## PACKERS – REDSKINS HIGHLIGHT WEEK 6 NFC SCHEDULE

Two of the surprise teams in the NFC thus far – the 4-1 Packers and 3-1 Redskins – square off at historic Lambeau Field Sunday afternoon. It marks the 249th consecutive regular-season sellout (263 including play-offs) at the NFL's longest-tenured stadium.



- ▶ The Packers saw their eight-game winning streak come to an end Sunday night against Chicago in a 27-20 loss, while Washington comes off a 34-3 victory over Detroit.
- ▶ Green Bay also saw its six-game winning streak against NFC North opponents snapped. Prior to Sunday, the Packers' last division loss came against the Bears at Lambeau Field in the 2006 season opener.
- ▶ Green Bay achieved a 4-0 start for the ninth time in team history. Seven of those Packers teams went on to win an NFL championship (1929, '30, '31, '44, '62, '65, and 1966).
- ▶ Luckily for the Packers, former GM Ron Wolf was not discouraged by **Brett Favre's** first career appearance against Washington. Favre got his most extensive playing time as a 1991 rookie with the Falcons, at RFK Stadium, going 0-for-4 with two INTs in a 56-17 loss to the Redskins.
- ▶ Joe Gibbs returns to Lambeau Field for the first time since 1986, when he and quarterback Jay Schroeder registered a 16-7 win. Three years earlier in Green Bay, Gibbs and Joe Theismann sustained a 48-47 loss in the highest-scoring game in *Monday Night Football* history.

## ANOTHER FIRST FOR FAVRE

For the first time in his illustrious career, Favre has thrown for 300 yards-or-more in three consecutive games. With a 322-yard effort against Chicago, Favre now has 51 career 300-yard passing games.

- ▶ Favre has thrown for 1,035 yards over the past three contests – the most passing yards over a three-game stretch in his 17-year career.
- ▶ Much of the Packers' offensive success can be traced to Favre's precision passing. Between a second-quarter interception against the Giants (Week 2) and a third-quarter interception against the Bears (Week 5), Favre had attempted 142 consecutive passes without an interception – the third-longest streak of his career. During the interception-free streak, he threw nine touchdown passes.

## TURNOVERS THE NAME OF THE GAME

Green Bay put up more yardage on offense than it had all season – 439 total net yards – and surrendered just two yards more – 285 – than its best defensive outing of the season, but could not overcome five turnovers against the rival Bears on Sunday night.

- ▶ The Packers had won the turnover battle in each of their first three games and came out even in their fourth win against Minnesota.
- ▶ Green Bay did not have a giveaway in the victory over San Diego. The

team was 3-0 last season in games without a giveaway.

- ▶ Over a longer stretch, the team has won 25 of 26 games playing turnover-free football, since a loss at Minnesota, Dec. 1, 1997. Green Bay's only loss in such games during that stretch was a 23-20 defeat at Minnesota, Oct. 23, 2005.
- ▶ Including playoffs, the Packers have won 28 of their last 29 games without a giveaway.

## WITH THE CALL

**FOX Sports** enters its 14th season as an NFL network television partner and will air the contest to a regional audience. Play-by-play man **Kenny Albert** joins color analyst **Troy Aikman** in the broadcast booth with **Pam Oliver** serving as the sideline reporter.

- ▶ Milwaukee's **WTMJ** (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The network covers 47 markets in six states.
- ▶ For out-of-town listeners, the broadcast is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on [www.packers.com](http://www.packers.com) as well as on Sirius Satellite Radio as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.

# THIS WEEK AT LAMBEAU

## HAPPY BIRTHDAY, BRETT


Favre celebrates his 38th birthday on Wednesday. Rookie **DeShawn Wynn**, No. 1 on the depth chart at tailback, celebrates a birthday one day earlier on Tuesday. Wynn turns 24.

- ▶ Despite being the oldest starting quarterback in the NFL, Brett Favre has shown no signs of fatigue. He continues his iron-man streak of consecutive starts – 243 regular-season games in a row should he start Sunday – and has led the league in passing attempts the past two seasons.
- ▶ Heading into action this weekend, Favre leads the NFL in completions, attempts and passing yards.

## SPITZ TO START AT CENTER FOR AN INJURED WELLS

Center **Scott Wells** will see his streak of 28 consecutive starts snapped this weekend, as Coach McCarthy declared him out for the Redskins contest.

- ▶ Wells was poked in the eye in the third quarter against the Bears and did not return. Remarkably durable, Wells had played every offensive snap thus far in 2007 after playing 99.8% of the snaps in 2006, missing two snaps after his shoe came off.
- ▶ Second-year pro **Jason Spitz** will get his 15th career start Sunday, his first at center. Spitz started 13 games at guard as a rookie and opened 2007 as the starter at right guard before being sidelined by a calf injury.



**Note of the Week**

**PICKS KEEP COMING AND COMING...**

Linebacker **Brady Poppinga** intercepted a pass in the fourth quarter, marking the 11th straight game that the Packers have intercepted at least one pass.

- ▶ According to Elias Sports Bureau, that 11-game interception streak is the longest current streak in the NFL.
- ▶ The Packers' current streak also matches the longest mark in franchise history since an 11-game streak in 1984-85.

## “SPECIAL” TEAMS

Having always been a key ingredient to the success of the Packers, Green Bay's special teams unit has seen a remarkable improvement this season.

- ▶ In Rick Gosselin's annual *Dallas Morning News* rankings, which objectively grades teams by their rankings in 22 kicking-game categories, Green Bay finished seventh both in 1996 and 1997. The Packers reached the Super Bowl both seasons.
- ▶ More recently, the Packers ranked 8th in 2003 and 9th in 2004. Both years they made the playoffs.
- ▶ For the past two seasons, Green Bay has ranked last in the NFL in Gosselin's rankings.
- ▶ The coverage units have been excellent thus far. Through five games, the Packers rank first in opponent punt return average and second in opponent kickoff return average.
- ▶ An area of emphasis all offseason, the unit got things going early in Week 1 by accounting for all 16 points. Cornerback Jarrett Bush delivered a crushing hit on Eagles return man Greg Lewis. The muffed punt bounced back 20 yards into the end zone, where it was recovered by linebacker Tracy White. Both White (No. 1) and Bush (No. 3) were among the team leaders in special teams tackles in 2006. Bush recov-

ered another muffed punt in the fourth quarter to set up the game-winning field goal.

- ▶ Rookie kicker Mason Crosby has connected on 9-of-10 field goal attempts on the season and has displayed a powerful kickoff leg. His seven touchbacks rank fifth in the NFL.
- ▶ Though the team has been unable to put cornerback Will Blackmon on return duties, fellow defensive back Tramon Williams has filled in nicely. His 65-yard kickoff return in Week 5 against Chicago was the longest return by a Packer since Robert Ferguson's 71-yard kickoff return at Indianapolis (Sept. 26, 2004).

## TURNING BACK THE CLOCK

In Weeks 2-4, quarterback Brett Favre compiled a passer rating over 100.0 for three consecutive weeks, something he has not done since the 1996 season. Not surprisingly, the Packers won all three contests (at N.Y. Giants, San Diego, at Minnesota).

- ▶ In fact, it was only the fifth time in his career that Favre had recorded three straight games with a passer rating over 100.0. He did it twice in 1995 (Nov. 12 – Dec. 3, 4 games; Dec. 16 – Jan. 6, 4 games) and twice again in 1996 (Sept. 1 – Sept. 15, 3 games; Dec. 22 – Sept. 1, 1997, 5 games). Favre was voted the league's MVP in both seasons.
- ▶ The last time he accomplished the feat, Favre had five straight games with a passer rating over 100.0 during the team's Super Bowl XXXI run. The streak began with the final regular-season game against Minnesota (Dec. 22, 1996) and culminated in the first regular-season game the following season (vs. Chicago, Sept. 1). It included three playoff victories, most notably a 35-21 victory over New England in the Super Bowl.
- ▶ Elias Sports Bureau, the NFL's official statistician for half a century, never intended for the passer rating to reflect efficiency on a game-by-game basis, but rather to measure the effectiveness of a quarterback over an entire season, or an entire career.
- ▶ Nonetheless, in games when Favre compiles at least a 100.0 rating, the Packers are 76-7 (.916).
- ▶ The Packers are a perfect 41-0 (1.000) at Lambeau Field when Favre hits the century mark. The team is 35-7 (.829) on the road when Favre eclipses the century mark.

## THE IMPORTANCE OF A QUICK START

There's no secret that early success increases an NFL team's chance to earn a playoff berth.

- ▶ Maintaining the confidence and momentum built during the four-game win streak to close 2006 has been a major focus of the offseason program for Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** and his team.
- ▶ One of McCarthy's early goals this season – getting off to a quick start – was accomplished with the 4-0 start.
- ▶ Slow starts have plagued the Packers the past three seasons, only one of which resulted in a postseason appearance (2004). That season, the team started 1-4 but won nine of its last 11 games.
- ▶ In 2005, injuries contributed to a 1-7 start while a 1-4 start in 2006 proved too much to overcome.
- ▶ A look at how important fast starts have become to eventual playoff success in the NFL, compiled from 1990-2006:

**MIKE MCCARTHY...** In second year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Led the Packers to an 8-8 finish and near playoff berth, losing a tiebreaker with the New York Giants, who also finished 8-8.
- ▶ Spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator for the New Orleans Saints (2000-04) and San Francisco 49ers (2005).
- ▶ Began his coaching career as a college assistant at Fort Hays State (1987-88) and at the University of Pittsburgh (1989-92) before breaking into the NFL as a quality control assistant with the Chiefs in 1993.

**JOE GIBBS...** In fourth year as the Redskins' 21st head coach.

- ▶ Previously coached the Redskins for 12 seasons (1981-92), guiding the team to four Super Bowl appearances and three championships.
- ▶ Inducted into the Pro Football Hall of Fame in 1996.
- ▶ Served as an assistant with the Cardinals, Bucs and Chargers before joining the Redskins in 1981.
- ▶ Left Washington in 1993 to spend more time with his family and pursue work with his NASCAR team, established in 1991. His drivers won the Daytona 500 in 1992 (Dale Jarrett) and Winston Cups in 2000 (Bobby Labonte) and 2002 (Tony Stewart).

## THE PACKERS-REDSKINS SERIES

The Packers first met the Redskins, then the Boston Braves, in 1932, five days after Franklin D. Roosevelt won his first presidential election.

- ▶ Green Bay won that initial meeting, 21-0, in a year when the Packers would've claimed a fourth consecutive league championship. Before playoffs began in 1933, the NFL determined league champions based on standings, and had tie games counted like they do today, the Packers' winning percentage would've been first.
- ▶ The two clubs met several times in the early years, most memorably in the 1936 NFL championship game. That year, Redskins owner George Preston Marshall, upset with his fans' lack of support, was moving his team to Washington and didn't want to host the championship in Boston. So, the NFL moved the game to New York's Polo Grounds, where Green Bay claimed its fourth title, 21-6.
- ▶ In the other playoff meeting in the series, an NFC divisional game on Christmas Eve 1972, Bill Kilmer hit Roy Jefferson on a 32-yard TD pass, and Curt Knight kicked three field goals in a 16-3 Washington win, spoiling the Packers' Central Division crown.
- ▶ The Packers and Redskins played the highest scoring game in *Monday Night Football* history on Oct. 17, 1983, at Lambeau Field, in a game that featured 11 touchdowns, 11 extra points and six field goals.
- ▶ The Packers own a three-game series winning streak (2001-04). That streak began at Lambeau Field, Sept. 24, 2001, the historic first

Monday night game after the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks. The Packers have outscored Washington 95-23 in the three games.

## NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

McCarthy and Redskins associate head coach/offense Al Saunders worked together for six seasons on the offensive staff in Kansas City (1993-98); also on that Kansas City staff was Packers special teams coordinator Mike Stock, defensive line coach Carl Hairston and secondary coach Kurt Schottenheimer...Stock spent three seasons in Washington (2001-03) as special teams coach...Schottenheimer spent one season with the Redskins (2001) as defensive coordinator...Packers defensive tackles coach Robert Nunn spent one season in Washington (2003) as defensive line coach...Redskins assistant head coach/offense Joe Bugel coached four seasons with the Houston Oilers (1977-80) during Packers GM Ted Thompson's 10-year playing career with the Oilers (1975-84)...Packers personnel analyst John Schneider spent one season with the Redskins (2001) as vice president of player personnel...Packers long-snapper Rob Davis is a Washington, D.C. native and attended Eleanor Roosevelt High School in Greenbelt, Md. ...Packers LB Tracy White attended Howard University in Washington, D.C. ...Aaron Rouse, a third-round draft choice by the Packers, grew up in the Tidewater area as a Virginia Beach, Va., native...Redskins C Casey Rabach is a Sturgeon Bay, Wis., native and graduate of Wisconsin; he played alongside Packers T Mark Tauscher on the Badgers' offensive line in 1999.

## INDIVIDUALLY VS. WASHINGTON REDSKINS

Despite throwing more interceptions (6) than touchdown passes (4) against the Redskins, Favre has won all three of his starts against the club...Favre passed for 236 yards and three touchdowns against Washington in 2001; departed early in the '02 contest with a knee sprain after a LaVar Arrington sack...Defensive end Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila established a career high with seven solo tackles against the Redskins (Oct. 20, 2002); also had two sacks in the game...Cornerback Al Harris has two career interceptions against Washington – one with Philadelphia ('99) and the other with Green Bay ('04).

## LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Oct. 31, 2004, at FedExField; Packers won 28-14.

- ▶ Al Harris' fourth quarter interception set up the insurance score to cap a 28-14 victory that pulled Green Bay back to .500 after a 1-4 start.
- ▶ The Packers scored on their first three possessions to take a commanding 17-0 lead, but two interceptions set up Washington touchdowns to pull the Redskins within striking distance.
- ▶ Harris' interception came one play after a fourth-quarter Washington penalty nullified the go-ahead touchdown. Ahman Green's 11-yard touchdown run sealed the victory for Green Bay.
- ▶ The Packers gained 361 yards against the NFL's No. 1 ranked defense, becoming the first team to tally more than 300 yards against Washington on the season.

## LAST MEETING, AT LAMBEAU FIELD

Oct. 20, 2002; Packers won 30-9.

- ▶ Ahman Green recorded the first three-touchdown performance of his career as the Packers won their fifth straight game.
- ▶ The victory was overshadowed by an injury to Brett Favre in the third quarter. After a LaVar Arrington sack, Favre was carted off the field and did not return. An MRI the following day revealed no significant damage to his knee.
- ▶ Green rushed for two first-half touchdowns as the Packers held a 17-6 halftime advantage.
- ▶ Backup Doug Pederson replaced Favre in the third quarter and led the team on three scoring drives to close out the game.
- ▶ Kicker Ryan Longwell connected on three field goals as the Packers improved to 6-1 on the season.



## PACKERS VS. BEARS - I, 20-27

### MISCUES APLENTY IN FIRST LOSS

The Packers outgained the Bears by over 150 yards but could not overcome five turnovers as they tried to protect a halftime lead.

- ▶ In the end the Bears scored 17 unanswered points to pull out a 27-20 decision to hand the Packers (4-1) their first loss in 2007 and stun the 70,904 in attendance at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ On the game's opening possession, **DeShawn Wynn** broke off runs of 12 and 44 yards to set up his own 2-yard TD run just 3:59 into the game. But the offensive rhythm was interrupted by a couple of eerily similar miscues by rookie receiver **James Jones**. On back-to-back possessions, Jones had the ball stripped by Chicago cornerback Charles Tillman after catching slant passes, the first inside the Bears' 10-yard line and the second just after Green Bay had crossed mid-field.
- ▶ As it turned out, the Packers still had a 10-point lead by halftime. The Bears tied the game at 7 in the second quarter on a Cedric Benson touchdown run, but Green Bay responded with a 41-yard touchdown pass from **Brett Favre** (29-of-40, 322 yards) to **Greg Jennings**, and a 37-yard **Mason Crosby** field goal to close the half with a 17-7 lead.
- ▶ Both teams traded field goals to open the second half, making it 20-10, but two more turnovers turned the game around. Favre's ill-advised throw on a scramble to his right was intercepted by Chicago middle linebacker Brian Urlacher at the Green Bay 19-yard line, and the Bears needed just one play to capitalize. Brian Griese (15-of-25, 214 yards) hit rookie tight end Greg Olsen for a touchdown to make it 20-17.
- ▶ A few minutes later, Packers punt returner **Charles Woodson** had the ball stripped by Brendon Ayanbadejo at the end of a 25-yard return, and the Bears turned that into a field goal to tie the game at 20 early in the fourth quarter.
- ▶ Even though the defense got a **Brady Poppinga** interception (off a **Nick Collins** deflection) and **Nick Barnett** sack to thwart two potential scoring drives by the Bears, it couldn't hold out forever. Chicago's game-winning 79-yard touchdown drive started with a 27-yard completion to Olsen. A 4-yard run by Adrian Peterson converted a critical third-and-4 to the Packers' 42, and even though a Green Bay challenge of the spot did result in the ball being moved back a foot or so, the nose of the ball still grazed the measuring stick for a first down.
- ▶ Three plays later, Chicago faced third-and-2 from the 34, and with the Packers playing up tight against the run, Griese ran play-action and tight end Desmond Clark slipped behind everybody for a touchdown pass with 2:05 left in the game.
- ▶ On the final desperation drive, Favre completed four passes of 8 yards and another for 9 to get the ball to the Chicago 32, burning his last time-out with 13 seconds left. A heave to the end zone was then intercepted by Brandon McGowan, putting the Packers at minus-4 in turnovers for the evening and saving the Bears' season for the time being after the defending NFC champions got off to a 1-3 start.



- ▶ The 5-yard penalty gave the Bears a first down at the Green Bay 13-yard line, so the Bears took the points off the board and resumed their possession. Two plays later, Cedric Benson ran in for a 10-yard touchdown to tie the game.
- ▶ Only replays appeared to show that Williams was lined up between the center and guard, legally. That's certainly what Williams and the Packers' coaches thought.

### HESTER CONTAINED; HARRELL MAKES DEBUT

The Packers prevented return specialist Devin Hester from breaking any big gains.

- ▶ The kickoff team simply avoided the second-year speedster, using pop-up kickoffs that would come down between the 25- and 35-yard lines and were caught by bigger, less mobile players.
- ▶ Considering that simply kicking the ball out of bounds each time would have given the Bears the ball at the 40-yard line, the strategy was mildly successful. After the pooch kickoffs, the Bears began drives at the 30, 35, 36 and 40-yard lines.
- ▶ On punts, Hester was able to return the ball four of five times, but the coverage was solid. He averaged 10 yards per return with a long of 20, but that one was cut in half by a penalty.
- ▶ Green Bay punter **Jon Ryan** averaged 48 yards per punt, with a long of 64. The net average on the five punts was a respectable 40 yards.
- ▶ Rookie first-round draft choice **Justin Harrell** was active for the first time all season, working into the rotation at defensive tackle and also playing on the field-goal block team.
- ▶ Harrell took **Colin Cole**'s place on the 45-man gameday roster. Cole had sustained a mild concussion earlier in the week, and though he practiced on Friday, he was inactive for the game after missing practice time earlier in the week.
- ▶ Harrell was credited with one solo tackle, dragging down Benson for a 1-yard loss early in the fourth quarter.

### OTHER POSTGAME NOTES

- The paid attendance of 70,904 was the second-largest regular-season crowd in Lambeau Field history.
- ▶ Green Bay's 121 rushing yards was its highest total of the season.
- ▶ Cornerback **Tramon Williams** had a 65-yard kickoff return in the third quarter, the longest return by a Packer since Robert Ferguson's 71-yard kickoff return at Indianapolis (Sept. 26, 2004).
- ▶ Tight end **Bubba Franks**' 18 receiving yards moved him to the No. 5 spot on the Packers all-time tight ends list, surpassing Mark Chmura (2,253). Franks now has 2,258 receiving yards.
- ▶ With his four catches, wide receiver **Donald Driver** surpassed Boyd Dowler (448) and moved to No. 4 on the Packers all-time receptions list. Driver entered the game with 448 and now has 452 career receptions.
- ▶ Linebacker **Brady Poppinga** recorded his first interception of the season. It was the second interception of his career.
- ▶ Punter **Jon Ryan** recorded a season-long 64-yard punt.

### CRUCIAL PENALTY, OR WAS IT?

Of the Packers' 12 penalties (for 93 yards), perhaps the most crucial came in the second quarter, when Chicago lined up for a 36-yard field goal, trailing 7-0.

- ▶ Robbie Gould made the kick, but Packers defensive tackle **Corey Williams** was flagged for lining head-up over the center, which is illegal on a field-goal try.



## PACKERS TEAM NOTES

### WITH THE GAME ON THE LINE, PACKERS DELIVER

A major catalyst in the Packers' quick start has been their ability to get out to an early lead, as evidenced by their plus-20 scoring differential in the opening frame. More importantly, however, has been their ability to deliver in crunch time. Each of their four wins has come thanks to some strong fourth quarter play.

- ▶ In their four wins, Green Bay has entered the fourth quarter down four points (San Diego), tied (Philadelphia), up one (New York Giants) and up four (Minnesota).
- ▶ Chicago outscored Green Bay, 10-0, in the Packers' only loss of the season.
- ▶ Only Dallas and Carolina have outscored their opponents by a bigger margin in the fourth quarter than the Packers.

- ▶ McCarthy and the Packers have picked up right where they left off, winning their first two road games of the season.

### McCARTHY – EXCERPTS FROM MONDAY

- ▶ "We're disappointed because we lost the game, but the disappointment for myself and for the team will come on how we lost the game and why we lost the game. Today will probably not be much different than a number of Mondays that we've had. I think it's important to keep your eye on the target. We're making the same mistakes two weeks in a row, you can't have that. Ball security jumps off the chart at you, just the way we've been careless with the football the last two weeks. You cannot win football games that way. And we just have a number of technical, fundamental things we need to continue to work. Our meeting today will be very similar to probably last week's meeting."
- ▶ "Watching the film this morning, we had a lot of opportunities to run the football, and I don't regret that, because you have to run the football. I don't want to be a no-back guy or a passing guy. That's not in the best interests of our football team. We moved the ball when we did it in spurts last night. But we came out of the gate running the football in the first quarter, that doesn't happen very often, and for us not to run the ball in the second half was, like I've already said, very disappointing."
- ▶ "Turning the ball over five times, frankly, you're fortunate to even be in the game. If we weren't as productive as we were in the first half on offense, it's probably a whole different game. Everybody in the National

Football League, everybody coaching football I'm sure preaches ball security. But I'm a big believer, if you state things that need to be a foundation of how you're going to win games, you need to practice them every day, and they need to show up on Sunday. Now, we practice it every single day, and the last two weeks it hasn't shown up on Sunday. I have a problem with that, and we need to get that fixed."

- ▶ "It's a good win for Chicago based on where they were as a football team coming in here as far as their record. We did a lot of positive things coming into this game, but we didn't take care of business, and that's why we lost the game. I'm sure they feel good about themselves. I fully understand how this works. We were glorified for four weeks, and now they get it this week, and they deserve it. But we need to clean our own house right now. It's sloppy and we need to get it cleaned up."

### PACKERS ONCE AGAIN LEAGUE'S YOUNGEST TEAM

Green Bay has the distinction of being the NFL's youngest team for the second straight season. Coincidentally, the two youngest teams in the NFL have the two longest active winning streaks in the league.

- ▶ Since taking over general manager duties in 2005, Ted Thompson has vowed to build the team's foundation through the draft. Of the 53 active roster players, 21 have been drafted by Thompson.
- ▶ Each team's average age is based upon its opening-day roster. A look at the five youngest teams in 2007:

### MILESTONES COME ON THE ROAD FOR FAVRE

**Brett Favre** had one of the league's most coveted milestones in his sights and again made history away from Lambeau. Taking a look back at some of Favre's milestone touchdown passes throughout his career, all have a common theme – they came in road victories.

- ▶ Only touchdown pass No. 100 came in front of the home crowd at Lambeau Field, though it still came in a winning effort.
- ▶ Touchdown pass No. 301 pushed Favre ahead of John Elway (300) to third on the league's all-time touchdown passes list.
- ▶ No. 343 – coming in one of the most memorable performances of his career and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – placed Favre No. 2 on the all-time list, surpassing Fran Tarkenton.

### OTHER PACKERS BREAKING RECORDS

Though Favre's assault on numerous records has garnered most of the attention this season, a number of other Packers have records and milestones in their sights.

- ▶ **Donald Driver** became the seventh player in team history to surpass the 6,000-yard mark and also moved into fifth place in the franchise's all-time receptions list. Driver, who has caught a pass in 85 straight games, became Lambeau Field's all-time leader in receptions.
- ▶ **Bubba Franks** became the 11th player in Packers history to record 30 career touchdown receptions.
- ▶ Defensive end **Aaron Kampman** recorded his 30th career sack in a Packers uniform, becoming the eighth player in team history to do so.
- ▶ Defensive end **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** surpassed Reggie White's franchise record for sacks (68½). Gbaja-Biamila enters Sunday with 69½ career sacks, having tallied back-to-back, multi-sack games in Weeks 3 and 4.

### SIMPLY THE BEST

The Packers own more NFL championships (12) than any other franchise, but it's not all about past glory for the team nestled in the smallest market in professional sports.

- ▶ Since the advent of free agency in 1993, the Packers own a share of the best W-L record in the NFL, with the Steelers not far behind in third. A look at the most successful teams in the free-agency era:

### 'KGB' NO SECRET WEAPON

Gbaja-Biamila, who has seen a return to form as an elite pass rusher in recent weeks, has four career sacks against the Redskins in three career games against the NFC East opponent.

- ▶ 'KGB' registered a ½ sack against the Bears, the third consecutive game in which the San Diego State product has been credited with a sack. Not since 2004 had Gbaja-Biamila recorded such a streak.

- ▶ Gbaja-Biamila has also notched back-to-back multi-sack performances for the first time since the 2004 season. The eighth-year pro was credited with 1½ sacks against the Chargers, including a forced fumble against Philip Rivers, and two sacks against the Vikings.

### CLIFTON HITS CENTURY MARK

- ▶ Tackle **Chad Clifton** made his 100th career start Sunday for the Packers.
- ▶ A second-round pick in 2000, Clifton was inserted into the starting lineup in Week 7 as a rookie and has been a mainstay on the offensive line since then.
- ▶ Favre's blind-side shield, he has started 68 of 69 games since returning from a pelvic injury that ended his 2002 season after a blindside hit from Warren Sapp. Only a bout with the flu last season in Miami (Oct. 22) could snap the streak.
- ▶ An elite pass blocker, Clifton has anchored an offensive line that has allowed the second fewest sacks in the NFL since he joined the starting lineup in 2000. Interestingly enough, all the teams on this list play in the AFC besides the Packers.

## PACKERS TEAM NOTES

### 423 TOUCHDOWN PASSES AND COUNTING

After a moment now etched in NFL history, Brett Favre stands alone atop the all-time touchdown passes list.

- ▶ 43 different Packers have been on the receiving end of a Favre touchdown pass, beginning with **Sterling Sharpe's** grab in the fourth quarter against the Bengals on Sept. 20, 1992.
- ▶ Favre's two fourth-quarter touchdown throws in that game not only sealed the come-from-behind, 24-23 victory, but also earned him the start the following week, a job he hasn't relinquished since.
- ▶ In a three-touchdown performance at New England on Oct. 13, 2002, Favre became just the fourth NFL player to throw for 300 touchdowns. On his final TD pass of the day, a 2-yard toss to tight end **Bubba Franks**, Favre surpassed John Elway to move into third place on the all-time list.
- ▶ He moved into second place on the list in one of the most memorable performances of his career – and in the history of *Monday Night Football* – when he threw four touchdown passes in the first half against the Oakland Raiders just one day after the sudden death of his father, Irvin. Favre's second touchdown pass of the night, a 23-yard strike to Javon Walker, pushed him past Fran Tarkenton with 343 career TD passes.
- ▶ A first-quarter strike to **Greg Jennings** made NFL history at Minnesota in Week 4. The game was stopped briefly, and a videotaped message from Dan Marino was played on the Metrodome's scoreboard.
- ▶ A closer look at the record:

### A CHRONOLOGY OF THE RECORD

Eight players – all members of the Pro Football Hall of Fame – have held the NFL career touchdown pass record throughout the history of the league. Thanks to research provided by Elias Sports Bureau, the one-time record holders were:

- ▶ **Benny Friedman** had 66 career TD passes and held the record from 1930 until 1943.
- ▶ **Arnie Herber**, a former Green Bay signal caller, reached 66 touchdown passes in 1940 and shared the record with Friedman until 1943.
- ▶ **Sammy Baugh** passed Friedman and Herber in 1943 and threw 187 career touchdowns. He held the record until 1962.
- ▶ **Bobby Layne** tied Baugh in 1961 and passed him during the 1962 season. Layne finished with 196 touchdown passes and held the record until 1963.
- ▶ **Y.A. Tittle** passed Layne in 1963 and finished his career with 212 touchdown passes. Tittle held the record until 1966.
- ▶ **Johnny Unitas** passed Tittle in 1966 and ended his playing days with 290 TD passes. He held the record until 1975.
- ▶ **Fran Tarkenton** surpassed Unitas in 1975 and became the first NFL player with 300 career TD passes. He finished with 342 touchdown passes and held the record until 1995.
- ▶ **Dan Marino** passed Tarkenton on Nov. 26, 1995, at Indianapolis with a second-quarter touchdown pass and finished his career with 420 touchdown passes. He held the record until surpassed by Brett Favre in 2007.

### MORE MCCARTHY – EXCERPTS FROM MONDAY

- ▶ “Jennings had a shoulder sprain. I think he's going to be fine. I'll probably take caution with his hamstring a lot like I did last week. That's something I'll decide Wednesday once we have our Wednesday morning doctor evaluation.”
- ▶ “When we hit the touchdown to Greg was the last snap of 3-deep we saw

in the game. They played one defense the whole second half. They played us Cover-2. We had an excellent opportunity to run the football based on what they were playing on defense and what we had called, and we did not get that done. I'm disappointed in that. The penalties factored into playing uphill, down-and-distance wise, also did not help us. And the field position, really by game plan of kicking away from Hester, also factored into the game. But the biggest thing is they survive with turnovers. It's a big part of what they do and the success of their football team. They do an excellent job of it, but that's still no excuse. We need to take care of the football.”

- ▶ “Jason Spitz I thought did a good job (at center) with the declaration and the calls. But I'm not naïve to the fact that the timing is probably not exactly the same and so forth. But by no means was it because of the way he played. I thought the interior needs to do a much better job. We just did not execute very well.”
- ▶ “I think James Jones is a big-time competitor. He'd definitely grade out very high as far as taking tough coaching and being competitive. I fully anticipate that he'll learn from this experience, and hopefully it won't happen again to him.”
- ▶ “He's (Favre) played very well this year. He's had the four interceptions, and that would fall in the category of a minus decision. But that (Urlacher's interception) was probably his one big error in the game.”
- ▶ “Scott Wells has a fractured eye orbit, and he most likely won't be able to go this week. He'll probably be ready after the bye.”
- ▶ (*On DeShawn Wynn's cramps in the first quarter*) “He was sweating pretty good there in pre-game. I'm sure he was excited because he was going to receive most of the opportunities on first and second down. The young man is from Florida, you wouldn't think that would happen, but it did, and we need to learn from it. He was off to a strong start and was never really right again.”

### UPON FURTHER REVIEW

Some things that jump out about the Packers after a second glance at the statistics.

- ▶ The Packers have the No. 1 passing offense in the NFL, but will face a tough test this weekend. Washington comes in as the league's top-ranked defense against the pass, and third in overall defense.
- ▶ Both defenses do an excellent job of getting off the field on third downs. Washington owns the NFL's second-ranked defense on third down, while Green Bay is not far behind at sixth.
- ▶ After another 300-yard passing performance and a steady effort from the run game, Green Bay's offense jumped six spots in the league rankings. It is now ranked sixth.
- ▶ Thanks to its highest rushing output of the season (121 yards), Green Bay no longer possesses the NFL's lowest-ranked rushing attack. The Kansas City Chiefs hold that distinction heading into Week 6.
- ▶ Green Bay has scored 41 points on the nine turnovers it has forced, second most in the league. Only Detroit (48 points on 14 turnovers) has converted turnovers into more points.

### ONLY MARSHALL REMAINS

Favre made his 241st consecutive start against Minnesota, surpassing former Vikings center Mick Tingelhoff (240) and now owns the second-longest recorded streak in NFL history at 242.

- ▶ Only Jim Marshall (270, 1961-79) has been documented to have started more in consecutive fashion.
- ▶ Favre has played in 244 straight games (264 including playoffs) and his 242 starts in a row (262 including playoffs) is the NFL's record among quarterbacks.

### NO ONE WINS MORE THAN NO. 4

With his 149th win in Week 2, Favre surpassed John Elway on the all-time quarterback wins list. Favre enters Sunday with 151 career wins.

- ▶ Simply put, Favre was spectacular in the record-breaking victory over the New York Giants. He completed 29-of-38 passes for 286 yards and three touchdowns and earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors.
- ▶ "We gave him the game ball after the game," McCarthy said after the win. "The 'all-time' in anything in this league is such a monumental achievement. 149 victories - I think that speaks for itself. When you go out and win over that long of a period of time, I think that's the ultimate compliment a quarterback can have. To me, if you asked me what is the biggest record that he will achieve, I think he just accomplished it."



### QUITE THE DEBUT FOR CROSBY

According to Elias Sports Bureau, rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** on Sept. 9 became the first player in NFL history to kick a 50-plus yard field goal and a game-winning field goal in the final minute of his first NFL game.

- ▶ What a whirlwind couple of days it had been for Crosby. First, he found out on Sept. 1 that he had won the kicking job after what had been perhaps the most intense positional battle in training camp. Two days later, he celebrated his 23rd birthday, and just days after that the rookie was lining up for his first-ever professional game.
- ▶ Crosby was 3-for-3 on field goals against the Eagles. He hit a 53-yarder, one yard shy of the team record, in the first quarter, a 37-yarder in the third quarter, and a 42-yarder with 2 seconds left to break a 13-all tie and give the Packers the three-point win. He was later awarded NFC Special Teams Player of the Week honors for his efforts.

### PUNT BLOCKS

Jon Ryan was 13 years old the last time the Packers had a punt blocked. It happened Sept. 10, 1995, at Chicago, when the Bears' Anthony Marshall got to Craig Hentrich.

- ▶ Only one other team has a longer active stretch of punts without a block than Green Bay:

### ROOKIES IN THE BACKFIELD

Green Bay became the first NFL team to open the regular season with two rookie starters in the backfield since 1996. That season, both St. Louis (Derrick Harris and Lawrence Phillips) and Miami (Stanley Pritchett and Abdul-Karim al-Jabbar) used an all-rookie backfield on opening day.

- ▶ Rookie running back **Brandon Jackson**, a second-round pick from Nebraska, became the first rookie to start at running back on opening day for the Packers since John Brockington in 1971.
- ▶ Fullback **Korey Hall**, a linebacker at Boise State last season, was the first Packers rookie to start on opening day at fullback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

### SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Four coaches have new titles this season, though all four were with the team during the 2006 season. Former offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski left to become the head coach at Boston College in January, leaving a major opening on the staff.

- ▶ McCarthy tabbed **Joe Philbin** as offensive coordinator. Entering his fifth season with the Packers, Philbin most recently served as offensive line coach in 2006 where he implemented a new zone-blocking scheme and successfully integrated three rookie starters.
- ▶ **Winston Moss** was promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers after serving as linebackers coach in 2006.

As the assistant head coach, the 41-year-old Moss will be McCarthy's right-hand man with regard to administrative duties and team dynamics. Moss will continue to coach the linebackers as well.

- ▶ Promoted to offensive line coach, **James Campen** moves up from his position as assistant offensive line coach in McCarthy's first season at the helm. The center for Brett Favre's first career start in 1992, Campen begins his fourth season on the Packers staff.
- ▶ **Jerry Fontenot** will serve as assistant offensive line coach in 2007. A 16-year NFL veteran (1989-2004), Fontenot joined the Packers as a coaching intern last summer and remained with the team throughout the 2006 season as an offensive assistant.

- LG 73 Daryn Colledge (6-4, 305, Second Year, Boise State)** — Mature, second-round pick in '06 started 15 games as a rookie...Earned *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie Team honors...Called the team's most improved player by McCarthy at season's end.
- C 72 Jason Spitz (6-3, 300, Second Year, Louisville)** — Second-year pro gets his first start at center for an injured Scott Wells (eye)...Opened the season as the starter at right guard before being sidelined by a calf injury.
- RG 62 Junius Coston (6-3, 313, Third Year, North Carolina A&T)** — Earned his first career start in Week 2 against the Giants...Athletic lineman who has practiced at all five positions along the line...In his third year as a pro, still only 23 years old.

# PACKERS TEAM NOTES

## GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Packers will host a season-long celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of Lambeau Field. The crown jewel of the National Football League remains the most historic stadium in football.

- ▶ Dedicated as City Stadium Sept. 29, 1957, with a 21-17 victory over the archrival Chicago Bears, the team renamed the facility Lambeau Field in 1965 following the death of E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach. It is the NFL's longest-tenured facility.
- ▶ To mark the occasion, an anniversary logo was created and will be featured on the team's home uniforms, *Gameday* program, the media guide and the Packers Yearbook.
- ▶ Lambeau Field also will feature the special logo in the north end zone. Both end zones have been painted to reflect the way they were in Lambeau Field's first season in 1957.
- ▶ Renowned 3-D pop artist Charles Fazzino was commissioned by the Packers to create an art piece celebrating the 50th anniversary. Fazzino, the official artist of the Super Bowl and Major League Baseball's All-Star Game, spent nine months on the project. The piece is available in a limited edition 3-D format, as well as on T-shirts, helmets and assorted items in the Packers Pro Shop.
- ▶ Packers ticket holders will enjoy images of Lambeau Field through the years on their tickets as well.



## TRAVELING LIGHT IN 2007

NFL teams will cover 566,650 miles this season – about 75,000 more miles than a round trip flight from the earth to the moon.

- ▶ No team will cover more mileage than the St. Louis Rams (34,352), while the N.Y. Jets will travel the fewest (9,186).
- ▶ In the preseason and regular season, Green Bay will fly a total of 10,738 miles, over 6,000 miles less than the team traveled in 2006.

## '07 SCHEDULE AT A GLANCE

Three prime-time contests highlight the Green Bay Packers' 87th NFL regular-season schedule.

- ▶ The '07 slate includes six playoff teams (Chicago, Philadelphia, San Diego, Dallas, N.Y. Giants and Kansas City) from 2006.
- ▶ Green Bay plays three prime-time contests, barring any changes via the league's flexible scheduling options. Two of those three — at Denver Oct. 29 (ESPN) and at Dallas Nov. 29 (NFL Network) — are on the road. The third was the Oct. 7 Bears game (NBC).

- ▶ The Packers make their first trip to Kansas City since 1996. The only other active city in which the Packers have waited longer to visit during the regular season is Cleveland (1995).

## FINAL 53 LOADED ON DEFENSIVE LINE, SECONDARY

A look at the 53-man roster shows some big numbers along the defensive line and in the secondary. But throughout training camp, Head Coach Mike McCarthy and GM Ted Thompson reiterated that they were going to keep "the best 53" regardless of position.

- ▶ The theme on offense was 2's. Among the 53 were two quarterbacks, two fullbacks and two tight ends. Under center, the team will go with Favre and third-year pro **Aaron Rodgers**, who impressed this preseason. Wide receiver **Carlyle Holiday**, who played quarterback at Notre Dame and previously was listed as the No. 3 quarterback, was placed on I.R. after a Week 1 injury.
- ▶ **Donald Lee** and **Bubba Franks**, two veterans of the system, will serve as the tight ends. Their experience is contrasted by the fullback position, where rookie **Korey Hall** and second-year player **John Kuhn** fill out the backfield. Hall played linebacker at Boise State and made his first career start against Philadelphia. Kuhn was claimed on waivers prior to Week 1 and has seen time on special teams as he continues to learn the offensive system.
- ▶ No position is as deep as defensive line, a unit Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** feels is among the most talented in the league. It may be the deepest in the league too, as coaches have 11 players from which to choose their gameday rotation. Pro Bowl defensive end **Aaron Kampman** highlights the group, while the emerging **Cullen Jenkins** had a strong preseason.
- ▶ 10 players were kept in the secondary, including six cornerbacks. Three starters return to the unit, including the cornerback duo of **Charles Woodson** and **Al Harris**.
- ▶ A breakdown of the roster shows 26 defensive players, 24 offensive players and three specialists.

## CONFIDENT MCCARTHY HEADS INTO SECOND SEASON

Now in his second year at the helm, McCarthy heads into 2007 with a much more confident team than a year ago. His system is firmly in place as he looks to join the likes of Vince Lombardi, Dan Devine, Mike Holmgren and Mike Sherman as the fifth head coach in franchise history to lead the team to the postseason in his second season.

- ▶ "I think there are so many positive aspects of our football team that we're able to build on," McCarthy said at the conclusion of the preseason. "The only thing you have to compare it to is last year, so we're clearly further ahead."
- ▶ As for the strength of his team? "Our defense is clearly the catalyst of our football team," said McCarthy. "They've been the most consistent part of our football team, and I think it will clearly carry over to special teams once we set those groups and the core players are playing all the time."
- ▶ The No. 1 defense was strong — if not dominant — throughout the preseason and into the opener, showing the communication problems in the secondary that plagued the unit in '06 were behind them.
- ▶ Questions surrounded the offense and its lack of playmakers in the off-season, but as the one calling the plays, McCarthy has seen enough to establish a method of attack. "I'm very comfortable with the building of the offense, playing whatever way we need to play to score points."



## PACKERS TEAM NOTES

### Q&A WITH MIKE MCCARTHY

***You kept 11 defensive linemen and 10 defensive backs on the roster. That's 40 percent of your players at two position groups. Why so many players there, and what difference will that make?***

Ted Thompson and I clearly stated throughout the offseason and training camp that we would keep the best 53 players. I'm of the opinion if you do not do that, you will be on this cycle where the bottom half of your roster does not get totally upgraded. By keeping the best 53 players, it gives us the opportunity to create continuity and depth in some areas as we continue to improve the others.

***The competition at running back didn't play out as expected in training camp, due to several injuries. With all the injuries and inexperience, can this running game be productive enough to complement Brett Favre?***

I'm very comfortable that we'll do whatever it takes to win football games. Running the football is an important part of a successful offense. I'm confident we'll get that done.

***Your team is the youngest in the NFL this season. Second-youngest is the defending champion Indianapolis Colts. What do you make of that?***

That's the makeup of our football team. We're in the second year of our program. We've been able to acquire a number of players through the draft, and that directly reflects the youth we have on our team. But the most important thing is the amount of talent we've been able to amass on our football team, and we'll take their abilities, be specific to what they can do, and put them in position to be successful. Every team has a different makeup, and that's the makeup of our football team. (With the Colts) I think it's really the product of the salary cap and everything that's going on throughout the NFL. They're the Super Bowl champions, they lost a number of veterans off of that Super Bowl team, and they've replaced them through the draft. I think that's why they're in that position. Our position of being younger was a different path. I think our football teams are structured differently.

***Getting off to a fast start has been talked about a lot, yet a Packers team hasn't won two of its first three games since 2002. Can this team change that trend, and how?***

We definitely are taking the approach to change it. It's very important to win games at home, and two out of our first three are at home, so that is an opportunity we need to take advantage of. Playing in your home environment, in front of a tremendous crowd, are all things that give you the ability to play downhill. Now, the things that happen in the beginning of the season traditionally in the NFL are factors in a football game we need to be sure to overcome. The opponent is going to have unscouted looks, we need to be prepared for that. Ball security is usually an issue in earlier games in the season. Officiating is a lot tighter earlier in the season. So there are some tendencies of the way early-season games go, and we've educated our players on that. A lot of them are just emphasizing fundamentals of the football game, and we need to just come out and play a smart, tough, fundamentally sound football game.

***You're facing four 2006 playoff teams in the season's first five weeks. Do you look at that as a daunting task or an opportunity to make an early statement in 2007?***

It's an opportunity to line up against some very good football teams that have had success in the recent past. So I think we will answer some ques-

tions about our team and where we are. But every week is a challenge in the NFL, and we will approach every week the same and make sure we are ready for our opponent and give our players a chance to win the game. Being aggressive in our approach, being fundamentally sound in our approach, to make sure at the end of the day that those players had a chance to win that football game.

***It's often said players make the biggest jump from their first year to their second in the NFL. Does that mean the improvement of your second-year starters - A.J. Hawk, Greg Jennings, Daryn Colledge and Jason Spitz - will be the biggest key to improving on last year's 8-8 record?***

Individual improvement in the offseason was one thing we had the most of. You could see it throughout the spring. It was very evident in my view during training camp, and it ultimately needs to factor in the outcome of winning football games. We've had a number of young players that have improved, whether they're going into their second or third year. It's the continuity you're striving for, the consistency you're striving for, that helps good football teams come together as fast as possible. That will be the key to us winning early in the season.



***The Chicago Bears have set the standard in recent years for defensive play in the NFC North Division, and the NFC as a whole. Can the 2007 Green Bay defense approach that level, in your opinion?***

We have the physical ability to, we have the mindset and confidence to at this point. We need to do it day in and day out, week in and week out on Sundays, and those things will take care of themselves. The way our defense played at the end of the season last year, and they've picked up where they left off and showed their ability to be a big-time defense in preseason. But all the games are for real now. They'll definitely be a catalyst for our success.

***Last year, players like Aaron Kampman and Cullen Jenkins emerged as significant forces on defense. Who might be the next defensive player to truly step into the spotlight?***

We have a couple guys who can step into that role. I think our inside players - Ryan Pickett doesn't get enough credit for the level of player he is. I think Johnny Jolly is a young and up-and-coming player going into his second year who I think will definitely impact our defense. Corey Williams did a lot of good things last year, particularly in pass rush, and has shown a lot of flexibility this year playing both defensive end and defensive tackle. I think he's a guy we'll talk a lot about. With the linebacker group, Brady Poppinga is much improved from last year, and A.J. Hawk. Nick Barnett is at the level in his career that when we do have the winning season he'll be a lot more recognized. Our corners speak for themselves. They're veterans that have been in there and played at a high level in the past, and we expect them to play at that level too. And I think we have two young, exciting safeties that could really grow into impact players. We have a lot of depth at the corner position, a lot of depth at the D-line position, so it's a defense that's really set up for a big year.

***With Brett Favre's career winding down, do you feel a sense of urgency to get him one final shot at a playoff run?***

We all have the sense of urgency to get in the playoffs, so to answer the question, yes. We'll do everything we can possible to win week in and week out.
