## PACKERS PAY RARE VISIT TO HOUSTON TO FACE TEXANS

Green Bay travels to Houston for the first time since 2004 to take on the undefeated Texans in the Packers' second game of a three-game road trip.

- It will be the first time the Packers have faced an undefeated team with five or more wins since they played the 7-0 Tennessee Titans in Nashville on Nov. 2, 2008. Houston and Atlanta are the only remaining undefeated teams this season.
- This marks only the second visit to Reliant Stadium for the Packers, with the first meeting also played on a Sunday night. That game (Nov. 21, 2004) ended with a 46-yard Ryan Longwell field goal as time expired to give Green Bay a 16-13 win.
- The Packers are 4-0 all-time in the city of Houston, with three of those victories coming against the Oilers.
- The only other meeting between the Packers and Texans also ended with a field goal as time expired. Kris Brown's 40-yarder at Lambeau Field on Dec. 7, 2008, gave Houston the 24-21 victory.
- Green Bay fell to 2-3 this season with a 30-27 loss to Indianapolis on Sunday at Lucas Oil Stadium. The Packers have won 19 of their last 23 regular-season games (.826), the best record in the league over that span.
- The Texans improved to 5-0 with a 23-17 win at the N.Y. Jets on Monday night. Houston enters Sunday's game tied for No. 3 in the league in points scored (29.8 ppg) and ranked No. 4 in points allowed (14.6 ppg).
- Following Sunday's contest at Houston, Green Bay will close out its three-game road swing at St. Louis next Sunday. It is the first time the Packers have played three straight road contests since 1998 (Weeks 10-12).
- Ironically, Houston (Weeks 12-14) is the only other team in the league with three consecutive road games on the 2012 schedule.
- Including playoffs, Green Bay is 10-3 (.769) away from Lambeau Field over its last 13 games. The Packers have won seven of their last 10 regular-season road contests.



## UNDER THE LIGHTS

This week's contest at Houston is one of three scheduled Sunday night contests for the Packers this season, with games at the N.Y. Giants in Week 12 and vs. Detroit in Week 14 (both subject to flex scheduling).

- The Packers have won five of their last six games played on Sunday night, with the lone loss over that span coming at New England (31-27) in Week 15 of the 2010 season.
- Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the Packers are 6-3 (.667) in Sunday night contests.
- Green Bay is 18-5 all-time in Sunday night contests, a .783 winning percentage that ranks **No. 1 in NFL history**, ahead of Miami (15-7, .682) and Kansas City (10-5, .667).
- Since 2009, Green Bay is 9-4 overall (.692) in prime-time games.

## WITH THE CALL

NBC Sports will broadcast the game to a national audience. Play-by-play man **Al Michaels** joins color commentator **Cris Collinsworth** in the booth with **Michele Tafoya** reporting from the sidelines.



- Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 53-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) calling the action. The duo enters its 14th season of broadcasts together across the Packers Radio Network, which covers 44 markets in six states.
- Dial Global Sports radio will air the game across the country. **Dave Sims** (play-by-play) and **James Lofton** (analyst) will call the action, with **Hub Arkush** reporting from the sidelines. **Scott Graham** hosts pregame and halftime shows.
- Univision Radio will broadcast the game in Spanish to a national audience, with **Raul Striker Jr.** (play-by-play) and **Joaquin Duro** (color) calling the action.
- The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (Channel 92, WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.

## PACKERS AT TEXANS – WEEK 6

### PRODUCTION APLENTY INSIDE THE 20

The Packers are off to another fast start when it comes to productivity in the red zone, converting 11-of-15 opportunities this season.

- Green Bay's 73.3 conversion percentage inside the 20 through Week 5 ranks **No. 1 in the NFL**:

- Last season marked the fourth straight top-10 finish in the category for the Packers. In 2010, Green Bay checked in at No. 6 in the NFL at 60.4. The team finished No. 9 in 2009 (54.8) and No. 6 in 2008 (60.4).
- Green Bay was one of only two teams in the NFL (Tennessee) to finish in the top 10 in red-zone efficiency each year from 2008-11.
- A look at the top red-zone percentages in the league **since 2008**:

- Over their past 14 regular-season games, the Packers have scored TDs on 38-of-53 trips inside the 20-yard line (71.7 percent).
- Green Bay will be put to the test on Sunday night by a Houston club that ranks No. 6 in the league in red-zone defense (36.4 percent, 4-of-11).

### ON THE ROAD

Since taking over as the starter in 2008, QB **Aaron Rodgers** has been one of the most effective signal-callers in the league away from home.

- Rodgers' 117.5 passer rating on the road in 2011 (185-of-277, 2,494 yards, 21 TDs, two INTs) set a single-season franchise record, and he now holds the top two spots with that and his 108.4 rating in 2009.
- A look at where Rodgers' career rating (min. 700 attempts) on the road ranks in NFL history:

- In his last 13 regular-season starts away from Lambeau Field, Rodgers has completed 287-of-426 passes (67.4 percent) for 3,651 yards and 29 TDs with just four INTs for a **112.7 passer rating**. Rodgers has posted a 100-plus passer rating in **10 of those 13 games**.

### STAT OF THE WEEK

- At Indianapolis this past Sunday, WR **James Jones** caught two TD passes for the second straight week.
- The two TD catches matched Jones' career high (Week 4 vs. New Orleans, last season in Week 16 vs. Chicago), with all three of his two-TD catch games coming over the past seven regular-season contests.
- Jones is the **only player in the NFL** with three two-TD catch games over the past seven regular-season contests, and his seven TD catches over that span are tied for No. 1 in the league with Saints WR Marques Colston, Giants WR Victor Cruz and Falcons WR Julio Jones.
- Jones is the second Packer since 2011 to accomplish that feat, with WR Jordy Nelson also recording three two-TD catch games in the final seven games last season.
- With five TD grabs this season, Jones is **tied with Cruz for the league lead** through Week 5.
- Jones is the **first Packer** to have five or more TD catches in the first five games of a season since WR Javon Walker registered five TD grabs in the opening five games of the 2004 season.
- Jones now has five-plus TD catches each of the past four seasons (2009-12), the first Packer to accomplish that feat since WR Antonio Freeman did so in six consecutive seasons (1996-2001).

**MIKE MCCARTHY...**Is in seventh year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Has led the Packers to playoff appearances in four of his six seasons as the helm, and the team's four postseason berths over the past five seasons are the most by an NFC team.
- ▶ His .642 winning percentage (including playoffs) ranks No. 5 among active NFL coaches (min. 50 games).
- ▶ One of only two coaches, along with New Orleans' Sean Payton, to have his offense ranked in the top 10 in total yardage each season from 2006-11.
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Became the first Packers coach since Lombardi to lead the team to a championship game in his second season (2007).

**GARY KUBIAK...**Is in seventh year as Texans' second head coach.

- ▶ In 2011, led the Texans to a franchise-best 10-6 record, their first division title, their first playoff appearance and first postseason victory.
- ▶ His tenure has produced the top five scoring, total offense and passing marks in franchise history from 2007-11.
- ▶ Prior to joining the Texans, spent 20 of the previous 23 years with the Broncos, including 11 years (1995-2005) as Denver's offensive coordinator, helping guide the team to back-to-back world titles in Super Bowls XXXII and XXXIII.
- ▶ Starred at quarterback for Texas A&M (1979-82), earning All-Southwest Conference honors as a senior. Played for the Broncos for nine seasons (1983-91) as John Elway's backup. Appeared in 119 career games and was a part of three teams that reached the Super Bowl.

## THE PACKERS-TEXANS SERIES

- ▶ This will be just the third meeting between the clubs since the Texans entered the NFL as an expansion club in 2002.
- ▶ The first meeting also came in a nationally televised Sunday night contest at Reliant Stadium in Houston, one the Packers won 16-13, on a 46-yard field goal by Ryan Longwell as time expired.
- ▶ Houston native Donald Driver led the Packers with 10 catches for 148 yards (14.8 avg.) and QB Brett Favre threw for 383 yards.
- ▶ The last meeting came at Lambeau Field on Dec. 7, 2008, a 24-21 Texans win that ended with a 40-yard field goal from Kris Brown as time expired.

## NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Packers defensive coordinator Dom Capers was the first head coach in Texans franchise history, leading the club for four seasons (2002-05) after being hired in January 2001, more than a year before Houston's inaugural season...CB Tramon Williams entered the NFL as a non-drafted free agent with the Texans in May 2006 before being released by the club at the end of the 2006 preseason...Packers WR Donald Driver is a Houston native and attended Milby High...Packers general manager Ted Thompson was born in Atlanta, Texas, played at Southern Methodist, and played in the city of Houston for 10 seasons (1975-84) with the Oilers...Texans defensive coordinator Wade Phillips was on the Oilers' staff from 1976-80 and was Thompson's position coach in '76...Packers running backs coach Alex Van Pelt played QB for the Bills when Phillips was Buffalo's head coach from 1998-2000...Packers RB Cedric Benson played at the University of Texas and attended Robert E. Lee High in Midland, Texas...Packers TE Jermichael Finley also played at Texas and Diboll (Texas) High...Packers K Mason Crosby was born in Lubbock, Texas, and attended Georgetown (Texas) High...Packers QB Graham Harrell played at Texas Tech and attended Ennis (Texas) High, finishing his high school career as the state's all-time leading passer with 12,532 yards and 167 TDs...Packers T Marshall Newhouse was born in Dallas, attended Lake Highlands High there, and played at Texas Christian...Packers special teams coordinator Shawn Slocum is from Bryan, Texas, played at Texas A&M, and coached at the school in three different stints (1989, 1991-93, 2000-02)...Slocum coached at Texas A&M with Texans head coach Gary Kubiak in 1992-93...Packers tight ends coach Jerry Fontenot twice earned honorable mention All-American honors (1986-87) as an offensive lineman at Texas A&M...Texans DE J.J. Watt played at the University of Wisconsin and attended Pewaukee (Wis.) High...Texans TEs Owen Daniels and Garrett Graham also played at Wisconsin...Texans G Brandon Brooks is from Milwaukee and attended Riverside University High in the city...Packers head coach Mike McCarthy coached on Kansas City's staff when Texans assistant defensive backs coach Perry Carter played for the Chiefs in 1995...Carter was also a teammate of Packers DB Charles Woodson with the Oakland Raiders in 1998...McCarthy was a volunteer assistant at the University of Pittsburgh in 1989 when Texans wide receivers coach Larry Kirksey was on the Panthers' staff...Capers and Texans special teams coordinator Joe Marciano coached together with the USFL's Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars, the New Orleans Saints, and with the Texans when Marciano coached on Capers' staff...Former college teammates include Packers LB Clay Matthews and Texans LB Brian Cushing (Southern California), Packers QB Aaron Rodgers and Texans RB Justin Forsett (California), Packers LB Frank Zombo and Watt (Central Michigan), Packers CB Sam Shields and Texans CB Brandon Harris (Miami), Packers S Morgan Burnett and Texans T Andrew Gardner (Georgia Tech), Packers S M.D. Jennings and Texans T Derek Newton (Arkansas State), Packers TE Ryan Taylor and Texans QB T.J. Yates (North Carolina), Packers RB Brandon Saine and Texans WR DeVier Posey (Ohio State), and Packers TE Tom Crabtree and Texans G Brandon Brooks (Miami of Ohio).

## LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Dec. 7, 2008, at Lambeau Field; Texans won, 24-21.

- ▶ QB Aaron Rodgers led the way with 295 yards and two TDs on 19-of-30 passing, with RB Ryan Grant chipping in 104 rushing yards and a score on 19 carries (5.5 avg.).
- ▶ CB Tramon Williams recorded an interception for Green Bay and LB Desmond Bishop posted 12 tackles, his first career sack and two forced fumbles in his first career start.
- ▶ After Green Bay P Jeremy Kapinos pinned the Texans at their own 3-yard line with 1:49 remaining, QB Matt Schaub led Houston on a nine-play, 75-yard drive that was capped off by a 40-yard Kris Brown field goal as time expired.

## PACKERS AT TEXANS – WEEK 6

### BREAKING DOWN THE 53

The Packers' current roster is composed of 24 offensive players, 26 defensive players and three specialists.

- Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 31 of them (58.5 percent) were drafted by the Packers.
- With 10 non-drafted free agents on the roster having started their NFL career with Green Bay, 41 of the 53 players (77.4 percent) began their pro careers with the Packers.
- Nearly half of the players (26 of 53, 49.1 percent) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as an undrafted player. More than a third of the players (18, 34.0 percent) on the roster were not drafted.
- The Packers had four rookie free agents make the 53-man roster (G/T **Don Barclay**, WR **Jarrett Boykin**, LB **Dezman Moses**, S **Sean Richardson**), a roster that features 10 rookies overall.
- Of the 53 players on the roster, 45 of them (84.9 percent) are 28 years old or younger.

### AT THE HELM

Having led Green Bay to the playoffs in four of his six seasons as head coach, **Mike McCarthy** is joined by Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl win with a victory over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.

- McCarthy led the Packers to a Super Bowl win in his fifth season in Green Bay (2010), the same point that Holmgren led the Packers for the first time to the NFL title game in 1996.
- McCarthy joined Pittsburgh's Bill Cowher (2005) as the only Super Bowl-winning coaches to lead their respective teams to three road wins as the No. 6 seed in the postseason en route to a world title.
- The Packers' 21-14 win at Chicago in the 2010 season was their second NFC Championship Game appearance in four seasons, the only team in the conference to do so over that span.
- Including playoffs, McCarthy has a 70-39 record since taking over as head coach in 2006, a .642 winning percentage that ranks **No. 5 among current NFL head coaches** (minimum 50 games):

- Since taking over in 2006, McCarthy has a 65-36 regular-season record (.644) and a 5-3 mark (.625) in the postseason.
- McCarthy's .625 winning percentage in the playoffs ranks No. 3 in franchise history behind only the legendary Lombardi (9-1, .900) and Holmgren (9-5, .643). With the five postseason wins, McCarthy trails only Lombardi and Holmgren (nine each) for the most in Packers annals.
- With 70 overall wins, McCarthy ranks No. 4 in team history:

### SACKING PACK

### SPREADING THE WEALTH

Through five games this season, Green Bay's air attack has been a balanced one, with four players posting 20-plus receptions in 2012.

- The Packers are the **only team in the league** to have **four different players** each catch 20 or more passes this season, with WR **Jordy Nelson** (23), WR **Randall Cobb** (22), TE **Jermichael Finley** (22) and WR **James Jones** (20) all hitting the 20-catch mark.
- Last year's record-setting Green Bay offense also featured a distributed attack, with the Packers having **five WRs** each catch 25-plus passes for the first time in franchise history. Nelson (68) led the way with Nelson (67), Jones (38), WR **Donald Driver** (37) and Cobb (25) coming in behind him. Finley had 55 receptions on the season.
- The Packers set single-season franchise records in 2011 with 3,667 yards receiving and 38 receiving TDs coming **from their wide receivers**, easily eclipsing the previous marks of 3,215 yards in 2004 and 26 TDs in 1994.

### JENNINGS FLASHES HOT HANDS

In 2011, WR **Greg Jennings** was on the way to his fourth consecutive 1,000-yard campaign before his season was cut short by a knee injury sustained in Week 14.

- Through 13 games last season, Jennings led the team in receptions (67) and ranked No. 2 in receiving yards (949) and TD catches (nine). Despite missing the final three regular-season games in 2011, Jennings was selected to the Pro Bowl for the second straight season.
- In Week 12 at Detroit last season, Jennings went over the 6,000-yard receiving mark for his career in his 86th game in a Green Bay uniform, which tied him for the second fewest games needed to reach 6,000 receiving yards in franchise history:

- ▶ Rodgers' 4,643 passing yards in 2011 were a **franchise record** (Lynn Dickey, 4,458 in 1983). Rodgers now has two of the top three single-season passing yardage marks in franchise history (4,434 in 2009).
- ▶ With eight 300-yard passing games last season, Rodgers set the single-season franchise record, topping Favre's mark of seven (1995, 2007).

- ▶ Rodgers set a franchise record in Week 14 of 2011 by reaching the 4,000-yard passing mark in just the 13th game of the season (previous record was 15 games). It was also tied for the second fastest to 4,000 yards in NFL history behind only Saints QB Drew Brees (12 games in 2011).
- ▶ Rodgers joined Favre (five) as the only Green Bay quarterbacks to post three or more 4,000-yard passing seasons.
- ▶ Rodgers became the first **4,000-yard passer in NFL history** and **the first with 45-plus TDs** to throw six or fewer INTs in that season.
- ▶ It was also his second season with at least 500 attempts and seven or fewer INTs. He was the **only QB in league history** to accomplish that feat in two seasons (Jason Campbell, 2008; Brett Favre, 2009).

## A RATINGS SUCCESS

Since taking over as the starter in 2008, **QB Aaron Rodgers** has posted more 100-plus passer rating games (min. 15 attempts) than any other quarterback in the league:

- In 2011, Rodgers became the **first NFL quarterback** to start a season with 11 straight 110-rating games since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. No other QB has done it in more than five games to begin a season.
- Rodgers' 11 consecutive 110-rating games were also a single-season NFL record, topping 49ers QB Steve Young's mark of seven straight in 1994.
- No quarterback in team history had posted more than five straight 110-rating games in a season, and Rodgers' 12 total games with a 110-plus rating is a single-season team record, topping the previous mark of eight by Brett Favre in 2007.
- Rodgers posted a 100-plus passer rating in each of the first 12 games in 2011, a streak that **topped the NFL single-season mark** of nine set by Colts QB Peyton Manning in 2004.
- Rodgers was the **first NFL quarterback** to record a stretch of four (or more) straight 110-rating games in three straight seasons since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. No other NFL signal-caller over the past 42 seasons has ever posted four straight 110-rating games in back-to-back seasons, let alone three straight like Rodgers has registered.
- By posting at least six games with a 110-plus passer rating in each of the last three seasons (2009-11), Rodgers joined Young (1992-94) as the **only quarterbacks since the 1970 merger** with at least six 110-rating games in three consecutive seasons.
- Including the postseason, Rodgers has recorded a **110-plus passer rating in 21 of his last 32 starts** (20-1 record in those games).
- With a 140.3 rating in Week 10 vs. Minnesota last season, Rodgers became just the **second QB in NFL history** to post three consecutive 140-plus rating games (min. 15 attempts) in a season. Rams QB Kurt Warner (1999) is the only other signal-caller to accomplish the feat.

- In 67 career regular-season starts, Rodgers has eclipsed the century mark in passer rating 40 times and recorded 24 games of 300-plus yards. ### SUCCESS AGAINST FAMILIAR FOES

The Packers' 45-41 victory over Detroit in the season finale gave them a perfect 6-0 mark in divisional games in 2011.

- It marked the first time that the Packers had posted an undefeated record in their division since the NFL went to a divisional format in 1967.
- Green Bay became the first team to sweep the NFC North/Central since the 1987 Chicago Bears (7-0).
- The Packers have a 28-9 (.757) regular-season record against NFC North opponents under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, a divisional record that ranks **No. 2 in the NFL** since 2006:

DB **Charles Woodson** enjoyed the finest season of his career in 2009, his first year in the 3-4 scheme, and has continued to make his presence felt ever since.

- In 2011, Woodson **tied for the NFL lead** with seven interceptions. It marked the second time in three seasons (2009) that he has shared the league lead:

- Woodson has returned an INT for a touchdown in six straight seasons (2006-11), becoming the **first player in NFL history** to do so. No other NFL player has accomplished the feat in more than four consecutive seasons.
- Woodson's nine interceptions for TDs from 2006-11 ranked No. 1 in the league over that span, more than double the total of the nine players that tied for the No. 2 spot with four each.
- Woodson's nine interception TDs over the past six seasons (2006-11) were tied for the most by a player over a six-year period in NFL history, matching the mark of Houston Oilers safety Ken Houston (1967-72).

- With his first INT for a TD coming in his rookie season of 1998, the time from Woodson's first INT-TD to his most recent spans 14 seasons (1998-2011). That ranks tied for No. 3 in NFL history behind only Rod Woodson (1987-2002) and Deion Sanders (1990-2004), according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

- His INT return for a score against the Broncos was his ninth career with the Packers, further extending his franchise record. Adderley ranks No. 2 in team annals (seven, 1961-69).

- It was also Woodson's 10th defensive TD (nine INTs, one fumble return) in a Green Bay uniform, which further extended his franchise mark.

- He led the Packers with a career-high five forced fumbles in 2010. He was the **only defensive back in the NFL** to register four or more forced fumbles each season in 2009 and 2010.

- Woodson registered two sacks in 2011, his fourth straight season with two-plus sacks. He is the **first defensive back in franchise history** (since 1982) to accomplish that feat. With one more half-sack this season, he would join Rodney Harrison (2000-04) and Adam Archuleta (2001-05) as the only NFL defensive backs to post two-plus sacks in five straight seasons.

- When Matthews intercepted Giants QB Eli Manning at New York in Week 13 of 2011 and returned the pick 38 yards for a score, it marked the third straight season that he had scored a defensive TD.
- Matthews is the **only player in franchise history** to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league.
- Matthews was one of only two NFL linebackers (Miami LB Kevin Burnett) to record an interception for a score in 2010 and 2011.
- Matthews posted a career-high three interceptions in 2011. It was tied for the most in a season by a Green Bay linebacker since 1984. He is tied for No. 2 among NFL linebackers with four INTs since 2010:
- Matthews was named to his third straight Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Packer since RB John Brockington (1971-73) to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first three seasons in the league.
- He received first-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Packer LB to earn that recognition since Tim Harris in 1989. Matthews finished second to only Pittsburgh's Troy Polamalu in the AP Defensive Player of the Year voting a season ago.

- With a sack of QB Jon Kitna in the second quarter in Week 9 of 2010, Matthews became the first Packer since the stat became official in 1982 to register a double-digit sack total in each of his first two seasons in the NFL.
- According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Matthews became the **first NFL player** since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to register double-digit sacks and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the NFL.
- In 2009, Matthews set a Packers rookie record with 10 sacks on his way to earning Pro Bowl honors, the first Green Bay rookie to be named to the all-star game since Hall of Fame WR James Lofton in 1978.
- Matthews tied the top mark in team history (since 1982) for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the NFL:

## PACKERS AT TEXANS – WEEK 6

### ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Green Bay went 7-1 away from Lambeau Field in 2011, with the seven road wins setting a single-season franchise record.

- The Packers have been able to stay above the .500 mark on the road during Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** tenure, a notable achievement in the National Football League.
- Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only 10 of 32 NFL teams have regular-season road records above .500.

### 305 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Saints in Week 4 brought the stadium's consecutive sellouts streak to 305 games (288 regular season, 17 playoffs).

- The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 56th season of football in 2012. A total of 636,177 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine home contests last season.
- Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

### THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010 and a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002.
- Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 36-9 (.800) at home over the past 45 regular-season games.
- Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

### HOME COOKING

The Packers' win over Dallas at Lambeau in November 2009 was the first step to a 7-1 finish and a playoff berth for Green Bay.

- Since that victory, the Packers have been one of the best teams in the league at home. Green Bay's lone defeats since then came to Miami in 2010 in Week 6 and in the 2012 season opener vs. San Francisco:

- However, Green Bay has remained among the most successful teams since the advent of free agency in 1993. The Packers have won 10 or more games 12 times since '93 and captured eight division crowns.

## A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 92nd NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (three against 2011 playoff teams).

- The five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling) would be a franchise record, topping the previous mark of four contests on several occasions, most recently in 2010 and 2011. Since 2009, the Packers are 9-3 (.750) in prime-time contests.
- For the sixth time in seven seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the Packers opened the season at home, this year against San Francisco in a matchup of the top two teams in the NFC in 2011.
- The Packers stayed at home on a short week to host Chicago in a Thursday night contest, Green Bay's third-ever game on NFL Network and its first since it traveled to Dallas in Week 13 of 2007. It was the seventh straight season that the Packers and the Bears squared off in prime time.
- Green Bay visited Seattle for its first road contest of the season, one that began a stretch of four road games in five weeks. It was the Packers' lone game of the season on ESPN's *Monday Night Football*. 2012 marked the 20th consecutive season (1993-2012) that Green Bay has appeared on *MNF*, the NFL's second-longest streak (Denver, 21).
- The Packers hosted New Orleans in Week 4 in a matchup of the two highest-scoring teams in the league in 2011. Both teams have finished in the top 10 in total offense every season since 2006, the only teams in the NFL to accomplish the feat over that span.
- Starting with a trip to Indianapolis this past Sunday, Green Bay will play on the road for three straight games (also at Houston and St. Louis), the first time the Packers have had three consecutive road games since the 1998 season (Weeks 10-12). All three contests could be indoors (Indianapolis and Houston have retractable-roof stadiums).
- Green Bay returns home for back-to-back games at Lambeau Field (Jacksonville and Arizona) before its Week 10 bye. The Packers come out of their open week with back-to-back road contests against a pair of 2011 playoff teams (Detroit and N.Y. Giants), the second straight season they have played those teams on the road in consecutive weeks.
- Under McCarthy, the team has won five of six games immediately after the bye week and 12 of its last 16 after the week off dating back further.
- Overall, the Packers are 38-20 (.655) after the bye under McCarthy, and since 2000, the team is 69-37 (.651) following the week off.
- The Packers wrap up the regular season with three of five games in December in front of the home crowd, including divisional matchups against Minnesota and Detroit at Lambeau Field in Weeks 13-14.
- Four of Green Bay's final five games and five of its last seven will come against NFC North foes, capped off with the season finale at Minnesota.
- It is the sixth time in seven seasons under McCarthy that the Packers have finished the regular season with a divisional matchup (5-0 in season finales vs. the NFC North since 2006).
- The Packers could play up to five games indoors (Indianapolis, Houston, St. Louis, Detroit, Minnesota), which would be the most in a season in franchise history (four games in 1987, 1992, 1996, 2004, 2009).
- Since 2006, the Packers have a 13-5 mark indoors during the regular season, a .722 winning percentage that ranks No. 1 in the NFL (min. eight games).
- Fourteen games are slated for Sunday this season, including each of the final 13 contests, with one Thursday night game and one Monday night contest. Nine games are scheduled for noon (CT) starts with two games currently slated for 3:25 p.m. (CT).
- The Packers have six games on the schedule against 2011 playoff teams, beginning right away in Week 1 vs. San Francisco. The other matchups come against New Orleans (Week 4), Houston (Week 6), Detroit (Weeks 11 and 14) and the N.Y. Giants (Week 12).

## STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

### 2 MASON CROSBY

- His 649 points from 2006-11 rank No. 1 in NFL history for the most points scored by a player in his first five seasons, topping the mark of Washington K Chip Lohmiller (625, 1988-92).
- In 2011, set a franchise record with a 58-yard field goal in Week 7 at Minnesota, eclipsing the mark of 56 yards he held (Week 1 at Philadelphia, 2010; Week 5 at Atlanta, 2011).
- Ranks No. 5 in team annals with 675 career points, having surpassed Jim Taylor (546) last season at Atlanta in Week 5. Needs 86 points to surpass No. 4 Paul Hornung (760).
- Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most 100-point seasons with five, trailing only K Ryan Longwell (eight).
- Made 23 straight field goals from Week 13 of 2010 through Week 10 of 2011, the longest regular-season streak in franchise history as he eclipsed Chris Jacke's mark of 17 (1993).
- For his career, has hit 92-of-101 field goals (91.1 percent) from 39 yards and closer.
- Has hit 31-of-44 field goals (70.5 percent) from 40-49 yards.
- Has hit 13-of-27 field goals (48.1 percent) from 50-plus yards.

### 80 DONALD DRIVER

- Has 10,103 career receiving yards, which ranks No. 1 on the franchise's all-time list. Surpassed James Lofton (9,656) at Carolina in Week 2 of 2011.
- Surpassed Sterling Sharpe (595) in 2009 to become the franchise's all-time leader in receptions. Driver now has 738 career catches.
- Had a reception in 133 consecutive games, besting the franchise's previous long streak of Sharpe's 103 (1988-94), before not catching a pass in Week 7 of 2011 against Minnesota.
- In 2010, had 50-plus receptions for the ninth time, extending his franchise record. Lofton and Sharpe each had seven seasons with 50-plus catches.
- Holds Lambeau Field records for receptions (360) and receiving yards (4,980).
- Topped the 1,000-yard receiving mark for a seventh overall season and sixth consecutive in 2009, extending his own team record in each category.
- Ranks No. 2 in team annals with 26 TD catches at Lambeau Field, trailing only WR Antonio Freeman (36) in the stadium's history.
- Has 22 career 100-yard receiving games, which is tied for No. 4 in team history. Needs two more games to equal No. 3 Don Hutson (24) on the all-time list.
- With 60 career TD receptions, ranks No. 3 in team history behind only Hutson (99) and Sharpe (65).
- Ranks No. 6 in team history with 61 overall touchdowns, needing one more to tie No. 5 Paul Hornung (62).
- Ranks No. 2 all-time in yards from scrimmage with 10,320, trailing only RB Ahman Green (11,048).
- Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most games played with 197, trailing only QB Brett Favre (255).

### 88 JERMICHAEL FINLEY

- Is the only tight end in franchise history to register two 55-catch seasons (2009 and 2011).
- Ranks No. 2 all-time among Green Bay tight ends with three 100-yard receiving games in his career, trailing only Paul Coffman (six).
- Ranks No. 7 among TEs in team history with 2,016 receiving yards and needs 238 more yards to surpass No. 6 Mark Chmura (2,253).
- Ranks No. 8 among TEs in franchise annals with 159 receptions and needs 12 more catches to surpass No. 7 Ron Kramer (170).
- In Week 4 vs. New Orleans, surpassed 2,000 career receiving yards in his 52nd career game, fastest among tight ends in franchise history (Coffman, 66 games).

### 50 A.J. HAWK

- Has played in 99 of a possible 101 games in his career, including 96 starts, and has posted 28 double-digit tackle games.
- Posted a career-high three interceptions in 2010, a total that also was tied for No. 1 among NFL LBs.
- Has led the team in tackles three times during his career (2006, 2008, 2010).

### 85 GREG JENNINGS

- With 12 TD receptions in 2010, joined Sterling Sharpe, Antonio Freeman and Billy Howton as the only Packers to post 12-plus TD catches in two different seasons.
- By eclipsing the 1,000-yard receiving mark in 2010, became the fifth player in team history to post three straight 1,000-yard receiving seasons, joining Lofton, Sharpe, Freeman and Driver.
- His four career catches of 80-plus yards are a franchise record.
- His 30 catches of 40-plus yards since 2007 lead all NFL players.
- In 2011, had 147 receiving yards in Week 7 at Minnesota for his 22nd career 100-yard game, which moved him into a tie for the No. 4 spot in franchise history with Donald Driver.
- In Week 12 vs. Detroit, surpassed 6,000 career receiving yards in his 86th career game, which tied him for the second fastest to 6,000 yards receiving in team annals behind only WR Sterling Sharpe (84 games).
- Ranks No. 8 in team history with 6,249 career receiving yards and needs 98 more yards to surpass No. 7 Max McGee (6,346).
- Ranks No. 7 in franchise annals with 401 career catches and needs 31 more receptions to surpass No. 6 Freeman (431).
- Is tied for No. 5 in team history (with McGee) with 50 TD catches.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.

### 52 CLAY MATTHEWS

- ▶ Only player in team history to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ His 17 sacks in his first 20 games were the most by an NFL player to start his career, eclipsing the mark of 16.5 set by Leslie O'Neal (1986, 1988) and John Abraham (2000-01).
- ▶ Is the first NFL player since sacks became an official stat in 1982 to post a double-digit sack total and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the league.
- ▶ First player in franchise annals to post 10-plus sacks in each of his first two years in the NFL.
- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in team history with 37.5 career sacks. Needs 4.5 sacks to move past No. 5 Ezra Johnson (41.5).
- ▶ His 29.5 sacks from 2009-11 were tied for No. 1 in team history with Tony Bennett for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Ranks No. 4 in the NFL with 36.5 sacks since 2009.
- ▶ Set a franchise rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009.

### 12 AARON RODGERS

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with a 103.5 career passer rating.
- ▶ Set an NFL single-season record in 2011 with a 122.5 passer rating and set team marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games (eight).
- ▶ Posted 17,037 passing yards from 2008-11, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first four seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Has thrown a TD pass in 32 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre, 1992-96). It is the longest NFL streak since Dan Marino (39 games from 1983-88).
- ▶ In 67 regular-season starts, has 24 career 300-yard games, 26 three-TD games and 36 zero-INT games.
- ▶ Has posted a 100-plus passer rating 40 times. Set an NFL record for quarterbacks whose careers started since 1970 with 28 games with a 100-plus passer rating in his first 50 starts.
- ▶ Posted a 100-plus passer rating in three straight seasons (2009-11), one of only four QBs in league history to accomplish that feat (Steve Young, 1991-94; Peyton Manning, 2004-06; Philip Rivers, 2008-10).
- ▶ Is the only QB in team history with two 400-yard passing games.
- ▶ When he hit the 100-TD mark for his career, he had thrown just 34 INTs to that point, the fewest in NFL history as he surpassed Rivers' mark of 43 INTs.
- ▶ In 2009, became first QB in NFL history to throw 30 or more TDs, seven or fewer INTs, and rush for five TDs in the same season.
- ▶ Has registered a passer rating over 110.0 in four or more consecutive games three times in his career (Weeks 3-7, 2009; Week 9, Weeks 11-13, 2010; Weeks 1-7, 9-12, 2011), one of only two quarterbacks in franchise history (Bart Starr, 1966) to accomplish the feat in a single season.
- ▶ Is the only NFL QB since the 1970 merger to post four straight 110-plus rating games in three straight seasons (2009-11).
- ▶ Posted four or more rushing TDs in three straight seasons (2008-10), becoming only the second Packers QB to accomplish that feat (Tobin

Rote, 1954-56), and eclipsed 300 rushing yards in back-to-back seasons (2009-10), the first since Rote in 1954-56.

- ▶ Ranks No. 3 in team history with 142 TD passes, 11 shy of surpassing No. 2 Bart Starr (152).
- ▶ With 16 career rushing TDs, ranks No. 2 in team history among QBs behind only Tobin Rote (29).

### 21 CHARLES WOODSON

- ▶ His 10 defensive touchdowns with Green Bay (nine interceptions, one fumble recovery) are a team record.
- ▶ With nine interception returns for scores, ranks No. 1 on Green Bay's all-time list, eclipsing the previous mark set by Herb Adderley (seven, 1961-69).
- ▶ For his career, has 11 INT-return TDs, which ranks tied for No. 2 in NFL history with Darren Sharper behind only Rod Woodson (12).
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in the NFL with 26 interceptions since 2008.
- ▶ His five forced fumbles in 2010 were a career high and the most by a Packer since LB/DE Keith McKenzie posted five in 1999.
- ▶ In 2009, established career highs in interceptions (9, tied league lead), and interception returns for TDs (3, tied league lead and team record), and matched a then career high with four forced fumbles.
- ▶ Has 55 career interceptions, 38 in 98 games since coming to Green Bay in 2006. Woodson had 17 interceptions in 106 games with Oakland. Is tied for No. 4 in team history with S LeRoy Butler with the 38 interceptions. Needs one more to tie CB Herb Adderley (39) for No. 3.
- ▶ Became the fourth player in NFL history since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to record at least nine interceptions and two sacks in a single season. Is the only player in NFL history to post at least seven interceptions and two sacks in back-to-back seasons.
- ▶ In 2009, became the first NFC player to win the conference's Defensive Player of the Month award multiple times in one season (Sept., Nov., Dec.).
- ▶ With nine interceptions in 2009, became only the second player in franchise history to post at least seven interceptions in three different seasons (Bobby Dillon, 1953-57).
- ▶ With two interceptions against Minnesota in Week 7 of 2011, recorded the seventh multi-interception game of his career. Six of those games have come with Green Bay.
- ▶ Became the first NFL player since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to record two interceptions, an interception for a touchdown, a sack and a fumble recovery in the same game when he posted all of those statistics at Detroit on Thanksgiving in 2009.
- ▶ Is the only defensive back in Packers history (since 1982) to register at least two sacks in four straight seasons (2008-11).

### **WR Greg Jennings, 7th Year, Western Michigan, D2b-06**

- ▶ Ranks in the top 10 in franchise history in receptions (7th, 401), receiving yards (9th, 6,249) and touchdown catches (t-5th, 50).
- ▶ Leads the NFL with 30 catches of 40-plus yards since 2007 and ranks No. 4 in the NFL with 58 receptions of 25-plus yards over that span.
- ▶ One of just five receivers in team history to post three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons and one of only four to catch 12 touchdown passes in two different years.
- ▶ Has been named to the Pro Bowl each of the past two seasons (2010-11).

### **LT Marshall Newhouse, 3rd Year, Texas Christian, D5b-10**

- ▶ Played in all 16 games with 13 starts in 2011, opening 10 contests at LT and three at RT.
- ▶ His 13 starts in 2011 were the most by a Green Bay offensive tackle.
- ▶ Gameday inactive (healthy scratch) for the first 14 contests of his rookie campaign in 2010 before sustaining a back injury in practice that sent him to injured reserve for the final two games and the entire postseason.
- ▶ Was a three-year starter at LT at Texas Christian and earned first-team All-Mountain West honors as a senior.

### **LG T.J. Lang, 4th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09**

- ▶ One of only two Green Bay offensive linemen to start all 16 games in 2011, opening 15 contests at LG and one at RT.
- ▶ Has started games at three different positions on the line as a pro (LT, LG, RT).
- ▶ Played three different positions up front during his rookie campaign of 2009, starting games at both tackle spots and becoming the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

### **C Jeff Saturday, 14th Year, North Carolina, UFA-12 (Ind)**

- ▶ Signed with the Packers as an unrestricted free agent in March 2012 after playing 13 seasons with the Indianapolis Colts.
- ▶ Has been selected to the Pro Bowl five times during his career (2005-07, 2009-10) and has twice earned first-team All-Pro honors.
- ▶ Was named to the NFL All-Decade Team by *Sporting News* for 2000-09.
- ▶ Played in 197 games during his 13 seasons with the Colts, which is tied for No. 4 in franchise history. Has played in 202 career games, the most among active NFL offensive linemen.
- ▶ From 2000-11, was part of an Indianapolis line that allowed just 242 sacks, the fewest in the league over that span.

### **RG Josh Sitton, 5th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08**

- ▶ Has started 51 games since 2009, the most by an offensive lineman in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ▶ Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association and was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate each of the past two seasons (2010-11).
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, has allowed only six sacks in his three seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Was the only Packer on either side of the ball to not miss a snap from 2009-10.

### **RT Bryan Bulaga, 3rd Year, Iowa, D1-10**

- ▶ Has started 12 games at RT in each of his first two seasons as a pro (2010-11).
- ▶ Started the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at right tackle after taking over for veteran Mark Tauscher (shoulder), the most regular-season starts by a Packers rookie tackle since Tauscher's 14 in 2000.
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.
- ▶ Capped his rookie season by becoming the youngest player, according to STATS LLC, to ever start in the Super Bowl (21 years, 322 days).

### **TE Jermichael Finley, 5th Year, Texas, D3-08**

- ▶ Matched his career high with 55 receptions in 2011, tied for the second most in team history by a tight end behind Paul Coffman's 56 in 1979.
- ▶ Set a career high with 767 receiving yards last season, the No. 2 mark in franchise annals behind only Coffman's 814 yards in 1983.
- ▶ In breakout 2009 campaign, posted second-most catches in a single season by a Green Bay tight end (55) and sixth-most yards (676), despite missing three games with a knee injury.
- ▶ Finished '09 with Green Bay playoff-record 159 receiving yards in NFC Wild Card loss at Arizona, the third-most productive game by a tight end in NFL postseason history.

### **WR Jordy Nelson, 5th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08**

- ▶ Posted career highs in every receiving category in 2011, catching 68 passes for 1,263 yards (18.6 avg.) and 15 TDs on his way to being named a Pro Bowl alternate.
- ▶ Became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).
- ▶ Ranks No. 3 in the league with a 17.1-yard receiving average since 2011 (min. 75 receptions).
- ▶ Became the first player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to post three 80-yard TD grabs over an eight-game span in the regular season (Week 16, 2010-Week 6, 2011).

### **QB Aaron Rodgers, 8th Year, California, D1-05**

- ▶ His career passer rating of 103.5 ranks No. 1 in NFL history (min. 1,500 attempts).
- ▶ Posted 17,037 passing yards from 2008-11, which ranked No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first four seasons as a starter.
- ▶ In 67 regular-season starts (43-24 record), has posted 24 games with 300-plus passing yards, 36 without an interception and 40 with a 100-plus passer rating.
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

### **RB Alex Green, 2nd Year, Hawaii, D3-11**

- ▶ Has 57 yards on 11 carries (5.2 avg.) this season, including a 41-yard run at Indianapolis in Week 5, the longest by a Packer this season.
- ▶ Appeared in four games as a rookie in 2011 before sustaining a season-ending knee injury blocking on a kickoff return at Minnesota in Week 7.
- ▶ Rushed for 1,199 yards and 18 TDs as a senior at Hawaii in 2010, ranking second in school history for rushing yards in a single season and tying the single-season school mark for rushing TDs.
- ▶ His average of 8.2 yards per carry in 2010 ranked No. 1 in NCAA Division I-A among players with 100 or more carries.
- ▶ Attended the same junior college, Butte College in Oroville, Calif., as QB Aaron Rodgers.

### **FB John Kuhn, 7th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)**

- ▶ Has played in 83 of 85 games (90 of 92 including playoffs) during his five-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.
- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- ▶ Only player on the team to have a rushing and receiving touchdown each of the past four seasons (2008-11), and is the first Packer to achieve that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).
- ▶ Led the team with four rushing TDs in 2011 and led the running backs with six total TDs.



## PACKERS PROJECTED STARTERS – DEFENSE

### LDE Ryan Pickett, 12th Year, Ohio State, UFA-06 (StL)

- ▶ Has played in 167 of a possible 181 regular-season games during his career, missing just nine contests due to injury.
- ▶ Had another productive season in 2011, starting all 14 games in which he played and leading the defensive line with 54 tackles (24 solo).
- ▶ Key component of Packers' No. 1-ranked rushing defense in 2009 (franchise-record 83.3 yards allowed per game), the first time in team history that Green Bay led the league in that category.
- ▶ Signed with Green Bay as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 after spending five seasons with St. Louis (2001-05). Led all NFL defensive linemen with 115 tackles in 2005.

### NT B.J. Raji, 4th Year, Boston College, D1a-09

- ▶ Earned his first bid to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay defensive tackle since Bob Brown in 1972 to be voted to the all-star team.
- ▶ Has played in 42 games since 2010 (including playoffs), the most in the NFL by a defensive lineman.
- ▶ Led all NFL nose tackles with 6½ sacks in 2010, the third most recorded by a nose tackle since 1990 (according to STATS LLC).
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2009, the first Green Bay defensive lineman to be selected since DE Vonnie Holliday in 1998.

### RDE C.J. Wilson, 3rd Year, East Carolina, D7-10

- ▶ Has appeared in all but two games in his two-plus NFL seasons, seeing significant action in the rotation up front and totaling 56 tackles (33 solo) and a sack in 2011.
- ▶ Played in all 16 games in 2011 with two starts as he registered a career-high 35 tackles (21 solo).
- ▶ Appeared in 15 regular-season games and all four playoff contests as a rookie in 2010, starting Super Bowl XLV vs. Pittsburgh with the defense employing a fourth lineman as part of its "Hippo" package.

### LOLB Nick Perry, Rookie, Southern California, D1-12

- ▶ Has started four games, the most among Green Bay's rookies.
- ▶ Earned first-team All-Pacific-12 recognition as a junior in 2011, registering a team-high and career-best 9½ sacks. His sack total led the conference and was tied for No. 14 nationally.
- ▶ Was one of six finalists for the Hendricks Award, which is given to the nation's top defensive end, and was named second-team All-American by CBSSports.com.
- ▶ Led the Trojans with eight sacks as a redshirt freshman in 2009 on his way to earning Pac-10 All-Freshman Team honors from multiple publications.

### BLB A.J. Hawk, 7th Year, Ohio State, D1-06

- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in five of his six seasons in Green Bay.
- ▶ Has appeared in 99 of a possible 101 regular-season games in his career, starting 96 of them.
- ▶ Tied for No. 1 among NFL linebackers in 2010 with a career-high three interceptions. Earned first career Pro Bowl selection in 2010.
- ▶ Has posted 773 tackles (553 solo), 10½ sacks, eight interceptions, 34 passes defended, two forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries during his career.

### MLB D.J. Smith, 2nd Year, Appalachian State, D6b-11

- ▶ Was the lone Green Bay rookie in 2011 to appear in all 16 games, also leading the team's rookies with three starts.
- ▶ During his extended time on defense, led the team with 30 tackles (21 solo) over a three-game span from Weeks 13-15.
- ▶ Played primarily on special teams last season, tying for third on the squad with 11 coverage tackles.

- ▶ Finished his career at Appalachian State as the NCAA Division I FCS active leader in tackles and was one of only two players in school history to record 500 tackles in his career, joining three-time NFL Pro Bowler Dexter Coakley.

### ROLB Clay Matthews, 4th Year, Southern California, D1b-09

- ▶ Became the first Packer since RB John Brockington (1971-73) to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first three seasons in the NFL.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in the NFL with eight sacks this season and is No. 4 in the league with 37.5 sacks since 2009.
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting.

### LCB Tramon Williams, 6th Year, Louisiana Tech, FA-06

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in the league in interceptions (15) and INT return yards (296) since 2010 (including playoffs).
- ▶ Despite suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener, went on to start 15 games and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defended (24). Also added four interceptions.
- ▶ With three interceptions during the 2010 playoffs, tied Joe Laws (1944) and Craig Newsome (1996) for the franchise single-postseason record.
- ▶ Is the only non-drafted free agent in the NFL to post four or more interceptions each of the past four seasons (2008-11).

### RCB Sam Shields, 3rd Year, Miami, FA-10

- ▶ Appeared in 15 games with seven starts in 2011 and posted 36 tackles (32 solo), four interceptions, 14 passes defended and a forced fumble.
- ▶ Made an impact in 2010 after making the team as a non-drafted rookie, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one season in college.
- ▶ In Green Bay's NFC Championship win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.
- ▶ Played primarily wide receiver and special teams during his first three seasons at Miami.

### SS Charles Woodson, 15th Year, Michigan, UFA-06 (Oak)

- ▶ In 2011, was named first-team All-Pro for the third time and earned his fourth consecutive and eighth career Pro Bowl bid, becoming the first Green Bay CB to earn in the honor in four or more straight seasons since Herb Adderley (1963-67).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 2 in NFL history (with Darren Sharper) with 11 INT returns for TDs, trailing only Rod Woodson (12).
- ▶ Leads the NFL with 26 interceptions since 2008.
- ▶ Named NFL Defensive Player of the Year by *The Associated Press* in 2009, becoming only the second Packer to win the award (DE Reggie White, 1998) and the oldest defensive back to earn the honor.

### FS Morgan Burnett, 3rd Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10

- ▶ Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining NT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ Was one of only two players on the team (Woodson) to record a sack, an interception, a fumble recovery and a forced fumble in 2011.
- ▶ In 2010, became only the second Packers rookie to open the season as a starter at safety since Chuck Cecil in 1988, joining then-teammate and three-time Pro Bowl selection Nick Collins (2005).
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

GREEN BAY, Wis. — With the arrival of Randy Moss and a few other additions in the offseason, quarterback Alex Smith knew the San Francisco 49ers were serious about beating up their passing game.

And while the 49ers aren't going to stray completely from the defense and running game-based formula that got them to the NFC Championship game last season, Smith hoped he gave future opponents a few things to think about with his play in Sunday's 30-22 victory over the Green Bay Packers at Lambeau Field.

Smith was 20 of 26 for 211 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions, spreading the ball around to six different receivers — including Moss and fellow offseason addition Mario Manningham.

Smith got Moss involved early on, finding him wide open in the end zone for a 14-yard touchdown in the second quarter.

Facing a Packers team that lost only once in the 2011 regular season was a tough opening road test; the 49ers were more than ready.

Things went so well for San Francisco that when David Akers tried a 63-yard field goal at the end of the first half, it bounced off the crossbar and then kept going through the uprights to tie an NFL record.

Still, the most impressive part of Sunday's effort was on defense, where the 49ers smothered quarterback Aaron Rodgers and the Packers offense for three quarters, then made one last stand to stop a late rally to seal the win.

The 49ers took a 16-point lead into the fourth quarter, then twice let Rodgers and the Packers cut the lead to 8. But the defense held firm on a potential game-tying drive in the final minutes.

It was a harsh reality check for the Packers, who came into their opener with hopes that a rebuilt defense and improved running game could help get them back to the Super Bowl after coming up short in the playoffs last season.

Rodgers finished 30 of 44 for 303 yards with two touchdowns and an interception, but the Packers couldn't really move the ball before the fourth quarter.

Rodgers also finished the game as the Packers' leading rusher, with new addition Cedric Benson gaining just 18 yards on nine carries.

GREEN BAY, Wis. — The Green Bay Packers rattled and robbed Jay Cutler while Aaron Rodgers and Co. sputtered at times against the stout Chicago Bears defense.

So with all those stars on the field for the NFL's most storied rivalry, the biggest play of the day was a gutsy call for a perfectly executed fake field goal in Green Bay's 23-10 victory at Lambeau Field on Thursday.

With the Packers facing a 4th and 26 from the Chicago 27 and lined up for a field goal late in the second quarter, punter Tim Masthay flipped the ball to backup tight end Tom Crabtree, who streaked into the end zone.

The Packers' defense did the rest.

Cutler threw four interceptions, including a pair to Tramon Williams. Facing a fierce pass rush all night, Cutler was sacked seven times, including 3.5 for Clay Matthews. New Bears wide receiver Brandon Marshall was held to two catches for 24 yards.

It was an impressive rebound for the Packers from an unsettling season-opening loss to San Francisco.

Thursday's game was a huge step backward for the Bears, who were filled with confidence after steamrolling Indianapolis in their opener.

Rodgers finished the game 22 of 32 for 219 yards with a touchdown and an interception.

The touchdown went to Donald Driver, who barely played in the loss to San Francisco.

Cutler threw a late touchdown to Kellen Davis, cutting the lead to 23-10 with 6:49 remaining. But the Bears couldn't mount a comeback as Matthews and the Packers kept turning up the heat.

Bears running back Matt Forte provided much of what little offense the Bears could muster before leaving the game in the third quarter. He appeared to twist his right ankle while being tackled by Charles Woodson.

Marshall missed a huge opportunity early in the third, when Cutler found him streaking wide open in the end zone -- but the wide receiver couldn't haul it in, and the Bears had to settle for a 45-yard field goal by Robbie Gould that cut the lead to 13-3.

SEATTLE — M.D. Jennings was convinced he had the ball pinned to his chest the entire time and would be awarded an interception to cap Green Bay's comeback victory.

A crew of replacement officials had other views — the ones that counted.

The result is a bizarre ending that gave the Seattle Seahawks a 14-12 victory Monday night that capped a tough weekend for the replacement refs. Russell Wilson threw a disputed 24-yard touchdown pass to Golden Tate on the final play of the game, a game that finally ended 10 minutes later when both teams were brought back on the field for the extra point.

Wilson scrambled from the pocket and threw to the corner of the end zone as the clock expired. Tate shoved Green Bay's Sam Shields out of the way, then wrestled with Jennings for possession. It was ruled on the field as a touchdown and after a lengthy review, referee Wayne Elliott came out from under the hood and announced "the ruling on the field stands" and CenturyLink Field erupted in celebration.

The Packers shook off a disastrous first half when Aaron Rodgers was sacked eight times and completely controlled possession in the final 30 minutes. Green Bay ran 41 offensive plays in the second half, got field goals of 29 and 40 yards from Mason Crosby and Cedric Benson's 1-yard TD run with 8:44 left to take a 12-7 lead.

Rodgers converted 26 of 39 for 223 yards and no turnovers.

Rodgers converted three third-down conversions on the Packers' touchdown drive to take the lead. He hit Jeremiahae Finley for 14 yards on third-and-10 at the start of the drive deep in the Packers end. He followed with a third-and-10 completion to James Jones for 13 yards, getting rid of the ball before the blitz arrived.

Green Bay appeared to take the lead on an 11-yard TD pass to Greg Jennings, but he stepped out before reaching the end zone and was short of the first down. On third down, Rodgers rolled out and attempted to run, but was stopped short by inches. McCarthy challenged the spot and the call was reversed on the challenge with Rodgers given the first down. Benson then plowed in on the next play to give the Packers their first lead with 8:44 left. Seattle (2-1) won its second straight, while Green Bay (1-2) and saw its streak of wins in six straight road openers snapped.

GREEN BAY, Wis. — Garrett Hartley missed a field goal in a wild ending at Lambeau Field, where the New Orleans Saints (0-4) blew a fourth-quarter lead and lost to the Green Bay Packers 28-27 on Sunday.

Aaron Rodgers threw a go-ahead touchdown to Jordy Nelson in the fourth quarter.

Soon after, Packers fans were howling about what appeared to be yet another bad call — this time by the regular officials, not the replacements. Darren Sproles appeared to fumble the ensuing kickoff but officials ruled that he was down by contact. Replays showed that the ball clearly came out but the Packers were out of replay challenges, leaving Packers fans screaming at the officials for the second week in a row.

Drew Brees then led the Saints into field goal range, and Hartley hit a 43-yard attempt — but the Saints were called for holding, forcing Hartley to line up a 53-yarder. The Packers then were called for encroachment, leaving Hartley to try a 48-yarder and he missed it wide left. Rodgers threw for 319 yards with four touchdowns and an interception for the Packers (2-2).

With the Packers leading 21-14 in the third quarter, fans — and head coach Mike McCarthy — were on the officials again when McCarthy challenged a catch by Jimmy Graham but it wasn't overturned.

The Packers committed a personal foul on a Saints field goal attempt later in the drive, giving New Orleans first-and-goal on the 1. But the defense held, forcing a 20-yard field goal by Hartley to cut the lead to 21-17 with 9:41 left in the third quarter.

Rodgers marched the Packers down the field again but needed attention from the team's training staff after a face mask by New Orleans' Malcolm Jenkins. Rodgers came out of the game for one play and backup quarterback Graham Harrell came in — then tripped and fumbled as he tried to hand it off, allowing the Saints to get the ball back in the middle of a scrum.

Brees then found Joseph Morgan wide open behind the defense, and Morgan shed tackling attempts from the Packers' Sam Shields and Tramont Williams on his way to an 80-yard touchdown and a 24-21 lead with 3:49 left in the third quarter.

Things then got even worse for the Packers, as Rodgers then threw an interception to Patrick Robinson on a deep throw intended for Nelson. Brees then completed a pair of third-and-long situations, and the Saints drove for a 27-yard field goal by Hartley to take a 27-21 lead with 13:04 remaining.

With the Packers trailing by 6, Rodgers threw an 11-yard strike to Nelson as the Saints' Corey White tried to wrap his arms around the ball at the same time as Nelson — briefly re-creating a scene early similar to the controversial game-ender in Seattle on Monday. This time, though, Nelson clearly came away with the ball and spiked it emphatically.

INDIANAPOLIS — Mike McCarthy and Aaron Rodgers never saw this one coming.

Green Bay had an 18-point halftime lead and seemed to be in control Sunday afternoon.

Then, suddenly, Andrew Luck, Reggie Wayne and the rest of the emotionally charged Colts turned things around on one of the league's marquee franchises.

Playing for an ailing coach Chuck Pagano, Luck rallied the Colts in the second half, throwing for a career-high 362 yards and a 4-yard TD pass to Wayne with 35 seconds to go, giving Indy a stunning 30-27 victory.

Green Bay (2-3) faces an uphill climb in the NFC North.

They're still struggling to find an offensive rhythm, though it looked as if they might break out of their funk in the first half when Rodgers was 11 of 17 for 122 yards with two touchdown passes to take a 21-3 lead.

But nothing worked in the second half.

Mason Crosby missed a 52-yard field goal in the third quarter and a 51-yarder to the left with 3 seconds left in the game -- a kick that could have forced overtime.

Rodgers finished 21 of 33 for 243 yards with three touchdowns, an interception and a big dose of frustration.

The Colts dominated the second half.

Luck threw an 8-yard TD pass to Dwayne Allen and set up Adam Vinatieri for a 50-yard field goal to make it 21-13 midway through the third quarter. He then ran it in from 3 yards with 18 seconds left to go in the quarter to get the Colts within 21-19.

A few minutes later, Vinatieri hit a 28-yard field goal to give Indy its first lead, 22-21.

But Rodgers got Green Bay's offense back in sync in a hurry.

Alex Green ran 41 yards on the Packers' first play, and Rodgers threw an 8-yard TD pass to James Jones on the next one to give the Packers a 27-20 lead with 4:30 to go.

All the Packers had to do was stop Luck one more time to clinch it.

Luck and Wayne wouldn't allow it.

# 2012 BIOGRAPHIES

## 67 Don Barclay, G/T, Rookie, West Virginia

- One of four non-drafted rookie free agents to make the club's opening-day roster in 2012. Made the team on the strength of a preseason that saw him display versatility at both the guard and tackle positions.

- Was a three-year starter at LT in college, tying the school record by playing in 52 games with 39 starts, and twice being named an All-Big East Conference selection.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Made his NFL debut, appearing on special teams as a member of the kickoff return unit.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Played in the game on special teams, appearing on both the kickoff return unit and as part of the placement protection... Had a role in the game's most memorable play, a fake FG attempt late in the second quarter...On the play, he pulled from the left side of the line of scrimmage, serving as a lead blocker for TE Tom Crabtree who was on the receiving end of a shovel pass from P Tim Masthay...Led Crabtree through the hole before helping C/G Evan Dietrich-Smith drive S Chris Conte well away from the play and allowing Crabtree a clear path to the end zone for a 27-yard TD that put Green Bay ahead 10-0.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)** - at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Played in each game on special teams.

## 32 Cedric Benson, RB, 8th Year, Texas

- Veteran runner who was signed Aug. 12 and has emerged from training camp as the lead back in the Green Bay offense.

- Joined the Packers following a productive four-year stint with the Cincinnati Bengals that saw him lead the team in rushing each year, and post three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons from 2009-11.

- Was one of only five running backs in the NFL to run for 1,000 yards or more each of the last three seasons and his three-year rushing total of 3,429 yards ranked No. 7 in the league from 2009-11.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Made his Packers debut, getting the start on offense and finishing the game with 18 yards on nine carries (2.0 avg.)

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Had a productive day against his original team, carrying 20 times for 81 yards (4.1 avg.) and adding four receptions for 35 yards (8.8 avg.)...Became the first Packers RB to exceed the 20-carry mark in a game since Brandon Jackson (22) did so at New England on Dec. 19, 2010.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Carried 17 times for 45 yards (2.6 avg.) and a TD...Scored the offense's lone TD, his first as a Packer, on a 1-yard plunge in the fourth quarter...Also caught four passes for 19 yards (4.8 avg.)

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Provided an excellent balance for what was an especially productive day on offense, carrying 18 times for a season-high 84 yards (4.7 avg.)...Also made four catches out of the backfield for 22 yards (5.5 avg.)

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Started the game at RB but suffered an injury early in the second quarter when his foot got caught under LB Moise Fokou on a tackle following a 3-yard carry...Did not return following the injury, but carried seven times for 20 yards (2.9 avg.) and caught two passes for 21 yards (10.5 avg.) prior to going down...Accounted for 30 of 56 yards on the Packers first scoring drive late in the first quarter, one that culminated with a 2-yard TD plunge by FB John Kuhn.

## 11 Jarrett Boykin, WR, Rookie, Virginia Tech

- Non-drafted rookie free agent who earned a contract offer after first appearing as a tryout player at the team's rookie orientation camp May 11-13. One of four non-drafted rookies to make the team's opening-day roster joining G/T Don Barclay, LB Dezman Moses and S Sean Richardson.

- Went through the remainder of the offseason program with the club and was kept as the No. 6 WR after playing in all four of the team's preseason contests and finishing with a team-high 13 catches for 166 yards (12.8 avg.) and a TD.

- Finished his collegiate career at Virginia Tech as the school's all-time leader in both receptions (184) and receiving yards (2,884), while also adding 18 TDs.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Listed as a gameday inactive for his first

professional game.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)** - at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Inactive.

## 75 Bryan Bulaga, T, 3rd Year, Iowa

- Has started 12 games at RT in each of his first two seasons as a pro and opens the 2012 season entrenched as the starter at RT as one of the emerging young players on offense for the Packers.

- Allowed just one sack in 2011, according to STATS LLC.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Started at RT against the talented 49ers front seven and was part of a line that allowed QB Aaron Rodgers time to complete 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs, while being sacked three times during the game.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Started at RT and appeared on all 68 offensive plays, also appearing on special teams...Had a hand in the game's most memorable play, a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree on a fake field goal attempt in the second quarter...On the play, blocked out on the wing against WR Eric Weems, helping to create the large lane used by Crabtree on his way to the end zone.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Overcame what was a challenging first half for the offense as part of a line that helped produce three scoring drives and did not yield a sack in the second half.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Turned in a solid bounce-back performance as part of an offensive line that helped produce 421 yards of total offense, 30 first downs and four TD drives during the game...Protection unit was particularly proficient, allowing Rodgers to complete 31-of-41 passes for 319 yards and four TD passes, while pitching a shutout in the sack department.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Started at RT on what was an uneven day for the offense...Helped produce three TD drives and 179 yards of offense before halftime, staking the team to a 21-3 lead.

## 42 Morgan Burnett, S, 3rd Year, Georgia Tech

- Started each of the team's 16 regular-season games in 2011, the first two at strong safety and the final 14 at free safety in place of an injured Nick Collins (neck), one of only two Green Bay defenders to start all 16 games (NT B.J. Raji).

- Despite a hand injury that required him to play with a cast for a portion of the season, he continued to fill in the statistics sheet in first full season of action, establishing new career bests with a secondary-high 107 tackles (83 solo), 14 passes defended, three interceptions, two forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and a sack.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Started at FS and finished with six tackles (two solo).

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Posted six tackles (four solo) for the second consecutive week, also adding his first two passes defended of the young season...Part of a secondary that collected four INTs and helped limit Chicago to just 74 net passing yards during the game.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Finished with four assisted tackles.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Finished as the team's leading tackler with 13 stops (six solo) and a pass defended during the game...Made a key tackle for loss on a short pass from QB Drew Brees to RB Mark Ingram on a first-down play from the Green Bay 1-yard line in the third quarter...The subsequent two plays were incomplete passes and New Orleans was forced to attempt a FG on fourth down.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Led the defense with 11 tackles (10 solo) and added a pass defended.

## 24 Jarrett Bush, CB, 7th Year, Utah State

- Has played in all 16 games for four straight seasons.

- Served as both the dime and nickel CB at times during the 2011 season, making 21 tackles (14 solo), while posting a career-high two interceptions and his first career sack.

- Tied for the team lead with 12 special teams tackles in 2011, his sixth straight season with a double-digit tackle total on special teams, becoming the first Packer to accomplish the feat since the statistic began being

recorded in 1976.

- Current streak of 78 consecutive games played (including postseason) ranks No. 2 on the team behind K Mason Crosby (93).

- ▶ **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at CB and finished with five tackles (four solo), also recording a tackle on in kickoff coverage on special teams.

- ▶ **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Returned to his role on special teams, where he tallied another tackle on the kickoff team...Also helped limit WR Devin Hester to just two punt returns for 8 yards (4.0 avg.), as a member of the coverage unit that landed three kicks inside the 20-yard line.

- ▶ **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game, mostly on special teams, finishing with one coverage tackle...Also downed a second-quarter punt by P Tim Masthay at Seattle's 1-yard line.

- ▶ **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played on special teams and was credited with a tackle in kickoff coverage...Helped contain dangerous returner RB Darren Sproles to just one punt return for 4 yards and three kickoff returns for 91 yards (30.3 avg.).

- ▶ **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Played on special teams, recording a tackle in punt coverage where he helped limit the Colts to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.) on seven punts, four of them secured inside the Indianapolis 20-yard line.

## 18 Randall Cobb, WR, 2nd Year, Kentucky

- Second-year man who continues to see an increased role as both a runner and receiver on offense, while also serving at the team's primary kick returner.

- Ranked No. 2 in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.7) and No. 7 in the league in punt return average (11.3) in 2011. Checked in at No. 1 and No. 2 in those respective categories among rookies on his way to earning All-Rookie honors from *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA as a kickoff returner.

- As a receiver, netted 25 catches for 375 yards (15.0 avg.) and also carried the ball twice for 5 yards (2.5 avg.) in 2011.

- ▶ **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Opened the season with a bang for the second consecutive year with a leading performance on both offense and special teams...Followed his NFL-record 108-yard kickoff return for a TD in last season's opener vs. New Orleans with a fourth-quarter punt return that he took 75 yards for a TD, his third return in just his 17th career regular-season game...Is now tied for second in team history for career kick return TDs (Travis Williams, six), having taken two punts and one kickoff back for scores...According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he became the first player in NFL history to score on a kick return (punt or kickoff) in Week 1 each of his first two seasons in the league. On the play, eluded defenders to the outside and then raced up the right sideline past P Andy Lee on his way to the end zone...Offensively, posted career highs with both his nine catches and 77 yards.

- ▶ **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Finished with one catch for 20 yards to go with one carry for 28 yards, the longest rush of his career...Also had a 16-yard punt return.

- ▶ **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Made one catch for a loss of 1 yard and carried once for 20 yards, his second 20-plus-yard rush in as many weeks...Was limited in the return game, having his three punt returns go for just 12 yards (4.0 avg.) and his only returnable kickoff netting 23 yards.

- ▶ **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished second on offense with both his seven catches and 66 yards (9.4 avg.), seeing extended action in the second half after WR Greg Jennings left the game with a groin injury.

- ▶ **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Again saw increased action with Jennings sidelined due to injury and finished with four catches for a team-leading and career-high 82 yards (20.5 avg.) and a TD, his first receiving score of the season...Scored on a 31-yard play in the second quarter that extended the Green Bay lead to 21-3 (following PAT), after running a slant in front of CB Jerraud Powers out of the right slot, catching a bullet from Rodgers and cruising untouched into the end zone...Also had four punt returns for 19 yards (4.8 avg.) and three kickoff returns for 95 yards (31.7 avg.), including a season-long 35 yarder.

## 83 Tom Crabtree, TE, 3rd Year, Miami (Ohio)

- Started a career-high nine contests in 2011 and recorded a career-best six catches for 38 yards and a TD.

- Ranked No. 3 on the team with the 18 special teams tackles from 2010-11, trailing only CBs Jarrett Bush (24) and Pat Lee (19).

- ▶ **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on special teams and on offense, but did not record any statistics.

- ▶ **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Had the leading role in the game's most memorable play, a 27-yard TD off of a shovel pass on a fake field goal late in the second quarter...On the play, lined up at his normal position on the left end of the line of scrimmage...At the snap, turned to the inside of the formation to collect the pass from P Tim Masthay, before cutting up the field through the right side of the line behind a series of blocks from C/G Evan Dietrich-Smith, G/T Don Barclay and T Bryan Bulaga and racing untouched into the end zone...The play converted a fourth-and-26 from the 27-yard line and marked the second regular-season TD reception of his career.

- ▶ **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Was limited during the practice week with a lingering shoulder injury and was listed as a gameday inactive for the first time in his career, breaking a streak of 39 consecutive games played dating back to the 2010 season opener.

- ▶ **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Returned to action and got the start as part of a two-tight end set...Finished with one catch for 16 yards.

- ▶ **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Started as part of a three-TE set and finished with one catch for 6 yards.

## 2 Mason Crosby, K, 6th Year, Colorado

- In 2011, set an NFL record for the most points scored by a player in his first five seasons with 649, besting the previous mark held by Washington K Chip Lohmiller (625, 1988-92).

- Converted a career-best 85.7 percent of the field goals he attempted in 2011 (24-of-28), ranking No. 3 in the NFL with 140 points and becoming only the sixth player in the history of the league to register two 140-point seasons (141 in 2007).

- Has not missed a game in his career, playing in 93 straight games (including postseason), the longest current streak on the team.

- ▶ **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Did not attempt a FG, but did make both of his PAT tries and boomed three touchbacks on his four kickoffs.

- ▶ **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Converted each of his first three FG attempts on the young season, boasting makes of 48, 35 and 54 yards during the game...The 54-yarder came early in the fourth quarter and marked the longest FG by a Packer in Lambeau Field history, besting the previous record of 53 yards...Also had a hand in the game's most memorable play, a fake FG late in the second quarter that resulted in a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree...On the fake, released out to the left side of the field mocking a potential pass pattern...Drew CB Charles Tillman away from the shovel pass inside to Crabtree, thus creating one less defender in the pursuit of the ball...Also hit three of his five kickoffs for touchbacks and was successful on all three PAT attempts.

- ▶ **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Converted both of his FG tries during the game, hitting from both 29 and 40 yards in the third quarter to pull the Packers to within a point at 7-6 after being shut out in the first half...Also kicked two of his four kickoffs for touchbacks.

- ▶ **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Did not attempt a FG, but was good on all four of his PATs...Was efficient in the kickoff game, helping to limit explosive return man Darren Sproles to just 91 yards on three returns (30.3 avg.), also hitting two touchbacks.

- ▶ **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Had his most challenging day as a professional, missing both FG attempts on the afternoon, including a 51-yarder he pulled wide left that would have tied the score 30-30 with :03 remaining in regulation...First miss was a 52-yarder he pushed wide to the right late in the third quarter...Did have a productive day on kickoffs, hitting five touchbacks without allowing a return.

## **76 Mike Daniels, DE, Rookie, Iowa**

- Young defender who will look to contribute as an interior pass rusher in the team's various sub-packages as a rookie.

- Selected by the Packers at the end of the fourth round (No. 132 overall) with the first of four free-agent compensatory draft choices received following the 2011 season.

- Appeared in 47 games with 21 starts during his four-year career, tallying 123 tackles (54 solo), including 27 for loss and 15½ sacks for Iowa teams that played in four bowl games (with three wins) over that span.

- Had his best season as a senior in 2011, starting all 13 games and earning second-team All-Big Ten distinction from the league's coaches after setting new career highs with 67 tackles (32 solo), 13½ for loss, a team-high nine sacks and a pass defended.

- ▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Listed as a gameday inactive for his first NFL game.

- ▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Made his NFL debut against the division-rival Bears, appearing on 14 plays and finishing with one solo tackle that was also his first career sack...Play came in the fourth quarter when he fought off a block from veteran C Roberto Garza and wrapped up QB Jay Cutler as he stepped forward in the pocket for a 1-yard loss.

- ▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game on defense, but did not record any statistics.

- ▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Appeared on both defense and special teams, recording an assisted tackle on defense.

- ▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Returned to the inactive list following the activation of DE Mike Neal from reserve/suspended.

## **62 Evan Dietrich-Smith, C/G, 3rd Year, Idaho State**

- The primary reserve at each of the three interior OL positions and also a contributor on special teams.

- In 2011, played in all 16 regular-season games for the first time in his career and made three starts, two at RG and one at LG.

- Entered the NFL with Green Bay in 2009 as a non-drafted free agent and was the lone non-drafted rookie to make the Packers' opening-day roster that season.

- ▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game exclusively on special teams.

- ▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Participated on special teams, playing an integral role in the game's most memorable play, a 27-yard TD pass on a fake field goal attempt late in the second quarter...As part of the protection unit on the play, blocked out on S Chris Conte, driving the DB away from the line of scrimmage and helping to create the wide lane used by TE Tom Crabtree as he raced into the end zone to give the Packers a 10-0 lead (following PAT).

- ▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24) - at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Played on special teams.

## **80 Donald Driver, WR, 14th Year, Alcorn State**

- Sits atop the franchise record book for the most receptions (738) and the most receiving yards (10,103) in team history. Also ranks No. 1 in franchise history for the most 1,000-yard seasons with seven, highlighted by six straight from 2004-09, also a team record.

- Has caught 50-plus passes in a season a franchise-record nine times in his career (2002-10), topping WRs James Lofton and Sterling Sharpe (seven each).

- Surpassed QB Bart Starr for No. 2 in team history for most games played with 197, now trailing only QB Brett Favre (255).

- With 60 career TD receptions, ranks No. 3 in franchise annals behind only Don Hutson (99) and Sharpe (65).

- Has played in all 16 games in eight of his 13 seasons in the NFL.

- ▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on offense, but did not record any statistics.

- ▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Played in the game on offense and caught a 26-yard TD from QB Aaron Rodgers in the fourth quarter that extended

the Green Bay lead to 23-3...The scoring play was his lone reception of the game and marked the 60th receiving TD of his career.

- ▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game on offense, but did not record any statistics.

- ▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished with one catch for 3 yards.

- ▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Game marked his 197th in a Green Bay uniform, moving him past QB Bart Starr for No. 2 all-time in team history behind QB Brett Favre...Made one catch for 14 yards, a key play that came with :25 remaining in the fourth quarter...The catch moved the Packers to the Indianapolis 33-yard line for a 51-yard FG attempt to tie the game near the end of regulation.

- Is tied for fourth in club history with 22 career 100-yard receiving games.

- Reached 50 catches for nine consecutive seasons (2002-10) – a team record – and had over 1,000 yards receiving in six straight seasons (2004-09).

- Ranks first in receptions (360) and yards (4,980) at Lambeau Field.

- Ranks No. 2 all-time in team history for total yards from scrimmage (10,320; 217 rush, 10,103 rec.), trailing only RB Ahman Green (11,048; 8,322 rush, 2,726 rec.).

## **88 Jermichael Finley, TE, 5th Year, Texas**

- Is tied for No. 2 in the franchise single-season record books for most receptions by a tight end in a season (55 in 2009 and 2011) and ranks No. 2 in receiving yards (767 in 2011), trailing only Paul Coffman in both categories (56 catches in '79, 814 yards in '83).

- The lone tight end in team history to register two 55-catch seasons and is one of only two tight ends (Coffman) to record two 600-yard campaigns.

- ▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at TE and finished with seven catches for 47 yards (6.7 avg.) and a TD...Capped 10-play, 80-yard drive to score the team's first TD of the young season, catching a 1-yard slant between two defenders in the end zone in the second quarter.

- ▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Collected four catches for 26 yards (6.5 avg.).

- ▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Finished with four catches for a team-high 60 yards (15.0 avg.)...Two of his catches converted key third downs on a pair of second-half scoring drives, including his game-long 31-yarder that continued a march toward the offense's first FG in the third quarter.

- ▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Was particularly productive with his limited opportunities, finishing with 54 yards on four catches (13.5 avg.), seeing each of his receptions move the chains for first downs.

- ▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Finished with three catches for 11 yards (3.7 average)...Suffered a shoulder injury diving for a deep throw near the sideline in the third quarter and did not return.

## **49 Robert Francois, LB, 3rd Year, Boston College**

- Versatile backup linebacker and special teams performer who spent the entire season on the active roster for the first time in 2011 and saw the most extensive playing time of his career late in the year.

- Played in 11 games with two starts, tallying 21 tackles (15 solo), two interceptions, three passes defended and a forced fumble as an injury replacement for LB A.J. Hawk (calf) in 2011.

- ▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on special teams and was credited with a tackle on the punt coverage team.

- ▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Appeared in the game on special teams and recorded a tackle on the punt team when he wrapped up and carried the dangerous WR Devin Hester out of bounds on a fourth-quarter punt return that went for only 1 yard.

- ▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Played in the game on special teams and was credited with one coverage tackle.

- ▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Appeared in the game on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

- ▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Helped lead the coverage units, notching a tackle on the punt team as part of a unit that limited Indianapolis to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.) on seven kicks.



## 61 Brett Goode, LS, 5th Year, Arkansas

- Reliable long snapper who has performed the job for the past four-plus seasons, having appeared in all 69 regular-season games and six playoff contests since joining the club.

- Helped key an all-around improvement for the special teams in 2011, one that saw the units climb to No. 13 overall in the annual *Dallas Morning News* rankings, the team's highest finish since 2007.

- Played a critical role in P Tim Masthay posting 45.6-yard gross and 38.6-yard net punting averages in 2011, each of which set new franchise records. Also centered a placement operation that saw K Mason Crosby produce a career season, one that resulted in his being named a first alternate for the Pro Bowl.

- ▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Snapped for each of Masthay's six punts, four of which were down inside the 20-yard line.

- ▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Snapped for all three of Crosby's successful FG attempts, including his 54-yarder in the fourth quarter that set a new team record for a FG by a Packers kicker at Lambeau Field...Also centered the game's highlight play, a fake field goal attempt in the second quarter that resulted in a 27-yard TD pass from Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree...On the play, snapped the ball to the holder Masthay and then threw a cut-block that wiped out DE Israel Idonije, allowing a clear path for Crabtree to take the shovel pass from Masthay and dart up the field for the score.

- ▶at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Centered both of Crosby's successful third-quarter FGs and all six of Masthay's punts, three of which were downed inside the 20-yard line.

- ▶vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Snapped for all four PATs and both punts during the game...Was on the front end of a successfully executed trick play for the second time in three weeks when his direct snap to FB John Kuhn on a second-quarter fake punt on a fourth-and-1 resulted in a 5-yard gain that extended an eventual TD drive.

- ▶at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Delivered snaps for each of Crosby's unsuccessful second-half FG tries and also all seven of Masthay's punts.

## 20 Alex Green, RB, 2nd Year, Hawaii

- Young runner who has come back from the knee injury that prematurely ended his rookie season in 2011.

- Played in four contests as a rookie in 2011, primarily on special teams but also as the No. 3 running back, before seeing his debut season cut short by a knee injury sustained at Minnesota in Week 7.

- ▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Dressed for the game, but did not play.

- ▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Made his season debut, his first regular-season action since Week 7 of 2011, and carried twice for 2 yards (1.0 avg.).

- ▶at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Dressed for the game, but did not play.

- ▶vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

- ▶at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Saw extended action after starter Cedric Benson suffered a foot injury in the second quarter...Finished with career highs in carries (nine) and yards (55), and ripped off his career-long 41-yard run to set up a go-ahead TD late in the fourth quarter...On the play, took a hand-off from QB Aaron Rodgers on the first play of the drive...Followed a lead block from TE Ryan Taylor through the hole off LG and then put a move on S Tom Zbikowski in the open field before cutting back to the right past S Antoine Bethea and racing up the sideline where he was pushed out of bounds at the Indianapolis 8-yard line...Set up a TD pass from Rodgers to James Jones on the next play that gave Green Bay a 27-22 lead with 4:34 remaining...Marked the longest run by a Packer since RB Ryan Grant's 80-yarder vs. Oakland on Dec. 11, 2011.

## 6 Graham Harrell, QB, 1st Year, Texas Tech

- The team's primary backup behind reigning league MVP QB Aaron Rodgers. Played extensively in all four of the team's exhibition contests, completing 45-of-78 attempts for 484 yards with three TDs and two INTs.
- Finished the preseason with an exclamation point, throwing for 223 yards and two TDs on 13-of-15 passing, posting a perfect QB rating of 158.3 in the finale vs. Kansas City (Aug. 30).

- ▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Dressed for the game, but did not play, serv-

ing as the No. 2 QB behind Rodgers.

- ▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Dressed, but did not see any action.

- ▶at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Dressed for the game, but did not play.

- ▶vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Made his regular-season NFL debut in the third quarter when Rodgers was forced to leave the game after being poked in the eye...Inherited a first-and-goal at the New Orleans 2-yard line, but on his first snap, got stepped on by C Jeff Saturday while retreating to hand off to RB Cedric Benson...Tried to complete the exchange, but fumbled and surrendered possession to the Saints.

- ▶at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Did not play.

## 50 A.J. Hawk, LB, 7th Year, Ohio State

- Productive, assignment-sure defender entering his seventh season, having played in 99 of a possible 101 regular-season games with 96 starts in his six-plus years.

- Started all 14 games in which he appeared in 2011, missing the first two contests of his career following a calf injury.

- When healthy, maintained his role as the lead defensive communicator and finished third on the team with 104 tackles (73 solo), in addition to posting 1½ sacks and five passes defended. Was also voted by teammates to serve as a playoff captain for the second consecutive season.

- ▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Led the defense with a team-high 17 tackles (12 solo)...One of his stops came when he teamed with DB Charles Woodson to stop RB Frank Gore on a third-and-1 at the Green Bay 25-yard line late in the first half to force a FG.

- ▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Finished with five tackles (three solo)...Stuffed a screen pass to RB Matt Forte in the first quarter, beating a block by C Roberto Garza to drop Forte for a 1-yard loss.

- ▶at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Tied for the lead among LBs with eight tackles (all solo), helping to hold Seattle to just 14 first downs and 238 total yards during the game.

- ▶vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Started on defense, but was featured in a more limited role with the defense in DB-heavy personnel groupings to match the Saints' spread attack...Finished with five tackles (all solo).

- ▶at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Appeared on 50 plays, finishing with eight tackles (six solo)...Made a tackle for loss when he shot through the line on the Colts' second drive and dropped RB Vick Ballard for a 2-yard loss...Also thwarted a sneak by QB Andrew Luck on a fourth-and-1 play in the first quarter to force a turnover on downs.

## 29 Casey Hayward, CB, Rookie, Vanderbilt

- Drafted by the Packers with the second of two second-round selections (No. 62 overall). Became the highest-drafted defensive back out of Vanderbilt since CB Fred Vinson in 1999, who was selected by the Packers in the second round (No. 47 overall).

- Played in 50 games with 37 starts during his career and posted 199 tackles (146 solo), 15 interceptions, 46 passes defended and three forced fumbles. Finished his career tied for No. 1 in school history with the 15 career interceptions, matching the mark posted by Leonard Coleman (1980-83).

- ▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Made his NFL debut on special teams, recording a tackle in kickoff coverage when he brought down RB Kendall Hunter after a 31-yard return in the fourth quarter.

- ▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Saw extended action on defense as part of the various sub-packages, primarily as the team's fourth CB in the dime personnel grouping...Finished with three tackles (all solo), as part of a defense that helped hold the Bears to just 74 net passing yards during the game.

- ▶at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Saw playing time on defense as part of the team's DB-heavy subpackages, finishing with one solo tackle and his first career pass defended...Broke up a pass from QB Russell Wilson to WR Golden Tate on a third-down play that forced a punt in the second quarter...Also recorded a tackle on special teams.

- ▶vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Saw extended scrimmage action against the Saints spread attack, finishing with a season-high eight tackles (six solo) and a pass defended...Broke up a third-down pass from QB Drew Brees intended for WR Marques Colston in the second quarter to force a punt.

- ▶at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Appeared on 43 plays and finished with two



tackles (both solo) and his first career INT...Recorded the INT early in the fourth quarter when he was matched in coverage with veteran WR Reggie Wayne...Mirrored Wayne on an out-and-up route down the sideline and got his head around in time to pick off QB Andrew Luck's throw.

### **31 Davon House, CB, 2nd Year, New Mexico State**

- Carried the momentum of a strong offseason into the 2012 training camp where he was vying for the No. 2 CB position on defense. Suffered a shoulder injury in the exhibition opener at San Diego (Aug. 9) and was sidelined for the remainder of the preseason.
- Appeared in just two games as a rookie, playing only on special teams, where he was credited with one tackle.
- ▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Practiced during the week with a protective harness on his shoulder but was listed as a gameday inactive.
- ▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13) - at Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Inactive.

### **85 Greg Jennings, WR, 7th Year, Western Michigan**

- Ranks in the top 10 in franchise history in receptions (7th, 401), receiving yards (8th, 6,249) and touchdown catches (t-5th-50).
- Earned Pro Bowl recognition each of the past two seasons.
- One of just five receivers in team history to post three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons (2008-10), joining James Lofton, Sterling Sharpe, Antonio Freeman and Donald Driver.
- ▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Finished with five catches for 34 yards (6.8 avg.).
- ▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Missed the practice week following a groin injury suffered in the fourth quarter of the season opener vs. San Francisco...Was challenged by the short turnaround for the Thursday night game was listed as a gameday inactive.
- ▶at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Returned to the lineup and got the start, finishing with a team-high six catches for 35 yards (5.8 avg.).
- ▶vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Played in the game in the first half, making one catch, a 9-yard TD that put the Packers ahead 14-7 (following PAT) early in the second quarter...Aggravated his groin injury later in the quarter and did not return for the second half...TD was the 50th of his career, moving him past Lofton and into a tie for No. 5 in team history with Max McGee.
- ▶at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Was ruled out of the game early in the week after being shut down by the coaching and training staffs, in an attempt to allow him to fully rehabilitate the nagging groin injury.

#### **Streaks & Milestones**

- His total of 1,265 receiving yards in 2010 was the 12th highest in club history...Is now also tied for fourth in franchise annals with 22 100-yard receiving games.
- Of his 50 career TD catches, 18 have been at least 40 yards in length.

### **43 M.D. Jennings, S, 2nd Year, Arkansas State**

- Originally signed by Green Bay on July 28, 2011, ultimately becoming one of 10 rookies and three non-drafted free agents to make the club's opening-day roster a season ago.
- Played in 15 regular-season games last year, becoming the team's No. 3 safety after veteran Nick Collins suffered a season-ending neck injury in Week 2.
- Placed sixth on the team and third among rookies with nine special teams tackles in 2011, seeing eight of them come on the kickoff coverage team.
- ▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Appeared in the game on both defense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.
- ▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.
- ▶at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Appeared in the game on both defense and special teams, but did not record any statistics...Was at the center of the controversial play that decided the game in Seattle's favor when he jumped to intercept a ball in the end zone as time expired...Despite what was ultimately determined to be simultaneous possession, an official review determined that the ball changed hands and was in fact wrestled away by WR Golden Tate, giving the Seahawks a 14-12 victory (following PAT).
- ▶vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Appeared in the game on defense and special

teams in the first half, but suffered a shoulder injury and did not return... Was credited with two solo tackles on defense before leaving the game.

▶at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Played on special teams and also briefly on defense...Tallied a tackle in punt coverage, his first special teams stop of the season.

### **59 Brad Jones, LB, 4th Year, Colorado**

- Productive outside linebacker who has contributed both on defense and special teams during his career in Green Bay. Possesses the ability to play both the inside and outside LB positions in the defense and has worked at each at different times during his career.
- Played extensively as one of the club's top contributors on special teams in 2011, and tied for third on the team with a career-high 11 coverage tackles on the season.
- Posted the team's lone sack in the Divisional playoff contest vs. the N.Y. Giants, and also became the first Packer since Cletidus Hunt in 2002 to block a FG attempt in a postseason game.
- ▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Appeared in the game on special teams...Did not record any statistics, but made a key block on a fourth-quarter punt return that allowed WR Randall Cobb to turn the corner and race down the sideline for a 75-yard TD.
- ▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Played on special teams but did not record any statistics.
- ▶at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Appeared in the game on special teams, and was credited with a tackle in kickoff coverage.
- ▶vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Played in the game on special teams, and although he did not record any statistics, he led the charge in helping to contain dangerous return man Darren Sproles to just one punt return for 4 yards and three kickoff returns for 91 yards (30.3 avg.).
- ▶at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Played on special teams and finished with a tackle on the punt coverage unit, helping to limit the Colts to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.) on seven punts.

### **89 James Jones, WR, 6th Year, San Jose State**

- Played in all 16 games each season from 2009-11 and in four of his five years in the NFL.
- Posted career highs in TD catches (seven) and receiving average (16.7) in 2011, catching 38 passes for 635 yards.
- Has posted at least one 100-yard receiving game in each of his first five seasons in the league (2007-11), joining WR Greg Jennings as the only Packer to do so over that span.
- ▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Started the game as part of a three-WR set and finished with four catches for a game-high 81 yards (20.3 avg.) and a TD...Scored on a 10-yard TD pass from QB Aaron Rodgers with 6:05 remaining to pull the Packers to within one score at 30-22.
- ▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Finished the game with two receptions for -1 yards (-0.5 avg.).
- ▶at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Placed second on the team with both five catches and 55 yards (11.0 avg.)...Three of his five grabs moved the chains on key third downs.
- ▶vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Started and posted the second multi-TD game of his career (also vs. Chicago, Dec. 25, 2011), finishing with five catches for 56 yards (11.2 avg.) and two scores during the game...First TD came in the first quarter on a second reaction that saw Rodgers roll to his left and fire a pass for TE Jermichael Finley in the end zone that Jones stepped in front of and plucked for a 12-yard TD to open the game's scoring...Second TD came in the second quarter when he beat CB Jabari Greer to the inside and hauled in a 14-yard TD from Rodgers to put Green Bay ahead 21-7 (following PAT)...Later sealed the game with an excellent catch on a critical third-and-3 with under two minutes remaining...On the play, caught a stop-fade from Rodgers - despite a pass interference on Greer - allowing the Packers to run out the remaining time and secure a 28-27 win.
- ▶at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Finished with his second multi-TD outing in as many weeks, tying for a team-high four catches for 46 yards (11.5 avg.) and two TDs against the Colts...First TD came on a third down from the Indianapolis 6-yard line when he caught a short pass from Rodgers and battled his way to the pylon to extend the Green Bay lead to 14-0 in the

second quarter...Later helped reclaim the lead for the Packers when he caught a bullet from Rodgers between defenders in the end zone for an 8-yard score that put the team in front 27-22...With the catch, became the second Packer in as many years to post back-to-back multi-TD games, joining Jordy Nelson (Weeks 10-11, 16-17, 2011), and has now scored five or more TDs in four consecutive seasons.

### **30 John Kuhn, FB, 7th Year, Shippensburg**

- Has played in 83 of 85 games (90 of 92 including playoffs) during his five-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.

- Was the only player on the team to score on a rushing and receiving TD each of the past four seasons (2008-11), the first Packer to accomplish that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).

- Selected as a Pro Bowl starter in 2011, the first Green Bay fullback to earn Pro Bowl recognition since William Henderson in 2004. Also earned second-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press* in 2011.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Appeared in the game on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Carried the ball twice for 1 yard on offense (0.5 avg.) and had three receptions for 23 yards (7.7 avg.)...Also notched a tackle on special teams when he took down WR Devin Hester in the open field following a 7-yard punt return in the third quarter.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Played on both offense and special teams, collecting three catches for 25 yards (8.3 avg.), and also carrying once for 2 yards.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Lone carry was a meaningful one as he took a direct snap from the punt protector position on a second-quarter fourth-and-1 play, burrowing forward for a 5-yard gain...Successful fake punt resulted in a first down and the offense would score a TD nine plays later to extend Green Bay's lead to 21-7 (following PAT)...Also had a productive blocking day in front of RB Cedric Benson, who ran for a season-high 84 yards on 18 carries (4.7 avg.)...Added a tackle in punt coverage.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Had one catch for 6 yards and also carried twice for 9 yards (4.5 avg.), the first of which resulted in his first rushing TD of the season...Found the end zone on a 2-yard burst off of LG to open the scoring with 2:07 remaining in the first quarter.

### **70 T.J. Lang, G, 4th Year, Eastern Michigan**

- Ascending member of the team's core who was signed to a contract extension during the 2012 preseason.

- Has started games at three different positions (LT, LG, RT) in three-plus seasons as a pro and in his first year as a full-time starter in 2011, opened all 16 games (15 at LG, one at RT), one of only two Green Bay offensive linemen (C Scott Wells) to start every regular-season game.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Opened the game at LG and was faced with the task of blocking standout DE Justin Smith for the balance of the game...Helped limit Smith to what was ultimately one tackle in the official game statistics and was part of a line that allowed QB Aaron Rodgers time to complete 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Started at LG...Contributed in his role on special teams where as a member of the placement protection unit, he helped block for a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree on a successfully executed fake FG...On the play, teamed with G Josh Sitton to combination-block DT Henry Melton, before releasing to the next level and leading the way for Crabtree to get into the open and race into the end zone.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Part of a protection unit that recovered from a difficult first half to help put together three second-half scoring drives without allowing a sack over the final two quarters.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Played a key role in an impressive bounce-back performance by the offensive line that saw the team produce 421 yards of offense and four TD drives during the game...Also kept Rodgers upright to complete 31-of-41 passes for 319 yards and four TD passes, without being sacked during the game...Offense produced 30 first downs, the most by the team since they had 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Started at LG during what was an up-and-down offensive effort...Helped the offense produce 179 yards and three TD drives in the first half...Released cleanly from the line and made a good open-field block on LB Jerrell Freeman on an 18-yard screen pass to RB Cedric Benson that set up the Packers first TD in the opening quarter...Also helped engage DT Drake Nevis to the inside on a run play in the fourth quarter that resulted in RB Alex Green's 41-yard carry, the team's longest of the season through five games.

### **57 Jamari Lattimore, LB, 2nd Year, Middle Tennessee State**

- Practiced and played exclusively as an OLB in 2011, but made the switch to ILB during the offseason program and was repped there throughout training camp and the preseason. Finished the exhibition season with three tackles (all solo) and an INT he returned 27 yards for a TD at Cincinnati (Aug. 23).

- Appeared in nine games as a rookie in 2011, seeing almost all of his playing time come on special teams, where he collected four coverage tackles during the season.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Listed as a gameday inactive due to an ankle injury suffered late in the preseason that limited him in practice during the week leading up to the game.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Made his season debut on special teams but did not record any statistics.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Inactive.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Returned to the lineup, appearing on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Played on special teams but did not record any statistics.

### **56 Terrell Manning, LB, Rookie, North Carolina State**

- Selected with the 163rd overall pick in the fifth round of the 2012 NFL Draft (23rd linebacker taken), the last of six consecutive defenders chosen by the Packers to open the draft in 2012.

- Appeared in all four of the team's preseason games, finishing with 10 tackles (eight solo) and a sack. Will compete for playing time at the 'Buck' inside LB position and also on special teams as a rookie.

- A two-year starter and three-year letterwinner at North Carolina State who elected to forego his final season at the collegiate level, he appeared in 36 games with 26 starts during his career, finishing with 207 tackles (128 solo), including 26 for loss, 10½ sacks, five interceptions, five forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Made his NFL debut on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Missed the practice week with symptoms of a concussion suffered in the season opener and was listed as an inactive on gameday.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Returned to practice after being cleared during the week, but was an inactive on gameday.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Inactive.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Inactive.

### **8 Tim Masthay, P, 3rd Year, Kentucky**

- Established specialist whose marked consistency and improvement was rewarded with a contract extension during the 2012 training camp.

- Improved upon what was a promising first-year campaign by delivering franchise records for gross (45.6 avg.) and net (38.6 avg.) punting averages in 2011.

- Finished 2011 in a similar fashion to his run at the end of 2010, posting a gross average of 48.1 yards and a net average of 43.6, while dropping 19 punts inside the 20-yard line over the final 10 games of the season.

- Has also served as the team's holder on placements over the past two seasons, helping K Mason Crosby to a career-high 85.7 field goal percentage in 2011 and an NFL-best three FGs of 56-plus yards since 2010.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Opened the season with a difference-making performance against the 49ers...Punted six times for 289 yards (48.6 avg., 41.5 net), landing four of them inside the 20-yard line and three of them inside the 10...Limited San Francisco to just one return and left them with

an average starting position at their own 16-yard line following his six attempts.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Followed up his solid opener with another memorable performance...Punted five times for 238 yards (47.6 avg., 42.0 net), landing three inside the 20-yard line and limiting WR Devin Hester to just 8 yards on two returns (4.0 avg.)...Highlight play of his night came from his role as the team's holder for placements...Flipped a shovel pass to TE Tom Crabtree on a fake FG attempt late in the second quarter that went for a 27-yard TD to convert a fourth-and-26...Was credited with his first career TD pass, becoming the first Green Bay punter to throw one since Ron Widby threw a 68-yarder to WR Dave Davis at Houston on Nov. 19, 1972.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Punted six times for 267 yards (44.5 avg, 43.7 net), downing three of his kicks inside the 20-yard line, including one at the Seattle 1 late in the second quarter.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Was limited to just two punts for 82 yards (41.0 avg., 39.0 net), limiting the dangerous returner RB Darren Sproles to just one return for 4 yards and placing his other attempt out of bounds at the New Orleans 9-yard line.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Delivered another consistent performance, punting seven times for 316 yards (45.1 avg., 43.3 net), with a long of 58 against his initial NFL team...Landed four inside the 20-yard line for the second time in 2012, and limited the Colts to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.)...Marked the sixth time in his career that he has landed four-plus kicks inside the 20.

## 52 Clay Matthews, LB, 4th Year, Southern California

- Enjoyed the healthiest training camp and preseason of his career, participating in every practice and starting each of the team's four exhibition games. Opens 2012 by returning to the ROLB position after spending the 2010-11 seasons at LOLB.

- In 2011, became the first Packer since RB John Brockington (1971-73) to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first three seasons in the NFL, and has been voted a starter each of the last two years.

- Started all 15 games in which he played for the second consecutive season in 2011, finishing with 69 tackles (49 solo), six sacks and three forced fumbles.

- Also showed the diversity of his skill set in his third season, setting new career highs with three interceptions and nine passes defended. The INT total tied for the most by a Green Bay LB since 1984.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made a welcomed return to the ROLB position he last played in 2009, finishing the season opener with four tackles (three solo) and 2½ sacks...Beat LT Joe Staley twice for sacks of QB Alex Smith during the game, the seventh multi-sack outing of his career and his most in a game since the three he had vs. Buffalo on Sept. 19, 2010.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Had one of the most dominant outings of his career, finishing with seven tackles (six solo) and a career-high 3½ sacks and a pass defended against the rival Bears...Combined with his efforts in Week 1, the six sacks matched his personal best for the most sacks in a two-game span in his career (also had six in Weeks 1-2 of 2010)...The 3½ sacks were the most in a game by a Green Bay defender since DE Kaber Gbaja-Biamila had four at Chicago on Jan. 2, 2005, and the yardage total (29) was the second-highest of his career and helped result in a net passing total of 74 yards...Contributions led a defense that limited the Bears to just 168 total yards during the game, the fewest surrendered by the Packers in the rivalry game since Nov. 30, 1975.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Had an active game, finishing with six tackles (four solo)...Played the role of a spy on QB Russell Wilson at various times, including a third-down play in the fourth quarter where he pressured the rookie QB into a throw-away that led to a punt...Also drew a hold on LT Russell Okung on another drive in the fourth quarter.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished with seven tackles (five solo) and a sack...Started the game with a bang, chasing down a handoff to RB Pierre Thomas on third-and-1 on the Saints' first possession, stopping the RB for no gain to force a punt...The ensuing possession led to Green Bay's first TD of the game...Lined up in various positions during the game and surged through the middle of the line of scrimmage in the third quarter to drop QB Drew Brees for a 10-yard loss, his seventh sack of the season...The sack

gave him 36½ for his career, moving him past Tony Bennett and into the No. 6 spot in franchise history in his fourth season.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Appeared on an exhausting 96 plays, finishing with three tackles (two solo), a sack that included a forced fumble and five QB hits...Sack came in the second quarter when he beat LT Anthony Costanzo around the edge and hit QB Andrew Luck before he released the ball, forcing a fumble that caromed all the way out of bounds, resulting in a third-and-12 and a subsequent punt...Later ran a stunt with DE Mike Neal, tying up both LG Jeff Linkenbach and Costanzo, allowing Neal to turn the corner on the outside to drop Luck for a 9-yard loss.

## 22 Jerron McMillian, S, Rookie, Maine

- Drafted by the Packers with the second of two fourth-round selections (No. 133 overall), the second of four compensatory picks awarded to the team in 2012. Figures in the rotation at strong safety in the defense's sub-packages and also as a slot CB at dimes in the dime alignment.

- Started 36 of 46 career games played at Maine, including 35 straight starts to end his career, and recorded 231 tackles (151 solo), 6½ sacks, nine interceptions, 22 passes defended, four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut, appearing on both defense and special teams in the season opener...Finished with one solo tackle on defense.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Saw his role increase significantly after becoming the No. 1 SS in the nickel defense when veteran DB Charles Woodson moved down into the slot CB...Appeared on 44 plays and finished with three tackles (one solo), two passes defended and the first INT of his career in the fourth quarter.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Played extensively as the SS in the team's nickel and dime subpackages, finishing with two solo tackles and a pass defended...Broke up a third-down pass from QB Russell Wilson intended for WR Ben Obamanu in the first quarter to force a punt...Also had what appeared to be his second INT in as many weeks negated by a roughing-the-passer penalty in the fourth quarter.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Again saw extended action with the defense employing several DB-heavy personnel groupings to match New Orleans' spread attack...Finished with three tackles (one solo).

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Saw action on 81 plays and finished with an assisted tackle and a pass defended.

## 54 Dezman Moses, LB, Rookie, Tulane

- One of four non-drafted free agent rookies to make the opening-day roster in 2012, following an offseason program and training camp that saw him make the transition from collegiate DE to a stand-up OLB at the pro level.

- Appeared in all four of the team's preseason games and finished with 12 tackles (seven solo) and a pass defended, while consistently applying pressure as a pass rusher off the edge.

- Started his collegiate career at the University of Iowa where he was a member of the same recruiting class as current Packers teammates T Bryan Bulaga and DE Mike Daniels. Transferred to Tulane, where he played out the remaining two years of his eligibility for the Green Wave, finishing with 114 tackles (including 24½ for loss) 15½ sacks and six forced fumbles, twice earning All-Conference USA honors.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut on special teams and appeared briefly on defense, where he was credited with one assisted tackle.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Appeared on 18 defensive plays as part of various sub-packages and finished with one assisted tackle...Was also credited with a QB hit and a pressure by the coaching staff.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game on defense and special teams, and tied for the team lead with two coverage tackles, both coming in punt coverage.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played on both defense and special teams, and was credited with one tackle on the coverage units...Tackle came on a controversial fourth-quarter kickoff return by RB Darren Sproles...It appeared Moses jarred the ball loose and recovered the fumble on the play,



but the ruling on the field was that the runner was down and the Saints retained possession.

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Saw five plays on defense and finished with an assisted tackle...Also played on special teams but did not record any statistics.

### **96 Mike Neal, DE, 3rd Year, Purdue**

- Powerful, strong defensive end and inside pass rusher who will look to bounce back from a series of injuries that have plagued him throughout his first two professional seasons.

- Missed the first four games of the 2012 season serving a suspension for violation of the NFL's performance enhancing drugs policy.

- Has been limited to just nine games over the course of 2010-11, missing all but two games of his rookie campaign with abdominal/shoulder injuries and then suffering a knee sprain in training camp that sidelined him until midseason in 2011.

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Made his awaited 2012 debut in his home state after going through a week of practice and being activated the day before the game...Flashed the play-making ability that made him a promising prospect when healthy his rookie season, appearing on 32 plays and recording a sack and three QB hits during the game...The sack came on a stunt with LB Clay Matthews in the second quarter, when he went around the outside and corralled QB Andrew Luck for a 9-yard loss, moving Indianapolis from Green Bay's 26-yard line back to the 35 where an ultimate 53-yard FG attempt was unsuccessful...Sack was the second of his career and first since Oct. 10, 2010 at Washington.

### **87 Jordy Nelson, WR, 5th Year, Kansas State**

- Fifth-year wideout who ascended to the forefront of the team's arsenal in 2011, posting career highs in every receiving category by catching 68 passes for 1,263 yards (18.6 avg.) and 15 TDs on his way to being named a Pro Bowl alternate.

- Became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).

- Ranks No. 3 among active NFL players (min. 20 TD catches) with a 31.1-yard average on his 22 career TD receptions.

- For his career, has now played in 65 games with 18 starts and totaled 189 catches for 2,791 yards and 22 touchdowns.

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started and finished with five catches for 64 yards (12.8 avg.)...Was also on the receiving end of a two-point conversion pass from QB Aaron Rodgers in the fourth quarter to pull Green Bay to within eight points at 23-15.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Led the team with both six catches and 84 yards (14.0 avg.) during the game.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Finished with two catches for 19 yards (9.5 avg.).

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Rediscovered the chemistry with Rodgers that made the duo so prolific in 2011, leading the team with both his season-high eight catches and 93 yards receiving (11.6 avg), along with his first TD of the young season...TD came in the fourth quarter when he beat a jam from CB Patrick Robinson at the line, catching a slant from Rodgers and fighting his way past both Robinson and CB Corey White to get into the end zone.

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Recorded two catches for 29 yards (14.5 avg.).

### **74 Marshall Newhouse, T, 3rd Year, Texas Christian**

- Saw his first action as a pro in 2011, playing in all 16 contests with 13 starts, opening 10 games at LT and three at RT with regular starters Chad Clifton and Bryan Bulaga missing time due to injuries.

- His 13 starts in 2011 were the most by a Packers offensive tackle.

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Opened the season as a starter for the first time in his career and afforded himself well at LT against a formidable right side of the San Francisco front seven...Matched against the standout LB/DE tandem of Aldon Smith and Justin Smith for much of the game, helping to limit the duo to four tackles and a sack (that came on a rollout outside the pocket) on 61 offensive plays.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Started and appeared on all 68 plays at LT...Also saw six snaps as part of the placement protection unit including the team's second-quarter fake FG attempt that resulted in a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree...On the play, went low off the snap and provided obstruction to both DE Julius Peppers and DE Corey Wootton, who were both unable to get to Crabtree as he crossed the formation to catch the shovel pass.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Overcame what was a rocky start for the offense with a bounce-back effort in the second half...Part of a line that helped produce three scoring drives after halftime and did not allow a sack over the final two quarters.

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Fared well in protection despite drawing the assignment of talented RDE Will Smith for the majority of the game...Part of a protection unit that did not allow a sack during the game and allowed Rodgers to complete 31-of-41 for 319 yards and four TDs...Offense accounted for 421 total yards and 30 first downs, the most by the Packers since 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989.

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Part of an uneven performance by the offense that produced three TD drives in the first half, but stagnated after halftime and didn't score again until there was 4:30 remaining in the fourth quarter...Made a good block at the line of scrimmage on OLB Dwight Freeney on RB Alex Green's 41-yard run in the fourth quarter, helping to create the wide lane used by Green to emerge into the second level.

### **53 Nick Perry, LB, Rookie, Southern California**

- Drafted by the Packers with the No. 28 overall selection in the first round and continues to make the transition from collegiate DE to professional OLB.

- Became the fifth first-round pick out of the University of Southern California in team history, joining Al Carmichael (1953), Ken Reutgers (1985), John Michels (1996) and Clay Matthews (2009).

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut as the starter at LOLB, and finished tied for second on the defense with a season-high nine tackles (seven solo).

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Rotated with Erik Walden at LOLB, seeing action on 20 plays, but did not record any statistics.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Started at LOLB and tallied eight tackles (two solo) and his first career sack...Sack came in the third quarter when he fought past RT Breno Giacomini and chased down QB Russell Wilson for a 19-yard loss...Forced a third-and-32 on a drive that ultimately ended with a punt.

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Started and played as part of a rotation with Walden, netting four tackles (all solo).

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Did not start, but saw his snaps split almost evenly with Walden and finished with seven tackles (four solo) and a sack on the afternoon...Sack was bittersweet as he came free off the left side and delivered a jarring hit to QB Andrew Luck, knocking the ball loose on what was initially an 8-yard loss...The play was flagged as officials ruled that he led with the crown of his helmet on the hit and a 15-yard unnecessary roughness penalty was enforced, nullifying the fumble and lost yardage.

### **79 Ryan Pickett, DT, 12th Year, Ohio State**

- Begins his 12th NFL season and seventh in Green Bay as a primary run-stuffer and unsung veteran leader on the defensive line.

- Has unselfishly rotated between both nose tackle and left defensive end since the Packers' implementation of the 3-4 alignment in 2009.

- Played more predominantly over the center in 2011, starting all 14 games in which he appeared, and leading the defensive line with 54 tackles (24 solo) and adding two passes defended.

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at LDE and finished with two assisted tackles.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Started and appeared on 30 plays, finishing with three assisted tackles...Part of a defensive effort that limited the Bears to just 168 total yards during the game, the fewest surrendered by the Packers in the rivalry game since Nov. 30, 1975.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Turned in an excellent performance, finishing

with 10 tackles (four solo) and helping to spearhead a defense that allowed just 91 yards in the second half and only 238 total yards during the game.

- vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Started at LDE and posted three assisted tackles...Suffered a shoulder injury that limited him during the game...Helped limit New Orleans to just 45 rushing yards on 19 carries (2.4 avg.).
- at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Appeared on 43 plays with the team mostly employing its sub-defenses and recorded five assisted tackles.

### **81 Andrew Quarless, TE, 3rd Year, Penn State**

- Opens the season on the reserve/physically unable to perform list after missing the entire offseason program and training camp while rehabilitating a severe knee injury he suffered in Week 13 of 2011.
- Has played in 23 games with five starts in his first two seasons, catching 24 passes for 274 yards (11.4 avg.) and one TD.
- Appeared in 10 contests with two starts in 2011, but saw his season cut short in Week 13 at the N.Y. Giants when he sustained a significant knee injury covering a kickoff in the fourth quarter.
- Made noticeable strides as a blocker in '11, playing regularly as part of two-TE sets and out of the backfield in a FB role. Caught three passes for 36 yards (12.0 avg.) on the season.

### **90 B.J. Raji, DT, 4th Year, Boston College**

- Has emerged as one of the top players in the league at his position over the past three seasons, and earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl in 2011, the first Packers defensive tackle since Bob Brown in 1972 to receive the honor.
- Started all 16 games for the second consecutive year in 2011 (joining S Morgan Burnett as the only two defensive players to do so last season) and registered 43 tackles (19 solo), three sacks, three passes defended and a fumble recovery.
- His 40 games played over the last three seasons (including playoffs) rank No. 1 in the NFL among defensive linemen during that span.
- vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Started and posted two tackles (one solo).
- vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Led the defensive line by seeing time on 47 plays and finishing with five tackles (two solo, one for loss)...Marked his first five-tackle game since Week 7 of 2011.
- at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Finished with six tackles (two solo), helping to key a run defense that limited standout RB Marshawn Lynch to a 3.9-yard average on 25 carries during the game.
- vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Was credited with two tackles (one solo) and was part of a stingy run defense that limited the Saints to just 45 yards on 19 carries (2.4 avg.).
- at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Started and appeared on the first 15 defensive snaps before rolling his ankle while engaged in a block in the second quarter...Did not return to the game following the injury and finished with one solo tackle.

### **28 Sean Richardson, S, Rookie, Vanderbilt**

- One of four non-drafted rookie free agents to make the team's roster out of training camp on the strength of a solid preseason that saw him lead the defense with 16 tackles (12 solo) and a fumble recovery.
- A four-year letterman who started 31 consecutive games at Vanderbilt, finishing with 256 tackles (including 18 for loss), three sacks and an interception for his career.
- A teammate of fellow Packers rookie, CB Casey Hayward and also QB Aaron Rodgers' younger brother, Jordan, while in college.
- vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Listed as a gameday inactive for the season opener.
- vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Inactive.

### **12 Aaron Rodgers, QB, 8th Year, California**

- In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise records for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games

(eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

- His career passer rating of 103.5 ranks No. 1 in NFL history (min. 1,500 attempts).
- Posted 17,037 passing yards from 2008-11, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first four seasons as a starter.
- In 67 regular-season starts, has posted 24 games with 300-plus passing yards, 36 without an interception and 40 with a 100-plus passer rating.
- vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Opened the season by completing 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs with one INT...Has now posted 300-yard games in back-to-back season openers and did so against a 49ers defense that allowed just four 300-yard passing games in all of 2011...Marked the 23rd 300-yard outing of his career and the 30th consecutive home game with a TD pass, a franchise record.
- vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Completed 22-of-32 attempts for 219 yards and a TD to go along with one INT...Led four scoring drives (three FGs, one TD) and extended his team-record home-game TD pass streak to 31 games.
- at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Finished the game 26-of-39 passing for 223 yards...Overcame a difficult first half that saw the pocket regularly collapsed by the Seahawks' front seven to the tune of eight sacks...Rebounded in the second half to complete 13-of-24 for 137 yards with no sacks as he led three scoring drives (two FG, one TD) to give the Packers a 12-7 advantage late in the fourth quarter.
- vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors after guiding the offense to its most prolific outing to this point in the young season, a 421-yard output that resulted in four TD drives and a 28-27 win...Completed 31-of-41 for 319 yards and four TD passes for a unit that produced 30 first downs, the most by the Packers since they had 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989...Threw TD passes to James Jones (2), Jordy Nelson and Greg Jennings, the last one an 11-yard bullet to Nelson on a slant to cap a 7-play, 57-yard drive to put Green Bay ahead for good...Drew a facemask penalty on S Malcolm Jenkins when the defender got his hand inside the QB's helmet on a third-quarter scramble, poking him in the eye...Forced him to miss the following play, a first-and-goal from the Saints' 2-yard line that saw backup QB Graham Harrell fumble a handoff exchange and give possession to New Orleans.
- at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Finished what was an up-and-down day having completed 21-of-33 attempts for 243 yards and three TDs with one INT...Was also the team's leading rusher during the game, carrying five times for 57 yards (11.4 avg.), a regular-season career-high total on the ground...Started the game fast, leading the offense to the first of its three first-half TDs on the second possession of the first quarter...Threw TD passes to both Jones and WR Randall Cobb in the second quarter, staking Green Bay to a 21-3 halftime lead...Opened the second half with an INT to CB Jerraud Powers on a throw that was tipped at the line, the beginning of a challenging two quarters for the offense...Rebounded late in the fourth quarter to hit Jones for another TD, an 8-yarder that gave Green Bay a 27-22 lead with 4:30 remaining...Following a go-ahead scoring drive by the Colts, moved the offense 47 yards in four plays, setting up a game-tying 51-yard FG try by K Mason Crosby.

### **33 Brandon Saine, RB, 2nd Year, Ohio State**

- Reserve RB who could figure in as a third-down back and special teams player. Suffered a hamstring injury during the 2012 training camp and did not appear in any of the four preseason games.
- Played in eight games as a rookie in 2011, rushing for 69 yards on 18 carries (3.8 avg.) and catching 10 passes for 69 yards (6.9 avg.).
- Spent the first seven games on the team's practice squad before being signed to the active roster following the season-ending knee injury suffered by fellow rookie RB Alex Green at Minnesota in Week 7.
- vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)** - at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Appeared in each game on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

### **63 Jeff Saturday, C, 14th Year, North Carolina**

- Veteran stalwart up front, signed with the Packers as an unrestricted free agent on March 13, 2012, after playing for 13 seasons with the



Indianapolis Colts.

- Has been selected to the Pro Bowl five times during his career and twice earned first-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press*.
- Was named to the NFL All-Decade Team by *Sporting News* for 2000-09.
- Played in 197 games with 188 starts with the Colts, which is tied for No. 4 in franchise history for the most games played.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his Packers debut in the season opener, as part of a protection unit that allowed QB Aaron Rodgers time to complete 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Appeared on all 68 offensive plays...Helped block for a ground game that netted 112 yards on 25 running plays (4.5 avg.).

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Helped the offense bounce back from a difficult first half, centering a unit that produced three second-half scoring drives and did not allow a sack over the final two quarters...Also had a key fumble recovery inside the Green Bay 5-yard line late in the fourth quarter after RB Cedric Benson was stripped behind the line of scrimmage.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Led an offensive line that helped produce 421 yards of total offense and four TD drives during the game...Allowed Rodgers to complete 31-of-41 for 319 yards and four TD passes, without being sacked...Finished the game with a six-quarter sackless streak for the OL going back to the second half at Seattle...Also helped clear the way for Benson to rush for 84 yards on 18 carries, a healthy 4.7-yard average that provided great balance for the offense.

## 78 Derek Sherrod, T, 2nd Year, Mississippi State

- Opens the 2012 season on the reserve/physically unable to perform list after missing the entire offseason program and training camp while rehabilitating a broken leg suffered in Week 15 of 2011.
- Appeared in five games as a rookie in 2011, seeing time at tackle with injuries to veteran LT Chad Clifton and second-year RT Bryan Bulaga.
- Saw his most significant action in Week 5 at Atlanta when he played RT for most of the game with Bulaga sidelined and Clifton exiting on the second series.
- Was a first-team All-America selection by CBSSports.com and Rivals.com in 2010 and earned first-team All-SEC honors from the coaches and the media.

## 37 Sam Shields, CB, 3rd Year, Miami

- Maturing defender who has moved into a starting role at RCB in the team's base defense opposite Tramont Williams.
- Set career highs in every major statistical category in what was his second season as the team's third corner in 2011. Appeared in 15 games with seven starts, collecting 36 tackles (32 solo), four interceptions, 14 passes defended and a forced fumble.
- Made a major impact as a non-drafted rookie in 2010, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one year in college. Finished his first season with 27 tackles (22 solo), two INTs and nine passes defended.
- vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared on defense and special teams...Finished with one solo tackle on defense, including a key third-down stop of RB Frank Gore after a 1-yard completion on a swing pass to force a punt in the fourth quarter.
- vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Had another solid performance after reclaiming starting duties at CB on the strength of his outing in the season opener...Opened the game at RCB and appeared on 60 defensive plays, finishing with an assisted tackle and a pass defended...Played a key role in helping to limit Chicago to just 74 net passing yards and spent much of the game matched against Bears rookie WR Alshon Jeffery, whom he helped hold to just one catch for 7 yards.
- at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Started at RCB and appeared on all but one defensive play (55), finishing with four solo tackles and two passes defended...One pass defended came on the game's final drive when he broke up a deep throw along the left sideline from QB Russell Wilson intended for WR Golden Tate.

## 71 Josh Sitton, G, 5th Year, Central Florida

- Has been selected as a Pro Bowl alternate each of the past two seasons (2010-11) and was named the Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association in 2010.
- According to STATS LLC, has given up just six sacks in his three-plus seasons (2009-12) as a starter.
- vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at RG and helped control an active 49ers front in pass protection, allowing QB Aaron Rodgers time to complete 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs.
- vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Played all 68 offensive snaps...Also had six plays on special teams in placement protection including the fake FG attempt late in the second quarter that resulted in a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree...Teamed with G T.J. Lang to combination-block DT Henry Melton at the snap and finished the play by pinning the defender to the inside, also walling off the wide lane used by Crabtree to race into the end zone for the score.
- at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Part of a protection unit that recovered from a challenging first half to produce three scoring drives in the second half (two FG, one TD) that staked Green Bay to a 12-7 lead in the fourth quarter...Line allowed Rodgers to complete 13-of-24 for 137 yards without being sacked in the second half.
- vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Helped the offense have its best performance in the season's first quarter...Blocked for a unit that generated a 421 yards and four TD drives, allowing Rodgers to complete 31-of-41 for 319 yards without being sacked...The 30 first downs produced by the offense were the most by the Packers since they posted 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989.
- at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Helped extend the unit's streak to eight quarters without allowing a sack with a clean first half that included 179 total yards of offense and three TD drives...Made a good block when he released on a first-quarter screen pass to RB Cedric Benson, shoving LB Moise Fokou in the open field on what was an 18-yard gain.

## 51 D.J. Smith, LB, 2nd Year, Appalachian State

- Young defender who will assume starting duty at the 'Mack' LB position in 2012 following a season-ending injury suffered by Desmond Bishop (hamstring) in the team's exhibition opener at San Diego (Aug. 9).
- Was the lone Packers rookie to appear in all 16 games in 2011, also leading the group with three starts.
- Played primarily on special teams, where he tied for third on the club with 11 coverage tackles, but also started three games as an injury replacement at ILB.
- During his extended time on defense, led the team with 30 tackles (21 solo) over a three-game span between Weeks 13-15.
- vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at LB and finished tied for second on the defense with nine tackles (all solo, a career high in that respect).
- vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Led the way with 10 tackles (six solo) and notched his first career sack on the first play from scrimmage...On the sack, blitzed through the left side of the offensive line and fought past RB Matt Forte to drop QB Jay Cutler for a 13-yard loss.
- at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Started and appeared on 54 defensive plays, recording six tackles (five solo).
- vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished with six tackles (four solo) and a career-high three passes defended...On several plays, drew the difficult coverage assignment of RB Darren Sproles, who he helped limit to five catches for 44 yards and a long reception of 20.
- at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Posted eight tackles (all solo), a sack and a pass defended...Sack came in the second quarter when he blitzed from

the right edge of the defense and chased down QB Andrew Luck for no gain, his second sack of the season...Pass defended came when he batted down a Luck pass at the line of scrimmage in the third quarter to force a FG attempt.

#### **44 James Starks, RB, 3rd Year, Buffalo**

- Third-year ball-carrier who has battled injuries early in his career, but also flashed exciting potential when healthy. Opened training camp as the starter in the backfield, but suffered a turf toe injury in the preseason opener at San Diego (Aug. 9) and did not practice for the remainder of the summer.
- Led the team with 578 rushing yards on 133 carries (4.3 avg.) in 2011, while also leading the running backs with 29 receptions for 216 yards (7.4 avg.).

- Limited to just three games as a rookie in 2010 as he worked his way back from a hamstring injury, but burst onto the scene with a league-leading 315 rushing yards in the 2010 postseason.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Inactive (toe).

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Returned to practice on a limited basis late in the week, but remained inactive on gameday.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)** - at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Inactive.

#### **82 Ryan Taylor, TE, 2nd Year, North Carolina**

- A core special teams player and developing contributor on offense, he appeared in the final three exhibition games and netted three catches for 16 yards (5.3 avg.).

- Appeared in 15 games in 2011, second most among Packers rookies behind only LB D.J. Smith. He finished fifth on the team with 10 special teams tackles, which was also second among Green Bay rookies behind only Smith (11).

- Saw his first action on offense vs. Oakland in Week 14 following the season-ending knee injury sustained by TE Andrew Quarless the previous week at the N.Y. Giants. Scored a TD on his first offensive snap of the season, a 4-yard grab from QB Aaron Rodgers against the Raiders.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Appeared on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Again played on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Saw 19 snaps on offense, many of which came in the second half as part of multiple-TE formations, including lining up in the backfield alongside TE D.J. Williams in a lead-blocking FB role...Also added first two tackles of the season on special teams.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Played extensively on offense with Williams inactive...Also factored on special teams, where he was credited with a tackle after bringing down RB Darren Sproles following a 4-yard punt return in the first quarter.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Appeared on both offense and special teams...Had a hand in the team's longest offensive play, a 41-yard run by RB Alex Green in the fourth quarter...Lined up in the backfield as part of an inverted wishbone formation and served as a lead blocker through the line of scrimmage...Threw a good block on LB Jerrell Freeman, allowing Green entry to the second level where he made a pair of defenders miss...Green sprinted all the way to the Indianapolis 8-yard line, where QB Aaron Rodgers would find WR James Jones for a TD on the following play.

#### **93 Erik Walden, LB, 5th Year, Middle Tennessee State**

- Enjoyed a strong training camp that saw him appear in all four preseason games and finish with five tackles (four solo) and a team-leading two sacks. Opened the season on the reserve/suspended list that forced him to miss the season opener before returning in Week 2.

- Became a full-time starter for the first time in his career in 2011, opening the first 15 games at ROLB and setting or tying his career highs in every major statistical category.

- Recovered his first career fumble and returned it 5 yards for his first career TD against the Oakland Raiders on Dec. 11, 2011.

- Signed by the Packers as a free agent on Oct. 27, 2010, and went on to appear in nine games with two starts, along with another three starts in the postseason.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Made his season debut in Week 2 after serving a one-game suspension the week of the season opener...Was featured prominently in a rotation with Nick Perry at the LOLB position, seeing action on 36 plays and finishing with five tackles (three solo) and a half-sack.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Appeared on 30 defensive plays, both in a rotation with Perry and also part of various subpackages that featured multiple LBs...Finished with seven tackles (four solo)...Pressured QB Russell Wilson into an errant throw that appeared to be intercepted by S Jerron McMillian in the fourth quarter, but finished the play by tackling Wilson and was called for a controversial roughing-the-passer penalty that instead gave the Seahawks a first down.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Rotated with Perry throughout the game, finishing with two solo tackles.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Received his first start of the season at LOLB and split snaps with Perry, finishing with three tackles (two solo) and a career-high three passes defended...All three of his pass break-ups came on third-down plays...First pass defended came on a third-down play on the Colts' opening drive of the game to force a punt...Later delivered a crushing hit on WR Nathan Palmer as the ball arrived on a third-and-goal play from the Green Bay 6-yard line to force a FG in the second quarter...Last one came in the fourth quarter when he dropped into a zone in the middle of the field and deflected a pass intended for TE Coby Fleener near the end zone, forcing another FG attempt.

#### **84 D.J. Williams, TE, 2nd Year, Arkansas**

- Showed significant strides throughout the 2012 offseason program and early in training camp where he displayed the skills that made him a dangerous receiving threat in college.

- Battled back and foot injuries during training camp, but started the first two preseason contests and finished with five catches for 40 yards (8.0 avg.).

- Appeared in 13 games as a rookie in 2011, posting two receptions for 13 yards (6.5 avg.) and three tackles on special teams.

- In 2010, became the first Arkansas TE to win the John Mackey Award, an honor given to the nation's top tight end.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Appeared on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Participated on both offense and special teams and made his first reception of the season, a 6-yard catch in the second half.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Finished with one catch for 11 yards, a play that moved Green Bay off of its own 1-yard line on a drive in the first quarter...Appeared on 37 plays during the game, seeing time in various multiple-TE sets and also lining up in the backfield and serving as a lead blocker on various running plays...Also recorded a tackle on special teams.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Inactive.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Returned to action and received his first career start as part of a three-TE formation...Appeared on 22 offensive plays and finished with two catches for 20 yards (10.0 avg.), the first multi-catch outing of his career.

#### **38 Tramon Williams, CB, 6th Year, Louisiana Tech**

- Former non-drafted free agent and practice-squad player has developed into one of the top players at his position in the league.

- Appears to have regained the form that made him one of the most formidable cover men in the game in 2010 after suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener that nagged him throughout the season.

- Despite the injury, managed to still start 15 games and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defended (24) in 2011. Also added four interceptions, including the first TD return of his career in Week 9 at San Diego.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Started at LCB and finished with four tackles (all solo).

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Delivered an excellent performance against the rival Bears, finishing with four tackles (all solo), two INTs and two passes defended...Found himself matched against standout WR Brandon Marshall for much of the game and was part of an effort that helped limit him to just two catches for 24 yards (12.0 avg.)...Game marked the second

regular-season multi-INT game of his career (also Week 11 of 2011 vs. Tampa Bay)...First INT came late in the first half when he undercut a crossing route intended for WR Earl Bennett, diving to collect QB Jay Cutler's throw and secure the ball...Turnover resulted in a 35-yard Mason Crosby FG before halftime that extended the Green Bay lead to 13-0...Second INT came in the fourth quarter when he leapt to tip a deep Cutler pass intended for Marshall...Tipped the ball to himself before scampering 38 yards down the sideline on the return...The offense wasted little time taking advantage, as QB Aaron Rodgers hit WR Donald Driver for a 26-yard TD on the ensuing play to put the game out of reach at 23-3.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared on all 56 defensive plays and finished with two tackles (one solo), a key part of a pass defense that allowed just 111 net passing yards and held Seattle WRs to a mere six catches during the game.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Had a busy day against the Saints' spread attack that attempted 54 passes during the game...Finished with nine tackles (seven solo) and tied for the team lead with three passes defended.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Started and appeared on all 96 defensive plays, posting six tackles (all solo, one for loss) and was credited with a career-high five passes defended by the coaching staff...Passes defended were the most by a Packer since Charles Woodson was credited with six at Minnesota on Oct. 23, 2011...Broke up a third-and-1 pass from QB Andrew Luck to WR T.Y. Hilton just before halftime to force a punt...Had what appeared to be his third INT of the season in the third quarter when he dove to snare a pass from Luck intended for Hilton, but replay reviews showed the ball hitting the turf and the play was ruled incomplete...Also had another near-INT go through his hands in the back of the end zone in the fourth quarter...Tackle for loss came when he ran RB Donald Brown out of bounds for a 2-yard loss in the fourth quarter.

## 98 C.J. Wilson, DE, 3rd Year, East Carolina

- Third-year man who has played in 35 of 37 possible games in his two-plus professional seasons. Opens 2012 as the starter at RDE in the team's base 3-4 defense, where he continues to anchor steadily against opposing rushing attacks.

- Played in all 16 games in 2011, making two starts and setting a career high with 35 tackles (21 solo).

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at RDE and posted four tackles (three solo) before departing with a groin injury during the game.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Was limited during the practice week and missed his first game since the 2010 season opener his rookie year, a streak of 37 straight games.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Posted four tackles (two solo) on 15 defensive snaps.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Started at RDE and finished with three tackles (one solo) and his second career sack...Sack came in the fourth quarter when he fought his way past G Ben Grubbs and dropped QB Drew Brees for a 7-yard loss, his first sack since Week 9 of 2010.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Started at RDE and saw extended action on defense after fellow DL B.J. Raji was lost to an ankle injury in the second quarter...Finished with a season-high five tackles (two solo).

## 21 Charles Woodson, DB, 15th Year, Michigan

- Veteran team leader and playmaker enters the 2012 season amid a transition to playing safety in the team's base defense, while resuming his slot CB role in the various sub-packages.

- Earned his fourth straight and eight career Pro Bowl bid in 2011, two years after his best individual season in 2009, when he won NFL Defensive Player of the Year honors from *The Associated Press*.

- Was named a first-team All-Pro for the third time in his career after starting the first 15 games of 2011 before being rested by the coaching staff in the regular-season finale. Finished with 83 tackles (68 solo), tying for the NFL lead with seven interceptions, while also adding 20 passes defended, two sacks, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

- Now has 11 career interceptions returned for touchdowns, tied for second on the NFL's all-time list with Darren Sharper (11), behind only Rod Woodson (12). Nine of those are with Green Bay, which constitute a

franchise record, as do his 10 defensive touchdowns (one fumble return).

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in his 200th career contest, starting at SS and finishing with three tackles (all solo), 1½ sacks and a forced fumble...Sack total was the second-highest single-game output of his career behind the two sacks he posted vs. Seattle as a member of the Oakland Raiders on Sept. 30, 2001...Forced fumble came when he punched the ball loose from WR Mario Manningham on a tackle near the sideline in the first quarter, but the ball bounced out of bounds.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Maintained his productivity with a strong performance against the rival Bears...Posted five tackles (four solo) and his first INT of the season, the 55th of his career, moving him into a tie with Aeneas Williams for 19th all time...INT came on a third-down play in the third quarter when he stepped in front of a QB Jay Cutler throw intended for WR Earl Bennett.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Part of a pass defense that limited Seattle to just 111 net passing yards, including a mere 42 in the second half...Finished with five tackles (two solo) and two passes defended.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Placed second on the defense with 12 tackles (11 solo) and a pass defended.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Appeared on all 96 defensive plays, finishing with 10 tackles (eight solo) and a pass defended...Broke up a QB Andrew Luck pass intended for WR Reggie Wayne in the fourth quarter...Also came up in run support to make a no-gain stop of RB Vick Ballard in the third quarter.

## 99 Jerel Worthy, DE, Rookie, Michigan State

- Explosive, powerful big man whom the Packers traded up to select in the second round of the 2012 NFL Draft.

- Enjoyed a first training camp that saw him figure prominently in the rotation up front, appearing in all four exhibition games and finishing with seven tackles (three solo).

- A consensus All-American following his junior season at Michigan State, earning first-team honors from *The Associated Press*, American Football Coaches Association, Walter Camp, Sporting News, CBSSports.com, NBCSports.com and Yahoo! Sports.

- Became the first Spartan defensive tackle to earn first-team All-America honors since Ronald Curl in 1971 and the first to be named to the AP first team since Charles "Bubba" Smith in 1966.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut in the season opener, appearing on both defense and on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Made his first career start at RDE in place of the injured C.J. Wilson (groin), and appeared on 37 defensive plays, making five tackles (three solo) and collecting his first career sack...Sack came on Chicago's final drive of the game when he threw QB Jay Cutler for a 4-yard loss...Also participated on special teams where he had a hand in one of the game's most memorable plays as part of the placement protection unit....Lined up to the left side of the formation on what was a fake FG attempt late in the second quarter...At the snap, threw a block on S Craig Steltz while P Tim Masthay shoveled a pass to TE Tom Crabtree, who took it 27 yards for a TD to give Green Bay a 10-0 lead.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Played on 29 defensive plays and recorded an assisted tackle.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Rotated on defense and registered two solo tackles.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Played extensively on defense following the departure of fellow DL B.J. Raji, who exited in the second quarter with an ankle injury and did not return...Appeared on 54 plays and finished with one solo tackle and two pressures.

## 58 Frank Zombo, LB, 3rd Year, Central Michigan

- Opens the 2012 season on the reserve/physically unable to perform list after missing the entire offseason program and training camp with a hamstring injury suffered in the spring.

- Battled an array of injuries that shelved him for much of 2011, including a fractured shoulder blade in the preseason and later hamstring and knee injuries that limited him to just five games.
