PACKERS TRAVEL TO SEATTLE FOR SEASON OPENER

The Green Bay Packers take on the Seahawks in the first game of the NFL regular season. It is the first time the Packers have taken on the defending Super Bowl Champions in Week 1.



- ▶ This will be the second time in the last four seasons that the Packers have played in the NFL's primetime regular-season opener (2011 vs. New Orleans).
- ▶ Nine of the last 12 primetime kickoff games have been decided by 10 points or less.
- ▶ The Packers have won each of the last two games they played on Thursday night.
- ▶ This is the first time Green Bay has opened the regular season in Seattle.
- ▶ The contest is one of two matchups in Week 1 between teams that made the playoffs last season (Indianapolis at Denver).
- ▶ This marks the the third straight season that the Packers have traveled to face the defending Super Bowl champions (N.Y. Giants in 2012, Baltimore in 2013), a first for the franchise.
- ▶ This will be the sixth time Green Bay has played in Seattle in the regular season. The Seahawks have won three of the previous five matchups. All but one of the five contests between the Packers and Seahawks has been decided by at least 10 points. The only game between the two that was decided by single digits was the 2012 contest, which Seattle won 14-12.
- ▶ Green Bay is opening up the season against a team from the NFC West for the third consecutive year and against a team from the NFC for the 14th straight season. The last time the Packers faced an AFC team in Week 1 was in 2000 (New York Jets).
- ▶ For the fifth consecutive year Green Bay opens the regular season against a team the made the playoffs the previous year.
- ▶ Since 2010, Green Bay has made the playoffs four times, won three division titles, 44 regular-season games and a Super Bowl, while Seattle has made the playoffs three times, won two division titles, 38 regular-season games and a Super Bowl. They are joined by San Francisco and Atlanta as the only NFC teams with at least three playoff appearances and two division titles since 2010.

STARTING STRONG

Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the Packers are 5-3 in season openers. McCarthy's .625 winning percentage in openers is tied with Seattle's Pete Carroll (5-3) for the sixth highest among current head coaches who have coached in five-plus season openers.

- ▶ From 2007-11, the Packers won five consecutive season openers, which made McCarthy the only head coach in franchise history to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ Green Bay has 52 wins on Kickoff Weekend, second most in NFL history behind only the Chicago Bears (54 victories in Week 1). The Packers and Bears are the only teams in the NFL with 50-plus wins on Kickoff Weekend.
- ▶ This will mark just the third time in McCarthy's nine seasons (2006-14) that the Packers have opened their season away from Lambeau Field. The only other instances over that span were in 2013 at San Francisco and 2010 at Philadelphia.

- ▶ Opening on the road has been a rare occurrence dating back even further. Since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, the Packers have opened their season at home 32 times while opening on the road just 13 times. Since 1986, 23 of Green Bay's season openers have been at home, making Thursday's game just the sixth time in the past 29 years that the Packers have gone on the road to start their season.

WITH THE CALL

NBC will broadcast the game to a national audience. Play-by-play man **Al Michaels** joins color commentator **Cris Collinsworth** in the booth with **Michele Tafoya** reporting from the sidelines.



- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in five states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 20th season calling Packers' games. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 16th season of broadcasts together.
- ▶ Westwood One Sports will air the game across the country. **Kevin Harlan** (play-by-play) and **Boomer Esiason** (analyst) will call the action, with **Mark Malone** reporting from the sidelines. **Jim Gray** hosts pregame and halftime shows.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.

PACKERS AT SEAHAWKS – WEEK 1

SEPTEMBER STARTS

Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, Green Bay has been one of the most successful teams in the league early in the season.

► Since McCarthy took over in 2006, the Packers have a 17-10 (.630) mark in the month of September. Green Bay's 17 wins are tied for first in the NFC and fourth in the NFL. The Packers' .630 winning percentage is tied for sixth in the league.

► In the month of September under McCarthy (2006-13), the Packers rank in the top five in the following offensive categories: points per game (3rd, 26.3), touchdowns (2nd, 84), passing touchdowns (2nd, 53), completions (3rd, 652), completion percentage (4th, 65.3), gross passing yards (5th, 7,576), passer rating (2nd, 98.2) and touchdown/interception ratio (2nd, 2.94, 53/18).

► Dating back to 2008, QB **Aaron Rodgers** is one of three quarterbacks in the NFL with a passer rating of 100-plus in the month of September (min. 100 att.).

► Since becoming a full-time starter in 2008, Rodgers ranks in the top five in the month of September in: passing yards (5th, 5,472), passing TDs (4th, 38), 25-plus yard pass plays (T-5th, 45) and completion percentage (4th, 66.2).

PACKERS ON THURSDAYS

Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, Green Bay is 6-2 in games played on Thursday, 3-1 in Thursday night matchups and 3-1 in day games played on Thursday.

► According to STATS LLC, Packers QB **Aaron Rodgers** ranks second in the NFL in passer rating in games played on Thursdays (min. 100 att.).

► The last time the Packers played in the NFL's primetime kickoff game was in 2011. Green Bay won the shootout with the New Orleans Saints with a goal-line stand on the game's final play. Rodgers threw for 312 yards, three touchdowns and a passer rating of 132.1 and WR **Randall Cobb** became the second player in NFL history to catch a pass for a touchdown and return a kickoff for a touchdown in his pro debut.

► The Packers first played a game on a Thursday on Nov. 25, 1920, beating the Stambaugh Miners 14-0 on Thanksgiving. Green Bay's first Thursday night game came on Oct. 17, 1991, losing 10-0 to the Chicago Bears. Although the Packers started off losing the first three Thursday night games they played in, Green Bay has won two of the last three, including a 23-10 win vs. Chicago in 2012.

► This will be only the third time Green Bay has played on a Thursday in the month of September.

ROLLING ON THE ROAD

Since taking over as the starter in 2008, QB **Aaron Rodgers** has been one of the most effective signal-callers in the league away from home.

STAT OF THE WEEK

- ▶ Although this will only be the third time under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (2010 at Philadelphia, 2013 at San Francisco) that the Packers have played away from Lambeau Field in Week 1, they have had success in their first road contest of the season.
- ▶ Green Bay has won its first road game in six of eight seasons under McCarthy.
- ▶ The Packers have an all-time record of 53-38-2 (.582) in road openers, the **most wins** and **fourth-best winning percentage** in the NFL.
- ▶ With a six-game winning streak in the first road game of the season from 2006-11, McCarthy joined Vince Lombardi (eight straight, 1960-67) as the only coaches in team history to win six or more consecutive road openers.

BREAKING DOWN THE 53

The Packers' 53-man roster is composed of 24 offensive players, 26 defensive players and three specialists.

- ▶ Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 34 of them (64.2 percent) were draft picks of the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 16 players on the roster that began their careers as non-drafted free agents, with eight of those originally signed by Green Bay.
- ▶ Almost 50 percent of the players (24 of 53, 45.3%) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player.
- ▶ The Packers have 12 players on the roster that played in the NFL prior to the 2009 season, and six of those players began their pro careers as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player (QB Matt Flynn, K Mason Crosby, CB Tramon Williams, CB Jarrett Bush, FB John Kuhn, LS Brett Goode).
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 43 began their pro careers with the Packers (81.1 percent).
- ▶ Only 17 of the 53 players on the roster (32.1 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft, with 16 being drafted by the Packers.
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, nine of them (81.1 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Sept. 4) and 21 players (39.6 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

PACKERS AT SEAHAWKS – WEEK 1

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

- ▶ With a win, Green Bay would be 9-6 against the Seahawks during the regular season. It would be the Packers' first victory at Seattle since 2008 and would make them 3-3 on the road against the Seahawks.
- ▶ With a victory, the Packers would be one of five teams (Arizona, Atlanta, San Francisco, Washington) to win at least two games at Seattle since 2008.
- ▶ The Packers are looking for their third consecutive Thursday night win. It would improve Green Bay's overall record on Thursday nights to 4-4, including 4-1 under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**. It would also make Green Bay 7-2 overall in games played on Thursdays under McCarthy, which would tie Dallas and Pittsburgh for the second-most wins in the NFL on Thursdays from 2006-13.
- ▶ A win would improve the Packers to 6-3 in season openers under McCarthy, including 2-1 in season openers on the road.
- ▶ McCarthy will begin his ninth regular season as Green Bay's head coach, tying Vince Lombardi (1959-67) and Bart Starr (1975-83) for the second-most seasons as head coach in franchise history behind Curly Lambeau's 31 (1919-49).
- ▶ If Green Bay wins, it will be just the third road team to win the NFL's primetime kickoff game since 2002.
- ▶ Green Bay looks to become only the second team to beat Seattle at home in the last two seasons (Arizona in 2013).
- ▶ The Packers can break the Seahawks' streak of five consecutive wins in home openers, the third-longest active streak in the league.

OFFENSE

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** looks to throw for 300-plus yards for the fourth consecutive season opener. Last year, Rodgers recorded the most yards he has ever thrown for in a season opener, 333 at San Francisco. If Rodgers throws for 300-plus yards, it will be the 33rd 300-yard passing game of his career during the regular season.
- ▶ Rodgers has thrown for at least two touchdowns in each of the last four season openers. (2, 3, 2, 3)
- ▶ Rodgers needs 45 pass attempts (2,955) to become the third Packers player with 3,000 career attempts (Brett Favre, 8,754 / Bart Starr, 3,149).
- ▶ Rodgers needs 522 passing to surpass Bart Starr (24,718) for the second most in franchise history (Brett Favre, 61,655).
- ▶ Rodgers is looking to lead the Packers to their fourth consecutive road victory when he is the starting quarterback. If Green Bay wins it will be the second-longest road winning streak when Rodgers starts (10, 2010 postseason - 2011 regular season).
- ▶ WR **Jordy Nelson** (302) is nine receptions shy of passing WR James Jones (310) for the 12th most in franchise history. Nelson needs one receiving touchdown to tie Jones (37) for No. 11 in Packers history.
- ▶ Nelson looks to extend his consecutive games, in which he played in, with at least one reception to 24, including the postseason. It is the second-longest streak of his career (27 games, 2010 postseason - 2012 regular season).
- ▶ WR **Randall Cobb** needs one reception to extend his consecutive games, in which he played in, with a reception to 29, including the postseason.
- ▶ In the last two season openers, Cobb has recorded 185 yards receiving on 16 receptions (11.6 avg.) with one receiving touchdown.
- ▶ RB **Eddie Lacy** scored a rushing touchdown in the 2013 season opener while racking up 72 total yards.
- ▶ Including the postseason, Lacy recorded 20-plus carries in 11 of the final 14 games last season.
- ▶ Lacy registered a 31-yard reception in Week 1 last season, his second-longest reception of 2013.

DEFENSE

- ▶ LB **Clay Matthews** (50) is four sacks shy of being tied with DE Aaron Kampman (54) for No. 4 on the team's career sacks list.
- ▶ Matthews has registered a total of 6.5 sacks in five season openers. He set a career high with 10 tackles in the 2013 season opener at San Francisco.
- ▶ From 2009-11, LB **Julius Peppers** recorded a sack in each season opener.
- ▶ Peppers has registered a sack each of the last two times he has played against Seattle (2011-12), and also forced a fumble against the Seahawks in the 2011 game.
- ▶ LB **Nick Perry** registered career highs with nine tackles and seven solo tackles in the 2012 season opener against San Francisco, his first NFL regular-season game.
- ▶ The last time Green Bay beat the Seahawks in Seattle (2008), CB **Tramon Williams** registered an interception.
- ▶ S **Morgan Burnett** set a career high with 14 tackles in the 2011 season-opening win over New Orleans.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- ▶ Cobb is the only player in NFL history to score on a kick return (kickoff or punt) in Week 1 of each of his first two seasons in the league (108-yard kickoff return vs. New Orleans in 2011 and a 75-yard punt return vs. San Francisco in 2012).
- ▶ K **Mason Crosby** has attempted and made a total of 12 extra points in the last three season openers, but has not attempted a field goal in a season opener since 2010.
- ▶ Crosby looks to extend his consecutive-games-scoring streak to 113 regular-season games. It is the second longest streak in franchise history (Ryan Longwell, 144).

PRESEASON HIGHLIGHTS

- The Packers finished the 2014 preseason on a three-game winning streak. Green Bay's 3-1 record was its best since 2011 (3-1). It was the third time the Packers finished with three wins in the preseason under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**.
- ▶ In the final three games of the preseason, Green Bay outscored its opponents 86-42.
 - ▶ The Packers scored over 30 points (31, 34) in both of the final two preseason games.
 - ▶ Green Bay's offense scored on its opening possession in all four games.
 - ▶ The Packers outscored their opponents a combined 59-27 in the first half.
 - ▶ RB **Eddie Lacy** played in two drives during the preseason and both resulted in touchdowns. In those two drives, Lacy recorded 61 rushing yards on 11 carries (5.5 avg.) with one touchdown and two receptions for 22 yards (11.0 avg.).
 - ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** led Green Bay to four touchdowns and one field goal on the eight drives he played in. Rodgers finished the preseason with a passer rating of 116.6, completing 20 of 33 passes for 267 yards and three touchdowns. He registered a 100-plus passer rating in both games he played in this year and in four of the last five preseason games he has participated in.
 - ▶ LB **Jayrone Elliott** led the NFL with five sacks this preseason, including three sacks in a four-play span against St. Louis. Dating back to 2000, it was the most sacks recorded by a Packers' player in the preseason and tied for the second-most sacks in the league in the preseason (Caesar Rayford, IND, 2013 / Nate Bolling, BAL, 2003 / LaDairis Jackson, WAS, 2002 / Adalius Thomas, BAL, 2000) behind Adewale Ogunleye's eight in 2002 for Miami.

MIKE McCARTHY...Is in his ninth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Led the Packers to their fifth consecutive playoff appearance last season, joining New England as the only two NFL teams to do so over that span. Has also led the team to six playoff appearances in the last seven years (2007, 2009-13).
- ▶ Has guided the Packers to top-10 finishes in scoring each of the past seven seasons (2007-13), joining the Patriots as the only other team to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ His .637 winning percentage (including playoffs) ranks No. 4 among active NFL coaches (min. 60 games) entering the 2014 season.
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.

PETE CARROLL...Is in fifth year as the Seahawks' eighth head coach.

- ▶ Led Seattle to the first Super Bowl win in franchise history last season.
- ▶ Spent nine years as head coach at Southern California (2001-09), where he led the Trojans to seven consecutive Pacific-10 titles and two national championships (2003-04).
- ▶ Previously served as a head coach in the NFL with the New York Jets (1994) and New England (1997-99), leading the Patriots to two playoff appearances.
- ▶ Began his NFL career as a defensive backs coach for Buffalo (1984). Also served as an assistant coach for Minnesota (1985-89), N.Y. Jets (1990-93) and San Francisco (1995-96).
- ▶ A former all-conference free safety at Pacific, started his coaching career at his alma mater in 1974.

THE PACKERS-SEAHAWKS SERIES

- ▶ The two clubs have met 16 times, including the regular season and playoffs. The two playoff games (2007 Divisional, 2003 Wild Card) were both at Lambeau and won by the Packers.
- ▶ For a span of eight head-to-head meetings from 1996-2008, Mike Holmgren was the head coach for one of the teams.
- ▶ Since Seattle's shift to the NFC in 2002, the two teams have met eight times (including playoffs). They met in six of seven seasons from 2003-09, with 2004 being the lone exception.
- ▶ Neither team has ever won more than three in a row in the series.

The play was ruled simultaneous possession, therefore awarding the TD to Seattle. The call was challenged by the replay assistant but was upheld and Seattle won by two points.

COMEBACK PACK

In Green Bay's division-clinching win at Chicago in the regular season finale, the Packers overcame a 28-20 fourth-quarter deficit.

- ▶ For Green Bay, that was familiar territory in the final month of the season, with the comeback win over Chicago marking the third time in December that the Packers had come back to win after trailing by eight or more points in the second half.
- ▶ In Green Bay's 22-21 victory vs. Atlanta in Week 15, it trailed 21-10 in the second half before shutting out the Falcons and scoring 12 points to pull out the win. In the Packers' 37-36 win at Dallas the next week, they matched the biggest comeback in franchise history after trailing by 23 points (26-3) in the second half.

- **Winston Moss**, who is entering his ninth season on Green Bay's staff, served the past five seasons as assistant head coach/inside linebackers and will now coach both the inside and outside linebackers. He began his time in Green Bay as the linebackers coach in 2006 and served as assistant head coach/linebackers in 2007-08.
- **Scott McCurley** will help Moss with the linebackers as he makes the move to assistant linebackers coach. The former University of Pittsburgh linebacker has been with the Packers since 2007 and served as the defensive quality control coach from 2009-13.
- **Alex Van Pelt** made the move to quarterbacks coach after spending the last two seasons coaching the Packers' running backs. Prior to joining Green Bay, Van Pelt served as the quarterbacks coach for the Tampa Bay Buccaneers for two seasons (2010-11) and spent the previous four seasons (2006-09) with the Buffalo Bills as an offensive assistant.
- Former NFL fullback **Sam Gash** was hired as running backs coach. After his 12-year playing career, Gash spent two seasons as an assistant coach with the New York Jets and six seasons as an assistant with the Detroit Lions.
- After serving as a coaching administrator with the club for the past three years, **Jason Simmons** will be a defensive/special teams assistant. Longtime assistant and head coach **Ron Zook** will also help the special teams units as an assistant.
- **John Rushing**, who is entering his sixth season with the Packers, will be the defensive quality control coach, while **Luke Getsy** will serve as the offensive quality control coach after spending the past five years as a college assistant coach.
- Former Packers linebacker **Chris Gizzi** rejoins the organization as a strength and conditioning assistant.

straight season that he had scored a defensive TD.

- In 2009, Matthews set a Packers rookie record with 10 sacks on his way to earning Pro Bowl honors, the first Green Bay rookie to be named to the all-star game since Hall of Fame WR James Lofton in 1978.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Green Bay went 7-1 away from Lambeau Field in 2011, with the seven road wins setting a single-season franchise record.

- ▶ The Packers have been able to stay above the .500 mark on the road during Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** tenure, a notable achievement in the National Football League.
- ▶ Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only 10 of 32 NFL teams have regular-season road records above .500.

302 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Steelers in Week 16 last season brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 302 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field hosted its 57th season of football in 2013. A total of 701,102 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine games (including playoffs) in 2013.
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 46-12-1 (.788) at home over its past 59 regular-season games.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 94th NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling).

- ▶ Green Bay's schedule includes five games against 2013 playoff teams, with three of those contests (Carolina, Philadelphia, New England) at Lambeau Field and two on the road (Seattle, New Orleans).
- ▶ The Packers have three prime-time contests at home (vs. Minnesota on Thursday night in Week 5, vs. Chicago on Sunday night in Week 10 and vs. Atlanta on *Monday Night Football* in Week 14) and two on the road (Thursday night at Seattle in Week 1 and Sunday night at New Orleans in Week 8).
- ▶ The Packers' bye arrives in Week 9 for the first time since 2004.
- ▶ It is the second time in franchise history (1922) that Green Bay opens with three of their first four games on the road.
- ▶ Two of Green Bay's first five games are played on Thursday night, with the next seven taking place on Sunday, one on the following Monday, and three more on Sunday to close out the regular season.
- ▶ For the second year in a row and just the third time in nine seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (2010), the Packers will open the season on the road. For the third straight season Green Bay will open against an NFC West team after facing San Francisco each of the last two years.
- ▶ Dating back to 2001, the Packers have always played against an NFC team in Week 1. The last AFC team Green Bay faced in Week 1 was the New York Jets, who will visit the Packers in Week 2 for the home opener.
- ▶ Following the home opener, the Packers will go on the road to face two division opponents, Detroit and Chicago, before returning home to face Minnesota in a Thursday night divisional matchup. It will be the sixth time in the last seven seasons they have faced off in primetime.
- ▶ Green Bay will play two of the next three on the road prior to the Week 9 bye. The Packers travel to Miami for the third time in 23 years and first time since 2006, and to New Orleans in a game on Sunday night, marking the third primetime meeting between the two in the last four contests. Between the two road games, Carolina will travel to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2008.
- ▶ After the bye week, the Packers return to Sunday night to host the Bears, who they have beaten five of the last six times at home.
- ▶ Philadelphia comes to Lambeau for the second straight season, which is only the second time in the series that the two clubs have played at Green Bay in back-to-back seasons (1933-34).
- ▶ For the second consecutive season, Green Bay will play Minnesota in Week 12, traveling to face the Vikings in the first outdoor game (TCF Bank Stadium) between the two in Minnesota since they played at Metropolitan Stadium on Nov. 29, 1981.
- ▶ The last game in November brings New England to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2006 and only its third visit ever to the stadium (1979).
- ▶ December opens with a Monday night matchup at home versus Atlanta. It marks the 22nd straight season the Packers have appeared on *Monday Night Football*.
- ▶ The next two weeks include road games at Buffalo and Tampa Bay. It will be the Packers' first visit to Buffalo since 2006 and first trip to Tampa Bay in the month of December since 1999.
- ▶ Green Bay closes the regular season at Lambeau Field against Detroit for the fourth time under McCarthy (2007, 2008, 2011).



STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

18 RANDALL COBB

- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first person in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Has three kick return scores (two punts, one kickoff) in his career, which ties him for No. 2 in franchise history behind only RB Travis Williams' six return TDs (one punt, five kickoffs).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 5 in the NFL with the three total kick return TDs since 2011.

2 MASON CROSBY

- ▶ His 903 points from 2007-13 rank No. 1 in NFL history for the most points scored by a player in his first seven seasons, topping the mark of Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team annals with 903 career points (Ryan Longwell, 1,054), having surpassed Don Hutson (823) at Minnesota in Week 8.
- ▶ Reached the 900-point mark for his career in his 112th game, third fastest in NFL history (Gino Cappelletti, 106; Stephen Gostkowski, 108).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most 100-point seasons with seven, trailing only Longwell (eight).
- ▶ Made 23 straight field goals from Week 13 of 2010 through Week 10 of 2011, the longest regular-season streak in franchise history as he eclipsed Chris Jaffe's mark of 17 (1993).
- ▶ In 2011, set a franchise record with a 58-yard field goal in Week 7 at Minnesota, eclipsing the mark of 56 yards he held (Week 1 at Philadelphia, 2010; Week 5 at Atlanta, 2011).
- ▶ For his career, has hit 122 of 133 field goals (91.7 percent) from 39 yards and closer.
- ▶ Has made 44 of 62 field goals (71.0 percent) from 40-49 yards.
- ▶ Has hit 19 of 40 field goals (47.5 percent) from 50-plus yards.

50 A.J. HAWK

- ▶ Is tied for No. 1 in franchise history for the most seasons leading the team in tackles with five (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012-13), matching the mark of five by LB Nick Barnett (2003-05, 2007, 2009).
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Has posted 100-plus tackles in six of seven seasons.
- ▶ Has 1,025 career tackles, which ranks No. 1 in team history (since defensive stats began to be recorded by coaches in 1975). Moved past John Anderson (1,020, 1978-89) for the franchise record with eight tackles at Chicago in Week 17.

27 EDDIE LACY

- ▶ Set franchise rookie records in 2013 for rushing yards (1,178), rushing TDs (11) and rushing attempts (284).

- ▶ Tied the team rookie mark for 100-yard rushing games with four last season.
- ▶ Named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press* and was selected to the Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Vikings RB Adrian Peterson.
- ▶ Recorded 20-plus carries 10 times during the 2013 regular season, all coming in the the last 13 games. The Packers were 7-2-1 in those games. Dating back to 1960, he tied Dorsey Levens (1997) for the second-most games of 20-plus carries by a Packers' player in one regular season (Ahman Green, 12 in 2003).

8 TIM MASTHAY

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (min. 150 punts) with a 44.3-yard gross punting average.
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with his 45.6-yard gross average in 2011, surpassing Craig Hentrich's 45.0-yard mark in 1997.
- ▶ Tied Sean Landeta's single-season franchise record (1998) by placing 30 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2012.
- ▶ Holds the top four single-season marks for net punting average in franchise history (since 1976) with a 38.95 average in 2013, a 38.93 average in 2012, a 38.56 average in 2011 and a 37.65 average in 2010.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team annals (since 1976) with 100 punts placed inside the 20-yard line in his career. Trails only Craig Hentrich (104) in the franchise record book.

52 CLAY MATTHEWS

- ▶ Only player in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl each of his first four seasons in the league (2009-12).
- ▶ Only player in team history to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ His 17 sacks in his first 20 games were the most by an NFL player to start his career at the time, eclipsing the mark of 16.5 set by Leslie O'Neal (1986, 1988) and John Abraham (2000-01).
- ▶ Is the first NFL player since sacks became an official stat in 1982 to post a double-digit sack total and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the league.
- ▶ First player in franchise annals to post 10-plus sacks in each of his first two years in the NFL.
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in team history with 50.0 career sacks.
- ▶ His 29.5 sacks from 2009-11 were tied for No. 1 in team history with Tony Bennett for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL with 50.0 sacks since entering the league 2009.
- ▶ Set a franchise rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called *The Dope Sheet*, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.

87 JORDY NELSON

- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL with 30 TD catches since 2011 and is tied for No. 4 in the league with 17 TD grabs at home over that span.
- ▶ His 22 TD grabs from 2011-12 were the most by a Packer over a two-year span since WR Antonio Freeman posted 26 TDs from 1997-98.
- ▶ Caught 15 TD passes in 2011, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942) as the only players in franchise annals to catch 15-plus TD passes in a season.
- ▶ With three TD grabs of 80-plus yards during his career, Nelson is tied for No. 2 among active NFL players behind only Vikings WR Greg Jennings (four).
- ▶ Ranks No. 11 in franchise history with 4,590 career receiving yards.
- ▶ Ranks No. 12 in franchise history with 36 career TD catches. Trails No. 11 James Jones (37) by one TD.
- ▶ Among players with 250-plus catches, ranks No. 9 in franchise history with a 15.2-yard receiving average.

56 JULIUS PEPPERS

- ▶ Has been selected to eight Pro Bowls since entering the league in 2002, which ties him with Troy Polamalu and Ray Lewis for the third most among defensive players over that span (Ed Reed, 9 / Champ Bailey, 12).
- ▶ With eight double-digit sack seasons as a pro, is tied with Jared Allen for the most in the NFL since 2002.
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times and was selected to the NFL's All-Decade team for the 2000s.

12 AARON RODGERS

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with a 104.9 career passer rating.
- ▶ Set an NFL single-season record in 2011 with a 122.5 passer rating and set team marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games (eight).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first five seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Threw a TD pass in 35 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field from 2008-12, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre, 1992-96). It was the second-longest home streak in NFL history behind Dan Marino's 39-game streak from 1983-88.
- ▶ Tied a single-game franchise record with six TD passes at Houston in Week 6 of 2012, matching Matt Flynn's mark (Jan. 1, 2012, vs. Detroit).
- ▶ In 87 regular-season starts, has 32 career 300-yard games, 35 three-TD games and 47 zero-INT games (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ Has posted a 100-plus passer rating 51 times. Set an NFL record for quarterbacks whose careers started since 1970 with 43 games with a 100-plus passer rating in his first 75 starts.
- ▶ Posted a 100-plus passer rating in five straight seasons (2009-13), the only quarterback in league history to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ Is the only QB in team history with three 400-yard passing games, including a 480-yard effort vs. Washington in Week 2 last season that tied a franchise record.
- ▶ When he hit the 150-TD mark for his career, he had thrown just 42 INTs

- to that point, the fewest in NFL history as he bested Dan Marino's mark of 69 INTs at the time of his 150th TD pass.
- ▶ In 2009, became first QB in NFL history to throw 30 or more TDs, seven or fewer INTs, and rush for five TDs in the same season.
- ▶ Has registered a passer rating over 110.0 in four or more consecutive games three times in his career (Weeks 3-7, 2009; Week 9, Weeks 11-13, 2010; Weeks 1-7, 9-12, 2011), one of only two quarterbacks in franchise history (Bart Starr, 1966) to accomplish the feat in a single season.
- ▶ Is the only NFL QB since the 1970 merger to post four straight 110-plus rating games in three straight seasons (2009-11).
- ▶ Posted four or more rushing TDs in three straight seasons (2008-10), becoming only the second Packers QB to accomplish that feat (Tobin Rote, 1954-56), and eclipsed 300 rushing yards in back-to-back seasons (2009-10), the first since Rote in 1954-56.

PACKERS STARTERS – OFFENSE

WR Jordy Nelson, 7th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08

- ▶ Led the team in 2013 with a career-high 85 catches for a career-best 1,314 yards and eight TDs. Ranked No. 10 in the NFL last season in receiving yards.
- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL with 30 TD catches since 2011 and is tied for No. 4 in the league with 17 TD grabs at home over that span.
- ▶ With 15 TD catches in 2011, became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).
- ▶ Became the first player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to post three 80-yard TD grabs over an eight-game span in the regular season (Week 16, 2010-Week 6, 2011).

LT David Bakhtiari, Rookie, Colorado, D4a-13

- ▶ Started all 16 games at left tackle last season, the only rookie in the NFL to do so in 2013 and the first Packer rookie to do so since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start at LT in the season opener since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since 1985.
- ▶ Earned second-team All-Pacific-12 honors from the conference's coaches each of his last two seasons (sophomore and junior) at Colorado.
- ▶ Was named to the watch lists for both the Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Award in 2012.

LG Josh Sitton, 7th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08

- ▶ Has started 78 games since 2009, the most by an offensive player in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ▶ Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Marco Rivera in 2004.
- ▶ Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association.
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, has allowed only 9.0 sacks in his five seasons as a starter (2009-13).
- ▶ Was the only Packer on either side of the ball to not miss a snap from 2009-10.

C Corey Linsley, Rookie, Ohio State, D5a-14

- ▶ Named first-team All-Big Ten by both the coaches and the media as a senior.
- ▶ Was one of five team captains and was part of a line that helped the team set school records for points scored (637), yards per carry (6.8), touchdowns (87) and TD passes (38) in '13.
- ▶ The Ohio native was part of a Buckeye team that won 24 consecutive games from 2012-13.

RG T.J. Lang, 6th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09

- ▶ Has started games at four different positions on the line as a pro (27 at LG, 16 at RG, five at RT, two at LT). Played C in Week 10 last season.
- ▶ Has started 47 contests since 2011.
- ▶ Started games at both tackle spots in his first season (2009) and became the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

RT Bryan Bulaga, 5th Year, Iowa, D1-10

- ▶ Missed the second part of the 2012 season after suffering a hip injury vs. Arizona on Nov. 4 and missed all of the 2013 season after injuring his knee on Aug. 3.
- ▶ Started 37 games at RT in his first two-plus seasons in the league.
- ▶ Started the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at right tackle after taking over for veteran Mark Tauscher (shoulder), the most regular-season starts by a Packers rookie tackle since Tauscher's 14 in 2000.
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.

- ▶ Capped his rookie season by becoming the youngest player, according to STATS LLC, to ever start in the Super Bowl (21 years, 322 days).

TE Richard Rodgers, Rookie, California, D3b-14

- ▶ Played tight end for his first two seasons before moving to inside receiver in 2013.
- ▶ Recorded at least one reception in 19 consecutive games to end his career.
- ▶ Played in 35 games with 11 starts in three seasons at Cal and totaled 59 receptions for 896 yards (15.2 avg.) and two TDs.
- ▶ Is just the fourth Cal tight end to be drafted in the top 100, joining David Lewis (first round, No. 13, Kansas City, 1997), Tony Gonzalez (first round, No. 13, Kansas City, 1997) and Craig Stevens (third round, No. 85, Tennessee, 2008).

WR Randall Cobb, 4th Year, Kentucky, D2-11

- ▶ Before suffering a knee injury in Week 6 last season, led the team in receptions with 29 and was No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.
- ▶ Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, he became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Led the team in receptions (80) and receiving yards (954) in 2012 and finished second on the squad in TD catches (eight).

QB Aaron Rodgers, 10th Year, California, D1-05

- ▶ His career passer rating of 104.9 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Ranked No. 5 in the NFL last season in passer rating (104.9), No. 2 in yards per attempt (8.74) and No. 5 in completion percentage (66.6).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- ▶ In 87 regular-season starts (58-29 record), has posted 32 games with 300-plus passing yards, 47 without an interception and 51 with a 100-plus passer rating (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

RB Eddie Lacy, 2nd Year, Alabama, D2-13

- ▶ Ranked No. 1 in the league among rookies and No. 8 among all players with 1,178 rushing yards last season, despite missing one full game and nearly all of another due to a concussion.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history for the most rushing yards by a rookie in a single season, No. 1 in attempts (284), and tied for No. 1 for most 100-yard rushing games with four (John Brockington, four in 1971).
- ▶ Became the first Green Bay rookie RB to be selected to the Pro Bowl since Brockington in 1971 and was named Rookie of the Year by PFWA.
- ▶ Finished third in the league with 11 TD runs, with 10 of those scores coming between Weeks 7-17, the most in the league over that span.

FB John Kuhn, 9th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)

- ▶ Has played in 107 of 112 games (114 of 119 including playoffs) during his six-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.
- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- ▶ Only player on the team to have a rushing and receiving touchdown each season from 2008-11, and was the first Packer to achieve that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).
- ▶ Led the team with four rushing TDs in 2011 and led the running backs with six total TDs.



PACKERS STARTERS – DEFENSE

LDE Datone Jones, 2nd Year, UCLA, D1-13

- ▶ Overcame an ankle injury during the preseason to play in all 16 games in 2013.
- ▶ Rotated at defensive end and as one of the interior rushers in the team's sub-defenses, recording 3.5 sacks.
- ▶ Blocked an extra point at Cincinnati in Week 3 last year.
- ▶ Was the first UCLA defensive lineman selected in the first round since DT Manu Tuiaosopo in 1979 (No. 18 overall, Seattle).

NT Letroy Guion, 7th Year, Florida State, FA-14

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay this past offseason after spending his first six NFL seasons with the Minnesota Vikings after being selected in the fifth round of the 2008 NFL Draft.
- ▶ Started all 28 games he appeared in for Minnesota over the past two seasons, recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.
- ▶ Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012.

RDE Mike Daniels, 3rd Year, Iowa, D4a-12

- ▶ Played in all 16 games with one start last season and ranked No. 2 on the team with a career-high 6.5 sacks. Was tied for No. 6 in the NFL in sacks among defensive tackles.
- ▶ Appeared in 14 contests as a rookie in 2012 and posted 19 tackles (11 solo), two sacks, a team-high two fumble recoveries and a pass defensed.
- ▶ Returned a fumble 43 yards for a TD vs. Detroit in Week 14 of 2012, the longest fumble return for a TD by a rookie in franchise history.
- ▶ Starred as an interior pass rusher at Iowa, posting a team-high 24.5 tackles for a loss and 13 sacks from 2010-11.

LOLB Clay Matthews, 6th Year, Southern California, D1b-09

- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL since entering the league in 2009 with 50.0 sacks. His sack total ranks No. 5 in team history (since 1982).
- ▶ Became the first Packer in team history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the NFL (2009-12).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting.

BLB A.J. Hawk, 9th Year, Ohio State, D1-06

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (since 1975) with 1,025 tackles.
- ▶ Led the team with 153 tackles (112 solo) last season and was tied for No. 3 on the club with a career-high five sacks.
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Led the team with 142 tackles (105 solo) in 2012.
- ▶ Has appeared in 126 of a possible 128 regular-season games in his career, starting 123 of them.
- ▶ Has posted 1,025 tackles (734 solo), 16.5 sacks, nine interceptions, 39 passes defensed, three forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries during his career.

MLB Brad Jones, 6th Year, Colorado, D7-09

- ▶ Ranked No. 3 on the team with 98 tackles (73 solo) last season and added three sacks, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.
- ▶ Came on in relief of D.J. Smith, who sustained a season-ending knee injury in 2012 in Week 6 at Houston, and made his first career start on the inside (13 starts at OLB) at St. Louis in Week 7. Registered 99 tackles (69 solo), two sacks and a forced fumble in his 10 starts last season.
- ▶ Became a core member on special teams in 2011, appearing in a career-high 15 games and recording a career-best 11 coverage tackles.
- ▶ Worked at OLB for his first three seasons, including his rookie campaign of 2009 that saw him start seven games and register a career-high four sacks.

ROLB Julius Peppers, 13th Year, North Carolina, FA-14

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay during the offseason after playing the last four seasons for Chicago and the first eight of his career for Carolina after being selected as the No. 2 overall pick in 2002.
- ▶ Has been selected to the Pro Bowl eight times (2004-06, 2008-12) and has been named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times (2004, 2006, 2010). Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.
- ▶ Enters this week having played in 96 consecutive regular-season games.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in the league in sacks (118.5) and No. 5 in forced fumbles (39) since entering the NFL in 2002. His sack total ranks No. 17 in NFL history (since 1982).
- ▶ From 2002-13, led all NFL defensive linemen with nine interceptions.
- ▶ Has blocked 13 kicks (12 field goals, one extra point).

LCB Tramon Williams, 8th Year, Louisiana Tech, FA-06

- ▶ Ranks No. 3 in the league in interceptions (18) and No. 5 in the NFL in INT return yards (306) since 2010 (including playoffs).
- ▶ Started all 16 games last season and led the secondary with a career-high 91 tackles (68 solo) and a career-best 2.5 sacks. Added three interceptions, two fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and 14 passes defensed.
- ▶ Despite suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener, went on to start 15 games that season and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defensed (24). Also added four interceptions.
- ▶ With three interceptions during the 2010 playoffs, tied Joe Laws (1944) and Craig Newsome (1996) for the franchise single-postseason record.

RCB Sam Shields, 5th Year, Miami, FA-10

- ▶ Started all 14 games he appeared in last season and led the team with four INTs (tied career high) and a career-best 25 passes defensed.
- ▶ Was limited to 10 games with eight starts in 2012 due to injury, but registered 38 tackles (28 solo), three interceptions, 15 passes defensed (No. 3 on the team) and a sack.
- ▶ Made an impact in 2010 after making the team as a non-drafted rookie, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one season in college.
- ▶ In Green Bay's NFC Championship win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.

SS Morgan Burnett, 5th Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10

- ▶ Ranked No. 2 on the team with 106 tackles (77 solo) in 2013, despite missing the first three games due to injury. Recovered three fumbles, including one for a TD, and added nine passes defensed.
- ▶ Participated in all 1,088 plays for Green Bay's defense in 2012, one of only four non-offensive linemen in the NFL to appear in 100 percent of his team's snaps.
- ▶ Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining DT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

FS Micah Hyde, 2nd Year, Iowa, D5a-13

- ▶ Appeared in all 16 games last season, playing in the most defensive plays (428) among the Packers' defensive rookies.
- ▶ Spent most of his rookie season as the dime or nickel cornerback, helping to fill in for CB Casey Hayward, who missed all but three games due to a hamstring injury.
- ▶ As the team's primary return man for most of the 2013 season, ranked No. 5 in the NFL in punt return average (12.3) and No. 14 in kickoff return average (24.1). Recorded a 93-yard punt return for a touchdown, which tied for the fourth longest in team history.

17 Davante Adams, WR, Rookie, Fresno State

- Was tied for second on the team with six receptions for 85 yards (14.2 avg.) and a TD in the preseason.
- Led the nation in receptions (131) and receptions per game (10.1), while ranking second in the country in receiving yards (1,718) and receiving yards per game (132.2) as a sophomore in 2013.
- Caught 24 TD passes in '13, eight more than any player in the country and the most in school and Mountain West Conference history.
- Set Fresno State career records for receptions (233) and TD catches (38), despite playing just two seasons for the Bulldogs.

69 David Bakhtiari, T, 2nd Year, Colorado

- Started every game at left tackle for the Packers in 2013, becoming the first rookie to do so for Green Bay since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- By starting at San Francisco last season in Week 1, he became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start the season opener at LT since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since Ken Ruettggers in 1985.
- Was the only NFL rookie to start all 16 games at left tackle in 2013.

58 Sam Barrington, LB, 2nd Year, South Florida

- Appeared in seven games as a rookie in 2013, seeing time exclusively on special teams, before sustaining a season-ending hamstring injury vs. Chicago in Week 9.
- Registered three tackles on special teams last season.

86 Brandon Bostick, TE, 2nd Year, Newberry

- Appeared in 11 games in 2013 and posted a 17.1-yard receiving average on his seven receptions.
- Was tied for No. 4 on the team last season with seven tackles on special teams.
- Participated in the Packers' rookie orientation camp on a tryout basis in May 2012 before he was signed by the club later that month. Spent the entire '12 season on Green Bay's practice squad.

93 Josh Boyd, DT, 2nd Year, Mississippi State

- Appeared in nine games as a rookie in 2013, seeing increased playing time down the stretch as he was active for the final seven contests.
- Posted eight tackles (four solo) on the season, with an additional two tackles (one solo) in the NFC Wild Card game vs. San Francisco.

11 Jarrett Boykin, WR, 3rd Year, Virginia Tech

- Played in all 16 games with eight starts in 2013 and registered career highs in receptions (49), receiving yards (681) and receiving TDs (three).
- Ranked No. 2 on the team in all three receiving categories over the final 11 games in '13 with 48 catches for 638 yards (13.3 avg.) and three TDs.
- Signed by Green Bay on May 14, 2012, after participating in the team's rookie orientation camp on a tryout basis. Had signed with Jacksonville earlier in the month as a non-drafted free agent before being released on May 8.

54 Carl Bradford, LB, Rookie, Arizona State

- Earned first-team All-Pacific-12 honors at defensive end as a junior in 2013 after recording 61 tackles (45 solo), including 19 tackles for a loss, 8½ sacks, three forced fumbles, an interception that he returned for a TD and five passes defended.
- Won the Curley Culp Outstanding Defensive Lineman Award at the Sun Devils' team banquet in 2013.
- Posted 40.5 tackles for a loss over his final two seasons at Arizona State (2012-13), which was tied for fourth in the country over that span.

75 Bryan Bulaga, T, 5th Year, Iowa

- Started 33 contests at right tackle in his first three seasons as a pro (2010-12).
- Was sidelined for the entire 2013 campaign after sustaining a season-

- ending knee injury in the team's annual Family Night scrimmage on Aug. 3.
- Opened the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at RT after taking over for injured veteran Mark Tauscher, the most regular-season starts at the time by a Packers rookie tackle since Tauscher's 14 in 2000.
- Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.

42 Morgan Burnett, S, 5th Year, Georgia Tech

- Started each of the final 13 games in 2013, posting 106 tackles (77 solo), nine passes defended and a career-high and team-leading three fumble recoveries, one of which he returned for his first career TD.
- Has started 45 games between the two safety positions since the start of 2011.
- In 2010, joined Tom Flynn (1984) and Nick Collins (2005) as the only Green Bay rookies to open the season as a starter at safety since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

24 Jarrett Bush, CB, 9th Year, Utah State

- Tallied a double-digit tackle total on special teams for seven consecutive seasons (2006-12), becoming the first Packer to accomplish that feat since the statistic began being recorded by the team in 1976.
- Played in all 16 games for five straight seasons (2008-12), and saw a streak of 92 consecutive games played (including playoffs) snapped when he suffered a hamstring injury in Week 2 last season.
- Has been voted by teammates as a playoff captain each of the last four postseasons, earning selection each time as one of the two representatives for the special teams units.

21 Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, S, Rookie, Alabama

- Registered eight tackles (seven solo), a sack and a pass defended in the preseason.
- Was a consensus All-America selection in 2013 as a junior, earning first-team recognition from *The Associated Press*, the Football Writers Association of America and *Sporting News*.
- Played in 38 games with 20 starts in his three seasons at Alabama and registered 100 tackles (58 solo), including four tackles for a loss, seven interceptions, a forced fumble and 17 passes defended.
- Led the Southeastern Conference with a career-high five INTs as a sophomore in 2012.

18 Randall Cobb, WR, 4th Year, Kentucky

- Was limited to just six games in 2013 due to a knee injury. Through Week 6, led the team in receptions with 29 and ranked No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.
- Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- Ranked No. 2 in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.7) in 2011, setting a franchise rookie record with 941 kickoff return yards on the season.

2 Mason Crosby, K, 8th Year, Colorado

- Set an NFL record with 903 points in his first seven seasons (2007-13), topping the previous league record held by Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).
- With 903 career points, ranks No. 2 on the all-time franchise scoring list behind only K Ryan Longwell (1,054).
- Is one of only three players in NFL history to register three or more 140-point seasons (Stephen Gostkowski, David Akers).
- Has kicked the five longest field goals in franchise history (58-yarder in 2011, two 57-yarders in 2013, 56-yarders in 2010 and 2011).
- Set a franchise record with 23 consecutive field goals made (Week 13, 2010-Week 12, 2011), topping Chris Jacke's mark of 17 straight in 1993.

76 Mike Daniels, DT, 3rd Year, Iowa

- Emerged as a force in his second season in 2013, tying for sixth in the NFL among DTs with 6.5 sacks, the most in a season by a Green Bay defensive lineman since DT B.J. Raji posted the same total in 2010.
- Appeared in 14 games as a rookie in 2012 and finished with 19 tackles (11 solo), two sacks, a team-high two fumble recoveries (one for a TD) and a pass defended.

91 Jayrone Elliott, LB, Rookie, Toledo

- Led the NFL with five sacks in the preseason, highlighted by a three-sack effort at St. Louis (Aug. 16).
- Earned first-team All-Mid-American Conference honors as a senior in 2013 after recording 70 tackles (43 solo) and team highs in tackles for a loss (14), sacks (nine) and forced fumbles (five).

10 Matt Flynn, QB, 7th Year, Louisiana State

- Played for the Packers and the Raiders in 2013, starting a career-high five games on the season, with four of those starts coming with Green Bay (Weeks 13-16).
- Led the Packers to a 37-36 win last season at Dallas in Week 15 after trailing 26-3 at the half, matching the largest comeback in franchise history (23 points vs. Los Angeles Rams, Sept. 12, 1982).
- Served as the No. 2 quarterback for Green Bay behind Aaron Rodgers from 2008-11.
- Threw for 480 yards and six TDs for Green Bay in the 2011 season finale vs. Detroit, franchise records at the time that were later matched by Rodgers.

61 Brett Goode, LS, 7th Year, Arkansas

- One of only two Packers (K Mason Crosby) to appear in all 96 regular-season games from 2008-13.
- Has snapped for all five of the longest field goals in franchise history (all by Crosby).
- Has registered 12 tackles on special teams and a fumble recovery.
- Was originally signed as injury replacement for rookie LS J.J. Jansen following the 2008 preseason finale.

39 Demetri Goodson, CB, Rookie, Baylor

- Earned honorable mention All-Big 12 recognition as a senior in 2013, appearing in 11 games with 10 starts and recording career highs in tackles (26), interceptions (three) and passes defended (16).
- Played in just eight games during his first two seasons at Baylor (2011-12), sustaining season-ending injuries both of those years.
- Played basketball for three seasons (2008-11) at Gonzaga, starting 68 of 69 games in his final two years for the Zags.

98 Letroy Guion, DT, 7th Year, Florida State

- Signed with Green Bay as a free agent in March 2014 after spending his first six seasons in the league with the Minnesota Vikings, where he appeared in 68 games with 31 starts.
- Started all 28 games he appeared in for the Vikings over the past two seasons (2012-13), recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.
- Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012 (49-yard attempt vs. Oakland, Nov. 20, 2011; 43-yard attempt vs. San Francisco, Sept. 23, 2012).

26 DuJuan Harris, RB, 2nd Year, Troy

- Spent the 2013 season on injured reserve after reinjuring his knee in a preseason game vs. Seattle on Aug. 23.
- Played in the final four regular-season games and both playoff contests for Green Bay in 2012 after originally joining the team as a member of the practice squad on Oct. 24.
- In six games in 2012 (including playoffs), rushed for 257 yards and four TDs on 62 carries (4.1 avg.), with nine catches for 81 yards (9.0 avg.). Posted rushing TDs in both of Green Bay's playoff games that season, tying a team record for most consecutive playoff games with a rushing TD.

50 A.J. Hawk, LB, 9th Year, Ohio State

- Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (since 1975) with 1,025 tackles, having surpassed John Anderson (1,020 from 1978-89) for the team mark in the 2013 regular-season finale.
- Has posted 100-plus tackles in four consecutive seasons (2010-13) and in seven of his eight years in the NFL (2006-08, 2010-13).
- Has led the team in tackles five times during his career (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012-13), which ties LB Nick Barnett for the franchise record (since 1975).
- Appeared in 126 of a possible 128 regular-season games in his first eight seasons (2006-13), starting 123 of them.

29 Casey Hayward, CB, 3rd Year, Vanderbilt

- Burst onto the scene in 2012, leading all NFL rookies with his team-high six INTs and finishing third in the voting for Defensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press*.
- Became the first Green Bay CB ever to be named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team (est. 1974) and was chosen as the league's Defensive Rookie of the Year by ProFootballFocus.com.
- Battled a nagging hamstring injury that limited him to just three games in 2013.

31 Davon House, CB, 4th Year, New Mexico State

- Appeared in all 16 games in 2013 and posted career highs in every statistical category, posting personal bests in tackles (32) and solo tackles (26).
- Recorded his first career INT and tied previous career highs with 13 passes defended and a sack.
- Also emerged as a more consistent contributor on special teams in 2013, leading the club with a career-high 12 tackles on the coverage units.

33 Micah Hyde, DB, 2nd Year, Iowa

- Appeared in all 16 games with three starts as a rookie in 2013 and posted 54 tackles (38 solo), four passes defended, a sack and a forced fumble.
- Led all of the club's rookies in tackles, solo tackles, passes defended and forced fumbles.
- Posted a 12.3-yard punt return average in 2013 (No. 5 in the NFL), and a 93-yard TD return at Minnesota in Week 8 that is tied for the fourth-longest in team history.

83 Jeff Janis, WR, Rookie, Saginaw Valley State

- Finished his career at Saginaw Valley State as the school's all-time leader in receptions (241), receiving yards (4,274) and receiving TDs (46).
- Was twice named the Great Lakes Intercollegiate Athletic Conference's Offensive Back of the Year, earning the award as a junior and senior.
- As a senior in 2013, caught 83 passes for 1,572 yards (18.9 avg.) and 14 TDs, including a career-high eight 100-yard receiving games.

59 Brad Jones, LB, 6th Year, Colorado

- Has started 22 games over the past two seasons at ILB after making the transition from OLB prior to the start of the 2012 campaign.
- In 2013, entered the season as a starter for the first time since 2010 and opened a career-high 12 games at "Mack" LB.
- Finished the season third on the team with 98 tackles (73 solo), three sacks, two passes defended, a forced fumble and the first fumble recovery of his career.

95 Datone Jones, DE, 2nd Year, UCLA

- One of four Packers rookies to appear in all 16 games as a rookie in 2013, joining T David Bakhtiari, S Chris Banjo and CB Micah Hyde.
- Finished with 19 tackles (10 solo), 3½ sacks and a fumble recovery. Also blocked an extra point attempt on special teams.
- His sack total led all Packers rookies and he was one of only two Green Bay rookies to recover a fumble.

30 John Kuhn, FB, 9th Year, Shippensburg

- Has played in 107 games with the Packers (2007-13), the most by an offensive player on the team over that span.
- Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, he became the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- Also earned second-team All-Pro recognition from *The Associated Press* in '11.
- Has played in 107 of 112 games (118 of 123 including playoffs) during his seven seasons in Green Bay.
- Has scored a touchdown each of the last five postseasons (2009-13), the only player in the NFL to accomplish the feat over that span.

27 Eddie Lacy, RB, 2nd Year, Alabama

- Set franchise rookie records in 2013 for rushing yards (1,178), rushing TDs (11) and rushing attempts (284), and tied the team rookie mark for 100-yard rushing games (four).
- Was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press*, joining RB John Brockington (1971) as the only Packers to win the award since its inception in 1957.
- Was selected to the Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Vikings RB Adrian Peterson, the first Green Bay rookie RB to be named to the all-star game since Brockington in '71.
- Led all NFL rookies in rushing yards in 2013 and finished No. 8 in the league among all players.

70 T.J. Lang, G, 6th Year, Eastern Michigan

- Started 47 games over the past three seasons (2011-13), which was tied for No. 1 on the team (CB Tramon Williams).
- In his first three seasons as a starter (2011-13), helped the Packers rank No. 3 in the NFL in scoring (29.4 ppg), No. 6 in total offense (388.2 ypg) and No. 4 in passing offense (275.9 ypg) over that span.
- Has started 50 games in his first five seasons as a pro, opening contests at four different positions (27 at LG, 16 at RG, five at RT, two at LT).
- Saw the first action of his career at center in 2013 and has now played all five positions in a game during his NFL career.

57 Jamari Lattimore, LB, 4th Year, Middle Tenn. State

- Has evolved into one of the club's core players on special teams, having played in 29 games over the past two seasons and posted 15 coverage tackles, two onside kick recoveries and a blocked punt over that span.
- Was voted as one of six postseason captains by his teammates on the eve of the 2012 playoffs, joining CB Jarrett Bush as the two representatives for the special-teams units.
- Made the transition from outside linebacker as a rookie in 2011 to the inside in 2012 and continues to provide depth at both positions.

63 Corey Linsley, C, Rookie, Ohio State

- Started the preseason finale vs. Kansas City in place of an injured JC Tretter.
- Was named first-team All-Big Ten by both the coaches and the media as a senior in 2013, helping the Buckeyes rank No. 5 in the nation in rushing (308.6 yards per game).
- One of five team captains, he was part of an Ohio State line that helped the team set school records for points scored (637), yards per carry (6.8), touchdowns (87) and TD passes (38) in '13.

8 Tim Masthay, P, 5th Year, Kentucky

- Ranks No. 1 in team history (min. 150 attempts) in both career gross punting average (44.3) and career net punting average (38.5).
- Set a franchise record (since 1976) with a 38.95-yard net punting average in 2013, and now holds the top four single-season marks (2010-13) in team annals.
- Holds two of the top four single-season gross punting averages in team history (44.6 in 2013).
- Ranks No. 2 in team annals (since 1976) for the most career punts placed inside the 20 with 100, trailing only Hentrich's mark of 104.

52 Clay Matthews, LB, 6th Year, Southern California

- Ranks fifth in franchise history with 50.0 career sacks.
- Became the first player in franchise history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the league (2009-12).
- Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the league.
- Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting in 2010.

55 Andy Mulumba, LB, 2nd Year, Eastern Michigan

- Appeared in 14 games with three starts as a rookie in 2013, recording 34 tackles (17 solo), a sack and a fumble recovery.
- One of three rookie free agents to make the opening-day roster last season, he was tied with CB Micah Hyde for the most starts by a Green Bay rookie on the defensive side of the ball with three.
- Was tied for No. 6 on the team with five tackles on special teams in 2013.

96 Mike Neal, LB/DE, 5th Year, Purdue

- Made the move from DE to a hybrid OLB/DE role in 2013 and established personal bests for games played (16), starts (10), tackles (61), solo tackles (39), sacks (five) and INTs (one).
- Appeared in 11 games in 2012, finishing with 18 tackles (10 solo) and ranking second on the team behind LB Clay Matthews with 4½ sacks.

87 Jordy Nelson, WR, 7th Year, Kansas State

- Posted a career-high 85 catches for a career-best 1,314 yards (15.5 avg.) last season, becoming just the fourth player in franchise history to register 85-plus receptions and 1,300-plus receiving yards in the same season.
- Led the NFL with 19 catches of 25-plus yards in 2013, the most by a Green Bay player since STATS LLC began recording the statistic in 1994.
- Ranks No. 6 in the league with 30 TD catches since 2011 and ranks No. 5 in the NFL (min. 125 receptions) over that span with a 16.4-yard receiving average.

64 Mike Pennel, DT, Rookie, Colorado State-Pueblo

- Finished his collegiate career at Colorado State-Pueblo after spending a year at Arizona State (2012) and two years at Scottsdale Community College (2010-11).
- Played in all 12 games with 10 starts at CSU-Pueblo as a senior in 2013 and recorded 36 tackles (15 solo), including six for a loss, three sacks, three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and four passes defensed.

56 Julius Peppers, LB, 13th Year, North Carolina

- Has been selected to the Pro Bowl eight times during his career (2004-06, 2008-12) and has been named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times (2004, 2006, 2010).
- Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.
- Since entering the NFL in 2002, ranks No. 2 in the league in sacks (118.5) and No. 5 in forced fumbles (39).
- Has posted eight double-digit sack seasons since 2002, which is tied with Bears DE Jared Allen for No. 1 in the league over that span.

53 Nick Perry, LB, 3rd Year, Southern California

- Has battled injuries in each of his first two seasons, but has been productive when healthy, tallying six sacks and three forced fumbles in 17 professional contests.
- Posted career highs in every statistical category in 2013, including games played (11), starts (six), tackles (42), solo tackles (22), sacks (four), forced fumbles (three) and passes defensed (one).

81 Andrew Quarless, TE, 5th Year, Penn State

- Moved into a starting role in 2013 in Week 8 following TE Jermichael Finley's season-ending neck injury and responded with career highs in every category, catching 32 passes for 312 yards (9.8 avg.) and two TDs.
- Was sidelined for the entire 2012 campaign as he continued his rehabili-

tation from a significant knee injury sustained at the N.Y. Giants in Week 13 of the 2011 season.

- Played in 23 games with five starts in his first two seasons (2010-11).

28 Sean Richardson, S, 3rd Year, Vanderbilt

- Spent the entire 2013 offseason recovering from a neck surgery that followed a late-season injury suffered in November 2012.
- Opened the 2013 campaign on the reserve/physically unable to perform list, but was activated and appeared in the final six games of the regular season and the playoff game.
- Posted 12 tackles (10 solo) and a pass defensed from scrimmage, in addition to four coverage tackles on special teams.

12 Aaron Rodgers, QB, 10th Year, California

- His career passer rating of 104.9 ranks No. 1 in NFL history (min. 1,500 attempts), more than seven points ahead of No. 2 Peyton Manning (97.2).
- Ranks No. 1 in league history in career INT percentage (1.76) and TD/INT ratio (3.62, 188/52) and ranks No. 3 in completion percentage (65.8) and yards/attempt (8.19).
- Is the only quarterback in league history to record a 100-plus passer rating in five consecutive seasons (2009-13).
- In 87 career regular-season starts (58-29 record), has posted 32 games with 300-plus passing yards, 47 without an interception (min. 15 attempts) and 51 with a 100-plus passer rating.
- In the franchise record books, holds four of the top five single-season marks for passer rating (2009, 2011-13), two of the top three for passing TDs (2011-12), four of the top five for completion percentage (2010-13) and two of the top three for passing yards (2009, 2011).

89 Richard Rodgers, TE, Rookie, California

- Started all four preseason contests and caught four passes for 67 yards (16.8 avg.).
- Played tight end for his first two seasons before moving to inside receiver as a junior in 2013, where he caught a career-high 39 passes for a career-best 608 yards (15.6 avg.) and a TD.
- Led the Golden Bears with 11 receptions of 20-plus yards in 2013.
- Appeared in 35 games with 11 starts during his three seasons at Cal and finished with 59 receptions for 896 yards (15.2 avg.) and two TDs.

78 Derek Sherrod, T, 4th Year, Mississippi State

- Appeared in seven regular-season games in 2013 after missing the entire '12 campaign as he continued his rehabilitation from the broken leg he sustained at Kansas City in Week 15 of 2011.
- Played in five games as a rookie in 2011 before seeing his debut campaign cut short by the injury.

37 Sam Shields, CB, 5th Year, Miami

- Had his finest statistical season in 2013, setting new career highs for starts (14), tackles (64), solo tackles (57) and passes defensed (a team-high 25), and tied his previous career best with four INTs.
- Entered the NFL as a non-drafted free agent and earned the nickel cornerback job in 2010 as a rookie despite playing defense for just one season in college.
- Has made four INTs in eight career playoff games, a total that ties him with CB Herb Adderley, DB Joe Laws, CB Craig Newsome, S Eugene Robinson and CB Tramon Williams for the most in franchise postseason history.

71 Josh Sitton, G, 7th Year, Central Florida

- Was named second-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* last season, the first Green Bay offensive lineman to be honored by AP since G Marco Rivera (second team) in 2003.
- Made the transition to left guard in 2013, starting all 16 games there after spending his first five seasons at right guard for the Packers.
- Started 78 of a possible 80 games over the past five seasons (2009-13), the most by a Packers offensive lineman over that span.

- Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Rivera in 2004.

44 James Starks, RB, 5th Year, Buffalo

- Rushed for 493 yards and a career-high three TDs on 89 carries in 2013, an average of 5.54 yards per carry that ranked No. 1 in the NFL among players with 80-plus attempts.
- Was tied for No. 2 in the NFL last season with three TD runs of 20-plus yards, trailing only Eagles RB LeSean McCoy (four).
- Has rushed for a team-high 1,326 yards over the past three seasons (2011-13), highlighted by his club-high 578 rushing yards in 2011.
- Posted a league-leading 315 rushing yards in the 2010 postseason, third most ever by a rookie RB in the postseason behind only Washington's Timmy Smith (342 in 1987) and Baltimore's Jamal Lewis (338 in 2000).

65 Lane Taylor, G, 2nd Year, Oklahoma State

- One of three non-drafted rookie free agents to make Green Bay's opening-day roster in 2013, he went on to appear in 10 games last season.
- Played primarily on special teams but also saw limited action at right guard in his first season.

82 Ryan Taylor, TE, 4th Year, North Carolina

- Has appeared in 45 regular-season games during his three seasons as a pro and has registered 23 tackles on special teams, No. 3 on the team over that span.
- Played in 14 games in 2013 and registered career highs in catches (six) and receiving yards (30).
- Appeared in all 16 contests in 2012 and finished fifth on the team with eight special teams tackles.

16 Scott Tolzien, QB, 4th Year, Wisconsin

- Was on Green Bay's practice squad for the first eight games in 2013 before being signed to the active roster, appearing in three games with two starts on the season.
- Threw for 339 yards in his first career start (at N.Y. Giants, Week 11), the most by a Green Bay QB in his first start with the team in franchise history. Posted 619 passing yards in his first two NFL games, the most in franchise history and the fourth most in NFL history.
- Was on San Francisco's 53-man roster for the 2011-12 seasons, but did not appear in a game for the 49ers.

73 JC Tretter, C/G, 2nd Year, Cornell

- Spent the majority of his rookie campaign on reserve/physically unable to perform after sustaining a significant ankle injury during the first practice of Organized Team Activities in the spring.
- Returned to practice on Nov. 19 and was activated to the 53-man roster on Dec. 10. Was a gameday inactive for the final three regular-season games and the Packers' playoff contest.

38 Tramon Williams, CB, 8th Year, Louisiana Tech

- Has 19 interceptions since 2010 (including playoffs), which ranks No. 3 in the NFL over that span.
- Started all 16 games for the second consecutive season in 2013, extending his streak to 50 straight starts, dating back to Week 3 of the 2011 season.
- Ranked No. 1 in the NFL with a combined nine interceptions in 2010 (six in regular season, three in postseason).
- Posted 63 tackles, six interceptions and 23 passes defensed on his way to being selected to his first Pro Bowl in 2010 as an injury replacement.
