## PACKERS TRAVEL TO MIAMI

The Green Bay Packers go on the road to play the Miami Dolphins for their fourth road game in the first six weeks of the season.



- ▶ This will be the seventh time the two teams have faced each other in the month of October, including the fourth time in the last five matchups.
- ▶ The Dolphins hold a 10-3 advantage in the all-time series, but Green Bay has won three of the last five matchups.
- ▶ Green Bay is 1-6 all-time at Miami, with the Packers' only win coming the last time Green Bay played at the Dolphins, a 34-24 victory in Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** first season (2006).
- ▶ This Sunday Green Bay will see a familiar face in Dolphins head coach Joe Philbin, who spent nine seasons on the Packers' coaching staff (2003-11). It will be the first time McCarthy will face a team with a head coach that is one of his former assistants.
- ▶ While each of the first three games the Packers and Dolphins played each other were decided by 20-plus points, each of the last 10 games has been decided by less than 15 points, including six by single digits.
- ▶ Since 2002, NFC teams have played Miami three times. Green Bay's two wins and 78 points scored against the Dolphins during that span are both tied for the third most among NFC teams.
- ▶ Dating back to 2002, the Packers are 7-6 against the AFC East. Green Bay's seven wins are tied for the fourth most by an NFC team against the division over that span.
- ▶ The Packers-Dolphins game in Miami on Sept. 18, 1988, tied for the eighth-warmest road game Green Bay has played (87 degrees).
- ▶ With QB **Aaron Rodgers** as the starting quarterback, Green Bay is 15-9 against teams from the AFC, including the postseason.
- ▶ Including two games he did not start, Rodgers has completed 528 of 864 pass attempts (61.1 pct.) for 6,802 yards, 54 touchdowns, 13 interceptions and a passer rating of 100.4 in games against the AFC in the regular and postseason.
- ▶ During the regular season, teams get extended breaks during their bye week and also following a week they play on a Thursday. Dating back to 2006, Green Bay is 14-2 in games after the bye week or after playing on Thursday, including a win in Week 2 this season after opening the season on Thursday.
- ▶ Over the last two weeks, Green Bay has registered two wins and out-scored their opponents 80-27. The Packers' 80 points are the most scored in Weeks 4-5 this season. Green Bay's point differential of 53 is the largest over the past two weeks as well.
- ▶ The Packers have scored more than 30 points in each of their three wins this season.

## WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports, now in its 21st season as an NFL network television partner, will broadcast the game to a regional audience.



- ▶ Play-by-play man **Sam Rosen** joins analyst **John Lynch** and sideline reporter **Pam Oliver**.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in five states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 20th season calling Packers' games. McCarren, who is in his 26th year in Green Bay television, has four times been voted Wisconsin Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 16th season of broadcasts together.
- ▶ ESPN Radio will air the game across the country. **Ryan Ruocco** (play-by-play) and **Bill Polian** (analyst) will call the action, with **Ian Fitzsimmons** reporting from the sideline.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive..
- ▶ DIRECTV subscribers can watch the game on channel 707.

## PACKERS AT DOLPHINS – WEEK 6

### FACING THE AFC

The Green Bay Packers have played well against AFC teams. Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the Packers are 20-14 during the regular and postseason against teams from the AFC, including a 31-24 win in Week 2 over the New York Jets this season. Green Bay's 20 wins are tied for the second most among NFC teams since 2006.

► Dating back to 2006, Green Bay's .588 winning percentage (including the postseason) against teams from the AFC is tied for third among NFC teams:

► Under Coach McCarthy, in regular and postseason games against the AFC, the Packers:

- Scored over 30 points 18 times, including in 10 of the last 14 games
- Registered at least 350 total net yards 24 times, including in 11 of the last 13 matchups
- Tallied over 400 total net yards 11 times
- Rushed for over 100 net yards 20 times, including in five of the last six contests
- Possessed the ball for over 30 minutes in five of the last six games
- Turned the ball over one or fewer times in 24 matchups
- Won 10 of the last 14 games
- Recorded 12 wins in the 15 games they have held the opponent to 20 points or less
- Tallied at least one interception in 24 games, including multiple interceptions 15 times
- Are one of only seven NFC teams to have a positive point differential against AFC teams

### RUNNING THROUGH IT

Green Bay's run game had a breakout performance in the victory over the Vikings in Week 5, recording 156 yards on 28 carries (5.6 avg.) with two touchdowns.

► The Packers recorded six runs of 10-plus yards against Minnesota, which tied for the seventh most in a single game this season. Green Bay's 68 runs of 10-plus yards since the start of the 2013 regular season rank eighth in the NFL.

► RB **Eddie Lacy** rushed for 105 yards on 13 carries (8.1 avg.) and recorded his second career game with two rushing touchdowns (vs. Pittsburgh, Week 16 in 2013).

► It was the fifth 100-yard rushing game of his career, his lowest attempt total in a 100-yard rushing game and his best per-carry average in a game (min. 10 att.). Lacy's five 100-yard rushing games since the start of 2013 are tied for fifth in the NFL:

**BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER**

The Packers' active roster is composed of 24 offensive players, 26 defensive players and three specialists.

- ▶ Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 33 of them (63.5 percent) were draft picks of the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 18 players on the roster that began their careers as non-drafted free agents, with eight of those originally signed by Green Bay.
- ▶ Almost 50 percent of the players (25 of 53, 47.2%) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player.
- ▶ The Packers have 12 players on the roster that played in the NFL prior to the 2009 season, and six of those players began their pro careers as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player (QB Matt Flynn, K Mason Crosby, CB Tramon Williams, CB Jarrett Bush, FB John Kuhn, LS Brett Goode).
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 42 began their pro careers with the Packers (79.2 percent).
- ▶ Only 17 of the 52 players on the roster (32.7 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft, with 16 being drafted by the Packers.
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 43 of them (81.1 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Oct. 12) and 20 players (37.7 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

Dating back to 2008, the Packers are 19-5 in the month of October. Green Bay's 19 wins are tied for the league lead and the Packers' .792 winning percentage leads the NFL over that span:

- ▶ Green Bay's Week 5 victory over Minnesota marked the Packers eighth straight win in the month of October, the longest winning streak by any NFL team in a single calendar month.
- ▶ The Packers have won 14 of their last 15 games played in October.

**MR. OCTOBER**

Since taking over as the starter in 2008, QB **Aaron Rodgers** has had some success in the month of October.

- ▶ In 11 of his last 13 starts in October, Rodgers has registered a passer rating of at least 100. He has posted six 130-rating games over that span, including a 138.7 rating in a 42-10 win over Minnesota this year in Week 5.
- ▶ Over his last 13 October starts, Rodgers has completed 291 of 421 passes (69.1 percent) for 3,846 yards (295.8 ypg) and 36 TDs with just four INTs for a 122.3 passer rating. He has eclipsed the 300-yard mark in seven of those 13 games and thrown three or more TDs in eight of them as well, including this season against Minnesota (three). Rodgers has a 12-1 record in his last 13 October starts.

**STAT OF THE WEEK**

- ▶ Packers QB **Aaron Rodgers** threw for three touchdowns in a 42-10 win over Minnesota in Week 5. His third touchdown of the game was the 200th of his career during the regular season. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Rodgers set an NFL record for the fewest interceptions at the time of his 200th career touchdown pass with 53. It topped New England QB Tom Brady's (88) record by 35 interceptions.
- ▶ Rodgers reached 200 career touchdown passes in his 99th career game, the second fastest in NFL history behind only Dolphins QB Dan Marino (89 games).

- ▶ Rodgers' 200th career touchdown pass was the first touchdown reception for rookie WR **Davante Adams**.
- ▶ Rodgers' first touchdown pass of the game was to WR **Randall Cobb**. It was Cobb's sixth of the season, the most by a Packer through five games since Billy Howton posted seven in 1956. Cobb's six touchdown receptions tied for the fifth most by a Packer in the first five games of a season:

**WHAT TO LOOK FOR**

- ▶ A win would make McCarthy 86-47-1 during the regular season as the Packers' head coach.
- ▶ Green Bay's defense has recorded six interceptions in the last three games, the second most in the NFL over that span (N.Y. Giants, 8).
- ▶ The Packers' defense is looking to hold the opposing quarterback to a passer rating below 85.0 for the fifth game in a row (MIN-Christian Ponder, 45.8 / CHI-Jay Cutler, 82.5 / NYJ-Geno Smith, 64.1 / DET-Matthew Stafford, 61.6).
- ▶ Over the last two games, Green Bay's offense has scored on 11 of 20 drives.
- ▶ The Packers have recorded 170 interception return yards this season, the most in the NFL (HOU-155 / NYG-122).

**OFFENSE**

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** has registered three games with a 100-plus passer rating this season and 54 in his career.
- ▶ Rodgers has not thrown an interception in his last 128 pass attempts. His only interception of the season came in the third quarter at Seattle in Week 1.
- ▶ Rodgers looks to record the 34th 300-yard passing game of his career during the regular season.
- ▶ If Rodgers throws for at least three touchdowns, it would tie for the third most consecutive games with at least three touchdown passes in his career (2012-3 / 2012-4 / 2011-5).

- ▶ WR **Jordy Nelson** (336) is nine receptions shy of tying WR Max McGee (345) for ninth most in Packers' history.
- ▶ Nelson is one touchdown reception short of passing WR Boyd Dowler (40) for ninth place in franchise history.
- ▶ Nelson has recorded at least nine receptions in three games this season and in eight games in his career, including the postseason, the third-most games with at least nine receptions among Packers players, dating back to 1960 (Sterling Sharpe, 13 / Donald Driver, 12).
- ▶ Nelson has registered at least one reception in the last 28 games he has played in, including the postseason. Is the longest streak of his career (27 games, 2010 postseason - 2012 regular season).
- ▶ Since the start of 2013 (including the postseason), Nelson has nine games with at least seven receptions, including three games this season. It is tied for the fourth-most games with seven-plus receptions in the league over that time span (WAS Pierre Garcon, 12 / NE Julian Edelman, 11 / DEN Demaryius Thomas, 10 / PIT Antonio Brown, 9).
- ▶ WR **Randall Cobb** has recorded at least one reception in 33 consecutive games, including the postseason.
- ▶ Cobb has eight receiving touchdowns in his last six regular-season games, dating back to last season.
- ▶ Dating back to last season, RB **Eddie Lacy** has at least one rushing touchdown in 11 of the last 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ If Lacy runs for over 100 yards, it will mark the first time in his career he has surpassed 100 rushing yards in the back-to-back games.

**DEFENSE**

- ▶ LB **Julius Peppers** registered a half-sack against Minnesota in Week 5, becoming the 18th player in the NFL (since 1982) to record at least 120 sacks.
- ▶ Peppers also returned an interception for a touchdown in Week 5, making him the only player in NFL history with 10 interceptions and at least 100 sacks.
- ▶ Peppers' 49-yard return for a touchdown was the second-longest interception return of his career (97 yards vs. DEN, Oct. 10, 2004).
- ▶ Peppers has played in 101 consecutive games, which is tied for the longest active streak among NFL linebackers (NO Curtis Lofton, 101).
- ▶ LB **Clay Matthews** (51.0) is three sacks shy of tying DE Aaron Kampman (54.0) for No. 4 on the team's career sacks list.
- ▶ Matthews needs one more interception to join Peppers as two of five active NFL players with at least six interceptions and 40 sacks (BAL-Terrell Suggs / TEN-Shaun Phillips / PIT-James Harrison).

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

- ▶ Cobb needs either a punt return for a touchdown or a kickoff return for a touchdown to take sole possession of second place in Packers history for combined returns for touchdowns (Travis Williams, 6). Cobb, who has three returns for touchdowns, currently is tied with six other players.
- ▶ K **Mason Crosby** has played in 117 consecutive games, the longest active streak among kickers.
- ▶ Crosby looks to extend his consecutive-games-scoring streak to 118 regular-season games. It is the second-longest streak in franchise history (Ryan Longwell, 144).
- ▶ P **Tim Masthay** tied a single-game franchise record (since 1976) last week by landing five punts inside the 20-yard line, matching his own mark set at NYJ on Oct. 31, 2010 and David Beverly's set vs. CHI on Oct. 28, 1978. It gave him 108 punts inside the 20-yard line for his career, as he passed P Craig Hentrich (104) for the franchise record.

**MIKE MCCARTHY**...Is in his ninth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Led the Packers to their fifth consecutive playoff appearance last season, joining New England as the only two NFL teams to do so over that span. Has also led the team to six playoff appearances in the last seven years (2007, 2009-13).
- ▶ Has guided the Packers to top-10 finishes in scoring each of the past seven seasons (2007-13), joining the Patriots as the only other team to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ His .640 winning percentage during the regular season (84-47-1) ranks No. 5 among active NFL coaches (min. 50 games).
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.

**JOE PHILBIN**...Is in his third year as the Dolphins' ninth head coach.

- ▶ Before joining Miami, he coached as the offensive coordinator for the Packers from 2007-11.
- ▶ In his five years as Green Bay's offensive coordinator, the Packers ranked in the top 10 in points scored and total yards each season.
- ▶ In 2008-09, Green Bay became the first team in league annals to have a 4,000-yard passer (Aaron Rodgers), a 1,200-yard rusher (Ryan Grant) and two 1,000-yard receivers (Donald Driver and Greg Jennings).

QB **Aaron Rodgers** has continued to reach marks in record time.

▶ He posted his 3,000th career passing attempt in the Week 2 win over the Jets (now has 3,102), becoming just the third player in franchise history to register 3,000 career passing attempts (Brett Favre, 8,754; Bart Starr, 3,149).

▶ At the time of his 3,000th career passing attempt, Rodgers had 53 career interceptions, an NFL record by a quarterback for the fewest INTs at the time of his 3,000th career attempt (Neil O'Donnell, 59 INTs).

▶ Also in Week 2, Rodgers (25,196) moved past Bart Starr (24,718) for No. 2 on the all-time franchise list.

▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Rodgers reached the 25,000-yard mark in the fewest attempts in NFL history:

**HEADED NORTH**

This past offseason the Packers signed LB **Julius Peppers**. The former Carolina Panther and Chicago Bear has been selected to eight Pro Bowls and was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.

- ▶ In his first NFC North game for the Packers, Peppers forced a fumble that he recovered on a sack of Lions QB Matthew Stafford in Week 3.

► According to the Elias Sports Bureau, **Clinton-Dix** is the first rookie defensive back in franchise history (since 1982) to have a sack, an interception and a fumble recovery in the first three games of a season.

► In Week 1, he became the first Packer (since 1982) to register a sack and a fumble recovery in his NFL debut. The turnover helped set up **FB John Kuhn's** 2-yard touchdown run.

► Clinton-Dix registered his first career interception in Week 3.

► Dating back to 2000, he joined Charles Woodson (2012), Morgan Burnett (2011), Corey Williams (2007), Nick Barnett (2004) and Darren Sharper (2000) as the only Packers to register at least one interception and one sack in the first three games of the regular season.

► In the Week 4 win at Chicago, Clinton-Dix recorded five solo tackles, which tied for the third most on the team.

### ON THE ROAD AGAIN

### 303 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Vikings in Week 5 this season brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 303 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 58th season of football in 2014. A total of 701,102 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine games (including playoffs) in 2013.
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

### THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 48-17-1 (.735) at home in the regular-season since 2006.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

**A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE**

The Green Bay Packers' 94th NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling).

- ▶ Green Bay's schedule includes five games against 2013 playoff teams, with three of those contests (Carolina, Philadelphia, New England) at Lambeau Field and two on the road (Seattle, New Orleans).
- ▶ The Packers have three prime-time contests at home (vs. Minnesota on Thursday night in Week 5, vs. Chicago on Sunday night in Week 10 and vs. Atlanta on *Monday Night Football* in Week 14) and two on the road (Thursday night at Seattle in Week 1 and Sunday night at New Orleans in Week 8).
- ▶ The Packers' bye arrives in Week 9 for the first time since 2004.
- ▶ It is the second time in franchise history (1922) that Green Bay opens with three of their first four games on the road.
- ▶ Two of Green Bay's first five games are played on Thursday night, with the next seven taking place on Sunday, one on the following Monday, and three more on Sunday to close out the regular season.
- ▶ For the second year in a row and just the third time in nine seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (2010), the Packers opened the season on the road. For the third straight season Green Bay opened against an NFC West team after facing San Francisco each of the last two years.
- ▶ Dating back to 2001, the Packers have always played against an NFC team in Week 1. The last AFC team Green Bay faced in Week 1 was the New York Jets, who visited the Packers in Week 2 for the home opener.
- ▶ Following the home opener, the Packers went on the road to face two division opponents, Detroit and Chicago, before returning home to face Minnesota in a Thursday night divisional matchup. It was the sixth time in the last seven seasons they have faced off in primetime.
- ▶ Green Bay will play two of the next three on the road prior to the Week 9 bye. The Packers travel to Miami for the third time in 23 years and first time since 2006, and to New Orleans in a game on Sunday night, marking the third primetime meeting between the two in the last four contests. Between the two road games, Carolina will travel to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2008.
- ▶ After the bye week, the Packers return to Sunday night to host the Bears, who they have beaten five of the last six times at home.
- ▶ Philadelphia comes to Lambeau for the second straight season, which is only the second time in the series that the two clubs have played at Green Bay in back-to-back seasons (1933-34).
- ▶ For the second consecutive season, Green Bay will play Minnesota in Week 12, traveling to face the Vikings in the first outdoor game (TCF Bank Stadium) between the two in Minnesota since they played at Metropolitan Stadium on Nov. 29, 1981.
- ▶ The last game in November brings New England to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2006 and only its third visit ever to the stadium (1979).
- ▶ December opens with a Monday night matchup at home versus Atlanta. It marks the 22nd straight season the Packers have appeared on *Monday Night Football*.
- ▶ The next two weeks include road games at Buffalo and Tampa Bay. It will be the Packers' first visit to Buffalo since 2006 and first trip to Tampa Bay in the month of December since 1999.
- ▶ Green Bay closes the regular season at Lambeau Field against Detroit for the fourth time under McCarthy (2007, 2008, 2011).



## STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

### 18 RANDALL COBB

- ▶ In Week 4 at Chicago, joined WR **Jordy Nelson** as the first Packers teammates to each have at least 100 receiving yards and two touchdowns in the same game since December 21, 1969 (Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler).
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first person in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Has three kick return scores (two punts, one kickoff) in his career, which ties him for No. 2 in franchise history behind only RB Travis Williams' six return TDs (one punt, five kickoffs).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 5 in the NFL with the three total kick return TDs since 2011.

### 2 MASON CROSBY

- ▶ His 903 points from 2007-13 rank No. 1 in NFL history for the most points scored by a player in his first seven seasons, topping the mark of Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team annals with 933 career points (Ryan Longwell, 1,054).
- ▶ Reached the 900-point mark for his career in his 112th game, third fastest in NFL history (Gino Cappelletti, 106; Stephen Gostkowski, 108).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most 100-point seasons with seven, trailing only Longwell (eight).
- ▶ Made 23 straight field goals from Week 13 of 2010 through Week 10 of 2011, the longest regular-season streak in franchise history.
- ▶ In 2011, set a franchise record with a 58-yard field goal in Week 7 at Minnesota, eclipsing the mark of 56 yards he held (Week 1 at Philadelphia, 2010; Week 5 at Atlanta, 2011).
- ▶ For his career, has hit 125 of 137 field goals (91.2 percent) from 39 yards and closer.
- ▶ Has made 44 of 62 field goals (71.0 percent) from 40-49 yards.
- ▶ Has hit 21 of 42 field goals (50.0 percent) from 50-plus yards.

### 50 A.J. HAWK

- ▶ Is tied for No. 1 in franchise history for the most seasons leading the team in tackles with five (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012-13), matching the mark of five by LB Nick Barnett (2003-05, 2007, 2009).
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Has posted 100-plus tackles in six of seven seasons.
- ▶ Has 1,070 career tackles, which ranks No. 1 in team history (since defensive stats began to be recorded by coaches in 1975). Moved past John Anderson (1,020, 1978-89) for the franchise record with eight tackles at Chicago in Week 17 last season.

### 27 EDDIE LACY

- ▶ Set franchise rookie records in 2013 for rushing yards (1,178), rushing TDs (11) and rushing attempts (284).
- ▶ Tied the team rookie mark for 100-yard rushing games with four last season.
- ▶ Named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press* and was selected to the Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Vikings RB Adrian Peterson.
- ▶ Recorded 20-plus carries 10 times during the 2013 regular season, all coming in the the last 13 games. The Packers were 7-2-1 in those games. Dating back to 1960, he tied Dorsey Levens (1997) for the second-most games of 20-plus carries by a Packers' player in one regular season (Ahman Green, 12 in 2003).

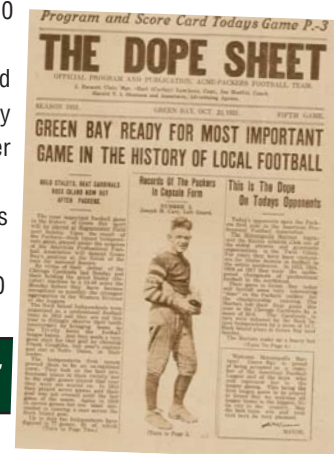
### 8 TIM MASTHAY

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (min. 150 punts) with a 44.4-yard gross punting average.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in team annals (since 1976) with 108 punts placed inside the 20-yard line in his career, passing Craig Hentrich (104) in the franchise record book.
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with his 45.6-yard gross average in 2011, surpassing Craig Hentrich's 45.0-yard mark in 1997.
- ▶ Tied Sean Landeta's single-season franchise record (1998) by placing 30 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2012.
- ▶ Holds the top four single-season marks for net punting average in franchise history (since 1976) with a 38.95 average in 2013, a 38.93 average in 2012, a 38.56 average in 2011 and a 37.65 average in 2010.

### 52 CLAY MATTHEWS

- ▶ Only player in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl each of his first four seasons in the league (2009-12).
- ▶ Only player in team history to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ His 17 sacks in his first 20 games were the most by an NFL player to start his career at the time, eclipsing the mark of 16.5 set by Leslie O'Neal (1986, 1988) and John Abraham (2000-01).
- ▶ Is the first NFL player since sacks became an official stat in 1982 to post a double-digit sack total and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the league.
- ▶ First player in franchise annals to post 10-plus sacks in each of his first two years in the NFL.
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in team history with 51.0 career sacks.
- ▶ His 29.5 sacks from 2009-11 were tied for No. 1 in team history with Tony Bennett for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL with 51.0 sacks since entering the league in 2009.
- ▶ Set a franchise rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called *The Dope Sheet*, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.





## STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

### 87 JORDY NELSON

- ▶ His 34 receptions this season are the second most by a Packer in the first five games of a season.
- ▶ His 22 TD grabs from 2011-12 were the most by a Packer over a two-year span since WR Antonio Freeman posted 26 TDs from 1997-98.
- ▶ Caught 15 TD passes in 2011, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942) as the only players in franchise annals to catch 15-plus TD passes in a season.
- ▶ With four TD grabs of 80-plus yards during his career, Nelson is tied for the most in team history and No. 1 among active NFL players (Vikings WR Greg Jennings).
- ▶ Is the 11th player in franchise history to surpass 5,000 career receiving yards.
- ▶ Tied for No. 9 in franchise history with 40 career TD catches (WR Boyd Dowler).
- ▶ Among players with 250-plus catches, ranks No. 9 in franchise history with a 15.2-yard receiving average.

### 56 JULIUS PEPPERS

- ▶ Only player in NFL history with at least 10 interceptions and 100 sacks.
- ▶ Has been selected to eight Pro Bowls since entering the league in 2002, which ties him with Troy Polamalu and Ray Lewis for the third most among defensive players over that span (Ed Reed, 9/ Champ Bailey, 12).
- ▶ With eight double-digit sack seasons as a pro, is tied with Jared Allen for the most in the NFL since 2002.
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times and was selected to the NFL's All-Decade team for the 2000s.

### 12 AARON RODGERS

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with a 105.4 career passer rating.
- ▶ When he hit the 200-TD mark for his career, he had thrown just 53 INTs to that point, the fewest in NFL history as he bested Tom Brady's mark of 88 INTs at the time of his 200th TD pass.
- ▶ Set an NFL single-season record in 2011 with a 122.5 passer rating and set team marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games (eight).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first five seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Threw a TD pass in 35 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field from 2008-12, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre, 1992-96). It was the second-longest home streak in NFL history behind Dan Marino's 39-game streak from 1983-88.
- ▶ Tied a single-game franchise record with six TD passes at Houston in Week 6 of 2012, matching Matt Flynn's mark (Jan. 1, 2012, vs. Detroit).
- ▶ In 92 regular-season starts, has 33 career 300-yard games, 38 three-TD games and 51 zero-INT games (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ Has posted a 100-plus passer rating 54 times. Set an NFL record for quarterbacks whose careers started since 1970 with 43 games with a 100-plus passer rating in his first 75 starts.
- ▶ Posted a 100-plus passer rating in five straight seasons (2009-13), the only quarterback in league history to accomplish that feat.

- ▶ Is the only QB in team history with three 400-yard passing games, including a 480-yard effort vs. Washington in Week 2 last season that tied a franchise record.
- ▶ In 2009, became first QB in NFL history to throw 30 or more TDs, seven or fewer INTs, and rush for five TDs in the same season.
- ▶ Has registered a passer rating over 110.0 in four or more consecutive games three times in his career (Weeks 3-7, 2009; Week 9, Weeks 11-13, 2010; Weeks 1-7, 9-12, 2011), one of only two quarterbacks in franchise history (Bart Starr, 1966) to accomplish the feat in a single season.
- ▶ Is the only NFL QB since the 1970 merger to post four straight 110-plus rating games in three straight seasons (2009-11).
- ▶ Posted four or more rushing TDs in three straight seasons (2008-10), becoming only the second Packers QB to accomplish that feat (Tobin Rote, 1954-56), and eclipsed 300 rushing yards in back-to-back seasons (2009-10), the first since Rote in 1954-56.

## PACKERS STARTERS – OFFENSE

### **WR Jordy Nelson, 7th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08**

- ▶ Led the team in 2013 with a career-high 85 catches for a career-best 1,314 yards and eight TDs. Ranked No. 10 in the NFL last season in receiving yards.
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in the NFL with 34 TD catches since 2011 and is No. 4 in the league with 19 TD grabs at home over that span.
- ▶ With 15 TD catches in 2011, became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).
- ▶ Became the first player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to post three 80-yard TD grabs over an eight-game span in the regular season (Week 16, 2010-Week 6, 2011).

### **LT David Bakhtiari, 2nd Year, Colorado, D4a-13**

- ▶ Has started every game since the start of the 2013 regular season.
- ▶ Started all 16 games at left tackle last season, the only rookie in the NFL to do so in 2013 and the first Packer rookie to do so since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start at LT in the season opener since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since 1985.
- ▶ Earned second-team All-Pacific-12 honors from the conference's coaches each of his last two seasons (sophomore and junior) at Colorado.

### **LG Josh Sitton, 7th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08**

- ▶ Has started 83 games since 2009, the most by an offensive player in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ▶ Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Marco Rivera in 2004.
- ▶ Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association.
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, allowed only 9.0 sacks in his first five seasons as a starter (2009-13).
- ▶ Was the only Packer on either side of the ball to not miss a snap from 2009-10.

### **C Corey Linsley, Rookie, Ohio State, D5a-14**

- ▶ First rookie center to start for Green Bay in Week 1 since the merger.
- ▶ Was one of five team captains and was part of a line that helped the team set school records for points scored (637), yards per carry (6.8), touchdowns (87) and TD passes (38) in '13.
- ▶ The Ohio native was part of a Buckeye team that won 24 consecutive games from 2012-13.

### **RG T.J. Lang, 6th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09**

- ▶ Has started games at four different positions on the line as a pro (27 at LG, 21 at RG, five at RT, two at LT). Played C in Week 10 last season.
- ▶ Has started 52 contests since 2011.
- ▶ Started games at both tackle spots in his first season (2009) and became the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

### **RT Bryan Bulaga, 5th Year, Iowa, D1-10**

- ▶ Missed the second part of the 2012 season after suffering a hip injury vs. Arizona on Nov. 4 and missed all of the 2013 season after injuring his knee on Aug. 3.
- ▶ Started 37 games at RT in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Started the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at right tackle after taking over for veteran Mark Tauscher (shoulder), the most regular-season starts by a Packers rookie tackle since Tauscher's 14 in 2000.
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.
- ▶ Capped his rookie season by becoming the youngest player, according to STATS LLC, to ever start in the Super Bowl (21 years, 322 days).

### **TE Richard Rodgers, Rookie, California, D3b-14**

- ▶ Has started four of five games this season.
- ▶ Registered a 43-yard reception in Week 4 at Chicago. It was the longest reception by a Packers' rookie tight end in team history.
- ▶ Played tight end for his first two seasons at California before moving to inside receiver in 2013.
- ▶ Recorded at least one reception in 19 consecutive games to end his career.
- ▶ Played in 35 games with 11 starts in three seasons at Cal and totaled 59 receptions for 896 yards (15.2 avg.) and two TDs.
- ▶ Is just the fourth Cal tight end to be drafted in the top 100, joining David Lewis (first round, No. 13, Kansas City, 1997), Tony Gonzalez (first round, No. 13, Kansas City, 1997) and Craig Stevens (third round, No. 85, Tennessee, 2008).

### **WR Randall Cobb, 4th Year, Kentucky, D2-11**

- ▶ Second in the NFL with six touchdown receptions this season.
- ▶ Before suffering a knee injury in Week 6 last season, led the team in receptions with 29 and was No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.
- ▶ Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, he became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Led the team in receptions (80) and receiving yards (954) in 2012 and finished second on the squad in TD catches (eight).

### **QB Aaron Rodgers, 10th Year, California, D1-05**

- ▶ His career passer rating of 105.4 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in the NFL this season in passer rating (114.8), No. 1 in touchdown percentage (8.2) and is tied for No. 2 in touchdown passes (12).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- ▶ In 92 regular-season starts (61-31 record), has posted 34 games with 300-plus passing yards, 51 without an interception and 54 with a 100-plus passer rating (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

### **RB Eddie Lacy, 2nd Year, Alabama, D2-13**

- ▶ Ranked No. 1 in the league among rookies and No. 8 among all players with 1,178 rushing yards last season, despite missing one full game and nearly all of another due to a concussion.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history for the most rushing yards by a rookie in a single season, No. 1 in attempts (284), and tied for No. 1 for most 100-yard rushing games with four (John Brockington, four in 1971).
- ▶ Became the first Green Bay rookie RB to be selected to the Pro Bowl since Brockington in 1971 and was named Rookie of the Year by PFWA.
- ▶ Finished third in the league with 11 TD runs, with 10 of those scores coming between Weeks 7-17, the most in the league over that span.

### **FB John Kuhn, 9th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)**

- ▶ Has played in 111 of 116 games (122 of 127 including playoffs) during his six-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.
- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- ▶ Only player on the team to have a rushing and receiving touchdown each season from 2008-11, and was the first Packer to achieve that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).
- ▶ Led the team with four rushing TDs in 2011 and led the running backs with six total TDs.





**PACKERS STARTERS – DEFENSE**

**LDE Datone Jones, 2nd Year, UCLA, D1-13**

- ▶ Overcame an ankle injury during the preseason to play in all 16 games in 2013.
- ▶ Rotated at defensive end and as one of the interior rushers in the team's sub-defenses, recording 3.5 sacks.
- ▶ Blocked an extra point at Cincinnati in Week 3 last year.
- ▶ Was the first UCLA defensive lineman selected in the first round since DT Manu Tuiaosopo in 1979 (No. 18 overall, Seattle).

**NT Letroy Guion, 7th Year, Florida State, FA-14**

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay this past offseason after spending his first six NFL seasons with the Minnesota Vikings after being selected in the fifth round of the 2008 NFL Draft.
- ▶ Started all 28 games he appeared in for Minnesota over the past two seasons, recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.
- ▶ Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012.

**RDE Mike Daniels, 3rd Year, Iowa, D4a-12**

- ▶ Leads Green Bay with nine sacks since the start of the 2013 regular season.
- ▶ Played in all 16 games with one start last season and ranked No. 2 on the team with a career-high 6.5 sacks. Was tied for No. 6 in the NFL in sacks among defensive tackles.
- ▶ Returned a fumble 43 yards for a TD vs. Detroit in Week 14 of 2012, the longest fumble return for a TD by a rookie in franchise history.
- ▶ Starred as an interior pass rusher at Iowa, posting a team-high 24.5 tackles for a loss and 13 sacks from 2010-11.

**LOLB Clay Matthews, 6th Year, Southern California, D1b-09**

- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL since entering the league in 2009 with 51.0 sacks. His sack total ranks No. 5 in team history (since 1982).
- ▶ Became the first Packer in team history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the NFL (2009-12).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting.

**BLB A.J. Hawk, 9th Year, Ohio State, D1-06**

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (since 1975) with 1,070 tackles.
- ▶ His 45 tackles this season are second on the team. Led the team with 153 tackles (112 solo) last season and was tied for No. 3 on the club with a career-high five sacks.
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Led the team with 142 tackles (105 solo) in 2012.
- ▶ Has appeared in 130 of a possible 132 regular-season games in his career, starting 127 of 130.
- ▶ Has posted 1,070 tackles (767 solo), 17.0 sacks, nine interceptions, 39 passes defended, three forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries during his career.

**MLB Jamari Lattimore, 4th Year, Middle Tenn. St., FA-11**

- ▶ Began this season providing depth at inside linebacker but has started each of the last four games, ranking third on the team with 36 tackles. In Week 5 he recorded his first career interception against Minnesota.
- ▶ Continued to contribute on special teams in 2013, but filled in at inside linebacker for injured LB Brad Jones, recording 38 tackles (31 solo), two sacks and a forced fumble.
- ▶ Spent the first three years of his career evolving into one of the core players on special teams.
- ▶ Made the transition from outside linebacker as a rookie in 2011 to inside linebacker in 2012.

**ROLB Julius Peppers, 13th Year, North Carolina, FA-14**

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay during the offseason after playing the last four seasons for Chicago and the first eight of his career for Carolina after being selected as the No. 2 overall pick in 2002.
- ▶ First player in NFL history with 10 interceptions and at least 100 sacks.
- ▶ Has been selected to the Pro Bowl eight times (2004-06, 2008-12) and has been named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times (2004, 2006, 2010). Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.
- ▶ Enters this week having played in 101 consecutive regular-season games.
- ▶ Ranks No. 3 in the league in sacks (120.0) and tied for No. 4 in forced fumbles (40) since entering the NFL in 2002. His sack total ranks No. 18 in NFL history (since 1982).
- ▶ Has blocked 13 kicks (12 field goals, one extra point) during his career.

**LCB Tramon Williams, 8th Year, Louisiana Tech, FA-06**

- ▶ Tied for No. 1 in the league in interceptions (20) and ranks No. 2 in the NFL in INT return yards (323) since 2010 (including playoffs).
- ▶ Started all 16 games last season and led the secondary with a career-high 91 tackles (68 solo) and a career-best 2.5 sacks. Added three interceptions, two fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and 14 passes defended.
- ▶ Despite suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener, went on to start 15 games that season and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defended (24). Also added four interceptions.
- ▶ With three interceptions during the 2010 playoffs, tied Joe Laws (1944) and Craig Newsome (1996) for the franchise single-postseason record.

**RCB Sam Shields, 5th Year, Miami, FA-10**

- ▶ Started all 14 games he appeared in last season and led the team with four INTs (tied career high) and a career-best 25 passes defended.
- ▶ Was limited to 10 games with eight starts in 2012 due to injury, but registered 38 tackles (28 solo), three interceptions, 15 passes defended (No. 3 on the team) and a sack.
- ▶ Made an impact in 2010 after making the team as a non-drafted rookie, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one season in college.
- ▶ In Green Bay's NFC Championship win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.

**SS Morgan Burnett, 5th Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10**

- ▶ Leads the team with 47 tackles this season. Ranked No. 2 on the team with 106 tackles (77 solo) in 2013, despite missing the first three games due to injury. Recovered three fumbles, including one for a TD, and added nine passes defended.
- ▶ Participated in all 1,088 plays for Green Bay's defense in 2012, one of only four non-offensive linemen in the NFL to appear in 100 percent of his team's snaps.
- ▶ Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining DT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

**FS Micah Hyde, 2nd Year, Iowa, D5a-13**

- ▶ Appeared in all 16 games last season, playing in the most defensive plays (428) among the Packers' defensive rookies.
- ▶ Spent most of his rookie season as the dime or nickel cornerback, helping to fill in for CB Casey Hayward, who missed all but three games due to a hamstring injury.
- ▶ As the team's primary return man for most of the 2013 season, ranked No. 5 in the NFL in punt return average (12.3) and No. 14 in kickoff return average (24.1). Recorded a 93-yard punt return for a touchdown, which tied for the fourth longest in team history.

## MEDIA INFORMATION & POLICIES

### MIKE MCCARTHY PRESS CONFERENCES

During the regular season (for a Sunday game), the head coach will be available in the Media Auditorium on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday.

### PLAYER INTERVIEWS

The team's locker room will generally be open Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and following games.

- ▶ At the conclusion of all games, the locker room will be opened following the NFL's standard "cooling-off period."
- ▶ Any requests to interview players other than at the aforementioned times should be directed to a member of the Packers' P.R. department.

### ASSISTANT COACH AVAILABILITY

All interviews by request only, through the P.R. department

- ▶ All assistants will generally be available in-person one day per week in the media auditorium (special teams/defense) and interview room (offense).
- ▶ Following games, McCarthy will be the only coach available to the media.
- ▶ Coordinators – Tom Clements (offense), Dom Capers (defense) and Shawn Slocum (special teams) – will continue to serve as primary spokesmen in their respective areas.
- ▶ However, position coaches are available for questions on specific players and the position group only. Broader interview topics need to be directed to the respective coordinator.
- ▶ Assistant coaches also are available for interviews on more personal subjects, such as Winston Moss on his NFL playing career.
- ▶ No assistant coach should be contacted directly by telephone (at his desk, home or on his cell phone), or by email. All interviews must be arranged through the P.R. department.
- ▶ Sarah Quick (quicks@packers.com) serves as the primary contact for assistant coaches. In her absence, feel free to contact Tom Fanning (fanningt@packers.com) or Nate LoCascio (locascion@packers.com).

### GENERAL PRACTICE REPORTING GUIDELINES PRACTICE INFORMATION

Once granted admission to practice, the Packers make the following requirements of reporting across all media platforms (print, television, radio, online or other) mandatory. All policies in place during the regular season are done so for competitive reasons and in accordance with guidelines established by the Pro Football Writers of America. Failure to adhere to the following policies will result in the revocation of practice access.

- ▶ NO reporting of specific plays (trick or other), personnel groupings or special/unusual formations. This includes the reporting of individual players as part of sub-packages or special formations across offense, defense and special teams.
- ▶ It is incumbent upon media to ask a member of the P.R. staff about any information that may be close to violating these policies BEFORE it is reported.

### PRIVATE TEAM COMMUNICATION

The Packers ask all media to refrain from reporting and/or recording/filming any team communication meant solely for the team.

- ▶ This includes the post-practice team huddle, in which McCarthy addresses his players. It also includes mid-practice and/or post-practice communication between any coach and his players, especially conversations of a reprimanding, negative nature.
- ▶ In general, reporting that the conversation took place is acceptable, just not the details of those conversations. Details are not to be relayed to the public either directly (through first-hand hearing), or indirectly (through interviews, even if the subject answers the question).

- ▶ If media has any question as to whether communication should be kept private, please contact the P.R. department before writing or airing such conversations.

### INJURY INFORMATION

All information concerning player injuries will be issued by Head Coach Mike McCarthy. Please do not address injury questions to Ted Thompson.

### PRACTICE ACCESS & PHOTOGRAPHY GUIDELINES

#### PRACTICE CREDENTIAL INFORMATION

Admittance will not be granted without a credential. No guests will be permitted to use media credentials, which are subject to revocation if used in that manner.

- ▶ Practice sessions will be open to members of the media who cover the team on a regular basis, unless otherwise stipulated.
- ▶ All other media (news departments, etc.) must secure a practice field pass from the public relations department and sign the necessary waiver before attending practice. No exceptions can be made.
- ▶ Visiting media may not attend practice in the regular season.
- ▶ Practice field (season-long photo ID and daily) credentials, required for all practice sessions, are not transferable and will be closely monitored.
- ▶ Under policy, members of the media (who have yet to do so) will need to sign a liability waiver before gaining access to the Packers' practices. They will be able to sign the waiver upon picking up their practice field credentials from Sarah Quick in the P.R. department office.
- ▶ Members of the media are asked to email their requests for practice field credentials to the P.R. department's Sarah Quick (quicks@packers.com) at least 24 hours in advance of the day (or days) on which they wish to cover practice.
- ▶ Practices will be open to media for designated periods during the first half of each session, similar to previous seasons. Also, as in previous years, videotaping opportunities will be limited to a few periods at the beginning of practice. Camera phones are allowed to take only still photos during permissible "shooting" periods, any social media video applications (Vine, Instagram, etc.) are not allowed at anytime.

#### ADDITIONAL PHOTO/VIDEO GUIDELINES

- ▶ Filming or relaying messages/information on closed-circuit televisions throughout the building, including the locker room, is prohibited.
- ▶ Shots that require members of the media to be in a kneeling position with camera resting on the ground are strongly discouraged.
- ▶ No tripods are allowed during practice.
- ▶ Still photography is not permitted in the locker room.

#### INJURY FOOTAGE POLICY

- ▶ Again this season, the Packers respectfully ask all photographers (video and still) to follow guidelines related to shooting injured players.
- ▶ Photographers are asked to avoid filming, photographing, printing and/or airing any shots of any injury situation, while the injury occurs, while trainers attend to/treat the injured player, and while the player is leaving the field, either on his own or with aid. This includes minor injuries.
- ▶ The team will allow shots of players after they've been treated. For instance, cameras are allowed to shoot a player on the sideline with ice on his knee, after trainers have left.
- ▶ However, cameras are not allowed to film a player on crutches, either on the field or in the locker room.
- ▶ If outlets choose not to respect this policy — or any other policy — the team will have no choice but to consider limiting access to the field and/or locker room.

## MEDIA INFORMATION & POLICIES

### PHOTO CREDENTIALS

Photo credentials will not be issued to free-lance photographers unless on a specific assignment from an accredited organization. Credentials are not provided to "grips" due to on-field space limitations.

### OTHER POLICIES & INFORMATION

#### 2014 NFL NON-GAME ONLINE CONTENT POLICY

- ▶ Accredited organizations may distribute online non-game audio and video content, including interviews, press conferences and team practices at NFL venues, acquired as a result of credentialed access ("Game Information") to games or club/league facilities provided that such distribution:
  - ▶ is 90 seconds maximum per day (180 seconds maximum in two-team markets -- 90 seconds per team);
  - ▶ may not be "archived" (i.e., made available for on-demand public access) for more than 24 hours;
  - ▶ appears in an editorial context only (no sponsorship, merchandising or advertising integrated with or around the content);
  - ▶ is not posted live, and is accompanied by links back to NFL.com and to the club website, www.packers.com in this instance.
- ▶ The 90-second limit does not include video/audio material that is comprised entirely of a credentialed media employee providing commentary or analysis ("Talking Head" reporting), including pre- or post-game stand-up material shot on the field or other facility location.
- ▶ While a game is in progress, any forms of accounts of the game must be sufficiently time-delayed and limited in amount (e.g., score updates with detail given only in quarterly game updates, fewer than 10 photographs during the game) so that the Accredited Organization's game coverage cannot be used as a substitute for, or otherwise approximate, authorized play-by-play accounts.
- ▶ The Packers do not permit raw video of any regular-season practices to be posted on the Internet (including Vine, other video applications).

### LIVE BLOGGING/TWITTER POLICY

The Packers ask that members of the media utilizing such technology adhere to the following guidelines, similar to policies already in place:

- ▶ NO live reports can be filed from the practice field.
- ▶ NO detailed speculation as to the potential nature or severity of an injury or level of practice participation until Coach McCarthy has addressed it following practice. Once again, acknowledging that an injury occurred and providing general details (i.e. 'right leg...' or 'left wrist...') is permitted, but anything beyond that would be purely speculative and possibly inaccurate, likewise with levels of practice participation.
- ▶ NO entries that violate the team's policy in regards to practice information (schemes, formations, etc.) or private team communication.

### MISCELLANEOUS

For their safety and the safety of Packers players, media are requested to adhere to the following:

- ▶ Any member of the media who does not have a credential will be asked to obtain one and sign the necessary waiver at the P.R. office or practice field before gaining admittance.
- ▶ All items brought to practice (cameras, bags, equipment, etc.) should be stored against the wall, away from the field, for safety reasons.
- ▶ **Food** is not allowed during practice. **Bottled drinks** are allowed, as long as they are stored in a personal bag against the wall, and consumed near the wall.
- ▶ Any equipment not stored should be held at all times; when avoiding oncoming action, it is important that anything in your possession moves as you move.
- ▶ When asked to move, media should move immediately.
- ▶ No players or coaches may be actively engaged in conversation or interviewed while practice is in progress.

### CELL PHONES

The team does not tolerate cell-phone distractions at practice. Please set all phones to off or vibrate. Any phone conversations should be conducted

well away from the field, while lengthy conversations must be conducted outside of the practice gate.

## **17 Davante Adams, WR, Rookie, Fresno State**

- Led the nation in receptions (131) and receptions per game (10.1), while ranking second in the country in receiving yards (1,718) and receiving yards per game (132.2) as a sophomore in 2013.

- Caught 24 TD passes in '13, eight more than any player in the country and the most in school and Mountain West Conference history.

- Set Fresno State career records for receptions (233) and TD catches (38), despite playing just two seasons for the Bulldogs.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games with one start, appearing on offense and special teams, and has 10 catches for 90 yards (9.0 avg.) and one TD.

- By starting at San Francisco last season in Week 1, he became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start the season opener at LT since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since Ken Ruettggers in 1985.

- Was the only NFL rookie to start all 16 games at left tackle in 2013.

#### **42 Morgan Burnett, S, 5th Year, Georgia Tech**

• Started each of the final 13 games in 2013, posting 106 tackles (77 solo), nine passes defensed and a career-high and team-leading three fumble

recoveries, one of which he returned for his first career TD.

• Has started 50 games between the two safety positions since the start of 2011.

• In 2010, joined Tom Flynn (1984) and Nick Collins (2005) as the only Green Bay rookies to open the season as a starter at safety since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games at SS and leads the team with 47 tackles (39 solo)...Also has recorded a pass defensed and a forced fumble and has added two tackles on special teams.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Appeared on all 70 defensive snaps and tied for the team lead with eight tackles (six solo).

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** One of two defensive players to play all 71 snaps (A.J. Hawk)...Led the team with 10 tackles (eight solo) and added a pass defensed and a tackle on special teams...Helped limit the Jets to 166 net passing yards.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Played all 75 defensive snaps and registered four tackles (three solo).

▶**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Led the secondary with 14 tackles (12 solo), a tackle total that matched his career high (vs. New Orleans, Sept. 8, 2011)...Added a tackle on special teams.

• Played in all 16 games for five straight seasons (2008-12), and saw a streak of 92 consecutive games played (including playoffs) snapped when he suffered a hamstring injury in Week 2 last season.

• Has been voted by teammates as a playoff captain each of the last four postseasons, earning selection each time as one of the two representatives for the special teams units.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games, seeing time on defense and special teams...Ranks second on the team with four special teams tackles and has added one tackle on defense.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Saw 19 snaps on special teams, which was tied for the second most on the team...Recorded two tackles on special teams.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played a team-high 23 snaps on special teams and also five snaps as the dime back.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Recorded a tackle on special teams, bringing down WR Jeremy Ross at the Detroit 17 on the opening kickoff of the game...Appeared on a team-high 19 plays on special teams.

• Played in 38 games with 20 starts in his three seasons at Alabama and registered 100 tackles (58 solo), including four tackles for a loss, seven interceptions, a forced fumble and 17 passes defensed.

• Led the Southeastern Conference with a career-high five INTs as a sophomore in 2012.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games and has recorded 21 tackles (16 solo), a sack, an interception, three passes defensed, two QB hits and two pressures...Also has posted a fumble recovery and a tackle on special

teams.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Saw 40 snaps on defense and 19 on special teams in his pro debut, and made an impact in both phases...Became the first Packer (since 1982) to register a sack and a fumble recovery in his NFL debut...Chased down QB Russell Wilson for a zero-yard sack on Seattle's opening drive...Later in the quarter, recovered a fumble at the Seattle 34 after Seahawks S Earl Thomas muffed the catch on a Tim Masthay punt, a turnover that helped set up FB John Kuhn's 2-yard TD run...Finished the game with six tackles (four solo) and a pass defended.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Appeared on 56 snaps, seeing even more significant action in the second half after FS Micah Hyde departed with a knee injury in the third quarter...Registered a solo tackle and helped limit the Jets to 166 net passing yards...Added a tackle on punt coverage.

### **18 Randall Cobb, WR, 4th Year, Kentucky**

• Was limited to just six games in 2013 due to a knee injury. Through Week 6, led the team in receptions with 29 and ranked No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.

• Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.

• With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.

• Ranked No. 2 in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.7) in 2011, setting a franchise rookie record with 941 kickoff return yards on the season.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games and has 24 catches for 273 yards (11.4 avg.) and a team-high six TDs...Leads all NFL wide receivers and ranks No. 2 in the league in TD catches, trailing only Broncos TE Julius Thomas (seven)...Has returned six punts for 48 yards (8.0 avg.).

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Finished with six receptions for 58 yards (9.7 avg), including a 3-yard TD grab in the fourth quarter...Handled punt-return duties, but did not have any returns (two fair catches).

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Caught two TD passes, his third straight regular-season game with a TD catch and his second two-TD game over that span...The first score came with six seconds remaining in the first half when he hauled in a 6-yard pass from Rodgers...The second, which came with just under six minutes remaining in the third quarter, was a 1-yard grab that put the Packers up 22-21...Caught a pass from Rodgers on the next play for the two-point conversion, Green Bay's first since Sept. 9, 2012, vs. San Francisco (Rodgers-Jordy Nelson pass).

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Appeared on 44 plays and caught three passes for 29 yards (9.7 avg.)...Posted a season-long 22-yard punt return early in the first quarter.

▶**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Played all 52 offensive snaps and caught seven passes for 113 yards (16.1 avg.) and two TDs, his third game with two TD catches in the last five contests...Had a game-long 46-yard grab

down to the Chicago 2 in the fourth quarter...Made the catch over the middle at the Chicago 33 before evading CB Kyle Fuller with a fake and taking it down the sideline to the 2-yard line...Went over the 2,000-yard receiving mark for his career on the 46-yarder...Hauled in a 22-yard TD grab over CB Isaiah Frey in the end zone late in the first half to give Green Bay a 21-17 edge, a lead they would never relinquish...Also caught a 3-yard TD pass early in the fourth quarter, bringing his season total to five TD catches, the first Packer to catch five TD passes in the first four games of a season since Billy Howton and Gary Knafelc both did so in 1956...Joined Jordy Nelson as they became the first Green Bay players to both register 100 receiving yards and two TD catches in the same game since Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler hit those marks vs. the St. Louis Cardinals on Dec. 21, 1969.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Tied for the team lead with three receptions for 34 yards (11.3 avg.), highlighted by his 8-yard TD catch in the first quarter that started the Green Bay scoring...Lined up in the slot, made a move in the end zone to shed CB Captain Munnerlyn for the 8-yard scoring grab...The TD was his sixth of the season as he became the first Green Bay player since Howton (seven) in 1956 to post six or more receiving TDs in the first five games of a season.

### **2 Mason Crosby, K, 8th Year, Colorado**

• Set an NFL record with 903 points in his first seven seasons (2007-13), topping the previous league record held by Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).

• With 933 career points, ranks No. 2 on the all-time franchise scoring list behind only K Ryan Longwell (1,054).

• Is one of only three players in NFL history to register three or more 140-point seasons (Stephen Gostkowski, David Akers).

• Has kicked the six longest field goals in franchise history (58-yarder in 2011, two 57-yarders in 2013, 56-yarders in 2010 and 2011, 55-yarder in 2014).

• Set a franchise record with 23 consecutive field goals made (Week 13, 2010-Week 12, 2011), topping Chris Jacke's mark of 17 straight in 1993.

**2014 Season:** Has converted five of his six field-goal attempts and all 15 extra points...Has connected on both of his attempts from 50-plus yards (55, 53), which is tied for No. 2 in the NFL...Has recorded 14 touchbacks on 27 kickoffs (51.9 percent).

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Connected on his lone field-goal attempt of the evening, a 23-yarder in the second quarter, to bring his streak of consecutive regular-season field goals made to 15 (ties Chris Jacke, 1989-90, for the third-longest streak in franchise history)...Also marked his franchise-record 16th straight regular-season game with at least one field goal, surpassing Longwell's record of 15 (2004-05)...Added two touchbacks on four kickoffs.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Made all three of his field-goal attempts, bringing his streak of consecutive FGs made in the regular season to 18, the second-longest streak in franchise history behind only his own streak of 23 straight from 2010-11...Drilled a 55-yard FG in the second quarter, the longest by a Green Bay player ever at Lambeau Field...It was his 20th FG of 50-plus yards, further extending his team record...Also extended his franchise record by making at least one FG in his 17th consecutive game.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Saw his team-record streak of 17 consecutive games with a field goal come to an end as his only points came on a first-quarter extra point...Did not have any field-goal attempts for the first time since Week 1 of 2013...Registered one touchback on two kickoffs.

▶**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Scored eight points, drilling a 53-yard field goal early in the third quarter and all five of his extra points...Saw his streak of consecutive field goal made come to an end at 19 straight, the second-longest streak in team history, when his 38-yard attempt in the fourth quarter was blocked by DE Willie Young...Posted a season-high five touchbacks on seven kickoffs.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Did not have any field-goal attempts for the second time in three games, but connected on all six of his extra points...Registered two touchbacks on the evening.

### **76 Mike Daniels, DT, 3rd Year, Iowa**

- Emerged as a force in his second season in 2013, tying for sixth in the NFL among DTs with 6.5 sacks, the most in a season by a Green Bay defensive lineman since DT B.J. Raji posted the same total in 2010.

- Appeared in 14 games as a rookie in 2012 and finished with 19 tackles (11 solo), two sacks, a team-high two fumble recoveries (one for a TD) and a pass defended.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games and leads the defensive line with 26 tackles (16 solo)...Has posted a team-high 2.5 sacks and leads the defense in both QB hits (seven) and pressures (eight).

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at RDE and registered a career-high eight tackles (five solo), which was tied for the team lead.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started at DT and led the defensive line with six tackles (five solo) and a sack...Added a team-high three QB hits and two pressures...Brought down RB Chris Johnson for a 6-yard loss on a carry at the end of the first quarter...Posted a QB hit on Geno Smith as his pass intended for TE Zach Sudfeld came up short and was intercepted by CB Tramon Williams at the Green Bay 3 late in the first half, a turnover that led to seven points as the Packers cut the Jets' lead to 21-16 at the half...Registered his first sack of the season on New York's final drive as he beat LG Brian Winters with an inside move and brought Smith down for a 7-yard loss despite being held by Winters on the play.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started at RDE and registered five tackles (two solo) and a pressure...Appeared on 47 plays, helping limit the Lions to an average of 3.0 yards per carry (115 yards on 38 attempts).

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Started at RDE and appeared on 38 snaps...Recorded three tackles (one solo) and a pressure.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Started at RDE and registered four tackles (three solo), 1.5 sacks, four QB hits and four pressures...Pushed G Charlie Johnson aside and then fought off C John Sullivan on his 8-yard sack of QB Christian Ponder in the second quarter...Fought off a double-team by Sullivan and Johnson on his shared 10-yard sack of Ponder with DT Letroy Guion on the final play of the first half.

### **91 Jayrone Elliott, LB, Rookie, Toledo**

- Led the NFL with five sacks in the preseason, highlighted by a three-sack effort at St. Louis (Aug. 16).

- Earned first-team All-Mid-American Conference honors as a senior in 2013 after recording 70 tackles (43 solo) and team highs in tackles for a loss (14), sacks (nine) and forced fumbles (five).

**2014 Season:** Has played in three games and was inactive for two others...Has posted one solo tackle on defense and two tackles on special teams.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4) - vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Inactive (healthy scratch).

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Made his NFL debut, appearing on 15 plays on special teams.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Played on defense and special teams, seeing the first action of his career on defense...Appeared on 14 defensive snaps and posted a solo tackle...Registered a career-high two tackles on special teams.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Appeared on 23 plays on special teams.

### **10 Matt Flynn, QB, 7th Year, Louisiana State**

- Played for the Packers and the Raiders in 2013, starting a career-high five games on the season, with four of those starts coming with Green Bay (Weeks 13-16).

- Led the Packers to a 37-36 win last season at Dallas in Week 15 after trailing 26-3 at the half, matching the largest comeback in franchise history (23 points vs. Los Angeles Rams, Sept. 12, 1982).

- Served as the No. 2 quarterback for Green Bay behind Aaron Rodgers from 2008-11.

- Threw for 480 yards and six TDs for Green Bay in the 2011 season finale vs. Detroit, franchise records at the time that were later matched by

Rodgers.

**2014 Season:** Has served as the No. 2 quarterback for all five games, seeing action for the first time in Week 5 vs. Minnesota.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4) – at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Dressed as the No. 2 QB, but did not play.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Entered the game at QB on the Packers' first series in the fourth quarter and directed the offense on its final three possessions...Completed 3 of 5 passes for 22 yards with one interception.

### **61 Brett Goode, LS, 7th Year, Arkansas**

- One of only two Packers (K Mason Crosby) to appear in all 101 regular-season games since 2008.

- Has snapped for all six of the longest field goals in franchise history (all by Crosby).

- Has registered 12 tackles on special teams and a fumble recovery during his career.

- Was originally signed as injury replacement for rookie LS J.J. Jansen following the 2008 preseason finale.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games, handling snapping duties for all punts and placements.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Handled snapping duties for all punts and placements.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Handled snapping duties, including for Crosby's 55-yard field goal in the second quarter, the longest ever by a Green Bay player at Lambeau Field...Helped P Tim Masthay post a career-best (min. four punts) net punting average of 46.5, also the third-best mark in team history (since 1976).

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Helped Masthay register a 43.0-yard gross average and a 39.8-yard net average on his five punts, including two placed inside the 20.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Held for Crosby's 53-yard FG in the third quarter and all five of his extra points.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Snapped for Masthay as he set the franchise record (since 1976) for the most career punts inside the 20-yard line (108), surpassing Craig Hentrich (104) for the team mark...Helped Masthay place five of six punts inside the 20-yard line, which tied the single-game team record (Masthay, at N.Y. Jets, Oct. 31, 2010; David Beverly, vs. Chicago, Oct. 28, 1978).

### **39 Demetri Goodson, CB, Rookie, Baylor**

- Earned honorable mention All-Big 12 recognition as a senior in 2013, appearing in 11 games with 10 starts and recording career highs in tackles (26), interceptions (three) and passes defended (16).

- Played in just eight games during his first two seasons at Baylor (2011-12), sustaining season-ending injuries both of those years.

- Played basketball for three seasons (2008-11) at Gonzaga, starting 68 of 69 games in his final two years for the Zags.

**2014 Season:** Has been inactive for all five games.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Inactive due to a concussion sustained in the preseason finale vs. Kansas City (Aug. 28).

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Returned to practice during the week, but was inactive (healthy scratch).

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21) – vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Inactive (healthy scratch).

### **98 Letroy Guion, DT, 7th Year, Florida State**

- Signed with Green Bay as a free agent in March 2014 after spending his first six seasons in the league with the Minnesota Vikings, where he appeared in 68 games with 31 starts.

- Started all 28 games he appeared in for the Vikings over the past two seasons (2012-13), recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.

- Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012 (49-yard attempt vs. Oakland, Nov. 20, 2011; 43-yard attempt vs. San Francisco,

Sept. 23, 2012).

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games and has registered 21 tackles (10 solo), 1.5 sacks, three QB hits and four pressures.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at NT in his Green Bay debut, appearing on 36 plays, and recorded three tackles (one solo).

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started at DT and registered five tackles (two solo), the second most on the defensive line.

### **26 DuJuan Harris, RB, 2nd Year, Troy**

• Played in the final four regular-season games and both playoff contests for Green Bay in 2012 after originally joining the team as a member of the practice squad on Oct. 24.

• In six games in 2012 (including playoffs), rushed for 257 yards and four TDs on 62 carries (4.1 avg.), with nine catches for 81 yards (9.0 avg.). Posted rushing TDs in both of Green Bay's playoff games that season, tying a team record for most consecutive playoff games with a rushing TD.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games, returning seven kickoffs for 169 yards (24.1 avg.)...Ranks No. 9 in the NFL in kickoff-return average... Also has carried four times for 9 yards (2.3 avg.) and has one reception for 11 yards.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Returned two kickoffs for 40 yards (20.0 avg.) and had one carry for 7 yards.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Returned two kickoffs for 58 yards (29.0 avg.), highlighted by a career-long 41-yard return in the second quarter...Also had an 11-yard reception.

• Has posted 100-plus tackles in four consecutive seasons (2010-13) and in seven of his eight years in the NFL (2006-08, 2010-13).

• Has led the team in tackles five times during his career (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012-13), which ties LB Nick Barnett for the franchise record (since 1975).

• Has appeared in 131 of a possible 133 regular-season games in his eight-plus seasons (2006-14), starting 128 of them.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games and ranks second on the team with 45 tackles (33 solo)...Has added two QB hits, four pressures and a pass defended.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at BLB and led the linebackers with seven tackles (five solo)...Added a QB hit and a pressure.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started at MLB as the defense opened in a 4-3 alignment and tied for the lead among linebackers with nine tackles (four

solo)...Added a QB hit and a pressure.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started at BLB and posted six tackles (all solo).

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Started at BLB and played all 78 defensive snaps...Led the team with a season-high 15 tackles (12 solo),

• As a senior in 2013, caught 83 passes for 1,572 yards (18.9 avg.) and 14 TDs, including a career-high eight 100-yard receiving games.

**2014 Season:** Has played in two games and was inactive for the other three contests.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4) – at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Inactive (healthy scratch).

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Made his NFL debut, seeing time on one offensive play and five special teams plays.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Registered the first receptions of his career, finishing with two catches for 16 yards (8.0 avg.)...His first career reception came on a third-and-5 from the Green Bay 25 when he hauled in a 9-yard pass from QB Matt Flynn on a slant with CB Xavier Rhodes covering him.

### **59 Brad Jones, LB, 6th Year, Colorado**

• Started 22 games over the past two seasons (2012-13) at ILB after making the transition from OLB prior to the start of the 2012 campaign.

• In 2013, entered the season as a starter for the first time since 2010 and opened a career-high 12 games at "Mack" LB.

• Finished the season third on the team with 98 tackles (73 solo), three sacks, two passes defended, a forced fumble and the first fumble recovery of his career.

• Finished with 19 tackles (10 solo), 3.5 sacks and a fumble recovery. Also blocked an extra-point attempt on special teams.

• His sack total led all Packers rookies and he was one of only two Green Bay rookies to recover a fumble.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games, starting three of them, and has posted 14 tackles (eight solo), a sack, four QB hits and five pressures.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Opened at LDE, his first career NFL start, and recorded a career-high five tackles (four solo).

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played 25 snaps on defense and registered three tackles (two solo), a QB hit and a pressure.

• Also earned second-team All-Pro recognition from *The Associated Press* in '11.

• Has played in 112 of 117 games (123 of 128 including playoffs) during his seven-plus seasons in Green Bay.

• Has scored a touchdown each of the last five postseasons (2009-13), the only player in the NFL to accomplish the feat over that span.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games, rushing four times for 11 yards (2.8 avg.) and a TD...Also has two receptions for 8 yards (4.0 avg.)...Has recorded a tackle on special teams.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Saw eight plays on offense and eight on special teams, scoring on a 2-yard run up the middle late in the first quarter to put the Packers up 7-3.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Had a 3-yard carry, a 5-yard reception and added a tackle on punt coverage.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Saw limited action on offense and special teams.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Saw limited time on offense and special teams.

100-yard rushing games (four).

- Was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press*, joining RB John Brockington (1971) as the only Packers to win the award since its inception in 1957.

- Was selected to the Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Vikings RB Adrian Peterson, the first Green Bay rookie RB to be named to the all-star game since Brockington in '71.

- Led all NFL rookies in rushing yards in 2013 and finished No. 8 in the league among all players.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games and leads the team with 66 carries for 266 yards (4.0 avg.) and three TDs...Also has 10 receptions for 76 yards (7.6 avg.).

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started in the season opener for the second straight year and rushed for 34 yards on 12 carries (2.8 avg.)...Added three receptions for 11 yards (3.7 avg.)...Left the game early in the fourth quarter due to a concussion.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Was back in the starting lineup after sustaining a concussion in Week 1, and paced the team with 43 rushing yards on 13 carries (3.3 avg.)...Added two receptions for 18 yards (9.0 avg.).

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Rushed for 36 yards on 11 carries (3.3 avg.), highlighted by a season-long 17-yarder up the middle in the fourth quarter...Added a 9-yard reception.

### **70 T.J. Lang, G, 6th Year, Eastern Michigan**

- Has started 52 games since 2011, which is tied for No. 1 on the team over that span (CB Tramon Williams).

- In his first three seasons as a starter (2011-13), helped the Packers rank No. 3 in the NFL in scoring (29.4 ppg), No. 6 in total offense (388.2 ypg) and No. 4 in passing offense (275.9 ypg) over that span.

- Has started 55 games as a pro, opening contests at four different positions (27 at LG, 21 at RG, five at RT, two at LT).

- Saw the first action of his career at center in 2013 and has now played all five positions in a game during his NFL career.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games at RG.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at RG and played all 62 snaps.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played all 71 snaps and protected QB Aaron Rodgers as he threw for 346 yards, the most registered by a QB against the Jets since Saints QB Drew Brees threw for 382 last season in Week 9.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started at RG and appeared on all 53 offensive snaps.

▶**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Appeared on all 52 snaps and helped protect Rodgers as he threw for 302 yards and four TDs on 22-of-28 passing for a 151.2 passer rating, the second-best single-game mark of Rodgers' career (min. 20 attempts) and the fourth-best rating in franchise history... Part of a line that allowed just one sack for 0 yards on the afternoon and

helped the offense score on six of seven possessions.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Helped the offense rack up 42 points and a season-high 156 rushing yards on 28 attempts (5.6 avg.), including RB Eddie Lacy's season-best 105 yards and two TDs on 13 carries (8.1 avg.)...Lacy's average of 8.1 yards per carry was a career high (min. 10 attempts) and was the best average by a Green Bay RB in a 100-yard game since Brandon Jackson rushed for 115 yards on 10 attempts (11.5 avg.) at Washington on Oct. 10, 2010...Cleared out DT Sharrif Floyd on Lacy's 17-yard run in the first quarter...Appeared on all 54 offensive snaps.

### **57 Jamari Lattimore, LB, 4th Year, Middle Tenn. State**

- Has evolved into one of the club's core players on special teams, having played in 29 games over the past two seasons (2012-13) and posted 15 coverage tackles, two onside kick recoveries and a blocked punt over that span.

- Was voted as one of six postseason captains by his teammates on the eve of the 2012 playoffs, joining CB Jarrett Bush as the two representatives for the special-teams units.

- Made the transition from outside linebacker as a rookie in 2011 to the inside in 2012 and continues to provide depth at both positions.

**2014 Season:** Has played in five games with four starts...Ranks No. 3 on the team with 36 tackles (22 solo) and has added an interception and two passes defended.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Appeared on a team-high 25 plays on special teams.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started at LOLB as the Packers opened in a 4-3 alignment, his second start in the last three regular-season games (Week 17 at Chicago last season)...Tied for the lead among linebackers with nine tackles (five solo).

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started at MLB and led the team with a season-high 11 tackles (eight solo)...Left the game in the third quarter (cramps) but did return.

- One of five team captains, he was part of an Ohio State line that helped the team set school records for points scored (637), yards per carry (6.8), touchdowns (87) and TD passes (38) in '13.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games at center.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Became the first Green Bay rookie to open at C in Week 1 since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger...Became the first NFL rookie drafted in the fifth round or later to start at center in the season opener since Philadelphia's Jason Kelce in 2011...Appeared on all 62 offensive snaps.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played all 71 snaps and protected QB Aaron Rodgers as he threw for 346 yards, the most posted by a QB against the Jets since Saints QB Drew Brees threw for 382 last season in Week 9.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started at C and appeared on all 53 offensive snaps.

▶**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Appeared on all 52 snaps and helped protect Rodgers as he threw for 302 yards and four TDs on 22-of-28 passing for a 151.2 passer rating, the second-best single-game mark of Rodgers' career (min. 20 attempts) and the fourth-best rating in franchise history...

Part of a line that allowed just one sack for 0 yards on the afternoon and helped the offense score on six of seven possessions.

### **8 Tim Masthay, P, 5th Year, Kentucky**

- Ranks No. 1 in team history (min. 150 attempts) in both career gross punting average (44.4) and career net punting average (38.8).

- Set a franchise record (since 1976) with a 38.95-yard net punting average in 2013, and now holds the top four single-season marks (2010-13) in team annals.

- Holds two of the top four single-season gross punting averages in team history (44.6 in 2013).

- Ranks No. 1 in team annals (since 1976) for the most career punts placed inside the 20 with 108, having surpassed Craig Hentrich's mark (104) in Week 5 vs. Minnesota.

**2014 Season:** Has registered a 45.7-yard gross average and a net average of 42.6 yards on 19 punts this season...Ranks No. 5 in the league in net punting average through Week 5...Is tied for No. 10 in the league with eight punts inside the 20.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Punted four times on the evening and posted a 38.3-yard gross average and a net average of 37.5...Booted a 57-yarder in the fourth quarter and placed one punt inside the 20...Also kicked off once on the evening.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Posted a career-best (min. four punts) net punting average of 46.5 yards, topping his previous high of 46.2 yards at Kansas City on Dec. 18, 2011...The 46.5-yard net average was also the third-best mark in team history (since 1976)...Had a 49.3-yard gross average on his four punts.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Punted five times and recorded a gross average of 43.0 and a net average of 39.8...Placed two punts inside the 20.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Did not have any punts on the afternoon, the second straight season he has had a game with zero punts (at Minnesota, Oct. 27, 2013).

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Tied a franchise record (since 1976) with five punts placed inside the 20, matching his mark set at the N.Y. Jets (Oct. 31, 2010) and David Beverly's set vs. Chicago (Oct. 28, 1978)...With the five punts inside the 20, brought his career total to 108 as he surpassed Hentrich (104) for the franchise record...Posted three 58-yard punts, with all of them coming in the first half...Finished with a 45.8-yard net average on the night, his career high for a game with six-plus punts.

### **52 Clay Matthews, LB, 6th Year, Southern California**

- Ranks fifth in franchise history with 51.0 career sacks.

- Became the first player in franchise history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the league (2009-12).

- Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the league.

- Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting in 2010.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games and has recorded 18 tackles (12 solo), a sack, an interception, a forced fumble, three passes defended, five QB hits and seven pressures.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Brought down WR Percy Harvin for a 2-yard loss on a short pass early in the second quarter, also forcing a fumble on the play, one that Harvin recovered...Finished the game with five tackles (three solo) and a pressure.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started at ROLB as the Packers opened in a 4-3 alignment and registered five tackles (four solo), a sack, a pass defended, a QB hit and two pressures...Came free from the right side early in the fourth quarter and batted down a Geno Smith pass...On the Jets' next series, chased down QB Michael Vick for a 3-yard sack.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started at LOLB and posted four tackles (three solo), a QB hit, two pressures and a pass defended...Left the game in the fourth quarter due to a groin injury and did not return.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Registered his first interception since Dec. 25, 2011 (vs. Chicago), picking off a Jay Cutler pass in the third quarter that was deflected by CB Tramon Williams...The pass, intended for WR Josh Morgan near the 20-yard line, bounced back to Matthews at the Green Bay 25 and was returned 40 yards by him down the left sideline to the Chicago 35...The turnover resulted in seven points for Green Bay as QB Aaron Rodgers connected with WR Jordy Nelson on an 11-yard TD pass six plays later...Added two tackles (one solo).

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Played 56 snaps and registered two tackles (one solo), three QB hits and a pressure.

### **55 Andy Mulumba, LB, 2nd Year, Eastern Michigan**

- Appeared in 14 games with three starts as a rookie in 2013, recording 34 tackles (17 solo), a sack and a fumble recovery.

- One of three rookie free agents to make the opening-day roster last season, he was tied with CB Micah Hyde for the most starts by a Green Bay rookie on the defensive side of the ball with three.

- Was tied for No. 6 on the team with five tackles on special teams in 2013.

**2014 Season:** Appeared in the first two games on special teams and registered one tackle...Was placed on season-ending injured reserve on Sept. 19 due to a knee injury.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Saw seven snaps on special teams.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Appeared on 21 plays on special teams...Brought WR Jalen Saunders down for no gain at the New York 36 on a fourth-quarter punt...Sustained a significant knee injury, one that would end his season, in the fourth quarter covering the next Tim Masthay punt.

### **96 Mike Neal, LB/DE, 5th Year, Purdue**

- Made the move from DE to a hybrid OLB/DE role in 2013 and established personal bests for games played (16), starts (10), tackles (61), solo tackles (39), sacks (five) and INTs (one).

- Appeared in 11 games in 2012, finishing with 18 tackles (10 solo) and ranking second on the team behind LB Clay Matthews with 4½ sacks.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games with one start and has registered 17 tackles (eight solo), a sack, five QB hits and four pressures.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Registered five tackles (three solo) and two pressures.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started at RDE as the defense opened in a 4-3 alignment...Posted three tackles (two solo), two QB hits and a pressure.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Posted his first sack of the season, bringing down QB Matthew Stafford for a 2-yard loss on a third down in the second quarter to force the Lions to settle for a field goal...On the play, ran a stunt with LB Clay Matthews and beat LT Riley Reiff before chasing Stafford down from behind at the Green Bay 12...Finished with five tackles (three solo) and a pressure.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Appeared on 39 defensive snaps and posted two solo tackles.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Played 47 snaps on defense and registered two solo tackles and two QB hits.

### **87 Jordy Nelson, WR, 7th Year, Kansas State**

- Posted a career-high 85 catches for a career-best 1,314 yards (15.5 avg.) last season, becoming just the fourth player in franchise history to register 85-plus receptions and 1,300-plus receiving yards in the same season.

- Led the NFL with 19 catches of 25-plus yards in 2013, the most by a Green Bay player since STATS LLC began recording the statistic in 1994.

- Is tied for No. 5 in the league with 34 TD catches since 2011 and ranks

No. 5 in the NFL (min. 150 receptions) over that span with a 16.3-yard receiving average.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games and leads the team in receptions (34) and receiving yards (525)...Ranks No. 2 in the league in receiving yards and is tied for No. 3 in the NFL in receptions...Has caught four TD passes and has posted three games with nine-plus receptions.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started and led the team with nine receptions for 83 yards (9.2 avg.), the most catches he has posted in a season opener...It marked his second straight game with nine or more receptions (a career-high 10 at Chicago in Week 17 in 2013), the first Green Bay player to accomplish that feat since WR Donald Driver in 2004.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Posted a career-best 209 yards on nine receptions (23.2 avg.), only the 11th 200-yard receiving game in the history of the franchise and the highest total since Don Beebe's 220-yard output vs. San Francisco on Oct. 14, 1996...Marked his third straight game with nine or more catches as he joined Don Hutson (three straight in 1942) as the only players in franchise history to accomplish that feat...With the game tied at 24 late in the third quarter, caught a game-winning 80-yard TD pass from Aaron Rodgers on the opening play of the drive...It marked his fourth TD catch of 80-plus yards during his career, which ties WR Greg Jennings for the franchise record...On the play, ran an out-and-up move at the Green Bay 30 to beat CB Dee Milliner, caught the ball near midfield and then made a cutback move on S Calvin Pryor as he took it the rest of the way for the score...Set a team record for the most receptions in the first two games of a season with 18, topping Ken Payne's mark of 17 in 1975, and his 292 receiving yards are the second most in franchise annals through two games behind only James Lofton's 323-yard total in 1983.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Led the team in receptions for the third straight game this season the fourth straight game dating back to last season, hauling in five passes for a team-high 59 yards (11.8 avg.)...With the five catches, brought his three-game total to 23, a franchise record for the most catches by a Green Bay player through the first three contests (previous high was 21 by three players).

▶**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Matched his career high with 10 receptions for 108 yards (10.8 avg.) and two TDs, his second 10-catch game in the last five contests (at Chicago, Dec. 29, 2013)...Brought his four-game total to 33 receptions, a franchise record for the most catches in the first four games of a season (RB Edgar Bennett, 29 in 1994)...Caught a 3-yard TD pass in the second quarter, beating CB Kyle Fuller on a fade in the left corner of the end zone...Made a leaping grab for an 11-yard score in the third quarter, absorbing a hit from CB Tim Jennings on the catch near the back of the end zone...Joined Randall Cobb as they became the first Green Bay players to both post 100 receiving yards and two TD catches in the same game since Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler hit those marks vs. the St. Louis Cardinals on Dec. 21, 1969...Went over the 5,000-yard mark for his career on a 15-yard reception on a third-and-8 in the second quarter...Appeared on all 52 offensive snaps.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** His lone reception of the evening was an impactful one, catching a 66-yard TD pass from Rodgers in the first quarter to put Green Bay up 14-0...Sped past CB Captain Munneryn, who passed him off to S Harrison Smith, before making an out-and-up move on Smith to get open and catch Rodgers' deep pass perfectly in stride at the Minnesota 20 before taking it the rest of the way for the score.

#### **64 Mike Pennel, DT, Rookie, Colorado State-Pueblo**

• Finished his collegiate career at Colorado State-Pueblo after spending a year at Arizona State (2012) and two years at Scottsdale Community College (2010-11).

• Played in all 12 games with 10 starts at CSU-Pueblo as a senior in 2013 and recorded 36 tackles (15 solo), including six for a loss, three sacks, three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and four passes defended.

**2014 Season:** Has played in two games, was inactive for two contests and dressed but did not play in the other...Has registered five tackles (three solo).

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Inactive (healthy scratch).

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Was on the 46-man gameday roster for the first time as a pro, but did not see any action.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Inactive (healthy scratch).

▶**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Made his NFL debut, seeing time on 22 defensive plays and recording two tackles (one solo).

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Played a season-high 26 snaps and posted a season-best three tackles (two solo).

#### **56 Julius Peppers, LB, 13th Year, North Carolina**

• Has been selected to the Pro Bowl eight times during his career (2004-06, 2008-12) and has been named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times (2004, 2006, 2010).

• Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.

• Since entering the NFL in 2002, ranks No. 3 in the league in sacks (120.0) and is tied for No. 4 in forced fumbles (40).

• Is the only player in NFL history (since 1982) to register 100 sacks (119.5) and 10 interceptions (10).

• Has posted eight double-digit sack seasons since 2002, which is tied with Bears DE Jared Allen for No. 1 in the league over that span.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games and has posted 13 tackles (11 solo), a sack, an interception that he returned for a TD, six QB hits, five pressures, three passes defended, a forced fumble and a fumble recovery.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at ROLB in his Green Bay debut, recording four tackles (all solo), a QB hit and a pressure.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started at LDE as the defense opened in a 4-3 alignment...Registered three tackles (two solo), two QB hits, two pressures and matched his career high with two passes defended...His passes defended came on back-to-back plays in the fourth quarter, with the first one a near-interception as he dropped back into coverage to make a leaping breakup of a pass intended for RB Chris Johnson down the sideline...Early in the third quarter, rushed from his LDE spot, avoided a cut-block by RT Breno Giacomini and hit QB Geno Smith on a play that was initially ruled a sack/fumble before it was reversed and ruled a forward pass.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started at ROLB and registered his first sack in a Green Bay uniform, one that came with the Lions in position to extend their 12-7 lead in the third quarter...On a second-and-goal at the Green Bay 7, came off the left side and blew past RT Garrett Reynolds to sack QB Matthew Stafford and rip the ball out, a fumble that Peppers recovered at the Green Bay 13...Also came untouched off the left side midway through the second quarter to stop RB Reggie Bush for a 4-yard loss...Added a team-high three QB hits on the afternoon.

▶**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Started at LOLB as the team opened up in its nickel package and posted two tackles (one solo) against his former team...Played in his 100th consecutive game, appearing on 52 defensive snaps.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Started at ROLB and posted two tackles, a half-sack, an interception, a pass defended and two pressures...Lined up on the right side and dropped back into coverage, picking off QB Christian Ponder's pass intended for WR Cordarrelle Patterson at the Minnesota 49 before taking it across the field and down the left sideline for the score...The INT was the 10th of his career as he became the first player in NFL history (since 1982) to post 10-plus career INTs and 100-plus career sacks...It was his first score since a 13-yard INT return for a TD at Arizona on Nov. 1, 2009, when he was with the Carolina Panthers...Came off the left end and evaded RT Phil Loadholt on his shared 0-yard sack of Ponder with LB A.J. Hawk early in the third quarter...Added two tackles (one solo) and two pressures.

#### **53 Nick Perry, LB, 3rd Year, Southern California**

• Battled injuries in each of his first two seasons, but has been productive when healthy, tallying six sacks and three forced fumbles in 20 professional contests.

• Posted career highs in every statistical category in 2013, including games played (11), starts (six), tackles (42), solo tackles (22), sacks (four), forced fumbles (three) and passes defended (one).

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games and has registered 12 tackles (10 solo), two sacks, and two pressures.

▶ **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Posted two solo tackles and a pass defended.

▶ **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Appeared on 21 plays and recorded two solo tackles.

▶ **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Played 24 snaps and registered a season-high four tackles (two solo).

### **81 Andrew Quarless, TE, 5th Year, Penn State**

• Moved into a starting role in 2013 in Week 8 following TE Jermichael Finley's season-ending neck injury and responded with career highs in every category, catching 32 passes for 312 yards (9.8 avg.) and two TDs.

• Was sidelined for the entire 2012 campaign as he continued his rehabilitation from a significant knee injury sustained at the N.Y. Giants in Week 13 of the 2011 season.

• Played in 23 games with five starts in his first two seasons (2010-11).

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games with two starts and leads the Green Bay tight ends with 10 catches for 96 yards (9.6 avg.) and a TD.

▶ **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Didn't start, but saw action on 46 plays, the most by a Green Bay tight end...Caught three passes for 26 yards (8.7 avg.), highlighted by an 18-yard grab over the middle in the second quarter.

▶ **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played 37 snaps and had an 8-yard reception.

▶ **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Posted a season-high four catches for a season-best 43 yards (10.8 avg.) and a TD...The TD grab came near the end of the first quarter with Green Bay facing a third-and-1 at the Detroit 10...Made a diving grab over the middle with S Isa Abdul-Quddus draped all over him for the 10-yard score.

▶ **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Got his first start of the season as the team opened up with two tight ends, but did not record any statistics...Appeared on 43 offensive plays, the most among the tight ends.

▶ **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Started as the lone TE and caught two passes for 19 yards (9.5 avg.).

### **28 Sean Richardson, S, 3rd Year, Vanderbilt**

• Spent the entire 2013 offseason recovering from a neck surgery that followed a late-season injury suffered in November 2012.

• Opened the 2013 campaign on the reserve/physically unable to perform list, but was activated and appeared in the final six games of the regular season and the playoff game.

• Posted 12 tackles (10 solo) and a pass defended from scrimmage in 2013, in addition to four coverage tackles on special teams.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games and leads the team with seven tackles on special teams...Has posted one solo tackle and a pass defended on defense.

▶ **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Played 18 snaps on special teams and posted a career-high three tackles.

▶ **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Appeared on 21 plays on special teams and registered a tackle on kickoff coverage.

▶ **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Played 15 snaps on special teams and also saw his first action of the season on defense, appearing on four snaps.

▶ **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Appeared on three snaps on defense and registered a solo tackle...Recovered an onside-kick attempt by Bears K Robbie Gould at the Green Bay 39 with just under four minutes remaining in the first half...The offense would drive 61 yards in seven plays and cap the drive off with a 22-yard TD pass from QB Aaron Rodgers to WR Randall

Cobb to give the Packers a 21-17 edge, a lead they would never relinquish.

▶ **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Matched his career high with a team-best three tackles on special teams...Also played 10 snaps on defense, registering a pass defended.

### **97 Luther Robinson, DT, Rookie, Miami**

• Spent the first four games of the season on Green Bay's practice squad before being signed to the 53-man roster on Oct. 2.

• Was signed by the Packers as a non-drafted free agent on May 19, 2014, after participating in the team's rookie orientation camp on a tryout basis.

• Was a three-year letterman at Miami, where he played in 33 games with three starts and registered 40 tackles (16 solo), including two for a loss, and two fumble recoveries.

**2014 Season:** Has played in one game and has recorded an assisted tackle, a QB hit, three pressures and a pass defended...Spent the first four games on the team's practice squad.

▶ **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Signed to the 53-man roster the afternoon of the game, had a hand in one of the key plays in the game on his third snap as a pro...Lined up at LDE, he fought off blocks by G Vladimir Ducasse and T Phil Loadholt to get in QB Christian Ponder's face and get a piece of the ball that was intercepted by LB Julius Peppers, an INT that Peppers took 49 yards for a TD and a 21-0 Green Bay lead with 6:51 remaining in the second quarter...Appeared on 35 snaps in his NFL debut, finishing with an assisted tackle, a QB hit, three pressures and the pass defended.

### **12 Aaron Rodgers, QB, 10th Year, California**

• His career passer rating of 105.4 ranks No. 1 in NFL history (min. 1,500 attempts), eight points ahead of No. 2 Peyton Manning (97.4).

• Ranks No. 1 in league history in career INT percentage (1.71) and TD/INT ratio (3.77, 200/53) and ranks No. 3 in completion percentage (65.9) and No. 3 in yards per attempt (8.17).

• Is the only quarterback in league history to record a 100-plus passer rating in five consecutive seasons (2009-13).

• In 92 career regular-season starts (61-31 record), has posted 34 games with 300-plus passing yards, 51 without an interception (min. 15 attempts) and 54 with a 100-plus passer rating.

• In the franchise record books, holds four of the top five single-season marks for passer rating (2009, 2011-13), two of the top three for passing TDs (2011-12), four of the top five for completion percentage (2010-13) and two of the top three for passing yards (2009, 2011).

**2014 Season:** Has completed 98 of 147 passes (66.7 percent) for 1,177 yards and 12 TDs with one INT for a 114.8 passer rating...Ranks No. 2 in the NFL this season in passer rating, No. 2 in TD/INT ratio (12.00, 12/1) and tied for No. 2 in TD passes.

▶ **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Connected on 23 of 33 passes (69.7 percent) for 189 yards and a TD with one INT for an 81.5 passer rating.

▶ **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Threw for 346 yards and three TDs with no INTs on 25-of-42 passing for a 109.8 passer rating, the fourth straight year that he posted a 100-plus passer rating in the home opener...Became just the third QB in franchise history to eclipse 3,000 career passing attempts, joining Brett Favre (8,754) and Bart Starr (3,149)...Set an NFL record with 53 INTs at the time of his 3,000th career attempt, besting the previous mark of 59 INTs by Neil O'Donnell...With his 346 passing yards, it brought his career total to 24,732 as he moved past Starr (24,718) for No. 2 on the all-time franchise list...Connected with WR Jordy Nelson on a game-winning 80-yard TD pass late in the third quarter, Rodgers' 14th career TD pass of 70-plus yards, one shy of the franchise record (Favre, 15)...Led the team back from an 18-point deficit (21-3), the biggest comeback of his career as a starter and tied for the fourth-largest comeback in franchise history.

▶ **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Completed 16 of 27 passes for 162 yards and a TD for a passer rating of 88.8...His TD pass came late in the first quarter when he threw a 10-yard bullet to TE Andrew Quarless over the middle for the score on third-and-1.

▶ **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Completed 22 of 28 passes for 302 yards

and four TDs with no INTs for a 151.2 passer rating, the second-best rating of his career and the fourth best in team history...Went over the 25,000-yard mark for his career on his 15-yard completion to Nelson on a third-and-8 in the second quarter...The pass was the 3,065th attempt of his career as he set the NFL record for the fewest attempts needed to reach 25,000 passing yards, topping Kurt Warner's mark of 3,076...Became the first QB in team history to throw for 300-plus yards and four-plus TDs and register a 150-plus passer rating in the same game...Threw a pair of TD passes to both Nelson and WR Randall Cobb as they became the first Green Bay players to both post 100 receiving yards and two TD catches in the same game since Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler hit those marks vs. the St. Louis Cardinals on Dec. 21, 1969...Led the offense to six scores (five TDs, one FG) on seven possessions...Connected on 7 of 7 passes on third down for 79 yards and two TDs for a 153.3 passer rating...Was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance, the ninth time in his career that he had earned the weekly honor.

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Completed 12 of 17 passes for 156 yards and three TDs with no INTs for a 138.7 passer rating, his sixth 130-plus rating game in his last seven starts against Minnesota...His 11-yard TD pass to WR Davante Adams in the second quarter was the 200th of his career as he reached that mark in his 99th career game, the second fastest in NFL history behind only Dolphins QB Dan Marino (89 games)...Set an NFL record for the fewest INTs by a quarterback at the time of his 200th career TD pass with 53, topping the previous mark held by Patriots QB Tom Brady (88) by 35 INTs...Connected with Nelson on a 66-yard TD pass in the second quarter, Rodgers' 21st of 60-plus yards since 2008, No. 1 in the NFL over that span...Posted his fourth straight zero-INT game, his longest streak since a four-gamer in 2012 (Weeks 14-17)...His 17 attempts on the evening tied his career low (vs. Detroit, Oct. 3, 2010) for a game he did not depart early due to injury...Exited the game after a seven-play, 52-yard TD drive that put Green Bay up 42-0 late in the third quarter.

### **89 Richard Rodgers, TE, Rookie, California**

- Played tight end for his first two seasons at California before moving to inside receiver as a junior in 2013, where he caught a career-high 39 passes for a career-best 608 yards (15.6 avg.) and a TD.
- Led the Golden Bears with 11 receptions of 20-plus yards in 2013.
- Appeared in 35 games with 11 starts during his three seasons at Cal and finished with 59 receptions for 896 yards (15.2 avg.) and two TDs.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games with four starts and has two catches for 52 yards (26.0 avg.).

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Became the first Green Bay rookie TE to start a season opener since Jackie Harris opened in a two-tight-end set in 1990...Left the game due to a neck injury sustained in the second quarter, but did return to action...Saw 20 snaps on offense.

►**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started, appearing on 34 plays, and helped protect QB Aaron Rodgers as he threw for 346 yards and three TDs with no INTs.

►**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started and appeared on 11 offensive snaps.

►**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Started and posted the first two receptions of his career, with both coming on Green Bay's opening drive...Hauled in a 9-yarder on the Packers' first offensive play and then caught a deep pass that went for 43 yards on the next snap, the longest reception by a rookie tight end in franchise history.

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Appeared on 19 offensive plays but did not record any statistics.

### **78 Derek Sherrod, T, 4th Year, Mississippi State**

- Appeared in seven regular-season games in 2013 after missing the entire '12 campaign as he continued his rehabilitation from the broken leg he sustained at Kansas City in Week 15 of 2011.
- Played in five games as a rookie in 2011 before seeing his debut campaign cut short by the injury.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all five games with one start.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Took over at RT early in the second

quarter after Bryan Bulaga departed due to a sprained knee...Played the remainder of the game there, appearing on 42 snaps.

►**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Made his first NFL start, opening at RT in place of an injured Bryan Bulaga (knee)...Played all 71 snaps and protected QB Aaron Rodgers as he threw for 346 yards, the most posted by a QB against the Jets since Saints QB Drew Brees threw for 382 last season in Week 9.

►**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Played one snap on special teams.

►**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Appeared on nine snaps on special teams.

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Played on offense and special teams, entering the game at LT for David Bakhtiari (coach's decision) with just over 10 minutes remaining...Played 10 offensive snaps.

### **37 Sam Shields, CB, 5th Year, Miami**

- Had his finest statistical season in 2013, setting new career highs for starts (14), tackles (64), solo tackles (57) and passes defended (a team-high 25), and tied his previous career best with four INTs.

- Entered the NFL as a non-drafted free agent and earned the nickel cornerback job in 2010 as a rookie despite playing defense for just one season in college.

- Has made four INTs in eight career playoff games, a total that ties him with CB Herb Adderley, DB Joe Laws, CB Craig Newsome, S Eugene Robinson and CB Tramont Williams for the most in franchise postseason history.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games at RCB and has posted 16 tackles (12 solo), an interception and seven passes defended.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Appeared on all 70 defensive plays, recording three tackles (one solo) and a team-high two passes defended.

►**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played 70 of 71 defensive snaps and registered a solo tackle and a pass defended...Part of a secondary that helped limit the Jets to 166 net passing yards.

►**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Appeared on 74 of 75 defensive snaps and helped limit WR Calvin Johnson to 82 yards on six receptions, his lowest yardage total of the season...Posted a season-high six tackles (all solo).

►**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Recorded five tackles (three solo) and tied his career high with four passes defended, appearing on all 78 defensive plays...Helped limit WR Brandon Marshall to two receptions for 19 yards (9.5 avg.), Marshall's lowest yardage output in seven career games against Green Bay...Picked off QB Jay Cutler's pass intended for Marshall at the Green Bay 27 late in the third quarter, cutting across the field and returning the pick 62 yards down the right sideline to the Chicago 11, a turnover that set up QB Aaron Rodgers' 3-yard TD pass to WR Randall Cobb...The 62-yard INT return was the longest of Shields' career.

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Played all 79 defensive snaps and posted a solo tackle...Helped limit the Vikings' top trio of receivers (Greg Jennings, Cordarrelle Patterson and Jarius Wright) to a combined 66 yards on seven receptions (9.4 avg.).

### **71 Josh Sitton, G, 7th Year, Central Florida**

- Was named second-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* last season, the first Green Bay offensive lineman to be honored by AP since G Marco Rivera (second team) in 2003.

- Made the transition to left guard in 2013, starting all 16 games there after spending his first five seasons at right guard for the Packers.

- Has started 83 of a possible 85 games since 2009, the most by a Packers offensive lineman over that span.

- Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Rivera in 2004.

**2014 Season:** Has started all five games at LG.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at LG and appeared on all 62 offensive plays.

►**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played all 71 snaps and protected QB Aaron Rodgers as he threw for 346 yards, the most posted by a QB against the Jets since Saints QB Drew Brees threw for 382 last season in Week 9.

►**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started at LG and played all 53 offensive snaps.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Appeared on all 52 snaps and helped protect Rodgers as he threw for 302 yards and four TDs on 22-of-28 passing for a 151.2 passer rating, the second-best single-game mark of Rodgers' career (min. 20 attempts) and the fourth-best rating in franchise history... Part of a line that allowed just one sack for 0 yards on the afternoon and helped the offense score on six of seven possessions.
