PACKERS TAKE ON THE SAINTS IN PRIMETIME

The Green Bay Packers travel to New Orleans to play the Saints in the Packers' final game before the bye week. It will be Green Bay's first visit to New Orleans since 2008 and the second in the last 12 seasons.



- ▶ It will be the Packers' fifth road game of the season. Green Bay has won each of its last two road games (at Chicago and at Miami).
- ▶ The Packers are currently on a four-game winning streak. Green Bay has posted at least one winning streak of four or more games each of the past six seasons (2009-14), the only NFL team to accomplish that feat over that span.
- ▶ The Packers are 16-7 all-time against the Saints, including winning the last two matchups.
- ▶ Sunday will mark the third meeting between the two teams in primetime. They split the two previous matchups (2008 at New Orleans / 2011 at Green Bay) with both teams winning at home. In each contest the winning team scored more than 40 points.
- ▶ Green Bay last won in New Orleans in 1995 (34-23). The Packers are 6-5 all-time on the road against the Saints.
- ▶ In the three games since 2008, Green Bay and New Orleans have combined for 70.3 points per game. According to the Elias Sports Bureau it is the second-highest points per game scored between opposing teams that have played each other at least three times since 2008 behind Giants-Saints (75.7 in three games).
- ▶ Dating back to 2006, each team has scored at least 27 points in each of the four games.
- ▶ In the four games since 2006, the Packers have Saints have combined for more than 750 total yards in each game (895 / 876 / 759 / 765).
- ▶ Out of Green Bay's 16 wins against the Saints, nine have come by 10-plus points, including five by at least 20 points.
- ▶ Green Bay has finished in the top 10 in total offense in seven of the last eight seasons while New Orleans has finished in the top 10 in all eight seasons (2006-13).
- ▶ The Packers have scored 20 or more points 20 times against the Saints and at least 30 nine times.
- ▶ In the last five meetings between the two clubs (2005, 2006, 2008, 2011, 2012), the teams combined to score a total of 327 points, an average of 65.4 points per game. That included a 52-point outing by Green Bay in '05 and a 51-point showing by New Orleans in '08.
- ▶ Dating back to 2006, the Packers' point differential of plus-560 against NFC teams during the regular season is the second most in the league (New Orleans, plus-568).
- ▶ The Packers are in Game No. 2 of a six-game stretch that includes four contests against teams that made the playoffs last season. Of those four teams (Carolina, New Orleans, Philadelphia, New England), three won their division in 2013 and all won at least 10 games.

WITH THE CALL

NBC will broadcast the game to a national audience. Play-by-play man **Al Michaels** joins color commentator **Cris Collinsworth** in the booth with **Michele Tafoya** reporting from the sidelines.



- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in five states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 20th season calling Packers' games. McCarren, who is in his 26th year in Green Bay television, has four times been voted Wisconsin Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 16th season of broadcasts together.
- ▶ Westwood One Sports will air the game across the country. **Kevin Kugler** (play-by-play) and **James Lofton** (analyst) will call the action, with **Chris Doering** reporting from the sidelines. **Scott Graham** hosts pregame and halftime shows.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.

PROLIFIC OFFENSES SET TO SQUARE OFF

Dating back to 2006 when Green Bay hired **Mike McCarthy** as head coach and New Orleans hired Sean Payton, both teams have been among the best in the league on offense.

SUNDAY NIGHT SUCCESS

This week's game against New Orleans is the first of two Sunday night matchups for Green Bay in the next three weeks. After the bye week, the Packers return home to play Chicago in primetime.

- The Packers have won eight of their last 10 games played on Sunday night, including both of the last two.
- Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the Packers are 9-4 overall (.692) on Sunday night.
- Green Bay is 21-6 all-time in Sunday night contests, a .778 winning percentage that ranks **No. 1 in NFL history** (since 1978).

- The Packers have scored 25-plus points in eight of their last nine Sunday night games, averaging 31.4 points per game over that span while allowing an average of 23.3 points per contest.
- In 10 career regular-season starts on Sunday night, QB **Aaron Rodgers** has completed 210 of 318 passes (66.0 percent) for 2,752 yards and 22 TDs with just three INTs for a 112.3 passer rating.

BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers' active roster is composed of 24 offensive players, 26 defensive players and three specialists.

- ▶ Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 33 of them (63.5 percent) were draft picks of the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 18 players on the roster that began their careers as non-drafted free agents, with eight of those originally signed by Green Bay.
- ▶ Almost 50 percent of the players (25 of 53, 47.2%) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player.
- ▶ The Packers have 12 players on the roster that played in the NFL prior to the 2009 season, and six of those players began their pro careers as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player (QB Matt Flynn, K Mason Crosby, CB Tramon Williams, CB Jarrett Bush, FB John Kuhn, LS Brett Goode).
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 42 began their pro careers with the Packers (79.2 percent).
- ▶ Only 17 of the 52 players on the roster (32.7 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft, with 16 being drafted by the Packers.
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 43 of them (81.1 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Oct. 26) and 20 players (37.7 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

GREEN BAY IN OCTOBER

Dating back to 2008, the Packers are 21-5 in the month of October. Green Bay's 21 wins are tied for the league lead and the Packers' .808 winning percentage leads the NFL over that span:

- ▶ Green Bay's Week 7 victory over Carolina marked the Packers' 10th straight win in the month of October, the longest current winning streak by any NFL team in a single calendar month.
- ▶ The Packers have won 16 of their last 17 games played in October.
- ▶ Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, Green Bay ranks in the top five in both points scored and points allowed per game in October:

MR. OCTOBER

Since taking over as the starter in 2008, QB **Aaron Rodgers** has had some success in the month of October.

- ▶ In 12 of his last 15 starts in October, Rodgers has registered a passer rating of at least 100. He has posted seven 130-plus rating games over that span, including a 138.7 rating in a 42-10 win vs. Minnesota in Week 5 and a 154.5 rating in a victory vs. Carolina in Week 7.
- ▶ Over his last 15 October starts (2011-present), Rodgers has completed 334 of 485 passes (68.9 percent) for 4,365 yards (291.0 ypg) and 42 TDs with just four INTs for a 122.4 passer rating. He has eclipsed the 300-yard mark in seven of those 15 games and thrown three or more TDs in 10 of them as well, including this season against Minnesota (three), Miami (three) and Carolina (three). Rodgers has a 14-1 record in his last 15 October starts.

STAT OF THE WEEK

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** posted his sixth consecutive zero-interception game in the Week 7 win over Carolina, tying Bart Starr's franchise record (min. 15 attempts a game) set in 1964.
- ▶ He brought his streak of consecutive attempts without an interception to 192, a career high and the second-best mark in franchise annals (Starr, 294, 1964-65). His only interception this season came in the third quarter at Seattle in Week 1.
- ▶ Rodgers joined Patriots QB Tom Brady (2007) as the only players in NFL history to register four straight three-touchdown/zero-interception games in a single season.
- ▶ With 18 touchdown passes and one interception this season, Rodgers became the first player in league history to throw for 18-plus touchdowns and one or zero interceptions in the first seven games of a season.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

- ▶ A win would make McCarthy 88-47-1 during the regular season as the Packers' head coach.
- ▶ The Packers are looking for their fifth consecutive win. It would tie for the third-longest winning streak during a single season under McCarthy (2009-5 / 2012-5 / 2007-6 / 2011-13).
- ▶ The Packers' defense is looking to hold the opposing starting quarterback to a passer rating below 85.0 for the seventh game in a row (CAR-Cam Newton, 72.6 / MIA-Ryan Tannehill, 81.5 / MIN-Christian Ponder, 45.8 / CHI-Jay Cutler, 82.5 / DET-Matthew Stafford, 61.6 / NYJ-Geno Smith, 64.1).
- ▶ If Green Bay wins, it would give them six wins in the first eight games of the season for the third time in the last eight years (2011-8 / 2007-7).
- ▶ The Packers are looking for their first three-game road winning streak since 2012 (Weeks 6-7, 11).
- ▶ Over the last four games, Green Bay's offense has scored on 22 of 43 drives, including four of the first five to begin the game last week.
- ▶ Green Bay's defense has recorded nine interceptions in the last five weeks, the second most in the NFL over that span (NYG, 11).
- ▶ The Packers have recorded a league-high 201 interception return yards this season.
- ▶ Green Bay has registered over 120 rushing yards in each of the last three games.
- ▶ The Packers are looking for their third consecutive win over the Saints but only their first win at New Orleans since 1995.

OFFENSE

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** has registered four games with a 100-plus passer rating this season and 55 in his career.
- ▶ Rodgers looks to record the 34th 300-yard passing game of his career during the regular season.
- ▶ If Rodgers throws for at least three touchdowns, it would tie for the most consecutive games with at least three touchdown passes in a single season in his career (2011-5).
- ▶ WR **Jordy Nelson** is two touchdown receptions short of passing WR Billy Howton (43) for eighth place in franchise history.
- ▶ Nelson is two receptions shy of passing Ahman Green (350) for the eighth most in team history.

- ▶ Nelson is 121 receiving yards shy of surpassing Carroll Dale (5,422) for 10th place in franchise history.
- ▶ Nelson has recorded at least nine receptions in four games this season. If Nelson registers one more game with at least nine receptions, it will be the most in a single season in franchise history.
- ▶ Nelson has a touchdown catch in a career-best four straight games. The last Packer to have a touchdown reception in five straight games was WR Greg Jennings in 2007.
- ▶ Nelson has registered at least one reception in the last 27 regular-season games he has played in. It is the second-longest streak of his career during the regular season (35 games, 2010 - 2012).
- ▶ Since the start of the 2013 regular season, Nelson has nine games with at least seven receptions, including four games this season. It is tied for the fourth-most games with seven-plus receptions in the league over that time span (WAS Pierre Garcon, 12 / NE Julian Edelman, 11 / PIT Antonio Brown, 11 / HOU Andre Johnson, 9 / DAL Dez Bryant, 9 / DEN Demaryius Thomas, 9).
- ▶ WR **Randall Cobb** has recorded at least one reception in 31 consecutive regular-season games.
- ▶ Cobb has caught at least one touchdown in six of seven games this season. He has 10 receiving touchdowns in his last eight regular-season games, dating back to last season.
- ▶ Dating back to last season, RB **Eddie Lacy** has at least one rushing touchdown in 12 of the last 18 regular-season games.
- ▶ Lacy has recorded four rushing touchdowns in the last four games.

DEFENSE

- ▶ LB **Julius Peppers** is the only player in the NFL with at least a sack (three), an interception (one), a forced fumble (one), a fumble recovery (two) and a defensive touchdown (one) this season.
- ▶ Peppers is the only player in NFL history with 10 interceptions and at least 100 sacks in his career.
- ▶ Peppers has played in 103 consecutive games, which is the longest active streak among NFL linebackers (NO Curtis Lofton, 102).
- ▶ LB **Clay Matthews** (51.5) is three sacks shy of passing DE Aaron Kampman (54.0) for No. 4 on the team's career sacks list.
- ▶ Matthews needs one more interception to join Peppers as two of five active NFL players with at least six interceptions and 40 sacks (BAL-Terrell Suggs / TEN-Shaun Phillips / PIT-James Harrison).
- ▶ CB **Casey Hayward** looks to tie his career high by recording an interception for the third straight game (Weeks 5-7, 2012).

SPECIAL TEAMS

- ▶ Cobb needs either a punt return for a touchdown or a kickoff return for a touchdown to take sole possession of second place in Packers history for combined returns for touchdowns (Travis Williams, 6). Cobb, who has three returns for touchdowns, currently is tied with six other players.
- ▶ K **Mason Crosby** has played in 119 consecutive games, the longest active streak among kickers.
- ▶ Crosby looks to extend his consecutive-games-scoring streak to 120 regular-season games. It is the second-longest streak in franchise history (Ryan Longwell, 144).

MIKE MCCARTHY...Is in his ninth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Led the Packers to their fifth consecutive playoff appearance last season, joining New England as the only two NFL teams to do so over that span. Has also led the team to six playoff appearances in the last seven years (2007, 2009-13).
- ▶ Has guided the Packers to top-10 finishes in scoring each of the past seven seasons (2007-13), joining the Patriots as the only other team to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ His .648 winning percentage during the regular season (87-47-1) ranks No. 5 among active NFL coaches (min. 50 games).
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.

SEAN PAYTON...Is in his eighth year as the Saints' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Has led New Orleans to five playoff appearances, three NFC South titles, two NFC Championship games and a Super Bowl title in his first seven seasons as head coach.
- ▶ Leads an offense that has ranked among the top 10 in the NFL each season he has been there, including ranking No. 1 in the league four times.
- ▶ Before joining New Orleans he coached for the Dallas Cowboys from 2003-05, serving as the assistant head coach/quarterbacks the first two years and the assistant head coach/passing game coordinator in his last year.
- ▶ Began his coaching career in the NFL as the quarterbacks coach for the Philadelphia Eagles in 1997-98 and then coached for the New York Giants from 1999-2002, serving as the offensive coordinator his last three seasons.
- ▶ Coached collegiately at San Diego State (1988-89, 1992-93), Indiana State (1990-91), Miami of Ohio (1994-95) and Illinois (1996).

THE PACKERS-SAINTS SERIES

These teams meet for the sixth time in 10 seasons after having met only once in the previous nine years.

- ▶ These clubs launched their series in 1968, when former Vince Lombardi assistants Phil Bengston (Packers) and Tom Fears (Saints) met in Milwaukee. The Packers, one year after winning Super Bowl II, defeated the second-year Saints, 29-7. Fears, who coached Super Bowl I hero Max McGee with the Packers from 1962-65, was New Orleans' first head coach.
- ▶ Green Bay's 52-3 victory in 2005 was the most lopsided in the series history, eclipsing the Packers' 35-7 victory in New Orleans on Dec. 13, 1981.

► He is the only player in the NFL this season to have at least one sack (three), a forced fumble (one), a fumble recovery (two), an interception (one) and a defensive touchdown (one).

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

304 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Panthers in Week 7 this season brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 304 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 58th season of football in 2014. A total of 701,102 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine games (including playoffs) in 2013.
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 49-17-1 (.739) at home in the regular-season since 2006.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 94th NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling).

- ▶ Green Bay's schedule includes five games against 2013 playoff teams, with three of those contests (Carolina, Philadelphia, New England) at Lambeau Field and two on the road (Seattle, New Orleans).
- ▶ The Packers have three prime-time contests at home (vs. Minnesota on Thursday night in Week 5, vs. Chicago on Sunday night in Week 10 and vs. Atlanta on *Monday Night Football* in Week 14) and two on the road (Thursday night at Seattle in Week 1 and Sunday night at New Orleans in Week 8).
- ▶ The Packers' bye arrives in Week 9 for the first time since 2004.
- ▶ It is the second time in franchise history (1922) that Green Bay opens with three of their first four games on the road.
- ▶ Two of Green Bay's first five games are played on Thursday night, with the next seven taking place on Sunday, one on the following Monday, and three more on Sunday to close out the regular season.
- ▶ For the second year in a row and just the third time in nine seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (2010), the Packers opened the season on the road. For the third straight season Green Bay opened against an NFC West team after facing San Francisco each of the last two years.
- ▶ Dating back to 2001, the Packers have always played against an NFC team in Week 1. The last AFC team Green Bay faced in Week 1 was the New York Jets, who visited the Packers in Week 2 for the home opener.
- ▶ Following the home opener, the Packers went on the road to face two division opponents, Detroit and Chicago, before returning home to face Minnesota in a Thursday night divisional matchup. It was the sixth time in the last seven seasons they have faced off in primetime.
- ▶ The Packers traveled to Miami for the third time in 23 years and first time since 2006. The following week Green Bay hosted Carolina for their first time since 2008.
- ▶ Before the bye week, the Packers will travel to New Orleans for a prime-time matchup against the Saints.
- ▶ Following the bye week, the Packers return to Sunday night to host the Bears, who they have beaten five of the last six times at home.
- ▶ Philadelphia comes to Lambeau for the second straight season, which is only the second time in the series that the two clubs have played at Green Bay in back-to-back seasons (1933-34).
- ▶ For the second consecutive season, Green Bay will play Minnesota in Week 12, traveling to face the Vikings in the first outdoor game (TCF Bank Stadium) between the two in Minnesota since they played at Metropolitan Stadium on Nov. 29, 1981.
- ▶ The last game in November brings New England to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2006 and only its third visit ever to the stadium (1979).
- ▶ December opens with a Monday night matchup at home versus Atlanta. It marks the 22nd straight season the Packers have appeared on *Monday Night Football*.
- ▶ The next two weeks include road games at Buffalo and Tampa Bay. It will be the Packers' first visit to Buffalo since 2006 and first trip to Tampa Bay in the month of December since 1999.
- ▶ Green Bay closes the regular season at Lambeau Field against Detroit for the fourth time under McCarthy (2007, 2008, 2011).



STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

18 RANDALL COBB

- ▶ In Week 4 at Chicago, joined WR **Jordy Nelson** as the first Packers teammates to each have at least 100 receiving yards and two touchdowns in the same game since December 21, 1969 (Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler).
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first person in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Has three kick return scores (two punts, one kickoff) in his career, which ties him for No. 2 in franchise history behind only RB Travis Williams' six return TDs (one punt, five kickoffs).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 5 in the NFL with the three total kick return TDs since 2011.

2 MASON CROSBY

- ▶ His 903 points from 2007-13 rank No. 1 in NFL history for the most points scored by a player in his first seven seasons, topping the mark of Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team annals with 950 career points (Ryan Longwell, 1,054).
- ▶ Reached the 900-point mark for his career in his 112th game, third fastest in NFL history (Gino Cappelletti, 106; Stephen Gostkowski, 108).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most 100-point seasons with seven, trailing only Longwell (eight).
- ▶ Made 23 straight field goals from Week 13 of 2010 through Week 10 of 2011, the longest regular-season streak in franchise history.
- ▶ In 2011, set a franchise record with a 58-yard field goal in Week 7 at Minnesota, eclipsing the mark of 56 yards he held (Week 1 at Philadelphia, 2010; Week 5 at Atlanta, 2011).
- ▶ For his career, has hit 126 of 138 field goals (91.3 percent) from 39 yards and closer.
- ▶ Has made 45 of 63 field goals (71.4 percent) from 40-49 yards.
- ▶ Has hit 21 of 42 field goals (50.0 percent) from 50-plus yards.

50 A.J. HAWK

- ▶ Is tied for No. 1 in franchise history for the most seasons leading the team in tackles with five (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012-13), matching the mark of five by LB Nick Barnett (2003-05, 2007, 2009).
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Has posted 100-plus tackles in six of seven seasons.
- ▶ Has 1,079 career tackles, which ranks No. 1 in team history (since defensive stats began to be recorded by coaches in 1975). Moved past John Anderson (1,020, 1978-89) for the franchise record with eight tackles at Chicago in Week 17 last season.

27 EDDIE LACY

- ▶ Set franchise rookie records in 2013 for rushing yards (1,178), rushing TDs (11) and rushing attempts (284).
- ▶ Tied the team rookie mark for 100-yard rushing games with four last season.
- ▶ Named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press* and was selected to the Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Vikings RB Adrian Peterson.
- ▶ Recorded 20-plus carries 10 times during the 2013 regular season, all coming in the the last 13 games. The Packers were 7-2-1 in those games. Dating back to 1960, he tied Dorsey Levens (1997) for the second-most games of 20-plus carries by a Packers' player in one regular season (Ahman Green, 12 in 2003).

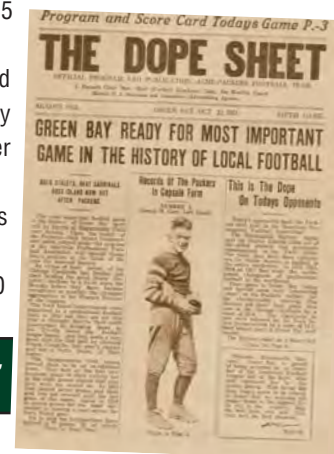
8 TIM MASTHAY

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (min. 150 punts) with a 44.6-yard gross punting average.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in team annals (since 1976) with 109 punts placed inside the 20-yard line in his career, passing Craig Hentrich (104) in the franchise record book.
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with his 45.6-yard gross average in 2011, surpassing Craig Hentrich's 45.0-yard mark in 1997.
- ▶ Tied Sean Landeta's single-season franchise record (1998) by placing 30 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2012.
- ▶ Holds the top four single-season marks for net punting average in franchise history (since 1976) with a 38.95 average in 2013, a 38.93 average in 2012, a 38.56 average in 2011 and a 37.65 average in 2010.

52 CLAY MATTHEWS

- ▶ Only player in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl each of his first four seasons in the league (2009-12).
- ▶ Only player in team history to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ His 17 sacks in his first 20 games were the most by an NFL player to start his career at the time, eclipsing the mark of 16.5 set by Leslie O'Neal (1986, 1988) and John Abraham (2000-01).
- ▶ Is the first NFL player since sacks became an official stat in 1982 to post a double-digit sack total and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the league.
- ▶ First player in franchise annals to post 10-plus sacks in each of his first two years in the NFL.
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in team history with 51.5 career sacks.
- ▶ His 29.5 sacks from 2009-11 were tied for No. 1 in team history with Tony Bennett for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL with 51.5 sacks since entering the league in 2009.
- ▶ Set a franchise rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called *The Dope Sheet*, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.





STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

87 JORDY NELSON

- ▶ Dating back to 1960, Nelson's 47 receptions and 712 receiving yards are both the second most by a Packers receiver in the first seven games of a season.
- ▶ His 22 TD grabs from 2011-12 were the most by a Packer over a two-year span since WR Antonio Freeman posted 26 TDs from 1997-98.
- ▶ Caught 15 TD passes in 2011, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942) as the only players in franchise annals to catch 15-plus TD passes in a season.
- ▶ With four TD grabs of 80-plus yards during his career, Nelson is tied for the most in team history and No. 1 among active NFL players (Vikings WR Greg Jennings).
- ▶ Is the 11th player in franchise history to surpass 5,000 career receiving yards.

56 JULIUS PEPPERS

- ▶ Only player in NFL history with at least 10 interceptions and 100 sacks.
- ▶ Has been selected to eight Pro Bowls since entering the league in 2002, which ties him with Troy Polamalu and Ray Lewis for the third most among defensive players over that span (Ed Reed, 9 / Champ Bailey, 12).
- ▶ With eight double-digit sack seasons as a pro, is tied with Jared Allen for the most in the NFL since 2002.
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times and was selected to the NFL's All-Decade team for the 2000s.

12 AARON RODGERS

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with a 105.8 career passer rating.
- ▶ When he hit the 200-TD mark for his career, he had thrown just 53 INTs to that point, the fewest in NFL history as he bested Tom Brady's mark of 88 INTs at the time of his 200th TD pass.
- ▶ This season he became the first quarterback to throw for 18-plus touchdowns with one or fewer interceptions in the first seven games of a season.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in NFL history for the most touchdown passes in a player's first 100 games with 203 (MIA QB Dan Marino, 217).
- ▶ Set an NFL single-season record in 2011 with a 122.5 passer rating and set team marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games (eight).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first five seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Threw a TD pass in 35 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field from 2008-12, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre, 1992-96). It was the second-longest home streak in NFL history behind Dan Marino's 39-game streak from 1983-88.
- ▶ Tied a single-game franchise record with six TD passes at Houston in Week 6 of 2012, matching Matt Flynn's mark (Jan. 1, 2012, vs. Detroit).
- ▶ In 94 regular-season starts, has 33 career 300-yard games, 40 three-TD games and 53 zero-INT games (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ Has posted a 100-plus passer rating 55 times. Set an NFL record for quarterbacks whose careers started since 1970 with 43 games with a 100-plus passer rating in his first 75 starts.

- ▶ Posted a 100-plus passer rating in five straight seasons (2009-13), the only quarterback in league history to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ Is the only QB in team history with three 400-yard passing games, including a 480-yard effort vs. Washington in Week 2 last season that tied a franchise record.
- ▶ In 2009, became first QB in NFL history to throw 30 or more TDs, seven or fewer INTs, and rush for five TDs in the same season.
- ▶ Has registered a passer rating over 110.0 in four or more consecutive games three times in his career (Weeks 3-7, 2009; Week 9, Weeks 11-13, 2010; Weeks 1-7, 9-12, 2011), one of only two quarterbacks in franchise history (Bart Starr, 1966) to accomplish the feat in a single season.
- ▶ Posted four or more rushing TDs in three straight seasons (2008-10), becoming only the second Packers QB to accomplish that feat (Tobin Rote, 1954-56), and eclipsed 300 rushing yards in back-to-back seasons (2009-10), the first since Rote in 1954-56.

PACKERS STARTERS – OFFENSE

WR Jordy Nelson, 7th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08

- ▶ Ranks in the top five in the league in receiving yards (712) and receptions (47) this season.
- ▶ Led the team in 2013 with a career-high 85 catches for a career-best 1,314 yards and eight TDs. Ranked No. 10 in the NFL last season in receiving yards.
- ▶ With 15 TD catches in 2011, became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).
- ▶ Became the first player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to post three 80-yard TD grabs over an eight-game span in the regular season (Week 16, 2010-Week 6, 2011).

LT David Bakhtiari, 2nd Year, Colorado, D4a-13

- ▶ Has started every game at LT since the start of the 2013 regular season.
- ▶ Started all 16 games at left tackle last season, the only rookie in the NFL to do so in 2013 and the first Packer rookie to do so since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start at LT in the season opener since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since 1985.
- ▶ Earned second-team All-Pacific-12 honors from the conference's coaches each of his last two seasons (sophomore and junior) at Colorado.

LG Josh Sitton, 7th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08

- ▶ Has started 85 games since 2009, the most by an offensive player in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ▶ Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Marco Rivera in 2004.
- ▶ Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association.
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, allowed only nine sacks in his first five seasons as a starter (2009-13).
- ▶ Was the only Packer on either side of the ball to not miss a snap from 2009-10.

C Corey Linsley, Rookie, Ohio State, D5a-14

- ▶ First rookie center to start for Green Bay in Week 1 since the merger.
- ▶ Was one of five team captains and was part of a line that helped the team set school records for points scored (637), yards per carry (6.8), touchdowns (87) and TD passes (38) in '13.
- ▶ The Ohio native was part of a Buckeye team that won 24 consecutive games from 2012-13.

RG T.J. Lang, 6th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09

- ▶ Has started games at four different positions on the line as a pro (27 at LG, 23 at RG, five at RT, two at LT). Played C in Week 10 last season.
- ▶ Has started 54 contests since 2011.
- ▶ Started games at both tackle spots in his first season (2009) and became the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

RT Bryan Bulaga, 5th Year, Iowa, D1-10

- ▶ Missed the second part of the 2012 season after suffering a hip injury vs. Arizona on Nov. 4 and missed all of the 2013 season after injuring his knee on Aug. 3. Has started all but one game this season.
- ▶ Started 37 games at RT in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Started the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at right tackle after taking over for veteran Mark Tauscher (shoulder), the most regular-season starts by a Packers rookie tackle since Tauscher's 14 in 2000.
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.
- ▶ Capped his rookie season by becoming the youngest player, according to STATS LLC, to ever start in the Super Bowl (21 years, 322 days).

TE Andrew Quarless, Fifth Year, Penn State, D5a-10

- ▶ With Green Bay trailing by four, hauled in the game-winning touchdown with three seconds left at Miami in Week 6.
- ▶ Has started each of the last four games and has tied his single-season career high with two touchdown receptions this season (2013).
- ▶ Recorded at least one reception in six of seven games this season.
- ▶ In 2013, moved into the starting role in Week 8 following TE Jermichael Finley's season-ending neck injury.
- ▶ Set career highs in receptions (32), receiving yards (312), games started (10) and games played (16) in 2013.
- ▶ At the end of his career at Penn State, held school records for receptions by a tight end in a career (87) and single season (41 in 2009). Finished his career ranked second in school history for receiving yards by a tight end with 1,146.

WR Randall Cobb, 4th Year, Kentucky, D2-11

- ▶ Ranks second in the NFL with eight touchdown receptions this season.
- ▶ Before suffering a knee injury in Week 6 last season, led the team in receptions with 29 and was No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.
- ▶ Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, he became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Led the team in receptions (80) and receiving yards (954) in 2012 and finished second on the squad in TD catches (eight).

QB Aaron Rodgers, 10th Year, California, D1-05

- ▶ His career passer rating of 105.8 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in the NFL this season in passer rating (117.3), No. 2 in touchdown percentage (7.9) and No. 3 in touchdown passes (18).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- ▶ In 94 regular-season starts (63-31 record), has posted 34 games with 300-plus passing yards, 53 without an interception and 55 with a 100-plus passer rating (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

RB Eddie Lacy, 2nd Year, Alabama, D2-13

- ▶ Ranked No. 1 in the league among rookies and No. 8 among all players with 1,178 rushing yards last season, despite missing one full game and nearly all of another due to a concussion.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history for the most rushing yards by a rookie in a single season, No. 1 in attempts (284), and tied for No. 1 for most 100-yard rushing games with four (John Brockington, four in 1971).
- ▶ Became the first Green Bay rookie RB to be selected to the Pro Bowl since Brockington in 1971 and was named Rookie of the Year by PFWA.
- ▶ Finished third in the league with 11 TD runs, with 10 of those scores coming between Weeks 7-17, the most in the league over that span.

FB John Kuhn, 9th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)

- ▶ Has played in 114 of 119 games (125 of 130 including playoffs) during his six-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.
- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- ▶ Only player on the team to have a rushing and receiving touchdown each season from 2008-11, and was the first Packer to achieve that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).
- ▶ Led the team with four rushing TDs in 2011 and led the running backs with six total TDs.



PACKERS STARTERS – DEFENSE

LDE Datone Jones, 2nd Year, UCLA, D1-13

- ▶ Overcame an ankle injury during the preseason to play in all 16 games in 2013.
- ▶ Rotated at defensive end and as one of the interior rushers in the team's sub-defenses, recording 3.5 sacks.
- ▶ Blocked an extra point at Cincinnati in Week 3 last year.
- ▶ Was the first UCLA defensive lineman selected in the first round since DT Manu Tuiaosopo in 1979 (No. 18 overall, Seattle).

NT Letroy Guion, 7th Year, Florida State, FA-14

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay this past offseason after spending his first six NFL seasons with the Minnesota Vikings after being selected in the fifth round of the 2008 NFL Draft.
- ▶ Started all 28 games he appeared in for Minnesota over the past two seasons, recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.
- ▶ Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012.

RDE Mike Daniels, 3rd Year, Iowa, D4a-12

- ▶ Leads Green Bay with nine sacks since the start of the 2013 regular season.
- ▶ Played in all 16 games with one start last season and ranked No. 2 on the team with a career-high 6.5 sacks. Was tied for No. 6 in the NFL in sacks among defensive tackles.
- ▶ Returned a fumble 43 yards for a TD vs. Detroit in Week 14 of 2012, the longest fumble return for a TD by a rookie in franchise history.
- ▶ Starred as an interior pass rusher at Iowa, posting a team-high 24.5 tackles for a loss and 13 sacks from 2010-11.

LOLB Clay Matthews, 6th Year, Southern California, D1b-09

- ▶ Tied for No. 7 in the NFL since entering the league in 2009 with 51.5 sacks. His sack total ranks No. 5 in team history (since 1982).
- ▶ Became the first Packer in team history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the NFL (2009-12).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting.

BLB A.J. Hawk, 9th Year, Ohio State, D1-06

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (since 1975) with 1,079 tackles.
- ▶ His 54 tackles this season are second on the team. Led the team with 153 tackles (112 solo) last season and was tied for No. 3 on the club with a career-high five sacks.
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Led the team with 142 tackles (105 solo) in 2012.
- ▶ Has appeared in 131 of a possible 133 regular-season games in his career, starting 128 of 131.
- ▶ Has posted 1,079 tackles (774 solo), 17.0 sacks, nine interceptions, 39 passes defended, three forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries during his career.

MLB Jamari Lattimore, 4th Year, Middle Tenn. St., FA-11

- ▶ Began this season providing depth at inside linebacker but has started five of the last six games. In Week 5, he recorded his first career interception against Minnesota.
- ▶ Continued to contribute on special teams in 2013, but filled in at inside linebacker for injured LB Brad Jones, recording 38 tackles (31 solo), two sacks and a forced fumble.
- ▶ Spent the first three years of his career evolving into one of the core players on special teams.
- ▶ Made the transition from outside linebacker as a rookie in 2011 to inside linebacker in 2012.

ROLB Julius Peppers, 13th Year, North Carolina, FA-14

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay during the offseason after playing the last four seasons for Chicago and the first eight of his career for Carolina after being selected as the No. 2 overall pick in 2002.
- ▶ First player in NFL history with 10 interceptions and at least 100 sacks.
- ▶ Has been selected to the Pro Bowl eight times (2004-06, 2008-12) and has been named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times (2004, 2006, 2010). Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.
- ▶ Enters this week having played in 103 consecutive regular-season games.
- ▶ Ranks No. 3 in the league in sacks (121.5) and tied for No. 4 in forced fumbles (40) since entering the NFL in 2002. His sack total ranks No. 18 in NFL history (since 1982).
- ▶ Has blocked 13 kicks (12 field goals, one extra point) during his career.

LCB Tramon Williams, 8th Year, Louisiana Tech, FA-06

- ▶ Tied for No. 1 in the league in interceptions (20) and ranks No. 2 in the NFL in INT return yards (323) since 2010 (including playoffs).
- ▶ Started all 16 games last season and led the secondary with a career-high 91 tackles (68 solo) and a career-best 2.5 sacks. Added three interceptions, two fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and 14 passes defended.
- ▶ Despite suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener, went on to start 15 games that season and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defended (24). Also added four interceptions.
- ▶ With three interceptions during the 2010 playoffs, tied Joe Laws (1944) and Craig Newsome (1996) for the franchise single-postseason record.

RCB Sam Shields, 5th Year, Miami, FA-10

- ▶ Started all 14 games he appeared in last season and led the team with four INTs (tied career high) and a career-best 25 passes defended.
- ▶ Was limited to 10 games with eight starts in 2012 due to injury, but registered 38 tackles (28 solo), three interceptions, 15 passes defended (No. 3 on the team) and a sack.
- ▶ Made an impact in 2010 after making the team as a non-drafted rookie, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one season in college.
- ▶ In Green Bay's NFC Championship win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.

SS Morgan Burnett, 5th Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10

- ▶ Leads the team with 59 tackles this season. Ranked No. 2 on the team with 106 tackles (77 solo) in 2013, despite missing the first three games due to injury. Recovered three fumbles, including one for a TD, and added nine passes defended.
- ▶ Participated in all 1,088 plays for Green Bay's defense in 2012, one of only four non-offensive linemen in the NFL to appear in 100 percent of his team's snaps.
- ▶ Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining DT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

FS Micah Hyde, 2nd Year, Iowa, D5a-13

- ▶ Appeared in all 16 games last season, playing in the most defensive plays (428) among the Packers' defensive rookies.
- ▶ Spent most of his rookie season as the dime or nickel cornerback, helping to fill in for CB Casey Hayward, who missed all but three games due to a hamstring injury.
- ▶ As the team's primary return man for most of the 2013 season, ranked No. 5 in the NFL in punt return average (12.3) and No. 14 in kickoff return average (24.1). Recorded a 93-yard punt return for a touchdown, which is tied for the fourth longest in team history.

GAME 1

SEATTLE — The Super Bowl champion Seattle Seahawks started 2014 the same way they finished last season, with a convincing win. Marshawn Lynch rushed for 110 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Percy Harvin had 100 combined yards rushing and receiving, and the Seahawks' Jimmy Graham had a 36-6 win over the Green Bay Packers to kick off the regular season.

The Seahawks unveiled the first Super Bowl banner in franchise history during a vibrant pregame ceremony and then began the process of trying to be the first team in a decade to repeat.

Russian Linebacker — a popular pick to contend in the NFC — will only reinforce the belief Seattle is still the favorite to be the first team in a decade to repeat.

Wilson finished 19 of 28 for 191 yards passing and Lynch was at his best. Pete Carroll said earlier this week that Lynch appeared in the best shape of his career, and it showed. Lynch averaged 3.3 yards per carry and topped 100 yards for the 20th time in the regular season since joining the Seahawks in 2010.

Lynch, who ran for 1,257 yards and 12 touchdowns last season, barreled through a trio of Packers for the TD with 3:41 left before halftime to give the Seahawks a 17-10 lead and added a second TD run on the first play of the fourth quarter.

Seattle had 207 yards rushing as a team and won for the 18th time in its last 20 regular-season home games. Harvin finished with 11 offensive touchdowns, including four rushes for 41 yards.

Rodgers finished 23 of 33 for 189 yards and was isolated to one side of the field. He looked almost exclusively for Jordy Nelson matched up against Byron Maxwell and never threw in Richard Sherman's direction. Nelson finished with nine receptions, but Maxwell came up with a third-quarter interception on a pass that deflected off Nelson's hands.

The most action for Sherman came in the first half when he accidentally blocked Davon House into Earl Thomas on a punt return causing a fumble recovered by the Packers.

But Seattle's defense did its part. They sacked Rodgers three times, taking advantage of a knee injury suffered by right tackle Byron Bulaga in the second quarter. His replacement, Derek Sherrod, gave up a fourth-down sack to Cliff Avril to end one drive inside Seattle territory. Following a Seattle punt, Sherrod was beaten by Michael Bennett on Green Bay's next offensive snap. Rodgers was stripped and Sherrod fell on the fumble in the end zone for a safety and a 22-10 lead.

Nine plays later, Lynch walked in from the 3-yard line for a 29-10 Seahawks lead. Rodgers threw a 3-yard TD pass to Randall Cobb in the fourth quarter but Wilson closed out the victory with a 13-play drive that ate up seven minutes and was capped by a 15-yard TD pass to Derrick Coleman on fourth down with 2:31 left.

Eddie Lacy was mostly a non-factor with 34 yards rushing on 12 carries and left in the fourth quarter to be evaluated for a concussion. Seattle Linebacker Bobby Wagner tied a career high with 14 tackles.

GAME 2

GREEN BAY WIS. — Aaron Rodgers threw for three scores, including an 80-yard strike to Jordy Nelson in the third quarter, and the Packers roared back from an 18-point deficit to win their home opener, 31-24, over the New York Jets.

After allowing a 21-3 lead early in the second quarter, coach Rex Ryan's team had a chance to the late. It looked as though that had happened with 5 minutes left on a 37-yard touchdown catch by Jeremy Kerley on fourth down — but the score was negated because the Jets (1-1) called a timeout from the sideline just before the snap.

Ryan said he didn't call time. He suspected it could have been offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg or quarterback Geno Smith. Defensive lineman Sheldon Richardson said he was to blame because he leaned over to tell the referee when he saw Mornhinweg calling for time.

Smith's last-ditch pass on fourth-and-8 with 3:31 left for a double-covered Kerley was tipped away. The 78,000-plus fans at Lambeau Field breathed a collective sigh of relief, and the Packers held the ball for a timeout.

Green Bay (1-1) avoided its first 0-2 start since 2005. It took a little while to get going, though, as Rodgers fumbled away the snap on the first play of the opening series. The Jets scored on their first three drives.

Slowly, but surely, the offense started chipping away. Then, the defense came up with some big stops late.

The Jets tried backup Michael Vick at quarterback on one play, but he was taken down from behind in the open by Clay Matthews for a sack. That drive ended with the pass breakup on Kerley in the end zone.

Rodgers finished 25 of 42 with 346 yards. Nelson had nine catches and Cobb finished with five catches for 39 yards. Cobb caught two short scoring strikes and a 2-point conversion that gave the Packers a 24-21 lead in the third quarter.

Green Bay went up 31-24 late in the third quarter when Nelson worked a double move on Dee Milliner for the 80-yard score. Nelson ran and out-and-out route. With the safety coming over late to help, Nelson beat out Jets defenders in a foray to the end zone.

Just a couple of hours earlier, it looked as if the home crowd was going to witness a surprising loss.

Chris Ivory bargained up the middle for a 4-yard score at 10:38 of the second quarter that left the fans stunned silence with the Packers down 21-3 on the ground with 13 carries and 43 yards.

The Packers' comeback started with a 13-point flurry in the final 5:43 of the first half, including field goals from 20 and 55 yards by Mason Crosby. The later kick set a Packers record at the time.

Then, the Packers got the defensive break they desperately needed when Tramon Williams stepped in front of tight end Zach Sudfield for an interception at the Packers 3.

Rodgers followed with a 10-play, 97-yard drive in 1:44 that ended with a 6-yard score to Cobb to get the Packers within five at the half.

DETROIT -- Even one of Matthew Stafford's interceptions quickly turned into two points for Detroit.

That was just part of a strong performance from the Lions' defensive front in a 19-7 victory over the Green Bay Packers.

Madamuro Suh and the Lions pressured Aaron Rodgers throughout, and Detroit's injury-plagued secondary was never a problem Sunday. Don Carey returned a fumble 40 yards for a touchdown, and the Lions held Green Bay to 223 yards of offense.

Detroit (2-1) came in with a secondary decimated by injuries, but Rodgers couldn't take advantage. He was sacked twice and threw for only 162 yards, and Green Bay (1-2) wasn't any better when running the ball.

Stafford was 22 of 34 for 246 yards with two interceptions. The Detroit quarterback's second interception - on third-and-long in the second quarter - actually worked out in his team's favor. His deep pass for Calvin Johnson was picked off near the goal line by Davon House, and although the play was initially ruled a touchdown, a review gave Green Bay the ball at its own 1-yard line.

The Packers tried a run with Eddie Lacy, and linebacker DeAndre Levy caught him in the end zone for a safety that put Detroit ahead 9-7.

Detroit's offense finally scored a touchdown in the fourth quarter on a 26-yard run by Reggie Bush.

Safety James Ihedigbo (neck) and cornerback Cassius Vaughn (ankle) were inactive for Detroit, which has also lost defensive backs Bill Bentley and Kevin Lawson to season-ending injuries. Linebacker Stephen Tulloch left in the first quarter after hurting his left knee while celebrating a sack of Rodgers.

The Packers lost despite forcing three turnovers. They tried to establish the run a bit early, and that backfired when Lacy's fumble was scooped up by Carey. The defensive back went all the way to the end zone for a 7-0 lead.

Carry hadn't played in Detroit's first two games this season because of a hamstring problem, and he left this game after aggravating that same injury.

Green Bay had won 15 of the past 17 meetings with Detroit, and the Packers were 9-1 with Rodgers playing. The one loss he took part in came in 2010, when he left the game in the first half with a concussion. Green Bay lost that game 7-3 - until Sunday, that was the only time since Rodgers became the starting quarterback. In 2008 that the Packers were held to seven points or fewer.

Last season, Rodgers was out with a fractured collarbone when Green Bay lost to the Lions 40-10 on Thanksgiving.

Rodgers threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to Andrew Quarless in the first quarter Sunday to tie it at 7, but the Packers never scored again.

The Packers (2-2) scored on their first six possessions to build a 38-17 lead. They racked up 358 yards after being held to 223, their lowest total since 2008, a week earlier in a 19-7 loss at Detroit.

They intercepted Jay Cutler twice in the third quarter to pull away from the Bears (2-2). That gave Green Bay five straight wins at Soldier Field, including the NFC title game four years ago and a playoffs-or-bust finale for both teams last season.

Rodgers called on Packers fans to take a deep breath during the week, and he gave them reason to exhale with this performance.

He had all the answers in this one.

Rodgers posted a 151.2 rating for the game, completing 22 of 28 passes, and had all the time he needed with five-time Pro Bowl defensive end Jared Allen sitting out because of an illness.

He threw two touchdown passes each to Randall Cobb and Jordy Nelson, and a fifth got called back by a penalty. That happened early in the third when a scrambling Rodgers got hit by at least one defender while unleashing an awkward, wobbly 34-yard pass that somehow connected with Davante Adams in the end zone.

Cobb had seven catches for 113 yards. Nelson had 10 receptions for 108 yards, and the Packers came away with the win despite allowing 496 yards.

The offenses were so effective - or the defenses struggled so badly - that neither team punted. That happened only once before in a regular-season NFL game, 22 years ago.

The Bears basically matched Green Bay score for score before Cutler threw those interceptions. He wound up passing for 256 yards and two TDs but fell to 1-10 lifetime against Green Bay, counting the possession.

Matt Forte ran for 122 yards on 23 carries. Martellus Bennett had nine catches for a career-high 134 yards, but Chicago came up short after back-to-back wins at San Francisco and the New York Jets.

Mason Crosby kicked a 53-yard field goal on the opening possession of the second half to extend the Packers' lead to 24-17 and things unraveled for the Bears after that.

Chicago had the ball on the Green Bay 24 when Cutler hit cornerback Tramon Williams in the chest with a pass. The ball ricocheted to Clay Matthews, who returned it 45 yards. That led to an 11-yard scoring pass from Rodgers to Nelson, making it 31-17.

Another interception set up another TD for the Packers. This time, Brandon Marshall went long when Cutler expected him to cut back toward the quarterback.

The pass went right to Sam Shields, who crossed the field on a 62-yard return to put the ball at the 11. Chicago's Jonathan Beasley got called for a hold, negating a field goal by Crosby.

The Packers took a 24-17 lead to the locker room after the two teams combined for 508 yards. Chicago missed a touchdown by inches when Bennett got stopped just short of the end zone on an 8-yard catch. Cutler thought Bennett reached across the goal line before getting taken down, but the ball was upfield after a replay.

Then, in the third quarter, Green Bay created some breathing room.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. -- Aaron Rodgers stood face-mask to face-mask with a teammate, screaming in jubilation at the end of a hot, harrowing afternoon.

Rodgers had the last word Sunday, throwing a 4-yard touchdown pass to Andrew Quarless with three seconds left to help the Green Bay Packers rally past the Miami Dolphins 27-24.

Green Bay twice gave up leads and trailed 24-17 before Rodgers directed consecutive drives of 68 and 60 yards for the victory. He overcame a fumble and a fourth-and-10 on the Packers' final possession, and faked an intentional spike before throwing a completion that set up the touchdown. Rodgers finished with three touchdown passes and 264 yards while committing no turnovers. The Packers (4-2) earned their third consecutive victory, won in Miami for the second time ever and remained tied with the Detroit Lions atop the NFC North.

The Dolphins (2-3) lost despite the return of six starters who had missed playing time. They overcame deficits of 10-3 and 17-10 to take a 24-17 lead with nine minutes left when Ryan Tannehill hit Mike Wallace for a 5-yard score.

At that point the Packers appeared to be willing on a typical fall day in the subtropics -- sunny, humid and 85 degrees.

Rodgers kicked a field goal with 4:09 to go, making it 24-20, then forced a punt to start at their 40 with 2:04 left.

Rodgers fumbled when sacked, and teammate J.J. Lary recovered. That set up a fourth-and-10, but Rodgers threw to Jordy Nelson for 18 yards, then hit James Starks on third-and-10 for 10 yards.

With the clock running following another completion, Rodgers faked a spike before throwing to Davante Adams, who gained 12 yards before going out of bounds with six seconds remaining.

Following a Dolphins timeout, Quarless easily outmaneuvered linebacker Philip Wheeler for the winning catch. Wheeler wasn't thrilled with the defensive scheme, which left him alone on the flank.

Playing in his 10th regular-season game, Rodgers also threw for scores of 9 yards to Nelson and 5 yards to Randall Cobb. He has 15 touchdowns passes and only one interception this season.

With the Packers' secondary depleted, Tannehill threw for two scores and 143 yards in the second half, but he was unable to run out the clock with a 24-20 lead. The Dolphins tried four passes and ran only three times on their final possession.

Green Bay made a goal-line stand in the first quarter, stopping Miami three consecutive times at the 1, including on fourth down when Morgan Burnett tackled Knowshon Moreno for a loss. Casey Hayward intercepted Tannehill to set up a field goal.

The Packers enjoyed a 14-and-a-half-minute advantage in time of possession, a big change from other games this season. Their run defense was ranked as the NFL's worst, but Miami's running backs totaled only 63 yards on 20 carries.

• Posted a career-high 85 catches for a career-best 1,314 yards (15.5 avg.) last season, becoming just the fourth player in franchise history to register 85-plus receptions and 1,300-plus receiving yards in the same season.

• Led the NFL with 19 catches of 25-plus yards in 2013, the most by a Green Bay player since STATS LLC began recording the statistic in 1994.

• Is tied for No. 3 in the league with 36 TD catches since 2011 and ranks No. 5 in the NFL (min. 150 receptions) over that span with a 16.2-yard receiving average.

• Ranks No. 9 in franchise history in receptions (349), No. 11 in receiving yards (5,302) and No. 9 in TD catches (42).

2014 Season: Has started all seven games and leads the team in receptions (47) and receiving yards (712)...Ranks No. 2 in the league in receiv-

ing yards and tied for No. 5 in the NFL in receptions...Has caught six TD passes, which is tied for No. 4 in the league...Has recorded four games with nine-plus receptions, which already ties the single-season franchise record and leads the league this season (no other player has more than two)...Ranks No. 2 in the league with 35 receiving first downs this season.

►**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Led the team in receptions for the third straight game this season the fourth straight game dating back to last season, hauling in five passes for a team-high 59 yards (11.8 avg.)...With the five catches, brought his three-game total to 23, a franchise record for the most catches by a Green Bay player through the first three contests (previous high was 21 by three players).

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** His lone reception of the evening was an impactful one, catching a 66-yard TD pass from Rodgers in the first quarter to put Green Bay up 14-0...Sped past CB Captain Munneryn, who passed him off to S Harrison Smith, before making an out-and-up move on Smith to get open and catch Rodgers' deep pass perfectly in stride at the Minnesota 20 before taking it the rest of the way for the score.

►**at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Led the team in receptions (nine) and receiving yards (107), his fourth game with nine-plus receptions on the season and his third 100-yard game...Tied the single-season franchise record with his fourth nine-catch game on the season (six other times in team history)...Brought his season receiving total to 43 receptions, which is tied with WR Sterling Sharpe (1993) for the most catches through six games in team history...Caught a 9-yard TD pass over the middle on Green Bay's opening drive, his third straight game with a TD grab as he tied his career high for consecutive games with a TD catch...On the Packers' game-winning TD drive late in the fourth quarter, made an 18-yard grab down the right sideline on fourth-and-10 with just over a minute remaining to keep the drive alive...Seven of his nine receptions on the day went for first downs.

• Finished his collegiate career at Colorado State-Pueblo after spending a year at Arizona State (2012) and two years at Scottsdale Community College (2010-11).

• Played in all 12 games with 10 starts at CSU-Pueblo as a senior in 2013 and recorded 36 tackles (15 solo), including six for a loss, three sacks, three forced fumbles, two fumble recoveries and four passes defended.

2014 Season: Has played in four games, was inactive for two contests and dressed but did not play in the other...Has registered nine tackles (six solo), two QB hits and a pressure.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Inactive (healthy scratch).

• Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.

• Since entering the NFL in 2002, ranks No. 3 in the league in sacks (121.5) and is tied for No. 4 in forced fumbles (40).

• Is the only player in NFL history (since 1982) to register 100 sacks (119.5) and 10 interceptions (10).

• Has posted eight double-digit sack seasons since 2002, which is tied with Bears DE Jared Allen for No. 1 in the league over that span.

2014 Season: Has started all seven games and has posted 23 tackles (15 solo), three sacks, an interception that he returned for a TD, seven QB hits, six pressures, three passes defended, a forced fumble and a team-high two fumble recoveries.

►**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at ROLB in his Green Bay debut, recording four tackles (all solo), a QB hit and a pressure.

►**vs. N.Y. - Ranks No. 1 in league history in career INT percentage (1.67) and TD/INT ratio (3.89, 206/53) and ranks No. 3 in completion percentage (65.9) and No. 3 in yards per attempt (8.17).

- Is the only quarterback in league history to record a 100-plus passer rating in five consecutive seasons (2009-13).

- In 94 career regular-season starts (63-31 record), has posted 34 games with 300-plus passing yards, 53 without an interception (min. 15 attempts) and 55 with a 100-plus passer rating.

- In the franchise record books, holds four of the top five single-season marks for passer rating (2009, 2011-13), two of the top three for passing TDs (2011-12), four of the top five for completion percentage (2010-13) and two of the top three for passing yards (2009, 2011).

as a starter and tied for the fourth-largest comeback in franchise history.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Completed 16 of 27 passes for 162 yards and a TD for a passer rating of 88.8...His TD pass came late in the first quarter when he threw a 10-yard bullet to TE Andrew Quarless over the middle for the score on third-and-1.

▶**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Completed 22 of 28 passes for 302 yards and four TDs with no INTs for a 151.2 passer rating, the second-best rating of his career and the fourth best in team history...Went over the 25,000-yard mark for his career on his 15-yard completion to Nelson on a third-and-8 in the second quarter...The pass was the 3,065th attempt of his career as he set the NFL record for the fewest attempts needed to reach 25,000 passing yards, topping Kurt Warner's mark of 3,076...Became the first QB in team history to throw for 300-plus yards and four-plus TDs and register a 150-plus passer rating in the same game...Threw a pair of TD passes to both Nelson and WR Randall Cobb as they became the first Green Bay players to both post 100 receiving yards and two TD catches in the same game since Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler hit those marks vs. the St. Louis Cardinals on Dec. 21, 1969...Led the offense to six scores (five TDs, one FG) on seven possessions...Connected on 7 of 7 passes on third down for 79 yards and two TDs for a 153.3 passer rating...Was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance, the ninth time in his career that he had earned the weekly honor.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Completed 12 of 17 passes for 156 yards and three TDs with no INTs for a 138.7 passer rating, his sixth 130-plus rating game in his last seven starts against Minnesota...His 11-yard TD pass to WR Davante Adams in the second quarter was the 200th of his career as he reached that mark in his 99th career game, the second fastest in NFL history behind only Dolphins QB Dan Marino (89 games)...Set an NFL record for the fewest INTs by a quarterback at the time of his 200th career TD pass with 53, topping the previous mark held by Patriots QB Tom Brady (88) by 35 INTs...Connected with Nelson on a 66-yard TD pass in the second quarter, Rodgers' 21st of 60-plus yards since 2008, No. 1 in the NFL over that span...Posted his fourth straight zero-INT game, his longest streak since a four-gamer in 2012 (Weeks 14-17)...His 17 attempts on the evening tied his career low (vs. Detroit, Oct. 3, 2010) for a game he did not depart early due to injury...Exited the game after a seven-play, 52-yard TD drive that put Green Bay up 42-0 late in the third quarter.
