PACKERS WRAP UP REGULAR SEASON WITH LIONS

Green Bay plays its 16th and final regular-season game Sunday when it hosts the Detroit Lions in the 157th meeting of the rivalry.

- ▶ The Lions have not won in the state of Wisconsin since a 21-17 victory over the Packers at Lambeau Field in 1991, a streak that spans 16 consecutive Packers victories and seven Lions head coaches.
- ▶ For the fourth straight season, Detroit makes its annual visit to Lambeau Field in December.
- ▶ The two clubs met just over one month ago, with Green Bay earning a hard-fought 37-26 win on Thanksgiving.
- ▶ The Packers' recent dominance in the series hasn't just been limited to games played in Wisconsin. They've won 12 of the last 14 overall meetings, and Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** is 3-0 against the Lions.
- ▶ Sunday is the 253rd consecutive regular-season sellout (266 including playoffs) at Lambeau Field, the league's longest-tenured stadium.
- ▶ Winners of 16 of its last 19 contests, Green Bay has clinched a first-round bye for the first time since 1997.
- ▶ One week after a rough performance in wintry conditions in Chicago, quarterback **Brett Favre** and the offense welcome the sight of the Lions. The Packers have scored more points (3,182) against the Lions than any other franchise, and Favre has completed more passes and thrown for more yards against the Lions than any other opponent. His 52 touch-down passes against Detroit rank just two behind his personal best of 54 against Minnesota.
- ▶ A 13th win would match Green Bay's franchise record for wins in a season. That goal seems attainable, especially given the fact that Green Bay owns the NFL's best W-L record in regular-season finales since 1994:

THE PLAYOFF PICTURE

By virtue of Green Bay's loss at Chicago and Dallas' win at Carolina, the Packers can finish no better than tied with the Cowboys at 13-3. Because of the Nov. 29 loss at Texas Stadium, the Packers are assured of the No. 2 seed in the NFC Playoffs.



- ▶ Green Bay will host a Divisional Playoff the weekend of Jan. 12-13, with an exact date and time still to be determined.
- ▶ And so too, of course, is the opponent. Seattle, Tampa Bay and the New

York Giants have all clinched playoff berths in the NFC, with the sixth and final seed still to be determined this weekend.

- ▶ The Packers are 14-2 all-time at home in the playoffs, including a 12-2 record at Lambeau Field. However, the team has dropped two of its last three playoff games in front of the home crowd.

WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports enters its 14th season as an NFL network television partner and will air the contest to a regional audience. Play-by-play man **Kenny Albert** joins color commentator **Daryl Johnston** in the broadcast booth with **Tony Siragusa** serving as the sideline reporter.

- ▶ Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The network covers 47 markets in six states.
- ▶ For out-of-town listeners, the broadcast is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on www.packers.com as well as on Sirius Satellite Radio (channel 130 WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.
- ▶ DirecTV subscribers can watch the game on channel 706.

THIS WEEK AT LAMBEAU

WHEN THE TEMPERATURE DROPS

Coming off a game in which they played in 16° weather with winds gusting up to 40 m.p.h., the Packers will most likely play in cold weather again on Sunday at Lambeau Field.

- ▶ Mississippi native **Brett Favre** has fared much better on the frozen tundra than foreign turf. He owns a remarkable 41-5 record at home in cold weather, but following Sunday's loss is just 1-6 on the road when the temperature is 34° or below.
- ▶ His 91.1 passer rating at home in cold weather is supplemented by 10,508 passing yards and 81 touchdowns in those 46 games at Lambeau Field.

DECEMBER IS TIME TO REMEMBER

The importance of the NFL's final month cannot be understated. Whether it involves clinching division crowns, jockeying for playoff positioning or building momentum for next season, every game in December matters.

- ▶ For the Packers, re-establishing momentum heading into the postseason will be a key motivating factor this week. After a lackluster performance against rival Chicago, they have yet another division rival to study for. Another December win would give them 13 on the season, equaling the franchise best. History, it seems, is on their side.
- ▶ The home stretch of the NFL calendar has proved extremely successful for the Packers over the years. Since 1997, they own the league's best mark in games played in the final month (including regular-season games played in January) at 37-13-0. New England's 35-13-0 mark ranks second.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** certainly has continued the tradition of December success. He is 6-2 in the month.



FAVRE'S OWN LIONS DEN

Take away that '94 playoff victory and Favre's record of 15-0 starting at home against the Lions is the most home wins any starting QB has ever recorded against an opposing team. The runner-up is John Elway, who was 13-2 against the Chiefs at Denver.

NOBODY'S BETTER AFTER THE CATCH

The league's No. 2-ranked passing offense has been bolstered by its receivers' ability to run after the catch, as was evidenced Sunday.

- ▶ Big plays have served as a catalyst to the success of the Packers offense. The offensive unit ranks third overall in the NFL thanks in large part to its dominance through the air.
- ▶ Wins over San Diego, Denver, Kansas City and Oakland have all been highlighted by long TD passes by Favre. Not to be overlooked is who he is throwing to, and what they are able to do after the catch.
- ▶ Led by wide receivers **Donald Driver**, **Greg Jennings**, **James Jones** and tight end **Donald Lee**, Green Bay leads the league in yards after the catch. With results from this past weekend still to be tabulated, the Packers have amassed a league-best 2,151 yards after the catch through their first 14 games. The league average through that period was 1,395 yards.
- ▶ Behind the Packers at No. 2 is a team with a much more publicized group of receivers – the New England Patriots with 1,797 yards after the catch.
- ▶ The big-play ability of the Packers offense shouldn't come as a total surprise. Green Bay finished second in yards after the catch, behind New Orleans, in 2006.

MAKING HIS POINT

Rookie kicker **Mason Crosby**, thanks to a recent 15-point performance at St. Louis, leads all NFL players with 131 points.

- ▶ He needs just one point to surpass Ryan Longwell's franchise record for points in a season by a kicker (131 in 2000).
- ▶ Crosby needs 14 points to surpass the NFL record for points in a season by a rookie kicker, established by Kevin Butler (144 points) in 1985.
- ▶ He would become only the seventh rookie in NFL history to lead the league in scoring and the first since Butler in '85. The last Packers player to lead the league in points was Chester Marcol (94, 1974).

HEADING TO HONOLULU

Represented by two selections on each side of the ball, Green Bay Packers quarterback **Brett Favre**, wide receiver **Donald Driver**, defensive end **Aaron Kampman** and cornerback **Al Harris** were named Pro Bowl selections by the National Football League.

- ▶ Three Packers players were named first alternates: linebacker **Nick Barnett**, tackle **Chad Clifton** and cornerback **Charles Woodson**.
- ▶ For Favre, this marks the ninth Pro Bowl selection of his career and first since 2003. This year's leading Pro Bowl vote-getter has broken some of the league's most hallowed records, including career touchdown passes, passing yards and wins.
- ▶ Driver earns his second consecutive and third career Pro Bowl selection. He tied a franchise record with 1,000 receiving yards in a fifth overall season, joining Sterling Sharpe and Pro Football Hall of Famer James Lofton as one of three Packers to achieve that feat.
- ▶ Kampman, in his sixth season out of Iowa, returns to Hawaii for the second consecutive year. The defensive end has started 73 consecutive games for the Packers and stands sixth in the NFC with 12 sacks.
- ▶ Harris is the only Packers player making his first trip to the Pro Bowl. In his 10th NFL season and fifth with Green Bay, he has totaled 36 tackles, two interceptions and nine pass deflections.
- ▶ Other alternates include safety **Nick Collins**, tight end **Bubba Franks**, running back **Ryan Grant**, linebacker **A.J. Hawk**, wide receiver **Greg Jennings**, tight end **Donald Lee** and center **Scott Wells**.



MORE ON DETROIT'S STREAK

Favre's first game against the Lions in Wisconsin was a 38-10 victory at County Stadium in Milwaukee on Dec. 6, 1992. Fifteen more Packers-Lions games have been played in the state since then, all with Favre under center for the Packers, and each has resulted in a Green Bay victory.

- ▶ Take away Green Bay's 1994 playoff win over Detroit, and the Packers' 15 straight regular-season home wins over the Lions ranks second among active NFL streaks:

MIKE MCCARTHY...Is in second year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Won more games (16) in his first 25 contests than any other coach in franchise history.
- ▶ Spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- ▶ Began his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

ROD MARINELLI...Is in his second year as the Lions' 24th head coach.

- ▶ Named Lions head coach on Jan. 19, 2006, after 10 seasons (1996-2005) with Tampa Bay as defensive line coach; additionally was the Bucs' assistant head coach his last four seasons.
- ▶ In that 10-year tenure in Tampa Bay, the Buccaneers recorded 416 sacks, with 328½ coming courtesy of the defensive line, the most among all NFL defensive lines during that span.
- ▶ The Bucs' defensive front four garnered Top 5 rankings in sacks during six of the 10 seasons under Marinelli. That line also played a major role in setting an NFL record for consecutive games with a sack (69) from 1999-2003, a streak ended by the Packers on Nov. 16, 2003.

THE LIONS-PACKERS SERIES

No other NFL teams have played every year since 1932, when the Packers first met the Lions, then known as the Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans.

- ▶ Including a pair of playoff clashes early in Brett Favre's career, this week marks Game No. 157 in the venerable Detroit-Green Bay series.
- ▶ The Packers have won 16 consecutive contests over Detroit in Wisconsin, including the '94 playoffs. The streak includes seven Lions head coaches: Wayne Fontes (1992-96), Bobby Ross (1997-99), Gary Moeller (2000), Marty Mornhinweg (2001-02), Steve Mariucci (2003-04), Dick Jauron (2005) and Rod Marinelli (2006-Present).
- ▶ Before the '03 Thanksgiving loss at Ford Field, the Packers had won six straight over Detroit, the longest series winning streak by either team since the Lions won 11 straight from 1949-54. Green Bay has the opportunity to win its fifth straight in the series on Sunday.
- ▶ The Packers have scored more points (3,182) against the Lions than any other franchise.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Packers DE Cullen Jenkins (Belleville), WR Greg Jennings (Kalamazoo) and WR Ruvell Martin (Muskegon) are all Michigan natives...Packers WR Shaun Bodiford played three games with Detroit in 2006 before he was acquired on waivers by Green Bay...Lions LB Paris Lenon (2002-05) and QB J.T. O'Sullivan (2004) previously played for the Packers...Detroit LB Alex Lewis played at the University of Wisconsin...Green Bay DT Colin Cole spent one week on Detroit's 53-man roster in 2003, and all of the 2004 preseason with the Lions...Packers secondary coach Kurt Schottenheimer spent two seasons (2002-03) on staff with the Lions as defensive coordinator...Packers offensive quality control coach Ty Knott served a minority coaching internship in Detroit in 2001...Detroit receivers coach Kippy Brown was the Packers' running backs coach in 2000...Lions offensive coordinator Mike Martz was Packers DT Ryan Pickett's head coach in St. Louis.

INDIVIDUALLY VS. DETROIT LIONS

Quarterback Brett Favre's career totals of 700 completions, 1,116 attempts and 8,155 yards against Detroit are his highest against any opponent, and his 22 wins against the Lions are tied with Chicago for his most wins against an opponent...Greg Jennings has three touchdown receptions in three career games against the Lions...Donald Driver matched his career high with 11 receptions against the Lions on Nov. 10, 2002...Aaron Kampman has six career sacks against Detroit...Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila, the franchise leader in sacks, has 6½ sacks against the Lions...Cullen Jenkins established career highs in tackles (7) and sacks (3) against the Lions at Lambeau Field last season...Koren Robinson had an 80-yard TD reception on the Vikings' first play from scrimmage at Detroit in 2005 (Dec. 4), the longest TD catch of his career.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Nov. 22, 2007, at Ford Field; Packers won 37-26.

- ▶ Favre established a franchise record with 20 consecutive completions and finished with 381 yards and three touchdowns in victory as Green Bay matched its best start (10-1) since 1929.
- ▶ The Packers fell behind early, 6-0, before Favre found Greg Jennings for an 11-yard score and Ryan Grant capped an 80-yard drive with a 5-yard TD plunge.
- ▶ In the midst of hitting 20 consecutive passes, Favre tossed two more scores, another to Jennings and one to Ruvell Martin, as the Packers built a commanding 34-12 lead.
- ▶ The Lions began the fourth quarter with two long scoring drives to pull within eight points.
- ▶ Green Bay responded with a 10-play, 72-yard drive that took nearly five minutes off the clock. Mason Crosby's 26-yard field goal ensured the Thanksgiving day win.

LAST MEETING, AT GREEN BAY

Dec. 17, 2006, at Lambeau Field; Packers won 17-9.

- ▶ Two rushing touchdowns by Vernand Morency lifted the Packers to a sweep over Detroit in the season series.
- ▶ Green Bay overcame four turnovers thanks to a defense that yielded just 142 yards and a 2-for-12 third-down conversion rate. In the big-play department, the defense created three turnovers and lineman Cullen Jenkins (3), Aaron Kampman (2) and Corey Williams combined for six sacks, keeping Detroit out of the end zone.
- ▶ Detroit closed the gap early in the fourth quarter after Jason Hanson connected on his third field goal to make it 10-9.
- ▶ The Packers pounded out a 12-play, 78-yard drive that took 6 minutes, 45 seconds off the fourth-quarter clock, culminating in Morency's second TD run of the day, a 21-yard gallop.
- ▶ Kampman and Williams each collected sacks on Detroit's final drive to seal the victory.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

TACKLE DUO AS STEADY AS THEY COME

With a fourth-quarter sack of quarterback **Brett Favre**, the Chicago Bears ended a streak of 152 consecutive passes without a sack, one short of Favre's career high established in 2004.

- ▶ Behind Favre's top-notch protection are two stalwart tackles in **Chad Clifton** and **Mark Tauscher**. Both Clifton (110 career starts) and Tauscher (106) were inserted into the starting lineup as rookies in 2000.
- ▶ Favre's blind-side shield, Clifton has started 78 of 79 games since returning from a pelvic injury that ended his 2002 season after a blind-side hit from Warren Sapp. Only a bout with the flu last season in Miami (Oct. 22) could snap the streak.
- ▶ Tauscher started 14 games as a rookie in 2000, earning his first start at right tackle in Week 3, a position he has yet to relinquish. He saw his own consecutive starts streak come to an end as well in 2006 (57 games) because of a groin injury.
- ▶ The duo has provided a steady influence to their younger teammates along the line. Already this season, five different players have seen extensive time along the interior of the offensive line (**Daryn Colledge**, **Junius Coston**, **Tony Moll**, **Jason Spitz** and **Scott Wells**).
- ▶ Elite pass blockers that rarely receive the credit they deserve, Clifton and Tauscher have anchored an offensive line that has allowed just 18 sacks on the season, tied for third best in the league.
- ▶ The 2007 results shouldn't come as a total surprise. A look at the clubs who have given up the fewest sacks since Clifton and Tauscher became fixtures in the starting lineup in 2000:

"SPECIAL" TEAMS SHINE AGAIN

Having always been a key ingredient to the success of the Packers, Green Bay's special teams unit has seen a remarkable improvement this season.

- ▶ An area of emphasis all offseason, the unit got things going early in Week 1 by accounting for all 16 points. Against Oakland in Week 14, they accounted for two more TDs, bringing their 2007 total to four.
- ▶ In Rick Gosselin's annual *Dallas Morning News* rankings, which objectively grades teams by their rankings in 22 kicking-game categories, Green Bay finished seventh both in 1996 and 1997. The Packers reached the Super Bowl both seasons.
- ▶ More recently, the Packers ranked eighth in 2003 and ninth in 2004. Both years they made the playoffs.
- ▶ For the past two seasons, Green Bay has ranked last in the NFL in Gosselin's rankings. Neither year resulted in a postseason appearance.
- ▶ The coverage units have been much improved thus far. Through 15 games, the Packers rank fourth in the league in opponent punt return average and eighth in opponent kickoff return average.
- ▶ Another sign of the coverage units' improvement: their ability to take the ball away. They had just one forced fumble in 2006, but have already totaled three forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries.
- ▶ Their own return game is much improved from last season as well, having scored on multiple returns (two punts) for the first time since 1998. Ranked 24th in punt return average last season, the unit now ranks sixth thanks to **Will Blackmon**, **Tramon Williams** and **Charles Woodson**. Their kick return game, ranked 31st last year, has been bolstered by the addition of **Koren Robinson**, who exploded in St. Louis for 130 yards on three returns.

THE POINT OF NO RETURN

The Green Bay Packers entered the Chicago game as the only NFL team that had yet to allow a single touchdown on any type of return – fumble, interception, punt or kickoff – this season.

- ▶ Chicago put a quick end to that streak, scoring on both an interception return for a score and a short return after a blocked punt.
- ▶ Conversely, the Packers are 5-0 when either their defense or special teams scores a touchdown. Special teams have scored in three victories (Phi., Car., Oak.) while the defense has scored twice (Was., K.C.).

PUTTING THE STREAK IN PERSPECTIVE

According to Elias Sports Bureau, 210 other quarterbacks have started an NFL game since Favre launched his current 252-game starting streak on Sept. 27, 1992.

- ▶ Eight quarterbacks have made their first career starts this season.
- ▶ What's more, 25 NFL teams during Favre's streak have started at least 10 other quarterbacks. The team who has started the most? Chicago has had 21 different quarterbacks start a game during the period.

ANOTHER STREAK SNAPPED

The Chicago game saw another Packers streak come to a close, this time with the special teams unit having two punts blocked. Punter **Jon Ryan** had two punts blocked

- ▶ Punter **Jon Ryan** was 13 years old the last time the Packers had a punt blocked. It happened Sept. 11, 1995, at Chicago, when the Bears' Anthony Marshall got to Craig Hentrich.
- ▶ The block snapped a streak of 929 consecutive punts without a block, the second-longest active streak in the NFL.
- ▶ It had been considerably longer since the Packers had multiple punts blocked in the same game. That last occurred on Sept. 21, 1975, vs. Detroit. Green Bay had three punts blocked that day.

PACKERS VS. BEARS - I, 35-7

LOSS FREEZES PACKERS OUT OF NFC'S TOP SPOT

If the Green Bay Packers are going to reach the Super Bowl this season, they'll have to do it as a No. 2 playoff seed. The Dallas Cowboys' victory on Saturday night coupled with Green Bay's 35-7 loss at division rival Chicago on Sunday has locked the Packers (12-3) into the NFC's second seed for the postseason.

► But before the Packers can even entertain postseason thoughts, they'll have to rebound, starting with the regular-season finale against Detroit next Sunday, from by far their ugliest performance of 2007.

► With temperatures in the teens and winds whipping off Lake Michigan at anywhere from 20 to 40 miles per hour, the Packers struggled mightily in the cold, blustery conditions. A slew of fumbled snaps, dropped passes and punting problems prevented the Packers from establishing much of anything, and the Bears simply overran them to sweep the season series.

► The Bears looked better prepared for the wintry weather from the outset, putting together an 18-play drive to open the game that consumed 10 minutes, 45 seconds and resulted in a field goal.

► The Packers avoided some trouble early when a fumbled punt snap and a blocked punt failed to produce any points for Chicago. Following the blocked punt, a fourth-and-goal pass from Kyle Orton to Muhsin Muhammad bounced right off the receiver's chest, keeping the early score 3-0.

► Green Bay briefly showed signs of life on **Ryan Grant's** 66-yard touchdown run in the second quarter, taking a 7-6 lead. But a shanked punt set up a Chicago TD drive just before halftime, and set the tone for an abysmal second half.

► Alex Brown's interception led to a short TD pass to Desmond Clark, another blocked punt was returned for a touchdown by Corey Graham, and Brian Urlacher turned the game officially into a rout with an interception and 85-yard return for a score, making it 35-7 early in the fourth.

► Running back Adrian Peterson pounded away 30 times for 102 yards, and former third-string quarterback Kyle Orton was impressively efficient (8-for-14, 101 yards, 1 TD, 103.6 rating) in limited opportunities.

► By contrast, both before and after the game became a blowout, the Packers simply couldn't muster anything on offense. Other than Grant's TD run, Green Bay didn't cross Chicago's 35-yard line until the fourth quarter. When they did twice late, Urlacher's pick-six and a turnover on downs ended the scoring chances.

► All of which sends the Packers into regroup mode. With the Detroit game rendered meaningless in terms of playoff positioning, how long Green Bay plays its starters next Sunday at Lambeau Field will be discussed all week. But the priority will be performing in a way that gets the taste of this game out of their mouths.

WIND WHIPS UP ROUGH DAY FOR RYAN

For all the positive impact the Packers' special teams have made lately, there were seemingly nothing but struggles on Sunday.

► It made for a forgettable day for punter **Jon Ryan**, who fumbled one snap, had two punts blocked, and had another shank off his shin in the 35-7 loss to the Bears.

► The key culprit was the wind. Ryan struggled catching **Rob Davis'** long punt snaps that were being pushed sideways as much as 2 or 3 yards by winds that gusted up to 40 miles per hour, and the timing on virtually every punt was messed up as a result.

► On his first punt of the day, Ryan said he "over-thought" the situation,

knowing the wind was going to move the snap and make him rush to get it off, and as a result he dropped the ball, getting tackled just after picking it up.

► Ryan did prove on his next effort that the proper execution was possible, booming a 47-yard punt from his own 8-yard line that return threat Devin Hester had to backpedal and fair-catch. But that didn't manage to turn Ryan's day for the better.

► At the end of the first half, with the Packers stalled near midfield, Ryan slightly bobbled another snap and then rushed to get the punt off under pressure. He ended up kicking the ball with his shin rather than his foot, and it took a hard left and wobbled out of bounds at the Chicago 45 for just a 9-yard punt. The Bears took advantage, driving 55 yards in 1 minute, 31 seconds, for a touchdown that gave them the lead for good at 13-7.

► Chicago then essentially put the game away early in the second half with a second blocked punt. Charles Tillman rushed untouched from Ryan's right, stuffed the punt, and Corey Graham scooped it up and returned it 7 yards for a touchdown to make it 28-7 midway through the third quarter.



GRANT BREAKS 2 BIG RUNS, LITTLE ELSE

When Grant cut back through Chicago's defensive line for a 24-yard run on the Packers' first offensive play on Sunday, it looked like it might be a good day for a ground game taking on added importance in the cold, blustery conditions.

► But, like most everything else for the Packers at Soldier Field on Sunday, it didn't work out. He did rip off a 66-yard touchdown run in the second quarter on another nice cutback, but other than those two runs, Green Bay's feature back was held to just 10 yards on 12 carries. Grant finished with his fifth 100-yard game of the season, at exactly 100 yards on 14 rushes, but that didn't mean much in the 35-7 defeat.

► The Packers were just 3-of-12 on third downs, and by falling behind 28-7 by the midway point of the third quarter, they forced quarterback **Brett Favre** to throw the ball 32 times compared to just 14 for Chicago's Kyle Orton.

SWITCHEROO; NO. 500

► The Packers continue to try to find the right combination at guard on the offensive line. They opened the game by switching **Junius Coston** to left guard and moving **Jason Spitz** to right guard. Then **Daryn Colledge** subbed in for Coston for a stretch, before Coston went back in.

► With four catches on Sunday, receiver **Donald Driver** became just the third receiver in Packers history to amass 500 receptions. Driver now has 503 catches, third on the franchise's all-time list behind Sterling Sharpe (595) and James Lofton (530).

► Driver also surpassed 80 catches on the season for the fourth time in his career and has 82 this year. The only other Packers receiver with four 80-catch seasons was Sharpe.

► Tight end **Bubba Franks** returned from his knee injury and saw game action for the first time since Oct. 14 vs. Washington. Franks had one catch for 8 yards.

► Receiver **Greg Jennings** injured an ankle in the second half and was being evaluated after the game.

► Defensive tackle **Ryan Pickett** was inactive due to his groin injury, leading to the first NFL start for rookie first-round draft pick **Justin Harrell**, who posted five total tackles (four solo).



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

PACKERS AMONG NFL'S BEST AWAY FROM LAMBEAU

Green Bay has enjoyed remarkable success on the road, winning eight of its last 10 contests. Its recent seven-game road winning streak, which was snapped at Dallas, was something the franchise had not accomplished since Vince Lombardi's final two seasons (1966-67) in Green and Gold.

- ▶ The seven-game road winning streak was the third-longest mark in franchise history. The Packers have won eight consecutive road games twice (1941-42 and 1966-67), the best mark in their history.
- ▶ One of the most impressive accomplishments of Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**'s first year as head coach was the way his club performed on the road. The Packers finished 5-3 away from home in 2006, recording the most road wins in franchise history for a coach in his first season.
- ▶ McCarthy and the Packers did one better in 2007, finishing their regular-season road record at 6-2.

LOOKOUT, QUARTERBACKS

On the other side of the ball is a defense that has collected 36 sacks through 14 games, headlined by one of the NFL's top sack duos.

- ▶ Defensive end **Aaron Kampman**, NFC Defensive Player of the Month for October, has posted 12 sacks, tied for eighth in the NFL. Fellow end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** has tallied 9½ sacks, tied for 16th.
- ▶ 31½ of those sacks have come courtesy of the defensive line, which forms one of the deepest rotations in all of football. Defensive tackle **Corey Williams** has already matched his career high, established last season, with seven sacks.

IN THE NFL'S 'BLACK AND BLUE' DIVISION

Under McCarthy, the Packers have been extremely successful in the NFC North and clinched the club's first division crown since 2004.

- ▶ McCarthy is 8-3 in NFC North games since taking over in Green Bay in 2006. All three division losses have been to the Chicago Bears.
- ▶ Last season, the Packers finished tied for the NFL's best division record at 5-1, losing only to Chicago in the season opener. No other head coach in team annals had a better division mark in his rookie season than McCarthy.

COACH SAYS - EXCERPTS FROM MIKE MCCARTHY

- ▶ *(On the adverse weather conditions)* "Well, I'll say this, Chicago handled it a lot better than we did. There is no doubt about that. It's no excuse. Our performance was poor today in all three phases. We did not handle the football every well. We had the ball on the ground too many times, Chicago did not. They handled the ball very well. The footing we tried to emphasize as much as we could the last couple of days. Playing with good balance, keeping your feet underneath you. I felt we were on the ground way too much today, so we didn't handle it very well."
- ▶ "I was down here with the 49ers a few years back, very similar game. I would say this was worse. It was a lot colder than I recall the San Francisco game (being). But yeah, those are probably the two worst games that I've coached in, and they've both been here in Chicago."
- ▶ *(On offensive struggles)* "We didn't do anything very well. Our run

blocking was sporadic in the beginning and was not very good in the second half. Pass protection we had some breakdowns in protection versus their pressure, and obviously you don't want to throw the ball that many times particularly in that wind, so we were playing uphill, especially when it got to be a three-score game."

- ▶ *(On punt protection)* "We didn't handle the snap very good, and I know the ball moved on him a couple of times but really the punt protection we need to clean up. We have two problems there, but it's part of the game. They played in it (the weather) also."
- ▶ *(On limiting Chicago's early scoring opportunities)* "I guess that's a positive if you're looking for one. The time of possession, 22 minutes in the first half, I thought factored. When Ryan hit the run there, we had a chance to get back in the game and had the series right there before the two minute where we had good, probably our best field position of the day and we did not take advantage of that and turn it around and turn it into points for Chicago. So, we did not play very well at all"
- ▶ *(Did the weather affect the gameplan?)* "Yeah, but that's no excuse. We prepared for the weather. We met about it Friday, watched the forecast and then Saturday morning went through the whole thing with the quarterbacks. As far as the approach to the game, I'm comfortable with it. The execution was very poor."
- ▶ *(On the rotation at guard)* "Just something that we thought would help us game-plan wise, and as far as the relationships of the guard with the tackle and so forth, and trying once again to solidify that situation at guard. That's still not a clean operation for us, and that's why we're still doing what we're doing."
- ▶ "In the big picture, it's not a setback because our focus was about improving. I thought that was important as we prepared for the playoffs. Frankly, some of the things that manifested today in my opinion showed up last week against St. Louis. I thought I addressed them this week in practice. I obviously didn't get that done, so that's my responsibility. We need to clean our house, starting Wednesday, and we need to go out and perform well against Detroit. Now as far as how we're going to play our players, and so forth, I'm not ready to really answer those questions. You need to perform better than the way we did today. I'm very disappointed in our performance."



AN ALL-PRO SINCE MIDSEASON

While it struggled to get production out of its run game through the first half of the season, Green Bay has seemed to uncover a gem in first-year running back **Ryan Grant**.

- ▶ Grant assumed running back duties in the second quarter against Denver and responded with his first 100-yard performance.
- ▶ A powerful runner with the requisite open-field speed, Grant has totaled five 100-yard performances on the season and stands 101 rushing yards from his first 1,000 yard season.
- ▶ Acquired in a trade with the New York Giants, Grant arrived in Green Bay just before Week 1 and made an early mark with his play on the special teams coverage units.
- ▶ Grant earned his first career start in Week 9 at Kansas City and has started every game since. A dual threat out of the backfield, the Notre Dame product also has caught 29 passes.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

TURNOVERS THE NAME OF THE GAME

With its turnover margin at plus-five, Green Bay has 12 wins thanks in large part to its ability to turn turnovers into points. On defense, the Packers have been able to clamp down after turnovers, not allowing opponents to capitalize on scoring opportunities.

- ▶ Green Bay has 89 points scored off turnovers. On the other side of the ball, the defense has allowed 61 points off turnovers.
- ▶ The Packers have won the turnover battle in eight of their 12 wins this season. They came out even in their wins at Minnesota, at Kansas City and at Detroit. They were minus in that category in their only losses, twice against Chicago (minus-four and minus-two) and at Dallas (minus-one), but were able to defeat the Rams despite losing the turnover battle (minus-one).
- ▶ Green Bay did not have a giveaway in the victory over Carolina in Week 11, a feat the club accomplished against Minnesota, Denver and San Diego this season.
- ▶ Over a longer stretch, the team has won 30 of 31 games playing turnover-free football, since a loss at Dallas, Nov. 18, 1996. Green Bay's only loss in such games during that stretch was a 23-20 defeat at Minnesota, Oct. 23, 2005.
- ▶ Including playoffs, the Packers have won 33 of their last 34 games without a giveaway.

ANOTHER WEEK, ANOTHER LONG TOUCHDOWN PASS

Favre continues to lead a big-play offense which has already seen eight touchdown passes of 40 yards or longer through 15 games, the latest a 44-yard bomb to **Greg Jennings** against St. Louis. Never in Favre's career has he hit for so many long touchdowns in one season.

- ▶ On the receiving end of six of the eight long touchdowns has been the second-year pro Jennings, who connected on two such scoring plays as a rookie last season. Three this season have been quite memorable, providing the go-ahead touchdown in the fourth quarter or overtime against San Diego, at Denver and at Kansas City.
- ▶ "I think Brett and the receiver group have done an excellent job in the three- and five-step drops," McCarthy said about the team's success with the long ball. "With that we've been given some opportunities to go vertical, go deep, whether it's inside or outside."
- ▶ The latest Favre-to-Jennings connection was the quarterback's 59th career touchdown pass of 40 yards or more. A look at Favre's most productive seasons with the big play:

WHEN FAVRE HITS THE CENTURY MARK

Quarterback **Brett Favre**, who turned 38 in October, is turning in a season that is beginning to defy description. The league's only three-time MVP (1995-97), Favre could potentially establish new career highs in a number of statistical categories, including completions, passing yards and completion percentage.

- ▶ His Week 14 performance against the Raiders was his ninth game of the season with a passer rating over 100.0. All nine have come in victory.
- ▶ Favre compiled a passer rating over 100.0 for five consecutive weeks (Week 8-12), tying his own career high and marking the first time he's accomplished the feat in a single season. He had three games with a passer rating over 100.0 in Weeks 2-4 earlier this season.
- ▶ This marks the sixth time in his career that Favre has recorded at least

three straight games with a passer rating over 100.0. He did it twice in 1995 (Nov. 12 – Dec. 3, 4 games; Dec. 16 – Jan. 6, 4 games) and twice again in 1996 (Sept. 1 – Sept. 15, 3 games; Dec. 22 – Sept. 1, 1997, 5 games). Favre was voted the league's MVP in both seasons.

- ▶ The last time he accomplished five consecutive games with a passer rating over 100.0 was during the team's Super Bowl XXXI run. The streak began with the final regular-season game against Minnesota (Dec. 22, 1996) and culminated in the first regular-season game the following season (vs. Chicago, Sept. 1). It included three playoff victories, most notably a 35-21 victory over New England in the Super Bowl.
- ▶ Elias Sports Bureau never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis, but rather to measure the effectiveness of a quarterback over an entire season, or an entire career.
- ▶ Nonetheless, in games when Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 82-7 (.921).
- ▶ The Packers are a perfect 44-0 (1.000) at Lambeau Field when Favre hits the century mark. The team is 38-7 (.844) on the road when Favre eclipses the mark.

DID YOU KNOW? A CLOSER LOOK AT THE STATS

- ▶ Green Bay's streak of 22 consecutive games with a takeaway was snapped at Chicago.
- ▶ With four TD passes, Favre can extend his NFL record with a ninth season with 30-or-more TD passes.
- ▶ One week after its worst offensive performance of the season, Green Bay faces the 32nd ranked defense in the NFL.

- RCB 31 Al Harris (6-1, 188, Tenth Year, Texas A&M-Kingsville)** — Regularly assigned to shadow the opponent's top receiver, Harris will make his first career trip to the Pro Bowl in February...Has not missed a game since 1998 (169 contests)...Rarely comes off the field, having played in 98.5 percent of the defensive snaps last year.
- SS 20 Atari Bigby (5-11, 211, Second Year, Central Florida)** — First-year starter was the star of training camp...Played in five games last season and saw his first defensive snaps in the NFL...Previously had been cut by Miami and N.Y. Jets before coming to Green Bay.
- FS 36 Nick Collins (5-11, 200, Third Year, Bethune-Cookman)** — A knee injury in Week 9 forced him to miss the first three games of his pro career...Previously had started every game since arriving as a rookie in 2005...Set new career highs in tackles (102) and interceptions (3) last season...Has all the physical tools to develop into one of the NFC's premier safeties.
- P 9 Jon Ryan (6-0, 202, Second Year, Regina, Canada)** — Canada native had strong rookie campaign...44.5-yard gross average was ninth in the NFL...Voted by teammates the 2006 Ed Block Courage Award winner for his courage in playing through the illness and death of his father.

SIMPLY THE BEST

The Packers own more NFL championships (12) than any other franchise, but it's not all about past glory for the Green and Gold.

- ▶ Talk of unrestricted free agency in the early '90s led many to believe small-town Green Bay would be the first to fold.
- ▶ Since the advent of free agency in 1993, the Packers own the best W-L record in the NFL.
- ▶ A look at the most successful teams in the free-agency era reveal eight of the last 11 Super Bowl champions, beginning with Green Bay in 1997:

FAVRE TURNING BACK THE CLOCK THIS SEASON

Quarterback **Brett Favre** has surpassed some of the NFL's greatest milestones so far this season, but not lost on the rest of the league is just how well he has been playing through the first 15 games.

- ▶ For the first time in his career, Favre threw for 300 yards-or-more in three consecutive games (Weeks 3-5). What's more, he's done it twice this season, completing three straight 300-yard games in Weeks 8-10.
- ▶ The 1,042 passing yards Favre had in Weeks 8-10 are the most passing yards over a three-game stretch in his 17-year career.
- ▶ Under **Mike McCarthy**, his position coach in 1999, Favre has cut down dramatically on his interceptions. With 15 so far on the season, he is on pace for his lowest total since 2001.
- ▶ Much of the Packers' offensive success can be traced to Favre's precision passing. Between a second-quarter interception against the Giants (Week 2) and a third-quarter interception against the Bears (Week 5), Favre had attempted 142 consecutive passes without an interception – the third-longest streak of his career. During the interception-free streak, he threw nine touchdown passes.
- ▶ Favre completed another long interception-free streak of 139 passes, beginning with an interception just before the half in Kansas City (Week 9) and ending in the first quarter at Dallas (Week 13). He threw eight TD passes over the course of this latest streak.

WOODSON AGAIN AMONG THE GAME'S ELITE

Cornerback **Charles Woodson**, who has seen a resurgence to his Pro Bowl level since arriving in Green Bay, has returned to action after a toe injury suffered on Thanksgiving kept him out of the Dallas game and has still kept him out of punt return duties. The 10-year pro so far has four interceptions and two defensive touchdowns on the season.

- ▶ When he signed as a free agent prior to the '06 season, many around the league thought Woodson's days as an elite corner were over. Already, his three defensive touchdowns in Green and Gold surpass his total (two) in eight seasons as a Raider. What's more, the former Heisman Trophy winner has 12 interceptions in 30 games with Green Bay. He had 17 interceptions in 106 games with Oakland. He credits fellow corner Al Harris, as opposing quarterbacks can no longer ignore Woodson.
- ▶ Despite the fact he is a four-time Pro Bowler, Woodson won just the first

Defensive Player of the Week honor of his career for his performance in Week 6 against Washington. He picked off a Jason Campbell pass and also returned a fumble 57 yards for the go-ahead touchdown.

- ▶ Historically speaking, Woodson is only the fourth Packers player since 1940 with a fumble recovery for a touchdown and an interception in the same game. The other three Green Bay Packers to do that were Charley Brock (10/4/1942, at CHI), Tom Brown (11/17/1968, vs. NO) and Ahmad Carroll (11/29/2004, vs. StL).

CLOSING IN ON MARINO...AGAIN

Quarterback **Brett Favre** threw for three touchdowns in Week 12, the 63rd game of his career with at least three TD passes.

- ▶ With the effort, Favre surpassed Dan Marino's (62) NFL record.
- ▶ He is also chasing Marino in 300-yard passing games. Favre has seven already this season, tying his own record of seven 300-yard passing games established in 1995.
- ▶ A list of the quarterbacks with the most 300-yard passing games:

MCCARTHY TOPS THROUGH 25

Notching his 16th victory in his 25th game since taking over head coaching duties at the offices on Lombardi Avenue, McCarthy won more games through his first 25 than any coach in franchise history.

- ▶ Vince Lombardi and Mike Sherman had previously topped the list, as both went 15-10 to open their coaching careers in Green Bay. Mike Holmgren went 14-11 through his first 25.
- ▶ According to Elias, McCarthy tied Joe Gibbs for the best career start of any active head coach over 25 games.
- ▶ "My focus is on winning the world's championship," McCarthy said when asked about the accomplishment. "That will always be the focus regardless of how many games it takes to get there through the regular season and so forth. Because when you win championships, everything else takes care of itself."

'FAB 5' A NIGHTMARE MATCHUP

For the seventh consecutive week, Green Bay displayed its 'Big 5' formation with receivers **Donald Driver**, **Greg Jennings**, **James Jones**, **Ruvell Martin** and **Koren Robinson** all split out wide.

- ▶ Highlighted by each receiver's ability to run after the catch and their quarterback's quick release, the formation aims to take advantage of whichever favorable matchup the defense may present.
- ▶ The offense also displays a variation of the formation, with tight end **Donald Lee** split wide and Favre again with an empty backfield.
- ▶ "It's mismatches versus time (to throw) is what we're playing against," Favre said when asked about the formation. "If I was a defensive coordinator, I don't know who you stop or who you go in saying, OK, this is what we (have to prepare for) ... And for us that's a good thing. We have enough diversity to present its own set of problems."
- ▶ "It's important because our game is about match-ups," McCarthy said. "To me that's one of the most important aspects of game-planning. When you get to this point in the season you're looking at the injuries and different packages. Being able to take advantage of that is even more important. I think it's more evident when you watch the way that defenses react to four wide receivers or five wide receivers. There's a lot of respect and cautiousness in the way defenses approach it. I'm sure there will be a time when people challenge us (with) those particular sets, but it's definitely a weapon for us."



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

TOUGHEST ROAD VENUES? NO PROBLEM

Earlier this season, the league's youngest club proved its ability in hostile environments, even coming off short rest.

- ▶ In the span of six days, the Packers went into two of the NFL's most hostile stadiums – Denver's INVESCO Field and Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium – and came away with victories. Entering play this season, Kansas City (No. 1) and Denver (No. 2) owned the league's best home records since 1990. Green Bay, with its Lambeau Field advantage, owned the fourth-best winning percentage in that period.
- ▶ What's more, Green Bay faced a rested Kansas City club coming off a bye week, while the Packers had an abbreviated week thanks to the Monday night showdown in Denver.
- ▶ "I think our players realize, young and old, that (K.C.) was a tough game going into and a tough place to play," McCarthy said following the victory over the Chiefs. "This group works hard, stays focused. I tell them every day: smart, tough, fundamentally sound. They're in tune with that. That's the way we grade them every day. You make smart decisions, you play tough and you're fundamentally sound. We try to keep it as simple as possible."
- ▶ The Packers completed a sweep of the AFC West and have now won six straight and nine of their last 11 against the division, dating back to a 1996 victory over Denver.

440 TD PASSES AND COUNTING...

After a moment now etched in NFL history, Brett Favre stands alone atop the all-time touchdown passes list.

- ▶ James Jones became the 43rd different Packers player on the receiving end of a Favre touchdown pass. The start of the record, touchdown pass No. 1, began with **Sterling Sharpe's** grab in the fourth quarter against the Bengals on Sept. 20, 1992.
- ▶ Favre's two fourth-quarter touchdown throws in that game not only sealed the come-from-behind, 24-23 victory, but also earned him the start the following week, a job he hasn't relinquished since.
- ▶ In a three-touchdown performance at New England on Oct. 13, 2002, Favre became just the fourth NFL player to throw for 300 touchdowns. On his final TD pass of the day, a 2-yard toss to tight end **Bubba Franks**, Favre surpassed John Elway to move into third place on the all-time list.
- ▶ He moved into second place on the list in one of the most memorable performances of his career – and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – when he threw four touchdown passes in the first half against Oakland just one day after the sudden death of his father, Irvin. Favre's second touchdown pass of the night, a 23-yard strike to Javon Walker, pushed him past Fran Tarkenton on the league's all-time list with 343 career TD passes.
- ▶ A first-quarter strike to **Greg Jennings** made NFL history at Minnesota in Week 4. The game was stopped briefly, and a videotaped message from Dan Marino was played on the Metrodome's scoreboard.

A CHRONOLOGY OF THE RECORD

Eight players – all members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame – have held the NFL career touchdown pass record throughout the history of the league. Thanks to research provided by Elias Sports Bureau, the one-time record holders were:

- ▶ **Benny Friedman** had 66 career TD passes and held the record from 1930 until 1943.
- ▶ **Arnie Herber**, a former Green Bay signal caller, reached 66 touchdown passes in 1940 and shared the record with Friedman until 1943.
- ▶ **Sammy Baugh** passed Friedman and Herber in 1943 and threw 187 career touchdowns. He held the record until 1962.
- ▶ **Bobby Layne** tied Baugh in 1961 and passed him during the 1962 season. Layne finished with 196 touchdown passes and held the record until 1963.
- ▶ **Y.A. Tittle** passed Layne in 1963 and finished his career with 212 touchdown passes. Tittle held the record until 1966.
- ▶ **Johnny Unitas** passed Tittle in 1966 and ended his playing days with 290 TD passes. He held the record until 1975.
- ▶ **Fran Tarkenton** surpassed Unitas in 1975 and became the first NFL player with 300 career TD passes. He finished with 342 touchdown passes and held the record until 1995.
- ▶ **Dan Marino** passed Tarkenton on Nov. 26, 1995, at Indianapolis with a second-quarter touchdown pass and finished his career with 420 touchdown passes. He held the record until surpassed by Brett Favre in 2007.

PACKERS ONCE AGAIN LEAGUE'S YOUNGEST TEAM

Green Bay has the distinction of being the NFL's youngest team for the second straight season.

- ▶ Since taking over general manager duties in 2005, Ted Thompson has vowed to build the team's foundation through the draft. Of the 53 active roster players, 18 have been drafted by Thompson.
- ▶ Each team's average age is based upon its opening-day roster. A look at the five youngest teams in 2007:

MCCARTHY NOW A HALL-OF-FAMER

Though the bye week is meant for rest for players and coaches alike, Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** did take a detour to Baldwin City, Kan.

- ▶ There on Oct. 20, McCarthy was inducted into Baker University's Athletic Hall of Fame, where he was an all-conference tight end and senior captain in 1986. That season, the team made a run all the way to the NAIA title game.
- ▶ McCarthy became the 103rd member of Baker's Hall of Fame, which was founded in 1977. Baker, the oldest university in Kansas, is celebrating its 150th anniversary in 2007-08.
- ▶ McCarthy has been taking home some hardware for his performance with the Packers as well. He was honored as Motorola NFL Coach of the Week honors after a Week 10 shutout victory over the Minnesota Vikings. It was the second such honor of the season for McCarthy, who is certainly among the top candidates for NFL Coach of the Year honors.



MARK H. MURPHY NAMED GREEN BAY PACKERS PRESIDENT AND CEO

MURPHY ELECTED TO SUCCEED HARLAN

Mark H. Murphy, possessor of extensive experience in professional football and sports administration, has been elected as the Green Bay Packers' President and CEO, the organization announced Dec. 3.

▶ The Packers Board of Directors approved Murphy as the franchise's 10th Chief Executive Officer in a unanimous vote at Lambeau Field. Packers Chairman of the Board **Bob Harlan** will continue to lead the organization through the 2007 football campaign, including any postseason games. Prior to that, the transition formally will begin Jan. 1, 2008, with Murphy assuming the title of President and CEO-elect.

▶ "The Green Bay Packers are very pleased to name Mark Murphy as our President and CEO," Harlan said. "He has an excellent background and record of success in the business of athletics, and through his NFL playing career brings a great understanding of our game to his position. He'll be an outstanding leader for our franchise and a great addition to our community. We're delighted to have Mark join us."

▶ "I am honored to have been selected and very appreciative of this tremendous opportunity," Murphy said. "The Packers are one of the great franchises in all of professional sports, with a rich history and incredible fan support. These are successful times for the Packers. On the field they're performing well, and off the field, they're in great shape, too. I look forward to being a part of that continued success."

▶ Murphy, who holds a law degree and an M.B.A. in finance, brings a unique and highly qualified background to his role as head of one of the NFL's flagship franchises, first drawing from a deep understanding and appreciation of the game that comes from an eight-year playing career with the Washington Redskins. Later, he served a combined 16 years as director of athletics at Colgate University and Northwestern University, as well as positions as an assistant executive director of the NFL Players Association and a trial attorney with the U.S. Department of Justice.

▶ In addition to his playing career and work with the NFL Players Association, Murphy has maintained his ties to the NFL through his work on the Commissioner's Player Advisory Committee (1994-2002) as well as the NFL Youth Football Committee (2002-present).

▶ "Mark brings an important blend of experiences to the job, so many of which touch on issues that we will be dealing with in the future," said NFL Commissioner **Roger Goodell**. "Based on eight seasons with the Redskins, Mark has a deep respect for the history of the league, its players and coaches. He understands the impact of a franchise on its community and the importance of players and coaches meshing with their local fan bases."

▶ The 52-year-old Murphy joins the Packers after four and a half years as director of athletics at Northwestern University. At the Big Ten Conference university, Murphy oversaw a 19-sport program with a \$40-million budget and 160 full-time employees. The school enjoyed eight individual national championships and three NCAA team titles. Additionally, the university won nine conference team championships and 34 individual Big Ten titles. A total of 49 Wildcats have earned first-team All-America distinction. On the football field, the Wildcats have participated in two bowl games during Murphy's tenure after playing in just four previous such contests in the program's history. In 2006-07, Northwestern finished 30th in the U.S. Sports Academy Directors' Cup standings with a school-best 626.5 points. The Wildcats have ranked among the top 30 in the standings for the past three seasons and last year finished sixth among Big Ten schools for the third straight year after previously not placing higher than ninth.



▶ The school's athletic success under Murphy was achieved while its student-athletes continued to excel off the field. The most recent NCAA Graduation Success Rate (GSR) data released in October 2007 reported Northwestern's rate at 98 percent, tying it with Notre Dame and Navy for tops in the nation.

▶ Prior to his tenure at Northwestern, Murphy served as director of athletics at Colgate University in Hamilton, N.Y. (1992-2003), the school from which he graduated in 1977. During his 11 years at the helm, the university experienced a renaissance of its football program, going from 0-11 in 1995 to three consecutive appearances in the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs. In 2003, the year after Murphy's departure to Northwestern, the team made it to the championship game; the achievement of that squad - a non-scholarship program - remains one of Murphy's proudest moments.

▶ A former All-Pro safety for the Washington Redskins, Murphy enjoyed an eight-year (1977-84) career after originally signing with the team as a non-drafted free agent in 1977. He was a co-captain from 1980-84, a period that included two Super Bowl teams (1982-83). He enjoyed his finest season in 1983, leading the NFL with nine interceptions and earning consensus All-Pro honors as well as a trip to the Pro Bowl. Murphy was named as one of the Redskins' "70 Greatest Players" and also is a member of the club's "50th Anniversary Team."

▶ During his days as a Redskin, Murphy earned an M.B.A. in finance from American University in Washington, D.C., attending classes full-time in the offseason and evening classes in-season. Upon completion of his playing career in 1985 he joined the NFL Players Association as assistant executive director. While with the NFLPA, Murphy served on the bargaining team, developed the agent certification system and strengthened the PA's degree completion and career counseling programs.

▶ While with the NFLPA, he started work on a law degree from Georgetown University and ultimately finished his studies full-time after leaving the Players Association. Upon receiving his law degree in 1988, he worked for a year at a Washington law firm before becoming a trial attorney with the U.S. Department of Justice in 1989.

▶ During a four-year career with the Department of Justice, he primarily represented government agencies in trials. Then, in 1992, his alma mater called and he returned to the sports realm.

▶ Born July 13, 1955, in Fulton, N.Y., Murphy was a three-sport star (football, baseball and basketball) at Clarence Central High School in the Buffalo-area community of Williamsville, and was named the best all-around athlete in western New York during his senior year. His baseball talents drew attention from Major League scouts. In 2002, he was inducted into the Greater Buffalo Sports Hall of Fame in recognition of his achievements both on and off the field.

▶ Murphy and his wife, Laurie, who also is a Colgate graduate, have been involved in the communities in which they've lived. Over the years the couple has donated their time to numerous organizations, including local schools, the United Methodist Church in Hamilton, N.Y., and the First Congregational Church of Evanston, Ill. While at Colgate University, Murphy formed the Hamilton Youth Basketball League and served as its commissioner. Heavily involved in the community while with the Redskins, Murphy was named the team's "Miller Man of the Year" in 1984 in honor of his work off the field.

▶ The couple has four children: Katie, 24, a graduate of Harvard who played basketball for the Crimson; Emily, 22, a senior at Middlebury (Vt.) College; Brian, 18, a freshman at Amherst (Mass.) College; and Anna, 17.

FAVRE'S MOST IMPRESSIVE STAT?

Not to be overlooked as he breaks nearly every career passing record is just how durable Favre has been since being inserted into the starting lineup. Despite playing one of the most susceptible positions in the game, Favre has answered the bell time after time for the Packers.

- ▶ Favre has played in 254 straight games (274 including playoffs) and his 252 starts in a row (272 including playoffs) is the NFL's record among quarterbacks.
- ▶ Consecutive start No. 250 looked to be in doubt during the Dallas game, as Favre left in the second quarter with elbow and shoulder injuries. However, Favre earned the start against Oakland, the seventh time in his career he started a game after being unable to finish the previous one.
- ▶ Favre has appeared on the injury report an amazing 50 times during the streak.
- ▶ Only Minnesota's Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more regular-season games in consecutive fashion.

MILESTONES COME ON THE ROAD FOR FAVRE

Brett Favre achieved yet another of the league's most coveted milestones away from Lambeau Field in a Green Bay road victory. Taking a look back at some of Favre's milestone touchdown passes throughout his career, all have a common theme – they came in road victories.

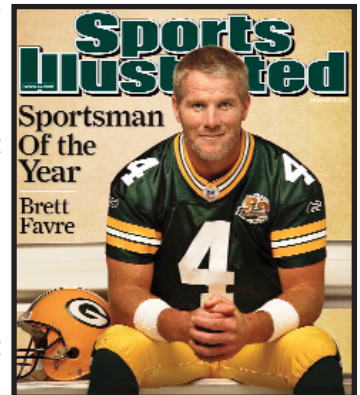
- ▶ Only touchdown pass No. 100 came in front of the home crowd at Lambeau Field, though it still came in a winning effort.
- ▶ Touchdown pass No. 301 pushed Favre ahead of John Elway (300) to third on the league's all-time touchdown passes list.
- ▶ No. 343 – coming in one of the most memorable performances of his career and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – placed Favre No. 2 on the all-time list, surpassing Fran Tarkenton.

FAVRE NAMED 2007 SPORTS ILLUSTRATED SPORTSMAN OF THE YEAR

The accolades are already beginning to pour in for the NFL's winningest quarterback. Favre, who became the NFL's all-time leader in touchdown passes earlier this season, was chosen as the 2007 Sports Illustrated Sportsman of the Year on Dec. 3.

- ▶ The Sportsman of the Year issue, dated Dec. 10, quickly sold out around the country. Also, Favre received the Sportsman of the Year award, a sterling silver trophy crafted by Tiffany & Co..
- ▶ It seems to be just the beginning for Favre, who is currently leading the league in Pro Bowl voting. The league's only three-time MVP has enjoyed a renaissance year, enjoying as good a year statistically as he has ever had.
- ▶ Favre is the fourth NFL player to be named Sportsman: Terry Bradshaw (1979, with Willie Stargell), Joe Montana (1990) and Tom Brady (2005) were the others. Favre is the first Green Bay Packer to earn the honor.



MORE THAN JUST A SACK TO KGB, COMMUNITY

Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila**, who earlier this season surpassed Hall of Famer Reggie White on the franchise's all-time career sack list, has seen a return to form this season with 9½ sacks through 15 games.

- ▶ With another ½ sack, Gbaja-Biamila can reach double digits in sacks for the fifth time in his career. He stands tied with White with four seasons with 10 or more sacks.
- ▶ That milestone just may happen Sunday. Gbaja-Biamila has recorded more sacks against Chicago (11) than any other NFL team.
- ▶ This season, many more are cheering on 'KGB' with each sack for what it will mean towards the greater Green Bay community.
- ▶ More than \$10,000 goes to Freedom House, a Green Bay homeless shelter, with each KGB sack. The pledge for each sack comes from Gbaja-Biamila, teammates **Ryan Pickett** and **Bubba Franks**, and local donors.
- ▶ One of the decade's most-feared pass rushers, KGB recorded 10-plus sacks four consecutive seasons (2001-04). The eight-year pro, along with many others, is hoping he can reach that plateau again this season.



PACKERS TEAM NOTES

LAMBEAU CELEBRATES GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Packers will host a season-long celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of Lambeau Field. The crown jewel of the National Football League remains the most historic stadium in football.

► Dedicated as City Stadium Sept. 29, 1957, with a 21-17 victory over the archrival Chicago Bears, the team renamed the facility Lambeau Field in 1965 following the death of E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach. It is the NFL's longest-tenured facility.

► To mark the occasion, an anniversary logo was created and is featured on the team's home uniforms, *Gameday* program, the media guide and the Packers Yearbook.

► Lambeau Field also features the special logo in the north end zone. Both end zones have been painted to reflect the way they were in the stadium's first season in 1957.

► Renowned 3-D pop artist Charles Fazzino was commissioned by the Packers to create an art piece celebrating the 50th anniversary. Fazzino, the official artist of the Super Bowl and Major League Baseball's All-Star Game, spent nine months on the project. The piece is available in a limited edition 3-D format, as well as on T-shirts, helmets and assorted items in the Packers Pro Shop.

► Packers ticket holders will enjoy images of Lambeau Field through the years on their tickets as well.



PACKERS SEEM TO MAKE HISTORY ON MONDAY NIGHT

In Denver, Green Bay won its first overtime game on the road since Dec. 12, 1983, at Tampa Bay, also a game on *Monday Night Football*. Jan Stenerud's 23-yard field goal sealed the 12-9 Packers win in Howard Cosell's final broadcast.

► Also in the game, **James Jones** and **Greg Jennings** became the first Packers' duo to record 100 yards receiving each since Donald Driver and Javon Walker on Oct. 11, 2004 vs. Tennessee, also a game on *MNF*.

► Favre's 82-yard strike to Jennings tied for the second-longest TD pass to end an overtime in NFL history. The longest was the 99-yard play from Philadelphia's Ron Jaworski to Mike Quick on Nov. 10, 1985, vs. Atlanta. New England's Tom Brady connected with Troy Brown on an 82-yard pass play to beat Miami on Oct. 19, 2003.

► Jones' 79-yard touchdown catch in the first quarter was the team's longest touchdown reception by a Packers rookie since Max McGee's 82-yard reception in the 1954 season.

NO ONE WINS MORE THAN NO. 4

In what has been a record-breaking year for Favre thus far, certainly one of the most meaningful accomplishments, both from a team and individual standpoint, came early. With his 149th win in Week 2, Favre surpassed John Elway on the all-time quarterback wins list. Heading into the contest against Oakland, Favre now has 159 career wins.

► Simply put, Favre was spectacular in the record-breaking victory over the New York Giants. He completed 29-of-38 passes for 286 yards and three touchdowns and earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors.

► "We gave him the game ball after the game," McCarthy said after the win. "The 'all-time' in anything in this league is such a monumental achievement. 149 victories - I think that speaks for itself. When you go out and win over that long of a period of time, I think that's the ultimate compliment a quarterback can have. To me, if you asked me what is the biggest record that he will achieve, I think he just accomplished it."

SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Four coaches have new titles this season, though all four were with the team during the 2006 season. Former offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski left to become the head coach at Boston College in January,

leaving a major opening on the staff.

► McCarthy tabbed **Joe Philbin** as offensive coordinator. Entering his fifth season with the Packers, Philbin most recently served as offensive line coach in 2006 where he implemented a new zone-blocking scheme and successfully integrated three rookie starters.

► **Winston Moss** was promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers after serving as linebackers coach in 2006. As the assistant head coach, the 41-year-old Moss will be McCarthy's right-hand man with regard to administrative duties and team dynamics. Moss will continue to coach the linebackers as well.

► Promoted to offensive line coach, **James Campen** moves up from his position as assistant offensive line coach in McCarthy's first season at the helm. The center for Brett Favre's first career start in 1992, Campen begins his fourth season on the Packers staff.

► **Jerry Fontenot** will serve as assistant offensive line coach in 2007. A 16-year NFL veteran (1989-2004), Fontenot joined the Packers as a coaching intern last summer and remained with the team throughout the 2006 season as an offensive assistant.

QUITE THE DEBUT FOR CROSBY

According to Elias Sports Bureau, rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** on Sept. 9 became the first player in NFL history to kick a 50-plus yard field goal and a game-winning field goal in the final minute of his first NFL game.

► What a whirlwind couple of days it had been for Crosby. First, he found out on Sept. 1 that he had won the kicking job after what had been perhaps the most intense positional battle in training camp. Two days later, he celebrated his 23rd birthday, and just days after that the rookie was lining up for his first-ever professional game.

► Crosby was 3-for-3 on field goals against the Eagles. He hit a 53-yarder, one yard shy of the team record, in the first quarter, a 37-yarder in the third quarter, and a 42-yarder with 2 seconds left to break a 13-all tie and give the Packers the three-point win. He was later awarded NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his efforts.

ROOKIES IN THE BACKFIELD

Green Bay became the first NFL team to open the regular season with two rookie starters in the backfield since 1996. That season, both St. Louis (Derrick Harris and Lawrence Phillips) and Miami (Stanley Pritchett and Abdul-Karim al-Jabbar) used an all-rookie backfield on opening day.

► Rookie running back **Brandon Jackson**, a second-round pick from Nebraska, became the first rookie to start at running back on opening day for the Packers since John Brockington in 1971.

► Fullback **Korey Hall** was the first Packers rookie to start on opening day at fullback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

TRAVELING LIGHT IN 2007

NFL teams will cover 566,650 miles this season – about 75,000 more miles than a round trip flight from the earth to the moon.

► No team this season covered more mileage than the St. Louis Rams (34,352), while the N.Y. Jets traveled the fewest (9,186).

► In the preseason and regular season, Green Bay will have flown a total of 10,738 miles, over 6,000 miles less than the team traveled in 2006.

- ▶ Could become only the second Packers player with multiple 90-catch seasons, joining Sterling Sharpe (four). Driver had his first 90-reception campaign in 2006.
- ▶ Needs two TD receptions to become only the eighth player in franchise annals to reach 40 career, joining Don Hutson (99), Sterling Sharpe (65), Antonio Freeman (57), Max McGee (50), James Lofton (49), Billy Howton (43) and Boyd Dowler (40). Driver enters with 38.

4 BRETT FAVRE

- ▶ Has played in 254 straight games (274 including playoffs) and started 252 in a row (272 including playoffs), the NFL's record among quarterbacks.
