

PACKERS OPEN SEASON IN SAN FRANCISCO FOR THE FIRST TIME

Green Bay kicks off its 95th season in team history, and 93rd as a member of the National Football League, by visiting San Francisco

in Week 1 for the first time in franchise history.



- It marks the second consecutive year that the Packers have opened their season against the 49ers (at
- Lambeau Field in 2012), the first time Green Bay has faced the same opponent in Week 1 in consecutive seasons since it squared off with the Chicago Bears in three straight season openers from 1979-81.
- Outside of the last two seasons, the only other time the Packers and 49ers played each other in Week 1 came in 1976 at Green Bay.
- Sunday's matchup will feature two of the three teams in the NFL to have won 24 or more regular-season games over the past two years. Since 2011, Green Bay has a 26-6 mark (.813) in the regular season, No. 1 in the league over that span. San Francisco is 24-7-1 (.765) since '11, No. 3 in the NFL behind only the Packers and New England (25-7, .781).
- According to the Elias Sports Bureau, this will be the first Week 1 matchup since 1991 featuring two teams that have won 24-plus games over the previous two regular seasons. On Sept. 2, 1991, San Francisco (28 wins from 1989-90) visited the N.Y. Giants (25 wins from 1989-90) in Week 1 on Monday Night Football.
- This will be the third matchup between the two clubs in the last 12 months, with the teams meeting last year on Sept. 9 in Green Bay and also in a NFC Divisional playoff contest on Jan. 12, 2013, in San Francisco.
- Green Bay enters Sunday's contest having won nine of the last 10 regular-season meetings against the 49ers. Including the playoffs, the Packers have won 13 of the last 16 against San Francisco.

STARTING STRONG

Under Head Coach Mike McCarthy, the Packers have won five of their last six season openers, which is tied for the No. 2 mark in the NFL with Baltimore over that span behind only New England (6-0 since 2007).

- That included five straight Week 1 wins from 2007-11, which made McCarthy the only head coach in franchise history to accomplish that feat.
- Green Bay has 52 wins on Kickoff Weekend, second most in NFL history behind only the Chicago Bears (53 victories in Week 1).
- This will mark just the second time in McCarthy's eight seasons (2006-13) that the Packers have opened their season away from Lambeau Field. The only other instance over that span was in 2010 at Philadelphia.
- Opening on the road has been a rare occurrence dating back even further. Since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, the Packers have opened their season at home 32 times while opening on the road just 12 times. Since 1986, 23 of Green Bay's season openers have been at home, making Sunday's game just the fifth time in the past 28 years that the Packers have gone on the road to start their season.

WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports, now in its 20th season as an NFL network television partner, will broadcast the game to the majority of the country.

Play-by-play man Joe Buck and color analyst Troy Aikman will have the call from the broadcast booth with **Pam Oliver** reporting from the sidelines.



WEEK 1

- This marks the sixth straight season that the Packers' Week 1 game will be either a nationally televised prime-time contest or a late-afternoon tilt seen by the majority of the country.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since 1929, heads up the 50-station Packers Radio Network, with Wayne Larrivee (play-by-play) and Larry McCarren (color) calling the action. The duo is in its 15th season of broadcasts together across the Packers Radio Network, which covers 42 markets in six states.
- Dial Global Sports will air the game across the country. Chuck Cooperstein (play-by-play) and Rod Woodson (analyst) will call the action with **Scott Graham** hosting the pregame and halftime shows.
- Compass Media Networks will broadcast the game to a national audience with Matt Smith (play-by-play) and Curtis Conway (analyst) handling the call.
- The broadcast is also available on SiriusXM Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.

SEPTEMBER STARTS

Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, Green Bay has been one of the most successful teams in the league early in the season.

► Over the past four seasons, the Packers are tied for the second-best mark in the league in September:

ROAD RUN

Since the start of the 2010 postseason, the Packers have won 14 of their last 20 road contests. Green Bay's .700 winning percentage over that span ranks No. 3 in the league:

- Green Bay had a 4-4 record (.500) away from Lambeau Field in 2012. In five of seven seasons (2006-07, 2009, 2011-12) under Head Coach Mike McCarthy, the team has finished with a mark of .500 or better on the road. The Packers set a franchise record with seven road wins in '11.
- ►Green Bay is 11-5 on the road over the past two regular seasons, which is tied for No. 2 in the NFL over that span:

TWO AT THE TOP

Sunday's matchup will feature two of the three teams in the NFL to post at least 11 wins in each of the last two seasons.

► Green Bay (15 wins in 2011, 11 wins in 2012) and San Francisco (13 wins in 2011, 11 wins in 2012) were joined by New England (13 wins in 2011, 12 wins in 2012) as the only teams in the league to accomplish that feat each of the past two seasons.

A HISTORY OF SUCCESS

Frequent foes in the 1990s and 2000s, the rivalry between the Packers and 49ers went to new heights when the clubs met four straight years in the playoffs (1995-98).

The two franchises have been among the most successful in the NFL in the postseason, with both clubs checking in among the league leaders in playoff winning percentage and world championships:

STAT OF THE WEEK

- Although this will only be the second time under Head Coach Mike McCarthy (2010 at Philadelphia) that the Packers have played away from Lambeau Field in Week 1, they have had success in their first road contest of the season.
- Green Bay has won its first road game in six of seven seasons under McCarthy, with last season at Seattle in Week 3 the lone exception.
- ► The Packers have an all-time record of 53-37-2 (.596) in road openers, the **most wins** and **third-best winning percentage** in the NFL.
- ►With a six-game winning streak in the first road game of the season from 2006-11, McCarthy joined Vince Lombardi (eight straight, 1960-67) as the only coaches in team history to win six or more consecutive road openers.

MIKE McCARTHY...Is in his eighth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ► Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ► Has led the Packers to playoff appearances in five of his seven seasons at the helm, and the team's five postseason berths over the past six seasons are the most by an NFC team.
- Led Green Bay to 47 regular-season victories from 2009-12, the second most in the NFL over that span and the second most in franchise history over a four-year period.
- ► His .656 winning percentage (including playoffs) ranks No. 3 among active NFL coaches (min. 50 games) entering the 2013 season.
- ► Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first headcoaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.
- ▶ Became the first Packers coach since Lombardi to lead the team to a championship game in his second season (2007).

JIM HARBAUGH...Is in his third year as the 49ers' 17th head coach.

- ► In his first two seasons at the helm, has led the 49ers to two NFC West titles, two NFC Championship appearances and one Super Bowl appearance.
- ► Is just the second NFL coach to win consecutive division titles in his first two seasons after inheriting a team with a losing record.
- ► Earned NFL Coach of the Year honors from *The Associated Press* in 2011 after leading the 49ers to a 13-3 record in his rookie campaign.
- ► Was previously the head coach at Stanford (2007-10), where he led the Cardinal to its first BCS game appearance and victory in the Orange Bowl, in 2010.
- Also was the head coach at the University of San Diego (2004-06). Began his NFL coaching career as an offensive assistant with the Oakland Raiders (2002-03). Played QB for 15 seasons in the NFL with the Bears, Colts, Ravens, Chargers and Panthers.

THE PACKERS-49ERS SERIES

Originally dating back to 1950, the series featured two games per season from 1953-66 with the teams trading dominant stretches.

- ► San Francisco won 13 times in a span of 15 games between 1950-58, while the Packers won 10 of 11 games between 1959-64.
- In more recent times, the series has been noted for its postseason

clashes, including several defining moments in Packers history. Green Bay's 27-17 triumph in the 1995 NFC Divisional playoff was considered the breakthrough victory that established the Packers as an elite team for the next several years. The Packers also won the next two postseason meetings, a 35-14 home victory in the 1996 NFC Divisional playoff en route to the Super Bowl XXXI title, and a 23-10 win at San Francisco in the 1997 NFC Championship game.

► The two teams met in the playoffs for a fourth straight season in 1998, with the 49ers winning 30-27 on QB Steve Young's last-second TD pass to WR Terrell Owens.

Packers head coach Mike McCarthy was San Francisco's offensive coordinator in 2005...Packers outside linebackers coach Kevin Greene played for the 49ers in 1997...Packers guarterbacks coach Ben McAdoo served as assistant offensive line coach/quality control for the 49ers in 2005...Packers QB Seneca Wallace was with the 49ers during the 2013 preseason; Wallace is from Rancho Cordova, Calif., and attended Sacramento City Junior College...Packers QB Aaron Rodgers is from Chico, Calif., and played collegiately at Butte College in Oroville, Calif., and the University of California...Packers WR Jeremy Ross attended Laguna Creek High in Elk Grove, Calif., and played at the University of California...Other Packers from northern California include T David Bakhtiari (San Mateo), CB Jarrett Bush (Vacaville) and WR James Jones (San Jose); Jones also attended San Jose State...Packers LB Clay Matthews' grandfather, Clay Sr., played defensive line for the 49ers for four seasons (1950, 1953-55)...49ers QB Colin Kaepernick was born in Milwaukee...49ers secondary coach Ed Donatell served as Green Bay's defensive coordinator from 2000-03...49ers head coach Jim Harbaugh and Packers tight ends coach Jerry Fontenot were teammates with the Chicago Bears...Harbaugh, 49ers tight ends coach Reggie Davis and 49ers asst. secondary coach Greg Jackson were teammates of Packers secondary-safeties coach Darren Perry with the San Diego Chargers in 1999...Perry was 49ers CB Nnamdi Asomugha's position coach in Oakland for two seasons (2007-08)...McCarthy coached with 49ers offensive line coach Mike Solari in Kansas City from 1997-98...Packers defensive coordinator Dom Capers and 49ers defensive coordinator Vic Fangio coached together with the Philadelphia/Baltimore Stars (USFL), the New Orleans Saints, Carolina Panthers and Houston Texans...49ers offensive coordinator Greg Roman worked on Capers' staffs in Carolina and Houston...49ers special teams coordinator/asst. head coach Brad Seely also worked on Capers' staff in Carolina...Packers special teams coordinator Shawn Slocum was 49ers LB Patrick Willis' position coach for one season at Ole Miss (2005)...Packers vice president/general counsel Ed Policy's father, Carmen, worked in San Francisco's front office in the 1980s and 1990s, including time as president and chief executive officer...49ers quarterbacks coach Geep Chryst is a native of Madison, Wis., and coached at Wisconsin-Platteville (1987) and Wisconsin (1988)...49ers assistant secondary coach Greg Jackson coached on the staff at Wisconsin in 2010.

LAST MEETING, REGULAR SEASON

Sept. 9, 2012, at Lambeau Field; 49ers won, 30-22.

- ► QB Alex Smith threw for 211 yards and two TDs with no INTs and RB Frank Gore rushed for 112 yards as the 49ers snapped a nine-game losing streak to the Packers in the regular season.
- ►QB Aaron Rodgers connected on 30 of 44 passes for 303 yards and two TDs with one interception.
- ►WR Randall Cobb led the Packers with nine catches for 77 yards (8.6 avg.) and scored on a 75-yard punt return in the fourth quarter.



BREAKING DOWN THE 53

The Packers' current 53-man roster is composed of 23 offensive players, 27 defensive players and three specialists.

- Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 33 of them (62.3 percent) were drafted by the Packers.
- ▶ With nine non-drafted free agents on the roster having entered the league with Green Bay, 42 of the 53 players (79.2 percent) began their pro careers with the Packers. Of the 53 players on the team, 50 of them have only seen regular-season NFL action with the Packers.
- Nearly half of the players (26 of 53, 49.1 percent) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as an undrafted player. More than a third of the players (18, 34.0 percent) on the roster were not drafted.
- Only 15 of the 53 players on the roster (28.3 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft.
- The Packers had three rookie free agents make the 53-man roster (S Chris Banjo, LB Andy Mulumba, G Lane Taylor), one that features 11 rookies overall. Green Bay has had at least three non-drafted free agents make the opening-day roster each of the last four seasons.
- Of the 53 players on the roster, 44 of them (83.0 percent) are 28 years old or younger.

WHAT TO WATCH FOR ...

- QB Aaron Rodgers has not thrown an interception in 144 consecutive passing attempts in the regular season, the longest current streak in the league. He has not had a two-INT game in 39 straight regular-season starts, the longest streak in NFL history since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.
- ► In three career regular-season starts against the 49ers, Rodgers has completed 83 of 119 passes (69.7 percent) for 945 yards and seven TDs with one interception for a 109.4 passer rating. He has also rushed for 79 yards on 16 carries (4.9 avg.) in those three contests.
- ► WR Randall Cobb is the only player in NFL history to score on a kick return (kickoff or punt) in Week 1 of each of his first two seasons in the league. Cobb scored on a 108-yard kickoff return vs. New Orleans in the 2011 opener and on a 75-yard punt return vs. San Francisco in Week 1 of 2012.

- TE Jermichael Finley needs five catches to move past No. 3 Ed West (202) on the all-time franchise list for tight ends and 110 receiving yards to move past No. 2 Ron Kramer (2,594). In his last three regular-season games, Finley has caught 18 passes for 203 yards (11.3 avg.).
- In two games against San Francisco last season, LB Clay Matthews registered 3.5 sacks.
- In his last three regular-season games, WR James Jones has caught 18 passes for 222 yards (12.3 avg.) and five TDs.
- In two games against the 49ers last season, P Tim Masthay posted a 47.7-yard average and a 43.7-yard net average on 10 punts, with six of those punts placed inside the 20-yard line.

ROLLING ON THE ROAD

Since taking over as the starter in 2008, QB **Aaron Rodgers** has been one of the most effective signal-callers in the league away from home.

- Over the last two seasons, Rodgers has completed 369 of 550 passes (67.1 percent) for 43 TDs and five INTs for a 116.2 passer rating on the road. That passer rating is the **best by a QB in NFL history** on the road over a two-season span (min. 300 attempts).

In his last 19 regular-season starts away from Lambeau Field, Rodgers has completed 424 of 627 passes (67.6 percent) for 5,434 yards and 48 TDs with six INTs for a **116.1 passer rating**. He has posted a 100-plus passer rating in **15 of those 19 games** and 10 games with 300-plus passing yards.

PUT IT ON THE BOARD

Last season marked the sixth consecutive campaign (2007-12) that the Packers finished in the top 10 in the league in scoring. Green Bay was joined by New England as the only teams to accomplish that feat over the past six seasons.

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Vikings in an NFC Wild Card contest last season brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 311 games (293 regular season, 18 playoffs).

- ► The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 57th season of football in 2013. A total of 635,610 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine home contests in 2012.
- Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark last season.
- Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 41-9 (.820) at home over the past 50 regular-season games.
- Since Ron Wolf and Mike Holmgren began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992. Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 93rd NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by four prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling) and a Thanksgiving contest at Detroit.

- ▶ Green Bay's schedule includes seven games against 2012 playoff teams, with three of those contests (Atlanta, Minnesota, Washington) at Lambeau Field and four on the road (Baltimore, Cincinnati, Minnesota, San Francisco). The Packers will travel to play both of the teams that played in Super Bowl XLVII (Baltimore and San Francisco).
- The Packers have two prime-time contests at home (vs. Chicago on Monday Night Football in Week 9 and vs. Atlanta on Sunday night in Week 14) and two on the road (Sunday night contests at Minnesota in Week 8 and at the N.Y. Giants in Week 11). Green Bay plays at Detroit on Thanksgiving in a nationally televised contest.
- The Packers' by arrives in Week 4, the earliest their open date has come on the schedule since they had a Week 4 by in 1999.
- ► For the first time since entering the National Football League in 1921, Green Bay does not have back-to-back road games on its schedule.
- ► The Packers have 14 games on Sunday, including seven straight to start the season, one Monday night game and the Thursday game on Thanksgiving.
- ► For just the second time in eight seasons under Head Coach Mike McCarthy (also 2010), the Packers will open the season on the road, this year against San Francisco on Sunday, Sept. 8. Green Bay opens its season against the 49ers for the second straight year and at San Francisco for the first time in franchise history.
- ► In Week 2, the Packers open their home slate against the Redskins for the first time since 1933, when they hosted the Boston Redskins in the season opener.
- Green Bay heads into its Week 4 bye with a road contest at Cincinnati in Week 3, and then hosts Detroit in Week 5, the third time in the past five seasons that the Lions have visited Lambeau Field in October.
- ► The Packers travel to Baltimore in Week 6 to take on the Ravens, the second straight season that Green Bay has visited the defending Super Bowl champions (N.Y. Giants in 2012).
- Green Bay's Week 8 trip to Minnesota for a Sunday night contest kicks off a stretch of three prime-time games in four weeks for the Packers.
- ► In Week 9, the Packers will host the Bears in a Monday night game, the 21st consecutive season that Green Bay has appeared on *Monday Night Football* (1993-2013). It marks the eighth straight season (2006-13) that the division rivals have squared off in a prime-time contest.
- Green Bay stays home on a short week to host the Eagles in Week 10 before traveling to New York for the second straight season to play the Giants in a Sunday night contest.
- ► The Packers visit Detroit on Thanksgiving (Week 13) for the fourth time in seven seasons (2007, 2009, 2011) and then return home for their final scheduled prime-time contest against Atlanta in Week 14 on Sunday night.
- The Packers' lone NFC North contest in the final month of the season comes in Week 17 at Chicago, the second time under McCarthy (also 2006) that Green Bay has closed out the regular season at Soldier Field. The Packers visit Dallas in Week 15 and host Pittsburgh in the home finale in Week 16.

- ► Is No. 4 among TEs in team annals with 198 receptions. Needs five more catches to move past No. 3 Ed West (202).
- ► In Week 4 vs. New Orleans last season, surpassed 2,000 career receiving yards in his 52nd career game, fastest among tight ends in franchise history (Coffman, 66 games).

50 A.J. HAWK

- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first five seasons as a starter.
- Threw a TD pass in 35 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field from 2008-12, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre, 1992-96). It was the second-longest home streak in NFL history behind Dan Marino's 39-game streak from 1983-88.

- Opened 22 games at LT over his final two seasons after starting at right tackle as a redshirt freshman in 2010.

LG Josh Sitton, 6th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08

- ► Has started 62 games since 2009, the most by an offensive lineman in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ► Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Marco Rivera in 2004.
- ► Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association.
- According to STATS LLC, has allowed only 7.5 sacks in his four seasons as a starter.
- ► Was the only Packer on either side of the ball to not miss a snap from 2009-10.

C Evan Dietrich-Smith, 4th Year, Idaho State, FA-10

- ► Appeared in all 16 games last season with a career-high six starts (four at LG, two at C).
- ► Has started games at three different positions during his career (five at LG, two at RG, two at C).
- Rejoined the Packers in Week 17 of 2010 after being released at the end of training camp that season; spent the first four weeks of the season with Seattle.
- ► Was the only non-drafted rookie to make the Packers' opening-day roster in 2009.
- Set an Idaho State record with 44 starts on the offensive line, playing all five positions in his college career, including the last two years at LT.

RG T.J. Lang, 5th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09

- Started 15 of 16 games last season (12 at LG, three at RT) and has started 31 contests over the past two seasons.
- ► Has started games at three different positions on the line as a pro (27 at LG, five at RT, two at LT).
- Started games at both tackle spots in his first season (2009) and became the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

RT Don Barclay, 2nd Year, West Virginia, FA-12

- ► Appeared in all 16 games in 2012, the only Green Bay rookie on the offensive side of the ball to do so last season.
- Started the final four regular-season games and both playoff contests at right tackle.
- ► Was one of four rookie free agents to make the Packers' opening-day roster in 2012.

Started three years at LT for West Virginia and tied a school record by playing in 52 career games, including 39 consecutive contests.

TE Jermichael Finley, 6th Year, Texas, D3-08

- Played in all 32 contests over the last two seasons and ranked No. 3 on the team last season with 61 catches, the most ever by a Green Bay tight end, for 667 yards (10.9 avg.) and two TDs.
- ► Is the only tight end in team history to register three 55-catch seasons.
- Set a career high with 767 receiving yards in 2011, the No. 2 mark in franchise annals behind only Paul Coffman's 814 yards in 1983.
- ► Finished the 2009 season with Green Bay playoff-record 159 receiving yards in NFC Wild Card loss at Arizona, the third-most productive game by a tight end in NFL postseason history.

WR Randall Cobb, 3rd Year, Kentucky, D2-11

- Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ► With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, he became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ► Led the team in receptions (80) and receiving yards (954) in 2012 and finished second on the squad in TD catches (eight).
- ► Over his last 12 games in 2012, he caught 69 passes for 858 yards (12.4 avg.) and eight TDs.

QB Aaron Rodgers, 9th Year, California, D1-05

- ▶ His career passer rating of 104.9 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- Ranked No. 1 in the league last season in passer rating (108.0), No. 2 in passing TDs (39), No. 1 in TD/INT ratio (4.88, 39/8), and No. 3 in completion percentage (67.2).
- Has posted 21,332 yards as a starter, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- In 78 regular-season starts (52-26 record), has posted 28 games with 300-plus passing yards, 43 without an interception and 46 with a 100plus passer rating.
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

RB Eddie Lacy, Rookie, Alabama, D2-13

- ► Earned first-team All-Southeastern Conference following his first full season as the starter in 2012, rushing for 1,322 yards and 17 TDs on 204 carries (6.5 avg.). The 17 rushing TDs were a single-season school record and his yardage total was the sixth highest in school annals.
- A member of national championship teams in three of his four years on campus at Alabama, he finished with the highest yards-per-carry average (6.8) in school history for players with 300-plus attempts.
- ► Turned pro following his junior season and was chosen by the Packers in the second round with the No. 61 overall pick. Became the highestdrafted RB by Green Bay since Darrell Thompson was selected with the No. 19 overall pick in 1990.

FB John Kuhn, 8th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)

- Has played in 92 of 96 games (99 of 103 including playoffs) during his six seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.
- Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- Only player on the team to have a rushing and receiving touchdown each season from 2008-11, and was the first Packer to achieve that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).
- ► Led the team with four rushing TDs in 2011 and led the running backs with six total TDs.

PACKERS PROJECTED STARTERS – DEFENSE

LDE C.J. Wilson, 4th Year, East Carolina, D7-10

- ► Dealt with injuries for the first time as a pro in 2012, appearing in 11 games, but started a career-high seven contests and registered career bests in tackles (37) and sacks (2.5).
- Played in 31 of a possible 32 games in his first two seasons as a pro (2010-11).
- ► Has played in 42 career games with 11 starts and has recorded 93 tackles (51 solo) and 3.5 sacks.
- ► Was named Conference USA Defensive Player of the Year by *Sporting News* each of his final two seasons at East Carolina.

NT Ryan Pickett, 13th Year, Ohio State, UFA-06 (StL)

- Has played in 178 of a possible 192 regular-season games during his career, missing just nine contests due to injury.
- ► Was the only Green Bay defensive lineman to start all 16 games last season and led the line with 75 tackles (27 solo).
- ► Key component of Packers' No. 1-ranked rushing defense in 2009 (franchise-record 83.3 yards allowed per game), the first time in team history that Green Bay led the league in that category.
- ► Signed with Green Bay as an unrestricted free agent in 2006 after spending five seasons with St. Louis (2001-05). Led all NFL defensive linemen with 115 tackles in 2005.

RDE B.J. Raji, 5th Year, Boston College, D1a-09

- ► Earned his first bid to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay defensive tackle since Bob Brown in 1972 to be voted to the all-star team.
- ► Has played in 53 games since 2010 (including playoffs), tied for the fourth most in the NFL by a defensive lineman over that span.
- ► Led all NFL nose tackles with 6½ sacks in 2010, the third most recorded by a nose tackle since 1990 (according to STATS LLC).
- ► Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2009, the first Green Bay defensive lineman to be selected since DE Vonnie Holliday in 1998.

LOLB Nick Perry, 2nd Year, Southern California, D1-12

- Held the starting role at LOLB for the first six games of his rookie campaign in 2012 before succumbing to a wrist injury that ended his season.
 Registered 29 tackles (18 solo) and two sacks in 2012.
- Registered 29 tackles (18 solo) and two sacks in 2012.
- ► Earned first-team All-Pacific-12 recognition as a junior at Southern California in 2011, registering a team-high and career-best 9.5 sacks. His sack total led the Pac-12 and was tied for No. 14 nationally.
- Was one of six finalists for the Hendricks Award in 2011, which is given to the nation's top defensive end.

BLB A.J. Hawk, 8th Year, Ohio State, D1-06

- Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Led the team with 142 tackles (105 solo) in 2012.
- ► Has appeared in 110 of a possible 112 regular-season games in his career, starting 107 of them.
- ► Tied for No. 1 among NFL linebackers in 2010 with a career-high three interceptions. Earned first career Pro Bowl selection in 2010.
- ►Has posted 872 tackles (622 solo), 13½ sacks, eight interceptions, 34 passes defensed, two forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries during his career.

MLB Brad Jones, 5th Year, Colorado, D7-09

- Came on in relief of D.J. Smith, who sustained a season-ending knee injury in 2012 in Week 6 at Houston, and made his first career start on the inside (13 starts at OLB) at St. Louis in Week 7. Registered 99 tackles (69 solo), two sacks and a forced fumble in his 10 starts last season.
- Became a core member on special teams in 2011, appearing in a careerhigh 15 games and recording a career-best 11 coverage tackles.

Worked at OLB for his first three seasons, including his rookie campaign of 2009 that saw him start seven games and register a career-high four sacks.

ROLB Clay Matthews, 5th Year, Southern California, D1b-09

- Ranked No. 5 in the league with 13.0 sacks last season, despite missing four games due to a hamstring injury.
- Became the first Packer in team history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the NFL (2009-12).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the *AP's* Defensive Player of the Year voting.

LCB Tramon Williams, 7th Year, Louisiana Tech, FA-06

- Is tied for No. 2 in the league in interceptions (15) and ranks No. 2 in the NFL in INT return yards (296) since 2010 (including playoffs).
- Ranked No. 2 on the team with 24 passes defensed last season, which matched his career high set in 2011.
- Despite suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener, went on to start 15 games that season and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defensed (24). Also added four interceptions.
- With three interceptions during the 2010 playoffs, tied Joe Laws (1944) and Craig Newsome (1996) for the franchise single-postseason record.

RCB Sam Shields, 4th Year, Miami, FA-10

- ► Was limited to 10 games with eight starts last season due to injury, but registered 38 tackles (28 solo), three interceptions, 15 passes defensed (No. 3 on the team) and a sack.
- Made an impact in 2010 after making the team as a non-drafted rookie, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one season in college.
- In Green Bay's NFC Championship win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.
- Played primarily wide receiver and special teams during his first three seasons at Miami.

SS M.D. Jennings, 3rd Year, Arkansas State, FA-11

- Saw the first scrimmage action of his career in 2012, appearing in all 16 contests with 10 starts. Moved into the starting lineup permanently in Week 8 after veteran Charles Woodson sustained a broken collarbone.
- Started the final nine games at FS and finished the season with 46 tackles (41 solo), six passes defensed and an INT that he returned for a TD.
- Also contributed regularly on special teams in 2012, finishing with a career-high 10 tackles (tied for No. 3 on the team).
- ► Joined LBs Jamari Lattimore and Vic So'oto as the three non-drafted rookies to make Green Bay's opening-day roster in 2011.

FS Morgan Burnett, 4th Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10

- Ranked No. 2 on the team with a career-high 137 tackles (95 solo) in 2012 and was the only player on the club with a sack (two), an interception (two), a fumble recovery and a forced fumble.
- ► Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining DT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ► In 2010, became only the second Packers rookie to open the season as a starter at safety since Chuck Cecil in 1988, joining then-teammate and three-time Pro Bowl selection Nick Collins (2005).
- Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

• Former non-drafted free agent and waiver-wire pickup who has played in all 16 games for five straight seasons, continuing his role as a reserve DB and key contributor on special teams.

• Led the team in coverage tackles during the regular season in 2012, matching his career high of 17 set in 2008. Marked his seventh straight season with a double-digit tackle total on special teams, becoming the first Packer to accomplish the feat since the statistic began being recorded in 1976.

• Current streak of 91 consecutive games played (including postseason) ranks No. 2 on the team behind K Mason Crosby (106).

• His 79 special teams tackles over the past five seasons rank first on the team over that span.

18 Randall Cobb, WR, 3rd Year, Kentucky

• Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.

• Led the team in receptions (80) and receiving yards (954) in 2012 despite missing the season finale due to injury.

• With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, he became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.

• Was named a first alternate for the Pro Bowl at kick returner in 2012. Averaged 25.4 yards on 38 kickoff returns and 9.4 yards on 31 punt returns.

2 Mason Crosby, K, 7th Year, Colorado

• Set an NFL record for the most points scored by a player in his first six seasons (2007-12) with 762, besting the previous mark held by Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (755, 1998-2003).

• Ranks No. 4 in franchise history with 762 career points (306 extra points, 152 field goals). His 152 field goals rank No. 3 in team annals behind only Ryan Longwell (226) and Chris Jacke (173).

• Has posted six 100-point seasons, No. 2 in franchise history behind only Longwell's eight seasons (1997-2004).

• Has not missed a game in his career, playing in 106 straight games (including postseason), the longest current streak on the team.

 \bullet Has 14 FGs of 50 yards or more in his career, and 20 games with three or more FGs.

• Reached 700 points after 89 career games, the second-fastest player to hit the 700-mark in club history behind only RB Paul Hornung (87 contests).

76 Mike Daniels, DE, 2nd Year, Iowa

• Appeared in 14 regular-season games and both playoff contests as a rookie in 2012, playing mostly in the defensive sub-packages as an interior pass rusher and also at times on special teams. Finished with 19 tackles (11 solo), two sacks, a team-leading two fumble recoveries and a pass defensed.

• Both of his fumble recoveries came in games against Detroit, the second of which he returned for a 43-yard TD in Week 14, the longest fumble return for a score by a rookie in franchise history.

62 Evan Dietrich-Smith, C/G, 4th Year, Idaho State

• Appeared in all 32 games over the past two seasons, joining T Marshall Newhouse as the only offensive linemen on the team to do so over that span.

• Has started nine contests since 2011, opening five at LG, two at C and two at RG.

• Took over as the starting center for the final two regular-season games and both postseason contests in 2012. Also opened four games at LG earlier in the season with the line shuffling due to T Bryan Bulaga's season-ending injury.

88 Jermichael Finley, TE, 6th Year, Texas

• Ranks No. 3 in franchise history for the most career receiving yards by a tight end with 2,485 and No. 4 in team annals for the most receptions by a TE with 198. Needs just 110 yards to move past No. 2 Ron Kramer (2,594) and five catches to move past No. 3 Ed West (202).

• Is the only tight end in Packers history to record three 55-catch seasons (2009, 2011-12) and holds three of the top seven single-season yardage totals by a TE in team annals (2009, 2011-12).

• Set a single-season franchise record for the most catches by a tight end with 61 in 2012.

49 Robert Francois, LB, 4th Year, Boston College

• Versatile backup linebacker and special teams performer who played in a career-high 16 games in 2012. Appeared exclusively on the coverage units and finished the season ranked second on the club with a career-best 13 coverage tackles.

• Spent the entire season on the active roster for the first time in 2011 and saw the most extensive playing time of his career late in the year. Played in 11 games with two starts, tallying 21 tackles (15 solo), two interceptions, three passes defensed and a forced fumble as an injury replacement for LB A.J. Hawk (calf).

23 Johnathan Franklin, RB, Rookie, UCLA

 Rookie ballcarrier who looks to add depth in the backfield and also participate on special teams.

• Drafted by the Packers with the last of three fourth-round selections (No. 125 overall).

• Played in 53 games with 45 starts during his collegiate career and rushed for 4,403 yards and 31 TDs on 788 carries (5.6 avg.) and added 58 receptions for 517 yards (8.9 avg.) and three TDs.

61 Brett Goode, LS, 6th Year, Arkansas

• Reliable long snapper was a last-minute injury replacement for LS J.J. Jansen following the 2008 preseason and has performed the job almost flawlessly for the past five seasons.

• Was one of only three Packers (CB Jarrett Bush, K Mason Crosby) to appear in all 80 regular-season games from 2008-12.

• Has appeared in all 80 regular-season games and eight playoff contests since joining the club, having recorded 11 coverage tackles and a fumble recovery in his five seasons, including a career-best five tackles in 2010.

50 A.J. Hawk, LB, 8th Year, Ohio State

• Productive, assignment-sure defender entering his eighth season, having played in 110 of a possible 112 regular-season games with 107 starts in his first seven years.

• Has posted 872 tackles (622 solo), 13½ sacks, eight interceptions, 34 passes defensed, two forced fumbles and four fumble recoveries during his career, and has registered 100-plus tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay.

• The lone constant in an ILB group beset by injuries in 2012, he started all 16 games for the first time since 2008 and led the defense with 142 tackles (105 solo), the second-highest total of his career. Also recorded three sacks, his most since 2008.

29 Casey Hawyard, CB, 2nd Year, Vanderbilt

. Demonstrated the playmaking ability that made him a standout at the col-

lege level, playing in all 16 games as a rookie, starting seven and finishing with 55 tackles (43 solo) and a forced fumble, while also leading the club with six INTs and 25 passes defensed.

• His six INTs led all NFL rookies, ranked tied for fifth in the league among all players, and were the most by a Packers rookie since CB Mike McKenzie had six in 1999.

• Served as the team's nickel CB early in the season before entering the starting lineup in Week 7 at St. Louis as a replacement for the injured Sam Shields (shin/ankle). Reassumed the No. 3 CB role upon Shields' return to the lineup in Week 15, playing out the remainder of the regular season and both playoff games in that capacity.

31 Davon House, CB, 3rd Year, New Mexico State

• Suffered a shoulder injury on special teams late in the 2012 preseason opener at San Diego (Aug. 9), a setback that sidelined him for the remainder of the summer and the first six weeks of the regular season.

• Following an injury to CB Sam Shields (shin/ankle), made his season debut in Week 7 at St. Louis and went on to start five of the next six contests, seeing the most extended action of his young career.

• Finished the season with 18 tackles (17 solo), a sack and tied for fourth on the club with 13 passes defensed.

33 Micah Hyde, CB, Rookie, Iowa

• Promising newcomer who turned in an impressive training camp and preseason. Appears primed for playing time as one of the defense's nickel/ dime CBs, and may also look to contribute in the return game in 2013.

• Finished his time at lowa having played in every game over the course of his career (51), recording 240 tackles (155 solo), including 5½ for a loss, 29 passes defensed, eight INTs, four forced fumbles and three fumble recoveries.

• Earned first-team All-Big Ten honors from both the league's coaches and media following the 2012 season and was also honored as the second-ever recipient of the conference's Jack Tatum-Rod Woodson Defensive Back of the Year Award, now given annually to the league's most outstanding player in the secondary.

43 M.D. Jennings, S, 3rd Year, Arkansas State

• Appeared in all 16 games in 2012, seeing his role expanded when he became the primary injury replacement for veteran Charles Woodson (collarbone) and went on to start the final nine regular-season games at free safety.

• Registered the first defensive statistics of his career, finishing with 46 tackles (41 solo), six passes defensed and an INT that he returned for a touchdown.

• Also factored on special teams for the second consecutive season, tallying a career-high 10 coverage tackles, a total that was tied for third on the club.

97 Johnny Jolly, DE, 5th Year, Texas A&M

• Veteran defensive lineman who returns to the club following a threeyear hiatus due to an NFL-issued suspension for violation of the league's substance-abuse policy. Had his suspension lifted by the commissioner on March 4, 2013, and was legally cleared to rejoin the team for the conclusion of the offseason program in late May.

• Appeared in each of the team's four 2013 preseason games and showed glimpses of the production that made him a valuable contributor during the first part of his career. Finished the preseason with four tackles (all solo), a sack, an interception and two passes defensed.

59 Brad Jones, LB, 5th Year, Colorado

• Made the offseason transition from outside to inside LB in 2012, and ultimately assumed starting duties at the 'Mack' LB position following season-ending injuries to both Desmond Bishop (hamstring) and D.J. Smith (knee).

• Took over as the starter in Week 7 following the injury to Smith and went on to open the final 10 games, posting career highs in tackles (102), solo tackles (75), passes defensed (six) and forced fumbles (one). His tackle total ranked No. 3 on the team and he also added two sacks.

• Also started both playoff games and tied for the team lead with 16 tackles (13 solo) in the postseason.

• Reached unrestricted free agency in the spring of 2013, but was quickly re-signed to a new contract by the Packers, March 21.

95 Datone Jones, DE, Rookie, UCLA

• Drafted by the Packers with the No. 26 overall selection in the first round. Joined QB Ernie Case (No. 6 overall, 1947) as the only UCLA players to be drafted by the Packers in the first round.

• Appeared in 51 games with 43 starts during his Bruin career and finished with 148 tackles (90 solo), 36½ tackles for loss, 13½ sacks, five passes defensed, four forced fumbles and one fumble recovery.

• Started all 14 games as a senior in 2012 and earned second-team All-Pacific-12 honors from the league's coaches.

89 James Jones, WR, 7th Year, San Jose State

• Led the NFL with 14 TD catches in 2012, the first Packer to lead the league in the category since WR Sterling Sharpe did so with his franchise-record 18 in 1994. The 14 TD grabs were tied for the fourth most in a season in franchise history.

• Recorded career highs in every category last season, hauling in 64 passes for 784 yards (12.3 avg.) and the 14 scores.

• Has played in all 16 games each of the past four seasons, one of only six NFL wide receivers to do so over that span, and in five of his six seasons as a pro.

30 John Kuhn, FB, 8th Year, Shippensburg

• Has played in 92 games with the Packers (2007-12), the most by an offensive player on the roster over that span.

• Has appeared in 92 of 96 games (102 of 106 including playoffs) during his six seasons in Green Bay, including all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.

• Has scored a touchdown each of the last four postseasons (2009-12), the only player in the NFL to accomplish that feat over that span. Joined RB Dorsey Levens (five straight, 1994-98) and WR Antonio Freeman (1995-98) as the only players in team history to score a TD in four or more consecutive postseasons.

27 Eddie Lacy, RB, Rookie, Alabama

• Selected by the Packers in the second round (No. 61 overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft following a productive three-year playing career at Alabama.

• Was a member of three national championship teams during his four years on campus, during which time the program posted a 49-5 record (.907).

• Ended his career with a 6.8-yard per carry average that ranked No. 1 in school history among players with a minimum of 300 career attempts.

70 T.J. Lang, G, 5th Year, Eastern Michigan

• His 31 starts over the past two seasons are the most by a Green Bay offensive lineman.

• Has started 34 games in his first four seasons as a pro, opening contests at three different positions (27 at LG, five at RT, two at LT). Enters the 2013 season as the team's starter at RG following an offseason transition from his familiar LG post.

• In his first two seasons as a full-time starter (2011-12), helped the Packers rank No. 3 in the NFL in scoring (31.0 ppg) and No. 4 in overall offense (382.3 yards per game) over that span.

57 Jamari Lattimore, LB, 3rd Year, Middle Tennessee State

• A core special teams player who was voted by teammates as one of six playoff captains prior to the 2012 postseason, serving as one of two representatives for the special teams.

• Originally made the team as an outside linebacker in 2011, but spent his first offseason transitioning to the inside positions, where he played in 2012.

• Played in a career-high 14 games in 2012, tying for fourth on the club

with a career-best 10 special teams tackles, also recovering an onside kick.

8 Tim Masthay, P, 4th Year, Kentucky

• Bested his own franchise record by posting a 38.9-yard net average in 2012, improving upon that number for the second consecutive season as he now holds the top three single-season marks in club history (since 1976).

• Ranked No. 7 in the NFL and tied Sean Landeta's (1998) franchise record by landing a career-high 30 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2012.

• Also spearheaded a stingy punting unit that ranked No. 5 in the NFL in opponent return average (7.5) in 2012 and allowed the third-fewest return yards in the league with 179, the second-lowest total in franchise history (113 in 2007).

• After clearing the 150-career punt mark in 2012, his 44.2-yard gross average now qualifies for No. 1 in franchise history.

52 Clay Matthews, LB, 5th Year, Southern California

• Became the first player in franchise history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the NFL (2009-12).

• Returned to the ROLB position for the 2012 campaign and was en route to what would have been his finest statistical season when a hamstring injury suffered in Week 10 sidelined him for Weeks 11-14 and caused him to miss four full games.

• Finished the 2012 season having started all 12 games in which he appeared, registering 60 tackles (45 solo), 13 sacks, four passes defensed and a forced fumble, earning his fourth consecutive bid to the Pro Bowl.

22 Jerron McMillian, S, 2nd Year, Maine

• Made marked contributions in his first season in 2012, becoming one of four rookies to appear in all 16 games, playing extensively on both special teams and defense.

• Defensively, amassed 30 tackles (21 solo), an INT, a fumble recovery and tied for fourth on the club with 13 passes defensed.

• Flashed playmaking ability at different points during the season, joining fellow S Morgan Burnett as the only two players on the team to record both an INT and a fumble recovery in 2012.

55 Andy Mulumba, LB, Rookie, Eastern Michigan

• One of three non-drafted free agents to make the opening-day roster in 2013, joining S Chris Banjo and G Lane Taylor.

• A collegiate DE who has undertaken the conversion to OLB in the Packers' 3-4 defensive front, he finished the preseason with seven tackles (five solo) and a sack.

• Played in all 48 games with 31 starts during his four-year college career, totaling 143 tackles (46 solo), $4\frac{1}{2}$ sacks, four forced fumbles and a fumble recovery.

96 Mike Neal, DE, 4th Year, Purdue

• Powerful, strong defensive end and inside pass rusher who enters the 2013 campaign in a DE/OLB hybrid role that will see him line up in mulitple positions across the defensive front.

• Appeared in a career-high 11 games in 2012, finishing with 18 tackles (10 solo) and ranking second on the team behind LB Clay Matthews with a career-best $4\frac{1}{2}$ sacks.

• Was limited to just nine games over the course of his first two seasons, missing all but two games of his rookie campaign with abdominal/shoulder injuries and then suffering a knee sprain in training camp that sidelined him until midseason in 2011.

87 Jordy Nelson, WR, 6th Year, Kansas State

• Sixth-year veteran wideout seeking to bounce back from an injuryplagued 2012 season that saw him miss four full games and extended parts of others with a hamstring injury.

• Underwent a minor knee surgery during training camp and did not make his preseason debut until the Week 4 finale at Kansas City (Aug. 29).

• Ranks No. 2 in the NFL with 22 TD catches since 2011, trailing only Patriots TE Rob Gronkowski (28) over that span.

• Has an average of 17.2 yards per catch since 2011, No. 2 in the NFL over that span among players with 100 or more receptions behind only Buccaneers WR Vincent Jackson (18.9).

74 Marshall Newhouse, T, 4th Year, Texas Christian

• Opens the season as the top backup at both tackle positions on the offensive line, offering depth and experience after two seasons as a member of the starting lineup.

• Has played in all 32 regular-season games with 29 starts over the past two seasons, opening 26 at LT and three at RT.

• Started every game at left tackle in 2012, one of only two offensive linemen (Josh Sitton) to open all 16 contests last season.

51 Nate Palmer, LB, Rookie, Illinois State

• Newcomer seeking to make the transition from collegiate DE to professional OLB in the Packers' 3-4 defensive front.

• Was selected with the team's lone choice in the sixth round (193rd overall) of the 2013 NFL Draft, becoming the 12th player in Illinois State history to be drafted and the first since 2007 (WR Laurent Robinson, Atlanta).

• After transferring from Illinois, finished his career having started all 24 games over his two seasons for the Redbirds, amassing 117 tackles (50 solo), including 25½ for loss, 17 sacks, five forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries.

53 Nick Perry, LB, 2nd Year, Southern California

• Top draft choice in 2012 that made the difficult transition from playing defensive end in college to stand-up outside linebacker at the pro level. Opened five of the first six contests of his rookie season, collecting 29 tackles (18 solo) and two sacks from the LOLB position.

• A true power player who showed little difficulty physically adjusting to the NFL before suffering a knee injury in Week 6 at Houston (Oct. 14), and later having surgery on a lingering wrist ailment that ultimately ended his season. Placed on injured reserve, Nov. 7.

79 Ryan Pickett, DE, 13th Year, Ohio State

• Begins his 13th NFL season and eighth in Green Bay as a primary runstuffer and unsung veteran leader on the defensive line.

• Has unselfishly rotated between both nose tackle and left defensive end since the Packers' implementation of the 3-4 alignment in 2009.

• Was impressively available and reliable during what was his 12th season in 2012, starting all 16 games for the first time since 2008 and ranking fourth on the club with 75 tackles (27 solo), his highest total since 2008.

81 Andrew Quarless, TE, 4th Year, Penn State

• Seeking to return to action after missing the entire 2012 season as he continued his rehabilitation from a significant knee injury sustained at the N.Y. Giants in in Week 13 of the 2011 season.

• Played in 23 games with five starts in his first two seasons (2010-11), catching 24 passes for 274 yards (11.4 avg.) and one TD.

90 B.J. Raji, DT, 5th Year, Boston College

• Has emerged as one of the top players in the league at his position over the past three seasons, and earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl in 2011, the first Packers defensive tackle since Bob Brown in 1972 to receive the honor.

• Earned Pro Bowl alternate status for his performance in 2012 after starting all 14 games in which he appeared and posting 46 tackles (26 solo) and a pass defensed.

28 Sean Richardson, S, 2nd Year, Vanderbilt

• Opens the 2013 season on the reserve/physically unable to perform list as he continues to recovery from offseason surgery on his neck.

• One of four non-drafted free agents to emerge from training camp to make the team's opening-day roster in 2012.

• Battled a hamstring injury early in the 2012 regular season before appearing in five games, but then suffered the neck injury that landed him on injured reserve, Dec. 1.

12 Aaron Rodgers, QB, 9th Year, California

• Ranks No. 1 in NFL history (min. 1,500 attempts) with a career passer rating of 104.9, more than eight points ahead of No. 2 Steve Young (96.8).

• Also ranks No. 1 in league history in career INT percentage (1.73) and TD/INT ratio (3.72, 171/46) and ranks No. 2 in career completion percentage (65.7).

• In 78 career regular-season starts (52-26 record), has posted 28 games with 300-plus passing yards, 43 without an interception and 46 with a 100-plus passer rating.

 \bullet Has been selected to the Pro Bowl three of the last four seasons (2009, 2011-12) and was named the NFC's starting QB each of the past two seasons.

10 Jeremy Ross, WR, 1st Year, California

• Played in the final five regular-season games and both playoff contests for Green Bay in 2012 after originally joining the team as a member of the practice squad on Oct. 17.

• Posted a 25.8-yard average on four punt returns in the regular season, highlighted by a 58-yard return vs. Tennessee in Week 16, and a 28.7-yard average on three kickoff returns.

78 Derek Sherrod, T, 3rd Year, Mississippi State

• Opens the 2013 season on the reserve/physically unable to perform list, having spent the last year and a half rehabilitating a broken leg suffered in Week 15 of 2011.

• Appeared in five games as a rookie in 2011, seeing time at tackle with injuries to veteran LT Chad Clifton and second-year RT Bryan Bulaga.

• Saw his most significant action in Week 5 at Atlanta when he played RT for most of the game with Bulaga sidelined and Clifton exiting on the second series.

• Was a first-team All-America selection by CBSSports.com and Rivals. com in 2010 and earned first-team All-SEC honors from the coaches and the media.

37 Sam Shields, CB, 4th Year, Miami

• Enters 2013 as a cemented starter on the outside for the Green Bay defense.

• Worked his way into the starting lineup after the beginning of the regular season in 2012, taking over as the No. 2 CB in the team's base defense following veteran Charles Woodson's transition to safety.

• Started Weeks 2-6 at RCB before suffering a shin/ankle injury at Houston (Oct. 14) that sidelined him for the next six games. For the season, appeared in 10 games with eight starts and registered career highs with 38 tackles (27 solo) and 16 passes defensed, also ranking second on the club with three interceptions, in addition to his first career sack.

71 Josh Sitton, G, 6th Year, Central Florida

• Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Marco Rivera in 2004.

• One of only two linemen (T Marshall Newhouse) to start all 16 games in 2012 and joined Newhouse as the only players on the team to play every offensive snap last season.

• Was selected as a Pro Bowl alternate in both 2010 and 2011 and was named the Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association in 2010.

44 James Starks, RB, 4th Year, Buffalo

• Posted a combined 833 rushing yards in 2011-12, the most by a Packer over that span, despite being limited to just six games because of injuries in 2012.

• Led the team with 578 rushing yards on 133 carries (4.3 avg.) in 2011, while also leading the running backs with 29 receptions for 216 yards (7.4 avg.).

65 Lane Taylor, G, Rookie, Oklahoma State

• One of three non-drafted rookie free agents to make the opening-day roster in 2013.

• Joined the Packers following an impressive college career that saw him start 47 games over the course of four seasons for the Cowboys.

• Blocked for an offense that ranked in the top 3 nationally in scoring each of his final three seasons and was voted a unanimous first-team All-Big 12 selection by the league's coaches in 2012.

82 Ryan Taylor, TE, 3rd Year, North Carolina

• Has appeared in 31 regular-season games during his first two seasons and registered 18 tackles on special teams as one of the team's top contributors in the third phase.

• His two-year tackle total ranked No. 3 on the team over that span behind only CB Jarrett Bush (29) and S M.D. Jennings (19).

• Played in all 16 contests in 2012 and finished fifth on the team with eight special teams tackles.

73 JC Tretter, T, Rookie, Cornell

• Rookie OL who will begin the season on the reserve/physically unable to perform list after suffering a significant ankle injury in the first practice of the Organized Team Activities in the spring.

• Chosen by Green Bay with the second of three fourth-round draft picks in 2013. Selected with 122nd overall pick.

• A four-year letterman and two-year starter for the Big Red who grew from a 238-pound freshman tight end to a 300-pound All-American left tackle during his time on campus and appeared in 40 games during his career.

• Earned unanimous first-team All-Ivy League honors, and was a first-team All-American (Football Championship Subdivision) selection by the *NFL Draft Report* as a senior in 2012.

64 Greg Van Roten, G/C, 2nd Year, Pennsylvania

• Top backup along the interior who added the center position to his repertoire during the offseason program this spring.

• Signed by Green Bay as a non-drafted free agent on July 25, 2012, and spent the opening five games on the Packers' practice squad.

• Was later signed to the active roster on Oct. 13 and appeared in seven regular-season games and both playoff contests.

• As a rookie in 2012, saw time on special teams and as an extra blocker on offense.

9 Seneca Wallace, QB, 10th Year, Iowa State

• Signed by Green Bay Sept. 2, to serve as the primary backup to QB Aaron Rodgers.

• Spent time with both New Orleans and San Francisco during the 2013 preseason after sitting out the 2012 regular season.

• Appeared in 62 games with 21 starts over the course of his first nine seasons in the league, spending his first seven seasons as a member of the Seattle Seahawks (2003-09) and an additional two years with the Cleveland Browns (2010-11).

• For his career, has completed 452 of 764 passes (59.2 percent) for 4,808 yards and 31 TDs with and 18 INTs for a 81.3 passer rating.

38 Tramon Williams, CB, 7th Year, Louisiana Tech

• Former non-drafted free agent and practice-squad player who has gone on to appear in nearly 100 games for the Packers since 2007.

• Battled a knee injury during the 2013 training camp and made his preseason debut in the finale at Kansas City, making an INT on the game's opening play before exiting the game (coaches' decision).
