PACKERS HOST BEARS IN PRIMETIME MATCHUP

The Packers and Bears, who are both coming off the bye, will meet for the second time this season.

- ▶ Sunday will mark game No. 190 in the NFL's oldest rivalry. The Bears hold a 93-90-6 edge in the series, which includes two playoff games (1-1).
- ▶ The Packers have won 10 of the last 12 meetings against the Bears (including playoffs). Green Bay won the first matchup against the Bears this season, 38-17, at Chicago in Week 4.
- ▶ It is the ninth consecutive year that the Packers and Bears will play in primetime. It is the second year in a row that Chicago will play at Green Bay in early November after visiting Lambeau Field on Nov. 4 last season.
- ▶ Dating back to 1970, the Packers' 18 primetime games against the Bears are the most they have played against any team.
- ▶ Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the Packers are 12-6 against the Bears during the regular and postseason, including 5-3 at home.
- ▶ In all but one of the 12 wins under McCarthy, Green Bay has scored at least 20 points.
- ▶ It will be fourth divisional game this season for the Packers, having won two of the first three, including the only matchup at home, a 42-10 win over Minnesota in Week 5.
- ▶ Under McCarthy, Green Bay has a 37-13-1 overall record (.735) in division games (No. 2 in the NFL) and a 20-4-1 mark (.820) at home in the division (No. 3 in the NFL).
- ▶ After playing five of the first eight games on the road this season, Green Bay will play four of the next five contests at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Two of the Packers' next three games will be against NFC North foes, with Green Bay traveling to play Minnesota in Week 12. The Packers' final divisional game of the season will be played at home against Detroit in Week 17.



AFTER THE BYE

Green Bay will come out of its bye week with a home game for only the third time in eight seasons under McCarthy (2009, 2013).

- ▶ In games immediately following its bye week, Green Bay has won 14 of its last 18 (.778). Under McCarthy, the Packers are 7-1 (.875) in the game following the bye.
- ▶ McCarthy's .875 winning percentage (7-1) in games following the bye week is tied for the second highest in NFL history (min. eight games) with Andy Reid (14-2). They trail only former Kansas City Chiefs and Buffalo Bills head coach Marv Levy (8-1, .889).
- ▶ Green Bay has won its first game after the bye each of the last five seasons, outscoring its opponents 148-70 in those contests. That included a 26-0 win vs. Detroit in 2009, a 31-3 victory at Minnesota in 2010 and a 22-9 win vs. Detroit in 2013.
- ▶ Since 2006, the Packers have a 50-27-1 overall record (.647) after the bye. Since 2009, Green Bay is 33-14-1 (.698) overall after the bye.
- ▶ It will be the fifth time in the last six seasons that the Packers will play an opponent from the NFC North in the first game after the bye.

WITH THE CALL

NBC will broadcast the game to a national audience. Play-by-play man **Al Michaels** joins color commentator **Cris Collinsworth** in the booth with **Michele Tafoya** reporting from the sidelines.



- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in five states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 20th season calling Packers' games. McCarren, who is in his 26th year in Green Bay television, has four times been voted Wisconsin Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 16th season of broadcasts together.
- ▶ Westwood One Sports will air the game across the country. **Kevin Kugler** (play-by-play) and **James Lofton** (analyst) will call the action, with **Hub Arkush** reporting from the sidelines. **Scott Graham** hosts pregame and halftime shows.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.

PACKERS VS. BEARS - WEEK 10

HOME COOKING

The Packers have won 27 of their last 32 with one tie and 33 of their last 39 games with one tie at Lambeau Field in the regular season.

- ▶ Green Bay's .826 winning percentage (35-7-1) at home since 2009 ranks **No. 2 in the NFL** over that span:

- ▶ The Packers have averaged 31.0 points per game at home since 2009, **No. 3 in the league** over that span. Green Bay has posted 21 games of 30-plus points since '09:

- ▶ Green Bay has posted 10 games with 40-plus points at home since 2009. The Packers are 10-0 at home when scoring at least 40 points. Green Bay's 10 games with 40-plus points at home since 2009 **rank No. 2 in the NFL** over that span:

- ▶ The defense has done its part as well at home since 2009, generating 91 turnovers at Lambeau Field. With Green Bay's offense posting only 43 giveaways over that span, the Packers have a plus-48 turnover ratio at home, which **ranks No. 2 in the league** since '09:

- ▶ With the 91 takeaways at home since 2009, the Packers **rank No. 4 in the league** in that category:

- ▶ Green Bay has generated at least two takeaways in 26 of 42 home games since 2009. The Packers have a 23-3 mark (.885) in those games. The Packers have posted four or more takeaways at Lambeau Field in nine of those contests.

- ▶ The Packers' win over Tennessee in Week 16 of 2012 gave the team its third straight season with at least seven wins at home. It marked the second-longest streak in franchise history behind only a span of five straight seasons (1994-98) with seven or more victories at home.

- ▶ A look at the most home victories over a three-season span in franchise history:

SUNDAY NIGHT SUCCESS

Green Bay will play on Sunday night for the second time this season when the Packers take on the Bears this week.

- ▶ The Packers have won eight of their last 11 games played on Sunday night.

- ▶ Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, the Packers are 9-5 overall (.643) on Sunday night.

- ▶ Green Bay is 21-7 all-time in Sunday night contests, a .750 winning percentage that ranks **No. 1 in NFL history** (since 1978):

- ▶ The Packers have scored 25-plus points in eight of their last 10 Sunday night games, averaging 30.6 points per game over that span while allowing an average of 25.4 points per contest.

- ▶ In 11 career regular-season starts on Sunday night, QB **Aaron Rodgers** has completed 238 of 357 passes (66.7 percent) for 3,170 yards and 23 TDs with just five INTs for a 110.3 passer rating.

BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers' active roster is composed of 24 offensive players, 26 defensive players and three specialists.

- ▶ Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 33 of them (63.5 percent) were draft picks of the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 18 players on the roster that began their careers as non-drafted free agents, with eight of those originally signed by Green Bay.
- ▶ Almost 50 percent of the players (25 of 53, 47.2%) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player.
- ▶ The Packers have 12 players on the roster that played in the NFL prior to the 2009 season, and six of those players began their pro careers as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player (QB Matt Flynn, K Mason Crosby, CB Tramon Williams, CB Jarrett Bush, FB John Kuhn, LS Brett Goode).
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 42 began their pro careers with the Packers (79.2 percent).
- ▶ Only 16 of the 53 players on the roster (30.2 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft, with 15 being drafted by the Packers.
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 43 of them (81.1 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Nov. 9) and 20 players (37.7 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

SUCCESS AFTER THE WEEK OFF

Dating back to 1999, the Packers' Week 9 bye ties for the latest open date Green Bay has had behind Week 10 byes in 2010 and 2012.

- ▶ Since Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** took over in 2006, the Packers have posted a 7-1 mark (.875) in the game after the bye, which was tied for No. 1 in the NFL over that span (2006-13):

- ▶ This season will mark the third time in the last five seasons that Green Bay has a bye in Week 9 or later (2010 / 2012).

- ▶ Over the past 18 seasons, Green Bay has a 14-4 record (.778) in the game immediately following the bye.
- ▶ The Packers have outscored their opponents 148-70 in the game after the bye the last five seasons.

STAT OF THE WEEK

- ▶ Green Bay is playing its fourth home game of the season this Sunday. The Packers have started the season 3-0 at home for the second consecutive season and the 21st time in franchise history.
- ▶ Green Bay is looking to start 4-0 at home for the 16th time in franchise history but only the sixth time since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970 (1996, 1997, 2001, 2002, 2011).
- ▶ Green Bay has scored over 30 points in the first three home games (38, 42, 31). Dating back to 1921, it is the first time the Packers have registered at least 30 points in each of their first three home games.
- ▶ Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, Green Bay has scored 30-plus points at home 31 times, winning 29 of those contests. The Packers' 31 home games with at least 30 points is the fourth most in the league over that span.
- ▶ Green Bay is tied for the third-most home games with at least 30 points this season, trailing only the Denver Broncos and Pittsburgh Steelers (four).
- ▶ The Packers average 37.0 points per game at home to lead the NFL this season.

DIVISIONAL DRIVE

The Packers have a 37-13-1 (.735) overall regular-season record against NFC North opponents under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, a divisional mark that ranks **No. 2 in the NFL** since 2006:

► Green Bay has held NFC North foes to 20 points or less in 30 of those contests, including in all three games this season, and to 10 points or less in 13 of the games. The Packers have given up 18.9 points per game in divisional games, ranking **No. 6 in the NFL** since 2006:

► Green Bay had won 10 straight home games against divisional foes before losing to Chicago at Lambeau Field last season in Week 9.
 ► Green Bay's 37-34 loss at Minnesota in Week 17 of the 2012 season snapped the Packers' 12-game winning streak in regular-season NFC North games, which was the longest divisional winning streak in team history since the league went to a divisional format in 1967:

► The Packers finished with a 3-2-1 record in NFC North contests last season. Green Bay has posted a winning record in divisional games in every season under McCarthy (2006-13). The only other team in the league to accomplish that feat each of the past eight seasons was the New England Patriots.

► The streak of eight straight seasons with a winning record in divisional games is also a franchise record, topping the previous mark of five straight from 2000-04.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR

► A win would make McCarthy 88-48-1 during the regular season as the Packers' head coach.

► Green Bay is looking to beat Chicago for the ninth time in the last 10 matchups, including the postseason.

► The Packers can improve to 3-1 in the division with a win.

► The Packers' defense is looking to hold the opposing starting quarterback to a passer rating below 85.0 for the seventh game this season (CAR-Cam Newton, 72.6 / MIA-Ryan Tannehill, 81.5 / MIN-Christian Ponder, 45.8 / CHI-Jay Cutler, 82.5 / DET-Matthew Stafford, 61.6 / NYJ-Geno Smith, 64.1).

OFFENSE

► QB **Aaron Rodgers** is 11-3 against the Bears as the starting quarterback during the regular and postseason.

► Including the postseason, Rodgers has won eight in a row against Chicago in games he throws at least five passes.

► Rodgers threw for 302 yards, four touchdowns and a passer rating of 151.2 in the Week 4 win at Chicago this season.

► WR **Jordy Nelson** is two touchdown receptions short of passing WR Billy Howton (43) for eighth place in franchise history.

► Nelson is 96 receiving yards shy of surpassing Carroll Dale (5,422) for 10th place in franchise history.

► Nelson has recorded at least nine receptions in four games this season. If Nelson registers one more game with at least nine receptions, it will be the most in a single season in franchise history.

► WR **Randall Cobb** has recorded at least one reception in 32 consecutive regular-season games.

► Cobb has set a career high by registering a touchdown reception in each of the last five games. It is the longest streak by a Packers' player since Greg Jennings (five) in 2007. The last Green Bay player to have six consecutive games with a touchdown reception was WR Sterling Sharpe in 1994.

► Cobb has caught at least one touchdown in seven of eight games this season. He has 11 receiving touchdowns in his last nine regular-season games, dating back to last season.

► Cobb is looking for his career-best third 100-plus-yard receiving game in a row. It would be his fourth game this season with at least 100 yards receiving, which would also be a career high (3-2012).

► In the first meeting against Chicago this season, Cobb registered 113 yards and two touchdowns on seven receptions (16.1 avg.).

DEFENSE

► LB **Julius Peppers** has registered 2.5 sacks in the last two games.

► LB **Clay Matthews** (52.5) is two sacks shy of passing DE Aaron Kampman (54.0) for No. 4 on the team's career sacks list.

► Matthews has registered 7.5 sacks and two interceptions against Chicago, the most he has recorded against any one team.

COACHES CAPSULES

Mike McCarthy: 93-53-1, .636, (incl. 6-5 postseason); 9th NFL season

Marc Trestman: 11-13, .458; 2nd NFL season

MIKE MCCARTHY...Is in his ninth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Led the Packers to their fifth consecutive playoff appearance last season, joining New England as the only two NFL teams to do so over that span. Has also led the team to six playoff appearances in the last seven years (2007, 2009-13).
- ▶ Has guided the Packers to top-10 finishes in scoring each of the past seven seasons (2007-13), joining the Patriots as the only other team to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ His .644 winning percentage during the regular season (87-48-1) ranks No. 3 among active NFL coaches (min. 50 games).
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.

MARC TRESTMAN...Is in his second year as the Bears' 14th head coach.

- ▶ In Trestman's first season, the Bears' offense set a franchise record with 6,109 net yards.
- ▶ Was the head coach of the Canadian Football League's Montreal Alouettes for five seasons (2008-12) and led the club to back-to-back Grey Cup championships in 2009-10. Was named the CFL's Coach of the Year in 2009.
- ▶ During his time in Montreal, compiled a 59-31 (.656) regular-season record, which included four East Division titles, and a 5-3 record (.625) in the playoffs.
- ▶ Has 18 years of NFL coaching experience, including eight as an offensive coordinator and 13 working with quarterbacks. Coached for the Vikings, Browns, Lions, Cardinals, Dolphins, 49ers and Raiders.
- ▶ During his time in the NFL, he helped his teams to eight playoff appearances, two conference championship games and a Super Bowl appearance (XXXVII as offensive coordinator of the Raiders).

THE PACKERS-BEARS SERIES

- ▶ No two teams have met on the gridiron more than the Packers and Bears. Sunday they face off for the 190th time.
- ▶ Starting in 1923, the clubs met for 59 straight years until both games in 1982 were canceled as part of a strike-shortened season.
- ▶ During the 2010 season, the teams squared off in the playoffs for just the second time in the history of the series. With a berth in Super Bowl XLV on the line, the Packers emerged victorious, 21-14, in the NFC Championship Game at Soldier Field.
- ▶ The last time Green Bay led the overall series? On the heels of its three straight NFL championships, 1932, when the Packers led 11-10-5.

- ▶ After setting a career high with 10 receptions in Soldier Field last season, Nelson matched it at Chicago in Week 4. He became the first player since Lions WR Calvin Johnson (Jan. 1, 2012 and Dec. 9, 2012 at Lambeau Field) to post 10-plus catches in back-to-back games at a visiting stadium.
- ▶ In the Week 2 win over the Jets, Nelson finished with a career-high 209 yards receiving, which tied for the fourth most in a game in franchise history, and were the most by a Packer since Don Beebe registered 220 yards receiving vs. San Francisco on Oct. 14, 1996.

USING THE BACKS

Over the past four games, Green Bay has shown more commitment to getting the running backs involved.

- ▶ The Packers recorded over 25 carries and 100 yards three times in that span (Weeks 5-8), averaging at least 4 yards a carry in both Weeks 7 (4.1) and 8 (4.7).
- ▶ In the four weeks before the Week 9 bye, the Packers ranked ninth in both attempts (111) and yards per carry (4.4), as well as sixth in yards:

- ▶ Green Bay's run game had a breakout performance in the victory over the Vikings in Week 5, recording 156 yards on 28 carries (5.6 avg.) with two touchdowns.
- ▶ The Packers ran the ball a season-high 34 times for 121 yards (3.6 avg.) in a Week 6 win at Miami.
- ▶ In a Week 7 victory over Carolina, RBs **Eddie Lacy** and **James Starks** each averaged over five yards a carry and both recorded a rushing touchdown.
- ▶ In Week 8 at New Orleans, Green Bay ran the ball for 89 yards on 19 attempts. The 4.7 average was the second highest in a single game this season for Green Bay.
- ▶ Green Bay also utilized the running back position in the pass game as Lacy recorded 123 yards on eight receptions, the second most by a Green Bay running back since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, trailing only Eddie Lee Ivery's 128 yards at Tampa Bay on Oct. 12, 1980.
- ▶ Lacy became the first Green Bay running back to post a 100-yard receiving game since Edgar Bennett (101 yards) on Dec. 18, 1994 (vs. Atlanta).
- ▶ Lacy's 182 yards from scrimmage in Week 8 were the most by a Green Bay running back since Najeh Davenport posted 186 vs. St. Louis on Nov. 29, 2004.
- ▶ The Packers recorded six runs of 10-plus yards in two games this season (Minnesota, Carolina), which is tied for the eighth most in a single game this season. Green Bay's 81 runs of 10-plus yards since the start of the 2013 regular season **rank No. 9 in the NFL**.
- ▶ In Week 5, Lacy rushed for 105 yards on 13 carries (8.1 avg.) and recorded his second career game with two rushing touchdowns (vs. Pittsburgh, Week 16 in 2013).
- ▶ It was the fifth 100-yard rushing game of his career, his lowest attempt total in a 100-yard rushing game and his best per-carry average in a game (min. 10 att.). Lacy's five 100-yard rushing games since the start of 2013 are **tied for sixth in the NFL**.

RACKING UP POINTS

Including 2013, **K Mason Crosby** made 19 consecutive field goals in the regular season, until his final kick against the Bears was blocked in Week 4. He now owns the two longest consecutive field-goal streaks in franchise history (23 straight from 2010-11). The blocked field goal was Crosby's only miss this season (11-12).

Peppers has shown throughout his career the ability to do a little bit of everything on defense, and this year is no different.

► Peppers and Houston Texans DE J.J. Watt are the only players in the NFL this season to have at least one sack (four), a forced fumble (one), a fumble recovery (two), an interception (one) and a defensive touchdown (one).

304 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Panthers in Week 7 this season brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 304 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 58th season of football in 2014. A total of 701,102 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine games (including playoffs) in 2013.
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 49-17-1 (.739) at home in the regular-season since 2006.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 94th NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling).

- ▶ Green Bay's schedule includes five games against 2013 playoff teams, with three of those contests (Carolina, Philadelphia, New England) at Lambeau Field and two on the road (Seattle, New Orleans).
- ▶ The Packers have three prime-time contests at home (vs. Minnesota on Thursday night in Week 5, vs. Chicago on Sunday night in Week 10 and vs. Atlanta on *Monday Night Football* in Week 14) and two on the road (Thursday night at Seattle in Week 1 and Sunday night at New Orleans in Week 8).
- ▶ The Packers' bye arrives in Week 9 for the first time since 2004.
- ▶ It is the second time in franchise history (1922) that Green Bay opens with three of their first four games on the road.
- ▶ Two of Green Bay's first five games are played on Thursday night, with the next seven taking place on Sunday, one on the following Monday, and three more on Sunday to close out the regular season.
- ▶ For the second year in a row and just the third time in nine seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (2010), the Packers opened the season on the road. For the third straight season Green Bay opened against an NFC West team after facing San Francisco each of the last two years.
- ▶ Dating back to 2001, the Packers have always played against an NFC team in Week 1. The last AFC team Green Bay faced in Week 1 was the New York Jets, who visited the Packers in Week 2 for the home opener.
- ▶ Following the home opener, the Packers went on the road to face two division opponents, Detroit and Chicago, before returning home to face Minnesota in a Thursday night divisional matchup. It was the sixth time in the last seven seasons they have faced off in primetime.
- ▶ The Packers traveled to Miami for the third time in 23 years and first time since 2006. The following week Green Bay hosted Carolina for the first time since 2008.
- ▶ Before the bye week, the Packers traveled to New Orleans for a prime-time matchup against the Saints.
- ▶ Following the bye week, the Packers return to Sunday night to host the Bears, who they have beaten five of the last six times at home.
- ▶ Philadelphia comes to Lambeau for the second straight season, which is only the second time in the series that the two clubs have played at Green Bay in back-to-back seasons (1933-34).
- ▶ For the second consecutive season, Green Bay will play Minnesota in Week 12, traveling to face the Vikings in the first outdoor game (TCF Bank Stadium) between the two in Minnesota since they played at Metropolitan Stadium on Nov. 29, 1981.
- ▶ The last game in November brings New England to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2006 and only its third visit ever to the stadium (1979).
- ▶ December opens with a Monday night matchup at home versus Atlanta. It marks the 22nd straight season the Packers have appeared on *Monday Night Football*.
- ▶ The next two weeks include road games at Buffalo and Tampa Bay. It will be the Packers' first visit to Buffalo since 2006 and first trip to Tampa Bay in the month of December since 1999.
- ▶ Green Bay closes the regular season at Lambeau Field against Detroit for the fourth time under McCarthy (2007, 2008, 2011).



STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

18 RANDALL COBB

- ▶ Dating back to 1960, his nine receiving touchdowns are the most by a Packers receiver in the first eight games of a season.
- ▶ In Week 4 at Chicago, joined WR **Jordy Nelson** as the first Packers teammates to each have at least 100 receiving yards and two touchdowns in the same game since December 21, 1969 (Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler).
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first person in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Has three kick return scores (two punts, one kickoff) in his career, which ties him for No. 2 in franchise history behind only RB Travis Williams' six return TDs (one punt, five kickoffs).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 5 in the NFL with the three total kick return TDs since 2011.

2 MASON CROSBY

- ▶ His 903 points from 2007-13 rank No. 1 in NFL history for the most points scored by a player in his first seven seasons, topping the mark of Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team annals with 961 career points (Ryan Longwell, 1,054).
- ▶ Reached the 900-point mark for his career in his 112th game, third fastest in NFL history (Gino Cappelletti, 106; Stephen Gostkowski, 108).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most 100-point seasons with seven, trailing only Longwell (eight).
- ▶ Made 23 straight field goals from Week 13 of 2010 through Week 10 of 2011, the longest regular-season streak in franchise history.
- ▶ In 2011, set a franchise record with a 58-yard field goal in Week 7 at Minnesota, eclipsing the mark of 56 yards he held (Week 1 at Philadelphia, 2010; Week 5 at Atlanta, 2011).
- ▶ For his career, has hit 128 of 140 field goals (91.4 percent) from 39 yards and closer.
- ▶ Has made 46 of 64 field goals (71.9 percent) from 40-49 yards.
- ▶ Has hit 21 of 42 field goals (50.0 percent) from 50-plus yards.

50 A.J. HAWK

- ▶ Is tied for No. 1 in franchise history for the most seasons leading the team in tackles with five (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012-13), matching the mark of five by LB Nick Barnett (2003-05, 2007, 2009).
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Has posted 100-plus tackles in six of seven seasons.
- ▶ Has 1,085 career tackles, which ranks No. 1 in team history (since defensive stats began to be recorded by coaches in 1975). Moved past John Anderson (1,020, 1978-89) for the franchise record with eight tackles at Chicago in Week 17 last season.

27 EDDIE LACY

- ▶ His 123 receiving yards at New Orleans in Week 8 this season, were the second most by a Green Bay running back since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, trailing only Eddie Lee Ivery's 128 yards at Tampa Bay on Oct. 12, 1980.
- ▶ Set franchise rookie records in 2013 for rushing yards (1,178), rushing TDs (11) and rushing attempts (284).
- ▶ Tied the team rookie mark for 100-yard rushing games with four last season.
- ▶ Named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press* and was selected to the Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Vikings RB Adrian Peterson.
- ▶ Recorded 20-plus carries 10 times during the 2013 regular season, all coming in the the last 13 games. The Packers were 7-2-1 in those games. Dating back to 1960, he tied Dorsey Levens (1997) for the second-most games of 20-plus carries by a Packers' player in one regular season (Ahman Green, 12 in 2003).

8 TIM MASTHAY

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (min. 150 punts) with a 44.6-yard gross punting average.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in team annals (since 1976) with 109 punts placed inside the 20-yard line in his career, passing Craig Hentrich (104) in the franchise record book.
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with his 45.6-yard gross average in 2011, surpassing Craig Hentrich's 45.0-yard mark in 1997.
- ▶ Tied Sean Landeta's single-season franchise record (1998) by placing 30 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2012.
- ▶ Holds the top four single-season marks for net punting average in franchise history (since 1976) with a 38.95 average in 2013, a 38.93 average in 2012, a 38.56 average in 2011 and a 37.65 average in 2010.

52 CLAY MATTHEWS

- ▶ Only player in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl each of his first four seasons in the league (2009-12).
- ▶ Only player in team history to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ His 17 sacks in his first 20 games were the most by an NFL player to start his career at the time, eclipsing the mark of 16.5 set by Leslie O'Neal (1986, 1988) and John Abraham (2000-01).
- ▶ Is the first NFL player since sacks became an official stat in 1982 to post a double-digit sack total and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the league.
- ▶ First player in franchise annals to post 10-plus sacks in each of his first two years in the NFL.
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in team history with 52.5 career sacks.
- ▶ His 29.5 sacks from 2009-11 were tied for No. 1 in team history with Tony Bennett for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL with 52.5 sacks since entering the league in 2009.
- ▶ Set a franchise rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called *The Dope Sheet*, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.





STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

87 JORDY NELSON

- ▶ Dating back to 1960, Nelson's 50 receptions are tied for the second most by a Packers receiver in the first eight games of a season.
- ▶ His 22 TD grabs from 2011-12 were the most by a Packer over a two-year span since WR Antonio Freeman posted 26 TDs from 1997-98.
- ▶ Caught 15 TD passes in 2011, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942) as the only players in franchise annals to catch 15-plus TD passes in a season.
- ▶ With four TD grabs of 80-plus yards during his career, Nelson is tied for the most in team history and No. 1 among active NFL players (Vikings WR Greg Jennings).
- ▶ Is the 11th player in franchise history to surpass 5,000 career receiving yards.

56 JULIUS PEPPERS

- ▶ Only player in NFL history with at least 10 interceptions and 100 sacks.
- ▶ Has been selected to eight Pro Bowls since entering the league in 2002, which ties him with Troy Polamalu and Ray Lewis for the third most among defensive players over that span (Ed Reed, 9 / Champ Bailey, 12).
- ▶ With eight double-digit sack seasons as a pro, is tied with Jared Allen for the most in the NFL since 2002.
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times and was selected to the NFL's All-Decade team for the 2000s.

12 AARON RODGERS

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with a 105.6 career passer rating.
- ▶ Posted six consecutive zero-interception games this season (Weeks 2-7), tying Bart Starr's franchise record (min. 15 attempts a game) set in 1964.
- ▶ Joined Patriots QB Tom Brady (2007) as the only players in NFL history to register four straight three-touchdown/zero-interception games in a single season (Weeks 4-7, 2014).
- ▶ When he hit the 200-TD mark for his career, he had thrown just 53 INTs to that point, the fewest in NFL history as he bested Tom Brady's mark of 88 INTs at the time of his 200th TD pass.
- ▶ This season he became the first NFL quarterback to throw for 18-plus touchdowns with one or fewer interceptions in the first seven games of a season.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in NFL history for the most touchdown passes in a player's first 100 games with 203 (MIA QB Dan Marino, 217).
- ▶ Set an NFL single-season record in 2011 with a 122.5 passer rating and set team marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games (eight).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first five seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Threw a TD pass in 35 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field from 2008-12, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre, 1992-96). It was the second-longest home streak in NFL history behind Dan Marino's 39-game streak from 1983-88.
- ▶ Tied a single-game franchise record with six TD passes at Houston in Week 6 of 2012, matching Matt Flynn's mark (Jan. 1, 2012, vs. Detroit).
- ▶ In 95 regular-season starts, has 35 career 300-yard games, 40 three-TD

- games and 53 zero-INT games (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ Has posted a 100-plus passer rating 55 times. Set an NFL record for quarterbacks whose careers started since 1970 with 43 games with a 100-plus passer rating in his first 75 starts.
- ▶ Posted a 100-plus passer rating in five straight seasons (2009-13), the only quarterback in league history to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ Is the only QB in team history with four 400-yard passing games, including a 480-yard effort vs. Washington in Week 2 last season that tied a franchise record. No one else has more than one 400-yard game.
- ▶ In 2009, became first QB in NFL history to throw 30 or more TDs, seven or fewer INTs, and rush for five TDs in the same season.
- ▶ Has registered a passer rating over 110.0 in four or more consecutive games three times in his career (Weeks 3-7, 2009; Week 9, Weeks 11-13, 2010; Weeks 1-7, 9-12, 2011), one of only two quarterbacks in franchise history (Bart Starr, 1966) to accomplish the feat in a single season.

PACKERS STARTERS – OFFENSE

WR Jordy Nelson, 7th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08

- ▶ Ranks eighth in the league in receiving yards (737) and tied for ninth in receptions (50) this season.
- ▶ Led the team in 2013 with a career-high 85 catches for a career-best 1,314 yards and eight TDs. Ranked No. 10 in the NFL last season in receiving yards.
- ▶ With 15 TD catches in 2011, became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).
- ▶ Became the first player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to post three 80-yard TD grabs over an eight-game span in the regular season (Week 16, 2010-Week 6, 2011).

LT David Bakhtiari, 2nd Year, Colorado, D4a-13

- ▶ Has started every game at LT since the start of the 2013 regular season.
- ▶ Started all 16 games at left tackle last season, the only rookie in the NFL to do so in 2013 and the first Packer rookie to do so since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start at LT in the season opener since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since 1985.
- ▶ Earned second-team All-Pacific-12 honors from the conference's coaches each of his last two seasons (sophomore and junior) at Colorado.

LG Josh Sitton, 7th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08

- ▶ Has started 86 games since 2009, the most by an offensive player in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ▶ Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Marco Rivera in 2004.
- ▶ Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association.
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, allowed only nine sacks in his first five seasons as a starter (2009-13).
- ▶ Was the only Packer on either side of the ball to not miss a snap from 2009-10.

C Corey Linsley, Rookie, Ohio State, D5a-14

- ▶ First rookie center to start for Green Bay in Week 1 since the merger.
- ▶ Was one of five team captains and was part of a line that helped the team set school records for points scored (637), yards per carry (6.8), touchdowns (87) and TD passes (38) in '13.
- ▶ The Ohio native was part of a Buckeye team that won 24 consecutive games from 2012-13.

RG T.J. Lang, 6th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09

- ▶ Has started games at four different positions on the line as a pro (27 at LG, 24 at RG, five at RT, two at LT). Played C in Week 10 last season.
- ▶ Has started 55 contests since 2011.
- ▶ Started games at both tackle spots in his first season (2009) and became the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

RT Bryan Bulaga, 5th Year, Iowa, D1-10

- ▶ Missed the second part of the 2012 season after suffering a hip injury vs. Arizona on Nov. 4 and missed all of the 2013 season after injuring his knee on Aug. 3. Has started all but one game this season.
- ▶ Started 37 games at RT in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Started the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at right tackle after taking over for veteran Mark Tauscher (shoulder), the most regular-season starts by a Packers rookie tackle since Tauscher's 14 in 2000.
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.
- ▶ Capped his rookie season by becoming the youngest player, according to STATS LLC, to ever start in the Super Bowl (21 years, 322 days).

TE Andrew Quarless, Fifth Year, Penn State, D5a-10

- ▶ With Green Bay trailing by four, hauled in the game-winning touchdown with three seconds left at Miami in Week 6.
- ▶ Has started each of the last five games and has tied his single-season career high with two touchdown receptions this season (2013).
- ▶ Recorded at least one reception in seven of eight games this season.
- ▶ In 2013, moved into the starting role in Week 8 following TE Jermichael Finley's season-ending neck injury.
- ▶ Set career highs in receptions (32), receiving yards (312), games started (10) and games played (16) in 2013.
- ▶ At the end of his career at Penn State, held school records for receptions by a tight end in a career (87) and single season (41 in 2009). Finished his career ranked second in school history for receiving yards by a tight end with 1,146.

WR Randall Cobb, 4th Year, Kentucky, D2-11

- ▶ Tied for second in the NFL with nine touchdown receptions this season.
- ▶ Before suffering a knee injury in Week 6 last season, led the team in receptions with 29 and was No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.
- ▶ Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, he became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Led the team in receptions (80) and receiving yards (954) in 2012 and finished second on the squad in TD catches (eight).

QB Aaron Rodgers, 10th Year, California, D1-05

- ▶ His career passer rating of 105.6 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in the NFL this season in passer rating (113.6), No. 2 in touchdown percentage (7.6) and No. 6 in touchdown passes (19).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- ▶ In 95 regular-season starts (63-32 record), has posted 35 games with 300-plus passing yards, 53 without an interception and 55 with a 100-plus passer rating (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

RB Eddie Lacy, 2nd Year, Alabama, D2-13

- ▶ Ranked No. 1 in the league among rookies and No. 8 among all players with 1,178 rushing yards last season, despite missing one full game and nearly all of another due to a concussion.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history for the most rushing yards by a rookie in a single season, No. 1 in attempts (284), and tied for No. 1 for most 100-yard rushing games with four (John Brockington, four in 1971).
- ▶ Became the first Green Bay rookie RB to be selected to the Pro Bowl since Brockington in 1971 and was named Rookie of the Year by PFWA.
- ▶ Finished third in the league with 11 TD runs, with 10 of those scores coming between Weeks 7-17, the most in the league over that span.

FB John Kuhn, 9th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)

- ▶ Has played in 115 of 120 games (126 of 131 including playoffs) during his six-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.
- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- ▶ Only player on the team to have a rushing and receiving touchdown each season from 2008-11, and was the first Packer to achieve that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).
- ▶ Led the team with four rushing TDs in 2011 and led the running backs with six total TDs.



PACKERS STARTERS – DEFENSE

LDE Datone Jones, 2nd Year, UCLA, D1-13

- ▶ Overcame an ankle injury during the preseason to play in all 16 games in 2013.
- ▶ Rotated at defensive end and as one of the interior rushers in the team's sub-defenses, recording 3.5 sacks.
- ▶ Blocked an extra point at Cincinnati in Week 3 last year.
- ▶ Was the first UCLA defensive lineman selected in the first round since DT Manu Tuiaosopo in 1979 (No. 18 overall, Seattle).

NT Letroy Guion, 7th Year, Florida State, FA-14

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay this past offseason after spending his first six NFL seasons with the Minnesota Vikings after being selected in the fifth round of the 2008 NFL Draft.
- ▶ Started all 28 games he appeared in for Minnesota over the past two seasons, recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.
- ▶ Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012.

RDE Mike Daniels, 3rd Year, Iowa, D4a-12

- ▶ Second on the team with nine sacks since the start of the 2013 regular season (LB Clay Matthews-10).
- ▶ Played in all 16 games with one start last season and ranked No. 2 on the team with a career-high 6.5 sacks. Was tied for No. 6 in the NFL in sacks among defensive tackles.
- ▶ Returned a fumble 43 yards for a TD vs. Detroit in Week 14 of 2012, the longest fumble return for a TD by a rookie in franchise history.
- ▶ Starred as an interior pass rusher at Iowa, posting a team-high 24.5 tackles for a loss and 13 sacks from 2010-11.

LOLB Clay Matthews, 6th Year, Southern California, D1b-09

- ▶ Ranks No. 7 in the NFL since entering the league in 2009 with 52.5 sacks. His sack total ranks No. 5 in team history (since 1982).
- ▶ Became the first Packer in team history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the NFL (2009-12).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the *AP's* Defensive Player of the Year voting.

BLB A.J. Hawk, 9th Year, Ohio State, D1-06

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (since 1975) with 1,085 tackles.
- ▶ His 60 tackles this season are No. 1 on the team. Led the team with 153 tackles (112 solo) last season and was tied for No. 3 on the club with a career-high five sacks.
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Led the team with 142 tackles (105 solo) in 2012.
- ▶ Has appeared in 132 of a possible 134 regular-season games in his career, starting 129 of 132.
- ▶ Has posted 1,085 tackles (778 solo), 17.0 sacks, nine interceptions, 39 passes defended, three forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries during his career.

MLB Jamari Lattimore, 4th Year, Middle Tenn. St., FA-11

- ▶ Has provided depth at inside linebacker this season, and has started five games. In Week 5, he recorded his first career interception against Minnesota.
- ▶ Continued to contribute on special teams in 2013, but filled in at inside linebacker for injured LB Brad Jones, recording 38 tackles (31 solo), two sacks and a forced fumble.
- ▶ Spent the first three years of his career evolving into one of the core players on special teams.
- ▶ Made the transition from outside linebacker as a rookie in 2011 to inside linebacker in 2012.

ROLB Julius Peppers, 13th Year, North Carolina, FA-14

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay during the offseason after playing the last four seasons for Chicago and the first eight of his career for Carolina after being selected as the No. 2 overall pick in 2002.
- ▶ First player in NFL history with 10 interceptions and at least 100 sacks.
- ▶ Has been selected to the Pro Bowl eight times (2004-06, 2008-12) and has been named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times (2004, 2006, 2010). Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.
- ▶ Has played in 104 consecutive regular-season games.
- ▶ Ranks No. 3 in the league in sacks (122.5) and tied for No. 4 in forced fumbles (40) since entering the NFL in 2002. His sack total ranks No. 16 in NFL history (since 1982).
- ▶ Has blocked 13 kicks (12 field goals, one extra point) during his career.

LCB Tramon Williams, 8th Year, Louisiana Tech, FA-06

- ▶ Tied for No. 1 in the league in interceptions (20) and ranks No. 2 in the NFL in INT return yards (323) since 2010 (including playoffs).
- ▶ Started all 16 games last season and led the secondary with a career-high 91 tackles (68 solo) and a career-best 2.5 sacks. Added three interceptions, two fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and 14 passes defended.
- ▶ Despite suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener, went on to start 15 games that season and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defended (24). Also added four interceptions.
- ▶ With three interceptions during the 2010 playoffs, tied Joe Laws (1944) and Craig Newsome (1996) for the franchise single-postseason record.

RCB Sam Shields, 5th Year, Miami, FA-10

- ▶ Started all 14 games he appeared in last season and led the team with four INTs (tied career high) and a career-best 25 passes defended.
- ▶ Was limited to 10 games with eight starts in 2012 due to injury, but registered 38 tackles (28 solo), three interceptions, 15 passes defended (No. 3 on the team) and a sack.
- ▶ Made an impact in 2010 after making the team as a non-drafted rookie, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one season in college.
- ▶ In Green Bay's NFC Championship win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.

SS Morgan Burnett, 5th Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10

- ▶ Second on the team with 59 tackles this season. Ranked No. 2 on the team with 106 tackles (77 solo) in 2013, despite missing the first three games due to injury. Recovered three fumbles, including one for a TD, and added nine passes defended.
- ▶ Participated in all 1,088 plays for Green Bay's defense in 2012, one of only four non-offensive linemen in the NFL to appear in 100 percent of his team's snaps.
- ▶ Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining DT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

FS Micah Hyde, 2nd Year, Iowa, D5a-13

- ▶ Appeared in all 16 games last season, playing in the most defensive plays (428) among the Packers' defensive rookies.
- ▶ Spent most of his rookie season as the dime or nickel cornerback, helping to fill in for CB Casey Hayward, who missed all but three games due to a hamstring injury.
- ▶ As the team's primary return man for most of the 2013 season, ranked No. 5 in the NFL in punt return average (12.3) and No. 14 in kickoff return average (24.1). Recorded a 93-yard punt return for a touchdown, which is tied for the fourth longest in team history.

GAME 1

SEATTLE -- The Super Bowl champion Seattle Seahawks started 2014 the same way they finished last season, with a convincing win. Marshawn Lynch rushed for 110 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Percy Harvin had 100 combined yards rushing and receiving, and the Seahawks' Jimmy Graham had a 36-6 win over the Green Bay Packers to kick off the regular season.

The Seahawks unveiled the first Super Bowl banner in franchise history during a vibrant pregame ceremony and then began the process of trying to be the first team in a decade to repeat.

Russell Wilson was outstanding in the first half, including a 53-yard touchdown pass to Ricardo Lockette. Harvin got touches as a receiver, running back and returner. He was used all over the field in different formations save never being truly healthy in his first season with Seattle.

Wilson finished 19 of 28 for 191 yards passing and Lynch was at his best. Pete Carroll said earlier this week that Lynch appeared in the best shape of his career, and it showed. Lynch averaged 3.3 yards per carry and topped 100 yards for the 20th time in the regular season since joining the Seahawks in 2010.

Lynch, who ran for 1,257 yards and 12 touchdowns last season, barreled through a trio of Packers for the TD with 3:41 left before halftime to give the Seahawks a 17-10 lead and added a second TD run on the first play of the fourth quarter.

Seattle had 207 yards rushing as a team and won for the 18th time in its last 20 regular-season home games. Harvin finished with 11 offensive touches, including four rushes for 41 yards.

Rodgers finished 23 of 33 for 189 yards and was isolated to one side of the field. He looked almost exclusively for Jordy Nelson matched up against Byron Maxwell and never threw Richard Sherman's direction. Nelson finished with nine receptions, but Maxwell came up with a third-quarter interception on a pass that deflected off Nelson's hands.

The most action for Sherman came in the first half when he accidentally blocked Davon House into Earl Thomas on a punt return causing a fumble recovered by the Packers.

But Seattle's defense did its part. They sacked Rodgers three times, taking advantage of a knee injury suffered by right tackle Bryan Bulaga in the second quarter. His replacement, Derek Sherrod, gave up a fourth-down sack to Cliff Avril to end one drive inside Seattle territory. Following a Seattle punt, Sherrod was beaten by Michael Bennett on Green Bay's next offensive snap. Rodgers was stripped and Sherrod fell on the fumble in the end zone for a safety and a 22-10 lead.

Nine plays later, Lynch walked in from the 3-yard line for a 29-10 Seahawks lead. Rodgers threw a 3-yard TD pass to Randall Cobb in the fourth quarter but Wilson closed out the victory with a 13-yard drive that ate up seven minutes and was capped by a 15-yard TD pass to Derrick Coleman on fourth down with 2:31 left.

Eddie Lacy was mostly a non-factor with 34 yards rushing on 12 carries and left in the fourth quarter to be evaluated for a concussion. Seattle linebacker Bobby Wagner tied a career high with 14 tackles.

GAME 2

GREEN BAY WIS. — Aaron Rodgers threw for three scores, including an 80-yard strike to Jordy Nelson in the third quarter, and the Packers roared back from an 18-point deficit to win their home opener, 31-24, over the New York Jets.

After allowing a 21-3 lead early in the second quarter, coach Rex Ryan's team had a chance to the late. It looked as though that had happened with 5 minutes left on a 37-yard touchdown catch by Jeremy Kerley on fourth down — but the score was negated because the Jets' (1-1) called a timeout from the sideline just before the snap.

Ryan said he didn't call time. He suspected it could have been offensive coordinator Marty Mornhinweg or quarterback Geno Smith. Defensive lineman Sheldon Richardson said he was to blame because he leaned over to tell the referee when he saw Mornhinweg calling for time.

Smith's last-ditch pass on fourth-and-8 with 3:31 left for a double-covered Kerley was tipped away. The 78,000-plus fans at Lambeau Field breathed a collective sigh of relief, and the Packers held the ball for a timeout.

Green Bay (1-1) avoided its first 0-2 start since 2005. It took a little while to get going, though, as Rodgers fumbled away the snap on the first play of the opening series. The Jets scored on their first three drives.

Slowly, but surely, the offense started chipping away. Then, the defense came up with some big stops late.

The Jets tried backup Michael Vick at quarterback on one play, but he was taken down from behind in the open by Clay Matthews for a sack. That drive ended with the pass breakup on Kerley in the end zone.

Rodgers finished 25 of 42 with 346 yards. Nelson had nine catches and Cobb finished with five catches for 39 yards. Cobb caught two short scoring strikes and a 2-point conversion that gave the Packers a 24-21 lead in the third quarter.

Green Bay went up 31-24 late in the third quarter when Nelson worked a double move on Dee Milliner for the 80-yard score. Nelson ran and out-and-out route. With the safety coming over late to help, Nelson beat our Jets defenders in a footrace to the end zone.

Just a couple of hours earlier, it looked as if the home crowd was going to witness a surprising loss.

Chris Ivory bargained up the middle for a 4-yard score at 10:38 of the second quarter that left the fans stunned silence with the Packers down 21-3 on the ground with 13 carries and 43 yards.

The Packers' comeback started with a 13-point flurry in the final 5:43 of the first half, including field goals from 20 and 55 yards by Mason Crosby. The later kick set a Packers record at the time.

Then, the Packers got the defensive break they desperately needed when Tramon Williams stepped in front of tight end Zach Sudfield for an interception at the Packers 3.

Rodgers followed with a 10-play, 97-yard drive in 1:44 that ended with a 6-yard score to Cobb to get the Packers within five at the half.

GAME 3

DETROIT — Even one of Matthew Stafford's interceptions quickly turned into two points for Detroit.

That was just part of a strong performance from the Lions' defensive front in a 19-7 victory over the Green Bay Packers. Madsimir Surt and the Lions pressured Aaron Rodgers throughout, and Detroit's injury-plagued secondary was never a problem Sunday. Don Carey worked a fumble 40 yards for a touchdown, and the Lions held Green Bay to 223 yards of offense.

Detroit (2-1) came in with a secondary decimated by injuries, but Rodgers couldn't take advantage. He was sacked twice and threw for only 162 yards, and Green Bay (1-2) wasn't any better when running the ball.

Stafford was 22 of 34 for 246 yards with two interceptions. The Detroit quarterback's second interception - on third-and-long in the second quarter - actually worked out in his team's favor. His deep pass for Calvin Johnson was picked off near the goal line by Davon House, and although the play was initially ruled a touchdown, a review gave Green Bay the ball at its own 1-yard line.

The Packers tried a run with Eddie Lacy, and linebacker DeAndre Levy caught him in the end zone for a safety that put Detroit ahead 9-7.

Detroit's offense finally scored a touchdown in the fourth quarter on a 26-yard run by Reggie Bush.

Safety James Ihedigbo (neck) and cornerback Cassius Vaughn (ankle) were inactive for Detroit, which has also lost defensive backs Bill Bentley and Kevin Lawson to season-ending injuries. Linebacker Stephen Tulloch left in the first quarter after hurting his left knee while celebrating a sack of Rodgers.

The Packers lost despite forcing three turnovers. They tried to establish the run a bit early, and that backfired when Lacy's fumble was scooped up by Carey. The defensive back went all the way to the end zone for a 7-0 lead.

Carry hadn't played in Detroit's first two games this season because of a hamstring problem, and he left this game after aggravating that same injury.

Green Bay had won 15 of the past 17 meetings with Detroit, and the Packers were 9-1 with Rodgers playing. The one loss he took part in came in 2010, when he left the game in the first half with a concussion. Green Bay lost that game 7-3 - until Sunday, that was the only time since Rodgers became the starting quarterback in 2008 that the Packers were held to seven points or fewer.

Last season, Rodgers was out with a fractured collarbone when Green Bay lost to the Lions 40-10 on Thanksgiving.

Rodgers threw a 10-yard touchdown pass to Andrew Quarless in the first quarter Sunday to tie it at 7, but the Packers never scored again.

CHICAGO -- Aaron Rodgers urged Packers fans to relax. Maybe they will after this one. Rodgers threw for 302 yards and four touchdowns, and Green Bay shook off one of its worst offensive performances in years with a 38-17 victory over the Chicago Bears on Sunday afternoon.

The Packers (2-2) scored on their first six possessions to build a 38-17 lead. They racked up 358 yards after being held to 223, their lowest total since 2008, a week earlier in a 19-7 loss at Detroit.

They intercepted Jay Cutler twice in the third quarter to pull away from the Bears (2-2). That gave Green Bay five straight wins at Soldier Field, including the NFC title game four years ago and a playoffs-or-bust finale for both teams last season.

Rodgers called on Packers fans to take a deep breath during the week, and he gave them reason to exhale with this performance.

He had all the answers in this one.

Rodgers posted a 151.2 rating for the game, completing 22 of 28 passes, and had all the time he needed with five-time Pro Bowl defensive end Jared Allen sitting out because of an illness.

He threw two touchdown passes each to Randall Cobb and Jordy Nelson, and a fifth got called back by a penalty. That happened early in the third when a scrambling Rodgers got hit by at least one defender while unleashing an awkward, wobbly 34-yard pass that somehow connected with Davante Adams in the end zone.

Cobb had seven catches for 113 yards. Nelson had 10 receptions for 108 yards, and the Packers came away with the win despite allowing 496 yards.

The offenses were so effective - or the defenses struggled so badly - that neither team punted. That happened only once before in a regular-season NFL game, 22 years ago.

The Bears basically matched Green Bay score for score before Cutler threw those interceptions. He wound up passing for 256 yards and two TDs but fell to 1-10 lifetime against Green Bay, counting the 23 carries.

Martellus Bennett had nine catches for a career-high 134 yards, but Chicago came up short after back-to-back wins at San Francisco and the New York Jets.

Mason Crosby kicked a 53-yard field goal on the opening possession of the second half to extend the Packers' lead to 24-17 and things unraveled for the Bears after that.

Chicago had the ball on the Green Bay 24 when Cutler hit cornerback Tramon Williams in the chest with a pass. The ball ricocheted to Clay Matthews, who returned it 45 yards. That led to an 11-yard scoring pass from Rodgers to Nelson, making it 31-17.

Another interception set up another TD for the Packers. This time, Brandon Marshall went long when Cutler expected him to cut back toward the quarterback.

The pass went right to Sam Shields, who crossed the field on a 62-yard return to put the ball at the 11. Chicago's Jonathan Beasley got called for a hold, negating a field goal by Crosby for a 31-17 lead to the locker room after the two teams combined for 508 yards. Chicago missed a touchdown by inches when Bennett got stopped just short of the end zone on an 8-yard catch. Cutler thought Bennett reached across the goal line before getting taken down, but the ball was upfield after a replay.

Then, in the third quarter, Green Bay created some breathing room.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. — Aaron Rodgers stood facemask to facemask with a teammate, screaming in jubilation at the end of a hot, harrowing afternoon.

Rodgers had the last word Sunday, throwing a 4-yard touchdown pass to Andrew Quarless with three seconds left to help the Green Bay Packers rally past the Miami Dolphins 27-24.

Green Bay twice gave up leads and trailed 24-17 before Rodgers directed consecutive drives of 68 and 60 yards for the victory. He overcame a fumble and a fourth-and-10 on the Packers' final possession, and faked an intentional spike before throwing a completion that set up the touchdown. Rodgers finished with three touchdown passes and 264 yards while committing no turnovers. The Packers (4-2) earned their third consecutive victory, won in Miami for the second time ever and remained tied with the Detroit Lions atop the NFC North.

The Dolphins (2-3) lost despite the return of six starters who had missed playing time. They overcame deficits of 10-3 and 17-10 to take a 24-17 lead with nine minutes left when Ryan Tannehill hit Mike Wallace for a 5-yard score.

At that point the Packers appeared to be willing on a typical fall day in the subtropics -- sunny, humid and 85 degrees.

Rodgers kicked a field goal with 4:09 to go, making it 24-20, then forced a punt to start at their 40 with 2:04 left.

Rodgers fumbled when stacked, and teammate T.J. Lang recovered. That set up a fourth-and-10, but Rodgers threw to Jordy Nelson for 18 yards, then hit James Starks on third-and-10 for 10 yards.

With the clock running following another completion, Rodgers faked a spike before throwing to Davante Adams, who gained 12 yards before going out of bounds with six seconds remaining.

Following a Dolphins timeout, Quarless easily outmaneuvered linebacker Philip Wheeler for the winning catch. Wheeler wasn't thrilled with the defensive scheme, which left him alone on the flank.

Playing in his 10th regular-season game, Rodgers also threw for scores of 9 yards to Nelson and 5 yards to Randall Cobb. He has 15 touchdowns passes and only one interception this season.

With the Packers' secondary depleted, Tannehill threw for two scores and 143 yards in the second half, but he was unable to run out the clock with a 24-20 lead. The Dolphins tried four passes and ran only three times on their final possession.

Green Bay made a goal-line stand in the first quarter, stopping Miami three consecutive times at the 1, including on fourth down when Morgan Burnett tackled Knowshon Moreno for a loss. Casey Hayward intercepted Tannehill to set up a field goal.

The Packers enjoyed a 14-and-a-half-minute advantage in time of possession, a big change from other games this season. Their run defense was ranked as the NFL's worst, but Miami's running backs totaled only 63 yards on 20 carries.

GREEN BAY WRs -- Randall Cobb got messy on his Lambeau Leap. A fan spilled ketchup on the receiver's uniform during his post-touchdown celebration in the second quarter of Green Bay's 38-17 win Sunday over the Carolina Panthers. It was about the only stain on an otherwise flawless first half for the Packers.

Aaron Rodgers threw three touchdown passes. Cobb touched the Carolina secondary for 121 yards and a score on six catches and Green Bay dominated after building a 28-3 lead at halftime.

The sure-tackling Packers (5-2) limited quarterback Cam Newton. Green Bay scored on its first three series, and the 25-point lead at halftime eliminated the threat of the Panthers' ground game.

Cobb said it might have been the team's most complete performance of the season.

Newton, who had a career-high 17 carries last week, had 41 yards rushing on seven attempts. He passed for 205 yards and a fourth-quarter touchdown for Carolina (3-3-1).

His Packers' counterpart was masterful against the Carolina defense. The 2011 MVP was 19 of 22 for 255 yards before leaving early in the fourth quarter with the game well in hand.

It was Rodgers' sixth straight game without an interception, tying Bart Starr for the franchise record set in 1964.

Rodgers finished Sunday with a quarterback rating of 154.5, and the Packers said he was just the second player in NFL history with a rating of 150 or more in two of the first seven games of the season. New England's Tom Brady also did it in 2007.

Carolina coach Ron Rivera says more than enough.

Carolina's Mike McCarthy said Rodgers is much better than three seasons ago. Rodgers thought he could do more. Carolina coach Ron Rivera says more than enough.

The Packers scored on their first series after Rodgers connected with Jordy Nelson for a 59-yard scoring strike and never looked back to win their fourth straight. Eddie Lacy and James Starks each added rushing touchdowns in the first quarter.

The Panthers finally got their first touchdown with 9:39 left in the fourth quarter after Newton found receiver Kelvin Benjamin for a 13-yard score.

Nearly everything went right for the Packers in the first half, when nearly everything went wrong for the Panthers.

Carolina had pushed Green Bay back to third-and-12 on the Packers' 28 on the first drive when the Panthers were whittled for back-to-back penalties. Rodgers scrambled for 3 yards on third-and-2 before finding Nelson for the long touchdown.

Nelson got behind cornerback Antonio Carson, who then slipped. Safety Roman Harper watched Nelson slide past around him and log all the way into the end zone.

Green Bay's next drive ended with Lacy high-stepping his way for a 5-yard touchdown and a 14-0 lead with 5:53 left in the first quarter.

Carolina's frustration mounted as the deficit grew.

Linebacker Luke Kuebelly was ejected late in the third quarter. Last season's Defensive Player of the Year swung his arms and seemed agitated as he was restrained from behind by back judge Steve Freeman following a scramble for a tumble recovered by the Packers.

24 Jarrett Bush, CB, 9th Year, Utah State

- Tallied a double-digit tackle total on special teams for seven consecutive seasons (2006-12), becoming the first Packer to accomplish that feat since the statistic began being recorded by the team in 1976.

- Played in all 16 games for five straight seasons (2008-12), and saw a streak of 92 consecutive games played (including playoffs) snapped when he suffered a hamstring injury in Week 2 last season.

- With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.

- Ranked No. 2 in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.7) in 2011, setting a franchise rookie record with 941 kickoff return yards on the season.

2014 Season: Has started all eight games and has 40 catches for 578 yards (14.5 avg.) and a team-leading and career-high nine TDs...Is tied for No. 2 in the league (Broncos TE Julius Thomas, 10) and leads all wide receivers in TD catches...Has caught at least one TD pass in seven of eight games this season and has 11 TD grabs over his last nine games...Has returned eight punts for 86 yards (10.8 avg.).

catches, the first Packer to catch five TD passes in the first four games of a season since Billy Howton and Gary Knafelc both did so in 1956...Joined Jordy Nelson as they became the first Green Bay players to both register 100 receiving yards and two TD catches in the same game since Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler hit those marks vs. the St. Louis Cardinals on Dec. 21, 1969.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Tied for the team lead with three receptions for 34 yards (11.3 avg.), highlighted by his 8-yard TD catch in the first quarter that started the Green Bay scoring...Lined up in the slot, made a move in the end zone to shed CB Captain Munnerlyn for the 8-yard scoring grab...The TD was his sixth of the season as he became the first Green Bay player since Howton (seven) in 1956 to post six or more receiving TDs in the first five games of a season.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Caught five passes for 58 yards (11.6 avg.), including a 5-yard TD catch late in the third quarter that put Green Bay up 17-10...Working against S Louis Delmas in the end zone on third down, cut to the right and then back to the left to free himself as Rodgers scrambled and found him for the score.

► **at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Led the team with 126 receiving yards on five grabs (25.2 avg.), highlighted by a career-long 70-yard TD reception on Green Bay's first possession of the game...On third-and-10 at the Green Bay 30, adjusted his route and headed up field as Rodgers scrambled, getting behind CB Keenan Lewis near the sideline and making the catch at the New Orleans 35...Outran Lewis and S Rafael Bush the rest of the way for his career-high ninth TD of the season, surpassing his previous season high (eight in 2012) in just the eighth game of the season...It marked his fifth consecutive game with a TD catch, the first Packer to do so since WR Greg Jennings in 2007...Finished the first quarter with 101 yards receiving on three receptions, the best receiving-yardage total by a Packer in a first quarter since WR Donald Driver registered 111 yards on three grabs (37.0 avg.) at Chicago on Oct. 7, 2002.

2 Mason Crosby, K, 8th Year, Colorado

- Set an NFL record with 903 points in his first seven seasons (2007-13), topping the previous league record held by Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).

- With 961 career points, ranks No. 2 on the all-time franchise scoring list behind only K Ryan Longwell (1,054).

- Is one of only three players in NFL history to register three or more 140-point seasons (Stephen Gostkowski, David Akers).

- Has kicked the six longest field goals in franchise history (58-yarder in 2011, two 57-yarders in 2013, 56-yarders in 2010 and 2011, 55-yarder in 2014).

- Set a franchise record with 23 consecutive field goals made (Week 13, 2010-Week 12, 2011), topping Chris Jacke's mark of 17 straight in 1993.

2014 Season: Has converted 11 of 12 field-goal attempts (a blocked FG) and all 25 extra points for 58 points on the season...Has connected on both of his attempts from 50-plus yards (55, 53)...Has recorded 26 touchbacks on 44 kickoffs (59.1 percent)...Has made one tackle on special teams.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Connected on his lone field-goal attempt

of the evening, a 23-yarder in the second quarter, to bring his streak of consecutive regular-season field goals made to 15 (ties Chris Jacke, 1989-90, for the third-longest streak in franchise history)...Also marked his franchise-record 16th straight regular-season game with at least one field goal, surpassing Longwell's record of 15 (2004-05)...Added two touchbacks on four kickoffs.

70 T.J. Lang, G, 6th Year, Eastern Michigan

- Has started 55 games since 2011, which is tied for No. 1 on the team over that span (CB Tramon Williams).
- In his first three seasons as a starter (2011-13), helped the Packers rank No. 3 in the NFL in scoring (29.4 ppg), No. 6 in total offense (388.2 ypg) and No. 4 in passing offense (275.9 ypg) over that span.
- Has started 58 games as a pro, opening contests at four different positions (27 at LG, 24 at RG, five at RT, two at LT).
- Saw the first action of his career at center in 2013 and has now played all five positions in a game during his NFL career.

2014 Season: Has started all eight games at RG.

- Set a franchise record (since 1976) with a 38.95-yard net punting average in 2013, and now holds the top four single-season marks (2010-13) in team annals.

- Holds two of the top four single-season gross punting averages in team history (44.6 in 2013).

- Ranks No. 1 in team annals (since 1976) for the most career punts placed inside the 20 with 109, having surpassed Craig Hentrich's mark (104) in Week 5 vs. Minnesota.

2014 Season: Has registered a 47.0-yard gross average and a net average of 40.8 yards on 28 punts this season...Ranks No. 7 in the NFL in gross punting average and No. 10 in the league in net punting average through Week 9...Has placed nine punts inside the 20.

- Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting in 2010.

2014 Season: Has started all eight games, opening four at LOLB and four at ROLB, and has recorded 27 tackles (15 solo), 2.5 sacks, an interception, a team-high two forced fumbles, four passes defended, eight QB hits and 10 pressures...Ranks No. 2 on the defense in both QB hits and pressures.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Brought down WR Percy Harvin for a 2-yard loss on a short pass early in the second quarter, also forcing a fumble on the play, one that Harvin recovered...Finished the game with five tackles (three solo) and a pressure.

• Is tied for No. 4 in the league with 36 TD catches since 2011 and ranks No. 5 in the NFL (min. 150 receptions) over that span with a 16.1-yard receiving average.

• Ranks No. 8 in franchise history in receptions (352), No. 11 in receiving yards (5,327) and No. 9 in TD catches (42).

2014 Season: Has started all eight games and leads the team in recep-

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** His lone reception of the evening was an impactful one, catching a 66-yard TD pass from Rodgers in the first quarter to put Green Bay up 14-0...Sped past CB Captain Munnerlyn, who passed him off to S Harrison Smith, before making an out-and-up move on Smith to get open and catch Rodgers' deep pass perfectly in stride at the Minnesota 20 before taking it the rest of the way for the score.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Led the team in receptions (nine) and receiving yards (107), his fourth game with nine-plus receptions on the season and his third 100-yard game...Tied the single-season franchise record with his fourth nine-catch game on the season (six other times in team history)...Brought his season receiving total to 43 receptions, which is tied with WR Sterling Sharpe (1993) for the most catches through six games in team history...Caught a 9-yard TD pass over the middle on Green

• Has posted eight double-digit sack seasons since 2002, which is tied with Bears DE Jared Allen for No. 1 in the league over that span.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Completed 12 of 17 passes for 156 yards and three TDs with no INTs for a 138.7 passer rating, his sixth 130-plus rating game in his last seven starts against Minnesota...His 11-yard TD pass to WR Davante Adams in the second quarter was the 200th of his career as he reached that mark in his 99th career game, the second fastest

in NFL history behind only Dolphins QB Dan Marino (89 games)...Set an NFL record for the fewest INTs by a quarterback at the time of his 200th career TD pass with 53, topping the previous mark held by Patriots QB Tom Brady (88) by 35 INTs...Connected with Nelson on a 66-yard TD pass in the second quarter, Rodgers' 21st of 60-plus yards since 2008, No. 1 in the NFL over that span...Posted his fourth straight zero-INT game, his longest streak since a four-gamer in 2012 (Weeks 14-17)...His 17 attempts on the evening tied his career low (vs. Detroit, Oct. 3, 2010) for a game he did not depart early due to injury...Exited the game after a seven-play, 52-yard TD drive that put Green Bay up 42-0 late in the third quarter.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Appearing in his 100th career regular-season game, led the Packers on an 11-play, 60-yard game-winning drive that was capped off with his 4-yard TD pass to TE Andrew Quarless with three seconds remaining in the 27-24 win...It marked the first time the Packers won a game on a TD with three seconds or less remaining in the fourth quarter since they beat the Bears, 20-19, on a 3-yard TD run by QB Bart Starr with three seconds left on Nov. 15, 1970...Completed 24 of 42 passes on the day for 264 yards and three TDs with zero INTs, his fifth consecutive start with no interceptions as he matched his career high set in 2010...The three TD passes brought his career total to 203, the second most in NFL history through 100 games behind only Dolphins QB Dan Marino (217)...On his 5-yard TD pass to Cobb in the third quarter, moved up in the pocket to avoid DE Cameron Wake, scrambled to his right to elude DE Olivier Vernon and LB Koa Misi, and then threw across his body to find Cobb in the end zone...On the game-winning TD drive, found Nelson for an 18-yard gain down the right sideline to convert a fourth-and-10...After finding Cobb four plays later for a 4-yard gain to the Miami 16, raced up to the line to down the ball and stop the clock, but instead faked a spike with 12 seconds left before throwing to WR Davante Adams on the right sideline for a 12-yard pickup to the Miami 4...On the next play, went to Quarless, who was split out wide to the right and matched up with LB Philip Wheeler, on a back-shoulder throw in the end zone for the winning score...Added 34 rushing yards on the afternoon on seven attempts (4.9 avg.), his best rushing-yardage total since a 57-yard day at Indianapolis on Oct. 7, 2012.

► **vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Threw for 255 yards and three TDs on 19-of-22 passing for a 154.5 passer rating, the second-highest rating of his career (min. 20 attempts) and the third best in team annals...His 86.4 completion percentage was a career high and the third-best mark in team history...Posted his fourth straight three-TD/zero-INT game, joining Patriots QB Tom Brady (2007) as the only QBs in NFL history to accomplish the feat in a single season...Posted his sixth straight zero-INT game, tying Bart Starr's franchise record (min. 15 attempts per game) set in 1964...With 22 attempts and no interceptions, brought his streak of consecutive attempts without an interception to 192, his career high and the second-best mark in franchise history (Starr, 294, 1964-65)...His three TD passes gave him 18 for the season as he became the first QB in NFL history to throw for 18 TD passes in the first seven games of the season with one or zero interceptions...Joined Brady (2007) as the only QBs in NFL history to register two 150-rating outings in the first seven games of the season...Completed three passes of 30-plus yards on the afternoon, highlighted by a 59-yard TD pass to Nelson on the opening drive...Also found Cobb for gains of 47 and 33 yards...Did not play in the fourth quarter (coach's decision), departing with a 38-3 lead...Was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance, the second time on the season he earned the weekly award and the 10th time he has received the honor in his career.

► **at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Threw for 418 yards and a TD on 28-of-39 passing with two INTs, the second-highest yardage output of his career...Marked the fourth 400-yard passing game of his career, with no other QB in franchise annals having more than one 400-yard game...Saw his streak of passing attempts without an interception come to an end at 212, the second-longest streak in franchise history...Found WR Randall Cobb for a 70-yard TD pass on the opening drive of the game, his 15th career TD pass of 70-plus yards as he matched QB Brett Favre for the franchise record...Also tied Favre and QB Peyton Manning for the most

70-yard TD passes in NFL history...Connected with RB Eddie Lacy on a 65-yard screen pass on Green Bay's second series, becoming the first NFL quarterback since Cardinals QB Kurt Warner (vs. Miami, Sept. 14, 2008) to complete a 65-yard pass on both of the first two series...Posted 203 passing yards in the first quarter alone, his career high for any quarter, topping his previous best of 197 yards in the second quarter vs. Washington on Sept. 15, 2013...His 278 yards passing in the first half were his second most in either half behind only his 335-yard output in the first half against the Redskins in 2013...With Lacy (123) and Cobb (126) both recording 100-yard days, it marked the first time Green Bay had a RB/WR duo each register 100 yards receiving in the same game since RB Eddie Lee Ivey (128) and WR Aundra Thompson (102) accomplished the feat on Oct. 12, 1980, at Tampa Bay...Sustained a hamstring injury on a 7-yard scramble that picked up a first down with about nine minutes left in the third quarter, but remained in the game...Scored on a 14-yard run with 5:07 left in the contest, his first rushing TD since Dec. 23, 2012, vs. Tennessee.

89 Richard Rodgers, TE, Rookie, California

- Played tight end for his first two seasons at California before moving to inside receiver as a junior in 2013, where he caught a career-high 39 passes for a career-best 608 yards (15.6 avg.) and a TD.

- Led the Golden Bears with 11 receptions of 20-plus yards in 2013.

- Appeared in 35 games with 11 starts during his three seasons at Cal and finished with 59 receptions for 896 yards (15.2 avg.) and two TDs.

2014 Season: Has played in all eight games with four starts and has seven catches for 111 yards (15.9 avg.).

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Became the first Green Bay rookie TE to start a season opener since Jackie Harris opened in a two-tight-end set in 1990...Left the game due to a neck injury sustained in the second quarter, but did return to action...Saw 20 snaps on offense.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started, appearing on 34 plays, and helped protect QB Aaron Rodgers as he threw for 346 yards and three TDs with no INTs.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started and appeared on 11 offensive snaps.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Started and posted the first two receptions of his career, with both coming on Green Bay's opening drive...Hauled in a 9-yarder on the Packers' first offensive play and then caught a deep pass that went for 43 yards on the next snap, the longest reception by a rookie tight end in franchise history.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Appeared on 19 offensive plays but did not record any statistics.
