GREEN BAY (2-0) at ARIZONA (0-2)

Friday, Aug. 28 • University of Phoenix Stadium • 9 p.m. CDT

GREEN BAY HEADS WEST TO FACE ARIZONA

The Packers travel over 1,800 miles for their third exhibition contest against the Arizona Cardinals, a trip they will repeat in Week 17.

- ▶ In many ways, this may be the team's best test of the preseason. For starters, it is the first road game of 2009, giving the team a valuable look at how its younger players will perform in a hostile environment.
- ▶ In Arizona, Green Bay faces one of the league's most explosive aerial attacks, led by QB Kurt Warner and WR Larry Fitzgerald. The Cardinals are coming off an appearance in Super Bowl XLIII.
- ▶ As has been the case under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, primary starters will see their most extended action of the preseason as well. Traditionally, they have played into the second half.
- ▶ Both the No. 1 offense and defense will look to maintain the momentum of the first two exhibition games in what should be its most extended 'live' action until the regular-season opener Sept. 13 vs. Chicago.
- ▶ It will be the first trip to the University of Phoenix Stadium for the Green Bay franchise. It was an overtime away from playing at the state-of-the-art facility in Super Bowl XLII.
- ▶ Arizona lost at home, 17-6, to the San Diego Chargers this past Saturday after dropping its preseason opener in Pittsburgh a week earlier. It will wrap up the preseason Sept. 3 in Denver.
- ▶ Old-time rivals dating back to the days when the Cardinals franchise called Chicago home, Friday night marks the 21st preseason meeting between the two franchises. Green Bay holds a 14-6 advantage.

STARTING FAST

One of the main goals in Green Bay this offseason was an added emphasis on starting fast through increasing the tempo at the line of scrimmage and ultimately improving upon point production.

- ▶ The Packers produced a total of 13 points (one TD, two FGs) on their first offensive possessions a year ago, second fewest among all NFL teams (Detroit, 10). Despite ranking No. 5 in total scoring (419 points) in 2008, the Packers produced their lowest output (61 points) in the first quarter. That total ranked tied for 20th.
- ▶ So far this offseason, it looks as though that emphasis has paid off, as the No. 1 offense has produced touchdowns on five of its six drives.
- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** is a combined 13-of-19 for 200 yards with three TDs, producing a passer rating of 142.5.
- ▶ Not to be outdone, the defense continued its preseason shutout through six quarters thanks to four first-half takeaways against Buffalo. Through two games, the unit has recorded nine takeaways and seven sacks.
- ▶ While Green Bay has outscored its opponents 38-0 in the first half thus far, coaches and players alike know that there is plenty to correct through its first two showings.
- ▶ "There's a lot of positive information in our first two games, and we feel very good about that," McCarthy said following the Buffalo victory. "But the reality is there are things we need to correct too. So there's no reason to strike up the band or anything like that."

WITH THE CALL

The **Green Bay Packers Broadcast Partners** will air the game over a nine-station network throughout the states of Wisconsin, Upper Michigan and Northeastern Minnesota, with CBS network production, personnel and the latest network-quality technology.

- ▶ The top-notch broadcast team includes CBS's **Kevin Harlan** (play-by-play) alongside fellow CBS broadcaster **Rich Gannon** (analyst).
- ▶ WTMJ's **Jessie Garcia** serves as the sideline reporter and WFRV's **Larry McCarren** joins the crew for pre-game segments. In addition to WFRV-TV (Green Bay) and WTMJ-TV (Milwaukee), the games are televised over WKOW/ABC, Madison, Wis.; WAOW/ABC, Wausau/Rhineland, Wis.; WXOW/ABC, La Crosse, Wis.; WQOW/ABC, Eau Claire; WYOW/ABC, Eagle River, Wis.; WJMN/CBS, Marquette, Mich.; and KQDS-TV/FOX, Duluth, Minn.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 48-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The duo enters its 11th season of broadcasts together across the Packers Radio Network, which covers 43 markets in five states.

THIS WEEK IN PACKERS NEWS

POSITION BATTLES COME TO A HEAD

The two most publicized battles thus far in camp – starting jobs along the offensive line – could be decided upon this week as the team looks to give its primary starters the most action of the preseason Friday in Arizona.

- ▶ The first spot, at center, will be won by to either **Jason Spitz** or **Scott Wells**. Each has spent time with the first team offense this summer, and both have extensive NFL experience.
- ▶ Should Spitz win the job at center, that would mean second-year player **Josh Sitton** would most likely get the nod at right guard. If Wells were to get the nod, Spitz would in all likelihood be at right guard.
- ▶ Where the offensive line will be counting on an entirely new starter is at the right tackle position, a battle that seems to be nearing a decision between **Allen Barbre** and **Breno Giacomini**.
- ▶ The duo began splitting reps with the No. 1 offense recently, though Barbre spent the entire offseason there as Giacomini returned from an ankle injury.
- ▶ Barbre is perhaps the most athletic offensive lineman on the team, while Giacomini (6-7, 311) is an imposing physical presence. Barbre has played in 15 games in his first two seasons, as well as the benefit of an entire offseason, compared to Giacomini's one game as a rookie last season.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** has stated his desire to settle on a starting five, a move that could come this week in the hopes of building some continuity up front.
- ▶ "I'm hopeful the film will give me that option or a strong opinion one way or the other," McCarthy said after the Bills game. "That's something definitely we'll take a close look at (Sunday) as a staff and I am hopeful that would happen, but I'm not making any guarantees. We'll get as much information as we can and hopefully we can make a good decision."



CAMP BREAKS

The Packers had their final "two-a-day" last Thursday and moved out of the dorms at St. Norbert College on Friday, marking an unofficial end to training camp.

- ▶ The team now moves into a schedule that more closely resembles the regular season. It will hit the practice field three times this week – Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday – before traveling to Arizona Thursday.
- ▶ Green Bay will only have short weeks (five days) in between games for its final two contests on the preseason schedule.

INJURY REPORT

S **Nick Collins** (ribs), QB **Matt Flynn** (shoulder) and TE **Devin Frischknecht** (shin) all suffered injuries against Buffalo.

- ▶ X-rays on Collins were negative, while McCarthy also indicated that Flynn's shoulder injury did not appear to be serious. Frischknecht did appear to suffer a serious injury and was taken to a local hospital.
- ▶ Sitting out Saturday night were LB **Nick Barnett** (knee), P **Durant Brooks** (hip), DE **Justin Harrell** (back), CB **Pat Lee** (back), LB **Clay Matthews** (hamstring), S **Charlie Peprah** (knee), S **Aaron Rouse** (hamstring) and LB **Jeremy Thompson** (stinger).
- ▶ McCarthy said after the game that Rouse appeared to be day-to-day, so his availability on the practice field this week will determine if he sees any action against Arizona.

FAMILIAR FACES RETURN TO LINEUP

New defensive coordinator Dom Capers got three players back to practice at Ray Nitschke Field last week.

- ▶ LB **Nick Barnett** made his return to the practice field after battling back from an ACL injury that ended his season in Week 10 of 2008. One of the veteran leaders of the defense, Barnett has been a starter at middle linebacker for the past six years and was chosen as the defensive player to wear the new helmet speaker for defensive players last season. He had been on the physically-unable-to-perform list.
- ▶ Barnett participated in jog-throughs, individual work, and some 7-on-7 drills. In addition to keeping him on a "one-a-day" schedule, the coaching staff kept him out of team drills in order to keep him away from any unnecessary pileups.

▶ Two members of the draft class made their debuts against Buffalo: first-round pick **B.J. Raji** and seventh-round pick **Brad Jones**.

▶ Raji, who joined his teammates on the practice field last week after getting his contract signed, played a limited amount of reps Saturday night.

▶ "I thought he had some penetration, live legs," McCarthy said about the rookie's performance. "I think he's going to be an exciting young player for us."

▶ Jones, who like Barnett came off the PUP list, was thrown right into the mix at outside linebacker and made his presence felt.

- ▶ The Colorado product got a sack and forced fumble right before halftime, a turnover the Packers converted into three points. Jones should see plenty of action in practice and potentially on the field in Arizona, as the injury status of both **Clay Matthews** (hamstring) and **Jeremy Thompson** (stinger) remains up in the air. Jones, with a 6-foot-3, 239-pound frame, could also make his mark on special teams.

BREAKOUT CANDIDATES

Every preseason, a number of emerging young players or surprising rookies jump out immediately when game action begins.

▶ On the offensive side of the ball, it's been hard to ignore the emergence of second-year TE **Jermichael Finley**. His team-high five receptions thus far have showcased his ability to separate from linebackers and safeties and his abilities in the open field. An athletic specimen at 6-foot-5 and 247 pounds, Finley turned down an opportunity to play college basketball at Arizona in order to play tight end at Texas.

▶ "He's definitely a weapon for us," McCarthy said. "We felt that last year just the way we were able to utilize Jermichael the last couple games of the season, and now he's able to do the full gamut. He's another young player that looks like he's ready to take off."

▶ Also standing out thus far on offense has been rookie free agent RB **Tyrell Sutton**, who leads the team with 140 rushing yards on 27 carries (5.2 avg.). Despite standing 5-foot-8, Sutton has proved to be a tough runner between the tackles and has displayed some shifty moves. He also worked some on kickoff returns, which could be a spot for him to make his push to be on the 53-man roster.

▶ On defense, no one has had more highlight-reel plays than LB **Desmond Bishop**. The third-year player from California has collected two interceptions, a sack and a fumble recovery. An adept blitzer, he has also forced a number of quarterback hurries and loud hits. He is tied for the team lead with CB **Tramon Williams** with eight tackles.

MIKE McCARTHY...Is in fourth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Honored as the 2007 Motorola NFL Coach of the Year and NFL Alumni Coach of the Year.
- ▶ Became the first Packers coach since Vince Lombardi to lead the team to a championship game in his second season.
- ▶ One of only three head coaches to lead an offense ranked in the top 10 in the league each of the past three years.

KEN WHISENHUNT...Is in third year as the Cardinals' 34th head coach.

- ▶ In just his second season as an NFL head coach in 2008, led the franchise to its first Super Bowl berth.
- ▶ Played nine seasons as a tight end for three different clubs -- the Atlanta Falcons (1985-88), Washington Redskins (1989-90) and N.Y. Jets (1991-93).
- ▶ Before taking over the Cardinals in 2007, served as an NFL assistant coach for 10 seasons, the last six as tight ends coach (2001-03) and then offensive coordinator (2004-06) with the Pittsburgh Steelers, the team that beat Arizona in Super Bowl XLIII.
- ▶ Is just the second Cardinals head coach to go .500 or better in his first two seasons (Arnie Horween, 1923-24).

THE PACKERS-CARDINALS SERIES

One of the oldest rivalries in sports, the series launched on Nov. 20, 1921, when the Packers and Chicago Cardinals tied 3-3. That afternoon marked one of four ties in the series, with the last tie coming in 1971.

- ▶ The series has been noted for its streaks, with the Packers winning 15 straight between 1937 and 1946, followed by the Cardinals winning seven straight through 1949, and the Packers winning 14 of the last 18 (with one tie) since.
- ▶ With the Cardinals franchise located in Chicago prior to 1960, the two teams played two or more times in a season 20 different years between 1926 and 1949.
- ▶ One postseason meeting following the 1982 season marked the Packers' first trip to the playoffs in 10 years and first playoff victory

since winning Super Bowl II.
 ▶ In the teams' last meeting in Arizona in 2003, the kickoff temperature was 102 degrees, tied for the hottest game ever recorded in Packers history. The temperature reached 106 in the fourth quarter.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Whisenhunt, Cardinals assistant head coach Russ Grimm, and Packers safeties coach Darren Perry coached on the same staff with the Pittsburgh Steelers earlier this decade...Green Bay's director of football operations Reggie McKenzie played linebacker for the then-Phoenix Cardinals in 1989-90...Cardinals defensive coordinator Bill Davis served on Green Bay's coaching staff in 2000 as defensive assistant/defensive line...Cardinals QB Kurt Warner got his NFL start in Green Bay at training camp in 1994. He was released before the regular season...Packers defensive quality control coach Scott McCurley was a four-year letterwinner at Pittsburgh, where he was teammates with Cardinals LB Gerald Hayes and WR Larry Fitzgerald...Cardinals defensive quality control coach Ryan Slowik played safety at University of Wisconsin-Oshkosh and is the son of former Packers defensive coordinator Bob Slowik...Cardinals LB Ali Highsmith is the cousin of Packers scout Alonzo Highsmith...Cardinals C Donovan Raiola played collegiately at the University of Wisconsin... Packers QB Matt Flynn, FB Quinn Johnson and Cardinals WR Early Doucet, LB Highsmith and G Herman Johnson were teammates at LSU, as were Cardinals QB Matt Leinart and Packers LB Clay Matthews at USC, and Packers LB Brandon Chillar and Cardinals S Matt Ware at UCLA... Packers LB Danny Lannan and Cardinals OLB Cody Brown played on the defense together at Connecticut...Cardinals G Trevor Canfield and Packers CB Brandon Underwood were teammates last season at Cincinnati.

In four career games against Arizona, WR Donald Driver has 10 receptions for 87 yards...LB Nick Barnett has 1 1/2 sacks and one interception in his career against the Cardinals. He had 15 tackles in the 2003 contest...LB Aaron Kampman has two sacks, both in the 2006 meeting.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

- Oct. 29, 2006, at Lambeau Field; Packers won, 31-14.
- ▶ The Packers put together four touchdown drives of 70 yards or longer, fueled by two 100-yard rushers in Ahman Green (21 carries, 106 yards) and Vernand Morency (11-101). It marked the first time since 1985 the Packers had two 100-yard rushers in the same game.
- ▶ Green scored on two short TD runs in the second quarter to give the Packers a 21-0 lead. Brett Favre's 1-yard TD run in the third quarter preceded his first career "Lambeau Leap."
- ▶ The defense held the Cardinals to just 218 total yards, as rookie quarterback Matt Leinart had a rough day, completing just 14 of 35 passes for 157 yards with one touchdown and one interception.
- ▶ Donald Driver led the Packers' receivers with five catches for 48 yards. Greg Jennings sat out the game with an ankle injury sustained the previous week in Miami.

LAST MEETING, PRESEASON

- Aug. 17, 2002, at Arizona; Packers won, 29-21.
- ▶ With the kickoff temperature at 105 degrees, the Cardinals took an early 7-0 lead, but the Packers scored 29 straight points to lead 29-7 after three quarters.
- ▶ Green Bay got touchdown receptions from Donald Driver and Charles Lee, two field goals by Ryan Longwell, plus a safety and interception return for a score on defense.
- ▶ Driver had five receptions for 73 yards, and the Packers defense recorded seven sacks and three interceptions.

PACKERS 31, BILLS 21

SOLID START IN SHUTOUT WIN

The Green Bay Packers' first units continued their dominant preseason so far, this time at the expense of the Buffalo Bills.

- ▶ The No. 1 defense forced three turnovers in four Buffalo drives, and the No. 1 offense scored three touchdowns in four possessions as the Packers bolted to a big lead and cruised to a 31-21 victory in front of 68,908 on Saturday night at Lambeau Field, improving to 2-0 in the preseason.
- ▶ After recording four interceptions in the preseason opener last week against Cleveland, the Packers and their new 3-4 defensive scheme continued to take the ball away, racking up five more turnovers in the game. Three were credited to the first-string defense, which allowed just four first downs and did not allow the Bills across midfield.

▶ S **Nick Collins** deflected a Trent Edwards pass that LB **Brady Poppinga** intercepted, DE **Johnny Jolly** and LB **Brandon Chillar** forced a sack of Edwards and a fumble that LB **A.J. Hawk** recovered, and DE **Cullen Jenkins** forced a fumble by running back Fred Jackson that Poppinga recovered, all in the first 16 minutes, 9 seconds of the contest.

▶ "The takeaways, I think we have something special," Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** said. "I think the guys are playing with a lot of confidence. They seem very comfortable in the scheme. The disguise part of it has gone very well. We're playing with more vision to the football than we did in the past, and we're off to a good start."

▶ Green Bay's top offensive unit was able to take advantage, after an initial stall when RB **Ryan Grant** was stopped for a 2-yard loss on fourth-and-1 at the Buffalo 15. Three plays later, Hawk's fumble recovery came on the Bills' 5, and QB **Aaron Rodgers** hit WR **Greg Jennings** on the ensuing snap for the first score of the game.

▶ The offense followed that up with its longest drive of the night, going 79 yards in just six plays after a Buffalo punt. Rodgers hit TE **Jermichael Finley** for completions of 18 and 21 yards, and after two defensive penalties, he found WR **Donald Driver** for 21 yards down to the 3. Grant took it in from there to make it 14-0.

▶ The third turnover - Poppinga's second of the game - put the ball on the Buffalo 41, and Grant netted 31 yards on three carries and a screen pass. Rodgers then hit Driver for a 5-yard touchdown, scrambling to the right and throwing low to the outside, where Driver made a nifty sliding catch and stayed in bounds.

▶ That play was particularly impressive to McCarthy, who praised Rodgers for taking all the scramble and footwork drills that are part of the head coach's quarterback school and executing them well when the situation warranted it.

▶ "I thought that was a big-time play," McCarthy said. "For him to put that ball where he put it and for Donald to keep his feet in bounds, that's exciting. Those are the type of plays that win football games."

▶ Rodgers once again put up efficient numbers, finishing 8-of-9 for 98 yards and two scores for a 151.6 rating. He completed passes to six different receivers, while Grant added 10 carries for 43 yards, plus two receptions for 21 more.

▶ "I think the key is it starts up front," Rodgers said. "In two games, I haven't been sacked, really haven't been touched. It gives you a lot of confidence as a passer. In the running game they're opening up holes and guys are running through arm tackles, and we're controlling the line



of scrimmage."

- ▶ Meanwhile, the defense through two games has recorded nine turnovers and seven sacks. As the defense began substituting on Saturday, the big plays kept coming, with LB **Brad Jones** sacking backup quarterback Ryan Fitzpatrick and knocking the ball loose late in the second quarter. LB **Desmond Bishop** recovered at the Buffalo 26, setting up a 36-yard field goal by K **Mason Crosby** to make it 24-0 at halftime.
- ▶ The defense kept its preseason-long shutout intact early in the third quarter with - you guessed it - another turnover. Buffalo had driven into Green Bay territory for the first time and faced fourth-and-2 at the Packers' 21, but Fitzpatrick's pass was picked off by a diving Bishop, the third-year linebacker's second interception of the preseason.
- ▶ Buffalo finally got on the scoreboard late in the third on a 9-yard TD pass from Fitzpatrick to tight end Jonathan Stupar. The Packers came 1 minute, 9 seconds shy of going seven full quarters without allowing a point in the preseason.

▶ The Bills tacked on two more touchdowns in the fourth quarter, as No. 3 quarterback Gibran Hamdan directed drives of 60 and 74 yards.

▶ In between those the Packers got some third-string offensive production. QB **Brian Brohm**, who played most of the second and third quarters after Rodgers came out, re-entered late after QB **Matt Flynn** injured his shoulder. Having had little success, with one interception, in the middle part of the game, Brohm led a 13-play, 75-yard drive for

Green Bay's final score, a 3-yard TD run by rookie RB **Tyrell Sutton**.

GAME NOTES

Rookie DE **B.J. Raji**, who signed with the team last Friday, made his NFL debut Saturday night, entering the game on the defense's third series of the night.

▶ "I think he's going to be an exciting young player for us," McCarthy said. "He broke contain on that one quarterback scramble that I saw was his. But other than that, I thought it was a good start for him. I'm going to have to watch the film to give you a more accurate evaluation."

▶ Raji estimated that he took about 12 snaps, lining up at both left defensive end and as one of two down linemen when the Packers were in nickel.

▶ For the second straight week the Packers employed a rotation at the center and right guard spots, with C/G **Jason Spitz** opening at center and G **Josh Sitton** starting at right guard on Saturday night.

▶ Last week C **Scott Wells** got the opening nod at center with Spitz at right guard, and those three have rotated with the rest of the No. 1 offense in both games. T **Allen Barbre** got the start at right tackle for the second straight game, but T **Breno Giacomini** also saw significant time there with the first line on Saturday night. For the second straight game, Rodgers was not sacked.

▶ LB **Nick Barnett** (knee), P **Durant Brooks** (hip), DE **Justin Harrell** (back), CB **Pat Lee** (back), LB **Clay Matthews** (hamstring), S **Charlie Peprah** (knee), S **Aaron Rouse** (hamstring) and LB **Jeremy Thompson** (stinger) did not dress for the game.

▶ QB **Matt Flynn** suffered a shoulder injury in the second half, but neither he nor McCarthy thought the injury was serious. TE **Devin Frischknecht** suffered a serious leg injury in the third quarter and was taken to a local hospital.



2009 TRAINING CAMP

PACKERS IMPRESSIVE IN PRESEASON OPENER

In their exhibition opener, the Packers blanked the Browns 17-0 in front of 69,091 at Lambeau Field.

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** completed five passes to five different receivers, leading the No. 1 offense to touchdowns on each of its two drives. The unit's play was highlighted by a 53-yard TD connection from Rodgers to WR **Donald Driver** on its first possession.
- ▶ Much of the focus was on the debut of the Packers' new 3-4 defense under new defensive coordinator **Dom Capers**, and it did not disappoint. In fact, it was the first preseason shutout by a Green Bay defense since the 1997 preseason opener. While not revealing too much of its blitz and sub-packages, the unit still came away with four interceptions and three sacks.
- ▶ "I thought as a whole for our football team, it was a good solid starting point," Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** said following the opener. "There were a lot of positives that came out of this game. And there are some negatives and we have to make sure we learn from that."



LIGHTNING CANCELS FAMILY NIGHT SCRIMMAGE

Players did get warmups in, but sustained lightning around the area forced the team to cancel its annual Family Night scrimmage on Aug. 8.

- ▶ 50,787 fans had packed Lambeau Field Saturday night to get their first look of 'live' action in 2009.
- ▶ A number of players were slated to miss the scrimmage because of minor injuries, prompting Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** and his staff to honor the off day following Sunday, giving the team two days of rest heading into the first game week.
- ▶ "We're going to take this opportunity to get the players back and just keep our install schedule going," McCarthy said after the cancellation. "I'm very pleased with the number of reps that we were able to attain last week in practice. We feel as a coaching staff that we are ahead of schedule in some areas."

SAVE THE DATE

PHYSICAL TONE SET IN FIRST WEEK

Part of the reason the coaching staff was able to give the team rest with the cancellation of Family Night was just how physical the opening week of camp had been.

- ▶ "I think we may have fallen under the classification of 'live' in segments of our practice," McCarthy said after the cancellation. "I have been very pleased with the nature of our practices, the extra reps in the particular situations that we felt we needed the extra work. I like the attitude and

- the temperament of our football team right now."
- ▶ Players agree, as many are saying this has been the most physical camp in the McCarthy tenure. The first week was highlighted by nine practices – seven in full pads – and a number of skirmishes in practice.
- ▶ "This has been as physical a camp as I've been in since I got here," LB **A.J. Hawk** said. "It's been good so far. That's why having (Family Night) canceled isn't going to hurt us as maybe it would in years past because of how physical we've been and the number of plays we've taken so far in camp."
- ▶ The second night practice, on Aug. 4, featured three separate fights that stopped the action each time.
- ▶ "I thought the defense had a heck of a night tonight," McCarthy said following the Aug. 4 night practice. "I probably shouldn't even say this, but we were 6-10 last year, and we didn't have a damn fight all training camp. So, I guess we're off to a hell of a start."

WHERE THEY'LL BE FRIDAY NIGHT

Coaches often use the preseason as a test to see where coaches are best utilized, especially with a new staff. Coach McCarthy is on the sidelines, but here's a look at where the rest of the staff will be Friday:

- ▶ **Coaches' Box:** Dom Capers (defensive coordinator), Jerry Fontenot (asst. offensive line), Scott McCurley (defensive quality control), Chad Morton (administrator), Joe Philbin (offensive coordinator), John Rushing (offensive quality control), and Joe Whitt (secondary - cornerbacks).
- ▶ **Sideline:** Edgar Bennett (running backs), James Campen (offensive line), Tom Clements (quarterbacks), Mike Eayrs (research and development), Curtis Fuller (special teams asst.), Kevin Greene (outside linebackers), Ben McAdoo (tight ends), Winston Moss (inside linebackers/asst. head coach), Darren Perry (secondary - safeties), Jimmy Robinson (wide receivers), Shawn Slocum (special teams coordinator) and Mike Trgovac (defensive line).

WHEN IT COUNTS

No one needs to remind the Packers how important play in the fourth quarter can be.

- ▶ In eight of the 10 losses from 2008, the Packers either led or were behind by no more than one score in the fourth quarter. In those same eight games, the outcome was decided in the final two minutes.
- ▶ The "lessons of 2008", as Coach McCarthy has referred to them this entire offseason, most likely center around the Packers not coming up with the critical play in crunch time.
- ▶ Their seven losses in games decided by four points or less tied the second highest total in NFL history.
- ▶ It wasn't a problem of putting up points in the final frame, as Green Bay's 150 fourth quarter points were second in the NFL behind San Diego (152).
- ▶ Perhaps most telling was the fact that the Green Bay defense allowed the second-most fourth quarter points (135) in the league. Only Houston (136) allowed more.
- ▶ It comes as no surprise that the two-minute drill has been heavily stressed on both sides of the ball. The drill comes towards the end of practice to help simulate the fatigue and end-of-game conditions.

2009 TRAINING CAMP

STAFF CHANGES HEADLINE OFFSEASON

On the heels of a disappointing 6-10 season, a new defensive staff and scheme headlined the changes this offseason at 1265 Lombardi Ave.

- **Dom Capers** was brought in as defensive coordinator, and the Packers began the transition to a 3-4 defense in offseason workouts.
- Joining Capers on the defensive staff are **Mike Trgovac** (defensive line), who spent the last six years in Carolina as defensive coordinator; outside linebackers coach **Kevin Greene**, third on the NFL's all-time sacks list and a former player under Capers; and safeties coach **Darren Perry**, who most recently coached in Oakland and also played under Capers in Pittsburgh. Assistant head coach/inside linebackers coach **Winston Moss** remains on the staff, as does **Joe Whitt Jr.**, who spent 2008 as defensive quality control before his promotion to cornerbacks coach this offseason.
- **Shawn Slocum** was promoted to special teams coordinator after serving as the unit's assistant each of the last three seasons. **Curtis Fuller**, a former Packers safety and training camp coaching intern, will serve as his assistant. New strength and conditioning coordinator **Dave Redding** is entering his 23rd season at the NFL level, while **Scott McCurley** (defense) and **John Rushing** (offense) will serve as the quality control coaches.



MORE ON DOM CAPERS

Charged with revamping the Packers' defense is veteran coach **Dom Capers**, who is entering his 24th season on the NFL level in 2009, his 17th as a defensive coordinator or head coach.

- Noted around the league as one of the game's best defensive minds, Capers will transition the Packers to a 3-4 defense. Much of the depth chart on defense returns, including all 11 primary starters. The offseason was heavily focused on learning the new system, including position changes for some. None will receive more attention this month than Pro Bowler **Aaron Kampman**, who makes the switch to outside linebacker from defensive end.
- In addition to serving as the head coach of two different expansion franchises (Carolina and Houston), Capers brings an impressive résumé as a coordinator. Pittsburgh ranked No. 22 in overall defense in 1991, the year before Capers' arrival. The Steelers' defense rose up in the defensive rankings to 13th in 1992, Capers' first season as a defensive coordinator in the NFL. The unit rose to No. 3 in 1993 and No. 2 in 1994, earning the moniker "Blitzburgh" with one of the decade's most feared defenses.
- Capers' instant impact was also seen in his stint as defensive coordinator with Jacksonville (1999-00) and Miami (2006-07). Ranking 25th in overall defense in 1998, the Jaguars' unit rose immediately under Capers in '99 to No. 4 overall in addition to allowing the fewest points in the NFL. The Dolphins ranked No. 18 in overall defense in 2005 but rose to No. 4 in 2006 under Capers, with DE Jason Taylor earning Defensive Player of the Year honors that season as well.

SOME NEW FACES SURROUND MANY FAMILIAR ONES

While coaches get familiar with their surroundings in Green Bay, much of the Packers' young core remains intact.

- In fact, 21 of 22 primary starters from last season remain on the team, as do many backups who saw significant action in '08.
- Ten starters return on offense, while all 11 return on defense. But that doesn't mean there won't be some serious competition for playing time – and roster spots – this month.
- As has been the case under General Manager **Ted Thompson**, most

new players have come this offseason via the draft. 2009 will mark the first time since 1993 that the team has two first-round picks, and both NT **B.J. Raji** (No. 9 overall) and LB **Clay Matthews** (No. 26 overall) are expected to compete for playing time immediately.

- On offense, G/T **T.J. Lang** (fourth round) and T **Jamon Meredith** (fifth round) will be in the mix along the offensive line, while FB **Quinn Johnson** (fifth round) could push for a starting job.
- With an almost entirely new defensive staff, DE **Jarius Wynn** (sixth round), CB **Brandon Underwood** (sixth round) and LB **Brad Jones** (seventh round) will all get a chance at their respective positions.

► Joining the Packers via free agency were C/G **Duke Preston** and S **Anthony Smith**. Preston spent four seasons with the Buffalo Bills after being drafted by the Bills in the fourth round of the 2005 NFL Draft. He appeared in 59 games, starting 20 of them, including a career-high 11 starts in 2008.

► Smith, a third-round draft choice by Pittsburgh in 2006, spent three seasons with the Steelers. He appeared in 46 games, including 14 starts.

REST AND RECOVERY

In addition to the traditional days off after a pre-season game, Coach McCarthy built in three off days to help players recuperate.

- The team received the first three Wednesdays (Aug. 5, 12, and 19) off before settling into a routine more closely mirroring the regular season.
- On those days, the team gathered in the morning for weight lifting, meetings, and film review, and then had the afternoon and evening off before two practices the next day.

2009 TRAINING CAMP

277 AND COUNTING

Lambeau Field saw eight regular-season sellouts in '08, bringing the consecutive sellouts streak to 277 games (261 regular season, 16 playoffs).

- ▶ Lambeau Field, the league's longest-tenured stadium, will host its 53rd season of football this year.
- ▶ A total of 565,460 fans came through the turnstiles in the eight home contests last season, an average of 70,683.
- ▶ Lambeau Field also saw the four largest regular-season crowds in stadium history in 2008 (vs. Minnesota, vs. Dallas, vs. Indianapolis, vs. Chicago). The Week 3 contest vs. Dallas (71,113) set a new regular-season attendance record.
- ▶ A number of games have the potential to challenge some stadium records this season. The primetime opener against Chicago – including the debut of new QB Jay Cutler – will be a tough ticket, as will home contests against the Dallas Cowboys and Baltimore Ravens. None, however, is expected to match the Nov. 1 game against the Minnesota Vikings, where QB Brett Favre is expected to make his return to Lambeau Field wearing an opposing uniform.

NATIONALLY TELEVISED GAMES HEADLINE 2009 SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' regular-season schedule – containing five nationally televised games – was released in April by the National Football League.

- ▶ The Packers will play each of their NFC North opponents in front of a national audience, including a primetime opener in Week 1 against the Chicago Bears at Lambeau Field and a Thanksgiving game in Detroit against the Lions in Week 12.
- ▶ Green Bay also will travel to Minnesota to take on the rival Vikings in Week 4 for the first of two appearances on *Monday Night Football*. The signing of QB Brett Favre by Minnesota last week ensures that the game will be among the most watched this season.
- ▶ "It's great to see that the NFL and our network partners feel strongly about the national appeal and popularity of the Packers, with five of our games slated for national broadcasts," President and CEO **Mark Murphy** said. "For those taking in games at Lambeau Field, we'll now begin our detailed planning with our sponsors for creating the great gameday fan experience."
- ▶ The Packers' other appearance on Monday night comes Dec. 7 in a Week 13 showdown with the Baltimore Ravens at Lambeau Field. It marks the first *MNF* game played at Lambeau Field in the month of December.
- ▶ 2009 marks the 17th consecutive season the Packers have appeared on *Monday Night Football*, the NFL's longest active streak.
- ▶ Green Bay's fifth game in front of a national TV audience comes against the Dallas Cowboys in Week 10. The Nov. 15 game will kick off at 3:15 p.m. on FOX. The fifth home game on the schedule, the Cowboys contest is slated as a Gold Package (Milwaukee season-ticket holders) game. Cincinnati comes to Lambeau Field in Week 2 for the other Gold Package game.
- ▶ "I'm excited for the 2009 regular season – we have a great opportunity starting with two home games and three early division games," Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** said. "Playing on Monday night after Thanksgiving will give us a chance for another break before the final month. Historically we've been strong in December, and we'll look to rise to that challenge."
- ▶ Though it is a noon kickoff, the Vikings-Packers matchup at Lambeau Field on Nov. 1 will certainly be watched by many around the country as Favre makes his return to Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Green Bay's final four games of the season, including matchups at Super Bowl XLIII opponents Arizona and Pittsburgh, as well as the club's final division game of the season in Chicago, are all subject to the NFL's flexible scheduling.
- ▶ Built into the schedule for Sundays from Weeks 11-17, flex changes

must be announced 12 days prior to kickoff, except for Week 17, which is announced on six days' notice.

- ▶ Green Bay is not a candidate to be flexed in Week 11 against San Francisco because the team plays just four days later against Detroit on Thanksgiving. The Packers also are not a candidate to be flexed in Week 13 because of the Monday night matchup against the Ravens.

SCHEDULE NUGGETS

Green Bay's bye week – which occurs in Week 5 – is the earliest bye for the team since 1999, when it had its bye in Week 4.

- ▶ Though their bye week comes early, the Packers will get some extra rest coming off the Week 12 Thanksgiving contest. They won't play until the following Monday night, Dec. 7, at home.
- ▶ The Packers have five games against playoff teams from a year ago (Week 4 at Minnesota, Week 8 vs. Minnesota, Week 13 vs. Baltimore, Week 15 at Pittsburgh and Week 17 at Arizona).
- ▶ The first four games of the season will be broadcast on four different networks. After the bye week, Green Bay has seven straight games on FOX and could have 11 of the last 12 on the network, pending the NFL's flex scheduling. Also dependent upon the flex scheduling is the amount of 12 noon starts, which at this point is set for 10 games. An 11th, at Detroit, is set for 11:30 a.m.
- ▶ Green Bay plays three of the four teams who played in last season's conference championships. All three games (vs. Baltimore, at Pittsburgh, at Arizona) occur in the season's final five weeks. Making the season's final stretch tougher too is the fact that three of the final four games will be on the road.
- ▶ For the first time since 2003, the Packers will not play a division opponent in the season's final three weeks.

POSITION-BY-POSITION

BY THE NUMBERS

Here's a look at the Packers' current roster, and how things are shaping up. Just a quick note – the first number is the number of players at that position currently on the roster, while the second is the number at the position during Week 1 last season.

Quarterback – 3 (3)

- ▶ **Aaron Rodgers** begins his second year under center for the Packers and looks more comfortable in the offense than he did a year ago. That may not be good news for opponents considering the statistical milestones Rodgers eclipsed in 2008. His stated goals this offseason were to improve on his consistency and to work with play-caller **Mike McCarthy** to expand his role in the offensive game plan, which he'll now get a chance to do in preseason action.
- ▶ Behind Rodgers there will be a competition between second-year signal callers **Matt Flynn** and **Brian Brohm** for the backup role. Flynn, a 2008 seventh-round selection, beat out Brohm, a 2008 second-round selection, last summer.
- ▶ Both went through their first year of McCarthy's quarterback school this offseason and split reps during OTAs this spring. Each will get a long look at No. 2 this August.

Running back – 5 (3)

- ▶ **Ryan Grant** enters entrenched as the clear starter and under much different circumstances than a year ago. Grant missed all of the offseason work prior to the 2008 season because of contract issues, and then proceeded to hurt his hamstring in one of his first training camp practices.
- ▶ That hamstring caused Grant to come out of the gates a bit slow, but he still managed to become the fourth player in team history to top the 1,200-yard mark. Now Grant will get preseason action under his belt, which could help him return to the explosive form he showed in 2007.
- ▶ Vying for carries behind Grant will be a trio of returning veterans – **Brandon Jackson**, **Kregg Lumpkin** and **DeShawn Wynn** – along with rookie free agent **Tyrell Sutton**. With 230 total rushing yards against Cleveland in the first preseason game, it's clear this group is already performing at a high level.

Fullback – 3 (2)

- ▶ Last year the team kept two fullbacks, but with two veterans returning and a rookie draft pick in his first training camp, this position figures to be among the most competitive battles for a roster spot.
- ▶ Both **Korey Hall** and **John Kuhn** will be in the mix having been valuable contributors from scrimmage and on special teams each of the last two seasons.
- ▶ A knee injury suffered early in the season ultimately cost Hall five games last season, but the third-year pro has returned healthy this offseason. Kuhn saw his most extended action in '08 since arriving in Green Bay, but whether the team can afford to keep both for another season will be sorted out this summer.
- ▶ Also added to the mix this spring was **Quinn Johnson**, the team's fifth-round pick in the 2009 NFL Draft. Lauded as a traditional fullback, Johnson paved the way for a 1,100-yard rusher in each of his final two seasons at LSU while also proving to be a reliable option in short-yardage situations and as a pass catcher.

Wide receiver – 9 (5)

- ▶ **Donald Driver** and **Greg Jennings** head up what is one of the deepest receiving groups across the league. Both are coming off 1,000-yard campaigns and look to be in top form so far this summer.
- ▶ **James Jones** and **Jordy Nelson** will battle for the No. 3 job, though Jones looks to be completely healthy after knee troubles plagued his 2008 season. **Ruvell Martin** returns as well, giving the Packers a physical presence both in the red zone and running game. Coach

McCarthy has utilized the 'Big Five' formation in previous years, and those same five return to give Rodgers plenty of options.

- ▶ Even with all five veterans returning, they will be pushed by a number of young players. **Jake Allen** and **Brett Swain** spent the entire 2008 season on the practice squad and could push for a spot, while **JaRon Harris** and **Kole Heckendorf** will look to make an impression in preseason action.

Tight end – 5 (3)

- ▶ Tight end is always an interesting position to keep an eye on because of the way McCarthy likes to utilize the position on offense, especially with multiple tight-end sets.
- ▶ **Donald Lee**, the unit's primary starter each of the last two seasons, might be one of the more unheralded players at the position across the NFL. His numbers over the past two seasons (87 catches, 878 yards, 11 touchdowns) prove as much.
- ▶ One of the players on the roster most will be keeping an eye on is **Jermichael Finley**, a prime candidate to have a breakout season. Entering his second season and still only 22, Finley showed flashes of his potential at the end of his rookie season and is certainly a big, athletic target for Rodgers.
- ▶ With the injury to **Devin Frischknecht**, **Spencer Havner** and **Evan Moore** should see plenty of game action. Havner is trying to make the conversion from linebacker, where he still practices, and is a special teams standout.

Offensive line – 14 (9)

- ▶ An opportunity for someone to emerge at the right tackle spot will dominate the talk along the offensive line, but there's also plenty to watch along the interior of the line.
- ▶ **Jason Spitz**, who has started at each of the three inside positions in his first three years in the league, has been competing with veteran **Scott Wells** at center. Wells battled through an injury-riddled campaign in 2008, and offseason shoulder surgery kept the veteran out of offseason workouts. Spitz, who slid over to center in Wells' absence, is making the move to center not only because of his ability there, but because of the emergence of **Josh Sitton** at right guard.
- ▶ Sitton first cracked the starting lineup last summer in his first training camp, and the second-year pro will have every opportunity to win the job at right guard this summer. At this point, all three seem to be in a rotation with the first unit. Veterans **Chad Clifton** and **Daryn Colledge** make up the left side of the line, with Clifton having 126 career starts in the Green and Gold. In three seasons, Colledge has 44 career starts.
- ▶ A new starter will take over the spot at right tackle, and it appears to be mainly a competition between **Allen Barbre** and **Breno Giacomini**. Barbre, a third-year pro, spent the entire offseason with the No. 1 offense, while Giacomini spent the offseason rehabbing an ankle injury. Rookie **T.J. Lang** has been a bright spot thus far at both guard and tackle and could become a factor at the spot.

Defensive end – 7 (6)

- ▶ Defensive end will have a much different look both in responsibility and in roster numbers in defensive coordinator **Dom Capers'** 3-4 defense. The Packers kept six on the opening-day roster for 2008, but that number may drop this season.
- ▶ **Cullen Jenkins**, who has played both inside and outside, has looked outstanding thus far in camp in his return from a pectoral injury that cut short what was promising to be a career season in 2008. Jenkins appeared in the first four games, with the Packers' defense collecting nine sacks over that time. The team accumulated 18 sacks in the 12 games Jenkins missed.
- ▶ Two players who may get the chance to start opposite Jenkins are **Johnny Jolly** and **Justin Harrell**. Both former defensive tackles

in the old scheme, Jolly has the edge in experience with 32 games played, including 23 starts, in his first three NFL campaigns. Harrell has appeared in just 13 games since arriving in Green Bay as a first-round pick in 2007, but both have been plagued by injuries thus far in camp. Jolly was set back by an ankle injury, while Harrell is suffering from a back injury.

- ▶ That does open the potential for immediate playing time to first-round pick **B.J. Raji**, who will be taking part in his second week of practice. Raji spent significant time at end once he arrived in Green Bay this offseason and appears as though he will spend time both inside and outside in his first season.
- ▶ Veterans **Alfred Malone** and **Michael Montgomery** will get a chance to earn backup roles. As with any position on the roster this time of year, the duo has some competition from younger players in **Jarius Wynn**, a sixth-round draft pick from Georgia, and rookie free agent **Ronald Talley**.

Nose tackle – 4 (3)

- ▶ The Packers kept only three defensive tackles last season in their 4-3 scheme, but there isn't really an accurate way of predicting just what the coaching and personnel staff will decide to do in the 3-4.
- ▶ Raji will obviously see time at the position once he gets more reps in general but is now well behind starter **Ryan Pickett**. Like Raji, Pickett could see time at multiple positions along the line, but he has practiced exclusively at nose tackle thus far.
- ▶ Both **Dean Muhtadi** and **Anthony Toribio** provide some depth at the position, and it remains to be seen whether Capers and the staff will take a look at any of the ends – Harrell, Jenkins or Jolly – at the nose tackle position.



Linebacker – 13 (6)

- ▶ No position may look more different in 2009 than it did in 2008 than linebacker. Whether it be former defensive ends converting to the outside or veterans adjusting to new responsibilities, it will be one of the most highly watched position groups in camp.
- ▶ The team will most likely keep more than the total it did last year and should have considerable competition at both inside and outside spots.
- ▶ Converted from defensive end were **Aaron Kampman** and **Jeremy Thompson**, both of whom have lined up with the first-team defense. Kampman, one of the NFL's most productive pass rushers over the past three seasons, will be under a media microscope all summer as he converts to playing without his hand on the ground.
- ▶ Thompson seems like an ideal fit for the position and was praised by coaches for his quick transition to the position. Still, Thompson is entering just his second season, and has already split first-team reps with first-round draft pick **Clay Matthews**. Both should be major contributors on various special-teams units but are currently sidelined with injuries.
- ▶ In the middle will be veterans **Nick Barnett** and **A.J. Hawk**. **Desmond Bishop** and **Brandon Chillar** have enjoyed outstanding starts to their respective training camps and preseason, including some impactful plays against the Browns and Bills, and give the team great depth along the inside.
- ▶ **Spencer Havner** and **Danny Lansanah** both were valuable members of the special-teams units a year ago and remain in the mix. Veteran

Brady Poppinga has seen reps on the outside with the No. 1 defense in the absence of Matthews and Thompson. He will be competing with rookie draft pick **Brad Jones**, who flashed in his first game, and rookie free agent **Cyril Obiozor**. Havner too has seen time on the outside.

Cornerback – 9 (6)

- ▶ While the team may no longer play as much press coverage as it had become known for in prior seasons, this group is still led by Pro Bowlers **Al Harris** and **Charles Woodson**. Both have been impressive in the earlygoing and seem to have grasped the new system quickly.
- ▶ Behind the veteran duo is a group of young corners, led by third-year man **Tramon Williams**. When Harris was sidelined last season with a spleen injury, Williams stepped up in his absence and finished the season with five interceptions.
- ▶ After Williams, a number of young corners will be looking to establish themselves in sub packages and on special teams. **Will Blackmon**, the team's primary return specialist, and **Pat Lee**, a second-round pick in 2008, will have every chance to earn those opportunities this month. So too will **Joe Porter**, who appeared in his first game action last season after spending portions of the previous two seasons on the practice squad, sixth-round draft pick **Brandon Underwood** from the University of Cincinnati, and rookie free agent **Trevor Ford**.

Safety – 5 (4)

- ▶ All five safeties on the roster have NFL experience, and when you include **Jarrett Bush**, who will play both corner and safety and is a top player on the Packers' special-teams units, this could be one of the most competitive positions in camp.
- ▶ **Nick Collins** is coming off a career season in which he earned his first Pro Bowl berth, and the fifth-year player remains neck-and-neck with Woodson for the interception lead thus far in camp. Collins, who must make more calls and checks in the new scheme, will be under close watch to see how quickly he can transition to the new defense.
- ▶ At the other safety position, **Atari Bigby** will look to regain the form he had two seasons ago after suffering through an injury-plagued '08. Competing for reps at both spots will be veterans **Charlie Peprah** and **Aaron Rouse**, who saw time in the secondary last season in Bigby's absence. Joining the team this offseason as a free agent was **Anthony Smith**, who spent his first three NFL seasons in the 3-4 in Pittsburgh.

Specialists – 4 (3)

- ▶ Though no specialist job in the NFL could ever be deemed secure, K **Mason Crosby** and LS **Brett Goode** are the only players at their respective positions on the roster. With a solid performance in camp and in preseason action, each should be back for another season.
- ▶ Where the competition lies will be at punter, where incumbent **Jeremy Kapinos** will try to hold off **Durant Brooks**. Kapinos punted in the last four games for the team last season and does cause return men some problems as a left-footed kicker. Brooks was a sixth-round draft pick in 2008 by the Washington Redskins and punted in six games for the team before he was released. Both have been a bit shaky thus far in practices and game action.
