WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports, now in its 19th season as an NFL network television partner, will broadcast the game to a national audience.

► Play-by-play man **Joe Buck** and color analyst **Troy Aikman** will have the call from the broadcast booth with **Pam Oliver** and **Erin Andrews** reporting from the sidelines.



► Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 53-station Packers Radio Network, with **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) calling the action. The duo enters its 14th season of broadcasts together across the Packers Radio Network, which covers 44 markets in six states.

► Dial Global Sports radio will air the game across the country. **Kevin Harlan** (play-by-play) and **Dan Fouts** (analyst) will call the action with **Hub Arkush** reporting from the sidelines. **Scott Graham** hosts pregame and halftime shows.

► Univision Radio will broadcast the game in Spanish to a national audience, with **Rafael Hernandez Brito** (play-by-play) and **Raul Striker Jr.** (color) calling the action.

PACKERS TO FACE 49ERS IN NFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF GAME

Green Bay will travel to San Francisco to take on the 49ers in an NFC Divisional playoff contest this Saturday night at Candlestick Park, the third straight season that the Packers have advanced to the divisional round of the playoffs.



- The Packers are the lone NFC team to advance to the divisional round each of the past three postseasons (2010-12). The last time Green Bay accomplished that feat was when the team did so in five straight seasons (1993-97).
- Green Bay beat division-rival Minnesota, 24-10, at Lambeau Field on Saturday night in an NFC Wild Card contest. The 10 points allowed were the fewest given up by the Packers in a playoff game since they allowed 10 at San Francisco on Jan. 11, 1998.
- The Packers improved to 30-17 all-time in the postseason with the win, a .638 winning percentage that ranks No. 1 in league history (min. five games).
- Saturday night will feature a matchup of two of the winningest teams in postseason history. Green Bay ranks No. 3 in league history with 30 wins, while San Francisco ranks No. 4 with 26 playoff victories.
- This will mark the sixth time the Packers and 49ers have squared off in the postseason. That is tied for the second most for Green Bay against one opponent behind only the Packers' seven playoff meetings with the N.Y. Giants.
- The Packers have won four of the five previous meetings against the 49ers in the playoffs, including two of three at Candlestick Park. Including playoffs, Green Bay has won 13 of its last 15 games against the 49ers.
- The clubs last met in the postseason in an NFC Wild Card contest in the 2001 season (Jan. 13, 2002) at Lambeau Field, a 25-15 Green Bay win. Prior to that, the teams met in four consecutive postseasons (1995-98).
- The playoff meeting in the 2001 season was the last time the teams played where each had 11-plus wins. In that contest, both teams entered the game with 12-4 records.
- This will be the second meeting between the two clubs this season, with Green Bay having hosted San Francisco in the season opener, a 30-22 49ers win. This will be the third time in the history of the series (1996, 1998) that the teams have met in the regular season and the postseason.
- The Packers have won three consecutive playoff games on the road, their longest road winning streak in franchise postseason history. Green Bay has a 3-1 road record (.750) in the playoffs under Mike McCarthy.
- Since the start of the 2010 postseason, Green Bay has won 14 of its last 19 road contests, a .737 winning percentage that ranks No. 2 in the NFL over that span behind only New England (12-4, .750).
- Since 2011, Green Bay ranks No. 3 in the NFL with a scoring average of 31.0 points per game. San Francisco is No. 1 in the league over that span in scoring defense at 15.7 points per game.

PACKERS AT 49ERS – NFC DIVISIONAL PLAYOFF

POSTSEASON SUCCESS

The Packers have won two straight NFC North titles for the first time since 2002-04, when the team captured three consecutive divisional crowns.

- ▶ This season's NFC North title marks the Packers' 20th division crown in franchise history.
- ▶ With the Week 15 win at Chicago, Green Bay clinched its 28th postseason berth in team history and its 15th appearance in the last 20 seasons.
- ▶ The Packers have made the playoffs in each of the last four seasons and five of the last six, the only NFC team to accomplish those feats.
- ▶ Green Bay currently ranks No. 3 in NFL history with its 28 playoff appearances, trailing only the N.Y. Giants (31) and Dallas Cowboys (30).
- ▶ The Packers' 15 postseason appearances in the free-agency era (since 1993) are the most of any team in the NFL.
- ▶ Green Bay improved to 30-17 all-time in the postseason with a win over Minnesota this past Saturday. The Packers' .638 winning percentage in the postseason ranks No. 1 in NFL history (min. five games):

ROAD RUN

Since the start of the 2010 postseason, the Packers have won 14 of their last 19 road contests.

- ▶ Green Bay's .737 winning percentage over that span ranks No. 2 in the league:

- ▶ Green Bay had a 4-4 record (.500) away from Lambeau Field this season. In five of seven seasons (2006-07, 2009, 2011-12) under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the team has finished with a mark of .500 or better on the road.
- ▶ The Packers posted a league-best 7-1 road mark in 2011, setting a single-season franchise record for the most road victories.
- ▶ Green Bay is 11-5 on the road over the past two regular seasons, which is tied for No. 2 in the NFL:

ROLLING ON THE ROAD

Since taking over as the starter in 2008, QB **Aaron Rodgers** has been one of the most effective signal-callers in the league away from home.

- ▶ In his last 19 regular-season starts away from Lambeau Field, Rodgers has completed 424 of 627 passes (67.6 percent) for 5,434 yards and 48 TDs with six INTs for a **116.1 passer rating**. Rodgers has posted a 100-plus passer rating in **15 of those 19 games**.

- ▶ In four career postseason road starts, Rodgers has completed 94-of-135 passes for 1,213 yards and 10 TDs with three INTs for a 113.0 passer rating. That ranks No. 1 in NFL postseason history (min. 100 attempts):

STAT OF THE WEEK

- ▶ In Saturday's 24-10 Wild Card win vs. Minnesota, FB **John Kuhn** scored on a 3-yard run and a 9-yard reception.
- ▶ For Kuhn, it marked the **second time in his career** that he scored on a rushing TD and a receiving TD in a playoff game (also at Atlanta, Jan. 15, 2011). He became the **first player in franchise playoff history** to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ Kuhn also became the **only current NFL player** to score at least one touchdown in each of the last four postseasons (2009-12).
- ▶ Kuhn joined RB Dorsey Levens (five straight, 1994-98) and WR Antonio Freeman (four straight, 1995-98) as the only Packers in team history to score a TD in four or more consecutive postseasons.
- ▶ With the two scores on Saturday night, Kuhn brought his career postseason total to six TDs. That is tied for No. 2 in team history behind only Freeman (12 TDs).

POSTSEASON PROFICIENCY

As productive as QB **Aaron Rodgers** has been during the regular season in his five years as the starter, he has also carried that over to the playoffs.

- ▶ Rodgers has posted a 110-plus passer rating in four of his seven career postseason starts. That already **ties him for fourth in league history** behind only Joe Montana (six in 23 starts), Brett Favre (five in 24 starts) and Tom Brady (five in 22 starts).

- ▶ In Saturday's win over Minnesota, Rodgers **tied an NFL postseason record** and **set a franchise playoff mark** by completing a pass to 10 different receivers.
- ▶ Rodgers holds both of the top single-game passing yardage marks in postseason history with a 423-yard outing at Arizona in the 2009 post-season and a 366-yard effort in 2010 at Atlanta.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR ...

A look at some recent statistical notes for the Packers that include this past Saturday's playoff win vs. Minnesota:

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** has not thrown an interception in five consecutive games and has not thrown an INT in 177 consecutive passing attempts.
- ▶ Rodgers has posted a 100-plus passer rating in each of the last four contests. He has connected on 101 of 147 passes (68.7 percent) for 1,272 yards and 11 TDs with zero INTs for a 120.3 passer rating over that four-game span.
- ▶ Over the last three games, WR **Greg Jennings** has 19 catches for 226 yards (11.9 avg.) and three TDs.
- ▶ LB **Clay Matthews** has recorded at least one sack in each of the last four games, registering six sacks over that span.
- ▶ Green Bay has scored touchdowns on 15 of 17 (88.2 percent) red-zone trips over the past four games.
- ▶ The Packers have turned the ball over five times over the past six games. Green Bay has a plus-5 turnover ratio over that span.
- ▶ The Packers have averaged 30.7 points per game over their last six contests.
- ▶ The Packers have held their opponent to 20 points or less in nine of the last 11 games.
- ▶ Green Bay's defense has limited opposing QBs to a combined 68.0 passer rating over its last six games (91 of 179, 1,072 yards, eight TDs, seven INTs).

MIKE MCCARTHY...Is in seventh year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Has led the Packers to playoff appearances in five of his seven seasons as the helm, and the team's four postseason berths over the past five seasons are the most by an NFC team.
- ▶ His .661 winning percentage (including playoffs) ranks No. 3 among active NFL coaches (min. 50 games).
- ▶ Has helped guide the Packers to top-10 finishes in scoring each of the last six seasons (2007-12), one of only two NFL teams (New England) to do so.
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Became the first Packers coach since Lombardi to lead the team to a championship game in his second season (2007).

JIM HARBAUGH...Is in second year as the 49ers' 17th head coach.

- ▶ Has led the 49ers to NFC West titles each of the last two seasons, the team's first division crowns since 2002.
- ▶ San Francisco's 13-3 record in 2011 made him just the fourth rookie coach in NFL history to take a team with a losing record the previous season to 13 wins.
- ▶ Was previously the head coach at Stanford (2007-10), where he led the Cardinal to its first BCS game appearance and victory in the Orange Bowl, in 2010.
- ▶ Also was the head coach at the University of San Diego (2004-06). Began his NFL coaching career as an offensive assistant with the Oakland Raiders (2002-03). Played QB for 15 seasons in the NFL with the Bears, Colts, Ravens, Chargers and Panthers.

THE PACKERS-49ERS SERIES

Originally dating back to 1950, the series featured two games per season from 1953-66 with the teams trading dominant stretches.

- ▶ San Francisco won 13 times in a span of 15 games between 1950-58, while the Packers won 10 of 11 games between 1959-64.
- ▶ In more recent times, the series has been noted for its postseason clashes, including several defining moments in Packers history. Green Bay's 27-17 triumph in the 1995 NFC Divisional playoff was considered the breakthrough victory that established the Packers as an elite team for the next several years. The Packers also won the next two postseason meetings, a 35-14 home victory in the 1996 NFC Divisional playoff en route to the Super Bowl XXXI title, and a 23-10 win at San Francisco in the 1997 NFC Championship game.

- ▶ The two teams met in the playoffs for a fourth straight season in 1998, with the 49ers winning 30-27 on QB Steve Young's last-second TD pass to WR Terrell Owens, marking one of San Francisco's two wins in these teams' last 15 contests.

NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Packers head coach Mike McCarthy was the 49ers offensive coordinator in 2005...Packers outside linebackers coach Kevin Greene played for the 49ers in 1997...Packers quarterbacks coach Ben McAdoo served as assistant offensive line coach/quality control for the 49ers in 2005... Packers QB Aaron Rodgers is from Chico, Calif., and played collegiately at Butte College in Oroville, Calif., and the University of California...Packers RB Alex Green also played at Butte College...Packers WR Jeremy Ross played at the University of California and attended high school in Elk Grove, Calif. ...Packers C/G Evan Dietrich-Smith is from Salinas, Calif. ...Packers CB Jarrett Bush is a native of Vacaville, Calif. ...Packers WR James Jones is from San Jose and attended San Jose State...Packers LB Clay Matthews' grandfather, Clay Sr., played defensive line for the 49ers for four seasons (1950, 1953-55)...49ers secondary coach Ed Donatell served as Green Bay's defensive coordinator from 2000-03...49ers head coach Jim Harbaugh and Packers tight ends coach Jerry Fontenot were teammates with the Chicago Bears...Harbaugh and Packers secondary-safeties coach Darren Perry were teammates with the San Diego Chargers in 1999...Packers DB Charles Woodson played for the Raiders when Harbaugh was on the staff there as an offensive assistant in 2002-03; Woodson was also a teammate of 49ers WR Randy Moss for one season (2005) in Oakland...McCarthy coached with 49ers offensive line coach Mike Solari in Kansas City from 1997-98...Packers defensive coordinator Dom Capers and 49ers defensive coordinator Vic Fangio coached together with the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars (USFL), the New Orleans Saints, Carolina Panthers and Houston Texans...49ers offensive coordinator Greg Roman worked on Capers' staffs in Carolina and Houston...49ers special teams coordinator/asst. head coach Brad Seely also worked on Capers' staff in Carolina...Packers special teams coordinator Shawn Slocum was 49ers LB Patrick Willis' position coach for one season at Ole Miss (2005)...Packers vice president/general counsel Ed Policy's father, Carmen, worked in San Francisco's front office in the 1980s and 1990s, including a time as president and chief executive officer...49ers QB Colin Kaepernick was born in Milwaukee...49ers QB Scott Tolzien played at the University of Wisconsin...49ers quarterbacks coach Geep Chryst is a native of Madison, Wis., and coached at Wisconsin-Platteville (1987) and Wisconsin (1988)...49ers assistant secondary coach Greg Jackson coached on the staff at Wisconsin in 2010...Former college teammates include Packers LB A.J. Hawk and 49ers WR Ted Ginn Jr. and S Donte Whitner (Ohio State), Packers QB Graham Harrell and 49ers WR Michael Crabtree and CB Darcel McBath (Texas Tech), Packers TE Jermichael Finley and 49ers CB Tarell Brown (Texas), Packers CB Sam Shields and 49ers LB Tavares Gooden (Miami), and Packers G Josh Sitton and 49ers FB Bruce Miller (Central Florida).

LAST MEETING, POSTSEASON

Jan. 13, 2002, at Lambeau Field; Packers won, 25-15.

- ▶ The Packers trailed the 49ers, 7-6, at the half before outscoring San Francisco, 19-8, in the second half.
- ▶ QB Brett Favre connected on 22 of 29 passes (75.9 percent) for 269 yards and two TDs with one INT for a 112.6 passer rating.
- ▶ WR Antonio Freeman caught six passes for 84 yards (14.0 avg.) and a TD and RB Ahman Green rushed for 86 yards and a score on 21 carries (4.1 avg.).
- ▶ 49ers QB Jeff Garcia completed 22 of 32 passes (68.8 percent) for 233 yards and a TD with one INT.
- ▶ Garcia's 14-yard TD pass to WR Tai Streets with 12 minutes remaining tied the game at 15, but a 45-yard FG by Ryan Longwell and a 9-yard TD run by Green with less than two minutes remaining gave Green Bay the win.

HOW THEY HAVE FARED

Since the NFL went to a 12-team playoff format in 1990, the Packers have been the No. 3 seed in the NFC four times (1995, 2002, 2004, 2012).

- ▶ This will be the 11th time that the Packers have played in the divisional round in their 15 playoff appearances since 1990. Green Bay has a 5-5 (.500) record in the divisional round, including a 2-1 mark (.667) under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**.
- ▶ A breakdown of the Packers' playoff seeds, and their postseason record as that seed, since 1990:

THE WINS KEEP COMING

With a win in Week 15 at Chicago, Green Bay posted its fourth straight 10-win season, tying a franchise record (1929-32, 1995-98, 2001-04).

- ▶ A win against Tennessee in Week 16 brought the Packers' win total over the past four seasons to 47, which ranks second in franchise history:

THE RECEIVING TREE

In Green Bay's 31-17 victory over Arizona in Week 9 at Lambeau Field, TE Tom Crabtree caught a 72-yard touchdown pass on the final play of the third quarter to extend the Packers' lead to 31-17.

► It marked the **longest TD reception by a Green Bay tight end** since Paul Coffman scored on a 78-yard grab at Miami on Oct. 28, 1979.

► For Crabtree, it was his second TD catch of 45-plus yards this season. In Green Bay's Week 6 win at Houston, he caught a 48-yard TD pass from Rodgers in the fourth quarter.

► According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Crabtree became the **first Green Bay tight end since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger** to have two touchdown catches of 45-plus yards in a season.

► Crabtree had three TD receptions this season, with the other coming in Week 2 when he posted a 27-yard scoring grab on a shovel pass from P Tim Masthay on a fake field goal.

► Crabtree had a 49.0-yard average on his three TDs this season, **No. 2 in the NFL this season** among players with three or more touchdown catches:

▶ Woodson's nine interception TDs over six seasons (2006-11) were tied for the most by a player over a six-year period in NFL history, matching the mark of Houston Oilers safety Ken Houston (1967-72).

▶ With his first INT for a TD coming in his rookie season of 1998, the time from Woodson's first INT-TD to his most recent spans 14 seasons (1998-2011). That ranks tied for No. 3 in NFL history behind only Rod Woodson (1987-2002) and Deion Sanders (1990-2004), according to the Elias Sports Bureau.

▶ His INT return for a score against the Broncos was his ninth career with the Packers, further extending his franchise record. Adderley ranks No. 2 in team annals (seven, 1961-69).

▶ It was also Woodson's 10th defensive TD (nine INTs, one fumble return) in a Green Bay uniform, which further extended his franchise mark.

▶ He led the Packers with a career-high five forced fumbles in 2010. He was the **only defensive back in the NFL** to register four or more forced fumbles each season in 2009 and 2010.

▶ A look at where Woodson ranks in career forced fumbles among active defensive backs (according to STATS LLC):

▶ Woodson achieved the highest individual honor bestowed upon a defensive player, taking home *The Associated Press* Defensive Player of the Year award in 2009.

▶ In 2009, Woodson became the fourth player in NFL history since sacks became an official statistic to record at least nine interceptions and two sacks in a single season.

▶ Woodson registered two sacks in 2011, his fourth straight season with two-plus sacks. He was the **first defensive back in franchise history** (since 1982) to accomplish that feat.

- ▶ When Matthews intercepted Giants QB Eli Manning at New York in Week 13 of 2011 and returned the pick 38 yards for a score, it marked the third straight season that he had scored a defensive TD.
- ▶ Matthews is the **only player in franchise history** to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ Matthews posted a career-high three interceptions in 2011. It was tied for the most in a season by a Green Bay linebacker since 1984.

- ▶ Matthews was named to his fourth straight Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the **first Packer** to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the league.
- ▶ He received first-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Packer LB to earn that recognition since Tim Harris in 1989. Matthews finished second to only Pittsburgh S Troy Polamalu in the AP Defensive Player of the Year voting a season ago.
- ▶ With a sack of QB Jon Kitna in the second quarter in Week 9 of 2010, Matthews became the first Packer since the stat became official in 1982 to register a double-digit sack total in each of his first two seasons in the NFL.
- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Matthews became the **first NFL player** since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to register double-digit sacks and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the NFL.
- ▶ In 2009, Matthews set a Packers rookie record with 10 sacks on his way to earning Pro Bowl honors, the first Green Bay rookie to be named to the all-star game since Hall of Fame WR James Lofton in 1978.
- ▶ Matthews tied LB Tony Bennett (29.5) for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the NFL (since 1982).

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Green Bay went 7-1 away from Lambeau Field in 2011, with the seven road wins setting a single-season franchise record.

- ▶ The Packers have been able to stay above the .500 mark on the road during Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** tenure, a notable achievement in the National Football League.
- ▶ Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only 10 of 32 NFL teams have regular-season road records above .500.

311 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Vikings in an NFC Wild Card contest this season brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 311 games (293 regular season, 18 playoffs).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 56th season of football in 2012. A total of 635,610 fans have made their way through the turnstiles for the nine home contests this season.
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark this season.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 41-9 (.820) at home over the past 50 regular-season games.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

- ▶ His 762 points from 2006-12 rank No. 1 in NFL history for the most points scored by a player in his first six seasons, topping the mark of Indianapolis Mike Vanderjagt (755, 1998-2003).
- ▶ In 2011, set a franchise record with a 58-yard field goal in Week 7 at Minnesota, eclipsing the mark of 56 yards he held (Week 1 at Philadelphia, 2010; Week 5 at Atlanta, 2011).
- ▶ Ranks No. 4 in team annals with 762 career points, having surpassed Paul Hornung (760) this season at Minnesota in Week 17. Needs 59 points to surpass No. 3 Chris Jacke (820).
- ▶ Reached the 700-point mark for his career in his 89th game, second fastest to 700 in team history behind only Hornung (87 games).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most 100-point seasons with six, trailing only K Ryan Longwell (eight).
- ▶ Made 23 straight field goals from Week 13 of 2010 through Week 10 of 2011, the longest regular-season streak in franchise history as he eclipsed Chris Jacke's mark of 17 (1993).
- ▶ For his career, has hit 100 of 111 field goals (90.1 percent) from 39 yards and closer.
- ▶ Has hit 38 of 54 field goals (70.4 percent) from 40-49 yards.
- ▶ Has hit 14 of 34 field goals (42.4 percent) from 50-plus yards.

80 DONALD DRIVER

- ▶ Has 10,137 career receiving yards, which ranks No. 1 on the franchise's all-time list. Surpassed James Lofton (9,656) at Carolina in Week 2 of 2011.
- ▶ Surpassed Sterling Sharpe (595) in 2009 to become the franchise's all-time leader in receptions. Driver now has 743 career catches.
- ▶ Had a reception in 133 consecutive games, besting the franchise's previous long streak of Sharpe's 103 (1988-94), before not catching a pass in Week 7 of 2011 against Minnesota.
- ▶ In 2010, had 50-plus receptions for the ninth time, extending his franchise record. Lofton and Sharpe each had seven seasons with 50-plus catches.
- ▶ Holds Lambeau Field records for receptions (363) and receiving yards (5,000).
- ▶ Topped the 1,000-yard receiving mark for a seventh overall season and sixth consecutive in 2009, extending his own team record in each category.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team annals with 27 TD catches at Lambeau Field, trailing only WR Antonio Freeman (36) in the stadium's history.
- ▶ Has 22 career 100-yard receiving games, which is No. 5 in team history.
- ▶ With 61 career TD receptions, ranks No. 3 in team history behind only Hutson (99) and Sharpe (65).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 5 in team history with Paul Hornung with 62 overall touchdowns. Is four shy of No. 4 Sharpe (66).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 all-time in yards from scrimmage with 10,354, trailing only RB Ahman Green (11,048).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most games played with 204, trailing only QB Brett Favre (255).

88 JERMICHAEL FINLEY

- ▶ Is the only tight end in franchise history to register three 55-catch seasons (2009, 2011, 2012).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 all-time among Green Bay tight ends with three 100-yard receiving games in his career, trailing only Paul Coffman (six).
- ▶ Ranks No. 3 among TEs in team history with 2,485 receiving yards and needs 110 more yards to surpass No. 2 Ron Kramer (2,594).
- ▶ Is No. 4 among TEs in team annals with 198 receptions. Needs five more catches to move past No. 3 Ed West (202).
- ▶ In Week 4 vs. New Orleans, surpassed 2,000 career receiving yards in his 52nd career game, fastest among tight ends in franchise history (Coffman, 66 games).

85 GREG JENNINGS

- ▶ With 12 TD receptions in 2010, joined Sterling Sharpe, Antonio Freeman and Billy Howton as the only Packers to post 12-plus TD catches in two different seasons.
- ▶ By eclipsing the 1,000-yard receiving mark in 2010, became the fifth player in team history to post three straight 1,000-yard receiving seasons, joining Lofton, Sharpe, Freeman and Driver.
- ▶ His four career TD catches of 80-plus yards are a franchise record.
- ▶ Had 120 receiving yards in Week 17 at Minnesota for his 23rd career 100-yard game, which moved him into sole possession of the No. 4 spot in franchise history, one shy of No. 3 Don Hutson (24).
- ▶ In Week 12 vs. Detroit in 2011, surpassed 6,000 career receiving yards in his 86th career game, which tied him for the second fastest to 6,000 yards receiving in team annals behind only WR Sterling Sharpe (84 games).
- ▶ Ranks No. 7 in team history with 6,537 career receiving yards and needs 115 more yards to surpass No. 6 Antonio Freeman (6,651).
- ▶ Ranks No. 7 in franchise annals with 425 career catches and needs seven more receptions to surpass No. 6 Freeman (431).
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in team history with 53 TD catches.

52 CLAY MATTHEWS

- ▶ Only player in team history to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ His 17 sacks in his first 20 games were the most by an NFL player to start his career, eclipsing the mark of 16.5 set by Leslie O'Neal (1986, 1988) and John Abraham (2000-01).
- ▶ Is the first NFL player since sacks became an official stat in 1982 to post a double-digit sack total and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the league.
- ▶ First player in franchise annals to post 10-plus sacks in each of his first two years in the NFL.
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in team history with 42.5 career sacks.
- ▶ His 29.5 sacks from 2009-11 were tied for No. 1 in team history with Tony Bennett for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in the NFL with 42.5 sacks since 2009.
- ▶ Set a franchise rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.

12 AARON RODGERS

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with a 104.9 career passer rating.
- ▶ Set an NFL single-season record in 2011 with a 122.5 passer rating and set team marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games (eight).
- ▶ Has posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first five seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Threw a TD pass in 35 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field from 2008-12, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre, 1992-96). It was the second-longest streak in NFL history behind Dan Marino's 39-game streak from 1983-88.
- ▶ Tied a single-game franchise record with six TD passes at Houston in Week 6, matching Matt Flynn's mark (Jan. 1, 2012, vs. Detroit).
- ▶ In 78 regular-season starts, has 28 career 300-yard games, 32 three-TD games and 42 zero-INT games.
- ▶ Has posted a 100-plus passer rating 46 times. Set an NFL record for quarterbacks whose careers started since 1970 with 43 games with a 100-plus passer rating in his first 75 starts.
- ▶ Posted a 100-plus passer rating in four straight seasons (2009-12), one of only two QBs in league history to accomplish that feat (Steve Young, 1991-94).
- ▶ Is the only QB in team history with two 400-yard passing games.
- ▶ When he hit the 150-TD mark for his career, he had thrown just 42 INTs to that point, the fewest in NFL history as he surpassed Dan Marino's mark of 69 INTs at the time of his 150th TD pass.
- ▶ In 2009, became first QB in NFL history to throw 30 or more TDs, seven or fewer INTs, and rush for five TDs in the same season.
- ▶ Has registered a passer rating over 110.0 in four or more consecutive games three times in his career (Weeks 3-7, 2009; Week 9, Weeks 11-13, 2010; Weeks 1-7, 9-12, 2011), one of only two quarterbacks in franchise history (Bart Starr, 1966) to accomplish the feat in a single season.
- ▶ Is the only NFL QB since the 1970 merger to post four straight 110-plus rating games in three straight seasons (2009-11).
- ▶ Posted four or more rushing TDs in three straight seasons (2008-10), becoming only the second Packers QB to accomplish that feat (Tobin Rote, 1954-56), and eclipsed 300 rushing yards in back-to-back seasons (2009-10), the first since Rote in 1954-56.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history with 171 TD passes, having surpassed Bart Starr (152) in Week 8.
- ▶ With 18 career rushing TDs, ranks No. 2 in team history among QBs behind only Tobin Rote (29).

21 CHARLES WOODSON

- ▶ His 10 defensive touchdowns with Green Bay (nine interceptions, one fumble recovery) are a team record.
- ▶ With nine interception returns for scores, ranks No. 1 on Green Bay's all-time list, eclipsing the previous mark set by Herb Adderley (seven, 1961-69).
- ▶ For his career, has 11 INT-return TDs, which ranks tied for No. 2 in NFL history with Darren Sharper behind only Rod Woodson (12).
- ▶ Ranks No. 3 in the NFL with 26 interceptions since 2008.
- ▶ His five forced fumbles in 2010 were a career high and the most by a Packer since LB/DE Keith McKenzie posted five in 1999.
- ▶ In 2009, established career highs in interceptions (nine, tied league lead), and interception returns for TDs (three, tied league lead and team

- record), and matched a then career high with four forced fumbles.
- ▶ Has 55 career interceptions, 38 in 100 games since coming to Green Bay in 2006. Woodson had 17 interceptions in 106 games with Oakland. Is tied for No. 4 in team history with S LeRoy Butler with the 38 interceptions. Needs one more to tie CB Herb Adderley (39) for No. 3.
- ▶ Became the fourth player in NFL history since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to record at least nine interceptions and two sacks in a single season. Is the only player in NFL history to post at least seven interceptions and two sacks in back-to-back seasons.
- ▶ In 2009, became the first NFC player to win the conference's Defensive Player of the Month award multiple times in one season (Sept., Nov., Dec.).
- ▶ With nine interceptions in 2009, became only the second player in franchise history to post at least seven interceptions in three different seasons (Bobby Dillon, 1953-57).
- ▶ With two interceptions against Minnesota in Week 7 of 2011, recorded the seventh multi-interception game of his career. Six of those games have come with Green Bay.
- ▶ Became the first NFL player since sacks became an official statistic in 1982 to record two interceptions, an interception for a touchdown, a sack and a fumble recovery in the same game when he posted all of those statistics at Detroit on Thanksgiving in 2009.
- ▶ Is the only defensive back in Packers history (since 1982) to register at least two sacks in four straight seasons (2008-11).

PACKERS PROJECTED STARTERS – OFFENSE

WR Greg Jennings, 7th Year, Western Michigan, D2b-06

- ▶ Ranks in the top 10 in franchise history in receptions (7th, 425), receiving yards (7th, 6,537) and touchdown catches (5th, 53).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 5 in the NFL with 59 receptions of 25-plus yards since 2007 and is tied for No. 4 in the league with 50 TD grabs over that span.
- ▶ One of just five receivers in team history to post three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons (2008-10) and one of only four to catch 12 touchdown passes in two different years (2007, 2010).
- ▶ Has been named to the Pro Bowl each of the past two seasons (2010-11).

LT Marshall Newhouse, 3rd Year, Texas Christian, D5b-10

- ▶ Has played in all 32 games with 29 starts since 2011, opening 26 contests at LT and three at RT over that span.
- ▶ His 13 starts in 2011 were the most by a Green Bay offensive tackle.
- ▶ Gameday inactive (healthy scratch) for the first 14 contests of his rookie campaign in 2010 before sustaining a back injury in practice that sent him to injured reserve for the final two games and the entire postseason.
- ▶ Was a three-year starter at LT at Texas Christian and earned first-team All-Mountain West honors as a senior.

LG T.J. Lang, 4th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09

- ▶ Started 15 of 16 games this season and has started 31 contests over the past two seasons.
- ▶ Has started games at three different positions on the line as a pro (27 at LG, five at RT, two at LT).
- ▶ Played three different positions up front during his rookie campaign of 2009, starting games at both tackle spots and becoming the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

C Evan Dietrich-Smith, 3rd Year, Idaho State, FA-10

- ▶ Has appeared in all 16 games this season with a career-high six starts (four at LG, two at C).
- ▶ Has started games at three different positions during his career (five at LG, two at RG, one at C).
- ▶ Rejoined the Packers in Week 17 of 2010 after being released at the end of training camp that season; spent the first four weeks of the season with Seattle.
- ▶ Was the only non-drafted rookie to make the Packers' opening-day roster in 2009.
- ▶ Set an Idaho State record with 44 starts on the offensive line, playing all five positions in his college career, including the last two years at LT.

RG Josh Sitton, 5th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08

- ▶ Has started 62 games since 2009, the most by an offensive lineman in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ▶ Was selected as a first alternate for the 2013 Pro Bowl, the third straight season he has been named an alternate.
- ▶ Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association.
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, has allowed only 7.5 sacks in his four seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Was the only Packer on either side of the ball to not miss a snap from 2009-10.

RT Don Barclay, Rookie, West Virginia, FA-12

- ▶ Started the final four games at RT after playing strictly on special teams in the opening 12 games of the season.
- ▶ Signed by Green Bay as a non-drafted free agent in May 2012.
- ▶ Started at LT for three years at West Virginia. Tied a school record by playing in 52 career games, including 39 consecutive starts.
- ▶ Earned first-team All-Big East recognition as a senior, helping the Mountaineers finish No. 15 in the country in total offense (469.5 yards per game) and No. 5 in passing offense (362.5 yards per game).

TE Jermichael Finley, 5th Year, Texas, D3-08

- ▶ Has played in all 32 contests over the last two seasons and ranked No. 3 on the team this season with 61 catches, the most ever by a Green Bay tight end, for 667 yards (10.9 avg.) and two TDs.
- ▶ Is the only tight end in team history to register three 55-catch seasons.
- ▶ Set a career high with 767 receiving yards last season, the No. 2 mark in franchise annals behind only Coffman's 814 yards in 1983.
- ▶ Finished the 2009 season with Green Bay playoff-record 159 receiving yards in NFC Wild Card loss at Arizona, the third-most productive game by a tight end in NFL postseason history.

WR Jordy Nelson, 5th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08

- ▶ Caught 49 passes for 745 yards (15.2 avg.) and seven TDs this season despite missing four full games and most of two others due to injury.
- ▶ With 15 TD catches in 2011, became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 2 in the NFL with 22 TD catches since 2011, trailing only New England TE Rob Gronkowski (28).
- ▶ Became the first player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to post three 80-yard TD grabs over an eight-game span in the regular season (Week 16, 2010-Week 6, 2011).

QB Aaron Rodgers, 8th Year, California, D1-05

- ▶ His career passer rating of 104.9 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in the league this season in passer rating (108.0), No. 2 in passing TDs (39), No. 1 in TD/INT ratio (4.88, 39/8), and No. 3 in completion percentage (67.2).
- ▶ Has posted 21,332 yards as a starter, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- ▶ In 78 regular-season starts (52-26 record), has posted 28 games with 300-plus passing yards, 43 without an interception and 46 with a 100-plus passer rating.
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

RB DuJuan Harris, 1st Year, Troy, FA-12

- ▶ Was signed by Green Bay to the practice squad on Oct. 24, 2012, where he spent four games before being signed to the active roster on Dec. 1.
- ▶ Rushed for 157 yards and two TDs on 34 carries (4.6 avg.) in four games in the regular season, including a 14-carry, 70-yard outing at Minnesota in Week 17.
- ▶ Appeared in five games for the Jacksonville Jaguars in 2011, rushing for 42 yards on nine carries (4.7 avg.).
- ▶ Entered the NFL as a non-drafted free agent with the Jaguars and spent the opening 11 games of the '11 season on Jacksonville's practice squad. Also was with the Pittsburgh Steelers briefly during the 2012 preseason after being claimed off waivers from Jacksonville on Aug. 27.

FB John Kuhn, 7th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)

- ▶ Has played in 92 of 96 games (99 of 103 including playoffs) during his five-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.
- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- ▶ Only player on the team to have a rushing and receiving touchdown each of the past four seasons (2008-11), and was the first Packer to achieve that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).
- ▶ Led the team with four rushing TDs in 2011 and led the running backs with six total TDs.

PACKERS PROJECTED STARTERS – DEFENSE

LDE Ryan Pickett, 12th Year, Ohio State, UFA-06 (StL)

- ▶ Has played in 178 of a possible 192 regular-season games during his career, missing just nine contests due to injury.
- ▶ Was the only Green Bay defensive lineman to start all 16 games this season and led the line with 75 tackles (27 solo)
- ▶ Key component of Packers' No. 1-ranked rushing defense in 2009 (franchise-record 83.3 yards allowed per game), the first time in team history that Green Bay led the league in that category.
- ▶ Signed with Green Bay as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 after spending five seasons with St. Louis (2001-05). Led all NFL defensive linemen with 115 tackles in 2005.

NT B.J. Raji, 4th Year, Boston College, D1a-09

- ▶ Earned his first bid to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay defensive tackle since Bob Brown in 1972 to be voted to the all-star team.
- ▶ Has played in 52 games since 2010 (including playoffs), tied for the most in the NFL by a defensive lineman over that span.
- ▶ Led all NFL nose tackles with 6½ sacks in 2010, the third most recorded by a nose tackle since 1990 (according to STATS LLC).
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2009, the first Green Bay defensive lineman to be selected since DE Vonnie Holliday in 1998.

RDE C.J. Wilson, 3rd Year, East Carolina, D7-10

- ▶ Has played in 42 games with 11 starts during his three seasons in Green Bay. Had 37 tackles (18 solo) and a career-high 2.5 sacks this season.
- ▶ Played in all 16 games in 2011 with two starts as he registered a career-high 35 tackles (21 solo).
- ▶ Appeared in 15 regular-season games and all four playoff contests as a rookie in 2010, starting Super Bowl XLV vs. Pittsburgh with the defense employing a fourth lineman as part of its "Hippo" package.
- ▶ Named the Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year by *Sporting News* each of his final two seasons at East Carolina.

LOLB Dezman Moses, Rookie, Tulane, FA-12

- ▶ Played in all 16 games with six starts, opening four contests at ROLB for an injured Clay Matthews and the final two games of the season at LOLB.
- ▶ Led all Green Bay rookies with four sacks on the season, which was tied for No. 3 among NFC rookies.
- ▶ Was one of four non-drafted rookies to make Green Bay's opening-day roster this season.
- ▶ Played two years at Iowa before transferring to Tulane for his final two seasons. Finished his career at Tulane ranked No. 5 in school history with 15.5 sacks despite playing just two seasons for the Green Wave.

BLB A.J. Hawk, 7th Year, Ohio State, D1-06

- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Led the team with 142 tackles (105 solo) in 2012.
- ▶ Has appeared in 110 of a possible 112 regular-season games in his career, starting 107 of them.
- ▶ Tied for No. 1 among NFL linebackers in 2010 with a career-high three interceptions. Earned first career Pro Bowl selection in 2010.
- ▶ Has posted 872 tackles (622 solo), 13½ sacks, eight interceptions, 34 passes defensed, two forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries during his career.

MLB Brad Jones, 4th Year, Colorado, D7-09

- ▶ Came on in relief of D.J. Smith, who sustained a season-ending knee injury in Week 6 at Houston, and made his first career start on the inside (13 starts at OLB) at St. Louis in Week 7. Registered 99 tackles (69 solo), two sacks and a forced fumble in his 10 starts this season.
- ▶ Became a core member on special teams in 2011, appearing in a career-high 15 games and recording a career-best 11 coverage tackles.
- ▶ Worked at OLB for his first three seasons, including his rookie campaign of 2009 that saw him start seven games and register a career-high four sacks.
- ▶ Began working at inside linebacker during 2012 training camp.

ROLB Clay Matthews, 4th Year, Southern California, D1b-09

- ▶ Ranked No. 5 in the league with 13.0 sacks this season, despite missing four games due to a hamstring injury.
- ▶ Became the first Packer to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the NFL (2009-12).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting.

LCB Tramon Williams, 6th Year, Louisiana Tech, FA-06

- ▶ Is tied for No. 2 in the league in interceptions (15) and ranks No. 2 in the NFL in INT return yards (296) since 2010 (including playoffs).
- ▶ Ranked No. 2 on the team with 22 passes defensed this season.
- ▶ Despite suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener, went on to start 15 games last season and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defensed (24). Also added four interceptions.
- ▶ With three interceptions during the 2010 playoffs, tied Joe Laws (1944) and Craig Newsome (1996) for the franchise single-postseason record.
- ▶ Is the only non-drafted free agent in the NFL to post four or more interceptions each of the past four seasons (2008-11).

RCB Sam Shields, 3rd Year, Miami, FA-10

- ▶ Was limited to 10 games with eight starts this season due to injury, but registered 38 tackles (28 solo), three interceptions, 15 passes defensed (No. 3 on the team) and a sack.
- ▶ Made an impact in 2010 after making the team as a non-drafted rookie, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one season in college.
- ▶ In Green Bay's NFC Championship win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.
- ▶ Played primarily wide receiver and special teams during his first three seasons at Miami.

SS Charles Woodson, 15th Year, Michigan, UFA-06 (Oak)

- ▶ Is tied for No. 2 in NFL history (with Darren Sharper) with 11 INT returns for TDs, trailing only Rod Woodson (12).
- ▶ Ranks No. 3 in the NFL with 26 interceptions since 2008, despite missing nine games due to injury this season.
- ▶ In 2011, was named first-team All-Pro for the third time and earned his fourth consecutive and eighth career Pro Bowl bid, becoming the first Green Bay CB to earn in the honor in four or more straight seasons since Herb Adderley (1963-67).
- ▶ Named NFL Defensive Player of the Year by *The Associated Press* in 2009, becoming only the second Packer to win the award (DE Reggie White, 1998) and the oldest defensive back to earn the honor.

FS Morgan Burnett, 3rd Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10

- ▶ Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining NT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ In 2010, became only the second Packers rookie to open the season as a starter at safety since Chuck Cecil in 1988, joining then-teammate and three-time Pro Bowl selection Nick Collins (2005).
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

GREEN BAY, Wis. — The Green Bay Packers rattled and robbed Jay Cutler while Aaron Rodgers and Co. sputtered at times against the stout Chicago Bears defense.

So with all those stars on the field for the NFL's most storied rivalry, the biggest play of the day was a gutsy call for a perfectly executed fake field goal in Green Bay's 23-10 victory at Lambeau Field on Thursday.

With the Packers facing a 4th and 26 from the Chicago 27 and lined up for a field goal late in the second quarter, punter Tim Masthay flipped the ball to backup tight end Tom Crabtree, who streaked into the end zone.

The Packers' defense did the rest. Cutler threw four interceptions, including a pair to Tramon Williams. Facing a fierce pass rush all night, Cutler was sacked seven times, including 3.5 for Clay Matthews. New Bears wide receiver Brandon Marshall was held to two catches for 24 yards.

It was an impressive rebound for the Packers from an unsettling season-opening loss to San Francisco. Thursday's game was a huge step backward for the Bears, who were filled with confidence after steamrolling Indianapolis in their opener.

Rodgers finished the game 22 of 32 for 219 yards with a touchdown and an interception. The touchdown went to Donald Driver, who barely played in the loss to San Francisco.

Cutler threw a late touchdown to Kellen Davis, cutting the lead to 23-10 with 6:49 remaining. But the Bears couldn't mount a comeback as Matthews and the Packers kept turning up the heat.

Bears running back Matt Forte provided much of what little offense the Bears could muster before leaving the game in the third quarter. He appeared to twist his right ankle while being tackled by Charles Woodson.

Marshall missed a huge opportunity early in the third, when Cutler found him streaking wide open in the end zone -- but the wide receiver couldn't haul it in, and the Bears had to settle for a 45-yard field goal by Robbie Gould that cut the lead to 13-3.

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. — The Packers' five-game winning streak came to an end as Eli Manning threw three touchdowns and the Giants routed Green Bay 38-10 in a nationally televised game Sunday night.

Coming on the heels of last season's loss in the playoffs, it was the Packers' second straight lopsided loss to New York (7-4) and this one seemed worse than the 37-20 setback. It also left them a game behind Chicago (8-3) in the NFC North.

The Giants dominated in all phases on a night that Manning set a franchise record with his 200th career touchdown pass.

The 38 points were the most given up by Green Bay this season and it came in a game in which Aaron Rodgers was sacked five times and hit at least as many times.

The Packers were missing such key starters as linebacker Clay Matthews, defensive back Charles Woodson and receiver Greg Jennings, and it showed.

New York struck early with a brilliantly conceived screen pass to Ahmad Bradshaw off a fake reverse to Victor Cruz. Bradshaw sped down the field before being caught at the Green Bay 2, a 59-yard pickup that led to Andre Brown's scoring run.

Brown later broke his leg; Giants head coach Tom Coughlin did not say which leg after the game.

Green Bay didn't flinch, with Jordy Nelson getting behind Corey Webster in single coverage down the right sideline for a 61-yard TD reception from Rodgers.

The scoring flurry went back in the Giants' favor -- and pretty much stayed there -- when Manning hit Rueben Randle in the back of the end zone for a 16-yard TD. It was the first score for the rookie and Manning's first touchdown throw in four games, and he set it up with, of all things, a scramble in which he laid his shoulder into Packers cornerback Tramon Williams for a 13-yard gain.

Webster's interception led to Lawrence Tynes' 43-yard field goal late in the first quarter for a 17-7 lead, and the Giants weren't nearly done. Manning's 9-yard connection with Cruz tied him for the club record with 199 career TD passes, and after Osi Umenyiora's strip-sack of Rodgers was recovered by Jason Pierre-Paul at the Green Bay 23, Bradshaw scored from the 13.

CHICAGO — The Green Bay Packers delivered the ultimate comeback to the Chicago Bears on Sunday, a 21-13 victory that gave Green Bay its second straight NFC North title and put a serious dent in Chicago's playoff hopes. Aaron Rodgers connected with James Jones on all three touchdowns, and Clay Matthews continued his dominance of Jay Cutler with two more sacks as the Packers won their sixth straight against their archrivals. The Packers are assured of a home playoff game and, at 10-4, are still in the running for the No. 2 seed in the NFC.

Brandon Marshall scored Chicago's only touchdown, but finished with 56 yards on six catches, his fewest totals in a month. Cutler had another dismal day against the Packers, throwing an interception that led to the game-winning touchdown. He's been picked off 17 times by the Packers, including 10 in his last five games.

The Bears managed only 67 yards the entire second half, and Alston Jeffrey was whistled for offensive pass interference three times — yes, three — in the final 16 minutes of the game.

The Packers piled almost 400 yards on Lance Briggs and his buddies, and turned a 7-0 deficit into a 14-7 lead over the last 4:19 of the second quarter thanks to a pair of Rodgers-to-Jones TDs sandwiched around a Casey Hayward pick.

The Packers made it 21 unanswered points on the first drive of the second half. In another third-and-long situation, Rodgers threw incomplete to Jeremie Michael Finley.

But Green Bay got a second chance when Chris Conte was called for pass interference. After a delay of game penalty, Rodgers found Jones for a 6-yard score.

It was Jones' first three-touchdown game and the fourth multiple-TD game of his career.

The Bears had chances to get back into it. Green Bay's Mason Crosby missed two more field goals, and Charles Tillman forced a fumble by Ryan Grant that Nick Roach recovered. Chicago got a big break on the next play when Green Bay safety Morgan Burnett hauled Alston Jeffrey down right in front of the end zone — and right in front of an official. The pass interference penalty gave Chicago the ball at the Green Bay 1.

But the Bears could only get a 34-yard field goal by Olindo Mare out of it after the first of Jeffrey's pass interference penalties.

GREEN BAY, Wis. — The Green Bay Packers sure look ready for the playoffs. Aaron Rodgers threw for three touchdowns and ran for another, Ryan Grant scored twice and the Green Bay defense picked on Jake Locker early and often in a 55-7 rout of the Tennessee Titans on Sunday.

It was the most points scored by the Packers since they put up the same number against Tampa Bay on Oct. 2, 1983, and their largest margin of victory since a 52-3 win over New Orleans on Oct. 9, 2005.

The Packers (11-4) moved up to the No. 2 seed with Seattle's victory over San Francisco. Green Bay finishes the regular season next Sunday at Minnesota, and a victory would give the Packers a first-round bye.

The Packers have been one of the NFL's best teams over the past two months, winning nine of 10 games. But they haven't always been at their best against inferior teams, struggling to put away the likes of the Jaguars, Cardinals and Lions.

That wasn't the case against Tennessee. Far from it. The Titans had one of the NFL's stingiest defenses since giving up 51 points to Chicago on Nov. 4, allowing an average of 17.6 points to their past five opponents.

But Rodgers and the Green Bay offense may as well have been playing the Madden NFL video game for as easily as they piled up the yardage and the scores on the Titans.

Green Bay scored on nine of its first 12 drives — one of those misses was the end of the first half — and was six of seven in the red zone. Rodgers finished 27 of 38, and matched his season high with 342 yards passing despite sitting for most of the fourth quarter. He connected with Randall Cobb (20 yards), Greg Jennings (1) and James Jones (12) for touchdowns, and also ran 6 yards for Green Bay's first score.

Cobb had another big day, breaking Ahmad Green's single-season franchise record for net yardage the first time he touched the ball. He finished with 101 yards and has 2,342 for the year, 92 more than Green in 2009.

Green Bay's defense, meanwhile, made life miserable for Locker and the Titans. Tennessee managed to cross midfield just three times during the game, and only avoided the shutdown on Kenny Britt's 2-yard catch with 1:39 left.

MINNEAPOLIS — Back and forth they went. Adrian Peterson and Aaron Rodgers going at each other with so much on the line. The emotional pendulum swung wildly in one of the most memorable games of this long and bitter rivalry.

It was a game so good that it deserves a rematch. And that's just what it will get. Peterson rushed for 199 yards to become the seventh player to surpass 2,000 in a season and scored two touchdowns to help the Minnesota Vikings to a 37-34 victory over the Green Bay Packers on Sunday that sets up a playoff rematch next weekend.

Christian Ponder threw for 234 yards and three touchdowns in the best game of his young career and Blair Walsh kicked a 29-yard field goal as time expired for the Vikings (10-6), who won the last four games of the regular season to squeak in as the final NFC wild card. Peterson finished with 2,097 yards in his remarkable comeback season, just nine yards shy of breaking Eric Dickerson's single-season record set back in 1984.

The two teams will meet again at Lambeau Field on Saturday night because the Packers (11-5) once again couldn't find a way to stop Peterson. He needed 102 yards to join the 2,000-yard club and 208 to surpass Dickerson coming into the game. Tom Ilegems, who was injured on Dec. 2, Peterson played through the Packers again on the one-year anniversary of surgery to repair two torn ligaments in his left knee.

Rodgers completed 28 of 40 passes for 365 yards and four touchdowns, overcoming a slow start to bring the Packers roaring back into the game. The Vikings jumped out to a 13-0 lead early in the second quarter, with Peterson scoring from seven yards out and Walsh kicking a 54-yard field goal and a 37-yarder to get the Metrodome crowd rocking. Peterson went over 2,000 yards with a 20-yard burst in the third quarter, getting serenaded with chants of "MVP!" along the way.

But Rodgers isn't ready to give up his crown just yet. He hit Greg Jennings and James Jones for touchdown passes in the third quarter and Mason Crosby's second field goal of the game tied it at 27 early in the fourth quarter to set up the wild finish.

Ponder squeezed a 3-yard TD just past Packers safety M.D. Jennings' diving reach to Michael Jenkins in the fourth before Rodgers hooked up with Jordy Nelson for a 2-yard score with 2:54 to play. Peterson took over from there, ripping off a 26-yard run to put Walsh in position for the game winner.

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Had one of his most impactful games as a pro, making two game-changing INTs inside the Green Bay 20-yard line in the third quarter with the Vikings threatening to score...Became the sixth player in the NFL this season to have two INTs in the same quarter...According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he also became the first Packer to record two INTs in the same game on plays that both started at the Green Bay 25-yard line or in since CB Doug Evans did so vs. Minnesota on Oct. 22, 1995...The first turnover came on the third play of the second half after the Vikings quickly moved into the red zone following a kickoff out of bounds and a 48-yard run by RB Adrian Peterson...On the play, carried WR Michael Jenkins into the corner of the end zone as QB Christian Ponder scrambled to the right side to avoid DE Mike Neal...Ponder attempted a cross-body throw for Jenkins in the back of the end zone that was underthrown and Burnett was able to leap to haul it in...The offense would turn the possession into a 51-yard drive that resulted in a 47-yard FG by K Mason Crosby...Came back to haunt the Vikings again on the final play of the third quarter after an unnecessary roughness penalty moved them up to the Green Bay 25-yard line...This time, he was matched in man-coverage against TE Kyle Rudolph, who he undercut on a deep crossing route toward the sideline, diving to pick off Ponder's pass at the Green Bay 13...The pair of INTs were his first of the 2012 season and marked his the second multi-INT game of his career (also at Chicago, Sept. 25, 2011)...Finished the game with a secondary-leading nine tackles and three passes defended.

►**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Appeared on all 84 defensive plays and finished with

a secondary-leading 12 tackles (nine solo)...Helped contribute to a defense that held what was the NFL's top-ranked pass offense to 264 yards, almost 50 yards below its season average (312.5) entering the game.

►**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Part of a pass defense that limited Chicago to just 107 net passing yards and held them without a third-down conversion during the game...Finished with eight tackles (all solo), a forced fumble and a pass defended...Fumble came late in the second quarter after QB Jay Cutler completed a quick screen to WR Brandon Marshall...Burnett charged toward the line of scrimmage, punching the ball free from Marshall where it had to be recovered by a Bears offensive lineman for no gain.

►**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Part of another excellent performance by the Packers pass defense that limited the Titans to just 101 net passing yards and a 41.0 QB rating that was affected significantly by two INTs...Finished with seven tackles (four solo).

►**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Led the secondary with nine tackles (eight solo), a QB hit and a pressure...Came free on a blitz through the middle of the line in the second quarter and drilled Ponder as he released the ball, forcing a lofted throw that was nearly intercepted by LB A.J. Hawk, but instead caromed into the hands of WR Jarius Wright.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Part of a secondary that rendered the Vikings' passing game ineffective to the tune of just 180 yards on 11-of-30 attempts, with one TD and one INT, a QB rating of 54.9... Individually tallied five tackles (four solo) and a pass defended.

24 Jarrett Bush, CB, 7th Year, Utah State

2012 Season: Veteran special teams ace whose streak of 89 consecutive games played (including playoffs) ranks second on the roster behind K Mason Crosby's 103...Has played in all 16 games for five straight seasons (2008-12)...A member of each of the core special teams units, he was the club's leading tackler in the third phase, having posted a career-high-tying 17 stops and a fumble recovery in 2012...Has now posted double-digit tackles on special teams in seven consecutive seasons, a franchise record...Appeared in spot duty on defense and made nine tackles (six solo) from scrimmage...Was voted by teammates as a playoff captain for the third consecutive season, elected as one of two representatives for the special teams' units.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at CB and finished with five tackles (four solo), also recording a tackle on in kickoff coverage on special teams.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Returned to his role on special teams, where he tallied another tackle on the kickoff team...Also helped limit WR Devin Hester to just two punt returns for 8 yards (4.0 avg.), as a member of the coverage unit that landed three kicks inside the 20-yard line.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game, mostly on special teams, finishing with one coverage tackle...Also downed a second-quarter punt by P Tim Masthay at Seattle's 1-yard line.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played on special teams and was credited with a tackle in kickoff coverage...Helped contain dangerous returner RB Darren Sproles to just one punt return for 4 yards and three kickoff returns for 91 yards (30.3 avg.).

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Played on special teams, recording a tackle in punt coverage where he helped limit the Colts to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.) on seven punts, four of them secured inside the Indianapolis 20-yard line.

►**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Keyed a special teams coverage effort that helped the Packers win the field-position battle by 263 yards during the game (579-316) and limited talented return man CB Patrick Peterson to just four punt returns for 19 yards (4.8 avg.)...Was the first man down on a punt near the end of the fourth quarter, recovering the football after Peterson had muffed the catch...Made the recovery at the Arizona 2-yard line, but the Packers, already holding a 31-17 advantage, kneeled on the ball to run out the remaining clock and end the game.

►**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Played on special teams where he recorded a tackle in kickoff coverage...Downed a first-quarter punt by Masthay at the Detroit 2-yard line and was part of the punt coverage team that held WR Stefan Logan without a single return during the game...Also appeared briefly on four defensive plays, but did not record any statistics.

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Posted a team-leading two tackles on special teams, one each on the punt and kickoff coverage units...Elevated his tackle total to 11, the seventh consecutive season he has posted double-digit tackles on special teams, extending his own team record in that respect.

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Played on special teams, registering a tackle on the kickoff coverage unit.

►**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Led the way with two special teams tackles, collecting both of his stops on the punt coverage unit...Also saw two snaps on defense and recorded an assisted tackle.

►**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Played on special teams and tallied two tackles.

►**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Tied for the team high with two tackles on the coverage units, finishing the season with a career-high-tying 17, equaling his previous best from the 2008 season...Also saw three plays on defense and posted an assisted tackle.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Posted a tackle on the punt coverage unit...Also saw two plays on defense but did not record any statistics.

18 Randall Cobb, WR, 2nd Year, Kentucky

2012 Season: Dynamic young target who evolved into a greater role in the offense in his second season...Was been used as both a runner and receiver in 2012, setting new career highs with his team-leading 80 catches for a team-high 954 yards (11.9 avg.) and eight TDs in addition to 10 carries for 132 yards (13.2 avg.)...Also served as the team's primary returner in the kicking game, with 31 punt returns for 292 yards (9.4 avg.) and a TD, and 38 kickoff returns for 964 yards (25.4 avg.)...Set the franchise's single-season all-purpose yardage record in Week 16 vs. Tennessee (Dec. 23), as his combined receiving, rushing, kick and punt return yardage total of 2,342 surpassed RB Ahman Green's 2,250 mark set in 2003...Scored on a 75-yard punt return vs. San Francisco in the season opener, becoming the first player in NFL history to score on a kick return (punt or kickoff) in Week 1 each of his first two seasons in the league...Suffered an ankle injury on a punt return in the team's Week 16 contest vs. Tennessee (Dec. 23) and was inactive in Week 17 at Minnesota (Dec. 30).

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Opened the season with a bang for the second consecutive year with a leading performance on both offense and special teams...Followed his NFL-record 108-yard kickoff return for a TD in last season's opener vs. New Orleans with a fourth-quarter punt return that he took 75 yards for a TD, his third return in just his 17th career regular-season game...Is now tied for second in team history for career kick return TDs (Travis Williams, six), having taken two punts and one kickoff back for scores...According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he became the first player in NFL history to score on a kick return (punt or kickoff) in Week 1 each of his first two seasons in the league. On the play, eluded defenders to the outside and then raced up the right sideline past P Andy Lee on his way to the end zone...Offensively, posted a new career high with his nine catches for 77 yards.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Finished with one catch for 20 yards to go with one carry for 28 yards, the longest rush of his career...Also had a 16-yard punt return.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Made one catch for a loss of 1 yard and carried

once for 20 yards, his second 20-plus-yard rush in as many weeks...Was limited in the return game, having his three punt returns go for just 12 yards (4.0 avg.) and his only returnable kickoff netting 23 yards.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished second on offense with both his seven catches and 66 yards (9.4 avg.), seeing extended action in the second half after WR Greg Jennings left the game with a groin injury.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Again saw increased action with Jennings sidelined due to injury and finished with four catches for a team-leading and career-high 82 yards (20.5 avg.) and a TD, his first receiving score of the season...Scored on a 31-yard play in the second quarter that extended the Green Bay lead to 21-3 (following PAT), after running a slant in front of CB Jerraud Powers out of the right slot, catching a bullet from Rodgers and cruising untouched into the end zone...Also had four punt returns for 19 yards (4.8 avg.) and three kickoff returns for 95 yards (31.7 avg.), including a season-long 35 yarder.

►**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Posted a 211-yard all-purpose performance, highlighted by a career-high 102 receiving yards on seven catches (14.6 avg.), the first time he'd eclipsed the century mark from scrimmage in his career...Made some of his catches on second-reaction plays, when he adjusted his route and worked his way back into QB Aaron Rodgers' field of vision to make plays downfield...Had three catches for 46 yards on the methodical 16-play, 80-yard TD drive that opened the second half and put the Packers ahead 28-10...Also had three punt returns for 23 yards (7.7 avg.) and three kickoff returns for 86 yards (28.7 avg.), including a season-long 46-yarder late in the third quarter that ignited another TD drive.

►**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Followed up his career-high yardage output with another outstanding effort at St. Louis, catching eight passes for 89 yards (11.1 avg.) and scoring two TDs, the first multi-TD receiving outing of his career...First TD was a 5-yard catch in the back of the end zone that finished an impressive 12-play, 80-yard drive, spanning 6:56 to open the second half...Later converted two first downs with 11- and 8-yard catches on a fourth-quarter drive, capping the series with a 39-yard TD catch from Rodgers...TD came on a defensive-offsidess free play where he sprinted into the QB's field of vision and hauled in the pass in the end zone for the longest scoring reception of his career...Had his first carry since Week 3, a 19-yard carry off of left tackle in the first quarter...Also returned one punt for 15 yards and one kickoff for 23 yards.

►**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Finished with five catches for 28 yards (5.6 avg.) and his fourth TD of the season...TD came from 5 yards out when he mirrored a rolling Rodgers along the back line of the end zone, opening the Packers' scoring on their second drive of the game in the first quarter...Also had two kickoff returns for 57 yards (28.5 avg.).

►**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Turned in another electrifying performance as he continues to help propel the offense in the face of injuries to key contributors...Started as the No. 3 WR with Nelson returning to the lineup, and finished with three catches for 37 yards (12.3 avg.) and two TDs, his second multi-TD outing in three weeks and third consecutive game with a score...First TD opened the game's scoring on the offense's second drive of the first quarter...With the team facing third-and-13 from the Arizona 13-yard line, he caught a screen off a quick slant from the outside, following blocks by WR Donald Driver and TE Jermichael Finley all the way inside the 5-yard line where he spun away from S Adrian Wilson and crashed into the end zone...Two drives later, beat CB William Gay to the outside along the right sideline and hauled in a lofted pass from Rodgers over his shoulder in the end zone for a 21-yard TD that put the Packers back in front 14-7 in the second quarter...Also lined up in the backfield on a handful of plays, carrying the ball three times for 29 yards (9.7 avg.), contributing to a rushing output of 176 yards on 39 carries (4.5 avg.), the most on the ground by the Packers in more than three years (Oct. 25, 2009)...On special teams, returned three kickoffs for 90 yards (30.0 avg.), including a 44-yarder to open the second half and had three punt returns for 46 yards (15.3 avg.), highlighted by a 28-yard return in the first quarter.

►**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Finished with a team-high and career-high tying nine catches for 74 yards (8.2 avg.) and the game-winning TD late in the fourth quarter...Also had two carries for 19 yards (9.5 avg), including a game-long 15-yarder in the third quarter to convert a third-and-1 play for the offense...TD gave Green Bay a 21-20 lead with 1:55 remaining and

came off of a corner route against CB Jacob Lacey from the left slot, catching the pass from Rodgers in the end zone while also avoiding S Ricardo Silva, who converged on the play just after the ball arrived...Catch was particularly impressive as his right hand was mostly tied up during the play and he had to secure it with just his left...Also had four kickoff returns for 71 yards (17.8 avg.) during the game.

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Led the team in receiving with four catches for 39 yards (9.8 avg.) and also had one carry for 12 yards...Returned two punts for 20 yards (10.0 avg.) with a long of 15.

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Tied for the team lead with six catches for 62 yards (10.3 avg.)...Long gain of 33 yards came on a third-and-12 to extend a fourth-quarter drive that ultimately spanned 18 plays and 73 yards, and ran 11:00 off the clock...His catch pushed the offense into FG range and K Mason Crosby converted from 31 yards to give the Packers a 23-14 two-possession advantage.

►**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Notched his second 100-yard receiving game of the season, equaling the season-high 102-yard effort he had at Houston in Week 6...Totaled a team-high seven catches (14.6 avg.), highlighted by his game-long 38-yarder in the fourth quarter, converting a third-and-11 and leading to a 41-yard Mason Crosby FG four plays later that gave the Packers a two-score advantage, 27-17...Also returned three kickoffs for 75 yards (25.3 avg.) and had his long punt return go for 13 yards.

►**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Posted his second consecutive 100-yard receiving game, this time racking up a career-best 115 yards on a team-high six catches (19.2 avg.)...Did not find the end zone, but almost all of his catches were critical, drive-extending plays that helped the Packers mount a 21-7 lead...The first was his game-long 31-yarder in the second quarter, a highlight-reel catch along the sideline amid three Chicago defenders...The play converted a third-and-6 and the offense would score its first points three plays later on a 29-yard TD pass from Rodgers to Jones...Made a 13-yard catch to convert a third-and-7 on the team's second TD drive just before halftime...Had a 12-yard catch on a key fourth-and-6 in Chicago territory on the opening drive of the second half that also resulted in a TD...Also had two kickoff returns for 37 yards (18.5 avg.).

►**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Eclipsed Green's franchise record for all-purpose yardage on his first touch, a 14-yard punt return in the first quarter...Posted three catches for 62 yards (20.7 avg.) and his eighth TD of the season, scoring on a 20-yard pass from Rodgers with 4:28 remaining in the opening quarter that extended the Packers' lead to 14-0...Suffered an ankle injury on a punt return in the third quarter and did not return.

►**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Was limited during the practice week due to the ankle injury suffered vs. Tennessee...Was listed as a gameday inactive for just the second time in his career (also Week 17 of 2011, vs. Detroit).

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Returned to action during the practice week and was in the starting lineup on gameday...Had one catch for 7 yards on offense and returned four punts for 17 yards (4.3 avg.).

83 Tom Crabtree, TE, 3rd Year, Miami (Ohio)

2012 Season: Reserve tight end known mostly for his ability as a blocker, but evolved as a receiving threat in this his third season...Appeared in 14 games with four starts...Suffered a shoulder injury in the preseason that was aggravated in Week 2 and forced him to miss the first game of his career at Seattle in Week 3...Also suffered a hamstring injury at Chicago in Week 15 that sidelined him for the team's Week 16 game vs. Tennessee...For the season, set career highs with eight receptions, 203 receiving yards (25.4 avg.) and three TDs.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on special teams and on offense, but did not record any statistics.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Had the leading role in the game's most memorable play, a 27-yard TD off of a shovel pass on a fake field goal late in the second quarter...On the play, lined up at his normal position on the left end of the line of scrimmage...At the snap, turned to the inside of the formation to collect the pass from P Tim Masthay, before cutting up the field through the right side of the line behind a series of blocks from C/G Evan Dietrich-Smith, G/T Don Barclay and T Bryan Bulaga and racing untouched into the end zone...The play converted a fourth-and-26 from the 27-yard line and marked the second regular-season TD reception of his career.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Was limited during the practice week with a lingering shoulder injury and was listed as a gameday inactive for the first time in his career, breaking a streak of 39 consecutive games played dating back to the 2010 season opener.

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Returned to action and got the start as part of a two-tight end set...Finished with one catch for 16 yards.

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Started as part of a three-TE set and finished with one catch for 6 yards.

► **at Houston Texans (10/14):** Made another impactful scoring play in prime-time, this time a career-long 48-yard reception resulting in a TD that put the Packers ahead 35-17 in the fourth quarter...On the play, a third-and-1, ran through an attempted jam by S Glover Quin, while the Texans rushed seven defenders at QB Aaron Rodgers...Turned to see Rodgers throw a perfect strike as he was being hit, and caught the ball at the 32-yard line, running untouched the rest of the way for the score...Also made a key 14-yard reception on a shovel pass in the first quarter, running over S Troy Nolan and fighting his way to the Houston 6-yard line to set up a TD pass from Rodgers to WR James Jones on the following play.

► **at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Appeared on 29 offensive plays, but did not record any statistics.

► **vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Played on offense but did not record any statistics.

► **vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Once again took advantage of an opportunity to make arguably the game's most impactful play...Was on the receiving end of a 72-yard TD pass from Rodgers to extend the Packers' lead to 31-17 on the final play of the third quarter, thwarting what was beginning to look like an Arizona comeback...On the play, lined up in the backfield in front of Rodgers who took the snap from the shotgun...Emerged through the line as if he was lead blocking for RB Alex Green, freezing LB Paris Lenon, who he then passed on a seam route, entering into a secondary void of defenders...Caught a perfect throw from Rodgers at the 43-yard line and outran the rest of the defense to the end zone for what was a career-long 72-yard catch, the longest pass play by the Packers through nine games of the 2012 season...Play marked the longest TD reception by a Green Bay TE since Paul Coffman's 78-yard catch at Miami on Oct. 28, 1979, and combining his 48-yard TD at Houston, he became the first Packers TE since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970 to have two catches of 45-plus yards in the same season.

► **at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Played on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

► **at New York Giants (11/25):** Played on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Finished with two catches for 20 yards (10.0 avg.), his first multi-reception outing since Week 6 at Houston...Also stayed in on several plays as an extra pass protector, allowing Rodgers time to complete 27-of-35 attempts for 286 yards and a TD.

► **vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Played on offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics...Did have a key block on RB DuJuan Harris' fourth-quarter TD run, blocking DE Cliff Avril to the outside and helping to create the large alley used by Harris as he went untouched 14 yards into the end zone.

► **at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Saw 12 plays on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

► **vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Missed the practice week with a hamstring injury sustained late in the game at Chicago...Listed as a gameday inactive.

► **at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Returned to action after sitting out the previous week with the hamstring injury...Played on both offense and special teams, but did not register any statistics.

► **NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Appeared on both offense and special teams, finishing with one catch for 10 yards.

2 Mason Crosby, K, 6th Year, Colorado

2012 Season: Veteran specialist who connected on 21-for-33 on FG attempts and converted each of his 50 PAT tries...Also kicked 35 touchbacks during the regular season.

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Did not attempt a FG, but did make both of his PAT tries and boomed three touchbacks on his four kickoffs.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Converted each of his first three FG attempts on the young season, boasting makes of 48, 35 and 54 yards during the game...The 54-yarder came early in the fourth quarter and marked the longest FG by a Packer in Lambeau Field history, besting the previous record of 53 yards...Also had a hand in the game's most memorable play, a fake FG late in the second quarter that resulted in a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree...On the fake, released out to the left side of the field mocking a potential pass pattern...Drew CB Charles Tillman away from the shovel pass inside to Crabtree, thus creating one less defender in the pursuit of the ball...Also hit three of his five kickoffs for touchbacks and was successful on all three PAT attempts.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Converted both of his FG tries during the game, hitting from both 29 and 40 yards in the third quarter to pull the Packers to within a point at 7-6 after being shut out in the first half...Also kicked two of his four kickoffs for touchbacks.

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Did not attempt a FG, but was good on all four of his PATs...Was efficient in the kickoff game, helping to limit explosive return man Darren Sproles to just 91 yards on three returns (30.3 avg.), also hitting two touchbacks.

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Had his most challenging day as a professional, missing both FG attempts on the afternoon, including a 51-yarder he pulled wide left that would have tied the score 30-30 with :03 remaining in regulation...First miss was a 52-yarder he pushed wide to the right late in the third quarter...Did have a productive day on kickoffs, hitting five touchbacks without allowing a return.

► **at Houston Texans (10/14):** Did not officially attempt a FG (had a make negated by a defensive penalty), but was successful on each of his six PAT tries and also hit four touchbacks on kickoffs.

► **at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Tied his season high with three successful FG tries, converting from 47, 23 and 48 yards out...Marked his 19th career game with three or more FGs...Missed a 58-yard try before halftime that would have tied the franchise record kick he made at Minnesota in Week 7 of 2011...Successfully executed a surprise inside kick on the kickoff that followed the Packers' first TD in the first quarter...Bounced a high kick off the turf that was bobbled by CB Trumaine Johnson and eventually recovered by LB Jamari Lattimore at the Rams' 49-yard line...Capped the ensuing possession with a 47-yard field goal...Has now succeeded on four of his last five inside kicks dating back to the 2009 playoffs...Also converted each of his PAT tries and had three touchbacks on traditional kickoffs.

► **vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Was 1-for-2 on FG attempts, missing a 32-yard FG off the right upright in the third quarter, his first miss inside of 50 yards in 2012...Later converted from 25 yards late in the fourth quarter to extend the Green Bay lead to 24-15 with less than a minute remaining in the game.

► **vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Missed his first FG attempt, a 44-yarder, wide to the left in the first quarter, but rallied to make a 33-yarder early in the third...Converted all four PAT attempts and hit three touchbacks, contributing to a field position battle that the Packers won by more than 260 yards during the game (579-316).

► **at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Had yet another difficult day, pulling FG attempts of 50 and 38 yards wide to the left, both of which would have tied the game's score in the second and fourth quarters, respectively...Recovered to make a 39-yarder with :19 remaining in the fourth quarter to extend Green Bay's lead to 24-20, and forcing Detroit to attempt a desperation TD drive in the waning moments.

► **at New York Giants (11/25):** Missed his first attempt from 55 yards out in the first quarter but rallied to later convert from 28 yards in the second.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Converted a season-high-tying three FGs in four attempts, hitting from 30, 31 and 47 yards, his 20th career game with three or more FGs...31-yarder came with 4:00 remaining in the fourth quarter and gave Green Bay a 23-14 lead, a two-possession advantage that ended up being the game's final score...Also kicked three touchbacks on kickoffs.

▶**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Rebounded to convert FGs from 26 and 48 yards during the game, banging the second off the right upright and in with 4:40 remaining in the second quarter...Also matched his career high with seven successful PAT attempts en route to posting a season-high 13 points.

2012 Season: Young defender who has appeared as an interior pass rusher in the team's various sub-packages as a rookie...For the season, appeared in 13 games and posted 18 tackles (11 solo), two sacks and two fumble recoveries, including one he returned for a TD and a pass defended.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Listed as a gameday inactive for his first NFL game.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Made his NFL debut against the division-rival Bears, appearing on 14 plays and finishing with one solo tackle that was also his first career sack...Play came in the fourth quarter when he fought off a block from veteran C Roberto Garza and wrapped up QB Jay Cutler as he stepped forward in the pocket for a 1-yard loss.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game on defense, but did not record any statistics.

2012 Season: Initially the primary reserve at each of the three interior OL positions, who also saw starting duty at LG in Weeks 11-14...Re-entered the starting lineup in Week 16 vs. Tennessee as the coaching staff elected to initiate a transition between he and veteran C Jeff Saturday...Appeared in all 16 games, making a career-high six starts...First saw his most extended scrimmage action in Week 9 vs. Arizona as the first man off the bench when RT Bryan Bulaga suffered a hip injury and did not return...Originally moved into the starting lineup at LG at Detroit in Week 11 with regular starter T.J. Lang moving to RT in the absence of the injured Bulaga, who was placed on injured reserve.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game exclusively on special teams.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Participated on special teams, playing an integral role in the game's most memorable play, a 27-yard TD pass on a fake field goal attempt late in the second quarter...As part of the protection unit on the play, blocked out on S Chris Conte, driving the DB away from the line of scrimmage and helping to create the wide lane used by TE Tom Crabtree as he raced into the end zone to give the Packers a 10-0 lead (following PAT).

80 Donald Driver, WR, 14th Year, Alcorn State

2012 Season: All-time leading receiver in franchise history, played in 13 games with one start and made eight catches for 77 yards (9.6 avg.) and two TDs.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on offense, but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Played in the game on offense and caught a 26-yard TD from QB Aaron Rodgers in the fourth quarter that extended the Green Bay lead to 23-3...The scoring play was his lone reception of the

game and marked the 60th receiving TD of his career.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game on offense, but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished with one catch for 3 yards.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Game marked his 197th in a Green Bay uniform, moving him past QB Bart Starr for No. 2 all-time in team history behind QB Brett Favre (255)...Made one catch for 14 yards, a key play that came with :25 remaining in the fourth quarter...The catch moved the Packers to the Indianapolis 33-yard line for a 51-yard FG attempt to tie the game near the end of regulation.

88 Jermichael Finley, TE, 5th Year, Texas

2012 Season: Athletic tight end who played in all 16 games with 14 starts and ranked third on the team with a career-high 61 catches for 667 yards (10.9 avg.) and two TDs...The 61 catches was also a franchise single-season record for a TE.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at TE and finished with seven catches for 47 yards (6.7 avg.) and a TD...Capped 10-play, 80-yard drive to score the team's first TD of the young season, catching a 1-yard slant between two defenders in the end zone in the second quarter.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Collected four catches for 26 yards (6.5 avg.).

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Finished with four catches for a team-high 60 yards (15.0 avg.)...Two of his catches converted key third downs on a pair of second-half scoring drives, including his game-long 31-yarder that continued a march toward the offense's first FG in the third quarter.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Was particularly productive with his limited opportunities, finishing with 54 yards on four catches (13.5 avg.), seeing each of his receptions move the chains for first downs.

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Started and posted three catches for 51 yards (17.0 avg.)...Made an alert reception of an errant throw by Rodgers that was affected when the QB was hit by DE Justin Tuck...Finley followed the deflection in the air and secured it for a 16-yard gain, saving a potential INT.

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Tied for the team lead with six catches for 60 yards (10.0 avg.), his highest reception total since the season opener vs. San Francisco (seven)...Three of his catches resulted in first downs on third-down plays.

►**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Finished with two catches for 16 yards (8.0 avg.)...Made both receptions on the opening drive of the second half that ended with a 27-yard TD run by Rodgers...On Rodgers' TD play, drew LB Justin

Durant with him in coverage along the right sideline, attracting the LB far enough away to help create the alley used by Rodgers to run up the field into the end zone.

►**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Continued his second-half momentum, making five catches for a season-high 70 yards (14.0 avg.)...Four of his five catches went for first downs.

►**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Tied for the team lead with a season-high eight catches, also posting a season-best 72 yards (9.0 avg.)...Made his fourth catch of the game and 57th of the season just before halftime, breaking Paul Coffman's (56 - 1979) franchise record for catches by a TE in a season...The eight catches were his most in a game since he had nine at Chicago, Sept. 27, 2010...Long gain was an acrobatic 20-yard catch along the Packers sideline in the fourth quarter, advancing a third-and-21 into a fourth-and-1 that the offense would convert on the following play...Also threw a strong downfield block on CB Chris Cook following a short reception along the sideline by Jones...The play sprung Jones all the way up the field for a 30-yard gain.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Finished with one catch, a 10-yard play on the offense's first TD drive in the first quarter...Suffered hamstring cramps in the second half and did not return to the game.

49 Robert Francois, LB, 3rd Year, Boston College

2012 Season: Versatile backup linebacker and special teams performer, has played in all 16 games as a core player on special teams and ranked second on the team with a career-high 13 coverage tackles.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on special teams and was credited with a tackle on the punt coverage team.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Appeared in the game on special teams and recorded a tackle on the punt team when he wrapped up and carried the dangerous WR Devin Hester out of bounds on a fourth-quarter punt return that went for only 1 yard.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Played in the game on special teams and was credited with one coverage tackle.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Appeared in the game on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Returned to the team in time to participate in all three practices during the week and was active on gameday...Saw his lone carry come on the team's seven-play, 59-yard TD drive in the fourth quarter, breaking a 13-yard run off the left side of the line.

▶**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Carried eight times for 32 yards (4.0 avg.)...Saw his game-long 14-yard carry in the third quarter end negatively when the ball was punched loose by CB Charles Tillman and the Bears recovered.

20 Alex Green, RB, 2nd Year, Hawaii

2012 Season: Young runner who returned from the knee injury that prematurely ended his rookie season in 2011 and assumed a prominent role in the backfield following a season-ending foot injury to Cedric Benson that originally occurred in Week 5...Suffered a concussion late in the game at Chicago in Week 15 and was held out of action the following week...For the season, played in 12 games with four starts and carried 135 times for a team-leading 464 yards (3.4 avg.) and made 18 catches for 125 yards (6.9 avg.).

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Dressed for the game, but did not play.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Made his season debut, his first regular-season

action since Week 7 of 2011, and carried twice for 2 yards (1.0 avg.).

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Dressed for the game, but did not play.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Saw extended action after Benson suffered a foot injury in the second quarter...Finished with 10 carries for 63 yards, and ripped off his career-long 41-yard run to set up a go-ahead TD late in the fourth quarter...On the play, took a handoff from QB Aaron Rodgers on the first play of the drive...Followed a lead block from TE Ryan Taylor through the hole off LG and then put a move on S Tom Zbikowski in the open field before cutting back to the right past S Antoine Bethea and racing up the sideline where he was pushed out of bounds at the Indianapolis 8-yard line...Set up a TD pass from Rodgers to James Jones on the next play that gave Green Bay a 27-22 lead with 4:34 remaining...Marked the longest run by a Packer since RB Ryan Grant's 80-yarder vs. Oakland on Dec. 11, 2011.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Made the first start of his NFL career and acquitted himself very well against a talented Texans defense that entered the game ranked No. 3 in the NFL in yards allowed...Carried 22 times for 65 yards (3.0 avg.), providing the needed balance to offset a Rodgers-led passing game that racked up 338 yards and six TDs during the game... Also added one catch for 8 yards...Made an excellent pick-up of a blitz by LB Bradie James in the fourth quarter on what was a seven-man pressure, allowing Rodgers time to find TE Tom Crabtree for a 48-yard TD pass that extended the Packers lead to 35-17.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Started for the second consecutive week and had a challenging day against St. Louis' active front...Finished with 20 carries for 35 yards (1.8 avg.), often meeting penetrating Rams defenders in the backfield...Did make marked contributions in the passing game where he had a career-high four catches for 29 yards (7.3 avg.).

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Started at RB and once again had trouble finding consistent running lanes, carrying 22 times for 54 yards (2.5 avg.)...Added four catches for 28 yards (7.0 avg.).

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Yielded primary RB duties to James Starks, and appeared in spot duty on six offensive snaps...Did not register on the stat sheet with either a rush or reception.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Returned to regular action on offense, carrying a team-high 10 times for 30 yards (3.0 avg.)...Also made three catches for 20 yards (6.7 avg.).

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Teamed with Starks to produce 124 yards on 27 combined carries (4.6 avg.) as part of a balanced offensive attack that netted 435 total yards on the afternoon...Individually, carried 12 times for 58 yards (4.8 avg.) and added one catch for 12 yards.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Came on in relief of Rodgers late in the game with the Packers comfortably ahead 42-24...Handed off seven times and did not attempt a pass.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21) - at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Dressed for the game, but did not play.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Entered the game in place of Rodgers for the final drive of the fourth quarter with the team trailing by 28 points... Attempted the first two passes of his career, completing one to FB John Kuhn for an 11-yard gain.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Did not play.

▶**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Did not play.

▶**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Did not play.

▶**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Entered the game early in the fourth quarter with the Packers holding a 41-0 advantage...Guided three true possessions, two of which culminated with TD runs by RB Ryan Grant... Completed 1-of-2 pass attempts for 11 yards.

▶**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Did not play.

▶**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Did not play.

26 DuJuan Harris, RB, 1st Year, Troy

2012 Season: Reserve ball-carrier who was signed to the active roster from the Packers' practice squad, Dec. 1...Filled the roster void created by an injury to RB Johnny White (concussion) sustained in Week 12 at the N.Y. Giants and was active on gameday in Week 13 vs. Minnesota... Originally joined the practice squad on Oct. 24...Saw his first game action in Week 14 vs. Detroit (Dec. 9), when he made his first career start in the Packers' backfield...For the season, appeared in four games with two starts and carried 34 times for 157 yards (4.6 avg.) and two TDs.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Was signed to the active roster on Dec. 1, assuming White's role as the team's No. 3 RB...Dressed for the game, but did not play.

▶**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Opened the game in the backfield, making his first career start in what was his first regular-season action since Week 17 of 2011...Finished with seven carries for 31 yards (4.4 avg.) and a TD...Took a handoff from QB Aaron Rodgers on the offense's opening play of the game and slashed off of RT for a 13-yard gain...Later carried on back-to-back plays on the opening drive of the fourth quarter...Capped the seven-play drive with a 14-yard scoring run off of RG, where he burst through a large hole to score the first TD of his career and give Green Bay a 24-17 lead.

▶**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Saw action in his second consecutive game, carrying five times for 27 yards (5.4 avg.)...Opened the second half with the team's longest run of the game, a 21-yard burst off of left guard that kick-started a 13-play, 79-yard TD drive that extended the Packers' lead to 21-7.

▶**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Enjoyed increased playing time as one of just two active RBs on gameday as RB Alex Green (concussion) joined RB James Starks (knee) on the inactive list...Started the game in the Packers' backfield and carried eight times for 29 yards (3.6 avg.) and a TD, scoring on a 7-yard burst off the right side early in the third quarter.

▶**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Posted career highs with 14 carries and 70 yards (5.0 avg.), all of which were amassed over the final three quarters... Also made his first receptions as a Packer, finishing with two catches for 17 yards (8.5 avg.).

▶**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Started at RB and delivered

another dynamic performance...Carried 17 times for 47 yards (2.8 avg.) and a TD, but was especially effective as a receiver out of the backfield, making a game-high five catches for 53 yards (10.6 avg.)...Accounted for 50 of the 82 yards (22 rushing, 28 passing) on the offense's first TD drive late in the first quarter, capping the series with a 9-yard cutback run that saw him extend over the goal line for the first postseason TD of his career.

50 A.J. Hawk, LB, 7th Year, Ohio State

2012 Season: Productive, durable defender enjoying his seventh season in Green Bay, having played in 110 of a possible 112 regular-season games with 107 starts in his six-plus years...Started all 16 games and finished as the team's leading tackler with 142 tackles (105 solo) and also recorded three sacks.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Led the defense with a team-high 17 tackles (12 solo)...One of his stops came when he teamed with DB Charles Woodson to stop RB Frank Gore on a third-and-1 at the Green Bay 25-yard line late in the first half to force a FG.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Finished with five tackles (three solo)...Stuffed a screen pass to RB Matt Forté in the first quarter, beating a block by C Roberto Garza to drop Forté for a 1-yard loss.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Tied for the lead among LBs with eight tackles (all solo), helping to hold Seattle to just 14 first downs and 238 total yards during the game.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Started on defense, but was featured in a more limited role with the defense in DB-heavy personnel groupings to match the Saints' spread attack...Finished with five tackles (all solo).

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Started and helped key a run defense that limited Peterson to 99 yards on 22 attempts (4.5 avg.), just the second time he'd been held under 100 yards rushing since Week 7 of the regular season...Finished with two assisted tackles.

29 Casey Hayward, CB, Rookie, Vanderbilt

2012 Season: Promising rookie defender who spent time in a starting role in the secondary due to injuries, while also serving as a contributor on special teams...For the season, made 55 tackles (42 solo), to go with his team-leading six INTs and a team-best 24 passes defended...The six picks are tied for fourth most in the NFL among all players (most among rookies) and are tied for the most by a Packers rookie since CB Mike McKenzie posted six in 1999...By collecting the first four over a consecutive three week stretch, (Weeks 5-7), he became the first Packers rookie since S Tom Flynn in 1984 to record four INTs in a three-game span...Also added four tackles on special teams.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut on special teams, recording a tackle in kickoff coverage when he brought down RB Kendall Hunter after a 31-yard return in the fourth quarter.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Saw extended action on defense as part of the various sub-packages, primarily as the team's fourth CB in the dime personnel grouping...Finished with three tackles (all solo), as part of a defense that helped hold the Bears to just 74 net passing yards during the game.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Saw playing time on defense as part of the team's DB-heavy subpackages, finishing with one solo tackle and his first career pass defended...Broke up a pass from QB Russell Wilson to WR Golden Tate on a third-down play that forced a punt in the second quarter... Also recorded a tackle on special teams.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Saw extended scrimmage action against the Saints spread attack, finishing with a season-high eight tackles (six solo) and a pass defended...Broke up a third-down pass from QB Drew Brees intended for WR Marques Colston in the second quarter to force a punt.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Appeared on 43 plays and finished with two tackles (both solo) and his first career INT...Recorded the INT early in the fourth quarter when he was matched in coverage with veteran WR Reggie Wayne...Mirrored Wayne on an out-and-up route down the sideline and got his head around in time to pick off QB Andrew Luck's throw.

►**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Saw action on 30 plays and added his second and third INTs of the season in the second half, becoming the first Packers rookie to post a multi-INT game since CB Mike McKenzie during the 1999 season (Jan. 2, 2000)...Finished the game with a team-high four passes defended...First INT came at the end of an impressive three-play sequence in the fourth, where he defended three consecutive passes from QB Matt Schaub intended for WR Keshawn Martin...The first was an out-and-up that he deflected in the end zone, the second a quick that he also broke up, and the third was his first INT, on a fade to the end zone that he again got his head around in time to spot before tipping it to himself and intercepting it behind the goal line...Made his second INT on the Texans next possession when he was trailing WR DeVier Posey in a deep zone coverage and was able to corral a deflection by S Jerron McMillian and return it 20 yards.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Started his third consecutive game and finished with six tackles (five solo), two passes defended and a forced fumble...One of his passes defended came in the third quarter when he converged with TE Rob Housler on a short pass, deflecting the high into the air where it was eventually intercepted by LB Erik Walden...Forced fumble came in the fourth quarter when he punched the ball loose from WR Andre Roberts following a 14-yard gain, but the ball rolled out of bounds.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Turned in another excellent performance against the division-rival Lions, starting at RCB and posting five tackles (four solo), a team-high four passes defended and his fifth INT of the season...Broke up back-to-back passes on the Lions' opening drive, first breaking quickly to deflect a short throw to TE Brandon Pettigrew on second down and then converging with WR Calvin Johnson on a crossing route, tackling the WR and dislodging the ball on third down, to force a punt...Interception came late in the first half and thwarted a promising Lions drive before halftime... Hawk...Finished with five tackles (four solo) and one pass defended.

►at **Minnesota Vikings (12/30)**: Saw time on 28 plays, finishing with two tackles (one solo) and a pass defended...Pass break-up came on a third down in the third quarter when he nearly intercepted a pass from QB Christian Ponder intended for TE Kyle Rudolph in the middle of the field.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13)**: Appeared in his first ever postseason game, seeing time on 33 plays and finishing with two solo tackles.

31 Davon House, CB, 2nd Year, New Mexico State

2012 Season: Carried the momentum of a strong offseason into the 2012 training camp where he was vying for the No. 2 CB position on defense...Suffered a shoulder injury in the exhibition opener at San Diego (Aug. 9) and was sidelined for the remainder of the preseason...Spent the early portion of the season rehabilitating the injury, but made his season

debut at St. Louis in Week 7...Played in nine games with five starts and posted 18 tackles (17 solo), a sack and 13 passes defended.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Practiced during the week with a protective harness on his shoulder but was listed as a gameday inactive.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13) - at Houston Texans (10/14)**: Inactive.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)**: Made his season debut at St. Louis after fellow CB Sam Shields (shin/ankle) was rendered inactive due to injury...Served as the team's dime CB, appearing on 22 defensive plays and made one tackle and a team-high three passes defended, the first defensive statistics of his career...Made an impressive play on a fourth-and-2 from the Green Bay 14-yard line in the second quarter...Converged on a slant by WR Brandon Gibson, breaking up the pass to force a turnover on downs and keep the Rams from scoring.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28)**: Started his first career game on defense as the team's third CB minus Shields...Appeared on 55 defensive plays and finished with two solo tackles and two passes defended...Also had a key hand in one of the game's most defining plays when he blocked a second-quarter punt that was recovered by LB Dezman Moses in the end zone for a TD...On the play, crept down toward the line of scrimmage from his jammer position on the perimeter to the left edge of the Packers' rush... Broke up a QB John Skelton throw intended for WR Michael Floyd in the fourth quarter, a ball that went through his hands for what would have been an INT.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Started his third straight game with the defense opening in its nickel alignment...Appeared on all 72 defensive plays (a career-high) and finished with two tackles (both solo), his first career sack and two passes defended...Sack came in the fourth quarter when he charged forward from a shallow zone coverage as QB Matthew Stafford stepped out of a collapsing pocket and dropped him for a 3-yard loss... Contributed to a pass defense that limited Stafford to just 17-of-39 passing for 266 yards, two INTs and a 54.0 rating (a season-low through 10 games).

85 Greg Jennings, WR, 7th Year, Western Michigan

2012 Season: Standout big-play threat who ranks in the top 10 in franchise history in receptions (7th, 425), receiving yards (7th, 6,537) and touchdown catches (5th-53)...Suffered a groin injury in the season opener vs. San Francisco and then re-aggravated the injury in Week 4 vs. New Orleans causing him to be shut down for the subsequent six weeks... Returned to action in Week 13 vs. Minnesota (Dec. 2)...For the season,

made 36 catches for 366 yards (10.2 avg.) and four TDs.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Finished with five catches for 34 yards (6.8 avg.).

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Missed the practice week following a groin injury suffered in the fourth quarter of the season opener vs. San Francisco...Was challenged by the short turnaround for the Thursday night game was listed as a gameday inactive.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Returned to the lineup and got the start, finishing with a team-high six catches for 35 yards (5.8 avg.).

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Played in the game in the first half, making one catch, a 9-yard TD that put the Packers ahead 14-7 (following PAT) early in the second quarter...Aggravated his groin injury later in the quarter and did not return for the second half...TD was the 50th of his career, moving him past Lofton and into a tie for No. 5 in team history with Max McGee.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Was ruled out of the game early in the week after being shut down by the coaching and training staffs, in an attempt to allow him to fully rehabilitate the nagging groin injury.

►vs. **Minnesota Vikings (12/2)**: Returned to the gameday lineup for the first time since Week 4, and participated with little restriction, seeing time on 53 plays...Finished with four catches for 46 yards (11.5 avg.), including a key 8-yard grab on a third-and-8 in the fourth quarter that extended the offense's season-long, 18-play, 11-minute scoring drive.

►vs. **Detroit Lions (12/9)**: Started his first game since Week 3 at Seattle and finished with one catch for 27 yards.

►at **Chicago Bears (12/16)**: Finished with four catches for 50 yards (12.5 avg.)...His 19-yard catch-and-run in the second quarter helped get the offense away from its own goal line and kick-started the unit's first TD drive that culminated with a TD pass from QB Aaron Rodgers to WR James Jones.

►vs. **Tennessee Titans (12/23)**: Tied for the team lead with a season-high seven catches for 45 yards (6.4 avg.) and a TD...Scored on a quick-hitting 1-yard TD in the third quarter as the offense hurried to the line and Rodgers fired him the ball before the defense had fully set itself...Marked the 51st TD of his career and gave him sole possession of fifth place all-time in franchise history for TD catches...He had previously been tied with WR Max McGee.

►at **Minnesota Vikings (12/30)**: Had his most productive outing of the season, moving inside in place of the injured WR Randall Cobb (ankle) and finishing with season highs in catches (eight), yards (120) and touchdowns (two)...The yardage total was his highest since he posted 147 on Oct. 23, 2011, also at Minnesota, and the eight catches were the most he'd had since Week 3 of 2011 at Chicago (nine)...First TD kicked off the team's scoring in the second quarter when he mirrored a scrambling Rodgers in the back of the end zone and hauled in the 3-yard pass for the score...Saw his season-long 45-yard catch come on the opening drive of the second half when he caught a short throw over the middle, put an impressive juke move on LB Chad Greenway and then jetted up the right sideline to the Minnesota 8-yard line...Finished the drive two plays later when he released from the left slot into the left side of the end zone, where he was left all alone in a coverage miscue and Rodgers found him for a 5-yard TD...Also had a critical third-down, drive-extending catch on the offense's game-tying TD drive in the fourth quarter, beating CB Marcus Sherels on a slant from the right slot, gaining 14 yards to move the chains on a third-and-4...Game marked his first multi-TD outing since Dec. 5, 2010, vs. San Francisco and was the sixth of his career.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13)**: Started and posted four catches for a team-high 61 yards...Made a critical catch on a fourth-and-5 in the second quarter, running a stop route along the left sideline and then breaking CB Chris Cook's tackle, advancing the ball 32 yards to the Vikings' 2-yard line to set up a 20-yard FG by K Mason Crosby.

43 M.D. Jennings, S, 2nd Year, Arkansas State

2012 Season: Young defender who took on an increased role from scrimmage following an injury to veteran S Charles Woodson (collarbone)...Appeared in all 16 games with 10 starts and made 46 tackles (41 solo), an interception that he returned for a TD and five passes defended...Also added 10 tackles on special teams, the third-highest total on the club.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Appeared in the game on both defense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Appeared in the game on both defense and special teams, but did not record any statistics...Was at the center of the controversial play that decided the game in Seattle's favor when he jumped to intercept a ball in the end zone as time expired...Despite what was ultimately determined to be simultaneous possession, an official review determined that the ball changed hands and was in fact wrestled away by WR Golden Tate, giving the Seahawks a 14-12 victory (following PAT).

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Appeared in the game on defense and special teams in the first half, but suffered a shoulder injury and did not return...Was credited with two solo tackles on defense before leaving the game.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Played on special teams and also briefly on defense...Tallied a tackle in punt coverage, his first special teams stop of the season.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14)**: Saw action on both defense and special teams, seeing 28 plays on defense and making a career-high eight tackles (all solo)...Made an impressive solo stop in the fourth quarter on a crossing route by Pro Bowl WR Andre Johnson, trailing the receiver across the field and closing on him after only a 2-yard gain...Also added a tackle in kickoff coverage.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)**: Received his first career start and appeared on 27 defensive plays, finishing with three solo tackles...Was a key part of the well-executed surprise onside kick the Packers called late in the first quarter...On the play, teamed with CB Jarrett Bush to hit Rams CB Trumaine Johnson as he leapt to receive the ball, jarring it loose and allowing LB Jamari Lattimore to make the recovery...Also later added a tackle on the kickoff coverage team.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28)**: Started at FS as Morgan Burnett moved over to SS in the absence of injured veteran Charles Woodson (collarbone) who was inactive for the game...Saw action on a career-high 65 plays and finished with seven tackles (six solo) and two passes defended...Continued to contribute extensively on special teams where he also posted a coverage tackle.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Once again started at FS and appeared on 57 plays, finishing with three tackles (one solo) and two passes defended.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Made the most impactful play of his young career when he returned an INT 72 yards for a TD in the third quarter against the division rival...INT was the first of his career and came when he was trailing TE Tony Scheffler on a deep crossing pattern...QB Matthew Stafford's throw was behind Scheffler, who reached back to catch it, but instead bobbed it into the air where it was secured by Jennings...He side-stepped a tackle attempt by T Riley Reiff near the sideline early in the return and went untouched the rest of the way before being tackled into the end zone by WR Titus Young...The TD gave Green Bay a 14-10 lead and was the longest INT return for a TD by a Packer since S Aaron Rouse's 99-yarder vs. Indianapolis, Oct. 19, 2008...For the game, finished with two tackles (both solo) and two passes defended.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Started at FS, and appeared on 45 defensive plays, finishing with five tackles (four solo).

►vs. **Minnesota Vikings (12/2)**: Started at FS and finished with four solo tackles.

►vs. **Detroit Lions (12/9)**: Started at FS and appeared on 72 plays, finishing with four solo tackles.

►at **Chicago Bears (12/16)**: Finished with three tackles (two solo), helping to limit the Bears to just 190 yards of total offense, including just 135 through the air...Also added his eighth tackle of the season on special teams.

2012 Season: Entered the season as one of the team's leading special teams players, but eventually moved into the starting lineup in the middle of the Packers' defense following season-ending injuries to LBs Desmond Bishop (hamstring) and D.J. Smith (knee)...Appeared in all 16 games with 10 starts and recorded new career highs with 101 tackles (71 solo) and six passes defended, while also adding two sacks and a forced fumble... Also had two tackles on special teams prior to being elevated to the starting lineup.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on special teams...Did not record any statistics, but made a key block on a fourth-quarter punt return that allowed WR Randall Cobb to turn the corner and race down the sideline for a 75-yard TD.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Played on special teams but did not record any statistics.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game on special teams, and was credited with a tackle in kickoff coverage.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played in the game on special teams, and although he did not record any statistics, he led the charge in helping to contain dangerous return man Darren Sproles to just one punt return for 4 yards and three kickoff returns for 91 yards (30.3 avg.).

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Played on special teams and finished with a tackle on the punt coverage unit, helping to limit the Colts to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.) on seven punts.

►**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Started and posted six tackles (three solo, one for loss)...Tackle for loss came on a second down play in the fourth quarter with the Lions threatening inside the Green Bay 10-yard line...Shot between C and LG and met RB Mikel Leshoure in the backfield for a 2-yard loss...The ensuing third down fell incomplete and Detroit was forced into a FG attempt.

►**at New York Giants (11/25):** Appeared on all 65 defensive plays, finishing with eight tackles (six solo, one for loss).

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Started and saw time on all 55 defensive snaps, finishing with eight tackles (seven solo, one for loss) and a pass defended...Pass defended came late in the third quarter when he raced down the sideline in man-coverage against RB Adrian Peterson and the

underthrown ball deflected off of his back and out of bounds.

►**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Started and appeared on 83 defensive plays, finishing with a career-high 15 tackles (12 solo) and a QB pressure.

►**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Finished with a team-leading 13 tackles (10 solo) and two passes defended in what was one of his most active, impactful games since he assumed starting duty in Week 7...Made a pair of no-gain stops on RB Matt Forte on back-to-back plays near the goal line late in the third quarter, twice thwarting the ball carrier on a defensive stand that would ultimately force a turnover...Also had a pair of passes defended in coverage against the Bears' talented RB...The first came on a go-route down the right sideline that he swatted away in the first quarter and another on a third-down play over the middle in the fourth quarter that he jarred loose, forcing another FG attempt.

►**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Finished with a team-high 10 tackles (seven solo), a sack and a pass defended as part of a dominating defensive effort that held the Titans to just 180 total yards and seven points during the game...Sack came late in the fourth quarter when he surged through the line and dropped QB Jake Locker for a 6-yard loss.

►**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Appeared on 68 plays and finished with 10 tackles (seven solo) and a pass defended.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Started his second playoff game in as many seasons, his first at ILB and finished with five tackles (two solo)...Helped stymie the Vikings' vaunted rushing attack, as the Packers defense held Peterson to 99 yards on 22 carries (4.5 avg.).

89 James Jones, WR, 6th Year, San Jose State

2012 Season: Veteran WR who took advantage of injuries and increased opportunities to have his most productive start to a season to this point in his career...Has set career highs in each of the major statistical categories, including his 64 catches and 784 yards (12.3 avg.) and his NFL-leading 14 TD catches...Became the first Packer to lead the NFL in TD catches since WR Sterling Sharpe did so with his franchise-record 18 in 1994...By catching two TDs in each game between Weeks 4-6, he became just the second player in team history to do so in three straight games, joining Don Hutson (1943)...Was also voted by teammates as a playoff captain for the first time in his career, joining QB Aaron Rodgers as the two representatives for the offense.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started the game as part of a three-WR set and finished with four catches for a game-high 81 yards (20.3 avg.) and a TD...Scored on a 10-yard TD pass from Rodgers with 6:05 remaining to pull the Packers to within one score at 30-22.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Finished the game with two receptions for -1 yards (-0.5 avg.).

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Placed second on the team with both five catches and 55 yards (11.0 avg.)...Three of his five grabs moved the chains on key third downs.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Started and posted the second multi-TD game of his career (also vs. Chicago, Dec. 25, 2011), finishing with five catches for 56 yards (11.2 avg.) and two scores during the game...First TD came in the first quarter on a second reaction that saw Rodgers roll to his left and fire a pass for TE Jermichael Finley in the end zone that Jones stepped in front of and plucked for a 12-yard TD to open the game's scoring...Second TD came in the second quarter when he beat CB Jabari Greer to the inside and hauled in a 14-yard TD from Rodgers to put Green Bay ahead 21-7 (following PAT)...Later sealed the game with an excellent catch on a critical third-and-3 with under two minutes remaining...On the play, caught a stop-fade from Rodgers - despite a pass interference on Greer - allowing the Packers to run out the remaining time and secure a 28-27 win.

►**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Finished with his second multi-TD outing in as many weeks, tying for a team-high four catches for 46 yards (11.5 avg.) and two TDs against the Colts...First TD came on a third down from the Indianapolis 6-yard line when he caught a short pass from Rodgers and battled his way to the pylon to extend the Green Bay lead to 14-0 in the second quarter...Later helped reclaim the lead for the Packers when he caught a bullet from Rodgers between defenders in the end zone for an 8-yard score that put the team in front 27-22...With the catch, became the second Packer in as many years to post back-to-back multi-TD games,

joining Jordy Nelson (Weeks 10-11, 16-17, 2011), and has now scored five or more TDs in four consecutive seasons.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Totaled three catches for 33 yards (11.0 avg.) and two TDs, joining Hutson (1943) as the only other player in franchise history to post three consecutive multi-TD games in a season... Also became the first Packer to post seven or more TD receptions in the season's first six games since Billy Howton had eight in 1956...First TD came late in the first quarter when he dragged across the field in front of S Danieal Manning, diving to make the 6-yard catch in the end zone to give Green Bay a 14-0 lead...Second TD was an exceptional catch in the fourth quarter that extended the Packers lead to 42-17, effectively putting the game away...On the play, released to the outside in single coverage against CB Kareem Jackson along the right sideline...Dove in the end zone to make a full-extension catch of a Rodgers throw, securing the ball as he went to the ground for his seventh TD of the still young season...Also drew a 28-yard defensive pass interference penalty on Jackson in the second quarter that set up a TD pass from Rodgers to WR Jordy Nelson on the following play.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Started and posted six catches for 53 yards (8.8 avg), with a long of 17...Had three of his catches for 32 yards (10.7 avg.) on the team's second-half opening drive that spanned 80 yards in 12 plays, took 6:56 off the clock and culminated with a Rodgers 5-yard TD pass to WR Randall Cobb.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Once again got the start and led the offense with a team-high seven catches and 78 yards (11.1 avg.)...Appeared on a season-high 66 plays in the absence of WR Greg Jennings (groin) and WR Jordy Nelson (hamstring), who were both deactivated for the game...Drew a pair of second-half penalties against CB William Middleton, the first of which was an unnecessary roughness late hit after an 11-yard catch in the third quarter...Later drew a defensive pass interference flag on the DB on a third-and-7 play that extended a Green Bay drive that resulted in a 25-yard FG by K Mason Crosby that effectively sealed the game, 24-15.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Led the team in receiving with four catches for 61 yards (15.3 avg.), including his career-high eighth TD grab of the season in the second quarter...On the play, beat CB Jamell Fleming down the left sideline, going up over the defender to haul in the pass from Rodgers, a 28-yard strike that extended the Green Bay lead to 21-7 just before halftime.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Had a quiet day by his 2012 standards, finishing with two catches for 33 yards (16.5 avg.).

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Started at WR. but was held without a reception for the first time this season.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Made the most of what were again limited opportunities, making two catches for 40 yards (20.0 avg.) and a TD... Scored the game's first points on the team's opening drive, taking advantage of an offside free play and running a streak into the end zone...In what was very similar to the TD he had against Arizona in Week 9, he made an acrobatic play by going up over CB A.J. Jefferson and pulling the ball into his body for the 32-yard score...Also made a key block on RB James Starks' 22-yard TD run in the third quarter, when he sealed S Harrison Smith to the inside, sealing off the sideline for Starks to motor in for the score.

▶**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Finished with two catches for 27 yards (13.5 avg.).

▶**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Had an efficient and especially productive outing that saw him account for all of the team's points as he posted five catches for 60 yards (12.0 avg.) and a career-high three TDs...Capped three of the offense's four possessions with TDs over an unanswered span between the second and third quarters, cashing in each time with scoring catches from Rodgers that turned a 7-0 deficit into a 21-7 lead...First TD came with 4:19 remaining in the second quarter when he beat CB Kelvin Hayden in single coverage on a go-route down the right sideline for a 29-yard score to tie the score at 7-7...The second came less than four minutes later after the offense reassumed possession following an INT by CB Casey Hayward...Lined up as the middle WR in a trips formation to the left from the Chicago 8-yard line...Ran a quick in-breaking route against CB D.J. Moore, catching a bullet from Rodgers in front of the goal line and fighting his way into the end zone for a critical score just before halftime...Final TD

capped the offense's opening drive of the second half when he caught a back-shoulder throw in the end zone against CB Charles Tillman, a 6-yard scoring play that put the Packers ahead 21-7...Marked his fourth multi-TD game of the season and the fifth of his career.

▶**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Posted his first 100-yard game of the season, tying for the team high with seven catches for a team-leading 100 yards and a TD...Marked his first 100-yard outing since Week 5 of 2011 at Atlanta (Oct. 9), with the TD coming on a 12-yard pass from Rodgers early in the fourth quarter to extend Green Bay's lead to 41-0...The TD was his 13th of the season and tied him with three others for fifth most in a season in team history...In addition, the yardage output brought his season total to 722, surpassing his previous single-season career high of 679 in 2010.

▶**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Recorded six catches for 62 yards (10.3 avg.) and his 14th TD of the season...Five of his six receptions resulted in either first downs or TDs, including his game-long 30-yard catch-and-run in the third quarter...Scored on an 8-yard play later in the third quarter when he caught a quick pass at the line of scrimmage, put a move on CB Chris Cook and burst toward the end zone, extending the ball over the goal line to bring Green Bay to within three points at 27-24.

▶**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Finished with four catches for 51 yards (12.8 avg.)...Three of his four receptions went for first downs, including key catches of 9 and 19 yards on the opening drive of the second half...Both plays converted third downs on what was ultimately a TD drive that extended the Packers' lead to 24-3.

30 John Kuhn, FB, 7th Year, Shippensburg

2012 Season: Reliable fullback and utility-man who does a little of everything in the Green Bay offense...Has played in 92 of 96 games during his six-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons...Suffered a hamstring injury at St. Louis in Week 7, and landed on the inactive list vs. Jacksonville in Week 8 (also vs. Arizona in Week 9), the first games missed due to injury in his career... In 2012, had 23 carries for 63 yards (2.7 avg.) and a TD and caught 15 passes for 148 yards (9.9 avg.).

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Appeared in the game on both offense and special teams, but did not record any statistics.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Carried the ball twice for 1 yard on offense (0.5 avg.) and had three receptions for 23 yards (7.7 avg.)...Also notched a tackle on special teams when he took down WR Devin Hester in the open field following a 7-yard punt return in the third quarter.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Played on both offense and special teams, collecting three catches for 25 yards (8.3 avg.), and also carrying once for 2 yards.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Lone carry was a meaningful one as he took a direct snap from the punt protector position on a second-quarter fourth-and-1 play, burrowing forward for a 5-yard gain...Successful fake punt resulted in a first down and the offense would score a TD nine plays later to extend Green Bay's lead to 21-7 (following PAT)...Also had a productive blocking day in front of RB Cedric Benson, who ran for a season-high 84 yards on 18 carries (4.7 avg.)...Added a tackle in punt coverage.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Had one catch for 6 yards and also carried twice for 9 yards (4.5 avg.), the first of which resulted in his first rushing TD of the season...Found the end zone on a 2-yard burst off of LG to open the scoring with 2:07 remaining in the first quarter.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Carried twice for 6 yards (3.0 avg.), but was also helpful in protection against the Texans' varied pressure packages, helping QB Aaron Rodgers find time to complete 24-of-37 attempts for 338 yards and six TDs.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Made the most of his opportunities as part of a productive day for the offense, carrying three times for 16 yards (5.3 avg.) and had one reception for 16 yards...Reception moved the sticks on a drive that ended three plays later on a 39-yard TD pass from Rodgers to WR Randall Cobb.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Missed the practice week after suffering a hamstring injury late in the second half at St. Louis...Was a gameday inactive for just the third time in his career, the first due to injury, snapping a streak of 46 consecutive games played (including playoffs).

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Inactive.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Returned to action after missing the previous two games with a hamstring injury...Played on offense, carrying one time for minus 1 yard...Was credited with making a tackle of CB Jacob Lacey following a second-quarter Aaron Rodgers INT, limiting the return to just 10 yards.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Started at FB with the offense opening in a two-back formation and finished with four carries for 17 yards (4.3 avg.)...Also had three catches for 49 yards (16.3 avg.), highlighted by his career-long 32-yard catch-and-run in the second quarter.

►vs. **Minnesota Vikings (12/2)**: Carried four times for 8 yards (2.0 avg.) and had three catches for 20 yards (6.7 avg.)...Also had a very productive day as a blocker, helping to create lanes for RBs James Starks and Alex Green to combine for 124 yards on 27 carries (4.6 avg.), providing a strong balance for an offense that produced a season-high 435 yards.

►vs. **Detroit Lions (12/9)**: Had one carry that went for a 5-yard loss, but did help contribute to a running game that netted 140 yards on 25 carries (5.6 avg.).

►at **Chicago Bears (12/16)**: Started the game as the lone man in the backfield and ultimately appeared on 31 offensive plays...Carried twice for 5 yards (2.5 avg.), but was particularly productive in his role as an extra blocker on passing downs...Had a key blitz pick-up on a fourth-and-6 in the third quarter on the Packers' third TD drive...Stepped up to block charging LB Nick Roach, stalemating him at the line and allowing Rodgers time to find WR Randall Cobb for a 12-yard gain, extending the drive.

►vs. **Tennessee Titans (12/23)**: Contributed as one of just three healthy backs that were active on gameday, serving as the third-down protector in the backfield with Rodgers...Lone reception was a key 9-yard play to convert a third-and-7 in the second quarter on a drive that culminated with a 48-yard FG by K Mason Crosby.

►at **Minnesota Vikings (12/30)**: Played on offense and special teams, again seeing time as the lone back on third downs.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13)**: Had a memorable performance, finding the end zone on two occasions, boosting the Packers on the scoreboard as he has so many other times during his career...Carried three times for 4 yards (1.3 avg.) and a TD, and also had two catches for 15 yards (7.5 avg.) and a TD...Scored TDs on back-to-back possessions sandwiched around halftime...First on a 3-yard rushing TD that capped a two-minute drive before the break, and later on a 9-yard pass from Rodgers that finished the offense's opening drive of the third quarter...The reception came when he released out of the backfield on a first-down play that saw Rodgers draw the defense with him as he scrambled before throwing back to Kuhn in the middle of the field...Kuhn raced toward the goal line, evading a shot from S Harrison Smith and then absorbing S Jamarca Sanford as he helicoptered into the end zone...Became the only player in the NFL to have scored a TD in each of the last four postseasons (2009-12) and joined RB Dorsey Levens (five straight, 1994-98) and WR Antonio Freeman (1995-98) as the only players in team history to score a TD in four or more consecutive postseasons...Also became the first player in franchise history to score both a rushing and receiving TD in two different playoff games, also doing so at Atlanta on Jan. 15, 2011.

70 T.J. Lang, G, 4th Year, Eastern Michigan

2012 Season: Ascending member of the team's core who was signed to a contract extension during the 2012 preseason...Started each of the first 12 games, the first nine at LG, before moving outside to start Weeks 12-13 at RT following a season-ending hip injury to T Bryan Bulaga in Week 9...Suffered an ankle injury of his own vs. Minnesota in Week 13 that kept him out of action in Week 14, the first game missed due to injury in his career...Returned to action in Week 15 at Chicago, settling back into his familiar LG position with rookie Don Barclay assuming starting duty at RT.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Opened the game at LG and was faced with the task of blocking standout DE Justin Smith for the balance of the game...Helped limit Smith to what was ultimately one tackle in the official game statistics and was part of a line that allowed QB Aaron Rodgers time to complete 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Started at LG...Contributed in his role on special

teams where as a member of the placement protection unit, he helped block for a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree on a successfully executed fake FG...On the play, teamed with G Josh Sitton to combination-block DT Henry Melton, before releasing to the next level and leading the way for Crabtree to get into the open and race into the end zone.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Part of a protection unit that recovered from a difficult first half to help put together three second-half scoring drives without allowing a sack over the final two quarters.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Played a key role in an impressive bounce-back performance by the offensive line that saw the team produce 421 yards of offense and four TD drives during the game...Also kept Rodgers upright to complete 31-of-41 passes for 319 yards and four TD passes, without being sacked during the game...Offense produced 30 first downs, the most by the team since they had 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Started at LG during what was an up-and-down offensive effort...Helped the offense produce 179 yards and three TD drives in the first half...Released cleanly from the line and made a good open-field block on LB Jerrell Freeman on an 18-yard screen pass to RB Cedric Benson that set up the Packers first TD in the opening quarter...Also helped engage DT Drake Nevis to the inside on a run play in the fourth quarter that resulted in RB Alex Green's 41-yard carry, the team's longest of the season through five games.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14)**: Part of a proficient offensive outing that included 427 yards of offense and six TD drives on the road against a previously undefeated opponent...Helped protect Rodgers to the tune of 24-of-37 for 338 yards and a franchise-record-tying six TD passes, while only being sacked twice...Rodgers became just the fourth QB in league history to eclipse the 330-yard mark and throw six TDs with no INTs in the same game.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)**: Helped protect Rodgers to the tune of 30-of-37 passing for 342 yards and three TDs on what was another prolific passing day for the offense...The offensive line righted itself early in the game and did not surrender a sack in the final three quarters, during which time Rodgers completed 17-of-22 for 177 yards and two TDs, leading four scoring drives (two TD, two FG).

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28)**: Started at LG...Part of the protection unit on each of Rodgers' two TD passes, the second of which moved him past Bart Starr for the second most in franchise history (153).

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Opened the game at his customary LG spot but shifted out to RT after regular starter Bulaga suffered a hip injury in the second quarter and did not return...Played the remainder of the game at RT and helped block for an offense that accumulated 384 yards and produced five scoring drives (four TDs, one FG)...Allowed Rodgers to complete 14-of-30 for 218 yards and four TD passes, while only being sacked once during the game...Also part of a run-blocking unit that pounded out 176 yards on 39 attempts (4.5 avg.), the most rushing yards by the Packers in more than three years (Oct. 25, 2009 at Cleveland).

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Started at RT for the first time since Week 16 of 2011, just the fifth start of his career at either tackle position...Helped maintain control of a talented Detroit front, holding the group to just three sacks during the game, while allowing Rodgers to complete 19-of-27 for 236 yards and two TDs, a 106.4 QB rating...The rating was his ninth consecutive of over 100 (including playoffs) in indoor games.

►at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Started at RT for the second consecutive week.

►vs. **Minnesota Vikings (12/2)**: Started at RT and appeared on 31 plays before suffering an ankle injury in the second quarter that kept him out for the remainder of the contest.

►vs. **Detroit Lions (12/9)**: Was hampered by the ankle injury throughout the practice week and even though he did dress for the game, it was only as an emergency replacement and he did not play...It marked the first game missed due to injury in his career and snapped a streak of 45 consecutive games played (including playoffs) dating back to Week 5 of 2010.

►at **Chicago Bears (12/16)**: Returned to action following the injury that held him out the previous week, and also returned to his more familiar LG position with rookie Don Barclay taking over the starting role at RT...Helped block for an offense that rolled up 391 total yards, led by Rodgers who

completed 23-of-36 for 291 yards and three TDs...Made a good block on DT Stephen Paea on Rodgers' 29-yard TD pass fro WR James Jones and blocked Paea again to the inside on RB DuJuan Harris' 21-yard run that opened the second half.

►**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Started at LG for what was the offense's most productive performance of the season, one that saw them produce 460 total yards and nine scoring drives (seven TDs, two FGs), both season highs...Blocked for an especially efficient passing game that saw Rodgers complete 27-of-38 attempts for 342 yards and three TDs...Also cleared the way for what was the unit's fifth consecutive game with more than 100 rushing yards as the Packers churned out 117 yards and four TDs on the ground.

►**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Battled inside for an offense that overcame a slow start to produce 405 yards and six scoring drives (four TD, two FG) inside the hostile Metrodome...Allowed Rodgers time to complete 28-of-40 passes for a season-high 365 yards and four TD passes with no INTs, a QB rating of 131.8.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Helped the offense produce 326 yards en route to four scoring drives (three TDs, one FG) during the game...Part of the protection unit that aided Rodgers' efficient passing performance, one that saw him complete 23-of-33 attempts for 274 yards and a TD...Blocked down on DT Fred Evans on RB DuJuan Harris' 9-yard TD run in the first quarter, helping to create the large cutback lane used by the RB to reach the end zone...Also ran a trap on FB John Kuhn's 3-yard TD run just before halftime, clearing DT Kevin Williams out of the hole used by Kuhn to extend the Green Bay lead to 17-3.

2012 Season: A core special teams player and reserve defender at the ILB position...Played in 13 games, and recorded 10 tackles and a recovered onside kick on special teams...Voted by teammates as a playoff captain for the first time, joining CB Jarrett Bush as the two representatives for the special teams units.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Listed as a gameday inactive due to an ankle injury suffered late in the preseason that limited him in practice during the week leading up to the game.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Made his season debut on special teams but did not record any statistics.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Inactive.

►**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30) - at Houston Texans (10/14):** Returned to the lineup, appearing on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

2012 Season: Established specialist whose marked consistency and improvement was rewarded with a contract extension during the 2012 training camp...For the season, punted 70 times for 3,043 yards (43.5 avg., 38.9 net), landing a franchise-record-tying 30 inside the 20-yard line (tied for No. 7 in the NFL), while also having just five touchbacks...Bested his own franchise record for net punting average set in 2011 with a slightly higher number in 2012...The Packers yielded 7.5 yards per punt return in 2012, fifth in the NFL, and their total of 179 total punt return yards allowed was the second lowest in the league...Also was credited with his first career TD pass after shoveling the ball to TE Tom Crabtree on a fake FG play in Week 2 that resulted in a 27-yard TD.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Opened the season with a difference-making performance against the 49ers...Punted six times for 289 yards (48.6 avg., 41.5 net), landing four of them inside the 20-yard line and three of them inside the 10...Limited San Francisco to just one return and left them with an average starting position at their own 16-yard line following his six attempts.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Followed up his solid opener with another memorable performance...Punted five times for 238 yards (47.6 avg., 42.0 net), landing three inside the 20-yard line and limiting WR Devin Hester to just 8 yards on two returns (4.0 avg.)...Highlight play of his night came from his role as the team's holder for placements...Flipped a shovel pass to TE

Tom Crabtree on a fake FG attempt late in the second quarter that went for a 27-yard TD to convert a fourth-and-26...Was credited with his first career TD pass, becoming the first Green Bay punter to throw one since Ron Widby threw a 68-yarder to WR Dave Davis at Houston on Nov. 19, 1972.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Punted six times for 267 yards (44.5 avg., 43.7 net), downing three of his kicks inside the 20-yard line, including one at the Seattle 1 late in the second quarter.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Was limited to just two punts for 82 yards (41.0 avg., 39.0 net), limiting the dangerous returner RB Darren Sproles to just one return for 4 yards and placing his other attempt out of bounds at the New Orleans 9-yard line.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Delivered another consistent performance, punting seven times for 316 yards (45.1 avg., 43.3 net), with a long of 58 against his initial NFL team...Landed four inside the 20-yard line for the second time in 2012, and limited the Colts to just two returns for 13 yards (6.5 avg.)...Marked the sixth time in his career that he has landed four-plus kicks inside the 20.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Punted four times for 171 yards (42.8 avg., 30.4 net), landing three of those inside the 20...Had his numbers skewed by a fourth-quarter blocked punt that came as the result of a missed blocking assignment up front...The ball was recovered in the end zone for a Houston TD, the first block he's surrendered in his career.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Punted three times for 116 yards (38.7 avg., 38.7 net), landing two inside the 20 and not allowing a return...Also held for all four of Crosby's FG attempts, including the three makes, a season high through Week 7.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Punted five times for 225 yards (45.0 avg., 41.0 net), landing one inside the 20 and also having a touchback... Attempted his second pass of the season on another fake FG play, this time an audible was called pre-snap and he lined up in the shotgun behind center with Crosby motioning out wide...Rolled to his left and attempted to throw back deep to the right side for TE D.J. Williams, but the pass fell incomplete.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Finished with six punts for 255 yards (42.5 avg., 36.0 net), landing three inside the 20-yard line...Contributed to a field position battle that the Packers won by 263 yards (579-316)...Saw his final punt later in the fourth quarter muffed by CB Patrick Peterson at the Arizona 10-yard line and it was recovered by CB Jarrett Bush at the 2... Already holding a 14-point lead, the Packers knelt on the ball three times to run out the remaining clock.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Punted four times for 176 yards (44.0 avg., 44.0 net), landing two inside the 20-yard line and holding prolific returner WR Stefan Logan without a return...One of his kicks was again downed by Bush at the Detroit 2-yard line and another was fair caught by Logan at the 8.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Punted four times for 154 yards (38.5 avg., 38.5 net), holding the Giants without a return.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Had four punts for 166 yards (41.5 avg., 41.3 net), landing one inside the 20-yard line...Also held for each of Crosby's season-high tying three FGs.

▶**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Punted three times for 133 yards (44.3 avg., 37.7 net), placing one inside the 20...Also held for Crosby's three FG tries, including conversions from both 49 and 41 yards.

▶**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Punted five times for 208 yards (41.6 avg., 33.2 net), landing one inside the 20...Delivered a clutch kick with just over a minute remaining in the game, sailing a punt out of bounds at the Chicago 3-yard line...Chicago was faced with a 97-yard field with no timeouts and were only able to run three plays before time expired...Was also credited with his first coverage tackle of the season when he made a form tackle on WR Devin Hester near the sideline in the first quarter.

▶**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Had three punts for 119 yards (39.7 avg., 35.7 net)...Also held for each of Crosby's successful FG attempts (makes from 26 and 48 yards) and all of his career-high-tying seven PATs.

▶**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Punted three times for 128 yards (42.7 avg., 30.7 net)...Saw his final punt in the second quarter downed by LB Robert Francois at the Vikings' 11-yard line, his franchise-record-tying 30th of the season to be downed inside the opponent's 20...Also held for each of

Crosby's two successful FG attempts, including a 51-yarder in the second quarter that was his first make from 50-plus since Week 2.

▶**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Tied his postseason career high with eight punts, landing three inside the 20-yard line and forcing five fair catches...His consistent hangtime and proficiency forcing the fair catches limited return man Marcus Sherels to just three returns for 25 yards (8.3 avg.)...Also helped cause a turnover with his kick early in the fourth quarter that was muffed by Sherels and recovered by LB Dezman Moses...Held for Crosby's 20-yard FG in the second quarter, a successful conversion that set a new franchise record, as it was his sixth consecutive make in the playoffs (all of which were held by Masthay).

52 Clay Matthews, LB, 4th Year, Southern California

2012 Season: All-Pro defender who was in the conversation for the league's defensive player of the year award before suffering a hamstring injury in Week 9 that sidelined him for Weeks 11-14...Prior to the injury, had enjoyed the healthiest training camp and early season of his career, participating in every practice, starting in the summer...Returned to the ROLB position in 2012 after spending the 2010-11 seasons at LOLB... For the season, started all 12 games in which he appeared and posted 59 tackles (45 solo), a team-leading 13 sacks, a forced fumble and four passes defensed.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made a welcomed return to the ROLB position he last played in 2009, finishing the season opener with four tackles (three solo) and 2½ sacks...Beat LT Joe Staley twice for sacks of QB Alex Smith during the game, the seventh multi-sack outing of his career and his most in a game since the three he had vs. Buffalo on Sept. 19, 2010.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Had one of the most dominant outings of his career, finishing with seven tackles (six solo) and a career-high 3½ sacks and a pass defensed against the rival Bears...Combined with his efforts in Week 1, the six sacks matched his personal best for the most sacks in a two-game span in his career (also had six in Weeks 1-2 of 2010)...The 3½ sacks were the most in a game by a Green Bay defender since DE Kabere Gbaja-Biamila had four at Chicago on Jan. 2, 2005, and the yardage total (29) was the second-highest of his career and helped result in a net passing total of 74 yards...Contributions led a defense that limited the Bears to just 168 total yards during the game, the fewest surrendered by the Packers in the rivalry game since Nov. 30, 1975.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Had an active game, finishing with six tackles (four solo)...Played the role of a spy on QB Russell Wilson at various times, including a third-down play in the fourth quarter where he pressured the rookie QB into a throw-away that led to a punt...Also drew a hold on LT Russell Okung on another drive in the fourth quarter.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Finished with seven tackles (five solo) and a sack...Started the game with a bang, chasing down a handoff to RB Pierre Thomas on third-and-1 on the Saints' first possession, stopping the RB for no gain to force a punt...The ensuing possession led to Green Bay's first TD of the game...Lined up in various positions during the game and surged through the middle of the line of scrimmage in the third quarter to drop QB Drew Brees for a 10-yard loss, his seventh sack of the season...The sack gave him 36½ for his career, moving him past Tony Bennett and into the No. 6 spot in franchise history in his fourth season.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Appeared on an exhausting 96 plays, finishing with three tackles (two solo), a sack that included a forced fumble and five QB hits...Sack came in the second quarter when he beat LT Anthony Costanzo around the edge and hit QB Andrew Luck before he released the ball, forcing a fumble that caromed all the way out of bounds, resulting in a third-and-12 and a subsequent punt...Later ran a stunt with DE Mike Neal, tying up both LG Jeff Linkenbach and Costanzo, allowing Neal to turn the corner on the outside to drop Luck for a 9-yard loss.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Did not trigger the sack column but was a menace in the run game and was a key part of a front that limited Pro Bowl RB Arian Foster to a career-low 1.7-yard average (min. 15 att.) on 17 carries for 29 yards...Had back-to-back plays to thwart a drive in the first quarter, first beating LT Duane Brown to trip up Foster for a 1-yard loss in the backfield and then exploding between C and LG to force QB Matt Schaub into a throwaway on third down that forced a punt.

► **at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Finished with four tackles (two solo), a sack and a pass defended...Sack was his ninth of the season and came in the third quarter when he used an outside rush to fight past LT Joe Barksdale to chase down a rolling QB Sam Bradford, dropping him for a 9-yard loss.

► **vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Posted four tackles (all solo), including one for loss while also netting three QB hits and a pass defended...Drew a holding call on LT Eugene Monroe in the first quarter that forced and third-and-18...Later shed TE Mercedes Lewis on a toss play to his side and buried RB Rashad Jennings for a 2-yard loss.

► **vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Started the game and appeared on 35 plays before suffering a hamstring injury in the third quarter...Fell awkwardly while wrapping up QB John Skelton and limped off following the play and did not return.

► **at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Missed the practice week following the team's Week 10 bye while rehabilitating the injury...Was a gameday inactive for the first time since Week 17 of 2011 (rest) and the just the second time in his career (Week 6 of 2010, also hamstring).

► **at New York Giants (11/25) - vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Inactive (hamstring).

► **at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Participated in practice throughout the week and made his anticipated return to the lineup on gameday...Started and saw action on 48 defensive plays, making his presence felt almost immediately with the kind of impactful performance the defense missed in his absence...Finished with seven tackles (all solo), two sacks and a pass defended...Made both of his sacks on stunts through the middle of the Bears' protection unit, the first of which came on the first play of the second quarter when he crossed with DE Mike Neal and dropped QB Jay Cutler for a 7-yard loss...Executed almost the same technique in the fourth quarter, this time twisting with DT B.J. Raji and bursting through a space between C and LG, nabbing Cutler again for minus-7...The first sack was his 10th of the season and gave him double digits for the third time in his career, putting him behind only DEs Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila and Reggie White (four) for the most 10-sack seasons in team history...Also was active in the run game, twice tackling RB Matt Forté behind the line of scrimmage for losses.

► **vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Helped lead an excellent defensive effort, finishing with three tackles and a sack as part of a unit that held the Titans to just 180 total yards and 10 first downs during the game...Lined up over the ball to the inside of the formation on Tennessee's first third down of the game...Played a containment technique designed to keep athletic QB Jake Locker in the pocket, spying the QB as he stepped up to run and dropping him at the line of scrimmage for a zero-yard sack, forcing a punt...Also keyed a run defense that limited standout RB Chris Johnson to just 28 yards on 11 carries (2.5 avg.)...Another of his tackles came when he fought off of a block to nail Johnson for a 3-yard loss late in the first quarter.

► **at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Posted a season-high and career-high-tying nine tackles (five solo) and a sack...Sack came on the first play of the Vikings' second drive of the game, when he beat LT Matt Kalil around the edge and ran down QB Christian Ponder from behind, dropping him for a 7-yard loss.

► **NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Delivered another difference-making performance in the postseason, setting the tone for a defense that dominated the Vikings for the first three quarters as the Packers mounted a 24-3 lead...Finished with five tackles (four solo), two sacks, six QB hits and a forced fumble that he also recovered...First sack came early in the second quarter when he fought past Kalil, but lost his footing behind QB Joe Webb...Webb began to scramble to avoid LB Erik Walden, but tripped over the fallen Matthews for a 9-yard loss...Beat Kalil around the edge with a speed rush on a fourth-down play on the Minnesota's first drive of the third quarter...Dove at Webb, punching the ball out from his low carriage and quickly recovered the loose ball as it lie in the middle of the pocket... Also helped cause another turnover later in the quarter as he diagnosed a play-action bootleg to his side, breaking down on Webb in the open field and forcing a wild throw that was intercepted by CB Sam Shields downfield... The two-sack outing matched his previous postseason career high (at Atlanta, Jan. 15, 2011) and he joined DE Reggie White as the only two players in franchise playoff history to have two-plus sacks in two games.

22 Jerron McMillian, S, Rookie, Maine

2012 Season: Rookie defender who plays regularly on special teams and also rotates both at safety and other positions as a member of the sub-defenses...Appeared in all 16 games and tallied 30 tackles (21 solo), an INT, a fumble recovery and 12 passes defended...Also had five tackles on special teams.

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut, appearing on both defense and special teams in the season opener...Finished with one solo tackle on defense.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Saw his role increase significantly after becoming the No. 1 SS in the nickel defense when veteran DB Charles Woodson moved down into the slot CB...Appeared on 44 plays and finished with three tackles (one solo), two passes defended and the first INT of his career in the fourth quarter.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Played extensively as the SS in the team's nickel and dime subpackages, finishing with two solo tackles and a pass defended...Broke up a third-down pass from QB Russell Wilson intended for WR Ben Obamanu in the first quarter to force a punt...Also had what appeared to be his second INT in as many weeks negated by a roughing-the-passer penalty in the fourth quarter.

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Again saw extended action with the defense employing several DB-heavy personnel groupings to match New Orleans' spread attack...Finished with three tackles (one solo).

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Saw action on 81 plays and finished with an assisted tackle and a pass defended.

► **at Houston Texans (10/14):** Appeared on 26 plays on defense and finished with two solo tackles and a pass defended...Pass defended came late in the fourth quarter when he had underneath coverage on a pass from QB T.J. ► **vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Rotated in the secondary, appearing on 36 plays and finishing with three tackles (all solo) and a season-high three passes defended.

► **at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Appeared on 24 defensive snaps and finished with three tackles (all solo), two passes defended and his first career fumble recovery...One of his passes defended came when he batted down a fourth-and-15 throw from QB Matthew Stafford to TE Tony Scheffler on an attempted comeback drive late in the fourth quarter, forcing a turnover on downs...Was also credited with his first career fumble recovery when he snagged a lateral out of mid-air as WR Calvin Johnson tried to keep a desperation play alive on the final play of regulation.

► **at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Saw action on 24 defensive plays and finished with an assisted tackle.

► **vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Played on defense and special teams...Did not record any statistics from scrimmage, but did tie for the team high with two tackles on the coverage units.

► **at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Appeared on 25 plays and finished with two tackles (one solo).

► **NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Saw himself relegated to No.

4 safety duty as the veteran Woodson returned from injury...Appeared on just two defensive plays and recorded a solo tackle.

91 Jordan Miller, DT, 1st Year, Southern

2012 Season: Reserve defensive lineman who was initially signed to the Green Bay practice squad, Oct. 23...Later signed to the active roster, Dec. 11, and looks to provide depth up front...Dressed for the Packers' Week 15 contest at Chicago (Dec. 16), but did not play...Originally entered the NFL as a non-drafted free agent with the Chicago Bears in 2011...Spent the first 16 weeks of 2011 as a member of the Bears practice squad and was signed to the active roster for final week of the regular season.

▶**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Dressed for the game, but did not play.

▶**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Made his NFL debut, playing on defense, mostly in the second half after Green Bay had established a comfortable lead and many veterans were rested.

▶**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Was relegated to the gameday inactive list with veteran DE C.J. Wilson (knee) and rookie DE Jerel Worthy (hamstring) returning from injuries.

▶**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Inactive.

54 Dezman Moses, LB, Rookie, Tulane

2012 Season: One of four non-drafted free agent rookies to make the opening-day roster in 2012, following an offseason program and training camp that saw him make the transition from collegiate DE to a stand-up OLB at the pro level...Was pressed into starting duty following a season-ending wrist injury to LB Nick Perry and a hamstring injury that sidelined LB Clay Matthews in Week 11...Played in each of the 16 games, with six starts, and posted 39 tackles (14 solo), four sacks and a forced fumble...Also had five stops on the various coverage units and scored his first career TD, recovering a blocked punt in the end zone vs. Jacksonville in Week 8, becoming the first Packer to score on a blocked punt since S Tiger Greene on Dec. 2, 1990.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut on special teams and appeared briefly on defense, where he was credited with one assisted tackle.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Appeared on 18 defensive plays as part of various sub-packages and finished with one assisted tackle...Was also credited with a QB hit and a pressure by the coaching staff.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Appeared in the game on defense and special teams, and tied for the team lead with two coverage tackles, both coming in punt coverage.

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Played on both defense and special teams, and was credited with one tackle on the coverage units...Tackle came on a controversial fourth-quarter kickoff return by RB Darren Sproles...It appeared Moses jarred the ball loose and recovered the fumble on the play, but the ruling on the field was that the runner was down and the Saints retained possession.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Saw his role increased significantly when Matthews suffered a hamstring injury in the third quarter and did not

return...Replaced Matthews for the duration of the game and finished having appeared on 42 plays, collecting four assisted tackles and two QB hits...Also recorded a stop on special teams.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Started in place of the injured Matthews at ROLB and appeared on a season-high 56 plays...Finished with three tackles (one solo), four QB hits, a sack and the first forced fumble of his career...Was credited with his second sack of the season for a play that came just before halftime...On the play, he abandoned an upfield rush as QB Matthew Stafford stepped up in the pocket to scramble...Slapped the ball from the QB's low carriage, forcing a fumble that was recovered by DE Mike Daniels and ultimately resulted in a FG for Green Bay on the last play of the half...Also drew a holding call on T Riley Reiff in the fourth quarter on a play that saw him still manage to fight off the block and drop RB Mikel Leshoure for a 2-yard loss.

96 Mike Neal, DE, 3rd Year, Purdue

2012 Season: Powerful, athletic defensive end and inside pass rusher who figures prominently up front in the team's sub defenses...Missed the first four regular-season games while serving a suspension for violation of the league's performance-enhancing drug policy...Since coming off of the suspension, appeared in 11 games, posting 17 tackles (10 solo) and 4½ sacks, the second-highest total on the team behind only LB Clay Matthews...Suffered a shoulder injury in Week 13 vs. Minnesota (Dec. 2) that forced him to miss the team's Week 14 contest vs. Detroit.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Made his awaited 2012 debut in his home state after going through a week of practice and being activated the day before the game...Flashed the play-making ability that made him a promising prospect when healthy his rookie season, appearing on 32 plays and recording a sack and three QB hits during the game...The sack came on a stunt with Matthews in the second quarter, when he went around the outside and corralled QB Andrew Luck for a 9-yard loss, moving Indianapolis

from Green Bay's 26-yard line back to the 35 where an ultimate 53-yard FG attempt was unsuccessful...Sack was the second of his career and first since Oct. 10, 2010 at Washington.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Saw action on 28 plays, helping to fill the void in the absence of NT B.J. Raji, who was sidelined with an ankle injury... Finished with three tackles (two solo) and a QB hit.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Appeared on nine defensive plays, finishing with a solo tackle...Suffered a knee injury in the first quarter, but later returned to the game after halftime.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Played 25 defensive snaps and tallied an assisted tackle...Suffered an ankle injury in the second half and did not return.

▶**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Returned to the field and delivered an impactful performance as a pass rusher, appearing on 18 plays and finishing with three tackles (two solo) and a career-high 1½ sacks...Tallied his first sack in the third quarter when he fought past G James Brown and pursued QB Jay Cutler toward the front of the pocket where he sacked him for a 5-yard loss...Later added the half-sack on the Bears' final drive when as part of a three-man rush, he broke away from T Gabe Carimi and teamed with DE Jerel Worthy to drop Cutler for a 9-yard loss.

87 Jordy Nelson, WR, 5th Year, Kansas State

2012 Season: Fifth-year wideout who battled injuries but remained at the forefront of the team's arsenal when healthy in 2012 after posting career highs in every receiving category (catching 68 passes for 1,263 yards and 15 TDs) in 2011...For the season, played in 12 games with 10 starts...Suffered a hamstring injury in practice prior to the Week 8 game vs. Jacksonville and was listed as an inactive...Returned to action vs. Arizona in Week 9 and suffered an ankle injury in the first half and did not return... Re-aggravated the hamstring injury in Week 13 vs. Minnesota and was sidelined for the team's Week 14 contest vs. Detroit...Recorded 49 catches for 745 yards (15.2 avg.) and seven TDs.

▶**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started and finished with five catches for 64 yards (12.8 avg.)...Was also on the receiving end of a two-point conversion pass from QB Aaron Rodgers in the fourth quarter to pull Green Bay to within eight points at 23-15.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Led the team with both six catches and 84 yards (14.0 avg.) during the game.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Finished with two catches for 19 yards (9.5 avg.).

▶**vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Rediscovered the chemistry with Rodgers that made the duo so prolific in 2011, leading the team with both his season-high eight catches and 93 yards receiving (11.6 avg.), along with his first TD of the young season...TD came in the fourth quarter when he beat a jam from CB Patrick Robinson at the line, catching a slant from Rodgers and fighting his way past both Robinson and CB Corey White to get into the end zone.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Recorded two catches for 29 yards (14.5 avg.).

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Had a near-dominant performance in primetime, equaling his career highs with nine catches and three TDs, and posting a game-high 121 yards (13.4 avg.)...Marked his second three-TD outing over the past seven games (also vs. Detroit, 1/1/12), becoming the first NFL player to accomplish the feat since WR Santana Moss in 2005-06 with Washington and the first Packer to do so since WR Sterling Sharpe in 1994...First TD opened the game's scoring on the Packers first drive when he beat CB Johnathan Joseph down the right sideline for a 41-yard score... Scored again on a first-and-10 from the Texans' 21-yard line when he was matched in single coverage against DB Alan Ball, first faking to the outside before turning into the post where he caught a dart from Rodgers just inside the goal line, absorbing a hit from Ball to finish the play...Final TD capped a 16-play, 80-yard drive by the Packers to open the second half... Ran a corner route from the right slot against S Glover Quin, wrestling the ball into his body to give Green Bay a 28-10 lead midway through the third quarter.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Led the team in receiving for the second consecutive week, finishing the game with eight catches for a season-high 122 yards (15.3 avg.) and a TD...Saw his season-long catch come in the first quarter on what was a defensive-offside free play, when he beat CB Janoris Jenkins on a go-route down the right sideline for 52 yards... Finished the drive two plays later by hauling in a back-shoulder fade from Rodgers for a 3-yard TD, putting the Packers ahead 7-3...Five of his eight catches converted third downs as Rodgers continued to look his way to keep the chains moving during the game.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Suffered a hamstring injury during the practice week and was listed as a gameday inactive...Marked the first regular-season game he'd missed since Week 9 of 2009 (knee), seeing his consecutive games played streak (including playoffs) snapped at 53.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Returned to action and started the game...Went to the ground to catch a pass on a red-zone play on the offense's second drive of the first quarter and got his foot caught awkwardly underneath him...Suffered an ankle injury on the play and did not return.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Participated during the practice week following the team's Week 10 bye and was active on gameday, starting at WR and finishing with three catches for 45 yards (15.0 avg.)...Also made a key block along the sideline on TE Jermichael Finley's 40-yard catch-and-run late in the fourth quarter...Pushed CB Chris Houston into S Ricardo Silva, effectively wiping out two players and freeing Finley down the sideline for a play that kick-started the team's game-winning TD drive.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Had one of the team's lone highlights in an otherwise forgettable game, scoring on a 61-yard TD pass from Rodgers on the offense's fourth play from scrimmage in the first quarter...On the play, beat CB Corey Webster on a stop-and-go double-move down the right sideline to tie the score at 7-7 in the game's early going...Finished with two catches for a team-high 71 yards (35.5 avg.).

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Started the game and appeared on 11 plays, but suffered a hamstring injury following a 10-yard catch in the first quarter and did not return.

▶**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Missed the practice week while rehabilitating the hamstring injury and was inactive on gameday.

► **at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Inactive.

► **vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Inactive.

► **at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Returned to the action during the week of practice and was inserted into the starting lineup on gameday...Finished with three catches for 87 yards (29.0 avg.) and a TD...Yardage total was highlighted by his season-long 73-yard catch in the third quarter...On the play, raced past CB Marcus Sherels on a vertical route after lining up as the middle WR in a trips formation to the right side...Caught the ball over his shoulder on the plus side of midfield and ran the rest of the way before behind pushed out of bounds by CB A.J. Jefferson at the Vikings' 8-yard line, setting up a TD pass from Rodgers to Jones on the following play... Later drew a key pass interference penalty against CB A.J. Jefferson on a play near the goal line late in the fourth quarter, setting up the Packers with a first-and-goal from the 2, and he would score his TD on the following play...TD capped an 11-play, 78-yard drive, and saw him catch a 2-yard back-shoulder throw from Rodgers, separating from Jefferson as he went to the ground to catch the ball, tying the score at 34-34 with 2:54 remaining.

► **NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Finished with three catches for 51 yards (17.0 avg.)...Accounted for 45 of the offense's 62 yards on a two-minute drive before the end of the first half...Kick-started the series with a 22-yard catch on the first play of that drive and followed it up two plays later with a 23-yard gain to the Minnesota 3-yard line...Set up a 3-yard TD run by FB John Kuhn that gave Green Bay a 17-3 lead going into halftime.

74 Marshall Newhouse, T, 3rd Year, Texas Christian

2012 Season: Second-year starter who settled in at LT and opened each of the team's 16 games at the key position protecting QB Aaron Rodgers' blind side...Joined G Josh Sitton as the only two OL to start every game in 2012.

► **vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Opened the season as a starter for the first time in his career and afforded himself well at LT against a formidable right side of the San Francisco front seven...Matched against the standout LB/DE tandem of Aldon Smith and Justin Smith for much of the game, helping to limit the duo to four tackles and a sack (that came on a rollout outside the pocket) on 61 offensive plays.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (9/13):** Started and appeared on all 68 plays at LT...Also saw six snaps as part of the placement protection unit including the team's second-quarter fake FG attempt that resulted in a 27-yard TD pass from P Tim Masthay to TE Tom Crabtree...On the play, went low off the snap and provided obstruction to both DE Julius Peppers and DE Corey Wootton, who were both unable to get to Crabtree as he crossed the formation to catch the shovel pass.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Overcame what was a rocky start for the offense with a bounce-back effort in the second half...Part of a line that helped produce three scoring drives after halftime and did not allow a sack over the final two quarters.

► **vs. New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Fared well in protection despite drawing the assignment of talented RDE Will Smith for the majority of the game...Part of a protection unit that did not allow a sack during the game and allowed Rodgers to complete 31-of-41 for 319 yards and four TDs...Offense accounted for 421 total yards and 30 first downs, the most by the Packers since 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989.

► **at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Part of an uneven performance by the offense that produced three TD drives in the first half, but stagnated after halftime and didn't score again until there was 4:30 remaining in the fourth quarter...Made a good block at the line of scrimmage on OLB Dwight Freeney on RB Alex Green's 41-yard run in the fourth quarter, helping to create the wide lane used by Green to emerge into the second level.

► **at Houston Texans (10/14):** Part of an offense that turned in its best performance of the season to date, netting 427 total yards and six TD drives against what was the NFL's No. 3-ranked defense entering the game... Helped create consistent time for Rodgers to complete 24-of-37 attempts for 338 yards and a career-high and franchise-record-tying six TD passes, while only being sacked twice by the Texans' formidable pass rush... Yardage total was the most surrendered by Houston since Week 3 of 2011

and a high for the Packers through six games...Drew a critical personal foul penalty against S Daniele Manning in the third quarter following a third down play...Manning was seen punching his facemask at the bottom of a pile and the flag resulted in an automatic first down at the Houston 2-yard line...Green Bay would score a TD two plays later to extend its lead to 28-10 (following PAT).

► **at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Spent much of the game matched against emerging DE Robert Quinn...Got off to a rocky start, but ultimately limited Quinn to just one tackle (a 4-yard sack) during the game...Overall, helped allow time for Rodgers to complete 30-of-37 attempts for 342 yards and three TDs, as the offense produced six scoring drives (three TDs, three FGs).

► **vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Started at LT on what was another challenging day for the offense...Both TD drives culminated with Rodgers passes, the second of which moved him past Bart Starr for the second most in franchise history (153).

► **vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Part of an OL that overcame an injury to RT Bryan Bulaga to still have a prolific outing against a Cardinals defense that ranked No. 6 in the NFL in yards allowed entering the game...Offense racked up 384 yards and produced five scoring drives (four TDs, one FG), led by Rodgers, who threw four TD passes and was only sacked once on the afternoon...Also helped support a ground game that totaled 176 yards on 39 rushing attempts (4.5 avg.), the most by the Packers since Oct. 25, 2009, at Cleveland.

► **at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Started at LT and helped attempt to control a deep and talented Detroit front...Part of an offense that put together an impressive two-minute drive near the end of regulation that saw them span 82 yards in six plays, capping it with a 22-yard TD pass from Rodgers to WR Randall Cobb...On the play, teamed with newly inserted LG Evan Dietrich-Smith to pick up a line stunt by DT Nick Fairley and DE Willie Young... Pushed Young past Rodgers, giving him enough time to complete the throw and give Green Bay its the lead, 21-20.

► **at New York Giants (11/25):** Started at LT.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Faced the task of squaring off with standout DE Jared Allen for the majority of the game and held him mostly in check, as his lone full sack came on a play where he chased Rodgers across the field in the fourth quarter and ran him out of bounds for a 2-yard loss... Helped protect for an offense that churned out a season-high 435 yards on 73 plays (6.0 avg.), highlighted by a rushing attack that produced 152 yards on 36 attempts (4.2 avg.).

► **vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Once again helped clear the way for a productive rushing offense that yielded 140 yards on 25 plays (5.6) and a season-high two rushing TDs during the game...Was opposed regularly by DEs Lawrence Jackson and Kyle Vanden Bosch, who he helped hold to a combined four tackles in the game's official statistics.

► **at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Faced the challenge of being matched against the talented Peppers for most of the game, containing him just enough to allow the offense to post 391 total yards and three TD drives...Allowed consistent time for Rodgers to complete 23-of-36 attempts for 291 yards and three TDs...Had a good set against Peppers on Rodgers' first TD pass, a 29-yard throw to WR James Jones in the second quarter that tied the score at 7-7.

► **vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Part of a protection unit that helped the offense to its most prolific performance of the season, one that included a season-high 460 yards and nine scoring drives (seven TDs, two FGs), a 55-point output that was tied for the third-highest single game total in franchise history...Allowed consistent time for Rodgers to complete 27-of-38 for 342 passing yards and three TDs, while only being sacked one time and posting a 125.1 QB rating...The three passing TDs pushed Rodgers to 80 over the last two seasons, a new franchise record for any two-year stretch.

► **at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Was again matched with the Pro Bowler Allen for most of the game, limiting the talented pass rusher to just one tackle, a sack that was not charged to him...Part of an OL that paved the way for 405 total yards of offense and scored 34 points, the most by the team at the Metrodome since 2004...Allowed time for Rodgers to complete 28-of-40 for a season-high 365 yards and four TDs with no INTs.

► **NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Helped block for the offense as it recorded 326 yards on 67 plays, while Rodgers completed 23-of-33

for 274 and a TD...Blocked Allen laterally across the field on RB DuJuan Harris' 9-yard TD run that kicked off the Packers' scoring in the first quarter...Block helped seal off a large cutback lane that Harris used to get to the goal line.

53 Nick Perry, LB, Rookie, Southern California

2012 Season: Physically impressive rookie defender who made immediate contributions early in the season before suffering knee and wrist injuries, the latter of which ended his season...Drafted by the Packers with the No. 28 overall selection in the first round and was in the process of making the difficult transition from collegiate DE to professional OLB when his season was cut short and he was placed on injured reserve, Nov. 7...Appeared in the first six games, making five starts and collecting 29 tackles (18 solo) and two sacks...Suffered the wrist injury in Week 2 vs. Chicago and played through it before further evaluation dictated surgery...Also suffered a knee injury at Houston in Week 6 that held him out of action in Weeks 7-9 before the decision was made to shut him down because of the wrist.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Made his NFL debut as the starter at LOLB, and finished tied for second on the defense with a season-high nine tackles (seven solo).

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Rotated with Erik Walden at LOLB, seeing action on 20 plays, but did not record any statistics.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Started at LOLB and tallied eight tackles (two solo) and his first career sack...Sack came in the third quarter when he fought past RT Breno Giacomini and chased down QB Russell Wilson for a 19-yard loss...Forced a third-and-32 on a drive that ultimately ended with a punt.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Started and played as part of a rotation with Walden, netting four tackles (all solo).

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Missed the practice week due to the knee injury and was inactive on gameday.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Inactive (knee).

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Inactive.

79 Ryan Pickett, DT, 12th Year, Ohio State

2012 Season: Productive, reliable pro who remains a steady contributor in this his 12th season...Was the only defensive lineman to start each of the team's 16 games up front and led the group with 75 tackles (27 solo).

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9):** Started at LDE and finished with two assisted tackles.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13):** Started and appeared on 30 plays, finishing with three assisted tackles...Part of a defensive effort that limited the Bears to just 168 total yards during the game, the fewest surrendered by the Packers in the rivalry game since Nov. 30, 1975.

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24):** Turned in an excellent performance, finishing with 10 tackles (four solo) and helping to spearhead a defense that allowed just 91 yards in the second half and only 238 total yards during the game.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30):** Started at LDE and posted three assisted tackles...Suffered a shoulder injury that limited him during the game...Helped limit New Orleans to just 45 rushing yards on 19 carries (2.4 avg.).

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Appeared on 43 plays with the team mostly employing its sub-defenses and recorded five assisted tackles.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14):** Started at NT in the absence of the injured B.J. 2012 Season: Opened the season on the reserve/physically unable to perform list after missing the entire offseason program and training camp while rehabilitating a severe knee injury he suffered in Week 13 of 2011...Was activated from reserve/PUP on Nov. 7 following the end of the league-issued three-week roster exemption, during which he'd returned to practice with the club...Suffered continued soreness following practices and was unable to return to full physical form, prompting his being placed on injured reserve, Dec. 1.

►at **Detroit Lions (11/18):** Did not participate in practice late in the week and was inactive on gameday.

►at **New York Giants (11/25):** Inactive.

90 B.J. Raji, DT, 4th Year, Boston College

2012 Season: Continued to have a significant, if not always statistically glamorous impact up front for the Green Bay defense...Started each of the first five games before suffering an ankle injury at Indianapolis that caused him to miss the Houston contest, snapping a streak of 58 consecutive games played including playoffs (42 starts)...Returned for the Week 8

contest vs. Jacksonville...For the season, appeared in 14 games (all starts) and made 45 tackles (26 solo).

▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Started and posted two tackles (one solo).

▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Led the defensive line by seeing time on 47 plays and finishing with five tackles (two solo, one for loss)...Marked his first five-tackle game since Week 7 of 2011.

▶at **Chicago Bears (12/16)**: Turned in yet another active performance against both the run and pass, appearing on 43 plays and finishing with three tackles (two solo), three pressures and a QB hit...Forced a tackle for loss on Chicago's second possession when he slipped into the backfield between G James Brown and T J'Marcus Webb, pushing RB Matt Forte into the arms of LB Clay Matthews for a 3-yard loss...Also drew a holding call against G Gabe Carimi that wiped out a 7-yard gain by Forte late in the second quarter.

▶vs. **Tennessee Titans (12/23)**: Part of an excellent defensive effort that held the Titans to just 10 first downs and 180 total yards during the game... Teamed with Pickett to bolster a run defense that limited standout RB Chris Johnson to just 28 yards on 11 carries (2.5 avg.)...Finished with one tackle and a pass defended...Batted a pass at the line of scrimmage on the first play of the game and his tackle came on a no-gain stop of Johnson in the third quarter.

▶at **Minnesota Vikings (12/30)**: Delivered a strong individual performance against the Vikings' vaunted rushing attack, leading the defensive line with 59 plays and finishing with five solo tackles (including two for loss) and two pressures...One of his tackles for loss came in the first quarter when he shed LG Charlie Johnson and dropped RB Adrian Peterson in the backfield for a 2-yard loss...Had another one in the fourth quarter when he discarded RG Brandon Fusco and dragged Peterson down for a 1-yard loss behind the line.

▶**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13)**: Had another solid outing as part of a defense that effectively limited Peterson (22 carries, 99 yards,

4.5 avg.) and held the Vikings in check while the Packers mounted a 24-3 lead over the first three quarters...Finished with two tackles (one solo), two pressures and a QB hit...Nearly had a sack in the third quarter when he bulled his way past RG Brandon Fusco and zeroed in on QB Joe Webb in the pocket...Webb slipped his grasp but was then sacked by LB Erik Walden for a 7-yard loss.

28 Sean Richardson, S, Rookie, Vanderbilt

2012 Season: One of four non-drafted rookie free agents to make the team's roster out of training camp on the strength of a solid preseason that saw him lead the defense with 16 tackles (12 solo) and a fumble recovery... Suffered a hamstring injury in the final preseason game and was sidelined throughout the early portion of the regular season...Later sustained a back injury at the N.Y. Giants in Week 12 and was placed on injured reserve, Dec. 1...For the season, appeared in five regular-season games, mostly on special teams...Accounted for four tackles on the various coverage units and also one solo tackle on defense.

▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Listed as a gameday inactive for the season opener.

▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13) - at Houston Texans (10/14)**: Inactive.

▶at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)**: Returned to practice during the week and made his NFL debut on special teams against the Rams, but did not record any statistics.

▶vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28)**: Once again played on special teams, making his first career coverage tackle as a member of the kickoff team.

▶vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Appeared on special teams and led the coverage units with two tackles, one each on both the kickoff and punt teams.

▶at **Detroit Lions (11/18)**: Saw the first scrimmage action of his career in the second half, coming on in place of M.D. Jennings, who was being treated for cramps...Appeared on 15 defensive plays and finished with one solo tackle...Also posted a tackle on the kickoff coverage unit.

▶at **New York Giants (11/25)**: Played on special teams.

12 Aaron Rodgers, QB, 8th Year, California

2012 Season: Reigning league MVP who has once again put together an excellent season at the controls of the Packers offense...For the season, completed a career-high 371-of-552 attempts for 4,295 yards and 39 TDs against just eight INTs...He ranked No. 1 in the NFL passer rating (108.0) and his TD total was second...Was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance in Week 4 vs. New Orleans and again for his Week 6 outing at Houston, when he threw for 338 yards and a career-high and franchise-record-tying six TD passes...Was also the NFC Offensive Player of the Month for October...Threw his 150th career TD pass in Week 7 at St. Louis, eclipsing Dan Marino's NFL record for fewest INTs (69) at the 150-mark, having thrown just 42 in his eight-year career...His 22 TD passes between Weeks 4-9 set a new record for the most over a six-game span in franchise history...Also had 54 rushing attempts for 259 yards (4.8 avg.) and two TDs.

▶vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Opened the season by completing 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs with one INT...Has now posted 300-yard games in back-to-back season openers and did so against a 49ers defense that allowed just four 300-yard passing games in all of 2011... Marked the 23rd 300-yard outing of his career and the 30th consecutive home game with a TD pass, a franchise record.

▶vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Completed 22-of-32 attempts for 219 yards and a TD to go along with one INT...Led four scoring drives (three FGs, one TD) and extended his team-record home-game TD pass streak to 31 games.

▶at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Finished the game 26-of-39 passing for 223 yards...Overcame a difficult first half that saw the pocket regularly collapsed by the Seahawks' front seven to the tune of eight sacks... Rebounded in the second half to complete 13-of-24 for 137 yards with no sacks as he led three scoring drives (two FG, one TD) to give the Packers a 12-7 advantage late in the fourth quarter.

▶vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Earned NFC Offensive Player of the Week honors after guiding the offense to its most prolific outing to this point in

the young season, a 421-yard output that resulted in four TD drives and a 28-27 win...Completed 31-of-41 for 319 yards and four TD passes for a unit that produced 30 first downs, the most by the Packers since they had 31 at Detroit on Nov. 12, 1989...Threw TD passes to James Jones (2), Jordy Nelson and Greg Jennings, the last one an 11-yard bullet to Nelson on a slant to cap a 7-play, 57-yard drive to put Green Bay ahead for good... Drew a facemask penalty on S Malcolm Jenkins when the defender got his hand inside the QB's helmet on a third-quarter scramble, poking him in the eye...Forced him to miss the following play, a first-and-goal from the Saints' 2-yard line that saw backup QB Graham Harrell fumble a handoff exchange and give possession to New Orleans.

▶**at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Finished what was an up-and-down day having completed 21-of-33 attempts for 243 yards and three TDs with one INT... Was also the team's leading rusher during the game, carrying five times for 57 yards (11.4 avg.), a regular-season career-high total on the ground... Started the game fast, leading the offense to the first of its three first-half TDs on the second possession of the first quarter...Threw TD passes to both Jones and WR Randall Cobb in the second quarter, staking Green Bay to a 21-3 halftime lead...Opened the second half with an INT to CB Jeraud Powers on a throw that was tipped at the line, the beginning of a challenging two quarters for the offense...Rebounded late in the fourth quarter to hit Jones for another TD, an 8-yarder that gave Green Bay a 27-22 lead with 4:30 remaining...Following a go-ahead scoring drive by the Colts, moved the offense 47 yards in four plays, setting up a game-tying 51-yard FG try by K Mason Crosby.

▶**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Had one of the most remarkable passing performances of his prolific career, completing 24-of-37 attempts for 338 yards and a career-high six TDs...Even more remarkable was that the effort came on the road in a charged environment against a Houston defense that ranked No. 3 in the NFL in yardage (275.6) and No. 4 in scoring defense (14.6 ppg.) entering the game...TD pass total tied the franchise record set by Matt Flynn in the 2011 season finale vs. Detroit (1/1/12) and he became just the fourth QB in NFL history to throw for 330 yards, six TDs and no INTs in a game, joining Tom Brady, Mark Rypien and Y.A. Tittle...Started the offense fast with TDs on two of the team's first three possessions in the first quarter, getting the Packers out to a 14-0 lead in the first frame... Found Nelson for three TDs during the game, the first of which was a perfectly placed 41-yard deep ball along the right sideline to cap the team's opening drive of the game...Opened the second half with a methodical 16-play, 80-yard TD drive that spanned 6:44 and ended with a 1-yard TD throw to Nelson on a corner route in the end zone and extended the lead to 28-10...Also tossed a pair of TDs to Jones, joined WR Don Hutson (1943) as the only two players in franchise history to score two TDs in three consecutive games...Long play was a third-and-1 rollout on the second play of the fourth quarter when he courageously took a big hit from LB Brooks Reed, but was able to get the throw into the hands of a wide open TE Tom Crabtree, who ran untouched down the sideline for a 48-yard TD.

▶**at St. Louis Rams (10/21):** Continued the momentum from his spectacular outing the previous week, completing 30-of-37 attempts for 342 yards and three TDs with no INTs...His 81.1 completion percentage was the second highest of his career and set a single-game franchise record among QBs with 35-plus attempts, while the three TDs gave him 16 between Weeks 4-7, also a franchise record over a four-game regular-season stretch... Saw his two longest completions come on a pair of defensive-offsidess free plays, beginning with a 52-yard strike to Nelson that set up a TD in the first quarter, and later on a 39-yard TD to Cobb that effectively put the game away late in the fourth...Each of the team's three TD drives spanned 80 yards, highlighted by the 12-play march that took 6:56 off the clock to open the second half...Capped the drive by finding Cobb for a 5-yard TD in the back of the end zone, the 150th scoring throw of his career...With the TD, broke Dan Marino's NFL record for the fewest number of INTs at the 150-TD mark (69-42)...Joined Marino (62) as just the second player in league history to reach the 150-TD mark in 80 or fewer games, doing so in his 76th.

▶**vs. Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28):** Played his way through an admittedly choppy game that saw the offense struggle to find its rhythm...Completed 22-of-35 attempts for 186 yards and two TDs, the second of which moved

him past Bart Starr for second place all-time in franchise history (153)... The TD was a 4-yard strike to WR Donald Driver, giving him 21 TD passes for the season and making him the first player in NFL history to have 20-plus TD passes in the first eight games in back-to-back seasons (24 in 2011)...Also set the franchise record for the most TD passes over a five-game span, having thrown 18 dating back to the team's Week 4 contest vs. New Orleans.

▶**vs. Arizona Cardinals (11/4):** Led what was the most balanced effort for the offense to this point in the season, completing 14-of-30 attempts for 218 yards and four TDs with one INT...With the four-TD outing, joined Marino, Peyton Manning and Brett Favre as the only QBs in NFL history to have 10 or more games with four-plus TD passes in a three-season span...One of his most critical plays during the game came after he'd completed a handoff to RB James Starks in the second quarter...Starks gained 5 yards on the play, but had the ball stripped by LB Paris Lenon...Rodgers alertly followed the play and dove to recover the ball at the Green Bay 32-yard line...With the maintained possession, he hit Jones seven plays later for a 28-yard TD to give Green Bay a 21-7 advantage with just under two minutes to play in the first half...Saw his final TD pass come on the last play of the third quarter when he executed a play-action fake to RB Alex Green and threw a perfect ball to Crabtree, who released on a seam route out of the backfield...Crabtree caught the ball at the Packers' 43-yard line and went the rest of the way for a 72-yard TD, the team's longest pass play through nine games...Also carried the ball eight times for 33 yards, including a season-long 25-yard scramble on the Packers' first scoring drive in the first quarter.

▶**at Detroit Lions (11/18):** Overcame an afternoon filled with pass-rush pressure and lack of rhythm to engineer a key game-winning TD drive that culminated with a 22-yard TD pass to Cobb with 1:55 remaining to give Green Bay the lead, 21-20...Finished the game having completed 19-of-27 attempts for 236 yards, two TDs and an INT, good for a 106.4 QB rating... The rating was his ninth consecutive of 100-plus in indoor games (including playoffs)...First TD pass came in the second quarter when he sold a developing screen play to right side and came back to the middle of the field in the face of pressure, finding Finley wide open near the 15-yard line, where he would make the catch and go the rest of the way for the score...The game-winner to Cobb capped a six-play, 82-yard scoring drive and came on a corner route to the left side of the end zone, where he lofted a perfect pass just before being hit by DE Willie Young.

▶**at New York Giants (11/25):** Had one of the most challenging games of his prolific career as a starter, facing a dominant Giants' pass rush that disrupted the pocket throughout the game...Finished having completed 14-of-25 attempts for 219 yards with one TD and one INT...Hit Nelson for a 61-yard TD on the offense's fourth play from scrimmage, perfectly executing a stop-and-go double-move to tie the game's score 7-7...Had a difficult time from that point on, falling victim to five sacks and several other pressures up front that affected the unit's rhythm and execution for the remainder of the game.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Directed a balanced offensive performance that saw the unit produce a season-high 435 yards on 73 plays (6.0 avg.), highlighted by an 18-play, 73-yard FG drive the burned 11 minutes off the clock in the fourth quarter...Drive was the longest he'd led in his career and culminated with a 31-yard FG by Crosby that gave Green Bay a two-possession lead, 23-14, that was ultimately the game's final score...Also challenged the Vikings with his cadence during the game, forcing various defensive offsidess penalties, including one that resulted in a free play and led to his finding Jones for a 32-yard TD on the game's opening possession...Finished having completed 27-of-35 attempts for 286 yards and a TD with one INT, posting a 98.0 QB rating.

▶**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Was forced to make the most of limited opportunities with the offense possessing the ball for a season-low 22:46 during the game...Directed a balanced offensive attack that was again headed by a running game that produced 140 yards and two TDs on 25 attempts (5.6 avg.), highlighted by his game-long 27-yard TD run on the opening drive of the second half...On the play, escaped a collapsing pocket and rolled out to the right side...Noticed TE Jermichael Finley along the sideline working against LB Justin Durant and the rest of the defense scattered

across the field...Took advantage of a wide alley along that side and raced untouched into the end zone for the TD, giving Green Bay its first lead, 17-14...Marked his first rushing TD of the season and the longest scoring run of his career...Also marked the longest TD run by a Packers QB since Favre's 36-yarder at Chicago on Oct. 31, 1994, and was his longest run since another 27-yarder vs. Dallas in Week 9 of 2010...Was 14-of-24 passing for 173 yards, snapping a franchise-record streak of 35 consecutive games with a TD pass at Lambeau Field, the longest at a single venue in NFL history.

►**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Led an efficient offensive effort that helped clinch the franchise's second division title in as many seasons in memorable fashion against its chief NFC North rival...Game marked the Packers' sixth straight win over Chicago and 12th straight in the division, tied for the longest such streak in the league since realignment in 2002...Completed 23-of-36 attempts for 291 yards and three TD passes with no INTs... Fired all three of his TD passes to Jones on a series of four possessions between the second and third quarters that turned a 7-0 deficit into a 21-7 lead...Also used his instincts and athletic ability to avoid pocket pressure, extending plays and making a number of impressive throws on the move... Kick-started the team's first scoring drive when he escaped the pocket on a third-and-6 and rolled to his right, firing a bullet to Cobb between three defenders near the sideline for a 31-yard gain...Three plays later he found Jones in single coverage against CB Kelvin Hayden and dropped in a perfect throw on a go-route that Jones ran in for a 29-yard TD...Later found Jones for 8- and 6-yard scores inside the red zone and also moved the team into position for two FG attempts during the game...The yardage mark for the game gave him 20,625 yards since taking over as the starter in 2008, moving him beyond QB Peyton Manning (20,618) for the most by an NFL QB in his first five seasons as a starter.

►**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Had one of his finest performances, leading the Packers to a dominating 55-7 win in their regular-season home finale...The point total was tied for the third most in franchise history and the club's most since Oct. 2, 1983...Completed 27-of-38 attempts for a season-high-tying 342 yards and three TDs with no INTs, posting a 125.1 QB rating before being relieved early in the fourth quarter...Also carried the ball four times for 11 yards (2.8 avg.) and kicked off the game's scoring in the first quarter with a 6-yard scramble into the end zone for his second rushing TD of the season...With the run, he surpassed the 250-yard rushing mark for the season, the fourth consecutive season he has done so, joining Tobin Rote (five straight, 1954-58) as the only other QB in franchise history to accomplish the feat...Completed TD passes to Cobb, Jennings and Jones, pushing his season total to 35 and his two-year total to 80, surpassing Favre (77, 1995-96) for the franchise record over a two-year period, the second-highest total in NFL history.

►**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Put forth yet another excellent outing in the always-challenging Metrodome, completing 28-of-40 attempts for a season-high 365 yards and four TDs with no INTs, a QB rating of 131.8, the fifth highest of his career on the road...Directed six scoring drives (four TD, two FG) for a Packers offense that posted 34 points, the most by the club at Minnesota since the 2004 season...Saw the great majority of his production come over the final three quarters as the offense was slow out of the gate, only running six plays in the opening frame...Completed his season-long 73-yard pass to Nelson late in the third quarter, a perfectly placed ball over the WR's shoulder that he caught in stride and advanced to the Vikings' 8-yard line...Threw an 8-yard TD to Jones on the following play to bring the Packers to within 27-24...Later hit Nelson on a back-shoulder throw from 2-yards out, tying the score at 34-34 with 2:54 remaining... Finished the regular season having gone 144 straight pass attempts without an INT, having not thrown one since the third quarter of the team's Week 13 game vs. Minnesota the longest current streak in the league.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Continued his postseason mastery, completing an efficient 23-of-33 attempts for 274 yards and a TD, while leading four scoring drives (three TDs, one FG) en route to what was the first home playoff victory of his starting career...All four scoring drives spanned at least 60 yards in length and three of them consisted of 11 or more plays...Helped break the game open by sandwiching TD drives around halftime, first leading a successful five-play, 62-yard two-minute

march before the break and then a 12-play, 80-yard drive on the opening possession of the third quarter, widening Green Bay's lead to 24-3... Capped the latter with a crafty play that saw him draw the defense with him as he rolled to his right before firing back across to the middle of the field to FB John Kuhn, who took it the rest of the way for the score...Posted a 104.9 passer rating, the fifth time he has eclipsed the century mark in seven career playoff starts.

10 Jeremy Ross, WR, 1st Year, California

2012 Season: Joined the active roster prior to the team's Week 13 contest vs. Minnesota, after having initially been signed to the Packers' practice squad, Oct. 17...A part of the gameday lineup following his activation, he made his NFL debut on special teams against the Vikings...For the season, appeared in five games on special teams and returned four punts for 103 yards (25.8 avg.) and three kickoffs for 86 yards (28.7 avg.).

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (12/2):** Was signed to the active roster the day before the game and made his NFL debut on special teams.

►**vs. Detroit Lions (12/9):** Played on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►**at Chicago Bears (12/16):** Appeared in the game on special teams...Was part of one of the game's more memorable plays when the punt return unit attempted a throwback play with just under eight minutes remaining in the fourth quarter...Peeled away from his blocking responsibilities at the start of the return in an effort to catch a cross-field lateral from WR Randall Cobb...With coverage players closing in, he bobbled the throw from Cobb and it was recovered by S Anthony Walters at the Green Bay 16-yard line, ultimately resulting in a FG for Chicago.

►**vs. Tennessee Titans (12/23):** Played on special teams, assuming kick return duties after Cobb departed in the third quarter with an ankle injury and did not return...Signaled fair catch on his first punt return opportunity, but took full advantage of his second, breaking off to the left side of the field and knifing his way through the coverage team for a 58-yard return to the Tennessee 7-yard line...Was the longest punt return for the Packers since Cobb's 75-yard TD in the 2012 season opener and set up a 7-yard TD run by RB Ryan Grant on the offense's first play of the ensuing series.

►**at Minnesota Vikings (12/30):** Became the team's primary return man with Cobb inactive due to injury (ankle/knee) and made the most of his opportunities for the second consecutive week...Returned two punts for 41 yards (20.5 avg.), including a long of 32 yards in the second quarter that gave the offense the ball at the Minnesota 42-yard line and set up the Packers' first TD drive...Also had three kickoff returns for 86 yards (28.7 avg.), highlighted by the first of his career that he returned 44 yards, trailing only Cobb's 46-yarder at Houston in Week 6 as the longest by a Packer this season.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13):** Played on special teams, serving as the team's primary kickoff returner and also on the various coverage units...Had two kickoff returns for 28 yards (14.0), even though the second consisted of him picking up the ball and stepping out of bounds on a squib kick in the fourth quarter.

33 Brandon Saine, RB, 2nd Year, Ohio State

2012 Season: Reserve RB and special teams player who appeared in each of the first six games before suffering a significant knee injury in kickoff coverage in the second half at Houston (Oct. 14) that ended his season...Placed on injured reserve, Oct. 15.

►**vs. San Francisco 49ers (9/9) - at Indianapolis Colts (10/7):** Appeared in each game on special teams, but did not record any statistics.

►**at Houston Texans (10/14):** Appeared on special teams but suffered a knee injury covering a third-quarter kickoff and did not return.

63 Jeff Saturday, C, 14th Year, North Carolina

2012 Season: Veteran stalwart who started the first 14 games up front after signing with the Packers as an unrestricted free agent on March 13, 2012, after playing for 13 seasons with the Indianapolis Colts...Quickly acclimated himself to his new team while progressively picking up the scheme after playing his entire career in a different offense...Battled injuries in the season's second half and was replaced in the starting lineup by

C/G Evan Dietrich-Smith...For his career, has played in 211 games with 202 starts.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Made his Packers debut in the season opener, as part of a protection unit that allowed QB Aaron Rodgers time to complete 30-of-44 attempts for 303 yards and two TDs.

►vs. **Chicago Bears (9/13)**: Appeared on all 68 offensive plays...Helped block for a ground game that netted 112 yards on 25 running plays (4.5 avg.).

►at **Seattle Seahawks (9/24)**: Helped the offense bounce back from a difficult first half, centering a unit that produced three second-half scoring drives and did not allow a sack over the final two quarters...Also had a key fumble recovery inside the Green Bay 5-yard line late in the fourth quarter after RB Cedric Benson was stripped behind the line of scrimmage.

►vs. **New Orleans Saints (9/30)**: Led an offensive line that helped produce 421 yards of total offense and four TD drives during the game...Allowed Rodgers to complete 31-of-41 for 319 yards and four TD passes, without being sacked...Finished the game with a six-quarter sackless streak for the OL going back to the second half at Seattle...Also helped clear the way for Benson to rush for 84 yards on 18 carries, a healthy 4.7-yard average that provided great balance for the offense.

►at **Indianapolis Colts (10/7)**: Returned to Indianapolis to face the franchise he spent the first 13 years of his NFL career playing for...Helped the offense to a fast start that saw 179 yards and three first-half TD drives.

►at **Houston Texans (10/14)**: Part of a blocking unit that help clear the way for the team's most prolific offensive output to this point in the season... Helped the offense produce 427 yards, the most given up by Houston since Week 3 of 2011, including a 24-of-37, 338-yard, six-TD passing performance by Rodgers....The six TDs were a new career high for the QB and he became just the fourth player in NFL history to throw for 330 yards, six TDs and no INTs in a game.

►at **St. Louis Rams (10/21)**: Part of an OL that allowed Rodgers time to complete 30-of-37 attempts for 342 yards and three TDs, putting together six scoring drives (three TD, three FG) and not allowing a sack after the first quarter...Rodgers' 81.1 completion percentage was the second highest of his career and set a single-game franchise record by a QB with more than 35 attempts...Had the awareness to get off quick snaps on a pair of defensive offsides free plays during the game...The first of which resulted in a game-long 52-yard completion to Rodgers to Nelson in the first quarter, and the second became a 38-yard TD pass from Rodgers to WR Randall Cobb, effectively putting the game away in the fourth.

►vs. **Jacksonville Jaguars (10/28)**: Centered what was a challenging day for the offense...Still managed to allow Rodgers to post a 95.7 QB rating, completing 22-of-35 attempts for 186 yards and two TDs.

►vs. **Arizona Cardinals (11/4)**: Part of an offense that gained 384 total yards and produced five scoring drives (four TDs, one FG) against what was the NFL's No. 6 yardage and No. 4 scoring defense entering the game...Helped block for a rushing attack that churned out a season-high 176 yards on 39 attempts (4.5 avg.), the most by the Packers since Oct. 25, 2009 (at Cleveland)...Within that total, the offense featured four players with 25 or more rushing yards (Rodgers, Cobb, Alex Green, James Starks), a first for Green Bay since Nov. 2, 2003, at Minnesota.

For the season, appeared in 10 games with eight starts, and recorded 38 tackles (28 solo), one sack, three INTs and 15 passes defended.

2012 Season: Young defender who assumed starting duty at the 'Mack' LB position in 2012 following a season-ending injury suffered by Desmond Bishop (hamstring) in the team's exhibition opener at San Diego (Aug. 9)... Had opened each of the first six games and posted career highs with 42 tackles (35 solo), two sacks and four passes defensed before suffering a significant knee injury at Houston (Oct. 14) and was placed on injured reserve, Oct. 17.

►**NFC WILD CARD, vs. Minnesota Vikings (1/5/13)**: Inactive.

82 Ryan Taylor, TE, 2nd Year, North Carolina

2012 Season: A core special teams player and developing contributor on offense, he appeared in every game, predominantly on special teams, where he posted eight coverage tackles...Made his first career start on offense in Week 15 at Chicago...Made contributions as a blocker on offense, and made his first reception of the season in Week 16 vs. Tennessee, an 11-yard catch.

►vs. **San Francisco 49ers (9/9)**: Started at LCB and finished with four tackles (all solo).
