PACKERS TRAVEL TO DETROIT

The Green Bay Packers go back on the road to play the Detroit Lions. It will be the first time the Packers have played Detroit in the month of September since 2008, when Green Bay won 48-25 at Ford Field (Sept. 14).



- ▶ Dating back to 2000, the Packers are 5-1 against the Lions in the month of September, including 3-1 at Detroit. In those four road games, Green Bay scored over 30 points in three games, all wins.
- ▶ No other NFL teams have played every year since 1932, when the Packers and the Lions, then known as the Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans, began their yearly home-and-home series.
- ▶ The rivalry actually kicked off in 1930 at City Stadium in Green Bay, a 47-13 Packers win. Two seasons later, the teams began a yearly series. Sunday marks meeting No. 170 in the all-time series (including playoffs).
- ▶ The Packers lead the regular-season series 94-66-7 (.584) and have won both postseason contests the two have played. Green Bay's 94 wins over the Lions are the most the Packers have against any team.
- ▶ Green Bay has a 14-2 mark (.875) against the Lions under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, which is tied with Seattle (14-2 vs. St. Louis) for the third-best winning percentage by a team vs. a divisional foe since 2006 (New England, 15-1 vs. Buffalo / Pittsburgh, 15-2 vs. Cleveland). Dating back further, the Packers have won 15 of the last 17 against Detroit and 23 of the last 27 in the series.
- ▶ Of the 14 wins over Detroit, eight have been decided by 10 points or more, including four by over 20 points.
- ▶ The Packers have won eight of 12 games (.667) at Ford Field (opened in 2002) against the Lions, the fourth-best winning percentage in the league among teams that have played four or more games at the stadium behind only Atlanta, Tampa Bay and the New York Giants, who are all 3-1 (.750).

RODGERS AND THE LIONS

The Packers are 9-1 against Detroit with QB **Aaron Rodgers** as the starting quarterback. The only loss to the Lions came when Rodgers left the game in the first half with an injury in 2010 at Ford Field.

- ▶ Rodgers has registered a 100-plus passer rating in eight games against the Lions, has thrown for at least two touchdowns in seven games, and thrown for over 300 yards in five games.
- ▶ In the 10 games, Rodgers has thrown for 2,559 yards and 19 touchdowns with only five interceptions.
- ▶ Dating back to 2008, when Rodgers first started a game against the Lions, he has thrown for the most yards and touchdowns against Detroit of any quarterback in the NFL over that span.
- ▶ Rodgers overall passer rating of 111.0, 68.29 completion percentage and 8.92 yards gained per pass attempt are the highest of any quarterback who has started at least four games against the Lions since 2008.

WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports, now in its 21st season as an NFL network television partner, will broadcast the game to a regional audience.



- ▶ Play-by-play man **Kevin Burkhardt** joins color commentator **John Lynch** and sideline reporter **Pam Oliver**.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in five states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 20th season calling Packers' games. McCarren, who is in his 26th year in Green Bay television, has four times been voted Wisconsin Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 16th season of broadcasts together.
- ▶ Westwood One Sports will air the game across the country. **Chuck Cooperstein** (play-by-play) and **Rod Woodson** (analyst) will call the action, with **Scott Graham** hosting the pre-game and halftime shows.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.
- ▶ DIRECTV subscribers can watch the game on channel 711.

PACKERS AT LIONS – WEEK 3

DIVISIONAL DRIVE

The Packers have a 35-12-1 (.740) overall regular-season record against NFC North opponents under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, a divisional mark that ranks **No. 2 in the NFL** since 2006:

- ▶ In the Packers' 48 divisional games under McCarthy, they have registered a plus-27 turnover differential and outscored their opponents 1,232 to 918. Green Bay has held NFC North foes to 20 points or less in 27 of those contests and to 10 points or less in 12 of the games.
- ▶ The Packers have won 19 of 24 NFC North games with one tie at home under McCarthy, which ranks **No. 3 in the NFL** since 2006:

- ▶ Green Bay had won 10 straight home games against divisional foes before losing to Chicago at Lambeau Field last season in Week 9.
- ▶ Green Bay's 37-34 loss at Minnesota in Week 17 of the 2012 season snapped the Packers' 12-game winning streak in regular-season NFC North games, which was the longest divisional winning streak in team history since the league went to a divisional format in 1967:

- ▶ The Packers finished with a 3-2-1 record in NFC North contests last season. Green Bay has posted a winning record in divisional games in every season under McCarthy (2006-13). The only other team in the league to accomplish that feat each of the past eight seasons was the New England Patriots.
- ▶ The streak of eight straight seasons with a winning record in divisional games is also a franchise record, topping the previous mark of five straight from 2000-04.

TRAVELING AROUND THE NFC NORTH

Over the next two weeks, the Packers will play two divisional games on the road.

- ▶ The Packers have won 16 of 24 NFC North games on the road under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, which is tied for the No. 4 road divisional mark in the NFL since 2006:

- ▶ Under McCarthy, the Packers have finished 3-0 in road division games in two regular seasons and 2-1 four times.
- ▶ Since McCarthy was head coach, Green Bay has played only one away postseason game against a division opponent, a 21-14 victory at Chicago in the 2010 NFC Championship Game.
- ▶ With QB **Aaron Rodgers** as the starting quarterback, Green Bay is 11-6 in road division games during the regular season, including winning the only two he played in last season.
- ▶ With Rodgers at the helm, the Packers have scored 20-plus points in each of the last nine road division games and over 30 points in each of the last three.

INSIDE JOB

Sunday's game will be the fourth dome contest for Green Bay since the start of the 2013 season, an environment the Packers have had success in during Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** tenure.

- ▶ Since McCarthy took over in 2006, the Packers are 20-9 (.690) in dome games (including playoffs). That ranks **No. 3 in the NFL** among teams with 10 or more indoor games over that span:

- ▶ McCarthy won his first six indoor games as head coach before the Packers fell just short at Minnesota in a 28-27 loss on Nov. 9, 2008.
- ▶ In 17 of the 29 dome contests, the Packers have posted at least 390 yards of total offense (13-4 record in those games). Green Bay has scored 30-plus points in 17 of the indoor games (15-2 record).
- ▶ A look at some of Green Bay's statistics indoors compared to outdoors since 2006:

- ▶ The Packers' defense has done its part as well, posting 61 takeaways (2.1 per game) and 10 defensive touchdowns in the 29 indoor games since '06, including **11 contests with at least three takeaways**. That has contributed to Green Bay's **plus-27 turnover ratio** indoors since 2006.
- ▶ Starting with their victory at Atlanta in a 2010 NFC Divisional playoff contest, the Packers have won 10 of their last 13 games played indoors (.769).

BREAKING DOWN THE 53

The Packers' 53-man roster is composed of 24 offensive players, 26 defensive players and three specialists.

- ▶ Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 33 of them (62.3 percent) were draft picks of the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 17 players on the roster that began their careers as non-drafted free agents, with eight of those originally signed by Green Bay.
- ▶ Almost 50 percent of the players (25 of 53, 47.2%) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player.
- ▶ The Packers have 12 players on the roster that played in the NFL prior to the 2009 season, and six of those players began their pro careers as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player (QB Matt Flynn, K Mason Crosby, CB Tramon Williams, CB Jarrett Bush, FB John Kuhn, LS Brett Goode).
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 42 began their pro careers with the Packers (79.2 percent).
- ▶ Only 17 of the 53 players on the roster (32.1 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft, with 16 being drafted by the Packers.
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 43 of them (81.1 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Sept. 4) and 19 players (35.8 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

STAT OF THE WEEK

- ▶ From Sept. 21-Oct. 2, the Packers will play three divisional games. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, the last time the Packers played three divisional games in 12 days was Nov. 16-27, 1986.
- ▶ It will be the first time since 2012 that Green Bay has played three consecutive games against division opponents.
- ▶ Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the Packers have played three straight games against division foes twice (2006 and 2012).
- ▶ In both 2006 and 2012, Green Bay went 3-0 in those games.
- ▶ Green Bay will play NFC North teams on the road in back-to-back weeks for the first time since 2004. It was the only time since the NFC North was established during realignment in 2002 that the Packers played road games in the division in consecutive weeks.

SEPTEMBER STARTS

Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, Green Bay has been one of the most successful teams in the league early in the season.

- ▶ Since McCarthy took over in 2006, the Packers have an 18-11 (.621) mark in the month of September. Green Bay's 18 wins are tied for first in the NFC and fourth in the NFL. The Packers' .621 winning percentage is tied for sixth in the league:

- ▶ In the month of September under McCarthy (2006-14), the Packers rank in the top five in the following offensive categories: points per game (3rd, 26.1), touchdowns (2nd, 89), passing touchdowns (T-2nd, 57), completions (3rd, 700), completion percentage (4th, 65.2), gross passing yards (4th, 8,111), passer rating (1st, 98.2) and touchdown/interception ratio (2nd, 3.00, 57/19).
- ▶ Dating back to 2008, QB **Aaron Rodgers** ranks third in the NFL with a passer rating of 99.8 in the month of September (min. 100 att.):

- ▶ Since becoming a full-time starter in 2008, Rodgers ranks in the top 10 in the month of September in: completions (5th, 513), passing yards (5th, 6,007), passing TDs (5th, 42), 25-plus yard pass plays (T-5th, 47) and completion percentage (7th, 66.0).

HISTORIC START

Through the first two games of the season, WR **Jordy Nelson** has led the way for the Packers offense, putting up numbers of historical significance.

- ▶ Nelson's 18 receptions are the most by a Packers receiver in the first two games of a season, topping Ken Payne's mark of 17 in 1975.
- ▶ His 292 yards receiving are the second most through two games in franchise history, trailing only James Lofton's 323 in 1983.
- ▶ In the Week 2 win over the Jets, Nelson finished with a career-high 209 yards receiving, which tied for the fourth most in a game in franchise history.
- ▶ Nelson's 209 yards receiving are the most by a Packer since Don Beebe registered 220 yards receiving vs. San Francisco on Oct. 14, 1996.
- ▶ Nelson has recorded nine receptions in each of the last three regular-season games. He is only the second player in team history to register three straight regular-season games with at least nine receptions, joining Don Hutson (three straight in 1942).
- ▶ Nelson leads the league in receiving yards (292) and is tied for the league lead in receptions (18) this season.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

- ▶ Green Bay is one win away from becoming the second team in NFL history with 700 regular-season victories. The Packers (699-538-37) would join Chicago as the only teams to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ A win would make McCarthy 84-46-1 during the regular season as the Packers' head coach.

OFFENSE

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** looks to record the 34th 300-yard passing game of his career during the regular season.
- ▶ WR **Jordy Nelson** (320), who recorded nine receptions last week to tie FB William Henderson for the 11th most in Packers history, is three receptions shy of passing TE Paul Coffman (322) for the 10th most in franchise history.
- ▶ Nelson is the only player in the NFL to record at least nine receptions in each of the first two games this season.
- ▶ Nelson's league-leading 292 receiving yards are 45 more than any other player.
- ▶ If Nelson records at least nine receptions, it will be the seventh game of his career, including the postseason, with nine-plus receptions and would pass WR Antonio Freeman for the third-most games with at least nine receptions among Packers players, dating back to 1960 (Sterling Sharpe, 13 / Donald Driver, 12).
- ▶ After setting a career high with 209 receiving yards in Week 2, which tied for the fourth most in a game in franchise history, Nelson is 118 yards away from becoming the 11th Packers' player to reach 5,000 career receiving yards.
- ▶ Nelson has registered at least one reception in the last 25 games he has played in, including the postseason. It is the second-longest streak of his career (27 games, 2010 postseason - 2012 regular season).
- ▶ Since the start of 2013 (including the postseason), Nelson has eight games with at least seven receptions, including both games this season. It marks the fourth-most games with seven-plus receptions in the league over that time span (WAS-Pierre Garcon, 11 / NE Julian Edelman, 10 / DEN Demaryius Thomas, 9 / HOU Andre Johnson, 8 / CHI Brandon Marshall, 8).
- ▶ WR **Randall Cobb** has recorded at least one reception in 30 consecutive games, including the postseason.
- ▶ After a two-touchdown performance last week, Cobb has five receiving touchdowns in his last three regular-season games, dating back to last season.
- ▶ Cobb has registered at least one touchdown in each of the last three regular-season games, dating back to last season.
- ▶ Dating back to the start of the 2013 season, RB **Eddie Lacy** has registered at least 20 carries in 10 regular-season games to tie PHI LeSean McCoy for the NFL lead (MIN Adrian Peterson, 9 / SEA Marshawn Lynch, 8). The Packers are 7-2-1 when Lacy carries the ball at least 20 times in a regular-season game.
- ▶ FB **John Kuhn** has recorded three rushing touchdowns in the last five games, including the postseason.

DEFENSE

- ▶ LB **Julius Peppers** has played in 98 consecutive games, the third-longest active streak among NFL linebackers (MIN Chad Greenway, 114 / DET Stephen Tulloch, 130).
- ▶ After recording a sack in a Week 2 victory over the New York Jets, LB **Clay Matthews** (51) is three sacks shy of tying DE Aaron Kampman (54) for No. 4 on the team's career sacks list.

SPECIAL TEAMS

- ▶ Cobb needs either a punt return for a touchdown or a kickoff return for a touchdown to take sole possession of second place in Packers history for combined returns for touchdowns (Travis Williams, 6). Cobb, who has three returns for touchdowns, currently is tied with six other players.
- ▶ K **Mason Crosby** looks to extend his franchise best streak of 17 consecutive regular-season games scoring a field goal. In Week 1, he passed Ryan Longwell's previous record of 15 consecutive regular-season games scoring a field goal (2004-05).

- ▶ Dating back to 2013, Crosby has made 18 consecutive field goals during the regular season. It is the second-longest streak by a Packers kicker, next to his own record of 23 (2010-11).
- ▶ Crosby has played in 114 consecutive games, the longest active streak among kickers.
- ▶ Crosby looks to extend his consecutive-games-scoring streak to 115 regular-season games. It is the second-longest streak in franchise history (Ryan Longwell, 144).
- ▶ P **Tim Masthay** needs to land three punts inside the 20-yard line to tie P Craig Hentrich (104) for the franchise record.
- ▶ Last week, Masthay posted a 46.5-yard net punting average, his career high in a game with four-plus punts. His previous best was a 46.2-yard net average at Kansas City on Dec. 18, 2011. It was the third-best mark by a Green Bay punter (min. four punts) since 1976.

BALL CONTROL

- The Packers are tied for seventh in the NFL with two scoring drives of at least five minutes this season.
- ▶ The Packers recorded 19 5-minute scoring drives in 2013, which was **tied for No. 4** in the league last season:

- ▶ The Packers have posted six drives of 10 or more plays this season, with five resulting in points (FG, TD, FG, FG, TD). Green Bay's six drives and five scores are both tied for the third most in the NFL this season.

- ▶ The Packers' 22 points on 10-play drives rank No. 6 in the league this season.
- ▶ In 2013, Green Bay had 32 drives of 10 or more plays, which ranked **No. 5 in the league**:

Mike McCarthy: 89-51-1, .635, (incl. 6-5 postseason); 9th NFL season

MIKE MCCARTHY...Is in his ninth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Led the Packers to their fifth consecutive playoff appearance last season, joining New England as the only two NFL teams to do so over that span. Has also led the team to six playoff appearances in the last seven years (2007, 2009-13).
- ▶ Has guided the Packers to top-10 finishes in scoring each of the past seven seasons (2007-13), joining the Patriots as the only other team to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ His .642 winning percentage during the regular season ranks No. 4 among active NFL coaches (min. 50 games).
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.

JIM CALDWELL...Is in his first year as the Lions' 26th head coach.

- ▶ Prior to joining the Lions, Caldwell spent 2012-13 as the offensive coordinator of the Baltimore Ravens. He originally joined the Ravens as the quarterbacks coach and was promoted to offensive coordinator with three weeks left to play in the 2012 season. He went on to help Baltimore win the AFC North and Super Bowl XLVII.
- ▶ From 2002-11, Caldwell coached for the Indianapolis Colts, including three years as the head coach (2009-11).
- ▶ While in Indianapolis the Colts had nine consecutive playoff appearances that included six AFC South titles, two AFC Championships and one Super Bowl title.
- ▶ Caldwell began his NFL coaching career as the Tampa Bay Buccaneers' quarterbacks coach in 2001.

THE PACKERS-LIONS SERIES

- ▶ No other NFL teams have played every year since 1932, when the Packers first met the Lions, then known as the Portsmouth (Ohio) Spartans. Including a pair of playoff clashes in the early 1990s, this week marks Game No. 170 in the all-time series.
- ▶ Green Bay has scored more points (3,541 in the regular season) against the Lions than any other franchise.

CONTINUING TO CLIMB

QB **Aaron Rodgers** posted his 3,000th career passing attempt in the Week 2 win over the Jets (now has 3,030), becoming just the third player in franchise history to register 3,000 career passing attempts (Brett Favre, 8,754; Bart Starr, 3,149).

▶ At the time of his 3,000th career passing attempt, Rodgers had 53 career interceptions, an NFL record by a quarterback for the fewest INTs at the time of his 3,000th career attempt (Neil O'Donnell, 59 INTs).

▶ With 346 passing yards last week, Rodgers (24,732) moved past Bart Starr (24,718) for No. 2 on the all-time franchise list.

QB **Aaron Rodgers** once again found himself among the league leaders in yards per attempt, with his 8.74-yard average checking in at **No. 2 in the league last season**.

TAKING HIS PLACE AMONG THE GAME'S BEST

Rodgers surpassed the 1,500-attempt plateau for his career in 2010, the benchmark to qualify for passer rating in the NFL record book.

▶ Rodgers has completed 1,993 of 3,030 passes (65.8 percent) in his career for 24,732 yards and 192 touchdowns with 53 interceptions for a 104.7 passer rating in the regular season, **No. 1 in NFL history**:

▶ With 4,295 passing yards in 2012, Rodgers brought his total in five seasons as a starter to 21,332. That ranked **No. 1 in NFL history** for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter, topping the previous mark held by Peyton Manning (20,618, 1998-2002).

▶ In 89 career regular-season starts, Rodgers has eclipsed the century mark in passer rating 52 times and recorded 33 games of 300-plus yards. He surpassed both marks last week (109.8 / 346 yards).

- ▶ Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only 11 of 32 NFL teams have regular-season road records above .500.

302 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Jets in Week 2 this season brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 302 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 58th season of football in 2014. A total of 701,102 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine games (including playoffs) in 2013.
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 47-12-1 (.792) at home over its past 60 regular-season games.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 94th NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling).

- ▶ Green Bay's schedule includes five games against 2013 playoff teams, with three of those contests (Carolina, Philadelphia, New England) at Lambeau Field and two on the road (Seattle, New Orleans).
- ▶ The Packers have three prime-time contests at home (vs. Minnesota on Thursday night in Week 5, vs. Chicago on Sunday night in Week 10 and vs. Atlanta on *Monday Night Football* in Week 14) and two on the road (Thursday night at Seattle in Week 1 and Sunday night at New Orleans in Week 8).
- ▶ The Packers' bye arrives in Week 9 for the first time since 2004.
- ▶ It is the second time in franchise history (1922) that Green Bay opens with three of their first four games on the road.
- ▶ Two of Green Bay's first five games are played on Thursday night, with the next seven taking place on Sunday, one on the following Monday, and three more on Sunday to close out the regular season.
- ▶ For the second year in a row and just the third time in nine seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (2010), the Packers opened the season on the road. For the third straight season Green Bay opened against an NFC West team after facing San Francisco each of the last two years.
- ▶ Dating back to 2001, the Packers have always played against an NFC team in Week 1. The last AFC team Green Bay faced in Week 1 was the New York Jets, who visited the Packers in Week 2 for the home opener.
- ▶ Following the home opener, the Packers will go on the road to face two division opponents, Detroit and Chicago, before returning home to face Minnesota in a Thursday night divisional matchup. It will be the sixth time in the last seven seasons they have faced off in primetime.
- ▶ Green Bay will play two of the next three on the road prior to the Week 9 bye. The Packers travel to Miami for the third time in 23 years and first time since 2006, and to New Orleans in a game on Sunday night, marking the third primetime meeting between the two in the last four contests. Between the two road games, Carolina will travel to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2008.
- ▶ After the bye week, the Packers return to Sunday night to host the Bears, who they have beaten five of the last six times at home.
- ▶ Philadelphia comes to Lambeau for the second straight season, which is only the second time in the series that the two clubs have played at Green Bay in back-to-back seasons (1933-34).
- ▶ For the second consecutive season, Green Bay will play Minnesota in Week 12, traveling to face the Vikings in the first outdoor game (TCF Bank Stadium) between the two in Minnesota since they played at Metropolitan Stadium on Nov. 29, 1981.
- ▶ The last game in November brings New England to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2006 and only its third visit ever to the stadium (1979).
- ▶ December opens with a Monday night matchup at home versus Atlanta. It marks the 22nd straight season the Packers have appeared on *Monday Night Football*.
- ▶ The next two weeks include road games at Buffalo and Tampa Bay. It will be the Packers' first visit to Buffalo since 2006 and first trip to Tampa Bay in the month of December since 1999.
- ▶ Green Bay closes the regular season at Lambeau Field against Detroit for the fourth time under McCarthy (2007, 2008, 2011).

18 RANDALL COBB

- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first person in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Has three kick return scores (two punts, one kickoff) in his career, which ties him for No. 2 in franchise history behind only RB Travis Williams' six return TDs (one punt, five kickoffs).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 5 in the NFL with the three total kick return TDs since 2011.

2 MASON CROSBY

- ▶ His 903 points from 2007-13 rank No. 1 in NFL history for the most points scored by a player in his first seven seasons, topping the mark of Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team annals with 918 career points (Ryan Longwell, 1,054).
- ▶ Reached the 900-point mark for his career in his 112th game, third fastest in NFL history (Gino Cappelletti, 106; Stephen Gostkowski, 108).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most 100-point seasons with seven, trailing only Longwell (eight).
- ▶ Made 23 straight field goals from Week 13 of 2010 through Week 10 of 2011, the longest regular-season streak in franchise history. Has currently hit 18 consecutive field goals.
- ▶ In 2011, set a franchise record with a 58-yard field goal in Week 7 at Minnesota, eclipsing the mark of 56 yards he held (Week 1 at Philadelphia, 2010; Week 5 at Atlanta, 2011).
- ▶ For his career, has hit 125 of 136 field goals (91.9 percent) from 39 yards and closer.
- ▶ Has made 44 of 62 field goals (71.0 percent) from 40-49 yards.
- ▶ Has hit 20 of 41 field goals (48.8 percent) from 50-plus yards.

50 A.J. HAWK

- ▶ Is tied for No. 1 in franchise history for the most seasons leading the team in tackles with five (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012-13), matching the mark of five by LB Nick Barnett (2003-05, 2007, 2009).
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Has posted 100-plus tackles in six of seven seasons.
- ▶ Has 1,041 career tackles, which ranks No. 1 in team history (since defensive stats began to be recorded by coaches in 1975). Moved past John Anderson (1,020, 1978-89) for the franchise record with eight tackles at Chicago in Week 17 last season.

27 EDDIE LACY

- ▶ Set franchise rookie records in 2013 for rushing yards (1,178), rushing TDs (11) and rushing attempts (284).

- ▶ Tied the team rookie mark for 100-yard rushing games with four last season.
- ▶ Named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press* and was selected to the Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Vikings RB Adrian Peterson.
- ▶ Recorded 20-plus carries 10 times during the 2013 regular season, all coming in the the last 13 games. The Packers were 7-2-1 in those games. Dating back to 1960, he tied Dorsey Levens (1997) for the second-most games of 20-plus carries by a Packers' player in one regular season (Ahman Green, 12 in 2003).

8 TIM MASTHAY

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (min. 150 punts) with a 44.3-yard gross punting average.
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with his 45.6-yard gross average in 2011, surpassing Craig Hentrich's 45.0-yard mark in 1997.
- ▶ Tied Sean Landeta's single-season franchise record (1998) by placing 30 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2012.
- ▶ Holds the top four single-season marks for net punting average in franchise history (since 1976) with a 38.95 average in 2013, a 38.93 average in 2012, a 38.56 average in 2011 and a 37.65 average in 2010.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team annals (since 1976) with 101 punts placed inside the 20-yard line in his career. Trails only Craig Hentrich (104) in the franchise record book.

52 CLAY MATTHEWS

- ▶ Only player in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl each of his first four seasons in the league (2009-12).
- ▶ Only player in team history to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ His 17 sacks in his first 20 games were the most by an NFL player to start his career at the time, eclipsing the mark of 16.5 set by Leslie O'Neal (1986, 1988) and John Abraham (2000-01).
- ▶ Is the first NFL player since sacks became an official stat in 1982 to post a double-digit sack total and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the league.
- ▶ First player in franchise annals to post 10-plus sacks in each of his first two years in the NFL.
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in team history with 51.0 career sacks.
- ▶ His 29.5 sacks from 2009-11 were tied for No. 1 in team history with Tony Bennett for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL with 51.0 sacks since entering the league in 2009.
- ▶ Set a franchise rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called *The Dope Sheet*, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.

87 JORDY NELSON

- ▶ His 18 receptions this season are the most by a Packer in the first two games of a season.
- ▶ His 22 TD grabs from 2011-12 were the most by a Packer over a two-year span since WR Antonio Freeman posted 26 TDs from 1997-98.
- ▶ Caught 15 TD passes in 2011, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942) as the only players in franchise annals to catch 15-plus TD passes in a season.
- ▶ With four TD grabs of 80-plus yards during his career, Nelson is tied for the most in team history and No. 1 among active NFL players (Vikings WR Greg Jennings).
- ▶ Ranks No. 11 in franchise history with 4,882 career receiving yards.
- ▶ Tied for No. 11 in franchise history with 37 career TD catches (James Jones).
- ▶ Among players with 250-plus catches, ranks No. 9 in franchise history with a 15.3-yard receiving average.

56 JULIUS PEPPERS

- ▶ Has been selected to eight Pro Bowls since entering the league in 2002, which ties him with Troy Polamalu and Ray Lewis for the third most among defensive players over that span (Ed Reed, 9 / Champ Bailey, 12).
- ▶ With eight double-digit sack seasons as a pro, is tied with Jared Allen for the most in the NFL since 2002.
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times and was selected to the NFL's All-Decade team for the 2000s.

12 AARON RODGERS

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with a 104.7 career passer rating.
- ▶ Set an NFL single-season record in 2011 with a 122.5 passer rating and set team marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games (eight).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first five seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Threw a TD pass in 35 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field from 2008-12, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre, 1992-96). It was the second-longest home streak in NFL history behind Dan Marino's 39-game streak from 1983-88.
- ▶ Tied a single-game franchise record with six TD passes at Houston in Week 6 of 2012, matching Matt Flynn's mark (Jan. 1, 2012, vs. Detroit).
- ▶ In 89 regular-season starts, has 33 career 300-yard games, 36 three-TD games and 48 zero-INT games (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ Has posted a 100-plus passer rating 52 times. Set an NFL record for quarterbacks whose careers started since 1970 with 43 games with a 100-plus passer rating in his first 75 starts.
- ▶ Posted a 100-plus passer rating in five straight seasons (2009-13), the only quarterback in league history to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ Is the only QB in team history with three 400-yard passing games, including a 480-yard effort vs. Washington in Week 2 last season that tied a franchise record.
- ▶ When he hit the 150-TD mark for his career, he had thrown just 42 INTs

- to that point, the fewest in NFL history as he bested Dan Marino's mark of 69 INTs at the time of his 150th TD pass.
- ▶ In 2009, became first QB in NFL history to throw 30 or more TDs, seven or fewer INTs, and rush for five TDs in the same season.
- ▶ Has registered a passer rating over 110.0 in four or more consecutive games three times in his career (Weeks 3-7, 2009; Week 9, Weeks 11-13, 2010; Weeks 1-7, 9-12, 2011), one of only two quarterbacks in franchise history (Bart Starr, 1966) to accomplish the feat in a single season.
- ▶ Is the only NFL QB since the 1970 merger to post four straight 110-plus rating games in three straight seasons (2009-11).
- ▶ Posted four or more rushing TDs in three straight seasons (2008-10), becoming only the second Packers QB to accomplish that feat (Tobin Rote, 1954-56), and eclipsed 300 rushing yards in back-to-back seasons (2009-10), the first since Rote in 1954-56.

PACKERS STARTERS – OFFENSE

WR Jordy Nelson, 7th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08

- ▶ Led the team in 2013 with a career-high 85 catches for a career-best 1,314 yards and eight TDs. Ranked No. 10 in the NFL last season in receiving yards.
- ▶ Is tied for No. 6 in the NFL with 31 TD catches since 2011 and is tied for No. 4 in the league with 18 TD grabs at home over that span.
- ▶ With 15 TD catches in 2011, became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).
- ▶ Became the first player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to post three 80-yard TD grabs over an eight-game span in the regular season (Week 16, 2010-Week 6, 2011).

LT David Bakhtiari, 2nd Year, Colorado, D4a-13

- ▶ Started all 16 games at left tackle last season, the only rookie in the NFL to do so in 2013 and the first Packer rookie to do so since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start at LT in the season opener since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since 1985.
- ▶ Earned second-team All-Pacific-12 honors from the conference's coaches each of his last two seasons (sophomore and junior) at Colorado.
- ▶ Was named to the watch lists for both the Outland Trophy and the Lombardi Award in 2012.

LG Josh Sitton, 7th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08

- ▶ Has started 80 games since 2009, the most by an offensive player in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ▶ Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Marco Rivera in 2004.
- ▶ Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association.
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, has allowed only 9.0 sacks in his five seasons as a starter (2009-13).
- ▶ Was the only Packer on either side of the ball to not miss a snap from 2009-10.

C Corey Linsley, Rookie, Ohio State, D5a-14

- ▶ First rookie center to start for Green Bay in Week 1 since the merger.
- ▶ Was one of five team captains and was part of a line that helped the team set school records for points scored (637), yards per carry (6.8), touchdowns (87) and TD passes (38) in '13.
- ▶ The Ohio native was part of a Buckeye team that won 24 consecutive games from 2012-13.

RG T.J. Lang, 6th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09

- ▶ Has started games at four different positions on the line as a pro (27 at LG, 18 at RG, five at RT, two at LT). Played C in Week 10 last season.
- ▶ Has started 49 contests since 2011.
- ▶ Started games at both tackle spots in his first season (2009) and became the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

RT Bryan Bulaga, 5th Year, Iowa, D1-10

- ▶ Missed the second part of the 2012 season after suffering a hip injury vs. Arizona on Nov. 4 and missed all of the 2013 season after injuring his knee on Aug. 3.
- ▶ Started 37 games at RT in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Started the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at right tackle after taking over for veteran Mark Tauscher (shoulder), the most regular-season starts by a Packers rookie tackle since Tauscher's 14 in 2000.
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.
- ▶ Capped his rookie season by becoming the youngest player, according to STATS LLC, to ever start in the Super Bowl (21 years, 322 days).

TE Richard Rodgers, Rookie, California, D3b-14

- ▶ Played tight end for his first two seasons before moving to inside receiver in 2013.
- ▶ Recorded at least one reception in 19 consecutive games to end his career.
- ▶ Played in 35 games with 11 starts in three seasons at Cal and totaled 59 receptions for 896 yards (15.2 avg.) and two TDs.
- ▶ Is just the fourth Cal tight end to be drafted in the top 100, joining David Lewis (first round, No. 13, Kansas City, 1997), Tony Gonzalez (first round, No. 13, Kansas City, 1997) and Craig Stevens (third round, No. 85, Tennessee, 2008).

WR Randall Cobb, 4th Year, Kentucky, D2-11

- ▶ Before suffering a knee injury in Week 6 last season, led the team in receptions with 29 and was No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.
- ▶ Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, he became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Led the team in receptions (80) and receiving yards (954) in 2012 and finished second on the squad in TD catches (eight).

QB Aaron Rodgers, 10th Year, California, D1-05

- ▶ His career passer rating of 104.7 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Ranked No. 5 in the NFL last season in passer rating (104.9), No. 2 in yards per attempt (8.74) and No. 5 in completion percentage (66.6).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- ▶ In 89 regular-season starts (59-30 record), has posted 33 games with 300-plus passing yards, 48 without an interception and 52 with a 100-plus passer rating (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

RB Eddie Lacy, 2nd Year, Alabama, D2-13

- ▶ Ranked No. 1 in the league among rookies and No. 8 among all players with 1,178 rushing yards last season, despite missing one full game and nearly all of another due to a concussion.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history for the most rushing yards by a rookie in a single season, No. 1 in attempts (284), and tied for No. 1 for most 100-yard rushing games with four (John Brockington, four in 1971).
- ▶ Became the first Green Bay rookie RB to be selected to the Pro Bowl since Brockington in 1971 and was named Rookie of the Year by PFWA.
- ▶ Finished third in the league with 11 TD runs, with 10 of those scores coming between Weeks 7-17, the most in the league over that span.

FB John Kuhn, 9th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)

- ▶ Has played in 109 of 114 games (120 of 125 including playoffs) during his six-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.
- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- ▶ Only player on the team to have a rushing and receiving touchdown each season from 2008-11, and was the first Packer to achieve that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).
- ▶ Led the team with four rushing TDs in 2011 and led the running backs with six total TDs.

PACKERS STARTERS – DEFENSE

LDE Datone Jones, 2nd Year, UCLA, D1-13

- ▶ Overcame an ankle injury during the preseason to play in all 16 games in 2013.
- ▶ Rotated at defensive end and as one of the interior rushers in the team's sub-defenses, recording 3.5 sacks.
- ▶ Blocked an extra point at Cincinnati in Week 3 last year.
- ▶ Was the first UCLA defensive lineman selected in the first round since DT Manu Tuiaosopo in 1979 (No. 18 overall, Seattle).

NT Letroy Guion, 7th Year, Florida State, FA-14

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay this past offseason after spending his first six NFL seasons with the Minnesota Vikings after being selected in the fifth round of the 2008 NFL Draft.
- ▶ Started all 28 games he appeared in for Minnesota over the past two seasons, recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.
- ▶ Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012.

RDE Mike Daniels, 3rd Year, Iowa, D4a-12

- ▶ Played in all 16 games with one start last season and ranked No. 2 on the team with a career-high 6.5 sacks. Was tied for No. 6 in the NFL in sacks among defensive tackles.
- ▶ Appeared in 14 contests as a rookie in 2012 and posted 19 tackles (11 solo), two sacks, a team-high two fumble recoveries and a pass defensed.
- ▶ Returned a fumble 43 yards for a TD vs. Detroit in Week 14 of 2012, the longest fumble return for a TD by a rookie in franchise history.
- ▶ Starred as an interior pass rusher at Iowa, posting a team-high 24.5 tackles for a loss and 13 sacks from 2010-11.

LOLB Clay Matthews, 6th Year, Southern California, D1b-09

- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL since entering the league in 2009 with 51.0 sacks. His sack total ranks No. 5 in team history (since 1982).
- ▶ Became the first Packer in team history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the NFL (2009-12).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting.

BLB A.J. Hawk, 9th Year, Ohio State, D1-06

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (since 1975) with 1,041 tackles.
- ▶ Led the team with 153 tackles (112 solo) last season and was tied for No. 3 on the club with a career-high five sacks.
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Led the team with 142 tackles (105 solo) in 2012.
- ▶ Has appeared in 128 of a possible 130 regular-season games in his career, starting 125 of 128.
- ▶ Has posted 1,041 tackles (743 solo), 16.5 sacks, nine interceptions, 39 passes defensed, three forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries during his career.

MLB Brad Jones, 6th Year, Colorado, D7-09

- ▶ Ranked No. 3 on the team with 98 tackles (73 solo) last season and added three sacks, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.
- ▶ Came on in relief of D.J. Smith, who sustained a season-ending knee injury in 2012 in Week 6 at Houston, and made his first career start on the inside (13 starts at OLB) at St. Louis in Week 7. Registered 99 tackles (69 solo), two sacks and a forced fumble in his 10 starts last season.
- ▶ Became a core member on special teams in 2011, appearing in a career-high 15 games and recording a career-best 11 coverage tackles.
- ▶ Worked at OLB for his first three seasons, including his rookie campaign of 2009 that saw him start seven games and register a career-high four sacks.

ROLB Julius Peppers, 13th Year, North Carolina, FA-14

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay during the offseason after playing the last four seasons for Chicago and the first eight of his career for Carolina after being selected as the No. 2 overall pick in 2002.
- ▶ Has been selected to the Pro Bowl eight times (2004-06, 2008-12) and has been named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times (2004, 2006, 2010). Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.
- ▶ Enters this week having played in 98 consecutive regular-season games.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in the league in sacks (118.5) and No. 5 in forced fumbles (39) since entering the NFL in 2002. His sack total ranks No. 17 in NFL history (since 1982).
- ▶ From 2002-13, led all NFL defensive linemen with nine interceptions.
- ▶ Has blocked 13 kicks (12 field goals, one extra point) during his career.

LCB Tramon Williams, 8th Year, Louisiana Tech, FA-06

- ▶ Tied for No. 1 in the league in interceptions (20) and No. 2 in the NFL in INT return yards (323) since 2010 (including playoffs).
- ▶ Started all 16 games last season and led the secondary with a career-high 91 tackles (68 solo) and a career-best 2.5 sacks. Added three interceptions, two fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and 14 passes defensed.
- ▶ Despite suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener, went on to start 15 games that season and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defensed (24). Also added four interceptions.
- ▶ With three interceptions during the 2010 playoffs, tied Joe Laws (1944) and Craig Newsome (1996) for the franchise single-postseason record.

RCB Sam Shields, 5th Year, Miami, FA-10

- ▶ Started all 14 games he appeared in last season and led the team with four INTs (tied career high) and a career-best 25 passes defensed.
- ▶ Was limited to 10 games with eight starts in 2012 due to injury, but registered 38 tackles (28 solo), three interceptions, 15 passes defensed (No. 3 on the team) and a sack.
- ▶ Made an impact in 2010 after making the team as a non-drafted rookie, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one season in college.
- ▶ In Green Bay's NFC Championship win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.

SS Morgan Burnett, 5th Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10

- ▶ Ranked No. 2 on the team with 106 tackles (77 solo) in 2013, despite missing the first three games due to injury. Recovered three fumbles, including one for a TD, and added nine passes defensed.
- ▶ Participated in all 1,088 plays for Green Bay's defense in 2012, one of only four non-offensive linemen in the NFL to appear in 100 percent of his team's snaps.
- ▶ Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining DT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

FS Micah Hyde, 2nd Year, Iowa, D5a-13

- ▶ Appeared in all 16 games last season, playing in the most defensive plays (428) among the Packers' defensive rookies.
- ▶ Spent most of his rookie season as the dime or nickel cornerback, helping to fill in for CB Casey Hayward, who missed all but three games due to a hamstring injury.
- ▶ As the team's primary return man for most of the 2013 season, ranked No. 5 in the NFL in punt return average (12.3) and No. 14 in kickoff return average (24.1). Recorded a 93-yard punt return for a touchdown, which tied for the fourth longest in team history.

GAME 1

SEATTLE — The Super Bowl champion Seattle Seahawks started 2014 the same way they finished last season, with a convincing win. Marshawn Lynch rushed for 110 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Percy Harvin had 100 combined yards rushing and receiving, and the Seahawks' Jimmy Graham had a 36-6 win over the Green Bay Packers to kick off the regular season.

The Seahawks unveiled the first Super Bowl banner in franchise history during a vibrant pregame ceremony and then began the process of trying to be the first team in a decade to repeat.

Russian linebacker Packers — a popular pick to contend in the NFC — will only reinforce the belief Seattle is still the favorite to be the first team in a decade to repeat.

Wilson was outstanding in the first half, including a 53-yard touchdown pass to Ricardo Lockette. Harvin got touches as a receiver, running back and returner. He was used all over the field in different formations rather than being fully healthy in his first season with Seattle.

Wilson finished 19 of 28 for 191 yards passing and Lynch was at his best. Pete Carroll said earlier this week that Lynch appeared in the best shape of his career, and it showed. Lynch averaged 3.3 yards per carry and topped 100 yards for the 20th time in the regular season since joining the Seahawks in 2010.

Lynch who ran for 1,257 yards and 12 touchdowns last season, barreled through a trio of Packers for the TD with 3:41 left before halftime to give the Seahawks a 17-10 lead and added a second TD run on the first play of the fourth quarter.

Seattle had 207 yards rushing as a team and won for the 18th time in its last 20 regular-season home games. Harvin finished with 11 offensive touches, including four rushes for 41 yards.

Rodgers finished 23 of 33 for 189 yards and was isolated to one side of the field. He looked almost exclusively for Jordy Nelson matched up against Byron Maxwell and never threw in Richard Sherman's direction. Nelson finished with nine receptions, but Maxwell came up with a third-quarter interception on a pass that deflected off Nelson's hands.

The most action for Sherman came in the first half when he accidentally blocked Davon House into Earl Thomas on a punt return causing a fumble recovered by the Packers.

But Seattle's defense did its part. They sacked Rodgers three times, taking advantage of a knee injury suffered by right tackle Byron Bulaga in the second quarter. His replacement, Derek Sherrod, gave up a fourth-down sack to Cliff Avril to end one drive inside Seattle territory. Following a Seattle punt, Sherrod was beaten by Michael Bennett on Green Bay's next offensive snap. Rodgers was stripped and Sherrod fell on the fumble in the end zone for a safety and a 22-10 lead.

Nine plays later, Lynch walked in from the 3-yard line for a 29-10 Seahawks lead. Rodgers threw a 3-yard TD pass to Randall Cobb in the fourth quarter but Wilson closed out the victory with a 13-play drive that ate up seven minutes and was capped by a 15-yard TD pass to Derrick Coleman on fourth down with 2:31 left.

Eddie Lacy was mostly a non-factor with 34 yards rushing on 12 carries and left in the fourth quarter to be evaluated for a concussion. Seattle linebacker Bobby Wagner tied a career high with 14 tackles.

GREEN BAY WINS — Aaron Rodgers threw for three scores, including an 80-yard strike to Jordy Nelson in the third quarter, and the Packers roared back from an 18-point deficit to win their home opener, 31-24, over the New York Jets.

After allowing a 21-3 lead early in the second quarter, coach Rex Ryan's team had a chance to the date. It looked as though that had happened with 5 minutes left on a 37-yard touchdown catch by Jeremy Kerley on fourth down — but the score was negated because the Jets' (1-1) called a timeout from the sideline just before the snap.

Ryan said he didn't call time. He suspected it could have been offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg or quarterback Geno Smith. Defensive lineman Sheldon Richardson said he was to blame because he leaned over to tell the referee when he saw Mornhinweg calling for time.

Smith's last-ditch pass on fourth-and-8 with 3:31 left for a double-covered Kerley was tipped away. The 78,000-plus fans at Lambeau Field breathed a collective sigh of relief, and the Packers held the ball for a timeout.

Green Bay (1-1) avoided its first 0-2 start since 2005. It took a little while to get going, though, as Rodgers fumbled away the snap on the first play of the opening series. The Jets scored on their first three drives.

Slowly, but surely, the offense started chipping away. Then, the defense came up with some big stops late.

The Jets tried backup Michael Vick at quarterback on one play, but he was taken down from behind in the open by Clay Matthews for a sack. That drive ended with the pass breakup on Kerley in the end zone.

Rodgers finished 25 of 42 with 346 yards. Nelson had nine catches and Cobb finished with five catches for 39 yards. Cobb caught two short scoring strikes and a 2-point conversion that gave the Packers a 24-21 lead in the third quarter.

Green Bay went up 31-24 late in the third quarter when Nelson worked a double move on Dee Milliner for the 80-yard score. Nelson ran and out-and-out route. With the safety coming over late to help, Nelson beat out Jets defenders in a footrace to the end zone.

Just a couple of hours earlier, it looked as if the home crowd was going to witness a surprising loss.

Chris Ivory barged up the middle for a 4-yard score at 10:38 of the second quarter that left the fans stunned silence with the Packers down 21-3 on the ground with 13 carries and 43 yards.

The Packers' comeback started with a 13-point flurry in the final 5:43 of the first half, including field goals from 20 and 55 yards by Mason Crosby. The later kick set a Packers record at the time.

Then, the Packers got the defensive break they desperately needed when Tramon Williams stepped in front of tight end Zach Sudfield for an interception at the Packers 3.

Rodgers followed with a 10-play, 97-yard drive in 1:44 that ended with a 6-yard score to Cobb to get the Packers within five at the half.

• Set an NFL record with 903 points in his first seven seasons (2007-13), topping the previous league record held by Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).

• With 918 career points, ranks No. 2 on the all-time franchise scoring list behind only K Ryan Longwell (1,054).

• Is one of only three players in NFL history to register three or more 140-point seasons (Stephen Gostkowski, David Akers).

• Has kicked the six longest field goals in franchise history (58-yarder in 2011, two 57-yarders in 2013, 56-yarders in 2010 and 2011, 55-yarder in 2014).

• Set a franchise record with 23 consecutive field goals made (Week 13, 2010-Week 12, 2011), topping Chris Jacke's mark of 17 straight in 1993.

2014 Season: Has converted all four of his field-goal attempts and all three extra points...Has recorded six touchbacks on 11 kickoffs.

• Appeared in 14 games as a rookie in 2012 and finished with 19 tackles (11 solo), two sacks, a team-high two fumble recoveries (one for a TD) and a pass defended.

2014 Season: Has started both games and leads the defensive line with 14 tackles (10 solo) and a sack.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at RDE and registered a career-high eight tackles (five solo), which was tied for the team lead.

▶**vs. N.Y.
