TRAINING CAMP

TRAINING CAMP ARRIVES IN GREEN BAY

The most anticipated family event of the summer – Green Bay Packers training camp – begins its 63rd year Monday on Clarke Hinkle Field. A tradition that first began under Curly Lambeau in 1946, it remains one of the most intimate preseason settings in the NFL.

- ▶ Even with EAA AirVenture in Oshkosh bringing the world's greatest aviation celebration to the area and the Milwaukee Brewers in the heat of a division race, no event in the state creates the same buzz as training camp in Green Bay. This summer brings increased national attention to the practices at Lambeau Field as the team begins its summer camp with a new starting quarterback.
- ▶ Newer traditions – such as night practices under the lights and the team's intra-squad scrimmage in Lambeau Field – blend with the old as players continue to ride kids' bicycles to practice, a tradition started under Vince Lombardi, and live in the dorms at nearby St. Norbert College, the NFL's longest training camp relationship between a team and school.
- ▶ According to the Greater Green Bay Convention and Visitors Bureau, training camp attracts an estimated 115,000 visitors from across the nation and as many as 20 foreign countries. Also, it estimates training camp in 2007 brought an economic impact of more than \$48 million, a financial boost to many area businesses. The Greater Green Bay CVB partnered with the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay's Professional Programs in Business Administration for a survey to provide an updated economic study of training camp.
- ▶ None of these figures factors in the team's intra-squad scrimmage, 'Family Night, Presented by FOX 11', which this summer sold every available seat in Lambeau Field for the fifth consecutive year.

A FAN-FRIENDLY SCHEDULE

Seven night practices under the lights highlight a total of 22 practices open to the public during training camp.

- ▶ Head Coach Mike McCarthy stated before his first training camp in 2006 that the night-time practices would draw bigger crowds and produce a game-like atmosphere, increasing the intensity and competition in practice. Used by a number of teams around the NFL, he first experienced night practices as offensive coordinator in New Orleans.

- ▶ McCarthy once again will institute a "2-1-2" training camp schedule, beginning with a full-squad, shells workout at 8:45 a.m. on Monday, July 28, on Clarke Hinkle Field.
- ▶ The first night practice – and first full-pads workout – takes place later that night at 6:30 p.m. Five of the seven night practices are preceded by a morning workout at 8:45 a.m.
- ▶ In between "two-a-days", the team will break down film of the morning practice. On days with one practice, they will break down film twice – night practices will be broken down the following morning while the afternoon session is studied after dinner. In other words, the squad will never take the field without going over the previous practice's accomplishments and mistakes.
- ▶ Having not been in full pads since the overtime loss in the NFC Championship Game, the team will hold five practices over the first three days of training camp. Three of those will be in full pads. Over the course of camp, the team will hold 14 full-padded practices and eight practices in shells.
- ▶ In accordance with league guidelines, the team spent the entirety of mini-camp and OTAs in shorts and helmets. Fans and coaches alike will get their first chance to see many players, including the 2008 rookie class, in full pads and contact drills.

REST AND RECOVERY

For the second consecutive summer, Coach McCarthy has off days built into the schedule.

- ▶ In addition to the traditional days off after preseason games and the Family Night scrimmage, players also will be off on July 31 and Aug. 7.
- ▶ On those days, the team will gather in the morning for weightlifting, meetings and film review, with players given the afternoon and evening off to recover for two practices the next day.
- ▶ McCarthy initiated the days off last summer thanks to a successful off-season program in which the team was able to get some basic installations put in. With every player on the roster present for at least a portion of the mini-camps and OTAs this spring, the same holds true.
- ▶ It is also done to watch out for the continued health of the football team. McCarthy had hoped the additional rest would allow the Packers to jump out to a quick start in the regular season and in turn have the energy to finish strong. Last year, the Packers jumped out to a 4-0 start en route to a 13-3 regular-season finish and the NFC North Division title.

ABOUT THE OFFSEASON

McCarthy let everyone know at the annual Packers Shareholders meeting on July 24 just how he felt about the team's progress through the off-season conditioning program, mini-camps and OTAs.

- ▶ "I'm not trying to throw out some positive BS, but we had a great off-season," McCarthy said at the meeting.
- ▶ The team did slightly alter its offseason structure, holding the mandatory mini-camp at the end of the offseason in mid-June as opposed to sandwiching it in between voluntary OTAs as it had in prior offseasons.
- ▶ "I think it's the best offseason that we've had to date (with) the individual time that the players spent with the coaches, the commitment to the offseason program and the strength and conditioning all the way through the OTAs," McCarthy said after the final mini-camp June 19.
- ▶ "I really like the way our offseason came to a conclusion here with the mini-camp at the end. It's an exciting time for us. We felt like we had the opportunity to improve through this learning process because that's really what this time of year is. I liked the way the rookies jumped in there and picked things up. It puts us in a very good position to start off camp healthy and ready to go."
- ▶ As far as injuries heading into camp, McCarthy acknowledged that some players may have to ease into the schedule. "I would like to stand here and tell you that everybody is going to be back and that's my anticipation based off the conversations with our medical group. We may limit some of our players to one-a-days early, the ones that are coming off of significant injuries, but my hope is that we'll be healthy and ready to go when training camp starts."
- ▶ McCarthy has always stressed that he is not a believer in false confidence. Coming off the offseason, it seems he has *real* confidence in the 2008 Packers. "As far as our roster, the talent level on our depth chart board, it's the best that it has looked since I've been here, especially at this time of year. The amount of work that we were able to get done from March until today has been the most productive that we've been able to get done in my three years. We're trying to win every single football game, and this team has the ability to be something special and we felt that way coming off our offseason last year. We felt good about the direction we were going. I think our challenges are going to be a lot different this year. The obstacles that we're going to have to get over are going to be a lot different."

FOOTBALL LEADERSHIP INTACT

Before Bob Harlan's storied tenure as the leader of the Green Bay Packers came to a close last January, he saw to it that a strong football operations staff, led by General Manager **Ted Thompson** and **Mike McCarthy**, would remain in place.

- ▶ Thompson was signed to a new, five-year contract which runs through the 2012 season. In just three seasons, Thompson has built the Packers into one of the NFL's strongest young teams.
- ▶ McCarthy also was signed to a new, five-year contract that runs through the 2012 season.
- ▶ The continuity carries over to both the personnel and coaching staffs. **Reggie McKenzie** and **John Schneider** were promoted by Thompson in May and will share the title of director – football operations. McKenzie enters his 14th season in Green Bay's player personnel department and has served as director of pro personnel for the past 10 seasons. Schneider, a 15-year NFL personnel veteran, most recently served as the Packers' personnel analyst to general manager for the past six seasons. The duo, along with director of college scouting **John Dorsey**, head the Packers' player personnel department.
- ▶ Also joining the football operations staff this offseason as vice president of football administration/player finance was 20-year NFL veteran **Russ Ball**. He is responsible for negotiating player contracts, managing the salary cap and other football administration duties. Ball comes to Green Bay from New Orleans, where he spent six seasons with the Saints (2002-07), the final two as vice president of football administration and the first four as senior football administrator.
- ▶ McCarthy welcomes back nearly his entire coaching staff from last season, with defensive quality control **Eric Lewis** the only departure. Lewis joined the coaching staff at the University of Louisville, while he is replaced by **Joe Whitt, Jr.** Whitt comes to Green Bay after serving as assistant defensive backs coach for the Atlanta Falcons last year.

THE MOST ANTICIPATED POSITION BATTLES

20 of 22 starters return – 10 each on offense and defense – from the league's youngest team in 2007, ensuring what promises to be one of the most competitive training camps in recent memory.

- ▶ General Manager Ted Thompson knows all about training camp battles. Signed as a non-drafted free agent linebacker by the Houston Oilers, Thompson annually held off younger competition brought in by Bum Phillips during his 10-year career.
- ▶ The Packers GM inevitably will face some tough decisions toward the end of training camp, but it's all a part of his philosophy: building a solid foundation through the draft.
- ▶ Nothing attracts attention and headlines during training camp like the fight for playing time. Here are the positional battles that will draw the most interest over the next month:

LEFT GUARD

- ▶ Third-year pro **Daryn Colledge** has already started 28 games in his young career, but he must hold off a strong charge from second-year player **Allen Barbre**. A Division II Missouri Southern State product, Barbre saw action in seven games as a rookie last season, and his uncanny athletic ability for an offensive lineman (he played gunner on his college punt coverage team) makes him an ideal fit for the zone-blocking scheme.

ALONG THE OUTSIDE

- ▶ Few players on the football field can match the intensity of outside linebacker **Brady Poppinga**, who started at SAM linebacker for Green Bay the past two seasons. A defensive end at BYU, he has natural pass-rush instincts and is stout against the run. However, the team did sign **Brandon Chillar** from St. Louis, who comes in advertised as a top cover man. Will one linebacker win

the job, or will the two platoon throughout the year? Either way, count on both playing key roles on special teams.

NICKEL BACK

▶ The third cornerback on an NFL team gets enough reps to be considered a "12th" defensive starter. **Jarrett Bush** held that job at the beginning of '07 before **Tramon Williams** came on strong at the end of the season. Williams also was outstanding in offseason drills. **Will Blackmon** proved to be an impact player on special teams, but can he stay healthy enough to make a regular impact on defense? And where does second-round pick **Pat Lee** fit in? With a bevy of talent at wide receiver, this group will get tested often in practice.

ST. NORBERT AND THE PACKERS - ANOTHER NFL RECORD

Continuing a tradition started under Packers coach Scooter McLean in 1958, the Green Bay Packers will call St. Norbert College home for a 51st consecutive training camp this summer. The relationship between the private college in De Pere, Wis., and the Green Bay Packers marks the longest continual use of any training camp facility by an NFL team.

- ▶ Players will take up residence in Victor McCormick Hall, a 60-room coed dormitory used to house 225 students during the academic year.
- ▶ St. Norbert, founded in 1898 by Abbot Bernard Pennings, will celebrate its 110th anniversary in October.
- ▶ The Packers use their own practice and team meeting facilities at Lambeau Field during training camp, with the college serving as housing headquarters.
- ▶ Players return to St. Norbert via cars and vans every evening for team dinner.
- ▶ The 6.62-mile commute is estimated at 11 minutes each way.
- ▶ The team will travel roughly 264.8 miles between the college and practice facility during training camp...that's almost 4,660 lengths of a football field. It will take an estimated 7 hours, 20 minutes for the team to commute to and from the college...roughly the time of two-and-a-half NFL games.

INTRODUCING THE TUNDRA TAILGATE ZONE

The most obvious new feature at training camp this summer will be the Tundra Tailgate Zone, a three-tent, climate-controlled area encompassing 58,000 square feet in the parking lot on the stadium's east side.

- ▶ Near the path where players ride local children's bikes, the 'TTZ' will house an entertainment area with a main stage, the Kemps Packers Experience, and a food and beverage area.
- ▶ The main feature will be scheduled activities on the main stage, including player autograph sessions for younger fans, alumni autograph and question-and-answer sessions, special guest speeches, jersey giveaways, live bands and other performances. Activities will be scheduled for appropriate times before or after team practices.
- ▶ Other special attractions will include taping of Packers TV shows, *The Mike McCarthy Show* and Packers Training Camp Special. The Packers' flagship radio station, 620 WTMJ, also will be on hand for live radio remotes.
- ▶ The Kemps Packers Experience will be the new home of the activity area for younger Packers fans that has been a popular staple of training camp for years. Young fans can enjoy inflatable football games and participate in several skills challenges.

LAST THOUGHTS ON 2007

The most memorable Packers season in a decade came to a sudden and deflating end in overtime of the NFC Championship Game.

- ▶ On a bitterly cold Sunday night in what became the highest-rated non-Super Bowl telecast since the *Seinfeld* finale in 1998, the New York Giants ended Green Bay's season on a 47-yard field goal.
- ▶ Still, it was a season that exceeded nearly all expectations for the league's youngest club. Nearly every preseason prognosticator picked

Green Bay to finish around the .500 mark.

- ▶ Instead, the Packers matched a franchise record with 13 regular-season wins, many of which came in electrifying fashion, and captured the 18th division title in franchise history.
- ▶ Earning a first-round bye for the first time since 1997, the Packers defeated the Seahawks in the Divisional round in what will surely go down as one of the most memorable games in Lambeau Field history.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, 2007 Motorola NFL Coach of the Year, became the first Packers coach since Vince Lombardi to lead his team to a championship game in his second season.
- ▶ Just two seasons removed from a 4-12 record, the resurgence came from strong play in all three phases. McCarthy, the offense's play-caller, engineered the NFL's No. 2-ranked unit, which put up one of the most productive seasons in Packers history. Not to be overlooked was the defense, which ranked 11th in the league at season's end, and a special teams unit that produced four touchdowns.

POSITION BY POSITION

Eighty players for 53 spots. That's the inherent drama built into each NFL training camp as players hope to make the opening day roster. This off-season, General Manager **Ted Thompson** brought increased competition to the league's youngest roster. Much of the depth chart, including a few starting spots and key reserve roles, will be up for grabs as players fight through 29 practices, four games and one scrimmage in 32 days.

- ▶ The first NFL-mandated roster reduction, to 75 players, comes on Aug. 26 by 3 p.m. CDT, two days before the Packers' final preseason game vs. Tennessee. The final roster reduction, to 53 players, is due two days after that game, on Aug. 30 by 5 p.m. CDT.
- ▶ One only need to look back to last summer to realize how unpredictable training camp can be. Who would have guessed that **Atari Bigby** would emerge as the starter at strong safety, let alone amass over 120 tackles and lead the team with five interceptions?
- ▶ Not many people picked **Tramon Williams** to make the final cut last summer. After a stellar training camp, he became a key contributor in the secondary and on special teams as a return man.
- ▶ No one predicted **Ryan Grant** would emerge as the solution at running back when the Packers traded for him on Sept. 1, the same day the final roster was reduced to 53 players.
- ▶ So who will be the surprise of camp this summer? Who has the inside track on a roster spot? That's what a month's worth of grueling practices will reveal. Here's a look at the roster as it stands, position by position. The first number indicates the number of players at that position entering camp, while the number in parentheses represents how many players from that position made the opening-day roster in 2007.

Quarterback – 3 (2)

- ▶ No position in the NFL has been talked about more this offseason than the one under center for the Green Bay Packers, and that trend should continue well into training camp and the regular season.
- ▶ **Aaron Rodgers** enters camp as the starter after serving as the backup for three seasons to Brett Favre. Rodgers, who hosted teammates at his house for weekly get-togethers this offseason, has played well in prior preseason action and spot duty, most notably against the Cowboys last season. How well he plays as a first-time starter undoubtedly is the story of camp.
- ▶ The Packers added two accomplished signal-callers in April's NFL Draft. **Brian Brohm**, drafted in the second round, established a host of passing records at Louisville and has the inside position on the No. 2 spot heading into camp. Also pushing for time will be seventh-round selection **Matt Flynn**, who led the LSU Tigers to a national championship last fall. Neither Brohm nor Flynn will grab many headlines during the month of August, but their continued maturation as NFL quarterbacks, as well as the race for backup duties, will be closely watched.

Running back – 10 (6)

- ▶ **Ryan Grant** burst onto the national scene during the latter part of the 2007 season and enters 2008 as the team's starter. Including playoffs, he rushed for 1,159 yards and 11 touchdowns in the final 12 games of the season. If he can continue that production in '08, Grant could establish himself as one of the NFL's top backs.
- ▶ The opportunity for reps behind Grant is there, and a number of players will be vying for it. Second-year pro **Brandon Jackson** came on strong toward the end of his rookie season in 2007 and was saluted by the coaching staff for his progress this offseason. **Vernand Morency** and **DeShawn Wynn** both saw their playing time limited by injuries in 2007 but enter camp with a clean bill of health.
- ▶ **Noah Herron** looks to regain his form from 2006, when he served as a third-down back and special teams contributor, after missing the entire 2007 season with a knee injury. **Kregg Lumpkin** was brought in as a free agent after a successful collegiate career at Georgia.
- ▶ At fullback, **Korey Hall** and **John Kuhn** return to form a solid 1-2 punch. Hall started 10 games as a rookie last season, while Kuhn saw action in all 16 as a reserve fullback and key contributor on special teams.
- ▶ **Corey White**, who spent 2007 on the Packers practice squad, and **Ryan Powdrell** will push the incumbent duo. Powdrell spent last season on I.R. with a knee injury.

Tight end – 5 (2)

- ▶ The Packers kept four tight ends in '06 but just two last season. With little experience behind **Donald Lee**, who enjoyed a breakout year in '07 and is entrenched as the starter, the safe bet is Green Bay will keep at least three.
- ▶ **Tory Humphrey** has seen his last two seasons end on injured reserve, but the third-year pro returned to the practice field in the offseason and appears healthy. Though undersized, Humphrey's speed can stretch defenses. Third-round pick **Jermichael Finley** displayed his athleticism early on, but how much playing time he receives will be predicated upon how quickly he masters the offensive scheme and blocking responsibilities of an NFL tight end.
- ▶ The personnel staff brought in two non-drafted free agents: **Joey Haynos** (Maryland) and **Evan Moore** (Stanford) are both tall targets from BCS conference schools.

Wide receiver – 11 (5)

- ▶ Perhaps the deepest position on the team, the team may keep more than five coming out of camp. McCarthy unveiled a 'Big 5' formation in Week 10 last season, utilizing a five-wide formation, and may go to it a bit earlier this season to take advantage of mismatches.
- ▶ **Donald Driver** remains the leader of the group after recording a fourth-consecutive 1,000-yard season, a new club record. **Greg Jennings**

proved to be a big-play receiver in his second season, catching 12 TDs in just 13 games, and will start alongside Driver. After those two, nothing is set in stone.

- ▶ **James Jones** had a solid rookie season in 2007 and will enter camp as the No. 3 after serving in that role as a rookie. He gives the team a physical presence at the position, while **Ruvell Martin** gives the team some height in addition to being a top-flight blocker.
- ▶ Thompson added to the group with his first choice in the draft, selecting All-American **Jordy Nelson**. Reps on offense and special teams will have to be earned during camp for the Kansas State product. Also added in the 2008 NFL Draft was San Diego State wideout **Brett Swain**.
- ▶ Other returnees looking to grab a roster spot include **Shaun Bodiford** and **Chris Francies**. Both have been with the club since 2006.
- ▶ First-year player **Johnny Quinn** (North Texas) joined the club early this offseason, while two non-drafted free agents were signed following the draft: **Jake Allen** (Mississippi College) and **Taj Smith** (Syracuse).

Offensive line – 14 (9)

- ▶ The Packers have kept nine offensive linemen the past two seasons, so one can assume the number will be similar this year. Just because all five starters return along the line doesn't mean there won't be competition for starting spots.
- ▶ **Chad Clifton** and **Mark Tauscher** return for another season as the anchors at tackle. Both enjoyed stellar seasons in '07, with Clifton earning his first Pro Bowl trip. There will be competition to see who will back the two up. Third-year pro **Tony Moll** has the most experience of the group, while fifth-round draft choice **Breno Giacomini** will push Moll for reps. **Orrin Thompson**, who has spent parts of the past two seasons on the practice squad and active roster, worked on the left side this offseason.
- ▶ Guard should be one of the closest battles on the offensive side of the ball, specifically at left guard. **Daryn Colledge** has served as the starter in his first two NFL seasons, but is expected to be pushed by second-year pro **Allen Barbre**. The two shared reps with the No. 1 offense throughout the offseason. **Jason Spitz** enters camp at right guard, but the third-year pro actually started at all three interior spots last season thanks to various injuries. Backing him up will be fourth-round choice **Josh Sitton**. **Ryan Keenan** and **Ryan Considine** add depth to the position.
- ▶ **Scott Wells** returns at center and will look to establish himself as one of the NFC's top-flight centers. **Junius Coston**, who saw time in the starting lineup last season at guard, will serve as his backup, but the fourth-year pro can also slide over to guard if needed. **Brennen Carvalho** will also compete for a spot after a decorated career at Portland State.

Defensive line – 13 (11)

- ▶ One of the team's deepest positions, the Packers may keep as many defensive linemen as last year simply so they don't let talented players get away. Some were surprised that the Packers kept 11 last season, but nearly all saw valuable reps at some point during the year.
- ▶ **Aaron Kampman** and **Cullen Jenkins** form a solid duo at defensive end, and the race for a roster spot behind the two should be among the more competitive. **Michael Montgomery** has shown flashes in his first three seasons and has been a key member of the coverage units on special teams.
- ▶ Perhaps no one is as valuable on special teams as **Jason Hunter**, who led the unit in tackles a year ago. Added to the mix was fourth-round draft choice **Jeremy Thompson**, younger brother of Packers offensive tackle Orrin, who could see time as a pass-rush specialist.
- ▶ **Ryan Pickett** headlines the defensive tackle group, but the spot next to him will be open to competition. **Johnny Jolly** seems to have the inside track on that job after starting seven games in '07, but offseason shoulder surgery must be taken into consideration. Also recovering from off-season surgery (back) is former first-round pick **Justin Harrell**, who figures to be Jolly's main competition for the starting role.
- ▶ **Colin Cole** returns for his fifth season in Green Bay and is a proven run-stuffer, while **Daniel Muir** showed enough promise as a rookie to warrant

an opportunity at increased playing time this season. **Conrad Bolston** and **Alfred Malone**, both of whom joined Green Bay toward the end of the '07 season, also return.

Linebacker – 9 (5)

- ▶ Green Bay kept just five linebackers last year, so this may be one of the toughest positions to make the roster this summer. **Nick Barnett** and **A.J. Hawk** return as the cornerstones of the linebacker corps, but the third starting spot will be one of the most scrutinized defensive positions in camp.
- ▶ **Brady Poppinga**, fresh off a contract extension, will look to hold down his starting position on the outside. **Brandon Chillar**, who started each of the past two seasons for the Rams, was brought in from St. Louis as an unrestricted free agent. Both are expected to contribute on special teams and could end up seeing a similar number of snaps on defense. Poppinga has been noted for his ability to play against the run, while Chillar comes in with the reputation as a solid cover man.
- ▶ **Tracy White**, who plays on the outside, and **Desmond Bishop**, Barnett's backup in the middle last season, were both key members of the coverage units in '07. White finished second on the team in special teams stops, while Bishop was third. **Abdul Hodge** will be Bishop's competition as he returns after a season on injured reserve. **Spencer Havner**, a two-year member of Green Bay's practice squad, and **Danny Lansanah**, a non-drafted free agent from Connecticut, must make their mark on special teams if they are to make the club.

Defensive back – 13 (10)

- ▶ The 10 on last year's opening-day roster consisted of six cornerbacks and four safeties.
- ▶ **Charles Woodson** and **Al Harris** form one of the top corner duos in the league. Both played at a high level last season, and despite their age (Harris 33, Woodson 31), both looked in top shape during mini-camp.
- ▶ The nickel job will be tightly contested between a number of returnees and one newcomer. **Tramon Williams**, **Will Blackmon** and **Jarrett Bush** all spent time there last season, and added to the mix was second-round draft choice **Pat Lee** from Auburn. **Joe Porter** and **Condrew Allen** hope to join the fight for playing time as well.
- ▶ Both starters at safety return in **Nick Collins** and **Atari Bigby**, but that doesn't mean they won't be pushed. Second-year pro **Aaron Rouse** started three games last season and recorded an interception in two of them.
- ▶ **Charlie Peprah** was a key member of the coverage units last season and could push for playing time on defense, while **Tyrone Culver** returns to the mix after a season on injured reserve. Much like the linebacker position, special teams roles will factor into these final decisions.

Specialists – 4 (3)

- ▶ All kicker **Mason Crosby** did in his rookie season was lead the NFL in points. Both he and punter **Jon Ryan** return in '08.
- ▶ With the retirement of Rob Davis, two players will battle for long-snapping duties. **Thomas Gafford** spent training camp with the Packers in 2006 and will battle **J.J. Jansen**, a rookie from Notre Dame.



SOLD-OUT SCRIMMAGE

The eighth edition of the NFL's most popular practice, 'Family Night, Presented by FOX 11', will take place Sunday, Aug. 3, at Lambeau Field.

- ▶ For the fifth consecutive season, the scrimmage will sell every available seat in the bowl.
- ▶ One of summer's biggest attractions, Family Night tickets are priced at just \$8.
- ▶ On-field football drills kick off the event, followed by an intra-squad scrimmage between the Packers' offense and defense.
- ▶ A spectacular fireworks display lights up the sky at the conclusion of the scrimmage.

2008 SCHEDULE AT A GLANCE

The Green Bay Packers' 2008 campaign is highlighted by four prime-time contests, including a nationally-televised home-opening tilt against the NFC North division rival Minnesota Vikings on ESPN's *Monday Night Football*. The Packers' 88th regular-season includes two additional Monday night games and a Sunday night game on NBC.

- ▶ In addition to the *MNF* home-opener, the Packers host Dallas Sept. 21 (NBC) and will travel for the final two prime-time contests – at New Orleans Nov. 24 (ESPN) and at Chicago Dec. 22 (ESPN).
- ▶ The Week 1 prime-time matchup marks the fourth time the club will open the season on Monday night. The Packers own a 3-0 record in previous Monday night opening games.
- ▶ The Packers own the NFC's longest active streak for seasons with a *MNF* appearance, with the '08 campaign marking the 16th straight season.
- ▶ The Week 3 Sunday night matchup with Dallas marks the Packers' third consecutive season for a prime-time slot on NBC and is the second-straight season the team will meet the Cowboys in prime time.
- ▶ For the first time in club history, the first two games contested at Lambeau Field will be in prime time.
- ▶ The 2008 slate includes six playoff teams from a year ago (Dallas, Seattle, Tampa Bay, Indianapolis, Jacksonville and Tennessee).
- ▶ The Packers play five of the six postseason teams from a year ago in the first eight games, with only one postseason team from '07 scheduled in the second half of the season.
- ▶ An Oct. 12 tilt at Seattle pits the Packers against former coach Mike Holmgren and marks a rematch of the NFC Divisional Playoff matchup in January when the Packers topped the Seahawks, 42-20, in Green Bay.
- ▶ The Packers will see the Tennessee Titans twice during the '08 campaign – a preseason contest at Lambeau Field for the Midwest Shrine Game (Aug. 28) and a Week 9 trip to Nashville, the first regular-season trip to Tennessee for the Packers since the '01 season.
- ▶ Green Bay will travel to New Orleans for the third of four prime-time games in Week 12. The Packers last traveled to the Superdome in 2002. The Nov. 24 *MNF* game will be head coach Mike McCarthy's first return to the Superdome since serving as the Saints' offensive coordinator from 2000-04.
- ▶ The Packers host the Cincinnati Bengals for the preseason home-opening Bishop's Charities Game (Aug. 11), televised nationally on ESPN.
- ▶ The Houston Texans will make that franchise's first trip to Lambeau Field for a Dec. 7 matchup.
- ▶ For the fifth consecutive season, the Packers will celebrate Christmas

with NFC North foes – a trip to Chicago (Dec. 22) and a home tilt against Detroit (Dec. 28) mark the final regular-season matchups.

- ▶ *Monday Night Football* and the Packers roll into Chicago for Green Bay's third Monday night game against the Bears in Week 16. No two NFL teams have met on the gridiron more than the Packers and Bears. The 2008 edition of the series marks the 177th overall meeting.
- ▶ The last time the Packers had four prime-time games on the schedule was in 2005. That year also marks the last time that the Packers hosted a *Monday Night Football* contest, also against the Vikings.
- ▶ The Packers have 10 games with noon start times. Five of the noon start times beginning with Week 11 are subject to change due to NFL flexible scheduling. The '07 season saw 13 games with noon kickoffs.

UNDER THE LIGHTS

Initiated by Coach McCarthy prior to his first training camp, night practices return to training camp in 2008. The night practices are outside of normal working hours, offering increased opportunities for fans to see their favorite Packers.

- ▶ McCarthy first experienced night practices during his tenure in New Orleans, where the move was necessitated by temperature.
- ▶ Nonetheless, McCarthy noticed an increased intensity from players, coaches and fans alike.
- ▶ The "two-a-days" format also allows the staff and team ample time to review mistakes made in the morning practice with an afternoon film session. In the new format, the team will have the opportunity to break down a practice in the film room before returning to the practice field to correct any mistakes.
- ▶ The portable lighting system for Clarke Hinkle Field will remain the same as previous years and be installed in the days leading up to camp.
- ▶ The Packers are once again renting 11 mobile towers from Magnum Products, LLC, to light the field. Five units will be placed along the Don Hutson Center, five will be spaced out along Oneida Street on the street side of the fence, and an extra unit will be located in the alley behind the field to the player/coach parking lot.
- ▶ The towers from Magnum are approximately 30 feet high and are small enough to be installed on both sides.
- ▶ Magnum Products is based in Berlin, Wis., and was named the 2005 Wisconsin Manufacturer of the Year for medium-sized companies. Magnum employs 252 people and has been a leading supplier of mobile light towers and portable generators for the U.S. military efforts in Iraq.
- ▶ The company also has worked with NASA's space shuttle program, and with transportation departments.
- ▶ Beginning on Monday, July 28, night practices will take place on July 30, Aug. 1, Aug. 6, Aug. 8, Aug. 13 and Aug. 18.
- ▶ Each night practice will shut down traffic on Oneida Street near Hinkle Field.

COACHING INTERNS

The Packers annually welcome coaching interns as part of the NFL's Minority Coaching Program. This year's group includes:

- ▶ **Ricky Brumfield**, wide receivers coach at Fairmont State. This is his third year in the NFL's program, and he will assist the offense.
- ▶ **John Rushing**, cornerbacks coach at Utah State. He coached current Packers cornerback **Jarrett Bush**, and will assist the defense.
- ▶ **Curtis Fuller**, who played four seasons (2001-04) in the NFL, including two seasons (2003-04) in Green Bay. He will assist the defense.
- ▶ All three will remain with the team through the first preseason game.

NO STAFF WORKS HARDER

Equipment manager Red Batty and his dedicated staff face a daunting task each training camp – outfitting 80 players for each and every practice.

- ▶ Assistant equipment manager Tom Bakken says the team will go through 500-600 pairs of cleats during training camp.
- ▶ Each player has a choice of four different styles of helmets and 36 styles of facemasks. According to Batty, the team will go through 150 helmets



and have around 120 facemasks repaired during training camp.

- ▶ Two seamstresses on staff sew all ripped and torn jerseys and have them ready to wear the next day.
- ▶ A look at their work shows that on a day with two practices, the team will run through **300** pairs of socks, **200** pairs of shorts, **200** T-shirts and over **800** towels from the training room, weight room, locker room and practice field. It's no wonder the six washers and six dryers run **12** hours a day during "two-a-days".

WHAT TO DO BEFORE OR AFTER PRACTICE

A year-round destination for Packer faithful, the Lambeau Field Atrium experiences its 'busy season' during training camp. Before, after or in between practices, fans will take in the Packers Hall of Fame, Lambeau Field Stadium Tours, the Packers experience and the Packers Pro Shop.

- ▶ The **Green Bay Packers Hall of Fame** again will be a destination of choice for thousands of training camp attendees this summer. Many new films have been added to the mix, as well as other updates. Typically more than 20,000 fans go through the Hall during training camp. Its extended training camp hours are 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily.
- ▶ **Lambeau Field Stadium Tours**, which draw big crowds during camp, feature expanded hours during training camp as well: 9 a.m.-6 p.m. daily. Ticket sales begin at 8 a.m., and are sold on a first-come, first-served basis for each day's available tours.
- ▶ **Legendary Lambeau Experience**, a two-hour walking tour, is available as well. It features stops in the Lee Remmel Press Box, network TV broadcast booth and visitors locker room. Included in the tour is an admission pass to the Packers Hall of Fame and other Packers gift items.
- ▶ The **Packers Pro Shop** also features extending training camp hours: 8 a.m.-7 p.m. Monday through Friday; 9:30 a.m.-6 p.m. Saturdays; 10 a.m.-5 p.m. Sundays. On days where the team holds a night practice, the Pro Shop will remain open until 7:30 p.m.
- ▶ Additionally the Lambeau Field Atrium contains several dining options, including **Curly's Pub** and **Frozen in Time**.

CAMP EVEN HAS ITS OWN WEB SITE

The Packers in 2005 launched a new Web site, www.packerstraining-camp.com, an online location designed to assist Packers fans as they make plans to visit their favorite team's training sessions each summer.

- ▶ A vacation-planning resource, the site features a practice schedule as well as information on other Lambeau Field attractions, including the Packers Experience, the Packers Hall of Fame, Stadium Tours, the Packers Pro Shop and dining options.
- ▶ A key feature of the site is the daily practice schedule, which will include any up-to-the-minute changes that may occur. Other links include information on directions, parking and autograph sessions.
- ▶ Another important link takes viewers to The Greater Green Bay CVB's Web site, which features important information on accommodations, as well as other Green Bay summer activities, places of interest, dining options and airport and rental car information.

2008 MEDIA GUIDE

The 79th annual Green Bay Packers Media Guide arrives in time for training camp and is a one-stop source for everything Green Bay Packers.

- ▶ The 624-page book features players, coaches and staff bios, a comprehensive review of the 2007 season, a complete records and history section and a Lambeau Field section chronicling the stadium's rise from an open-ended facility in 1957 to a year-round destination venue.
