## PACKERS HOST VIKINGS IN NFC NORTH MATCHUP

The Packers return home to play at Lambeau Field for the first time in nearly a month when they welcome the division-rival Minnesota Vikings to town this Sunday.



- ▶ It kicks off a stretch of three straight NFC North games for Green Bay, the first time the Packers have had three consecutive divisional contests on the schedule since 2006 (Weeks 15-17). Four of Green Bay's final five games are against divisional foes.
- ▶ The Packers have won a **franchise-record nine consecutive games against NFC North opponents**. It is the second-longest current divisional winning streak in the NFL behind only Baltimore's 12-game winning streak against AFC North teams.
- ▶ This is Green Bay's first meeting with Minnesota this season, the latest that the first game has come between the teams in the history of the series (since 1961).
- ▶ The teams will also face off in Minnesota in the season finale. It marks the first time in the series that both season meetings will come in December.
- ▶ Sunday will mark the first time the teams have squared off in a noon kickoff at Lambeau Field since 2007. Three of the last four meetings in Green Bay (2008, 2010-11) have been prime-time matchups.
- ▶ The Packers have won 17 of their last 18 regular-season games (.944) at Lambeau Field and 23 of their last 25 (.920) at home.
- ▶ Green Bay has won 24 of its last 29 regular-season games overall (.828), the **best record in the league** over that span.
- ▶ The Packers' are coming off a 38-10 loss to the N.Y. Giants this past Sunday night, one that ended Green Bay's five-game winning streak.
- ▶ Green Bay currently sits at No. 2 in the NFC North with its 7-4 mark, one game behind Chicago (8-3) and one game ahead of Minnesota (6-5).

## AN EVENLY MATCHED SERIES

Through 102 meetings, which includes one postseason game, the Packers hold a 53-48-1 advantage over the Vikings in the all-time series.

- ▶ Fans can bet on a back-and-forth contest when the teams meet. In fact, **15 of the last 19 regular-season meetings have been decided by seven points or less**, the lone exceptions being the Packers' 34-0 win at Lambeau Field in 2007, Minnesota's 38-26 win at Green Bay in 2009, Green Bay's 31-3 win at Minnesota in 2010 and the Packers' 45-7 victory at Lambeau last season.
- ▶ The Packers have swept the season series in four of six seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (2006-07, 2010-11).
- ▶ Green Bay has won four straight against the Vikings, its longest streak since a five-game winning streak vs. Minnesota from 2006-08.
- ▶ Green Bay's 38-point win (45-7) over Minnesota last season in Week 10 was the largest margin of victory by either team in the history of the series.

## WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports, now in its 19th season as an NFL network television partner, will broadcast the game to a regional audience.

- ▶ Play-by-play man **Joe Buck** and color analyst **Troy Aikman** will have the call from the broadcast booth with **Pam Oliver** reporting from the sidelines.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 53-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The duo enters its 14th season of broadcasts together across the Packers Radio Network, which covers 44 markets in six states.
- ▶ Sports USA radio will air the game across the country. **Adam Amin** (play-by-play) and **Ross Tucker** (analyst) will call the action.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (Channel 91) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.
- ▶ DIRECTV subscribers can watch the game in HD on Channel 705.

## VIKINGS AT PACKERS – WEEK 13

### GETTING IT DONE IN THE DIVISION

With its current nine-game winning streak in NFC North games, Green Bay has **set the franchise record** for the longest divisional winning streak.

- ▶ A look at the longest winning streaks in franchise annals by the Packers since the league went to a divisional format in 1967:

- ▶ A glance at the top current divisional winning streaks in the NFL:

- ▶ During their current nine-game divisional winning streak, the Packers have outscored their opponents by a combined total of 269 to 161 and have a combined turnover differential of plus-13.

- ▶ Green Bay went 6-0 in NFC North games in 2011, the first time that the Packers had posted an undefeated record in their division since the NFL went to a divisional format in 1967. Green Bay became the first team to sweep the NFC North/Central since the 1987 Chicago Bears (7-0).

- ▶ The Packers have a 29-9 (.763) regular-season record against NFC North opponents under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, a divisional mark that ranks **No. 2 in the NFL** since 2006:

### HOME COOKING

The Packers enter Sunday's game with the Vikings having won 17 of their last 18 and 23 of their last 25 games at Lambeau Field in the regular season.

- ▶ Green Bay's .920 winning percentage (23-2) at home since Week 10 of 2009 is **tied for No. 1 in the NFL** over that span:

- ▶ Green Bay's 21-3 mark at home from 2009-11 was the best by the club over a three-year span since it posted the same mark from 2000-02.

- ▶ The Packers have averaged 31.4 points per game at home since 2009, **No. 3 in the league** over that span. Green Bay has posted 30-plus points in 14 of 29 home games since '09 and eight 40-point games.

- ▶ The defense has done its part as well at home since 2009, generating 72 turnovers at Lambeau Field. With Green Bay's offense posting only 31 giveaways over that span, the Packers have a plus-41 turnover ratio at home, **No. 1 in the league** since '09.

- ▶ Green Bay has generated at least two takeaways in 20 of 29 home games since 2009. The Packers have a 19-1 mark (.950) in those games.

### STAT OF THE WEEK

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers'** first career start and victory came vs. Minnesota on Sept. 8, 2008, and he has had a high level of productivity against the Vikings ever since.

- ▶ In eight career starts vs. Minnesota, Rodgers has a combined 116.5 passer rating. He has completed 175 of 251 passes (69.7 percent) for 2,172 yards and 19 TDs with just three INTs.

- ▶ Rodgers has been particularly efficient in the last three games against the Vikings, connecting on 69 of 91 passes (75.8 percent) for 886 yards and 11 TDs with zero INTs for a 145.4 passer rating.

- ▶ He posted a passer rating of 140.0 or better in each of those three contests, becoming the **first NFL quarterback since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger** to register a 140-plus passer rating in three consecutive games against the same opponent (according to the Elias Sports Bureau).

- ▶ Rodgers has a career passer rating of 110.1 in divisional games, the best by a QB in league history since the NFL went to a divisional format in 1967. He has completed 543 of 779 passes (69.7 percent) for 6,496 yards, 53 TDs and 14 INTs in NFC North contests.

- ▶The Packers' 34 sacks are the most through 11 games since the team posted the same number in the opening 11 contests in 2006. The last time Green Bay recorded more than 34 sacks in the first 11 games was in 2001 (42 sacks).
- ▶Green Bay's top sack season (since 1963) came in 2001, when the Packers registered 52 sacks as a team.
- ▶Of Green Bay's 34 sacks this season, 11 have come on first down (tied for No. 4 in the NFL) and 14 have come on second down (No. 1 in the league).
- ▶The Packers have had 14 different players register at least one full sack this season. That is **No. 2 in the NFL** this season behind only the Browns:

### STANDING TALL

An area that the Packers have shown significant improvement in since the start of the season is run defense, with the team currently checking in at No. 11 in the league (103.8 ypg) in the category.

- ▶After allowing 407 yards on the ground in the opening three games (135.7 ypg, No. 26 in the league), Green Bay has given up 735 yards rushing over its last eight contests, an average of 91.9 yards per game.

- ▶Since 2009, Green Bay ranks **No. 9 in the NFL** in run defense with an average of 103.4 yards allowed on the ground per game.
- ▶Green Bay has held its opposition to less than 100 yards rushing in nearly half of its games (29 of 59, 49.2 percent) since 2009. The Packers have a 24-5 record (.828) in those games.
- ▶The Packers have allowed only one back to rush for 100 yards this season (49ers RB Frank Gore, Week 1), which is tied for No. 2 in the NFL.
- ▶Green Bay's defense will be put to the test this Sunday by Vikings RB Adrian Peterson, who ranks No. 1 in the NFL with 1,236 rushing yards.

### COMING ON STRONG

After getting off to a slower start this season by his standards (87.0 rating in the first three games), QB **Aaron Rodgers** has put together a solid eight-game stretch, completing 174 of 264 passes (65.9 percent) for 2,093 yards and 25 TDs with five INTs for a 113.7 passer rating.

**MIKE McCARTHY**...Is in seventh year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Has led the Packers to playoff appearances in four of his six seasons as the helm, and the team's four postseason berths over the past five seasons are the most by an NFC team.
- ▶ His .652 winning percentage (including playoffs) ranks No. 4 among active NFL coaches (min. 50 games).
- ▶ One of only two coaches, along with New Orleans' Sean Payton, to have his offense ranked in the top 10 in total yardage each season from 2006-11.
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Became the first Packers coach since Lombardi to lead the team to a championship game in his second season (2007).

**LESLIE FRAZIER**...Is in third year as the Vikings' eighth head coach (served as the interim coach for the final six games in 2010).

- ▶ Served as Minnesota's defensive coordinator for four seasons (2007-10) and led the Vikings to top-10 finishes in total defense each season from 2008-10.
- ▶ Coached with the Philadelphia Eagles (1999-2002), Cincinnati Bengals (2003-04) and Indianapolis Colts (2005-06) before coming to Minnesota. In 12 seasons as NFL coach, has suffered a losing season only twice.
- ▶ Has coached on seven playoff teams and been a part of six division championships in his first 13 seasons as an NFL coach.
- ▶ Played defensive back for the Chicago Bears (1981-86) and was a member of Chicago's Super Bowl XX team.

**THE PACKERS-VIKINGS SERIES**

- ▶ This marks the 103rd overall meeting between the border rivals.
- ▶ Few, if any, rivalries in sports have exhibited more parity. The Packers own a slight advantage over the Vikings (53-48-1, including playoffs) in the all-time series.
- ▶ The Packers' five-game winning streak that was snapped in 2008 was the longest streak for either team since the Packers won five straight from 1983-85.
- ▶ The series began when the Vikings entered the league in 1961, and Vince Lombardi's Packers won nine of the first 10.
- ▶ Over the last 18 seasons (1994-2011), these teams have accounted for 13 NFC Central/North division championships.

**NOTABLE CONNECTIONS**

Packers LB Robert Francois entered the league as a non-drafted free agent with the Vikings in 2009...Packers C Jeff Saturday played for the Colts with Vikings G Charlie Johnson and when Vikings head coach Leslie Frazier and defensive coordinator Alan Williams were on the staff in Indianapolis...Packers tight ends coach Jerry Fontenot played for the Bengals in 2004 when Frazier was on Cincinnati's staff...Fontenot was a teammate of Vikings special assistant to the head coach/linebackers Mike Singletary with the Bears...Singletary coached with Packers head coach Mike McCarthy and quarterbacks coach Ben McAdoo on the San Francisco staff in 2005...Vikings tight ends coach Jimmie Johnson played for Kansas City for one season (1994) when McCarthy was an offensive asst. there...Packers assistant offensive line coach Joel Hilgenberg's uncle, Wally, played linebacker for the Vikings for for 12 seasons (1968-79)...Vikings special teams coordinator Mike Priefer's father, Chuck, was an assistant coach for the Packers from 1984-85...Vikings defensive backs coach Joe Woods held the same post at Western Michigan when Packers WR Greg Jennings played there...Packers defensive coordinator Dom Capers and Vikings linebackers coach Fred Pagac coached on the staff together at Ohio State in the early 1980s...Pagac coached in Oakland when Packers DB Charles Woodson played for the Raiders...Vikings asst. defensive line coach Diron Reynolds' brother, Jamal, was selected in the first round by the Packers in 2001...Packers running backs coach Alex Van Pelt played for the Bills when Vikings running backs coach James Saxon was on Buffalo's staff...Packers defensive line coach Mike Trgovac and Vikings offensive line coach Jeff Davidson coached on the staff together in Carolina...Trgovac was on the staff with Vikings strength and conditioning coach Tom Kanavy in Philadelphia and when Johnson played tight end for the Eagles...Former college teammates include Packers LB Clay Matthews and Vikings DE Everson Griffen, FB Rhett Ellison and T Matt Kalil (Southern California), Packers TE Jermichael Finley and Vikings DE Brian Robison (Texas), Packers DE Ryan Pickett and Vikings CB Antonie Winfield and WR Michael Jenkins (Ohio State), Packers LB A.J. Hawk and Jenkins (Ohio State), Packers TE D.J. Williams and Vikings WR Jarius Wright (Arkansas), Packers DE Mike Daniels and LB Dezman Moses and Vikings DT Christian Ballard and TE Allen Reisner (Iowa), and Packers LB Terrell Manning and Vikings LB Audie Cole (North Carolina State)...Packers area scout Lee Gissendaner went to training camp with the Vikings in 1996 and spent parts of that season on Minnesota's practice squad...Green Bay director of research and development Mike Eayrs (similar capacity, 1985-99) previously worked for the Vikings, as did Packers VP of football administration/player finance Russ Ball (1999-2000) and VP of sales and marketing Tim Connolly (1998-99).

**LAST MEETING, IN GREEN BAY**

- Nov. 14, 2011, at Lambeau Field; Packers won, 45-7.
- ▶ The Packers' 38-point win in the *Monday Night Football* contest was the largest margin of victory by either club in the history of the series.
  - ▶ QB Aaron Rodgers threw for 250 yards and four TDs on 23-of-30 passing (76.7 percent) for a 140.3 passer rating. It marked his third straight game with a 140-plus rating as he joined Kurt Warner as the only QBs in NFL history to accomplish that feat in a single season.
  - ▶ WR Randall Cobb kicked off the scoring with an 80-yard punt return for a TD early in the first quarter. With the score, he became the first rookie in team history to post a kickoff return and a punt return for a TD in the same season.
  - ▶ LB Clay Matthews led the defense with two sacks and CB Tramon Williams registered an interception as Green Bay limited the Vikings to 14 first downs and 266 total net yards on the night.



## VIKINGS AT PACKERS – WEEK 13

### FEWER FLAGS ON THE FIELD

After setting franchise records for fewest penalties and fewest penalty yards in 2011, Green Bay got off to a slow start in that area with 40 penalties for 390 yards in the first five games this season (fourth-most penalties and the most penalty yards in the league through Week 5).

► But during their last six games, the Packers have shown significant improvement in the area of penalties. Since Week 6, Green Bay has been penalized 29 times for 248 yards, an average of 4.8 penalties and 41.3 penalty yards per game.

► A look at where the Packers rank in penalties and penalty yards **since Week 6** this season:

► In 2011, the Packers tied Indianapolis for the fewest penalties in the league with 76, and Green Bay's 591 penalty yards were the second fewest in the NFL behind only the Colts' 549.

► Both totals for Green Bay set 16-game franchise records, topping the previous season lows of 78 penalties in 2010 and 604 penalty yards in 1995.

► In 2010, Green Bay was penalized just 78 times (tied for No. 3 in the NFL) for 617 yards (No. 3). That was a marked improvement from 2009, when the Packers were the most-penalized team in the league with 118 penalties for 1,057 yards (No. 31).

### AT THE HELM

Having led Green Bay to the playoffs in four of his six seasons as head coach, **Mike McCarthy** is joined by Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl win with a victory over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.

- ▶ McCarthy led the Packers to a Super Bowl win in his fifth season in Green Bay (2010), the same point that Holmgren led the Packers for the first time to the NFL title game in 1996.
- ▶ McCarthy joined Pittsburgh's Bill Cowher (2005) as the only Super Bowl-winning coaches to lead their respective teams to three road wins as the No. 6 seed in the postseason en route to a world title.
- ▶ The Packers' 21-14 win at Chicago in the 2010 season was their second NFC Championship Game appearance in four seasons, the only team in the conference to do so over that span.
- ▶ Including playoffs, McCarthy has a 75-40 record since taking over as head coach in 2006, a .652 winning percentage that ranks **No. 4 among current NFL head coaches** (minimum 50 games):

### SPREADING THE WEALTH

Through 11 games this season, Green Bay's air attack has been a balanced one, with three wide receivers on pace for 60-catch campaigns.

- ▶ The Packers are the **only team in the league** to have **three wide receivers** with 40-plus receptions in 2012 (WR **Randall Cobb**, 58; WR **Jordy Nelson**, 45; WR **James Jones**, 42).
- ▶ Only once in the history of the franchise have the Packers had three WRs with 50-plus receptions each in a single season (WR **Greg Jennings**, WR **Donald Driver** and Jones in 2010).
- ▶ Last year's record-setting Green Bay offense featured **five WRs** with 25-plus receptions each for the first time in franchise history. Nelson (68) led the way with Jennings (67), Jones (38), Driver (37) and Cobb (25) coming in behind him.
- ▶ The Packers set single-season franchise records in 2011 with 3,667 yards receiving and 38 receiving TDs coming **from their wide receivers**, easily eclipsing the previous marks of 3,215 yards in 2004 and 26 TDs in 1994. The yardage and TD totals also **led the NFL in 2011**.

- ▶ In 2011, Rodgers connected on 343 of 502 passes (68.3 percent) for 4,643 yards and a career-high 45 TDs with six INTs in 2011 on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

- ▶ In 2011, Rodgers became the **first NFL quarterback** to start a season with 11 straight 110-rating games since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. No other QB has done it in more than five games to begin a season.
- ▶ Rodgers' 11 consecutive 110-rating games were also a single-season NFL record, topping 49ers QB Steve Young's mark of seven straight in 1994.
- ▶ No quarterback in team history had posted more than five straight 110-rating games in a season, and Rodgers' 12 total games with a 110-plus rating is a single-season team record, topping the previous mark of eight by Brett Favre in 2007.
- ▶ Rodgers posted a 100-plus passer rating in each of the first 12 games in 2011, a streak that **topped the NFL single-season mark** of nine set by Colts QB Peyton Manning in 2004.
- ▶ Rodgers was the **first NFL quarterback** to record a stretch of four (or more) straight 110-rating games in three straight seasons since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970. No other NFL signal-caller over the past 42 seasons has ever posted four straight 110-rating games in back-to-back seasons, let alone three straight like Rodgers has registered.
- ▶ By posting at least six games with a 110-plus passer rating in each of the last three seasons (2009-11), Rodgers joined Young (1992-94) as the **only quarterbacks since the 1970 merger** with at least six 110-rating games in three consecutive seasons.
- ▶ Including the postseason, Rodgers has recorded a **110-plus passer rating in 23 of his last 38 starts** (22-1 record in those games).

**JONES JOINS SELECT COMPANY**

In Green Bay's Week 6 victory at Houston, WR **James Jones** caught two TD passes for the third consecutive game.

- ▶ By doing so, Jones joined WR Don Hutson (Nov. 14-Dec. 5, 1943) as the **only two players in franchise history** to catch two TD passes in three straight games, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.
- ▶ Jones is **tied for No. 3 in the NFL** with eight TD catches this season, already eclipsing his career high of seven TD catches in 2011:

When WR **Randall Cobb** returned a fourth-quarter punt 75 yards for a touchdown vs. San Francisco in the season opener, it marked the second straight season that he scored on a kick return in Week 1.

- ▶ Last season, Cobb made a splash in his pro debut vs. New Orleans with a 108-yard kickoff return for a TD that matched the NFL record.
- ▶ According to Elias, Cobb is the **only player in NFL history** to score on a kick return (punt or kickoff) in Week 1 each of his first two seasons.
- ▶ Cobb now has three kick return scores in 26 NFL games, which already **ties him for No. 2 in franchise history**:

### THE RECEIVING TREE

In Green Bay's 31-17 victory over Arizona in Week 9 at Lambeau Field, TE Tom Crabtree caught a 72-yard touchdown pass on the final play of the third quarter to extend the Packers' lead to 31-17.

► It marked the **longest TD reception by a Green Bay tight end** since Paul Coffman scored on a 78-yard grab at Miami on Oct. 28, 1979.

► For Crabtree, it was his second TD catch of 45-plus yards this season. In Green Bay's Week 6 win at Houston, he caught a 48-yard TD pass from Rodgers in the fourth quarter.

► According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Crabtree became the **first Green Bay tight end since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger** to have two touchdown catches of 45-plus yards in a season.

► Crabtree has three TD receptions this season, with the other coming in Week 2 when he posted a 27-yard scoring grab on a shovel pass from P Tim Masthay on a fake field goal.

► Crabtree has a 49.0-yard average on his three TDs this season, **No. 1 in the NFL this season** among players with three or more touchdown catches:

For the second time in three seasons, LB **Clay Matthews** got off to a torrid start when it came to sacking opposing quarterbacks with **six sacks in the first two games**.

▶ Through Week 12, Matthews is **tied for No. 6 in the league** in sacks, despite missing the past two games due to a hamstring injury:

- ▶ Matthews also registered six sacks in the first two games in 2010. He is just the sixth NFL player in history to register six or more sacks in the opening two games of a season and the **only one** to do it more than once.
- ▶ His six sacks over a two-game span this season and in 2010 rank No. 2 in team history behind only Bryce Paup's 6.5 in 1991 (Weeks 3-4).
- ▶ Matthews has registered 38.5 sacks since entering the NFL in 2009, which is **No. 4 in the league** over that span:

- ▶ According to STATS LLC, Matthews has recorded a total of 23.0 QB knockdowns/hurries this season through Week 12. That is tied for No. 9 in the league.
- ▶ When Matthews intercepted Giants QB Eli Manning at New York in Week 13 of 2011 and returned the pick 38 yards for a score, it marked the third straight season that he had scored a defensive TD.

- ▶ Matthews is the **only player in franchise history** to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ Matthews posted a career-high three interceptions in 2011. It was tied for the most in a season by a Green Bay linebacker since 1984.
- ▶ Matthews was named to his third straight Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Packer since RB John Brockington (1971-73) to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ He received first-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Packer LB to earn that recognition since Tim Harris in 1989. Matthews finished second to only Pittsburgh S Troy Polamalu in the AP Defensive Player of the Year voting a season ago.
- ▶ With a sack of QB Jon Kitna in the second quarter in Week 9 of 2010, Matthews became the first Packer since the stat became official in 1982 to register a double-digit sack total in each of his first two seasons in the NFL.
- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Matthews became the **first NFL player** since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to register double-digit sacks and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the NFL.
- ▶ In 2009, Matthews set a Packers rookie record with 10 sacks on his way to earning Pro Bowl honors, the first Green Bay rookie to be named to the all-star game since Hall of Fame WR James Lofton in 1978.
- ▶ Matthews tied LB Tony Bennett (29.5) for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the NFL (since 1982).
- ▶ A look at where Matthews' sack total in his first 20 pro games ranks in NFL history (since 1982):

### SHOWCASING HIS SKILLS

In the Packers' win at St. Louis in Week 7, CB **Casey Hayward** posted an interception in his third straight game, giving him four over a three-game span.

- ▶ Hayward became the **first Packer rookie with four INTs over a three-game span** since S Tom Flynn in 1984.
- ▶ The last NFL rookie to register four INTs over a three-game span was Patriots CB Devin McCourty in 2010 (four in Weeks 11-13).
- ▶ Hayward picked off two passes at Houston in Week 6 to become the first Green Bay rookie to do so in a regular-season game since CB Mike McKenzie (vs. Arizona, Jan. 2, 2000).
- ▶ Hayward's five INTs are the most by a Green Bay rookie since McKenzie had six in 1999. He is **tied for No. 2 in the NFL** this season:

**ON THE ROAD AGAIN**

Green Bay went 7-1 away from Lambeau Field in 2011, with the seven road wins setting a single-season franchise record.

- ▶The Packers have been able to stay above the .500 mark on the road during Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** tenure, a notable achievement in the National Football League.
- ▶Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only 12 of 32 NFL teams have regular-season road records above .500.

**307 AND COUNTING**

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Cardinals in Week 9 brought the stadium's consecutive sellouts streak to 307 games (290 regular season, 17 playoffs).

- ▶The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 56th season of football in 2012. A total of 636,177 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine home contests last season.
- ▶Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

**THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE**

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010 and a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002.
- ▶Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 38-9 (.809) at home over the past 47 regular-season games.
- ▶Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

The Packers' win over Dallas at Lambeau in Week 10 of 2009 was the first step to a 7-1 finish and a playoff berth for Green Bay.

- ▶Since that victory, the Packers have been one of the best teams in the league at home. Green Bay's lone defeats since then came to Miami in 2010 in Week 6 and in the 2012 season opener vs. San Francisco:

### A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 92nd NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (three against 2011 playoff teams).

- ▶ The five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling) would be a franchise record, topping the previous mark of four contests on several occasions, most recently in 2010 and 2011. Since 2009, the Packers are 9-3 (.750) in prime-time contests.
- ▶ For the sixth time in seven seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the Packers opened the season at home, this year against San Francisco in a matchup of the top two teams in the NFC in 2011.
- ▶ The Packers stayed at home on a short week to host Chicago in a Thursday night contest, Green Bay's third-ever game on NFL Network and its first since it traveled to Dallas in Week 13 of 2007. It was the seventh straight season that the Packers and the Bears squared off in prime time.
- ▶ Green Bay visited Seattle for its first road contest of the season, one that began a stretch of four road games in five weeks. It was the Packers' lone game of the season on ESPN's *Monday Night Football*. 2012 marked the 20th consecutive season (1993-2012) that Green Bay has appeared on *MNF*, the NFL's second-longest streak (Denver, 21).
- ▶ The Packers hosted New Orleans in Week 4 in a matchup of the two highest-scoring teams in the league in 2011. Both teams have finished in the top 10 in total offense every season since 2006, the only teams in the NFL to accomplish the feat over that span.
- ▶ Starting with a trip to Indianapolis in Week 5, Green Bay played on the road for three straight games (also at Houston and St. Louis), the first time the Packers had three consecutive road games since the 1998 season (Weeks 10-12). All three contests were indoors, the first time Green Bay had played three straight indoors in team history.
- ▶ Green Bay returned for back-to-back games at Lambeau Field (Jacksonville and Arizona) before its Week 10 bye. The Packers came out of their open week with back-to-back road contests against a pair of 2011 playoff teams (Detroit and N.Y. Giants), the second straight season they have played those teams on the road in consecutive weeks.
- ▶ Under McCarthy, the team has won six of seven games immediately after the bye week and 13 of its last 17 after the week off dating back further.
- ▶ Overall, the Packers are 39-21 (.650) after the bye under McCarthy, and since 2000, the team is 75-41 (.647) following the week off.
- ▶ The Packers wrap up the regular season with three of five games in December in front of the home crowd, including divisional matchups against Minnesota and Detroit at Lambeau Field in Weeks 13-14.
- ▶ Four of Green Bay's final five games and five of its last seven will come against NFC North foes, capped off with the season finale at Minnesota.
- ▶ It is the sixth time in seven seasons under McCarthy that the Packers have finished the regular season with a divisional matchup (5-0 in season finales vs. the NFC North since 2006).
- ▶ The Packers will play five games indoors (Indianapolis, Houston, St. Louis, Detroit, Minnesota), which is the most in a season in franchise history (four games in 1987, 1992, 1996, 2004, 2009).
- ▶ Fourteen games are slated for Sunday this season, including each of the final 13 contests, with one Thursday night game and one Monday night contest. Nine games are scheduled for noon (CT) starts with two games currently slated for 3:25 p.m. (CT).
- ▶ The Packers have six games on the schedule against 2011 playoff teams, beginning right away in Week 1 vs. San Francisco. The other matchups come against New Orleans (Week 4), Houston (Week 6), Detroit (Weeks 11 and 14) and the N.Y. Giants (Week 12).

**2 MASON CROSBY**

- ▶ His 649 points from 2006-11 rank No. 1 in NFL history for the most points scored by a player in his first five seasons, topping the mark of Washington K Chip Lohmiller (625, 1988-92).
- ▶ In 2011, set a franchise record with a 58-yard field goal in Week 7 at Minnesota, eclipsing the mark of 56 yards he held (Week 1 at Philadelphia, 2010; Week 5 at Atlanta, 2011).
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in team annals with 716 career points, having surpassed Jim Taylor (546) last season at Atlanta in Week 5. Needs 45 points to surpass No. 4 Paul Hornung (760).
- ▶ Reached the 700-point mark for his career in his 89th game, second fastest to 700 in team history behind only Hornung (87 games).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most 100-point seasons with five, trailing only K Ryan Longwell (eight).
- ▶ Made 23 straight field goals from Week 13 of 2010 through Week 10 of 2011, the longest regular-season streak in franchise history as he eclipsed Chris Jacke's mark of 17 (1993).
- ▶ For his career, has hit 97 of 108 field goals (89.8 percent) from 39 yards and closer.
- ▶ Has hit 33 of 47 field goals (70.2 percent) from 40-49 yards.
- ▶ Has hit 13 of 30 field goals (43.3 percent) from 50-plus yards.

**80 DONALD DRIVER**

- ▶ Has 10,137 career receiving yards, which ranks No. 1 on the franchise's all-time list. Surpassed James Lofton (9,656) at Carolina in Week 2 of 2011.
- ▶ Surpassed Sterling Sharpe (595) in 2009 to become the franchise's all-time leader in receptions. Driver now has 743 career catches.
- ▶ Had a reception in 133 consecutive games, besting the franchise's previous long streak of Sharpe's 103 (1988-94), before not catching a pass in Week 7 of 2011 against Minnesota.
- ▶ In 2010, had 50-plus receptions for the ninth time, extending his franchise record. Lofton and Sharpe each had seven seasons with 50-plus catches.
- ▶ Holds Lambeau Field records for receptions (363) and receiving yards (5,000).
- ▶ Topped the 1,000-yard receiving mark for a seventh overall season and sixth consecutive in 2009, extending his own team record in each category.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team annals with 27 TD catches at Lambeau Field, trailing only WR Antonio Freeman (36) in the stadium's history.
- ▶ Has 22 career 100-yard receiving games, which is tied for No. 4 in team history. Needs two more games to equal No. 3 Don Hutson (24) on the all-time list.
- ▶ With 61 career TD receptions, ranks No. 3 in team history behind only Hutson (99) and Sharpe (65).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 5 in team history with Paul Hornung with 62 overall touchdowns. Is four shy of No. 4 Sharpe (66).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 all-time in yards from scrimmage with 10,354, trailing only RB Ahman Green (11,048).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most games played with 202, trailing only QB Brett Favre (255).

**88 JERMICHAEL FINLEY**

- ▶ Is the only tight end in franchise history to register two 55-catch seasons (2009 and 2011).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 all-time among Green Bay tight ends with three 100-yard receiving games in his career, trailing only Paul Coffman (six).
- ▶ Ranks No. 7 among TEs in team history with 2,206 receiving yards and needs 48 more yards to surpass No. 6 Mark Chmura (2,253).
- ▶ Ranks No. 7 among TEs in franchise annals with 172 receptions and needs four more catches to surpass No. 6 Rich McGeorge (175).
- ▶ In Week 4 vs. New Orleans, surpassed 2,000 career receiving yards in his 52nd career game, fastest among tight ends in franchise history (Coffman, 66 games).

**85 GREG JENNINGS**

- ▶ With 12 TD receptions in 2010, joined Sterling Sharpe, Antonio Freeman and Billy Howton as the only Packers to post 12-plus TD catches in two different seasons.
- ▶ By eclipsing the 1,000-yard receiving mark in 2010, became the fifth player in team history to post three straight 1,000-yard receiving seasons, joining Lofton, Sharpe, Freeman and Driver.
- ▶ His four career TD catches of 80-plus yards are a franchise record.
- ▶ His 30 catches of 40-plus yards since 2007 lead all NFL players.
- ▶ In 2011, had 147 receiving yards in Week 7 at Minnesota for his 22nd career 100-yard game, which moved him into a tie for the No. 4 spot in franchise history with Donald Driver.
- ▶ In Week 12 vs. Detroit, surpassed 6,000 career receiving yards in his 86th career game, which tied him for the second fastest to 6,000 yards receiving in team annals behind only WR Sterling Sharpe (84 games).
- ▶ Ranks No. 8 in team history with 6,249 career receiving yards and needs 98 more yards to surpass No. 7 Max McGee (6,346).
- ▶ Ranks No. 7 in franchise annals with 401 career catches and needs 31 more receptions to surpass No. 6 Freeman (431).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 5 in team history (with McGee) with 50 TD catches.

**52 CLAY MATTHEWS**

- ▶ Only player in team history to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ His 17 sacks in his first 20 games were the most by an NFL player to start his career, eclipsing the mark of 16.5 set by Leslie O'Neal (1986, 1988) and John Abraham (2000-01).
- ▶ Is the first NFL player since sacks became an official stat in 1982 to post a double-digit sack total and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the league.
- ▶ First player in franchise annals to post 10-plus sacks in each of his first two years in the NFL.
- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in team history with 38.5 career sacks. Needs 3.5 sacks to move past No. 5 Ezra Johnson (41.5).
- ▶ His 29.5 sacks from 2009-11 were tied for No. 1 in team history with Tony Bennett for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Ranks No. 4 in the NFL with 38.5 sacks since 2009.
- ▶ Set a franchise rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.







## STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

### 12 AARON RODGERS

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with a 104.4 career passer rating.
- ▶ Set an NFL single-season record in 2011 with a 122.5 passer rating and set team marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games (eight).
- ▶ Posted 17,037 passing yards from 2008-11, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first four seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Has thrown a TD pass in 34 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre, 1992-96). It is the longest NFL streak since Dan Marino (39 games from 1983-88).
- ▶ Tied a single-game franchise record with six TD passes at Houston in Week 6, matching Matt Flynn's mark (Jan. 1, 2012, vs. Detroit).
- ▶ In 73 regular-season starts, has 26 career 300-yard games, 29 three-TD games and 39 zero-INT games.
- ▶ Has posted a 100-plus passer rating 43 times. Set an NFL record for quarterbacks whose careers started since 1970 with 28 games with a 100-plus passer rating in his first 50 starts.
- ▶ Posted a 100-plus passer rating in three straight seasons (2009-11), one of only four QBs in league history to accomplish that feat (Steve Young, 1991-94; Peyton Manning, 2004-06; Philip Rivers, 2008-10).
- ▶ Is the only QB in team history with two 400-yard passing games.
- ▶ When he hit the 150-TD mark for his career, he had thrown just 42 INTs to that point, the fewest in NFL history as he surpassed Dan Marino's mark of 69 INTs at the time of his 150th TD pass.
- ▶ In 2009, became first QB in NFL history to throw 30 or more TDs, seven or fewer INTs, and rush for five TDs in the same season.
- ▶ Has registered a passer rating over 110.0 in four or more consecutive games three times in his career (Weeks 3-7, 2009; Week 9, Weeks 11-13, 2010; Weeks 1-7, 9-12, 2011), one of only two quarterbacks in franchise history (Bart Starr, 1966) to accomplish the feat in a single season.
- ▶ Is the only NFL QB since the 1970 merger to post four straight 110-plus rating games in three straight seasons (2009-11).
- ▶ Posted four or more rushing TDs in three straight seasons (2008-10), becoming only the second Packers QB to accomplish that feat (Tobin Rote, 1954-56), and eclipsed 300 rushing yards in back-to-back seasons (2009-10), the first since Rote in 1954-56.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history with 160 TD passes, having surpassed Bart Starr (152) in Week 8.
- ▶ With 16 career rushing TDs, ranks No. 2 in team history among QBs behind only Tobin Rote (29).

### 21 CHARLES WOODSON

- ▶ His 10 defensive touchdowns with Green Bay (nine interceptions, one fumble recovery) are a team record.
- ▶ With nine interception returns for scores, ranks No. 1 on Green Bay's all-time list, eclipsing the previous mark set by Herb Adderley (seven, 1961-69).
- ▶ For his career, has 11 INT-return TDs, which ranks tied for No. 2 in NFL history with Darren Sharper behind only Rod Woodson (12).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 1 in the NFL with 26 interceptions since 2008.
- ▶ His five forced fumbles in 2010 were a career high and the most by a Packer since LB/DE Keith McKenzie posted five in 1999.
- ▶ In 2009, established career highs in interceptions (9, tied league lead), and interception returns for TDs (3, tied league lead and team record),

- and matched a then career high with four forced fumbles.
- ▶ Has 55 career interceptions, 38 in 100 games since coming to Green Bay in 2006. Woodson had 17 interceptions in 106 games with Oakland. Is tied for No. 4 in team history with S LeRoy Butler with the 38 interceptions. Needs one more to tie CB Herb Adderley (39) for No. 3.
- ▶ Became the fourth player in NFL history since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to record at least nine interceptions and two sacks in a single season. Is the only player in NFL history to post at least seven interceptions and two sacks in back-to-back seasons.
- ▶ In 2009, became the first NFC player to win the conference's Defensive Player of the Month award multiple times in one season (Sept., Nov., Dec.).
- ▶ With nine interceptions in 2009, became only the second player in franchise history to post at least seven interceptions in three different seasons (Bobby Dillon, 1953-57).
- ▶ With two interceptions against Minnesota in Week 7 of 2011, recorded the seventh multi-interception game of his career. Six of those games have come with Green Bay.
- ▶ Became the first NFL player since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to record two interceptions, an interception for a touchdown, a sack and a fumble recovery in the same game when he posted all of those statistics at Detroit on Thanksgiving in 2009.
- ▶ Is the only defensive back in Packers history (since 1982) to register at least two sacks in four straight seasons (2008-11).

**PACKERS PROJECTED STARTERS – OFFENSE**

**WR Greg Jennings, 7th Year, Western Michigan, D2b-06**

- ▶ Ranks in the top 10 in franchise history in receptions (7th, 401), receiving yards (9th, 6,249) and touchdown catches (t-5th, 50).
- ▶ Is No. 6 in the NFL with 58 receptions of 25-plus yards since 2007 and ranks No. 8 in the league over that span in receiving yards per game (72.9 ypg).
- ▶ One of just five receivers in team history to post three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons (2008-10) and one of only four to catch 12 touchdown passes in two different years (2007, 2010).
- ▶ Has been named to the Pro Bowl each of the past two seasons (2010-11).

**LT Marshall Newhouse, 3rd Year, Texas Christian, D5b-10**

- ▶ Has played in all 27 games with 24 starts since 2011, opening 21 contests at LT and three at RT over that span.
- ▶ His 13 starts in 2011 were the most by a Green Bay offensive tackle.
- ▶ Gameday inactive (healthy scratch) for the first 14 contests of his rookie campaign in 2010 before sustaining a back injury in practice that sent him to injured reserve for the final two games and the entire postseason.
- ▶ Was a three-year starter at LT at Texas Christian and earned first-team All-Mountain West honors as a senior.

**LG Evan Dietrich-Smith, 3rd Year, Idaho State, FA-10**

- ▶ Appeared in all 16 games for the first time in his career in 2011, along with a career-high three starts (two at RG, one at LG).
- ▶ Rejoined the Packers in Week 17 of 2010 after being released at the end of training camp that season; spent the first four weeks of the season with Seattle.
- ▶ Was the only non-drafted rookie to make the Packers' opening-day roster in 2009.
- ▶ Set an Idaho State record with 44 starts on the offensive line, playing all five positions in his college career, including the last two years at LT.

**C Jeff Saturday, 14th Year, North Carolina, UFA-12 (Ind)**

- ▶ Signed with the Packers as an unrestricted free agent in March 2012 after playing 13 seasons with the Indianapolis Colts.
- ▶ Has been selected to the Pro Bowl five times during his career (2005-07, 2009-10) and has twice earned first-team All-Pro honors.
- ▶ Was named to the NFL All-Decade Team by *Sporting News* for 2000-09.
- ▶ Played in 197 games during his 13 seasons with the Colts, which is tied for No. 4 in franchise history. Has played in 208 career games, the most among active NFL offensive linemen.
- ▶ From 2000-11, was part of an Indianapolis line that allowed just 242 sacks, the fewest in the league over that span.

**RG Josh Sitton, 5th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08**

- ▶ Has started 57 games since 2009, the most by an offensive lineman in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ▶ Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association and was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate each of the past two seasons (2010-11).
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, has allowed only six sacks in his three seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Was the only Packer on either side of the ball to not miss a snap from 2009-10.

**RT T.J. Lang, 4th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09**

- ▶ One of only two Green Bay offensive linemen to start all 16 games in 2011, opening 15 contests at LG and one at RT.
- ▶ Has started games at three different positions on the line as a pro (24 at LG, four at RT, two at LT).
- ▶ Played three different positions up front during his rookie campaign of 2009, starting games at both tackle spots and becoming the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

**TE Jermichael Finley, 5th Year, Texas, D3-08**

- ▶ Matched his career high with 55 receptions in 2011, tied for the second most in team history by a tight end behind Paul Coffman's 56 in 1979.
- ▶ Set a career high with 767 receiving yards last season, the No. 2 mark in franchise annals behind only Coffman's 814 yards in 1983.
- ▶ In breakout 2009 campaign, posted second-most catches in a single season by a Green Bay tight end (55) and sixth-most yards (676), despite missing three games with a knee injury.
- ▶ Finished '09 with Green Bay playoff-record 159 receiving yards in NFC Wild Card loss at Arizona, the third-most productive game by a tight end in NFL postseason history.

**WR Jordy Nelson, 5th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08**

- ▶ Posted career highs in every receiving category in 2011, catching 68 passes for 1,263 yards (18.6 avg.) and 15 TDs on his way to being named a Pro Bowl alternate.
- ▶ Became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in the NFL with 21 TD catches since 2011, trailing only New England TE Rob Gronkowski (27).
- ▶ Became the first player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to post three 80-yard TD grabs over an eight-game span in the regular season (Week 16, 2010-Week 6, 2011).

**QB Aaron Rodgers, 8th Year, California, D1-05**

- ▶ His career passer rating of 104.4 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in the league this season in passer rating (105.6) and TD percentage (7.4) and No. 2 in passing TDs (28) and TD/INT ratio (4.50).
- ▶ Posted 17,037 passing yards from 2008-11, which ranked No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first four seasons as a starter.
- ▶ In 73 regular-season starts (48-25 record), has posted 26 games with 300-plus passing yards, 39 without an interception and 43 with a 100-plus passer rating.
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

**RB Alex Green, 2nd Year, Hawaii, D3-11**

- ▶ Has 302 yards on 97 carries (3.1 avg.) this season, including a 41-yard run at Indianapolis in Week 5, the longest by a Packer this season.
- ▶ Appeared in four games as a rookie in 2011 before sustaining a season-ending knee injury blocking on a kickoff return at Minnesota in Week 7.
- ▶ Rushed for 1,199 yards and 18 TDs as a senior at Hawaii in 2010, ranking second in school history for rushing yards in a single season and tying the single-season school mark for rushing TDs.
- ▶ His average of 8.2 yards per carry in 2010 ranked No. 1 in NCAA Division I-A among players with 100 or more carries.
- ▶ Attended the same junior college, Butte College in Oroville, Calif., as QB Aaron Rodgers.

**FB John Kuhn, 7th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)**

- ▶ Has played in 87 of 91 games (94 of 98 including playoffs) during his five-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.
- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- ▶ Only player on the team to have a rushing and receiving touchdown each of the past four seasons (2008-11), and was the first Packer to achieve that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).
- ▶ Led the team with four rushing TDs in 2011 and led the running backs with six total TDs.



## PACKERS PROJECTED STARTERS – DEFENSE

### **LDE Ryan Pickett, 12th Year, Ohio State, UFA-06 (StL)**

- ▶ Has played in 173 of a possible 187 regular-season games during his career, missing just nine contests due to injury.
- ▶ Is the only Green Bay defensive lineman to have started all 11 games this season and ranks No. 3 on the team with 48 tackles (14 solo)
- ▶ Key component of Packers' No. 1-ranked rushing defense in 2009 (franchise-record 83.3 yards allowed per game), the first time in team history that Green Bay led the league in that category.
- ▶ Signed with Green Bay as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 after spending five seasons with St. Louis (2001-05). Led all NFL defensive linemen with 115 tackles in 2005.

### **NT B.J. Raji, 4th Year, Boston College, D1a-09**

- ▶ Earned his first bid to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay defensive tackle since Bob Brown in 1972 to be voted to the all-star team.
- ▶ Has played in 46 games since 2010 (including playoffs), tied for the fifth most in the NFL by a defensive lineman over that span.
- ▶ Led all NFL nose tackles with 6½ sacks in 2010, the third most recorded by a nose tackle since 1990 (according to STATS LLC).
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2009, the first Green Bay defensive lineman to be selected since DE Vonnie Holliday in 1998.

### **RDE C.J. Wilson, 3rd Year, East Carolina, D7-10**

- ▶ Has appeared in all but two games in his two-plus NFL seasons, seeing significant action in the rotation up front. Has 32 tackles (14 solo) and a career-high 2.5 sacks this season.
- ▶ Played in all 16 games in 2011 with two starts as he registered a career-high 35 tackles (21 solo).
- ▶ Appeared in 15 regular-season games and all four playoff contests as a rookie in 2010, starting Super Bowl XLV vs. Pittsburgh with the defense employing a fourth lineman as part of its "Hippo" package.
- ▶ Named the Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year by *Sporting News* each of his final two seasons at East Carolina.

### **LOLB Erik Walden, 5th Year, Middle Tennessee State, FA-10**

- ▶ Has played in 63 career games with 23 starts, including 35 games and 23 starts with Green Bay. Ranks No. 4 on the team with 46 tackles (31 solo) this season, along with three sacks, which matches his career high.
- ▶ Became a full-time starter for the first time in his career in 2011, opening the first 15 games at ROLB and setting or tying his career highs in every major statistical category.
- ▶ Signed by the Packers as a free agent on Oct. 27, 2010, and went on to appear in nine games with two starts along with another three starts in the postseason.
- ▶ Originally a sixth-round draft choice by the Dallas Cowboys in 2008, he played in a total of 28 games for Kansas City and Miami from 2008-10.

### **BLB A.J. Hawk, 7th Year, Ohio State, D1-06**

- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in five of his six seasons in Green Bay. Leads the team with 95 tackles (73 solo) in 2012.
- ▶ Has appeared in 105 of a possible 107 regular-season games in his career, starting 102 of them.
- ▶ Tied for No. 1 among NFL linebackers in 2010 with a career-high three interceptions. Earned first career Pro Bowl selection in 2010.
- ▶ Has posted 825 tackles (589 solo), 11½ sacks, eight interceptions, 34 passes defensed, two forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries during his career.

### **MLB Brad Jones, 4th Year, Colorado, D7-09**

- ▶ Came on in relief of D.J. Smith, who sustained a season-ending knee injury in Week 6 at Houston, and made his first career start on the inside (13 starts at OLB) at St. Louis in Week 7. Has registered 43 tackles (26 solo), a sack and a forced fumble in his five starts this season.

- ▶ Became a core member on special teams in 2011, appearing in a career-high 15 games and recording a career-best 11 coverage tackles.
- ▶ Worked at OLB for his first three seasons, including his rookie campaign of 2009 that saw him start seven games and register a career-high four sacks.
- ▶ Began working at inside linebacker during 2012 training camp.

### **ROLB Clay Matthews, 4th Year, Southern California, D1b-09**

- ▶ Became the first Packer since RB John Brockington (1971-73) to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first three seasons in the NFL.
- ▶ Is tied for No. 6 in the NFL with nine sacks this season and is No. 4 in the league with 38.5 sacks since entering the league in 2009.
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the *AP's* Defensive Player of the Year voting.

### **LCB Tramon Williams, 6th Year, Louisiana Tech, FA-06**

- ▶ Is tied for No. 1 in the league in interceptions (15) and ranks No. 1 in the NFL in INT return yards (296) since 2010 (including playoffs).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 on the team with 16 passes defensed this season.
- ▶ Despite suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener, went on to start 15 games last season and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defensed (24). Also added four interceptions.
- ▶ With three interceptions during the 2010 playoffs, tied Joe Laws (1944) and Craig Newsome (1996) for the franchise single-postseason record.
- ▶ Is the only non-drafted free agent in the NFL to post four or more interceptions each of the past four seasons (2008-11).

### **RCB Sam Shields, 3rd Year, Miami, FA-10**

- ▶ Appeared in 15 games with seven starts in 2011 and posted 36 tackles (32 solo), four interceptions, 14 passes defensed and a forced fumble.
- ▶ Made an impact in 2010 after making the team as a non-drafted rookie, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one season in college.
- ▶ In Green Bay's NFC Championship win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.
- ▶ Played primarily wide receiver and special teams during his first three seasons at Miami.

### **SS Morgan Burnett, 3rd Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10**

- ▶ Ranks No. 2 on the team with 92 tackles (58 solo) and is the only player on the club with a sack, a fumble recovery and a forced fumble this season.
- ▶ Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining NT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ In 2010, became only the second Packers rookie to open the season as a starter at safety since Chuck Cecil in 1988, joining then-teammate and three-time Pro Bowl selection Nick Collins (2005).
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

### **FS M.D. Jennings, 2nd Year, Arkansas State, FA-11**

- ▶ One of three non-drafted rookies to make Green Bay's opening-day roster in 2011.
- ▶ Tied for second among Packers rookies in 2011 by appearing in 15 games in his first season, becoming a regular on special teams and recording nine tackles on the coverage units.
- ▶ A three-year starter at Arkansas State, he earned first-team All-Sun Belt recognition as a senior in 2010 when he set or tied career highs in almost every statistical category.

**GREEN BAY, Wis.** — With the arrival of Randy Moss and a few other additions in the offseason, quarterback Alex Smith knew the San Francisco 49ers were serious about beating up their passing game.

And while the 49ers aren't going to stray completely from the defense and running game-based formula that got them to the NFC Championship game last season, Smith hoped he gave future opponents a few things to think about with his play in Sunday's 30-22 victory over the Green Bay Packers at Lambeau Field.

Smith was 20 of 26 for 211 yards with two touchdowns and no interceptions, spreading the ball around to six different receivers — including Moss and fellow offseason addition Mario Manningham.

Smith got Moss involved early on, finding him wide open in the end zone for a 14-yard touchdown in the second quarter.

Facing a Packers team that lost only once in the 2011 regular season was a tough opening road test, the 49ers were more than ready.

Things went so well for San Francisco that when David Akers tried a 63-yard field goal at the end of the first half, it bounced off the crossbar and then kept going through the uprights to tie an NFL record.

Still, the most impressive part of Sunday's effort was on defense, where the 49ers smothered quarterback Aaron Rodgers and the Packers offense for three quarters, then made one last stand to stop a late rally to seal the win.

The 49ers took a 16-point lead into the fourth quarter, and the Packers cut the lead to 8. But the defense held firm on a potential game-tying drive in the final minutes.

It was a harsh reality check for the Packers, who came into their opener with hopes that a rebuilt defense and improved running game could help get them back to the Super Bowl after coming up short in the playoffs last season.

Rodgers finished 30 of 44 for 303 yards with two touchdowns and an interception, but the Packers couldn't really move the ball before the fourth quarter.

Rodgers also finished the game as the Packers' leading rusher, with new addition Cedric Benson gaining just 18 yards on nine carries.

# GAME 2

**GREEN BAY, Wis.** — The Green Bay Packers rattled and robbed Jay Cutler while Aaron Rodgers and Co. sputtered at times against the stout Chicago Bears defense.

So with all those stars on the field for the NFL's most storied rivalry, the biggest play of the day was a gutsy call for a perfectly executed fake field goal in Green Bay's 23-10 victory at Lambeau Field on Thursday.

With the Packers facing a 4th and 26 from the Chicago 27 and lined up for a field goal late in the second quarter, punter Tim Masthay flipped the ball to backup tight end Tom Crabtree, who streaked into the end zone.

The Packers' defense did the rest. Cutler threw four interceptions, including a pair to Tramon Williams. Facing a fierce pass rush all night, Cutler was sacked seven times, including 3.5 for Clay Matthews. New Bears wide receiver Brandon Marshall was held to two catches for 24 yards.

It was an impressive rebound for the Packers from an unsettling season-opening loss to San Francisco. Rodgers finished the game 22 of 32 for 219 yards with a touchdown and an interception.

The touchdown went to Donald Driver, who barely played in the loss to San Francisco. Cutler threw a late touchdown to Kellen Davis, cutting the lead to 23-10 with 6:49 remaining. But the Bears couldn't mount a comeback as Matthews and the Packers kept turning up the heat.

Bears running back Matt Forte provided much of what little offense the Bears could muster before leaving the game in the third quarter. He appeared to twist his right ankle while being tackled by Charles Woodson.

Marshall missed a huge opportunity early in the third, when Cutler found him streaking wide open in the end zone -- but the wide receiver couldn't haul it in, and the Bears had to settle for a 45-yard field goal by Robbie Gould that cut the lead to 13-3.

SEATTLE — M.D. Jennings was convinced he had the ball pinned to his chest the entire time and would be awarded an interception to cap Green Bay's comeback victory.

A crew of replacement officials had other views — the ones that counted. The result is a bizarre ending that gave the Seattle Seahawks a 14-12 victory Monday night that capped a rough weekend for the replacement refs. Russell Wilson threw a disputed 24-yard touchdown pass to Golden Tate on the final play of the game, a game that finally ended 10 minutes later when both teams were brought back on the field for the extra point.

Wilson scrambled from the pocket and threw to the corner of the end zone as the clock expired. Tate shoved Green Bay's Sam Shields out of the way, then wrestled with Jennings for possession. It was ruled on the field as a touchdown and after a lengthy review, referee Wayne Elliott came out from under the hood and announced "the ruling on the field stands" and CenturyLink Field erupted in celebration.

The Packers shook off a disastrous first half when Aaron Rodgers was sacked eight times and completely controlled possession in the final 30 minutes. Green Bay ran 41 offensive plays in the second half, got field goals of 29 and 40 yards from Mason Crosby and Cedric Benson's 1-yard TD run with 8:44 left to take a 12-7 lead.

Rodgers finished 26 of 39 for 223 yards and no turnovers. Rodgers converted three third-down conversions on the Packers' touchdown drive to take the lead. He hit Jeremiahae Finley for 14 yards on third-and-10 at the start of the drive deep in the Packers end. He followed with a third-and-10 completion to James Jones for 13 yards, getting rid of the ball before the blitz arrived.

Green Bay appeared to take the lead on an 11-yard TD pass to Greg Jennings, but he stepped out before reaching the end zone and was short of the first down. On third down, Rodgers rolled out and attempted to run, but was stopped short by inches. McCarthy challenged the spot and the call was reversed on the challenge with Rodgers given the first down. Benson then plowed in on the next play to give the Packers their first lead with 8:44 left. Seattle (2-1) won its second straight, while Green Bay (1-2) and saw its streak of wins in six straight road openers snapped.

# GAME 4

GREEN BAY, Wis. — Garrett Hartley missed a field goal in a wild ending at Lambeau Field, where the New Orleans Saints (0-4) blew a fourth-quarter lead and lost to the Green Bay Packers 28-27 on Sunday.

Aaron Rodgers threw a go-ahead touchdown to Jordy Nelson in the fourth quarter.

Soon after, Packers fans were howling about what appeared to be yet another bad call — this time by the regular officials, not the replacements. Darren Sproles appeared to fumble the ensuing kickoff but officials ruled that he was down by contact. Replays showed that the ball clearly came out but the Packers were out of replay challenges, leaving Packers fans screaming at the officials for the second week in a row.

Drew Brees then led the Saints into field goal range, and Hartley hit a 43-yard attempt — but the Saints were called for holding, forcing Hartley to line up a 53-yarder. The Packers then were called for encroachment, leaving Hartley to try a 48-yarder and he missed it wide left.

Rodgers threw for 319 yards with four touchdowns and an interception for the Packers (2-2).

With the Packers leading 21-14 in the third quarter, fans — and head coach Mike McCarthy — were on the officials again when McCarthy challenged a catch by Jimmy Graham but it wasn't overturned.

The Packers committed a personal foul on a Saints field goal attempt later in the drive, giving New Orleans first-and-goal on the 1. But the defense held, forcing a 20-yard field goal by Hartley to cut the lead to 21-17 with 9:41 left in the third quarter.

Rodgers marched the Packers down the field again but needed attention from the team's training staff after a face mask by New Orleans' Malcolm Jenkins. Rodgers came out of the game for one play and backup quarterback Graham Harrell came in — then tripped and fumbled as he tried to hand it off, allowing the Saints to get the ball back in the middle of a scrum.

Brees then found Joseph Morgan wide open behind the defense, and Morgan shed tackling attempts from the Packers' Sam Shields and Tramon Williams on his way to an 80-yard touchdown and a 24-21 lead with 3:49 left in the third quarter.

Things then got even worse for the Packers, as Rodgers then threw an interception to Patrick Robinson on a deep throw intended for Nelson. Brees then completed a pair of third-and-long situations, and the Saints drove for a 27-yard field goal by Hartley to take a 27-21 lead with 13:04 remaining.

With the Packers trailing by 6, Rodgers threw an 11-yard strike to Nelson as the Saints' Corey White tried to wrap his arms around the ball at the same time as Nelson — briefly re-creating a scene eerily similar to the controversial game-ender in Seattle on Monday. This time, though, Nelson clearly came away with the ball and spiked it emphatically.

**GREEN BAY, Wis.** — After three tough weeks on the road, the Green Bay Packers were finally supposed to have it easy. They were at Lambeau Field, their offense was clicking and, best of all, they had the Jacksonville Jaguars, the NFL's worst team.

So much for that.

Looking flat and out of sync much of the afternoon Sunday, the Packers needed another score from special teams, a 4-yard touchdown pass from Aaron Rodgers to Donald Driver in the fourth quarter and a make-up field goal by Mason Crosby to hold off the Jaguars in a 24-15 win.

It was the third straight win for the Packers (5-3) and their 16th in their last 17 games at Lambeau.

The Packers were without their two best receivers, with Jordy Nelson joining Greg Jennings on the inactive list with a hamstring injury. Charles Woodson also was on the sidelines, with a broken collarbone.

But the Packers are better equipped than most teams to overcome injuries, particularly now that Randall Cobb has emerged to join James Jones as a big-play threat.

Still clinging to a 14-12 lead after Crosby's 32-yard field goal attempt bonked off the upright with less than two minutes left in the third quarter, the Packers finally found their rhythm on a seven-play, 52-yard drive that ended with Rodgers' TD pass to Driver.

The Jaguars marched to the Green Bay 12, only to stall on back-to-back incompletions by Blaine Gabbert. Josh Scobee kicked his third field goal of the day, but then booted the kickoff out of bounds, giving the Packers the ball at their own 40 with less than 7 minutes left.

A quick three-and-out gave the Jaguars the ball back with a chance to make things interesting. After Gabbert's first two passes to Justin Blackmon from midfield fell incomplete, they finally connected on the third try for a 6-yard gain. They went for it on fourth down, but the only player who got near the ball was Green Bay cornerback Tramon Williams.

The Packers padded their lead with 28 seconds left on Crosby's 25-yard field goal, set up by a 38-yard pass interference call on Jaguars cornerback William Middleton four plays earlier.

GREEN BAY, Wis.— The Green Bay Packers had a powerful incentive to beat the Arizona Cardinals.

Packers coach Mike McCarthy gave his banged-up team the whole week off after the Packers beat Arizona 31-17 Sunday. Less than a minute after Arizona kicked a 20-yard field goal to pare what had been a 17-point lead to a touchdown, Tom Crabtree chugged 72 yards for a late third-quarter score that sealed the victory.

Green Bay (6-3) takes a four-game winning streak into the bye, which it desperately needs. Greg Jennings, Charles Woodson and Cedric Benson headline a laundry list of injured Packers, and three more got hurt against Arizona. Clay Matthews tweaked his hamstring, Bryan Bulaga hurt his hip and Jordy Nelson, who missed last week's game and much of practice this week with a bad hamstring, injured his ankle.

The Packers are second in the NFC North behind Chicago, with five of their last seven games against division opponents. Criticized all year for their anemic efforts on the ground, the Packers broke free for 176 yards, their most since gaining 202 against Cleveland on Oct. 25, 2009. Four players — Aaron Rodgers, Randall Cobb, James Starks and Alex Green — had 25-plus yards rushing, the first time that's happened since 2003.

All that running must have left them tired, however, because the Packers came out sluggish in the second half. They failed to pick up a first down on any of their first four drives, and got only a 33-yard field goal from Mason Crosby despite getting the ball at their own 48, Arizona's 17 and midfield.

The Cardinals caught a break when LaRod Stephens-Howling was tripped up behind the line of scrimmage only to land on a Packer instead of the ground. He got up and kept going for a 5-yard gain, and the ruling was upheld on review because officials said only his wrist had hit the ground. On the next play, Larry Fitzgerald shook off tackles by Tramon Williams, M.D., Jennings and Dezman Moses for a 31-yard touchdown that cut Green Bay's lead to 24-14.

With Matthews in the locker room with a hamstring injury, John Skelton went 7 of 9 as he moved the Cardinals 74 yards to the Green Bay 2. But Stephens-Howling was stuffed on third-and-1, forcing Arizona to settle for a 20-yard field goal that cut the lead to 24-17.

Two plays later Crabtree caught the ball at the Green Bay 45 and rumbled up field, glancing over his shoulder to make sure Paris Lenon and William Gay weren't going to catch him.

They didn't — barely — and Crabtree tumbled into the end zone.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — The Packers' five-game winning streak came to an end as Eli Manning threw three touchdowns and the Giants routed Green Bay 38-10 in a nationally televised game Sunday night.

Coming on the heels of last season's loss in the playoffs, it was the Packers' second straight lopsided loss to New York (7-4) and this one seemed worse than the 37-20 setback. It also left them a game behind Chicago (8-3) in the NFC North.

The Giants dominated in all phases on a night that Manning set a franchise record with his 200th career touchdown pass. The 38 points were the most given up by Green Bay this season and it came in a game in which Aaron Rodgers was sacked five times and hit at least as many times.

The Packers were missing such key starters as linebacker Clay Matthews, defensive back Charles Woodson and receiver Greg Jennings, and it showed.

New York struck early with a brilliantly conceived screen pass to Ahmad Bradshaw off a fake reverse to Victor Cruz. Bradshaw sped down the field before being caught at the Green Bay 2, a 59-yard pickup that led to Andre Brown's scoring run.

Brown later broke his leg; Giants head coach Tom Coughlin did not say which leg after the game.

Green Bay didn't flinch, with Jordy Nelson getting behind Corey Webster in single coverage down the right sideline for a 61-yard TD reception from Rodgers.

The scoring flurry went back in the Giants' favor -- and pretty much stayed there -- when Manning hit Rueben Randle in the back of the end zone for a 16-yard TD. It was the first score for the rookie and Manning's first touchdown throw in four games, and he set it up with, of all things, a scramble in which he laid his shoulder into Packers cornerback Tramon Williams for a 13-yard gain.

Webster's interception led to Lawrence Tynes' 43-yard field goal late in the first quarter for a 17-7 lead, and the Giants weren't nearly done. Manning's 9-yard connection with Cruz tied him for the club record with 199 career TD passes, and after Osi Umenyiora's strip-sack of Rodgers was recovered by Jason Pierre-Paul at the Green Bay 23, Bradshaw scored from the 13.

# 2012 BIOGRAPHIES

THROUGH WEEK 12

## 67 Don Barclay, G/T, Rookie, West Virginia

**2012 Season:** One of four non-drafted rookie free agents to make the club's opening-day roster in 2012. Has appeared in each game on special teams after making the team on the strength of a preseason that saw him display versatility at both the guard and tackle positions.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut, appearing on special teams as a member of the kickoff return unit.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Played in the game on special teams, appearing on both the kickoff return unit and as part of the placement protection... Had a role in the game's most memorable play, a fake FG attempt late in the second quarter...On the play, he pulled from the left side of the line of scrimmage, serving as a lead blocker for TE Tom Crabtree who was on the receiving end of a shovel pass from P Tim Masthay...Led Crabtree through the hole before helping C/G Evan Dietrich-Smith drive S Chris Conte well away from the play and allowing Crabtree a clear path to the end zone for a 27-yard TD that put Green Bay ahead 10-0.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24) - at New York Giants (11/25):** Played in each game on special teams.

## 32 Cedric Benson, RB, 8th Year, Texas

**2012 Season:** Veteran runner who had become a focal point in the team's offense before suffering a foot injury in the first half at Indianapolis in Week 5 that will sideline him for a significant period of time...Placed on injured reserve - designated for return, Oct. 10...Was initially signed Aug. 12 and emerged from training camp as the lead back in the Green Bay offense, having carried 71 times for 248 yards (3.5 avg.) and a TD and also caught 14 passes for 97 yards (6.9 avg.) through four-plus games.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his Packers debut, getting the start on offense and finishing the game with 18 yards on nine carries (2.0 avg.)

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Had a productive day against his original team, carrying 20 times for 81 yards (4.1 avg.) and adding four receptions for 35 yards (8.8 avg.)...Became the first Packers RB to exceed the 20-carry mark in a game since Brandon Jackson (22) did so at New England on Dec. 19, 2010.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Carried 17 times for 45 yards (2.6 avg.) and a TD...Scored the offense's lone TD, his first as a Packer, on a 1-yard plunge in the fourth quarter...Also caught four passes for 19 yards (4.8 avg.)

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Provided an excellent balance for what was an especially productive day on offense, carrying 18 times for a season-high 84 yards (4.7 avg.)...Also made four catches out of the backfield for 22 yards (5.5 avg.)

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Started the game at RB but suffered an injury early in the second quarter when his foot got caught under LB Moise Fokou on a tackle following a 3-yard carry...Did not return following the injury, but carried seven times for 20 yards (2.9 avg.) and caught two passes for 21 yards (10.5 avg.) prior to going down...Accounted for 30 of 56 yards on the Packers' first scoring drive late in the first quarter, one that culminated with a 2-yard TD plunge by FB John Kuhn.

## 11 Jarrett Boykin, WR, Rookie, Virginia Tech

**2012 Season:** Non-drafted rookie free agent who earned a contract offer after first appearing as a tryout player at the team's rookie orientation camp May 11-13...One of four non-drafted rookies to make the team's opening-day roster after leading the team with 13 catches for 166 yards (12.8 avg.) and a TD in the preseason...Initially a healthy scratch for each of the first five games of the regular season, but was active in Weeks 6-9 and played in all four games on both offense and special teams...For the season, has appeared in five games and made three catches for 16 yards (5.3 avg.) and also had two tackles on special teams.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Listed as a gameday inactive for his first professional game.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13) - at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Inactive.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14):** Made his NFL debut, appearing both on offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Was again active for the game...Saw five plays on

offense and nine on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Appeared on both offense and special teams, seeing extended action from scrimmage with both WR Greg Jennings (groin) and WR Jordy Nelson (hamstring) sidelined by injuries... Appeared on 22 offensive plays and saw his first career reception come on a 9-yard play in the second quarter.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Played on both offense and special teams... Nelson returned to the starting lineup but exited in the first quarter with an ankle injury and did not return...Again saw increased playing time and finished with a season-high two catches for 7 yards (3.5 avg.)

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18):** Listed as a gameday inactive as a healthy scratch with the coaching staff electing to dress just four WRs for the game.

►at **New York Giants (11/25):** Returned to the gameday lineup, appearing primarily on special teams but also briefly on offense...Tallied his second tackle of the season as a member of the kickoff coverage team.

## 75 Bryan Bulaga, T, 3rd Year, Iowa

**2012 Season:** Young veteran and entrenched starter at RT who opened each of the first nine games at RT...Suffered a hip injury in the first half of the team's Week 9 contest vs. Arizona and was sidelined for the remainder of the game...Upon further evaluation, the injury was deemed season-ending and he was placed on injured reserve, Nov. 12.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at RT against the talented 49ers front seven and was part of a line that allowed QB Aaron Rodgers time to complete 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs, while being sacked three times during the game.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Started at RT and appeared on all 68 offensive plays, also appearing on special teams...Had a hand in the game's most memorable play, a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree on a fake field goal attempt in the second quarter...On the play, blocked out on the wing against WR Eric Weems, helping to create the large lane used by Crabtree on his way to the end zone.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Overcame what was a challenging first half for the offense as part of a line that helped produce three scoring drives and did not yield a sack in the second half.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Turned in a solid bounce-back performance as part of an offensive line that helped produce 421 yards of total offense, 30 first downs and four TD drives during the game...Protection unit was particularly proficient, allowing Rodgers to complete 31-of-41 passes for 319 yards and four TD passes, while pitching a shutout in the sack department.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Started at RT on what was an uneven day for the offense...Helped produce three TD drives and 179 yards of offense before halftime, staking the team to a 21-3 lead.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14):** Part of an OL that turned in an outstanding all-around performance against what was the NFL's No. 3-ranked yard-age defense entering the game...Helped the offense produce 427 yards, including 338 passing yards and a franchise-record-tying six TD passes from Rodgers...Rodgers became only the fourth QB in NFL history to post 330 yards, six TDs and no INTs and was sacked only twice by a noted Texans pass rush.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Spent much of the game matched against stand-out Rams DE Chris Long, who he limited to just one assisted tackle and no sacks according to the game statistics...Helped clear the way for an offense that rolled up 402 total yards on 66 plays, allowing Rodgers to complete 30-of-37 attempts for 342 yards and three TDs with no INTs.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Started at RT...Part of the OL that allowed Rodgers to complete 22-of-35 attempts for 186 yards and two TDs, the second of which moved him past QB Bart Starr for the second-most TD passes (153) in franchise history.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Started at RT...Suffered a hip injury on a second-quarter 12-yard carry by WR Randall Cobb, who'd lined up in the backfield on the play...Did not return to the game.



## **42 Morgan Burnett, S, 3rd Year, Georgia Tech**

**2012 Season:** Third-year defender on the back end who has started every game and ranks No. 2 on the team with 92 tackles (58 solo), a career-high two sacks, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery to go with nine passes defended.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at FS and finished with six tackles (two solo).

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Posted six tackles (four solo) for the second consecutive week, also adding his first two passes defended of the young season...Part of a secondary that collected four INTs and helped limit Chicago to just 74 net passing yards during the game.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Finished with four assisted tackles.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished as the team's leading tackler with 13 stops (six solo) and a pass defended during the game...Made a key tackle for loss on a short pass from QB Drew Brees to RB Mark Ingram on a first-down play from the Green Bay 1-yard line in the third quarter...The subsequent two plays were incomplete passes and New Orleans was forced to attempt a FG on fourth down.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Led the defense with 11 tackles (10 solo) and added a pass defended.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Finished with eight tackles (one solo) as part of a defense that held Houston to 321 total yards and 17 points, well below their per game averages of 371.8 and 29.8 entering Week 6.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Started and appeared on all 60 defensive plays, finishing with seven tackles (six solo) and a pass defended.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Inherited an increased responsibility with veteran S Charles Woodson sidelined with a collarbone injury...Started at SS instead of his customary FS position...Had one of the most complete performances of his young career, finishing with 11 tackles (nine solo), a sack, both a forced and recovered fumble and three passes defended during the game...Notched the second sack of his career when he came free on a blitz early in the third quarter and dropped QB Blaine Gabbert for a 16-yard loss, also forcing a fumble that Gabbert recovered on his way to the ground...Earlier in the game, recovered the defense's first fumble of the season when he pounced on a loose ball that LB Brad Jones punched free from RB Rashad Jennings.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Led the secondary with seven tackles (six solo) and a pass defended.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Posted a secondary-high nine tackles (eight solo) and his career-high second sack of the season...Sack came on a third-and-3 from the Packers' 3-yard line in the first quarter...Dropped into a zone coverage near the goal line before sprinting forward to close on rolling QB Matthew Stafford and dropping him for a 9-yard loss...Play forced the Lions to settle for a 30-yard FG.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Tied for second on defense with 10 tackles (six solo).

## **24 Jarrett Bush, CB, 7th Year, Utah State**

**2012 Season:** Veteran special teams ace whose streak of 84 consecutive games played (including playoffs) ranks second on the roster behind K Mason Crosby's 99...Has played in all 16 games for four straight seasons (2008-11)...A member of each of the core special teams units, he is the club's leading tackler in the third phase, having posted 11 stops thus far...Has also made seven tackles (six solo) on defense.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at CB and finished with five tackles (four solo), also recording a tackle on in kickoff coverage on special teams.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Returned to his role on special teams, where he tallied another tackle on the kickoff team...Also helped limit WR Devin Hester to just two punt returns for 8 yards (4.0 avg.), as a member of the coverage unit that landed three kicks inside the 20-yard line.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game, mostly on special teams, finishing with one coverage tackle...Also downed a second-quarter punt by P Tim Masthay at Seattle's 1-yard line.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played on special teams and was credited with a tackle in kickoff coverage...Helped contain dangerous returner RB Darren Sproles to just one punt return for 4 yards and three kickoff returns for 91 yards (30.3 avg.).

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Played on special teams, recording a tackle in punt coverage where he helped limit the Colts to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.) on seven punts, four of them secured inside the Indianapolis 20-yard line.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Appeared both on special teams and 20 plays on defense following an injury to CB Sam Shields...Finished with two solo tackles on defense...Also downed a Masthay punt at the Houston 3-yard line in the first quarter.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Played exclusively on special teams where he recorded a tackle on the kickoff coverage unit...Also played a role in the Packers' recovery of a surprise onside kick in the first quarter...On the play, wiped out CB Trumaine Johnson in the air after he'd leapt to receive the ball, teaming with S M.D. Jennings to jar it loose and allow LB Jamari Lattimore to come up with it for Green Bay...Possession resulted in a 47-yard FG by K Mason Crosby.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Finished with a team-high two special teams tackles, adding both stops as a member of the kickoff coverage team.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Keyed a special teams coverage effort that helped the Packers win the field-position battle by 263 yards during the game (579-316) and limited talented return man CB Patrick Peterson to just four punt returns for 19 yards (4.8 avg.)...Was the first man down on a punt near the end of the fourth quarter, recovering the football after Peterson had muffed the catch...Made the recovery at the Arizona 2-yard line, but the Packers, already holding a 31-17 advantage, kneeled on the ball to run out the remaining clock and end the game.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Played on special teams where he recorded a tackle in kickoff coverage...Downed a first-quarter punt by Masthay at the Detroit 2-yard line and was part of the punt coverage team that held WR Stefan Logan without a single return during the game...Also appeared briefly on four defensive plays, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Posted a team-leading two tackles on special teams, one each on the punt and kickoff coverage units...Elevated his tackle total to 11, the seventh consecutive season he has posted double-digit tackles on special teams, extending his own team record in that respect.

## **18 Randall Cobb, WR, 2nd Year, Kentucky**

**2012 Season:** Dynamic young target who has evolved into a greater role in the offense in his second season...Has been used as both a runner and receiver early in 2012, having already set new career highs with his now team-leading 58 catches for 613 yards (10.6 avg.) and seven TDs in addition to nine carries for 127 yards (14.1 avg.)...Also serves as the team's primary returner in the kicking game, with 21 punt returns for 231 yards (11.0 avg.) and a TD, and 30 kickoff returns for 783 yards (26.1 avg.)...Scored on a 75-yard punt return vs. San Francisco in the season opener, becoming the first player in NFL history to score on a kick return (punt or kickoff) in Week 1 each of his first two seasons in the league...Punt return average is tied for seventh in the NFL and his kickoff return average is 13th.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Opened the season with a bang for the second consecutive year with a leading performance on both offense and special teams...Followed his NFL-record 108-yard kickoff return for a TD in last season's opener vs. New Orleans with a fourth-quarter punt return that he took 75 yards for a TD, his third return in just his 17th career regular-season game...Is now tied for second in team history for career kick return TDs (Travis Williams, six), having taken two punts and one kickoff back for scores...According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he became the first player in NFL history to score on a kick return (punt or kickoff) in Week 1 each of his first two seasons in the league. On the play, eluded defenders to the outside and then raced up the right sideline past P Andy Lee on his way to the end zone...Offensively, posted a new career high with his nine catches for 77 yards.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Finished with one catch for 20 yards to go with one carry for 28 yards, the longest rush of his career...Also had a 16-yard punt return.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Made one catch for a loss of 1 yard and carried once for 20 yards, his second 20-plus-yard rush in as many weeks...Was limited in the return game, having his three punt returns go for just 12

yards (4.0 avg.) and his only returnable kickoff netting 23 yards.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished second on offense with both his seven catches and 66 yards (9.4 avg.), seeing extended action in the second half after WR Greg Jennings left the game with a groin injury.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Again saw increased action with Jennings sidelined due to injury and finished with four catches for a team-leading and career-high 82 yards (20.5 avg.) and a TD, his first receiving score of the season...Scored on a 31-yard play in the second quarter that extended the Green Bay lead to 21-3 (following PAT), after running a slant in front of CB Jerraud Powers out of the right slot, catching a bullet from Rodgers and cruising untouched into the end zone...Also had four punt returns for 19 yards (4.8 avg.) and three kickoff returns for 95 yards (31.7 avg.), including a season-long 35 yarder.

►**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Posted a 211-yard all-purpose performance, highlighted by a career-high 102 receiving yards on seven catches (14.6 avg.), the first time he'd eclipsed the century mark from scrimmage in his career...Made some of his catches on second-reaction plays, when he adjusted his route and worked his way back into QB Aaron Rodgers' field of vision to make plays downfield...Had three catches for 46 yards on the methodical 16-play, 80-yard TD drive that opened the second half and put the Packers ahead 28-10...Also had three punt returns for 23 yards (7.7 avg.) and three kickoff returns for 86 yards (28.7 avg.), including a season-long 46-yarder late in the third quarter that ignited another TD drive.

►**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Followed up his career-high yardage output with another outstanding effort at St. Louis, catching eight passes for 89 yards (11.1 avg.) and scoring two TDs, the first multi-TD receiving outing of his career...First TD was a 5-yard catch in the back of the end zone that finished an impressive 12-play, 80-yard drive, spanning 6:56 to open the second half...Later converted two first downs with 11- and 8-yard catches on a fourth-quarter drive, capping the series with a 39-yard TD catch from Rodgers...TD came on a defensive-offside free play where he sprinted into the QB's field of vision and hauled in the pass in the end zone for the longest scoring reception of his career...Had his first carry since Week 3, a 19-yard carry off of left tackle in the first quarter...Also returned one punt for 15 yards and one kickoff for 23 yards.

►**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Finished with five catches for 28 yards (5.6 avg.) and his fourth TD of the season...TD came from 5 yards out when he mirrored a rolling Rodgers along the back line of the end zone, opening the Packers' scoring on their second drive of the game in the first quarter...Also had two kickoff returns for 57 yards (28.5 avg.).

►**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Turned in another electrifying performance as he continues to help propel the offense in the face of injuries to key contributors...Started as the No. 3 WR with Nelson returning to the lineup, and finished with three catches for 37 yards (12.3 avg.) and two TDs, his second multi-TD outing in three weeks and third consecutive game with a score...First TD opened the game's scoring on the offense's second drive of the first quarter...With the team facing third-and-13 from the Arizona 13-yard line, he caught a screen off a quick slant from the outside, following blocks by WR Donald Driver and TE Jermichael Finley all the way inside the 5-yard line where he spun away from S Adrian Wilson and crashed into the end zone...Two drives later, beat CB William Gay to the outside along the right sideline and hauled in a lofted pass from Rodgers over his shoulder in the end zone for a 21-yard TD that put the Packers back in front 14-7 in the second quarter...Also lined up in the backfield on a handful of plays, carrying the ball three times for 29 yards (9.7 avg.), contributing to a rushing output of 176 yards on 39 carries (4.5 avg.), the most on the ground by the Packers in more than three years (Oct. 25, 2009)...On special teams, returned three kickoffs for 90 yards (30.0 avg.), including a 44-yarder to open the second half and had three punt returns for 46 yards (15.3 avg.), highlighted by a 28-yard return in the first quarter.

►**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Finished with a team-high and career-high tying nine catches for 74 yards (8.2 avg.) and the game-winning TD late in the fourth quarter...Also had two carries for 19 yards (9.5 avg.), including a game-long 15-yarder in the third quarter to convert a third-and-1 play for the offense...TD gave Green Bay a 21-20 lead with 1:55 remaining and came off of a corner route against CB Jacob Lacey from the left slot, catching the pass from Rodgers in the end zone while also avoiding S Ricardo

Silva, who converged on the play just after the ball arrived...Catch was particularly impressive as his right hand was mostly tied up during the play and he had to secure it with just his left...Also had four kickoff returns for 71 yards (17.8 avg.) during the game.

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Led the team in receiving with four catches for 39 yards (9.8 avg.) and also had one carry for 12 yards...Returned two punts for 20 yards (10.0 avg.) with a long of 15.

### **83 Tom Crabtree, TE, 3rd Year, Miami (Ohio)**

**2012 Season:** Reserve tight end used mostly for his ability as a blocker, has appeared in 10 of 11 games with three starts...Suffered a shoulder injury in the preseason that was aggravated in Week 2 and forced him to miss the first game of his career at Seattle in Week 3...For the season, has six receptions and has already set new career highs with both 183 receiving yards (30.5 avg.) and three TDs.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on special teams and on offense, but did not record any statistics.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Had the leading role in the game's most memorable play, a 27-yard TD off of a shovel pass on a fake field goal late in the second quarter...On the play, lined up at his normal position on the left end of the line of scrimmage...At the snap, turned to the inside of the formation to collect the pass from P Tim Masthay, before cutting up the field through the right side of the line behind a series of blocks from C/G Evan Dietrich-Smith, G/T Don Barclay and T Bryan Bulaga and racing untouched into the end zone...The play converted a fourth-and-26 from the 27-yard line and marked the second regular-season TD reception of his career.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Was limited during the practice week with a lingering shoulder injury and was listed as a gameday inactive for the first time in his career, breaking a streak of 39 consecutive games played dating back to the 2010 season opener.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Returned to action and got the start as part of a two-tight end set...Finished with one catch for 16 yards.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Started as part of a three-TE set and finished with one catch for 6 yards.

►**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Made another impactful scoring play in prime-time, this time a career-long 48-yard reception resulting in a TD that put the Packers ahead 35-17 in the fourth quarter...On the play, a third-and-1, ran through an attempted jam by S Glover Quin, while the Texans rushed seven defenders at QB Aaron Rodgers...Turned to see Rodgers throw a perfect strike as he was being hit, and caught the ball at the 32-yard line, running untouched the rest of the way for the score...Also made a key 14-yard reception on a shovel pass in the first quarter, running over S Troy Nolan and fighting his way to the Houston 6-yard line to set up a TD pass from Rodgers to WR James Jones on the following play.

►**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Appeared on 29 offensive plays, but did not record any statistics.

►**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Played on offense but did not record any statistics.

►**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Once again took advantage of an opportunity to make arguably the game's most impactful play...Was on the receiving end of a 72-yard TD pass from Rodgers to extend the Packers' lead to 31-17 on the final play of the third quarter, thwarting what was beginning to look like an Arizona comeback...On the play, lined up in the backfield in front of Rodgers who took the snap from the shotgun...Emerged through the line as if he was lead blocking for RB Alex Green, freezing LB Paris Lenon, who he then passed on a seam route, entering into a secondary void of defenders...Caught a perfect throw from Rodgers at the 43-yard line and outran the rest of the defense to the end zone for what was a career-long 72-yard catch, the longest pass play by the Packers through nine games of the 2012 season...Play marked the longest TD reception by a Green Bay TE since Paul Coffman's 78-yard catch at Miami on Oct. 28, 1979, and combining his 48-yard TD at Houston, he became the first Packers TE since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970 to have two catches of 45-plus yards in the same season.

►**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Played on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Played on both offense and special teams, but

did not record any statistics.

## **2 Mason Crosby, K, 6th Year, Colorado**

**2012 Season:** Veteran specialist who has gone 12-for-20 on FG attempts and converted each of his 31 PAT tries...Has also boomed 27 touchbacks through 11 games.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Did not attempt a FG, but did make both of his PAT tries and boomed three touchbacks on his four kickoffs.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Converted each of his first three FG attempts on the young season, boasting makes of 48, 35 and 54 yards during the game...The 54-yarder came early in the fourth quarter and marked the longest FG by a Packer in Lambeau Field history, besting the previous record of 53 yards...Also had a hand in the game's most memorable play, a fake FG late in the second quarter that resulted in a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree...On the fake, released out to the left side of the field mocking a potential pass pattern...Drew CB Charles Tillman away from the shovel pass inside to Crabtree, thus creating one less defender in the pursuit of the ball...Also hit three of his five kickoffs for touchbacks and was successful on all three PAT attempts.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Converted both of his FG tries during the game, hitting from both 29 and 40 yards in the third quarter to pull the Packers to within a point at 7-6 after being shut out in the first half...Also kicked two of his four kickoffs for touchbacks.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Did not attempt a FG, but was good on all four of his PATs...Was efficient in the kickoff game, helping to limit explosive return man Darren Sproles to just 91 yards on three returns (30.3 avg.), also hitting two touchbacks.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Had his most challenging day as a professional, missing both FG attempts on the afternoon, including a 51-yarder he pulled wide left that would have tied the score 30-30 with :03 remaining in regulation...First miss was a 52-yarder he pushed wide to the right late in the third quarter...Did have a productive day on kickoffs, hitting five touchbacks without allowing a return.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14):** Did not officially attempt a FG (had a make negated by a defensive penalty), but was successful on each of his six PAT tries and also hit four touchbacks on kickoffs.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Tied his season high with three successful FG tries, converting from 47, 23 and 48 yards out...Marked his 19th career game with three or more FGs...Missed a 58-yard try before halftime that would have tied the franchise record kick he made at Minnesota in Week 7 of 2011...Successfully executed a surprise onside kick on the kickoff that followed the Packers' first TD in the first quarter...Bounced a high kick off the turf that was bobbed by CB Trumaine Johnson and eventually recovered by LB Jamari Lattimore at the Rams' 49-yard line...Capped the ensuing possession with a 47-yard field goal...Has now succeeded on four of his last five onside kicks dating back to the 2009 playoffs...Also converted each of his PAT tries and had three touchbacks on traditional kickoffs.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Was 1-for-2 on FG attempts, missing a 32-yard FG off the right upright in the third quarter, his first miss inside of 50 yards in 2012...Later converted from 25 yards late in the fourth quarter to extend the Green Bay lead to 24-15 with less than a minute remaining in the game.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Missed his first FG attempt, a 44-yarder, wide to the left in the first quarter, but rallied to make a 33-yarder early in the third...Converted all four PAT attempts and hit three touchbacks, contributing to a field position battle that the Packers won by more than 260 yards during the game (579-316).

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18):** Had yet another difficult day, pulling FG attempts of 50 and 38 yards wide to the left, both of which would have tied the game's score in the second and fourth quarters, respectively...Recovered to make a 39-yarder with :19 remaining in the fourth quarter to extend Green Bay's lead to 24-20, and forcing Detroit to attempt a desperation TD drive in the waning moments.

►at **New York Giants (11/25):** Missed his first attempt from 55 yards out in the first quarter but rallied to later convert from 28 yards in the second.

## **76 Mike Daniels, DE, Rookie, Iowa**

**2012 Season:** Young defender who has appeared as an interior pass rusher in the team's various sub-packages as a rookie...For the season, has appeared in nine games and posted eight tackles (five solo), two sacks and a fumble recovery.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Listed as a gameday inactive for his first NFL game.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Made his NFL debut against the division-rival Bears, appearing on 14 plays and finishing with one solo tackle that was also his first career sack...Play came in the fourth quarter when he fought off a block from veteran C Roberto Garza and wrapped up QB Jay Cutler as he stepped forward in the pocket for a 1-yard loss.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game on defense, but did not record any statistics.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Appeared on both defense and special teams, recording an assisted tackle on defense.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Returned to the inactive list following the activation of DE Mike Neal from reserve/suspended.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14):** Was once again active with starting NT B.J. Raji sidelined by an ankle injury...Appeared on 20 plays and posted a career-high three tackles (two solo).

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Saw 17 defensive snaps but did not record any statistics.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Played 12 defensive snaps, most of which came after fellow rookie DE Jerel Worthy left the game with a concussion.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Part of the rotation up front with Worthy inactive for the game due to the effects of his concussion...Appeared on 20 plays and finished with three tackles (two solo) and his second sack of the season...Sack came late in the second quarter when he executed a twist with LB Clay Matthews, looping around the outside of the protection and closing quickly on QB John Skelton, dropping him for a 10-yard loss to help stall a two-minute drive before halftime.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18):** Appeared in the rotation up front, seeing time on eight defensive plays...Made his first career fumble recovery just before halftime, falling on a ball that was slapped from the grip of QB Matthew Stafford by LB Dezman Moses...The ensuing possession led to a FG attempt for the Packers just before halftime.

►at **New York Giants (11/25):** Saw action on 22 defensive plays and finished with two tackles (one solo) and a pressure.

## **62 Evan Dietrich-Smith, C/G, 3rd Year, Idaho State**

**2012 Season:** Initially the primary reserve at each of the three interior OL positions, who now figures as the permanent starter at LG...Has appeared in all 11 games with two starts...First saw his most extended scrimmage action in Week 9 vs. Arizona as the first man off the bench when RT Bryan Bulaga suffered a hip injury and did not return...Moved into the starting lineup at LG at Detroit in Week 11 with regular starter T.J. Lang moving to RT in the absence of the injured Bulaga, who was placed on injured reserve.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game exclusively on special teams.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Participated on special teams, playing an integral role in the game's most memorable play, a 27-yard TD pass on a fake field goal attempt late in the second quarter...As part of the protection unit on the play, blocked out on S Chris Conte, driving the DB away from the line of scrimmage and helping to create the wide lane used by TE Tom Crabtree as he raced into the end zone to give the Packers a 10-0 lead (following PAT).

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24) - at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Played on special teams.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14):** Played on special teams and also saw his first

scrimmage action of the season, entering the game as an extra lineman for four plays on offense.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Appeared in the game on special teams as a member of the placement protection units.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Played on special teams and also saw four plays as an extra blocker on offense, including a 6-yard gain by RB Alex Green to convert a third-and-1 in the third quarter.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Saw his extensive action on offense to this point in the season, coming in as the top reserve of front after Bulaga suffered a hip injury early in the second quarter and did not return... Substituted at LG with regular starter T.J. Lang kicking out to RT in place of Bulaga...Helped keep the offense on track to the tune of 384 yards and five scoring drives (four TDs, one FG), including 176 rushing yards, the most by the team since Oct. 25, 2009 (at Cleveland).

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Made his first start of the season and first since Week 16 of 2011, opening at LG...Held his ground against a deep and talented Detroit front, particularly on the team's go-ahead drive late in the fourth quarter that saw them span 82 yards in six plays, capping it with a 22-yard TD pass from QB Aaron Rodgers to WR Randall Cobb with 1:55 remaining...On the play, teamed with LT Marshall Newhouse to effectively pick up a line stunt by DE Willie Young and DT Nick Fairley, locking on to Fairley long enough for Rodgers to line up the throw.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Started at LG.

### 80 Donald Driver, WR, 14th Year, Alcorn State

**2012 Season:** All-time leading receiver in franchise history, has played in all 11 games with one start and made eight catches for 77 yards (9.6 avg.) and two TDs.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on offense, but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Played in the game on offense and caught a 26-yard TD from QB Aaron Rodgers in the fourth quarter that extended the Green Bay lead to 23-3...The scoring play was his lone reception of the game and marked the 60th receiving TD of his career.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game on offense, but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished with one catch for 3 yards.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Game marked his 197th in a Green Bay uniform, moving him past QB Bart Starr for No. 2 all-time in team history behind QB Brett Favre (255)...Made one catch for 14 yards, a key play that came with :25 remaining in the fourth quarter...The catch moved the Packers to the Indianapolis 33-yard line for a 51-yard FG attempt to tie the game near the end of regulation.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Appeared in the game but did not record any statistics.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Finished with one catch for two yards.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Saw extended action in his 200th career game with both WR Greg Jennings (groin) and WR Jordy Nelson (hamstring) sidelined with injuries...Finished with two catches for 10 yards (5.0 avg.), including a 4-yard TD in the fourth quarter that gave the Packers a two-possession, 21-12 lead...Scoring play marked the 62nd overall TD of his career, tying him with RB Paul Hornung for fifth all-time for the most overall TDs in franchise history...Also joined Favre as just the second player in club annals to reach the 200-games played mark, also becoming just the 22nd WR in NFL history to accomplish the feat.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Finished with one catch for 10 yards...The reception gave him an even 5,000 career receiving yards at Lambeau Field, the only player in franchise history to achieve that feat at the stadium...Also made a block on CB William Gay to help spring WR Randall Cobb's 13-yard TD catch on a quick screen play in the first quarter.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Made his first start of the season and posted one catch for 12 yards...Catch converted a key third down on the offense's first scoring drive, moving the chains on a third-and-9 for a drive that was capped three plays later on a 20-yard TD pass from Rodgers to TE Jermichael Finley.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Appeared briefly on offense but did not record any statistics.

### 88 Jermichael Finley, TE, 5th Year, Texas

**2012 Season:** Athletic tight end who has played in all 11 games with 10 starts and ranks fourth on the team with 35 catches for 388 yards (11.1 avg.) and two TDs.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at TE and finished with seven catches for 47 yards (6.7 avg.) and a TD...Capped 10-play, 80-yard drive to score the team's first TD of the young season, catching a 1-yard slant between two defenders in the end zone in the second quarter.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Collected four catches for 26 yards (6.5 avg.).

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Finished with four catches for a team-high 60 yards (15.0 avg.)...Two of his catches converted key third downs on a pair of second-half scoring drives, including his game-long 31-yarder that continued a march toward the offense's first FG in the third quarter.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Was particularly productive with his limited opportunities, finishing with 54 yards on four catches (13.5 avg.), seeing each of his receptions move the chains for first downs.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Finished with three catches for 11 yards (3.7 average)...Suffered a shoulder injury diving for a deep throw near the sideline in the third quarter and did not return.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Missed much of the practice week rehabilitating the injured shoulder but returned in time to play in the game...Saw more monitored reps and finished with two catches for 12 yards (6.0 avg.).

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Started and finished with two catches for 31 yards (15.5 avg.), making a pair of catches on a 2-minute drive late in the first half that helped set up a 58-yard FG attempt by K Mason Crosby.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Started and finished with two catches for 24 yards (12.0 avg.)...Had his game-long 20-yard catch in the first quarter, a play that gave the Packers first-and-goal from the Jacksonville 5-yard line...The offense would score the game's first TD on a pass from QB Aaron Rodgers to WR Randall Cobb on the following play.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Started at TE and posted one catch for 7 yards...Made a good block on LB Paris Lenon to help spring Cobb's 13-yard TD on a WR screen that opened the game's scoring in the first quarter.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Posted a season-high 66 receiving yards on three catches (22.0 avg.) and a TD, in what was his most impactful performance through the season's first 10 games...Scored his first TD since Week 1 to cap the team's third possession of the game early in the second quarter...On the play, went from the right side of the line into the middle of the field, beneath C Jeff Saturday, G Josh Sitton and RB James Starks, who had released into the right flat on a screen play...The screen caused LBs DeAndre Levy and Stephen Tulloch to vacate the middle, leaving Finley by himself to make the catch at the 15-yard line and race the rest of the way, diving through defenders near the goal line for the score...Later added his season-long 40-yard reception to kick-start the game-winning TD drive late in the fourth quarter...Long gain came on a second-and-10 from the

Green Bay 29-yard line when he ran a quick out to the right side, catching the pass from Rodgers just beyond the line of scrimmage before turning upfield...Received a pair of blocks from both Cobb and Nelson, while managing to stay in bounds as he jetted up the right sideline...Broke tackle attempts by LB Stephen Tulloch and CB Chris Houston, before eventually being dragged down by S Ricardo Silva at the Detroit 31-yard line...The offense would cash in three plays later on a 22-yard TD pass from Rodgers to Cobb that gave the Packers their first lead, 21-20, with 1:55 remaining in the game.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Started and posted three catches for 51 yards (17.0 avg.)...Made an alert reception of an errant throw by Rodgers that was affected when the QB was hit by DE Justin Tuck...Finley followed the deflection in the air and secured it for a 16-yard gain, saving a potential INT.

### **49 Robert Francois, LB, 3rd Year, Boston College**

**2012 Season:** Versatile backup linebacker and special teams performer, has played in all 11 games as a core player on special teams and ranks second on the team with a career-high eight coverage tackles.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on special teams and was credited with a tackle on the punt coverage team.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Appeared in the game on special teams and recorded a tackle on the punt team when he wrapped up and carried the dangerous WR Devin Hester out of bounds on a fourth-quarter punt return that went for only 1 yard.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Played in the game on special teams and was credited with one coverage tackle.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Appeared in the game on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Helped lead the coverage units, notching a tackle on the punt team as part of a unit that limited Indianapolis to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.) on seven kicks.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Led the way on the coverage units with two jarring tackles as a member of the kickoff team, twice dropping returner Keshawn Martin inside the Houston 20-yard line.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Played on special teams but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Performed well in his usual role on special teams, recording a tackle on kickoff coverage...Was also part of the punt return/rush unit that blocked P Bryan Anger's second-quarter attempt allowing LB Dezman Moses to recover the ball in the end zone...Rushed off the left edge, teaming with LB Jamari Lattimore to occupy blockers, freeing up CB Davon House to streak into the backfield...Marked the Packers' first punt block since the 2003 season and the first they'd returned for a TD since 1990.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Appeared on special teams, where he collected his eighth coverage tackle of the season, making a stop on the kickoff team.

### **61 Brett Goode, LS, 5th Year, Arkansas**

**2012 Season:** Reliable long snapper who has performed the job for the past four-plus seasons, having appeared in all 75 regular-season games and six playoff contests since joining the club.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Snapped for each of Masthay's six punts, four of which were down inside the 20-yard line.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Snapped for all three of Crosby's successful FG attempts, including his 54-yarder in the fourth quarter that set a new team record for a FG by a Packers kicker at Lambeau Field...Also centered the game's highlight play, a fake field goal attempt in the second quarter that resulted in a 27-yard TD pass from Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree...On the play, snapped the ball to the holder Masthay and then threw a cut-block that wiped out DE Israel Idonije, allowing a clear path for Crabtree to take the shovel pass from Masthay and dart up the field for the score.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Centered both of Crosby's successful third-quarter FGs and all six of Masthay's punts, three of which were downed inside the 20-yard line.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Snapped for all four PATs and both punts during the game...Was on the front end of a successfully executed trick play for the second time in three weeks when his direct snap to FB John Kuhn on a second-quarter fake punt on a fourth-and-1 resulted in a 5-yard gain that extended an eventual TD drive.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Delivered snaps for each of Crosby's unsuccessful second-half FG tries and also all seven of Masthay's punts.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Snapped for each of Crosby's six PAT tries in addition to Masthay's five punt attempts (one blocked).

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Centered all four of Crosby's FG attempts, three of which he converted to mark a new season high...Also snapped for Masthay's three punts, and was part of a coverage team that forced all three to be fair caught, two of them inside the 20-yard line.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Snapped for each of Masthay's five punts and also both of Crosby's FG attempts...Also delivered a shotgun snap to Masthay after the FG unit audibled out of the traditional FG formation...Masthay attempted a deep pass that fell incomplete.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Delivered snaps for each of Masthay's six punts, three of which were downed inside the 20-yard line, and also both of Crosby's two FG attempts and all four PATs...Also recorded his first coverage tackle of the season when he brought down explosive return man CB Patrick Peterson following an 8-yard punt return in the fourth quarter.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Appeared in his 80th career game (including play-offs), snapping for each of the team's six placements (three FG attempts, three PATs) and four punts.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Snapped for each of Crosby's FG attempts and all four Masthay punts.

### **20 Alex Green, RB, 2nd Year, Hawaii**

**2012 Season:** Young runner who has come back from the knee injury that prematurely ended his rookie season in 2011 and assumed lead RB duties following a significant foot injury to Cedric Benson...For the season, has carried 97 times for a team-leading 302 yards (3.1 avg.) and made 14 catches for 110 yards (7.9 avg.).

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Dressed for the game, but did not play.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Made his season debut, his first regular-season action since Week 7 of 2011, and carried twice for 2 yards (1.0 avg.).

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Dressed for the game, but did not play.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Saw extended action after Benson suffered a foot injury in the second quarter...Finished with career highs in carries (10) and yards (63), and ripped off his career-long 41-yard run to set up a go-ahead TD late in the fourth quarter...On the play, took a handoff from QB Aaron Rodgers on the first play of the drive...Followed a lead block from TE Ryan Taylor through the hole off LG and then put a move on S Tom Zbikowski in the open field before cutting back to the right past S Antoine Bethea and racing up the sideline where he was pushed out of bounds at the Indianapolis 8-yard line...Set up a TD pass from Rodgers to James Jones on the next play that gave Green Bay a 27-22 lead with 4:34 remaining...Marked the longest run by a Packer since RB Ryan Grant's 80-yarder vs. Oakland on Dec. 11, 2011.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Made the first start of his NFL career and acquitted himself very well against a talented Texans defense that entered the game ranked No. 3 in the NFL in yards allowed...Carried 22 times for 65 yards (3.0 avg.), providing the needed balance to offset a Rodgers-led passing game that racked up 338 yards and six TDs during the game...Also added one catch for 8 yards...Made an excellent pick-up of a blitz by LB Bradie James in the fourth quarter on what was a seven-man pressure, allowing Rodgers time to find TE Tom Crabtree for a 48-yard TD pass that extended the Packers lead to 35-17.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Started for the second consecutive week and had a challenging day against St. Louis' active front...Finished with 20 carries for 35 yards (1.8 avg.), often meeting penetrating Rams defenders in the

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Yielded primary RB duties to James Starks, and appeared in spot duty on six offensive snaps...Did not register on the stat sheet with either a rush or reception.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Returned to regular action on offense, carrying a team-high 10 times for 30 yards (3.0 avg.)...Also made three catches for 20 yards (6.7 avg.).

## 6 Graham Harrell, QB, 1st Year, Texas Tech

**2012 Season:** The team's primary backup behind reigning league MVP QB Aaron Rodgers...Has appeared in three games thus far, having completed 1-of-2 pass attempts for 11 yards...Made his NFL debut in Week 4 vs. New Orleans when Rodgers was briefly sidelined...Played extensively in all four of the team's exhibition contests, completing 45-of-78 attempts for 484 yards with three TDs and two INTs.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Dressed for the game, but did not play, serving as the No. 2 QB behind Rodgers.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Dressed, but did not see any action.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Dressed for the game, but did not play.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Made his regular-season NFL debut in the third quarter when Rodgers was forced to leave the game after being poked in the eye...Inherited a first-and-goal at the New Orleans 2-yard line, but on his first snap, got stepped on by C Jeff Saturday while retreating to hand off to RB Cedric Benson...Tried to complete the exchange, but fumbled and surrendered possession to the Saints.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Did not play.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14)**: Came on in relief of Rodgers late in the game with the Packers comfortably ahead 42-24...Handed off seven times and did not attempt a pass.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)** - at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Dressed for the game, but did not play.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Entered the game in place of Rodgers for the final drive of the fourth quarter with the team trailing by 28 points... Attempted the first two passes of his career, completing one to FB John Kuhn for an 11-yard gain.

## 50 A.J. Hawk, LB, 7th Year, Ohio State

**2012 Season:** Productive, assignment-sure defender enjoying his seventh season, having played in 105 of a possible 107 regular-season games with 102 starts in his six-plus years...Has started all 11 games and leads the defense with 95 tackles (73 solo) and also has one sack.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Led the defense with a team-high 17 tackles (12 solo)...One of his stops came when he teamed with DB Charles Woodson to stop RB Frank Gore on a third-and-1 at the Green Bay 25-yard line late in the first half to force a FG.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Finished with five tackles (three solo)...Stuffed a screen pass to RB Matt Forté in the first quarter, beating a block by C Roberto Garza to drop Forté for a 1-yard loss.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Tied for the lead among LBs with eight tackles (all solo), helping to hold Seattle to just 14 first downs and 238 total yards during the game.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Started on defense, but was featured in a more limited role with the defense in DB-heavy personnel groupings to match the Saints' spread attack...Finished with five tackles (all solo).

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Appeared on 50 plays, finishing with eight tackles (six solo)...Made a tackle for loss when he shot through the line

on the Colts' second drive and dropped RB Vick Ballard for a 2-yard loss... Also thwarted a sneak by QB Andrew Luck on a fourth-and-1 play in the first quarter to force a turnover on downs.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Started his 100th career game and saw time on 36 defensive plays, finishing with four tackles (three solo).

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Earned one of the weekly defensive game balls for his performance after finishing with a team-high 10 tackles (eight solo, one for loss)...Tackle for loss came when he sniffed out a screen pass on the Lions' third drive of the first quarter, racing past G Rob Sims to drop RB Mikel Leshoure for a 2-yard loss.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Started and saw time on 57 defensive plays, tying for second on the defense with 10 tackles (nine solo).

## 29 Casey Hayward, CB, Rookie, Vanderbilt

**2012 Season:** Promising rookie defender who has taken on a starting role in the secondary due to injuries and is also a contributor on special teams...For the season, has made 35 tackles (28 solo), to go with his team-leading five INTs and a team-best 18 passes defended...The five picks are tied for second most in the NFL among all players (most among rookies) and are the most by a Packers rookie since CB Mike McKenzie posted six in 1999...By collecting the first four over a consecutive three week stretch, (Weeks 5-7), he became the first Packers rookie since S Tom Flynn in 1984 to record four INTs in a three-game span...Has also added three tackles on special teams.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Made his NFL debut on special teams, recording a tackle in kickoff coverage when he brought down RB Kendall Hunter after a 31-yard return in the fourth quarter.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Saw extended action on defense as part of the various sub-packages, primarily as the team's fourth CB in the dime personnel grouping...Finished with three tackles (all solo), as part of a defense that helped hold the Bears to just 74 net passing yards during the game.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Saw playing time on defense as part of the team's DB-heavy subpackages, finishing with one solo tackle and his first career pass defended...Broke up a pass from QB Russell Wilson to WR Golden Tate on a third-down play that forced a punt in the second quarter... Also recorded a tackle on special teams.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Saw extended scrimmage action against the Saints spread attack, finishing with a season-high eight tackles (six solo) and a pass defended...Broke up a third-down pass from QB Drew Brees intended for WR Marques Colston in the second quarter to force a punt.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Appeared on 43 plays and finished with two tackles (both solo) and his first career INT...Recorded the INT early in the fourth quarter when he was matched in coverage with veteran WR Reggie Wayne...Mirrored Wayne on an out-and-up route down the sideline and got his head around in time to pick off QB Andrew Luck's throw.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14)**: Saw action on 30 plays and added his second and third INTs of the season in the second half, becoming the first Packers rookie to post a multi-INT game since CB Mike McKenzie during the 1999 season (Jan. 2, 2000)...Finished the game with a team-high four passes defended...First INT came at the end of an impressive three-play sequence in the fourth, where he defended three consecutive passes from QB Matt Schaub intended for WR Keshawn Martin...The first was an out-and-up

that he deflected in the end zone, the second a quick that he also broke up, and the third was his first INT, on a fade to the end zone that he again got his head around in time to spot before tipping it to himself and intercepting it behind the goal line...Made his second INT on the Texans next possession when he was trailing WR DeVier Posey in a deep zone coverage and was able to corral a deflection by S Jerron McMillian and return it 20 yards.

►**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Made his first career start at RCB in the absence of the injured Sam Shields (shin/ankle)...Finished with five tackles (three solo) and his fourth INT of the season...INT came late in the third quarter when he was matched against WR Chris Givens on a go-route down the left sideline...LBs Clay Matthews and Erik Walden both got pressure off the edge, forcing QB Sam Bradford to rush an underthrown ball that Hayward turned in time to intercept...Possession resulted in a 23-yard FG by K Mason Crosby that extended Green Bay's lead to 20-6 in the fourth quarter...With his fourth INT since the Week 5 game at Indianapolis, he became the first Packers rookie since Flynn in 1984 to have four over a three game span.

►**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Started at RCB and finished with five tackles (four solo) and two passes defended.

►**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Started his third consecutive game and finished with six tackles (five solo), two passes defended and a forced fumble...One of his passes defended came in the third quarter when he converged with TE Rob Housler on a short pass, deflecting the high into the air where it was eventually intercepted by LB Erik Walden...Forced fumble came in the fourth quarter when he punched the ball loose from WR Andre Roberts following a 14-yard gain, but the ball rolled out of bounds.

►**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Turned in another excellent performance against the division-rival Lions, starting at RCB and posting five tackles (four solo), a team-high four passes defended and his fifth INT of the season...Broke up back-to-back passes on the Lions' opening drive, first breaking quickly to deflect a short throw to TE Brandon Pettigrew on second down and then converging with WR Calvin Johnson on a crossing route, tackling the WR and dislodging the ball on third down, to force a punt...Interception came late in the first half and thwarted a promising Lions drive before halftime... On the play, dropped into a zone coverage and intercepted a QB Matthew Stafford pass intended for WR Titus Young at the Green Bay 28-yard line, returning it 20 yards...Nearly had a second INT late in the fourth quarter when he broke up a sideline throw from Stafford to Young on a third-and-13 with less than two minutes remaining in the game.

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Saw more limited action as Davon House assumed the starting role at RCB...Appeared on 21 plays and finished with two passes defended, including breaking up and nearly interception a third-down throw by QB Eli Manning on the Giants' second drive of the game.

### **31 Davon House, CB, 2nd Year, New Mexico State**

**2012 Season:** Carried the momentum of a strong offseason into the 2012 training camp where he was vying for the No. 2 CB position on defense...Suffered a shoulder injury in the exhibition opener at San Diego (Aug. 9) and was sidelined for the remainder of the preseason...Spent the early portion of the season rehabilitating the injury, but made his season debut at St. Louis in Week 7...Has played in five games with four starts and posted 13 tackles (12 solo), a sack and 11 passes defended.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Practiced during the week with a protective harness on his shoulder but was listed as a gameday inactive.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13) - at Houston Texans (10/14):** Inactive.

►**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Made his season debut at St. Louis after fellow CB Sam Shields (shin/ankle) was rendered inactive due to injury...Served as the team's dime CB, appearing on 22 defensive plays and made one tackle and a team-high three passes defended, the first defensive statistics of his career...Made an impressive play on a fourth-and-2 from the Green Bay 14-yard line in the second quarter...Converged on a slant by WR Brandon Gibson, breaking up the pass to force a turnover on downs and keep the Rams from scoring.

►**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Started his first career game on defense as the team's third CB minus Shields...Appeared on 55 defensive plays and finished with two solo tackles and two passes defended...Also had a key hand in one of the game's most defining plays when he blocked a second-

quarter punt that was recovered by LB Dezman Moses in the end zone for a TD...On the play, crept down toward the line of scrimmage from his jammer position on the perimeter to the left edge of the Packers' rush... Came clean on his rush and made a perfect block of P Bryan Anger's kick, deflecting it backward toward the end zone where a mob of players failed to handle it before Moses secured it on the ground...Marked the Packers first blocked punt since Sept. 29, 2003 (LB Marcus Wilkins) and the first that was returned for a TD since Dec. 2, 1990 (S Tiger Greene).

►**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Started for the second consecutive week and finished with a career-high five tackles (four solo) and a pass defended...Broke up a QB John Skelton throw intended for WR Michael Floyd in the fourth quarter, a ball that went through his hands for what would have been an INT.

►**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Started his third straight game with the defense opening in its nickel alignment...Appeared on all 72 defensive plays (a career-high) and finished with two tackles (both solo), his first career sack and two passes defended...Sack came in the fourth quarter when he charged forward from a shallow zone coverage as QB Matthew Stafford stepped out of a collapsing pocket and dropped him for a 3-yard loss... Contributed to a pass defense that limited Stafford to just 17-of-39 passing for 266 yards, two INTs and a 54.0 rating (a season-low through 10 games).

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Made the start at RCB as the No. 2 CB in the team's base defense...Finished with three tackles (all solo) and a team-high three passes defended.

### **85 Greg Jennings, WR, 7th Year, Western Michigan**

**2012 Season:** Standout big-play threat who ranks in the top 10 in franchise history in receptions (7th, 401), receiving yards (8th, 6,249) and touchdown catches (t-5th-50)...Suffered a groin injury in the season opener vs. San Francisco and then re-aggravated the injury in Week 4 vs. New Orleans causing him to be shut down for the subsequent six weeks... For the season, has made 12 catches for 78 yards (6.5 avg.) and a TD.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Finished with five catches for 34 yards (6.8 avg.).

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Missed the practice week following a groin injury suffered in the fourth quarter of the season opener vs. San Francisco...Was challenged by the short turnaround for the Thursday night game was listed as a gameday inactive.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Returned to the lineup and got the start, finishing with a team-high six catches for 35 yards (5.8 avg.).

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played in the game in the first half, making one catch, a 9-yard TD that put the Packers ahead 14-7 (following PAT) early in the second quarter...Aggravated his groin injury later in the quarter and did not return for the second half...TD was the 50th of his career, moving him past Lofton and into a tie for No. 5 in team history with Max McGee.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Was ruled out of the game early in the week after being shut down by the coaching and training staffs, in an attempt to allow him to fully rehabilitate the nagging groin injury.

►**at Houston Texans (10/14) - at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Inactive.

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Returned to action during the practice week on a limited basis, but remained inactive for the game.

- His total of 1,265 receiving yards in 2010 was the 12th highest in club history...Is now also tied for fourth in franchise annals with 22 100-yard receiving games.

- Of his 50 career TD catches, 18 have been at least 40 yards in length.

### **43 M.D. Jennings, S, 2nd Year, Arkansas State**

**2012 Season:** Young defender who has taken on an increased role from scrimmage following an injury to veteran S Charles Woodson (collarbone)...Has appeared in all 11 games with five starts and made 30 tackles (26 solo), an interception that he returned for a TD and five passes defended...Has also added six tackles on special teams, the third-highest total on the club.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on both defense and

special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Appeared in the game on both defense and special teams, but did not record any statistics...Was at the center of the controversial play that decided the game in Seattle's favor when he jumped to intercept a ball in the end zone as time expired...Despite what was ultimately determined to be simultaneous possession, an official review determined that the ball changed hands and was in fact wrestled away by WR Golden Tate, giving the Seahawks a 14-12 victory (following PAT).

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Appeared in the game on defense and special teams in the first half, but suffered a shoulder injury and did not return... Was credited with two solo tackles on defense before leaving the game.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Played on special teams and also briefly on defense...Tallied a tackle in punt coverage, his first special teams stop of the season.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14)**: Saw action on both defense and special teams, seeing 28 plays on defense and making a career-high eight tackles (all solo)...Made an impressive solo stop in the fourth quarter on a crossing route by Pro Bowl WR Andre Johnson, trailing the receiver across the field and closing on him after only a 2-yard gain...Also added a tackle in kickoff coverage.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)**: Received his first career start and appeared on 27 defensive plays, finishing with three solo tackles...Was a key part of the well-executed surprise onside kick the Packers called late in the first quarter...On the play, teamed with CB Jarrett Bush to hit Rams CB Trumaine Johnson as he leapt to receive the ball, jarring it loose and allowing LB Jamari Lattimore to make the recovery...Also later added a tackle on the kickoff coverage team.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28)**: Started at FS as Morgan Burnett moved over to SS in the absence of injured veteran Charles Woodson (collarbone) who was inactive for the game...Saw action on a career-high 65 plays and finished with seven tackles (six solo) and two passes defended...Continued to contribute extensively on special teams where he also posted a coverage tackle.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Once again started at FS and appeared on 57 plays, finishing with three tackles (one solo) and two passes defended.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Made the most impactful play of his young career when he returned an INT 72 yards for a TD in the third quarter against the division rival...INT was the first of his career and came when he was trailing TE Tony Scheffler on a deep crossing pattern...QB Matthew Stafford's throw was behind Scheffler, who reached back to catch it, but instead bobbled it into the air where it was secured by Jennings...He side-stepped a tackle attempt by T Riley Reiff near the sideline early in the return and went untouched the rest of the way before being tackled into the end zone by WR Titus Young...The TD gave Green Bay a 14-10 lead and was the longest INT return for a TD by a Packer since S Aaron Rouse's 99-yarder vs. Indianapolis, Oct. 19, 2008...For the game, finished with two tackles (both solo) and two passes defended.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Started at FS, and appeared on 45 defensive plays, finishing with five tackles (four solo).

### 59 Brad Jones, LB, 4th Year, Colorado

**2012 Season:** One of the team's leading special teams players who has moved into the starting lineup in the middle of the Packers' defense following season-ending injuries to LBs Desmond Bishop (hamstring) and D.J. Smith (knee)...Has appeared in all 11 games with five starts and recorded 45 tackles (28 solo), a sack and a forced fumble...Also had two tackles on special teams prior to being elevated to the starting lineup.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Appeared in the game on special teams...Did not record any statistics, but made a key block on a fourth-quarter punt return that allowed WR Randall Cobb to turn the corner and race down the sideline for a 75-yard TD.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Played on special teams but did not record any statistics.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Appeared in the game on special teams, and was credited with a tackle in kickoff coverage.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Played in the game on special teams, and although he did not record any statistics, he led the charge in helping to contain dangerous return man Darren Sproles to just one punt return for 4 yards and three kickoff returns for 91 yards (30.3 avg.).

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Played on special teams and finished with a tackle on the punt coverage unit, helping to limit the Colts to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.) on seven punts.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14)**: Came on in relief of an injured Smith who suffered a knee injury in the second quarter and did not return...Wound up playing 17 plays on defense and finished with two solo tackles...One of his tackles was for loss as he sliced between C and LG and dropped RB Arian Foster for a 1-yard loss just before halftime.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)**: Started his first game of the season and his first career game at ILB (had previously made 13 at OLB)...Opened at the 'Mack' LB position and appeared on 60 plays, finishing with eight tackles (two solo).

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28)**: Had an especially productive day in his second start, leading the defense with 12 tackles (nine solo), a sack and a forced fumble...Had his first sack of the season come on the Jaguars first drive of the game when he joined fellow ILB A.J. Hawk on a blitz and came free inside to drop QB Blaine Gabbert for an 8-yard loss...Later in the first half, disengaged from a block by G Uche Nwaneri and came back to knock the ball loose from RB Rashad Jennings on a short gain...The fumble was recovered by S Morgan Burnett, the defense's first fumble recovery of the season and the first forced fumble of his career.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Finished with a team-high nine tackles (six solo) and a pass defended...Broke up a third-down pass from QB John Skelton to WR Larry Fitzgerald, pushing the WR out of bounds and preventing him from maintaining possession, forcing a punt.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Started and posted six tackles (three solo, one for loss)...Tackle for loss came on a second down play in the fourth quarter with the Lions threatening inside the Green Bay 10-yard line...Shot between C and LG and met RB Mikel Leshoure in the backfield for a 2-yard loss...The ensuing third down fell incomplete and Detroit was forced into a FG attempt.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Appeared on all 65 defensive plays, finishing with eight tackles (six solo, one for loss).

### 89 James Jones, WR, 6th Year, San Jose State

**2012 Season:** Veteran WR who has taken advantage of injuries and increased opportunities to have his most productive start to a season to this point in his career...Has 42 catches for 495 yards (11.8 avg.) and has already set a new career high with eight TDs (tied for No. 3 in the NFL)... By catching two TDs in each game between Weeks 4-6, he became just the second player in team history to do so in three straight games, joining Don Hutson (1943).

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Started the game as part of a three-WR set and finished with four catches for a game-high 81 yards (20.3 avg.) and a TD...Scored on a 10-yard TD pass from QB Aaron Rodgers with 6:05 remaining to pull the Packers to within one score at 30-22.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Finished the game with two receptions for -1 yards (-0.5 avg.).

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Placed second on the team with both five catches and 55 yards (11.0 avg.)...Three of his five grabs moved the chains on key third downs.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Started and posted the second multi-TD game of his career (also vs. Chicago, Dec. 25, 2011), finishing with five catches for 56 yards (11.2 avg.) and two scores during the game...First TD came in the first quarter on a second reaction that saw Rodgers roll to his left and fire a pass for TE Jermichael Finley in the end zone that Jones stepped in front of and plucked for a 12-yard TD to open the game's scoring...Second TD came in the second quarter when he beat CB Jabari Greer to the inside and hauled in a 14-yard TD from Rodgers to put Green Bay ahead 21-7 (following PAT)...Later sealed the game with an excellent catch on a critical third-and-3 with under two minutes remaining...On the play, caught a stop-fade from Rodgers - despite a pass interference on Greer - allowing the Packers to run out the remaining time and secure a 28-27 win.



► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Finished with his second multi-TD outing in as many weeks, tying for a team-high four catches for 46 yards (11.5 avg.) and two TDs against the Colts...First TD came on a third down from the Indianapolis 6-yard line when he caught a short pass from Rodgers and battled his way to the pylon to extend the Green Bay lead to 14-0 in the second quarter...Later helped reclaim the lead for the Packers when he caught a bullet from Rodgers between defenders in the end zone for an 8-yard score that put the team in front 27-22...With the catch, became the second Packer in as many years to post back-to-back multi-TD games, joining Jordy Nelson (Weeks 10-11, 16-17, 2011), and has now scored five or more TDs in four consecutive seasons.

► **at Houston Texans (10/14):** Totaled three catches for 33 yards (11.0 avg.) and two TDs, joining Hutson (1943) as the only other player in franchise history to post three consecutive multi-TD games in a season... Also became the first Packer to post seven or more TD receptions in the season's first six games since Billy Howton had eight in 1956...First TD came late in the first quarter when he dragged across the field in front of S Danieal Manning, diving to make the 6-yard catch in the end zone to give Green Bay a 14-0 lead...Second TD was an exceptional catch in the fourth quarter that extended the Packers lead to 42-17, effectively putting the game away...On the play, released to the outside in single coverage against CB Kareem Jackson along the right sideline...Dove in the end zone to make a full-extension catch of a Rodgers throw, securing the ball as he went to the ground for his seventh TD of the still young season...Also drew a 28-yard defensive pass interference penalty on Jackson in the second quarter that set up a TD pass from Rodgers to WR Jordy Nelson on the following play.

► **at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Started and posted six catches for 53 yards (8.8 avg), with a long of 17...Had three of his catches for 32 yards (10.7 avg.) on the team's second-half opening drive that spanned 80 yards in 12 plays, took 6:56 off the clock and culminated with a Rodgers 5-yard TD pass to WR Randall Cobb.

► **vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Once again got the start and led the offense with a team-high seven catches and 78 yards (11.1 avg.)...Appeared on a season-high 66 plays in the absence of WR Greg Jennings (groin) and WR Jordy Nelson (hamstring), who were both deactivated for the game...Drew a pair of second-half penalties against CB William Middleton, the first of which was an unnecessary roughness late hit after an 11-yard catch in the third quarter...Later drew a defensive pass interference flag on the DB on a third-and-7 play that extended a Green Bay drive that resulted in a 25-yard FG by K Mason Crosby that effectively sealed the game, 24-15.

► **vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Led the team in receiving with four catches for 61 yards (15.3 avg.), including his career-high eighth TD grab of the season in the second quarter...On the play, beat CB Jamell Fleming down the left sideline, going up over the defender to haul in the pass from Rodgers, a 28-yard strike that extended the Green Bay lead to 21-7 just before halftime.

► **at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Had a quiet day by his 2012 standards, finishing with two catches for 33 yards (16.5 avg.).

► **at New York Giants (11/25):** Started at WR. but was held without a reception for the first time this season.

### **30 John Kuhn, FB, 7th Year, Shippensburg**

**2012 Season:** Reliable fullback and utility-man who does a little of everything in the Green Bay offense...Has played in 87 of 91 games (95 of 99 including playoffs) during his five-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons...Suffered a hamstring injury at St. Louis in Week 7, and landed on the inactive list vs. Jacksonville in Week 8 (also vs. Arizona in Week 9), the first game missed due to injury in his career...In 2012, has 16 carries for 55 yards (3.4 avg.) and a TD and has caught 11 passes for 119 yards (10.8 avg.).

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Carried the ball twice for 1 yard on offense (0.5 avg.) and had three receptions for 23 yards (7.7 avg.)...Also notched a tackle on special teams when he took down WR Devin Hester in the open field following a 7-yard punt return in the third quarter.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Played on both offense and special teams, collecting three catches for 25 yards (8.3 avg.), and also carrying once for 2 yards.

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Lone carry was a meaningful one as he took a direct snap from the punt protector position on a second-quarter fourth-and-1 play, burrowing forward for a 5-yard gain...Successful fake punt resulted in a first down and the offense would score a TD nine plays later to extend Green Bay's lead to 21-7 (following PAT)...Also had a productive blocking day in front of RB Cedric Benson, who ran for a season-high 84 yards on 18 carries (4.7 avg.)...Added a tackle in punt coverage.

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Had one catch for 6 yards and also carried twice for 9 yards (4.5 avg.), the first of which resulted in his first rushing TD of the season...Found the end zone on a 2-yard burst off of LG to open the scoring with 2:07 remaining in the first quarter.

► **at Houston Texans (10/14):** Carried twice for 6 yards (3.0 avg.), but was also helpful in protection against the Texans' varied pressure packages, helping QB Aaron Rodgers find time to complete 24-of-37 attempts for 338 yards and six TDs.

► **vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Missed the practice week after suffering a hamstring injury late in the second half at St. Louis...Was a gameday inactive for just the third time in his career, the first due to injury, snapping a streak of 46 consecutive games played (including playoffs).

► **vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Inactive.

► **at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Returned to action after missing the previous two games with a hamstring injury...Played on offense, carrying one time for minus 1 yard...Was credited with making a tackle of CB Jacob Lacey following a second-quarter Aaron Rodgers INT, limiting the return to just 10 yards.

► **at New York Giants (11/25):** Started at FB with the offense opening in a two-back formation and finished with four carries for 17 yards (4.3 avg.)...Also had three catches for 49 yards (16.3 avg.), highlighted by his career-long 32-yard catch-and-run in the second quarter.

### **70 T.J. Lang, G, 4th Year, Eastern Michigan**

**2012 Season:** Ascending member of the team's core who was signed to a contract extension during the 2012 preseason...Started each of the first nine games at LG before moving outside to RT following a season-ending hip injury to T Bryan Bulaga in Week 9.

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Opened the game at LG and was faced with the task of blocking standout DE Justin Smith for the balance of the game...Helped limit Smith to what was ultimately one tackle in the official game statistics and was part of a line that allowed QB Aaron Rodgers time to complete 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Started at LG...Contributed in his role on special teams where as a member of the placement protection unit, he helped block for a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree on a successfully executed fake FG...On the play, teamed with G Josh Sitton to combination-block DT Henry Melton, before releasing to the next level and leading the way for Crabtree to get into the open and race into the end zone.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Part of a protection unit that recovered from a difficult first half to help put together three second-half scoring drives without allowing a sack over the final two quarters.

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played a key role in an impressive bounce-back performance by the offensive line that saw the team produce 421 yards of offense and four TD drives during the game...Also kept Rodgers upright to complete 31-of-41 passes for 319 yards and four TD passes, without being sacked during the game...Offense produced 30 first downs, the most by the team since they had 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989.

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Started at LG during what was an up-and-down offensive effort...Helped the offense produce 179 yards and three TD drives in the first half...Released cleanly from the line and made a good open-

field block on LB Jerrell Freeman on an 18-yard screen pass to RB Cedric Benson that set up the Packers first TD in the opening quarter...Also helped engage DT Drake Nevis to the inside on a run play in the fourth quarter that resulted in RB Alex Green's 41-yard carry, the team's longest of the season through five games.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Part of a proficient offensive outing that included 427 yards of offense and six TD drives on the road against a previously undefeated opponent...Helped protect Rodgers to the tune of 24-of-37 for 338 yards and a franchise-record-tying six TD passes, while only being sacked twice...Rodgers became just the fourth QB in league history to eclipse the 330-yard mark and throw six TDs with no INTs in the same game.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Helped protect Rodgers to the tune of 30-of-37 passing for 342 yards and three TDs on what was another prolific passing day for the offense...The offensive line righted itself early in the game and did not surrender a sack in the final three quarters, during which time Rodgers completed 17-of-22 for 177 yards and two TDs, leading four scoring drives (two TD, two FG).

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Started at LG...Part of the protection unit on each of Rodgers' two TD passes, the second of which moved him past Bart Starr for the second most in franchise history (153).

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Opened the game at his customary LG spot but shifted out to RT after regular starter Bulaga suffered a hip injury in the second quarter and did not return...Played the remainder of the game at RT and helped block for an offense that accumulated 384 yards and produced five scoring drives (four TDs, one FG)...Allowed Rodgers to complete 14-of-30 for 218 yards and four TD passes, while only being sacked once during the game...Also part of a run-blocking unit that pounded out 176 yards on 39 attempts (4.5 avg.), the most rushing yards by the Packers in more than three years (Oct. 25, 2009 at Cleveland).

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Started at RT for the first time since Week 16 of 2011, just the fifth start of his career at either tackle position...Helped maintain control of a talented Detroit front, holding the group to just three sacks during the game, while allowing Rodgers to complete 19-of-27 for 236 yards and two TDs, a 106.4 QB rating...The rating was his ninth consecutive of over 100 (including playoffs) in indoor games.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Started at RT for the second consecutive week.

## 57 Jamari Lattimore, LB, 2nd Year, Middle Tennessee State

**2012 Season:** A core special teams player and reserve defender who may compete for playing time at an ILB position that has been hit with injuries this season...Has played in nine games, and has recorded four tackles and a recovered onside kick on special teams.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Listed as a gameday inactive due to an ankle injury suffered late in the preseason that limited him in practice during the week leading up to the game.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Made his season debut on special teams but did not record any statistics.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Inactive.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30) - at Houston Texans (10/14):** Returned to the lineup, appearing on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Appeared on special teams and was part of another impactful play as a member of the punt return unit that blocked a second quarter attempt by P Bryan Anger and saw LB Dezman Moses fall on it for a TD...Teamed with LB Robert Francois to occupy blockers on their rush off the left edge, freeing up CB Davon House to make the clean block of Anger's kick...Almost recovered it himself, but had the ball elude his grasp as he tried to pick it up near the end zone.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Played on special teams and also saw eight snaps on defense, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Led the team with a career-high three coverage tackles, making two on the kickoff team and one on a punt return.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

## 56 Terrell Manning, LB, Rookie, North Carolina State

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Was again active and played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Played on special teams and recorded a tackle on kickoff coverage...Suffered a shoulder injury late in the game and did not return.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Inactive (shoulder).

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Inactive.

## 8 Tim Masthay, P, 3rd Year, Kentucky

**2012 Season:** Established specialist whose marked consistency and improvement was rewarded with a contract extension during the 2012 training camp...For the season, has punted 52 times for 2,289 yards (44.0 avg., 40.0 net), landing 26 inside the 20-yard line (No. 3 in the NFL), while also having just four touchbacks...Also was credited with his first career TD pass after shoveling the ball to TE Tom Crabtree on a fake FG play in Week 2 that resulted in a 27-yard TD.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Opened the season with a difference-making performance against the 49ers...Punted six times for 289 yards (48.6 avg., 41.5 net), landing four of them inside the 20-yard line and three of them inside the 10...Limited San Francisco to just one return and left them with an average starting position at their own 16-yard line following his six attempts.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Followed up his solid opener with another memorable performance...Punted five times for 238 yards (47.6 avg., 42.0 net), landing three inside the 20-yard line and limiting WR Devin Hester to just 8 yards on two returns (4.0 avg.)...Highlight play of his night came from his role as the team's holder for placements...Flipped a shovel pass to TE Tom Crabtree on a fake FG attempt late in the second quarter that went for a 27-yard TD to convert a fourth-and-26...Was credited with his first career TD pass, becoming the first Green Bay punter to throw one since Ron Widby threw a 68-yarder to WR Dave Davis at Houston on Nov. 19, 1972.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Punted six times for 267 yards (44.5 avg, 43.7 net), downing three of his kicks inside the 20-yard line, including one at the Seattle 1 late in the second quarter.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Was limited to just two punts for 82 yards (41.0 avg., 39.0 net), limiting the dangerous returner RB Darren Sproles to just one return for 4 yards and placing his other attempt out of bounds at the New Orleans 9-yard line.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Delivered another consistent performance, punting seven times for 316 yards (45.1 avg., 43.3 net), with a long of 58 against his initial NFL team...Landed four inside the 20-yard line for the second time in 2012, and limited the Colts to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.)...Marked the sixth time in his career that he has landed four-plus kicks inside the 20.

► **at Houston Texans (10/14):** Punted four times for 171 yards (42.8 avg., 30.4 net), landing three of those inside the 20...Had his numbers skewed by a fourth-quarter blocked punt that came as the result of a missed blocking assignment up front...The ball was recovered in the end zone for a Houston TD, the first block he's surrendered in his career.

► **at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Punted three times for 116 yards (38.7 avg., 38.7 net), landing two inside the 20 and not allowing a return...Also held for all four of Crosby's FG attempts, including the three makes, a season high through Week 7.

► **vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Punted five times for 225 yards (45.0 avg., 41.0 net), landing one inside the 20 and also having a touchback... Attempted his second pass of the season on another fake FG play, this time an audible was called pre-snap and he lined up in the shotgun behind center with Crosby motioning out wide...Rolled to his left and attempted to throw back deep to the right side for TE D.J. Williams, but the pass fell incomplete.

► **vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Finished with six punts for 255 yards (42.5 avg., 36.0 net), landing three inside the 20-yard line...Contributed to a field position battle that the Packers won by 263 yards (579-316)...Saw his final punt later in the fourth quarter muffed by CB Patrick Peterson at the Arizona 10-yard line and it was recovered by CB Jarrett Bush at the 2... Already holding a 14-point lead, the Packers kneeled on the ball three times to run out the remaining clock.

► **at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Punted four times for 176 yards (44.0 avg., 44.0 net), landing two inside the 20-yard line and holding prolific returner WR Stefan Logan without a return...One of his kicks was again downed by Bush at the Detroit 2-yard line and another was fair caught by Logan at the 8.

► **at New York Giants (11/25):** Punted four times for 154 yards (38.5 avg., 38.5 net), holding the Giants without a return.

## 52 Clay Matthews, LB, 4th Year, Southern California

**2012 Season:** All-Pro defender who is in the conversation among the leading defensive player of the year candidates at the season's midpoint... Enjoyed the healthiest training camp and preseason of his career, participating in every practice and starting each of the team's four exhibition games...Returned to the ROLB position in 2012 after spending the 2010-11 seasons at LOLB...Started each of the first nine games while rarely leaving the field and has posted 40 tackles (26 solo), a team-leading nine sacks (tied for the second most in the NFL), a forced fumble and three passes defended...Suffered a hamstring injury in Week 9 vs. Arizona that landed him on the gameday inactive list following the team's bye in Week 11 at Detroit, just the second game of his career missed due to injury (vs. Miami, Week 6, 2010).

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made a welcomed return to the ROLB position he last played in 2009, finishing the season opener with four tackles (three solo) and 2½ sacks...Beat LT Joe Staley twice for sacks of QB Alex Smith during the game, the seventh multi-sack outing of his career and his most in a game since the three he had vs. Buffalo on Sept. 19, 2010.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Had one of the most dominant outings of his career, finishing with seven tackles (six solo) and a career-high 3½ sacks and a pass defended against the rival Bears...Combined with his efforts in Week 1, the six sacks matched his personal best for the most sacks in a two-game span in his career (also had six in Weeks 1-2 of 2010)...The 3½ sacks were the most in a game by a Green Bay defender since DE Kaber Gbaja-Biamila had four at Chicago on Jan. 2, 2005, and the yardage total (29) was the second-highest of his career and helped result in a net passing total of 74 yards...Contributions led a defense that limited the Bears to just 168 total yards during the game, the fewest surrendered by the Packers in the rivalry game since Nov. 30, 1975.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Had an active game, finishing with six tackles (four solo)...Played the role of a spy on QB Russell Wilson at various times, including a third-down play in the fourth quarter where he pressured the rookie QB into a throw-away that led to a punt...Also drew a hold on LT Russell Okung on another drive in the fourth quarter.

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished with seven tackles (five solo) and a sack...Started the game with a bang, chasing down a handoff to RB Pierre

Thomas on third-and-1 on the Saints' first possession, stopping the RB for no gain to force a punt...The ensuing possession led to Green Bay's first TD of the game...Lined up in various positions during the game and surged through the middle of the line of scrimmage in the third quarter to drop QB Drew Brees for a 10-yard loss, his seventh sack of the season...The sack gave him 36½ for his career, moving him past Tony Bennett and into the No. 6 spot in franchise history in his fourth season.

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Appeared on an exhausting 96 plays, finishing with three tackles (two solo), a sack that included a forced fumble and five QB hits...Sack came in the second quarter when he beat LT Anthony Costanzo around the edge and hit QB Andrew Luck before he released the ball, forcing a fumble that caromed all the way out of bounds, resulting in a third-and-12 and a subsequent punt...Later ran a stunt with DE Mike Neal, tying up both LG Jeff Linkenbach and Costanzo, allowing Neal to turn the corner on the outside to drop Luck for a 9-yard loss.

► **at Houston Texans (10/14):** Did not trigger the sack column but was a menace in the run game and was a key part of a front that limited Pro Bowl RB Arian Foster to a career-low 1.7-yard average (min. 15 att.) on 17 carries for 29 yards...Had back-to-back plays to thwart a drive in the first quarter, first beating LT Duane Brown to trip up Foster for a 1-yard loss in the backfield and then exploding between C and LG to force QB Matt Schaub into a throwaway on third down that forced a punt.

► **at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Finished with four tackles (two solo), a sack and a pass defended...Sack was his ninth of the season and came in the third quarter when he used an outside rush to fight past LT Joe Barksdale to chase down a rolling QB Sam Bradford, dropping him for a 9-yard loss.

► **vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Posted four tackles (all solo), including one for loss while also netting three QB hits and a pass defended...Drew a holding call on LT Eugene Monroe in the first quarter that forced and third-and-18...Later shed TE Marcedes Lewis on a toss play to his side and buried RB Rashad Jennings for a 2-yard loss.

► **vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Started the game and appeared on 35 plays before suffering a hamstring injury in the third quarter...Fell awkwardly while wrapping up QB John Skelton and limped off following the play and did not return.

## 22 Jerron McMillian, S, Rookie, Maine

**2012 Season:** Rookie defender who plays regularly on special teams and also rotates both at safety and other positions as a member of the sub-defenses...Has appeared in all 11 games and tallied 23 tackles (17 solo), an INT, a fumble recovery and 11 passes defended.

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut, appearing on both defense and special teams in the season opener...Finished with one solo tackle on defense.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Saw his role increase significantly after becoming the No. 1 SS in the nickel defense when veteran DB Charles Woodson moved down into the slot CB...Appeared on 44 plays and finished with three tackles (one solo), two passes defended and the first INT of his career in the fourth quarter.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Played extensively as the SS in the team's nickel and dime subpackages, finishing with two solo tackles and a pass defended...Broke up a third-down pass from QB Russell Wilson intended for WR Ben Obamanu in the first quarter to force a punt...Also had what appeared to be his second INT in as many weeks negated by a roughing-the-passer penalty in the fourth quarter.

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Again saw extended action with the defense employing several DB-heavy personnel groupings to match New Orleans' spread attack...Finished with three tackles (one solo).

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Saw action on 81 plays and finished with an assisted tackle and a pass defended.

► **at Houston Texans (10/14):** Appeared on 26 plays on defense and finished with two solo tackles and a pass defended...Pass defended came late in

## 54 Dezman Moses, LB, Rookie, Tulane

**2012 Season:** One of four non-drafted free agent rookies to make the opening-day roster in 2012, following an offseason program and training camp that saw him make the transition from collegiate DE to a stand-up OLB at the pro level...Was pressed into starting duty following a season-ending wrist injury to LB Nick Perry and a hamstring injury that sidelined LB Clay Matthews in Week 11...Has played in each of the 11 games, with two starts and has posted 24 tackles (eight solo), three sacks and a forced fumble...Also has five stops on the various coverage units and scored his first career TD, recovering a blocked punt in the end zone vs. Jacksonville in Week 8, becoming the first Packer to score on a blocked punt since S Tiger Greene on Dec. 2, 1990.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut on special teams and appeared briefly on defense, where he was credited with one assisted tackle.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Appeared on 18 defensive plays as part of various sub-packages and finished with one assisted tackle...Was also credited with a QB hit and a pressure by the coaching staff.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game on defense and special teams, and tied for the team lead with two coverage tackles, both coming in punt coverage.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played on both defense and special teams, and was credited with one tackle on the coverage units...Tackle came on a controversial fourth-quarter kickoff return by RB Darren Sproles...It appeared Moses jarred the ball loose and recovered the fumble on the play, but the ruling on the field was that the runner was down and the Saints retained possession.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Saw five plays on defense and finished with an assisted tackle...Also played on special teams but did not record any statistics.

►**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Appeared on 16 defensive plays, finishing with an assisted tackle...Was also credited with a tackle on the kickoff coverage team.

►**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Saw his role increased significantly when Matthews suffered a hamstring injury in the third quarter and did not return...Replaced Matthews for the duration of the game and finished having appeared on 42 plays, collecting four assisted tackles and two QB hits...Also recorded a stop on special teams.

►**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Started in place of the injured Matthews at ROLB and appeared on a season-high 56 plays...Finished with three tackles (one solo), four QB hits, a sack and the first forced fumble of his career...Was credited with his second sack of the season for a play that came just before halftime...On the play, he abandoned an upfield rush as QB Matthew Stafford stepped up in the pocket to scramble...Slapped the ball from the QB's low carriage, forcing a fumble that was recovered by DE Mike Daniels and ultimately resulted in a FG for Green Bay on the last play of the half...Also drew a holding call on T Riley Reiff in the fourth quarter on a play that saw him still manage to fight off the block and drop RB Mikel Leshoure for a 2-yard loss.

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Once again started in place of the injured Matthews, appearing on all 65 defensive plays...Recorded a team-leading 11 tackles (six solo), including the defense's lone sack, a 6-yard takedown of QB Eli Manning in the second quarter...Also registered the first pass defended of his career when he leaped to bat a Manning pass at the line of scrimmage on a fourth-down play in the second half to force a turnover on downs.

## 96 Mike Neal, DE, 3rd Year, Purdue

**2012 Season:** Powerful, athletic defensive end and inside pass rusher who figures prominently up front in the team's sub defenses...Missed the first four regular-season games while serving a suspension for violation of the league's performance-enhancing drug policy...Since coming off of the suspension, has appeared in seven games, posting nine tackles (six solo) and two sacks.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Made his awaited 2012 debut in his home state after going through a week of practice and being activated the day before the game...Flashed the play-making ability that made him a promising prospect when healthy his rookie season, appearing on 32 plays and recording a sack and three QB hits during the game...The sack came on a stunt with LB Clay Matthews in the second quarter, when he went around the outside and corraled QB Andrew Luck for a 9-yard loss, moving Indianapolis from Green Bay's 26-yard line back to the 35 where an ultimate 53-yard FG attempt was unsuccessful...Sack was the second of his career and first since Oct. 10, 2010 at Washington.

►**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Saw action on 28 plays, helping to fill the void in the absence of NT B.J. Raji, who was sidelined with an ankle injury...Finished with three tackles (two solo) and a QB hit.

►**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Appeared on nine defensive plays, finishing with a solo tackle...Suffered a knee injury in the first quarter, but later returned to the game after halftime.

►**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Played 25 defensive snaps and tallied an assisted tackle...Suffered an ankle injury in the second half and did not return.

►**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Substituted on 24 defensive plays and finished with two solo tackles, including his second sack of the season...Sack came on a third down on the Cardinals' opening possession when he fought past G Daryn Colledge and dropped QB John Skelton for a 10-yard loss...Second tackle came on a third down in the fourth quarter when he stuffed RB Larod Stephens-Howling for a 2-yard loss to force an eventual turnover on downs.

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Saw time on 14 plays for the second consecutive week and was credited with a pressure.

## **87 Jordy Nelson, WR, 5th Year, Kansas State**

**2012 Season:** Fifth-year wideout who remains at the forefront of the team's arsenal in 2012 after posting career highs in every receiving category (catching 68 passes for 1,263 yards and 15 TDs) in 2011...For the season, has played in 10 games with eight starts...Suffered a hamstring injury in practice prior the Week 8 game vs. Jacksonville and was listed as an inactive...Returned to action vs. Arizona in Week 9 and suffered an ankle injury in the first half and did not return...Has recorded 45 catches for a team-leading 648 yards (14.4 avg.) and six TDs.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started and finished with five catches for 64 yards (12.8 avg.)...Was also on the receiving end of a two-point conversion pass from QB Aaron Rodgers in the fourth quarter to pull Green Bay to within eight points at 23-15.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Led the team with both six catches and 84 yards (14.0 avg.) during the game.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Finished with two catches for 19 yards (9.5 avg.).

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Rediscovered the chemistry with Rodgers that made the duo so prolific in 2011, leading the team with both his season-high eight catches and 93 yards receiving (11.6 avg), along with his first TD of the young season...TD came in the fourth quarter when he beat a jam from CB Patrick Robinson at the line, catching a slant from Rodgers and fighting his way past both Robinson and CB Corey White to get into the end zone.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Recorded two catches for 29 yards (14.5 avg.).

►at **Houston Texans (10/14):** Had a near-dominant performance in primetime, equaling his career highs with nine catches and three TDs, and posting a game-high 121 yards (13.4 avg.)...Marked his second three-TD outing over the past seven games (also vs. Detroit, 1/1/12), becoming the first NFL player to accomplish the feat since WR Santana Moss in 2005-06 with Washington and the first Packer to do so since WR Sterling Sharpe in 1994...First TD opened the game's scoring on the Packers first drive when he beat CB Johnathan Joseph down the right sideline for a 41-yard score... Scored again on a first-and-10 from the Texans' 21-yard line when he was matched in single coverage against DB Alan Ball, first faking to the outside before turning into the post where he caught a dart from Rodgers just inside the goal line, absorbing a hit from Ball to finish the play...Final TD capped a 16-play, 80-yard drive by the Packers to open the second half...Ran a corner route from the right slot against S Glover Quin, wrestling the ball into his body to give Green Bay a 28-10 lead midway through the third quarter.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Led the team in receiving for the second consecutive week, finishing the game with eight catches for a season-high 122 yards (15.3 avg.) and a TD...Saw his season-long catch come in the first quarter on what was a defensive-offside free play, when he beat CB Janoris Jenkins on a go-route down the right sideline for 52 yards... Finished the drive two plays later by hauling in a back-shoulder fade from Rodgers for a 3-yard TD, putting the Packers ahead 7-3...Five of his eight catches converted third downs as Rodgers continued to look his way to keep the chains moving during the game.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Suffered a hamstring injury during the practice week and was listed as a gameday inactive...Marked the first regular-season game he'd missed since Week 9 of 2009 (knee), seeing his consecutive games played streak (including playoffs) snapped at 53.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Returned to action and started the game...Went to the ground to catch a pass on a red-zone play on the offense's second drive of the first quarter and got his foot caught awkwardly underneath him...Suffered an ankle injury on the play and did not return.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18):** Participated during the practice week following the team's Week 10 bye and was active on gameday, starting at WR and finishing with three catches for 45 yards (15.0 avg.)...Also made a key block along the sideline on TE Jermichael Finley's 40-yard catch-and-run late in the fourth quarter...Pushed CB Chris Houston into S Ricardo Silva, effectively wiping out two players and freeing Finley down the sideline for a play that kick-started the team's game-winning TD drive.

►at **New York Giants (11/25):** Had one of the team's lone highlights in an otherwise forgettable game, scoring on a 61-yard TD pass from Rodgers

on the offense's fourth play from scrimmage in the first quarter...On the play, beat CB Corey Webster on a stop-and-go double-move down the right sideline to tie the score at 7-7 in the game's early going...Finished with two catches for a team-high 71 yards (35.5 avg.).

## **74 Marshall Newhouse, T, 3rd Year, Texas Christian**

**2012 Season:** Second-year starter who has settled in at LT and opened each of the first 11 games at the key position protecting QB Aaron Rodgers' blind side.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Opened the season as a starter for the first time in his career and afforded himself well at LT against a formidable right side of the San Francisco front seven...Matched against the standout LB/DE tandem of Aldon Smith and Justin Smith for much of the game, helping to limit the duo to four tackles and a sack (that came on a rollout outside the pocket) on 61 offensive plays.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Started and appeared on all 68 plays at LT...Also saw six snaps as part of the placement protection unit including the team's second-quarter fake FG attempt that resulted in a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree...On the play, went low off the snap and provided obstruction to both DE Julius Peppers and DE Corey Wootton, who were both unable to get to Crabtree as he crossed the formation to catch the shovel pass.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Overcame what was a rocky start for the offense with a bounce-back effort in the second half...Part of a line that helped produce three scoring drives after halftime and did not allow a sack over the final two quarters.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Fared well in protection despite drawing the assignment of talented RDE Will Smith for the majority of the game...Part of a protection unit that did not allow a sack during the game and allowed Rodgers to complete 31-of-41 for 319 yards and four TDs...Offense accounted for 421 total yards and 30 first downs, the most by the Packers since 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Part of an uneven performance by the offense that produced three TD drives in the first half, but stagnated after halftime and didn't score again until there was 4:30 remaining in the fourth quarter...Made a good block at the line of scrimmage on OLB Dwight Freeney on RB Alex Green's 41-yard run in the fourth quarter, helping to create the wide lane used by Green to emerge into the second level.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14):** Part of an offense that turned in its best performance of the season to date, netting 427 total yards and six TD drives against what was the NFL's No. 3-ranked defense entering the game... Helped create consistent time for Rodgers to complete 24-of-37 attempts for 338 yards and a career-high and franchise-record-tying six TD passes, while only being sacked twice by the Texans' formidable pass rush...Yardage total was the most surrendered by Houston since Week 3 of 2011 and a high for the Packers through six games...Drew a critical personal foul penalty against S Danieal Manning in the third quarter following a third down play...Manning was seen punching his facemask at the bottom of a pile and the flag resulted in an automatic first down at the Houston 2-yard line...Green Bay would score a TD two plays later to extend its lead to 28-10 (following PAT).

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Spent much of the game matched against emerging DE Robert Quinn...Got off to a rocky start, but ultimately limited Quinn to just one tackle (a 4-yard sack) during the game...Overall, helped allow time for Rodgers to complete 30-of-37 attempts for 342 yards and three TDs, as the offense produced six scoring drives (three TDs, three FGs).

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Started at LT on what was another challenging day for the offense...Both TD drives culminated with Rodgers passes, the second of which moved him past Bart Starr for the second most in franchise history (153).

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Part of an OL that overcame an injury to RT Bryan Bulaga to still have a prolific outing against a Cardinals defense that ranked No. 6 in the NFL in yards allowed entering the game...Offense racked up 384 yards and produced five scoring drives (four TDs, one FG), led by Rodgers, who threw four TD passes and was only sacked once on the afternoon...Also helped support a ground game that totaled 176 yards on 39 rushing attempts (4.5 avg.), the most by the Packers since Oct. 25,

2009, at Cleveland.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Started at LT and helped attempt to control a deep and talented Detroit front...Part of an offense that put together an impressive two-minute drive near the end of regulation that saw them span 82 yards in six plays, capping it with a 22-yard TD pass from Rodgers to WR Randall Cobb...On the play, teamed with newly inserted LG Evan Dietrich-Smith to pick up a line stunt by DT Nick Fairley and DE Willie Young...Pushed Young past Rodgers, giving him enough time to complete the throw and give Green Bay its the lead, 21-20.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Started at LT.

### **53 Nick Perry, LB, Rookie, Southern California**

**2012 Season:** Physically impressive rookie defender who made immediate contributions early in the season before suffering knee and wrist injuries, the latter of which ended his season...Drafted by the Packers with the No. 28 overall selection in the first round and was in the process of making the difficult transition from collegiate DE to professional OLB when his season was cut short and he was placed on injured reserve, Nov. 7...Appeared in the first six games, making five starts and collecting 29 tackles (18 solo) and two sacks...Suffered the wrist injury in Week 2 vs. Chicago and played through it before further evaluation dictated surgery...Also suffered a knee injury at Houston in Week 6 that held him out of action in Weeks 7-9 before the decision was made to shut him down because of the wrist.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut as the starter at LOLB, and finished tied for second on the defense with a season-high nine tackles (seven solo).

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Rotated with Erik Walden at LOLB, seeing action on 20 plays, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Started at LOLB and tallied eight tackles (two solo) and his first career sack...Sack came in the third quarter when he fought past RT Breno Giacomini and chased down QB Russell Wilson for a 19-yard loss...Forced a third-and-32 on a drive that ultimately ended with a punt.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Started and played as part of a rotation with Walden, netting four tackles (all solo).

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Started at LOLB and appeared on 10 plays, making a solo tackle...Suffered a knee injury early in the second quarter and did not return.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Missed the practice week due to the knee injury and was inactive on gameday.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Inactive (knee).

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Inactive.

### **79 Ryan Pickett, DT, 12th Year, Ohio State**

**2012 Season:** Productive, reliable pro who remains a steady contributor in this his 12th season...Has started each of the first 11 games up front and leads the team's defensive linemen with 48 tackles (14 solo).

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at LDE and finished with two assisted tackles.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Started and appeared on 30 plays, finishing with three assisted tackles...Part of a defensive effort that limited the Bears to just 168 total yards during the game, the fewest surrendered by the Packers in the rivalry game since Nov. 30, 1975.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Turned in an excellent performance, finishing with 10 tackles (four solo) and helping to spearhead a defense that allowed just 91 yards in the second half and only 238 total yards during the game.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Started at LDE and posted three assisted tackles...Suffered a shoulder injury that limited him during the game...Helped limit New Orleans to just 45 rushing yards on 19 carries (2.4 avg.).

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Appeared on 43 plays with the team mostly employing its sub-defenses and recorded five assisted tackles.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Started at NT in the absence of the injured B.J. ### **81 Andrew Quarless, TE, 3rd Year, Penn State**

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Did not participate in practice late in the week and was inactive on gameday.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Inactive.

### **90 B.J. Raji, DT, 4th Year, Boston College**

**2012 Season:** One of the top players in the league at his position, he continues to have a significant, if not always statistically glamorous impact up front for the Green Bay defense...Started each of the first five games before suffering an ankle injury at Indianapolis that caused him to miss the Houston contest, snapping a streak of 57 consecutive games played including playoffs (42 starts)...Returned for the Week 8 contest vs. Jacksonville...For the season, has appeared in nine games (all starts) and has 24 tackles (12 solo).

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started and posted two tackles (one solo).

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Led the defensive line by seeing time on 47 plays and finishing with five tackles (two solo, one for loss)...Marked his first five-tackle game since Week 7 of 2011.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Finished with six tackles (two solo), helping to key a run defense that limited standout RB Marshawn Lynch to a 3.9-yard average on 25 carries during the game.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Was credited with two tackles (one solo) and was part of a stingy run defense that limited the Saints to just 45 yards on 19 carries (2.4 avg.).

Suffered a hamstring injury in the final preseason game and was sidelined throughout the early portion of the regular season...Has now appeared in five regular-season games, mostly on special teams...Has four tackles on the various coverage units and also one solo tackle on defense.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Listed as a gameday inactive for the season opener.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13) - at Houston Texans (10/14)**: Inactive.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)**: Returned to practice during the week and made his NFL debut on special teams against the Rams, but did not record any statistics.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28)**: Once again played on special teams, making his first career coverage tackle as a member of the kickoff team.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Appeared on special teams and led the coverage units with two tackles, one each on both the kickoff and punt teams.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Saw the first scrimmage action of his career in the second half, coming on in place of M.D. Jennings, who was being treated for cramps...Appeared on 15 defensive plays and finished with one solo tackle...Also posted a tackle on the kickoff coverage unit.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Played on special teams.

## **12 Aaron Rodgers, QB, 8th Year, California**

**2012 Season:** Reigning league MVP who appears to have rounded into his exceptional form at the season's midpoint...For the season, has completed 252-of-379 attempts for 2,838 yards and 28 TDs against just seven INTs...He ranks No. 1 in the NFL passer rating (105.6) and his TD total is second...Was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance in Week 4 vs. New Orleans and again for his Week 6 outing at Houston, when he threw for 338 yards and a career-high and franchise-record-tying six TD passes...Was also the NFC Offensive Player of the Month for October...Threw his 150th career TD pass in Week 7 at St. Louis, eclipsing Dan Marino's NFL record for fewest INTs (69) at the 150-mark, having thrown just 42 in his eight-year career...His 22 TD passes between Weeks 4-9 set a new record for the most over a six-game span in franchise history...Also has 39 rushing attempts for 187 yards (4.8 avg.).

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Opened the season by completing 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs with one INT...Has now posted 300-yard games in back-to-back season openers and did so against a 49ers defense that allowed just four 300-yard passing games in all of 2011...Marked the 23rd 300-yard outing of his career and the 30th consecutive home game with a TD pass, a franchise record.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Completed 22-of-32 attempts for 219 yards and a TD to go along with one INT...Led four scoring drives (three FGs, one TD) and extended his team-record home-game TD pass streak to 31 games.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Finished the game 26-of-39 passing for 223 yards...Overcame a difficult first half that saw the pocket regularly collapsed by the Seahawks' front seven to the tune of eight sacks...

Rebounded in the second half to complete 13-of-24 for 137 yards with no sacks as he led three scoring drives (two FG, one TD) to give the Packers a 12-7 advantage late in the fourth quarter.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors after guiding the offense to its most prolific outing to this point in the young season, a 421-yard output that resulted in four TD drives and a 28-27 win...Completed 31-of-41 for 319 yards and four TD passes for a unit that produced 30 first downs, the most by the Packers since they had 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989...Threw TD passes to James Jones (2), Jordy Nelson and Greg Jennings, the last one an 11-yard bullet to Nelson on a slant to cap a 7-play, 57-yard drive to put Green Bay ahead for good...Drew a facemask penalty on S Malcolm Jenkins when the defender got his hand inside the QB's helmet on a third-quarter scramble, poking him in the eye...Forced him to miss the following play, a first-and-goal from the Saints' 2-yard line that saw backup QB Graham Harrell fumble a handoff exchange and give possession to New Orleans.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Finished what was an up-and-down day having completed 21-of-33 attempts for 243 yards and three TDs with one INT... Was also the team's leading rusher during the game, carrying five times for 57 yards (11.4 avg.), a regular-season career-high total on the ground...Started the game fast, leading the offense to the first of its three first-half TDs on the second possession of the first quarter...Threw TD passes to both Jones and WR Randall Cobb in the second quarter, staking Green Bay to a 21-3 halftime lead...Opened the second half with an INT to CB Jerraud Powers on a throw that was tipped at the line, the beginning of a challenging two quarters for the offense...Rebounded late in the fourth quarter to hit Jones for another TD, an 8-yarder that gave Green Bay a 27-22 lead with 4:30 remaining...Following a go-ahead scoring drive by the Colts, moved the offense 47 yards in four plays, setting up a game-tying 51-yard FG try by K Mason Crosby.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14)**: Had one of the most remarkable passing performances of his prolific career, completing 24-of-37 attempts for 338 yards and a career-high six TDs...Even more remarkable was that the effort came on the road in a charged environment against a Houston defense that ranked No. 3 in the NFL in yardage (275.6) and No. 4 in scoring defense (14.6 ppg.) entering the game...TD pass total tied the franchise record set by Matt Flynn in the 2011 season finale vs. Detroit (1/1/12) and he became just the fourth QB in NFL history to throw for 330 yards, six TDs and no INTs in a game, joining Tom Brady, Mark Rypien and Y.A. Tittle...Started the offense fast with TDs on two of the team's first three possessions in the first quarter, getting the Packers out to a 14-0 lead in the first frame...Found Nelson for three TDs during the game, the first of which was a perfectly placed 41-yard deep ball along the right sideline to cap the team's opening drive of the game...Opened the second half with a methodical 16-play, 80-yard TD drive that spanned 6:44 and ended with a 1-yard TD throw to Nelson on a corner route in the end zone and extended the lead to 28-10...Also tossed a pair of TDs to Jones, joined WR Don Hutson (1943) as the only two players in franchise history to score two TDs in three consecutive games...Long play was a third-and-1 rollout on the second play of the fourth quarter when he courageously took a big hit from LB Brooks Reed, but was able to get the throw into the hands of a wide open TE Tom Crabtree, who ran untouched down the sideline for a 48-yard TD.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)**: Continued the momentum from his spectacular outing the previous week, completing 30-of-37 attempts for 342 yards and three TDs with no INTs...His 81.1 completion percentage was the second highest of his career and set a single-game franchise record among QBs with 35-plus attempts, while the three TDs gave him 16 between Weeks 4-7, also a franchise record over a four-game regular-season stretch...Saw his two longest completions come on a pair of defensive-offside free plays, beginning with a 52-yard strike to Nelson that set up a TD in the first quarter, and later on a 39-yard TD to Cobb that effectively put the game away late in the fourth...Each of the team's three TD drives spanned 80 yards, highlighted by the 12-play march that took 6:56 off the clock to open the second half...Capped the drive by finding Cobb for a 5-yard TD in the back of the end zone, the 150th scoring throw of his career...With the TD, broke Dan Marino's NFL record for the fewest number of INTs at the 150-TD mark (69-42)...Joined Marino (62) as just the second player

in league history to reach the 150-TD mark in 80 or fewer games, doing so in his 76th.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28)**: Played his way through an admittedly choppy game that saw the offense struggle to find its rhythm...Completed 22-of-35 attempts for 186 yards and two TDs, the second of which moved him past Bart Starr for second place all-time in franchise history (153)... The TD was a 4-yard strike to WR Donald Driver, giving him 21 TD passes for the season and making him the first player in NFL history to have 20-plus TD passes in the first eight games in back-to-back seasons (24 in 2011)...Also set the franchise record for the most TD passes over a five-game span, having thrown 18 dating back to the team's Week 4 contest vs. New Orleans.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Led what was the most balanced effort for the offense to this point in the season, completing 14-of-30 attempts for 218 yards and four TDs with one INT...With the four-TD outing, joined Marino, Peyton Manning and Brett Favre as the only QBs in NFL history to have 10 or more games with four-plus TD passes in a three-season span...One of his most critical plays during the game came after he'd completed a handoff to RB James Starks in the second quarter...Starks gained 5 yards on the play, but had the ball stripped by LB Paris Lenon...Rodgers alertly followed the play and dove to recover the ball at the Green Bay 32-yard line...With the maintained possession, he hit Jones seven plays later for a 28-yard TD to give Green Bay a 21-7 advantage with just under two minutes to play in the first half...Saw his final TD pass come on the last play of the third quarter when he executed a play-action fake to RB Alex Green and threw a perfect ball to Crabtree, who released on a seam route out of the backfield...Crabtree caught the ball at the Packers' 43-yard line and went the rest of the way for a 72-yard TD, the team's longest pass play through nine games...Also carried the ball eight times for 33 yards, including a season-long 25-yard scramble on the Packers' first scoring drive in the first quarter.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Overcame an afternoon filled with pass-rush pressure and lack of rhythm to engineer a key game-winning TD drive that culminated with a 22-yard TD pass to Cobb with 1:55 remaining to give Green Bay the lead, 21-20...Finished the game having completed 19-of-27 attempts for 236 yards, two TDs and an INT, good for a 106.4 QB rating... The rating was his ninth consecutive of 100-plus in indoor games (including playoffs)...First TD pass came in the second quarter when he sold a developing screen play to right side and came back to the middle of the field in the face of pressure, finding Finley wide open near the 15-yard line, where he would make the catch and go the rest of the way for the score...The game-winner to Cobb capped a six-play, 82-yard scoring drive and came on a corner route to the left side of the end zone, where he lofted a perfect pass just before being hit by DE Willie Young.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Had one of the most challenging games of his prolific career as a starter, facing a dominant Giants' pass rush that disrupted the pocket throughout the game...Finished having completed 14-of-25 attempts for 219 yards with one TD and one INT...Hit Nelson for a 61-yard TD on the offense's fourth play from scrimmage, perfectly executing a stop-and-go double-move to tie the game's score 7-7...Had a difficult time from that point on, falling victim to five sacks and several other pressures up front that affected the unit's rhythm and execution for the remainder of the game.

### **33 Brandon Saine, RB, 2nd Year, Ohio State**

**2012 Season:** Reserve RB and special teams player who appeared in each of the first six games before suffering a significant knee injury in kickoff coverage in the second half at Houston (Oct. 14) that ended his season...Placed on injured reserve, Oct. 15.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)** - at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Appeared in each game on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14)**: Appeared on special teams but suffered a knee injury covering a third-quarter kickoff and did not return.

### **63 Jeff Saturday, C, 14th Year, North Carolina**

**2012 Season:** Veteran stalwart up front, signed with the Packers as an unrestricted free agent on March 13, 2012, after playing for 13 seasons

with the Indianapolis Colts...Quickly acclimated himself to his new team while progressively picking up the scheme after playing his entire career in a different offense...For his career, has played in 208 games with 199 starts.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Made his Packers debut in the season opener, as part of a protection unit that allowed QB Aaron Rodgers time to complete 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Appeared on all 68 offensive plays...Helped block for a ground game that netted 112 yards on 25 running plays (4.5 avg.).

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Helped the offense bounce back from a difficult first half, centering a unit that produced three second-half scoring drives and did not allow a sack over the final two quarters...Also had a key fumble recovery inside the Green Bay 5-yard line late in the fourth quarter after RB Cedric Benson was stripped behind the line of scrimmage.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Led an offensive line that helped produce 421 yards of total offense and four TD drives during the game...Allowed Rodgers to complete 31-of-41 for 319 yards and four TD passes, without being sacked...Finished the game with a six-quarter sackless streak for the OL going back to the second half at Seattle...Also helped clear the way for Benson to rush for 84 yards on 18 carries, a healthy 4.7-yard average that provided great balance for the offense.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Returned to Indianapolis to face the franchise he spent the first 13 years of his NFL career playing for...Helped the offense to a fast start that saw 179 yards and three first-half TD drives.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14)**: Part of a blocking unit that help clear the way for the team's most prolific offensive output to this point in the season... Helped the offense produce 427 yards, the most given up by Houston since Week 3 of 2011, including a 24-of-37, 338-yard, six-TD passing performance by Rodgers...The six TDs were a new career high for the QB and he became just the fourth player in NFL history to throw for 330 yards, six TDs and no INTs in a game.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)**: Part of an OL that allowed Rodgers time to complete 30-of-37 attempts for 342 yards and three TDs, putting together six scoring drives (three TD, three FG) and not allowing a sack after the first quarter...Rodgers' 81.1 completion percentage was the second highest of his career and set a single-game franchise record by a QB with more than 35 attempts...Had the awareness to get off quick snaps on a pair of defensive offsides free plays during the game...The first of which resulted in a game-long 52-yard completion to Rodgers to Nelson in the first quarter, and the second became a 38-yard TD pass from Rodgers to WR Randall Cobb, effectively putting the game away in the fourth.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28)**: Centered what was a challenging day for the offense...Still managed to allow Rodgers to post a 95.7 QB rating, completing 22-of-35 attempts for 186 yards and two TDs.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Part of an offense that gained 384 total yards and produced five scoring drives (four TDs, one FG) against what was the NFL's No. 6 yardage and No. 4 scoring defense entering the game...Helped block for a rushing attack that churned out a season-high 176 yards on 39 attempts (4.5 avg.), the most by the Packers since Oct. 25, 2009 (at Cleveland)...Within that total, the offense featured four players with 25 or more rushing yards (Rodgers, Cobb, Alex Green, James Starks), a first for Green Bay since Nov. 2, 2003, at Minnesota.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Started against the powerful Lions interior defensive line...Helped create time for Rodgers to complete 19-of-27 for 236 yards and two TDs, a 106.4 QB rating...Held his ground just long enough in protection against standout DT Ndamukong Suh on Rodgers' game-winning 22-yard TD pass to Cobb that gave Green Bay a 21-20 lead with 1:55 remaining in regulation.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Started at C.

### **78 Derek Sherrod, T, 2nd Year, Mississippi State**

• Opened the 2012 season on the reserve/physically unable to perform list after missing the entire offseason program and training camp while rehabilitating a broken leg suffered in Week 15 of 2011.

• Appeared in five games as a rookie in 2011, seeing time at tackle with injuries to veteran LT Chad Clifton and second-year RT Bryan Bulaga.

• Saw his most significant action in Week 5 at Atlanta when he played



RT for most of the game with Bulaga sidelined and Clifton exiting on the second series.

- Was a first-team All-America selection by CBSSports.com and Rivals.com in 2010 and earned first-team All-SEC honors from the coaches and the media.

### **37 Sam Shields, CB, 3rd Year, Miami**

**2012 Season:** Maturing defender who has moved into a starting role at RCB in the team's base defense opposite opposite Tramon Williams... Appeared in the first six games with five starts, making 22 tackles (17 solo), an INT and seven passes defended...Suffered a shin/ankle injury at Houston in Week 6 and did not return to the game.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared on defense and special teams... Finished with one solo tackle on defense, including a key third-down stop of RB Frank Gore after a 1-yard completion on a swing pass to force a punt in the fourth quarter.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Had another solid performance after reclaiming starting duties at CB on the strength of his outing in the season opener... Opened the game at RCB and appeared on 60 defensive plays, finishing with an assisted tackle and a pass defended...Played a key role in helping to limit Chicago to just 74 net passing yards and spent much of the game matched against Bears rookie WR Alshon Jeffery, whom he helped hold to just one catch for 7 yards.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Started at RCB and appeared on all but one defensive play (55), finishing with four solo tackles and two passes defended...One pass defended came on the game's final drive when he broke up a deep throw along the left sideline from QB Russell Wilson intended for WR Golden Tate.

Was injured on Houston's next play from scrimmage when in pursuit of a run play, he was inadvertently kicked in the lower leg by a teammate and did not return.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)** - at **New York Giants (11/25):** Inactive (shin/ankle).

### **71 Josh Sitton, G, 5th Year, Central Florida**

**2012 Season:** Solid interior blocker who has started 57 of a possible 59 games at RG over the last three-plus seasons, including every contest in 2012.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at RG and helped control an active 49ers front in pass protection, allowing QB Aaron Rodgers time to complete 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Played all 68 offensive snaps...Also had six plays on special teams in placement protection including the fake FG attempt late in the second quarter that resulted in a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree...Teamed with G T.J. Lang to combination-block DT Henry Melton at the snap and finished the play by pinning the defender to the inside, also walling off the wide lane used by Crabtree to race into the end zone for the score.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Part of a protection unit that recovered from a challenging first half to produce three scoring drives in the second half (two FG, one TD) that staked Green Bay to a 12-7 lead in the fourth quarter...Line allowed Rodgers to complete 13-of-24 for 137 yards without being sacked in the second half.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Helped the offense have its best performance in the season's first quarter...Blocked for a unit that generated a 421 yards and four TD drives, allowing Rodgers to complete 31-of-41 for 319 yards without being sacked...The 30 first downs produced by the offense were the most by the Packers since they posted 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Helped extend the unit's streak to eight quarters without allowing a sack with a clean first half that included 179 total yards of offense and three TD drives...Made a good block when he released on a first-quarter screen pass to RB Cedric Benson, shoving LB Moise Fokou in the open field on what was an 18-yard gain.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14):** Helped protect for what was an especially productive day on offense as the team accumulated 427 total yards and produced 42 points against what was the NFL's No. 3-ranked defense entering the game...Was matched regularly against standout Texans DE J.J. Watt, who he fared very well against and was not responsible for either of the defender's two sacks during the game...Part of an OL that allowed Rodgers time to complete 24-of-37 attempts for 338 yards and a career-high six TDs while only being sacked twice during the game...The QB became just the fourth player in NFL history to eclipse the 330-yard mark with six TDs and no INTs.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Contributed to another productive outing for the offense as the unit racked up 402 total yards and six scoring drives (three TD, three FG)...Helped create time for Rodgers to complete 30-of-37 attempts for 342 yards and three TDs, an 81.1 completion percentage that was the second highest of his career in the regular season.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Part of a challenging day for the offense that saw them put together just three scoring drives (two TDs, one FG)... Did allow Rodgers time to complete 22-of-35 for 186 yards and two TDs, the second of which moved him into second place in tam history for career TD passes (153).

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Helped contribute to a balanced, productive day on offense, one that saw the team rack up 384 yards of offense, including 176 on the ground, the most by the Packers in more than three years (at Cleveland, Oct. 25, 2009)...Also part of a protection unit that allowed Rodgers to be sacked just once while completing 14-of-30 attempts for 218 yards and four TDs.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18):** Part of an offense that conquered a charged road environment and deep Detroit defensive line en route to a 24-20 win... Helped allow time for Rodgers to complete 19-of-27 attempts for 236 yards and two TDs with one INT, for a 106.4 QB rating...The rating was Rodgers' ninth consecutive of 100-plus at an indoor game (including playoffs), and Sitton is the only OL to have started each of those games, opening all nine at RG.

►at **New York Giants (11/25):** Started at RG.

### **51 D.J. Smith, LB, 2nd Year, Appalachian State**

**2012 Season:** Young defender who assumed starting duty at the 'Mack' LB position in 2012 following a season-ending injury suffered by Desmond Bishop (hamstring) in the team's exhibition opener at San Diego (Aug. 9)... Had opened each of the first six games and posted career highs with 42 tackles (35 solo), two sacks and four passes defended before suffering a significant knee injury at Houston (Oct. 14) and was placed on injured reserve, Oct. 17.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at LB and finished tied for second on the defense with nine tackles (all solo, a career high in that respect).

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Led the way with 10 tackles (six solo) and notched his first career sack on the first play from scrimmage...On the sack, blitzed through the left side of the offensive line and fought past RB Matt Forté to drop QB Jay Cutler for a 13-yard loss.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Started and appeared on 54 defensive plays, recording six tackles (five solo).

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished with six tackles (four solo) and a career-high three passes defended...On several plays, drew the difficult coverage assignment of RB Darren Sproles, who he helped limit to five catches for 44 yards and a long reception of 20.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Posted eight tackles (all solo), a sack and a pass defended...Sack came in the second quarter when he blitzed from

the right edge of the defense and chased down QB Andrew Luck for no gain, his second sack of the season...Pass defended came when he batted down a Luck pass at the line of scrimmage in the third quarter to force a FG attempt.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Started the game and appeared on 28 plays making three solo tackles...Suffered a knee injury in the second quarter when LT Duane Brown blocked him from the side toward the end of a play and his leg buckled beneath him...Did not return to the game and was announced as lost for the season the following day.

### **97 Vic So'oto, LB, 2nd Year, Brigham Young**

**2012 Season:** Re-signed by Green Bay, Nov. 12, after spending the early portion of the season with the Oakland Raiders...Joined the club after rookie LB Nick Perry was placed on injured reserve (wrist), Nov. 7, and LB Clay Matthews suffered a hamstring injury vs. Arizona (Nov. 4)...Initially entered the NFL as a non-drafted free agent with the Packers, July 28, 2011, and made the opening-day roster on the strength of a strong end to the preseason a year ago...Played in seven games during the 2011 regular season, finishing with seven tackles (five solo) and a sack on defense, while also adding three tackles on special teams.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Was active on gameday after joining the team earlier in the week and participating in practice...Appeared on two defensive plays, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Inactive.

### **44 James Starks, RB, 3rd Year, Buffalo**

**2012 Season:** Third-year ball-carrier who suffered a turf toe injury in the preseason opener at San Diego (Aug. 9) and did not practice for the remainder of the summer...Returned to the gameday lineup in Week 6 at Houston following a foot injury to RB Cedric Benson that was suffered the week before...For the season, has carried 56 times for 189 yards (3.4 avg) and has two catches for 15 yards (7.5 avg.).

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Inactive (toe).

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Returned to practice on a limited basis late in the week, but remained inactive on gameday.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24) - at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Inactive.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Re-entered the picture at RB after Benson suffered a significant injury at Indianapolis in Week 5...Was active on gameday for the first time in 2012 and made his season debut in the second half, carrying five times for 11 yards (2.2 avg.) as the Packers attempted to run out the remaining clock in a lopsided 42-24 victory.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Dressed for the game, but did not play.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Saw a handful of plays in the second half of the game, carrying one time for 8 yards and making one catch for 9 yards.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Carried eight times for a team-high 35 yards (4.4 avg.).

### **82 Ryan Taylor, TE, 2nd Year, North Carolina**

**2012 Season:** A core special teams player and developing contributor on offense, has appeared in every game, predominantly on special teams, where he has four coverage tackles...Has also contributed as a blocker on

offense, but has yet to register any receiving statistics.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Played on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Appeared on special teams and also saw three plays on offense.

### **64 Greg Van Roten, G, Rookie, Pennsylvania**

**2012 Season:** Signed by Green Bay on July 25 after going undrafted in the spring and unsigned following a tryout with the San Diego Chargers...Played his way onto the practice squad with a solid training camp and preseason and was signed to the active roster on Oct. 13 after RB Cedric Benson was placed on injured reserve with a foot injury.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Was again active on gameday, but did not play.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Made his NFL debut on special teams as a member of the kickoff return unit.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

### **93 Erik Walden, LB, 5th Year, Middle Tennessee State**

**2012 Season:** Veteran OLB who is enjoying the finest season of his career in 2012...Entered the season in a rotation with first-round draft pick Nick Perry at the LOLB post opposite LB Clay Matthews, but has since become a full-time starter after Perry suffered an injury in Week 6 and was ultimately placed on injured reserve (wrist)...Has appeared in 10 games with six starts and registered 46 tackles (31 solo), a career-high-tying

three sacks, an INT and four passes defended.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Made his season debut in Week 2 after serving a one-game suspension the week of the season opener...Was featured prominently in a rotation with Nick Perry at the LOLB position, seeing action on 36 plays and finishing with five tackles (three solo) and a half-sack.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared on 30 defensive plays, both in a rotation with Perry and also part of various subpackages that featured multiple LBs...Finished with seven tackles (four solo)...Pressured QB Russell Wilson into an errant throw that appeared to be intercepted by S Jerron McMillian in the fourth quarter, but finished the play by tackling Wilson and was called for a controversial roughing-the-passer penalty that instead gave the Seahawks a first down.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Once again was active for the game, appearing on special teams.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Saw time on special teams early in the game, but suffered a concussion in the first half and did not return.

### **84 D.J. Williams, TE, 2nd Year, Arkansas**

**2012 Season:** Showed significant strides throughout the 2012 offseason program and early in training camp where he displayed the skills that made him a dangerous receiving threat in college...Battled back and foot injuries during training camp, but started the first two preseason contests and finished with five catches for 40 yards (8.0 avg.)...Suffered a hamstring injury in practice prior to the Week 6 game at Houston and was inactive... Has appeared in nine games during the regular season with two starts and has made four catches for 37 yards (9.3 avg.).

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Participated on both offense and special teams and made his first reception of the season, a 6-yard catch in the second half.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Finished with one catch for 11 yards, a play that moved Green Bay off of its own 1-yard line on a drive in the first quarter... Appeared on 37 plays during the game, seeing time in various multiple-TE sets and also lining up in the backfield and serving as a lead blocker on various running plays...Also recorded a tackle on special teams.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Inactive.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Returned to action and received his first career start as part of a three-TE formation...Appeared on 22 offensive plays and finished with two catches for 20 yards (10.0 avg.), the first multi-catch outing of his career.

### **38 Tramon Williams, CB, 6th Year, Louisiana Tech**

**2012 Season:** Former non-drafted free agent and practice-squad player who has developed into one of the top players at his position in the league...Appears to have regained the form that made him one of the most formidable cover men in the game in 2010 after suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener that nagged him throughout the season...Has started each of the team's 11 games in 2012 and has posted 45 tackles (39 solo), two INTs and ranks No. 2 on the team with 16 passes defended.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at LCB and finished with four tackles (all solo).

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Delivered an excellent performance against the rival Bears, finishing with four tackles (all solo), two INTs and two passes defended...Found himself matched against standout WR Brandon Marshall for much of the game and was part of an effort that helped limit him to just two catches for 24 yards (12.0 avg.)...Game marked the second regular-season multi-INT game of his career (also Week 11 of 2011 vs.

Tampa Bay)...First INT came late in the first half when he undercut a crossing route intended for WR Earl Bennett, diving to collect QB Jay Cutler's throw and secure the ball...Turnover resulted in a 35-yard Mason Crosby FG before halftime that extended the Green Bay lead to 13-0...Second INT came in the fourth quarter when he leapt to tip a deep Cutler pass intended for Marshall...Tipped the ball to himself before scampering 38 yards down the sideline on the return...The offense wasted little time taking advantage, as QB Aaron Rodgers hit WR Donald Driver for a 26-yard TD on the ensuing play to put the game out of reach at 23-3.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared on all 56 defensive plays and finished with two tackles (one solo), a key part of a pass defense that allowed just 111 net passing yards and held Seattle WRs to a mere six catches during the game.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Had a busy day against the Saints' spread attack that attempted 54 passes during the game...Finished with nine tackles (seven solo) and tied for the team lead with three passes defended.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Started and appeared on all 96 defensive plays, posting six tackles (all solo, one for loss) and was credited with a career-high five passes defended by the coaching staff...Passes defended were the most by a Packer since Charles Woodson was credited with six at Minnesota on Oct. 23, 2011...Broke up a third-and-1 pass from QB Andrew Luck to WR T.Y. ▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Started against his initial NFL team and finished with six tackles (all solo) and three passes defended...Helped contain standout WR Andre Johnson, who finished the game with just 75 receiving yards on eight catches (9.4 avg.).

## 98 C.J. Wilson, DE, 3rd Year, East Carolina

**2012 Season:** Third-year man who has played in 40 of 42 possible games in his two-plus professional seasons...Serves as the starter at RDE in the team's base 3-4 defense, where he continues to anchor steadily against opposing rushing attacks...Suffered a groin injury in the season opener and missed the Week 2 contest vs. Chicago...Has started seven of the 10 games in which he's played and tallied 32 tackles (14 solo), a career-high 2½ sacks and a pass defended.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at RDE and posted four tackles (three solo) before departing with a groin injury during the game.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Was limited during the practice week and missed his first game since the 2010 season opener his rookie year, a streak of 37 straight games.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Posted four tackles (two solo) on 15 defensive snaps.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Started at RDE and finished with three tackles (one solo) and his second career sack...Sack came in the fourth quarter when he fought his way past G Ben Grubbs and dropped QB Drew Brees for a 7-yard loss, his first sack since Week 9 of 2010.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Started at RDE and saw extended action on defense after fellow DL B.J. Raji was lost to an ankle injury in the second quarter...Finished with a season-high five tackles (two solo).

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Continued to play an important role in the absence of Raji, who remained sidelined and was inactive due to the ankle injury suffered the week before...Started and appeared on 34 plays, helping to key a run defense that held Pro Bowl RB Arian Foster to a career-low 1.7-yard rushing average (min. 15 att.) on 17 carries for 29 yards...Also made his career-high second sack of the season on the game's opening play when he bull-rushed RG Antoine Caldwell and dropped QB Matt Schaub for a 2-yard loss.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Finished with three tackles (one solo) and was credited with a half-sack for teaming with LB Erik Walden on a zero-yard stop of QB Sam Bradford in the first quarter.

## 21 Charles Woodson, DB, 15th Year, Michigan

**2012 Season:** Veteran team leader and playmaker who was enjoying a transition to playing safety in the team's base defense, while resuming his slot CB role in the various sub-packages...Suffered a broken collarbone at St. Louis in Week 7 that will sideline him for an extended period of time, with a hopeful return late in the season...Had started each of the first seven games at SS and ranked third on the team with 44 tackles (36 solo), 1½ sacks, an INT, a forced fumble and five passes defended at the time of his injury.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in his 200th career contest, starting at SS and finishing with three tackles (all solo), 1½ sacks and a forced fumble...Sack total was the second-highest single-game output of his career behind the two sacks he posted vs. Seattle as a member of the Oakland Raiders on Sept. 30, 2001...Forced fumble came when he punched the ball loose from WR Mario Manningham on a tackle near the sideline in the first quarter, but the ball bounced out of bounds.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Maintained his productivity with a strong performance against the rival Bears...Posted five tackles (four solo) and his first INT of the season, the 55th of his career, moving him into a tie with Aeneas Williams for 19th all time...INT came on a third-down play in the third quarter when he stepped in front of a QB Jay Cutler throw intended for WR Earl Bennett.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Part of a pass defense that limited Seattle to just 111 net passing yards, including a mere 42 in the second half...Finished with five tackles (two solo) and two passes defended.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Placed second on the defense with 12 tackles (11 solo) and a pass defended.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Appeared on all 96 defensive plays, finishing with 10 tackles (eight solo) and a pass defended...Broke up a QB Andrew Luck pass intended for WR Reggie Wayne in the fourth quarter...Also came up in run support to make a no-gain stop of RB Vick Ballard in the third quarter.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Again saw action on all 62 defensive plays, finishing with three tackles (all solo) in an impressive all-around performance by a Packers defense that held the Texans more than 50 yards below their season average of 371.8 yards entering the game...Made significant contributions in run support, helping to hold RB Arian Foster to just 29 yards on 17 carries, a 1.7-yard average that was a career-low (min. 15 att.)...Also

held up on the back end where the defense forced three interceptions and a combined rating of 45.4 between the Texans' two QBs.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Finished with six tackles (five solo) and played every defensive snap before suffering a broken collarbone in the fourth quarter when he tackled WR Brandon Gibson after a 5-yard gain...Stayed in for the last play of that series, but did not return for the Rams' final drive of the game...Injury was similar to the one he suffered in the first half of Super Bowl XLV and will likely sideline him for the third quarter of the regular season.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Missed the game due to the collarbone injury suffered the previous week, the first game he's missed due to injury (has missed two regular-season finales for rest) since Nov. 29, 2007.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4) - at New York Giants (11/25):** Inactive.

### **99 Jerel Worthy, DE, Rookie, Michigan State**

**2012 Season:** Explosive, powerful big man whom the Packers traded up to select in the second round of the 2012 NFL Draft...Has made strides throughout the season and has seen extended playing time as the season's progressed...Suffered a concussion blocking on a kickoff return in Week 8 vs. Jacksonville and was inactive for the following week's contest vs. Arizona (Nov. 4)...For the season, has appeared in 10 games with two starts and made 17 tackles (nine solo) and two sacks.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut in the season opener, appearing on both defense and on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Made his first career start at RDE in place of the injured C.J. Wilson (groin), and appeared on 37 defensive plays, making five tackles (three solo) and collecting his first career sack...Sack came on Chicago's final drive of the game when he threw QB Jay Cutler for a 4-yard loss...Also participated on special teams where he had a hand in one of the game's most memorable plays as part of the placement protection unit.... Lined up to the left side of the formation on what was a fake FG attempt late in the second quarter...At the snap, threw a block on S Craig Steltz while P Tim Masthay shoveled a pass to TE Tom Crabtree, who took it 27 yards for a TD to give Green Bay a 10-0 lead.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Played on 29 defensive plays and recorded an assisted tackle.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Rotated on defense and registered two solo tackles.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Played extensively on defense following the departure of fellow DL B.J. Raji, who exited in the second quarter with an ankle injury and did not return...Appeared on 54 plays and finished with one solo tackle and two pressures.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Got the start at LDE in the absence of Raji, who remained sidelined and was listed as an inactive due to the ankle injury suffered the week before...Led the defensive line by appearing on 55 plays and had arguably his best performance to this point in the season...Finished with five tackles (three solo), two QB hits and a sack...The sack came on a third down on the Texans' second drive of the first quarter...Used an inside rush to beat G Antoine Caldwell into the pocket and dropped QB Matt Schaub for a 10-yard loss...Also showed up against the run where he was part of a unit that held RB Arian Foster to a career-low 1.7-yard average (min. 15 att.) during the game.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Led the defensive line by playing 48 snaps and finished with an assisted tackle.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Appeared on 26 defensive plays before suffering a concussion on a kickoff return in the second half that caused him to miss the remainder of the game.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Missed the practice week due to the concussion and was inactive for the first time as a pro.
