## PACKERS OPEN PRESEASON ON THE ROAD VS. TITANS

The Green Bay Packers' 2014 season officially kicks off Saturday night when they travel to take on the Tennessee Titans at LP Field, the first time the Packers have played the Titans in the pre-season since 2009.



- ▶ It marks the ninth time since 2002 that the Packers and Titans have played in the preseason but the first time it won't be in the final week. From 2002-09, Green Bay and Tennessee played each other in Week 4 of the preseason every year.
- ▶ Green Bay's nine games against Tennessee during the preseason are the most the Packers have played against any team in the NFL dating back to 2000. It will bypass the eight preseason games Green Bay has played against the Cleveland Browns. The Packers' third-most common preseason opponent during that span is the Kansas City Chiefs, who Green Bay will play later this preseason for the sixth time.
- ▶ This preseason the Packers will play the Titans and Chiefs for the fifth time each under Head Coach Mike McCarthy, marking the most times a McCarthy coached team has faced any club during the preseason.
- ▶ The teams have met eight times during the preseason since the club moved from Houston to Tennessee in 1997. The Packers are 2-6 vs. Tennessee in the preseason.
- ▶ Overall, Green Bay is 3-7 against the Houston/Tennessee franchise in the preseason, with the first meeting coming on Aug. 19, 1972, in Houston. Of the 10 preseason matchups, one took place in Houston, one in Milwaukee, four in Green Bay, and this year's game will be the fifth in Tennessee, where the Packers are 1-3.
- ▶ The last time Green Bay and Tennessee played was in the regular season on Dec. 23, 2012, at Lambeau Field, with the Packers racking up 460 yards of total offense and six different players scoring at least one touchdown in a 55-7 win.
- ▶ The Packers are opening the preseason on the road for the third time in the last four seasons (at San Diego in 2012 and at Cleveland in 2011).
- ▶ This is the ninth time in the last 10 years that Green Bay's first preseason opponent is an AFC team. The only exception came in 2013, when the Packers played the Arizona Cardinals. It also marks the ninth time in the last 10 seasons that Green Bay's preseason slate has consisted of at least three teams from the AFC.
- ▶ Green Bay's next preseason contest comes a week from Saturday when it travels to St. Louis to face the Rams on Aug. 16 at 3 p.m. It will be only the second time the Packers have played the Rams in St. Louis during the preseason (2013).

## WITH THE CALL

Flagshipped by Milwaukee's WTMJ-TV and in conjunction with WGBA-TV in Green Bay, the game will be televised over the 14-station Packers TV Network throughout the state of Wisconsin, Upper Michigan, northeastern Minnesota, the Quad Cities, Des Moines, Cedar Rapids and Waterloo in Iowa, Omaha in Nebraska and Honolulu in Hawaii.

- ▶ The top-notch broadcast team includes CBS's **Kevin Harlan** (play-by-play) alongside fellow CBS broadcaster **Rich Gannon** (analyst), with **Rod Burks** of WTMJ-TV serving as the sideline reporter. An informative half-hour pregame show prior to the game will feature former Packers tackle **Mark Tauscher**.
- ▶ In addition to WTMJ-TV (Milwaukee) and WGBA-TV (Green Bay), three preseason games will be televised over WKOW/ABC, Madison, Wis.; WAOW/ABC, Wausau/Rhineland, Wis.; WXOW/ABC, La Crosse, Wis.; WQOW/ABC, Eau Claire, Wis.; WLUC/NBC, Escanaba/Marquette, Mich.; KQDS-TV/FOX, Duluth/Superior, Minn.; KLJB-TV/FOX and KGCW/CW, Davenport, Iowa (Quad Cities); KCWI-TV/CW, Des Moines, Iowa; KWWL-TV, Cedar Rapids/Waterloo, Iowa; KMTV-TV/CBS, Omaha, Neb.; and KFVE-TV in Honolulu, Hawaii.
- ▶ In its third season, in conjunction with the Packers TV Network, Telemundo Wisconsin (WYTU-TV in Milwaukee and on Charter Cable elsewhere in Wisconsin) will broadcast three preseason games with **Kevin Holden** (play-by-play) and **Epigmenio (Epi) Guerrero** (analyst) calling the action.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in five states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) call the action. The duo enters its 16th season of broadcasts together across the Packers Radio Network, originally being paired together in 2009.

# PACKERS AT TITANS – PRESEASON WEEK 1

## BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers 90-man roster is composed of 45 offensive players, 42 defensive players and three specialists.

- ▶ Of the 90 players on Green Bay’s roster, 41 of them (46.1 percent) were draft picks of the Packers. Dating back to 2009, Green Bay has selected seven players in the first round, all of which are still on the team.
- ▶ Green Bay has 45 players on the roster that began their careers as non-drafted free agents, with 28 of those originally signed by Green Bay.
- ▶ More than 60 percent of the players (56 of 90, 62.2 percent) on Green Bay’s roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player.
- ▶ The Packers have nine players on the roster that played in the NFL prior to the 2009 season, and four of those players began their pro careers as non-drafted free agents (CB Tramon Williams, CB Jarrett Bush, FB John Kuhn, LS Brett Goode).
- ▶ Of the 90 players on the roster, 69 began their pro careers with the Packers (77.5 percent).
- ▶ Only 20 of the 90 players on the roster (22.2 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft, with 19 being drafted by the Packers.
- ▶ Of the 90 players on the roster, 80 of them (88.9 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Aug. 1) and 52 players (57.8 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

## MEET THE DRAFT PICKS

Preseason storylines always hover around new players and just how they figure into the depth chart. This past May, the Packers added to an already deep and talented roster with a nine-man draft class.

▶ **S Ha Ha Clinton-Dix**, the second safety ever drafted by the Packers in the first round (Alabama S George Teague, No. 29 in 1993), was a consensus All-America selection in 2013 as a junior, earning first-team recognition from *The Associated Press*, the Football Writers Association of America and *Sporting News*. He played in 38 games with 20 starts in his three seasons at Alabama and registered 100 tackles (58 solo), including four tackles for a loss, seven interceptions, a forced fumble and 17 passes defended. He was part of an Alabama team that won back-to-back national titles. The Orlando, Fla. native led the conference with a career-high five interceptions as a sophomore in 2012.

- ▶ The Packers selected WR **Davante Adams** out of Fresno State in the second round, making him one of two Fresno State receivers (Henry Ellard, 1983) to ever be picked in the first two rounds of the draft. In 2013, he led the nation in receptions (131) and receptions per game (10.1), while ranking second in the country in receiving yards (1,718) and receiving yards per game (132.2). He also registered 24 TD receptions, eight more than any player in the country and the most in school and Mountain West Conference history.
- ▶ Green Bay drafted DT **Khyri Thornton** with the first of two selections in the third round. He earned second-team All-Conference USA honors and was a finalist for the Conerly Trophy, which is given to the state’s top collegiate player, as a senior in 2013. Thornton is the highest-drafted defensive end from Southern Mississippi since Richard Byrd was chosen in the second round by the Houston Oilers in 1985.
- ▶ With their second pick in the third round, the Packers selected TE **Richard Rodgers** out of the University of California-Berkeley. Rodgers, who played tight end for his first two seasons before moving to inside receiver in 2013, recorded at least one reception in 19 consecutive games to end his career. He played in 35 games with 11 starts in three seasons at Cal and totaled 59 receptions for 896 yards (15.2 avg.) and two TDs.
- ▶ Green Bay selected LB **Carl Bradford** out of Arizona State in the fourth round. The former Sun Devil earned first-team All-Pacific-12 honors at defensive end as a junior in 2013 after recording 61 tackles (45 solo), including 19 tackles for a loss, 8½ sacks, three forced fumbles, an interception that he returned for a touchdown, and five passes defended. Bradford posted 40½ tackles for a loss over his final two seasons at Arizona State (2012-13), which was tied for fourth in the country over that span.
- ▶ The Packers picked C **Corey Linsley** out of Ohio State with the first of two selections in the fifth round. He was named first-team All-Big Ten by both the coaches and the media as a senior. Linsley was one of five team captains and was part of a line that helped the team set school records for points scored (637), yards per carry (6.8), touchdowns (87) and TD passes (38) in ’13. The Ohio native was part of a Buckeye team that won 24 consecutive games from 2012-13.
- ▶ Green Bay drafted WR **Jared Abbrederis** out of the University of Wisconsin with its second selection in the fifth round, making him the first Wisconsin native drafted by Green Bay since T Mark Tauscher (Marshfield, Wis.) in 2000. The former walk-on finished his career at Wisconsin tied for the school record for receptions (202) and ranked No. 2 all-time in receiving yards (3,140) and TD receptions (23). He also ranks No. 8 all-time among Big Ten players in receiving yards.
- ▶ The Packers selected CB **Demetri Goodson** out of Baylor with their sixth-round choice. After playing just eight games in his first two seasons at Baylor due to season-ending injuries both years, he was granted an extra year of eligibility and earned All-Big 12 recognition in 2013 after appearing in 11 games with 10 starts and posting career highs in tackles (26), interceptions (three) and passes defended (16). Before playing football for the Bears, he spent three seasons playing basketball at Gonzaga (2008-11).
- ▶ With their final pick of the draft the Packers selected WR **Jeff Janis** out of Saginaw Valley State in the seventh round. The first wide receiver from SVS ever to be selected in the NFL Draft finished his career as the school’s all-time leader in receptions (241), receiving yards (4,274) and receiving TDs (46). Janis was twice named the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference’s Back of the Year. He was also selected to the Little All-America team by *The Associated Press* in 2013.

**MIKE MCCARTHY**...Is in his ninth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Led the Packers to their fifth consecutive playoff appearance last season, joining New England as the only two NFL teams to do so over that span. Has also led the team to six playoff appearances in the last seven years (2007, 2009-13).
- ▶ Has guided the Packers to top-10 finishes in scoring each of the past seven seasons (2007-13), joining the Patriots as the only other team to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ His .637 winning percentage (including playoffs) ranks No. 4 among active NFL coaches (min. 60 games) entering the 2014 season.
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.

**KEN WHISENHUNT**...Is in his first year as the 17th coach in franchise history.

- ▶ Has 17 seasons of NFL coaching experience, including six years as the head coach of the Arizona Cardinals (2007-12), where he won a franchise record 49 games. Guided Arizona to a team-record 12-win season in 2008 and an appearance in Super Bowl XLIII.
- ▶ In 2013, he was the offensive coordinator for the San Diego Chargers and was named NFL Assistant Coach of the Year by the Pro Football Writer's Association.
- ▶ Also served as tight ends coach (2001-03) and offensive coordinator (2004-06) for Pittsburgh, tight ends coach for the New York Jets (2000), special teams coach for Cleveland (1999), tight ends coach for Baltimore (1997-98), and special teams/tight ends at Vanderbilt (1995-96).

## THE PACKERS-TITANS SERIES

- ▶ Green Bay played its first ever dome game, a 23-10 win on Nov. 20, 1972, when the franchises first met over 40 years ago at the Houston Astrodome. The clubs have met only 11 other times in the regular season since then.
- ▶ The Packers are 2-3 vs. the Titans in the regular season since the franchise moved from Houston to Tennessee in 1997.

▶ The teams' first meeting after the move, at Lambeau Field on Dec. 20, 1998, was a memorable contest. A 30-22 Packers win in snowy, 29-degree conditions, the game marked Reggie White's final Lambeau Field performance in a Green Bay uniform. WR Antonio Freeman posted seven catches for 186 yards (26.6 avg.) and three TDs.

## NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

Packers GM Ted Thompson played linebacker for 10 seasons (1975-84) for the Houston Oilers...Thompson was a teammate of Titans asst. secondary coach Steve Brown with the Oilers...Brown also played with Packers senior personnel executive Alonzo Highsmith, who was selected by the Houston Oilers with the No. 3 overall pick in 1987 and played three seasons for the club...Packer equipment manager Red Batt spent 13 seasons (1981-93) in the same position with the Houston Oilers... Packers area scout Lee Gissendaner was selected by the Houston Oilers in the sixth round of 1994 NFL Draft...Titans offensive line coach Bob Bostad, a Pardeeville, Wis. native, served in the same position at the University of Wisconsin-Stevens Point from 1990-91 after playing linebacker at UWSP, and coached at the University of Wisconsin from 2006-11...From 2001-03, Titans running backs coach Sylvester Croom served in the same position for the Packers...Packers WR Randall Cobb was born in Maryville, Tenn., and attended Alcoa High...Packers LB/DE Julius Peppers was teammates on the Bears with Titans C/G Chris Spencer from 2011-12...Packers QB Matt Flynn and Titans RB Leon Washington both played for the Seahawks in 2012...Packers QB Scott Tolzien was teammates with Titans TE Delanie Walker on the 49ers in 2011-12...Titans linebackers coach Lou Spanos served as a defensive assistant for the Steelers from 1994-2009, and he was joined by Packers defensive coordinator Dom Capers (1992-94), offensive coordinator Tom Clements (2001-03), secondary/safeties coach Darren Perry (played 1992-98/coached 2003-06), defensive/special teams assistant Jason Simmons (played 1998-2001) and Packers FB John Kuhn (2005-06), as well as Titans head coach Ken Whisenhunt (2001-06), tight ends coach Mike Mularkey (1996-2003), defensive coordinator Ray Horton (2004-10) and WR Nate Washington (2005-08)...Clements served in the same position for the Bills and Packers quarterbacks coach Alex Van Pelt was a volunteer offensive quality control coach while Mularkey was the head coach...Highsmith, Horton and Titans assistant offensive line coach Mike Sullivan were teammates on the Cowboys...Sullivan and Packers assistant offensive line coach Steve Marshall coached the offensive line together for the Browns from 2007-08...Titans wide receivers coach Shawn Jefferson and Packers running backs coach Sam Gash were teammates on the Patriots and were on the Lions' coaching staff together...Gash was on the New York Jets' coaching staff with Titans offensive coordinator Jason Michael while Washington played for New York...Gash and Perry played at Penn State with Titans quarterbacks coach John McNulty... Packers RB Rajion Neal played for the University of Tennessee and was roommates with Titans WR Justin Hunter...Other former college teammates include Packers LB Clay Matthews and Titans DL Jurrell Casey (Southern California), Packers QB Aaron Rodgers and Titans TE Craig Stevens (California), Packers RB Eddie Lacy, S Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, LB Adrian Hubbard and Titans G Chance Warmack (Alabama), Packers CB Sam Shields and Titans LB Colin McCarthy (Miami), Packers DE Datone Jones and Titans LB Akeem Ayers (UCLA), Packers S Morgan Burnett and Titans LB/DE Derrick Morgan (Georgia Tech), and Packers T Bryan Bulaga and DT Mike Daniels and Titans RB Shonn Greene (Iowa).

## LAST MEETING, PRESEASON

- ▶ QB Aaron Rodgers connected on 2 of 3 passes for 7 yards. QB Brian Brohm played the majority of the preseason finale, connecting on 20 of 28 passes for 154 yards (84.5 passer rating).
- ▶ TE Spencer Havner led Green Bay with five receptions (22 yards) while WR Jordy Nelson recorded a team-high 50 yards on three receptions. In all, 11 different Packers registered at least one reception.

## A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers’ 94th NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling), including opening the season on Thursday night in Seattle, marking the first time the Packers have faced the defending Super Bowl champions in Week 1.

- ▶ Green Bay’s schedule includes five games against 2013 playoff teams, with three of those contests (Carolina, Philadelphia, New England) at Lambeau Field and two on the road (Seattle, New Orleans). All five play-off teams that the Packers play won at least 10 games last season, and four won their division.
- ▶ The Packers have three prime-time contests at home (vs. Minnesota on Thursday night in Week 5, vs. Chicago on Sunday night in Week 10 and vs. Atlanta on *Monday Night Football* in Week 14) and two on the road (Thursday night at Seattle in Week 1 and Sunday night at New Orleans in Week 8).
- ▶ The Packers’ bye arrives in Week 9 for the first time since 2004.
- ▶ It is the second time in franchise history (1922) that Green Bay opens with three of their first four games on the road.
- ▶ Two of Green Bay’s first five games are played on Thursday night, with the next seven taking place on Sunday, one on the following Monday, and three more on Sunday to close out the regular season.
- ▶ For the second year in a row and just the third time in nine seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (2010), the Packers will open the season on the road. For the third straight season Green Bay will open against an NFC West team after facing San Francisco each of the last two years.
- ▶ Dating back to 2001, the Packers have always played against an NFC team in Week 1. The last AFC team Green Bay faced in Week 1 was the New York Jets, who will visit the Packers in Week 2 for the home opener.
- ▶ Following the home opener the Packers will go on the road to face two division opponents, Detroit and Chicago, before returning home to face Minnesota in a Thursday night divisional matchup. It will be the sixth time in the last seven seasons they have faced off in primetime.

- ▶ Green Bay will play two of the next three on the road prior to the Week 9 bye. The Packers travel to Miami for the third time in 23 years and first time since 2006, and to New Orleans in a game on Sunday night, marking the third primetime meeting between the two in the last four contests. Between the two road games, Carolina will travel to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2008.
- ▶ After the bye week, the Packers return to Sunday night to host the Bears, who they have beaten five of the last six times at home.
- ▶ Philadelphia comes to Lambeau for the second straight season, which is only the second time in the series that the two clubs have played at Green Bay in back-to-back seasons (1933-34).
- ▶ For the second consecutive season, Green Bay will play Minnesota in Week 12, traveling to face the Vikings in the first outdoor game (TCF Bank Stadium) between the two in Minnesota since they played at Metropolitan Stadium on Nov. 29, 1981.
- ▶ The last game in November brings New England to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2006 and only its third visit ever to the stadium (1979).
- ▶ December opens with a Monday night matchup at home versus Atlanta. It marks the 22nd straight season the Packers have appeared on *Monday Night Football*.
- ▶ The next two weeks include road games at Buffalo and Tampa Bay. It will be the Packers’ first visit to Buffalo since 2006 and first trip to Tampa Bay in the month of December since 1999.
- ▶ Green Bay closes the regular season at Lambeau Field against Detroit for the fourth time under McCarthy (2007, 2008, 2011). Including a 1994 playoff victory, the Packers have won 23 consecutive games against the Lions in the state of Wisconsin. Green Bay has a 14-2 overall mark (.875) and an 8-0 home record against Detroit under McCarthy.

### IN THE PRESEASON

The Packers' preseason schedule is highlighted by a nationally televised contest at Lambeau Field against the Oakland Raiders on Friday, Aug. 22.

- This is the first time since 2003 that the Packers have opened the pre-season with two games outside of Green Bay and closed the pre-season with two home games. That year the Packers opened the pre-season in the Hall of Fame game in Canton, Ohio, then played two road games before finishing with two games at Lambeau Field.
- Dating back to 1970, this will be only the third time the Packers have opened both the pre-season and the regular season as the away team (1981 and 1985).
- Green Bay opens the pre-season at Tennessee, marking the first time they have played the Titans in the pre-season since 2009. This will mark the ninth time since 2002 that the Packers and Titans have played in the pre-season but the first time it won't be in the final week.
- The Packers travel to play at St. Louis in the second week of the pre-season for the second year in a row.
- This year will mark the 65th annual Upper Midwest Shrine Game (32-29-3) and will be the third time the Packers have played the Oakland Raiders in the game (1981 and 1998).
- The Packers and Chiefs will play each other in the pre-season finale for the fourth consecutive year.
- Green Bay is 28-24-1 in Bishop's Charities Games and have recorded wins in four of the last five games. The Chiefs will be the Packers' opponent in the game for the third time in the last four years.

### FINAL THOUGHTS ON THE 2013 SEASON

The Packers won their third consecutive NFC North title in 2013, the first time Green Bay won its division in three straight years since the club captured three consecutive NFC North crowns from 2002-04.

- Green Bay had a winning record in each of its last five seasons (2009-13), joining New England as the only two teams in the league to accomplish that feat.
- The Packers are the only NFC team to win its division each of the last three seasons (2011-13) and one of only three teams in the league to do so over that span (Denver, New England).
- For the eighth straight season the Packers posted a winning record in the division last year. New England was the only other team in the NFL to accomplish that feat over the past eight seasons (2006-13).
- The Packers generated 6,404 yards of total offense in 2013, the second most in franchise history behind only the 6,482 yards posted in 2011. Green Bay ranked No. 3 in the league in total offense with its average of 400.3 yards per game.
- For Green Bay, it marked its seventh top-10 finish in total offense in the past eight seasons.
- The Packers ranked No. 7 in the league in rushing offense with an average of 133.5 yards per game, the team's best finish in the league rankings since it finished third in the NFL in 2003.
- By also finishing No. 6 in the NFL in passing offense last year, it marked the first time since 2004 (No. 3 passing/No. 10 rushing) that it finished in the top 10 in the NFL in both categories.

## COMEBACK PACK

In Green Bay's division-clinching win at Chicago in the regular season finale, the Packers overcame a 28-20 fourth-quarter deficit.

- ▶ For Green Bay, that was familiar territory in the final month of the season, with the comeback win over Chicago marking the third time in December that the Packers had come back to win after trailing by eight or more points in the second half.
- ▶ In Green Bay's 22-21 victory vs. Atlanta in Week 15, it trailed 21-10 in the second half before shutting out the Falcons and scoring 12 points to pull out the win. In the Packers' 37-36 win at Dallas the next week, they matched the biggest comeback in franchise history after trailing by 23 points (26-3) in the second half.
- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, it marked the **first time in franchise history** that the Packers had won three games in a calendar month when they trailed by eight-plus points in the second half in each of those victories.
- ▶ According to Elias, the last NFL team to accomplish the feat in a calendar month was the **Indianapolis Colts in December 1986**.
- ▶ The Packers scored 83 second-half points in their last four games, No. 2 in the NFL over that span behind only Philadelphia (92).

- For the Packers, it marked the second straight game that they had a run of 50-plus yards. In the Week 3 contest at Cincinnati, RB **Johnathan Franklin** registered a 51-yard run in the third quarter, which at the time was the longest by a Green Bay rookie since RB Samkon Gado's 64-yard TD run vs. Detroit on Dec. 11, 2005.
- With Cobb's 67-yard run in Week 5 against the Lions, it marked the first time since 2001 that the Packers posted a run of 50-plus yards in back-to-back games in the same season.
- In 2001, RB Ahman Green registered a 61-yard run at Minnesota in Week 6 and then followed that up with a 63-yard TD run in the Packers' next game vs. Tampa Bay in Week 8.
- RB **Eddie Lacy** recorded the team's third run of 50-plus yards with a 56-yard gain vs. Chicago in Week 9 of the 2013 season.
- Lacy registered the Packers' fourth 50-yarder of the season with a 60-yard pickup at Dallas in Week 15. It was the longest run by a Green Bay rookie since Gado's 64-yard TD run in 2005.

- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, it marked the **first time a division winner had four different QBs start at least one game** in that season since the 1987 Chicago Bears. Having led Green Bay to the playoffs in five of his seven seasons as head coach, **Mike McCarthy** is joined by Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl win with a victory over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.

▶ McCarthy joined Pittsburgh's Bill Cowher (2005) as the only Super Bowl-winning coaches to lead their respective teams to three road wins as the No. 6 seed in the postseason en route to a world title.

▶ Including playoffs, McCarthy has an 88-50-1 record since taking over as head coach in 2006, a .637 winning percentage that ranks **No. 4 among current NFL head coaches** (minimum 60 games):

### ADJUSTMENTS TO THE STAFF

In addition to making changes to the roster this past offseason, the Packers also made a few changes to the coaching staff.

► **Winston Moss**, who is entering his ninth season on Green Bay's staff, served the past five seasons as assistant head coach/inside linebackers and will now coach both the inside and outside linebackers. He began his time in Green Bay as the linebackers coach in 2006 and served as assistant head coach/linebackers in 2007-08.

► **Scott McCurley** will help Moss with the linebackers as he makes the move to assistant linebackers coach. The former University of Pittsburgh linebacker has been with the Packers since 2007 and served as the defensive quality control coach from 2009-13.

► **Alex Van Pelt** made the move to quarterbacks coach after spending the last two seasons coaching the Packers' running backs. Prior to joining Green Bay, Van Pelt served as the quarterbacks coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers for two seasons (2010-11) and spent the previous four seasons (2006-09) with the Buffalo Bills as an offensive assistant.

► Former NFL fullback **Sam Gash** was hired as running backs coach. After his 12-year playing career, Gash spent two seasons as an assistant coach with the New York Jets and six seasons as an assistant with the Detroit Lions.

► After serving as a coaching administrator with the club for the past three years, **Jason Simmons** will be a defensive/special teams assistant. Longtime assistant and head coach **Ron Zook** will also help the special teams units as an assistant.

► **John Rushing**, who is entering his sixth season with the Packers, will be the defensive quality control coach, while **Luke Getsy** will serve as the offensive quality control coach after spending the past five years as a college assistant coach.

► Former Packers linebacker **Chris Gizzi** rejoins the organization as a strength and conditioning assistant.

## BIG-PLAY JAMES

In Green Bay's loss to Chicago in Week 9 last season, RB **James Starks** scored on a 32-yard TD run, matching his career-long TD run (32 yards vs. Washington this season in Week 2).

► For Starks, it marked his second straight game that he posted a TD run of 25-plus yards (25-yard TD at Minnesota in Week 8). He became the first Packer to accomplish that feat since RB Ryan Grant did so in Weeks 16-17 of 2007.

► It was Starks' third scoring run of 25-plus yards over a four-game span. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Starks is the **first player in franchise history** to have three TD runs of 25-plus yards over a four-game span in the same season.

► Starks was **tied for No. 2 in the NFL** last season with three TD runs of 20-plus yards:

► Starks rushed for 493 yards and a career-high three TDs on 89 carries (5.5 avg.) last season.

► Starks' average of 5.54 yards per carry ranked **No. 1 in the league** last season among running backs with 80-plus carries.

## RARE ROOKIE

By starting against the 49ers in the 2013 season opener at San Francisco, **David Bakhtiari** became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start at left tackle in Week 1 since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970 and the first to do so since 1985.

► Bakhtiari was drafted by the Packers in the fourth round (109th overall) out of the University of Colorado. Of the four rookies to start at LT in Week 1 for the Packers since the merger, he is the only one not to be drafted in the first two rounds. Ruettggers (No. 7 overall) and Koncar (No. 23 overall) were first-round picks and Bain was a second-round selection (No. 47 overall).

► Bakhtiari was the **only rookie in the league** to start at left tackle in every game for his team last season.

► With a start at Chicago in Week 17, Bakhtiari became the first Green Bay rookie to start every game at left tackle since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978. The last Packer rookie to start every game at LT was Koncar (14 games) in 1976.

► In 2009, Matthews set a Packers rookie record with 10 sacks on his way to earning Pro Bowl honors, the first Green Bay rookie to be named to the all-star game since Hall of Fame WR James Lofton in 1978.

- ▶ Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only 10 of 32 NFL teams have regular-season road records above .500.

### 302 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Steelers in Week 16 last season brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 302 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field hosted its 57th season of football in 2013. A total of 701,102 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine games (including playoffs) in 2013.
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

### THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the toughest venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 46-12-1 (.788) at home over its past 59 regular-season games.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:
