## PACKERS TRAVEL TO WASHINGTON FOR WILD CARD GAME

The Green Bay Packers and Washington Redskins will square off this Sunday afternoon in the final game of the Wild Card round.



- ▶ Green Bay last played on the road in the Wild Card round during the 2010 playoffs, beating the Philadelphia Eagles, 21-16. It was also the last time the Packers played on the road against an NFC East team in the postseason.
- ▶ The Packers are the No. 5 seed in the playoffs for the third time (1998, 2009) since the NFL went to a 12-team playoff format in 1990.
- ▶ The Packers are making their 31st postseason appearance, tied with the Dallas Cowboys and New York Giants for the most in the NFL.
- ▶ Green Bay set a franchise record by appearing in the playoffs for the seventh consecutive year (2009-15). The Packers join the New England Patriots as the only teams to make the postseason each of the past seven seasons. Both teams join Houston (1987-93) and San Francisco (1992-98) for the seventh-longest postseason streak in NFL history (Nine: Dallas, 1975-83 / Indianapolis, 2002-10; Eight: Dallas, 1966-1973 / Pittsburgh, 1972-79/ L.A. Rams, 1973-80 / San Francisco, 1983-90).
- ▶ Green Bay is 31-20 all-time in the postseason. The Packers' 31 wins are the second most in the NFL behind the Pittsburgh Steelers (33-22). Green Bay's .608 postseason winning percentage ranks No. 3 in NFL history (Baltimore, 15-8, .652 / New England, 28-18, .609).
- ▶ The Packers' 51 postseason games played are the third most in the NFL, trailing only Pittsburgh (55) and Dallas (60).
- ▶ The Packers and Redskins will meet in the postseason for the third time. They last met in the playoffs in an NFC Divisional game at Washington in 1972, a 16-3 Redskins victory. The only other meeting was in the NFL Championship in 1936 when the Washington franchise was located in Boston. The game was played in New York and Green Bay won, 21-6.
- ▶ The Packers have won an NFL-record eight Wild Card games (1982, 1993-95, 2001, 2003, 2010, 2012), including two under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**.
- ▶ The Packers are 2-2 in Wild Card playoff games during the McCarthy era.
- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** started his first Wild Card game in 2009 at Arizona and recorded the second-most passing yards (423) in NFL Wild Card history (Drew Brees, 466 in 2011 vs. Detroit). The Packers lost to the Cardinals in overtime, 51-45, but the 96 combined points were the most in a single Wild Card game in NFL history.
- ▶ Rodgers has a 101.0 passer rating in the postseason, No. 3 in NFL history (min. 150 att.) behind Kurt Warner (102.8) and Bart Starr (104.8).

## WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports, now in its 22nd season as an NFL network television partner, will broadcast the game to a national audience.



- ▶ Play-by-play man **Joe Buck** joins color commentator **Troy Aikman** and sideline reporters **Erin Andrews** and **Chris Myers**.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in five states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (color) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 21st season calling Packers' games. McCarren has four times been voted Wisconsin Sportscaster of the Year by the National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Association. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 17th season of broadcasts together.
- ▶ Westwood One Sports will air the game across the country. **Ian Eagle** (play-by-play) and **Boomer Esiason** (analyst) will call the action with **Tony Boselli** reporting from the sidelines and **Scott Graham** hosting pre-game and halftime shows.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed).

**PACKERS AT REDSKINS - NFC WILD CARD PLAYOFF**

**NOTES ON THE REGULAR SEASON**

- ▶ The Packers earned the 750th total victory in franchise history this season. Green Bay is 751-567-37 and joined the Chicago Bears as the only teams in NFL history to reach 750 total wins.
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** has now led Green Bay to seven seasons with 10-plus regular-season wins, the most in franchise history (since 1921).
- ▶ McCarthy is the 10th coach to record seven-or-more 10-win seasons in their first 10 years as an NFL head coach (Don Shula, Marty Schottenheimer, Chuck Knox, Joe Gibbs, Bud Grant, Tony Dungy, Mike Ditka, George Seifert, Bill Walsh).
- ▶ Green Bay posted eight zero-turnover games during the 2015 regular season, tied for No. 1 (2009) in franchise history (since 1933).
- ▶ The Packers finished the regular season 7-5 against NFC teams. It was the eighth regular season since 2006 that Green Bay finished with seven-plus wins against NFC opponents.
- ▶ Dating back to 1963, the Packers' three six-plus sack games during the regular season tied a single-season franchise record (1966, 1978, 1991).
- ▶ The Packers had four players with 50-plus receptions for only the third time (1983, 2002) since 1940.

**OFFENSE**

- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** reached 30 passing touchdowns (31) during the regular season for the fifth time in his career. He ranks second in team history behind Brett Favre's eight. Rodgers' five 30-plus passing touchdown seasons since 2009 are tied for the second most in the NFL over that time span (NE Tom Brady and IND/DEN Peyton Manning, five / NO Drew Brees, seven).
- ▶ Rodgers only threw eight interceptions, marking his fifth season with 500-plus attempts/eight or fewer interceptions. He has five of the 13 seasons in NFL history (Tom Brady - three / Aaron Brooks, Marc Bulger, Jason Campbell, Brett Favre, Alex Smith - one).
- ▶ Rodgers finished with 344 rushing yards, the second-highest total of his career (356 in 2010).
- ▶ WR **Randall Cobb** has recorded a reception in 56 consecutive regular-season games, the fifth-longest streak in franchise history. He trails WR James Lofton (58, 1979-1983) for the fourth longest.
- ▶ WR **James Jones** finished the regular season with a team-high 102 yards on four receptions (25.5 avg.) against Minnesota, giving him a single-season career-best three games with 100-plus receiving yards.
- ▶ Jones set a career high with 890 receiving yards on 50 receptions, his fourth consecutive season with 50-plus catches.
- ▶ Dating back to 1991, Jones' 15 receptions for 25-plus yards tied the fourth-most in a single regular season by a Green Bay player (Jordy Nelson, 19 in 2013, 16 in 2011 / Greg Jennings, 16 in 2010).
- ▶ TE **Richard Rodgers** hauled in 58 receptions for 510 yards (8.8 avg.) and eight touchdowns. He became only the fourth tight end in team history with 55-plus receptions in a season: Jermichael Finley (three), Paul Coffman (two), Jackie Harris (one).
- ▶ Rodgers has 10 career receiving touchdowns, tied for the most by a Green Bay tight end in his first two seasons since the 1970 merger (Bubba Franks, 10, 2000-01).
- ▶ RB **Eddie Lacy** finished the season with three 100-yard rushing games. He has recorded three or more 100-yard rushing games in each of his three NFL seasons (three in 2014 and four in 2013).
- ▶ With 3,075 rushing yards, Lacy is one of only two players in team history (RB John Brockington, 3,276) to rush for 3,000-plus yards in his first three seasons in the NFL.
- ▶ RB **James Starks** set new career bests in receptions (43), receiving yards (392) and receiving touchdowns (three) this season.
- ▶ Starks recorded 100-plus yards from scrimmage four times during the regular season. His 993 yards from scrimmage were a new career high, surpassing the 794 yards in 2011.
- ▶ With 601 rushing yards, Starks surpassed his single-season career high of 578 yards from 2011.

- ▶ Lacy (758) and Starks (601) gave the Packers two players with 600-plus rushing yards in the same season for the first time since 1985 (Jessie Clark-633 / Eddie Lee Ivery-636).
- ▶ Starks (993) and Lacy (946) each recorded over 900 yards from scrimmage, making the Packers one of three teams in the NFL with two running backs with 900-plus yards from scrimmage (Denver and Tampa Bay).

**DEFENSE**

- ▶ LB **Clay Matthews** finished second on the team with 85 tackles, eclipsing his previous career high of 83 tackles (2010).
- ▶ Matthews finished second on the team with 6.5 sacks this season. It was the seventh consecutive season he recorded six or more sacks, tying him with LB **Julius Peppers**, KC LB Tamba Hali and DEN LB DeMarcus Ware for the most six-plus sack seasons in the NFL since 2009.
- ▶ Peppers led the team with 10.5 sacks during the regular season. Dating back to last season (including playoffs), Peppers has 15.0 sacks in the last 20 games.
- ▶ Peppers recorded his ninth season with 10-plus sacks, which tied John Randle for the fourth-most 10-sack seasons since 1982 (Bruce Smith, 13 / Reggie White, 12 / Kevin Greene, 10).
- ▶ Peppers tied Jared Allen (136.0) for No. 9 on the all-time sacks list (since 1982). He trails both Richard Dent and John Randle (137.5) for the seventh most.
- ▶ DB **Micah Hyde**, CB **Damarious Randall** and CB **Sam Shields** tied for the team lead with three interceptions each. It was the first time Green Bay had three players with three or more interceptions in the same regular season since 2011, when they had six.

**SPECIAL TEAMS**

- ▶ P **Tim Masthay** finished the regular season with a net punting average of 40.25 yards, the top mark in franchise history (since 1976) as he surpassed his own record of 38.95 in 2013. He now holds the top five single-season marks in team annals (2010-13, 2015).
- ▶ Masthay averaged 44.9 net yards per punt from Week 13-16, No. 1 in the NFL over that span. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, it was the best by a Green Bay punter over a four-game stretch in a single season (min. four punts per game) since net punting began to be tracked in 1976.
- ▶ From Week 13-15, Masthay became the first Packers punter to post a net average of 44-plus yards (min. four punts) in three straight games (according to the Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ The Packers led the league in opponent punt return average (4.2) during the regular season. It was the best by a Green Bay team since 1969 (3.4 avg.).
- ▶ K **Mason Crosby** was one of five players (min. 25 att.) to connect on all extra points this season. Among those five, his 36 attempts were the second most (NE Stephen Gostkowski, 52-52).
- ▶ Crosby recorded 108 points, giving him the ninth 100-point season of his career and passing with Ryan Longwell (1997-2004) for the franchise record.

**STAT OF THE WEEK**

- ▶ Packers S **Ha Ha Clinton Dix** recorded his third sack of the season in Week 17 against Minnesota. According to STATS LLC, his three sacks are tied for the fifth most in a single regular season by a Packers safety (since 1982) and the most since Mark Roman recorded 3.5 in 2004:

- ▶ Clinton-Dix's three sacks were tied for No. 3 in the NFL this season among safeties.

### BACK TO THE POSTSEASON

The Packers clinched their seventh consecutive postseason berth (2009-15), a franchise record as they topped the previous mark of six straight from 1993-98.

- ▶ The Packers join the New England Patriots as the only teams to make the playoffs each of the last seven years.
- ▶ The Packers have made the playoffs eight times in 10 seasons under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy**.
- ▶ Green Bay leads the NFC with eight trips to the postseason since 2006.
- ▶ Green Bay has now made the postseason 31 times, tied with the Dallas Cowboys and New York Giants for No. 1 in league annals.

### HOW THEY HAVE FARED

Since the NFL went to a 12-team playoff format in 1990, the Packers have made postseason appearances as all six seeds.

- ▶ Green Bay is the No. 5 seed this postseason for just the third time since 1990.
- ▶ A breakdown of the Packers' playoff seeds, and their postseason record as that seed, from 1990-2014:

### POSTSEASON PROFICIENCY

As productive as QB **Aaron Rodgers** has been during the regular season in his eight years as the starter, he has also carried that over to the playoffs.

- ▶ Rodgers capped off the 2010 postseason with a 304-yard, three-TD effort vs. Pittsburgh that earned him Super Bowl MVP honors. He became just the **fourth quarterback in NFL history** to throw for 300 yards and three TDs with no INTs in a Super Bowl, joining Joe Montana, Steve Young and Jake Delhomme.
- ▶ Rodgers has posted a 110-plus passer rating in five of his 11 career postseason starts, including a 125.4 rating in the Divisional win against Dallas last season. That already ties him with Brett Favre (five in 24 starts), Troy Aikman (five in 16 starts) and Terry Bradshaw (five in 19 starts) for **third in league history** behind Montana (six in 23 starts) and Tom Brady (six in 28 starts).

- ▶ With one 100-yard rushing game, RB **Eddie Lacy** is tied with six other players for the second most in Packers postseason history (Dorsey Levens, three).
- ▶ **K Mason Crosby** is on a current franchise-record streak of 16 consecutive field goals made in the playoffs, which is also tied for second in NFL playoff history behind only David Akers (19). He also has scored in his last 13 consecutive postseason games, a franchise record.

**CB Damarious Randall**

NFL Defensive Rookie of the Month for November (Oct. 29 - Nov. 30).  
 -Joined CB **Casey Hayward** (October 2012) as the only Packers defensive backs to be named Defensive Rookie of the Month.  
 -Is the first Packers player to win a Rookie of the Month Award since RB **Eddie Lacy** (Offense, October 2013).

**QB Aaron Rodgers**

Pro Bowl - Fifth selection  
 -Passes Bart Starr (1960-62, 1966) for the second-most selections by a Green Bay quarterback, trailing Brett Favre's nine (1992-93, 1995-97, 2001-03, 2007).

NFC Offensive Player of the Week – Week 3 (vs. Kansas City)

-Ranks first in franchise history with 13 Player of the Week Awards, passing Brett Favre (12).  
 -Leads the league with the most Player of the Week Awards since 2010 (13).  
 -Named Player of the Week for the sixth consecutive season.

**G Josh Sitton**

Pro Bowl - third career Pro Bowl honor (2012, 2014), second straight as an original selection  
 -Is the first Green Bay guard to be named to consecutive Pro Bowls since Marco Rivera was selected to three straight from 2002-04.

**MIKE MCCARTHY**...Is in his 10th year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Led the Packers to their seventh consecutive playoff appearance this season, joining New England as the only two NFL teams to do so over that span. Has also led the team to eight playoff appearances and seven double-digit win seasons in the last 10 years (2007, 2009-2015).
- ▶ Guided the Packers to top-10 finishes in scoring in eight seasons (2007-14).
- ▶ His .653 winning percentage during the regular season (104-55-1) is ranked second among active NFL coaches (min. 50 games).
- ▶ Was named Packers head coach on Jan. 12, 2006, his first head-coaching job after 13 years as an NFL assistant.

**JAY GRUDEN**...Is in his second year as the Redskins' 29th head coach.

- ▶ Helped Washington capture its first NFC East division championship under his reign this season, after winning four of the last five games and finishing with a 9-7 record.
- ▶ Hired by the Redskins in 2014, becoming the team's youngest head coaching hire since eventual Pro Football Hall of Famer Joe Gibbs (age 40, 1981) and the first Redskins coach hired directly from an offensive coordinator role on another team since Norv Turner in 1994.
- ▶ Prior to joining the Redskins, he spent his previous three seasons as offensive coordinator for the Cincinnati Bengals where they averaged 10 wins a season, making three consecutive playoff appearances and earning an AFC North championship in 2013.
- ▶ Produced seven Pro Bowl selections on offense in his three seasons in Cincinnati.
- ▶ Spent seven seasons (2002-08) with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers, earning a Super Bowl championship ring as an offensive assistant in 2002.

## THE PACKERS-REDSKINS SERIES

- ▶ The Packers first met the Redskins (then Boston Braves) in 1932, five days after Franklin D. Roosevelt won his first presidential election.
- ▶ The two clubs met several times in the early years, most memorably in the 1936 NFL championship game. That year, Redskins owner George Preston Marshall, upset with his fans' lack of support, was moving his team to Washington and didn't want to host the championship in Boston. So, the NFL moved the game to New York's Polo Grounds, where Green Bay claimed its fourth title, 21-6.
- ▶ In the other playoff meeting in the series, an NFC Divisional game on Christmas Eve 1972, Bill Kilmer hit Roy Jefferson on a 32-yard TD pass, and Curt Knight kicked three FGs in a 16-3 Washington win, spoiling the Packers' Central Division crown.
- ▶ The Packers and Redskins played the highest-scoring game in *Monday Night Football* history on Oct. 17, 1983, at Lambeau Field, in a game that featured 11 TDs and six FGs in the 48-47 Green Bay win.

Packers President/CEO Mark Murphy played eight seasons (1977-84) with the Redskins, serving as co-captain from 1980-84, playing on the Super Bowl XVII championship team, and earning All-Pro and Pro Bowl honors in 1983...Packers vice president of football administration/player finance Russ Ball spent the 2001 season as director of football administration for the Redskins...Packers defensive line coach Mike Trgovac held the same position with the Redskins for two seasons (2000-01)... Packers secondary-safeties coach Darren Perry was born in Norfolk, Va. ...Packers longsnapper Rick Lovato went to Old Dominion University... Redskins General Manager Scot McCloughan was a scout for Green Bay from 1994-99...Redskins CB Will Blackmon was a fourth round pick by the Packers in the 2006 NFL Draft and played for Green Bay from 2006-09...Redskins offensive assistant Aubrey Pleasant played safety at the University of Wisconsin from 2005-08, while Redskins offensive line coach Bill Callahan coached the offensive line from 1990-94... Callahan coached alongside Trgovac while the two were in Philadelphia from 1995-97... Redskins defensive coordinator Joe Barry was Packers linebacker Nick Perry's position coach at USC from 2010-11...Barry, Redskins assistant special teams coach Bradford Banta and Packers running backs coach Sam Gash were on the same staff in Detroit from 2007-08...Banta played tight end and long snapper for the Bills in 2004 while Packers associate head coach/offense Tom Clements was the offensive coordinator...Redskins quarterbacks coach Matt Cavanaugh and assistant offensive line coach Shane Day both coached with the Bears (separate times) while Packers linebacker Julius Peppers was with the team... Cavanaugh was the offensive coordinator for the Ravens while Gash was his fullback...Packers offensive coordinator Edgar Bennett also played under Cavanaugh while the two were in Chicago from 1997-98...Packers assistant offensive line coach Mike Solari served in the same role in San Francisco while Cavanaugh was the quarterbacks coach...Redskins defensive backs coach Perry Fewell was the defensive coordinator for the Bills from 2006-09 while Packers quarterbacks/wide receivers coach Alex Van Pelt was the offensive quality control/quarterbacks coach...Fewell coached defensive backs under Packers defensive coordinator Dom Capers while he served in the same role in Jacksonville...Capers served as the head coach of the Texans while Redskins offensive quality control coach Dave Ragone played quarterback...Redskins running backs coach Randy Jordan played running back for the L.A. Raiders in 1993 while Packers associate head coach/linebackers Winston Moss played linebacker...Some college connections include: Packers DT B.J. Raji and Redskins CB Will Blackmon (Boston College), Packers WR Davante Adams and Redskins TE Marcel Jensen (Fresno State), Packers S Ha Ha Clinton-Dix and RB Eddie Lacy and Redskins G Arie Kouandjio (Alabama), Packers S Chris Banjo and Redskins C/G Josh LeRibeus (Southern Methodist), Packers CB Damarious Randall and Redskins WR Rashad Ross (Arizona State), and Packers FB Aaron Ripkowski and Redskins P Tress Way (Oklahoma).

**BREAKING DOWN THE 53**

The Packers' 53-man roster is composed of 26 offensive players, 24 defensive players and three specialists.

► According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Green Bay was joined by Tampa Bay and Jacksonville as the only teams in the NFL to have at least two rookie free agents make the opening-day roster each of the last six seasons (2010-15).

► Green Bay's average age on the opening-day roster was 25.23, making it the second-youngest team in the NFL (St. Louis, 24.96).

► Of the 53 players on Green Bay's roster, 35 of them (66.0 percent) were draft picks of the Packers. Dating back to 2009, Green Bay has selected eight players in the first round, seven of which are still on the team.

► Green Bay has 16 players on the roster that began their careers as non-drafted free agents, with 10 of those originally signed by Green Bay.

► Over 40 percent of the players (22 of 53, 41.5 percent) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as a non-drafted player.

► The Packers have five players on the roster that played in the NFL prior to the 2009 season. Four of those players were draft picks of the Packers (QB **Aaron Rodgers**, WR **James Jones**, K **Mason Crosby** and G **Josh Sitton**) and four have made at least one Pro Bowl (FB **John Kuhn**, Rodgers, LB **Julius Peppers** and Sitton).

► Of the 53 players on the roster, 45 began their pro careers with the Packers (84.9 percent).

► Only 19 of the 53 players on the roster (35.8 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft, with 18 being drafted by the Packers.

### TAKING CARE OF THE BALL

Since taking over as the starter in 2008, QB **Aaron Rodgers** has been one of the best in the league when it comes to limiting interceptions. He threw eight during the 2015 regular season (**tied for No. 6 in the NFL**, min. 300 att.) and **ranked No. 1 in the NFL** during the 2014 regular season with five interceptions, the third fewest in a single regular season (min. 250 att.) in Packers history.

Having led Green Bay to the playoffs in eight of his 10 seasons as head coach, **Mike McCarthy** is joined by Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl win with a victory over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.

► McCarthy guided the Packers to a franchise-record fourth consecutive division title in 2014.

- ▶ TE **Justin Perillo** registered a career-high five catches for a career-best 58 yards (11.6 avg.) in Week 10 against Detroit, including the first touchdown grab of his career.

**THE GROUND GAME**

The combination of RBs **Eddie Lacy** and **James Starks** led a rushing attack that rushed for 120-plus yards in eight regular-season games, **tyed for No. 6 in the NFL** in 2015:

- ▶ Lacy (758) and Starks (601) gave the Packers two players with 600-plus rushing yards in the same season for the first time since 1985 (Jessie Clark-633 / Eddie Lee Ivery-636).
- ▶ Green Bay was **one of four teams in the NFL** with two players recording 600-plus rushing yards during the 2015 regular season (Carolina, Cincinnati and Denver).
- ▶ With 3,075 rushing yards, Lacy is **one of only two players in team history** (RB John Brockington, 3,276) to rush for 3,000-plus yards in his first three seasons in the NFL.
- ▶ The Packers have recorded 25-plus carries and 100-plus yards 20 times in the last 28 regular-season games (Weeks 5-8, 10-17 of 2014 and Weeks 1-4, 11-15 of 2015), averaging at least 4 yards a carry 14 times during that span.
- ▶ Dating back to the 2013 regular season, Green Bay is 21-5 in the last 26 games it ran the ball at least 25 times, including 18-4 since the start of the 2014 regular season. The Packers are 81-18-1 under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** when running the ball 25-plus times.
- ▶ In Weeks 11-12, Lacy recorded back-to-back 100-yard rushing games for the first time in his career (100 and 105 yards).
- ▶ Lacy recorded a season-best 124 yards on 24 carries (5.2 avg.) in Week 14. It fueled a rushing attack that produced 230 yards on 44 carries (5.2 avg.), the Packers most rushing yards in a regular-season game since Nov. 29, 2004, vs. St. Louis (231 yards on 28 carries).
- ▶ In Week 14 against Dallas, Lacy also matched career highs by rushing for nine first downs (at MIN, Nov. 23, 2014) and recording five runs of 10-plus yards (at DAL, Dec. 15, 2013 / vs. MIN, Oct. 2, 2014).
- ▶ Starks set a career high with 993 yards from scrimmage this season, surpassing the 794 he recorded in 2011.
- ▶ Starks was one of only five players in the NFL in 2015 with 600-plus rushing yards and 390-plus receiving yards (Devonta Freeman, Lamar Miller, Mark Ingram, Giovani Bernard).
- ▶ Starks put together two of the finest rushing games of his career in 2015. In Week 2, he carried the ball 20 times for 95 yards (4.8 avg.), and in Week 6, he racked up 112 yards on just 10 carries (11.2 avg.), becoming the first Packers player to rush for 100-plus yards on 10 or fewer carries since RB Brandon Jackson at Washington on Oct. 10, 2010 (115 yards on 10 carries).

▶ Starks' average of 11.2 yards per carry against San Diego is the second highest in a game by an NFL back this season (min. 10 att.).

- ▶ In Week 6, Starks registered the longest run of his career, a 65-yard touchdown that was also the longest by a Green Bay player since RB DeShawn Wynn's 73-yard touchdown vs. Detroit on Dec. 28, 2008. Starks also recorded a 5-yard touchdown reception against San Diego, giving him the first two touchdown game of his career and becoming the first Packer to post a 50-yard touchdown run and a touchdown reception in the first quarter of a game since RB Dorsey Levens did so at Indianapolis on Nov. 16, 1997.
- ▶ Starks set new career bests in receptions (43), receiving yards (392) and touchdown receptions (three) during the 2015 regular season.

**RACKING UP POINTS**

K **Mason Crosby** is moving his way up the record books.

▶ Crosby passed Ryan Longwell in Week 2 to become the franchise career points leader:

- ▶ In Week 6, Crosby (296) eclipsed Longwell (277) for the most field goal attempts in Packers' history.
- ▶ Crosby (1,247) passed Longwell (1,119) for the most points scored in the regular and postseason combined in franchise history.
- ▶ Crosby recorded 108 points during the 2015 regular season, giving him the ninth 100-point season of his career and passing with Ryan Longwell (1997-2004) for the franchise record.
- ▶ In Week 11, he tied the single-game team record with five field goals and became the first player in NFL history to have five field goals of 40-plus yards in a game. In the same game, Crosby connected on a 52-yard field goal, extending his career franchise record for the most 50-yard FGs to 26.
- ▶ Crosby was one of five players (min. 25 att.) to connect on all extra points during the 2015 regular season. Among those five, his 36 attempts were the second most (NE Stephen Gostkowski, 52-52).
- ▶ Including 2013, Crosby made 19 consecutive field goals in the regular season, until his final kick against the Bears was blocked in Week 4 of 2014. He now owns the two longest consecutive field-goal streaks in franchise history (23 straight from 2010-11).
- ▶ Dating back to the 2013 regular season, Crosby made at least one FG in 17 consecutive regular-season games before not getting an attempt in Week 3 at Detroit last year. It is the longest streak in team history.

### CLAY FINDS HIS WAY TO THE BALL

LB **Clay Matthews'** impact on opposing offenses continues to be felt beyond sacks due to the multiple positions he plays.

- ▶ In 2015, Matthews was selected to his sixth Pro Bowl and first as an inside linebacker after recording 6.5 sacks (second on the team), 15 QB hits (No. 1 on the team), and a career high 85 tackles (No. 2 on the team). He was also one of three players (Micah Hyde, Sam Shields) on the team to have an interception and a fumble recovery.
- ▶ It was the seventh consecutive season he recorded six or more sacks, **tied for the most six-plus-sack seasons in the NFL since 2009:**

- ▶ From Week 8 of 2014 to the end of the 2015 regular season, Matthews is **tied for No. 10 in the NFL** in sacks over that span (16).
- ▶ Matthews, Peppers and Panthers DE Jared Allen are the only players in the NFL with five-plus interceptions and 45-plus sacks since 2009. Matthews has six interceptions and 67.5 sacks, Peppers has seven interceptions and 65.5 sacks and Allen has five interceptions and 78.5 sacks.

- ▶ Marked his ninth season with 10-plus sacks, which tied John Randle for the fourth-most 10-sack seasons since 1982 (Bruce Smith, 13 / Reggie White, 12 / Kevin Greene, 10).
- ▶ Peppers recorded a half sack or more in nine 2015 regular season games, which is **tied for the fifth most in the NFL.**

**CONTINUAL IMPACT**

In his young career, DT **Mike Daniels** has seen his playing time steadily increase as well as his production. After playing in 14 games as a rookie in 2012, he has played in every game since the start of the 2013 season. He led Green Bay's defensive line with 5.5 sacks and was the team leader in quarterback hits (19) and pressures (22) during the 2014 regular season.

- ▶ In 2015, Daniels led the Packers' defensive line in tackles (67) and sacks (four). He finished third on the team with 13 QB hits.
- ▶ In Week 5 versus St. Louis, he tied for the team lead with a career-best nine tackles (eight solo).
- ▶ Daniels registered his first career interception in Week 16 at Arizona, returning it 23 yards. According to STATS LLC, it was the first interception by a Packers DT since Cullen Jenkins on Oct. 18, 2009. Dating back to 1960, his 23-yard interception return was the longest by a Green Bay DT on an interception.
- ▶ Daniels is third on the Packers with 16.0 sacks since the start of the 2013 season (Peppers-17.5 / Matthews-25.0). His 16.0 sacks are **tied for No. 8 among NFL defensive tackles** over that span, according to STATS LLC:

The Packers' secondary is led by veteran cornerback **Sam Shields**, who earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl after a 2014 season that saw him record multiple interceptions for the fifth consecutive season.

- ▶ With three interceptions during the regular season (tied for the team high), Shields has registered multiple interceptions in each season from 2010-15.
- ▶ In 2015, he recorded interceptions in back-to-back games for the first time in his career (Weeks 3-4).

**MAKING AN IMPACT**

**S Ha Ha Clinton-Dix** has been a presence on the Packers defense since his rookie season.

- ▶ After starting 10 of 16 games and both postseason contests last season, he started every game this season.
- ▶ Clinton-Dix finished second on the team with 95 tackles (73 solo) in 2014 and led the Packers with 115 tackles (96 solo) this season.
- ▶ The second-year player registered a total of three interceptions last season (including playoffs). He tied for fourth on the team with two during the 2015 regular season.
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, his three sacks during the 2015 regular season were tied for the fifth most in a single regular season by a Packers safety (since 1982) and the most since Mark Roman recorded 3.5 in 2004.
- ▶ Clinton-Dix's three sacks also tied for No. 3 in the NFL in 2015 among safeties.
- ▶ During the 2015 regular season, he registered eight-plus tackles in eight games, including setting career highs in both total tackles (12) and solo tackles (11) in the Week 10 game vs. Detroit, in which he also registered an interception.

**GOOD FIRST IMPRESSION**

Packers rookie CBs **Damarious Randall** and **Quinten Rollins** stepped in and contributed in their first NFL season.

- ▶ Both Randall and Rollins returned an interception for a touchdown this season, marking the first time the Packers had two rookies/first-year players post INT returns for TDs in the same season since 1921 (Nate Abrams, Billy DuMoe).
- ▶ Randall led the Packers with 16 passes defended and is tied for the team lead with three interceptions.
- ▶ Both players ranked near the top of NFL rookies in interceptions during the regular season:

### ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Green Bay went 7-1 away from Lambeau Field in 2011, with the seven road wins setting a single-season franchise record.

- ▶ The Packers have been able to stay above the .500 mark on the road during Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** tenure, a notable achievement in the National Football League.
- ▶ Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only nine of 32 NFL teams have regular-season road records above .500.

### 317 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Vikings in Week 17 brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 317 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 59th season of football in 2015. Including the playoffs, a total of 704,818 fans made their way through the turnstiles for the nine games last season. For the victory over Dallas in the Divisional round, Packers fans set a new Lambeau Field paid attendance record (79,704).
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

### THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012. The Packers were one of two teams to finish undefeated at home during the 2014 regular season (Denver).
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 59-20-1 (.744) at home in the regular season since 2006, **No. 2 in the NFL.**
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

### A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 95th NFL regular-season schedule was headlined by six prime-time games, including a Thanksgiving night game at Lambeau Field against the Chicago Bears, the first home Thanksgiving game since 1923.

- ▶ The Packers honored two of its all-time greats – Brett Favre and Ron Wolf – in halftime ceremonies during the 2015 season, with Wolf's name unveiled next to fellow Pro Football Hall of Famers on the stadium's east side Nov. 15 and Favre's name and retired No. 4 unveiled on Lambeau Field's north façade on Nov. 26.
- ▶ Green Bay's schedule includes seven games against 2014 playoff teams. Three of those games (Dallas, Detroit, Seattle) will be at Lambeau Field, while four (Arizona, Carolina, Denver, Detroit) will come on the road.
- ▶ The Packers opened the season on the road, traveling to Chicago to play the Bears in Week 1 for the first time since 1981.
- ▶ Green Bay spent Week 2 playing a Sunday night game against the Seattle Seahawks. In Week 3, they faced the Kansas City Chiefs on *Monday Night Football*. It was the first time since 2008 that the Packers played their first two home games in primetime. It is the 23rd consecutive season (1993-2015) that the Packers are appearing on *MNF*. Green Bay is 15-8-1 at home on *MNF*, including 5-1 under McCarthy.
- ▶ The Packers traveled to San Francisco in Week 4, the fifth time the Packers and 49ers will meet in the regular or postseason since 2012.
- ▶ The St. Louis Rams visited Lambeau for the first time since 2011 in Week 5, and in Week 6 the Packers hosted the San Diego Chargers for the first time since 2007 and only the fifth time overall. Green Bay improved to 8-2 against the Rams at Lambeau Field (dating back to 1990) and improved to 10-1 all-time versus the Chargers.
- ▶ Following Green Bay's first Week 7 bye since 2007, the Packers traveled to play the Broncos in Denver for the first time on a Sunday night. It was Green Bay's seventh visit to the Mile High City during the regular season and first since a 19-13 overtime victory in 2007. It was a matchup of two of three NFL teams (New England) that have won their division each of the last four years. It was the first of a three-game stretch the Packers will play against 2014 playoff teams.
- ▶ The Packers stayed on the road for a Week 9 game at Carolina, facing the Panthers in back-to-back seasons for the first time since 2007-08. Green Bay fell to 8-5 against the Panthers during the regular season, including 5-3 at Carolina.
- ▶ The second half of the regular season saw Green Bay face division opponents in four consecutive weeks. The Packers faced the Lions at home in Week 10, traveled to play Minnesota in Week 11, came home and played the Bears on Thanksgiving in Week 12 and played at Detroit in another Thursday night game in Week 13. It was the first time Green Bay played division opponents in four consecutive weeks since 2000 (Weeks 14-17) and the first time the Packers played on consecutive Thursdays since 2007 (Weeks 12-13).
- ▶ The Packers' final four regular-season games were bookended by two home contests, which started with Dallas returning to Green Bay in Week 14. Including the postseason, the Packers won their fifth consecutive game against the Cowboys. Green Bay is 11-4 against Dallas at home during the regular and postseason.
- ▶ In Week 15, Green Bay traveled west and won its seventh consecutive game against the Oakland Raiders. The Packers traveled to Arizona to play the Cardinals in Week 16.
- ▶ Green Bay hosted the Vikings at Lambeau to close out the regular season, marking the sixth time the two have met in the regular-season finale and first at Lambeau since 1996.

They have won 31 of 51 playoff games, starting with their first-ever postseason contest – the 1936 NFL championship, a 21-6 victory over the Boston Redskins. The standings:

## STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON

### 18 RANDALL COBB

- ▶ Joined by WR **Jordy Nelson** as the first duo in franchise history to both catch 10-plus touchdown passes in the same season in 2014.
- ▶ Reached the 1,000-yard receiving mark for the first time in his career last season (1,287). He joined Nelson (1,433) as the the second duo in Packers' history to each reach 1,200 receiving yards in the same season, joining the 2004 duo of Javon Walker (1,382) and Donald Driver (1,208).
- ▶ With a career-best 91 receptions in 2014, seventh most in franchise history, joined Nelson (92) to become the only pair of Packers' players to reach 90 receptions each in the same season.
- ▶ Joined Nelson to become the first duo in NFL history to record 90-plus receptions, 1,200-plus yards and 12-plus touchdown receptions in the same regular season (2014).
- ▶ Cobb and Nelson became just the third set of teammates in NFL history with at least 1,200 receiving yards and 10 touchdowns each in the same season (2014), joining Minnesota's Cris Carter and Randy Moss in 1999 and Denver's Demaryius Thomas and Eric Decker in 2013.
- ▶ Registered a touchdown reception in a career-best six consecutive games (Games 4-9, 2014). It was the longest streak by a Packer since WR Sterling Sharpe (six) in 1994.
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, became the first person in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.
- ▶ Has three kick return scores (two punts, one kickoff) in his career, which ties him for No. 2 in franchise history behind only RB Travis Williams' six return TDs (one punt, five kickoffs).

### 2 MASON CROSBY

- ▶ Is the franchise all-time leader in career points (1,145) and field goal attempts (296) during the regular season.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in team history for the most 100-point seasons with nine.
- ▶ Made six consecutive field goals from 50-plus yards during the 2014 season, a franchise record.
- ▶ Made 23 straight field goals from Week 13 of 2010 through Week 10 of 2011, the longest regular-season streak in franchise history.
- ▶ In 2011, set a franchise record with a 58-yard field goal in Week 7 at Minnesota, eclipsing the mark of 56 yards he held (Week 1 at Philadelphia, 2010; Week 5 at Atlanta, 2011).

### 27 EDDIE LACY

- ▶ With 3,075 rushing yards, Lacy is one of only two players in team history (RB John Brockington, 3,276) to rush for 3,000-plus yards in his first three seasons in the NFL.
- ▶ Became the first player in franchise history to rush for at least 1,000 yards and score 10-plus scrimmage touchdowns in each of his first two seasons (2013-14).
- ▶ With 2,317 rushing yards in 2013-14, passed John Brockington (2,132) for the most by a Packers' running back in his first two NFL seasons.
- ▶ With 13 touchdowns during the 2014 season, joined WRs **Randall Cobb** and **Jordy Nelson** as the first Green Bay trio to each score 10-plus touchdowns in the same season.
- ▶ Was the first Packers back to ever to record 100 yards from scrimmage and a touchdown reception in three consecutive games (Weeks 10-12, 2014).
- ▶ Set a franchise record with nine straight games with more than 100 yards from scrimmage (2014).

- ▶ Became first Green Bay running back to register receptions of 55 yards or more in consecutive games (2014: at NO and vs. CHI).
- ▶ His 123 receiving yards at New Orleans in Week 8 (2014) were the second most by a Green Bay running back since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger, trailing only Eddie Lee Ivery's 128 yards at Tampa Bay on Oct. 12, 1980.
- ▶ Set franchise rookie records in 2013 for rushing yards (1,178), rushing TDs (11) and rushing attempts (284).
- ▶ Tied the team rookie mark for 100-yard rushing games with four (2013).
- ▶ Named NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press* and was selected to the Pro Bowl as an injury replacement for Vikings RB Adrian Peterson.

### 8 TIM MASTHAY

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history (min. 150 punts) with a 44.2-yard gross punting average.
- ▶ Finished the 2015 regular season with a net punting average of 40.25 yards, the top mark in franchise history (since 1976) as he surpassed his own record of 38.95 in 2013. He now holds the top five single-season marks in team annals (2010-13, 2015).
- ▶ Has recorded at least one 60-yard punt for six straight seasons (2010-15), a franchise record.
- ▶ In Weeks 13-15 this season, he became the first Packers punter to post a net average of 44-plus yards (min. four punts) in three straight games since net punting average was first tracked in 1976 (according to the Elias Sports Bureau).
- ▶ Set a franchise record with nine punts against Detroit in Week 10.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in team annals (since 1976) with 130 punts placed inside the 20-yard line in his career.
- ▶ Set a single-season franchise record with his 45.6-yard gross average in 2011, surpassing Hentrich's 45.0-yard mark in 1997.
- ▶ Tied Sean Landeta's single-season franchise record (1998) by placing 30 punts inside the 20-yard line in 2012.

### 52 CLAY MATTHEWS

- ▶ In 2015, he was selected to his sixth Pro Bowl and first as an inside linebacker after recording 6.5 sacks (second on the team), 15 QB hits (No. 1 on the team) and a career-high 85 tackles (No. 2 on the team). It was the seventh consecutive season he recorded six or more sacks, tied for the most six-plus sack seasons in the NFL since 2009.
- ▶ Ranks No. 3 in team history with 67.5 career sacks.
- ▶ Tied for No. 1 in team history with four 10-plus sack seasons.
- ▶ Only player in franchise history to be named to the Pro Bowl each of his first four seasons in the league (2009-12).
- ▶ Only player in team history to score a defensive TD in each of his first three seasons in the league (2009-11).
- ▶ His 17 sacks in his first 20 games were the most by an NFL player to start his career at the time, eclipsing the mark of 16.5 set by Leslie O'Neal (1986, 1988) and John Abraham (2000-01).
- ▶ Is the first NFL player since sacks became an official stat in 1982 to post a double-digit sack total and a defensive TD in each of his first two seasons in the league.
- ▶ First player in franchise annals to post 10-plus sacks in each of his first two years in the NFL.

Two years after he co-founded the Packers with Curly Lambeau, George Calhoun began writing a piece called *The Dope Sheet*, which served as the official press release from 1921-24.





**STREAKS & MILESTONES – REGULAR SEASON**

**56 JULIUS PEPPERS**

- ▶ Tied with Jared Allen for the most sacks among active players (136.0) and the ninth most in NFL history (since 1982).
- ▶ Is the only player in NFL history with 100 career sacks and four interception returns for touchdowns.
- ▶ Became the first linebacker in Packers' history to post two interception returns for touchdowns in the same season (2014).
- ▶ Only player in NFL history with at least 10 interceptions and 100 sacks.
- ▶ Has been selected to eight Pro Bowls since entering the league in 2002, which is second most among active defensive players (Charles Woodson and DeMarcus Ware - nine).
- ▶ With eight double-digit sack seasons as a pro, is tied with Jared Allen and DeMarcus Ware for the most in the NFL since 2002.
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times and was selected to the NFL's All-Decade team for the 2000s.

**12 AARON RODGERS**

- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with a 104.1 career passer rating.
- ▶ Reached the 30,000 career passing yards on his 3,652nd attempt, the fewest attempts needed in NFL history as he bested the previous record held by QB Johnny Unitas (3,695 attempts).
- ▶ Set NFL records with 494 pass attempts and 44 touchdown passes (586 and 49 including playoffs) at home without an interception. The streak lasted from Dec. 2, 2012, to Oct. 11, 2015.
- ▶ In 119 regular-season starts, has 43 career 300-yard games, 46 three-TD games and 70 zero-INT games (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ Is the only QB in team history with four 400-yard passing games, including a 480-yard effort vs. Washington in 2013 that tied a franchise record. No one else has more than one 400-yard game.
- ▶ Tied with Brett Favre for the franchise record for 4,000-yard passing seasons (five).
- ▶ Threw for a career-best five interceptions last season, the third fewest in a single regular season in Packers' history.
- ▶ Threw six touchdown passes in the first half against the Bears in Week 10 (2014), tying Raiders QB Daryle Lamonica (vs. Buffalo, Oct. 19, 1969) for the NFL record for most touchdown passes in a half. It was the second time Rodgers threw for a franchise-best six touchdowns in a game.
- ▶ Posted six consecutive zero-interception games during the 2014 season (Weeks 2-7), tying Bart Starr's franchise record (min. 15 attempts a game) set in 1964.
- ▶ Rodgers (four, 2014), along with Patriots QB Tom Brady (four, 2007) and Seahawks QB Russell Wilson (five, 2015) are the only players in NFL history to register four or more consecutive three-touchdown/zero-interception games in a single season. His eight overall in 2014 also tied Brady (2007) for the most during a single regular season.
- ▶ When he hit the 200-TD mark for his career, he had thrown just 53 INTs to that point, the fewest in NFL history as he bested Tom Brady's mark of 88 INTs at the time of his 200th TD pass.
- ▶ In 2014, he became the first NFL quarterback to throw for 18-plus touchdowns with one or fewer interceptions in the first seven games of a season.
- ▶ Ranks No. 2 in NFL history for the most touchdown passes in a player's first 100 games with 203 (MIA QB Dan Marino, 217).
- ▶ Set an NFL single-season record in 2011 with a 122.5 passer rating and set team marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25), TD/INT ratio (7.50) and 300-yard games (eight).

- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, the most in NFL history by a quarterback in his first five seasons as a starter.
- ▶ Threw a TD pass in 35 straight regular-season games at Lambeau Field from 2008-12, a team record (previous mark was 25 by Brett Favre, 1992-96). It was the second-longest home streak in NFL history behind Dan Marino's 39-game streak from 1983-88.
- ▶ Tied a single-game franchise record with six TD passes at Houston in Week 6 of 2012, matching Matt Flynn's mark (Jan. 1, 2012, vs. Detroit).
- ▶ Posted a 100-plus passer rating in six straight seasons (2009-14), the only quarterback in league history to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ In 2009, became first QB in NFL history to throw 30 or more TDs, seven or fewer INTs, and rush for five TDs in the same season.
- ▶ Has registered a passer rating over 110.0 in four or more consecutive games three times in his career (Weeks 3-7, 2009; Week 9, Weeks 11-13, 2010; Weeks 1-7, 9-12, 2011), one of only two quarterbacks in franchise history (Bart Starr, 1966) to accomplish the feat in a single season.

**WR Davante Adams, 2nd Year, Fresno State, D2-14**

- ▶ Has started 26 of the last 30 games, including the postseason.
- ▶ Started 11 of 16 regular-season games played as a rookie in 2014 and both playoff contests.
- ▶ Recorded 121 receiving yards against New England in Week 13 last season, the most by a Green Bay rookie since WR Sterling Sharpe's 124-yard effort vs. Detroit on Nov. 20, 1988.
- ▶ Set franchise postseason single-game records for the most receptions and receiving yards by a rookie when he posted seven catches for 117 yards (16.7 avg.) and a touchdown in the NFC Divisional playoff victory vs. Dallas.

**LT David Bakhtiari, 3rd Year, Colorado, D4a-13**

- ▶ Has started all but two games at LT since the start of the 2013 regular season. Missed final two games of 2015 regular season due to injury.
- ▶ Started all 16 games at left tackle in 2013, the only rookie in the NFL to do so in 2013 and the first Packer rookie to do so since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start at LT in the season opener since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since 1985.

**LG Josh Sitton, 8th Year, Central Florida, D4b-08**

- ▶ Has started 110 games since 2009, the most by an offensive player in a Green Bay uniform over that span.
- ▶ Due to injuries along the offensive line, made first career start at LT in Week 17 of 2015.
- ▶ Was named to his third career, and second straight, Pro Bowl this season.
- ▶ Was named 2010 Offensive Lineman of the Year by the NFL Alumni Association.
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, has allowed just 18.0 sacks in his eight-year career.

**C Corey Linsley, 2nd Year, Ohio State, D5a-14**

- ▶ Has started every game he has played in, missing only three games.
- ▶ First rookie center to start for Green Bay in Week 1 since the merger.
- ▶ Was the first rookie center to start every game for the Packers since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Named to PFWA's All-Rookie team, the first Green Bay center to be honored since its inception in 1974.

**RG T.J. Lang, 7th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09**

- ▶ Has started games at four different positions on the line as a pro (47 at RG, 27 at LG, five at RT, two at LT). Played C in Week 10 in 2013.
- ▶ Has started 78 contests since 2011.
- ▶ Started games at both tackle spots in his first season (2009) and became the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

**RT Bryan Bulaga, 6th Year, Iowa, D1-10**

- ▶ Missed the second part of the 2012 season after suffering a hip injury vs. Arizona on Nov. 4 and missed all of the 2013 season after injuring his knee on Aug. 3. Has started 27 of 32 games since the start of the 2014 season.
- ▶ Started 37 games at RT in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Started the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at right tackle after taking over for veteran Mark Tauscher (shoulder), the most regular-season starts by a Packers rookie tackle since Tauscher's 14 in 2000.
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.
- ▶ Capped his rookie season by becoming the youngest player, according to STATS LLC, to ever start in the Super Bowl (21 years, 322 days).

**TE Richard Rodgers, 2nd Year, California, D3a-14**

- ▶ Finished second on the team this season in receptions (58), becoming the fourth TE in team history with 55-plus receptions in a season: Jermichael Finley (three), Paul Coffman (two), Jackie Harris (one).
- ▶ Has 10 career receiving TDs, tied for the most by a Green Bay TE in his first two seasons since the 1970 merger (Bubba Franks, 10, 2000-01).
- ▶ Set a regular-season franchise record for a tight end with 146 yards on eight receptions (18.3 avg.), including a game-winning 61-yard touchdown catch with no time on the clock, at Detroit in Week 13.
- ▶ Including the postseason, has registered one or more receptions in 25 of the last 27 games.

- ▶ Played in all 16 games with five starts as a rookie in 2014, recording 20 receptions for 225 yards (11.3 avg.) and two touchdowns.
- ▶ Became the first rookie TE to start for the Packers in a season opener since Jackie Harris opened in a two-tight-end set in 1990.

**WR Randall Cobb, 5th Year, Kentucky, D2-11**

- ▶ Led the team in receptions (79), was No. 2 in receiving yards (829) and was No. 3 in touchdown receptions (six) during the 2015 regular season.
- ▶ Set a new single-season career high with five 100-yard receiving games during the 2014 season (three-2012). Earned first trip to the Pro Bowl.
- ▶ His career-best 91 receptions in 2014 were the seventh most in team history.
- ▶ Finished the regular season tied for fourth in the NFL with 12 touchdown receptions in 2014.
- ▶ Before suffering a knee injury in Week 6 in 2013, led the team in receptions with 29 and was No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.
- ▶ Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.
- ▶ With 954 receiving yards and 964 kickoff return yards in 2012, he became the first player in NFL history to post 900-plus yards in each category in the same season.

**QB Aaron Rodgers, 11th Year, California, D1-05**

- ▶ Earned his fifth selection to the Pro Bowl this season, passing Bart Starr (1960-62, 1966) for the second-most selections by a Green Bay quarterback behind Brett Favre's nine (1992-93, 1995-97, 2001-03, 2007).
- ▶ His career passer rating of 104.1 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Finished the 2014 regular season ranked No. 2 in the NFL in passer rating (112.2), touchdown percentage (7.3), No. 1 in interception percentage (1.0) and No. 3 in touchdown passes (38).
- ▶ In 119 regular-season starts (79-40 record), has posted 43 games with 300-plus passing yards, 70 without an interception and 67 with a 100-plus passer rating (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ Recorded a passer rating of at least 120.0 in seven regular-season games in 2014, setting a single-season career high and tying for the third most in a single season in the NFL, dating back to 1960.
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

**RB Eddie Lacy, 3rd Year, Alabama, D2-13**

- ▶ With 758 rushing yards this season, he and James Starks (601) gave the Packers two players with 600-plus rushing yards in the same regular season for the first time since 1985 (Jessie Clark-633 / Eddie Lee Ivory-636).
- ▶ With 3,075 rushing yards, is one of only two players in team history (RB John Brockington, 3,276) to rush for 3,000-plus yards in his first three seasons in the NFL.
- ▶ Became the first player in team history to post 1,000 rushing yards and 10-plus total TDs in both of his first two seasons.
- ▶ With 1,139 rushing yards in 2014, became the fifth player in franchise history to record consecutive 1,000-yard rushing seasons (Ryan Grant, 2008-09 / Ahman Green, 2000-04 / John Brockington, 1971-73 / Jim Taylor, 1960-64).
- ▶ Ranked No. 1 in the league among rookies and No. 8 among all players with 1,178 rushing yards in 2013, despite missing one full game and nearly all of another due to a concussion.
- ▶ Ranks No. 1 in franchise history for the most rushing yards by a rookie in a single season, No. 1 in attempts (284), and tied for No. 1 for most 100-yard rushing games with four (John Brockington, four in 1971).

**FB John Kuhn, 10th Year, Shippensburg, W-07 (Pit)**

- ▶ Selected to the Pro Bowl for the third time in 2015, becoming the first Green Bay FB to be named to the Pro Bowl in back-to-back seasons since Taylor went to five straight (1960-64).
- ▶ Has played in 137 of 142 games (148 of 153 including playoffs) during his nine seasons in Green Bay, appearing in all 16 regular-season contests in five of those seasons, including 2015.





## PACKERS STARTERS – DEFENSE

### **DE Letroy Guion, 8th Year, Florida State, FA-14**

- ▶ Has started 20 of the 29 games he has played since the start of the 2014 season.
- ▶ Signed with Green Bay during the 2014 offseason after spending his first six NFL seasons with the Minnesota Vikings.
- ▶ Started all 28 games he appeared in for Minnesota over the past two seasons, recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.
- ▶ Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012.

### **NT B.J. Raji, 7th Year, Boston College, D1a-09**

- ▶ Started 15 games this season after missing the entire 2014 season with a biceps injury suffered during a preseason game vs. Oakland.
- ▶ Played in 70 games from 2010-13 (including playoffs), tied for second most in NFL by a defensive lineman over that span.
- ▶ Named to the Pro Bowl in 2011, becoming the first Packers defensive tackle since Bob Brown in 1972 to receive the honor.
- ▶ Earned All-Rookie team honors from *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA in 2009, the first Packers defensive lineman to be selected since DE Vonnie Holiday in 1998.

### **DT Mike Daniels, 4th Year, Iowa, D4a-12**

- ▶ Ranks third on the team with 16.0 sacks since the start of the 2013 regular season (LB Julius Peppers-17.5 / LB Clay Matthews-25.0).
- ▶ Has started all 32 games over the past two seasons and has led the defensive line in both tackles and sacks each of that last two seasons.
- ▶ Returned a fumble 43 yards for a TD vs. Detroit in Week 14 of 2012, the longest fumble return for a TD by a rookie in franchise history.
- ▶ Starred as an interior pass rusher at Iowa, posting a team-high 24.5 tackles for a loss and 13 sacks from 2010-11.

### **LOLB Mike Neal, 6th Year, Purdue, D2-10**

- ▶ Tied with DT Mike Daniels for No. 3 on the team with 4.0 sacks in 2015.
- ▶ Started a career-best 15 of 16 games played this season.
- ▶ Tied for No. 2 on the Packers with 18.0 sacks since 2012.
- ▶ Transitioned to a hybrid OLB/DE role in 2013 and racked up 102 tackles (66 solo), a interception, a forced fumble and 9.5 sacks from 2013-14.

### **BLB Jake Ryan, Rookie, Michigan, D4-15**

- ▶ Started the final five games of the regular season.
- ▶ Recorded a team-best nine tackles (eight solo) and one fumble recovery in Week 13 at Detroit in his first pro start.
- ▶ Served as a team captain for his final two seasons at Michigan and was a three-time winner (2012-14) of the Roger Zatkoff Award, given to the Wolverines top linebacker. He was the only player to win the award (est. 1991) three times.
- ▶ Joined LB John Anderson (first round, 26th overall) as the only Michigan linebackers ever drafted by Green Bay.
- ▶ Started 41 of 46 games played in college, appearing at inside linebacker as a senior after spending his first three seasons at outside linebacker and defensive end.

### **MLB Clay Matthews, 7th Year, Southern California, D1b-09**

- ▶ Selected to his sixth Pro Bowl and first as an inside linebacker in 2015 after recording 6.5 sacks (second on the team), 15 QB hits (No. 1 on the team), and a career-high 85 tackles (No. 2 on the team).
- ▶ His 67.5 sacks since entering the NFL in 2009 are **tied for No. 6 in the league** over that span.
- ▶ With a team-high 11.0 sacks last season, is now tied for the most 10-plus sack seasons in franchise history (four).
- ▶ Is the only Packer in team history to earn Pro Bowl recognition in each of his first four seasons in the NFL (2009-12).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).
- ▶ Named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* in 2010, the first Green Bay LB to earn that honor since Tim Harris in 1989. Finished second to Pittsburgh safety Troy Polamalu in the AP's Defensive Player of the Year voting.

### **ROLB Julius Peppers, 14th Year, North Carolina, FA-14**

- ▶ Recorded his ninth season with 10-plus sacks in 2015 (10.5), which tied John Randle for the fourth-most 10-sack seasons since 1982 (Bruce Smith, 13 / Reggie White, 12 / Kevin Greene, 10).
- ▶ Only player in NFL history with 10 interceptions and at least 100 sacks.
- ▶ Has been selected to the Pro Bowl eight times (2004-06, 2008-12) and has been named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times (2004, 2006, 2010). Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.
- ▶ Has played in 128 consecutive regular-season games, tied for the longest active streak among NFL linebackers (OAK Curtis Lofton).
- ▶ Tied for No. 2 in the league in sacks (136.0) and ranks No. 5 in forced fumbles (45) since entering the NFL in 2002. His sack total is tied for No. 9 in NFL history (since 1982).
- ▶ Has blocked 13 kicks (12 field goals, one extra point) during his career.

### **LCB Casey Hayward, 4th Year, Vanderbilt, D2b-12**

- ▶ Started a career high 11 of 16 games this season, tying for fourth on the team with a career-best 73 tackles.
- ▶ Played in all 16 games in 2014 and tied for No. 1 on the team (LB Julius Peppers) and No. 7 in the NFL for total takeaways with five (three INTs, two fumble recoveries).
- ▶ Missed most of the 2013 season with a nagging hamstring injury.
- ▶ Became the first Green Bay CB ever to be named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team (est. 1974) and was chosen as the league's Defensive Rookie of the Year by ProFootballFocus.com in 2012. Led all NFL rookies with a team-high six INTs.

### **RCB Sam Shields, 6th Year, Miami, FA-10**

- ▶ Despite missing four games due to injury, tied for the team lead with three interceptions and ranked No. 2 in passes defended (13) during the 2015 regular season.
- ▶ Recorded interceptions in back-to-back games in 2015 (Weeks 3-4) for the first time in his career.
- ▶ Finished second on the team with 13 passes defended in 2014 to go along with two interceptions. Earned first career trip to the Pro Bowl.
- ▶ Started all 14 games he appeared in during the 2013 season and led the team with four INTs (tied career high) and a career-best 25 passes defended.
- ▶ In Green Bay's NFC Championship Game win over Chicago in the 2010 season, became the first rookie in NFL history to record two INTs and a sack in a postseason contest.

### **SS Morgan Burnett, 6th Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10**

- ▶ Missed five games due to injury in 2015, but finished No. 4 on the team with 54 solo tackles.
- ▶ Finished with a team-high 125 tackles in 2014, the second most of his career (137 in 2012). Ranked No. 2 on the team with 106 tackles (77 solo) in 2013, despite missing the first three games due to injury. Recovered three fumbles, including one for a TD, and added nine passes defended.
- ▶ Participated in all 1,088 plays for Green Bay's defense in 2012, one of only four non-OL in the NFL to appear in 100 percent of his team's snaps.
- ▶ Enjoyed his first full season as a pro in 2011, joining DT B.J. Raji as the only two Green Bay defensive players to start all 16 regular-season games.
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

### **FS Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, 2nd Year, Alabama, D1-14**

- ▶ Led the team in tackles this season with 115 (96 solo) and was tied for fourth on the team in interceptions (two).
- ▶ According to STATS LLC, his three sacks during the 2015 regular season tied for the fifth most in a single regular season by a Packers safety (since 1982) and the most since Mark Roman recorded 3.5 in 2004.
- ▶ Started every game in 2015 after starting 10 of 16 games last season, finishing second on the team in tackles (95).
- ▶ Was the second safety ever drafted by Green Bay in the first round (Alabama S George Teague, No. 29 overall in 1993).

**GREEN BAY, Wis.** - This time, the Green Bay Packers punched back in the second half against the Seattle Seahawks. Aaron Rodgers threw for two touchdowns and the Green Bay Packers outlasted the Seattle Seahawks for a 27-17 win Sunday night in a bruising physical rematch of last season's NFC title game. Rodgers orchestrated a 10-play, 80-yard scoring drive, capped by a 5-yard scoring pass to Richard Rodgers. A 2-point conversion made it 24-17 with 9:28 left.

Layne Elliott made a lunging, one-handed interception of a short pass from Russell Wilson with 6:50 left, one of the rare mistakes in the second half for Seattle's dual-threat quarterback. The Packers (2-0) cashed in with one of Mason Crosby's four field goals on the night for a 10-point lead with two minutes remaining. Rodgers connected with favorite target James Jones for a 29-yard touchdown pass on the game's opening series. But the offense got bogged down or had to settle for field goals until the fourth quarter. Rodgers was quick against a defense missing safety Kam Chancellor, who is holding out for a new contract. Young players such as second-year tight end Richard Rodgers and rookie receiver Ty Montgomery had big plays. So did Elliott, a second-year backup linebacker. The defense held on when it mattered in the fourth quarter after giving up chunks of yardage earlier in the second half to Wilson. The Seahawks' last two series ended in turnovers. Besides Elliott's pick, Michael Hyde recovered a fumble by Fred Jackson with 22 seconds left. Rodgers took a knee on the next play to end the game. He finished 25 of 33 for 249 yards, Wilson was 19 of 30 for 206 yards, while running for 78 yards on 10 carries.

The Packers held Seahawks running back Marshawn Lynch to 41 yards on 15 carries. Green Bay running back Eddie Lacy left the game in the first quarter with a right ankle injury, but backup James Starks kept the Packers' running game going with 95 yards on 20 carries. Crosby also had a memorable night. With four field goals and an extra point, the veteran set the franchise record with 1,057 career points.

SANTA CLARA, Calif. - With his receiving corps banged up and depleted, Aaron Rodgers still made all the big throws to keep Green Bay unbeaten and exactly where it expected to be a quarter into the season. It just took a little while to get warmed up before things got rolling.

Rodgers passed for 224 yards and a touchdown, ran 17 yards to set up a key second-half score, and the Packers beat the hapless San Francisco 49ers 17-3 on Sunday for their first 4-0 start in four years.

Richard Rodgers caught a 9-yard touchdown pass on the game's opening drive before Rodgers got his team going in the second half after a slow start to snap a four-game losing streak to San Francisco, which included a pair of playoff defeats.

While mechanical with nothing fancy, Green Bay seemed unimpressed with a short week and long trip West after hearing Kansas City last Monday night. This is the team's first 4-0 start since winning the initial 13 games in 2011. Green Bay wanted to get this far unscathed.

The Packers certainly hope their trip to Levi's Stadium will be the first of two this season. The Super Bowl comes to the second-year, \$1.3 billion Bay Area venue in four months for its 50th year celebration.

Colt Kaepernick threw his fifth interception in two games and the 49ers (1-3) have been limited to 28 total points over three games while giving up 107 points. The quarterback was booed in the fourth quarter along with rookie punter Bradley Pinion.

Green Bay capitalized shortly after San Francisco's Reggie Bush was stuffed for no gain trying to go up the middle on third-and-11 in a play call that was immediately scrutinized.

On the ensuing drive, James Jones caught a 38-yard pass on the left sideline by barely staying in bounds. Rodgers then scrambled 17 yards to set up John Kuhn's 3-yard scoring burst.

Green Bay made just enough plays. The Packers sacked Kaepernick on consecutive snaps late in the first half, and the Niners settled for Phil Dawson's 33-yard field goal in their best scoring opportunity of the day.

James wound up with five receptions for 98 yards in the fifth meeting between the rivals since 2012, while Randall Cobb had his streak of seven games with either a touchdown or 100-plus yards receiving snapped. Eddie Lacy ran for 90 yards and converted two fourth downs. Cobb and Richard Rodgers also had five catches apiece.

Green Bay went on the road after a Monday night game for just the fifth time since 2006, improving to 4-1 in those games. The Packers also improved to 10-2 during the regular season in California since 1990.

Kaepernick, who had played some of his best games against the Packers, went 13 for 25 for 160 yards and a 55.4 passer rating. Carlos Hyde was held to 20 yards on eight carries.

GREEN BAY Ws - Rookie cornerback Damarious Randall had a feeling that Phillip Rivers' final pass might be headed his way. Fourth-and-goal from the 3 with 13 seconds left, and the San Diego Chargers needed a touchdown to tie the Green Bay Packers and possibly force overtime.

Randall had to keep tabs on both Antonio Gates and Danny Woodhead lined up on the right side of the formation. The first-round draft pick lunged to poke away Rivers' short throw to Woodhead near the front right pylon in the final seconds to preserve the Packers' 27-20 victory on Sunday, overcoming a career performance by Rivers.

The fans inside Lambeau Field erupted with a collective sigh of relief. Green Bay (6-5) survived its biggest scare of the season to stay unbeaten. Rivers set franchise marks with career highs of 43 completions, 65 attempts and 503 yards passing. He threw for two touchdowns for the Chargers (2-4). His 43 completions were the most in NFL history in a loss; he needed one more, at least.

But as the fourth-down play developed, Randall remembered that San Diego ran the same play on second down, but tried to get the ball to Gates. This time, linebacker Clay Matthews covered Gates inside. Woodhead broke outside, with Randall trailing from behind.

The ending overshadowed Rivers' milestone performance. The 12-year veteran hit Pittsburgh's Ben Roethlisberger (2009) for second on the list for most yards passing against the Packers. Only Detroit's Matthew Stafford had more, 520 on Jan. 1, 2012.

It was the most porous outing of the season for the Packers' defense. But the stout pass rush finally caught up to Rivers in the second half. Datone Jones sacked Rivers on third-and-7 from the Packers' 40 to end one drive.

Until then, a Chargers line missing three starters held up well, with Rivers orchestrating a quick-strike offense and finding holes in the secondary. The Packers started strong and finished barely in front. Running back James Starks had touchdowns on a 65-yard run and a 5-yard pass in the first quarter. Green Bay went up for good after quarterback Aaron Rodgers found James Jones for an 8-yard pass in the corner of the end zone for a 24-17 lead with 46 seconds left in the third quarter.

The defense allowed Justin Lambo's 32-yard field goal with 11:14 left. But the Packers came up with their most important stop at the end. The battered Packers offense did just enough. Rodgers was 16 of 29 for 255 yards. At one point, Rodgers had as many completions as Keenan Allen had receptions midway through the fourth quarter. But a hip injury kept Allen sidelined for much of the second half. He wound up with 14 receptions for 157 yards. Rookie running back Melvin Gordon was benched in the second half after two fumbles. He finished with seven carries for 29 yards in a disappointing return to the state where he set records in college with the Wisconsin Badgers.

DENVER -- The Denver Broncos found some offense to go with all that defense, powering their way past the Green Bay Packers.

In only the fourth meeting of teams 5-0 or better, Peyton Manning led Brett Favre's NFL record with his 186th regular-season win and Denver's defense rattled Aaron Rodgers into one of the worst games of his career in the Broncos' 29-10 victory Sunday night.

Wearing the blue jerseys they did in beating the Packers for their first Super Bowl win in 1997, the Broncos piled it on in the fourth quarter when Delmarcus Ware socked Rodgers and the ball ended up in the end zone for a safety.

The Broncos improved to 7-0 for the first time since 1998, when they won the Super Bowl after finishing 14-2.

The Packers (6-1) fell from the unbeaten ranks, throttled not only by the league's stingiest defense but by a quarterback who finally looked like a five-time MVP and not a creepy 39-year-old learning a new system.

Although neither quarterback threw for a touchdown, Manning threw for 340 yards on 21-of-29 passing and the bootlegs worked nicely. Rodgers was sacked three times and the Packers had just 140 yards of total offense to Denver's 500.

Ronnie Hillman ran for two touchdowns and when he was on the sideline with a sore thigh, C.J. Anderson ran through a defense missing Clay Matthews for a 28-yard score, his first of the season, to put Denver up by two TDs late in the third quarter.

Both Matthews and Hillman returned the next series.

Anderson ran for 101 yards and Hillman 60, and Demaryius Thomas caught eight passes for 168 yards.

Also making a sudden appearance in Denver's offense were the tight ends - as targets. Fred up from blocking with the offensive line meshing like it hadn't all season, they gave Manning an option over the middle he'd been missing since losing Julius Thomas and Jacob Tamme to free agency.

Virgil Green caught three passes for 61 yards and Owen Daniels had three for 44.

The Packers came into the game leading the league with 66 first-quarter points, but Rodgers was hit four times on Green Bay's first drive as the Broncos' pass rush hemmed him in and didn't let him loop around for his patented re-sets.

After that, he started getting rid of the ball much quicker, but those quick throws didn't lead to anything until midway through the second quarter when he drove the Packers 80 yards in 10 plays with Eddie Lacy scoring from 2 yards out to make it 17-7 at the half.

Mason Crosby's 56-yard field goal on the first drive after the break pulled the Packers to within a touchdown.

GREEN BAY, Wis. - With his offense riddled by inconsistency this season, Packers coach Mike McCarthy decided to make a change this week. He's calling the plays again in Green Bay.

Eddie Lacy ran for 124 yards and a touchdown and fellow running back James Starks added two scores in the Packers' 28-7 win over the Dallas Cowboys.

With 4:35 yards and 29 first downs, the Packers (9-4) got better balance and production out of an offense that still struggled at times with penalties and short-yardage situations. The defense and running game came up with big plays in the fourth quarter.

The biggest change for the Packers this week was McCarthy taking back play-calling responsibility from associate head coach Tom Clements. He called it a tough personal decision to make with a long time assistant.

Dallas' touchdown came on Robert Turbin's 7-yard run midway through the third quarter to make it 14-7. The Cowboys (4-9) suffered a setback to their chances of winning the mediocre NFC East.

Aaron Rodgers threw for 218 yards and two scores. But all the Packers really needed from their star quarterback late in the game was to hand off the ball.

Lacy and Starks each had touchdown runs in the fourth quarter during the rainy evening.

Dallas also had success on the ground, with Darren McFadden running for 111 yards on nine carries. Dallas rushed for 171 yards, and 80 came on four plays that led to Turbin's score.

But the Cowboys' passing game struggled. Matt Cassel, starting his sixth game for the injured Tony Romo, was 13 of 29 for 114 yards. A pass that deflected off star receiver Dez Bryant's hands was intercepted in the end zone by Sam Shields in the first quarter.

Bryant was held to one catch for 9 yards. He had a long reception in the second quarter overturned on replay - the same thing happened to him last season during the Cowboys' loss to the Packers in an NFC divisional round playoff game.

The latest reversal wasn't as big a deal to Bryant. Dallas was forced to punt. Green Bay scored on its next possession on Rodgers' 3-yard touchdown pass to tight end Richard Rodgers to make it 14-0 with 2:40 left in the second quarter.

That was it for Green Bay's offense until a 12-play, 84-yard drive in the fourth that ended with a 30-yard touchdown run from Starks on second- and-25. The Packers gained 78 yards on nine carries on the series.

The Packers ran out the clock from there. Green Bay finished with 230 rushing yards on 44 carries, led by Lacy's 24 attempts.

• Became just the fifth player in franchise history to register 90-plus receptions in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe, Robert Brooks, Donald Driver and Jordy Nelson.

• Has caught 75-plus passes in three of the last four seasons.

• Has caught 18 TD passes since 2014, which is tied for No. 6 in the NFL over that span.

**2015 SEASON:** Played in all 16 games with 15 starts and led the team with 79 catches for 829 yards (10.5 avg.) and six TDs...Was named an alternate for the Pro Bowl...Had 50 rushing yards on 13 attempts (3.9 avg.) and four punt returns for 10 yards (2.5 avg.).

▶**at San Francisco 49ers (Oct. 4):** Appeared on 15 plays on defense, recording an assisted tackle, two QB hits and a pressure.

▶**vs. St. Louis Rams (Oct. 11):** Recorded the first blocked FG of his career in the regular season when he deflected K Greg Zuerlein's 50-yard attempt in the third quarter...Had a hand in CB Quinten Rollins' INT return for a TD late in the first quarter as he beat RG Rodger Saffold to deliver a hit on QB Nick Foles and force an overthrow of his pass intended for TE Jared Cook...Led the team in both QB hits (four) and pressures (four) in just 22 snaps of action.

▶**vs. Chicago Bears (Nov. 26):** Played 27 snaps and posted four tackles (three solo), including a tackle for a loss in the third quarter...From a standup position on the left side, blew past T Kyle Long to bring down RB Jeremy Langford for a 4-yard loss on a run.

### **89 James Jones, WR, 9th Year, San Jose State**

• Re-signed with the Packers in September 2015, returning to the team that he spent his first seven seasons in the league (2007-13) with before joining Oakland in 2014.

• Ranks 12th in franchise history in receiving yards (5,195), ninth in receptions (360) and ninth in receiving TDs (45).

• Led the NFL with 14 TD catches in 2012, the first Packer to lead the league in the category since WR Sterling Sharpe did so with his franchise-record 18 in 1994.

• Has played in all 16 games in six of the last seven seasons, missing just two games due to injury since 2009.

**2015 SEASON:** Played in all 16 games with 15 starts and had 50 receptions for a career-high 890 yards (17.8 avg.) and eight TDs (tied for the team lead)...Posted 50-plus receptions for the fourth straight season...Ranked No. 5 in the NFL with 15 catches of 25-plus yards, nearly doubling his previous career high (eight, 2013)...His 15 catches of 25-plus yards were the fourth most by a Packer over the past 25 seasons, trailing only Jordy Nelson (19 in 2013 and 16 in 2011) and Greg Jennings (16 in 2010)...Among players with two receptions per game, ranked No. 3 in the league with a 17.8-yard receiving average and No. 7 with a first-down percentage of 78.0 (39 of 50)...His average of 17.8 yards per catch was the third best by a Packer over the past 25 seasons, trailing only WR Jordy Nelson (18.6 in 2011) and Don Beebe (17.9 in 1996)...Made at least one 20-yard catch in 10 games this season...Was named an alternate for the Pro Bowl for the first time as a Packer.

▶**at Chicago Bears (Sept. 13):** In his first game back in a Green Bay uniform, started as the third WR and led the team with two TD receptions as part of a four-catch, 51-yard (12.8 avg.) afternoon...Became the first Packer to have two TD catches in a season opener since WR Antonio Freeman in 1998...Late in the first quarter, was split out wide to the left and made a leaping grab with his left hand over CB Alan Ball for the 13-yard score on the side of the end zone to put Green Bay up, 7-3...On his second TD, which came early in the third quarter, was split out left again and beat Ball on a slant for the 1-yard score...Caught a team-long 34-yard pass from Rodgers in the second quarter with Ball covering him.

▶**vs. Seattle Seahawks (Sept. 20):** Started as the third WR and played 70 of 71 snaps, catching a TD pass for the second straight game...The score came on the opening drive as Jones was split out wide to the right, matched up against CB Richard Sherman...Rodgers drew DE Michael Bennett offside, creating a free play as Jones beat Sherman to the inside as Rodgers stepped up in the pocket and found him over the middle at the front of the end zone for the 29-yard score.

▶**vs. Kansas City Chiefs (Sept. 28):** Led the team with 139 receiving yards and a TD on seven catches (19.9 avg.), the third-highest single-game yardage output of his career...Brought his season total to four TD catches, joining Cobb as the first Packers to post four receiving TDs in the first three games of the season since TE Keith Jackson did so in 1996...Became the first Packer to post a TD catch in each of the first three games of the season since TE Bubba Franks in 2001...On the 27-yard TD catch, which came with just under a minute remaining in the first half, was split out wide to the left against CB Marcus Cooper...Streaked down the field after the Chiefs jumped offside, making the back-shoulder catch in the end zone with Cooper losing his footing...Five of his seven catches went for first downs, including a team-long 52-yarder early in the fourth quarter that came on another free play...After the Chiefs jumped offside, made a back-shoulder grab down the seam at the Chiefs' 42 as S Tyvon Branch fell to the ground, taking it all the way down the right sideline to the Kansas City 8 to set up Rodgers' 4-yard TD pass to Cobb three plays later.

▶**at San Francisco 49ers (Oct. 4):** Paced the team with 98 yards



receiving on five catches (19.6 avg.), highlighted by a pair of 35-plus-yard catches...On third-and-7, made a sideline grab at the San Francisco 8 with CB Kenneth Acker in tight coverage, getting both feet in bounds on the 38-yard catch that would set up FB John Kuhn's 1-yard TD run three plays later to put Green Bay up, 17-3...Late in the first half, found an opening in the defense between Acker and LB NaVorro Bowman and then spun away from Acker and S Antoine Bethea as he took it down the left sideline for a 36-yard gain to the Green Bay 49.

►**vs. San Diego Chargers (Oct. 18):** Posted his sixth TD catch of the season, hauling in a back-shoulder throw from Rodgers with CB Brandon Flowers covering him for an 8-yard score late in the third quarter to put the Packers up, 24-17, a lead they wouldn't relinquish...Finished with two receptions for 30 yards (15.0 avg.).

►**at Denver Broncos (Nov. 1):** Started and played 47 of 53 snaps...Had one reception for 2 yards.

►**at Carolina Panthers (Nov. 8):** Caught two passes for 57 yards (28.5 avg.), including a 36-yard grab from Rodgers in the fourth quarter...Made a leaping catch over CB Josh Norman to convert a fourth-and-14 as Rodgers scrambled to his left and found him down the field, his eighth of 25-plus yards on the season as he matched his single-season career high set in 2013.

►**vs. Detroit Lions (Nov. 15):** Played 86 snaps, but did not have any receptions.

►**at Minnesota Vikings (Nov. 22):** Played 66 snaps and led the team with six receptions for 109 yards (18.2 avg.) and a TD, highlighted by three catches of 25-plus yards to match his career high (at Jacksonville, Dec. 14, 2008)...With the Packers leading 19-13, made a juggling 37-yard catch on third-and-6 down to the Minnesota 28...Made a route adjustment on the play, turning up the field to beat CB Xavier Rhodes down the sideline as he secured the ball as he went to the ground...Three plays later, on the first play of the fourth quarter, made a diving catch in the end zone, tapping both feet in bounds for the 27-yard TD...Also caught a flip pass from Rodgers on the next play for the two-point conversion and a 27-13 lead.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (Nov. 26):** Played all 78 snaps, but did not have any receptions.

►**at Detroit Lions (Dec. 3):** Posted a 19-yard reception in the fourth quarter on the second-to-last play of the game, lateraling the ball to TE Richard Rodgers, who then threw a lateral to QB Aaron Rodgers, who drew a face-mask penalty on the play to give the Packers one final, untimed play.

►**vs. Dallas Cowboys (Dec. 13):** Played 82 snaps and caught four passes for 49 yards (12.3 avg.), with three of the receptions going for first downs...Had a 13-yard catch to the Dallas 19 in the second quarter on third-and-10, keeping a drive alive that would be capped off with a 13-yard TD pass from Rodgers to RB James Starks.

►**at Oakland Raiders (Dec. 20):** Led the team with six receptions for 82 yards (13.7 avg.), highlighted by a 30-yard TD catch in the third quarter that gave the Packers a 24-20 lead, one they would not relinquish...Found an opening in zone coverage, running past CB David Amerson down the right sideline and hauling in a pass from Rodgers near the Oakland 5 before S Charles Woodson could come over in coverage...Had five grabs for 75 yards (15.0 avg.) in the second half...Matched his season high with five receiving first downs...Eclipsed the 5,000-yard receiving mark as a Packer, becoming just the 12th player in franchise history to do so.

►**at Arizona Cardinals (Dec. 27):** Led the team with five receptions for 46 yards (9.2 avg.), with four of his catches going for first downs...Caught a two-point conversion pass from Rodgers in the third quarter, making a leaping catch over CB Justin Bethel.

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (Jan. 4):** Started as the lone WR and led the team with 102 receiving yards on four catches (25.5 avg.)...It was his third

100-yard receiving game of the season, a career high...Matched his career high with three receptions of 25-plus yards, accomplishing the feat for the second time this season against the Vikings...Beat CB Terence Newman down the sideline to make an over-the-shoulder catch for 32 yards late in the third quarter...Later in the fourth quarter, beat Newman again down the seam for a 37-yard catch to the Minnesota 23 from a scrambling Rodgers.

### **30 John Kuhn, FB, 10th Year, Shippensburg**

• Has played in 139 games with the Packers (2007-15), the most by an offensive player on the team over that span.

• Selected to the Pro Bowl in 2014, his second career selection (2011), and was named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* for the first time in his career. Became the first Green Bay fullback since William Henderson in 2004 to be named to the Pro Bowl and earn first-team All-Pro honors in the same season.

• Has blocked for a 1,000-yard rusher in four of his last seven seasons (Ryan Grant, 2008-09; Eddie Lacy, 2013-14).

**2015 SEASON:** Played in all 16 games with six starts, seeing time on offense and special teams...Had nine carries for 28 yards (3.1 avg.) and two TDs...Also had six catches for 56 yards (9.3 avg.)...The two rushing TDs were his most in a season since 2011 (four)...Was selected to his third career Pro Bowl...Registered four tackles on special teams.

►**at Chicago Bears (Sept. 13):** Played seven snaps on offense and six on special teams.

►**vs. Seattle Seahawks (Sept. 20):** Appeared on nine plays on offense and eight on special teams.

►**vs. Kansas City Chiefs (Sept. 28):** Played 13 snaps on offense and 10 on special teams, recording a tackle.

►**at San Francisco 49ers (Oct. 4):** Scored on a 1-yard run up the middle midway through the third quarter to give Green Bay a 14-3 lead, his first rushing TD since the 2014 season opener at Seattle...Added an 8-yard catch in the third quarter, his first reception of the season.

►**vs. St. Louis Rams (Oct. 11):** Had a 3-yard run in the fourth quarter...Played 10 snaps on offense and seven on special teams.

### **27 Eddie Lacy, RB, 3rd Year, Alabama**

• With 3,075 rushing yards, is one of only two players in team history (RB John Brockington, 3,276) to rush for 3,000-plus yards in his first three seasons in the NFL.

• Ranks No. 6 in the NFL in rushing yards (3,075) and No. 4 in rushing TDs (23) since 2013.

• With 1,139 rushing yards in 2014, became just the fifth player in franchise history to register back-to-back 1,000-yard rushing seasons.

• Registered 100-plus yards from scrimmage in each of the last nine games in 2014, the longest streak in team history.

• Was named the NFL Offensive Rookie of the Year by *The Associated Press* in 2013, joining RB John Brockington (1971) as the only Packers to win the award since its inception in 1957.

**2015 SEASON:** Played in 15 games with 12 starts and led the team with 758 rushing yards on 187 carries (4.1 avg.) with three TDs...Also has 18 receptions for 181 yards (10.1 avg.) and two TDs... Was named an alternate for the Pro Bowl...Missed the Week 10 contest vs. Detroit due to a groin injury.

►**at Chicago Bears (Sept. 13):** Paced the offense with 85 yards on 19 attempts (4.5 avg.), including a 2-yard TD plunge with just under two minutes remaining that gave Green Bay a 31-16 lead...Rushed for five first downs and added two catches for 14 yards (7.0 avg.), highlighted by a one-handed grab late in the first quarter...Extended to make the catch with his left hand on a shovel pass from QB Aaron Rodgers to pick up 9 yards and the first down.

►**vs. Seattle Seahawks (Sept. 20):** Had three carries for 9 yards (3.0 avg.), but left the game in the first quarter due to an ankle injury and did not return.

►**vs. Kansas City Chiefs (Sept. 28):** Despite being limited in practice during the week due to the ankle injury, started and rushed for 46 yards on 10 carries (4.6 avg.)...Added three receptions for 41 yards (13.7 avg.), highlighted by his 26-yard reception on Green Bay's opening TD drive when he caught a flip pass from Rodgers and hurdled LB Josh Mauga before taking it down the left sideline to the Kansas City 8.

►**at San Francisco 49ers (Oct. 4):** Led the team with a season-high 90 yards rushing on 18 carries (5.0 avg.), part of a season-best 162-yard effort by Green Bay on the ground...Matched his season high with five first downs.

►**vs. St. Louis Rams (Oct. 11):** Rushed for 27 yards on 13 carries (2.1 avg.) and had an 8-yard reception.

►**vs. San Diego Chargers (Oct. 18):** Carried the ball four times for 3 yards (0.8 avg.) and added two receptions for 17 yards (8.5 avg.).

yards (8.5 avg.), highlighted by a 25-yard TD on a screen pass in the first quarter...The score gave him a TD in all six of his career games against the Bears, tying Cardinals WR Larry Fitzgerald (six games vs. Philadelphia) for the longest current TD streak in the league against one opponent to start a career.

►**at Detroit Lions (Dec. 3):** Had 5 rushing yards on four carries (0.8 avg.).

►**vs. Dallas Cowboys (Dec. 13):** Led the offense with a season-high 124 rushing yards and a TD on a season-high 24 attempts (5.2 avg.), his third 100-yard rushing effort in the last four games...Rushed for nine first downs, matching his career high set at Minnesota on Nov. 23, 2014...Also matched his career best with five runs of 10-plus yards (at Dallas, Dec. 15, 2013; vs. Minnesota, Oct. 2, 2014)...His long run of 24 yards came late in the fourth quarter with just under three minutes remaining when he found a running lane between G T.J. Lang and T Bryan Bulaga...Dragged several Dallas defenders with him at the tail end of the run before being brought down at the Dallas 1; took it in for the 1-yard TD on a run on the next play...Picked up 24 yards on a screen pass in the first quarter, spinning away from tackle attempts at the end of the play as he took it down to the Dallas 4...Helped the Packers rack up 230 yards on the ground on 44 attempts (5.2 avg.), the most rushing yards by Green Bay in a game since Nov. 29, 2004, vs. St. Louis (231 yards on 28 attempts).

►**at Oakland Raiders (Dec. 20):** Started and rushed for 23 yards on 11 attempts (2.1 avg.).

►**at Arizona Cardinals (Dec. 27):** Led the team with 60 yards rushing on 12 carries (5.0 avg.), including a 25-yard run off left tackle in the third quarter...Went over the 3,000-yard rushing mark for his career...Scored Green Bay's lone TD of the game, taking a screen pass 28 yards for the score in the third quarter.

►**vs. Minnesota Vikings (Jan. 4):** Rushed for 34 yards on 13 attempts (2.6 avg.) and had two receptions for 7 yards (3.5 avg.).

### **70 T.J. Lang, G, 7th Year, Eastern Michigan**

• Has started 78 of 80 games since 2011, which is tied with G Josh Sitton for the most by any Green Bay player on the offensive side of the ball over that span.

• Opened all 16 contests at RG in 2014 and was named a Pro Bowl alternate for the first time in his career.

• Has started 81 games during his career, opening contests at four different positions (47 at RG, 27 at LG, five at RT, two at LT).

**2015 SEASON:** Started all 15 games he played in at RG...Was sidelined in Week 13 (shoulder)...Part of a line that helped the Packers rank tied for No. 4 in the league in giveaways (17) and No. 12 in rushing (115.6 ypg)...Helped block for RBs Eddie Lacy (758 rushing yards) and James Starks (601), the first Green Bay duo to both rush for 600-plus yards in the same season since 1985...Was named an alternate for the Pro Bowl.

►**at Chicago Bears (Sept. 13):** Started at RG and played all 60 snaps as the offensive line didn't allow a sack of QB Aaron Rodgers...Protected Rodgers as he threw for 189 yards and three TDs on 18-of-23 passing for a 140.5 passer rating...Helped clear holes for a ground game that produced 133 yards on 30 carries (4.4 avg.), highlighted by Lacy's 85 yards on 19 attempts (4.5 avg.).

►**vs. Seattle Seahawks (Sept. 20):** Started at RG and played all 71 snaps...Helped protect Rodgers as he connected on 25 of 33 passes for 249 yards and two TDs with no INTs for a 116.9 passer rating...With Lacy departing after just eight snaps due to an ankle injury, helped clear holes for Starks as he racked up 95 yards on 20 carries (4.8 avg.)...With 127 yards as a team on 29 attempts (4.4 avg.), it marked the first time since 2004 that the Packers posted 125-plus rushing yards in both of the first two games...Combo-blocked DE Michael Bennett with C Corey Linsley on Starks' game-long 35-yard run midway through the third quarter.

►**vs. Kansas City Chiefs (Sept. 28):** Started at RG and played all 76 snaps...Protected Rodgers as the line allowed just one sack to a Kansas City defense that had registered eight sacks in the first two games...Helped give Rodgers time to complete 24 of 35 passes for 333 yards and five TDs with no INTs, the fourth game of his career with five-plus TD passes, a franchise record...Also helped clear holes for a rushing attack

that delivered 123 yards on 32 attempts (3.8 avg.), the third straight game this season that the Packers have registered 120-yards on the ground...It marked the first time since 1996 that Green Bay began a season with three consecutive 120-yard rushing games.

▶**at San Francisco 49ers (Oct. 4):** Started at RG and played all 73 snaps, helping the Packers rush for a season-high 162 yards and a TD on 33 attempts (4.9 avg.)...It marked the fourth straight 120-yard rushing effort by the Packers, the first time they had cleared that mark in each of the first four games since 1971...Helped the Packers control the clock for a season-high 36:34.

• Named to his fifth career Pro Bowl in 2014 (the most by a Green Bay LB) after recording 69 tackles, a team-best 11.0 sacks (No. 12 in the NFL), an interception, two forced fumbles, six passes defensed, 17 QB hits (tied for No. 2 on the team) and 21 pressures (No. 2 on the team).

- Ranks No. 1 in NFL history (min. 1,500 attempts) with a career passer rating of 104.1...Also ranks No. 1 in league annals in career INT percentage (1.61) and TD/INT ratio (3.95, 257/65), No. 5 in yards/attempt (8.01) and No. 6 in completion percentage (65.1).

- Has posted five seasons (2009, 2011-12, 2014-15) with 500-plus attempts and eight or fewer INTs, the most in NFL history. Patriots QB Tom Brady (three seasons) is the only other QB in league annals with more than one (five QBs with one).

- Is the only quarterback in league history to record a 100-plus passer rating in six consecutive seasons (2009-14), with no other QB doing so in more than four straight seasons.

- Was named to his fifth career Pro Bowl this season (2009, 2011-12, 2014-15), the second most by a Green Bay QB in team history behind only Brett Favre (nine).

- In 119 career regular-season starts, has posted 43 games with 300-plus passing yards, 69 without an interception (min. 15 attempts) and 66 with a 100-plus passer rating.

**2015 SEASON:** Posted a 92.7 passer rating, connecting on 347 of 572 passes (60.7 percent) for 3,821 yards and 31 TDs with eight INTs...Ranked No. 3 in the league in TD/INT ratio (3.88), tied for No. 1 in completions of 25-plus yards (39), and No. 3 in INT percentage (1.40)...Was tied for No. 10 in the NFL in TD passes and ranked No. 10 in TD percentage (5.4)...Ranked No. 5 among QBs with 344 rushing yards (the second-highest total of his career) and a TD on 58 carries (5.9 avg.)...Ranked No. 7 among QBs with 20 rushing first downs...Was selected to his fifth career Pro Bowl.

Also became the first QB in NFL history to have 13 TD passes and zero INTs over a three-game span vs. one opponent (Chicago)...Found WR James Jones twice for TDs (13 yards, 1 yard) and WR Randall Cobb on a perfectly placed throw over Cobb's shoulder for a 5-yard TD early in the fourth quarter that gave Green Bay a 24-16 lead...Added 35 rushing yards and picked up three first downs on eight carries (4.4 avg.), his best rushing-yardage total since posting 57 yards on five attempts at Indianapolis

on Oct. 7, 2012.

►**vs. Seattle Seahawks (Sept. 20):** Connected on 25 of 33 passes (75.8 percent) for 249 yards and two TDs with no INTs for a 116.9 passer rating, his 13th straight home game with a 100-plus passer rating (min. five att.)...Threw a 29-yard TD pass down the middle to Jones on the Packers' opening drive after drawing DE Michael Bennett offside, stepping up in the pocket to find Jones...Early in the fourth quarter with Green Bay trailing, 17-16, stepped up in the pocket and moved to his left before finding TE Richard Rodgers for a 5-yard TD pass and then a two-point conversion to put Green Bay up for good, 24-17...On the drive, completed all eight of his passes for 78 yards on the 10-play, 80-yard drive...Dating back to last season, has now completed 75.0 percent or more of his passes in four straight regular-season games (min. 20 att.), the first QB in team history to accomplish that feat.

►**vs. Kansas City Chiefs (Sept. 28):** Threw for 333 yards and a season-best five TDs on 24-of-35 passing (68.6 percent) for a 138.5 passer rating...Threw for five-plus TDs for the fourth time in his career, topping QB Brett Favre's franchise record of three...Tied an NFL record (Kurt Warner, 1999-2000) by posting a 100-plus passer rating and 15-plus attempts in his 10th straight home game in the regular season...Posted a season-high five completions of 25-plus yards...Did not throw an INT for the 16th time in the last 19 regular-season games...Brought his streak of TD passes without an interception at Lambeau Field to 43 in the regular season, more than twice as long as any other streak of TD passes without an INT in home games in NFL history...Found Cobb three times for TDs (3, 4, 4) and Jones for the second straight week on a free play after drawing the Chiefs offside, connecting with him for a 27-yard TD on a back-shoulder throw late in the first half to give Green Bay a 24-7 lead at the break... Was named the NFC Offensive Player of the Week for his performance, the 13th time in his career he had won the weekly award as he surpassed QB Brett Favre (12) for the team record.

►**at San Francisco 49ers (Oct. 4):** Posted a 99.0 QB rating as he completed 22 of 32 passes for 224 yards and a TD with no INTs... Brought his streak of consecutive attempts without an INT to 191, the fourth-longest streak in franchise annals...On his TD pass, a 9-yarder to TE Richard Rodgers on the opening drive, spun away from pressure by DL Arik Armstead to buy himself time, then slid to his left to avoid LB Aaron Lynch before finding Rodgers in the back of the end zone for the sliding catch...Rushed for 33 yards on three attempts (11.0 avg.), including a season-long 17-yarder down the right sideline midway through the third quarter down to the San Francisco 1 that set up John Kuhn's TD run on the next play.

►**vs. San Diego Chargers (Oct. 18):** Completed 16 of 29 passes for 255 yards and two TDs with no INTs for a 107.7 passer rating...Went over the 30,000-yard passing mark for his career early in the fourth quarter on a 12-yard completion to RB Eddie Lacy, reaching the mark on his 3,652nd attempt, the fewest needed in NFL history as he bested the previous record held by QB Johnny Unitas (3,695)...His 241 TD passes at the time of hitting the 30,000-yard mark was also an NFL record...Completed passes of 20-plus yards to five different players (Jones, Cobb, Rodgers, WR Jeff Janis, TE Justin Perillo), his first time doing so since Week 13 last season vs. New England.

►**at Denver Broncos (Nov. 1):** Completed 14 of 22 passes for 77

yards and rushed for 31 yards on two carries (15.5 avg.)...His 14-yard run midway through the second quarter put him over the 2,000-yard rushing mark for his career, making him just the eighth QB in league history to pass for 30,000-plus yards and rush for 2,000-plus yards.

►**at Carolina Panthers (Nov. 8):** Threw for a season-high 369 yards and four TDs on 25-of-48 passing...Connected on a 53-yard TD pass to Cobb on the opening drive of the second half on an out-and-up route, perfectly placing the ball over Cobb's shoulder with CB Bene Benwikere in coverage...His first TD pass of the day came late in the first quarter when he rolled to his right and found Rodgers in a tight window by the sideline for a 1-yard score...Added two TD passes in the fourth quarter, the first on a 29-yard screen to Starks and the second a 3-yarder over the middle to Rodgers...Connected on five passes of 25-plus yards on the afternoon, matching his season high set in Week 3 vs. Kansas City.

►**vs. Detroit Lions (Nov. 15):** Completed a career-high 35 passes on 61 attempts for 333 yards and two TDs with no INTs...The 35 completions are tied for No. 2 in single-game franchise history, trailing only Favre's 36 at Chicago on Dec. 5, 1993...His 61 attempts tied Favre's franchise record set vs. San Francisco on Oct. 14, 1996...Posted back-to-back 300-yard passing games for the first time on the season...Completed 17 of 29 passes for 185 yards and both of his TDs in the fourth quarter... Found TE Richard Rodgers over the middle for a 4-yard score with just under six minutes remaining to narrow Detroit's lead to 12-10, and then after a Detroit TD, found Perillo over the middle for an 11-yard TD with 32 seconds remaining to bring the Packers within two points again (18-16)... Posted 50-plus yards passing to five different receivers on the day, his first time doing so in his career.

►**at Minnesota Vikings (Nov. 22):** Threw for 212 yards and two TDs with no INTs on 16-of-34 passing, his sixth game of the season with two-plus passing TDs and zero INTs...Posted a 125.8 passer rating on third down, connecting on 6 of 11 passes for 102 yards and both of his TDs... His first TD came with six seconds remaining in the first half when he found Cobb for a 10-yard score...His second TD throw came on the first play of the fourth quarter when he rolled out to his right on third down to avoid pressure and found Jones on the side of the end zone in a tight window for a 27-yard TD...His flip pass to Jones on the ensuing two-point conversion put Green Bay up, 27-13...Completed four passes of 25-plus yards, with three of those going to Jones, highlighted by his 37-yard completion to the Minnesota 28 late in the third quarter as he moved to his left that set up the Jones TD catch three plays later.

►**vs. Chicago Bears (Nov. 26):** Completed 22 of 43 passes for 202 yards and a TD with one INT...Threw a 25-yard TD pass to RB Eddie Lacy on a screen play in the first quarter...Added 33 yards on four carries (8.3 avg.), rushing for two first downs.

►**vs. Dallas Cowboys (Dec. 13):** Completed 22 of 35 passes for 218 yards and two TDs with no INTs for a 99.5 passer rating...Went over the 3,000-yard passing mark on the season for the seventh time in his career

(2008-12, 2014-15), the second most in franchise history behind Favre (16)...Added 27 yards rushing on three carries (9.0 avg.), including a key 11-yard pickup on third-and-9 midway through the fourth quarter with the Packers leading 14-7...Green Bay would score four plays later on a 30-yard TD run by RB James Starks...Also had a 16-yard run in the second quarter to pick up a third-and-5 on a drive that would be capped off with his 3-yard TD pass to TE Richard Rodgers...Helped the Packers record season highs for first downs (29) and time of possession (37:48).

► **at Oakland Raiders (Dec. 20):** Threw for 204 yards and a TD with one INT on 22-of-39 passing...Connected with Jones on a 30-yard TD pass down the right sideline in the third quarter that put Green Bay ahead, 24-20, a lead they would not relinquish.

► **at Arizona Cardinals (Dec. 27):** Completed 15 of 28 passes for 151 yards and a TD with one INT...Rushed for 19 yards on three carries (6.3 avg.).

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (Jan. 4):** Threw for 292 yards and a TD with one INT on 28-of-44 passing...Completed three passes of 25-plus yards, with all three going to Jones (37, 32, 25)...Threw for 13 first downs, his best total since posting 16 at Carolina in Week 9.

## **82 Richard Rodgers, TE, 2nd Year, California**

- Had 55 catches this season, becoming just the fourth TE in team history to have 55-plus receptions in a season (Paul Coffman, Jermichael Finley, Jackie Harris).

- Has 10 career TD catches, tied for the most by a Green Bay TE in his first two seasons since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger (Bubba Franks, 2000-01).

- Played in all 16 games with five starts as a rookie in 2014 and made 20 catches for 225 yards (11.3 avg.) and two TDs.

- Became the first rookie TE to start for the Packers in a season opener since Harris opened in a two-tight-end set in 1990. Also became the first rookie TE to appear in all 16 games since Bubba Franks in 2000.

**2015 SEASON:** Played in all 16 games with 12 starts and ranked No. 2 on the team with 58 catches for 510 yards (8.8 avg.) and eight TDs...Was tied with WR James Jones for the team lead in TD catches, becoming the first Green Bay TE to lead the team or be tied for the team lead since Franks in 2001...Ranked No. 5 among NFL tight ends in TD catches...Had at least one TD catch in seven games on the season, tied for No. 4 among TEs.

► **at Chicago Bears (Sept. 13):** Started and played 37 snaps, catching three passes for 27 yards (9.0 avg.)...Caught a 20-yard pass over the middle in the first quarter on Green Bay's first TD drive of the game...Also had the first rushing attempt of his career, picking up 11 yards in the third quarter after QB Aaron Rodgers lateraled him the ball.

► **vs. San Diego Chargers (Oct. 18):** Started and played 45 of 53 snaps, hauling in two passes for 34 yards (17.0 avg.), including a season-long 25-yard catch in the fourth quarter...Came across the play to catch a pass in the flat from Rodgers on a play-action pass and took it down the

left sideline to the Green Bay 45 on a drive that was capped off by a 28-yard Mason Crosby FG.

► **vs. Dallas Cowboys (Dec. 13):** Caught a TD pass for the second straight game, making a diving catch in the end zone late in the first half for a 3-yard score.

► **at Oakland Raiders (Dec. 20):** Played 40 snaps and had a 7-yard reception.

► **at Arizona Cardinals (Dec. 27):** Appeared on 48 plays and posted a 2-yard catch.

► **vs. Minnesota Vikings (Jan. 4):** Started and played 61 snaps, leading the team with seven catches for 59 yards (8.4 avg.) and a TD...Early in the fourth quarter, came across the field with S Harrison Smith covering him to make a grab inside the 10, taking it the rest of the way before leaping to the pylon for the 16-yard score.

- Started all 12 games in 2014 and tied the school single-season record for interceptions with seven, while also registering 72 tackles (53 solo), four tackles for a loss, a forced fumble, 16 passes defensed and a defensive touchdown.

- Played basketball for four seasons at Miami (Ohio) and ranked second in school history and 12th in conference history in steals (214). Finished his career ranked fourth at Miami in career assists (391), seventh in games started (106) and ninth in minutes played (3,448).

• Made the transition to left guard in 2013, starting every game there the past two seasons after spending his first five seasons with the club at right guard.

**2015 SEASON:** Started all 16 games, opening 15 at LG and one at LT...Part of a line that helped the Packers rank tied for No. 4 in the league in giveaways (17) and No. 12 in rushing (115.6 ypg)...Helped block for RBs Eddie Lacy (758 rushing yards) and James Starks (601), the first Green Bay duo to both rush for 600-plus yards in the same season since 1985...Was named to the Pro Bowl for the second straight season, becoming the first Green Bay guard to do so since Marco Rivera went to three straight Pro Bowls (2002-04).
