## WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports, now in its 21st season as an NFL network television partner, will broadcast the game to a regional audience.



- ▶ Play-by-play man **Joe Buck** joins analyst **Troy Aikman** and sideline reporter **Erin Andrews**.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in five states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 20th season calling Packers' games. McCarren, who is in his 26th year in Green Bay television, has four times been voted Wisconsin Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 16th season of broadcasts together.
- ▶ Sports USA Radio will air the game across the country. **Adam Amin** (play-by-play) and **Doug Plank** (analyst) will call the action with **Samy Panayotovitch** reporting from the sidelines.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed) as part of the network's NFL Sunday Drive.
- ▶ DIRECTV subscribers can watch the game on channel 707.



## PACKERS HOST EAGLES AT LAMBEAU FIELD

Green Bay plays Philadelphia at home for the second consecutive season. This will be the 14th meeting all-time between the clubs at Lambeau Field.

- ▶ The Packers play the Eagles in Green Bay in back-to-back seasons for only the second time in the series (1933-34).
- ▶ Green Bay and Philadelphia have played each other at least once in eight of the past 14 seasons (2000-13). Including the postseason, they have played a total of 10 times since 2000.
- ▶ The Packers are 2-0 against the Eagles in the regular season with Aaron Rodgers as the starting quarterback. This will be Rodgers' first start against Philadelphia at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Each of the Packers' last five victories over the Eagles have come by single digits.
- ▶ The two teams are meeting for consecutive seasons for the first time since meeting five straight years, 2003-07.
- ▶ In each of the previous four matchups, including the postseason, neither team scored more than 27 points.
- ▶ Sunday's contest marks the 39th time the Packers and Eagles have met in the regular season, with Green Bay holding a 24-14 edge in the series. The teams have met three times in the postseason, with Green Bay winning one of those games.
- ▶ At 6-3 on the season, Green Bay is currently second in the NFC North behind Detroit (7-2).
- ▶ Including this week, the Packers will face two teams over the next three games that won their division last season in Philadelphia and New England. Since the start of 2013 the Eagles and Patriots have a combined regular-season record of 36-14, including 14-4 this season.
- ▶ The Packers are playing home games in consecutive weeks for the first time all season.
- ▶ This will be the second of four home games over a five-week stretch for Green Bay.
- ▶ For the 16th time in franchise history, the Packers have started 4-0 at home. In the previous 15 times Green Bay has started 4-0 at home, they went on to finish undefeated 12 times, while only losing one game in each of the other three seasons.
- ▶ The Packers have outscored their opponents 166-65 in the four games at Lambeau Field. Green Bay's plus-101 point differential at home leads the NFL this season.
- ▶ This Sunday the Packers will wear their third jersey, a re-creation of the team's uniform from 1929, the year of the Packers' first world championship. Green Bay has worn the uniform three times, winning all three games by a combined score of 89-32.

## PACKERS VS. EAGLES - WEEK 11

### HOME COOKING

The Packers have won 28 of their last 33 with one tie and 34 of their last 40 games with one tie at Lambeau Field in the regular season.

- ▶ Green Bay's .830 winning percentage (36-7-1) at home since 2009 ranks **No. 2 in the NFL** over that span:

- ▶ The Packers have averaged 31.5 points per game at home since 2009, **No. 3 in the league** over that span. Green Bay has posted 22 games of 30-plus points since '09, including all four this season:

- ▶ Green Bay has posted 11 games with 40-plus points at home since 2009, including scoring 42 and 55 points this season. The Packers are 11-0 at home when scoring at least 40 points. Green Bay's 11 games with 40-plus points at home since 2009 **are tied for No. 1 in the NFL** over that span:

- ▶ The defense has done its part as well at home since 2009, generating 94 turnovers at Lambeau Field. With Green Bay's offense posting only 44 giveaways over that span, the Packers have a plus-50 turnover ratio at home, which **ranks No. 2 in the league** since '09:

- ▶ With the 94 takeaways at home since 2009, the Packers **are tied for No. 2 in the league** in that category:

- ▶ Green Bay has generated at least two takeaways in 27 of 43 home games since 2009. The Packers have a 24-3 mark (.889) in those games. The Packers have posted four or more takeaways at Lambeau Field in nine of those contests.
- ▶ The Packers' win over Tennessee in Week 16 of 2012 gave the team its third straight season with at least seven wins at home. It marked the second-longest streak in franchise history behind only a span of five straight seasons (1994-98) with seven or more victories at home.
- ▶ A look at the most home victories over a three-season span in franchise history:

### STAT OF THE WEEK

- ▶ Green Bay started 4-0 at home for the 16th time in franchise history but only the sixth time since the AFL-NFL merger in 1970 (1996, 1997, 2001, 2002, 2011).
- ▶ The Packers have recorded two home games with 40-plus points. Dating back to 1940, it ties for the second-most 40-plus point games at home by Green Bay, trailing only the five 40-point games the Packers recorded in 2011.
- ▶ Green Bay has scored more than 30 points in each of the first four home games (31, 42, 38, 55). Dating back to 1921, it is the first time the Packers have registered at least 30 points in each of their first four home games.
- ▶ Including the 2013 regular season, the Packers have registered 30-plus points in five straight home games for only the second time in franchise history (2011).
- ▶ Green Bay is tied for the most home games with at least 30 points this season (Denver Broncos, Philadelphia Eagles and Pittsburgh Steelers).
- ▶ Under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**, Green Bay has scored 30-plus points at home 32 times, winning 30 of those contests. The Packers' 32 home games with at least 30 points is tied for the third most in the league over that span.

- ▶ The Packers are averaging 41.5 points per game at home to lead the NFL this season:

- ▶ Green Bay has averaged more than 30 points per game at home seven times in franchise history (2011, 2010, 1996, 1983, 1960, 1945, 1942) and more than 40 points per game at home once (40.1 in 2011).
- ▶ Green Bay scored 55 points against Chicago in Week 10. It was the most points scored by the Packers at Lambeau Field since Green Bay scored 55 vs. Tennessee on 12/23/12.

**BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER**

The Packers' active roster is composed of 24 offensive players, 26 defensive players and three specialists.

- ▶ Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 33 of them (63.5 percent) were draft picks of the Packers.
- ▶ Green Bay has 18 players on the roster that began their careers as non-drafted free agents, with eight of those originally signed by Green Bay.
- ▶ Almost 50 percent of the players (25 of 53, 47.2%) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player.
- ▶ The Packers have 12 players on the roster that played in the NFL prior to the 2009 season, and six of those players began their pro careers as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player (QB Matt Flynn, K Mason Crosby, CB Tramon Williams, CB Jarrett Bush, FB John Kuhn, LS Brett Goode).
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 42 began their pro careers with the Packers (79.2 percent).
- ▶ Only 16 of the 53 players on the roster (30.2 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft, with 15 being drafted by the Packers.
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 43 of them (81.1 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Nov. 16) and 19 players (35.8 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

**QUICK OUT OF THE GATE**

Green Bay has performed well in the first half this season and that has been fueled by quick starts.

- ▶ The Packers have scored a touchdown on their opening drive in five of the last six games and in each of the last four. The Packers lead the NFL with 35 points on the first offensive possession.
- ▶ Green Bay has produced an NFL-leading 90 points in the first quarter this season:

- ▶ In a 55-14, Week 10 victory over the Chicago Bears, the Packers put up a memorable performance in the first half:
  - Green Bay's 42 points scored were the third most in a first half in franchise history and the most since a 49-point performance vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 2, 1983.
  - The Packers' 42-point lead tied for the second-biggest halftime lead in league history (also Green Bay vs. Tampa Bay on Oct. 2, 1983, 49-7). The NFL record is 45 points by New England vs. Tennessee (45-0) on Oct. 18, 2009.
  - Rodgers' six touchdown passes tied for the most in any half in NFL history (Raiders QB Daryle Lamonica vs. Buffalo on Oct. 19, 1969).



## PACKERS VS. EAGLES - WEEK 11

### WHAT TO LOOK FOR

- ▶ A win would make McCarthy 89-48-1 during the regular season as the Packers' head coach.
- ▶ Green Bay has recorded at least four scoring drives in the first half of each of the last three games.
- ▶ Below is the halftime score of each of the Packers' last three home games:

- ▶ Green Bay has outscored opponents at home 114-24 in the first half this season.
- ▶ In four home games this season, the Packers have recorded 1,006 total net yards in the first half.
- ▶ Last Sunday was the first game in team history that five different players recorded a touchdown reception.
- ▶ Green Bay has given up 17 points or less in each of the last three home games (14, 17, 10).
- ▶ The Packers' defense is looking to hold the opposing starting quarterback to a passer rating below 85.0 for the eighth game this season (CHI-Jay Cutler, 68.8 / CAR-Cam Newton, 72.6 / MIA-Ryan Tannehill, 81.5 / MIN-Christian Ponder, 45.8 / CHI-Jay Cutler, 82.5 / DET-Matthew Stafford, 61.6 / NYJ-Geno Smith, 64.1).
- ▶ This will be the second time Green Bay faces Eagles QB Mark Sanchez. The last time (Oct. 31, 2010), Sanchez was the quarterback of the New York Jets and was limited to 16-of-38 passing for 256 yards, zero touchdowns, two interceptions and a passer rating of 43.3.
- ▶ Last week, the fans set a new Lambeau Field attendance record, 78,292.

### OFFENSE

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** is 2-0 as a starter against the Eagles in the regular and postseason.
- ▶ Rodgers has a streak of 286 consecutive attempts without an INT at Lambeau Field during the regular season (last one on Dec. 2, 2012, vs. Minnesota). His touchdown-interception ratio during that span is 26-0.
- ▶ Rodgers has completed 74-of-108 passes (68.5 pct.) for 1,072 yards, 15 touchdowns, zero interceptions and a passer rating of 140.1 at home this season. He has registered a passer rating of at least 135.0 in each of the last three home games (145.8 vs. CHI / 154.5 vs. CAR / 138.7 vs. MIN).
- ▶ Rodgers has thrown for a franchise record six touchdown passes twice. He is joined by Pittsburgh QB Ben Roethlisberger as the only NFL quarterbacks to post two six-TD passing games since 2012.
- ▶ Rodgers has thrown for three or more touchdowns in five of the last six games.
- ▶ Rodgers has recorded a passer rating of at least 130.0 in four of the last six contests.
- ▶ Rodgers has thrown for 733 yards in the last two games.
- ▶ WR **Jordy Nelson** is 103 receiving yards shy of surpassing Billy Howton (5,581) for ninth place in franchise history.
- ▶ Nelson needs 111 receiving yards for his second straight 1,000-yard receiving season and his third in the last four years.
- ▶ Nelson has recorded at least nine receptions in four games this season. If Nelson registers one more game with at least nine receptions, it will be the most in a single season in franchise history.
- ▶ Nelson has three touchdown receptions of 65 yards or more this season, the most by a Packer since WR Antonio Freeman had four touchdown catches of 65-plus yards in 1998.
- ▶ Nelson has five touchdown receptions of 40-plus yards this season, no other receiver in the league has more than three in 2014.

- ▶ WR **Randall Cobb** has recorded at least one reception in 33 consecutive regular-season games.
- ▶ Cobb has set a career high by registering a touchdown reception in each of the last six games. It is tied for the third-best streak in franchise history and the longest streak by a Packers' player since WR Sterling Sharpe (six) in 1994.
- ▶ Cobb has caught at least one touchdown in eight of nine games this season. He has 12 receiving touchdowns in his last 10 regular-season games, dating back to last season.
- ▶ Cobb is looking for his fourth game this season with at least 100 yards receiving, which would be a career high (three-2012).
- ▶ Over the last two games, RB **Eddie Lacy** has 11 receptions for 191 yards (17.4 avg.) and one touchdown. Although he has only played in two games in the last three weeks due to the bye, Lacy's 191 receiving yards lead all running backs from Weeks 8-10.

### DEFENSE

- ▶ LB **Julius Peppers** has registered at least one sack in each of the last three games.
- ▶ Peppers has three sacks and two forced fumbles against the Eagles during the regular season.
- ▶ LB **Clay Matthews** (53.5) is one sack shy of passing DE Aaron Kampman (54.0) for No. 4 on the team's career sacks list.
- ▶ Including the postseason, Matthews has registered four sacks and one forced fumble in three games against Philadelphia.
- ▶ CB **Casey Hayward** is looking to register an interception in at least two consecutive games for the second time this season and for the third time in his career.
- ▶ Hayward has three interceptions in the last four games.
- ▶ DB **Micah Hyde** registered the first interception of his career last week against Chicago.

### SPECIAL TEAMS

- ▶ Cobb needs either a punt return for a touchdown or a kickoff return for a touchdown to take sole possession of second place in Packers history for combined returns for touchdowns (Travis Williams, 6). Cobb, who has three returns for touchdowns, currently is tied with six other players.
- ▶ K **Mason Crosby** has made six field goals in a row from 50-plus yards, the longest streak in team history.

**MIKE MCCARTHY**...Is in his ninth year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Led the Packers to their fifth consecutive playoff appearance last season, joining New England as the only two NFL teams to do so over that span. Has also led the team to six playoff appearances in the last seven years (2007, 2009-13).
- ▶ Has guided the Packers to top-10 finishes in scoring each of the past seven seasons (2007-13), joining the Patriots as the only other team to accomplish the feat.
- ▶ His .647 winning percentage during the regular season (88-48-1) ranks No. 3 among active NFL coaches (min. 50 games).
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.

**CHIP KELLY**...Is in his second year as the Eagles' 21st head coach.

- ▶ Led the Eagles to an NFC East division title in his first season as head coach.
- ▶ Came to the NFL after 23 years of working in the college ranks.
- ▶ Was the head coach at the University of Oregon from 2009-12 and led the Ducks to a 46-7 (.868) overall record during his tenure.
- ▶ Led Oregon to a BCS bowl game in each of his four seasons as head coach, including an appearance in the BCS National Championship game in 2010.
- ▶ Served as Oregon's offensive coordinator from 2007-08. Prior to that, he worked as New Hampshire's offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach from 1999-2006. Also coached at Columbia and Johns Hopkins.

### THE PACKERS-EAGLES SERIES

- ▶ The clubs first met in 1933, the Eagles' inaugural year in the NFL.
- ▶ Philadelphia was the only team to defeat Vince Lombardi in a postseason game. The Eagles edged the Packers, 17-13, at Franklin Field for the 1960 NFL championship. The legendary coach won nine straight playoff games after that loss.
- ▶ Before that 1960 game, the Packers had won 13 of the teams' first 14 meetings, including the first nine (1933-46).
- ▶ The Packers broke a nine-game losing streak in Philadelphia with their season-opening win in 2010. The losing streak began in 1974. Prior to 2010, Green Bay's last win in Philly came in 1962.

### NOTABLE CONNECTIONS

- ▶ Of QB **Aaron Rodgers'** 25 touchdown passes this season, 18 have gone to Cobb or Nelson (72.0 percent). The 18 touchdown receptions are tied for the most by two players on the same team this season (Denver Broncos).
- ▶ The Packers are the only team in the NFL to have two wide receivers ranked in the top 30 in receptions.
- ▶ Green Bay is joined by the Broncos as the only teams with two wide receivers in the top 20 in receiving yards this year.

**USING THE BACKS**

Over the past five games, Green Bay has shown more commitment to getting the running backs involved.

- ▶ The Packers recorded over 25 carries and 100 yards four times in that span (Weeks 5-8, 10), averaging at least 4 yards a carry in Weeks 7 (4.1), 8 (4.7) and 10 (4.1).
- ▶ Dating back to the 2013 regular season, Green Bay is 7-1 in the last eight games they ran the ball at least 25 times, including 4-0 this season. The Packers are 67-14-1 under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** when running the ball 25-plus times.
- ▶ Green Bay's run game had a breakout performance in the victory over the Vikings in Week 5, recording 156 yards on 28 carries (5.6 avg.) with two touchdowns.
- ▶ The Packers ran the ball a season-high 34 times for 121 yards (3.6 avg.) in a Week 6 win at Miami.
- ▶ In a Week 7 victory over Carolina, RBs **Eddie Lacy** and **James Starks** each averaged over 5 yards a carry and both recorded a rushing touchdown.
- ▶ In Week 8 at New Orleans, Green Bay ran the ball for 89 yards on 19 attempts. The 4.7 average was the second highest in a single game this season for Green Bay.
- ▶ Green Bay has utilized the running-back position in the pass game over the last couple games:
  - Lacy recorded 123 yards on eight receptions at New Orleans, the second most by a Green Bay running back since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, trailing only Eddie Lee Ivery's 128 yards at Tampa Bay on Oct. 12, 1980.
  - He became the first Green Bay running back to post a 100-yard receiving game since Edgar Bennett (101 yards) on Dec. 18, 1994 (vs. Atlanta).
  - Lacy registered a 67-yard reception against the Saints and a 56-yard touchdown reception versus Chicago to become the first Packers' running back to record 55-yard receptions in consecutive games.
- ▶ Lacy's 182 yards from scrimmage in Week 8 at New Orleans were the most by a Green Bay running back since Najeh Davenport posted 186 vs. St. Louis on Nov. 29, 2004.
- ▶ The Packers recorded six runs of 10-plus yards in two games this season (Minnesota, Carolina), which is tied for the ninth most in a single game this season. Green Bay's 85 runs of 10-plus yards since the start of the 2013 regular season **are tied for No. 8 in the NFL**.
- ▶ In Week 5, Lacy rushed for 105 yards on 13 carries (8.1 avg.) and recorded his second career game with two rushing touchdowns (vs. Pittsburgh, Week 16 in 2013).
- ▶ It was the fifth 100-yard rushing game of his career, his lowest attempt total in a 100-yard rushing game and his best per-carry average in a game (min. 10 att.). Lacy's five 100-yard rushing games since the start of 2013 are **tied for sixth in the NFL**.

**RACKING UP POINTS**

Including 2013, **K Mason Crosby** made 19 consecutive field goals in the regular season, until his final kick against the Bears was blocked in Week 4. He now owns the two longest consecutive field-goal streaks in franchise history (23 straight from 2010-11). The blocked field goal was Crosby's only miss this season (13-14).

Peppers has shown throughout his career the ability to do a little bit of everything on defense, and this year is no different.

## PACKERS VS. EAGLES - WEEK 11

### ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Green Bay went 7-1 away from Lambeau Field in 2011, with the seven road wins setting a single-season franchise record.

- ▶ The Packers have been able to stay above the .500 mark on the road during Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** tenure, a notable achievement in the National Football League.
- ▶ Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only 10 of 32 NFL teams have regular-season road records above .500.

### 305 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Bears in Week 10 this season brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 305 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 58th season of football in 2014. A total of 701,102 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine games (including playoffs) in 2013.
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

### THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 50-17-1 (.743) at home in the regular-season since 2006.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

Talk of unrestricted free agency in the early '90s led many to forecast tough times for the small-town Green Bay Packers.

- ▶ However, Green Bay has remained among the most successful teams since the advent of free agency in 1993. The Packers have won 10 or more games 13 times since '93 and captured 10 division crowns.

### A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 94th NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling).

- ▶ Green Bay's schedule includes five games against 2013 playoff teams, with three of those contests (Carolina, Philadelphia, New England) at Lambeau Field and two on the road (Seattle, New Orleans).
- ▶ The Packers have three prime-time contests at home (vs. Minnesota on Thursday night in Week 5, vs. Chicago on Sunday night in Week 10 and vs. Atlanta on *Monday Night Football* in Week 14) and two on the road (Thursday night at Seattle in Week 1 and Sunday night at New Orleans in Week 8).
- ▶ The Packers' bye arrives in Week 9 for the first time since 2004.
- ▶ It is the second time in franchise history (1922) that Green Bay opens with three of their first four games on the road.
- ▶ Two of Green Bay's first five games are played on Thursday night, with the next seven taking place on Sunday, one on the following Monday, and three more on Sunday to close out the regular season.
- ▶ For the second year in a row and just the third time in nine seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (2010), the Packers opened the season on the road. For the third straight season Green Bay opened against an NFC West team after facing San Francisco each of the last two years.
- ▶ Dating back to 2001, the Packers have always played against an NFC team in Week 1. The last AFC team Green Bay faced in Week 1 was the New York Jets, who visited the Packers in Week 2 for the home opener.
- ▶ Following the home opener, the Packers went on the road to face two division opponents, Detroit and Chicago, before returning home to face Minnesota in a Thursday night divisional matchup. It was the sixth time in the last seven seasons they have faced off in primetime.
- ▶ The Packers traveled to Miami for the third time in 23 years and first time since 2006. The following week Green Bay hosted Carolina for their first time since 2008.
- ▶ Before the bye week, the Packers traveled to New Orleans for a prime-time matchup against the Saints.
- ▶ Following the bye week, the Packers returned to Sunday night to host the Bears, recording a win for the fifth time in the last six games at home.
- ▶ Philadelphia comes to Lambeau for the second straight season, which is only the second time in the series that the two clubs have played at Green Bay in back-to-back seasons (1933-34).
- ▶ For the second consecutive season, Green Bay will play Minnesota in Week 12, traveling to face the Vikings in the first outdoor game (TCF Bank Stadium) between the two in Minnesota since they played at Metropolitan Stadium on Nov. 29, 1981.
- ▶ The last game in November brings New England to Lambeau Field for the first time since 2006 and only its third visit ever to the stadium (1979).
- ▶ December opens with a Monday night matchup at home versus Atlanta. It marks the 22nd straight season the Packers have appeared on *Monday Night Football*.
- ▶ The next two weeks include road games at Buffalo and Tampa Bay. It will be the Packers' first visit to Buffalo since 2006 and first trip to Tampa Bay in the month of December since 1999.
- ▶ Green Bay closes the regular season at Lambeau Field against Detroit for the fourth time under McCarthy (2007, 2008, 2011).

**STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON**

**18 RANDALL COBB**

- ▶ Dating back to 1960, his nine receiving touchdowns are the most by a Packers receiver in the first 10 games of a season.
- ▶ In Week 4 at Chicago, joined WR **Jordy Nelson** as the first Packers teammates to each have at least 100 receiving yards and two touchdowns in the same game since December 21, 1969 (Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler).
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first person in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Has three kick return scores (two punts, one kickoff) in his career, which ties him for No. 2 in franchise history behind only RB Travis Williams' six return TDs (one punt, five kickoffs).
- ▶ Is tied for No. 5 in the NFL with the three total kick return TDs since 2011.

**2 MASON CROSBY**

- ▶ His 903 points from 2007-13 rank No. 1 in NFL history for the most points scored by a player in his first seven seasons, topping the mark of Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team annals with 974 career points (Ryan Longwell, 1,054).
- ▶ Has made six consecutive field goals from 50-plus yards, a franchise record.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in team history for the most 100-point seasons with seven, trailing only Longwell (eight).
- ▶ Made 23 straight field goals from Week 13 of 2010 through Week 10 of 2011, the longest regular-season streak in franchise history.
- ▶ In 2011, set a franchise record with a 58-yard field goal in Week 7 at Minnesota, eclipsing the mark of 56 yards he held (Week 1 at Philadelphia, 2010; Week 5 at Atlanta, 2011).
- ▶ For his career, has hit 129 of 141 field goals (91.5 percent) from 39 yards and closer.
- ▶ Has made 46 of 64 field goals (71.9 percent) from 40-49 yards.
- ▶ Has hit 22 of 43 field goals (51.2 percent) from 50-plus yards.

**50 A.J. HAWK**

- ▶ Is tied for No. 1 in franchise history for the most seasons leading the team in tackles with five (2006, 2008, 2010, 2012-13), matching the mark of five by LB Nick Barnett (2003-05, 2007, 2009).
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Has posted 100-plus tackles in six of seven seasons.
- ▶ Has 1,090 career tackles, which ranks No. 1 in team history (since defensive stats began to be recorded by coaches in 1975). Moved past John Anderson (1,020, 1978-89) for the franchise record with eight tackles at Chicago in Week 17 last season.

**27 EDDIE LACY**

- ▶ Became first Green Bay running back to register receptions of 55 yards or more in consecutive games (2014: at NO and vs. CHI).

- ▶ His 123 receiving yards at New Orleans in Week 8 this season, were the second most by a Green Bay running back since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, trailing only Eddie Lee Ivery's 128 yards at Tampa Bay on Oct. 12, 1980.
- ▶ Set franchise rookie records in 2013 for rushing yards (1,178), rushing TDs (11) and rushing attempts (284).
- ▶ Tied the team rookie mark for 100-yard rushing games with four last season.
- ▶ Named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press* and was selected to the Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Vikings RB Adrian Peterson.
- ▶ Recorded 20-plus carries 10 times during the 2013 regular season, all coming in the the last 13 games. The Packers were 7-2-1 in those games. Dating back to 1960, he tied Dorsey Levens (1997) for the second-most games of 20-plus carries by a Packers' player in one regular season (Ahman Green, 12 in 2003).

**8 TIM MASTHAY**

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (min. 150 punts) with a 44.5-yard gross punting average.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in team annals (since 1976) with 110 punts placed inside the 20-yard line in his career, passing Craig Hentrich (104) in the franchise record book.
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with his 45.6-yard gross average in 2011, surpassing Craig Hentrich's 45.0-yard mark in 1997.
- ▶ Tied Sean Landeta's single-season franchise record (1998) by placing 30 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2012.
- ▶ Holds the top four single-season marks for net punting average in franchise history (since 1976) with a 38.95 average in 2013, a 38.93 average in 2012, a 38.56 average in 2011 and a 37.65 average in 2010.

**52 CLAY MATTHEWS**

- ▶ Only player in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl each of his first four seasons in the league (2009-12).
- ▶ Only player in team history to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ His 17 sacks in his first 20 games were the most by an NFL player to start his career at the time, eclipsing the mark of 16.5 set by Leslie O'Neal (1986, 1988) and John Abraham (2000-01).
- ▶ Is the first NFL player since sacks became an official stat in 1982 to post a double-digit sack total and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the league.
- ▶ First player in franchise annals to post 10-plus sacks in each of his first two years in the NFL.
- ▶ Ranks No. 5 in team history with 53.5 career sacks.
- ▶ His 29.5 sacks from 2009-11 were tied for No. 1 in team history with Tony Bennett for the most sacks by a Packer in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Ranks No. 6 in the NFL with 53.5 sacks since entering the league in 2009.
- ▶ Set a franchise rookie record with 10 sacks in 2009.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called The Dope Sheet, which served as the official press release and game program from 1921-24.





## STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

### 87 JORDY NELSON

- ▶ Nelson's 889 receiving yards this season are the most by a Packer through nine games since WR Antonio Freeman's 903 yards in 1998.
- ▶ His 22 TD grabs from 2011-12 were the most by a Packer over a two-year span since WR Antonio Freeman posted 26 TDs from 1997-98.
- ▶ Caught 15 TD passes in 2011, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942) as the only players in franchise annals to catch 15-plus TD passes in a season.
- ▶ With four TD grabs of 80-plus yards during his career, Nelson is tied for the most in team history and No. 1 among active NFL players (Vikings WR Greg Jennings).
- ▶ Is the 11th player in franchise history to surpass 5,000 career receiving yards.

### 56 JULIUS PEPPERS

- ▶ Only player in NFL history with at least 10 interceptions and 100 sacks.
- ▶ Has been selected to eight Pro Bowls since entering the league in 2002, which ties him with Troy Polamalu and Ray Lewis for the third most among defensive players over that span (Ed Reed, 9 / Champ Bailey, 12).
- ▶ With eight double-digit sack seasons as a pro, is tied with Jared Allen for the most in the NFL since 2002.
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times and was selected to the NFL's All-Decade team for the 2000s.

### 12 AARON RODGERS

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with a 106.2 career passer rating.
- ▶ Threw six touchdown passes in the first half against the Bears in Week 10 this season, tying Raiders QB Daryle Lamonica (vs. Buffalo, Oct. 19, 1969) for the NFL record for most touchdown passes in a half. It was the second time Rodgers threw for a franchise-best six touchdowns in a game.
- ▶ Posted six consecutive zero-interception games this season (Weeks 2-7), tying Bart Starr's franchise record (min. 15 attempts a game) set in 1964.
- ▶ Joined Patriots QB Tom Brady (2007) as the only players in NFL history to register four straight three-touchdown/zero-interception games in a single season (Weeks 4-7, 2014).
- ▶ When he hit the 200-TD mark for his career, he had thrown just 53 INTs to that point, the fewest in NFL history as he bested Tom Brady's mark of 88 INTs at the time of his 200th TD pass.
- ▶ This season he became the first NFL quarterback to throw for 18-plus touchdowns with one or fewer interceptions in the first seven games of a season.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in NFL history for the most touchdown passes in a player's first 100 games with 203 (MIA QB Dan Marino, 217).
- ▶ Set an NFL single-season record in 2011 with a 122.5 passer rating and set team marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games (eight).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first five seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Threw a TD pass in 35 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field from 2008-12, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre,

- 1992-96). It was the second-longest home streak in NFL history behind Dan Marino's 39-game streak from 1983-88.
- ▶ Tied a single-game franchise record with six TD passes at Houston in Week 6 of 2012, matching Matt Flynn's mark (Jan. 1, 2012, vs. Detroit).
- ▶ In 96 regular-season starts, has 36 career 300-yard games, 41 three-TD games and 54 zero-INT games (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ Has posted a 100-plus passer rating 55 times. Set an NFL record for quarterbacks whose careers started since 1970 with 43 games with a 100-plus passer rating in his first 75 starts.
- ▶ Posted a 100-plus passer rating in five straight seasons (2009-13), the only quarterback in league history to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ Is the only QB in team history with four 400-yard passing games, including a 480-yard effort vs. Washington in Week 2 last season that tied a franchise record. No one else has more than one 400-yard game.
- ▶ In 2009, became first QB in NFL history to throw 30 or more TDs, seven or fewer INTs, and rush for five TDs in the same season.

**PACKERS STARTERS – OFFENSE**

**WR Jordy Nelson, 7th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08**

- ▶ Ranks fifth in the league in receiving yards (889) and is tied for seventh in receptions (56) this season.
- ▶ Led the team in 2013 with a career-high 85 catches for a career-best 1,314 yards and eight TDs. Ranked No. 10 in the NFL last season in receiving yards.
- ▶ With 15 TD catches in 2011, became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).
- ▶ Became the first player since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger to post three 80-yard TD grabs over an eight-game span in the regular season (Week 16, 2010-Week 6, 2011).

**LT David Bakhtiari, 2nd Year, Colorado, D4a-13**

- ▶ Has started every game at LT since the start of the 2013 regular season.
- ▶ Started all 16 games at left tackle last season, the only rookie in the NFL to do so in 2013 and the first Packer rookie to do so since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start at LT in the season opener since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since 1985.
- ▶ Earned second-team All-Pacific-12 honors from the conference's coaches each of his last two seasons (sophomore and junior) at Colorado.

**LG Josh Sitton, 7th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08**

- ▶ Has started 87 games since 2009, the most by an offensive player in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ▶ Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Marco Rivera in 2004.
- ▶ Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association.
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, allowed only nine sacks in his first five seasons as a starter (2009-13).
- ▶ Was the only Packer on either side of the ball to not miss a snap from 2009-10.

**C Corey Linsley, Rookie, Ohio State, D5a-14**

- ▶ First rookie center to start for Green Bay in Week 1 since the merger.
- ▶ Was one of five team captains and was part of a line that helped the team set school records for points scored (637), yards per carry (6.8), touchdowns (87) and TD passes (38) in '13.
- ▶ The Ohio native was part of a Buckeye team that won 24 consecutive games from 2012-13.

**RG T.J. Lang, 6th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09**

- ▶ Has started games at four different positions on the line as a pro (27 at LG, 25 at RG, five at RT, two at LT). Played C in Week 10 last season.
- ▶ Has started 56 contests since 2011.
- ▶ Started games at both tackle spots in his first season (2009) and became the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

**RT Bryan Bulaga, 5th Year, Iowa, D1-10**

- ▶ Missed the second part of the 2012 season after suffering a hip injury vs. Arizona on Nov. 4 and missed all of the 2013 season after injuring his knee on Aug. 3. Has started all but one game this season.
- ▶ Started 37 games at RT in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Started the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at right tackle after taking over for veteran Mark Tauscher (shoulder), the most regular-season starts by a Packers rookie tackle since Tauscher's 14 in 2000.
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.
- ▶ Capped his rookie season by becoming the youngest player, according to STATS LLC, to ever start in the Super Bowl (21 years, 322 days).

**TE Andrew Quarless, Fifth Year, Penn State, D5a-10**

- ▶ With Green Bay trailing by four, hauled in the game-winning touchdown with three seconds left at Miami in Week 6.
- ▶ Has started each of the last six games and has set a single-season career high with three touchdown receptions this season.
- ▶ Recorded at least one reception in eight of nine games this season.
- ▶ In 2013, moved into the starting role in Week 8 following TE Jermichael Finley's season-ending neck injury.
- ▶ Set career highs in receptions (32), receiving yards (312), games started (10) and games played (16) in 2013.
- ▶ At the end of his career at Penn State, held school records for receptions by a tight end in a career (87) and single season (41 in 2009). Finished his career ranked second in school history for receiving yards by a tight end with 1,146.

**WR Randall Cobb, 4th Year, Kentucky, D2-11**

- ▶ Ranks second in the NFL with 10 touchdown receptions this season.
- ▶ Before suffering a knee injury in Week 6 last season, led the team in receptions with 29 and was No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.
- ▶ Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, he became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Led the team in receptions (80) and receiving yards (954) in 2012 and finished second on the squad in TD catches (eight).

**QB Aaron Rodgers, 10th Year, California, D1-05**

- ▶ His career passer rating of 106.2 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in the NFL this season in passer rating (120.1), touchdown percentage (9.0), touchdown/interception ratio (8.33), passing yards/attempt (8.69) and No. 3 in touchdown passes (25).
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- ▶ In 96 regular-season starts (64-32 record), has posted 36 games with 300-plus passing yards, 54 without an interception and 56 with a 100-plus passer rating (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

**RB Eddie Lacy, 2nd Year, Alabama, D2-13**

- ▶ Ranked No. 1 in the league among rookies and No. 8 among all players with 1,178 rushing yards last season, despite missing one full game and nearly all of another due to a concussion.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history for the most rushing yards by a rookie in a single season, No. 1 in attempts (284), and tied for No. 1 for most 100-yard rushing games with four (John Brockington, four in 1971).
- ▶ Became the first Green Bay rookie RB to be selected to the Pro Bowl since Brockington in 1971 and was named Rookie of the Year by PFWA.
- ▶ Finished third in the league with 11 TD runs, with 10 of those scores coming between Weeks 7-17, the most in the league over that span.

**FB John Kuhn, 9th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)**

- ▶ Has played in 116 of 121 games (127 of 132 including playoffs) during his six-plus seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in four of those seasons.
- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Green Bay fullback to be honored since William Henderson in 2004.
- ▶ Only player on the team to have a rushing and receiving touchdown each season from 2008-11, and was the first Packer to achieve that feat since RB Ahman Green (2001-04).
- ▶ Led the team with four rushing TDs in 2011 and led the running backs with six total TDs.



## PACKERS STARTERS – DEFENSE

### LDE Datone Jones, 2nd Year, UCLA, D1-13

- ▶ Overcame an ankle injury during the preseason to play in all 16 games in 2013.
- ▶ Rotated at defensive end and as one of the interior rushers in the team's sub-defenses, recording 3.5 sacks.
- ▶ Blocked an extra point at Cincinnati in Week 3 last year.
- ▶ Was the first UCLA defensive lineman selected in the first round since DT Manu Tuiaosopo in 1979 (No. 18 overall, Seattle).

### NT Letroy Guion, 7th Year, Florida State, FA-14

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay this past offseason after spending his first six NFL seasons with the Minnesota Vikings after being selected in the fifth round of the 2008 NFL Draft.
- ▶ Started all 28 games he appeared in for Minnesota over the past two seasons, recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.
- ▶ Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012.

### RDE Mike Daniels, 3rd Year, Iowa, D4a-12

- ▶ Second on the team with nine sacks since the start of the 2013 regular season (LB Clay Matthews-11).
- ▶ Played in all 16 games with one start last season and ranked No. 2 on the team with a career-high 6.5 sacks. Was tied for No. 6 in the NFL in sacks among defensive tackles.
- ▶ Returned a fumble 43 yards for a TD vs. Detroit in Week 14 of 2012, the longest fumble return for a TD by a rookie in franchise history.
- ▶ Starred as an interior pass rusher at Iowa, posting a team-high 24.5 tackles for a loss and 13 sacks from 2010-11.

### LOLB Clay Matthews, 6th Year, Southern California, D1b-09

- ▶ Ranks No. 7 in the NFL since entering the league in 2009 with 53.5 sacks. His sack total ranks No. 5 in team history (since 1982).
- ▶ Became the first Packer in team history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the NFL (2009-12).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting.

### BLB A.J. Hawk, 9th Year, Ohio State, D1-06

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (since 1975) with 1,090 tackles.
- ▶ His 65 tackles this season are tied for No. 1 on the team. Led the team with 153 tackles (112 solo) last season and was tied for No. 3 on the club with a career-high five sacks.
- ▶ Has either led the team or finished second in tackles in six of his seven seasons in Green Bay. Led the team with 142 tackles (105 solo) in 2012.
- ▶ Has appeared in 135 of a possible 137 regular-season games in his career, starting 132 of 135.
- ▶ Has posted 1,090 tackles (781 solo), 17.0 sacks, nine interceptions, 39 passes defended, three forced fumbles and five fumble recoveries during his career.

### MLB Sam Barrington, 2nd Year, South Florida, D7c-13

- ▶ Has provided depth at inside linebacker this season, starting two games and registering 22 tackles and one sack.
- ▶ Appeared in seven games as a rookie in 2013, seeing time exclusively on special teams.
- ▶ Sustained a season-ending hamstring injury vs. Chicago in Week 9 last year.
- ▶ Earned second-team All-Big East recognition as a senior in 2012 after posting a career-high 80 tackles (49 solo), including 6.5 tackles for loss, 3.5 sacks, two forced fumbles and three passes defended.

### ROLB Julius Peppers, 13th Year, North Carolina, FA-14

- ▶ Signed with Green Bay during the offseason after playing the last four seasons for Chicago and the first eight of his career for Carolina after being selected as the No. 2 overall pick in 2002.
- ▶ First player in NFL history with 10 interceptions and at least 100 sacks.
- ▶ Has been selected to the Pro Bowl eight times (2004-06, 2008-12) and has been named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times (2004, 2006, 2010). Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.
- ▶ Has played in 104 consecutive regular-season games.
- ▶ Ranks No. 3 in the league in sacks (122.5) and tied for No. 4 in forced fumbles (40) since entering the NFL in 2002. His sack total ranks No. 16 in NFL history (since 1982).
- ▶ Has blocked 13 kicks (12 field goals, one extra point) during his career.

### LCB Tramon Williams, 8th Year, Louisiana Tech, FA-06

- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in the league in interceptions (20) and No. 4 in the NFL in INT return yards (323) since 2010 (including playoffs).
- ▶ Started all 16 games last season and led the secondary with a career-high 91 tackles (68 solo) and a career-best 2.5 sacks. Added three interceptions, two fumble recoveries, two forced fumbles and 14 passes defended.
- ▶ Despite suffering a shoulder injury in the 2011 season opener, went on to start 15 games that season and post career highs for tackles (65) and passes defended (24). Also added four interceptions.
- ▶ With three interceptions during the 2010 playoffs, tied Joe Laws (1944) and Craig Newsome (1996) for the franchise single-postseason record.

### RCB Sam Shields, 5th Year, Miami, FA-10

- ▶ Started all 14 games he appeared in last season and led the team with four INTs (tied career high) and a career-best 25 passes defended.
- ▶ Was limited to 10 games with eight starts in 2012 due to injury, but registered 38 tackles (28 solo), three interceptions, 15 passes defended (No. 3 on the team) and a sack.
- ▶ Made an impact in 2010 after making the team as a non-drafted rookie, earning the nickel CB job despite playing the position only one season in college.
- ▶ In Green Bay's NFC Championship win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.

### SS Morgan Burnett, 5th Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10

- ▶ Tied for the team lead with 65 tackles this season. Ranked No. 2 on the team with 106 tackles (77 solo) in 2013, despite missing the first three games due to injury. Recovered three fumbles, including one for a TD, and added nine passes defended.
- ▶ Participated in all 1,088 plays for Green Bay's defense in 2012, one of only four non-offensive linemen in the NFL to appear in 100 percent of his team's snaps.
- ▶ Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining DT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

### FS Micah Hyde, 2nd Year, Iowa, D5a-13

- ▶ Registered his first career interception this season (Week 10 vs. CHI).
- ▶ Appeared in all 16 games last season, playing in the most defensive plays (428) among the Packers' defensive rookies.
- ▶ Spent most of his rookie season as the dime or nickel cornerback, helping to fill in for CB Casey Hayward, who missed all but three games due to a hamstring injury.
- ▶ As the team's primary return man for most of the 2013 season, ranked No. 5 in the NFL in punt return average (12.3) and No. 14 in kickoff return average (24.1). Recorded a 93-yard punt return for a touchdown, which is tied for the fourth longest in team history.

## GAME 1

SEATTLE — The Super Bowl champion Seattle Seahawks started 2014 the same way they finished last season, with a convincing win. Marshawn Lynch rushed for 110 yards and a pair of touchdowns. Percy Harvin had 100 combined yards rushing and receiving, and the Seahawks' Jimmy Graham had a 36-6 win over the Green Bay Packers to kick off the regular season.

The Seahawks unveiled the first Super Bowl banner in franchise history during a vibrant pregame ceremony and then began the process of trying to be the first team in a decade to repeat.

Russian Linebacker — a popular pick to contend in the NFC — will only reinforce the belief Seattle is still the favorite to repeat.

Wilson was outstanding in the first half, including a 53-yard touchdown pass to Ricardo Lockette. Harvin got touches as a receiver, running back and returner. He was used all over the field in different formations after never being truly healthy in his first season with Seattle.

Wilson finished 19 of 28 for 191 yards passing and Lynch was at his best. Pete Carroll said earlier this week that Lynch appeared in the best shape of his career, and it showed. Lynch averaged 3.3 yards per carry and topped 100 yards for the 20th time in the regular season since joining the Seahawks in 2010.

Lynch who ran for 1,257 yards and 12 touchdowns last season, barreled through a trio of Packers for the TD with 3:41 left before halftime to give the Seahawks a 17-10 lead and added a second TD run on the first play of the fourth quarter.

Seattle had 207 yards rushing as a team and won for the 18th time in its last 20 regular-season home games. Harvin finished with 11 offensive touchdowns, including four rushes for 41 yards.

Harvin finished 23 of 33 for 189 yards and was isolated to one side of the field. He looked almost exclusively for Jordy Nelson matched up against Byron Maxwell and never threw in Richard Sherman's direction. Nelson finished with nine receptions, but Maxwell came up with a third-quarter interception on a pass that deflected off Nelson's hands.

The most action for Sherman came in the first half when he accidentally blocked Davon House into Earl Thomas on a punt return causing a fumble recovered by the Packers.

But Seattle's defense did its part. They sacked Rodgers three times, taking advantage of a knee injury suffered by right tackle Byron Bulaga in the second quarter. His replacement, Derek Sherrod, gave up a fourth-down sack to Cliff Avril to end one drive inside Seattle territory. Following a Seattle punt, Sherrod was beaten by Michael Bennett on Green Bay's next offensive snap. Rodgers was stripped and Sherrod fell on the fumble in the end zone for a safety and a 22-10 lead.

Nine plays later, Lynch walked in from the 3-yard line for a 29-10 Seahawks lead. Rodgers threw a 3-yard TD pass to Randall Cobb in the fourth quarter but Wilson closed out the victory with a 13-play drive that ate up seven minutes and was capped by a 15-yard TD pass to Derrick Coleman on fourth down with 2:31 left.

Eddie Lacy was mostly a non-factor with 34 yards rushing on 12 carries and left in the fourth quarter to be evaluated for a concussion. Seattle Linebacker Bobby Wagner tied a career high with 14 tackles.

CHICAGO -- Aaron Rodgers urged Packers fans to relax. Maybe they will after this one. Rodgers threw for 302 yards and four touchdowns, and Green Bay shook off one of its worst offensive performances in years with a 38-17 victory over the Chicago Bears on Sunday afternoon.

The Packers (2-2) scored on their first six possessions to build a 38-17 lead. They racked up 358 yards after being held to 223, their lowest total since 2008, a week earlier in a 19-7 loss at Detroit.

They intercepted Jay Cutler twice in the third quarter to pull away from the Bears (2-2). That gave Green Bay five straight wins at Soldier Field, including the NFC title game four years ago and a playoffs-or-bust finale for both teams last season.

Rodgers called on Packers fans to take a deep breath during the week, and he gave them reason to exhale with this performance.

He had all the answers in this one.

Rodgers posted a 151:2 rating for the game, completing 22 of 28 passes, and had all the time he needed with five-time Pro Bowl defensive end Jared Allen sitting out because of an illness.

He threw two touchdown passes each to Randall Cobb and Jordy Nelson, and a fifth got called back by a penalty. That happened early in the third when a scrambling Rodgers got hit by at least one defender while unleashing an awkward, wobbly 34-yard pass that somehow connected with Davante Adams in the end zone.

Cobb had seven catches for 113 yards. Nelson had 10 receptions for 108 yards, and the Packers came away with the win despite allowing 496 yards.

The offenses were so effective - or the defenses struggled so badly - that neither team punted. That happened only once before in a regular-season NFL game, 22 years ago.

The Bears basically matched Green Bay score for score before Cutler threw those interceptions. He wound up passing for 256 yards and two TDs but fell to 1-10 lifetime against Green Bay, counting the possession.

Matt Forte ran for 122 yards on 23 carries. Martellus Bennett had nine catches for a career-high 134 yards, but Chicago came up short after back-to-back wins at San Francisco and the New York Jets.

Mason Crosby kicked a 53-yard field goal on the opening possession of the second half to extend the Packers' lead to 24-17 and things unraveled for the Bears after that.

Chicago had the ball on the Green Bay 24 when Cutler hit cornerback Tramon Williams in the chest with a pass. The ball ricocheted to Clay Matthews, who returned it 45 yards. That led to an 11-yard scoring pass from Rodgers to Nelson, making it 31-17.

Another interception set up another TD for the Packers. This time, Brandon Marshall went long when Cutler expected him to cut back toward the quarterback. The pass went right to Sam Shields, who crossed the field on a 62-yard return to put the ball at the 11. Chicago's Jonathan Beasley got called for a hold, negating a field goal by Crosby.

The Packers took a 24-17 lead to the locker room after the two teams combined for 508 yards. Chicago missed a touchdown by inches when Bennett got stopped just short of the end zone on an 8-yard catch. Cutler thought Bennett reached across the goal line before getting taken down, but the ball was upfield after a replay.

Then, in the third quarter, Green Bay created some breathing room.

**GREEN BAY VIKS** — Julius Peppers crossed the goal line and caught his breath. But he wasn't done after returning an interception 49 yards for a touchdown. Teammate Morgan Burnett pointed to the stands - time for Peppers' first lamb chop. One of many for the Packers on Thursday night.

Jordan Rodgers threw for three scores, and Eddie Lacy ran for a touchdown. Aaron Nelson hauled in a 66-yard touchdown catch. Things were going so well in Green Bay that even Peppers found his way to the end zone through the mist.

The Vikings had it much worse.

The Packers led 28-0 after the first half played in a light rain.

Peppers had the highlight-reel play in the second quarter after picking off a pass over the middle from Christian Ponder, who was hit by tackle Luther Robinson as he released the throw. The 34-year-old Peppers veered left across the field and waited for blocks before striding the final 10 yards along the sideline to make it 21-0 with 7:06 left in the second quarter.

Peppers became the first player in NFL history with 100 sacks and 10 interceptions.

Ponder struggled in getting the start at quarterback with rookie Teddy Bridgewater out with a sprained left ankle.

Daniam Lattimore intercepted Ponder's pass over the middle on Minnesota's drive after the Peppers' touchdown, setting up Rodgers' 11-yard scoring pass to Aaron Adams to give Green Bay a four-touchdown lead with 4:55 left in the first half.

The rest of the game was a mere formality. Fans took delight in showering former Green Bay receiver Greg Jennings with boos whenever he touched the ball. Jennings finished with two catches for 31 yards. Rodgers was 12 of 17 for 156 yards.

The Packers' straggling running game also got back on track, with Lacy running for touchdowns on back-to-back drives in the third quarter. He barreled over safety Robert Blanton into the end zone on his second score, from 10 yards out.

In contrast, Minnesota rarely advanced past midfield. Its only venture across the 50 in the first half ended with Burnett forcing Matt Asiata to fumble after an 11-yard run, and Casey Hayward recovered the Vikings' third consecutive turnover.

Under pressure much of the night, Minnesota could rarely get anything going through the air until late with the game well in hand. Ponder was 22 of 44 for 222 yards.

Green Bay finished with six sacks, including 1.5 apiece for Mike Daniels and former Viking Letroy Guion.

The Vikings finally broke the shutout on Ponder's 6-yard touchdown run on the first play of the fourth quarter. But they still trailed 42-7.

Minnesota had the most notable injury when receiver Cordale Patterson left with a hip injury early in the third quarter after making a 6-yard catch. For Green Bay, defensive lineman Datone Jones left in the second quarter with an ankle injury.

**MIAMI GARDENS, Fla.** — Aaron Rodgers stood face-mask to face-mask with a teammate, screaming in jubilation at the end of a hot, harrowing afternoon.

Rodgers had the last word Sunday, throwing a 4-yard touchdown pass to Andrew Quarless with three seconds left to help the Green Bay Packers rally past the Miami Dolphins 27-24.

Green Bay twice gave up leads and trailed 24-17 before Rodgers directed consecutive drives of 68 and 60 yards for the victory. He overcame a fumble and a fourth-and-10 on the Packers' final possession, and faked an intentional spike before throwing a completion that set up the touchdown.

Rodgers finished with three touchdown passes and 264 yards while committing no turnovers. The Packers (4-2) earned their third consecutive victory, won in Miami for the second time ever and remained tied with the Detroit Lions atop the NFC North.

The Dolphins (2-3) lost despite the return of six starters who had missed playing time. They overcame deficits of 10-3 and 17-10 to take a 24-17 lead with nine minutes left when Ryan Tannehill hit Mike Wallace for a 5-yard score.

At that point the Packers appeared to be willing on a typical fall day in the subtropics -- sunny, humid and 85 degrees.

Rodgers kicked a field goal with 4:09 to go, making it 24-20, then forced a punt to start at their 40 with 2:04 left.

Rodgers fumbled when sacked, and teammate T.J. Lang recovered. That set up a fourth-and-10, but Rodgers threw to Jordy Nelson for 18 yards, then hit James Starks on third-and-10 for 10 yards.

With the clock running following another completion, Rodgers faked a spike before throwing to Davante Adams, who gained 12 yards before going out of bounds with six seconds remaining.

Following a Dolphins' timeout, Quarless easily outmaneuvered linebacker Philip Wheeler for the winning catch. Wheeler wasn't thrilled with the defensive scheme, which left him alone on the flank.

Playing in his 10th regular-season game, Rodgers also threw for scores of 9 yards to Nelson and 5 yards to Randall Cobb. He has 15 touchdowns passes and only one interception this season.

With the Packers' secondary depleted, Tannehill threw for two scores and 143 yards in the second half, but he was unable to run out the clock with a 24-20 lead. The Dolphins tried four passes and ran only three times on their final possession.

Green Bay made a goal-line stand in the first quarter, stopping Miami three consecutive times at the 1, including on fourth down when Morgan Burnett tackled Knowshon Moreno for a loss. Casey Hayward intercepted Tannehill to set up a field goal.

The Packers enjoyed a 14-and-a-half-minute advantage in time of possession, a big change from other games this season. Their run defense was ranked as the NFL's worst, but Miami's running backs totaled only 63 yards on 20 carries.

# GAME 8

**NEW ORLEANS** -- The Saints were delayed in Detroit one week, sliding in the Superdome the next. And just like that, Drew Brees and the suddenly resurgent New Orleans Saints have first place in the NFC South division within their immediate grasp. Brees completed 27 of 32 passes for 311 yards and three touchdowns. New Orleans' defense produced big plays in the clutch and the Saints ended the Green Bay Packers' four-game winning streak, 44-23 on Sunday night.

Rookie receiver Brandon Cooks had a 50-yard touchdown catch and a 4-yard scoring run, and tight end Jimmy Graham caught a touchdown pass. The Saints (3-4) pulled even in victories with Carolina (3-4-1), setting up a Thursday night showdown for first place in the NFC South.

Aaron Rodgers intercepted only once in Green Bay's first seven games, was picked off twice on tipped passes and sacked three times. He still passed for 418 yards, including a 70-yard touchdown pass to Randall Cobb, but it was not nearly enough to prevent the Packers (5-3) from falling a game behind NFC North leader Detroit.

Rodgers, who also complained of a sore hamstring, called the Packers' performance "uncharacteristic of our team and myself."

Packers coach Mike McCarthy said he kept Rodgers in the shotgun formation to help him play through his sore hamstring and thought Rodgers "was smart" in avoiding exposure to further injury. McCarthy also dismissed the idea that the raucous environment in the Superdome, where the Saints are unbeaten since 2012, was an over-difficult factor.

Saints coach Sean Payton wasn't complaining about the 491 net yards his defense gave up, given the big plays the unit produced.

Except perhaps in the punting game, because there were no pun by either team, marking only the third game that happened in NFL history. It has now happened twice this season, both times involving Green Bay, starting with the Packers' 36-17 victory over Chicago on Sept. 28.

Carson Wentz had two sacks for New Orleans, one which forced a field goal in the first half. Kavin Telzoff also had two sacks for New Orleans, his second on reserve QB Matt Flynn, who was in for mop-up duty and fumbled on the play.

Brees completed all 11 of his passes in the second half, including a 2-yard touchdown pass to tight end Josh Hill, as the Saints improved to 3-0 at home this season. It also marked New Orleans' 14th straight victory in the Superdome. Most of those games were win-clubs and the Packers offense was the strong young unit of Matt Ryan, who only made three play-action passes and a touchdown. Carrying a heavy load in the absence of injured running backs Pierre Thomas and Kelly Robinson, Ingram had 24 carries for a career-high 172 yards and one touchdown.

Packers running back Eddie Lacy, who grew up in the New Orleans area, had 182 yards from scrimmage - including 123 yards on eight catches - but was stopped on fourth-and-short in the third quarter. Soon after, Graham scored his first touchdown since injuring his shoulder in Week 5, giving New Orleans a two-score lead.

for Andrew Quarless near the goal line and linebacker David Hawthorne caught it. That led to Cooks' second TD, which gave the Saints the lead for good. Payton set up New Orleans' fourth-down stop by challenging the spot of a reception near the first-down marker. Initially ruled a first down, the spot was moved back a yard, then Hawthorne and defensive tackle Tyrann Walker stuffed Lacy.

## GAME 9

**GREEN BAY WINS** -- Aaron Rodgers had a record-setting night for the Green Bay Packers. The Chicago Bears' season is quickly turning into a nightmare. Rodgers threw six touchdown passes to tie the franchise game record and match the NFL record for a half, and the Packers routed the meeting Bears 55-14 on Sunday night.

Rodgers was 18 of 27 for 315 yards, throwing touchdown passes of 73 and 40 yards to Jordy Nelson to help the Packers (6-3) open a 42-0 halftime lead. Rodgers led the team touchdown pass record that he shared with Matt Flynn and matched the NFL mark for a half set by Oakland's Darley Lamonia in 1969. The 19th meeting of the NFL's oldest rivalry turned into an old-fashioned blowout, and Rodgers watched most of the second half from the sideline in a knit cap. A night full of milestones included Rodgers' 16th scoring pass of 70 yards or more to break the record he shared with Denver's Peyton Manning and Rodgers' predecessor in Green Bay, Brett Favre. Rodgers looked just fine two weeks after tweaking his left hamstring in a loss to New Orleans.

The 55 points tied a Packers record at Lambeau Field.

Bolt Bears were coming off byes. The down time didn't help the Bears, who have lost five of six to drop to 3-6. Their defense has falten completely apart. Two weeks after giving up 38 points in the first half in a 51-23 loss to the Patriots, the Bears set a dubious franchise record by giving up 42 points in a half. Embellished quarterback Jay Cutler was on his way to having another night to forget at Lambeau Field with two first-half turnovers. He has thrown 12 interceptions in four career games in Tilton.

Cutler was 22 of 37 for 272 yards. His performance surely won't ease the withering criticism the quarterback has faced back home in Chicago. Rodgers could seemingly do no wrong. He completed with tight end Andrew Quarless on a 4-yard scoring strike with 3:53 left in the quarter for a 14-0 lead. But the injury was only just beginning for the Chicago secondary.

Rodgers found Nelson for a 46-yard touchdown pass with 12:17 left in the second quarter. A screen pass to Eddie Lacy on Green Bay's next possession turned into another catch-and-run for a 56-yard score and the one-touchdown lead.

About the only thing that kept wrong for the Packers was when Cobb tumbled near the goal line after a 4-yard catch. The Bears recovered in the end zone, but even that they were away for Chicago later (5) the fumble was wasted for unnecessary toughness.

Nelson had six receptions for 152 yards, while Cobb had 72 yards on four catches. He caught a touchdown for the sixth straight game.

Star pass rushers Jay Matthews and Julius Peppers each had sacks. Peppers forced a fumble on his sack against his former team that he recovered at the Chicago 32, setting up another score.

The Packers' league-worst run defense also held Matt Forte to 54 yards on 17 carries. Matthews relished this performance after the defense had an embarrassing second-half meltdown in the 44-23 loss to the Saints.

The Bears finally released the shutdown when Cutler connected with Brandon Marshall for a 45-yard touchdown pass with 7:44 left in the third quarter.

## **17 Davante Adams, WR, Rookie, Fresno State**

- Led the nation in receptions (131) and receptions per game (10.1), while ranking second in the country in receiving yards (1,718) and receiving yards per game (132.2) as a sophomore in 2013.
- Caught 24 TD passes in '13, eight more than any player in the country and the most in school and Mountain West Conference history.
- Set Fresno State career records for receptions (233) and TD catches (38), despite playing just two seasons for the Bulldogs.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Started for the second straight week as the Packers opened with three WRs, and posted a career-high six receptions for a career-best 77 yards (12.8 avg.) on a career-high 62 snaps, with five of his six grabs going for first downs...Posted a career-long 24-yard reception in the third quarter...Caught a pass from Rodgers at the Miami 37, eluded a tackle attempt by CB Cortland Finnegan, and took it 19 more yards down to the Miami 18, helping set up Rodgers' 5-yard TD pass to WR Randall Cobb...On the Packers' game-winning TD drive with the clock ticking down caught a quick pass off the line from Rodgers after the QB did a fake spike with 12 seconds remaining, and made a move on Finnegan on the sideline to pick up 12 yards down to the Miami 4 with six seconds remaining...The catch set up Rodgers' game-winning 4-yard TD pass to TE Andrew Quarless on the next play.

► **vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Started as the third wide receiver for the third straight week and caught a 21-yard TD pass over the middle from Rodgers early in the third quarter to give Green Bay a 35-3 lead...Found an opening in the middle of the field near the Carolina 10-yard line, where he caught the pass before taking it in for the score.

► **at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Opened the game as the third wide-out for the fourth straight week and posted a career-high seven receptions for 75 yards (10.7 avg.), with four of his seven grabs on the night going for first downs.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (11/9):** Played 38 snaps and caught one pass for 10 yards.

## **69 David Bakhtiari, T, 2nd Year, Colorado**

- Started every game at left tackle for the Packers in 2013, becoming the first rookie to do so for Green Bay since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- By starting at San Francisco last season in Week 1, he became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start the season opener at LT since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since Ken Ruettggers in 1985.
- Was the only NFL rookie to start all 16 games at left tackle in 2013.

**2014 Season:** Has started all nine games at LT.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Opened at LT and played all 62 snaps.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played all 71 snaps and protected QB Aaron Rodgers as he threw for 346 yards, the most posted by a QB against the

Jets since Saints QB Drew Brees threw for 382 last season in Week 9.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started and played all 53 snaps.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Appeared on all 52 snaps and helped protect Rodgers as he threw for 302 yards and four TDs on 22-of-28 passing for a 151.2 passer rating, the third-best single-game mark of Rodgers' career (min. 20 attempts) and the fifth-best rating in franchise history...Part of a line that allowed just one sack for 0 yards on the afternoon and helped the offense score on six of seven possessions.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Helped the offense rack up 42 points and a season-high 156 rushing yards on 28 attempts (5.6 avg.), including RB Eddie Lacy's season-best 105 yards and two TDs on 13 carries (8.1 avg.)...Lacy's average of 8.1 yards per carry was a career high (min. 10 attempts) and was the best average by a Green Bay RB in a 100-yard game since Brandon Jackson rushed for 115 yards on 10 attempts (11.5 avg.) at Washington on Oct. 10, 2010...Sealed DE Everson Griffen to help create a lane for Lacy on his season-long 28-yard run in the first quarter...Played 44 of 54 offensive snaps, departing with just over 10 minutes remaining (coach's decision) and the Packers leading 42-10.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Appeared on all 80 snaps and was part of a line that helped the Green Bay offense rack up a season-high 27 first downs, 369 total yards and a 37:12 time of possession, the best mark posted by the Packers since Week 8 last season at Minnesota (40:54).

► **vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Started and helped the offense score TDs on four of its first five possessions as Green Bay got out to a 28-0 lead...Blocked for Rodgers as he completed 19 of 22 passes for 255 yards and three TDs, a career-high completion percentage of 86.4 and a passer rating of 154.5 that was the second best of his career (min. 20 attempts)...Played 49 of 58 offensive snaps, departing after the Packers' final drive of the third quarter (coach's decision).

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at RT, his first regular-season game action since Week 10 of 2012 (vs. Arizona)...Left the game early in the second quarter after spraining his knee, and did not return.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Practiced on a limited basis during the week, but was inactive (knee).

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Appeared on all 54 offensive plays and helped the offense register 42 points and a season-high 156 rushing yards on 28 attempts (5.6 avg.), including RB Eddie Lacy's season-best 105 yards and two TDs on 13 carries (8.1 avg.)...Lacy's average of 8.1 yards per carry was a career high (min. 10 attempts) and was the best average by a Green Bay RB in a 100-yard game since Brandon Jackson rushed for 115 yards on 10 attempts (11.5 avg.) at Washington on Oct. 10, 2010.

▶**at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Appeared on all 80 snaps and was part of a line that helped the Green Bay offense register a season-high 27 first downs, 369 total yards and a 37:12 time of possession, the best mark posted by the Packers since Week 8 last season at Minnesota (40:54).

▶**vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Started and appeared on all 58 offensive snaps, helping the offense score TDs on four of its first five possessions as Green Bay got out to a 28-0 lead...Blocked for Rodgers as he completed 19 of 22 passes for 255 yards and three TDs, a career-high completion percentage of 86.4 and a passer rating of 154.5 that was the second best of his career (min. 20 attempts).

▶**at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Played all 68 snaps and helped protect Rodgers on his way to 418 yards on 28-of-39 passing, the second-best yardage output of the QB's career and tied for the third-best total in franchise history...Helped Lacy (123) and WR Randall Cobb (126) become the first Green Bay RB/WR duo to both post 100 yards receiving in the same game since RB Eddie Lee Ivey (128) and WR Aundra Thompson (102) did so at Tampa Bay on Oct. 12, 1980.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (11/9):** Started and played all 67 snaps, helping the offense rack up 55 points, which is tied for the third most in franchise history, and 451 total yards...Part of a line that didn't allow a sack and helped Rodgers throw for six TDs, which tied the single-game franchise record, with all of them coming in the first half as he tied Raiders QB Daryle Lamonica (1969) for the most in a first half in NFL history...Helped the offense score TDs on each of its first five possessions on the way to a 42-0 halftime lead, which tied the second-biggest halftime lead in league history.

## **42 Morgan Burnett, S, 5th Year, Georgia Tech**

- Started each of the final 13 games in 2013, posting 106 tackles (77 solo), nine passes defensed and a career-high and team-leading three fumble recoveries, one of which he returned for his first career TD.

- Has started 53 games between the two safety positions since the start of 2011.

- In 2010, joined Tom Flynn (1984) and Nick Collins (2005) as the only Green Bay rookies to open the season as a starter at safety since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

**2014 Season:** Has started eight games at SS, missing one due to injury, and is tied for the team lead with 65 tackles (53 solo)...Also has recorded a sack, two passes defensed, a forced fumble and has added two tackles on special teams...Part of a secondary that has helped Green Bay rank No. 6 in opponent passer rating (80.2) this season.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Appeared on all 70 defensive snaps and tied for the team lead with eight tackles (six solo).

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** One of two defensive players to play all 71 snaps (A.J. Hawk)...Led the team with 10 tackles (eight solo) and added a pass defensed and a tackle on special teams...Helped limit the Jets to 166 net passing yards.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Played all 75 defensive snaps and registered four tackles (three solo).

▶**at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Led the secondary with 14 tackles (12 solo), a tackle total that matched his career high (vs. New Orleans, Sept. 8, 2011)...Added a tackle on special teams.

▶**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Posted a team-high 11 tackles (10 solo) and a forced fumble, his first since forcing one at Chicago on Dec. 16, 2012...With just over two minutes remaining in the first half, punched the ball out on a RB Matt Asiata run, a fumble that was recovered by CB Casey Hayward at the Green Bay 34.

▶**at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** One of two defensive players (Hawk) to play all 58 snaps, he registered five tackles (four solo), including a tackle for a loss...The TFL came on a fourth-and-goal from the 1 in the first quarter when he knifed through the line to stop RB Knowshon Moreno for a 2-yard loss...The stop came after Miami took over at the Green Bay 16 following a blocked punt.

▶**vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Registered seven tackles (six solo). Left in the fourth quarter with a calf injury and did not return.

▶**at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Inactive due to a calf injury.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (11/9):** Returned to action and registered six tackles (four solo), a sack and a pass defensed...Came off the left side on a fourth-and-10 late in the first half and brought QB Jay Cutler down for an 8-yard loss, eluding a block attempt by RB Matt Forte to get to Cutler...Marked his first sack since Oct. 28, 2012, vs. Jacksonville.

## **24 Jarrett Bush, CB, 9th Year, Utah State**

- Tallied a double-digit tackle total on special teams for seven consecutive seasons (2006-12), becoming the first Packer to accomplish that feat since the statistic began being recorded by the team in 1976.

- Played in all 16 games for five straight seasons (2008-12), and saw a streak of 92 consecutive games played (including playoffs) snapped when he suffered a hamstring injury in Week 2 last season.

- Has been voted by teammates as a playoff captain each of the last four postseasons, earning selection each time as one of the two representatives for the special teams units.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all nine games, seeing time on defense and special teams...Is tied for the team lead with 10 special teams tackles, and has added seven tackles (six solo) and a pass defensed on defense.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Saw 19 snaps on special teams, which was tied for the second most on the team...Recorded two tackles on special teams.

▶**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played a team-high 23 snaps on special teams and also five snaps as the dime back.

▶**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Recorded a tackle on special teams, bringing down WR Jeremy Ross at the Detroit 17 on the opening kickoff of the game...Appeared on a team-high 19 plays on special teams.

## **21 Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, S, Rookie, Alabama**

• Was a consensus All-America selection in 2013 as a junior, earning first-team recognition from *The Associated Press*, the Football Writers Association of America and *Sporting News*.

• Played in 38 games with 20 starts in his three seasons at Alabama and registered 100 tackles (58 solo), including four tackles for a loss, seven interceptions, a forced fumble and 17 passes defended.

• Led the Southeastern Conference with a career-high five INTs as a sophomore in 2012.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all nine games with three starts (two at FS, one at SS), and ranks No. 3 on the team with 51 tackles (38 solo)... Has added a sack, an interception, five passes defended, two QB hits and three pressures... Also has posted a fumble recovery and two tackles on special teams... Part of a secondary that has helped Green Bay rank No. 6 in the NFL in opponent passer rating (80.2) this season.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Saw 40 snaps on defense and 19 on special teams in his pro debut, and made an impact in both phases... Became the first Packer (since 1982) to register a sack and a fumble recovery in his NFL debut... Chased down QB Russell Wilson for a zero-yard sack on Seattle's opening drive... Later in the quarter, recovered a fumble at the Seattle 34 after Seahawks S Earl Thomas muffed the catch on a Tim Masthay punt, a turnover that helped set up FB John Kuhn's 2-yard TD run... Finished the game with six tackles (four solo) and a pass defended.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Appeared on 56 snaps, seeing even more significant action in the second half after FS Micah Hyde departed with a knee injury in the third quarter... Registered a solo tackle and helped limit the Jets to 166 net passing yards... Added a tackle on punt coverage.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Posted the first interception of his NFL career, picking off a Matthew Stafford pass late in the first quarter at the Green Bay 17... Picked off the deep pass down the left sideline intended for WR Corey Fuller, one that deflected off of Fuller and CB Davon House, and then returned it 9 yards to the Green Bay 26 with a 15-yard penalty tacked on for a low block by RB Joique Bell... The takeaway would result in seven points as the offense drove 59 yards in nine plays and capped off the drive with a 10-yard pass from QB Aaron Rodgers to TE Andrew Quarless... With the INT, he became the first Green Bay rookie defensive back to register an interception, a sack and a fumble recovery (since 1982) in his first three NFL games... Added two tackles (one solo) and an additional pass defended.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Played 58 snaps and registered six solo tackles and a pressure... Made a tackle of TE Martellus Bennett after an 8-yard reception at the Green Bay 1 on the final play of the first half as time expired.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Appeared on 68 defensive snaps and recorded six tackles (five solo), a QB hit and a pressure.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Played 37 snaps and led the team with a career-high nine tackles (eight solo), including a tackle for a loss... The TFL came early in the second quarter when RB Lamar Miller went up the middle and got knocked back by LB Nick Perry and LB/DE Mike Neal before Clinton-Dix came up and brought him down for a 9-yard loss... Also added a pressure and a pass defended.

► **vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Started his first NFL game, opening up at FS... Was one of only two defensive players (LB A.J. Hawk) to play all 69 snaps... Led the team for the second straight game with nine tackles (eight solo), matching his career high... Added a tackle on special teams.

► **at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Started for the second straight week, opening at SS in place of an injured Morgan Burnett (calf)... Led the secondary with eight tackles (four solo).

► **vs. Chicago Bears (11/9):** Got the start for the third straight week, opening at FS, and registered four tackles (two solo) and a pass defended.

## **18 Randall Cobb, WR, 4th Year, Kentucky**

• Was limited to just six games in 2013 due to a knee injury. Through Week 6, led the team in receptions with 29 and ranked No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.

• Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.

• With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.

• Ranked No. 2 in the NFL in kickoff return average (27.7) in 2011, setting a franchise rookie record with 941 kickoff return yards on the season.

**2014 Season:** Has started all nine games and has 44 catches for 650 yards (14.8 avg.) and a team-leading and career-high 10 TDs... Leads all NFL wide receivers and ranks No. 2 in the league (Broncos TE Julius Thomas, 12) in TD catches... Dating back to 1960, ranks No. 1 in team history for the most TD catches through nine games... Has caught at least one TD pass in eight of nine games this season and has 12 TD grabs over his last 10 games... Has returned 10 punts for 102 yards (10.2 avg.).

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Finished with six receptions for 58 yards (9.7 avg), including a 3-yard TD grab in the fourth quarter... Handled punt-return duties, but did not have any returns (two fair catches).

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Caught two TD passes, his third straight regular-season game with a TD catch and his second two-TD game over that span... The first score came with six seconds remaining in the first half when he hauled in a 6-yard pass from Rodgers... The second, which came with just under six minutes remaining in the third quarter, was a 1-yard grab that put the Packers up 22-21... Caught a pass from Rodgers on the next play for the two-point conversion, Green Bay's first since Sept. 9, 2012, vs. San Francisco (Rodgers-Jordy Nelson pass).

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Appeared on 44 plays and caught three passes for 29 yards (9.7 avg.)... Posted a season-long 22-yard punt return early in the first quarter.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Played all 52 offensive snaps and caught seven passes for 113 yards (16.1 avg.) and two TDs, his third game with two TD catches in the last five contests... Had a game-long 46-yard grab down to the Chicago 2 in the fourth quarter... Made the catch over the middle at the Chicago 33 before evading CB Kyle Fuller with a fake and taking it down the sideline to the 2-yard line... Went over the 2,000-yard receiving mark for his career on the 46-yarder... Hauled in a 22-yard TD grab over CB Isaiah Frey in the end zone late in the first half to give Green Bay a 21-17 edge, a lead they would never relinquish... Also caught a 3-yard TD pass early in the fourth quarter, bringing his season total to five TD catches, the first Packer to catch five TD passes in the first four games of a season since Billy Howton and Gary Knafelc both did so in 1956... Joined Jordy Nelson as they became the first Green Bay players to both register 100 receiving yards and two TD catches in the same game since Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler hit those marks vs. the St. Louis Cardinals on Dec. 21, 1969.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Tied for the team lead with three receptions for 34 yards (11.3 avg.), highlighted by his 8-yard TD catch in the first quarter that started the Green Bay scoring... Lined up in the slot, made a move in the end zone to shed CB Captain Munnerlyn for the 8-yard scoring grab... The TD was his sixth of the season as he became the first Green Bay player since Howton (seven) in 1956 to post six or more receiv-

ing TDs in the first five games of a season.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Caught five passes for 58 yards (11.6 avg.), including a 5-yard TD catch late in the third quarter that put Green Bay up 17-10...Working against S Louis Delmas in the end zone on third down, cut to the right and then back to the left to free himself as Rodgers scrambled and found him for the score.

► **vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Led the team in both catches (six) and receiving yards (121)...The 121 yards receiving was the second-best total of his career, trailing only his 128-yard output vs. Washington (Sept. 15, 2013)...His average of 20.2 yards per catch was a career high in games with five or more receptions...Had a season-long 47-yard grab in the second quarter, lining up in the slot and running to the flat before moving back to find a hole in the Carolina defense...Caught the pass near midfield, made a nifty cutback move to evade CB Antoine Cason and LB Luke Kuechly, and cut across the field and down the sideline to the Carolina 17...Capped that drive off with a 3-yard TD catch from Rodgers, matching his single-season career high set in 2012 (eight)...With the eight TD grabs, has recorded the most by a Packer through the first seven games of the season since Howton had nine in 1956...Marked his fourth consecutive game with a TD catch, matching his career high set in 2012...Also posted a season-long 24-yard punt return in the second quarter.

► **at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Led the team with 126 receiving yards on five grabs (25.2 avg.), highlighted by a career-long 70-yard TD reception on Green Bay's first possession of the game...On third-and-10 at the Green Bay 30, adjusted his route and headed up field as Rodgers scrambled, getting behind CB Keenan Lewis near the sideline and making the catch at the New Orleans 35...Outran Lewis and S Rafael Bush the rest of the way for his career-high ninth TD of the season, surpassing his previous season high (eight in 2012) in just the eighth game of the season...It marked his fifth consecutive game with a TD catch, the first Packer to do so since WR Greg Jennings in 2007...Finished the first quarter with 101 yards receiving on three receptions, the best receiving-yardage total by a Packer in a first quarter since WR Donald Driver registered 111 yards on three grabs (37.0 avg.) at Chicago on Oct. 7, 2002.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (11/9):** Caught four passes for 72 yards (18.0 avg.), including a leaping left-handed 18-yard TD catch from Rodgers with CB Demontre Hurst covering him near the end of the first half that put Green Bay up 42-0 at the break...It marked his sixth consecutive game with a TD catch, which is tied for the third-longest streak in franchise history, and he became the first Green Bay player to accomplish the feat since WR Sterling Sharpe did so in six straight in 1994.

## **2 Mason Crosby, K, 8th Year, Colorado**

• Set an NFL record with 903 points in his first seven seasons (2007-13), topping the previous league record held by Indianapolis K Mike Vanderjagt (874, 1998-2004).

• With 974 career points, ranks No. 2 on the all-time franchise scoring list behind only K Ryan Longwell (1,054).

• Is one of only three players in NFL history to register three or more 140-point seasons (Stephen Gostkowski, David Akers).

• Has kicked the six longest field goals in franchise history (58-yarder in 2011, two 57-yarders in 2013, 56-yarders in 2010 and 2011, 55-yarder in 2014).

• Is tied for No. 3 in the NFL with eight field goals of 50-plus yards since 2013.

• Set a franchise record with 23 consecutive field goals made (Week 13, 2010-Week 12, 2011), topping Chris Jacke's mark of 17 straight in 1993.

**2014 Season:** Has converted 13 of 14 field-goal attempts (a blocked FG) and all 32 extra points for 71 points on the season...Has connected on all three of his attempts from 50-plus yards (55, 53, 52)...Is tied for No. 5 in the league with the three FGs of 50-plus yards...Has recorded 26 touchbacks on 54 kickoffs (48.1 percent)...Has made one tackle on special teams.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Connected on his lone field-goal attempt of the evening, a 23-yarder in the second quarter, to bring his streak

of consecutive regular-season field goals made to 15 (ties Chris Jacke, 1989-90, for the third-longest streak in franchise history)...Also marked his franchise-record 16th straight regular-season game with at least one field goal, surpassing Longwell's record of 15 (2004-05)...Added two touchbacks on four kickoffs.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Made all three of his field-goal attempts, bringing his streak of consecutive FGs made in the regular season to 18, the second-longest streak in franchise history behind only his own streak of 23 straight from 2010-11...Drilled a 55-yard FG in the second quarter, the longest by a Green Bay player ever at Lambeau Field...It was his 20th FG of 50-plus yards, further extending his team record...Also extended his franchise record by making at least one FG in his 17th consecutive game.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Saw his team-record streak of 17 consecutive games with a field goal come to an end as his only points came on a first-quarter extra point...Did not have any field-goal attempts for the first time since Week 1 of 2013...Registered one touchback on two kickoffs.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Scored eight points, drilling a 53-yard field goal early in the third quarter and all five of his extra points...Saw his streak of consecutive field goal made come to an end at 19 straight, the second-longest streak in team history, when his 38-yard attempt in the fourth quarter was blocked by DE Willie Young...Posted a season-high five touchbacks on seven kickoffs.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Did not have any field-goal attempts for the second time in three games, but connected on all six of his extra points...Registered two touchbacks on the evening.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Connected on both of his field-goal attempts, including a 30-yarder with 4:09 remaining to cut Miami's lead to 24-20...Recorded touchbacks on three of his six kickoffs...Posted his first tackle of the season on special teams, bringing down WR Jarvis Landry at the Green Bay 49 on Miami's first kickoff return.

► **vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Made his lone field-goal attempt of the afternoon, a 34-yarder late in the third quarter, and all five extra points...Matched his season high with five touchbacks on seven kickoffs.

► **at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Posted 11 points, connecting on all three of his field-goal attempts (31, 49, 27) and both extra points...Posted touchbacks on each of his four kickoffs.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (11/9):** Registered a season-high 13 points, connecting on both of his field-goal attempts and all seven of his extra points...Drilled a 52-yarder in the third quarter, his sixth consecutive make from 50 yards or more, the longest streak in franchise history.

## **76 Mike Daniels, DT, 3rd Year, Iowa**

• Emerged as a force in his second season in 2013, tying for sixth in the NFL among DTs with 6.5 sacks, the most in a season by a Green Bay defensive lineman since DT B.J. Raji posted the same total in 2010.

• Appeared in 14 games as a rookie in 2012 and finished with 19 tackles (11 solo), two sacks, a team-high two fumble recoveries (one for a TD) and a pass defended.

**2014 Season:** Has started all nine games and leads the defensive line with 42 tackles (27 solo)...Has posted 2.5 sacks and is tied for the team lead in both QB hits (nine) and pressures (12).

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at RDE and registered a career-high eight tackles (five solo), which was tied for the team lead.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started at DT and led the defensive line with six tackles (five solo) and a sack...Added a team-high three QB hits and two pressures...Brought down RB Chris Johnson for a 6-yard loss on a carry at the end of the first quarter...Posted a QB hit on Geno Smith as his pass intended for TE Zach Sudfeld came up short and was intercepted by CB Tramon Williams at the Green Bay 3 late in the first half, a turnover that led to seven points as the Packers cut the Jets' lead to 21-16 at the half...Registered his first sack of the season on New York's final drive as he beat LG Brian Winters with an inside move and brought Smith down for a 7-yard loss despite being held by Winters on the play.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started at RDE and registered five tackles (two solo) and a pressure...Appeared on 47 plays, helping limit the Lions

to an average of 3.0 yards per carry (115 yards on 38 attempts).

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Started at RDE and appeared on 38 snaps... Recorded three tackles (one solo) and a pressure.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Registered four tackles (three solo), 1.5 sacks, four QB hits and four pressures... Pushed G Charlie Johnson aside and then fought off C John Sullivan on his 8-yard sack of QB Christian Ponder in the second quarter... Fought off a double-team by Sullivan and Johnson on his shared 10-yard sack of Ponder with DT Letroy Guion on the final play of the first half.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Recorded four tackles (two solo), a QB hit and a pressure... Part of a line that helped limit Miami's running backs to just 63 yards on 20 carries (3.2 avg.).

► **vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Posted two tackles (one solo) and two pressures... Part of a line that limited Carolina's running backs to 67 yards on 18 carries (3.7 avg.).

► **at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Matched his career high with eight tackles (all solo)... The eight solo tackles were a career high... Added a QB hit.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (11/9):** Played 39 snaps, recording two assisted tackles and a pressure... Part of a line that limited the Bears to a season-low average of 2.3 yards per carry as they ran for just 55 yards on 24 attempts.

### **13 Kevin Dorsey, WR, 2nd Year, Maryland**

• Was drafted by Green Bay with the second of three seventh-round picks in the 2013 NFL Draft (No. 224 overall).

• Spent the entire 2013 season on injured reserve due to a toe injury sustained during the preseason.

• Was on the Packers' practice squad for the first five games this season before being signed to the 53-man roster on Oct. 6.

- Ranks fifth in franchise history with 53.5 career sacks.

- Became the first player in franchise history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the league (2009-12).

- Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the league.

- Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the *AP's* Defensive Player of the Year voting in 2010.

**2014 Season:** Has started all nine games, opening four at LOLB, four at ROLB and one at MLB, and has recorded 37 tackles (27 solo), 3.5 sacks, an interception, two forced fumbles (tied for the team lead), four passes defended, nine QB hits and 12 pressures...Is tied for the team lead in both QB hits and pressures.

▶**at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Brought down WR Percy Harvin for a 2-yard loss on a short pass early in the second quarter, also forcing a fumble on the play, one that Harvin recovered...Finished the game with five tackles (three solo) and a pressure.

• Has played in 51 games with 24 starts during his career, seeing time with Buffalo, the N.Y. Giants, Pittsburgh, Tampa Bay and Indianapolis.

### **55 Andy Mulumba, LB, 2nd Year, Eastern Michigan**

• Appeared in 14 games with three starts as a rookie in 2013, recording 34 tackles (17 solo), a sack and a fumble recovery.

• One of three rookie free agents to make the opening-day roster last season, he was tied with CB Micah Hyde for the most starts by a Green Bay rookie on the defensive side of the ball with three.

• Was tied for No. 6 on the team with five tackles on special teams in 2013.

**2014 Season:** Appeared in the first two games on special teams and registered one tackle...Was placed on season-ending injured reserve on Sept. 19 due to a knee injury.

• Led the NFL with 19 catches of 25-plus yards in 2013, the most by a Green Bay player since STATS LLC began recording the statistic in 1994.

• Ranks No. 4 in the league with 38 TD catches since 2011 and ranks No. 5 in the NFL (min. 150 receptions) over that span with a 16.3-yard receiving average.

• Ranks No. 8 in franchise history in receptions (358), No. 10 in receiving yards (5,479) and No. 8 in TD catches (44).

**2014 Season:** Has started all nine games and leads the team in receptions (56) and receiving yards (889)...Ranks No. 5 in the league in receiving yards and tied for No. 7 in the NFL in receptions...Has caught eight TD passes, which is tied for No. 4 in the league...Has recorded four games with nine-plus receptions, which already ties the single-season franchise record and leads the league this season (no other player has more than two)...Is tied for No. 3 in the league with 41 receiving first downs this season...His 889 receiving yards are the most by a Packer through nine games since WR Antonio Freeman's 903 yards in 1998...Has three TD receptions of 65-plus yards, the most by a Packer since Freeman had four in 1998...Ranks No. 1 in the league with five TD catches of 40-plus yards this season, two more than any other player.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started and led the team with nine receptions for 83 yards (9.2 avg.), the most catches he has posted in a season

opener...It marked his second straight game with nine or more receptions (a career-high 10 at Chicago in Week 17 in 2013), the first Green Bay player to accomplish that feat since WR Donald Driver in 2004.

►**vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Posted a career-best 209 yards on nine receptions (23.2 avg.), only the 11th 200-yard receiving game in the history of the franchise and the highest total since Don Beebe's 220-yard output vs. San Francisco on Oct. 14, 1996...Marked his third straight game with nine or more catches as he joined Don Hutson (three straight in 1942) as the only players in franchise history to accomplish that feat...With the game tied at 24 late in the third quarter, caught a game-winning 80-yard TD pass from Aaron Rodgers on the opening play of the drive...It marked his fourth TD catch of 80-plus yards during his career, which ties WR Greg Jennings for the franchise record...On the play, ran an out-and-up move at the Green Bay 30 to beat CB Dee Milliner, caught the ball near midfield and then made a cutback move on S Calvin Pryor as he took it the rest of the way for the score...Set a team record for the most receptions in the first two games of a season with 18, topping Ken Payne's mark of 17 in 1975, and his 292 receiving yards are the second most in franchise annals through two games behind only James Lofton's 323-yard total in 1983.

►**at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Led the team in receptions for the third straight game this season the fourth straight game dating back to last season, hauling in five passes for a team-high 59 yards (11.8 avg.)...With the five catches, brought his three-game total to 23, a franchise record for the most catches by a Green Bay player through the first three contests (previous high was 21 by three players).

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** His lone reception of the evening was an impactful one, catching a 66-yard TD pass from Rodgers in the first quarter to put Green Bay up 14-0...Sped past CB Captain Munnerlyn, who passed him off to S Harrison Smith, before making an out-and-up move on Smith to get open and catch Rodgers' deep pass perfectly in stride at the Minnesota 20 before taking it the rest of the way for the score.

►**at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Led the team in receptions (nine) and receiving yards (107), his fourth game with nine-plus receptions on the season and his third 100-yard game...Tied the single-season franchise record with his fourth nine-catch game on the season (six other times in team history)...Brought his season receiving total to 43 receptions, which is tied with WR Sterling Sharpe (1993) for the most catches through six games in team history...Caught a 9-yard TD pass over the middle on Green Bay's opening drive, his third straight game with a TD grab as he tied his career high for consecutive games with a TD catch...On the Packers' game-winning TD drive late in the fourth quarter, made an 18-yard grab down the right sideline on fourth-and-10 with just over a minute remaining to keep the drive alive...Seven of his nine receptions on the day went for first downs.

• Has posted eight double-digit sack seasons since 2002, which is tied with Bears DE Jared Allen for No. 1 in the league over that span.

**2014 Season:** Has started all nine games and has posted 28 tackles (20 solo), a team-leading five sacks, an interception that he returned for a TD, nine QB hits, seven pressures, five passes defended, two forced fumbles and a team-high three fumble recoveries...Is tied for the team lead in forced fumbles and QB hits...Is also tied with CB Casey Hayward for the team lead with four takeaways (three fumble recoveries, INT)...Joins Texans DE J.J. • Opened the 2013 campaign on the reserve/physically unable to perform list, but was activated and appeared in the final six games of the regular season and the playoff game.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Signed to the 53-man roster the afternoon of the game, had a hand in one of the key plays in the game on his third snap as a pro...Lined up at LDE, he fought off blocks by G Vladimir Ducasse and T Phil Loadholt to get in QB Christian Ponder's face and get a piece of the ball that was intercepted by LB Julius Peppers, an INT that Peppers took 49 yards for a TD and a 21-0 Green Bay lead with 6:51 remaining in the second quarter...Appeared on 35 snaps in his NFL debut, finishing with an assisted tackle, a QB hit, three pressures and the pass defended.

• Ranks No. 1 in league history in career INT percentage (1.70) and TD/INT ratio (3.87, 213/55) and ranks No. 3 in completion percentage (66.0) and in yards per attempt (8.23).

• Is the only quarterback in league history to record a 100-plus passer rating in five consecutive seasons (2009-13).

• In 96 career regular-season starts (64-32 record), has posted 35 games with 300-plus passing yards, 54 without an interception (min. 15 attempts) and 56 with a 100-plus passer rating.

• In the franchise record books, holds four of the top five single-season marks for passer rating (2009, 2011-13), two of the top three for passing TDs (2011-12), four of the top five for completion percentage (2010-13) and two of the top three for passing yards (2009, 2011).

**2014 Season:** Has completed 187 of 277 passes (67.5 percent) for 2,407 yards and 25 TDs with three INTs for a 120.1 passer rating...Ranks No. 1 in the NFL this season in passer rating, yards/attempt (8.69), and TD/INT ratio (8.33, 25/3), and No. 3 in TD passes...Has thrown a league-leading three TD passes of 70-plus yards this season...Has thrown three TD passes of 70-plus yards this season (No. 1 in the league), and ranks No. 1 in NFL history with 16 TD passes of 70-plus yards...His 25 TD passes through nine games are tied for the second most in franchise history behind only his 28 TDs in the first nine games in 2011...Has posted seven zero-INT games this season.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Completed 16 of 27 passes for 162 yards and a TD for a passer rating of 88.8...His TD pass came late in the first quarter when he threw a 10-yard bullet to TE Andrew Quarless over the middle for the score on third-and-1.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Completed 22 of 28 passes for 302 yards and four TDs with no INTs for a 151.2 passer rating, the second-best rating of his career and the fourth best in team history...Went over the 25,000-yard mark for his career on his 15-yard completion to Nelson on a third-and-8 in the second quarter...The pass was the 3,065th attempt of his career as he set the NFL record for the fewest attempts needed to reach 25,000 passing yards, topping Kurt Warner's mark of 3,076...Became the first QB in team history to throw for 300-plus yards and four-plus TDs and register a 150-plus passer rating in the same game...Threw a pair of TD passes to both Nelson and WR Randall Cobb as they became the first Green Bay players to both post 100 receiving yards and two TD catches in the same game since Carroll Dale and Boyd Dowler hit those marks vs. the St. Louis Cardinals on Dec. 21, 1969...Led the offense to six scores (five TDs, one FG) on seven possessions...Connected on 7 of 7 passes on third down for 79 yards and two TDs for a 153.3 passer rating...Was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance, the ninth time in his career that he had earned the weekly honor.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Completed 12 of 17 passes for 156 yards and three TDs with no INTs for a 138.7 passer rating, his sixth 130-plus rating game in his last seven starts against Minnesota...His 11-yard TD pass to WR Davante Adams in the second quarter was the 200th of his career as he reached that mark in his 99th career game, the second fastest in NFL history behind only Dolphins QB Dan Marino (89 games)...Set an NFL record for the fewest INTs by a quarterback at the time of his 200th career TD pass with 53, topping the previous mark held by Patriots QB Tom Brady (88) by 35 INTs...Connected with Nelson on a 66-yard TD pass in the second quarter, Rodgers' 21st of 60-plus yards since 2008, No. 1 in the NFL over that span...Posted his fourth straight zero-INT game, his longest streak since a four-gamer in 2012 (Weeks 14-17)...His 17 attempts on the evening tied his career low (vs. Detroit, Oct. 3, 2010) for a game he did not depart early due to injury...Exited the game after a seven-play, 52-yard TD drive that put Green Bay up 42-0 late in the third quarter.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Appearing in his 100th career regular-season game, led the Packers on an 11-play, 60-yard game-winning drive that was capped off with his 4-yard TD pass to TE Andrew Quarless with three seconds remaining in the 27-24 win...It marked the first time the Packers won a game on a TD with three seconds or less remaining in the fourth quarter since they beat the Bears, 20-19, on a 3-yard TD run by QB Bart Starr with three seconds left on Nov. 15, 1970...Completed 24 of 42 passes on the day for 264 yards and three TDs with zero INTs, his fifth consecutive start with no interceptions as he matched his career high set in 2010...The three TD passes brought his career total to 203, the second most in NFL history through 100 games behind only Dolphins QB Dan Marino (217)...On his 5-yard TD pass to Cobb in the third quarter, moved up in the pocket to avoid DE Cameron Wake, scrambled to his right to elude DE Olivier Vernon and LB Koa Misi, and then threw across his body to find Cobb in the end zone...On the game-winning TD drive, found Nelson for an 18-yard gain down the right sideline to convert a fourth-and-10...After finding Cobb four plays later for a 4-yard gain to the Miami 16, raced up to the line to down the ball and stop the clock, but instead faked a spike with 12 seconds left before throwing to WR Davante Adams on the right sideline for a 12-yard pickup to the Miami 4...On the next play, went to Quarless, who was split out wide to the right and matched up with LB

Philip Wheeler, on a back-shoulder throw in the end zone for the winning score...Added 34 rushing yards on the afternoon on seven attempts (4.9 avg.), his best rushing-yardage total since a 57-yard day at Indianapolis on Oct. 7, 2012.

► **vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Threw for 255 yards and three TDs on 19-of-22 passing for a 154.5 passer rating, the second-highest rating of his career (min. 20 attempts) and the third best in team annals...His 86.4 completion percentage was a career high and the third-best mark in team history...Posted his fourth straight three-TD/zero-INT game, joining Patriots QB Tom Brady (2007) as the only QBs in NFL history to accomplish the feat in a single season...Posted his sixth straight zero-INT game, tying Bart Starr's franchise record (min. 15 attempts per game) set in 1964...With 22 attempts and no interceptions, brought his streak of consecutive attempts without an interception to 192, his career high and the second-best mark in franchise history (Starr, 294, 1964-65)...His three TD passes gave him 18 for the season as he became the first QB in NFL history to throw for 18 TD passes in the first seven games of the season with one or zero interceptions...Joined Brady (2007) as the only QBs in NFL history to register two 150-rating outings in the first seven games of the season...Completed three passes of 30-plus yards on the afternoon, highlighted by a 59-yard TD pass to Nelson on the opening drive...Also found Cobb for gains of 47 and 33 yards...Did not play in the fourth quarter (coach's decision), departing with a 38-3 lead...Was named NFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance, the second time on the season he earned the weekly award and the 10th time he has received the honor in his career.

► **at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Threw for 418 yards and a TD on 28-of-39 passing with two INTs, the second-highest yardage output of his career...Marked the fourth 400-yard passing game of his career, with no other QB in franchise annals having more than one 400-yard game...Saw his streak of passing attempts without an interception come to an end at 212, the second-longest streak in franchise history...Found WR Randall Cobb for a 70-yard TD pass on the opening drive of the game, his 15th career TD pass of 70-plus yards as he matched QB Brett Favre for the franchise record...Also tied Favre and QB Peyton Manning for the most 70-yard TD passes in NFL history...Connected with RB Eddie Lacy on a 65-yard screen pass on Green Bay's second series, becoming the first NFL quarterback since Warner (vs. Miami, Sept. 14, 2008) to complete a 65-yard pass on both of the first two series...Posted 203 passing yards in the first quarter alone, his career high for any quarter, topping his previous best of 197 yards in the second quarter vs. Washington on Sept. 15, 2013...His 278 yards passing in the first half were his second most in either half behind only his 335-yard output in the first half against the Redskins in 2013...With Lacy (123) and Cobb (126) both recording 100-yard days, it marked the first time Green Bay had a RB/WR duo each register 100 yards receiving in the same game since RB Eddie Lee Ivey (128) and WR Aundra Thompson (102) accomplished the feat on Oct. 12, 1980, at Tampa Bay...Sustained a hamstring injury on a 7-yard scramble that picked up a first down with about nine minutes left in the third quarter, but remained in the game...Scored on a 14-yard run with 5:07 left in the contest, his first rushing TD since Dec. 23, 2012, vs. Tennessee.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (11/9):** Tied the franchise single-game record with six TD passes (Rodgers, Matt Flynn), with all of them coming in the first half as he tied the NFL record (Raiders QB Daryle Lamonica, first half, 1969) for the most in a half...Completed TD passes to five different players, a franchise record...Threw TD passes of 73, 40 and 56 yards, becoming the first Green Bay QB to throw three or more TD passes of 40-plus yards since Cecil Isbell had four vs. the Chicago Cardinals on Nov. 1, 1942...The 73-yard TD pass to Nelson early in the second quarter was his 16th career TD pass of 70-plus yards, the most in NFL history as he surpassed Manning and Favre (15 each)...With his six TD passes, he brought his season total to 10 TDs and zero INTs against the Bears, the first QB in NFL history to throw 10 TDs and no INTs against an opponent in a single season...Racked up 315 passing yards in the first half, the second-best total of his career for either half behind only his 335-yard output vs. Washington in the first half on Sept. 15, 2013...Departed the game with just under

11 minutes remaining in the third quarter (coach's decision), finishing the evening with 315 yards and six TDs on 18-of-27 passing for a 145.8 passer rating...Despite injuring his hamstring in the Week 8 game at New Orleans, showed no effects as he utilized his scrambling ability to elude DE Willie Young on his 4-yard TD pass to Quarless in the first quarter and as he rolled to his right to make a throw on the run on his 40-yard strike to Nelson in the second quarter...Posted his 10th straight zero-INT game at Lambeau Field as he brought his streak to 286 attempts without an INT at the stadium...Completed 5 of 7 passes for 108 yards and three TDs on third down (153.3 rating), which combined with his outing at Chicago earlier in the season, gave him a perfect 158.3 rating against the Bears on third down this season (12 of 14, 187 yards, five TDs).

### **89 Richard Rodgers, TE, Rookie, California**

- Played tight end for his first two seasons at California before moving to inside receiver as a junior in 2013, where he caught a career-high 39 passes for a career-best 608 yards (15.6 avg.) and a TD.
- Led the Golden Bears with 11 receptions of 20-plus yards in 2013.
- Appeared in 35 games with 11 starts during his three seasons at Cal and finished with 59 receptions for 896 yards (15.2 avg.) and two TDs.

**2014 Season:** Has played in all nine games with five starts and has nine catches for 117 yards (13.0 avg.).

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Became the first Green Bay rookie TE to start a season opener since Jackie Harris opened in a two-tight-end set in 1990...Left the game due to a neck injury sustained in the second quarter, but did return to action...Saw 20 snaps on offense.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Started, appearing on 34 plays, and helped protect QB Aaron Rodgers as he threw for 346 yards and three TDs with no INTs.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started and appeared on 11 offensive snaps.

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Started and posted the first two receptions of his career, with both coming on Green Bay's opening drive...Hauled in a 9-yarder on the Packers' first offensive play and then caught a deep pass that went for 43 yards on the next snap, the longest reception by a rookie tight end in franchise history.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Appeared on 19 offensive plays but did not record any statistics.

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Played 34 snaps on offense.

► **vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Playing against his father, Richard Sr. (special teams coordinator for the Panthers), appeared on 32 plays and caught a 1-yard pass...Also helped the offense rush for 122 yards on 30 carries (4.1 avg.)...Delivered a punishing block on S Roman Harper to help spring WR Randall Cobb for extra yardage on his season-long 47-yard reception in the second quarter.

► **at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Played 34 snaps and registered a career-high four catches for a career-best 58 yards (14.5 avg.)...Lined up in the slot, found an opening down the left sideline for a 22-yard gain to the New Orleans 40 in the second quarter...Added a 14-yard grab over the middle at the end of the drive on third-and-20 to help set up Mason Crosby's 27-yard field goal.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (11/9):** Started as the Packers opened up with two tight ends (Andrew Quarless)...Played a season-high 51 snaps and caught two passes for 6 yards (3.0 avg.).

### **37 Sam Shields, CB, 5th Year, Miami**

- Had his finest statistical season in 2013, setting new career highs for starts (14), tackles (64), solo tackles (57) and passes defended (a team-high 25), and tied his previous career best with four INTs.

• Entered the NFL as a non-drafted free agent and earned the nickel cornerback job in 2010 as a rookie despite playing defense for just one season in college.

• Has 19 interceptions since 2010 (including playoffs), which ranks No. 3 in the NFL among active players behind only Seahawks CB Richard Sherman (21) and teammate Tramon Williams (20).

**2014 Season:** Has started all seven games he has played in at RCB

and has posted 25 tackles (19 solo), two interceptions and nine passes defended (tied for the team lead with Williams and CB Davon House)...Part of a secondary that has helped Green Bay rank No. 6 in opponent passer rating (80.2) this season.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Appeared on all 70 defensive plays, recording three tackles (one solo) and a team-high two passes defended.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played 70 of 71 defensive snaps and registered a solo tackle and a pass defended...Part of a secondary that helped limit the Jets to 166 net passing yards.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Appeared on 74 of 75 defensive snaps and helped limit WR Calvin Johnson to 82 yards on six receptions, his lowest yardage total of the season...Posted a season-high six tackles (all solo).

► **at Chicago Bears (9/28):** Recorded five tackles (three solo) and tied his career high with four passes defended, appearing on all 78 defensive plays...Helped limit WR Brandon Marshall to two receptions for 19 yards (9.5 avg.), Marshall's lowest yardage output in seven career games against Green Bay...Picked off QB Jay Cutler's pass intended for Marshall at the Green Bay 27 late in the third quarter, cutting across the field and returning the pick 62 yards down the right sideline to the Chicago 11, a turnover that set up QB Aaron Rodgers' 3-yard TD pass to WR Randall Cobb...The 62-yard INT return was the longest of Shields' career.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Played all 79 defensive snaps and posted a solo tackle...Helped limit the Vikings' top trio of receivers (Greg Jennings, Cordarrelle Patterson and Jarius Wright) to a combined 66 yards on seven receptions (9.4 avg.).

► **at Miami Dolphins (10/12):** Posted two tackles (one solo) and his second interception of the season...Late in the second quarter, ran stride for stride with WR Brian Hartline and made a leaping interception of QB Ryan Tannehill's deep pass intended for Hartline at the Green Bay 32...Left the game with just under four minutes remaining in the third quarter due to a knee injury and did not return.

► **vs. Carolina Panthers (10/19):** Inactive due to the knee injury.

► **at New Orleans Saints (10/26):** Inactive (knee) for the second straight game.

► **vs. Chicago Bears (11/9):** Returned to action after missing two games due to a knee injury, sliding back into his customary starting spot at RCB...Led the secondary with seven tackles (six solo) and added a pass defended on 60 snaps...The pass defended came when he nearly intercepted Cutler's pass intended for WR Alshon Jeffery near the goal line on fourth-and-goal from the 6 with just under eight minutes remaining in the first quarter.

### **71 Josh Sitton, G, 7th Year, Central Florida**

• Was named second-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* last season, the first Green Bay offensive lineman to be honored by AP since G Marco Rivera (second team) in 2003.

• Made the transition to left guard in 2013, starting all 16 games there after spending his first five seasons at right guard for the Packers.

• Has started 86 of a possible 88 games since 2009, the most by a Packers offensive lineman over that span.

• Was named to his first career Pro Bowl in 2012, becoming the first Green Bay guard to be selected since Rivera in 2004.

**2014 Season:** Has started all nine games at LG.

► **at Seattle Seahawks (9/4):** Started at LG and appeared on all 62 offensive plays.

► **vs. N.Y. Jets (9/14):** Played all 71 snaps and protected QB Aaron Rodgers as he threw for 346 yards, the most posted by a QB against the Jets since Saints QB Drew Brees threw for 382 last season in Week 9.

► **at Detroit Lions (9/21):** Started at LG and played all 53 offensive snaps.

helped the offense score on six of seven possessions.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (10/2):** Helped the offense record 42 points and a season-high 156 rushing yards on 28 attempts (5.6 avg.), including RB Eddie Lacy's season-best 105 yards and two TDs on 13 carries (8.1 avg.)...Lacy's average of 8.1 yards per carry was a career high (min. 10 attempts) and was the best average by a Green Bay RB in a 100-yard game since Brandon Jackson rushed for 115 yards on 10 attempts (11.5 avg.) at Washington on Oct. 10, 2010...Delivered a cut block on DT Linval Joseph to help spring Lacy for a 17-yard run in the first quarter...Sealed off DT Sharrif Floyd on Lacy's season-long 28-yard run in the first quarter...Played 44 of 54 offensive snaps, departing with just over 10 minutes remaining (coach's decision) and the Packers leading 42-10.
