## PACKERS KICK OFF 2008 SEASON IN PRIME TIME

Green Bay kicks off its 90th season in franchise history – its 88th as a member of the National Football League – as the archrival Minnesota Vikings come to Lambeau Field for a Monday night showdown.

- ▶ Green Bay opens the season at home for the third consecutive season. The Packers are 48-36-3 (.569) all-time in season openers but have lost three of their last five.
- ▶ For the fourth time in club history, Green Bay opens the season on *Monday Night Football*. The team is 3-0 in its previous MNF openers.
- ▶ Just as it has dealt with the spotlight all offseason, Green Bay kicks off the 2008 season in front of a national audience. All eyes will be on new Packers quarterback **Aaron Rodgers**, who will become the first quarterback other than Brett Favre to start a Packers game since Don Majkowski, Sept. 20, 1992.
- ▶ Monday night marks the 95th meeting in the all-time series between the clubs. For the sixth time in the series, they will meet in the season opener.
- ▶ In a rivalry that has exhibited great parity over the years (Packers 48-45-1, including playoffs), Green Bay could establish the first five-game winning streak in the series in nearly 25 years. The last such streak in the series came during the 1983-85 seasons, when the Packers won five straight.
- ▶ Honored by the NFL Alumni and Motorola as 2007 NFL Coach of the year, **Mike McCarthy** has not lost to the Vikings (4-0) since arriving in Green Bay in 2006.



## PLENTY OF OPTIMISM IN GREEN BAY

Headed by a strong football operations led by McCarthy and *Sporting News* NFL Executive of the Year **Ted Thompson**, the Packers enter 2008 as one of the league's strongest young teams.

- ▶ Winners of 17 of its last 20 regular-season games, Green Bay returns much of its core from a team that reached the NFC Championship Game. In fact, 21 of 22 starters return from a year ago.
- ▶ The Packers will be among the league's youngest teams for a third straight year. But unlike previous years, Green Bay will have experienced NFL players at nearly every position. Only two rookies made their way onto the season-opening two-deep – both on offense.
- ▶ There's no doubt the team will be tested early. Five of its first eight games come against playoff teams from a year ago.
- ▶ If the Packers are going to match and exceed their success from a year ago, they again must get outstanding play from all three phases. Last season, the club finished as the league's No. 2-ranked offense and its No. 6 scoring defense. The Packers also finished No. 7 in the *Dallas Morning News* special teams rankings, a dramatic jump of 25 spots from their last-place finish the previous two years.

## WITH THE CALL

ESPN enters its third season as host of the most successful series in sports television history, *Monday Night Football*. Play-by-play man **Mike Tirico** is joined by analysts **Ron Jaworski** and **Tony Kornheiser** for the 39th season of MNF broadcasts.

- ▶ The contest also will air as a simulcast locally on WBAY (Ch. 2) in Green Bay and WISN (Ch. 12) in Milwaukee.
- ▶ ESPN Deportes, with **Alvaro Martin**, **Raul Allegre** and **John Sutcliffe**, will broadcast in Spanish. ESPN International will air the contest in three languages to over 180 countries.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 56-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The duo enter their 10th season of broadcasts together across the Packers Radio Network, which covers 47 markets in six states.
- ▶ Westwood One will air the game across the country. **Marv Albert** (play-by-play) and **Boomer Esiason** (analyst) will call the action. **Jim Gray** hosts pregame and halftime shows.
- ▶ For out-of-town listeners, the broadcast is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on [www.packers.com](http://www.packers.com) as well as on Sirius Satellite Radio (channel 127 WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive. DIRECTV subscribers can watch the game on channel 206 (HD ch. 73).

**PACKERS TEAM NOTES**

**GOT TICKETS?**

Lambeau Field. Season opener. Rivalry game. *Monday Night Football*. First game with Aaron Rodgers as the starting quarterback.

- ▶ Any single one of these factors would make this game a tough ticket to find. But put them all together, and undoubtedly few tickets will be floating around Lombardi Avenue in the hours before kickoff.
- ▶ Monday night will be the 270th consecutive sellout (254 regular season, 16 playoffs) at Lambeau Field, the league's longest-tenured stadium.

**A MATCHUP OF YOUNG QUARTERBACKS**

Packers quarterback **Aaron Rodgers** has been a mainstay in the headlines this offseason as he becomes the first quarterback not named Favre to start under center for Green Bay in nearly 16 years.

- ▶ Don Majkowski started for the Packers against the Bengals on Sept. 20, 1992, and 253 games later, Rodgers gets the nod.
- ▶ The last Packers quarterback not named Favre to start at Lambeau Field on *Monday Night Football*? It was Lynn Dickey, who led the club to a 12-9 overtime victory over Tampa Bay on Dec. 12, 1983.
- ▶ While Rodgers is slated to start his first game under center, it's not as if he's new to the NFL. Rodgers is entering his fourth year in the NFL – his third in Mike McCarthy's West Coast offense – and is already among the most tenured players in the locker room. Of the 53-man roster, only nine have been in Green Bay longer than Rodgers.
- ▶ In his first preseason as the starter, Rodgers proved to be both accurate (68.5% completion rate) and efficient (103.6 rating).
- ▶ On Monday night, the fourth-year pro will be competing against a quarterback equally as young. Third-year Vikings QB Tarvaris Jackson is slated to make his 15th career start on Monday night.
- ▶ Among Week 1 projected starters in the NFC, only Falcons rookie quarterback Matt Ryan is younger than Rodgers and Jackson. A look at the youngest starting quarterbacks in the conference:

**OPENING-DAY ROSTER SET**

After several transactions Monday afternoon, the Packers finalized their 53-man roster.

- ▶ A breakdown of the opening-day roster shows 25 defensive players, 25 offensive players and three specialists.
- ▶ Change seems to be a constant in today's NFL, but the 2008 Packers return 41 players from a year ago. Also on the 53-man roster are eight of the nine selections from the '08 draft and four free agents.
- ▶ Nine linemen were kept on both sides of the ball, including many who can play multiple positions. All five starters – **Chad Clifton**, **Daryn Colledge**, **Scott Wells**, **Jason Spitz** and **Mark Tauscher** – are back for a third consecutive season on the offensive line.
- ▶ On defense, the team kept just three defensive tackles but some of the ends, most notably **Cullen Jenkins**, have the ability to play inside.
- ▶ A bevy of talent at linebacker led the team to keep six. **Nick Barnett**, **A.J. Hawk** and **Brady Poppinga** will return as the starting trio, with

free agent signee **Brandon Chillar** contributing on some of the sub packages.

- ▶ Luckily for Rodgers, nearly all of the production at the skill positions returns, including running backs **Ryan Grant** and **Brandon Jackson**, tight end **Donald Lee** and a talented group of receivers that allow Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the offensive play-caller, to employ his 'Big 5' formation with all five wideouts on the field.
- ▶ **Al Harris** and **Charles Woodson**, arguably the top corner duo in the league, lead a talented and young secondary that accounted for 14 of the Packers' 19 interceptions a year ago.

**RESTORING THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE**

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ McCarthy stated consistently that one of the team's goals was to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished.
- ▶ The team finished 7-1 at home last season, a marked improvement over the prior three seasons (10-14 combined).
- ▶ Green Bay begins the 2008 home slate having won nine of its last 10 home games. Two of those nine wins came against the Vikings.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, no NFL team has enjoyed more consistent success at home. A look at the top home W-L records since the '92 season:

**NOTE OF THE WEEK**

The Green Bay Packers enter the 2008 season with three quarterbacks on the roster: Aaron Rodgers, Matt Flynn and Brian Brohm. Rookies Flynn (LSU) and Brohm (Louisville) will serve as the backups.

- ▶ None of the three players has started an NFL game, but that's not necessarily rare in this day and age in the NFL.
- ▶ In fact, it will be the third time this decade that a team went into its opening game of a season without a quarterback on the roster who had ever started an NFL game. The two previous instances show decidedly different results.
- ▶ In **2006**, the San Diego Chargers began the season with two quarterbacks on the roster, neither of whom had started an NFL game: starter Philip Rivers and rookie backup Charlie Whitehurst. Rivers, a third-year pro in his first season as the starter, went to the Pro Bowl that season as the Chargers finished an NFL-best 14-2.
- ▶ In **2001**, the Carolina Panthers had three quarterbacks on the opening-day roster who had never started a game before: Chris Weinke, Dameyune Craig and Matt Lytle. The team finished 1-15.

**NOTABLE CONNECTIONS**

Vikings K Ryan Longwell is Green Bay's all-time leading scorer, having racked up 1,054 points in nine seasons with the Packers (1997-2005)...Fifth in Packers history with 36 interceptions, Vikings S Darren Sharper spent his first eight NFL seasons (1997-2004) in Green Bay...The Vikings coaching staff has several ties to the University of Wisconsin, where Childress (1991-98) and offensive line coach Jim Hueber (1992-2005) worked together, and where offensive coordinator Darrell Bevell played quarterback (1992-95) and assistant special teams coach Brian Murphy (2000-05) held various recruiting and administrative roles...Bevell also was a Packers offensive assistant coach from 2000-05, including QB coach (2003-05)...Green Bay director of research and development Mike Eayrs (similar capacity, 1985-99) previously worked for the Vikings...Vikings WR Robert Ferguson spent the first six seasons (2001-06) of his NFL career in Green Bay...Packers DT Colin Cole originally signed with Minnesota as a rookie free agent in 2003 and spent separate one-week stints on the Vikings' 53-man roster that season...Packers staff writer Tom Fanning joined the front office in May after nine seasons (1999-2007) with the Vikings.

**MIKE McCARTHY...**Is in third year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- Honored as the 2007 Motorola NFL Coach of the Year and NFL Alumni Coach of the Year.
- Became the first Packers coach since Vince Lombardi to lead the team to a championship game in his second season.
- Tied franchise record for most victories by a coach in his first two seasons (21).

**BRAD CHILDRESS...**Is in third year as the Vikings' seventh head coach.

- In his 31st season of coaching and his 11th in the NFL. Broke in as Colts' quarterbacks coach (1985) and spent seven years (1999-2005) in Philadelphia, where he was offensive coordinator.
- Also coached at four colleges, including the University of Wisconsin (1991-98). The staff at Northern Arizona (1986-89) included future NFL head coaches Bill Callahan, Marty Mornhinweg and Andy Reid.
- In 2007, the Vikings became the first team in franchise history to rank No. 1 in the league in both rushing offense and rushing defense.
- The Vikings' seven Pro Bowlers last year were the team's most since 2000.

**THE PACKERS-VIKINGS SERIES**

These two longtime divisional rivals – seperated by some 280 miles down Highway 29 – square off for the 95th time in the history of the rivalry.

- Few, if any, rivalries in sports have exhibited more parity. The Packers own a slight advantage over the Vikings (48-45-1, including playoffs) in the all-time series.
- The teams have met five times previously on *Monday Night Football*, with the Vikings holding a 3-2 edge, winning the most recent *MNF* contest on Nov. 21, 2005 (20-17). The *MNF* series includes Antonio Freeman's famous deflected overtime TD catch in 2000 at Lambeau Field.
- Last season's 34-0 shutout by the Packers was the first blanking by either team in their 94 meetings.
- The Packers look for their first five-game winning streak in the series since the 1983-85 seasons.
- The series began when the Vikings entered the league in 1961, and Vince Lombardi's Packers won the first six meetings and nine of the first 10.

**INDIVIDUALLY VS. VIKINGS**

Greg Jennings' 16-yard TD reception at Minnesota last season (Sept. 30, 2007) was Brett Favre's 421st career TD pass, breaking Dan Marino's NFL record...Donald Driver established a career high for receiving yards with 191 against the Vikings at Minnesota (Nov. 12, 2006), topping the 162 he had on Dec. 24, 2004, also at the Metrodome...Driver also had a career-high 11 receptions (tie) in that 2004 contest, as well as a career-long 45-yard run on Nov. 2, 2003. His six TD catches against the Vikings are his most against any opponent, as are his 65 receptions and 1,021 receiving yards against Minnesota...James Jones had seven receptions for 111 yards and one of his two TDs last season in the two meetings with the Vikings...Ruvell Martin has 12 of his 37 career catches and 225 of his 600 yards against Minnesota, including the first two-TD game of his career in the second meeting last season...After a crucial fourth-quarter fumble in the first meeting with Minnesota last year, Ryan Grant came back to rush 25 times for 119 yards in the rematch...Aaron Kampman originally established his career high of three sacks against the Vikings (Nov. 21, 2005), and tied the mark against Minnesota (Dec. 21, 2006), giving him two of his four career three-sack games in this rivalry...Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila has three career multi-sack games against the Vikings.

**LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON**

Nov. 11, 2007, at Lambeau Field; Packers won, 34-0.

- The Packers posted the first shutout in the 94-game history of the rivalry.
- Ryan Grant's 30-yard TD run in the first quarter highlighted his 119-yard day.
- Brett Favre was 33-of-46 for 351 yards and three touchdowns, two to Ruvell Martin.
- After cracking 100 yards in the teams' first meeting, Minnesota running back Adrian Peterson was held to just 45 yards on 11 carries before leaving with a knee injury.
- Green Bay's defense held the Vikings to just 247 total yards, and the Packers won the time of possession by more than 20 minutes (40:40 to 19:20).

**PACKERS TEAM NOTES**

**GREEN BAY ON MONDAY NIGHT FOOTBALL**

In Week 1 the Packers make their first of three appearances this season on ESPN's *Monday Night Football*.

- ▶ It marks the 16th consecutive season with an appearance on Monday night for Green Bay, the NFC's longest *MONF* appearance streak. In the NFL, only Denver (1992-2008) now has a longer streak.
- ▶ Though Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** has twice coached on *MONF* with the Packers (1-1), it will mark the first Monday night game at Lambeau Field for McCarthy. The Packers' last Monday night home game came in 2005, also against the Vikings.
- ▶ Green Bay has played remarkably even in Monday night games. Its all-time *MONF* record stands at 25-25-1.
- ▶ It is the fourth season opener on Monday night for Green Bay, which is 3-0 in such games. The Packers beat the Jets, 23-7, to open the 1973 season, and defeated the Bears, 38-24, in the first game of the '97 season. Green Bay last opened the season on *MONF* in 2004, defeating the Panthers 24-14.
- ▶ Against the Minnesota Vikings on Monday night, the Packers are 2-3. Most memorable in the Monday night series for Packers fans is the 2000 edition, which the Packers won 26-20 in overtime at Lambeau Field. **Antonio Freeman** made a miraculous catch while flat on his back at the Vikings' 15, then ran past stunned Minnesota defenders for the game-winning, 43-yard score.
- ▶ The Packers had not played an overtime *MONF* game since Freeman's catch until last October in Denver. With the ball deep in their own end, the Packers came out on the first play from scrimmage and went for the home run ball. **Greg Jennings** beat Dré Bly down the left sideline and strolled into the end zone for an 82-yard, game-winning score. Packers 19, Broncos 13.



- ▶ Strength of schedule is a subjective statistic because as coaches often say, it's not *who* you play, but *when* you play them.
- ▶ The overall schedule this season shows opposing teams with a combined mark of 136-120 (.531) from last season. That's up from last year, when opponents had a 126-130 (.492) record the previous season.
- ▶ In that same vein, the eight opponents coming to Lambeau Field (67-61, .523) have a stronger record than last year's home opponents (61-67, .477). So too are Green Bay's road contests, where the opponents appear stronger this year (69-59, .539) than last (65-63, .508).

**TOPS IN THE FREE AGENCY ERA**

The Packers own more NFL championships (12) than any other franchise, but it's not all about past glory for the Green and Gold.

- ▶ Talk of unrestricted free agency in the early '90s led many to believe small-town Green Bay would be the first franchise to fold.
- ▶ Since the advent of free agency in 1993, the Packers own the best W-L record in the NFL. They have captured seven division titles in that time.
- ▶ The Packers have won 10 or more game in nine seasons since 1993.
- ▶ A look at the most successful teams in the free-agency era shows eight of the last 12 Super Bowl champions, beginning with Green Bay's '96 title:

**DEFENDING THEIR CROWN**

The Packers and McCarthy must be up to a new task this season. For the first time in his three seasons as coach, McCarthy must get a team ready to defend its division crown.

- ▶ That defense begins immediately, not only with Minnesota in Week 1 but also a road game at Detroit in Week 2.
- ▶ Green Bay won't play another NFC North opponent until Week 10 when it travels to the HHH Metrodome to play the Vikings.
- ▶ They'll continue division play in Week 11, hosting the Bears, before stepping outside the NFC North for another month.
- ▶ In games that ultimately could decide playoff seeding and the division crown, Green Bay wraps up the regular season with a trip to Chicago and a home contest against the Lions.
- ▶ McCarthy's solid 9-3 record in the NFL's 'black and blue' division is noteworthy because he's undefeated against two of the division opponents: Detroit and Minnesota. The Packers are just 1-3 against Chicago over the past two seasons.

**2008 STRENGTH OF SCHEDULE**

Though it faces six playoff teams from a year ago – the same number of playoff teams on the '07 schedule – Green Bay's 2008 schedule appears tougher on the surface than last year's slate.

- ▶ This season's schedule rotation matches up arguably the strongest division in the AFC, the South, against the NFC North. The AFC South sent three teams to the postseason in '07 (Colts, Jaguars and Titans), and its teams finished a combined 42-22 (.656) last season. By virtue of its first-place finish last season, Green Bay also plays division winners Dallas and Seattle.
- ▶ By the strength of schedule statistic, Green Bay's upcoming schedule ranks tied for the 11th toughest (with Chicago) among NFL teams.

**PACKERS NOTES - OFFENSE**

**READY TO PICK UP WHERE HE LEFT OFF**

To say **Ryan Grant** rescued the Packers' run game last season might be an understatement.

- ▶ Through the first six games of 2007, Green Bay's rushing attack was ranked last in the league. Thrust into duty because of injuries, Grant responded with the team's first 100-yard rushing game in Week 8.
- ▶ The Notre Dame product rushed for 929 yards over the final 10 weeks of the season, second only to All-Pro LaDainian Tomlinson (947).
- ▶ In Week 10 vs. Minnesota, he rushed for 119 yards and a touchdown on 25 attempts (4.8 avg). He was the only back all season to post a 100-yard game against the Vikings, the league's top rush defense in '07.
- ▶ Grant enters play against the Vikings Monday night with a rushing touchdown in six consecutive games, tied for the second-longest streak in Packers history.
- ▶ With a rushing touchdown in a seventh consecutive game, he would tie Paul Hornung's franchise record established in 1960.
- ▶ Monday night will be the first real on-field action for Grant since the NFC Championship Game. He was slated to play in the final preseason game with the first-team offense, but **Aaron Rodgers'** 68-yard TD to **Greg Jennings** on a play-action fake ended the unit's night after one play.



**EXPERIENCED DUO ON THE EDGE**

Green Bay surrendered just 19 sacks last season, tied for third fewest in the NFL. While injuries shuffled the interior line during the preseason – much like it had in 2007 – **Chad Clifton** and **Mark Tauscher** remain fixtures at tackle.

- ▶ Although not necessarily the sole forecaster of strength at the position, experience on the offensive line is often closely related to the ultimate success or failure of the collective unit.
- ▶ Clifton and Tauscher boast a combined 16 years and 218 career starts between them. All of that experience has come in a Packers uniform.
- ▶ A look at the longest-tenured tackle duos in the NFL :

1. Jon Runyan (176) and Tra Thomas (149)- Phi. - 325 combined starts
2. **Chad Clifton (111) and Mark Tauscher (107)- GB - 218**
3. Walter Jones (168) and Sean Locklear (42)- Sea. - 210
4. Flozell Adams (146) and Marc Colombo (39)- Dal. - 185
5. Alex Barron (43) and Orlando Pace (140)- StL - 183

- ▶ Rookies in 2000, Tauscher earned his first start at right tackle in Week 3, while Clifton earned his first career start on the left side in Week 7.
- ▶ Elite pass blockers who rarely get the credit they deserve, the duo has just one Pro Bowl appearance between them (Clifton, 2007).
- ▶ The stats show just how sturdy they have been. A look at the clubs who have given up the fewest regular-season sacks since Clifton and Tauscher became fixtures in the starting lineup in 2000:

**BIG-PLAY POTENTIAL**

Big plays served as the catalyst to Green Bay's high-octane offense last season, and all of those parts at the skill positions return this year.

- ▶ The Packers finished the season with 67 plays of 20 yards-or-more, second only to Dallas (68). Fifteen of those big plays came on the ground, and 52 came through the air.
- ▶ Five touchdown runs were of 20 yards-or-more, while 11 touchdowns through the air were of 20 yards-or-more. Of those 11 TDs, eight were of 40 yards-or-more.
- ▶ The NFL's fourth-highest scoring offense put up 435 points in 2007, third on the Packers' all-time single-season list.

**NO ONE'S BETTER AFTER THE CATCH THAN THE 'FAB FIVE'**

Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** utilized a number of four- and five-wide sets last season to take advantage of his receivers' abilities after the catch.

- ▶ Called the 'Big Five' or 'Fab Five' formation by McCarthy, it proved a nightmare for opposing defenses with its matchup problems.
- ▶ It was the matchups – such as a wideout isolated on a linebacker – that Green Bay utilized to its advantage.
- ▶ Led by wide receivers **Donald Driver**, **Greg Jennings**, **James Jones**, **Ruvell Martin** and tight end **Donald Lee**, Green Bay led the league in yards after the catch.
- ▶ The Packers amassed a league-best 2,294 yards after the catch, 51.4% of their total passing yards. The NFL average in 2007 was 1,596 yards.
- ▶ The only other teams to surpass 2,000 yards after the catch were New Orleans (2,112) and New England (2,052).

- ▶ The big-play ability of the group didn't come as a total surprise. Green Bay finished second in yards after the catch, behind New Orleans, in 2006.
- ▶ Added in the draft was All-America wideout **Jordy Nelson** from Kansas State. Originally a walk-on safety, he went on to produce the most prolific single season in school history in 2007. His 122 receptions and 1,606 receiving yards both ranked second nationally. He caught 11 touchdowns, returned two punts for scores and threw for two more TDs.
- ▶ Packers scouts and coaches have praised his run-after-the-catch ability, so McCarthy will find a way to get him involved in the offense one way or another. His most immediate contribution could come on special teams, where he returned two kicks for 50-plus yard gains in the preseason.

**A NEW LOOK**

Kicker **Mason Crosby** led the NFL in points as a rookie in 2007, the first rookie to do so since 1985.

- ▶ His 141 points ranked third behind Paul Hornung (176, 1960; 146, 1961) on the team's single-season scoring list.
- ▶ Plenty of watchful eyes will be on Crosby this week in practice. The Colorado product had a solid preseason, but he has just one week of practice to get used to a new snapper and new holder.
- ▶ Signed Monday, **Brett Goode** will serve as the long snapper. The first-year player from Arkansas has never played in a regular-season game.
- ▶ Also signed Monday, **Derrick Frost**, Green Bay's new punter, will serve as the holder. The trio has five practices this week before they are all game-tested Monday night.



**PACKERS NOTES - DEFENSE**

**SACK MASTER**

Members of the Vikings offensive line won't be excited to see Pro Bowl defensive end **Aaron Kampman** lining up across from them.

- ▶ Kampman established a career high with three sacks against Minnesota on Nov. 21, 2005. He matched that career high against Tarvaris Jackson and the Vikings in the Dec. 2006 matchup.
- ▶ It has been a long offseason for Kampman, who saw his hometown of Parkersburg, Iowa, ravaged by a tornado in late May. Hundreds of homes, including those of his relatives, were destroyed in the disaster.
- ▶ Kampman's alma mater, Aplington-Parkersburg High School, also was ravaged by the storm.
- ▶ In a town of just 1,800, the school has produced four current NFL players. Including Kampman, Jaguars C Brad Meester, Lions DE Jared DeVries and Broncos C Casey Wiegmann are also graduates of the high school.
- ▶ Kampman helped out around his hometown almost immediately and returned in early June with teammates and Packers staff members to help in the cleanup and rebuilding process.
- ▶ He was happy to report Monday in the locker room that the school will host its first home football game of the season Friday night.
- ▶ Kampman is no doubt happy to return to the field as well, where he is one of the game's most feared defensive players.
- ▶ Vikings defensive end Jared Allen has attracted headlines as the newcomer to the Packers-Vikings rivalry, but over the past two seasons, only San Diego's Shawne Merriman has more sacks than Kampman.

**HEALTH WILL BE KEY**

Green Bay's defense was without a number of starters in the preseason, and their availability won't be known until later in the week.

- ▶ "(In) Long weeks, there are certain players that I will not work until the end of the week," McCarthy said Monday. "We'll practice tomorrow, it will be a Wednesday type of environment, and then Wednesday will be our Tuesday, in a sense. I wanted to make sure I split the workload up, and did all the heavy lifting early in the week, but give the guys that are nicked time to get ready, and we'll get their work at the end of the week."
- ▶ Run-stuffing defensive tackle **Ryan Pickett** missed all of training camp and the preseason with a hamstring injury. With the defending No. 1 rushing team in the league coming to Lambeau Field on Monday night for the season opener, his return is even more important.
- ▶ The Vikings, who set a franchise single-season record and led the NFL with 2,634 yards on the ground last season, feature Pro Bowler and 2007 offensive rookie of the year, running back Adrian Peterson.
- ▶ Pickett said he cleared a number of run tests before taking the practice field Monday for the first time.
- ▶ Also a welcome sight back on the practice field was pass-rushing specialist **Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila**. KGB practiced in the final week of the

preseason but did not see any game action.

- ▶ Among the players who will not receive work until later in the week are S **Atari Bigby**, LB **A.J. Hawk**, S **Charlie Peprah** and DE **Jeremy Thompson**.
- ▶ Bigby, slated to start at the strong safety position, missed the final pre-season game with an ankle injury. Hawk missed the final three exhibition games after suffering a chest injury in the first preseason game against Cincinnati.

**EVERYONE'S BACK**

All 11 starters return on defense. What's more, there's only one newcomer – linebacker **Brandon Chillar** who arrived via free agency – on the two-deep.

- ▶ Green Bay's defense finished just yards away from being a top-10 unit last season, finishing at No. 11.
- ▶ Perhaps more telling is where it finished in scoring defense – No. 6. It surrendered just 291 points.
- ▶ It was also a top-10 unit in two very important categories: third-down defense (No. 3) and red-zone defense (No. 8).
- ▶ Led by veteran cornerbacks **Charles Woodson** and **Al Harris**, the Packers were one of the league's top defenses against the pass. Quarterbacks had a hard time against the Packers defense, completing just 55.2% of their passes. Only Pittsburgh (54.5%) held opponents to a lower completion percentage.

**DEFENSE FEASTS ON VIKINGS QUARTERBACKS**

Over the past four games against Minnesota, defensive coordinator **Bob Sanders** and his unit have contained the Vikings' quarterbacks.

- ▶ Each of the past four games, the defense had to prepare for a different QB. In 2006, the Packers faced Brad Johnson (Week 10) and Tarvaris Jackson (Week 16).
- ▶ Jackson, slated to be the Minnesota starter on Monday night, recorded the second-lowest passer rating of his career (35.4) against the Packers in 2006. In his first career start, the Vikings gained just three first downs and put up 104 net yards.
- ▶ Last season, the defense faced Kelly Holcomb (Week 4) and Brooks Bollinger (Week 10).
- ▶ In the Week 10 matchup, the last time the two squads faced off, the Packers blanked the Vikings 34-0. It was the defense's first shutout since a 10-0 win over Buffalo on Dec. 22, 2002.
- ▶ In the 94th meeting of the all-time series, the Packers shut out the Vikings for the first time. The defense did not allow the Vikings to convert on third down (0-for-8) or fourth down (0-for-3).
- ▶ Shutting out the Vikings is no easy task. The Vikings owned the league's longest active scoring streak at 260 games. Minnesota's 260-game streak without a shutout is the third-longest in NFL history.
- ▶ A look at how Vikings quarterbacks, in chronological order, have fared against the Packers in the last four games:

## PACKERS TEAM NOTES

### IMPORTANCE OF A QUICK START

It's no secret that early success dramatically increases a team's chance to make the postseason.

- ▶ Green Bay got off to a quick start last season – a 4-0 start in the opening month – on its way to a 13-3 record and first-round playoff bye.
- ▶ The Packers traditionally have done well in the first month of the season. Over the past 10 years (1998-2007), Green Bay's opening-month record stands at 22-13 (.629), the fifth best in the NFL over that period.
- ▶ During that period, only Indianapolis (24-9, .727), Seattle (23-11, .676), Denver (23-12, .657) and Jacksonville (21-12, .647) have a better record in the opening month of the season.

### FAVRE, PACKERS PART AFTER 16 SEASONS

Once thought to be impossible, the Green Bay Packers and first-ballot Hall of Famer Brett Favre parted ways after 16 memorable seasons.

- ▶ The Packers traded Favre to the New York Jets for a conditional 2009 draft selection on Aug. 6, five months to the day after his initial retirement press conference.
- ▶ President/CEO **Mark Murphy** and General Manager **Ted Thompson** issued a joint statement in announcing the trade: "We respect Brett's decision that he could no longer remain here as a Packer. But there were certain things we were not willing to do because they were not in the best interest of the team. We were not going to release him nor trade him to a team within the division. When Brett ultimately decided that he still wanted to play football, but not in Green Bay, we told him that we would work to find the best solution for all parties involved."
- ▶ Needless to say, Favre's jersey number will not be retired on Monday night, as was previously scheduled. Murphy made it clear that the organization will work to set a new date with Favre once he decides to retire from the NFL.
- ▶ Michael Jordan laced them up for the Washington Wizards, and Willie Mays finished his career in the outfield for the New York Mets. Star players ending their careers with different clubs isn't so foreign to the NFL:

### 2008 SCHEDULE QUICK HITS

The Green Bay Packers' 2008 campaign is highlighted by six games in front of a national audience, including four prime-time contests.

- ▶ In addition to the *MNF* home-opener, the Packers host Dallas Sept. 21 (NBC) and will travel for the final two prime-time contests – at New

Orleans Nov. 24 (ESPN) and at Chicago Dec. 22 (ESPN).

- ▶ The Week 3 Sunday night matchup with Dallas marks the Packers' third consecutive season for a prime-time slot on NBC and is the second-straight season the team will meet the Cowboys in prime time.
- ▶ For the first time in club history, the first two games contested at Lambeau Field will be in prime time.
- ▶ An Oct. 12 tilt at Seattle pits the Packers against former coach Mike Holmgren and marks a rematch of the NFC Divisional Playoff matchup in January when the Packers topped the Seahawks, 42-20, in Green Bay.
- ▶ The Packers will see the Tennessee Titans twice during the '08 campaign – the clubs played in the preseason on Aug. 28 and will see each other again in Week 9 when Green Bay travels to Nashville, the first regular-season trip to Tennessee for the Packers since the '01 season.
- ▶ Green Bay will travel to New Orleans for the third of four prime-time games in Week 12. The Packers last traveled to the Superdome in 2002. The Nov. 24 *MNF* game will be head coach Mike McCarthy's first return to the Superdome since serving as the Saints' offensive coordinator from 2000-04.
- ▶ The Houston Texans will make that franchise's first trip to Lambeau Field for a Dec. 7 matchup.
- ▶ For the fifth consecutive season, the Packers will celebrate Christmas with NFC North foes – a trip to Chicago (Dec. 22) and a home tilt against Detroit (Dec. 28) mark the final regular-season matchups.
- ▶ *Monday Night Football* and the Packers roll into Chicago for Green Bay's third Monday night game against the Bears in Week 16. No two NFL teams have met on the gridiron more than the Packers and Bears. The 2008 edition of the series marks the 176th and 177th overall meetings.
- ▶ The last time the Packers had four prime-time games on the schedule was in 2005.
- ▶ The Packers have 10 games with noon start times. Five of the noon start times beginning with Week 11 are subject to change due to NFL flexible scheduling. The '07 season saw 13 games with noon kickoffs.

### SUCCESS WITH YOUNG QUARTERBACKS

Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** is known around the league as one of the preeminent teachers of quarterbacks.

- ▶ McCarthy now has two new pupils in **Matt Flynn** and **Brian Brohm**, rookie draft picks who will serve as the No. 2 and No. 3 backup quarterback, respectively, to starter **Aaron Rodgers**.
- ▶ Flynn, a three-year backup at LSU, led the Tigers to the BCS National Championship in 2007. Brohm finished his career at Louisville as the Big East's all-time leader in passing yards (10,775) and completions (780).
- ▶ While his work with starting QBs with names like Favre and Montana is well documented, McCarthy's work with some of the backup quarterbacks in his various coaching stops around the NFL is just as impressive.
- ▶ During his stint in Kansas City (1993-98), McCarthy worked with backup quarterback Rich Gannon. Gannon said of his experience with McCarthy: "He's the guy that really helped catapult my career. He was the guy who really taught me the West Coast system of football. He really taught me how to prepare for a game, taught me how to watch film, how to break down an opponent, how to study. It was really those things I took with me to Oakland."
- ▶ In Oakland, Gannon was a four-time Pro Bowler, two-time first-team All-Pro and 2002 NFL MVP.
- ▶ As quarterbacks coach for the Packers in 1999, McCarthy worked with Matt Hasselbeck in his first season on the Packers' active roster. Hasselbeck is a three-time Pro Bowler.
- ▶ During his time as offensive coordinator in New Orleans (2000-05), McCarthy tutored young quarterbacks Marc Bulger and Jake Delhomme. Bulger has been to two Pro Bowls with the St. Louis Rams, while Delhomme was a Pro Bowler in 2005 with Carolina.



INDIVIDUAL NOTES & STREAKS

**56 NICK BARNETT**

- ▶ Has tallied over 130 tackles in each of his first five NFL seasons.
- ▶ Led the Packers in tackles for the fourth time in his five seasons. Tied Brian Noble (4) and Bernardo Harris (4) for the franchise lead for most seasons leading the team in tackles (stat began in 1975).
- ▶ His 3½ sacks last season were a career high.

**20 ATARI BIGBY**

- ▶ His 121 tackles last season were the most by any Packers defensive back since safety Mark Murphy recorded 128 tackles in 1990.
- ▶ Also led the team in interceptions (five) and passes defended (13) and tied for the lead with three forced fumbles.

**76 CHAD CLIFTON**

- ▶ A first-time Pro Bowler last year, has played in 116 career games, including 111 starts.
- ▶ Has started 79 of 80 games (missed 2006 game vs. Miami, flu) at left tackle since returning from a serious pelvic injury that ended his 2002 season.

**2 MASON CROSBY**

- ▶ With 141 points, became the seventh rookie in NFL history to lead the league in scoring and first since Kevin Butler in 1985.
- ▶ Surpassed Ryan Longwell's franchise record of points in a season by a kicker (131, 2000) and placed third behind Paul Hornung (176, 1960; 146, 1961) on the team's single-season scoring list.
- ▶ Established a franchise record for points in a season by a rookie and joined Chester Marcol (1972), Chris Jacke (1989) and Longwell (1997) as the only kickers in Packers history to score more than 100 points as a rookie.

**80 DONALD DRIVER**

- ▶ Became the third player in team annals to reach 500 career receptions, joining Sterling Sharpe (595) and James Lofton (530). Driver enters 2008 with 503.
- ▶ Established a Packers record with four consecutive seasons with 1,000 receiving yards. Antonio Freeman, Lofton and Sharpe each had three.
- ▶ Tied a franchise record with 1,000 receiving yards in a fifth overall season. Lofton and Sharpe also have five 1,000-yard campaigns.
- ▶ Has a reception in 95 consecutive games, the franchise's second-longest streak behind Sharpe's 103 (1988-94).
- ▶ Is one of four players in team annals to produce as many as six seasons with 50 receptions, joining Lofton and Sharpe (both seven) and Freeman (six).
- ▶ Also became only the second Packers player with four 80-catch seasons, joining Sharpe (four).



- ▶ Became only the seventh player in Packers history to reach 6,000 career yards, joining Lofton (9,656), Sharpe (8,134), Don Hutson (7,991), Boyd Dowler (6,918), Freeman (6,651) and Max McGee (6,346). Driver (6,977) stands at No. 4 in team history.
- ▶ Became Lambeau Field's all-time leader in receptions, surpassing Freeman (213) last season. Driver enters with 240 receptions at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Stands 54 Lambeau Field receiving yards from surpassing No. 2 Lofton (3,330) and 201 from becoming the stadium's all-time leader ahead of Freeman (3,477). Driver (3,277) is No. 3.
- ▶ His 14 touchdown receptions at Lambeau Field rank fourth in the stadium's history. He needs four to surpass No. 3 Robert Brooks (17).
- ▶ Needs one 100-yard receiving game to match No. 5 Boyd Dowler (19), two to reach No. 4 Freeman (20) and six to equal No. 3 Hutson (24) on the team's all-time list. Driver has 18 career 100-yard receiving games.

- ▶ Needs two TD receptions to become only the eighth player in franchise annals to reach 40 career, joining Hutson (99), Sharpe (65), Freeman (57), McGee (50), Lofton (49), Billy Howton (43) and Dowler (40). Driver has 38.

**94 KABEER GBAJA-BIAMILA**

- ▶ Stands as the franchise leader on Green Bay's all-time sacks list, having surpassed Reggie White's career record (68½) last season. Gbaja-Biamila enters with 74.

**25 RYAN GRANT**

- ▶ Carries a streak of six consecutive games with a rushing TD into 2008, which ties the second-longest streak in Packers history. Terdell Middleton had a rushing touchdown in six straight games in 1978, and Paul Hornung scored in seven consecutive games in 1960.
- ▶ Needs 44 rushing yards to reach 1,000 career.

**31 AL HARRIS**

- ▶ Has played in 172 straight games (160 regular season, 12 playoffs), a streak that began in Philadelphia in 1998. Since coming to Green Bay in 2003, has started all 80 regular-season games.
- ▶ Has 101 career starts.
- ▶ Needs to return one interception for a touchdown to tie No. 5 Charley Brock, Doug Hart and Ken Ellis (all with three) on Green Bay's all-time career list. With a second TD on an interception, would match No. 4 Johnny (Blood) McNally, who returned four. Harris has two.



Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.



**INDIVIDUAL NOTES & STREAKS**

**50 A.J. HAWK**

- Needs 16 tackles for 300 career.
- Has started every game (32) since arriving in Green Bay as the No. 5 overall pick in the 2006 NFL Draft.

**85 GREG JENNINGS**

- Has caught a pass in 27 consecutive games.
- His streak of five consecutive games with a touchdown catch last season (Weeks 11-15) was the longest streak since Antonio Freeman's five-game streak in 1998-99.
- Surpassed 1,000 career receiving yards on the 82-yard, game-winning touchdown catch in overtime vs. Denver last season. Jennings enters with 1,552.
- His 12 touchdown receptions were the most by a Packers player since Javon Walker had 12 TD catches in 2004.
- His average of 17.4 yards per catch ranked fourth in the NFL.

**89 JAMES JONES**

- Last season, his 47 catches ranked third on the team's list of receptions by a rookie. His yardage total (676) ranked fourth on the team's all-time rookies list.
