL'S 'BLACK AND BLUE' DIVISION

Under McCarthy, the Packers have been extremely successful in the NFC North and clinched the club's first division crown since 2004.

- ▶ McCarthy is 9-3 in NFC North games since taking over in Green Bay in

2006. All three division losses have been to the Chicago Bears.

- ▶ Last season, the Packers finished tied for the NFL's best division record at 5-1, losing only to Chicago in the season opener. No other head coach in team annals had a better division mark in his rookie season than McCarthy.

TURNOVERS THE NAME OF THE GAME

With its turnover margin at plus-four, Green Bay has 12 wins thanks in large part to its ability to turn turnovers into points. On defense, the Packers have been able to clamp down after turnovers, not allowing opponents to capitalize on scoring opportunities.

- ▶ Green Bay has 96 points scored off 28 turnovers. On the other side of the ball, the defense has allowed 65 points off 24 turnovers.
- ▶ The Packers have won the turnover battle in nine of their 13 wins this season. They came out even in their wins at Minnesota, at Kansas City and at Detroit. They were minus in that category in their only losses, twice against Chicago (minus-four and minus-two) and at Dallas (minus-one), but were able to defeat the Rams despite losing the turnover battle (minus-one).
- ▶ Green Bay did not have a giveaway in the victory over Carolina in Week 11, a feat the club accomplished against Minnesota, Denver and San Diego this season.
- ▶ Over a longer stretch, the team has won 30 of 31 games playing turnover-free football, since a loss at Dallas, Nov. 18, 1996. Green Bay's only loss in such games during that stretch was a 23-20 defeat at Minnesota, Oct. 23, 2005.
- ▶ Including playoffs, the Packers have won 33 of their last 34 games without a giveaway.

PROTECTION, TACKLE DUO AS STEADY AS THEY COME

Facing a formidable pass rush this week from Patrick Kerney and the Seattle defense, Green Bay will lean heavily on its stellar pass protection. Earlier this season, Favre had a streak of 152 consecutive passes without a sack, one short of his career high established in 2004.

- ▶ Behind Favre's top-notch protection are two stalwart tackles in **Chad Clifton** and **Mark Tauscher**. Both Clifton (111 career starts) and Tauscher (107) were inserted into the starting lineup as rookies in 2000.
- ▶ Favre's blind-side shield, Clifton has started 79 of 80 games since returning from a pelvic injury that ended his 2002 season after a blind-side hit from Warren Sapp. Only a bout with the flu last season in Miami (Oct. 22) could snap the streak.
- ▶ Tauscher started 14 games as a rookie in 2000, earning his first start at right tackle in Week 3, a position he has yet to relinquish. He saw his own consecutive starts streak come to an end as well in 2006 (57 games) because of a groin injury.
- ▶ The duo has provided a steady influence to their younger teammates along the line. Already this season, five different players have seen extensive time along the interior of the offensive line (**Daryn Colledge**, **Junius Coston**, **Tony Moll**, **Jason Spitz** and **Scott Wells**).
- ▶ Elite pass blockers that rarely receive the credit they deserve, Clifton and Tauscher have anchored an offensive line that has allowed just 19 sacks on the season, tied for third best in the league.
- ▶ The 2007 results shouldn't come as a total surprise. A look at the clubs who have given up the fewest regular-season sacks since Clifton and Tauscher became fixtures in the starting lineup in 2000:

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

HEADING TO HONOLULU

Represented by two selections on each side of the ball, Green Bay Packers quarterback **Brett Favre**, wide receiver **Donald Driver**, defensive end **Aaron Kampman** and cornerback **Al Harris** were named Pro Bowl selections by the National Football League.

- ▶ Three Packers players were named first alternates: linebacker **Nick Barnett**, tackle **Chad Clifton** and cornerback **Charles Woodson**.
- ▶ For Favre, this marks the ninth Pro Bowl selection of his career and first since 2003. The leading Pro Bowl vote-getter has broken some of the league's most hallowed records, including career TD passes, passing yards and wins.
- ▶ Driver earns a trip to his second consecutive and third career Pro Bowl. He tied a team record with 1,000 receiving yards in a fifth overall season, joining Sterling Sharpe and Pro Football Hall of Famer James Lofton as one of three Packers to achieve the feat.
- ▶ Kampman, in his sixth season out of Iowa, returns to Hawaii for the second consecutive year. The defensive end had his streak of consecutive starts (73) snapped in Week 17 and finished with 12 sacks.
- ▶ Harris is the only Packers player making his first trip to the Pro Bowl. In his 10th NFL season and fifth with Green Bay, he totaled 37 tackles, two interceptions and nine pass deflections.
- ▶ Other alternates include safety **Nick Collins**, tight end **Bubba Franks**, running back **Ryan Grant**, linebacker **A.J. Hawk**, wide receiver **Greg Jennings**, tight end **Donald Lee** and center **Scott Wells**.



MORE STATISTICAL ODDITIES FROM 2007

Having some fun with numbers, 0-16:

- ▶ **0:** Touchdown passes Favre threw to running backs this season. All 28 of his TDs went to receivers and tight ends for the first time in his career. In two other seasons, Favre had just one TD pass to a back, in 1998 (William Henderson) and 1993 (Edgar Bennett).
- ▶ **1:** Games **Mason Crosby** did not attempt a field goal. His only game without a three-point try was at Chicago (Dec. 23). The only other game he didn't make at least one field goal was at the N.Y. Giants (0-for-1).
- ▶ **2:** Green Bay touchdowns called back on penalties. A 23-yard TD pass to James Jones vs. Washington was nullified by a holding penalty, and Atari Bigby's 70-yard interception return for a score vs. Oakland was wiped out by an unnecessary roughness call for a block on the QB.
- ▶ **3:** Victories in domes this season. The Packers won at Minnesota's Metrodome, Detroit's Ford Field, and St. Louis' Edward Jones Dome. That brings Head Coach Mike McCarthy's dome record over two seasons to 5-0, improving the team's mark to 21-24 since 1992, Favre's first season here. The Packers can even that record at .500 next year if they can win again in Minneapolis and Detroit, and at New Orleans.
- ▶ **4:** Games Favre attempted at least 40 passes this season without throwing an interception. Favre attempted 45 passes in back-to-back games vs. San Diego and at Minnesota (Sept. 30) without a pick. He then attempted 46 vs. Minnesota (Nov. 11) and 41 at Detroit (Nov. 22), also without an interception. Favre has now done that 13 times in his career, and the 46 this season was a career-high for a single game and tied the franchise mark also held by Don Majkowski (at Detroit, Sept. 30, 1990).
- ▶ **5:** Fair-catches called by Packers punt returners, all by Woodson. Last season, Green Bay had just three (two by Woodson), giving the unit eight fair-catches while returning 101 punts over the past two seasons (7.3%). By contrast, in the three previous years combined, the Packers called 63 fair-catches while returning just 113 punts (35.8%).
- ▶ **6:** Number of starts by the season-opening offensive line of Chad Clifton, Daryn Colledge, Scott Wells, Jason Spitz and Mark Tauscher. After the season opener, this group went seven games before it was together again, starting four straight from Weeks 9 through 12, and then another four-game gap before starting the regular-season finale.

- ▶ **7:** TD drives the Packers surrendered that were 80 yards or longer. By contrast, the offense produced 12 TD drives of 80 yards or more.
- ▶ **8:** Times the opponent failed to score after reaching the red zone. The Packers thwarted eight red zone possessions by their opponents by getting five turnovers, two turnovers on downs, and one missed field goal. The Packers had just five empty red zone possessions.
- ▶ **9:** Number of times the Packers won the time-of-possession battle, an indication of how misleading this statistic can be. The Packers actually won the time-of-possession in one of their losses (vs. Chicago, Oct. 7, 30 minutes, 30 seconds) and lost it in five of their wins. Green Bay's biggest time-of-possession advantage was vs. Minnesota (Nov. 11), 40:40 to 19:20 in a 34-0 win. The largest discrepancy the other way was at St. Louis, 23:36 to 36:24 in a 33-14 win.
- ▶ **10:** Scores the Packers posted on their opening drive of the second half. Green Bay had five TDs and five FGs on its opening second-half possessions, including a streak of four straight touchdowns from Weeks 10-13. The Packers had just five scores (four TDs, one FG) on game-opening drives, for a total of 15 scores and 81 points in those situations. The opponents had nearly as many scores (13) but not nearly as many points (55), posting eight scores (three TD, five FG) to open the second half and five (one TD, four FG) to open the game.
- ▶ **11:** Number of 100-yard performances by running backs and receivers on the season, led by Ryan Grant's five top rushing outings of 104 yards at Denver, 119 vs. Minnesota (Nov. 11), 101 at Detroit (Nov. 22), 156 vs. Oakland, and 100 at Chicago (Dec. 23). With two apiece were receivers Donald Driver, who had 126 yards vs. San Diego and 147 at Detroit (Nov. 22), and Greg Jennings with 141 at Denver and 100 vs. Oakland). Adding one each were receiver James Jones, with 107 yards at Denver, and running back Brandon Jackson, with 113 vs. Detroit (Dec. 30).
- ▶ **12:** TD catches by Jennings, the highest by a Packers player in three years and accomplished in just 13 games. Jennings missed the first two games of the season with a hamstring injury and then sat out the regular-season finale as a precaution with an ankle injury. He had a pair of two-TD games and found the end zone in 10 of the 13 games in which he played. Javon Walker also had 12 TD receptions in 2004 for Green Bay, and those are the only double-digit TD seasons by Packers wide receivers since Antonio Freeman posted 14 in 1998.
- ▶ **13:** If you count the 11:30 a.m. CT start on Thanksgiving Day, the number of "noon" kickoffs for the Packers this season. The Packers went 12-1 in those games and were 1-2 in prime time. Interestingly, the Packers have not played a late afternoon game all season, but will do so to open the playoffs on Jan. 12, at 3:30 p.m. CT.
- ▶ **14:** Number of coaches' replay challenges called in Green Bay's games, by both teams combined. McCarthy was 4-for-9 in getting calls overturned, the most notable being a 36-yard pass by Kansas City initially ruled complete, but replays showed the receiver stepped out of bounds; and an Oakland fumble on a punt return that was at first ruled down by contact, but replay reversed it, and the fumble was recovered by the Packers for a touchdown. Opposing coaches were 0-for-5 on challenges, and there were four booth reviews, all upholding the call on the field.
- ▶ **15:** Number of Ruvell Martin's pass receptions, out of 16, that resulted in a first down (or a touchdown). Martin's only catch that did not pick up a first down came vs. Minnesota (Nov. 11), a 7-yard reception on first-and-10 during a two-minute drive at the end of the first half. That was the game Martin posted season-highs in receptions (four), yards (57) and touchdowns (two).
- ▶ **16:** Games the Green Bay defense held opponents to less than 50 percent conversions on third downs. Not once this season did the Packers allow the other team to reach 50 percent in a game. Three teams — Philadelphia (8-for-18), San Diego (5-for-11) and Dallas (4-for-9) came within one conversion of hitting or beating 50 percent. For the season, the Packers allowed opponents to convert just 69 of 209 third downs, for 33 percent, third-best in the NFL.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

'FAB 5' A NIGHTMARE MATCHUP

At home against Minnesota, Green Bay unveiled its 'Big 5' formation with receivers **Donald Driver**, **Greg Jennings**, **James Jones**, **Ruvell Martin** and **Koren Robinson** all split out wide.

- Highlighted by each receiver's ability to run after the catch and their quarterback's quick release, the formation aims to take advantage of whichever favorable matchup the defense may present. The formation isn't dependent upon a certain down or distance, as it has been utilized in nearly every possible situation.
- The offense also displays a variation of the formation, with tight end **Donald Lee** split wide and Favre again with an empty backfield.
- "It's mismatches versus time (to throw) is what we're playing against," Favre said when asked about the formation. "If I was a defensive coordinator, I don't know who you stop or who you go in saying, OK, this is what we (have to prepare for) ... And for us that's a good thing. We have enough diversity to present its own set of problems."
- "It's important because our game is about match-ups," McCarthy said. "To me that's one of the most important aspects of game-planning. When you get to this point in the season you're looking at the injuries and different packages. Being able to take advantage of that is even more important. I think it's more evident when you watch the way that defenses react to four wide receivers or five wide receivers. There's a lot of respect and cautiousness in the way defenses approach it. I'm sure there will be a time when people challenge us (with) those particular sets, but it's definitely a weapon for us."



FAVRE AS PRECISE AS EVER

Quarterback **Brett Favre** surpassed some of the NFL's greatest milestones so far this season, but not lost on the rest of the league is just how well he has been playing in his 17th season.

- For the first time in his career, Favre threw for 300 yards-or-more in three consecutive games (Weeks 3-5). What's more, he's done it twice this season, completing three straight 300-yard games in Weeks 8-10.
- The 1,042 passing yards Favre had in Weeks 8-10 are the most passing yards over a three-game stretch in his 17-year career.
- Under **Mike McCarthy**, his position coach in 1999, Favre has cut down dramatically on his interceptions. With 15 on the season, he recorded his lowest total since 2001, when he had 15 as well.
- Much of the Packers' offensive success can be traced to Favre's precision passing. Between a second-quarter interception against the Giants (Week 2) and a third-quarter interception against the Bears (Week 5), Favre had attempted 142 consecutive passes without an interception – the third-longest streak of his career. During the interception-free streak, he threw nine touchdown passes.
- Favre completed another long interception-free streak of 139 passes, beginning with an interception just before the half in Kansas City (Week 9) and ending in the first quarter at Dallas (Week 13). He threw eight TD passes over the course of this latest streak.

WOODSON AGAIN AMONG THE GAME'S ELITE

Cornerback **Charles Woodson**, who has seen a resurgence to his Pro Bowl level since arriving in Green Bay, had another standout season for the Packers. While battling through a toe injury, the 10-year pro had four interceptions and two defensive touchdowns on the season.

- When he signed as a free agent prior to the '06 season, many around the league thought Woodson's days as an elite corner were over. Already, his three defensive touchdowns in Green and Gold surpass his total (two) in eight seasons as a Raider. What's more, the former Heisman Trophy winner has 12 interceptions in 30 games with Green Bay. He had 17 interceptions in 106 games with Oakland.
- Despite the fact he is a four-time Pro Bowler, Woodson won just the first Defensive Player of the Week honor of his career for his performance in Week 6 against Washington. He picked off a Jason Campbell pass and also returned a fumble 57 yards for the go-ahead touchdown.
- Historically, Woodson is only the fourth Packers player since 1940 with a fumble recovery for a TD and an interception in the same game. The other three Green Bay Packers to do that were Charley Brock (10/4/1942, at CHI), Tom Brown (11/17/1968, vs. NO) and Ahmad Carroll (11/29/2004, vs. StL).

JONES STEPS UP IN ROOKIE SEASON

Rookie wideout **James Jones**, a virtual unknown when he was drafted by the Packers in the third round of the 2007 NFL Draft, made an immediate impact in his debut season with the Packers.

- Much like **Greg Jennings** a year ago, Jones shined through spring mini-camps and training camp, as coaches and players alike praised his ability to catch the ball away from his body.
- Favre could not help but compare the San Jose State product to another physical receiver he had worked with – Sterling Sharpe.
- Jones burst onto the scene in the preseason, tying for the league lead in receptions (21) and finishing third in yardage (233).
- He finished third among NFL rookies in receptions and receiving yards.

PLAYOFF CAPTAINS

The Packers were one of a few teams this season to have alternating game captains but have elected playoff captains for the postseason.

- Representing the offense will be Favre and Driver. This marks Favre's 11th postseason appearance, while Driver is playing in the postseason for the fifth time.
- For the defense, Kampman and **Nick Barnett** will serve as captains. This will be Kampman's fourth trip to the postseason and Barnett's third.
- Special teams elected **Rob Davis** and **Tracy White**. Davis, the team's long-snapper and oldest player, makes his seventh postseason appearance. White, who played two seasons in Seattle, makes his first.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

TOUGHEST ROAD VENUES? NO PROBLEM

Earlier this season, the league's youngest club proved its ability in hostile environments, even coming off short rest.

- In the span of six days, the Packers went into two of the NFL's most hostile stadiums – Denver's INVESCO Field and Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium – and came away with victories. Entering play this season, Kansas City (No. 1) and Denver (No. 2) owned the league's best home records since 1990. Green Bay, with its Lambeau Field advantage, owned the fourth-best winning percentage in that period.
- What's more, Green Bay faced a rested Kansas City club coming off a bye week, while the Packers had an abbreviated week thanks to the Monday night showdown in Denver.
- "I think our players realize, young and old, that (K.C.) was a tough game going into and a tough place to play," McCarthy said following the victory over the Chiefs. "This group works hard, stays focused. I tell them every day: smart, tough, fundamentally sound. They're in tune with that. That's the way we grade them every day. You make smart decisions, you play tough and you're fundamentally sound. We try to keep it as simple as possible."
- The Packers completed a sweep of the AFC West and have now won six straight and nine of their last 11 against the division, dating back to a 1996 victory over Denver.

442 TD PASSES AND COUNTING...

After a moment now etched in NFL history, Brett Favre stands alone atop the all-time touchdown passes list.

- James Jones became the 43rd different Packers player on the receiving end of a Favre touchdown pass. The start of the record, touchdown pass No. 1, began with **Sterling Sharpe's** grab in the fourth quarter against the Bengals on Sept. 20, 1992.
- Favre's two fourth-quarter touchdown throws in that game not only sealed the come-from-behind, 24-23 victory, but also earned him the start the following week, a job he hasn't relinquished since.
- In a three-touchdown performance at New England on Oct. 13, 2002, Favre became just the fourth NFL player to throw for 300 touchdowns. On his final TD pass of the day, a 2-yard toss to tight end **Bubba Franks**, Favre surpassed John Elway to move into third place on the all-time list.
- He moved into second place on the list in one of the most memorable performances of his career – and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – when he threw four touchdown passes in the first half against Oakland just one day after the sudden death of his father, Irvin. Favre's second touchdown pass of the night, a 23-yard strike to Javon Walker, pushed him past Fran Tarkenton on the league's all-time list with 343 career TD passes.
- A first-quarter strike to **Greg Jennings** made NFL history at Minnesota in Week 4. The game was stopped briefly, and a videotaped message from Dan Marino was played on the Metrodome's scoreboard.

A CHRONOLOGY OF THE RECORD

Eight players – all members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame – have held the NFL career touchdown pass record throughout the history of the league. Thanks to research provided by Elias Sports Bureau, the one-time record holders were:

- **Benny Friedman** had 66 career TD passes and held the record from 1930 until 1943.
- **Arnie Herber**, a former Green Bay signal caller, reached 66 touchdown passes in 1940 and shared the record with Friedman until 1943.
- **Sammy Baugh** passed Friedman and Herber in 1943 and threw 187 career touchdowns. He held the record until 1962.
- **Bobby Layne** tied Baugh in 1961 and passed him during the 1962 season. Layne finished with 196 touchdown passes and held the record until 1963.
- **Y.A. Tittle** passed Layne in 1963 and finished his career with 212 touchdown passes. Tittle held the record until 1966.
- **Johnny Unitas** passed Tittle in 1966 and ended his playing days with 290 TD passes. He held the record until 1975.
- **Fran Tarkenton** surpassed Unitas in 1975 and became the first NFL player with 300 career TD passes. He finished with 342 touchdown passes and held the record until 1995.
- **Dan Marino** passed Tarkenton on Nov. 26, 1995, at Indianapolis with a second-quarter touchdown pass and finished his career with 420 touchdown passes. He held the record until surpassed by Brett Favre in 2007.



PACKERS ONCE AGAIN LEAGUE'S YOUNGEST TEAM

Green Bay has the distinction of being the NFL's youngest team for the second straight season.

- Since taking over general manager duties in 2005, Ted Thompson has vowed to build the team's foundation through the draft. Of the 53 active roster players, 18 have been drafted by Thompson.
- Each team's average age is based upon its opening-day roster. A look at the five youngest teams in 2007:

MCCARTHY NOW A HALL-OF-FAMER

- There on Oct. 20, McCarthy was inducted into Baker University's Athletic Hall of Fame, where he was an all-conference tight end and senior captain in 1986. That season, the team made a run all the way to the NAIA title game.
- McCarthy became the 103rd member of Baker's Hall of Fame, which was founded in 1977. Baker, the oldest university in Kansas, is celebrating its 150th anniversary in 2007-08.
- McCarthy has been taking home some hardware for his performance with the Packers as well. He was honored as Motorola NFL Coach of the Week honors after a Week 10 shutout victory over the Minnesota Vikings. It was the second such honor of the season for McCarthy, who is certainly among the top candidates for NFL Coach of the Year honors.

FAVRE'S MOST IMPRESSIVE STAT?

Not to be overlooked as he breaks nearly every career passing record is just how durable Favre has been since being inserted into the starting line-up. Despite playing one of the most susceptible positions in the game, Favre has answered the bell time after time for the Packers.

- ▶ 64 QBs started a game this season, the most ever in one NFL season (note: 87 started in the 1987 season due to replacement players).
- ▶ According to Elias Sports Bureau, 212 other quarterbacks have started an NFL game since Favre launched his starting streak on Sept. 27, 1992.
- ▶ He has played in 255 straight games (275 including playoffs) and his 253 starts in a row (273 including playoffs) is the NFL record for QBs.
- ▶ Consecutive start No. 250 looked to be in doubt during the Dallas game, as Favre left in the second quarter with elbow and shoulder injuries. However, Favre earned the start against Oakland, the seventh time in his career he started a game after being unable to finish the previous one. He has appeared on the injury report exactly 50 times during the streak.
- ▶ Only Minnesota's Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more regular-season games in consecutive fashion.

MILESTONES COME ON THE ROAD FOR FAVRE

Brett Favre achieved yet another of the league's most coveted milestones away from Lambeau Field in a Green Bay road victory. Taking a look back at some of Favre's milestone touchdown passes throughout his career, all have a common theme – they came in road victories.


- ▶ Only touchdown pass No. 100 came in front of the home crowd at Lambeau Field, though it still came in a winning effort.
- ▶ Touchdown pass No. 301 pushed Favre ahead of John Elway (300) to third on the league's all-time touchdown passes list.
- ▶ No. 343 – coming in one of the most memorable performances of his career and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – placed Favre No. 2 on the all-time list, surpassing Fran Tarkenton.

FAVRE NAMED 2007 SPORTS ILLUSTRATED SPORTSMAN OF THE YEAR

The accolades are already beginning to pour in for the NFL's winningest quarterback. Favre, who became the NFL's all-time leader in touchdown passes earlier this season, was chosen as the 2007 Sports Illustrated Sportsman of the Year on Dec. 3.

- ▶ The issue, dated Dec. 10, quickly sold out around the country. Also, Favre received the Sportsman of the Year award, a sterling silver trophy crafted by Tiffany & Co..
- ▶ It seems to be just the beginning for Favre, who led all NFL players in Pro Bowl voting. The league's only three-time MVP has enjoyed a renaissance year, enjoying as good a year statistically as he has ever had.
- ▶ Favre is the fourth NFL player to be named Sportsman: Terry Bradshaw (1979, with Willie Stargell), Joe Montana (1990) and Tom Brady (2005) were the others. Favre is the first Green Bay Packer to earn the honor.





PACKERS TEAM NOTES

LOTS OF YOUTH IN THE BACKFIELD

Green Bay became the first NFL team to open the regular season with two rookie starters in the backfield since 1996. That season, both St. Louis (Derrick Harris and Lawrence Phillips) and Miami (Stanley Pritchett and Abdul-Karim al-Jabbar) used an all-rookie backfield on opening day.

- ▶ Rookie running back **Brandon Jackson**, a second-round pick from Nebraska, became the first rookie to start at running back on opening day for the Packers since John Brockington in 1971.
- ▶ Fullback **Korey Hall** was the first Packers rookie to start on opening day at fullback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.
- ▶ It's not like they've gotten a whole lot older in the backfield since opening day. Second-year pro **John Kuhn** got a start at fullback in Week 17 when Hall went down with a hip injury, and since Jackson started the first three games of the season, two other running backs have gotten the starting nod: rookie **DeShawn Wynn** (four games) and first-year player **Ryan Grant** (seven games).

NO ONE WINS MORE THAN NO. 4

In what has been a record-breaking year for Favre thus far, certainly one of the most meaningful accomplishments, both from a team and individual standpoint, came early. With his 149th win in Week 2, Favre surpassed John Elway on the all-time quarterback wins list. After the third 13-win season of his career, Favre now has 160 career wins.

- ▶ Simply put, Favre was spectacular in the record-breaking victory over the New York Giants. He completed 29-of-38 passes for 286 yards and three touchdowns and earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors.
- ▶ "We gave him the game ball after the game," McCarthy said after the win. "The 'all-time' in anything in this league is such a monumental achievement. 149 victories - I think that speaks for itself. When you go out and win over that long of a period of time, I think that's the ultimate compliment a quarterback can have. To me, if you asked me what is the biggest record that he will achieve, I think he just accomplished it."

QUITE THE DEBUT FOR CROSBY

According to Elias Sports Bureau, rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** on Sept. 9 became the first player in NFL history to kick a 50-plus yard field goal and a game-winning field goal in the final minute of his first NFL game.

- ▶ What a whirlwind couple of days it had been for Crosby. First, he found out on Sept. 1 that he had won the kicking job after what had been perhaps the most intense training camp battle against incumbent Dave Rayner. Two days later, he celebrated his 23rd birthday, and just days after was lining up for his professional debut against the Eagles.
- ▶ Crosby was 3-for-3 on field goals in his NFL debut. He hit a 53-yarder, one yard shy of the team record, in the first quarter, a 37-yarder in the third quarter, and a 42-yarder with 2 seconds left to break a 13-all tie and give the Packers the three-point win. He was later awarded NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his efforts.

'KGB' GIVES BACK WITH EACH SACK

Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila**, who earlier this season surpassed Hall of Famer Reggie White on the franchise's all-time career sack list, saw a return to form this season with 9½ sacks.

- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** made a drastic move with Gbaja-Biamila in the final four games of 2006, replacing him in the starting lineup with end **Cullen Jenkins** and bringing in Gbaja-Biamila on passing downs.
- ▶ The move seems to have paid off for the Packers and 'KGB'. The eighth-year pro, who only registered six sacks in 2006, was back among the league leaders in 2007.
- ▶ This season, many more were cheering on 'KGB' with each sack for what it will mean towards the greater Green Bay community.
- ▶ More than \$10,000 goes to Freedom House, a Green Bay homeless shel-

ter, with each KGB sack. The pledge for each sack comes from Gbaja-Biamila, teammates **Ryan Pickett** and **Bubba Franks**, and local donors.

- ▶ One of the decade's most-feared pass rushers, Gbaja-Biamila will look to add to his career playoff total of one sack.

PACKERS SEEM TO MAKE HISTORY ON MONDAY NIGHT

In Denver, Green Bay won its first overtime game on the road since Dec. 12, 1983, at Tampa Bay, also a game on *Monday Night Football*. Jan Stenerud's 23-yard field goal sealed the 12-9 Packers win in Howard Cosell's final broadcast.

- ▶ Also in the game, **James Jones** and **Greg Jennings** became the first Packers' duo to record 100 yards receiving each since Donald Driver and Javon Walker on Oct. 11, 2004 vs. Tennessee, also a game on *MNF*.
- ▶ Favre's 82-yard strike to Jennings tied for the second-longest TD pass to end an overtime in NFL history. The longest was the 99-yard play from Philadelphia's Ron Jaworski to Mike Quick on Nov. 10, 1985, vs. Atlanta. - ▶ Jones' 79-yard touchdown catch in the first quarter was the team's longest touchdown reception by a Packers rookie since Max McGee's 82-yard reception in the 1954 season.

CLOSING IN ON MARINO...AGAIN

Favre threw for three touchdowns in Week 12, the 63rd game of his career with at least three TD passes.

- ▶ With the effort, Favre surpassed Dan Marino's (62) NFL record.
- ▶ He is also chasing Marino in 300-yard passing games. Favre had seven this season, tying his own record of seven established in 1995.

- ▶ Vince Lombardi and Mike Sherman had previously topped the list, as both went 15-10 to open their coaching careers in Green Bay. Mike Holmgren went 14-11 through his first 25.
- ▶ According to Elias, McCarthy tied Joe Gibbs for the best career start of any active head coach over 25 games.
- ▶ "My focus is on winning the world's championship," McCarthy said when asked about the accomplishment. "That will always be the focus regardless of how many games it takes to get there through the regular season and so forth. Because when you win championships, everything else takes care of itself."

MARK H. MURPHY NAMED GREEN BAY PACKERS PRESIDENT AND CEO

MURPHY ELECTED TO SUCCEED HARLAN

Mark H. Murphy, possessor of extensive experience in professional football and sports administration, has been elected as the Green Bay Packers' President and CEO, the organization announced Dec. 3.

► The Packers Board of Directors approved Murphy as the franchise's 10th Chief Executive Officer in a unanimous vote at Lambeau Field. Packers Chairman of the Board **Bob Harlan** will continue to lead the organization through the 2007 football campaign, including any postseason games. Prior to that, the transition formally will begin Jan. 1, 2008, with Murphy assuming the title of President and CEO-elect.

► "The Green Bay Packers are very pleased to name Mark Murphy as our President and CEO," Harlan said. "He has an excellent background and record of success in the business of athletics, and through his NFL playing career brings a great understanding of our game to his position. He'll be an outstanding leader for our franchise and a great addition to our community. We're delighted to have Mark join us."

► "I am honored to have been selected and very appreciative of this tremendous opportunity," Murphy said. "The Packers are one of the great franchises in all of professional sports, with a rich history and incredible fan support. These are successful times for the Packers. On the field they're performing well, and off the field, they're in great shape, too. I look forward to being a part of that continued success."

► Murphy, who holds a law degree and an M.B.A. in finance, brings a unique and highly qualified background to his role as head of one of the NFL's flagship franchises, first drawing from a deep understanding and appreciation of the game that comes from an eight-year playing career with the Washington Redskins. Later, he served a combined 16 years as director of athletics at Colgate University and Northwestern University, as well as positions as an assistant executive director of the NFL Players Association and a trial attorney with the U.S. Department of Justice.

► In addition to his playing career and work with the NFL Players Association, Murphy has maintained his ties to the NFL through his work on the Commissioner's Player Advisory Committee (1994-2002) as well as the NFL Youth Football Committee (2002-present).

► "Mark brings an important blend of experiences to the job, so many of which touch on issues that we will be dealing with in the future," said NFL Commissioner **Roger Goodell**. "Based on eight seasons with the Redskins, Mark has a deep respect for the history of the league, its players and coaches. He understands the impact of a franchise on its community and the importance of players and coaches meshing with their local fan bases."

► The 52-year-old Murphy joins the Packers after four and a half years as director of athletics at Northwestern University. At the Big Ten Conference university, Murphy oversaw a 19-sport program with a \$40-million budget and 160 full-time employees. The school enjoyed eight individual national championships and three NCAA team titles. Additionally, the university won nine conference team championships and 34 individual Big Ten titles. A total of 49 Wildcats have earned first-team All-America distinction. On the football field, the Wildcats have participated in two bowl games during Murphy's tenure after playing in just four previous such contests in the program's history. In 2006-07, Northwestern finished 30th in the U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup standings with a school-best 626.5 points. The Wildcats have ranked among the top 30 in the standings for the past three seasons and last year finished sixth among Big Ten schools for the third straight year after previously not placing higher than ninth.



► The school's athletic success under Murphy was achieved while its student-athletes continued to excel off the field. The most recent NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) data released in October 2007 reported Northwestern's rate at 98 percent, tying it with Notre Dame and Navy for tops in the nation.

► Prior to his tenure at Northwestern, Murphy served as director of athletics at Colgate University in Hamilton, N.Y. (1992-2003), the school from which he graduated in 1977. During his 11 years at the helm, the university experienced a renaissance of its football program, going from 0-11 in 1995 to three consecutive appearances in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs. In 2003, the year after Murphy's departure to Northwestern, the team made it to the championship game; the achievement of that squad - a non-scholarship program - remains one of Murphy's proudest moments.

► A former All-Pro safety for the Washington Redskins, Murphy enjoyed an eight-year (1977-84) career after originally signing with the team as a non-drafted free agent in 1977. He was a co-captain from 1980-84, a period that included two Super Bowl teams (1982-83). He enjoyed his finest season in 1983, leading the NFL with nine interceptions and earning consensus All-Pro honors as well as a trip to the Pro Bowl. Murphy was named as one of the Redskins' "70 Greatest Players" and also is a member of the club's "50th Anniversary Team."

► During his days as a Redskin, Murphy earned an M.B.A. in finance from American University in Washington, D.C., attending classes full-time in the offseason and evening classes in-season. Upon completion of his playing career in 1985 he joined the NFL Players Association as assistant executive director. While with the NFLPA, Murphy served on the bargaining team, developed the agent certification system and strengthened the PA's degree completion and career counseling programs.

► While with the NFLPA, he started work on a law degree from Georgetown University and ultimately finished his studies full-time after leaving the Players Association. Upon receiving his law degree in 1988, he worked for a year at a Washington law firm before becoming a trial attorney with the U.S. Department of Justice in 1989.

► During a four-year career with the Department of Justice, he primarily represented government agencies in trials. Then, in 1992, his alma mater called and he returned to the sports realm.

► Born July 13, 1955, in Fulton, N.Y., Murphy was a three-sport star (football, baseball and basketball) at Clarence Central High School in the Buffalo-area community of Williamsville, and was named the best all-around athlete in western New York during his senior year. His baseball talents drew attention from Major League scouts. In 2002, he was inducted into the Greater Buffalo Sports Hall of Fame in recognition of his achievements both on and off the field.

► Murphy and his wife, Laurie, who also is a Colgate graduate, have been involved in the communities in which they've lived. Over the years the couple has donated their time to numerous organizations, including local schools, the United Methodist Church in Hamilton, N.Y., and the First Congregational Church of Evanston, Ill. While at Colgate University, Murphy formed the Hamilton Youth Basketball League and served as its commissioner. Heavily involved in the community while with the Redskins, Murphy was named the team's "Miller Man of the Year" in 1984 in honor of his work off the field.

► The couple has four children: Katie, 24, a graduate of Harvard who played basketball for the Crimson; Emily, 22, a senior at Middlebury (Vt.) College; Brian, 18, a freshman at Amherst (Mass.) College; and Anna, 17.

- ▶ Led the Packers in tackles for the fourth time in his five seasons. Ties Brian Noble (4) and Bernardo Harris (4) for the franchise lead for most seasons leading the team in tackles (stat began in 1975).
- ▶ His 3½ sacks on the season were a career high.

20 ATARI BIGBY

- ▶ His 121 tackles were the most by any Packers defensive back since safety Mark Murphy recorded 128 tackles in 1990.
- ▶ Led the team in interceptions (five) and passes defended (13) and tied for the lead with three forced fumbles.

2 MASON CROSBY

- ▶ With 141 points, became the seventh rookie in NFL history to lead the league in scoring and first since Kevin Butler in 1985.
- ▶ Surpassed Ryan Longwell's franchise record of points in a season by a kicker (131, 2000) and placed third behind Paul Hornung (176, 1960; 146, 1961) on the team's single-season scoring list.
- ▶ Established a franchise record for points in a season by a rookie and joined Chester Marcol (1972), Chris Jacke (1989) and Longwell (1997) as the only kickers in Packers history to score more than 100 points as a rookie.

60 ROB DAVIS

- ▶ With 84 games played at Lambeau, needs another 10 to surpass No. 2 William Henderson (93) on the stadium's all-time games played list.
- ▶ Having played in 167 consecutive games in a Packers uniform, stands at No. 3 on the team's all-time list.
- ▶ Tied with No. 7 Ed West on the team's all-time list of overall games played (167 games).



80 DONALD DRIVER

- ▶ Became the third player in team annals to reach 500 career receptions, joining Sterling Sharpe (595) and James Lofton (530). Driver has 503.
- ▶ Has a reception in 95 consecutive games, the franchise's second-longest streak behind Sharpe's 103 (1988-94).
- ▶ Tied a franchise record with 1,000 receiving yards in a fifth overall season. Lofton and Sharpe also have five 1,000-yard campaigns.
- ▶ This season became one of four players in team annals to produce as many as six seasons with 50 receptions, joining Lofton and Sharpe (both seven) and Antonio Freeman (six).
- ▶ Also became only the second Packers player with four 80-catch seasons, joining Sharpe (four).
- ▶ Became only the seventh player in Packers history to reach 6,000 career yards, joining James Lofton (9,656), Sterling Sharpe (8,134), Don Hutson (7,991), Boyd Dowler (6,918), Antonio Freeman (6,651) and Max McGee (6,346). Driver (6,977) stands at No. 4 in team history.
- ▶ Became Lambeau Field's all-time leader in receptions, surpassing Antonio Freeman (213) in Week 3. Driver now has 240 receptions at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Stands 54 Lambeau Field receiving yards from surpassing No. 2 James Lofton (3,330) and 201 from becoming the stadium's all-time leader ahead of Antonio Freeman (3,477). Driver (3,277) is No. 3.
- ▶ His 36 career TD receptions from Brett Favre stands at No. 3 on the

team's list of touchdown combinations. The duo needs six more TDs to surpass the No. 2 combination of Favre and Sterling Sharpe (41).

- ▶ Needs one 100-yard receiving game to match No. 5 Boyd Dowler (19), two to reach No. 4 Antonio Freeman (20) and six to equal No. 3 Don Hutson (24) on the team's all-time list. Driver has 18 career 100-yard receiving games.
- ▶ Needs two TD receptions to become only the eighth player in franchise annals to reach 40 career, joining Don Hutson (99), Sterling Sharpe (65), Antonio Freeman (57), Max McGee (50), James Lofton (49), Billy Howton (43) and Boyd Dowler (40). Driver has 38.

4 BRETT FAVRE

- ▶ Has played in 255 straight games (275 including playoffs) and started 253 in a row (273 including playoffs), the NFL's record among quarterbacks and the second-longest recorded streak in NFL history. Only Minnesota's Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more games in consecutive fashion.
- ▶ Surpassed Dan Marino's NFL record of 420 touchdown passes against Minnesota in Week 4. Favre now has 444 career TD passes.
- ▶ Surpassed Marino's NFL record for attempts (8,358) against Minnesota. Favre has 8,758.
- ▶ Surpassed Marino's record of 61,361 career passing yards. Favre has 61,655 career yards.
- ▶ Surpassed John Elway's NFL record for wins by a quarterback (148) with his 149th victory against the Giants in Week 2. Favre has 160 career wins.
- ▶ Threw his 200th TD pass at Lambeau Field in Week 10 to extend the league's single-stadium record. He now has 209.

- ▶ Threw for three touchdowns in Week 12, the 63rd game of his career with at least three TD passes, surpassing Dan Marino's (62) NFL record.
- ▶ Established a new team record against Detroit in

Week 12 by completing 20 consecutive passes.

- ▶ Has 40 career game-winning comebacks (fourth quarter deficit or tie), including four this season.
- ▶ Has 55 career 300-yard passing games, including seven this season, tying his own record of seven 300-yard passing games in 1995.
- ▶ Extended two of his own NFL records with at least 3,000 passing yards for a 16th consecutive season and 16th overall season.
- ▶ Surpassed the 4,000 yards passing mark for the fifth time in his career.

Favre also:

- ▶ By playing a 16th season in a Packers uniform, surpassed Ray Nitschke (1958-72) and tied Bart Starr (1956-71) for most in Packers history.
- ▶ Surpassed 30,000 road passing yards at Denver. Favre has an NFL record 31,462 road passing yards.
- ▶ Needs 4 scoring drives for 1,000.

88 BUBBA FRANKS

- ▶ Stands tied with No. 10 Robert Brooks (32) on the team's all-time touchdown receptions list.
- ▶ Needs six starts for 100 career. Franks has 94.

- Needs to return one interception for a touchdown to tie No. 5 Charley Brock, Doug Hart and Ken Ellis (all with three) on Green Bay's all-time career list. With a second TD on an interception, would match No. 4 Johnny (Blood) McNally, who returned four. Harris has two.

85 GREG JENNINGS

- His streak of five consecutive games with a touchdown catch (Weeks 11-15) was the longest streak since Antonio Freeman's five-game streak in 1998-99.
- Surpassed 1,000 career receiving yards on the 82-yard, game-winning touchdown catch vs. Denver in Week 8. Jennings has 1,552.

- Set career highs in receptions (48), receiving yards (575) and touchdown recpetions (6).

12 AARON RODGERS

- Could become the first quarterback other than Brett Favre to start a Packers game since Don Majkowski, Sept. 20, 1992.

9 JON RYAN

- Needs 6 punts to reach 150 and qualify for the Packers' all-time lead in gross punting average. Ryan averaged 44.5 yards on 84 punts in his first Packers season, 2006, and 44.4 yards on 60 punts this season. The franchise leader is Craig Hentrich, who averaged 42.8 yards on 289 punts from 1994-97.

65 MARK TAUSCHER

- Started his 100th career game in Week 10. He enters with 109 career games and 107 starts.

21 CHARLES WOODSON

- Needs one interception for 30 career.
- Needs to return one interception for a touchdown to tie No. 5 Brock, Hart and Ellis (all with three) on Green Bay's all-time career list. With a second TD on an interception, would match No. 4 Johnny (Blood) McNally, who returned four. Woodson has two.
- With three defensive touchdowns as a member of the Packers (two interceptions, one fumble return), needs one defensive score to tie No. 5 Johnny (Blood) McNally, Charley Brock and Keith McKenzie on the team's all-time list.
