PACKERS TRAVEL TO PHILADELPHIA FOR SEASON OPENER

Green Bay kicks off its 92nd season in team history – and 90th as a member of the National Football League – at Philadelphia on Sunday afternoon.

▶ The Packers open up the season against the Eagles for the sixth time in franchise history but for the first time in Philadelphia. The Packers are 4-1 in previous openers against Philadelphia, with matchups in 1934, 1940, 1968, 1991 and 2007. In the '07 opener, Green Bay beat Philadelphia, 16-13, on rookie Mason Crosby's 42-yard field goal with two seconds remaining.

▶ Opening the season on the road has been a rare occurrence for the Packers. Since 1986, 21 of Green Bay's season openers have been at Lambeau Field, making Sunday's game just the fourth time in the past 25 years that the Packers have gone on the road to begin a season.

▶ Sunday's contest will be the first time during Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** tenure that the Packers have started their season away from Lambeau Field. The last time Green Bay started a season on the road was at Detroit in 2005.

▶ Even though it has become accustomed to opening at home, Green Bay has started fast on the road under McCarthy. The team is 4-0 in its first road contest of the season under him, and 5-2 (.714) in September road contests during his tenure.

▶ Green Bay enters Sunday's contest having won three straight season openers, making the Packers one of only five teams in the NFL to accomplish that feat. Dallas, Denver, New England and Pittsburgh have also won their season openers each of the past three years.

▶ The last time the Packers won three or more consecutive season openers came from 1996-99.

▶ Sunday's game is a matchup of two of the most successful teams in the league over the past decade. Since 2000, the Eagles have a regular-season record of 103-56-1 (.647), which is tied for third in the NFL and first in the NFC. The Packers have posted a mark of 95-65-0 (.594) over that span, good for fifth in the NFL and second in the NFC.

▶ There have been only two seasons (1999, 2005) since 1992 that didn't include either the Packers or the Eagles in the playoffs. Since realignment in 2002, the Eagles lead the NFC with six playoff berths, while the Packers are tied for second in the conference with five appearances.

▶ Sunday's contest is the 37th time that the Packers and Eagles have squared off in the regular season, with Green Bay holding a 23-13 advantage in the series.

▶ This year marks the 50th anniversary of the most famous matchup between the teams. On Dec. 26, 1960, Philadelphia beat Green Bay, 17-13, in the NFL Championship Game at Franklin Field.

▶ Green Bay couldn't hold a 13-10 fourth-quarter lead, with Eagles RB Ted Dean scoring the game-winning TD with just over five minutes remaining. The Packers drove to the Eagles' 22 on their final possession, but Philadelphia LB Chuck Bednarik stopped Green Bay FB Jim Taylor at the 8 as time expired.

▶ It was the only time Vince Lombardi lost a postseason game, and the legendary coach went on to lead the Packers to nine straight playoff wins after the loss in Philadelphia.



WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports, now in its 17th season as an NFL network television partner, will broadcast the game to the majority of the country.

▶ Play-by-play man **Joe Buck** and color analyst **Troy Aikman** will have the call from the broadcast booth with **Pam Oliver** serving as the sideline reporter.

▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 53-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The duo enters its 12th season of broadcasts together across the Packers Radio Network, which covers 43 markets in five states.

▶ For out-of-town listeners, the broadcast is available to NFL Field Pass subscribers on www.packers.com as well as on Sirius Satellite Radio (channel 123 WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.

▶ DIRECTV subscribers can watch the game in HD on channel 713.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

A LOOK AT THE 53

Faced with some of the toughest cuts of his tenure, General Manager **Ted Thompson** and the football operations staff finalized the opening-day roster this past weekend.

- ▶ It's a balanced roster for Green Bay, which holds 26 offensive players, 24 defensive players and three specialists.
- ▶ Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 36 of them (67.9 percent) were drafted by the Packers, and 39 of them (73.6 percent) played in a game for the Packers in 2009.
- ▶ Six of the team's seven draft picks from 2010 made the 53-man roster. The only one that didn't, sixth-round RB **James Starks**, is on the reserve/physically unable to perform list due to a hamstring injury. Three non-drafted free agents (G **Nick McDonald**, CB **Sam Shields** and LB **Frank Zombo**) also made the final roster.
- ▶ 11 players on the team have yet to play in an NFL regular-season game. The list is comprised of the nine rookies and two first-year players (P **Tim Masthay** and TE **Tom Crabtree**).
- ▶ The breakdown by position is fairly consistent with last year's opening-day roster. The Packers kept one more offensive lineman and one more tight end with one fewer running back and one fewer linebacker on the final 53.

PRESEASON MOMENTUM

Last year during the preseason, Green Bay's No. 1 offense put together a string of impressive performances that it carried over into the regular season. With another strong preseason this year, the offense looks to do the same again in 2010.

- ▶ In a little more than four quarters of work this preseason, the No. 1 offense scored seven touchdowns, with all seven of those drives 70 or more yards in length.
- ▶ The first offensive unit put together several long scoring drives, but it didn't take them much time to find the end zone. Of the seven touchdown drives, four of them were three minutes or less. Green Bay's No. 1 offense had an average drive time of just 3:41 on its seven touchdowns.
- ▶ Leading the way was QB **Aaron Rodgers**, who ranked No. 1 in the NFL during the preseason with a 141.2 passer rating. Rodgers completed 41-of-53 passes (77.4 percent) for 470 yards and a league-leading six TDs with no INTs.
- ▶ Rodgers' performance in the first three contests mirrored what he did during the 2009 preseason, when he posted a 147.9 passer rating on 29-of-41 passing (70.7 percent) for 465 yards and six TDs with no INTs. The No. 1 offense scored nine TDs and a FG on 13 possessions during the '09 preseason.
- ▶ Over the last two preseasons, Rodgers connected on 70-of-94 attempts (74.5 percent) for 935 yards, 12 TDs and no INTs for a 145.2 passer rating.
- ▶ Rodgers' favorite target this preseason was third-year TE **Jermichael Finley**, who led the team and tied for the NFL lead among tight ends with 12 receptions for 163 yards (13.6 avg.) and two TDs. Finley caught six passes for 85 yards (14.2 avg.) and a TD in just a half of work against Indianapolis in the third preseason contest.
- ▶ Credit must be given to the Packers' offensive line, as it didn't allow a sack of Rodgers in the three preseason games he played in. The No. 1 line didn't yield a single sack in the 2009 preseason on Rodgers' 41 attempts, and is made up of the same five players that started the final seven games in 2009.



- ▶ Green Bay's offense as a whole was productive this preseason, ranking first in the league at 406.0 yards per game with an average of 296.0 yards passing per contest, also first in the NFL. The Packers also led the league with 106 first downs and 123 points in the preseason.

RETURNING TO HEALTH

While the offense can credit some of its preseason success to the stability in the starting lineup each week, it was a different story for Green Bay's defense during the preseason.

- ▶ Of the 11 projected starters for Week 1, only five played in each of the preseason games. The starting outside linebackers, **Clay Matthews** (hamstring) and **Brad Jones** (shoulder), missed four games and three games, respectively. DE **Cullen Jenkins** missed the final two games with a calf injury, inside linebackers **Nick Barnett** (knee) and **A.J. Hawk** (ankle) sat out games, while CB **Charles Woodson** rested for both road contests.
- ▶ Matthews and Jones both returned to practice as full participants on Monday with Jenkins expected to return to the practice field either Wednesday or Thursday, so the Packers should have their full comple-

ment of defensive players for the season opener against an Eagles offense led by new starting QB Kevin Kolb.

▶ "We'll exercise a full game plan for Philadelphia," Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** said. "We will not play with any restrictions as far as volume or creativity. We trust the players that are coming back off of injury and we feel it is important to have quality preparation throughout the week and get ourselves ready to play at the level we are capable of playing."

▶ "Injuries are a part of the game. We had more than usual in the preseason for the defensive side of it, but it's also the way the game goes in the NFL. I'm not concerned about it. I think it's really

just part of the path that is created in this league."

- ▶ With veteran CB **Al Harris** out for at least the first six games as he continues his rehab from a major knee injury sustained in Week 11 last season, fourth-year CB **Tramon Williams** moves into the starting lineup on the right side. Second-year CB **Brandon Underwood**, who appeared to be the leading candidate to take over Williams' nickel role, has been out since injuring his shoulder in the third preseason contest vs. Indianapolis. McCarthy said the team will take the week of practice before deciding on a nickel back if Underwood is out, with rookie CB **Sam Shields** in contention to fill that spot.
- ▶ One area that remained a constant from last year during the preseason was the Packers' stout run defense, with Green Bay allowing opponents an average of just 80.3 yards per game on the ground in the first three preseason contests. The No. 1 defense played just one series in the preseason finale at Kansas City.
- ▶ The defense held each of its first three opponents to under 100 yards rushing, and allowed only one 15-plus yard run by a back in those three contests.

AHEAD THIS WEEK

After a shells practice Monday, the team will settle into its "in-season" schedule.

- ▶ Players will have the normal Tuesday off, followed by practice on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday. The team will gather in the morning Saturday for meetings and a walk-through before departing for Philadelphia in the afternoon.

MIKE MCCARTHY...Is in fifth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Has led his team to the playoffs two of the past three years.
- ▶ One of only two coaches, along with New Orleans' Sean Payton, to have his offense ranked in the top 10 in total yardage each of the last four years.
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Honored as the 2007 Motorola NFL Coach of the Year and NFL Alumni Coach of the Year.
- ▶ Became the first Packers coach since Vince Lombardi to lead the team to a championship game in his second season.

ANDY REID...Is in 12th year as the Eagles' 21st head coach.

- ▶ Has compiled the highest win total (118), winning percentage (.611) and playoff victory total (10) in team history.
- ▶ Has captured five division titles and advanced to the NFC Championship Game five times, reaching the Super Bowl once (2004).
- ▶ Is the second-longest tenured head coach in the NFL behind Tennessee's Jeff Fisher.
- ▶ Is one of only five active coaches to reach 100 career wins, and ranks second in winning percentage among all who have coached at least 100 games, behind only New England's Bill Belichick.

THE PACKERS-EAGLES SERIES

- ▶ The clubs first met in 1933, the Eagles' inaugural year in the NFL.
- ▶ Prior to the Packers' 2007 win, the Eagles had won five straight meetings, including a 20-17 overtime decision in the 2003 NFC Divisional playoffs.
- ▶ Philadelphia was the only team to defeat Vince Lombardi in a postseason game. The Eagles edged the Packers, 17-13, at Franklin Field for the 1960 NFL championship. The legendary coach won nine straight playoff games after that loss.
- ▶ Before that 1960 game, the Packers had won 13 of the teams' first 14 meetings, including the first nine in a row (1933-46).
- ▶ Both teams have enjoyed the homefield advantage recently in the series. Green Bay has won four of the last five at Lambeau Field, while Philadelphia has won the last nine contests played in the City of Brotherly Love.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

In Green Bay, Andy Reid was a TE/O-line asst. coach from 1992-96 and QB coach from 1997-98. The following year, when he became the Eagles' head coach in 1999, he was replaced as Green Bay's QB coach

by Mike McCarthy...Packers DL coach Mike Trgovac held the same post with the Eagles for four seasons (1995-98)...The Packers acquired CB Al Harris and the Eagles' fourth-round pick in 2003 for Green Bay's second-round selection in the same draft...Three Philadelphia assistant coaches spent time on Green Bay's staff: asst. head coach/off. coord. Marty Mornhinweg (1995-96), senior asst./DB coach Dick Jauron (1986-94) and head strength & conditioning coach Barry Rubin (1999-2005)...Eagles offensive quality control coach Doug Pederson is a former Packers QB who backed up Brett Favre from 1996-98 and 2001-04...Eagles asst. LB coach Mike Caldwell, as a pro LB, was a teammate of Packers LB Clay Matthews' father with the Browns in 1993, the elder Matthews' final season in Cleveland. He also played for Carolina's defense in 2003, Trgovac's first season as def. coord. there...Eagles special teams quality control coach Jeff Nixon coached at Shippensburg when Packers RB John Kuhn played there...Packers off. coord. Joe Philbin spent four years coaching at Allegheny College (Pa.)...Eagles LB Stewart Bradley and Packers RB Brandon Jackson were teammates at Nebraska and were drafted 24 spots apart in 2007 (Jackson 63rd overall, Bradley 87th)...Eagles CB Asante Samuel and Packers S Atari Bigby played in the same defensive backfield for two years at Central Florida (2001-02), while Eagles S Kurt Coleman and Packers CB Brandon Underwood were both reserve DBs at Ohio State in 2006...Other former college teammates include Eagles DT Antonio Dixon and Packers CB Sam Shields (Miami), Eagles T King Dunlap and Packers CB Pat Lee (Auburn), Eagles LB Omar Gaither and Packers C Scott Wells (Tennessee), Eagles T Winston Justice and Packers LB Clay Matthews (USC), Eagles CB Trevard Lindlay and Packers P Tim Masthay (Kentucky), Eagles S Quintin Mikell and Packers G Daryn Colledge (Boise State), and Eagles T Jason Peters and Packers LS Brett Goode (Arkansas).

INDIVIDUALLY VS. EAGLES

While playing for St. Louis, DE Ryan Pickett had the first of his three career-best 12-tackle games at Philadelphia on Dec. 1, 2002...In seven career games against the Eagles, including playoffs, WR Donald Driver has 23 receptions for 292 yards...In three games, including playoffs, LB Nick Barnett has 29 tackles (24 solo), two fumble recoveries and one interception vs. the Eagles...WR Greg Jennings had five catches for 86 yards in the 2006 meeting...In the '07 encounter, RB Brandon Jackson totaled 75 yards from scrimmage (15 rushes for 40 yards, four receptions for 35 yards).

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

- Sept. 9, 2007, at Lambeau Field; Packers won, 16-13.
- ▶ The Packers won without scoring an offensive TD, taking advantage of two muffed punts by the Eagles to account for 10 points.
 - ▶ On the first, LB Tracy White recovered Greg Lewis' fumbled punt for a TD less than 2 minutes into the game. Then J.R. Reed bobbed a punt with 59 seconds remaining in the game, and CB Jarrett Bush recovered to set up K Mason Crosby's game-winning 42-yard FG with two seconds left.
 - ▶ Crosby also had a 53-yard FG in the first quarter for his first NFL points. He became the first player in NFL history to kick a 50-plus-yard FG and a game-winning FG in the final minute of his first game.
 - ▶ RB Brian Westbrook totaled 131 yards from scrimmage for Philadelphia (85 rush, 46 rec.) while WR Jason Avant had a 9-yard TD catch.

LAST MEETING, IN PHILADELPHIA

- Oct. 2, 2006, at Lincoln Financial Field; Eagles won, 31-9.
- ▶ In the third quarter with the Eagles clinging to a 10-9 lead, QB Donovan McNabb hit WR Greg Lewis on TD passes of 45 and 30 yards just one minute, 17 seconds apart.
 - ▶ McNabb's fourth-quarter TD run, his second of the game, sealed the *Monday Night Football* victory for Philadelphia.
 - ▶ Green Bay K Dave Rayner hit three field goals in the contest, including a 54-yarder that tied a franchise record.
 - ▶ The Packers dropped their ninth straight game in Philadelphia, a streak that began in 1974. The Packers last defeated the Eagles in Philadelphia in 1962, 49-0, under head coach Vince Lombardi.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

THE STORY OF THE '09 PACKERS

The story of the Green Bay Packers began Aug. 1 as a standing-room only crowd gathered for the unveiling of the new Ray Nitschke Field and the first day of training camp practice. Like their passionate fan base, the Packers were eager to erase the memories of 2008 and return to their place among playoff contenders in the NFC.

- ▶ A quick start in preseason action built buzz around the team as the regular season approached, and a fantastic finish in Week 1 over the rival Bears kicked off the 2009 campaign with a bang.
- ▶ A second loss to Minnesota put the team at 4-3 heading into Tampa in Week 9. A 10-point loss to the previously winless Buccaneers left the Packers at 4-4 at the midway point, with a number of tough games still looming ahead on the schedule.
- ▶ Green Bay showed its ability to bounce back from adversity the following week against Dallas in a pivotal NFC matchup. A fantastic defensive effort kept Dallas out of the end zone until the waning moments of the game and helped springboard the team to a five-game win streak that put it back into the NFC playoff picture.
- ▶ In what was one of the more memorable games of the '09 regular season, Green Bay lost on the final play of the game in Pittsburgh, a tough finish to a back-and-forth fourth quarter.
- ▶ Again Green Bay responded, using all three phases to dominate Seattle at home and clinch a postseason berth in Week 16. Another fine performance in Arizona in the regular-season finale gave the Packers an 11-5 record and the No. 5 seed.
- ▶ Faced with a 31-10 deficit early in the second half at Arizona in the playoff game, Green Bay used a second-half flurry to tie the score at 38 and again at 45 in the back-and-forth affair. The season came to a bitter end on the Packers' first set of downs in overtime, as Arizona scooped up a fumble and returned it for the winning score, capping one of the most exciting games in Wild Card playoff history.



ALL THREE PHASES

Green Bay was one of two teams in the NFL in 2009 to have both the offense (No. 6) and defense (No. 2) rank among the league's top 6. Division foe Minnesota (No. 5 offense, No. 6 defense) was the other.

- ▶ The Packers offense ranked among the league's top 10 for the fourth consecutive season and was a unit that seemed nearly impossible to stop towards the latter part of the season. It topped the 30-point plateau in its last four contests and eight times overall in 2009.
- ▶ There was no shortage of statistical measures to show its strength, chief among them the 461 points scored, a new franchise record. The 1996 Super Bowl champion Packers had the previous team record at 456.
- ▶ It was just the third offense in franchise history that surpassed 6,000 total net yards, finishing No. 3 in team annals with 6,065.
- ▶ Though its perimeter players are as dangerous in big-play production as any group in the NFL, Green Bay dominated the ball and controlled the clock in its second-half run and finished No. 1 in the NFL with a time-of-possession average of 33:03, establishing a new franchise standard since the statistic began being recorded in 1977.
- ▶ Green Bay became the first team in NFL history to have a 4,000-yard passer (QB **Aaron Rodgers**), 1,200-yard rusher (RB **Ryan Grant**) and two 1,000-yard receivers (WRs **Donald Driver** and **Greg Jennings**) in back-to-back seasons.

- ▶ Driver and Jennings led a wideout group whose ability downfield and after the catch opened up the middle of the field for Grant and TE **Jermichael Finley**, two players whose production increased during the season's second half.
- ▶ On defense, veteran coordinator **Dom Capers** installed the 3-4 defense and led a unit that finished the year with the highest league ranking by a Packers defensive unit (No. 2) since the '96 Super Bowl team (No. 1).
- ▶ For the first time in team history, Green Bay ranked No. 1 in run defense. The unit allowed 83.3 rushing yards per game, the lowest average in franchise history.
- ▶ Its stellar run defense kept opponents in difficult down-and-distance situations, where the defense excelled in creating turnovers.
- ▶ The Packers led the league with 40 takeaways and led the NFL with 30 interceptions, the first time the Packers led the league in interceptions since 1965 (tied with Washington for No. 1 that season with 27).
- ▶ CB **Charles Woodson** led the team with as fine a season as any player in the NFL on the defensive side of the ball. His nine interceptions

marked a new career high and tied for the league lead, while he returned three of those interceptions for touchdowns, also tied for the NFL lead.

▶ Highlighting the defense's ability to take the ball away also brings the spotlight back onto the offense, which finished the season with 16 giveaways, fewest in the NFL. Not since 1997 (New York Giants) had a team led the league in most takeaways and fewest giveaways.

▶ Green Bay's plus-24 turnover margin also ranked atop the league standings, while its 141 points off takeaways tied the Super Bowl champion Saints for No. 1.

- ▶ Special teams, shaky in both the return and coverage units early, steadied later in the season. Kick-return coverage ranked tied for 17th, while the punt-cover unit finished No. 24. Injuries forced the team to look at a number of players in its own return game, but the Packers were never able to hit the long gain. The punt-return unit finished No. 23, while kick return was 19th.

WOODSON WINS TOP HONOR

For a man whose list of football accomplishments includes the Heisman Trophy, not to mention numerous All-Pro and Pro Bowl selections, CB **Charles Woodson** added the highest individual honor for an NFL defender when he was awarded *The Associated Press* NFL Defensive Player of the Year.

- ▶ Playing a number of different position in his first year in the 3-4 scheme under defensive coordinator **Dom Capers**, Woodson routinely lined up against the opposition's top threat and wreaked havoc when it came to causing turnovers. It was those big plays that set Woodson apart from the pack in 2009 as he quarterbacked the league's No. 2 defense.
- ▶ Big plays became a staple for Woodson, who picked off nine passes, tied for the NFL lead, and returned three of them for touchdowns, also tied for the league lead. All four of his forced fumbles were recovered by the Packers, none bigger than his two against Dallas. It was the performance against the Cowboys, in front of a national TV audience with the Packers' season hanging in the balance, where Woodson truly shined.
- ▶ Credit too must be given to Capers, who utilized Woodson's uncanny instincts all over the field. Woodson became the third player under Capers to win the award, joining CB Rod Woodson (Pittsburgh, 1993) and DE Jason Taylor (Miami, 2006).

PACKERS TEAM NOTES

FOUR PACKERS NAMED PRO BOWLERS

S **Nick Collins**, LB **Clay Matthews**, QB **Aaron Rodgers** and CB **Charles Woodson** were named to the NFC Pro Bowl squad last season. Additionally, Woodson was named a starter on the NFC squad.

- ▶ For Collins, it was his second consecutive and second career selection. For the season, the fifth-year pro had 51 tackles, six interceptions, a sack and fumble recovery. His six interceptions were second most among NFC safeties and tied for fifth overall in the NFL.
- ▶ Collins became the first Packers safety to be named to consecutive Pro Bowls since **LeRoy Butler**, who went three consecutive seasons (1996-98).
- ▶ Matthews became the first Packers rookie to earn a Pro Bowl selection since WR James Lofton in 1978. He finished the season with 58 tackles, a franchise rookie-record 10 sacks, three fumble recoveries, one forced fumble, six passes defended and a defensive touchdown.
- ▶ Rodgers earned his first career selection in his second season as a starter. He became the first player in NFL history to throw for 4,000 yards in each of his first two seasons as a starter and ranked among the league's top 10 in nearly every significant passing category.
- ▶ Woodson earned his sixth career Pro Bowl bid and second as a member of the Packers. He registered a career high in tackles (81) and interceptions (nine). Additionally, the 12-year pro had two sacks, four forced fumbles, one fumble recovery and 21 passes defended.
- ▶ With Woodson and Collins being named to the team, the Packers had two or more secondary players go to the Pro Bowl in consecutive years for the first time since 1973-74, when cornerbacks **Willie Buchanon** and **Ken Ellis** were selected. In 2008, **Al Harris** joined Collins and Woodson on the NFC Pro Bowl squad.
- ▶ **T Chad Clifton**, RB **Ryan Grant** and LB **A.J. Hawk** were all named Pro Bowl alternates.

IN THE FREE AGENCY ERA

Talk of unrestricted free agency in the early '90s led many to forecast tough times for the small-town Green Bay Packers.

- ▶ However, Green Bay has remained among the most successful teams since the advent of free agency in 1993. The Packers have won 10 or more games 10 times since '93 and captured seven division crowns.
- ▶ A look at the most successful teams in the free-agency era:

TURNOVER RATIO TOPS THE LEAGUE

While many football statistics don't have far-reaching implications through a sampling of the season, turnover ratio is always a telling statistic when it comes to a game's final outcome.

- ▶ The Packers' 40 takeaways in 2009 led the NFL, while their 16 giveaways also led the league and established a new franchise record.
- ▶ The 1997 New York Giants were the last team to lead the league in most takeaways and fewest giveaways.
- ▶ While Rodgers has always been careful with the ball in the passing game, credit must be given to the running backs, who carried the ball 374 times with one fumble, which was recovered by Green Bay, in '09.
- ▶ With a defense that excels at the takeaway and an offense that protects the football as well as it does, it was no surprise that Green Bay's plus-24 turnover ratio topped the league.
- ▶ Of the Packers' takeaways, 30 came via the interception, most in the NFL. It was the most for the Packers since 1981, when the team also had 30. In 2009, Green Bay also had 10 fumble recoveries.

- ▶ Every single Packers practice, be it during OTAs, training camp or the regular season, has a period devoted to ball security.
- ▶ Headed by assistant head coach/inside linebackers **Winston Moss**, the drill has offensive skill players carry the ball while two defenders (linebackers and defensive backs) try to strip the ball. Once free, the offensive player then must run through a gauntlet of offensive and defensive linemen attempting to strip the ball loose.
- ▶ The drill puts an emphasis on ball security for offensive players. For defensive players, the drill keeps the focus on stripping the ball from opposing players.
- ▶ Overall, the team had 11 forced fumbles on the year (one on special teams), 10 of which it recovered.
- ▶ Offensive skill players need only to look at RB **Ryan Grant** for a player who exemplifies ball security. Grant ranks No. 1 in the NFL for consecutive carries without a fumble, a streak he carries into play in 2010. Grant currently has a career-high 291 consecutive rushes without a fumble, the longest active streak in the league.
- ▶ While the Packers can be proud of their place atop the league in turnover margin, it is a statistic that has trended upwards in each of McCarthy's four seasons.
- ▶ In 2006, the team finished at even in the category but improved to plus-four in 2007. In 2008, a plus-seven margin, No. 6 among NFL teams, had been the franchise's best mark since 2002 (+17).
- ▶ Prior to McCarthy's arrival, the team had a franchise-worst turnover ratio (-24) in 2005.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Green Bay finished 5-3 on the road in 2009, the third time in four seasons it had finished above .500 under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**.

- The Packers have been able to stay above the .500 mark on the road during McCarthy's tenure, a notable achievement in the National Football League.
- Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only nine of 32 NFL teams have road records over .500.

285 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Seahawks in the regular-season home finale brought the stadium's consecutive sellouts streak to 285 games (269 regular season, 16 playoffs).

- The 2009 home game against Minnesota saw the largest regular-season crowd in Lambeau Field history (71,213).
- The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field will host its 54th season of football this year. A total of 565,666 fans made their way through the turnstiles in the eight home contests in 2009.
- Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing at 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal.
- Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 19-7 at home since 2007, a marked improvement over the prior three seasons (10-14 combined).
- Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top home W-L records since the '92 season:

DOMINATING TIME OF POSSESSION

Time of possession is a seldom-quoted statistic, but one that easily can underscore how a football game played out.

- The Packers' final ranking at the top of the time-of-possession chart in '09 should have been a sign the team was due to make the postseason.

- Of the teams that finished the season in the Top 3 in the category from 2000-09, 24 of those 30 teams made the playoffs.
- Of the six that didn't qualify for the postseason, only one, the 2004 Kansas City Chiefs (7-9), finished with a record below .500.
- In Green Bay's 30-24 win over San Francisco in Week 11, it controlled the ball for 41 minutes, 39 seconds. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, time-of-possession statistics have only been kept since 1977, but that mark for the Packers was a franchise record.
- Combined with the Packers' 40:48 time of possession against the Lions in Week 6, it gave the team two games with 40-plus minutes of controlling the ball, which was also a single-season franchise record.
- Green Bay won the time-of-possession battle against the Cardinals in Week 17, helping it achieve the league's No. 1 ranking in the category and a new franchise record.
- The Packers ranked No. 1 in the league with a time-of-possession average of 33:03, ahead of No. 2 New England (32:55) and No. 3 Minnesota (32:40). Pittsburgh (32:13) and Dallas (32:04) rounded out the league's top 5, with Pittsburgh being the only team not to make the postseason.
- Green Bay's previous best single-season mark came in 1992, when it posted an average of 32:30 per game.
- In the first nine games of the season, the Packers had just nine drives of 10 plays or more. Over their last seven games, they had 14 drives of 10 or more plays.
- As the weather turns, Green Bay has traditionally become a more ground-oriented team. Though the nature of a "big-play" offense suggests quick strikes, the Packers' offense seemed more suited to a controlled offense led by a ground attack, capable of producing multiple 10-play drives in a game.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES - OFFENSE

TAKING HIS PLACE AMONG THE GAME'S BEST

Now firmly entrenched in his role as the face of the franchise, QB **Aaron Rodgers** went from solid first-year starter to one of the game's top young signal callers in 2009.

▶ Rodgers ranked near the top of the NFL in most passing categories in 2009 and was honored as the NFC Offensive Player of the Month for October, the first such award of his career. He was the youngest of the six quarterbacks named to the Pro Bowl last season.

▶ In 2009, he engineered one of the NFL's most potent offenses, ranked No. 6 overall, and avoided costly mistakes, spearheading a team that had a league-low 16 giveaways (15 on offense).

▶ His 103.2 passer rating ranked fourth in the NFL. In addition, he was the game's top-ranked passer on third downs (133.5).

▶ The fourth-year pro threw for 4,434 yards, fourth most in the league. That total finished just shy of Lynn Dickey's franchise record (4,458, 1983) for passing yards in a single season.

▶ In addition to QB rating and passing yards, Rodgers ranked fourth in TD passes (30) and first in interception percentage (1.3).

▶ And just for good measure, he ranked second among QBs with 316 rushing yards on 58 carries (5.4 avg.), and added five rushing TDs.

▶ Rodgers joined Steve Young (San Francisco, 1998) as the only quarterbacks in NFL history to throw for 4,000 yards and 30 TDs and rush for 300 yards and five TDs in the same season.

▶ The Elias Sports Bureau never intended for passer rating to measure the effectiveness of a signal caller in one game, but rather over the course of a group of games or an entire season.

▶ Having said that, Rodgers' performance in Week 7 last year in Cleveland (15-of-20, 246 yards, 3 TDs) earned him a passer rating of 155.4, the highest single-game rating (minimum 20 attempts) in the history of the franchise. It bested the previous high, Brett Favre's 154.9 rating set in Oakland on Dec. 22, 2003.

▶ It was Rodgers' fourth consecutive game with a passer rating over 110.0, becoming only the second signal caller in team history to eclipse the mark four straight times in a single season. The legendary **Bart Starr** accomplished the feat four straight weeks during the 1966 season (Sept. 18-Oct. 9) en route to an NFL Championship and Super Bowl title.

▶ Rodgers just missed becoming the first to do it in five straight games, registering a 108.5 rating against Minnesota the following week.

▶ Not only did the statistic explain his play last season, but just how efficient he has been since becoming a starter. In 32 career starts, Rodgers has eclipsed the century mark in passer rating 18 times.

GRANT AND THE O-LINE

RB **Ryan Grant** had one of the better seasons among running backs in the NFC in '09 and was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate.

▶ Grant had a TD run over 20 yards in three straight weeks (Weeks 14-16), the type of play that typified his breakout season in 2007. He finished the year with a career-high 11 touchdowns on the ground, second most in the NFC.

▶ While he had three 100-yard performances on the season, he also surpassed the 90-yard mark on four other occasions.

▶ Without much fanfare, Grant's numbers ranked among the leaders in the NFC. His rushing total (career-high 1,253 yards) ranked third in the NFC

and seventh overall in the NFL. Utilized more in the screen game last season, his 197 receiving yards also was a career high.

▶ Grant's 1,450 total yards from scrimmage ranked fourth in the NFC and ninth in the NFL.

▶ McCarthy has consistently stated in his time in Green Bay that the most important rushing statistic to him is attempts, and there is no doubting the team's success when the attempts are up, specifically for Grant.

▶ When Grant gets 22 or more carries, the team is 9-1 (10-1 with playoffs).

▶ Green Bay allowed only 10 sacks over the last seven games, a pace that would have put it among the league's top five in terms of sacks allowed if kept up over a 16-game season.

▶ However, injuries and performance issues were a problem over the first half of the season, as Green Bay allowed 41 sacks over the first nine games. It finished 2009 having allowed a league-high 51 sacks. Pittsburgh finished No. 2 with 50 sacks allowed.

▶ Pass protection was paramount to the team's overall success, as four of the five losses came when Rodgers was sacked



six or more times.

▶ Injuries hurt the team's early-season continuity up front, as McCarthy had to use six different starting lineups across the offensive line. The offensive line he settled on in training camp started the first two contests before it was beset by injuries.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES - OFFENSE

EXCELLING ON THIRD DOWN

Part of Green Bay's success winning seven of its last eight games in 2009 was due in part to its ability to win the third-down battle on both sides of the ball. The third-down offense topped the NFC final rankings and was No. 3 overall, while the defense ranked No. 9 overall in the category.

- ▶ It would be hard to imagine a better performance on third down than what QB **Aaron Rodgers** did in Detroit on Thanksgiving.
- ▶ He finished 11-of-13 passing, good for eight first downs and two touchdowns for a perfect 158.3 passer rating.
- ▶ That's not all that surprising when you consider Rodgers was the league's top-ranked passer (133.5) on third down. No other quarterback threw for as many yards (1,710) or touchdowns (14) on third down as Rodgers, who threw all three of his scores on third down in Pittsburgh. In 157 third-down attempts, he had a 67.5% completion rate and did not throw an interception. Tom Brady was the only other quarterback to not throw an interception on third down (min. 100 attempts).
- ▶ Rodgers' third-down rating was the best in the NFL since Kurt Warner's 137.3 rating in 1999 with St. Louis.
- ▶ Now after two seasons as a starter, his third-down success is becoming a trend. He finished 2008 as the league's third-ranked passer on third down with a rating of 105.8. Of his 28 TD passes in 2008, 14 came on third down.

ANOTHER FRANCHISE MARK

WR **Donald Driver**, entering his 12th season with the Packers, established yet another team mark last year in Week 13. Last season, it seemed as though franchise records fell on a weekly basis for Driver.

- ▶ Driver became the 10th player in franchise history to reach the 50-touchdown plateau. No other NFL franchise has 10 players with 50-plus TDs.
- ▶ Earlier, Driver topped the 50-catch plateau for an eighth straight season (2002-09), a new franchise record.
- ▶ Though he was the oldest player on the active roster at age 34, Driver showed no signs of slowing down in 2009. He led the team in catches (70), ranked second in receiving yards (1,061) and first in touchdown catches (6).
- ▶ Driver also extended his own franchise record by recording a seventh overall season and sixth straight with 1,000 yards.
- ▶ The most significant record still within Driver's grasp is career receiving yards. James Lofton ranks No. 1 with 9,656 yards. Driver is No. 2 with 9,050. Driver should surpass the mark sometime this season.
- ▶ Driver has been the model of consistency for the Packers, catching at least one pass in 127 consecutive games, also a franchise record. His consistency also serves as a great example for younger teammates, as Driver has rarely missed a practice in his NFL career.
- ▶ While his reputation is as a slot guy who will make the tough catch over the middle, Driver made his share of big plays this season. His five catches of 40-plus yards tied for ninth in the NFL.

FINLEY BREAKS OUT IN YEAR TWO

Anyone needing to know how much the Packers missed TE **Jermichael Finley** in his three-game absence in 2009, which really should be considered a four-game streak because his injury occurred on the first series in Cleveland, need only to watch the game tape from the last seven contests.

- ▶ Over the last seven games, he caught a team-high 38 passes for 416 yards and four TDs. His reception total over that time was third among tight ends, trailing only Jason Witten (45) and Tony Gonzalez (39).
- ▶ His nine catches at Pittsburgh matched the single-game team record for



- receptions by a tight end, and Finley finished tied for the No. 2 spot for catches in a single season by a Packers tight end with 55.
- ▶ Rodgers clearly loves Finley's athletic ability down the middle of the field, as evidenced by his nine catches of 20-plus yards. And in goal-line situations, as was seen against the Ravens, Steelers and Cardinals, Rodgers is confident in Finley's ability to win a one-on-one battle.
- ▶ In a season in which he set career highs in every statistical category, Finley's coming-out party came on the team's first appearance on *Monday Night Football* at Minnesota in front of the largest television audience in cable history. That game, he set a new regular-season career high in receiving yards (128), highlighted by his 62-yard catch-and-run TD. The catch marked the longest reception by a Green Bay tight end since Jackie Harris caught a 66-yard scoring pass against Denver on Oct. 10, 1993.
- ▶ Finley's day also stands tied for the most productive day by a tight end in team history. His 128 yards matched Harris' output from that Broncos

contest, tying the franchise high for receiving yards by a tight end in a regular-season contest.

- ▶ There's no doubting the Packers' depth at the position. TE **Donald Lee** remained a favorite target of Rodgers, ranking fourth on the team with 37 catches. Finley and Lee were the only NFL tight-end combo with at least 37 catches each.

- ▶ And if the Week 4 game at Minnesota served as a coming-out party, the Wild Card playoff game at Arizona showed Finley's potential to take over a game. His 159 receiving yards set a new franchise postseason record and ranked second in NFL postseason history for a tight end.

TOP 10 AGAIN

The offense registered over 400 yards against Seattle in Week 16, the ninth time in '09 it went

over the mark. That ranked as the second-best single-season mark in franchise history (2004, 10 games). The unit found its stride toward the end of the year and again ranked among the NFL's top-10 offenses, a familiar place under play caller and Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**.

- ▶ Each year under McCarthy, it has finished among the league's top 10 offenses. Since 2006, New Orleans is the only other NFL team to have ranked in the top 10 each of the last four seasons. In 2009, the Packers averaged 379.1 yards per contest, its top average under McCarthy.
- ▶ In 2008, the Packers finished No. 8 overall with an average of 351.1 yards per contest. The unit finished No. 2 in 2007 (370.7 yards per game) and No. 9 in 2006 (341.1) under McCarthy.
- ▶ McCarthy spent six seasons as an offensive coordinator and play caller prior to his arrival in Green Bay (New Orleans 2000-04, San Francisco 2005). Twice the Saints ranked among the NFL's top 10 offenses.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES - DEFENSE

LED BY THE DEFENSE

The Green Bay defense finished No. 2 in the league's final overall defensive rankings in 2009. Not since 1996, when it finished the year No. 1 overall and went on to win Super Bowl XXXI, had the Packers' defense ranked among the league's top units.

- ▶ Behind new defensive coordinator **Dom Capers** and all-everything CB **Charles Woodson**, the Packers thrived in their new 3-4 scheme. The team finished the season ranked No. 1 against the run, a first in team history, and No. 5 against the pass.
- ▶ The previous top ranking in franchise history in run defense came in 1972, when the team finished No. 2.
- ▶ Green Bay allowed an average of 284.4 total yards per game, second behind the N.Y. Jets (252.3) and ahead of No. 3 Baltimore (300.5).
- ▶ Green Bay's improved defense against the run kept opponents in long down-and-distances, enhancing the defense's ability to get off the field on third down. Through the first four games, the unit ranked No. 28. As soon as Green Bay began to stop the run, it shot up the league rankings in third-down defense, finishing the year at No. 9.
- ▶ One constant for the defense was its ability to take the ball away, registering 39 of the team's 40 takeaways. That takeaway total led the NFL in 2009, and it's something that has become a habit for the defense. It has registered at least one takeaway in 18 of its last 19 games.
- ▶ Whether they be caused by pressure from a deep and talented front seven, or a fantastic read by a ball-hawking secondary led by Pro Bowlers **Nick Collins** (six INTs) and **Woodson** (nine), those 40 turnovers led to 141 points, tied with New Orleans for the most points-off-turnovers total in the NFL.
- ▶ In the first two years of the **Mike McCarthy** tenure, Green Bay's defense was close to being a top-10 unit, finishing at No. 12 in 2006 and No. 11 in 2007. In 2008, it slipped to No. 20 before making the jump up to No. 2 last year.
- ▶ In Capers' previous stints as a coordinator, his units made a jump in the rankings in his first season. In Pittsburgh, the defense went from No. 22 to No. 13 in '92 under Capers, then continued to rise to No. 3 in '93 and No. 2 in '94. In Jacksonville, the defense climbed to No. 4 under Capers in '99 after ranking 25th the previous season. The Dolphins ranked No. 4 in 2006, Capers' first year, after ranking No. 18 in '05.



AS GOOD AS HE'S EVER BEEN

At age 33, CB **Charles Woodson** enjoyed the finest season of his career in 2009, his first year in the 3-4 scheme.

- ▶ Woodson achieved the highest individual honor bestowed upon a defensive player, taking home *The Associated Press* Defensive Player of the Year award. He also was named an AP first-team All-Pro.
- ▶ Woodson became the fourth player in NFL history since sacks became an official statistic to record at least nine interceptions and two sacks in a single season. One of the players who previously accomplished the feat (Ed Reed - 2004) also went on to win Defensive Player of the Year. Woodson also led the Packers with four forced fumbles.
- ▶ Against Dallas, Woodson became the first NFL player to record two forced fumbles, an interception and a sack in a game since Steelers linebacker James Harrison accomplished the feat two years ago to the day vs. Baltimore on Nov. 15, 2007. In that contest, Harrison posted three forced fumbles, 3½ sacks and an interception.
- ▶ Against the Lions in Week 12, Woodson tallied two interceptions,

including one he returned for a score, a sack, forced fumble and fumble recovery, and held Calvin Johnson to two catches for 10 yards.

- ▶ Woodson was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week for both his Dallas (Week 10) and Detroit (Week 12) performances, and naturally won NFC Defensive Player of the Month for November. Woodson also was honored as the NFC Defensive Player of the Month for September and December, becoming the first NFC player to win the award multiple times.
- ▶ His Detroit performance marked the fifth multi-interception game of his career, and his fourth since coming to Green Bay.
- ▶ Woodson's INT return for a score against Arizona in Week 17 was his seventh with Green Bay, giving him eight defensive touchdowns with the Packers to establish a new franchise record. The seven INT returns for scores with Green Bay ties him for first on the franchise's all-time list with Hall of Famer Herb Adderley.
- ▶ In addition to his team-high and career-best nine interceptions, he established a new career high with 81 tackles, third most on the team. His previous career high had been 79, a total he accomplished twice before (OAK, 2000; GB, 2008).
- ▶ A skilled blitzer, he had two sacks on the year. His five sacks since 2008 is tied for the NFL lead among defensive backs (safeties and corners).
- ▶ His four forced fumbles tied for second among NFL defensive backs in 2009.
- ▶ There's no doubt Woodson's career has undergone a revitalization since coming to Green Bay. He now has 45 career interceptions, fifth among active NFL players. Of his interceptions, 28 have come in 62 games with Green Bay. In 106 games with the Raiders, he had 17.

SECONDARY BRINGS SOME PASS RUSH, TOO

Part of the reason Capers was able to trust in his defense as the Packers made the transition to the 3-4 in 2009 was his ability to rely on a secondary that included three Pro Bowl players.

- ▶ The team had to play its last stretch without CB **Al Harris** (knee injury), a physical corner who routinely lined up against the opposing team's top wide receiver. Harris was a Pro Bowl honoree in 2007-08.
- ▶ The team leaned on the all-around skill of CB **Charles Woodson**, who enjoyed a career year in the new defense. Woodson, who lined up all over the field in Capers' defense, was named *The Associated Press* Defensive Player of the Year and selected to his sixth career Pro Bowl.
- ▶ The team also relied heavily on CB **Tramon Williams**, who filled in with the No. 1 defense when Harris went down with a spleen injury in 2008 for four games. Williams, whose five interceptions in '08 highlighted a breakout season, finished 2009 with four interceptions and led the team with 22 passes defended, a new career high.
- ▶ Capers and the defense also were able to rely on Pro Bowl S **Nick Collins**, who intercepted six passes on the season. His 13 interceptions over the last two seasons are tied for second most in the NFL behind Woodson's 16. In addition to consecutive Pro Bowl selections, Collins' inclusion on the AP second-team All-Pro list for the second straight year solidifies his place as one of the game's best young safeties.
- ▶ S **Atari Bigby** played his best football at the end of the season, totaling three interceptions in his last two games. A knee injury suffered in the season opener kept him out of three games, two of which the team lost.
- ▶ Collins, Williams and Woodson all notched sacks last season, which for Collins and Williams were the first of their careers.

PACKERS TEAM NOTES - DEFENSE

MATTHEWS BURSTS ONTO NFL STAGE IN '09

Rookie LB **Clay Matthews** seems to have a knack for the football, leading all rookies and tying for third in the NFL with three fumble recoveries in 2009, including two against Dallas in Week 10.

- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the last Green Bay rookie to recover two opponents' fumbles in a game was DB Val Joe Walker on Nov. 26, 1953, against the Detroit Lions.
- ▶ He just missed tying the franchise's rookie record held by S Johnnie Gray (4, 1975). Matthews had a strip-sack and recovery of Steelers QB Ben Roethlisberger that was overturned after a Pittsburgh challenge.
- ▶ The first recovery of his career was in Week 4, when he forced a fumble on Vikings RB Adian Peterson and raced the ball 42 yards for a touch-down, the longest fumble return for a TD by a rookie in team history.
- ▶ Matthews recorded the third multi-sack game of his career against the Steelers and had 10 sacks on the season, a new Green Bay rookie record. In addition to leading the Packers, his 10 sacks ranked second behind Washington's Brian Orakpo (11) for the lead among all rookies.
- ▶ LB Tim Harris was the only other rookie to finish as the Packers' team leader in sacks. Harris (8, 1986) and Vonnie Holliday (8, '98) had shared the team rookie record for sacks since the stat became official in 1982.
- ▶ Matthews was also one of three rookie linebackers selected to the Pro Bowl and joined his father Clay Jr. (four Pro Bowls) and uncle Bruce (14 Pro Bowls) as family members to be selected.

TAKEAWAY POINTS KEY FOR PACKERS

Even with a new defensive scheme, Green Bay continued to show its knack for the takeaways with 30 interceptions and 10 fumble recoveries in 2009, which it turned into 141 points.

- ▶ The 30 interceptions led the league and was the team's highest single-season total since 1981, when it also had 30.
- ▶ Green Bay's 40 takeaways also led the NFL, and its 141 points scored off those 40 takeaways tied New Orleans for most in the league.
- ▶ Green Bay did not register a takeaway against the Steelers, snapping a streak of 16 straight games with at least one takeaway, but responded with four interceptions against the Seahawks and three against the Cardinals in Weeks 16-17. The Seattle game marked the third time last season that the team recorded four interceptions, which it also did against Chicago (Week 1) and at Detroit (Week 12).
- ▶ Green Bay surpassed its 2008 total of 124 points off takeaways, which led the NFL in '08.
- ▶ It also eclipsed its '08 total in interceptions (22) and fumble recoveries (six) while at the same time protecting the ball at a better clip. Green Bay's 16 giveaways was the lowest total in the NFL.
- ▶ If the Packers don't commit a turnover, like they didn't against Seattle in Week 16, they're almost guaranteed to win. They have now won 38 of 42 games playing turnover-free football, since a loss at Dallas, Nov. 18, 1996. Green Bay's only losses in such games during that stretch came three times against Minnesota, twice in Minneapolis (2005, '08) and once at home (2009), and in Week 15 this year in Pittsburgh against the Steelers.
- ▶ Including playoffs, the Packers have won 41 of their last 45 games without a giveaway.

INT RETURN YARDAGE A BRIGHT SPOT AGAIN

Three interception returns against Arizona in Week 17 helped add to what was an already impressive team yardage total on interceptions. Over the last two seasons, Green Bay defenders proved to be among the most dangerous when the ball was in their hands.

- ▶ With 477 yards on a league-best 30 interceptions, Green Bay finished second in the category in 2009 behind New Orleans (652).
- ▶ The Packers finished 2008 with an astounding 685 interception return yards, tops in the NFL and a new franchise standard.
- ▶ Combined with the 685 return yards in '08, it is just the second time in

franchise history that the Packers have posted back-to-back seasons of 475-plus INT return yards. The only other time was 1965 (561) and 1966 (547).

- ▶ The Packers led the NFL in interceptions (52), interception yards (1,162), and interception TDs (nine) from 2008-09.
- ▶ McCarthy has said his team's ability to make a play after an interception is something the team has repped after every turnover in practice since he arrived in 2006. Every offensive player, whether part of the 11 on the play or the group on the sidelines, attempts to catch the defender before he can advance up the field.

GETTING AFTER THE QUARTERBACK

The Packers' defense finished the 2009 season with 37 sacks, tied for 11th best in the league.

- ▶ Three times in '09 the Packers had five or more sacks. The last time Green Bay had five or more sacks in three games was '02. The team record is four games, a number that was hit in three separate seasons (1985, 2000, 2001).
- ▶ LB **Brad Jones**, who filled in following a season-ending knee injury to **Aaron Kampman**, recorded the first multi-sack game of his career against Pittsburgh, joining LB **Clay Matthews** (three multi-sack games) as the first rookie duo to post multi-sack games in a season.
- ▶ Jones became the third Packers rookie to collect a sack last season, joining first-round picks NT **B.J. Raji** (1.0) and Matthews (franchise rookie-record 10.0). The last time three Packers rookies recorded sacks was 1987.
- ▶ For the first time in franchise history, two rookies had four or more sacks.
- ▶ With another sack against the Bears in Week 15, Matthews became the first rookie in Packers history to record a sack in three consecutive games. His team rookie record ultimately rose to four after a two-sack effort against Pittsburgh.

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 90th NFL regular-season schedule – headlined by six nationally televised games – was released in late April.

- ▶ Though the 2010 opponents have been known since the end of last season, the arrival of the complete NFL schedule is a day circled on the calendar of all football fans.
- ▶ Green Bay opens the 2010 slate on the road at Philadelphia before kicking off the home schedule with the Buffalo Bills in Week 2.
- ▶ Its first prime-time appearance – against the rival Bears in Chicago on *Monday Night Football* – will come in Week 3. The NFL's oldest rivalry will be on display in prime time for a fifth straight season, with this first meeting of the year marking game No. 180 in the all-time series.
- ▶ 2010 marks the 18th consecutive season the Packers have appeared on *Monday Night Football*, the NFC's longest streak.
- ▶ Three games are slated for Sunday night on NBC, including home games against the Minnesota Vikings (Week 7) and Dallas Cowboys (Week 9). In Week 15, the Packers are scheduled to take on the Patriots on Sunday night in Foxborough, though the game is subject to the NFL's flex scheduling.
- ▶ The Packers will get their first look at the new stadium in New Jersey in Week 8 against the Jets, where they may experience some cool fall temperatures. While games at Lambeau Field later in the season always provide a home-field advantage for the Packers, the 2010 schedule is nearly void of cold-weather road games. After the Jets, three consecutive road contests will be played in domes (Minnesota, Atlanta, Detroit).
- ▶ That's good news for a Green Bay offense that seems to thrive in domes. Including playoffs, the Packers played in a dome five times last season, exceeding 400 total net yards in four of those games.
- ▶ A number of games on the Packers' 2010 schedule – namely those on national TV – are beginning to have a familiar feel. In addition to taking on the Bears for a fifth consecutive year in prime time, Green Bay will take on Minnesota in prime time for a third straight season. The Packers and Cowboys will meet on national TV for the fourth straight season.
- ▶ The schedule concludes with two home games for the first time since 2005. One of the NFL's best teams in regular-season games played in December and January, Green Bay may need to call upon that previous success for what could prove to be two very important contests surrounding the Christmas and New Year's holidays. Games against the Giants (Week 16) and Bears (Week 17) could determine not only the NFC North Division crown but conference playoff seeding.

2010 SCHEDULE NUGGETS

- Green Bay's bye week comes in Week 10, the latest possible week for NFL teams. It marks the latest time in which the Packers have had a bye in franchise history, besting the Week 9 bye in 2004. The Packers will play nine games before the bye and seven after the open date.
- ▶ Three of four games before the bye come at Lambeau Field, while four of five games after the bye are road contests.
 - ▶ Immediately following the bye comes an important division game against Minnesota, the first of three straight road games played in domes. Under McCarthy, the team has won three of four games after the bye week and 10 of its last 14 after the bye dating back further.
 - ▶ Green Bay has always been a successful team after the bye and 2009 was no different, as the team compiled a 9-3 (.750) mark after the bye week. Since 2000, the team is 61-36 (.629) overall after the bye.
 - ▶ Fifteen games are slated for Sunday, the most since 1993 (also 15).
 - ▶ Seven of the final eight games are against NFC opponents.
 - ▶ The Packers have six games on the schedule against 2009 playoff teams, beginning right away in Week 1 at Philadelphia. Beginning in Week 7 vs. Minnesota, Green Bay has a stretch of four straight games against playoff teams from a year ago. The team will travel east to take on the Jets in Week 8 and host the Cowboys in Week 9 before the bye. The stretch concludes in Minnesota in Week 11.
 - ▶ The NFL's oldest rivalry will see a first in 2010. For the first time in series history, Green Bay will host Chicago in the regular-season finale, set to be game No. 181 between the Packers and Bears.

STREAKS & MILESTONES

56 NICK BARNETT

- ▶ Ranks third on the franchise's all-time list in tackles with 986 career, behind No. 1 John Anderson (1,020) and No. 2 Johnnie Gray (1,001).
- ▶ Established a new career high with four sacks in 2009.
- ▶ Finished last season as the team's leading tackler for a franchise-record fifth time in his seven seasons.

76 CHAD CLIFTON

- ▶ Has played in 143 career games, including 138 starts.
- ▶ Has started 106 of last 112 games since returning from a serious pelvic injury that ended his 2002 season.

36 NICK COLLINS

- ▶ In 2009, became the first Packers player to record an interception in four consecutive games (Weeks 11-14) since 1961 (John Symank).
- ▶ With 13 interceptions since 2008, is tied for second with Philadelphia's Asante Samuel among all NFL players behind Charles Woodson (16).
- ▶ Leads all NFL players with 405 interception return yards since 2008.
- ▶ With four interception returns for scores in his career, matches No. 5 Johnny (Blood) McNally on Green Bay's all-time career list. With another, would match No. 3 Bobby Dillon and Darren Sharper, each of whom returned five.

2 MASON CROSBY

- ▶ Established a new NFL record for most points scored by a player in his first three seasons, breaking the record held by New England's Stephen Gostkowski (388, 2006-08). Crosby has 397 career points.
- ▶ For his career, has hit 59-of-65 field goals from 39 yards and closer.
- ▶ Has hit 18-of-27 field goals from 40-49 yards.
- ▶ Has hit 8-of-17 field goals from 50-plus yards.

80 DONALD DRIVER

- ▶ Topped the 1,000-yard receiving mark for a seventh overall season and sixth consecutive in 2009, extending his own team record in each category.
- ▶ Has 9,050 career receiving yards, No. 2 on the franchise's all-time receiving yards list behind No. 1 James Lofton (9,656).
- ▶ Surpassed Sterling Sharpe (595) in 2009 to become the franchise's all-time leader in receptions. Driver has 647 career catches.
- ▶ Has a reception in 127 consecutive games, besting the franchise's previous long streak of Sharpe's 103 (1988-94).
- ▶ For the eighth time had 50-plus receptions, a new franchise record. Lofton and Sharpe each had seven seasons with 50-plus catches.
- ▶ Is the all-time leading receiver at Lambeau Field, with 4,285 career receiving yards at the stadium.
- ▶ Also is Lambeau Field's all-time leader in receptions with 311.
- ▶ Stands at No. 3 with 19 TD catches at Lambeau Field. Antonio Freeman (36) ranks first in the stadium's history, while Sharpe (20) is No. 2.
- ▶ Has 22 career 100-yard receiving games, No. 4 in team history. Needs two more games to equal No. 3 Don Hutson (24) on the all-time list.

- ▶ With 49 career TD receptions, joins Hutson (99), Sharpe (65), Freeman (57), Max McGee (50), Lofton (49), Billy Howton (43) and Boyd Dowler (40) as the only Packers with 40 career TD catches.
- ▶ Ranks fourth all-time in yards from scrimmage with 9,267. Driver needs 446 yards to move past No. 3 Jim Taylor (9,712).

88 JERMICHAEL FINLEY

- ▶ His 55 catches in 2009 tied for the second-best mark in team history by a tight end in a single season behind only Paul Coffman's 56 in 1979.
- ▶ Had eight 50-yard games on the season, a team record for tight ends.
- ▶ Had career highs in catches (55), receiving yards (676) and TDs (5).
- ▶ Tied a franchise record for receiving yards by a tight end (Jackie Harris, 128, Oct. 10, 1993, vs. Denver) with 128 receiving yards in Week 4.
- ▶ His 62-yard touchdown in Minnesota was the longest reception by a tight end since 1993 (Jackie Harris, 66t, Oct. 10, 1993).

25 RYAN GRANT

- ▶ Established career highs in rushing yards (1,253), rushing touchdowns (11) and receiving yards (197) in 2009.
- ▶ Became the third player in team history to post back-to-back seasons of 1,200 rushing yards (Ahman Green, 2001-03; Jim Taylor, 1961-62).
- ▶ Has 3,412 career rushing yards, No. 9 in team history.
- ▶ Since becoming the Packers' feature back in Week 8 of 2007, his 3,385 rushing yards ranks second in the NFL (Adrian Peterson, 3,814).
- ▶ Has 12 career 100-yard games.
- ▶ When he gets 22 carries or more, the team is 9-1 (10-1 incl. playoffs).
- ▶ Enters 2010 with a streak of a career-high 291 carries without a fumble, No. 1 among active NFL streaks.

50 A.J. HAWK

- ▶ Has played in all 64 games in his career, including 62 starts.
- ▶ Tied a career high with two interceptions in 2009.
- ▶ In 2009, was one of only 10 NFL linebackers to record at least 85 tackles, two interceptions and a sack.

85 GREG JENNINGS

- ▶ Led the team in receiving yards (1,113) in 2009 for the second straight season.
- ▶ Became the fifth player in team history to post back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons, joining Lofton, Sharpe, Freeman and Driver.
- ▶ His 21 catches of 40-plus yards since 2007 leads all NFL players.
- ▶ Had 111 receiving yards in Week 16, his 14th career 100-yard game.
- ▶ In Week 3, surpassed 3,000 career receiving yards in his 46th career game. Surpassed 2,000 career receiving yards in 2008 at Tampa Bay, his 31st career game. He now has 3,957 career yards.
- ▶ Surpassed 1,000 career receiving yards on the 82-yard, game-winning touchdown catch in OT vs. Denver in 2007, his 19th career game.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.

86 DONALD LEE

- ▶ With 14 touchdowns while with the Packers, needs one more to match No. 5 Ron Kramer (15) on the franchise's all-time tight ends list.
- ▶ Needs four receptions to move past No. 6 Ron Kramer (170) on the team's all-time tight ends list.

12 AARON RODGERS

- ▶ Became the first player in NFL history to post 4,000 yards passing in each of his first two seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Finished the season with 4,434 passing yards, No. 2 on the franchise's single-season list behind Lynn Dickey (4,458, 1983).
- ▶ Finished the season fourth in the NFL in passing yards (career-high 4,434), fourth in touchdown passes (career-high 30), fourth in QB rating (103.2), ninth in completion percentage (64.7%), first in interception percentage (1.3%), tied for ninth in 20-plus yard completions (55) and tied for first in 40-plus yard passes (17).
- ▶ His passer rating of 103.2 was the second-best single-season mark in franchise history, behind Bart Starr's 105.0 in 1966 (min. 200 attempts).
- ▶ Is one of only two QBs in NFL history (Brett Favre, 2009) to post 30-plus passing TDs and seven or fewer interceptions in the same season.
- ▶ Joined Steve Young (San Francisco, 1998) as the only quarterbacks in NFL history to throw for 4,000 yards and 30 TDs and rush for 300 yards and five TDs in the same season.
- ▶ His third-down passer rating of 133.5 led the league and was the best mark in the NFL since Kurt Warner's 137.3 in 1999 with St. Louis.
- ▶ His 316 rushing yards ranked second among quarterbacks, and his five rushing TDs were the most by a Packers quarterback since 1989, when Don Majkowski also had five.
- ▶ Has nine career 300-yard games and nine 3-TD games.
- ▶ In 32 career starts, has eclipsed a 100.0-plus passer rating 18 times.
- ▶ His 155.4 passer rating at Cleveland in Week 7 in 2009 was the franchise's highest single-game total (min. 20 attempts), besting Brett Favre's 154.9 rating set in Oakland on Dec. 22, 2003.
- ▶ Registered a passer rating over 110.0 in four consecutive games (Weeks 3-7), becoming just the second quarterback in franchise history (Bart Starr, 1966) to accomplish the feat in a single season.
- ▶ Is the fourth player in Packers history to surpass the 4,000-yard mark, joining Lynn Dickey (1), Brett Favre (5) and Don Majkowski (1).

38 TRAMON WILLIAMS

- ▶ Led the team with a career-high 22 passes defended in 2009.
- ▶ Starting with his first career interception in the 2007 regular-season finale, has 10 interceptions in the last 33 games.
- ▶ Is the only non-drafted free agent in the NFL to post four or more interceptions each of the last two seasons.

21 CHARLES WOODSON

- ▶ In 2009, established new career highs in tackles (81), interceptions (9, tied league lead), and interception returns for TDs (3, tied league lead and team record), and matched a career high with four forced fumbles.
- ▶ Has 45 career interceptions, 28 in 62 games since coming to Green Bay in 2006. Woodson had 17 interceptions in 106 games with Oakland.
- ▶ Woodson's 16 interceptions since 2008 leads all NFL players.
- ▶ Became the fourth player in NFL history since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to record at least nine interceptions and two sacks in a single season. Is the only player in NFL history to post at least seven interceptions and two sacks in back-to-back seasons.
- ▶ His eight defensive touchdowns with Green Bay (seven interceptions, one fumble recovery) is a team record.
- ▶ With seven interception returns for scores, is tied at No. 1 on Green Bay's all-time list with Herb Adderley (1961-69).
- ▶ For his career, has nine INT-return TDs, tying him at No. 3 on the NFL's all-time list with Ken Houston, Deion Sanders and Aeneas Williams.
- ▶ In 2009, became the first NFC player to win the conference's Defensive Player of the Month award multiple times in one season (Sept., Nov., Dec).
- ▶ With nine interceptions in 2009, became only the second player in franchise history to post at least seven interceptions in three different seasons (Bobby Dillon, 1953-57).
- ▶ With two interceptions against Detroit on Thanksgiving in 2009, recorded the fifth multi-interception game of his career. Four of those games have come with Green Bay.
- ▶ His five sacks since 2008 is tied for the most among defensive backs.
- ▶ Became the first NFL player since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to record two interceptions, an interception for a touchdown, a sack and a fumble recovery in the same game when he posted all of those statistics at Detroit on Thanksgiving.

PACKERS PROJECTED STARTERS - OFFENSE

WR Greg Jennings, 5-11, 198, 5th Year, Western Michigan

- ▶ One of just five receivers in team history to post back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons.
- ▶ Leads the NFL with 21 catches of 40-plus yards over the past three seasons, and his career 34.2-yard average per TD reception is tops among active players.
- ▶ Has caught a pass in 58 of 59 games played for the Packers (61 of 62 including playoffs).

LT Chad Clifton, 6-5, 320, 11th Year, Tennessee

- ▶ Has blocked for five of the top eight single-season rushers in team history, and has helped pave the way for a 1,000-yard rusher in eight of his 10 seasons in Green Bay.
- ▶ Has started 106 of 112 games (112 of 118 including playoffs) at LT since returning to the field in 2003 from the serious pelvic injury that ended his '02 season.
- ▶ As an unrestricted free agent, re-signed with the team in early March for an 11th season in which he could play in his 150th regular-season game with Green Bay, a mark reached by only 18 others in team history.

LG Daryn Colledge, 6-4, 308, 5th Year, Boise State

- ▶ Has shown his durability by never missing a game in the NFL or in college, a combined total of 116 games (119 including playoffs).
- ▶ Played 97.4 percent of the offensive snaps in 2009, second on the team for any player on either side of the ball behind fellow G Josh Sitton. In 2008, joined Jason Spitz as the only offensive players to play every snap.
- ▶ Named Packers' 2009 Walter Payton Man of the Year, the only league award that recognizes player off-the-field community service as well as playing excellence.

C Scott Wells, 6-2, 300, 7th Year, Tennessee

- ▶ Began 2009 season as backup at center but reclaimed starting role early due to injury reshuffling and didn't relinquish it.
- ▶ Has played in 79 games with 68 starts during his first six seasons in Green Bay, with 56 starts at center the past four seasons.
- ▶ A key blocker in Ryan Grant's back-to-back 1,200-yard rushing seasons, making Grant only the third running back in team history to accomplish that feat.

RG Josh Sitton, 6-3, 318, 3rd Year, Central Florida

- ▶ Was the only Packers offensive lineman to open every game at one position in 2009. Also played all 1,093 snaps on offense, the only player on either side of the ball to not miss a snap with his unit.
- ▶ Known best for his run blocking, was a key cog in Ryan Grant's career-best 1,253-yard season in 2009, the sixth-best single-season rushing total in franchise annals.
- ▶ Was slated to start at RG as a rookie in 2008 if not for a preseason knee injury. Went on to play in 11 games with two starts.

RT Mark Tauscher, 6-3, 320, 11th Year, Wisconsin

- ▶ Was out of football for the first half of the 2009 season after the second season-ending knee injury of his career came in the final month of '08, but re-signed Oct. 12 and went on to start eight games in '09.
- ▶ Helped solidify the line during the second half of the year, as the offense allowed only 10 sacks over the final seven games after allowing 41 in the first nine.
- ▶ Originally a seventh-round selection by the Packers in 2000, has gone on to play in 130 games with 128 starts during his career.

TE Jermichael Finley, 6-5, 247, 3rd Year, Texas

- ▶ Posted second-most catches in a single season by a Green Bay tight end (55) and fifth-most yards (676) despite missing three games with a knee injury.
- ▶ Finished season with Green Bay playoff-record 159 receiving yards in NFC Wild Card loss at Arizona, the second-most productive game by a TE in NFL postseason history behind San Diego's Kellen Winslow (166 yards, Jan. 2, 1982, vs. Miami).
- ▶ Upon returning from knee injury in Week 11, ranked third in the league among tight ends with 37 receptions, trailing only Dallas' Jason Witten (45) and Atlanta's Tony Gonzalez (39).

WR Donald Driver, 6-0, 194, 12th Year, Alcorn State

- ▶ Ranks first on the franchise's all-time list for receptions with 647 and ranks second in team history with 9,050 career yards, trailing only James Lofton (9,656).
- ▶ Extended two team records in 2009 with his seventh 1,000-yard season and sixth straight. Indianapolis' Reggie Wayne is the only player in the NFL to have a 1,000-yard season each of the last six years (2004-09).
- ▶ Enters 2010 with a streak of 127 games with at least one reception (133 including postseason), the longest streak in franchise history.
- ▶ Signed two-year contract extension with the team through 2012 on Aug. 6.

QB Aaron Rodgers, 6-2, 225, 6th Year, California

- ▶ Became the first quarterback in NFL history to throw for 4,000 yards in each of his first two seasons as a starter.
- ▶ In 2009, nearly broke the franchise's single-season record with 4,434 passing yards, falling just short of Lynn Dickey's mark of 4,458 in 1984 on the way to his first Pro Bowl selection.
- ▶ In 32 regular-season starts, has posted nine 300-yard passing games, 19 games without an interception and 18 with a 100-plus passer rating.

RB Ryan Grant, 6-1, 222, 4th Year, Notre Dame

- ▶ Has topped 1,200 rushing yards in each of the last two seasons, only the third Green Bay back to do so in consecutive years (Ahman Green, 2001-03; Jim Taylor, 1961-62) and one of only four RBs in the NFL to do so in 2008-09 (Adrian Peterson, Thomas Jones, Chris Johnson).
- ▶ Since taking over as the feature back in Week 8 at Denver in 2007, has rushed for 3,385 yards, the second most in the NFL over that span behind only Peterson (3,814).
- ▶ Has a career-long streak of 291 carries without a fumble, which ranks No. 1 in the NFL among current streaks.

FB Korey Hall, 6-0, 236, 4th Year, Boise State

- ▶ Converted from linebacker to fullback upon arriving in Green Bay as a sixth-round pick in 2007, playing in 36 games with 20 starts over his first three seasons.
- ▶ Helped clear the way for RB Ryan Grant to post back-to-back 1,200-yard seasons, making Grant just the third back in team annals to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ Has posted 37 special teams tackles from 2007-09, third most on the team over that span.

2009 OFFENSE - TEAM NOTES

- ▶ Posted franchise-record 461 points, topping the mark of 456 set by the 1996 Super Bowl champion Packers.
- ▶ Led the league with just 16 giveaways, the fewest in franchise history, surpassing the previous low of 19 in 1972.
- ▶ Finished with 6,065 total net yards, the third-best mark in team history behind only the 6,357 yards in 2004 and the 6,172 in 1983.
- ▶ Became first team in NFL history to have a 4,000-yard passer (Rodgers), two 1,000-yard receivers (Driver and Jennings) and a 1,200-yard rusher (Grant) in back-to-back seasons.
- ▶ Led the NFL in time-of-possession average at 33:03, the best mark in team history since stat began to be recorded in 1977.
- ▶ Outscored opponents by 164 points, good for the No. 2 scoring differential in the league behind only New Orleans (plus-169).
- ▶ Had six different players (Driver, Jennings, J. Jones, Nelson, Finley, Havner) post 45-yard receptions, which matched the franchise record set in 1951 and 1983.



PACKERS PROJECTED STARTERS - DEFENSE

LDE Ryan Pickett, 6-2, 340, 10th Year, Ohio State

- ▶ Key component of Packers' No. 1-ranked rushing defense in 2009 (franchise-record 83.3 yards allowed per game), the first time in team history that Green Bay led the league in that category.
- ▶ Has played in 134 of a possible 144 regular-season games during his nine-year career, missing just five contests due to injury.
- ▶ Signed four-year contract extension with the team through 2013 in March, and made the move from NT to LDE this offseason.

NT B.J. Raji, 6-2, 337, 2nd Year, Boston College

- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team, the first Packers defensive lineman to be selected since DE Vonnie Holliday in 1998.
- ▶ Played in 14 games with one start as a rookie in 2009, seeing most of his time at both end spots and as a down lineman in the nickel package, but is taking over starting nose tackle spot this season.
- ▶ Part of top-ranked rushing defense in the NFL (team-record 83.3 yards allowed per game).

RDE Cullen Jenkins, 6-2, 305, 7th Year, Central Michigan

- ▶ Started all 16 games for the first time in his career in 2009, and posted career highs in both tackles (50) and forced fumbles (three).
- ▶ One of only eight NFL defensive linemen to post at least 50 tackles, four sacks and three forced fumbles in 2009.
- ▶ Batted down nine passes in 2007, at the time the most by a Packers defensive lineman since the team began recording the statistic in 1980. Teammate Johnny Jolly eclipsed the mark in 2009 with 11.

LOLB Clay Matthews, 6-3, 255, 2nd Year, Southern California

- ▶ Set a Packers rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009 on his way to earning Pro Bowl honors, the first Green Bay rookie to be named to the all-star game since WR James Lofton in 1978.
- ▶ Selected to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team, earned 'Pepsi NFL Rookie of the Week' honors twice (Weeks 6 and 10), and was named NFC Defensive Player of the Week once (Week 13).
- ▶ Was sidelined for all four preseason games after injuring hamstring in annual Family Night scrimmage on Aug. 7.

BLB A.J. Hawk, 6-1, 247, 5th Year, Ohio State

- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles each of his four seasons in Green Bay.
- ▶ One of only 10 NFL linebackers to record at least 85 tackles, two interceptions and a sack in 2009.
- ▶ Hasn't missed a game in his career, playing in all 64 games with 62 starts, with the only non-starts coming in both Minnesota games in 2009 when the Packers opened in their nickel defense.

MLB Nick Barnett, 6-2, 236, 8th Year, Oregon State

- ▶ Ranks third in franchise annals (stat kept since 1975) with 986 career tackles, trailing only John Anderson (1,020) and Johnnie Gray (1,001).
- ▶ In 2009, led the team in tackles (122) for the fifth time in his career, a franchise record.
- ▶ Has surpassed the 120-tackle total in every season besides 2008, when he missed the final seven games with a torn ACL.

ROLB Brad Jones, 6-3, 242, 2nd Year, Colorado

- ▶ Played in 14 games with seven starts as a rookie, taking over the starting LOLB position in Week 12 at Detroit after Aaron Kampman sustained a season-ending knee injury in the previous game.
- ▶ Became only the fifth Packer (since 1982) to record four sacks as a rookie.
- ▶ Was one of only six NFL rookies in 2009 to post four or more sacks, and was joined in that group by teammate Clay Matthews.

LCB Charles Woodson, 6-1, 202, 13th Year, Michigan

- ▶ Named NFL Defensive Player of the Year by *The Associated Press* last season, becoming only the second Packer to win the award (DE Reggie White, 1998) and the oldest defensive back to earn the honor.
- ▶ Earned his sixth Pro Bowl bid in '09 by posting career-high nine interceptions, and earned NFC Defensive Player of the Month honors three times. Became first defensive player in the NFL to win a monthly award three times in the same season.
- ▶ Holds the franchise record with eight defensive TDs (seven INTs, one fumble return), eclipsing CB Herb Adderley and S Darren Sharper in 2009 (seven each) for the team mark.

RCB Tramon Williams, 5-11, 191, 4th Year, Louisiana Tech

- ▶ Led the team with a career-high 22 passes defended in 2009, and added a career-best 11 tackles on special teams.
- ▶ Is the only non-drafted free agent in the NFL to post four or more interceptions each of the last two seasons.
- ▶ In 2009, became the first player in franchise history to post a 65-yard interception return (67 vs. Chicago, Sept. 13) and a 45-yard punt return (45 vs. Detroit, Oct. 18) in the same season.

SS Morgan Burnett, 6-1, 209, Rookie, Georgia Tech

- ▶ Could become only the second Packers rookie safety since Chuck Cecil in 1988 to start a regular-season opener (Nick Collins in 2005 was the other).
- ▶ Has worked with the No. 1 defense throughout camp with incumbent starting SS Atari Bigby sidelined with an ankle injury that required surgery on Aug. 6.
- ▶ A third-round pick that the Packers moved up 15 spots to select, Burnett intercepted 14 passes in just three seasons at Georgia Tech, two shy of the school's career record.

FS Nick Collins, 5-11, 207, 6th Year, Bethune-Cookman

- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl for the second straight season in 2009, becoming the first Packers safety to earn the honor in back-to-back seasons since LeRoy Butler (1996-98).
- ▶ Leads all NFL safeties with 13 interceptions since 2008, and leads the league with 405 interception return yards over that span.
- ▶ Returned three INTs for TDs in 2008, becoming the first NFL safety to do so since Kansas City's Lloyd Burruss in 1986. His 295 INT return yards in '08 led the NFL and broke the franchise record (Bobby Dillon, 244 in 1956).

2009 DEFENSE - TEAM NOTES

- ▶ Led the NFL in rushing defense (a franchise-record 83.3 yards per game), the first time in team history that the Packers had the top run defense in the league.
- ▶ Finished season as the No. 2 overall defense, the highest ranking since the 1996 Packers finished as the No. 1 defense.
- ▶ Moved up 25 spots in the league rushing defense rankings from 2008, the biggest one-year improvement in the history of the franchise.
- ▶ Led the league with 40 takeaways and led the NFL with 30 interceptions, the first time the Packers led the league in interceptions since 1965 (tied with Washington for No. 1 that season with 27).
- ▶ Held opponents to less than 90 net yards rushing in 12 games, breaking the previous franchise record of 11 games set in 1996.
- ▶ Posted 141 points off of takeaways, tied for the No. 1 ranking in the league with New Orleans.

Through preseason

56 Nick Barnett, LB, 8th Year, Oregon State

Has recorded close to 1,000 tackles in seven seasons, and returned from a season-ending knee injury in 2008 to lead the team in tackles a season ago...Has eclipsed the century mark in tackles in six of his seven seasons and in 2005, set the single-season franchise record with 194 stops (128 solo), breaking a 24-year-old mark of 180 (Mike Douglass, 1981).

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started three of the team's four preseason games at Mack LB and recorded four tackles...Did not travel with the team for its preseason game at Seattle (Aug. 21), and practiced on a one-a-day schedule throughout training camp while continuing to rehabilitate and rest his reconstructed knee.

Streaks & Milestones

- Led the team in tackles for the fifth time in his career in 2009, a new franchise record. Broke the mark set by Brian Noble (four) and Bernardo Harris (four) for the most seasons leading the team in tackles (stat began in 1975).
- Ranks third in franchise annals with 986 career tackles. Trails only No. 1 John Anderson (1,020) and No. 2 Johnnie Gray (1,001).

Josh Bell, CB, 3rd Year, Baylor

Reserve cornerback who entered training camp looking to compete for the team's open nickel and dime positions but suffered a sprain in his right foot during the team's annual Family Night Scrimmage (Aug. 7)...Was placed on injured reserve on Aug. 10.

20 Atari Bigby, S, 5th Year, Central Florida

Veteran safety who will begin the 2010 season on the reserve/physically unable to perform list after re-aggravating an injury in his left ankle during the team's pre-training camp conditioning test on July 30...Underwent surgery on Aug. 6 and was placed on reserve/PUP at the first roster reduction Aug. 31.

55 Desmond Bishop, LB, 4th Year, California

A reserve linebacker and one of the club's core special teams players, he led the way with 22 tackles on coverage units in 2009...Has recorded 49 special teams tackles in his three seasons (2007-09), the most by a Packer over that span...Serves as the top backup behind A.J. Hawk at the Buck LB position in the base defense, but also sees time in various sub packages, including the five-linebacker 'Psycho' personnel group that was employed in the second half of the 2009 season.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in three of the team's four exhibition contests and finished with seven tackles (three solo)...Started at Mack LB in place of Nick Barnett at Seattle (Aug. 21) and recorded four tackles (two solo)...Injured his left hamstring in the first half of the game vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26), did not participate in practice during the final week of training camp and was held out of the preseason finale at Kansas City (Sept. 2).

75 Bryan Bulaga, T/G, Rookie, Iowa

A first-team All-Big Ten selection and the conference's offensive lineman of the year in 2009...Appeared in 30 games with 28 starts over the course of his three seasons with the Hawkeyes...Surrendered just 3½ sacks and was penalized only five times during his career...An early entrant following his junior season, was selected by the Packers No. 23 overall in the 2010 NFL Draft...Viewed as the heir apparent to veteran stalwart Chad Clifton at LT, but also competed with Daryn Colledge for the starting job at LG during his first training camp in Green Bay.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Saw action in each of the first two preseason games vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14) and at Seattle (Aug. 21)...Left practice with an injury to his right hip flexor on Aug. 23, returned on Aug. 24, but was then held out again until Aug. 30 and was scratched for the final two preseason games vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26) and at Kansas City (Sept. 2).

42 Morgan Burnett, S, Rookie, Georgia Tech

An athletic player with good range and the ability to play the ball once it's in the air, he intercepted 14 passes in just three seasons at Georgia Tech, the second-highest total in school history...Appeared in 40 career games for the Yellow Jackets, starting 28 and recording 235 career tackles...Began training for the draft following his junior season and came off the board in the third round at No. 71 overall when the Packers traded up 15 spots from No. 86 (surrendering both their third- and fourth-round picks to the Philadelphia Eagles) to secure his rights.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Worked with the first-team defense throughout the offseason while incumbent starter Atari Bigby explored restricted free agency...Started all four games at strong safety during the preseason and finished with six tackles (five solo), two passes defended and an interception...Had arguably his best outing in the team's third preseason game, a match-up with the defending AFC champion Indianapolis Colts (Aug. 26)...Finished the game with two tackles (both solo), two passes defended and an INT...The first pass deflection came at the start of the Colts' second possession on an impressive play that saw him come from the right hashmark in the middle of the field all the way to the sideline to nearly intercept and break up a deep Peyton Manning pass intended for WR Pierre Garcon...Later in the second quarter, came up to cover in place of a blitzing Charles Woodson and jumped an underneath route by Garcon, intercepting Manning and returning it 11 yards, the first takeaway of his young career.

24 Jarrett Bush, CB, 5th Year, Utah State

A core member of the special teams units, has tallied double digits in special teams tackles each of the past four seasons...Played extensively as the team's nickel cornerback in the second half of the 2009 season after veteran CB Al Harris suffered a season-ending knee injury in Week 11 vs. San Francisco...Started three games down the stretch, posting a career-high 26 tackles and seven passes defended.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in all four exhibition games, tallying eight tackles (seven solo), two passes defended and an INT...Interception came in the preseason finale at Kansas City when WR Dwayne Bowe lost his footing on the end of a curl route and QB Matt Cassel's throw sailed into the arms of the nearby Bush who ran it back for a 9-yard return...INT was the seventh by a Packers defender during the 2010 preseason, tying both San Francisco and the New York Giants for the league lead.

54 Brandon Chillar, LB, 7th Year, UCLA

An intelligent and versatile player who looks to see his role expand even more in the second year of the Packers' 3-4 alignment...Possesses the athleticism and fluidity to play in space against the pass, but also the aggressiveness to make plays in the run game...One of the team's top coverage linebackers, he typically draws the assignment against opposing tight ends and running backs...In 2009, suffered a broken right hand during Week 8 vs. Minnesota, and was forced to miss three of the next four games...Injury derailed what was on pace to be his best statistical season, one that saw him ranked third on the defense with 41 tackles at the time of the injury...Would have been eligible for unrestricted free agency following the season, but was rewarded with a long-term contract extension on Dec. 12, 2009.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Highlighted his versatility even more when he began practicing as an outside linebacker during the night practice on Aug. 1...Worked extensively with the first-team defense at ROLB, starting the second preseason game at Seattle (Aug. 21) at the position...Eventually moved back to the inside on Aug. 23 where he is the top backup to Nick Barnett at Mack LB in the base personnel, but is featured prominently with the first group when the team employs its nickel package...Appeared in all four preseason games, starting two, and tallying seven tackles (all solo) and a pass defended.

76 Chad Clifton, T, 11th Year, Tennessee

Has blocked for five of the top eight single-season rushers in franchise history (Ahman Green, 2001-03; Ryan Grant, 2008-09), and has helped pave the way for a 1,000-yard rusher in eight of his 10 seasons in Green Bay... Has been a part of top-10 offenses in the league in seven of his 10 years with the Packers...Was named a Pro Bowl alternate and started 12 games at LT in 2009, including the final eight when the offense solved its protection issues and propelled the team to a 7-1 record down the stretch... Entered unrestricted free agency in the offseason but quickly re-signed with the team in early March.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started three of the four games at LT and was part of a line that did not allow a sack of QB Aaron Rodgers in the preseason...Had minor swelling in his right knee towards the end of training camp, and was rested in practices and did not travel with the team or play in the preseason finale at Kansas City (Sept. 2).

Streaks & Milestones

- Has started 106 of last 112 games at LT.
- Has appeared in 143 games for Green Bay during his career and is on pace to eclipse the 150-game plateau in 2010, which would make him just the 19th player in franchise history to do so.

73 Daryn Colledge, G, 5th Year, Boise State

The only offensive lineman on the team to start every game in each of the last two seasons...Started 14 games at LG and two at LT in 2009 and played 97.4 percent of the team's offensive snaps, second on the team behind linemate Josh Sitton...A restricted free agent, he was offered a second-round tender in the offseason and re-signed May 10.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started all four games at LG and was part of a starting line that did not allow a sack of QB Aaron Rodgers in the preseason...Was pushed by the coaches to maintain his starting position when they opened up the competition at LG and he began splitting first-team reps with rookie Bryan Bulaga on Aug. 9...Was declared the starter for Week 1 at Philadelphia on Aug. 29.

Streaks & Milestones

- Has not missed a game in his career, playing in 64 straight games with 60 starts.

36 Nick Collins, S, 6th Year, Bethune-Cookman

Has quickly become one of the top playmakers in the league at the safety position and became the first Packers safety since LeRoy Butler (1996-98) to earn Pro Bowl bids in back-to-back seasons when he gained the honor again in 2009...Also earned second-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press* for the second straight year...Ranked second on the team behind Charles Woodson (nine) with six interceptions a season ago and leads all NFL safeties with 13 picks since the start of 2008...Started all 16 games for the fourth time in his five seasons in 2009 and finished with 54 tackles (45 solo), 16 passes defended and his first career sack.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started all four games at FS and recorded six tackles (four solo) and four passes defended.

Streaks & Milestones

- Is tied with Johnny (Blood) McNally (with four) for No. 5 on the Packers' all-time list for interception returns for touchdowns. With one more interception for a score, would tie Darren Sharper and Bobby Dillon for third on the team's all-time list.
- Is tied for second in the NFL with four interception returns for touchdowns since 2006, trailing only teammate Charles Woodson (7).
- Leads all NFL safeties with 13 interceptions since 2008.
- With those 13 interceptions since 2008, ranks tied for second in the league with Philadelphia's Asante Samuel, trailing only Woodson's 16.
- Leads the league with 405 interception return yards since 2008.

83 Tom Crabtree, TE, 1st Year, Miami (Ohio)

A practice squad alumnus who came from relative obscurity to make the 53-man roster in 2010...Impressed coaches with his consistent and sound technique as a blocker and his development on special teams...Initially a non-drafted free agent of the Chiefs in 2009 who was released by the team at the final roster cutdown a season ago...Joined the Packers' practice squad on Dec. 1, 2009, and practiced with the team for the final five weeks of last season.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four games and recorded one catch for 14 yards on offense and added two tackles on special teams...Suffered a sprained left wrist in the opener vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14), but did not miss any practice time...Played with a cast for the final three games.

2 Mason Crosby, K, 4th Year, Colorado

Tied for fourth in the NFL among kickers with 129 points in 2009... Connected on 27-of-36 field goal attempts and 48-of-49 extra points a season ago, also posting 12 touchbacks on kickoffs and two special teams tackles...Enjoyed a strong offseason and training camp, attributing his noted improvement to a change in his workout program that places a renewed emphasis on core strength.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Performed well throughout the preseason, executing all 21 of his attempts, going a perfect six-for-six on field goals and converting all 15 extra points...Made a 33-yard field goal in the preseason opener vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14)...Was good on both 34- and 51-yard attempts at Seattle (Aug. 21)...Made a 28-yarder vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26)...Finished the exhibition season by making 40- and 41-yard kicks at Kansas City (Sept. 2), despite the absence of regular LS Brett Goode, who had been injured earlier in the game.

Streaks & Milestones

- His 268 career points in 2007-08 were the most in NFL history by a player in his first two seasons.
- With 129 points in 2009, set the NFL record for most points scored by a player in his first three seasons with 397, eclipsing the record of New England's Stephen Gostkowski (388 points, 2006-08).

80 Donald Driver, WR, 12th Year, Alcorn State

The all-time leading receiver in franchise history, he started all 16 games and led the team with 70 receptions for 1,061 yards and six TDs in 2009... The yardage total marked his sixth-consecutive 1,000-yard season and his five catches of 40 yards or more ranked ninth in the NFL...Underwent minor arthroscopic surgery on both knees during the offseason, but has participated in all of training camp...Signed a two-year contract extension with the Packers on Aug. 6 that will run through the 2012 season and could allow him to retire with the only team he's ever suited up for.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started and played in three of the team's four preseason games, finishing with eight catches for 54 yards and TD in limited action...Lone TD came on a 6-yard back-shoulder throw from QB Aaron Rodgers vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26), one he pulled into his chest using only his right arm to secure the ball.

Streaks & Milestones

- Ranks first on the franchise's all-time list for receptions with 647.
- Has caught a pass in 127 consecutive games (133 including postseason), tops in franchise history.
- Ranks second in team history with 9,050 career receiving yards, trailing only James Lofton (9,656).
- Went over the 1,000-yard receiving mark for the seventh time in his career, extending his record ahead of Lofton and Sharpe (five each).
- One of only two players in the NFL (Reggie Wayne) to have 1,000 yards receiving each of the last six seasons (2004-09).
- Has caught 50-or-more passes in a season a franchise-best eight times,

topping Lofton and Sharpe (seven each) for the team record.

- All-time leader in receptions (311) at Lambeau Field, surpassing Freeman's 213 in 2007, and yards (4,285), surpassing Freeman's 3,477 in 2008.
- Has posted four 80-catch seasons to tie Sharpe's franchise mark.
- Has 22 career 100-yard receiving games, which ranks fourth in team history. Needs two more to equal No. 3 Hutson (24) on the team's all-time list.
- With touchdown catch vs. Atlanta in Week 5 of 2008, became only the eighth player in franchise history to reach 40 career, joining Hutson (99), Sharpe (65), Freeman (57), Max McGee (50), Lofton (49), Billy Howton (43) and Boyd Dowler (40); currently has 49.
- His TD catch vs. Baltimore in 2009 gave him 50 touchdowns (49 receiving, 1 rushing) for his career, making him only the 10th player in franchise annals to hit that mark.
- Ranks fourth all-time in yards from scrimmage with 9,267. Needs 446 yards to move past No. 3 Jim Taylor (9,712).
- With four catches in last season's Wild Card game at Arizona, moved past Edgar Bennett (31) for No. 4 in franchise history for receptions in the postseason with 32. Trails only Freeman (47), Robert Brooks (45) and Dorsey Levens (41.)

88 Jermichael Finley, TE, 3rd Year, Texas

One of the bright young players at his position across the league, enters his third season as a centerpiece in the Packers offense...Emerged during the second half of the 2009 season and became a go-to target for QB Aaron Rodgers...Creates a difficult match-up for opposing defenses as his athleticism and speed gives him an advantage over linebackers, and his size and strength makes him a problem for most defensive backs.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Picked up where he left off in 2009 by leading the team and tying for seventh in the NFL with 12 catches for 163 yards and two TDs during the preseason...Started all four exhibition games, and provided the truest glimpse of his potential productivity in the team's game vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26)...Posted six catches for 85 yards and a TD against the Colts, despite only playing the first half of the game...Accounted for 50 of those yards on three consecutive plays when the starters went into their two-minute offense before the end of the first half...Also had a team-leading four catches for 48 yards and a 12-yard TD at Seattle (Aug. 21) in a little more than a quarter of action.

Streaks & Milestones

- With his 55 receptions in 2009, tied No. 2 Paul Coffman (1981) and Jackie Harris (1992) for most catches by a tight end in a season. Was just one catch shy of Coffman's franchise-best 56 receptions in 1979.
- His 676 receiving yards last season were the fifth most by a Packers TE in franchise history and the most since Mark Chmura's 679 in 1995.
- Posted eight 50-yard games during the season, a franchise record for tight ends, surpassing Coffman's mark of seven set in 1981 and 1983.
- Caught seven or more passes in a franchise-record three games and six or more in four contests to match Paul Coffman's (1979) team record for tight ends.

10 Matt Flynn, QB, 3rd Year, Louisiana State

Developing player who showed continued progress during the 2010 off-season and training camp...Received praise from both coaches and teammates for his improved fundamentals and gains in accuracy, arm strength and mastery of the offense...Appeared in 15 games during his second season in 2009, serving as the team's primary holder through the first 13 of them, but also coming on in relief of QB Aaron Rodgers four times.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four exhibition contests (starting one) and saw the most extensive playing time of his young career between the Pro Bowler Rodgers and first-year newcomer Graham Harrell...Finished the preseason having completed 50-of-85 (58.8%) attempts for 583 yards and two touchdowns...Had his most statistically efficient outing vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26), completing 8-of-13 for 80 yards and two touchdowns in the second half...Found RB John Kuhn (2 yards) and TE Andrew Quarless (11 yards) inside the red zone for his first two TD passes of the preseason...Received his first-career start at Kansas City (Sept. 2) in place of Rodgers (coach's decision) and played into the fourth

quarter before yielding to Harrell...Finished the game 23-of-37 for 304 yards against the Chiefs defense...Long play came on a play-action pass when he faked a handoff to RB Gregg Lumpkin and found WR Brett Swain down the seam uncovered for a 77-yard gain, the team's longest of the preseason.

61 Brett Goode, LS, 3rd Year, Arkansas

Has appeared and performed flawlessly in each of the team's 32 games over the course of the last two seasons since being signed as a last-minute injury replacement for J.J. Jansen on the eve of the 2008 season...Has recorded four tackles and a fumble recovery on special teams during his two seasons.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Handled snapping duties for all four games but suffered a concussion in the preseason finale at Kansas City (Sept. 2) following a vicious collision with Chiefs LB Cory Greenwood while covering a Tim Masthay punt in the first quarter...Cleared initial sideline testing and returned to the game, but the onset of symptoms led to his removal from play later in the first half.

25 Ryan Grant, RB, 4th Year, Notre Dame

Was named a Pro Bowl alternate and started all 16 games, leading the team with a career-high 1,253 rushing yards and a career-best 11 TDs on 282 carries (4.4 avg.) in 2009...Ranked third in the NFC and seventh in the NFL in rushing yards...Also had 25 receptions for a career-high 197 yards (7.9 avg.)...Finished fourth in the NFC and ninth in the NFL in yards from scrimmage with 1,450.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started in the team's first three preseason games before being held out at Kansas City (Sept. 2, coach's decision)...Carried 16 times for 61 yards (3.8 avg) in limited action during the exhibition games...Suffered a concussion on his third carry of the preseason vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14) when Browns defenders Chris Gocong and Robaire Smith combined to bring him down on the Packers' second possession...Cleared the medical testing and returned for night practice on Aug. 17, progressing through the rest of training camp and preseason without incident.

Streaks & Milestones

- With his second straight 1,200-yard season in 2009, became only the third back in franchise annals to post consecutive 1,200-yard campaigns (Ahman Green, 2001-03; Jim Taylor, 1961-62).
- Surpassed the 3,000-yard plateau for his career at Detroit in Week 12 of 2009 and currently has 3,412, good for No. 9 in franchise history...Needs 300 yards to move up to No. 8 (Paul Hornung, 3,711) on the all-time list.
- Is the fourth back in franchise history to post back-to-back 1,000-yard seasons, joining Taylor (1961-64), John Brockington (1971-73) and Green (2000-04).
- One of only four running backs in the NFL to post 1,200 yards in each of the last two seasons (Adrian Peterson, Thomas Jones, Chris Johnson).
- With his 11 rushing TDs this season and eight in 2007, became only the fourth RB in team history to post eight or more TDs in two different seasons (Taylor, Green, Hornung).
- Starting with Week 8 at Denver in 2007, has 3,385 rushing yards, good for No. 2 in the NFL over that span behind only Minnesota's Adrian Peterson (3,814).
- Packers have a 9-1 regular-season record when Grant has 22 or more carries.
- Has a streak of a career-high 291 carries without a fumble; previous best was 215 rushing attempts without one (2007-08). The streak ranks No. 1 in the NFL among current streaks.
- Has played in 47 straight games.

35 Korey Hall, FB, 4th Year, Boise State

Helped clear the way for RB Ryan Grant to rush for a career-high 1,253 yards in 2009...Caught five passes for 41 yards and solidified his standing as one of the team's core special teams players by posting 12 tackles on various coverage units for the second consecutive season...Has 37 special teams tackles since 2007, the third most on the team over that span.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four games and

caught one pass for 14 yards...Placed second on the team with four special teams tackles and recovered a muffed Tim Masthay punt in the end zone for a TD vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26) to give the Packers a 21-17 lead in the second quarter of what was ultimately a 59-24 rout.

91 Justin Harrell, DE, 4th Year, Tennessee

Former first-round draft pick stayed healthy for the majority of training camp and looks to contribute in the rotation along the defensive front...Has appeared in just 13 games over the course of three seasons, but possesses the ideal size and strength to be effective in the 3-4.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Had tightness in his back following practice on Aug. 16 but was cleared to return on Aug. 19...Appeared in all four preseason games and made two tackles (one solo) from his left defensive end position.

31 Al Harris, CB, 13th Year, Texas A&M-Kingsville

Veteran cornerback who will begin the season on the reserve/physically unable to perform list while continuing to rehab his surgically repaired left knee that was injured in Week 11 of 2009 vs. San Francisco (Nov. 22)... Had started the first 10 games of the season at RCB before sustaining the injury, totaling 37 tackles (28 solo), two interceptions and seven passes defended.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Began training camp on active/physically unable to perform list and was later transferred to the reserve/physically unable to perform at the team's first roster reduction on Aug. 31.

Streaks & Milestones

• Needs to return one interception for a TD to tie No. 5 Charley Brock, Doug Hart, and Ken Ellis (all with three) on the Packers' all-time list. With two more interceptions for scores, would match No. 4 Johnny (Blood) McNally, and current teammate Nick Collins.

50 A.J. Hawk, LB, 5th Year, Ohio State

A Pro Bowl alternate a season ago, has now played in all 64 games during pro career, starting 62 of them...Placed second on the team with 87 tackles (70 solo) last year, also equaling a career high with two interceptions... Was one of only 10 linebackers in the NFL to post at least 85 tackles, two interceptions and a sack in 2009.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in three of the four preseason games, starting two at Buck LB and finishing with three tackles (one solo)...Suffered a sprained right ankle in night practice on Aug. 19 and was held out of the game at Seattle (Aug. 21).

Streaks & Milestones

• Went over career 400-tackle mark in '08 season finale vs. Detroit and currently has 492.

32 Brandon Jackson, RB, 4th Year, Nebraska

Appeared in the final 12 games of 2009, rushing 37 times for 111 yards and a career-high two TDs...Finished second among RBs with 187 receiving yards and a touchdown on 21 catches (8.9 avg.)...Earned praise from both coaches and teammates alike for his willingness as a blocker in blitz pick-ups on third downs and was credited with helping to solve some of the protection issues that plagued the team in the season's earlygoing.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in all four games, starting the preseason finale at Kansas City (Sept. 2)...Finished as the team's leading rusher in the preseason, having carried 24 times for 110 yards (4.6 avg.) and a touchdown...Had his best statistical outing at Seattle (Aug. 21) when he posted 80 yards on 11 carries and scored the game-winning TD on a 12-yard run with 3:34 to play in the fourth quarter to give Green Bay a 27-24 lead.

77 Cullen Jenkins, DE, 7th Year, Central Michigan

Emerged as an impact player in 2009, starting all 16 games and ranking second on the team with 4.5 sacks...Part of top-ranked rushing defense in the NFL, the unit allowed a franchise-best 83.3 yards per game... Registered 50 tackles (33 solo) and 23 QB hits, ranked second on the team with a career-high three forced fumbles, and recorded his first-career interception.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started the first two games vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14) and at Seattle (Aug. 21) at his familiar RDE position, tallying three tackles (one solo)...Strained his right calf in night practice on Aug. 23 and was held out for the remainder of training camp and the preseason.

85 Greg Jennings, WR, 5th Year, Western Michigan

Played in all 16 games with 13 starts and led the team with 1,113 receiving yards on 68 catches (16.4 avg.) in 2009...Was tied for fourth on the team with four TD catches...Ranked tied for seventh in the NFL with six receptions of 40-plus yards and was sixth in the NFC in receiving yards.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started three of the team's four preseason games and finished with six catches for 133 yards (22.2 avg.) and a touchdown...Got behind CB Kelly Jennings and S Earl Thomas on the Packers' first snap at Seattle (Aug. 21) and caught a deep post from QB Aaron Rodgers for a 56-yard gain...Was the beneficiary of a CB blitz in the opener vs. Cleveland when he found himself matched against rookie S T.J. Ward, whom he quickly beat down the right sideline for a 25-yard TD... Suffered back spasms in practice on Aug. 24 and was held out of the game vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26), but returned to the practice field on Aug. 29.

Streaks & Milestones

• Became fifth player in team history to post back-to-back 1,000-yard receiving seasons, joining James Lofton, Sterling Sharpe, Antonio Freeman, and Donald Driver.

• With 50-yard catch in the second quarter at St. Louis in Week 3 of 2009, hit the 3,000-yard mark for his career. Currently has 3,928 yards and 28 touchdowns on 239 career receptions (16.0 avg.). His 3,928 yards rank No. 12 in franchise history.

• Of his 28 career touchdown catches, 13 have been at least 40 yards in length. He has an average of 34.2 yards per touchdown catch, the top mark in the NFL among active players.

• His 21 catches of 40-plus yards since 2007 lead the NFL over that span.

• His 34 receptions of 25-plus yards since 2007 ranks tied for third in the NFL (with New England's Randy Moss) behind only Carolina's Steve Smith (39) and Atlanta's Roddy White (36).

45 Quinn Johnson, FB, 2nd Year, Louisiana State

A physical player who brings a different dimension to the offense in short-yardage and goal-line situations...Played in nine games as a rookie in 2009, seeing time at FB and on special teams, and caught two passes for 4 yards.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played extensively in all four preseason contests and caught two passes for 19 yards.

59 Brad Jones, LB, 2nd Year, Colorado

A seventh-round draft choice in 2009 who became a starter following a season-ending knee injury to veteran LB Aaron Kampman in Week 11 vs. San Francisco...Filled in admirably at LOLB for Kampman, starting seven games and registering 31 tackles (23 solo), four sacks, and 11 QB hits... Also posted eight tackles on special teams.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Flip-flopped with fellow outside linebacker Clay Matthews and will now line up at ROLB in 2010...Went through an injury-plagued training camp and preseason...Took a helmet to the back in the first practice of camp on July 31 and did not return until the morning practice on Aug. 5...Started at ROLB in the opener vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14) and made two tackles (one solo)...Sprained his right shoulder in night practice on Aug. 19, returned to the practice field on Aug. 29, but was held out of the final three games as a precaution.

89 James Jones, WR, 4th Year, San Jose State

Played in all 16 games with three starts and made 32 catches for 440 yards (13.8 avg.) in 2009...Finished tied for second on the team with career-high five TD catches.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Received praise from coaches for another solid offseason of work and figures to be a contributing factor in the Packers dynamic passing game...Played in all four contests, starting three and tying for second on the team with eight catches for 79 yards (9.9 avg) and a TD...Started in place of an injured Greg Jennings and had four

catches for 30 yards and a TD vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26)...Three-yard TD came with :03 remaining in the first half on a back-shoulder throw from QB Aaron Rodgers to put the Packers ahead 28-17 going into halftime.

30 John Kuhn, RB, 5th Year, Shippensburg

Played in 14 games with six starts in 2009...Scored touchdowns on 20 percent (3 of 15) of his offensive touches, and caught seven passes for 47 yards (6.7 avg.) on the season...Helped block for RB Ryan Grant's second straight 1,200-yard season...Also registered 11 tackles on special teams.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Displayed his versatility once again by serving as the team's No. 3 running back due to a run of injuries at the bottom of the depth chart...Played in all four games, carrying 13 times for 53 yards (4.1 avg.) and a rushing TD, while also catching four passes for 10 yards and scoring two TDs through the air...Scored his rushing TD on a memorable second-effort play vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14) in which he took a handoff off right tackle, bounced off of LB Scott Fujita, and then recovered and collided with S T.J. Ward before diving across the goal line...Had a preseason-high six carries for 30 yards (5.0 avg.) at Seattle (Aug. 21), and also caught a one-yard TD from QB Aaron Rodgers in the game.

70 T.J. Lang, T/G, 2nd Year, Eastern Michigan

Young offensive lineman who saw action in all 16 games as a rookie in 2009...Made three starts between the two tackle positions and is considered the top backup behind veteran Mark Tauscher at RT entering 2010...Underwent surgery on his wrist in April and missed part of the offseason program but appears to be fully caught up.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four games, starting the finale at Kansas City (Sept. 2) in place of LT Chad Clifton...Also took a number of reps at right guard during training camp, making center the only position along the offensive front he has not seen time at since arriving in Green Bay.

86 Donald Lee, TE, 8th Year, Mississippi State

The experienced veteran of an otherwise young tight end group...Played in all 16 games with 10 starts in 2009, ranking fourth on the team with 37 receptions for 260 yards (7.0 avg.) and a touchdown...Has seen an increased role on special teams and practiced with most of the first-team units during training camp.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in all four games, starting vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14) and at Kansas City (Sept. 2) when the offense opened in double tight end formations...Finished with two catches for 6 yards and also chipped in two tackles on special teams.

22 Pat Lee, CB, 3rd Year, Auburn

Young defensive back who has not appeared in a regular-season game since Nov. 24, 2008, due to injury...Spent the 2009 season on injured reserve after suffering a hyperextended knee on a kickoff return in the preseason finale at Tennessee (Sept. 3)...Repped extensively with the nickel and dime defenses during the spring and could be called upon to contribute in the absence of veteran CB Al Harris for the first six weeks of the season.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in all four games, and tied for fourth on the defense with nine tackles (five solo)...Also contributed a tackle on special teams.

29 Derrick Martin, S, 5th Year, Wyoming

Acquired by the Packers via trade with Baltimore in exchange for OL Tony Moll on the eve of the 2009 season...Appeared in 14 games with one start in 2009 and posted a career-high 21 special teams tackles, the second-highest total on the team.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four games as both a reserve safety and on special teams...Recorded five tackles (all solo), an interception and a pass defended...Interception came during the opener vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14) when he stepped in front of a QB Colt McCoy pass intended for TE Evan Moore on an out route along the Packers sideline...Also recorded a tackle on special teams.

8 Tim Masthay, P, 1st Year, Kentucky

First-year pro who won an offseason and training-camp competition with Australian Chris Bryan for the Packers' punting job...Was a standout specialist during his collegiate career at Kentucky, appearing in 50 games as the Wildcats' holder, punter and kickoff specialist...A first-team All-Southeastern Conference pick by both the league's coaches and media following his senior season in 2008...Originally signed with the Indianapolis Colts as a non-drafted free agent but was released Aug. 11, 2009, before appearing in any preseason games...Sat out the entire 2009 season but signed with Green Bay on Jan. 14, 2010, and spent the full offseason with the team.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in all four games, rotating with Bryan, not only with repetitions as the punter, but also rotating games as the holder on placements for K Mason Crosby...Had three punts for 142 yards (47.3 avg., 35.7 net) in the opener vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14)...Punted only once at Seattle (Aug. 21), a 43-yarder that was not returned...Began to pull away in the competition after the third game vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26)...Against the Colts, he boomed his only punt 53 yards before it was bobbled by KR Brandon James and recovered by FB Korey Hall in the end zone for a TD...Also kicked off five times against the Colts, netting one touchback...Finished the preseason at Kansas City (Sept. 2) with three punts that traveled 121 yards (40.3 avg., 23.0 net).

52 Clay Matthews, LB, 2nd Year, Southern California

In 2009, became the first Packers rookie to be named to the Pro Bowl since WR James Lofton earned the honor in 1978...Played in all 16 games with 13 starts at ROLB...Led the team with 10 sacks, the most by a Packers rookie in franchise history...The 10 sacks also ranked second in the NFL among rookies behind only Washington's Brian Orakpo (11.0)...Tallied 58 tackles (42 solo), a forced fumble and three recoveries a season ago.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Sustained an injury to his left hamstring in the annual Family Night Scrimmage (Aug. 7) and was held out for the remainder of training camp and the preseason...Hamstring strain occurred almost one year to the day (Aug. 6) after he suffered the exact same injury prior to the 2009 preseason.

Streaks & Milestones

- Led the team with a Packers rookie-record 10 sacks. The only other Green Bay rookie to finish as the team leader in sacks was LB Tim Harris in 1986 with eight.
- With three fumble recoveries, finished one shy of Johnnie Gray (four in 1975) for the rookie franchise record.
- First NFL rookie since Tennessee's Jevon Kearse in 1999 to post three 2-sack games and a fumble return for a touchdown in the same season.
- Posted a sack in four straight games (Weeks 12-15), the longest streak by a rookie in team history and the longest in the NFL since Chicago's Mark Anderson (also four games) in 2006.

67 Nick McDonald, G, Rookie, Grand Valley State

One of three non-drafted college free agents (Sam Shields, Frank Zombo) to make the Packers' final 53-man roster...A tough, versatile player, he also possesses the ability to play center and did so at times during training camp...Played in 44 games with 29 starts during his college career, and was named the Great Lakes Athletic Conference's Offensive Lineman of the Year following his senior season in 2009.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four games seeing action as a reserve at both right guard and center.

96 Mike Neal, DE, Rookie, Purdue

Powerful young defensive lineman who stands to see significant playing time during his rookie season...Was chosen with the No. 56 overall pick in the second round of the 2010 draft and is listed as the top backup at RDE behind veteran Cullen Jenkins...Could also see extensive opportunities as an inside rusher in the team's nickel defense...Was a four-year letterman and two-year starter at Purdue who rarely left the field during his junior and senior seasons...Appeared in 46 games with 23 starts and totaled 99 tackles (56 solo), including 26 for loss and 13 sacks during his collegiate career.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four games, starting the final two vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26) and at Kansas City (Sept. 2) and made two tackles (both solo) from the RDE position...Impressed coaches and teammates with his strength and work ethic throughout the offseason and training camp, and looks to be physically ready to play at the professional level.

87 Jordy Nelson, WR, 3rd Year, Kansas State

Played in 13 games and posted 22 receptions for 320 yards (14.5 avg.) and two TDs in 2009...Also returned 25 kickoffs for a 25.4-yard average and 17 punts for a 5.3-yard average...His kick-return average ranked sixth in the NFC and 11th in the NFL...Continues to compete for opportunities in what is a talented receiving corps and is listed as the team's primary kickoff return man to start the regular season.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four games, starting one vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26) and had seven catches for 78 yards...Also tied for the team lead with three kickoff returns for 89 yards (a team-high 29.7 avg.).

74 Marshall Newhouse, G/T, Rookie, Texas Christian

The second of the Packers' two fifth-round draft choices, he played in 62 games with 38 starts over the course of four seasons...Started every game but one at LT during the final three years of his career...Has worked at both left guard and left tackle since arriving in Green Bay.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in all four games, playing extensively late in games at both left guard and left tackle.

26 Charlie Peprah, S, 4th Year, Alabama

Spent three seasons in Green Bay from 2006-08 before sustaining a knee injury during the 2009 training camp and was placed on injured reserve Sept. 6...Spent the second half of the 2009 season with the Atlanta Falcons, but signed as a free agent with the Packers on April 26...Will look to provide experienced depth in the secondary and contribute on special teams, where he notched 22 tackles during his first three seasons with the franchise.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in all four games, leading the safeties with eight tackles (seven solo) and a pass defensed, while also making a tackle on special teams.

79 Ryan Pickett, DE/NT, 10th Year, Ohio State

Veteran anchor in the defensive front who will make the transition to LDE in 2010...Played in 13 games with nine starts at NT in 2009 and posted 47 tackles (25 solo) and a pass defensed on the season...Was a critical part of top-ranked rushing defense in the NFL (a franchise-best 83.3 yards per game), the first time in franchise history that the team was No. 1 in the league against the run...Rewarded with a long-term contract extension on March 12 prior to the start of the team's offseason program.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in all four games, starting both road games at Seattle (Aug. 21) and at Kansas City (Sept. 2) when the team opened in its base defense...Led the defensive line with seven tackles (five solo) and looks to have adjusted well to his move away from the interior.

51 Brady Poppinga, LB, 6th Year, Brigham Young

A steady, experienced player who will provide depth at both outside linebacker positions and is a valuable contributor on special teams...Played in 15 games with three starts at ROLB in 2009 and recorded 21 tackles (14 solo), a sack and a pass defensed...Also registered 10 tackles on special teams.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started all four games at LOLB in the absence of Clay Matthews (hamstring) and tallied six tackles (five solo), a sack and a pass defensed...In the opener vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14), pursued QB Seneca Wallace and ran him out of bounds behind the line of scrimmage, registering the team's first sack of the preseason.

81 Andrew Quarless, TE, Rookie, Penn State

The first of the Packers' two fifth-round draft choices in 2010, showed

marked improvement over the course of training camp and made the final roster in what was an ultra-competitive tight end group...Finished his college career as the Nittany Lions' all-time leader in receptions by a tight end, tallying 87 catches for 1,146 yards and eight touchdowns in 49 career games.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in all four games and finished with seven catches for 63 yards and a TD...Scored on an 11-yard pass from QB Matt Flynn vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26).

90 B.J. Raji, NT, 2nd Year, Boston College

Played in 14 games with one start as a rookie in 2009, seeing most of his time at both end spots and as a down lineman in the nickel defense...Named to *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team after registering 36 tackles (24 solo) and a sack...Part of top-ranked rushing defense in the NFL (a franchise-best 83.3 yards per game), the first time in franchise history that the team was No. 1 in the league against the run...Slated to play exclusively at NT in 2010 after making the permanent switch to the all-important position during the offseason.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started all four games at NT and finished with two tackles (one solo)...In the first quarter vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26), came off a block from LG Mike Pollak and moved laterally down the line to bury WR Reggie Wayne behind the line of scrimmage on a screen play that resulted in a loss of 4 yards.

12 Aaron Rodgers, QB, 6th Year, California

Widely regarded as one of the top passers in the league and is a pre-season Most Valuable Player candidate according to several national publications...Selected to the Pro Bowl for the first time in his career in 2009 and ended up starting the game for the NFC...Started every game for the second straight season and completed 350-of-541 passes (64.7 percent) for 4,434 yards, 30 touchdowns and seven interceptions for a 103.2 rating, which ranked fourth in the NFL...Ranked fourth in the league in passing yards, fourth in TD passes and first in interception percentage (1.29)...Tied for NFL lead (with Donovan McNabb and Tony Romo) with 17 completions of 40-plus yards...Was tied for second in the league (with Romo and Drew Brees) with 39 completions of 25-plus yards, trailing only Eli Manning's 42...Rushed for 316 yards and five TDs on 58 carries (5.4 avg.), the second-most yards by any quarterback in the NFL in 2009 (David Garrard, 323).

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started the first three games before being held out for the preseason finale at Kansas City (Sept. 2, coach's decision)...Led the NFL with a 141.2 rating after completing 41-of-53 passes (77.4 percent) for 470 yards and six TDs without throwing an interception...Led touchdown drives on seven of the first-team offense's 12 possessions...Was not sacked in any of the three games...Opened the preseason with a near-perfect 12-of-13 outing vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14), throwing for 159 yards and TD...Nearly equaled that performance a week later at Seattle (Aug. 21), going 8-of-11 for 116 yards and two TDs...Completed 21-of-29 for 195 yards and three TDs in the first half vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26), his most extensive playing time of the exhibition season.

Streaks & Milestones

- Is the first quarterback in NFL history to throw for 4,000 yards in the first two seasons that he started a game.
- Is the first quarterback in NFL history to throw 30 or more touchdowns, seven or fewer interceptions, and rush for five TDs in the same season.
- His 4,434 passing yards on the season rank No. 2 in franchise history behind only Lynn Dickey's 4,458 in 1984.
- Is only the second QB in franchise history (Brett Favre, 1998-99) to post back-to-back seasons with 4,000 yards passing.
- In 2008, became only the fourth quarterback in franchise history to throw for 4,000 yards in a season (Favre, Lynn Dickey, Majkowski).
- Is one of just three QBs in franchise annals to hit the 30-TD mark in a season (Dickey, 1983; Favre 1994-98, 2001, 2003-04).
- His career passer rating of 97.2 ranks first in franchise history (min. 800 attempts).
- In 32 career starts, has posted a 100-plus passer rating in 18 contests.

- Now has had four or more rushing TDs in back-to-back seasons to become just the third Packers QB to accomplish that feat (Tobin Rote, 1954-56; Scott Hunter, 1971-72).
- His streak of 32 straight starts ranks tied for sixth in the league among active quarterbacks.

37 Sam Shields, CB, Rookie, Miami

An intriguing player with impressive physical tools who has played his way into a role as the team's nickel cornerback entering the season... Signed with the Packers as a non-drafted college free agent on April 30, following a collegiate career that saw him make the transition from wide receiver to CB before his senior year...Initially valued because of his elite speed and return ability, he has most recently appeared as the team's No. 3 CB because of injuries to veteran Al Harris and second-year man Brandon Underwood.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four games, starting one and leading the defense with five passes defended and two interceptions...The two picks tied him for the most in the NFL by a rookie during the exhibition season (Stevie Brown, Oakland) and were tied for the most among all players in the NFC...Totaled nine tackles (six solo) and added a stop on special teams...Started the finale at Kansas City (Sept. 2) as the team's third CB when the defense opened in nickel...Had a preseason-high six tackles (five solo) against the Chiefs...Sealed the win at Seattle (Aug. 21) late in the fourth quarter when QB Charlie Whitehurst's pass deflected off the hand of TE Anthony McCoy and into Shields' awaiting arms for his first interception...Returned the INT 19 yards and the Packers ran out the clock for a 27-24 victory...His other INT was a highlight-reel play vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26), when he jumped an out route and went full extension to pull in a QB Curtis Painter pass along the Packers sideline late in the fourth quarter.

71 Josh Sitton, G, 3rd Year, Central Florida

Has evolved into arguably the most steady player along the Packers offensive front...Started all 16 games at RG and participated in each of the 1,093 plays the offense ran in 2009, the only player on either side of the ball to accomplish the feat...Part of line that blocked for RB Ryan Grant's career-high 1,253 rushing yards, his second straight 1,200-yard season, and member of an offense that ranked No. 6 in total yards...Helped Packers become the first team in NFL history to have a 4,000-yard passer, a 1,200-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers in back-to-back seasons.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started all four games and was part of a line that did not allow QB Aaron Rodgers to be sacked the entire preseason.

72 Jason Spitz, C/G, 5th Year, Louisville

Versatile utility player who has started games at center and both the left and right guard positions during his career...Won starting C position in training camp in 2009 but was ultimately placed on injured reserve with a back injury on Nov. 7...Had surgery on Nov. 11...Adds depth and stability to the offensive line and could contribute at any of the three positions in 2010.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in three of the four games, appearing at both center and left guard...Was held out of the game vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14) after suffering a strain in his right calf in practice on Aug. 9...Returned to the field for the morning practice on Aug. 17.

44 James Starks, RB, Rookie, Buffalo

Sixth-round draft pick who has not practiced with the team since OTAs... Suffered a strain to his right hamstring during practice on May 18 and was placed on active/physically unable to perform at the start of training camp...Later transferred to reserve/physically unable to perform at the team's first roster reduction on Aug. 31...Was a very productive player during his college career before sustaining a shoulder injury that caused him to miss his senior season...Appeared in 36 games as a collegian, finishing as the all-time leading rusher in school history with 698 carries for 3,140 yards (4.5 avg.) and 34 touchdowns in his three seasons.

16 Brett Swain, WR, 2nd Year, San Diego State

Originally a seventh-round draft choice of the Packers in 2008, he made the final roster as the team's No. 5 WR in 2009 but suffered a season-ending knee injury while covering a kickoff in Week 7 at Cleveland (Oct. 25) and was placed on injured reserve Oct. 27...A determined special teams player who looks to contribute on the various coverage units again in 2010.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four games and posted a team-high 164 receiving yards on eight catches...Highlight of the preseason came at Kansas City (Sept. 2) when he got behind the secondary following a play-action fake by QB Matt Flynn and raced down the seam for a 77-yard gain, the offense's longest of the preseason...Finished the game against the Chiefs with six catches for 130 yards...Also added a tackle on special teams during the exhibition season.

65 Mark Tauscher, T, 11th Year, Wisconsin

A solid veteran who opens the season as the Packers' starter at right tackle for the 10th time in the last 11 years...Started eight games at RT in 2009 after joining the team in Week 6 following rehabilitation of a season-ending knee injury that caused him to miss the final three games of 2008...Began to take the majority of snaps against San Francisco in Week 11...In the seven-game span that ensued, he helped the line allow just 10 sacks after giving up 41 in the first nine contests...Part of a line that blocked for RB Ryan Grant's career-high 1,253 rushing yards, his second straight 1,200-yard season, and member of an offense that ranked No. 6 in total yards... Helped Packers become the first team in NFL history to have a 4,000-yard passer, a 1,200-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers in back-to-back seasons.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Reported to training camp healthy and in great shape and started all four games at RT...Part of a first-team OL unit that did not allow a sack of QB Aaron Rodgers throughout the preseason.

33 Brandon Underwood, CB, 2nd Year, Cincinnati

Young defender who made great strides during the offseason program and opened camp as the team's nickel cornerback...Appeared in 11 games as a rookie in 2009, mostly on special teams where he posted nine tackles.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started the first three games, vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14) and Indianapolis (Aug. 26) as the team's third CB in the nickel defense and at Seattle (Aug. 21) in the base package in place of veteran Charles Woodson... Finished the preseason with 10 tackles (eight solo), an interception and two passes defended...Against the Browns, intercepted a QB Colt McCoy pass in the end zone and returned it 35 yards... Sprained his left shoulder against the Colts and was removed from the game...Has not returned to practice since the injury and was held out of the game at Kansas City (Sept. 2).

63 Scott Wells, C, 7th Year, Tennessee

Played in 15 games with 14 starts at C in 2009...Part of line that blocked for RB Ryan Grant's career-high 1,253 rushing yards, his second straight 1,200-yard season, and member of an offense that ranked No. 6 in total yards...Helped Packers become the first team in NFL history to have a 4,000-yard passer, a 1,200-yard rusher and two 1,000-yard receivers in back-to-back seasons.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started all four games and was part of a line that did not allow a sack of QB Aaron Rodgers during the preseason.

38 Tramon Williams, CB, 4th Year, Louisiana Tech

Played in all 16 games with a career-high 10 starts in 2009...Served as the team's nickel back for first 10 contests before moving into starting RCB spot in Week 12 due to Al Harris' season-ending knee injury...Led team with a career-high 22 passes defended...Posted 42 tackles (29 solo), four interceptions and a sack...Added a career-high 11 stops on special teams, which was tied for fourth on the team...Had a 10.4-yard average on 13 punt returns and also returned two kickoffs for 26 yards (13.0 avg.)...Enters the 2010 season as the starter at RCB in the absence of Harris, who will spend the first six weeks on the reserve/PUP list.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Started all four games at RCB, tied for second on the defense and first among defensive backs with 11 tackles (nine solo) and a pass defended...Placed an emphasis on improving his tackling during the offseason and it showed with his productivity in that area during the exhibition games.

Streaks & Milestones

- Has played in 48 straight games.
- First player in franchise history to post an interception return of 65-plus yards (67 vs. Chicago, Sept 13) and a punt return of 45-plus yards (45 vs. Detroit, Oct. 18) in the same season. (Individual interceptions were not recorded until 1940).
- In 2009, along with secondary mates Charles Woodson, Nick Collins and Atari Bigby, became first Packers quartet to each post four-plus interceptions in a season since 1967.

98 C.J. Wilson, DE, Rookie, East Carolina

The Packers' seventh-round draft choice in 2010, he made the final roster as the team's sixth defensive lineman and will look to earn playing time as he continues to develop and learn the nuances of the 3-4 scheme...Was a highly productive 4-3 defensive end in college, playing in 54 games, starting the final 37, and finishing with 192 tackles, including an impressive 45½ for losses and 27 sacks.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Appeared in all four games and made five tackles (four solo) from the defensive end position.

21 Charles Woodson, CB, 13th Year, Michigan

The NFL's reigning Defensive Player of the Year, who is coming off of a career season in 2009...Was the first cornerback to win the award since Deion Sanders in 1994...Won NFL Defensive Player of the Year from *Sporting News*...Also named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press*, *Sporting News* and *Sports Illustrated*...Selected to the Pro Bowl for the sixth time in his career and for the second straight season, earning a starting spot on the NFC squad...Started all 16 games at LCB and led the team with a career-high nine interceptions, which tied for the NFL lead...Tied for the NFL lead with a career-high three interception returns for touchdowns...Led the team with four forced fumbles, which also matches his career high (Oakland, 2002)...Also posted two sacks, which was tied for second in the NFL among defensive backs...Led the secondary with a career-high 81 tackles (63 solo) and was second on the team with 21 passes defended...His four double-digit tackle games were a new career-high, eclipsing his mark of three with Oakland in 2004...Named NFC Defensive Player of the Month for September, the second straight year he earned the honor in September, and also for November and December/January to become the first player to win the Defensive Player of the Month award three times in the same season; Hall of Fame RB Barry Sanders and K Mike Vanderjagt are the only players to win the monthly recognition three times in a season...On Thanksgiving Day, his \$2 million donation to the new University of Michigan C.S. Mott Children's Hospital and Women's Hospital was announced.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in just two games, starting at LCB vs. Cleveland (Aug. 14) and vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26)...Did not travel for the games at Seattle (Aug. 21) or at Kansas City (Sept. 2)

Streaks & Milestones

- Holds the franchise record with eight defensive TDs (seven interceptions, one fumble return), eclipsing Herb Adderley and Darren Sharper (seven each) for the team mark.
- His three interception returns for touchdowns in 2009 tied him with Adderley (1966) and teammate Nick Collins (2008) for the team record.
- Posted his 40th career interception at Cleveland in Week 7 and currently has 45, with more than half of those (28) coming in his four seasons in Green Bay.
- Is tied for first in team history with seven interceptions for touchdowns, matching Adderley's franchise record.
- Is the only player in franchise history to score on an interception in four consecutive seasons.
- Only the second player in team history (Bobby Dillon) to post seven-plus interceptions in three seasons.

- Is second in the NFL for most interceptions since 2006 with 27, trailing only Philadelphia's Asante Samuel (29).

- His six interception returns for touchdowns since 2006 lead the NFL.
- His eight career interception returns for touchdowns tie him for No. 6 in NFL history with Eric Allen (1988-2001).
- Is the only player in NFL history (since sacks became an official statistic in 1982) to post seven interceptions and two sacks in back-to-back seasons (2008-09).
- Is only the fourth in NFL history (since 1982) and the first since Baltimore's Ed Reed in 2004 to post nine interceptions and two sacks in the same season.
- His five sacks over the past two seasons are tied (with Cincinnati's Chinedum Ndukwe) for the most by any defensive back in the NFL.
- First among active NFL cornerbacks with 22 career forced fumbles.
- Against Dallas in Week 10 of 2009, became the first NFL player to record two forced fumbles, an interception and a sack in a game since Steelers linebacker James Harrison accomplished the feat two years ago to the day vs. Baltimore on Nov. 15, 2007. In that contest, Harrison posted three forced fumbles, 3½ sacks and an interception.
- In 2009, along with secondary mates Tramon Williams, Nick Collins and Atari Bigby, became first Packers quartet to each post four-plus interceptions in a season since 1967.

58 Frank Zombo, LB, Rookie, Central Michigan

A college defensive end who has made the transition to outside linebacker in the Packers' 3-4 defense...Played his way onto the roster by taking advantage of the injuries atop the depth chart at OLB and making plays throughout the preseason...A four-year letterman and three-year starter at Central Michigan, he appeared in 55 games with 39 starts during his collegiate career...Finished his career ranked second all-time in school history with 25½ sacks and was an All-Mid-American Conference first-team choice following his senior season in 2009.

► **Preseason Notes & Statistics:** Played in all four games, starting two and finished as the defense's leading tackler and sack man...Suffered a sprained ankle in the morning practice Aug. 5 and had significant swelling, but returned to the practice field on Aug. 12 and showed continued progression in spite of the injury. Totaled 18 tackles (12 solo), two sacks and a forced fumble...Had five tackles (four solo) and his first sack, taking down QB Charlie Whitehurst at Seattle (Aug. 21)...Highlight of his preseason came in the third quarter vs. Indianapolis (Aug. 26) the following week, when he spun away from RT Ryan Diem and caught QB Peyton Manning from behind, sacking him and stripping the ball which was then picked up by LB Robert Francois and returned to the Indianapolis 2-yard line...The Packers' touchdown on the ensuing play gave them a commanding 38-17 lead in what was eventually a 59-24 rout.
