TRAINING CAMP

RITE OF SUMMER RETURNS

The most anticipated family event of the summer – Green Bay Packers training camp – begins its 62nd year Saturday on Clarke Hinkle Field. A tradition that first began under Curly Lambeau in 1946, it remains one of the most intimate preseason settings in the NFL.

- Newer traditions – such as night practices under the lights and the team's intra-squad scrimmage in Lambeau Field – blend with the old as players continue to ride kids' bicycles to practice, a tradition started under Vince Lombardi, and live in the dorms at nearby St. Norbert College, the NFL's longest training camp relationship between a team and school.
- According to the Packer Country Visitor and Convention Bureau, training camp attracts an estimated 115,000 visitors from across the nation and as many as 20 foreign countries. With an economic impact estimated at more than \$60 million, training camp brings a financial boost to many area businesses. The Packer Country VCB partnered with the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay's Professional Programs in Business Administration for a survey in 2005 to provide an updated economic study of training camp.
- None of these figures factor in the team's intra-squad scrimmage, 'Family Night, Presented by FOX 11', which this spring sold every available seat in Lambeau Field in four days.

FAN-FRIENDLY SCHEDULE

Eight night practices under the lights are highlighted by a return to the team's previous home at City Stadium at 6:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 31. A total of 24 practices will be open to the public.

- Head Coach Mike McCarthy stated before his first training camp in 2006 that the night-time practices would draw bigger crowds and produce a game-like atmosphere, increasing the intensity and competition in practice. Used by a number of teams around the NFL, he first experienced night practices as offensive coordinator in New Orleans.
- McCarthy once again will institute a "2-1-2-1" training camp schedule, beginning with a full-squad, full-pads workout at 2 p.m. on Saturday, July 28, on Clarke Hinkle Field.
- The first night practice takes place Sunday, July 29. Of the eight night practices, seven are preceded by a morning workout at 8:45 a.m.
- In between "two-a-days", the team will break down film of the morning practice. On days with one practice, they will break down film twice – night practices will be broken down the following morning while the afternoon session is studied after dinner.

- Having not been in full pads since a 26-7 victory over Chicago in the 2006 season finale, the team will hold six practices over the first four days of training camp. Five of those will be in full pads.
- In accordance with league guidelines, the team spent the entirety of mini-camp and OTAs in shorts and helmets. Fans and coaches alike will get their first chance to see many players, including the 2007 rookie class, in full pads.

REST AND RECOUP

One major adjustment to this year's camp made by McCarthy was three off days built into the schedule.

- Three successive Wednesdays (Aug. 1, 8, 15), the team will gather in the morning for meetings and film review, with players given the afternoon and evening off to recover for two practices the next day.
- Said McCarthy, "The number of things we were able to get done this spring gave us the ability to have those three Wednesdays where we only meet and have walk-throughs in the gym at the end. It's clearly (based) on the rest and recovery. I feel it will really help our football team particularly at the end of the year."
- "When you see the importance of rest and recovery happen on an indi-

vidual basis like I've watched it throughout the spring, it's obviously very important for our football team," McCarthy stated. "To do it on Wednesday, right in the middle of the workload, I think is smart, and we're still able to get everything done."

ALL ABOUT MOMENTUM

The momentum of four straight wins to close the 2006 season – coupled with missing the NFC's final playoff berth by mere percentage points – produced record attendance in the offseason program.

- Every player on the roster participated in the offseason program, many working under the supervision of the strength and conditioning staff beginning in mid-March.
- There will be no adjustment to new coaches, new schedules or new schemes this summer, as installations on both sides of the ball took place during mini-camp and OTAs.
- "We're clearly a lot further ahead than we were at this time last year," McCarthy said upon the conclusion of the offseason program June 18. "Over and over again we've talked about the individual improvement, and that's something that's very obvious as you look out there on the football field, the improvement that a number of our players have made since last year."
- "Just the way we practice - our practices are better, and I think that's part of where we are as a football team and how much of the offense, defense and special teams we have in," McCarthy explained. "As of today we have everything in; everything that we're going to use next year is in. The continuity to me breeds confidence. We need to carry this into training camp."

RETURN TO CITY STADIUM

Earlier this summer, the Packers announced plans to hold an open practice at historic City Stadium Tuesday evening, July 31. It marks the first practice in nearly 50 years at the team's former home field (1925-56).

- The Packers last practiced at the site Aug. 5, 1961, when Vince Lombardi led the team through an intra-squad scrimmage.
- Today's Packers will have the opportunity to play at the same venue that hosted many of the NFL's early legends, including Green Bay players Don Hutson, Curly Lambeau, Arnie Herber, Tony Canadeo and Clarke Hinkle.
- City Stadium, barely completed in time for the 1925 season opener, opened with an initial seating capacity of 6,000.
- Fittingly, the Packers defeated the Chicago Bears for the first time in club history, 14-10, in the stadium's second contest. It was just the fourth meeting between the NFL's longest standing rivals.
- More successes were soon to follow, including the club's first NFL championship in 1929. Five more titles were won (1930-31, 1936, 1939, 1944) while the team called City Stadium its home.
- Several expansions led to a seating capacity just over 25,000 during the final season at City Stadium in 1956.
- The practice will be free to the public, but in the "pass-the-hat" spirit of games in the 1920s and '30s at City Stadium, in which the team collected money to stay afloat, donations will be accepted to support the new Green Bay Children's Museum.

SAME FACES, NEW PLACES

Four coaches have new titles this season, though all four were with the team during the 2006 season. Former offensive coordinator Jeff Jagodzinski left to become the head coach at Boston College in January, leaving a major opening on the staff.

- McCarthy tabbed **Joe Philbin** as offensive coordinator. Entering his fifth season with the Packers, Philbin most recently served as offensive line coach in 2006 where he implemented a new zone-blocking scheme and successfully integrated three rookie starters.
- **Winston Moss** was promoted to assistant head coach/linebackers after serving as linebackers coach in 2006. As the assistant head coach, the

41-year-old Moss will be McCarthy's right-hand man with regard to administrative duties and team dynamics. Moss will continue to coach the linebackers as well.

- Promoted to offensive line coach, **James Campen** moves up from his position as assistant offensive line coach in McCarthy's first season at the helm. The center for Brett Favre's first career start in 1992, Campen begins his fourth season on the Packers staff.
- **Jerry Fontenot** will serve as assistant offensive line coach in 2007. A 16-year NFL veteran (1989-2004), Fontenot joined the Packers as a coaching intern last summer and remained with the team throughout the 2006 season as an offensive assistant.

COMPETITION BREEDS EXCELLENCE

20 of 22 starters return from the league's youngest team in 2006, ensuring what promises to be one of the most competitive training camps in recent memory.

- Executive Vice President/General Manager Ted Thompson has compiled a roster of 87 players, 27 of which were drafted since he took over as GM in January 2005.
- Thompson knows all about training camp battles. Signed as a non-drafted free agent linebacker by the Houston Oilers, Thompson annually held off younger competition brought in by Bum Phillips during his 10-year career.
- The Packers GM may face his toughest decisions yet towards the end of training camp, but it's all a part of his philosophy: building a solid foundation through the draft.
- Nothing attracts attention and headlines during training camp like the fight for playing time. Here are the positions that will draw the most interest over the next month:

IN THE BACKFIELD

- All eyes will be on the running back position, where a stable of backs will contend for carries. The zone-blocking scheme calls for a 'one-cut' runner, and veterans Vernand Morency and Noah Herron know the system. Both had 100-yard efforts last season. The 2007 draft brought more competition in the form of Brandon Jackson and DeShawn Wynn.

ALONG THE DEFENSIVE FRONT

- No position on the roster is as deep as the interior defensive line, where run-stopper Ryan Pickett will hold down one starting spot. Corey Williams enjoyed a breakout season in 2006 while Colin Cole and Johnny Jolly both proved capable of contributing. Thompson also added 6-foot-4, 310-pound Justin Harrell, a first-round pick, to the mix.

LAST LINE OF DEFENSE

- Strong safety Marquand Manuel will have to hold off hard charges from third-year pro Marviel Underwood and rookie Aaron Rouse. Manuel will benefit from a full training camp – something a calf injury kept him from in 2006 – while Underwood was an early star of training camp last season before going down with a knee injury. Third-round pick Rouse brings a linebacker's size and mentality to the position.

LACES OUT

- Undoubtedly the easiest battle to chart, where every kick is scrutinized and measured. Incumbent kicker Dave Rayner enjoyed a solid first season in Green Bay. He connected on 26-of-35 field goals while recording the most touchbacks in nearly a decade. Sixth-

round choice Mason Crosby, who established a host of records at Colorado, will look to transfer his success from college to the pros.

ST. NORBERT AND THE PACKERS - ANOTHER NFL RECORD

No NFL team enjoys a longer training camp relationship than the one between the Green Bay Packers and St. Norbert College. Formed in 1958 between Packers coach Scooter McLean and the private school in nearby De Pere, Wis., the relationship enters its 50th year this summer.

- Founded in 1898 by Abbot Bernard Pennings, the school presently enrolls nearly 2,000 students.
- All on-field activities and many football meetings take place at the team's home facility, with the college serving as the base for living arrangements.
- Victor McCormick Hall, a 60-room dormitory, will continue the long tradition of housing players and staff.
- Players will return to St. Norbert College each evening for dinner.
- The team will remain in the dorms until Aug. 17.



GOLDEN ANNIVERSARY

The Packers will host a season-long celebration commemorating the 50th anniversary of Lambeau Field. The crown jewel of the National Football League remains the most historic stadium in football.

- Dedicated as City Stadium Sept. 29, 1957, with a 21-17 victory over the archrival Chicago Bears, the team renamed the facility Lambeau Field in 1965 following the death of E.L. 'Curly' Lambeau, the Packers' founder and first coach.
- It is the NFL's longest-tenured facility.
- To mark the occasion, an anniversary logo was created and will be featured on the team's uniforms, Gameday Program, the media guide and the Packers Yearbook.
- Lambeau Field also will feature the special logo in both end zones.
- Renowned 3-D pop artist Charles Fazzino was commissioned by the Packers to create an art piece celebrating the 50th anniversary. Fazzino, the official artist of the Super Bowl and Major League Baseball's All-Star Game, spent nine months on the project. The piece is available in a limited edition 3-D format, as well as on T-shirts, helmets and assorted items in the Packers Pro Shop.
- Packers ticket holders will enjoy images of Lambeau Field through the years on their tickets as well.

LAST THOUGHTS ON 2006

Despite winning their final four games to conclude McCarthy's first season as Head Coach with a .500 record (8-8), Green Bay narrowly missed clinching one of the NFC's six playoff berths and finished No. 7 in the conference standings.

- Four NFC teams — the Giants, Packers, Rams and Panthers — finished 8-8. Four tiebreakers and mere percentage points were needed to dub the New York Giants, not Green Bay, as the conference's final playoff seed.
- The last time the Packers swept their final four contests and didn't make the playoffs? It happened in 2000. One year later, Green Bay finished 12-

4 and advanced to the Divisional playoffs.

- The Packers were 5-1 in the NFC North, which tied Chicago, Philadelphia, San Diego, Baltimore and Carolina for the best division mark in the NFL.
- In the final league rankings, the Packers finished ninth on offense (23rd in rushing, eighth in passing). Green Bay finished 12th on defense (13th against the run and 17th against the pass).
- On defense, Bob Sanders' unit over the season's final 10 weeks improved from 32nd in total yards allowed to finish 12th. Instrumental during the club's four-game winning streak to end the year, the defense allowed only 562 total yards over the last three games.
- On offense, only the New Orleans Saints (2,212) had more yards after the catch than the Packers (2,161) in the NFL.
- With coaches constantly stressing ball security in practice, the Packers concluded the season with a zero margin in turnover ratio, a marked improvement from minus-24 the year before. The zero margin was the team's best total since it also finished even at the end of 2003.
- "I'm proud of the smaller successes that we have accomplished since we all came together here, and I'm proud we have those in place and are able to build off them," said McCarthy in his season-ending press conference.
- "But I'm disappointed we didn't get in the playoffs," continued McCarthy. "I'm disappointed that I couldn't lead this team in the playoffs and see what happens. I'll never be completely satisfied until we reach the top."

LET THE BATTLES BEGIN

Eighty-seven players. Fifty-three spots. That's the basic math facing the Green Bay Packers as they begin their 2007 training camp. General Manager Ted Thompson and Head Coach Mike McCarthy have preached competition at every position, and they've established that to an even greater extent than last year.

- The first NFL-mandated roster reduction, to 75 players, comes on Aug. 28, two days before the Packers' final preseason game at Tennessee. The final roster reduction, to 53 players, is due two days after that game, on Sept. 1.
- Here's a position-by-position look at the roster breakdown, and where some of those difficulties lie. The first number indicates the number of players at that position entering camp, while the number in parentheses represents how many players from that position made the opening-day roster in 2006.

Quarterback – 4 (3)

- **Brett Favre** and **Aaron Rodgers** form the clear 1-2 punch here. Favre enters 2007 with the chance to rewrite the record books, while Rodgers will once again have all eyes on him in the preseason as he continues his maturation as an NFL quarterback.
- The battle for the No. 3 spot will be between second-year pro **Ingle Martin** and rookie **Paul Thompson**. The experience factor, and the fact that he got a full dose of McCarthy's quarterback school in the offseason, gives Martin the edge, but Thompson's athletic ability was promising enough to warrant an extended look.

Running back – 9 (5)

- All indications are third-year pro **Vernand Morency** and second-round draft pick **Brandon Jackson** are the top two backs and will share the load, but it's always possible one will emerge as the mainstay.
- **Noah Herron** is the most experienced in the third-down role, while rookie seventh-round pick **DeShawn Wynn** is expected to make an impact in camp after recovering from spring injuries and finally putting the pads on. Second-year holdover **P.J. Pope** is back from his 2006 injuries.
- How many fullbacks make the team could depend on how many of the above halfbacks warrant a spot, as well as how many tight ends the coaching staff decides to keep.
- Returning starter **Brandon Miree** has the inside track on the No. 1 job, but a trio of rookies in **Korey Hall**, **Ryan Powdrell** and **Corey White** will look to push Miree and/or land a roster spot of their own.

Tight end – 5 (4)

- Keeping four tight ends last year was a bit of a surprise, and it's difficult to say whether the Packers will do that again or revert to keeping the

more traditional three at this position.

- This may be as wide open as any position on the roster, not only in terms of who will make the team, but who will earn the starting job.
- Veterans **Bubba Franks** and **Donald Lee** will be pushed by second-year pros **Zac Alcorn**, who often flashes great hands in practice, and **Tory Humphrey**, noted for his blocking and work on special teams. Rookie seventh-round draft pick **Clark Harris** will look to make his mark as well.

Wide receiver – 11 (4)

- With the depth and competition here, it's difficult to imagine only four players making the opening day roster. Five, or perhaps even six, is more likely, and that numbers decision will have an impact on how many running backs and tight ends are kept as well.
- After starters **Donald Driver** and **Greg Jennings**, nothing is set in stone. There simply isn't room for everyone, which may present the coaching staff with some of its more difficult decisions as camp concludes.
- **Carlyle Holiday** and **Ruvell Martin** were strong contributors at the end of last season, rookie draft picks **James Jones** and **David Clowney** will be seen in pads for the first time, veteran **Robert Ferguson** looks to be healthy again, **Shaun Bodiford** is an intriguing prospect because of his punt and kick return abilities, and **Carlton Brewster** is coming off a banner spring in NFL Europe.

Offensive line – 14 (9)

- Barring an injury, there's perhaps the least drama here, with the starting five of **Mark Tauscher**, **Jason Spitz**, **Scott Wells**, **Daryn Colledge** and **Chad Clifton** returning and looking to maximize on the chemistry developed throughout 2006.
- **Tony Moll** is a versatile backup who gained starting experience as a rookie as well. After that, it's simply a matter of vying for backup spots.
- **Junius Coston** and **Tyson Walter** can play multiple positions, which could help their chances. Former defensive tackle **Orrin Thompson** progressed well during the offseason, and the coaches are eager to put the pads on rookie fourth-round draft pick **Allen Barbre**, who showed a lot of fire during mini-camps and OTAs.

Defensive line – 13 (10)

- The experience and depth here are perhaps as strong as anywhere on the roster. **Aaron Kampman**, **Cullen Jenkins** and **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila** are the top three defensive ends.
- Amongst returnees **Michael Montgomery** and **Jason Hunter**, and rookies **DeVon Hicks** and **Larry Birdine**, there's no telling the pecking order or how many ends will be kept.
- On the inside at tackle, the veteran group of **Ryan Pickett**, **Corey Williams**, **Colin Cole** and **Johnny Jolly** is joined by rookies **Justin Harrell** and **Daniel Muir**.

- Whether or not there's room for five defensive tackles remains to be seen, and Williams' ability to move outside if needed, as well as Jenkins' ability to move inside, could factor into the final roster decisions.

Linebacker – 10 (6)

- Barring injury, it's hard to imagine **Nick Barnett**, **A.J. Hawk** or **Brady Poppinga** losing his starting job, but the backup spots are far from determined and most likely will come down to special teams contributions.
- Second-year pro **Abdul Hodge** hopes to be healthy again and make the impact he did in his rookie training camp, while rookie sixth-rounder **Desmond Bishop** will look to be the tackling machine he was in college at Cal.
- **Tracy White** is a special teams veteran, **Tim Goodwell** is coming off a solid season in NFL Europa, and youngsters **Spencer Havner**, **Juwan Simpson** and **Rory Johnson** all have shown enough promise to deserve a chance.

Defensive back – 16 (9)

- The nine on last year's opening day roster consisted of five cornerbacks and four safeties.
- If that holds true again, then some combination of the cornerbacks fighting for the nickel job – **Will Blackmon**, **Frank Walker**, **Jarrett Bush** and **Patrick Dendy** – could make the team behind starters **Al Harris** and **Charles Woodson**. It will just be a question of what role each will play.
- The safety spot isn't nearly so clear-cut, however. Third-year pro **Nick Collins** is the only one whose job isn't on the line, and who earns the starting spot opposite him will be one of the most-watched camp battles.
- With last year's starter **Marquand Manuel** looking to get off to a better start, third-year pro **Marviel Underwood** returning from a knee injury, and rookie third-round draft pick **Aaron Rouse** able to hit for real, the competition could last well into the preseason.
- Add 2006 reserves like **Atari Bigby**, **Charlie Peprah** and **Tyrone Culver** to the mix, and there are numerous bodies for only a handful of spots. Much like the linebacker position, special teams roles could factor into these final decisions.

Specialists – 5 (3)

- Long snapper **Rob Davis** will keep his job for a 12th season, but competition was brought in for second-year pros **Jon Ryan** at punter and **Dave Rayner** at kicker. They both earned their jobs with strong training camp performances a year ago, and now they'll have to fend off challenges from Australian punter **David Lonie** and rookie kicker **Mason Crosby** from Colorado.
- Last summer, both competitions were essentially declared over after the second preseason game. But if the battles are close, the winners aren't likely to be declared so soon this time around.

2007 SCHEDULE AT A GLANCE

Three prime-time contests, including a Sunday night rematch with the Chicago Bears at Lambeau Field, highlight the Green Bay Packers' 87th regular-season schedule.

- The '07 slate includes six playoff teams (Chicago, Philadelphia, San Diego, Dallas, N.Y. Giants and Kansas City).
- Of those six opponents who qualified for the 2006 playoffs, three are right away — the first three tilts of the year. What's more, four of the first five games, including the Oct. 7 rematch with the Bears, are against playoff foes.
- The Packers will play three prime-time contests, barring any changes via the league's flexible scheduling options. Two of those three — at Denver Oct. 29 (ESPN) and at Dallas Nov. 29 (NFL Network) — are on the road. The third is the Oct. 7 Bears game (NBC). Five Packers games in 2007 fall under the NFL flex schedule, now in its second season.
- The Packers also welcome the Chargers to Lambeau Field for the first time since 1996 (only the Bengals have waited longer to play in Green

Bay, since 1995) and make their first trip to Kansas City since 1996. The only other active city in which the Packers have waited longer to visit during the regular season is Cleveland (1995).

- Preseason highlights include McCarthy's homecoming in Pittsburgh (Aug. 11), Mike Holmgren's return to Lambeau Field in the Midwest Shrine Game (Aug. 18), a nationally-televised home tilt vs. Jacksonville in the Bishop's Charities Game (Aug. 23) and a trip to Tennessee (Aug. 30) two days before the final roster cut to 53 players on Sept. 1.

SOLD-OUT SCRIMMAGE

The seventh edition of the NFL's most popular practice, 'Family Night, Presented by FOX 11', will take place Saturday, August 4 at Lambeau Field.

- For the fourth consecutive season, the Packers have sold every available seat in the bowl.
- It took the 2007 edition just four days to sell all available tickets.
- One of summer's biggest attractions, Family Night tickets are priced at just \$8.
- On-field football drills kick off the event, followed by an intra-squad scrimmage between the Packers' offense and defense.
- A spectacular fireworks display lights up the sky at the conclusion of the scrimmage.

UNDER THE LIGHTS

Initiated by Coach McCarthy prior to his first training camp, night practices return to training camp in 2007. The night practices are outside of normal working hours, offering increased opportunities for fans to see their favorite Packers.

- McCarthy first experienced night practices during his tenure in New Orleans, where the move was necessitated by temperature.
- Nonetheless, McCarthy noticed an increased intensity from players, coaches and fans alike.
- The "two-a-days" format also allows the staff and team ample time to review mistakes made in the morning practice with an afternoon film session. In the new format, the team will have the opportunity to break down a practice in the film room before returning to the practice field to correct any mistakes.
- The portable lighting system for Clarke Hinkle Field will remain the same as 2006 and be installed in the days leading up to training camp.
- The Packers are once again renting 11 mobile towers from Magnum Products, LLC, to light the field. Five units will be placed along the Don Hutson Center, five will be spaced out along Oneida Street on the street side of the fence, and an extra unit will be located in the alley behind the field to the player/coach parking lot.
- The towers from Magnum are approximately 30 feet high and are small enough to be installed on both sides.
- Magnum Products is based in Berlin, Wis., and was named the 2005 Wisconsin Manufacturer of the Year for medium-sized companies. Magnum employs 252 people and has been a leading supplier of mobile light towers and portable generators for the U.S. military efforts in Iraq.
- The company also has worked with NASA's space shuttle program, and with transportation departments.
- Beginning on Sunday, July 29, night practices will take place on Aug. 2, Aug. 7, Aug. 9, Aug. 14, Aug. 16 and Aug. 20. Note that the July 31 practice will be held at City Stadium on Green Bay's east side.



- Each night practice will shut down traffic on Oneida Street near Hinkle Field.

'FUTURE LAMBEAU LEAPERS' RETURNS

Young fans of the Green Bay Packers will have opportunities to see and interact with their favorite players up close during training camp.

- The "Future Lambeau Leapers" area will give children ages 12 and younger the chance to meet players, shake their hands, and potentially get autographs after practice.
- The area will be located on the south side of the Oneida Nation Gate at Lambeau Field.
- General Manager Ted Thompson came up with the idea after seeing young fans struggle to pass items for autographs over the fences near the Packers' facilities, and after noting how such a limited number of people were able to get tokens or tickets to the autograph tables.
- The more traditional opportunities to interact with the players, such as when they are walking to and from practice, entering and exiting the practice field, and mingling near the bike corral at the facility entrance, still will be available to all fans.
- Access to the "Future Lambeau Leapers" area will be limited to children ages 12 and under, but no tokens or tickets will be needed.
- The team cannot guarantee that every child in the area will receive an autograph, but those seeking autographs are encouraged not to ask an individual player to sign more than one item.
- Eight to 10 players will appear in the area for approximately 20 or 30 minutes following the first practice of the day (either the 8:45 a.m. or 2 p.m. workout). The area will not open following night practices. The identity of players appearing in the area won't be announced until after practice.
- The team's security department will monitor and facilitate the area.

MURPHY BACK WITH PACK

Former Green Bay Packers wide receiver **Terrence Murphy**, a 2005 second-round pick from Texas A&M, will once again take to Clarke Hinkle Field. Only this time he'll have a whistle.

- A promising rookie season ended abruptly with a neck injury that ultimately forced him to retire from football.
- A full year removed from the game, Murphy discovered his passion for football never diminished.
- He joined the coaching staff this spring at Trinity Valley Community College in Athens, Texas, near his hometown of Chapel Hill.
- Now, Murphy rejoins the Packers as a training camp intern. He will work with the running backs and assist the special teams unit.
- "I'm excited to now give the young man an opportunity to advance his coaching career," said McCarthy. "The thing young coaches often need the most is an opportunity. As I told Terrence the day he left here (in 2006), he'll always be a Packer."
- Also joining the Packers as a coaching intern during training camp is **Jovan Dewitt** from St. Norbert College.
- Dewitt serves as the defensive coordinator at St. Norbert and will assist the linebackers and special teams unit this summer.
- Both Dewitt and Murphy will remain with the team through the first pre-season game.

NO STAFF WORKS HARDER

Equipment manager Red Batty and his dedicated staff face a daunting task each training camp — outfitting close to 90 players for each and every practice.

- Assistant equipment manager Tom Bakken says the team will go through 500-600 pairs of cleats during training camp.
- Each player has a choice of four different styles of helmets and 36 styles of facemasks. According to Batty, the team will go through 150 helmets and have around 120 facemasks repaired during training camp.
- Two seamstresses on staff sew all ripped and torn jerseys and have them ready to wear the next day.

- A look at their work shows that on a day with two practices, the team will run through **300** pairs of socks, **200** pairs of shorts, **200** T-shirts and over **800** towels from the training room, weight room, locker room and practice field. It's no wonder the six washers and six dryers run **12** hours a day during "two-a-days".

ATRIUM BUSINESSES PREPARE FOR CROWDS

A year-round destination for Packer faithful, the Lambeau Field Atrium experiences its 'busy season' during training camp. Before, after or in between practices, fans will take in the Packers Hall of Fame, Lambeau Field Stadium Tours, the Packers experience and the Packers Pro Shop.

- The **Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame** again will be a destination of choice for thousands of training camp attendees this summer. Many new films have been added to the mix, as well as other updates. More than 20,000 fans went through the Hall during camp in 2006. Its extended training camp hours are 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily.
- **Lambeau Field Stadium Tours**, which drew nearly 20,000 fans during last summer's camp, features expanded hours during training camp as well: 9 a.m.-6 p.m. daily. Ticket sales begin at 8 a.m.
- **Legendary Lambeau Experience**, a new two-hour walking tour, is available as well. It features stops in the Lee Rammel Press Box, network TV broadcast booth and visitors locker room. Included in the tour is an admission pass to the Packers Hall of Fame, a lunch voucher for the Hall of Fame Grill, a Packers seat cushion, and a \$5 interactive game card for the Curly's Game Zone at Curly's Pub.
- The **Packers Pro Shop** also features extending training camp hours: 8 a.m.-7 p.m. Monday through Friday; 9:30 a.m.-6 p.m. Saturdays; 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Sundays
- Additionally, the Lambeau Field Atrium will be open to visitors and contains seven dining options, including **Curly's Pub**, **Hall of Fame Grill** and **Frozen in Time**, plus four eateries.



CAMP EVEN HAS ITS OWN WEB SITE

The Packers in 2005 launched a new Web site, **www.packerstraining-camp.com**, an online location designed to assist Packers fans as they make plans to visit their favorite team's training sessions each summer.

- A vacation-planning resource, the site features a practice schedule as well as information on other Lambeau Field attractions, including the Packers Experience, the Packers Hall of Fame, Stadium Tours, the Packers Pro Shop and dining options.
- A key feature of the site is the daily practice schedule, which will include any up-to-the-minute changes that may occur. Other links include information on directions, parking and autograph sessions.



- ▶ Another important link takes viewers to The Packer Country Visitor & Convention Bureau's Web site, which features important information on accommodations, as well as other Green Bay summer activities, places of interest, dining options and airport and rental car information.

2007 MEDIA GUIDE

The 78th annual Green Bay Packers Media Guide commemorates the many faces of Lambeau Field in its 50th anniversary season.

- ▶ The 624-page book features a pictorial timeline of the stadium on the cover, from its beginnings as an intimate open-ended facility in 1957, to its growth into a year-round destination venue, where fans from all over the world can visit any day of the week.
- ▶ To assist media in finding information quickly, the book continues to have the largest and most detailed index of any professional media guide, a six-page section near the end of the book.
