PACKERS vs. BEARS – THE RIVALRY CONTINUES

The NFL's most storied rivalry enjoys its 174th installment Sunday night at historic Lambeau Field. It is the 248th consecutive sellout at the league's longest-tenured stadium.

- The Packers enter the contest at 4-0, their best start since 1998, while the Bears come into the game at 1-3.
- Last Sunday's win at Minnesota was highlighted by one of the greatest records in professional football history as **Brett Favre** surpassed Dan Marino's NFL record for career touchdown passes. Favre hit Greg Jennings on a 16-yard slant with 4:56 remaining in the first quarter for his 421st career touchdown pass, breaking one of the league's most hallowed records. Earlier this season, Favre surpassed John Elway to become the winningest quarterback (now 151 wins) in NFL history.
- Only defending Super Bowl champion Indianapolis (nine) enters play this weekend with a longer winning streak than Green Bay (eight).
- Green Bay has gotten off to a 4-0 start for the ninth time in team history. Seven of those Packers teams went on to win an NFL championship (1929, '30, '31, '44, '62, '65, and 1966).



GREEN BAY MAKES NATIONAL TV DEBUT

The Packers play in front of a national audience in a Sunday night contest on NBC. Play-by-play man **Al Michaels** joins color analyst **John Madden** in the broadcast booth with **Andrea Kremer** serving as the sideline reporter. The Packers and Bears met in Week 17 on NBC last season.

- Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The network covers 47 markets in six states.
- For out-of-town listeners, the broadcast is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on www.packers.com as well as on Sirius Satellite Radio as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.
- Westwood One will air the game across the country. **Dave Sims** (play-by-play) and **Bob Trumpy** (analyst) will call the action.

NOT SINCE '96 HAS FAVRE PLAYED LIKE THIS

For the third straight week, quarterback **Brett Favre** compiled a passer rating over 100.0, something he has not done since the 1996 season.

- In fact, this is only the fifth time in his career that Favre has recorded three straight games with a passer rating over 100.0. He did it twice in 1995 (Nov. 12 – Dec. 3, 4 games; Dec. 16 – Jan. 6, 4 games) and twice again in 1996 (Sept. 1 – Sept. 15, 3 games; Dec. 22 – Sept. 1, 1997, 5 games). Favre was voted the league's MVP in both seasons.
- The last time he accomplished the feat, Favre had five straight games with a passer rating over 100.0 during the team's Super Bowl XXXI run. The streak began with the final regular-season game against Minnesota (Dec. 22, 1996) and culminated in the first regular-season game the following season (vs. Chicago, Sept. 1). It included three playoff victories, most notably a 35-21 victory over New England in the Super Bowl.
- Elias Sports Bureau, the NFL's official statistician for half a century, never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game

basis, but rather to measure the effectiveness of a quarterback over an entire season, or an entire career.

- Nonetheless, in games when Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 76-7 (.916).
- The Packers are a perfect 41-0 (1.000) at Lambeau Field when Favre hits the century mark. With a win at the Metrodome this past Sunday, the team improved to 35-7 (.829) on the road when Favre eclipses the century mark.
- In the last three games (vs. NYG, SD, MIN), he has completed 89-of-128 attempts (69.5%) for 999 yards and eight touchdowns. His lone interception in those three games came in the second quarter against the Giants. He since has attempted 119 passes without an interception, 8 of which have gone for touchdowns.
- According to Elias Sports Bureau, Favre's current streak of 119 passes without an interception is the fifth-longest of his career.

THIS WEEK AT LAMBEAU

THE IMPORTANCE OF A QUICK START

There's no secret that early success increases an NFL team's chance to earn a playoff berth.

- Maintaining the confidence and momentum built during the four-game win streak to close 2006 has been a major focus of the offseason program for Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** and his team.
- One of McCarthy's early goals this season – getting off to a quick start – has been accomplished with the 4-0 start.
- Slow starts have plagued the Packers the past three seasons, only one of which resulted in a postseason appearance (2004). That season, the team started 1-4 but won nine of its last 11 games.
- In 2005, injuries contributed to a 1-7 start while a 1-4 start in 2006 proved too much to overcome.
- A look at how important fast starts have become to eventual playoff success in the NFL, compiled from 1990-2006:

MILESTONES COME ON THE ROAD FOR FAVRE

Brett Favre had one of the league's most coveted milestones in his sights this past weekend and again made history away from Lambeau. Taking a look back at some of Favre's milestone touchdown passes throughout his career, all have a common theme – they came in road victories.

- Only touchdown pass No. 100 came in front of the home crowd at Lambeau Field, though it still came in a winning effort.
- Touchdown pass No. 301 pushed Favre ahead of John Elway (300) to third on the league's all-time touchdown passes list.
- No. 343 – coming in one of the most memorable performances of his career and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – placed Favre No. 2 on the all-time list, surpassing Fran Tarkenton.

HEATING UP IN THE RED ZONE

In addition to the importance of a quick start, McCarthy stressed red-zone efficiency this past offseason.

- The team spent a large portion of its minicamp and OTAs working on increasing the production near the end zone, and, quite frankly, it was needed. In 2006, the team finished last (16) in the NFC and second-to-last (31) in the NFL in red-zone offense. Last season, the Packers scored TDs on 32.7% of possessions in the red zone.
- So far this season, the team is 10th in the league (fifth in the NFC) in red-zone efficiency. In 13 possessions, the Packers have scored eight touchdowns (61.5%).
- On defense, the Packers have allowed touchdowns on only four of nine possessions in the red zone (44.4%), which is tied for eighth best in the NFC and tied for 11th in the NFL.

ROAD WARRIORS

One of the most impressive accomplishments of Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**'s first year as head coach was the way his club performed on the road. The Packers finished 5-3 away from home last season, recording the most road wins in franchise history for a coach in his first season.

- McCarthy and the Packers have picked up right where they left off, winning their first two road games of the season.

MCCARTHY – EXCERPTS FROM MONDAY

- “I feel like our football team has a very good understanding of where they are as far as the progression of being a great football team, a championship football team. It's something that we talk about all the time. I think we're a good, young football team that will continue to improve, and we just talk about it. I'm not into false confidence, just trying to build them up real high one week. I just tell them the truth. I tell them what I see on film, I tell them what I see at practice. And if a guy is running last-minute to a meeting, I confront him and question him on where's your focus. That's the only way I know how to do it, and will continue to do so. It's just a very up-front, direct approach, and just keeping your eye on the target.”
- “We need to improve. And it's important to improve at this time of year, because as you get into November and December, you can't be going down there for 2 hour, 45 minute practices. Your individual steps back, because now the health of your football team is a concern. You're more in a maintenance mode. We have a number of players that need to continue to improve in the technical and fundamentals of football, and it's an urgency and an emphasis to get it done now.”
- “I had a coordinator once tell me it's a lot more fun to throw the ball. It is, but that's not the best answer over the course of the year. We'll continue to work on the run game, we'll continue to work on the passing game, because we have to try to stay one step ahead of the team we're playing, based on what we anticipate their reaction or how they're going to play us in the passing game.”

WITH THE GAME ON THE LINE, PACKERS DELIVER

A major catalyst in the Packers' 4-0 start has been their play in the fourth quarter, as each of the four games has been decided in the final frame.

- Green Bay has entered the fourth quarter down four points (San Diego), tied (Philadelphia), up one (New York Giants) and up four (Minnesota).
- No NFL team has outscored its opponents by a bigger margin in the fourth quarter than the Packers.

MIKE MCCARTHY...In second year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- Led the Packers to an 8-8 finish and near playoff berth, losing a tiebreaker with the New York Giants, who also finished 8-8.
- Spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- Began his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

LOVIE SMITH...In fourth year as the Bears' 13th head coach.

- Has won more games over his first three seasons than any coach in franchise history and guided the team to its first Super Bowl appearance in 21 years in 2006.
- Named the *Associated Press* NFL Coach of the Year in 2005 after he led a worst-to-first revival in the NFC North.
- The Bears' six-win improvement from the previous season was tied for the biggest in the NFL in 2005.
- Came to Chicago from St. Louis, where he served as defensive coordinator from 2001-03, helping the Rams return to the Super Bowl in 2001. Prior to that, coached LBs for Tampa Bay from 1996-2000.

THE BEARS-PACKERS SERIES

The NFL's most prolific rivalry, no two teams have met on the gridiron more than the Packers and Bears. Sunday they face off for the 174th time.

- The Bears' two wins in 2005 marked the first time Chicago swept the season series since 1991, before Brett Favre became Green Bay's quarterback. With those two wins plus a split last season, the Bears have extended their lead in the NFL's richest rivalry to eight games, 87-79-6. The last time the gap had been as close as seven was the end of World War II and the Don Hutson era, 1945, when the Packers trailed 27-20-5.
- The last time Green Bay led the series? On the heels of its three straight NFL championships, 1932, when the Packers led 11-10-5. Two months after Babe Ruth allegedly called his shot at Wrigley Field in the '32 World Series, the Bears stole from Green Bay a fourth straight title (which at the time was determined by league standings). Chicago barely finished atop the league standings, which unlike today did not count ties. Had the league counted ties in standings, the Packers would have won. The next year, 1933, the NFL began determining its champion with postseason games.
- The Packers meet Lovie Smith for the seventh time as Bears head coach. Smith on Jan. 15, 2004, elevated one of sports' top rivalries to another level, saying his No. 1 goal, ahead of winning the division and Super Bowl, was to beat Green Bay. He won on Sept. 19, 2004. The

Packers went 18-2 against Chicago from 1994-2003. On only four occasions in NFL history has a team enjoyed a better 20-game stretch against a single opponent.

- Green Bay against Smith during his career as an NFL coach is 10-9 (all Favre starts).

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Green Bay running backs coach Edgar Bennett finished his playing career in Chicago (1998-99)...Packers assistant offensive line coach Jerry Fontenot was a third-round draft choice of the Bears in 1989 and was a mainstay at center in his eight seasons (1989-96) in Chicago...Bears running backs coach Tim Spencer played with the late Reggie White, the Packers' all-time sacks leader, with Memphis of the USFL in 1985...Bears defensive quality control coach Gill Byrd served as the Packers executive director/player programs and community affairs from 1999-2001...Lovie Smith was a University of Wisconsin assistant in 1987, while Bears defensive coordinator Bob Babich spent two seasons on the Badgers' staff (1988-89)...Long-snapper Rob Davis held the same role for the Bears in 1996...Bears LB Hunter Hillenmeyer was taken by Green Bay in the fifth round of the 2003 NFL Draft...Packers CB Charles Woodson and Bears QB Brian Griese were teammates on Michigan's 1997 national championship team; Woodson also took home the Heisman Trophy that season...Bears DE Mark Anderson and Packers S Charlie Peprah were teammates at Alabama.

INDIVIDUALLY VS. CHICAGO BEARS

Quarterback Brett Favre is 22-8 against the Bears, the most wins he has against any single opponent. He also has more TD passes against the Bears than any other opponent, with 52...Donald Driver's career-long catch was an 85-yard TD reception at Chicago (Champaign) on Oct. 7, 2002, on *Monday Night Football*...Another single-game career high set against the Bears was Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila's four sacks (Jan. 2, 2005)...Nick Collins intercepted a career-high two passes against the Bears last December, including a 55-yard interception return for a touchdown...The first two-interception game of Charles Woodson's career, and his only two-INT effort prior to the Seattle game in 2006, came at Chicago on Oct. 5, 2003, while playing for Oakland.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Dec. 31, 2006, at Soldier Field; Packers won 26-7.

- The Packers controlled the game from the outset, using six turnovers and two defensive scores to roll to a 26-7 victory.
- Their playoff hopes dashed the previous night, Green Bay closed the season with a four-game winning streak.
- The Packers marched 75 yards on 11 plays to open the game, and Favre found Driver on a slant route for a 9-yard touchdown pass.
- Green Bay's defense tallied four turnovers in the first half, including three interceptions of Rex Grossman, en route to a 23-0 lead at the break.

LAST MEETING, AT LAMBEAU FIELD

Sept. 10, 2006; Bears won 26-0.

- Grossman began the game with a 49-yard TD pass to Bernard Berrian on the first series and the Bears handed the Packers their first shutout since 1991.
- After the early TD, Chicago added four FGs by Robbie Gould and Devin Hester returned a punt 84 yards for a score.
- Grossman completed 18 of 26 passes for 262 yards, with Muhsin Muhammad catching six for 102 yards and tight end Desmond Clark adding five for 77 yards.
- The lone bright spots for Green Bay were running back Ahman Green (20 carries, 110 yards) and receiver Donald Driver (seven catches, 96 yards), accounting for all but 61 yards of the team's offensive output.

**PACKERS VS. VIKINGS - W, 23-16****4-0 START HIGHLIGHTED BY NFL HISTORY**

Two **Brett Favre** touchdown passes – the first of which made NFL history – helped Green Bay win their fourth straight game of the season and eighth straight overall. Not since 1998 have the Packers opened a season 4-0.

- Favre surpassed Dan Marino's NFL record of 420 touchdown passes on the Packers' second possession. A 27-yard drag route to tight end Donald Lee got the Packers in the end zone, and two plays later Favre and wide receiver **Greg Jennings** made NFL history with the 16-yard touchdown connection.
- The play officially came at 4:56 remaining in the first quarter, with Favre calling for an audible as the play clock ran down. Jennings got free on a slant route as camera bulbs flashed to capture the moment.
- Referees briefly stopped play as teammates and coaches mobbed Favre. A videotaped message from Dan Marino was played on the Metrodome scoreboard as Favre ran over to his wife Deanna in the first row behind the bench.
- What ensued afterwards was a typical NFC North slug fest, as the teams battled back and forth for field position through the next 35 minutes of play. **Mason Crosby** and former Packers kicker Ryan Longwell traded field goals back and forth – each hitting three – as the Packers held a 16-9 advantage early in the fourth quarter.
- Green Bay finally put together another touchdown drive with an 11-play, 82 yard drive that took over nine minutes off the clock in the quarter. Favre connected with five different receivers on the drive, including rookie wide-out **James Jones** for a 33-yard scoring strike. It was the first career touchdown for Jones.
- Minnesota battled back with a 12-play scoring drive to cut the lead back down to seven with just under two minutes to play. **Donald Driver's** recovery of an onside kick seemingly wrapped up the victory for Green Bay.
- Attempting to run out the clock, the Packers' offense turned the ball over on a fumbled exchange between Favre and running back **Ryan Grant**. It was just the second snap of the drive, returning the ball to the Vikings with 1:40 remaining.
- The defense responded again as **Atari Bigby's** interception sealed the victory for Green Bay on Minnesota's fourth play of the drive. The play was reviewed and upheld, giving Green Bay its fourth victory on the season.

**RYAN MAKES FAKE WORK**

The Packers surprised all 63,779 folks at the Metrodome on Sunday with a fake punt on the opening possession of the third quarter.

- Facing fourth-and-4 from the 50, punter **Jon Ryan** took the long snap and began running to his right, at first looking to throw. With no one open, Ryan ran into traffic along the right side, cut back toward the middle of the field and somehow eluded a handful of Minnesota tacklers to gain 7 yards and pick up the first down.
- "There was a pass option there, yeah, but that wasn't really an option once I looked up, so I just took off," Ryan said following the game. "I knew we only needed to go 4 yards, and I knew there was some room on the right, and I took off that way and the whole time I was looking at the first-down marker on the right. Then I cut back and I was looking at the first-down marker on the left. Then I cut back again and just fell forward. I knew we only needed about 4 yards, so I was just trying to get positive yards."
- It was the Packers' first fake punt since the 2006 season opener, which

also worked with a pass from Ryan to running back Noah Herron. This one kept alive what became a 16-play drive that consumed the first 8 minutes, 56 seconds of the third quarter and ended with a 44-yard Mason Crosby field goal for a 13-6 Green Bay lead.

FIRST ACTION FOR ROUSE; MORENCY RETURNS TO LINEUP

Rookie safety **Aaron Rouse** was active on gameday for the first time on Sunday, having missed the first three games with a hamstring injury.

- He played mostly on special teams, receiving credit for one assisted tackle. But he also got a handful of snaps at safety as an injury substitution.
- Midway through the second quarter, **Nick Collins** injured his knee while tackling Adrian Peterson at the end of a 55-yard run and sat out the rest of that drive plus one more before returning in the third quarter. Rouse also replaced the other starting safety, Bigby, for one play when he was briefly shaken up on Minnesota's first possession of the second half.
- Running back **Vernand Morency** also got his first action of 2007 after recovering from the knee injury he sustained during the first training camp practice, back on July 28.
- He came off the bench at running back and had just one carry for 2 yards. He also caught three passes for 33 yards, including an 18-yard gain on a screen pass during the 2-minute drive at the end of the first half. He dodged a few tacklers and managed to get out of bounds at the Minnesota 17-yard line with 27 seconds left, helping to set up Crosby's 28-yard field goal to close the first half.
- Morency also had an 11-yard gain on a completion in the fourth quarter but fumbled the ball when linebacker E.J. Henderson hit him from behind. Fortunately, the ball rolled harmlessly out of bounds, and the Packers kept possession.
- "I thought I had lost the guy, the backside linebacker," Morency said. "I was trying to set the safety up to make a move, and he came out of nowhere and hit it out. It was a great play by him, and I just need to be more cautious."
- Overall, Morency felt his knee held up well, and he doesn't anticipate any setbacks from the injury.
- "I'm a little sore right now, but that's kind of typical," he said. "I'm just looking forward to the next opportunity."

OTHER POSTGAME NOTES

Ten different receivers caught a pass against Minnesota.

- Favre, who notched the 50th 300-yard passing game of his career, set another NFL record on Sunday. He passed Dan Marino on the NFL's all-time attempts list.
- Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** tallied his first back-to-back multi-sack effort with two Sunday. He needs one sack to surpass Reggie White's franchise record (68½), as Gbaja-Biamila stands at 68.
- The fourth-quarter interception was the first of Bigby's career.
- Inactive Sunday were LB Desmond Bishop, G Allen Barbre, DT Justin Harrell, RB Brandon Jackson, DE Michael Montgomery, DT Daniel Muir, T Orrin Thompson and CB Frank Walker.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

422 TOUCHDOWN PASSES AND COUNTING

After a moment now etched in NFL history, Brett Favre stands alone atop the all-time touchdown passes list.

- 43 different Packers have been on the receiving end of a Favre touchdown pass, beginning with **Sterling Sharpe's** grab in the fourth quarter against the Bengals on Sept. 20, 1992.
- Favre's two fourth-quarter touchdown throws in that game not only sealed the come-from-behind, 24-23 victory, but also earned him the start the following week, a job he hasn't relinquished since.
- In a three-touchdown performance at New England on Oct. 13, 2002, Favre became just the fourth NFL player to throw for 300 touchdowns. On his final TD pass of the day, a 2-yard toss to tight end **Bubba Franks**, Favre surpassed John Elway to move into third place on the all-time list.
- He moved into second place on the list in one of the most memorable performances of his career – and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – when he threw four touchdown passes in the first half against the Oakland Raiders just one day after the sudden death of his father, Irvin. Favre's second touchdown pass of the night, a 23-yard strike to Javon Walker, pushed him past Fran Tarkenton with 343 career TD passes.
- A first-quarter strike to **Greg Jennings** made NFL history this past Sunday. The game was stopped briefly, and a videotaped message from Dan Marino was played on the Metrodome's scoreboard.

A CHRONOLOGY OF THE RECORD

Eight players – all members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame – have held the NFL career touchdown pass record throughout the history of the league. Thanks to research provided by Elias Sports Bureau, the one-time record holders were:

- **Benny Friedman** had 66 career TD passes and held the record from 1930 until 1943.
- **Arnie Herber**, a former Green Bay signal caller, reached 66 touchdown passes in 1940 and shared the record with Friedman until 1943.
- **Sammy Baugh** passed Friedman and Herber in 1943 and threw 187 career touchdowns. He held the record until 1962.
- **Bobby Layne** tied Baugh in 1961 and passed him during the 1962 season. Layne finished with 196 touchdown passes and held the record until 1963.
- **Y.A. Tittle** passed Layne in 1963 and finished his career with 212 touchdown passes. Tittle held the record until 1966.
- **Johnny Unitas** passed Tittle in 1966 and ended his playing days with 290 TD passes. He held the record until 1975.
- **Fran Tarkenton** surpassed Unitas in 1975 and became the first NFL player with 300 career TD passes. He finished with 342 touchdown passes and held the record until 1995.
- **Dan Marino** passed Tarkenton on Nov. 26, 1995, at Indianapolis with a second-quarter touchdown pass and finished his career with 420 touchdown passes. He held the record by himself until surpassed by Brett Favre in 2007.

PACKERS ONCE AGAIN LEAGUE'S YOUNGEST TEAM

Green Bay has the distinction of being the NFL's youngest team for the second straight season. Coincidentally, the two youngest teams in the NFL have the two longest active winning streaks in the league.

- Since taking over general manager duties in 2005, Ted Thompson has

vowed to build the team's foundation through the draft. Of the 53 active roster players, 21 have been drafted by Thompson.

- Each team's average age is based upon its opening-day roster. A look at the five youngest teams in 2007:

JONES MAKES IMMEDIATE CONTRIBUTION

Rookie wide receiver **James Jones** became the 43rd different player to catch a touchdown pass from Brett Favre, and what a memory it will be. Jones caught the fourth-quarter touchdown pass on a 33-yard missile from Favre.

- A third-round draft selection who came to the NFL as a relative unknown from San Jose State, Jones has excelled despite the lack of fanfare surrounding his arrival to the Packers offense.
- Through four games, he stands tied for the lead in receptions (18) and second in receiving yards (232) among NFL rookies, ahead of first-round selections Calvin Johnson, Ted Ginn Jr., Robert Meachem and Anthony Gonzalez.
- "He's a strong young man," said McCarthy about his rookie wideout on Monday. "He does a good job playing with his strength, but he needs to learn to do it all the time. What's exciting about James Jones is he's only going to get better, and he's been productive."
- Jones joked after the game that he was glad he caught No. 422 so that the ball can come home with him for his personal collection. "I'm just glad I got in there (the end zone), I'm glad we got the victory, and I'm glad I got to keep the ball," said Jones, who had four catches for 49 yards in victory. "But most of all, I'm just glad we're 4-0 and got the win."

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

IN THE DIVISION

The Packers under Mike McCarthy have been extremely successful in the NFL's 'black and blue' division, the NFC North.

- ▶ With the victory over the Vikings in Week 4, the team has now won six consecutive division games. McCarthy has yet to lose on the road in the division (4-0).
- ▶ Last season, the Packers finished tied for the NFL's best division record at 5-1, losing only to Chicago in the season opener.
- ▶ No other head coach in team annals had a better division mark in his rookie season than McCarthy.
- ▶ Green Bay was one of five teams in the league to win all three of its divisional road games in 2006. Philadelphia, Chicago, Carolina and both New York clubs – the Jets and Giants – also swept their road games in the division.

FAVRE FACES FAMILIAR FOE

Favre has won more games against the Bears (22) than any other opponent and has thrown more touchdown passes against Chicago than any other team.

- ▶ Not surprisingly, Marino and Favre sit atop yet another NFL passing record. A look at the most touchdown passes versus one team:

OTHER PACKERS BREAKING RECORDS

Though Favre's assault on numerous records has garnered most of the attention this season, a number of other Packers have records and milestones in their sights.

- ▶ **Donald Driver** became the seventh player in team history to surpass the 6,000 yard mark and also moved into fifth place in the franchise's all-time receptions list. Driver, who has caught a pass in 84 straight games, became Lambeau Field's all-time leader in receptions.
- ▶ **Bubba Franks** became the 11th player in Packers history to record 30 career touchdown receptions.
- ▶ Defensive end **Aaron Kampman** recorded his 30th career sack in a Packers uniform, becoming the eighth player in team history to do so.
- ▶ Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** needs just ½ sack to equal Reggie White's franchise record for sacks (68½). Gbaja-Biamila enters play Sunday with 68 career sacks, having tallied back-to-back multi-sack games.

'KGB' NO SECRET WEAPON AGAINST BEARS

Gbaja-Biamila, who has seen a return to form as an elite pass rusher in recent weeks, has more career sacks against Chicago (11) than any other NFL team.

- ▶ 'KGB' also recorded a career high against the Bears when he notched four sacks in the final regular-season game of 2004.
- ▶ Gbaja-Biamila has also notched back-to-back multi-sack performances for the first time since the 2004 season. The eighth-year pro was credited with 1½ sacks against the Chargers, including a forced fumble against Philip Rivers, and two sacks against the Vikings.

CLIFTON HITS CENTURY MARK

Tackle **Chad Clifton** – who is expected to start Sunday – will be making his 100th career start for the Packers.

- ▶ A second-round pick in 2000, Clifton was inserted into the starting lineup in Week 7 as a rookie and has been a mainstay on the offensive line since then.
- ▶ Favre's blind-side shield, he has started 67 of 68 games since returning from a pelvic injury that ended his 2002 season after a blindside hit from Warren Sapp. Only a bout with the flu last season in Miami (Oct. 22) could snap the streak.
- ▶ An elite pass blocker, Clifton has anchored an offensive line that has allowed the second fewest sacks in the NFL since he joined the starting lineup in 2000. Interestingly enough, all the teams on this list play in the AFC besides the Packers.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

BREAST CANCER AWARENESS WEEKEND

Home teams around the NFL this weekend – including the Green Bay Packers – are recognizing October 7-8 as NFL Breast Cancer Awareness Weekend.

- Each home team is being asked to name honorary team captains from the community as part of the weekend. Captains selected by the teams might be breast cancer survivors or volunteers from a local breast cancer organization, and will be presented with a bouquet of pink roses at the pre-game coin toss.
- The NFL will distribute pink ribbon/NFL shield pins to coaches, club personnel, and broadcasters for this weekend's games.
- Pink Gatorade towels will be prevalent on the sidelines, with a number of pink towels and other commemorative pink merchandise autographed by players. Items will be put up for bid on NFL Auction, with all proceeds going to breast cancer organizations.



MORE MCCARTHY – EXCERPTS FROM MONDAY

- “I don't think it (touchdown pass record) was a distraction at all. I think just by the comments made by the players and the reaction of everybody involved, it was a very good illustration of it. We didn't see it as a distraction. I think the way he handled it and the humility he showed and the focus he kept putting on the team was clearly evident in how everybody viewed that day. It was great for him to get the record, but more importantly for us to win the game.”
- “Very few people can celebrate a touchdown the way Brett does. I just think it shows the bond that he has with his teammates, and particularly the receiver group. We've talked over and over again in here that he spends a lot of extra time with the receivers. We had a Saturday night post-team-meeting meeting with just the quarterbacks and receivers. So there's a strong relationship between each of the perimeter players and Brett, and more importantly as a group, that's getting stronger and stronger as we move forward.”
- “He (Al Harris) and Charles (Woodson) are a big reason why we play the way we do. They're exceptional players at the line of scrimmage, and our young corners are improving week in and week out. We could not play the defense that we play schematically without bump-and-run corners.”
- “He's (Jennings) not practicing Wednesday or Thursday. He will practice Friday. We need to get off this every week. He has a legitimate hamstring injury, and we need to give it the time to heal properly.”
- “Greg's a very instinctive football player. He has what you like to refer to as 'it.' He sees the big picture. He understands. Just after he caught the touchdown, something we had talked about during the course of the week, and actually we revisited it as a perimeter group the night before, when he hit the touchdown he came right over and said, 'Hey, it's exactly like we talked about', as far as the hole and the angle of the route and so forth. He understands spacing and route-running. Some guys are more track-oriented, you know, narrow vision. But he sees the big picture. He has a clear understanding of flat angles and so forth. That part of it, a lot of it is instinct and natural. It concerns me a young player like that not practicing, don't get me wrong. But when he's available, we're better. So we need to give him every chance to be available. That's why the medical part of it we will handle like I've already stated, he won't practice until Friday.”
- “I can honestly say I have never walked into a contest that I did not think we could win. I think there's a path to success every time you take the football field. Everybody asks you what your record is. We're trying to win them all, and the approach is we're focused on winning against Chicago. And that's my approach. There are teams that have strengths, and teams that have weaknesses. So do we. We're going to continue to improve on the things that we haven't done very well to this point, and

we'll play to our strengths. That is our path for success, and we will not change.”

- “We're doing a lot of positive things the last eight times this football team has taken the field, and we'll continue to build off of that. But we're not blind to the things we need to work on, and I think that's just part of keeping the focus of the football team. And now, after yesterday's experience, I thought that was very revealing of our football players. Our football players knew they won a game in a tough environment, they felt good about that, but you could just tell by the mode in the locker room yesterday that we did not play our best game.”
- “Sore point with me today. We had the ball on the ground five times. That's unacceptable. I think it's vital for your football team to illustrate on game day what you practice. You guys are all at practice during the week, training camp, OTAs. Ball security drills, we do them every single day. Actually we do them Wednesdays and Fridays. We'll do them Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday this week, because that's just carelessness. We had a couple instances where guys just didn't have the ball high and tight, and we're not happy about it. You can't play like that. We had the ball on the ground five times and lost two of them, so we need to get back on the track that we were in prior weeks.”
- “I thought he (Morency) did some good things. The third down play, he runs an excellent route, beats Chad Greenway across the formation for a big third down. He had some nice pickups. Mo is an instinctive player, has a good feel on the checkdowns. He graded out good. He had a solid performance, but he didn't have a lot of opportunities.”

UPON FURTHER REVIEW

Some things that jump out about the Packers after a second glance at the statistics.

- According to Elias Sports Bureau, Green Bay's 217 rushing yards this season are the fewest for any 4-0 team in NFL history.

- The Packers defense has yet to allow a rushing touchdown this season.
- **Brett Favre** has thrown 45 passes in each of the past two games and he has not been intercepted in either game. Prior to those two games, Favre had never thrown 45-or-more passes in an NFL game without being intercepted.
- Of Green Bay's eight takeaways through the first four games, seven have been turned into points (five touchdowns, two field goals). The only takeaway not converted to points was **Atari Bigby's** interception to seal the victory against Minnesota. Favre and the offense kneeled on the ball the remaining two plays.
- The Packers have turned their eight takeaways into 41 points, while only surrendering six points on their own five turnovers.
- Favre ranks first in the league in completions and attempts, second in yardage, and eighth in completion percentage.

ONLY MARSHALL REMAINS

Favre made his 241st consecutive start against Minnesota, surpassing former Vikings center Mick Tingelhoff (240) and now owns the second-longest recorded streak in NFL history.

- Only Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more in consecutive fashion.
- Favre has played in 243 straight games (263 including playoffs) and his 241 starts in a row (261 including playoffs) is the NFL's record among quarterbacks.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

WOULDN'T BE PACKERS-BEARS WITHOUT LEE REMMEL

Team historian **Lee Remmel** will be in attendance for the 121st consecutive game (123rd overall) between the Packers and Bears.

- Remmel's consecutive attendance in the rivalry is simply unparalleled in the NFL. He attended the Packers-Bears game at City Stadium on Green Bay's east side in 1944 and 1945 – both Green Bay victories – before beginning his impressive attendance streak in 1946.
- He has been associated with the club for 62 years, first as a sports writer for the *Green Bay Press-Gazette* and then as a member of the club's front office.
- Remmel worked in the Packers' public relations office from 1974 to 2004 and is now in his fourth season as team historian. The Lambeau Field press box bears his name.

NO ONE WINS MORE THAN NO. 4

With his 149th win in Week 2, Favre surpassed John Elway on the all-time quarterback wins list. Favre enters Sunday with 151 career wins.

- Simply put, Favre was spectacular in the record-breaking victory over the New York Giants. He completed 29-of-38 passes for 286 yards and three touchdowns and earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors.
- "We gave him the game ball after the game," McCarthy said after the win. "The 'all-time' in anything in this league is such a monumental achievement. 149 victories - I think that speaks for itself. When you go out and win over that long of a period of time, I think that's the ultimate compliment a quarterback can have. To me, if you asked me what is the biggest record that he will achieve, I think he just accomplished it."

QUITE THE DEBUT FOR CROSBY

According to Elias Sports Bureau, rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** on Sept. 9 became the first player in NFL history to kick a 50-plus yard field goal and a game-winning field goal in the final minute of his first NFL game.

- What a whirlwind couple of days it had been for Crosby. First, he found out on Sept. 1 that he had won the kicking job after what had been perhaps the most intense positional battle in training camp. Two days later, he celebrated his 23rd birthday, and just days after that the rookie was lining up for his first-ever professional game.
- Crosby was 3-for-3 on field goals against the Eagles. He hit a 53-yarder, one yard shy of the team record, in the first quarter, a 37-yarder in the third quarter, and a 42-yarder with 2 seconds left to break a 13-all tie and give the Packers the three-point win. He was later awarded NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his efforts.

PUNT BLOCKS

Jon Ryan was 13 years old the last time the Packers had a punt blocked. It happened Sept. 10, 1995, at Chicago, when the Bears' Anthony Marshall got to Craig Hentrich.

- Only one other team has a longer active stretch of punts without a block than Green Bay:

ROOKIES IN THE BACKFIELD

Green Bay became the first NFL team to open the regular season with two rookie starters in the backfield since 1996. That season, both St. Louis (Derrick Harris and Lawrence Phillips) and Miami (Stanley Pritchett and Abdul-Karim al-Jabbar) used an all-rookie backfield on opening day.

- Rookie running back **Brandon Jackson**, a second-round pick from Nebraska, became the first rookie to start at running back on opening day for the Packers since John Brockington in 1971.
- Fullback **Korey Hall**, a linebacker at Boise State last season, was the first Packers rookie to start on opening day at fullback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Four coaches have new titles this season, though all four were with the team during the 2006 season. Former offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski left to become the head coach at Boston College in January, leaving a major opening on the staff.

- McCarthy tabbed **Joe Philbin** as offensive coordinator. Entering his fifth season with the Packers, Philbin most recently served as offensive line coach in 2006 where he implemented a new zone-blocking scheme and successfully integrated three rookie starters.
- **Winston Moss** was promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers after serving as linebackers coach in 2006. As the assistant head coach, the 41-year-old Moss will be McCarthy's right-hand man with regard to administrative duties and team dynamics. Moss will continue to coach the linebackers as well.
- Promoted to offensive line coach, **James Campen** moves up from his position as assistant offensive line coach in McCarthy's first season at the helm. The center for Brett Favre's first career start in 1992, Campen begins his fourth season on the Packers staff.
- **Jerry Fontenot** will serve as assistant offensive line coach in 2007. A 16-year NFL veteran (1989-2004), Fontenot joined the Packers as a coaching intern last summer and remained with the team throughout the 2006 season as an offensive assistant.

- LG 73 Daryn Colledge (6-4, 305, Second Year, Boise State)** — Mature, second-round pick in '06 started 15 games as a rookie...Earned *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie Team honors...Called the team's most improved player by McCarthy at season's end.
- C 63 Scott Wells (6-2, 295, Fourth Year, Tennessee)** — Former seventh-round selection started all 16 games last season...Played a team high 99.8% of offensive snaps; missed two plays after losing a shoe...Tough and unflappable, was inserted into the starting lineup midway through 2005 at left guard.
- RG 62 Junius Coston (6-3, 313, Third Year, North Carolina A&T)** — Earned his first career start in Week 2 against the Giants...Athletic lineman who has practiced at all five positions along the line...In his third year as a pro, still only 23 years old.
- RT 65 Mark Tauscher (6-4, 315, Eighth Year, Wisconsin)** — Pronounced "TAU-sheer"...Along with Clifton, with whom he started as a fellow rookie in 2000, serves as an anchor for Colledge and Coston...A local product, needs five starts for 100 career.
- TE 86 Donald Lee (6-4, 248, Fifth Year, Mississippi State)** — Played in 15 games, including two starts, in '06...Athletic tight end with ability to stretch the field...A valuable contributor on special teams, finished second in tackles last season.
- WR 85 Greg Jennings (5-11, 197, Second Year, Western Michigan)** — A strong rookie campaign earned him *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie Team honors last season...Despite impressive rookie numbers (45 catches, 632 yards, 3 TDs), undoubtedly would have been more productive if not slowed by an ankle injury in Week 6.
- QB 4 Brett Favre (6-2, 222, 17th Year, Southern Mississippi)** — Three-time NFL MVP, eight-time Pro Bowler guns for nearly every major passing record this season...Has started 241 consecutive games (261 incl. playoffs).
- RB 42 DeShawn Wynn (5-10, 232, Rookie, Florida)** — A seventh-round draft pick (228th overall), was the 20th running back selected in the 2007 NFL Draft...Florida's leading ground-gainer each of the past two years, including its National Championship season in 2006.

GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Packers will host a season-long celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of Lambeau Field. The crown jewel of the National Football League remains the most historic stadium in football.

- Dedicated as City Stadium Sept. 29, 1957, with a 21-17 victory over the archrival Chicago Bears, the team renamed the facility Lambeau Field in 1965 following the death of E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach. It is the NFL's longest-tenured facility.
- To mark the occasion, an anniversary logo was created and will be featured on the team's home uniforms, *Gameday* program, the media guide and the Packers Yearbook.
- Lambeau Field also will feature the special logo in the north end zone. Both end zones have been painted to reflect the way they were in Lambeau Field's first season in 1957.
- Renowned 3-D pop artist Charles Fazzino was commissioned by the Packers to create an art piece celebrating the 50th anniversary. Fazzino, the official artist of the Super Bowl and Major League Baseball's All-Star Game, spent nine months on the project. The piece is available in a limited edition 3-D format, as well as on T-shirts, helmets and assorted items in the Packers Pro Shop.
- Packers ticket holders will enjoy images of Lambeau Field through the years on their tickets as well.



TRAVELING LIGHT IN 2007

NFL teams will cover 566,650 miles this season — about 75,000 more miles than a round trip flight from the earth to the moon.

- No team will cover more mileage than the St. Louis Rams (34,352), while the N.Y. Jets will travel the fewest (9,186).
- In the preseason and regular season, Green Bay will fly a total of 10,738 miles, over 6,000 miles less than the team traveled in 2006.

'07 SCHEDULE AT A GLANCE

Three prime-time contests, including a Sunday night rematch with the Chicago Bears at Lambeau Field, highlight the Green Bay Packers' 87th NFL regular-season schedule.

- The '07 slate includes six playoff teams (Chicago, Philadelphia, San Diego, Dallas, N.Y. Giants and Kansas City) from 2006.
- Four of the first five games, including this week's rematch against the Bears, are against playoff foes.
- Green Bay will play three prime-time contests, barring any changes via

the league's flexible scheduling options. Two of those three — at Denver Oct. 29 (ESPN) and at Dallas Nov. 29 (NFL Network) — are on the road. The third is the Oct. 7 Bears game (NBC).

- The Packers make their first trip to Kansas City since 1996. The only other active city in which the Packers have waited longer to visit during the regular season is Cleveland (1995).

FINAL 53 LOADED ON DEFENSIVE LINE, SECONDARY

A look at the 53-man roster shows some big numbers along the defensive line and in the secondary. But throughout training camp, Head Coach Mike McCarthy and GM Ted Thompson reiterated that they were going to keep "the best 53" regardless of position.

- The theme on offense was 2's. Among the 53 were two quarterbacks, two fullbacks and two tight ends. Under center, the team will go with Favre and third-year pro **Aaron Rodgers**, who impressed this preseason. Wide receiver **Carlyle Holiday**, who played quarterback at Notre Dame and previously was listed as the No. 3 quarterback, was placed on I.R. after a Week 1 injury.
- **Donald Lee** and **Bubba Franks**, two veterans of the system, will serve as the tight ends. Their experience is contrasted by the fullback position, where rookie **Korey Hall** and second-year player **John Kuhn** fill out the backfield. Hall played linebacker at Boise State and made his first career start against Philadelphia. Kuhn was claimed on waivers prior to Week 1 and has seen time on special teams as he continues to learn the offensive system.
- No position is as deep as defensive line, a unit Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** feels is among the most talented in the league. It may be the deepest in the league too, as coaches have 11 players from which to choose their gameday rotation. Pro Bowl defensive end **Aaron Kampman** highlights the group, while the emerging **Cullen Jenkins** had a strong preseason.
- 10 players were kept in the secondary, including six cornerbacks. Three starters return to the unit, including the cornerback duo of **Charles Woodson** and **Al Harris**.
- A breakdown of the roster shows 26 defensive players, 24 offensive players and three specialists.

CONFIDENT MCCARTHY HEADS INTO SECOND SEASON

Now in his second year at the helm, McCarthy heads into 2007 with a much more confident team than a year ago. His system is firmly in place as he looks to join the likes of Vince Lombardi, Dan Devine, Mike Holmgren and Mike Sherman as the fifth head coach in franchise history to lead the team to the postseason in his second season.

- "I think there are so many positive aspects of our football team that we're able to build on," McCarthy said at the conclusion of the preseason. "The only thing you have to compare it to is last year, so we're clearly further ahead."
- As for the strength of his team? "Our defense is clearly the catalyst of our football team," said McCarthy. "They've been the most consistent part of our football team, and I think it will clearly carry over to special teams once we set those groups and the core players are playing all the time."
- The No. 1 defense was strong — if not dominant — throughout the preseason and into the opener, showing the communication problems in the secondary that plagued the unit in '06 were behind them.
- Questions surrounded the offense and its lack of playmakers in the off-season, but as the one calling the plays, McCarthy has seen enough to establish a method of attack. "I'm very comfortable with the building of the offense, playing whatever way we need to play to score points."



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

Q&A WITH MIKE MCCARTHY

You kept 11 defensive linemen and 10 defensive backs on the roster. That's 40 percent of your players at two position groups. Why so many players there, and what difference will that make?

Ted Thompson and I clearly stated throughout the offseason and training camp that we would keep the best 53 players. I'm of the opinion if you do not do that, you will be on this cycle where the bottom half of your roster does not get totally upgraded. By keeping the best 53 players, it gives us the opportunity to create continuity and depth in some areas as we continue to improve the others.

The competition at running back didn't play out as expected in training camp, due to several injuries. With all the injuries and inexperience, can this running game be productive enough to complement Brett Favre?

I'm very comfortable that we'll do whatever it takes to win football games. Running the football is an important part of a successful offense. I'm confident we'll get that done.

Your team is the youngest in the NFL this season. Second-youngest is the defending champion Indianapolis Colts. What do you make of that?

That's the makeup of our football team. We're in the second year of our program. We've been able to acquire a number of players through the draft, and that directly reflects the youth we have on our team. But the most important thing is the amount of talent we've been able to amass on our football team, and we'll take their abilities, be specific to what they can do, and put them in position to be successful. Every team has a different makeup, and that's the makeup of our football team. (With the Colts) I think it's really the product of the salary cap and everything that's going on throughout the NFL. They're the Super Bowl champions, they lost a number of veterans off of that Super Bowl team, and they've replaced them through the draft. I think that's why they're in that position. Our position of being younger was a different path. I think our football teams are structured differently.

Getting off to a fast start has been talked about a lot, yet a Packers team hasn't won two of its first three games since 2002. Can this team change that trend, and how?

We definitely are taking the approach to change it. It's very important to win games at home, and two out of our first three are at home, so that is an opportunity we need to take advantage of. Playing in your home environment, in front of a tremendous crowd, are all things that give you the ability to play downhill. Now, the things that happen in the beginning of the season traditionally in the NFL are factors in a football game we need to be sure to overcome. The opponent is going to have unscouted looks, we need to be prepared for that. Ball security is usually an issue in earlier games in the season. Officiating is a lot tighter earlier in the season. So there are some tendencies of the way early-season games go, and we've educated our players on that. A lot of them are just emphasizing fundamentals of the football game, and we need to just come out and play a smart, tough, fundamentally sound football game.

You're facing four 2006 playoff teams in the season's first five weeks. Do you look at that as a daunting task or an opportunity to make an early statement in 2007?

It's an opportunity to line up against some very good football teams that have had success in the recent past. So I think we will answer some ques-

tions about our team and where we are. But every week is a challenge in the NFL, and we will approach every week the same and make sure we are ready for our opponent and give our players a chance to win the game. Being aggressive in our approach, being fundamentally sound in our approach, to make sure at the end of the day that those players had a chance to win that football game.

It's often said players make the biggest jump from their first year to their second in the NFL. Does that mean the improvement of your second-year starters - A.J. Hawk, Greg Jennings, Daryn Colledge and Jason Spitz - will be the biggest key to improving on last year's 8-8 record?

Individual improvement in the offseason was one thing we had the most of. You could see it throughout the spring. It was very evident in my view during training camp, and it ultimately needs to factor in the outcome of winning football games. We've had a number of young players that have improved, whether they're going into their second or third year. It's the continuity you're striving for, the consistency you're striving for, that helps good football teams come together as fast as possible. That will be the key to us winning early in the season.



The Chicago Bears have set the standard in recent years for defensive play in the NFC North Division, and the NFC as a whole. Can the 2007 Green Bay defense approach that level, in your opinion?

We have the physical ability to, we have the mindset and confidence to at this point. We need to do it day in and day out, week in and week out on Sundays, and those things will take care of themselves. The way our defense played at the end of the season last year, and they've picked up where they left off and showed their ability to be a big-time defense in preseason. But all the games are for real now. They'll definitely be a catalyst for our success.

Last year, players like Aaron Kampman and Cullen Jenkins emerged as significant forces on defense. Who might be the next defensive player to truly step into the spotlight?

We have a couple guys who can step into that role. I think our inside players - Ryan Pickett doesn't get enough credit for the level of player he is. I think Johnny Jolly is a young and up-and-coming player going into his second year who I think will definitely impact our defense. Corey Williams did a lot of good things last year, particularly in pass rush, and has shown a lot of flexibility this year playing both defensive end and defensive tackle. I think he's a guy we'll talk a lot about. With the linebacker group, Brady Poppinga is much improved from last year, and A.J. Hawk. Nick Barnett is at the level in his career that when we do have the winning season he'll be a lot more recognized. Our corners speak for themselves. They're veterans that have been in there and played at a high level in the past, and we expect them to play at that level too. And I think we have two young, exciting safeties that could really grow into impact players. We have a lot of depth at the corner position, a lot of depth at the D-line position, so it's a defense that's really set up for a big year.

With Brett Favre's career winding down, do you feel a sense of urgency to get him one final shot at a playoff run?

We all have the sense of urgency to get in the playoffs, so to answer the question, yes. We'll do everything we can possible to win week in and week out.
