THIRD PRESEASON GAME

INDIANAPOLIS (0-2) at GREEN BAY (1-1)

Thursday, Aug. 26 • Lambeau Field • 7 p.m. CDT

COLTS COME TO LAMBEAU FOR PRESEASON ACTION

The Packers return home to take on the defending AFC champion Indianapolis Colts in a nationally televised contest at Lambeau Field.

► It will be the final home game of the preseason for Green Bay, and will give the team a longer look at its starters as well as some of the younger players fighting for a spot on the team with the first roster cut-down on the horizon.

► In the past under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the starters have played into the third quarter in the third preseason contest, and the Colts should provide a good measuring stick for the Packers as they begin to look ahead to the regular season. The overall health of the team will surely factor into how much Green Bay's starters play on Thursday night.

► Over the past 18 preseasons, the Packers have appeared on national television at least once 17 of those years. The lone year that Green Bay did not appear on national TV during that span was 2009.

► For the second straight preseason, the Packers will face a Super Bowl participant from the previous season in their third preseason contest. In '09, the Packers traveled to Arizona to face the defending NFC champion Cardinals and came away with a 44-37 win.

► The teams have squared off seven times before in the preseason, with the Colts holding a 5-2 advantage in the series. The last preseason meeting between the teams came on Aug. 24, 1996, a 30-6 Colts victory in Indianapolis.

► The Packers beat Seattle, 27-24, on Saturday night at Qwest Field. QB **Aaron Rodgers** led the No. 1 offense on a pair of touchdown drives, completing 8-of-11 passes for 116 yards and two TDs. RB **Brandon Jackson** scored on a 12-yard run with 3:34 remaining to give Green Bay the win.

► The Colts lost to Buffalo, 34-21, on Thursday night in Toronto. QB Peyton Manning completed 8-of-15 passes for 91 yards and a TD, and RB Joseph Addai posted a 17-yard TD run.

BISHOP'S CHARITIES GAME

Thursday night marks another Green Bay preseason tradition: the Bishop's Charities Game. It was first played in 1961 after **Vince Lombardi** was approached by the Diocese of Green Bay about playing a charitable contest in Green Bay (the Shrine contest was a fixture in Milwaukee).

► The series enjoys its 50th contest this year and has raised over \$3.4 million.

► For more than 30 years, the church handled much of the game's business-related tasks, including game program and advertising sales, using a network of volunteers covering 14 Northeastern Wisconsin counties. The Packers assumed many of those tasks in 1994.

► The Packers are 25-23-1 all-time in the series. They will be playing Indianapolis for the fourth time in the series, with the other meetings coming in 1984, 1989 and 1993.

► Green Bay got back to its winning ways last season when it defeated Buffalo, 31-21. Prior to that, the Packers had lost six consecutive Bishop's Charities contests. That six-game losing streak (2003-08) came on the heels of a 12-game winning streak (1991-2002) in the series.

WITH THE CALL

ESPN enters its fifth season as host of the most successful series in sports television history, *Monday Night Football*. Play-by-play man **Mike Tirico** is joined by analysts **Ron Jaworski** and **Jon Gruden** for the 41st season of *MNF* broadcasts, with **Suzy Kolber** and **Michele Tafoya** reporting from the sidelines.

► ESPN Deportes will broadcast the game with Spanish graphics and commentary provided by announcers **Alvaro Martin** and **Raul Allegre**, with **John Sutcliffe** as sideline reporter.

► The contest also will air as a simulcast locally on WBAY (Ch. 2) in Green Bay and WISN (Ch. 12) in Milwaukee.

► Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 53-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The duo enters its 12th season of broadcasts together across the Packers Radio Network, which covers 43 markets in five states.

THIS WEEK IN PACKERS NEWS

CONTINUING TO CLICK

Last year during the preseason, Green Bay's No. 1 offense put together a string of impressive performances that it carried over into the regular season. The Packers are only two games into this preseason, but the offense appears to be building momentum once again.

- On its six possessions in the first two preseason contests, the first-team offense has scored four touchdowns, including TDs on both of its drives (71 and 76 yards) Saturday night in Seattle.
- Leading the way has been QB **Aaron Rodgers**, who ranks No. 1 in the NFL during the preseason with a 154.0 passer rating. Rodgers has completed 20-of-24 passes (83.3 percent) for 275 yards and three TDs with no INTs.
- "I think he has been excellent," Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** said. "He has been sharp, and he's doing all of the little things that are necessary to continue to spread the ball around and keep our offense in good looks. He's doing an excellent job."
- Rodgers posted similar numbers during the 2009 preseason, registering a 147.9 passer rating as he completed 29-of-41 attempts (70.7 percent) for 465 yards and six TDs with no INTs. The No. 1 offense scored nine TDs and a FG on 13 possessions during the '09 preseason.
- Credit must be given to the Packers' offensive line, as it has yet to allow a sack of Rodgers through the first two preseason games. The No. 1 line didn't yield a single sack in the 2009 preseason on Rodgers' 41 attempts.



AHEAD THIS WEEK

Thursday night's contest will feature two of the more productive quarterbacks in the league in Rodgers and Peyton Manning.

- Rodgers and Manning are two of only four QBs in the NFL to throw for 4,000 yards each of the last two seasons, joining San Diego's Philip Rivers and New Orleans' Drew Brees.
- In 2009, Rodgers became the first QB in NFL history to throw for more than 4,000 yards in each of his first two seasons as a starter.
- Rodgers has a ways to go before he can match Manning, who posted a 4,000-yard passing season an NFL-record 10th time in 2009.
- Both quarterbacks rank among the top five in several categories over the past two seasons (2008-09).

EXCERPTS FROM COACH MCCARTHY - SEATTLE POSTGAME

► (How did you feel about the team responding to the deficit and working its way back in the second half?)

"I thought our guys just kept battling. Everybody had an opportunity to play; I thought Matt Flynn did a good job, I thought Graham [Harrell] did a good job those last two drives to get us in the end zone, and our defense was getting the ball back, so we were very pleased with the team's effort tonight."

► (What did you tell the team after the game?)

"Hurry up, drink some water and let's get on the plane.' We have a long ride home, and we have a number of things that we will correct as a football team on Monday. We have a short week next week – we play on Thursday – so I'm more concerned with how we bounce back from this game out here on the West Coast. We'll take Monday morning and we

will spend that on the corrections from Seattle."

► (What did you get out of seeing so many different players in the starting lineup on defense tonight?)

"We talk about this all the time: pre-season games are much different than regular-season games because there is so much more information you're trying to gather. This will give us more information on any individuals that had an opportunity to play earlier than they probably would have if the other players were here. Some of the things that we did, schematically, are we improving? Because Dom Capers and the defensive staff haven't changed the game plan or the ready-list since Family Night, so we'll look at all of those things."

► (What did you see from your special-teams units tonight?)

"[I got] lot of information; a lot of positives, some negatives. We played everybody on kickoff coverage again this week like we did last week, so I'm looking for some individuals to probably separate themselves from others because we have two games of information in that particular area. I thought the punt [unit] was solid. We've got to handle the football. Ball security is a premium not only for our offense and we didn't do that, so we'll get it corrected and move on to Indianapolis."

CAMP BREAKS

The Packers moved out of the dorms at St. Norbert College last Wednesday, and had their final "two-a-day" on Thursday, marking an unofficial end to training camp.

- The team now moves into a schedule that more closely resembles the regular season. It will hit the practice field twice this week – Monday night and Tuesday morning – before hosting Indianapolis on Thursday.
- After a quick turnaround in preparation for the Colts, Green Bay will have a full week before the preseason finale at Kansas City on Sept. 2.

MIKE MCCARTHY... Is in fifth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Has led his team to the playoffs two of the past three years.
- ▶ One of only two coaches, along with New Orleans' Sean Payton, to have his offense ranked in the top 10 in total yardage each of the last four years.
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Honored as the 2007 Motorola NFL Coach of the Year and NFL Alumni Coach of the Year.
- ▶ Became the first Packers coach since Vince Lombardi to lead the team to a championship game in his second season.

JIM CALDWELL... Is in second year as the Colts' 19th head coach.

- ▶ Led the team to a 14-2 record, two playoff wins, and a Super Bowl appearance in his first season.
- ▶ Became the only rookie head coach in NFL history to win his first 14 games, the second to post 14 regular-season wins overall (George Seifert, 1989), and the fifth to reach the Super Bowl.
- ▶ Previously served as the Colts' QB coach (2002-04) and as the assistant (2005-07) and associate head coach (2008) under Tony Dungy.
- ▶ Also served as QB coach at Tampa Bay (2001), head coach at Wake Forest University (1993-2000) and as an assistant coach at six other colleges, beginning in 1977 at his alma mater, Iowa, where he was a four-year starter at defensive back.

THE PACKERS-COLTS SERIES

- ▶ The rivalry dates back to 1953, when the Colts were in Baltimore and played the Packers twice per season from 1953-1966.
- ▶ The most memorable game in that stretch came in the 1965 Western Conference Championship at Lambeau Field, won by the Packers 13-10 in overtime, the first sudden-death game in franchise history. Don Chandler's disputed FG at the end of regulation tied the game and led the NFL to raise the uprights the following year.
- ▶ The two clubs have met just four times in the last 18 years but have staged two shootouts, both in Indianapolis, in that time. On Nov. 16, 1997, the Colts prevailed 41-38 on a FG at the end of regulation, handing the Packers their last loss that season until Super Bowl XXXII, vs. Denver. Then on Sept. 26, 2004, the Colts prevailed again, 45-31, as Brett Favre and Peyton Manning combined for 753 passing yards and nine TDs.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Colts DT Dan Muir played for the Packers in 2007, while Colts WR Taj Smith spent the 2008 training camp in Green Bay, and Packers WR Charles Dillon spent the 2008 offseason and part of training camp with the Colts...Packers WR coach Jimmy Robinson held the same position with the Colts from 1994-97...Packers offensive coordinator Joe Philbin was on the staff at Iowa when Colts TE Dallas Clark and S Bob Sanders played for the Hawkeyes...Colts OL coach Pete Metzelaars and QB coach Frank Reich played for Carolina in '95 when Packers defensive coordinator Dom Capers was in his first season as head coach there...Colts DL coach John Teerlinck was Packers OLB coach Kevin Greene's position coach with the Rams in '91...The two teams feature several veterans who were college teammates, including Colts QB Peyton Manning and Packers T Chad Clifton (Tennessee), Colts RB Joseph Addai and Packers QB Matt Flynn (LSU), Colts WR Anthony Gonzalez and Packers LB A.J. Hawk (Ohio State), Colts T Tony Ugoh and Packers LS Brett Goode (Arkansas), and Colts S Jamie Silva and Packers S Will Blackmon and NT B.J. Raji (Boston College)...Two pairs of college teammates are rookies who were both drafted this past April: Colts DE Jerry Hughes and Packers G/T Marshall Newhouse (TCU) and Colts LB Pat Angerer and Packers T/G Bryan Bulaga (Iowa); Colts DT Mitch King also was a teammate of Bulaga's at Iowa...Colts DT Fili Moala and Packers LB Clay Matthews were both 2009 draft picks out of USC; Colts DB Kevin Thomas was drafted out of USC in 2010...Packers P Tim Masthay began 2009 training camp with the Colts, and was a college teammate of Colts TE Jacob Tamme at Kentucky...Other former college teammates include Colts QB Curtis Painter, DB Brandon King and Packers DE Mike Neal (Purdue), Colts LB Philip Wheeler and Packers S Morgan Burnett (Georgia Tech), Colts DB Melvin Bullitt and Packers LB Cyril Obiozor (Texas A&M), Colts DE Keyunta Dawson and Packers QB Graham Harrell (Texas Tech), Colts LB Cody Glenn and Packers RB Brandon Jackson (Nebraska), Colts G Jacques McClendon and Packers DE Justin Harrell (Tennessee), Colts DT Marlon Favorite and Packers FB Quinn Johnson (LSU), Colts DB Jarraud Powers and Packers CB Pat Lee (Auburn), Colts RB Javarris James and Packers CB Sam Shields (Miami), Colts T Jeff Linkenbach, DT Ricardo Matthews and Packers CB Brandon Underwood (Cincinnati), Colts RB Devin Moore and Packers S Derrick Martin (Wyoming), and Colts G Jamey Richard, DB Mike Newton and Packers RB James Starks (Buffalo).

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Oct. 19, 2008, at Lambeau Field; Packers won, 34-14.

- ▶ Safeties Nick Collins (62 yards) and Aaron Rouse (99 yards) both ran back interceptions for long touchdowns as Green Bay won going away.
- ▶ QB Aaron Rodgers was an efficient 21-of-28 for 186 yards and a TD, a 12-yarder to TE Donald Lee early in the second quarter that gave the Packers the lead for good.
- ▶ RB Ryan Grant carried 31 times for 105 yards and a TD.
- ▶ Colts QB Peyton Manning was 21-of-42 for 229 yards and the two INTs. RB Dominic Rhodes rushed for 73 yards and two TDs.

LAST MEETING, PRESEASON

Aug. 24, 1996, at RCA Dome; Colts won, 30-6.

- ▶ In what eventually became their Super Bowl championship season, the Packers ended the preseason with a thud against a former Green Bay coach, Lindy Infante, who was beginning his first season at the Colts' helm.
- ▶ Indianapolis scored on three long TD passes. QB Jim Harbaugh connected with WR Marvin Harrison on a 54-yard score and with WR Sean Dawkins for a 39-yarder. QB Paul Justin added a 64-yard TD to WR Aaron Bailey in the fourth quarter.

PRESEASON GAME NO. 2 - PACKERS 27, SEAHAWKS 24

RODGERS AND NO. 1 OFFENSE CONTINUE TO PRODUCE

It's hard to imagine quarterback Aaron Rodgers and the Green Bay Packers' No. 1 offense playing any sharper halfway through this preseason.

- ▶ Rodgers and his first unit looked seemingly unstoppable for the second week in a row as they scored two touchdowns in two possessions, getting the Packers off to a fast start in what became a 27-24 victory over the Seattle Seahawks on Saturday night at Qwest Field.
- ▶ Rodgers produced with both the quick strike and a long, methodical drive. He hit Greg Jennings on a 56-yard bomb on the Packers' first offensive play, leading to a 1-yard touchdown toss to John Kuhn just four snaps later.
- ▶ Then, he directed a 12-play, 76-yard drive that chewed up nearly seven minutes on the clock. His favorite target on the march was tight end Jermichael Finley, who caught three 12-yard passes, the last one a bullet over the middle on third down for a touchdown and a 14-7 lead as the first quarter concluded.
- ▶ "The line does a great job, and it starts with those guys up front," Rodgers said. "We were able to move the pocket a little bit, run the ball effectively when we had to, and keep the defense guessing. When they're guessing, we're going to strike."
- ▶ Finley also had a key third-down conversion on the opening drive, snagging a 12-yard completion on third-and-8 from the Seattle 13. Finley, whom Rodgers credited with running more detailed routes in his third year in the offense, finished with four catches for 48 yards in his one quarter of action.
- ▶ Rodgers finished 8-of-11 for 116 yards with the two scores. That puts his two-game preseason totals at 20-of-24 for 275 yards with three TDs for a QB rating of 154.0. A perfect rating is 158.3.
- ▶ "That just means that the way I'm seeing the game is how I want it to be going into the season," Rodgers said. "The checks I'm making at the line of scrimmage are the correct checks, I'm getting us in good situations, and accuracy wise I'm throwing the ball pretty well. But I think it really starts up front. When those guys give me time, we're tough to stop."
- ▶ For the second straight game, Rodgers wasn't sacked, and wasn't pressured much at all. The No. 1 offense has now scored four touchdowns in a little more than two quarters of play this month.
- ▶ Meanwhile, the first-string defense isn't quite there yet but it got off to a better start in this game than last week's, forcing a three-and-out on the opening possession.
- ▶ But Seattle scored touchdowns on its next two drives, the first one courtesy of a short field when Josh Wilson ran back a kickoff 54 yards to the Green Bay 49-yard line. Matt Hasselbeck's 11-yard TD pass to Deion Branch tied the game at 7.
- ▶ The Seahawks then tied it at 14 as well with an 80-yard drive, this one helped by two defensive penalties against a cornerback group minus Charles Woodson. A pass interference call on Tramon Williams counted for 14 yards and a third-down illegal contact foul on Pat Lee gave Seattle a first down. Leon Washington's 11-yard TD run off the left side capped the drive.
- ▶ "Defensively, we had a lot of great flashes out there," cornerback Brandon Underwood said. "But the big word I'm going to use tonight is consistency."



- ▶ Underwood was speaking about ups and downs for both himself and the unit as a whole, which did keep the Seahawks off the board on their final two possessions of the first half. Like last week, the defense played its base, nickel and dime packages without a lot of exotic looks, but it still doesn't like getting scored upon.
- ▶ "We know we can do it; it's just a matter of getting everything cleaned up," defensive end Cullen Jenkins said. "We're killing ourselves out there with some of the mistakes we're making. We know that's not like us, that's not how we play, and we've got to get it corrected."
- ▶ From there the game remained a close, back-and-forth affair the rest of the way. Backup quarterback Matt Flynn directed a field-goal drive against Seattle's No. 1 defense to give the Packers a 17-14 lead at half-time.
- ▶ Seattle then scored 10 straight points in the second half to go up 24-17, as quarterback Charlie Whitehurst drove the Seahawks 60 yards for a TD and 29 yards for a field goal following a sack/fumble of Flynn. That was the Packers' second turnover in their first three possessions of the second half, with Flynn also throwing an interception on a deflected pass. In addition, Flynn had to deal with starting two drives backed up to his own 1-yard line, so nothing came easy.
- ▶ Late turnovers for the defense helped the Packers rally to win. Linebacker Spencer Havner's interception inside the Green Bay 10-yard line turned away a golden opportunity for the Seahawks, who had recovered a fumbled kickoff by Sam Shields. Havner's big play led to a 51-yard field goal by Mason Crosby that was good with plenty of distance to spare, cutting the deficit

to 24-20 midway through the fourth quarter.

- ▶ No. 3 quarterback Graham Harrell then led the game-winning drive on the Packers' next possession. He hit rookie receiver Chastin West for 23 yards before running back Brandon Jackson, filling in for rookie Quinn Porter after Porter left with an ankle injury, broke off consecutive runs of 26 and 12 yards to get the ball in the end zone with 3:34 left.
- ▶ Finally, Shields redeemed himself by intercepting Whitehurst on Seattle's final drive when a pass deflected off tight end Anthony McCoy. That was the Packers' fourth interception through two preseason games, which they've coincidentally split in the won-loss column by identical 27-24 scores.
- ▶ "It's a good win," Head Coach Mike McCarthy said. "Anytime you win a football game, it's a positive for your football team, but we'll continue to work on the fundamental aspects of our blueprint for success: taking care of the football – we need to do a better job with that, even though we did a good job of taking it away – and making sure we win the field-position battle."

GAME NOTES

- ▶ Five of Green Bay's linebackers sat out the game, with Nick Barnett resting his surgically repaired knee and A.J. Hawk (ankle), Clay Matthews (hamstring), Alex Joseph (quad) and Brad Jones (shoulder) all sidelined. Also sitting out due to injury were RB Kregg Lumpkin (hamstring), and the three players on the PUP list – CB Al Harris (knee), S Atari Bigby (ankle) and RB James Starks (hamstring). A pair of veterans, WR Donald Driver and CB Charles Woodson, also sat out.



2010 TRAINING CAMP

LOTS OF FAMILIAR FACES

General Manager **Ted Thompson** continued his philosophy of building through the draft in the 2010 offseason, so much of the Packers' core remains intact.

- ▶ Thompson moved to keep that core together this offseason, re-signing veterans **Chad Clifton**, **Nick Collins**, **Ryan Pickett** and **Mark Tauscher** to contract extensions.
- ▶ Clifton and Tauscher have been mainstays on the offensive line since 2000, while Collins and Pickett were two integral parts of the new 3-4 defense in 2009.
- ▶ The return of those four players means 20 of 22 starters return from a team that made its second postseason berth in three seasons.
- ▶ Leaving in free agency was **Aaron Kampman**, one of the most productive pass rushers in team history. Having made the switch to outside linebacker last summer, Kampman tore his ACL on Nov. 22, which put rookie **Brad Jones** into the lineup.
- ▶ Jones went on to start eight games including playoffs, so some may view him as a 21st returning starter.
- ▶ The team will be without defensive end **Johnny Jolly**, who was suspended indefinitely by the NFL for violating the NFL Policy and Program for Substances of Abuse. Jolly's suspension began immediately in July and will continue through at least the 2010 season. He will be eligible to apply for reinstatement following Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ That continuity extends to the coaching staff, where the same group returns for 2010. There are some slight changes however, as **Chad Morton** will serve as special teams assistant while **Curtis Fuller** serves as coaching administrator.
- ▶ Also, **Mark Lovat**, beginning his 12th season with the Packers, takes over as strength and conditioning coordinator. **Dave Redding** and **Thadeus Jackson** will serve as assistants in the weight room.

MEET THE DRAFT PICKS

Training camp storylines always hover around new players and just how they figure into the depth chart. This summer, eyes will be on the seven new draft picks added to the club this past April.

- ▶ First-round pick **Bryan Bulaga**, the Big Ten Offensive Lineman of the Year in 2009, is viewed as the potential heir to veteran **Chad Clifton** as **Aaron Rodgers'** blind-side protector and has entered the left guard competition. He started 23 games at left tackle over his final two seasons and was an early-entry candidate into the 2010 NFL Draft.
- ▶ The Packers stayed in the Big Ten in Round 2 by selecting Purdue defensive tackle **Mike Neal**. A four-year letterman and two-year starter, he played in 46 career games (23 starts) and earned honorable mention All-Big Ten honors from the media as a senior. Neal will make the shift to defensive end in the Packers' 3-4 scheme.
- ▶ Third-round choice **Morgan Burnett** was another early-entry candidate and displayed his playmaking skills at safety in his three seasons at Georgia Tech. In 40 career games, including 28 starts, Burnett intercepted 14 passes, tied for second most in school history. He was elected team captain as a junior and led the team in interceptions each of his three seasons.
- ▶ In the fifth round the Packers again went back to the Big Ten and drafted Penn State tight end **Andrew Quarless**. He appeared in 49 career games, including 29 starts, and finished his career as the Nittany Lions' all-time leader in receptions by a tight end (87) and second in receiving yards by a tight end (1,146).
- ▶ Also in the fifth round the Packers drafted offensive lineman **Marshall Newhouse** from Texas Christian. He was a three-year starter at left tackle and appeared in 52 career games, including 38 starts. A first-team All-Mountain West Conference selection as a senior, Newhouse has seen action at tackle and guard on the left side.
- ▶ Running back **James Starks** came to Green Bay in the sixth round. Starks became the University at Buffalo's all-time leading rusher in just three seasons and holds school records for rushing touchdowns (34) and points scored (222). He missed all of 2009 with a shoulder injury and has been sidelined during camp thus far with a hamstring injury.
- ▶ The Packers selected **C.J. Wilson** from East Carolina in the seventh round. A three-year starter at defensive end, he tallied 192 tackles, including 45½ for loss, and 27 sacks. He earned first-team All-Conference USA honors each of his final two seasons.
- ▶ In addition to the seven draft picks, one must also pay close attention to the non-drafted free agents, as at least one seems to make the team each year. Members of the Packers who entered the NFL via the free-agent route include S **Atari Bigby**, RB **Ryan Grant**, TE **Spencer Havner**, DE **Cullen Jenkins** and CB **Tramon Williams**.

REST AND RECOVERY

In today's NFL, training camp is no longer a time to get in shape and learn new wrinkles in the playbook.

- ▶ Most of the roster was back for the offseason program, which began on March 15 and ran through the mandatory, three-day minicamp at the end of June. Beginning with dedicated workout sessions under the close watch of the strength and conditioning staff, activities returned to the playing field later in the spring during OTAs.
- ▶ With that offseason work in mind, Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** scheduled his camp with three Wednesdays off to help the players recuperate from the grind of training camp.
- ▶ Much like the regular season, players will not practice the day after preseason games or after the Family Night scrimmage. The Packers also received three Wednesdays off during camp, with the final one coming last week.
- ▶ On those Wednesdays the team gathered in the morning for weight lifting, film review and team meetings before having the afternoon and evening off. Each off day was followed by two practices in one day, including the final "two-a-day" of training camp on Aug. 19.

2010 TRAINING CAMP

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 90th NFL regular-season schedule – headlined by six nationally televised games – was released in late April.

- ▶ Though the 2010 opponents have been known since the end of last season, the arrival of the complete NFL schedule is a day circled on the calendar of all football fans.
- ▶ Green Bay will open the 2010 slate on the road at Philadelphia before kicking off the home schedule with the Buffalo Bills in Week 2.
- ▶ Its first prime-time appearance – against the rival Bears in Chicago on *Monday Night Football* – will come in Week 3. The NFL's oldest rivalry will be on display in prime time for a fifth straight season, with this first meeting of the year marking game No. 180 in the all-time series.
- ▶ 2010 marks the 18th consecutive season the Packers have appeared on *Monday Night Football*, the NFC's longest streak.
- ▶ Three games are slated for Sunday night on NBC, including home games against the Minnesota Vikings (Week 7) and Dallas Cowboys (Week 9). In Week 15, the Packers are scheduled to take on the Patriots on Sunday night in Foxborough, though the game is subject to the NFL's flex scheduling.
- ▶ The Packers will get their first look at the new stadium in New Jersey in Week 8 against the Jets, where they may experience some cool fall temperatures. While games at Lambeau Field later in the season always provide a home-field advantage for the Packers, the 2010 schedule is nearly void of cold-weather road games. After the Jets, three consecutive road contests will be played in domes (Minnesota, Atlanta, Detroit).
- ▶ That's good news for a Green Bay offense that seems to thrive in domes. Including playoffs, the Packers played in a dome five times last season, exceeding 400 total net yards in four of those games.
- ▶ A number of games on the Packers' 2010 schedule – namely those on national TV – are beginning to have a familiar feel. In addition to taking on the Bears for a fifth consecutive year in prime time, Green Bay will take on Minnesota in prime time for a third straight season. The Packers and Cowboys will meet on national TV for the fourth straight season.
- ▶ The schedule concludes with two home games for the first time since 2005. One of the NFL's best teams in regular-season games played in December and January, Green Bay may need to call upon that previous success for what could prove to be two very important contests surrounding the Christmas and New Year's holidays. Games against the Giants (Week 16) and Bears (Week 17) could determine not only the NFC North Division crown but conference playoff seeding.

2010 SCHEDULE NUGGETS

Green Bay's bye week comes in Week 10, the latest possible week for NFL teams. It marks the latest time in which the Packers have had a bye in franchise history, besting the Week 9 bye in 2004. The Packers will play nine games before the bye and seven after the open date.

- ▶ Three of four games before the bye come at Lambeau Field, while four of five games after the bye are road contests.
- ▶ Immediately following the bye comes an important division game against Minnesota, the first of three straight road games played in domes. Under McCarthy, the team has won three of four games after the bye week and 10 of its last 14 after the bye dating back further.
- ▶ Green Bay has always been a successful team after the bye and 2009 was no different, as the team compiled a 9-3 (.750) mark after the bye week. Since 2000, the team is 61-36 (.629) overall after the bye.
- ▶ Fifteen games are slated for Sunday, the most since 1993 (also 15).
- ▶ Seven of the final eight games are against NFC opponents.
- ▶ The Packers have six games on the schedule against 2009 playoff teams, beginning right away in Week 1 at Philadelphia. Beginning in Week 7 vs. Minnesota, Green Bay has a stretch of four straight games against playoff teams from a year ago. The team will travel east to take on the Jets in Week 8 and host the Cowboys in Week 9 before the bye. The stretch concludes in Minnesota in Week 11.
- ▶ The NFL's oldest rivalry will see a first in 2010. For the first time in series history, Green Bay will host Chicago in the regular-season finale, set to be game No. 181 between the Packers and Bears.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing at 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal.
- ▶ Head Coach Mike McCarthy stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 19-7 at home since 2007, a marked improvement over the prior three seasons (10-14 combined).
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top home W-L records since the '92 season:

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Seahawks in the regular-season home finale brought the stadium's consecutive sellouts streak to 285 games (269 regular season, 16 playoffs).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field will host its 54th season of football this year. A total of 565,666 fans made their way through the turnstiles in the eight home contests in 2009.
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

POSITION-BY-POSITION

BY THE NUMBERS

Nothing attracts more attention during training camp, both from fans and media, than positional battles. Here's a look at the Packers' current roster. Just a quick note – the first number is the number of players at that position currently on the roster, while the second is the number at the position during Week 1 last season.

Quarterback – 3 (2)

- In his first two years under center in Green Bay, **Aaron Rodgers** proved he was tough, durable and accurate. Now, after throwing for 4,434 yards and 30 touchdowns, he is considered among the game's best young players regardless of position. Still only 26 years old, the sky is the limit for Rodgers in his sixth NFL season.
- Behind Rodgers is third-year signal caller **Matt Flynn**, who saw his most extensive game action in 2009. Flynn has served as the No. 2 quarterback in each of his first two NFL seasons and will look to impress in preseason action after an injury kept him out of most game action last summer.
- Also at the position is first-year player **Graham Harrell**, who set numerous NCAA records including career TD passes and completions while at Texas Tech (2005-08).

Running back – 5 (3)

- **Ryan Grant**, one of only three players in team annals to post back-to-back 1,200-yard seasons, again serves as the lead back. He established career highs in rushing yards, rushing TDs and receiving yards in '09.
- Behind Grant is fourth-year pro **Brandon Jackson**. A capable backup, Jackson excelled on third down last season both in the screen game and in pass protection.
- The team has traditionally kept three running backs, so the trio of **Kregg Lumpkin**, **Quinn Porter** and **James Starks** will be a group to watch in August. Lumpkin made the 53-man roster in 2008 and spent last season on the practice squad.
- Starks and Porter serve as the newcomers to the group. A sixth-round draft pick in April, Starks became the University at Buffalo's all-time leader in rushing yards, rushing TDs and points scored in just three seasons. He missed all of 2009 due to a shoulder injury and has been sidelined during camp thus far due to a hamstring injury. Porter, a non-drafted free agent from Stillman College (Tuscaloosa, Ala.), could also get a chance to impress on punt and kickoff return.

Fullback – 3 (3)

- Last year the team kept three fullbacks, and all three return in 2010. Certainly this will be among the positions most watched when it comes down to the 53-man roster cutdown.
- Both **Korey Hall** and **John Kuhn** have extensive experience over the past three seasons. While both have made contributions on offense, they have served as standouts on the special teams coverage units.
- **Quinn Johnson** saw action in nine games as a rookie in 2009, and at 263 pounds, can bring a physical presence to the position.
- Special teams may be the ultimate factor at fullback. If each of the three can prove to be among the most indispensable on the cover and return units, it's clear the team is comfortable with keeping three on the roster.

Wide receiver – 10 (5)

- Veterans **Donald Driver** and **Greg Jennings** form a dangerous 1-2 combination on the outside. Jennings has topped the 1,000-yard mark each of the last two seasons, while Driver has topped the mark for six straight years and seven of the last eight.
- **James Jones** and **Jordy Nelson** both enjoyed solid campaigns in 2009 and help form great depth at the position. With so many multi-wideout formations, and an offense that puts up prolific numbers through the air, both players will have ample opportunities to produce.
- **Brett Swain** showed terrific skills on special teams before a knee injury ended his '09 season, and **Patrick Williams** spent four weeks on the active roster to end the year. **Jason Chery**, **Charles Dillon**, **Shawn Gore** and **Chastin West** will all look to make their mark in their first training camp in Green Bay.



Tight end – 5 (3)

- Tight end serves as one of the deepest positions on the team, which has to please Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, who often uses multiple tight end sets in the offensive scheme.
- **Jermichael Finley** won't sneak up on anyone this season as he has emerged as one of the bright young talents at his position. Blessed with rare size and speed, he is coming off a breakout season in 2009, including a franchise playoff-record 159 yards receiving in the Wild Card playoff.
- Veteran **Donald Lee** has recorded at least 35 receptions for three straight seasons and is a reliable target for Rodgers. Few 2009 storylines were better than the emergence of **Spencer Havner**, a converted linebacker and special-teams ace who caught four touchdowns.
- **Andrew Quarless**, a fifth-round draft choice this past April from Penn State, brings another big-bodied athlete to the group, while **Tom Crabtree** returns after finishing the year on the team's practice squad.

Offensive line – 14 (9)

- All five starters from a year ago return, but that doesn't mean there won't be competition along the line.
- Veterans **Chad Clifton** and **Mark Tauscher** both re-signed this off-season. The duo has held down the tackle spots since 2000. First-round pick **Bryan Bulaga** will get to learn from Clifton at left tackle while also entering the competition at left guard. Second-year man **T.J. Lang** will get a look at right tackle as well as inside. **Breno Giacomini** also will be in the mix at right tackle.
- Many eyes will be focused on the battle inside, where a number of players with starting experience are in competition. **Josh Sitton** is an emerging player at right guard, where he started all 16 games in 2009. **Jason Spitz** returns from a back injury that sidelined him for nearly all of 2009 and could compete with veterans **Daryn Colledge** (left guard) and **Scott Wells** (center) for a spot in the lineup.
- Also competing along the inside are fourth-year man **Allen Barbre**, second-year pro **Evan Dietrich-Smith** and fifth-round draft choice **Marshall Newhouse**. Rookie free agents **Chris Campbell** (tackle) and **Nick McDonald** (guard) will also look to compete for a roster spot.

POSITION-BY-POSITION

Defensive end – 7 (4)

- One of the more intriguing position groups in training camp, the defensive end group will be led by veterans **Cullen Jenkins** and **Ryan Pickett**. Jenkins started all 16 games last season in the new defense, finished second on the club with 4.5 sacks, and provided stellar run support that helped the Packers finish No. 1 against the run. Pickett, a nose tackle last year, made the switch to end this offseason. No matter where he has played, be it a 4-3 defensive tackle or 3-4 nose, Pickett has excelled as a space eater and run stopper. Given his experience at the nose position last year, he can also play inside if needed.
- **Justin Harrell** and **Jarius Wynn** have a chance to be in the rotation. Wynn saw action in 11 games as a rookie in 2009, while Harrell missed all of last season with a back injury. Also, **Ronald Talley**, who spent last year on the practice squad, will be in the mix.
- Two players who have the chance to make an early impact at end are rookie draft picks **Mike Neal** (second round) and **C.J. Wilson** (seventh round). Neal was a two-year starter at defensive tackle for Purdue, while Wilson earned first-team all-conference accolades his final two seasons at East Carolina. How quickly each grasps a new position and the playbook will determine his ability to make an early impact.

Nose tackle – 2 (2)

- The Packers kept only first-round pick **B.J. Raji** and Pickett last season, so those trying to figure out where the Packers go with the 53-man roster will be paying close attention to this position.
- Raji enters camp as the starter after flashing as a rookie a year ago. While injuries slowed his performance out of the gate, he became a solid contributor along the line toward the end of the season, showing his potential in both run and pass defense. Most of his first season was spent at either end position or as a down lineman in the nickel package, but he was repped extensively at the nose this offseason.
- **Anthony Toribio** has spent time on the team's practice squad each of the last two seasons and is familiar with the scheme.

Linebacker – 12 (9)

- This position undergoes far less transition than it did one year ago. Last season, the team kept nine linebackers, five of whom played outside and four of whom were in the middle.
- Three of those inside linebackers return and make up what is one of the deeper positions on the team. **Nick Barnett**, **Desmond Bishop** and **A.J. Hawk** all saw significant playing time in both base and sub packages. Barnett and Hawk served as the two in base, while defensive coordinator **Dom Capers** came up with packages such as 'Big Okie' and 'Psycho' to get Bishop and Chillar on the field.
- On the outside, the team will depend upon second-year pro **Clay Matthews** and veteran **Brandon Chillar**, who has been lining up at right outside linebacker this preseason after working on the inside last year. Matthews surpassed expectations in collecting his first Pro Bowl appearance and a double-digit sack season. Chillar has been the team's primary cover man at LB over the past two seasons, and also has pass-rushing ability.
- Rookie free agent **Alex Joseph** (Temple) and first-year players **Robert Francois** and **Maurice Simpkins** will look to make their mark at one of the inside linebacker spots, while a host of players led by veteran **Brady Poppinga** and second-year man **Brad Jones** will compete for time at outside linebacker. Poppinga, heading into his sixth NFL season, is the most experienced of the group. Jones, who was forced into the lineup as a rookie because of injuries, collected four sacks over the final five regular-season games and remained a contributor on special teams.
- Second-year man **Cyril Obiozor** spent the entire season with the club last year, first on the practice squad and then on the active roster for the final five regular-season games and an appearance in the playoffs. Non-drafted free agent **Frank Zombo** (Central Michigan) also has an opportunity to make an impression as a backup on the outside.

Cornerback – 8 (6)

- All **Charles Woodson** did last season was have one of the most dominating seasons ever at his position, justly taking home NFL Defensive Player of the Year honors to become the first cornerback to do so since Deion Sanders in 1994.
- Used a number of different ways by Capers because of his intelligence and innate abilities, the Packers will look for Woodson to continue to cause havoc all over the field.
- Woodson's partner at the position, **Al Harris**, is coming off ACL surgery after suffering the injury Nov. 22. Though he has been held out of drills to this point in camp, it would be unwise to count out Harris, a player who overcame long odds before ascending to a Pro Bowl level.
- **Tramon Williams** has continued to get better, and the fourth-year pro will be counted on heavily as Harris returns to action. He has ample experience, with 48 games and 20 starts already under his belt.
- **Pat Lee** and **Brandon Underwood** are two players who will be watched closely during camp. Lee, a second-round pick in 2008, has been limited to five games in two seasons after dealing with injuries, while Underwood played in 11 games last season as a rookie. Both could work their way into the nickel and dime defense with a good camp.
- **Jarrett Bush** remains one of the team's best special teams players and saw extended action from scrimmage last season. Young players **D.J. Clark** and **Sam Shields** also will get an opportunity in their first training camp in Green Bay.

Safety – 7 (4)

- Securing back-to-back Pro Bowl berths has solidified **Nick Collins'** status as one of the game's best at his position. Opposite Collins, however, will be where most of the focus is in the back end.
- **Atari Bigby** notched 11 starts in '09, but has been sidelined during training camp due to an ankle injury that required surgery on Aug. 6. Bigby's absence has given the coaches a look at third-round pick **Morgan Burnett**, an early-entry candidate who led Georgia Tech in interceptions each of his three seasons.
- Adding to the intrigue at the position are candidates such as **Will Blackmon**, the team's primary return man who is making the switch from corner and is coming off ACL surgery, and **Derrick Martin**, one of the club's finest special teams players. Veteran **Charlie Peprah** and rookie free agent **Anthony Levine** will be in contention for a backup spot as well.

Specialists – 4 (3)

- Though no specialist job in the NFL could ever be deemed secure, kicker **Mason Crosby** and long snapper **Brett Goode** are the only players at their respective positions on the roster. Solid performances in camp and in preseason action should earn each a roster spot.
- The team knows it will have a new punter in 2010, as **Chris Bryan** and **Tim Masthay** are competing this month for those duties. Masthay spent last summer with the Indianapolis Colts, while Bryan, a former Australian rules football player, is seeing his first game action.

PACKERS STARTERS - OFFENSE

WR Greg Jennings, 5-11, 198, 5th Year, Western Michigan

- One of just five receivers in team history to post back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons.
- Leads the NFL with 21 catches of 40-plus yards over the past three seasons, and his career 34.2-yard average per TD reception is tops among active players.
- Has caught a pass in 58 of 59 games played for the Packers (61 of 62 including playoffs).

LT Chad Clifton, 6-5, 320, 11th Year, Tennessee

- Has blocked for five of the top eight single-season rushers in team history, and has helped pave the way for a 1,000-yard rusher in eight of his 10 seasons in Green Bay.
- Has started 106 of 112 games (112 of 118 including playoffs) at LT since returning to the field in 2003 from the serious pelvic injury that ended his '02 season.
- As an unrestricted free agent, re-signed with the team in early March for an 11th season in which he could play in his 150th regular-season game with Green Bay, a mark reached by only 18 others in team history.

LG Daryn Colledge, 6-4, 308, 5th Year, Boise State

- Has shown his durability by never missing a game in the NFL or in college, a combined total of 116 games (119 including playoffs).
- Played 97.4 percent of the offensive snaps in 2009, second on the team for any player on either side of the ball behind fellow G Josh Sitton. In 2008, joined Jason Spitz as the only offensive players to play every snap.
- Named Packers' 2009 Walter Payton Man of the Year, the only league award that recognizes player off-the-field community service as well as playing excellence.

C Scott Wells, 6-2, 300, 7th Year, Tennessee

- Began 2009 season as backup at center but reclaimed starting role early due to injury reshuffling and didn't relinquish it.
- Has played in 79 games with 68 starts during his first six seasons in Green Bay, with 56 starts at center the past four seasons.
- A key blocker in Ryan Grant's back-to-back 1,200-yard rushing seasons, making Grant only the third running back in team history to accomplish that feat.

RG Josh Sitton, 6-3, 318, 3rd Year, Central Florida

- Was the only Packers offensive lineman to open every game at one position in 2009. Also played all 1,093 snaps on offense, the only player on either side of the ball to not miss a snap with his unit.
- Known best for his run blocking, was a key cog in Ryan Grant's career-best 1,253-yard season in 2009, the sixth-best single-season rushing total in franchise annals.
- Was slated to start at RG as a rookie in 2008 if not for a preseason knee injury. Went on to play in 11 games with two starts.

RT Mark Tauscher, 6-3, 320, 11th Year, Wisconsin

- Was out of football for the first half of the 2009 season after the second season-ending knee injury of his career came in the final month of '08, but re-signed Oct. 12 and went on to start eight games in '09.
- Helped solidify the line during the second half of the year, as the offense allowed only 10 sacks over the final seven games after allowing 41 in the first nine.
- Originally a seventh-round selection by the Packers in 2000, has gone on to play in 130 games with 128 starts during his career.

TE Jermichael Finley, 6-5, 247, 3rd Year, Texas

- Posted second-most catches in a single season by a Green Bay tight end (55) and fifth-most yards (676) despite missing three games with a knee injury.
- Finished season with Green Bay playoff-record 159 receiving yards in NFC Wild Card loss at Arizona, the second-most productive game by a TE in NFL postseason history behind San Diego's Kellen Winslow (166 yards, Jan. 2, 1982, vs. Miami).
- Upon returning from knee injury in Week 11, ranked third in the league among tight ends with 37 receptions, trailing only Dallas' Jason Witten (45) and Atlanta's Tony Gonzalez (39).

WR Donald Driver, 6-0, 194, 12th Year, Alcorn State

- Ranks first on the franchise's all-time list for receptions with 647 and ranks second in team history with 9,050 career yards, trailing only James Lofton (9,656).
- Extended two team records in 2009 with his seventh 1,000-yard season and sixth straight. Indianapolis' Reggie Wayne is the only player in the NFL to have a 1,000-yard season each of the last six years (2004-09).
- Enters 2010 with a streak of 127 games with at least one reception (133 including postseason), the longest streak in franchise history.
- Signed two-year contract extension with the team through 2012 on Aug. 6.

QB Aaron Rodgers, 6-2, 225, 6th Year, California

- Became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw for 4,000 yards in each of his first two seasons as a starter.
- In 2009, nearly broke the franchise's single-season record with 4,434 passing yards, falling just short of Lynn Dickey's mark of 4,458 in 1984 on the way to his first Pro Bowl selection.
- In 32 regular-season starts, has posted nine 300-yard passing games, 19 games without an interception and 18 with a 100-plus passer rating.

RB Ryan Grant, 6-1, 222, 4th Year, Notre Dame

- Has topped 1,200 rushing yards in each of the last two seasons, only the third Green Bay back to do so in consecutive years (Ahman Green, 2001-03; Jim Taylor, 1961-62) and one of only four RBs in the NFL to do so in 2008-09 (Adrian Peterson, Thomas Jones, Chris Johnson).
- Since taking over as the feature back in Week 8 at Denver in 2007, has rushed for 3,385 yards, the second most in the NFL over that span behind only Peterson (3,814).
- Has a career-long streak of 291 carries without a fumble, which ranks No. 1 in the NFL among current streaks.

FB Korey Hall, 6-0, 236, 4th Year, Boise State

- Converted from linebacker to fullback upon arriving in Green Bay as a sixth-round pick in 2007, playing in 36 games with 20 starts over his first three seasons.
- Helped clear the way for RB Ryan Grant to post back-to-back 1,200-yard seasons, making Grant just the third back in team annals to accomplish the feat.
- Has posted 37 special teams tackles from 2007-09, third most on the team over that span.

2009 OFFENSE - TEAM NOTES

- Posted franchise-record 461 points, topping the mark of 456 set by the 1996 Super Bowl champion Packers.
- Led the league with just 16 giveaways, the fewest in franchise history, surpassing the previous low of 19 in 1972.
- Finished with 6,065 total net yards, the third-best mark in team history behind only the 6,357 yards in 2004 and the 6,172 in 1983.
- Became first team in NFL history to have a 4,000-yard passer (Rodgers), two 1,000-yard receivers (Driver and Jennings) and a 1,200-yard rusher (Grant) in back-to-back seasons.
- Led the NFL in time-of-possession average at 33:03, the best mark in team history since stat began to be recorded in 1977.
- Outscored opponents by 164 points, good for the No. 2 scoring differential in the league behind only New Orleans (plus-169).
- Had six different players (Driver, Jennings, J. Jones, Nelson, Finley, Havner) post 45-yard receptions, which matched the franchise record set in 1951 and 1983.

PACKERS STARTERS - DEFENSE

LDE Ryan Pickett, 6-2, 340, 10th Year, Ohio State

- Key component of Packers' No. 1-ranked rushing defense in 2009 (franchise-record 83.3 yards allowed per game), the first time in team history that Green Bay led the league in that category.
- Has played in 134 of a possible 144 regular-season games during his nine-year career, missing just five contests due to injury.
- Signed four-year contract extension with the team through 2013 in March, and made the move from NT to LDE this offseason.

NT B.J. Raji, 6-2, 337, 2nd Year, Boston College

- Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team, the first Packers defensive lineman to be selected since DE Vonnie Holliday in 1998.
- Played in 14 games with one start as a rookie in 2009, seeing most of his time at both end spots and as a down lineman in the nickel package, but is taking over starting nose tackle spot this season.
- Part of top-ranked rushing defense in the NFL (team-record 83.3 yards allowed per game).

RDE Cullen Jenkins, 6-2, 305, 7th Year, Central Michigan

- Started all 16 games for the first time in his career in 2009, and posted career highs in both tackles (50) and forced fumbles (three).
- One of only eight NFL defensive linemen to post at least 50 tackles, four sacks and three forced fumbles in 2009.
- Batted down nine passes in 2007, at the time the most by a Packers defensive lineman since the team began recording the statistic in 1980. Teammate Johnny Jolly eclipsed the mark in 2009 with 11.

LOLB Clay Matthews, 6-3, 255, 2nd Year, Southen California

- Set a Packers rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009 on his way to earning Pro Bowl honors, the first Green Bay rookie to be named to the all-star game since WR James Lofton in 1978.
- Selected to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team, earned 'Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Week' honors twice (Weeks 6 and 10), and was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week once (Week 13).
- Has been sidelined during camp since injuring hamstring in annual Family Night scrimmage on Aug. 7.

BLB A.J. Hawk, 6-1, 247, 5th Year, Ohio State

- Has either led the team or finished second in tackles each of his four seasons in Green Bay.
- One of only 10 NFL linebackers to record at least 85 tackles, two interceptions and a sack in 2009.
- Hasn't missed a game in his career, playing in all 64 games with 62 starts, with the only non-starts coming in both Minnesota games in 2009 when the Packers opened in their nickel defense.

MLB Nick Barnett, 6-2, 236, 8th Year, Oregon State

- Ranks third in franchise annals (stat kept since 1975) with 986 career tackles, trailing only John Anderson (1,020) and Johnnie Gray (1,001).
- In 2009, led the team in tackles (122) for the fifth time in his career, a franchise record.
- Has surpassed the 120-tackle total in every season besides 2008, when he missed the final seven games with a torn ACL.

ROLB Brandon Chillar, 6-3, 237, 7th Year, UCLA

- His 13 passes defended over the past two seasons are the most by a Packers linebacker.
- Made the move to outside linebacker early in training camp after working on the inside last season.
- Played for St. Louis from 2004-07 before signing with the Packers as an unrestricted free agent in '08, and has played in 89 games with 52 starts during his career.

LCB Charles Woodson, 6-1, 202, 13th Year, Michigan

- Named NFL Defensive Player of the Year by *The Associated Press* last season, becoming only the second Packer to win the award (DE Reggie White, 1998) and the oldest defensive back to earn the honor.
- Earned his sixth Pro Bowl bid in '09 by posting career-high nine interceptions, and earned NFC Defensive Player of the Month honors three times. Became first defensive player in the NFL to win a monthly award three times in the same season.
- Holds the franchise record with eight defensive TDs (seven INTs, one fumble return), eclipsing CB Herb Adderley and S Darren Sharper in 2009 (seven each) for the team mark.

RCB Tramon Williams, 5-11, 191, 4th Year, Louisiana Tech

- Led the team with a career-high 22 passes defended in 2009, and added a career-best 11 tackles on special teams.
- Is the only non-drafted free agent in the NFL to post four or more interceptions each of the last two seasons.
- In 2009, became the first player in franchise history to post a 65-yard interception return (67 vs. Chicago, Sept. 13) and a 45-yard punt return (45 vs. Detroit, Oct. 18) in the same season.

SS Morgan Burnett, 6-1, 209, Rookie, Georgia Tech

- Has worked with the No. 1 defense throughout camp with incumbent starting SS Atari Bigby sidelined with an ankle injury that required surgery on Aug. 6.
- Could become only the second Packers rookie safety since Chuck Cecil in 1988 to start a regular-season opener (Nick Collins in 2005 was the other).
- A third-round pick that the Packers moved up 15 spots to select, Burnett intercepted 14 passes in just three seasons at Georgia Tech, two shy of the school's career record.

FS Nick Collins, 5-11, 207, 6th Year, Bethune-Cookman

- Selected to the Pro Bowl for the second straight season in 2009, becoming the first Packers safety to earn the honor in back-to-back seasons since LeRoy Butler (1996-98).
- Leads all NFL safeties with 13 interceptions since 2008, and leads the league with 405 interception return yards over that span.
- Returned three INTs for TDs in 2008, becoming the first NFL safety to do so since Kansas City's Lloyd Burruss in 1986. His 295 INT return yards in '08 led the NFL and broke the franchise record (Bobby Dillon, 244 in 1956).

2009 DEFENSE - TEAM NOTES

- Led the NFL in rushing defense (a franchise-record 83.3 yards per game), the first time in team history that the Packers had the top run defense in the league.
- Finished season as the No. 2 overall defense, the highest ranking since the 1996 Packers finished as the No. 1 defense.
- Moved up 25 spots in the league rushing defense rankings from 2008, the biggest one-year improvement in the history of the franchise.
- Led the league with 40 takeaways and led the NFL with 30 interceptions, the first time the Packers led the league in interceptions since 1965 (tied with Washington for No. 1 that season with 27).
- Held opponents to less than 90 net yards rushing in 12 games, breaking the previous franchise record of 11 games set in 1996.
- Posted 141 points off of takeaways, tied for the No. 1 ranking in the league with New Orleans.
