PACKERS FACE FALCONS IN NFC CHAMPIONSHIP

The Green Bay Packers will travel to Atlanta to take on the Falcons in the NFC Championship on Sunday. It is the second time the two teams met in the season, with Atlanta winning the Week 8 matchup, 33-32, at the Georgia Dome.



- ▶ It will be the fourth postseason meeting between the Packers and Falcons all-time, with Green Bay holding a 2-1 advantage.
- ▶ The last time the two teams met in the postseason was in the 2010 Divisional playoffs, a 48-21 Green Bay victory at Atlanta.
- ▶ Including the regular and postseason, Green Bay has won four of the last five games against Atlanta.
- ▶ The Packers have scored 30-plus points in back-to-back games in the same postseason for the third time in franchise history (three straight in 1996, two straight in 1966).
- ▶ Green Bay's victory at Dallas in the Divisional round snapped a streak of 12 straight NFL playoff games won by the home team (dating back to last postseason). Prior to last Sunday, the last NFL team to win a road playoff game was the Packers at Washington in the 2015 Wild Card game.

BACK IN THE NFC CHAMPIONSHIP

Sunday will be the seventh time Green Bay has played in the NFC title contest since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger.

- ▶ The Packers are the only NFC team to appear in the NFC Championship two times in the last three years.
- ▶ This will be Green Bay's fourth NFC Championship appearance in the past 10 seasons (2007, 2010 and 2014), the most in the NFC over that span.
- ▶ The team's first appearance in the NFC Championship came in 1995, when it traveled to Dallas. Green Bay held a fourth-quarter lead but the Cowboys used two fourth-quarter rushing touchdowns from Emmitt Smith to end Green Bay's season for the third straight year.
- ▶ The Packers reached the NFC title game again the following year, hosting the first title game at Lambeau Field since the 'Ice Bowl.' The Packers overcame two early deficits to defeat the Panthers, 30-13, for their first Super Bowl appearance in 29 years. They would go on to beat New England in the Super Bowl.
- ▶ In '97, the Packers reached the title game for the third consecutive season, this time traveling to San Francisco. Green Bay built a comfortable 13-3 lead on a rain-soaked afternoon in an eventual 23-10 win as they bounced the 49ers from the playoffs for the third straight year.
- ▶ In '07, the Packers hosted the Giants in the third-coldest contest in championship game history with a game-time temperature of minus-1 and wind chill of minus-23. Lawrence Tynes sent New York to the Super Bowl with a 47-yard field goal in overtime for the Giants' 23-20 victory.
- ▶ In the '10 NFC Championship, Green Bay beat longtime division rival Chicago, 21-14. In a game that included five interceptions, Packers DT B.J. Raji helped seal the victory with an 18-yard interception return for a touchdown that put Green Bay up 21-7 with just over six minutes remaining. The Packers went on to beat the Pittsburgh Steelers for the club's fourth Super Bowl and 13th NFL championship.
- ▶ The Packers last played in the NFC Championship in 2014 at Seattle. After Green Bay took a 16-0 lead into halftime, the Seahawks outscored the Packers, 22-6, in the second half to force OT, and won on the first possession of extra time, 28-22.

NFC CHAMPIONSHIP

WITH THE CALL

FOX Sports, now in its 23rd season as an NFL network television partner, will broadcast the game to a national audience.



- ▶ Play-by-play man **Joe Buck** joins analyst **Troy Aikman** and sideline reporters **Erin Andrews** and **Chris Myers**.
- ▶ Milwaukee's WTMJ (620 AM), airing Green Bay games since November 1929, heads up the Packers Radio Network that is made up of 50 stations in five states. **Wayne Larrivee** (play-by-play) and two-time Packers Pro Bowler **Larry McCarren** (analyst) call the action. McCarren first joined the team's broadcasts in 1995 and enters his 22nd season calling Packers games. After originally being paired together in 1999, McCarren and Larrivee enter their 18th season of broadcasts together.
- ▶ Westwood One Sports will air the game on radio across the country. **Kevin Kugler** (play-by-play) and **James Lofton** (analyst) will call the action, with **Tony Boselli** reporting from the sidelines and **Scott Graham** hosting the pregame and halftime shows.
- ▶ The broadcast is also available on Sirius Satellite Radio (WTMJ feed).

POSTSEASON PACKERS

The Packers earned the 32nd postseason berth in team history and the franchise's 19th appearance in the last 24 seasons.

- ▶ Green Bay clinched its eighth consecutive postseason berth (2009-16), a franchise record as it topped the previous mark of six straight from 1993-98.

- ▶ Green Bay's eight consecutive playoff berths is tied for the third-longest streak in NFL history behind two teams with nine (Dallas, 1975-83; Indianapolis, 2002-10). It marks just the eighth time in NFL history that a franchise has had a streak of eight-plus playoff berths.
- ▶ The Packers joined the New England Patriots as the only teams to make the playoffs each of the last eight years.
- ▶ **Mike McCarthy** became just the fourth head coach in NFL history to lead a single franchise to eight-plus consecutive playoff appearances, joining Tom Landry, Chuck Noll and Bill Belichick.
- ▶ The Packers have made the playoffs nine times in 11 seasons under McCarthy.
- ▶ McCarthy's nine postseason appearances are the most by a Packers coach since the NFL postseason began in 1933.
- ▶ Green Bay leads the NFC with nine trips to the postseason since 2007.
- ▶ Green Bay has now made the postseason 32 times, tied with the Dallas Cowboys and New York Giants for No. 1 in league annals.

- ▶ The Divisional game against the Dallas Cowboys marked Green Bay's 55th postseason game, the third most in NFL history:

- ▶ The Packers have a 34-21 all-time record in the postseason, a .618 winning percentage that ranks **No. 2 in the NFL**:

- ▶ The Packers have won five NFC North titles in the last six years, the most in the NFC over that span with no other NFC club winning more than three division titles since 2011.
- ▶ The Packers have won an NFL-record 10 Wild Card games (1982, 1993-95, 2001, 2003, 2010, 2012, 2015-16), including four under McCarthy.
- ▶ The Packers are 4-2 in Wild Card playoff games during the McCarthy era.
- ▶ With a victory over Dallas in the 2016 playoffs, Green Bay beat the No. 1 seed in the Divisional round for the second time since 2010, the only NFL team to do so over that span.

HOW THEY HAVE FARED

Since the NFL went to a 12-team playoff format in 1990, the Packers have made postseason appearances as all six seeds.

- ▶ Green Bay is the No. 4 seed this postseason for the fifth time since 1990.
- ▶ A breakdown of the Packers' playoff seeds, and their postseason record as that seed, from 1990-2016:

10-WIN REGULAR SEASON

- ▶ Green Bay has recorded 10 or more wins 16 times in the last 22 seasons (since 1995) after registering 10-plus victories just 13 times in the first 74 seasons the Packers were in the NFL (1921-94).
- ▶ Green Bay's eight 10-plus-win regular seasons since 2006 are the most in the NFC and tied for the second most (Indianapolis) in the NFL over that span (New England, 11).
- ▶ In **Aaron Rodgers'** nine seasons as starting quarterback (since 2008), the Packers have recorded 10-plus wins seven times, the second-most seasons with 10 or more wins from 2008-16 (New England, nine).
- ▶ Green Bay finished the regular season with six consecutive wins, becoming the only team in the NFL to have a winning streak of four-plus games in each of the last eight seasons (2009-16). The six-game winning streak was the longest to end the season by the Packers since a nine-game streak in 1941. Green Bay has registered a winning streak of four-plus games in 10 of 11 seasons under McCarthy.

STAT OF THE WEEK

- ▶ **K Mason Crosby's** 51-yard field goal to give Green Bay a 34-31 victory over Dallas in the Divisional playoff was the longest game-winning FG in NFL postseason history, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.
- ▶ Crosby became the first kicker in NFL history to make two 50-yard FGs in the final two minutes of a postseason game.
- ▶ Crosby's 56-yard FG is the third longest in NFL postseason history and the longest in team playoff history.
- ▶ Crosby now has five of the seven longest FGs in franchise playoff history.

POSTSEASON PROFICIENCY

As productive as QB **Aaron Rodgers** has been during the regular season in his nine years as the starter, he has also carried that over to the playoffs.

- ▶ In the Wild Card win over the New York Giants, Rodgers completed 25 of 40 passes for 362 yards and four touchdowns for a passer rating of 125.2, becoming just the **fourth QB in NFL history** to throw for 350-plus yards, four-plus TDs and no INTs in a playoff game (Peyton Manning, Kurt Warner, Alex Smith).
- ▶ In the Divisional round win at Dallas, Rodgers totaled 355 passing yards, joining Drew Brees (2011) as the only QBs in NFL history to have back to back 350-yard passing games in a single postseason. He also became the first Green Bay QB to have back-to-back 300-yard passing games in the playoffs.
- ▶ Rodgers is **tyed for No. 3** in postseason games with 350-plus yards passing:

- ▶ Since his first postseason start in 2009, he has recorded seven 100-plus passer rating games, **No. 1 in the NFL**:

- ▶ Rodgers capped off the 2010 postseason with a 304-yard, three-TD effort vs. Pittsburgh that earned him Super Bowl MVP honors. He became just the **fourth quarterback in NFL history** to throw for 300 yards and three TDs with no INTs in a Super Bowl, joining Joe Montana, Steve Young and Jake Delhomme.
- ▶ In the Wild Card win over the Giants, Rodgers tied the single-game franchise playoff record with four touchdown passes, and became the **first quarterback in team history** to have two four-TD passing games in the postseason (at Arizona, Jan. 10, 2010).
- ▶ Dating back to 1970, Rodgers is tied for **No. 2 in the NFL** in postseason games with four-plus touchdown passes (according to pro-football-reference.com):

- ▶ Rodgers ranks **No. 1 in franchise history** with six postseason games with three-plus passing touchdowns.
- ▶ Dating back to 1970, Rodgers is tied for **No. 3 in the NFL** in postseason games with three-plus touchdown passes (according to pro-football-reference.com):

- ▶ Green Bay is 5-4 in road playoff games under McCarthy, with the Packers' five wins tied for the second most in the NFL since 2006:

- ▶ Green Bay's .556 road playoff winning percentage since 2006 is the fifth best in the NFL (min. three games) over that span:

- ▶ The Packers have averaged 30.8 points per game on the road in the postseason since 2006, **No. 1 in the NFL** over that span. They are the only team to average more than 26.0 points per game on the road in the playoffs since 2006.
- ▶ Dating back to 1970, QB **Aaron Rodgers'** 19 passing touchdowns in road playoff games are the most in the NFL (18 by Brett Favre and Joe Flacco).
- ▶ Rodgers (2,475) ranks **No. 3 in the NFL** in passing yards in road playoff games since 1970, trailing Joe Flacco (2,478) and Favre (2,637).

OTHER PLAYOFF NOTES

- ▶ Green Bay beat the Giants, 38-13, in an NFC Wild Card game at Lambeau Field. It marked the third straight season that the Packers have won their opening playoff game, the longest streak by Green Bay since a five-season stretch from 1993-97.
- ▶ It was the Packers' 10th Wild Card win, the most in league annals.
- ▶ The 38 points scored by the Packers against the Giants were the most in a postseason game since Jan. 15, 2011, at Atlanta (48-21). It ranks No. 5 in team history for most points in a playoff contest, with four of the top five scoring games coming under the direction of McCarthy.
- ▶ Including the regular and postseason, it was the **first time in franchise history** (since turnovers were kept in 1933) that the Packers posted zero giveaways in five straight games (Weeks 14-17, Wild Card).
- ▶ Green Bay advanced to the Divisional round of the playoffs for the sixth time in the last seven seasons (2010-12, 2014-16), tied with the Seattle Seahawks for the most in the NFC over that span.
- ▶ The Packers are 4-3 in the Divisional Playoffs under McCarthy.
- ▶ **G T.J. Lang** became the first player in franchise history to play in a postseason game in each of his first eight seasons in the league.
- ▶ WR **Randall Cobb** tied the **single-game NFL postseason record** with three TD catches versus the Giants. The only other Packer with three TD catches in a playoff game was Sterling Sharpe (at Detroit, Jan. 8, 1994).
- ▶ In the 2016 Wild Card game, Cobb became the **first player in franchise history** to register two TD catches of 30-plus yards (42, 30) in a playoff game.
- ▶ Cobb finished with 116 yards on five receptions versus the Giants, his second career 100-yard receiving game in the postseason. That ties him for **No. 4 in team history** behind three players with three (Robert Brooks, Antonio Freeman, Greg Jennings).

- ▶ WR **Davante Adams** led the Packers with eight catches for 125 yards (15.6 avg.) and a TD versus the Giants, the second 100-yard receiving game of his postseason career to move him into a **tie for No. 4 in franchise annals**.
- ▶ Adams' eight receptions tied for the **fourth most in a game by a Packer** in the playoffs (three players with nine).
- ▶ LB **Clay Matthews** registered a sack against the Giants, giving him 11.0 for his career in the playoffs (No. 1 in team history). He moved into a tie for the **fifth-most sacks in NFL postseason history**.

- ▶ LB **Julius Peppers** posted a sack in the second quarter of the Wild Card game, giving him at least one sack in each of his first three post-seasons with the Packers.
- ▶ GB **Damarious Randall's** 78-yard INT return in the fourth quarter versus the Giants was the second longest in team playoff history, trailing only George Teague's 101-yard return at Detroit on Jan. 8, 1994.
- ▶ TE **Jared Cook** ranks **No. 1 in the NFL among tight ends** in the 2016 playoffs in receptions (11) and receiving yards (152).
- ▶ With six receptions for 104 yards (17.3 avg.) and one TD at Dallas, Cook became the second TE in franchise history (Keith Jackson, 1995) to have 100-plus receiving yards and a TD in a playoff game. His 104 receiving yards were the second most by a Green Bay TE in a postseason contest (Jermichael Finley, 159, at Arizona, 2009).
- ▶ P **Jacob Schum's** 66-yard punt in the fourth quarter at Dallas was the longest in team playoff history.
- ▶ The Divisional game versus Dallas was the first time the Packers had six players with 30-plus receiving yards in a playoff game.

A RUN GAME TO REMEMBER

- ▶ In the Week 15 victory at Chicago, Green Bay rushed for 226 yards on 23 carries (9.8 avg.). Dating back to 1933, it was the best rushing average (min. 15 att.) by Green Bay (according to the Elias Sports Bureau). It was the second-best rushing average since the merger as far as teams with 20-plus rushing attempts in a game. Cincinnati had 407 yards on 37 attempts (11.0 avg.) against Denver on Oct. 22, 2000.
- ▶ Dating back to 2006, 226 yards in Week 15 against Chicago is the second-most rushing yards by the Packers (230 yards on 44 att., 5.2 avg. vs. Dallas, Dec. 13, 2015).
- ▶ RB **Ty Montgomery** led the way with 162 yards on 16 carries (10.1) and two touchdowns, and RB **Christine Michael** contributed 45 yards on four carries (11.3 avg.) and one TD. Both players recorded runs of 40-plus yards, the first time a Packers duo has done that in the same game since Ahman Green and Dorsey Levens on Dec. 23, 2001, vs. Cleveland, according to the Elias Sports Bureau.
- ▶ Montgomery's 162 yards are the most by a Packers player in a single game since Samkon Gado ran for 171 yards on 29 carries (5.9 avg.) against Detroit on Dec. 11, 2005.
- ▶ Dating back to 1960, Montgomery's 10.13 yards per carry average is the third highest (min. 15 carries) by a Green Bay player, trailing Ahman Green, who averaged 10.87 yards per carry (15 for 163) on Oct. 24, 2004, vs. Dallas and 10.90 yards per carry (20 for 218) against Denver on Dec. 28, 2003.

AT THE HELM

Having led Green Bay to the playoffs in nine of his 11 seasons as head coach, **Mike McCarthy** is joined by Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl win with a victory over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.

- ▶ McCarthy guided the Packers to a franchise-record fourth consecutive division title in 2014. In his 11 seasons, he has won six division titles, tying Vince Lombardi for the second most in franchise history.
- ▶ With a win at Tampa Bay in Week 16 of the 2014 season, McCarthy passed Lombardi for the No. 2 spot in team history as far as overall victories:

- ▶ The 124 overall wins are the most in the NFC and the second most in the NFL since 2006 (New England, 151).
- ▶ McCarthy reached 100 career wins (including playoffs) in just his 155th game. He was the fastest to reach 100 wins in the NFL since George Seifert in 1996 (132 games).
- ▶ McCarthy's 114 regular-season wins in his first 11 years as a head coach (2006-16) are **tied for No. 3 in NFL history**:

- ▶ McCarthy recorded his third regular season with 12-plus wins in 2014 (2007, 2011), passing Curly Lambeau (1929, 1931), Lombardi (1962, 1966), Holmgren (1996-97) and Mike Sherman (2001-02) for the most by a coach in franchise history.
- ▶ McCarthy has guided the Packers to five seasons with 11-plus wins (2007, 2009, 2011-12, 2014), passing Lombardi (1961-63, 1966) and Holmgren (1995-98) for the **most by a coach in franchise history**.
- ▶ McCarthy's eight regular seasons with 10-plus wins are a **franchise record** (since 1921). Among current NFL head coaches only Bill Belichick (16) and Andy Reid (11) have more 10-plus win seasons.
- ▶ McCarthy is the **only coach in franchise history** to post three or more consecutive 10-win seasons twice in his career (2009-12, 2014-16).
- ▶ McCarthy joined Pittsburgh's Bill Cowher (2005) as the only Super Bowl-winning coaches to lead their respective teams to three road wins as the No. 6 seed in the postseason en route to a world title.
- ▶ Including playoffs, McCarthy has a 124-68-1 record since taking over as head coach in 2006, a .645 winning percentage that ranks **No. 2 among current NFL head coaches** (minimum 100 games):

MIKE MCCARTHY...Is in his 11th year as the Packers' 14th head coach.

- ▶ Joined Vince Lombardi and Mike Holmgren as the only coaches to guide the Packers to a Super Bowl title with a win over Pittsburgh in Super Bowl XLV.
- ▶ Led the Packers to their eighth consecutive playoff appearance this season, joining New England as the only two NFL teams to do so over that span. Has also led the team to nine playoff appearances in the last 10 years (2007, 2009-16).
- ▶ Guided the Packers to top-10 finishes in scoring in eight straight seasons (2007-14), joining the Patriots as the only other team to accomplish the feat over that time; Packers finished first overall in scoring in 2014.
- ▶ His .651 winning percentage during the regular season (114-61-1) ranks No. 2 among active NFL head coaches (min. 50 games).
- ▶ Had 114 regular-season wins in his first 11 seasons as a head coach, tied for No. 3 in NFL history.

DAN QUINN...Is in his second year as the Falcons' 11th head coach.

- ▶ This season, led the Falcons to their seventh division title and sixth first-round bye in franchise history.
- ▶ Coached the Atlanta defense to keep five opposing quarterbacks under 200 passing yards and allowed just one 100-yard rusher in 2015.
- ▶ Inherited the No. 32 defense from 2014 and improved it to No. 16 in his first season as head coach.
- ▶ Coached Atlanta to a 5-0 start in 2015, the best start for a head coach in franchise history.
- ▶ Coordinated a Seattle defense that led the league in yards allowed per game, passing yards allowed per game and points allowed per game for two consecutive seasons (2013-14).

THE PACKERS-FALCONS SERIES

- ▶ The Packers and Falcons met in the regular season and playoffs of the same season in 2002 and 2010. The loser of the regular-season game had revenge in both playoff matchups.
- ▶ In 1992, Atlanta won the first game of the series after trading QB Brett Favre to Green Bay in February.
- ▶ Favre and the Packers had revenge with a 37-20 win in the 1995 NFC Wild Card, where the defense held the Falcons to just 21 rushing yards.
- ▶ No. 6-seeded Green Bay upset the top-ranked Falcons in the 2010 NFC Divisional playoffs, 48-21, as part of the Packers' run to become just the second team in NFL history to win the Super Bowl as a No. 6 seed.

- QB **Aaron Rodgers** did not throw an interception in the last seven games (Weeks 11-17) to set the franchise record (min. 15 att.). He had six-game streaks in 2014 and 2014-15 and QB Bart Starr had a six-game streak in 1964.
- Rodgers has not thrown an INT in his last 245 attempts, the second-best mark in team history next to Starr's streak of 294 in 1964.
- Rodgers' seven games without an interception (min. 15 pass att.) is the longest active streak in the NFL and was the longest during the 2016 regular season.
- Rodgers had multiple passing touchdowns in eight straight games (Week 7-14), tied for the longest streak in the NFL this season (Marcus Mariota) and the second longest of his career (13-game streak in 2011).
- In Week 14 vs. Seattle, Rodgers registered a 150.8 passer rating (18 of 23, 246 yards, three TDs, no INTs). It marked the fourth game with a 150-plus rating in his career.
- Rodgers posted a 158.3 passer rating in the first half of Week 14 (12 of 15, 202 yards, two TDs), the third time in his career that he has posted a perfect passer rating in the first half of a game (at Cleveland in 2009, vs. Detroit in 2010).
- Over the last four games of the regular season, the Packers registered a league-best 13 takeaways while not committing a turnover.
- Four straight games without a giveaway tied the longest single-season streak (2014) by the Packers since 1933 (the first season turnovers were recorded).
- With just 17 giveaways in the 2016 regular season, the top six single-season giveaway marks in franchise history have all come under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (2009, 2011-12, 2014-16).

ODDS AND ENDS

Below are some random notes from the 2016 regular season:

- For the first time since 1956 (Rote/Howton) the Packers had both the league's passing-TD leader (Aaron Rodgers) and the receiving-TD leader (Jordy Nelson) in the same season.
- Green Bay's victory in Week 16 was the 217th at Lambeau Field, the most home wins by any franchise at one stadium in NFL history. The Packers surpassed Chicago, which had 216 victories at Wrigley Field.
- The Packers scored 30-plus points in four straight games (Weeks 14-17), which tied for the second-longest streak (2003, 2007, 2011) in franchise history (seven in 1963).
- Green Bay tied for No. 6 in the NFL with 40 sacks in 2016, joining Denver and Minnesota as the only teams in the NFL to record 40-plus sacks as a team in each of the last five seasons (2012-16). It is also the longest streak by the Packers since team sacks began to be recorded in 1963.
- The Packers eclipsed 400 total net yards seven times during the 2016 regular season (406 vs. N.Y. Giants and Chicago Bears / 405 vs. Indianapolis / 402 at Tennessee / 424 at Washington / 451 at Chicago / 448 at Detroit), for the fifth-most games with 400 total net yards in the NFL.
- The Packers scored 21 or more points in 14 games during the 2016 regular season, tied with New England for No. 2 in the NFL (15, Atlanta).
- In Weeks 16-17, QB **Aaron Rodgers** became the first Green Bay QB to register 300-plus passing yards, four-plus passing TDs and no INTs in back-to-back games in a single season.
- In Week 16, Rodgers recorded his second career game with 300-plus passing yards, four-plus passing TDs and one-plus rushing TDs. According to pro-football-reference.com, he joined Drew Brees (three) and Peyton Manning (two) as the only players with multiple games with those numbers.
- In Weeks 14-15, Green Bay had 10 takeaways and zero giveaways. According to the Elias Sports Bureau it was the first time since Sept. 17-24, 1978 (15 takeaways, five giveaways) that Green Bay was plus-10 or better in turnover differential over a two-game span.

- The Packers posted six takeaways (five INTs, one fumble recovery) in the Week 14 win over Seattle, their first six-takeaway game since Dec. 26, 2010, vs. the N.Y. Giants. With zero giveaways, Green Bay posted a plus-six turnover differential for the first time since Oct. 27, 1991, at Tampa Bay (eight takeaways, two giveaways).
- Week 14 was Green Bay's first five-interception game since posting five at Chicago in Week 17 in 2006.
- In Weeks 12-14, the Packers allowed 13 or fewer points in each contest, the first time doing so in three straight games since 2010 (Weeks 8-9, 11).
- Green Bay gave up one or zero sacks in three consecutive games (Weeks 12-14), the first time doing so since four straight to end the 2014 season (Weeks 14-17).
- The Packers' 98-yard TD drive in the fourth quarter of the Week 13 victory vs. Houston was the team's longest TD drive since a 99-yarder at Cleveland on Oct. 25, 2009.
- The Packers converted 71.4 percent of third downs in Week 12 (10-14), the highest single-game third-down conversion rate in the NFL this season and the second highest under Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** (72.2 percent, 13-18, Oct. 27, 2013, at Minnesota).
- The Packers finished **No. 4 in the NFL** in points per game in the 2016 regular season; their **ninth top-10 finish in the last 10 seasons**.

- Green Bay's defense ranked **No. 5 in the NFL** this season with an interception rate of 2.98 percent and **tied for No. 4** with 17 interceptions.
- Rodgers threw for 371 yards in Week 10 and 351 yards in Week 11, marking only the third time in his career he has thrown for 350-plus passing yards in back-to-back games (2009, 2011).
- Rodgers registered a passer rating of 115.0-plus in seven games during the 2016 regular season (129.3 vs. Detroit / 125.5 at Atlanta / 115.0 at Washington / 116.7 at Philadelphia / 150.8 vs. Seattle / 136.6 vs. Minnesota / 126.0 at Detroit):

- According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Green Bay recorded 23-plus first downs in five consecutive games (Weeks 5-9) in a single regular season for the first time in franchise history.
- In Week 7, Green Bay recorded 32 first downs, the most by the Packers since Nov. 27, 1983, at Atlanta (32). It tied for the second most in franchise history. Green Bay also possessed the ball for 39:36, the best mark by the team since Oct. 27, 2013, at Minnesota (40:54).

GROUP EFFORT

The Packers have a history of relying on many receivers over the years and that continued during the 2016 regular season.

- ▶ The Packers were one of two teams in the NFL (New Orleans) to have three wide receivers with 60-plus receptions and 600-plus receiving yards each this season (**Jordy Nelson** - 97 rec. for 1,257 yds. / **Davante Adams** - 75 rec. for 997 yds. / **Randall Cobb** - 60 rec. for 610 yds.).
- ▶ Nelson (14) and Adams (12) were the **only teammate duo in the NFL** with 10-plus touchdown catches this season.
- ▶ Adams and Nelson are just the **second duo in team history to both record 10-plus TD catches in the same season** (Nelson and Cobb in 2014).
- ▶ Nelson finished **No. 1 in the NFL** in receiving touchdowns this season and Adams was **tied for No. 2**:

- ▶ Nelson **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** with five 100-yard receiving games this season while Adams (four) was **tied for No. 6**.
- ▶ Adams and Nelson joined New Orleans WR Brandin Cooks and Tampa Bay WR Mike Evans as the only players to record 100-plus yards receiving and two-plus TDs in two games during the 2016 regular season.
- ▶ Nelson and Adams **tied for No. 1 in the NFL** this season with three multi-receiving touchdown games (Beckham, Brown, Evans).
- ▶ Adams and New England WR Chris Hogan were the **only players in the league this season** to have two games with four-plus receptions and a 25-plus-yard receiving average.
- ▶ During the 2016 regular season, Green Bay had one or more players register 10-plus receptions and/or 100-plus receiving yards in 12 games.
- ▶ The Packers' six individual 10-catch games came via four different players (Adams-two, **Ty Montgomery**-two, Cobb, Nelson). According to the Elias Sports Bureau, four different players having at least one 10-catch game is **tied for the most in a single season in NFL history** (2015 New England Patriots / 2013 Atlanta Falcons / 2010 Indianapolis Colts / 2002 St. Louis Rams / 1991 Buffalo Bills).
- ▶ Green Bay's six individual 10-catch games were the **most in a single season in franchise history** (five in 2004 / three in 2014, 1993, 1942).
- ▶ Despite missing six games due to injury, TE **Jared Cook** totaled 30 receptions for 377 yards (12.6 avg.) and a touchdown. He is one of only five tight ends in the league with 30-plus receptions each of the last six seasons (2011-16), joining Antonio Gates, Jimmy Graham, Greg Olsen and Jason Witten.
- ▶ In Week 11, Cook registered 105 yards and one touchdown on six receptions (17.5 avg.). According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Cook became only the second TE (Benjamin Watson) to register a 100-yard receiving game with three different franchises.
- ▶ Dating back to 1996, Cook's 17.5 yards-per-catch average was the third highest by a Green Bay tight end in single game (min. five receptions), according to STATS (Jermichael Finley, Oct. 5, 2009, six for 128 yards, 21.3 avg. / Richard Rodgers, Dec. 3, 2015, eight for 146 yards, 18.3 avg.).
- ▶ In Week 10, Adams became the only Packer player to register three receptions of 35-plus yards in the same game (dating back to 1991).
- ▶ Week 10 also saw Adams (six receptions for 156 yards) and Nelson (12 receptions for 126 yards, one TD) become the second pair of teammates to record 120-plus receiving yards in the same game this season (New Orleans WRs Willie Snead and Cooks in Week 1).
- ▶ In Week 9, the Packers had four players with a reception of 20-plus yards (Nelson, Adams, TE **Richard Rodgers**, WR **Jeff Janis**).

- ▶ With 12 receptions for 74 yards (6.2 avg.) in Week 8, Adams became the first Packer to have back-to-back games with 12-plus catches, and his 25 over Weeks 7-8 were a franchise record for most over a two-game span.
- ▶ Week 8 also saw three Packers post their first career TD catches in the game at Atlanta (Janis, **Geronimo Allison**, **Trevor Davis**), which was the first time an NFL team had done that since the Jets on Oct. 23, 2000. Allison and Davis became first rookie duo to both have a TD catch in a game for the Packers since Max McGee and Joe Johnson on Dec. 12, 1954.
- ▶ According to the Elias Sports Bureau, in Week 7 the Packers became just the second team in NFL history to feature three players with 10-plus catches in a game (Adams, 13; Cobb, 11; Montgomery, 10), joining the New England Patriots (Leroy Thompson, Ben Coates, Michael Timpson) vs. Minnesota on Nov. 13, 1994.
- ▶ Adams' 13 receptions for 132 yards (10.2 avg.) and two touchdowns against Chicago tied for the second-most receptions in a single game in franchise history (Don Hutson, 13 receptions vs. Cleveland, Oct. 18, 1942, and 14 vs. N.Y. Giants on Nov. 22, 1942).
- ▶ Montgomery became the first Packer to post back-to-back games with 10-plus catches (10 vs. Dallas in Week 6) since WR Sterling Sharpe in 1993 (Oct. 10, Oct. 24). Adams joined him in Weeks 7 (13) and 8 (12). The only other player to accomplish that feat in a single season in team annals is Hutson in 1942 (Nov. 15, Nov. 22).
- ▶ Montgomery recorded 60 yards rushing and 66 yards receiving in Week 7, becoming the first Green Bay player since RB Ahman Green (63 rushing/68 receiving) at Detroit on Sept. 24, 2006, to register 60-plus rushing yards and 60-plus receiving yards in a game.

NELSON MAKES AN IMPACT

- ▶ This season, Nelson joined WR Sterling Sharpe as the **only players in team history** to record two seasons with 95-plus catches.
- ▶ In 2016, Nelson registered the fourth 1,200-yard (1,257) receiving season of his career, tying James Lofton for the **best mark in team history**.
- ▶ This was the third time in Nelson's career that he recorded 10-plus receiving TDs in a season (2011 and 2014). He joined Sterling Sharpe (four) and Don Hutson (three) as the **only players in franchise history to post 10-plus TD catches in three or more seasons**.
- ▶ Nelson is the **first player in franchise history to record 13-plus receiving touchdowns in three different seasons** (2011, 2014, 2016). His three seasons of 13-plus TD receptions tie Pro Football Hall of Famers Lance Alworth, Cris Carter and Marvin Harrison for the fourth most in NFL history. Only Pro Football Hall of Famer Jerry Rice (eight), Terrell Owens (seven) and Randy Moss (six) have more such seasons in NFL history.
- ▶ With at least one touchdown reception in 11 games this season, Nelson tied Sharpe (1992 and 1994) for the most games with at least one TD catch in a single season in franchise history.
- ▶ Nelson (95) recorded his **third straight 85-catch season**, joining Sharpe (1992-94) as the only to do so in team history.
- ▶ Nelson has 25 100-yard receiving games in his career, **passing Don Hutson (24) for No. 3 in team history**. He trails Sharpe (29) for the second most.
- ▶ QB **Aaron Rodgers** and Nelson have connected for 59 touchdowns, **the most by a duo in team history** (Brett Favre and Antonio Freeman, 57).
- ▶ Nelson (63) passed Donald Driver (61) for the **third-most receiving touchdowns in franchise history** (Sharpe, 65 / Hutson, 99).
- ▶ Nelson also ranks in the top five in franchise history in both receptions and receiving yards:

RODGERS AND TOUCHDOWNS

QB **Aaron Rodgers** has found the end zone a lot in his career, and that continued in the 2016 regular season. Rodgers threw for a league-best 40 touchdowns, his franchise-record fourth season (2011-12, 2014, 2016) with 35-plus TD passes (Brett Favre, three, 1995-97).

- ▶ With 40 passing TDs during the 2016 regular season, Rodgers became just the fourth QB in NFL history to record two seasons with 40-plus TD passes (Dan Marino, Peyton Manning, Drew Brees).
- ▶ Rodgers now has five seasons with 4,000-plus passing yards and 30-plus passing TDs (2009, 2011-12, 2014, 2016), further extending his team mark.
- ▶ In 2016, Rodgers registered his third straight season with 30-plus touchdown passes, the second-longest streak in franchise history (Favre, five straight, 1994-98)
- ▶ Rodgers finished **No. 1 in the NFL** in 2016 in passing touchdowns:

RODGERS THE RUNNER

With injuries costing Green Bay's top two running backs significant time this season, QB **Aaron Rodgers** helped try to fill the void.

- ▶ Rodgers is just the **fourth QB in NFL history** to post 35,000-plus passing yards and 2,500-plus rushing yards in his career, joining Fran Tarkenton, John Elway and Donovan McNabb as the only players to accomplish that feat.
- ▶ Rodgers ranked **No. 7 in the NFL** (min. 25 att.) among quarterbacks in rushing average (5.51) and **tied for No. 5** in rushing touchdowns (four) during the 2016 regular season.
- ▶ Rodgers recorded a career high 369 yards rushing during the 2016 regular season, the most by a Green Bay QB since Tobin Rote (398) in 1956.
- ▶ Rodgers finished the 2016 regular season **No. 4 in the NFL** in rushing yards among quarterbacks:

- ▶ Dating back to 1960, Rodgers' 60 rushing yards in Week 8 were the second most in a single game by a Green Bay quarterback, trailing only the 88 yards on eight carries (11.0 avg.) by Don Majkowski at Detroit, Sept. 30, 1990.
- ▶ Rodgers joined Cam Newton (Dec. 20, 2015, at NYG) as the only QBs over the past four seasons (2013-16) to post four-plus passing TDs and 60-plus rushing yards in the same game.
- ▶ By rushing for 43 yards on six carries (7.2 avg.) in Week 9, Rodgers recorded 40-plus rushing yards in back-to-back games for the first time in his career.

QB **Aaron Rodgers** surpassed the 1,500-attempt plateau for his career in 2010, the benchmark to qualify for passer rating in the NFL record book.

▶ Rodgers ranks **No. 1 in NFL history** in career passer rating:

▶ Rodgers registered the sixth 4,000-yard passing season of his career in 2016, setting the **franchise record** as he surpassed Brett Favre's mark of five 4,000-yard seasons.

▶ Rodgers had 11 zero-INT games this season (min. 15 att.), the third time in his career with 10-plus zero-INT games (13 in 2014, 12 in 2009). The only other QB in team history to have 10 in a season was Starr (10) in 1964.

▶ In 2016, Rodgers set the **single-season franchise record for completions** with 401, surpassing Favre's mark of 372 in 2005.

▶ In the Week 7 victory over Chicago, Rodgers set a **single-game franchise record** with 39 completions, besting the previous high of 36 by Favre at Chicago on Dec. 5, 1993.

▶ Rodgers went over the 35,000-yard passing mark for his career this season in Week 11 at Washington. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, he reached the mark on his 4,446th attempt, the **second-fewest attempts needed in NFL history** behind QB Johnny Unitas (4,388 attempts).

▶ Rodgers reached 250 touchdown passes in Week 12 of 2015. He did in his 121st career game, surpassing MIA QB Dan Marino (128) for the NFL record.

▶ Rodgers recorded his sixth season with 500-plus attempts and eight or fewer INTs in 2016, the most in NFL history (Tom Brady, three; nine others with one).

▶ The 2016 regular season saw Rodgers become just the second QB in NFL history to have 600-plus passing attempts and seven or fewer INTs in a season (Brady, 624 attempts, seven INTs in 2015).

▶ In Week 14, Rodgers recorded a passer rating of 150.8 in a win over Seattle, marking his fourth career game a passer rating of 150-plus which is the fourth most (min. 10 pass att.) among active quarterbacks (Drew Brees and Tom Brady, five / Ben Roethlisberger, eight).

▶ Rodgers rushed for a touchdown in Week 16, marking his 13th game with two-plus passing touchdowns and one-plus rushing touchdowns since 2008, which is **No. 2 among NFL QBs** over that span behind Cam Newton (18).

CLAY FINDS HIS WAY TO THE BALL

LB **Clay Matthews** continues to make an impact on opposing offenses. Despite injuries forcing him to miss four games and limiting him in six others, Matthews ranked third on the team with five sacks in 2016.

- For the first time in his career, Matthews recorded at least one sack in each of the first three regular-season games he played in.
- In 2015, Matthews was selected to his sixth Pro Bowl and first as an inside linebacker after recording 6.5 sacks (second on the team), 14 QB hits (No. 1 on the team), and a career-high 84 tackles (No. 2 on the team). He was also one of three players (Micah Hyde, Sam Shields) on the team to have an interception and a fumble recovery.
- It was the seventh consecutive season he recorded six or more sacks, **tied for the second-most** six-plus-sack seasons in the NFL since 2009, trailing teammate LB **Julius Peppers**, who has eight:

BURNETT BRINGS IT

Packers S **Morgan Burnett** has been a steady force on the Packers defense for years, starting 94 games (including playoffs) since 2011.

- From 2011-14, he was the only Packer to surpass 100 tackles each season, and despite missing five games in 2015, he tied for the team lead in solo tackles (54) and led the team with 14 total tackles in the postseason. In 2016, he was **No. 1 on the team** in tackles (92) despite missing a game.
- He set a single-season career high with three sacks in 2016, **No. 2 among safeties** according to STATS:

ONE OF THE BEST

Packers LB **Julius Peppers** is one of the greatest pass rushers of all-time and continues to contribute, finishing **No. 2 on the team** with 7.5 sacks during the 2016 regular season.

- Peppers recorded a streak of three straight games with a sack in each season with the Packers (Weeks 7-8 and 10 in 2014, Weeks 4-6 in 2015, Weeks 11-13 this season).
- The 2015 season (10.5) marked his ninth season with 10-plus sacks, which tied John Randle for the fourth-most 10-sack seasons since 1982 (Bruce Smith, 13 / Reggie White, 12 / Kevin Greene, 10).
- Peppers ranks **No. 1 among active players** in career sacks during the regular season:

- Peppers recorded a sack and forced fumble in two games during the 2016 season (Dallas, at Chicago). According to STATS LLC, he is **tied for No. 4 in the NFL** in forced fumbles (47) since 1994.

PERRY LEADS THE RUSH

Packers LB **Nick Perry** led a pass rush that recorded multiple sacks in 13 of 16 games in 2016 and included two-plus sacks by seven players.

- ▶ Despite missing two games, Perry registered a team-high 11 sacks, **tied for No. 8 in the NFL** in 2016. He became the 11th player in team history (since 1982) to register a double-digit sack total in a season.
- ▶ Perry registered a half-sack or more in 10 games during the 2016 season, **tied for No. 2 in the NFL**:

- ▶ In Week 6, Perry registered his first career interception and added a sack, making him the first Green Bay LB to post both in a game since **Clay Matthews** at the N.Y. Giants on Dec. 4, 2011.
- ▶ Perry matched his career high with a team-best two sacks in Week 3 vs. Detroit and Week 16 vs. Minnesota.
- ▶ Perry had at least one two-sack game in each of the last four seasons (2013-16), the lone Packer to accomplish that feat over that span.

CONTINUAL IMPACT

In his career, DT **Mike Daniels** has seen his playing time steadily increase as well as his production. After playing in 14 games as a rookie in 2012, he has played in every game since the start of the 2013 season.

- ▶ In Week 2 at Minnesota, he recorded a sack and tied for the team lead with four QB hits. In Week 3, he led the Packers with two QB hits, and he registered a sack in Weeks 8, 12 and 16, while also recovering a fumble in Week 16 as well, the third of his career.
- ▶ In 2015, Daniels led the Packers' defensive line in tackles (66) and sacks (four). He finished third on the team with 12 QB hits.
- ▶ In Week 5 versus St. Louis last season, he tied for the team lead with a career-best nine tackles (eight solo).
- ▶ Daniels registered his first career interception in Week 16 at Arizona (2015), returning it 23 yards. According to STATS LLC, it was the first interception by a Packers DT since Cullen Jenkins on Oct. 18, 2009. Dating back to 1960, his 23-yard interception return was the longest by a Green Bay DT on an interception.
- ▶ He led Green Bay's defensive line with 5.5 sacks and was the team leader in quarterback hits (19) and pressures (22) during the 2014 regular season.
- ▶ Daniels is fourth on the Packers with 20.0 sacks since the start of the 2013 season. He is **No. 12 among NFL defensive tackles** over that span, according to STATS LLC.
- ▶ Daniels ranks **No. 3 among Packers defensive tackles** in sacks (since 1982), according to STATS LLC:

ON THE RISE

S **Ha Ha Clinton-Dix** has been a presence on the Packers defense since his rookie season and earned his first trip to the Pro Bowl in 2016.

- ▶ After starting 10 of 16 games and both postseason contests as a rookie, he has started every game since 2015.
- ▶ His career-best five interceptions are **tied for No. 5 in the NFL** this season and **tied for No. 1 among safeties** (HOU Quintin Demps, OAK Reggie Nelson, NYG Landon Collins).
- ▶ According to STATS, it is the most interceptions by a Packers safety in a single season since Charles Woodson (seven) and Charlie Peprah (five) in 2011.
- ▶ In 2016, Clinton-Dix posted a career-high two interceptions in both Week 9 and Week 14, becoming the first Packer to have two two-INT games in a season since Woodson in 2011.
- ▶ In Week 9, he joined CB Al Harris (vs. New Orleans, Oct. 9, 2005) as the only players to post two INTs in a first quarter for the Packers since 1993.
- ▶ His three career postseason interceptions **rank No. 1 among safeties** since he entered the league in 2014, according to STATS.
- ▶ Clinton-Dix finished second on the team with 95 tackles (73 solo) in 2014 and led the Packers with 117 tackles (97 solo) in 2015.
- ▶ He registered a total of three interceptions last season (including playoffs). He tied for fourth on the team with two during the regular season and registered one in the postseason.
- ▶ According to STATS, his three sacks during the 2015 regular season were tied for the fifth most in a single regular season by a Packers safety (since 1982) and the most since Mark Roman recorded 3.5 in 2004.
- ▶ Clinton-Dix's three sacks also tied for **No. 3 in the NFL** in 2015 among safeties.
- ▶ During the 2015 regular season, he registered eight-plus tackles in eight games, including setting career highs in both total tackles (12) and solo tackles (11) in the Week 10 game vs. Detroit, in which he also registered an interception.

RACKING UP POINTS

K **Mason Crosby** is moving his way up the record books.

- ▶ Crosby passed Ryan Longwell in Week 2 of the 2015 season to become the franchise career points leader:

- ▶ Crosby's 1,267 points are the **second most by an NFL player in his first 10 seasons** (NE Stephen Gostkowski (1,330 - 2006-15).
- ▶ Crosby (1,393) passed Longwell (1,119) for the most points scored in the regular and postseason combined in franchise history.
- ▶ Dating back to 2013, Crosby has made 110 field goals during the regular season, **tied for No. 6 in the NFL** over that span.
- ▶ Crosby recorded 122 points during the 2016 season, giving him the 10th 100-point season of his career and **extending his franchise record**. Crosby's 10 seasons with 100-plus points are the **most in the NFL since 2007**.
- ▶ In Week 11 of 2015, he tied the single-game team record with five field goals and became the first player in NFL history to have five field goals of 40-plus yards in a game. In the same game, Crosby connected on a 52-yard field goal, extending his career franchise record for the most 50-yard FGs to 26.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

Green Bay went 7-1 away from Lambeau Field in 2011, with the seven road wins setting a single-season franchise record.

- ▶ The Packers have been able to stay above the .500 mark on the road during Head Coach **Mike McCarthy's** tenure, a notable achievement in the National Football League.
- ▶ Since 2006, McCarthy's first season as the head coach in Green Bay, only nine of 32 NFL teams have regular-season road records above .500.

326 AND COUNTING

Another packed house at Lambeau Field against the Minnesota Vikings in Week 16 brought the stadium's consecutive-sellouts streak to 326 regular-season games (not including replacement games).

- ▶ The league's longest-tenured stadium, Lambeau Field is hosting its 60th season of football in 2016. For the victory over Dallas in the Divisional round of the 2014 playoffs, Packers fans set a new Lambeau Field paid attendance record (79,704).
- ▶ Across American professional sports, only Boston's Fenway Park (1912) and Chicago's Wrigley Field (1914) have longer tenures.

THE LAMBEAU ADVANTAGE

The crown jewel of the National Football League, Lambeau Field has long been known as one of the tougher venues to play in, particularly during the harsh Wisconsin winter.

- ▶ Re-establishing home-field advantage after a 4-4 mark in 2008 was one of the goals of 2009, and with the Packers finishing 6-2 at home, they accomplished that goal. Green Bay followed that up with a 7-1 mark at Lambeau Field in 2010, a perfect 8-0 record in 2011, the first undefeated home mark since 2002, and a 7-1 mark in 2012. The Packers were one of two teams to finish undefeated at home during the 2014 regular season (Denver).
- ▶ Head Coach **Mike McCarthy** stated consistently upon his arrival in Green Bay that one of the team's goals would be to reclaim the mystique of playing at Lambeau Field. Mission accomplished. The team is 65-22-1 (.744) at home in the regular season since 2006, **No. 2 in the NFL**.
- ▶ Since **Ron Wolf** and **Mike Holmgren** began the revitalization of the franchise in 1992, Green Bay owns the best home record in the NFL. A look at the top regular-season home W-L records since the '92 season:

A LOOK AT THE SCHEDULE

The Green Bay Packers' 96th NFL regular-season schedule is headlined by five prime-time games (subject to flexible scheduling).

- ▶ Green Bay's schedule includes five games against 2015 playoff teams. Three of those contests (Minnesota, Houston, Seattle) will be at Lambeau Field, while two (Minnesota, Washington) will come on the road.
- ▶ The Packers kicked off their season on the road for the fourth consecutive year, the longest streak in team history, opening with two road games for the first time since 1924. Green Bay traveled to Jacksonville, playing on the road against an AFC team in Week 1 for the first time since facing the New England Patriots in 1985.
- ▶ Green Bay faced division opponents in Weeks 2-3. They began with a trip to Minnesota to face the Vikings in a prime-time game and returned to Lambeau Field last week for the home opener against the Detroit Lions.
- ▶ For the second time in four years, the Packers had their bye in Week 4.
- ▶ Green Bay returned to action with three consecutive home games against NFC teams over a 12-day span. In Week 5, the Packers played on Sunday night against the New York Giants. It was the Giants' first regular-season game at Lambeau Field since 2010. In Week 6, Green Bay played the Dallas Cowboys for the fourth consecutive season (including playoffs) and for the second straight year at home in the regular season. Green Bay finished the homestand playing the Chicago Bears on a Thursday night for the second consecutive season (11th straight year in primetime).
- ▶ Four of the Packers' next five games were on the road, including three road games in a row for the first time since 2012.
- ▶ After a trip to play the Atlanta Falcons in Week 8, Green Bay faced the Indianapolis Colts at home for the first time since 2008. The Packers made just their third regular-season visit to Tennessee to play the Titans in Week 10.
- ▶ Green Bay played two prime-time road games in a row, first traveling to play against the Washington Redskins on a Sunday night in Week 11 and then to Philadelphia to face the Eagles on *Monday Night Football* in Week 12. It marked the 24th consecutive season (1993-2016) that Green Bay has appeared on *MNF*.
- ▶ Green Bay played its first game at home in almost a month when it faced the Houston Texans in Week 13 for just the second time ever at Lambeau Field.
- ▶ Week 14 brought a familiar matchup as the Packers welcomed the Seattle Seahawks to Lambeau Field for the second consecutive year. Including the postseason, Green Bay and Seattle met for the fifth time in five years.
- ▶ For the first time since 2006, the Packers will finish the regular season with three straight games against NFC North opponents.
- ▶ In Week 15, Green Bay traveled to Chicago to play the Bears. The Packers won their fifth consecutive game against the Bears in December, four of which were played in Chicago.
- ▶ Green Bay returned home to play the Vikings in Week 16 on Christmas Eve, playing on a Saturday for the first time since 1997. The Packers last played on Christmas Eve in 2004, a 34-31 victory at Minnesota. Including playoffs, Green Bay improved to 9-2-1 mark (.792) against the Vikings at Lambeau Field under McCarthy.
- ▶ The Packers finished the regular season in Detroit for the first time since 1993. Green Bay won its eighth game in the last 11 contests at Ford Field under McCarthy. It was only the third time the Packers played at the Lions during the regular season in the month of January (1983, 1994).

BREAKING DOWN THE ROSTER

The Packers have a 53-man roster that is composed of 25 offensive players, 25 defensive players and three specialists.

- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 47 began their pro careers with the Packers (88.7 percent) and 34 of them (64.2 percent) were draft picks of the Packers. Dating back to 2009, Green Bay has selected nine players in the first round, seven of which are still on the team.
- ▶ Green Bay has 15 players on the roster that began their careers as undrafted free agents, with 13 of those originally signed by Green Bay.
- ▶ Seven 2016 undrafted rookie free agents are currently on the roster (WR Geronimo Allison, S Kentrell Brice, QB Joe Callahan, S Marwin Evans, CB Josh Hawkins, FB Joe Kerridge, CB Herb Waters).
- ▶ 39.6 percent of the players (21 of 53) on Green Bay's roster entered the league as a sixth-round or seventh-round pick or as an undrafted player.
- ▶ The Packers have five players on the roster that played in the NFL prior to the 2009 season. Three of those players were draft picks of the Packers (QB Aaron Rodgers, K Mason Crosby and WR Jordy Nelson) and two (Rodgers, Nelson) have made at least one Pro Bowl.
- ▶ Only 19 of the 53 players on the roster (35.8 percent) were selected in the first three rounds of the draft, with 17 being drafted by the Packers.
- ▶ Of the 53 players on the roster, 43 of them (81.1 percent) are 28 years old or younger (as of Jan. 22) and 24 players (45.3 percent) are 24 years old or younger.

PACKERS STARTERS – OFFENSE

WR Jordy Nelson, 9th Year, Kansas State, D2a-08

- ▶ Led the NFL with 14 receiving touchdowns this season.
- ▶ Became the first player in franchise history to record 13-plus receiving touchdowns in three different seasons (2011, 2014, 2016). His three seasons of 13-plus TD receptions tie Pro Football Hall of Famers Lance Alworth, Cris Carter and Marvin Harrison for the fourth-most in NFL history.
- ▶ Has 63 career receiving TDs, No. 3 in Packers history.
- ▶ Missed all of the 2015 season due to a knee injury.
- ▶ Finished the 2014 regular season ranked fourth in the NFL in receiving yards (1,519), seventh in receptions (98) and tied for second in receiving touchdowns (13). Earned first selection to the Pro Bowl.
- ▶ Led the team in 2013 with 85 catches for 1,314 yards and eight TDs. Ranked No. 10 in the NFL that season in receiving yards.
- ▶ With 15 TD catches in 2011, became only the third player in franchise history to catch 15 or more TDs in a season, joining WRs Sterling Sharpe (18 in 1994) and Don Hutson (17 in 1942).

LT David Bakhtiari, 4th Year, Colorado, D4a-13

- ▶ Named first alternate for the Pro Bowl in 2016.
- ▶ Has started all but two games at LT since the start of the 2013 regular season. Missed the final two games of the 2015 regular season due to injury.
- ▶ Started all 16 games at left tackle in 2013, the only rookie in the NFL to do so in 2013 and the first Packer rookie to do so since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Became just the fourth Green Bay rookie to start at LT in the season opener since the 1970 AFL-NFL merger and the first since 1985.

LG Lane Taylor, 4th Year, Oklahoma State, FA-13

- ▶ Has played in 46 regular-season games for Green Bay with 18 starts.
- ▶ Made the first starts of his career in 2015, opening at RG at Detroit in Week 13 in place of an injured T.J. Lang and at LG in Week 17 vs. Minnesota with Josh Sitton sliding to LT in place of an injured David Bakhtiari.
- ▶ A four-year letterman at OSU, starting 47 of 50 games played at right guard. Unanimous first-team All-Big 12 selection by the conference's coaches as a senior.

C Corey Linsley, 3rd Year, Ohio State, D5a-14

- ▶ Started all nine games he appeared in at C during the regular season. Was on reserve/physically unable to perform for the entire preseason and the first seven regular-season games
- ▶ Started 29 games and four postseason contests in his first two seasons.
- ▶ First rookie center to start for Green Bay in Week 1 since the merger.
- ▶ Was the first rookie center to start every game for the Packers since the league went to a 16-game schedule in 1978.
- ▶ Named to PFWA's All-Rookie team, the first Green Bay center to be honored since its inception in 1974.

RG T.J. Lang, 8th Year, Eastern Michigan, D4-09

- ▶ Selected to his first career Pro Bowl this season.
- ▶ Has started games at four different positions on the line as a pro (60 at RG, 27 at LG, five at RT, two at LT). Played C in Week 10 in 2013.
- ▶ Has started 91 contests since 2011, most by a Packers' offensive player.
- ▶ Started games at both tackle spots in his first season (2009) and became the first Packers rookie to start consecutive games at left tackle since Chad Clifton in 2000.
- ▶ Began his college career as a defensive lineman, but converted to the offensive line as a sophomore and started 36 straight games (10 at RT, 26 at LT) over his final three years.

RT Bryan Bulaga, 7th Year, Iowa, D1-10

- ▶ Has started 43 of 48 games since the start of the 2014 season.
- ▶ Missed the second part of the 2012 season after suffering a hip injury vs. Arizona on Nov. 4 and missed all of the 2013 season after injuring his knee on Aug. 3.
- ▶ Started 37 games at RT in his first three seasons in the league.
- ▶ Started the final 12 games of 2010 and the entire postseason at right tackle after taking over for veteran Mark Tauscher (shoulder).
- ▶ Named to the *Pro Football Weekly*/PFWA All-Rookie team in 2010.
- ▶ Capped his rookie season by becoming the youngest player at the time, according to STATS LLC, to ever start in the Super Bowl (21 years, 322 days).

TE Jared Cook, 8th Year, South Carolina, FA-16

- ▶ Recorded 24 receptions for 324 yards over the final seven games of the 2016 regular season. His 13.5 yards per catch ranked No. 3 among NFL tight ends since Week 11 (min. 21 rec.).
- ▶ Registered four receptions over 25 yards from Week 11-17, tied for the third most among NFL tight ends over that span.
- ▶ Started five of 10 games played during the 2016 regular season, missing Weeks 5-10 due to an ankle injury
- ▶ Signed with the Packers as a free agent in March 2016 after spending three seasons with the St. Louis Rams (2013-15) and four with the Tennessee Titans (2009-12).
- ▶ Holds the single-game franchise record for the most receiving yards by a tight end for both the Titans (169 vs. Jacksonville, Dec. 24, 2011) and the Rams (141 vs. Arizona, Sept. 8, 2013).

WR Randall Cobb, 6th Year, Kentucky, D2-11

- ▶ Finished No. 3 on the team with 60 receptions in 2016 despite missing three games due to injury.
- ▶ Led the team with a 13.5 punt return average in 2016.
- ▶ Posted the 12th 100-yard receiving game of his career in Week 4 (108 on nine receptions) and tied his single-game high for receptions (11 for 95 yards and a TD) in Week 7.
- ▶ Led the team in receptions (79), was No. 2 in receiving yards (829) and was No. 3 in touchdown receptions (six) in 2015.
- ▶ Set a new single-season career high with five 100-yard receiving games during the 2014 season (three-2012). Earned first trip to the Pro Bowl.
- ▶ His career-best 91 receptions in 2014 were the seventh most in team history.
- ▶ Finished the regular season tied for fourth in the NFL with 12 touchdown receptions in 2014.
- ▶ Before suffering a knee injury in Week 6 in 2013, led the team in receptions with 29 and was No. 2 in receiving yards with 378.
- ▶ Set a franchise single-season record with a league-high 2,342 combined net yards in 2012, topping the previous team mark of 2,250 yards by RB Ahman Green in 2003.

QB Aaron Rodgers, 12th Year, California, D1-05

- ▶ In 135 regular-season starts (90-45 record), has posted 49 games with 300-plus passing yards, 81 without an interception and 76 with a 100-plus passer rating (min. 15 attempts).
- ▶ Earned his sixth selection to the Pro Bowl in 2016, the second-most selections by a Green Bay quarterback behind Brett Favre's nine (1992-93, 1995-97, 2001-03, 2007).
- ▶ His career passer rating of 104.1 ranks No. 1 in NFL history.
- ▶ Finished the 2014 regular season ranked No. 2 in the NFL in passer rating (112.2), touchdown percentage (7.3), No. 1 in interception percentage (1.0) and No. 3 in touchdown passes (38).
- ▶ Recorded a passer rating of at least 120.0 in seven regular-season games in 2014, setting a single-season career high and tying for the third most in a single season in the NFL, dating back to 1960.
- ▶ Posted 21,332 passing yards from 2008-12, which ranks No. 1 in league history for the most passing yards by a QB in his first five seasons as a starter (previous record was Peyton Manning, 20,618, 1998-2002).
- ▶ In 2011, set an NFL record with a 122.5 passer rating and set franchise marks for TD passes (45), passing yards (4,643), completion percentage (68.3), yards per attempt (9.25) and 300-yard games (eight) on his way to earning NFL Most Valuable Player honors from *The Associated Press*.

RB Ty Montgomery, 2nd Year, Stanford, D3-15

- ▶ After being converted from wide receiver to running back during the season, started six games at RB, including the final four of the regular season.
- ▶ In Week 15 at Chicago, rushed for 162 yards on 16 carries and two touchdowns. His 162 yards were the most by a Packers player in a single game since Dec. 11, 2005 (Samkon Gado, 171 yards on 29 carries, 5.9 avg.). Dating back to 1960, his 10.13 yards per carry average was the third highest (min. 15 carries) by a Green Bay player.
- ▶ Played in six games with three starts as a rookie in 2015 before an ankle injury sustained in Week 6 sidelined him for the remainder of the season.
- ▶ Posted 5,190 all-purpose yards at Stanford (334 rushing, 2,125 receiving, 238 PR, 2,493 KOR), the fourth most in school history at the time.

FB Aaron Ripkowski, 2nd Year, Oklahoma, D6a-15

- ▶ Started eight of 16 games played in the 2016 regular season.
- ▶ Scored his first career rushing touchdown in Week 12 and followed it up with one in Week 13.
- ▶ Led the team and set career highs in Week 17 with 61 rushing yards on nine carries (6.8 avg.)
- ▶ Played in 15 games as a rookie, seeing action primarily on special teams. Tied for No. 4 on the team with nine special teams tackles.
- ▶ Began collegiate career as a walk-on and went on to play in 47 games with 17 starts.



PACKERS STARTERS – DEFENSE

DE Kenny Clark, Rookie, UCLA, D1-16

- ▶ Finished regular season No. 3 on the GB defensive line in tackles (33).
- ▶ Became the youngest player to appear in a season opener for the Packers since Arnie Herber (20 years old) in 1930.
- ▶ Earned third-team All-America honors from *The Associated Press* and first-team All-Pacific-12 recognition from the coaches and media as a junior in 2015.
- ▶ Was a team co-captain in '15 and recorded career highs in tackles (75), tackles for a loss (11) and sacks (six). Also ranked third on the team with five pass breakups.

NT Letroy Guion, 9th Year, Florida State, FA-14

- ▶ Led the Packers defensive line with 49 tackles this season.
- ▶ Has started 35 of the 44 regular-season games he has played in since the start of the 2014 season.
- ▶ Signed with Green Bay during the 2014 offseason after spending his first six NFL seasons with the Minnesota Vikings.
- ▶ Started all 28 games he appeared in for Minnesota in 2012-13, recording 72 tackles (32 solo) and three sacks over that span.
- ▶ Was the only Viking to block a field goal in both 2011 and 2012.

DT Mike Daniels, 5th Year, Iowa, D4a-12

- ▶ Leads Packers defensive linemen with 20.0 sacks since the start of the 2013 regular season.
- ▶ Led the defensive line in both tackles and sacks in 2014 and 2015.
- ▶ Returned a fumble 43 yards for a TD vs. Detroit in Week 14 of 2012, the longest fumble return for a TD by a rookie in franchise history.
- ▶ Starred as an interior pass rusher at Iowa, posting a team-high 24.5 tackles for a loss and 13 sacks from 2010-11.

LOLB Nick Perry, 5th Year, Southern California, D1-12

- ▶ Led the team with a career-high 11.0 sacks in 2016.
- ▶ Registered multiple sacks in each of his first five seasons in the NFL and has posted a two-sack game in each of the last four seasons (2013-16).
- ▶ Has totaled six sacks in five playoff games, including 3.5 in the 2015 postseason which tied Clay Matthews (2010) for the franchise record in a single postseason.
- ▶ His six postseason sacks rank No. 3 in franchise history behind Matthews (10) and Reggie White (eight) and are the most in team history (since 1982) by a player in his first five games with Green Bay.

ILB Jake Ryan, 2nd Year, Michigan, D4-15

- ▶ Finished No. 3 on the team with 82 tackles during the 2016 regular season.
- ▶ Started the final five games of the regular season and both playoff contests in 2015.
- ▶ Recorded a team-best nine tackles (eight solo) and one fumble recovery in Week 13 last season at Detroit in his first pro start.
- ▶ Served as a team captain for his final two seasons at Michigan and was a three-time winner (2012-14) of the Roger Zatkoff Award, given to the Wolverines top linebacker. He was the only player to win the award (est. 1991) three times.
- ▶ Joined LB John Anderson (first round, 26th overall) as the only Michigan linebackers ever drafted by Green Bay.
- ▶ Started 41 of 46 games played in college, appearing at inside linebacker as a senior after spending his first three seasons at outside linebacker and defensive end.

ILB Blake Martinez, Rookie, Stanford, D4a-16

- ▶ Started nine of 13 games he played in this year during the regular season, missing Weeks 12-14 due to injury.
- ▶ Became the first rookie to start on defense for Green Bay in Week 1 since Nick Perry in 2012.
- ▶ Finished collegiate career with 257 tackles (137 solo), 13.5 tackles for a loss, 6.5 sacks, five interceptions and five forced fumbles in 51 games played.
- ▶ Started all 27 games played in his final two seasons, leading the team in tackles as a junior (102) and senior (141).
- ▶ Led the Pacific-12 and ranked No. 7 nationally with 141 tackles (75 solo) as a senior, averaging a conference-best 10.1 tackles per game.

ROLB Clay Matthews, 8th Year, Southern California, D1b-09

- ▶ Despite injuries forcing him to miss four games and limiting him in six others, finished No. 3 on the team with five sacks in 2016.
- ▶ For the first time in his career, recorded at least one sack in each of the first three regular-season games he played in.
- ▶ Selected to his sixth Pro Bowl and first as an inside linebacker in 2015 after recording 6.5 sacks (second on the team), 15 QB hits (No. 1 on the team), and a career-high 85 tackles (No. 2 on the team).
- ▶ With 72.5 career sacks, passed Reggie White (68.5) for the second-most sacks in Packers history (Kabeer Gbaja-Biamila, 74.5).
- ▶ With a team-high 11.0 sacks in 2014, is tied for the most 10-plus sack seasons in franchise history (four).
- ▶ Is the only player in franchise history to score a defensive TD (interception or fumble return) in each of his first three seasons in the NFL (2009-11).

LCB Damarious Randall, 2nd Year, Arizona State, D1-15

- ▶ Was second on the team with three interceptions in 2016 despite missing six games due to injury.
- ▶ Played in 15 games with nine starts (six at LCB, two at RCB, one in the slot) in 2015 and tied for the team lead and No. 2 among NFL rookies with three interceptions, including one he returned for a TD. Finished with a team-best 16 passes defended.
- ▶ Named the NFL's Defensive Rookie of the Month for November 2015, joining CB Casey Hayward (October 2012) as the only Green Bay defensive backs to win the award.
- ▶ Earned first-team All-Pacific-12 honors at safety as a senior in 2014 after he led the Sun Devils in tackles (106) and passes defended (12) and tied for the team lead with three interceptions.

RCB LaDarius Gunter, 2nd Year, Miami (Fla.), FA-15

- ▶ Played in all 16 games with 15 starts during the 2016 regular season.
- ▶ Led the team in 2016 with 15 passes defended.
- ▶ Saw action in eight games as a rookie in 2015, recording two tackles on special teams. Also appeared in one postseason contest, playing 31 snaps on defense and 13 on special teams due to an injury to CB Quinten Rollins.
- ▶ One of two rookie free agents to make Green Bay's opening-day roster in 2015.

SS Morgan Burnett, 7th Year, Georgia Tech, D3-10

- ▶ Tied for No. 1 among NFL safeties with a career-best three sacks this season. Finished No. 1 on the team in tackles (92).
- ▶ Missed five games due to injury in 2015, but finished No. 4 on the team with 54 solo tackles.
- ▶ Totaled a team-high 125 tackles in 2014, the second most of his career (137 in 2012). Ranked No. 2 on the team with 106 tackles (77 solo) in 2013, despite missing the first three games due to injury. Recovered three fumbles, including one for a TD, and added nine passes defended.
- ▶ Participated in all 1,088 plays for Green Bay's defense in 2012, one of only four non-OL in the NFL to appear in 100 percent of his team's snaps.
- ▶ Started the first four games of the 2010 season at SS before sustaining a season-ending knee injury vs. Detroit in Week 4.

FS Ha Ha Clinton-Dix, 3rd Year, Alabama, D1-14

- ▶ Named to his first career Pro Bowl this season. His career-best five interceptions tied for No. 5 in the NFL this season and tied for No. 1 among safeties. It is the most interceptions by a Packers safety in a single season since Charles Woodson (seven) and Charlie Peprah (five) in 2011.
- ▶ In 2016, posted a career-high two interceptions in both Week 9 and Week 14, becoming the first Packer to have two two-INT games in a season since Woodson in 2011.
- ▶ Led the team in tackles in 2015 with 117 (97 solo) and was tied for fourth on the team in interceptions (two).
- ▶ According to STATS, his three sacks during the 2015 regular season tied for the fifth most in a single regular season by a Packers safety (since 1982) and the most since Mark Roman recorded 3.5 in 2004.
- ▶ Started every game in 2015 after starting 10 of 16 games as a rookie when he finished second on the team in tackles (95).
- ▶ Was a consensus All-America selection in 2013 as a junior, earning first-team recognition from *The Associated Press*, the Football Writers Association of America and *Sporting News*.

GREEN BAY, Wis. (AP) — Rookie Dak Prescott is starting an impressive case to remain the starting quarterback of the Dallas Cowboys. He's off to quite the start in his NFL career after taking over following veteran Tony Romo's preseason back injury. Prescott threw for 247 yards and three touchdowns, and the Cowboys forced four turnovers in a 30-10 win over the Green Bay Packers. Prescott was 18 of 27 and struck off two touchdowns and an interception to lead the Cowboys (5-1) to their fifth straight win. Prescott showed some poise in the fourth quarter while matching the Cowboys on a seven-play, 75-yard drive that ended with a 4-yard touchdown pass to Cole Beesley for an 18-point lead with 10:26 left. Romo seems to be getting closer to returning. After a bye, Dallas next plays on Oct. 30 against Philadelphia. Prescott looked on a Packers secondary that played much of the game without their top three cornerbacks because of injuries. His fourth-quarter touchdown pass left Packers fans at Lambeau stunned. They were booing at times following another choppy game for Green Bay's offense. The four turnovers were a season high for Green Bay (3-2).

The Packers had the fun times on the day, losing three. Even two-time NFL MVP quarterback Aaron Rodgers wasn't immune from the jeering. Rodgers finished 31 of 42 for a season-high 294 yards. The Packers didn't get into the end zone until Rodgers and Cobb connected on a 6-yard touchdown pass with 1:10 left in the third quarter. Rodgers accounted for two turnovers with an interception to go with a fumble on first-and-goal at the Cowboys' 1 with 1:10 left in the third quarter. Prescott threw the first interception of his career after he was picked off on third-and-8 from the Dallas 6, knowing out of his end zone with 20 seconds left in third quarter. Safety Morgan Burnett had the diving interception. Prescott's NFL record streak for a quarterback at the start of his career without an interception ended at 176 pass attempts. He broke the mark of 182 previously held by New England's Tom Brady earlier in the game. Drops were a problem again at times for Packers receivers. Timing may have been off on a couple other throws. Rodgers and McCarthy said the Packers would figure out the problems after watching the film. It was Green Bay's worst defeat at home with Rodgers as the starting quarterback since a 37-20 loss to the Giants in the 2011 NFC Divisional playoffs.

Dallas denied Green Bay's league-best run defense. The Cowboys rushed for 93 yards in the first half against the Packers, which was already a season high against Green Bay. The Packers had been allowing 42.8 yards per game entering Sunday. Dallas was averaging a league-best 155.2 yards per game. Rookie Ezekiel Elliott finished with 157 yards on 28 carries, giving him 703 yards rushing, in the second-most in a player's first six career games, behind only Eric Decker (787). Elliott also became the only rookie to rush for at least 130 yards in four consecutive games.

ATLANTA (AP) — The Atlanta Falcons found themselves in another tight game. This time, they came through with the winning play. After two excruciating losses, the Falcons rallied for a 35-32 victory over the Green Bay Packers when Matt Ryan threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to Mohamed Sanu with 31 seconds remaining Sunday.

With Julio Jones shut down in the second half, Ryan turned to Sanu to bail out Atlanta (5-3). He caught five passes for 50 yards on the final possession, the last of them a touchdown pass in the back of the end zone after he got matched against linebacker Jake Ryan. The Green Bay player didn't have a chance. Sanu raced past him and hauled in the pass right in front of the goalposts, the ball easily clearing Ryan's outstretched hands.

The Falcons were coming off a 26-24 loss at Seattle and a 33-30 overtime setback to San Diego in which they squandered a 17-point lead at home. Given what happened a year ago — Atlanta started the season 6-1, then lost six in a row and missed the playoffs — it was imperative to turn things around against the Packers. It didn't look good when Aaron Rodgers threw his fourth touchdown pass, putting the Packers ahead with 3:58 remaining.

Sanu had nine catches for 84 yards, both season highs in his first year with the Falcons. Atlanta needed every one of them, since Jones was held to three catches for 29 yards and targeted only once in the second half — a dropped pass on the final possession.

But Jones helped Sanu get open on the winning play, drawing two defenders when they lined up on the same side of the field. Ryan was 28 of 55 for 288 yards and three touchdowns.

Rodgers threw for 246 yards, teaming up with a bunch of young receivers as the banged-up Packers played without six starters. Linebacker Clay Matthews and receiver Randall Cobb were among those who couldn't go because of hamstring injuries.

Three Green Bay receivers — Geronimo Allison, Trevor Davis and Jeff Janis — got their first career touchdowns. Allison, in fact, had just been promoted from the practice squad and never caught a pass in an NFL game. Dillo for Davis, a rookie who had mainly been used as a returner.

The Packers took a 32-26 lead after the Falcons were caught with too many men on the field, giving Green Bay a first down rather than having to go for a fourth-and-1. Rodgers was tied for a 7-yard touchdown with 3:58 remaining, followed by a 2-point conversion.

It wasn't enough. Sanu's touchdown tied the game, and Matt Bryant booted through the winning extra point. Bryant had already become the Falcons career leading scorer, passing Moran Anderson, with a PAT after Atlanta's first TD.

Adrian Clayborn had the first muffed-sack game of his six-year NFL career, bringing down Rodgers twice in the second half. Vic Beasley Jr. also had a sack, giving him 6½ over the last four games and 7½ for the season.

Rodgers was also Green Bay's leading rusher with a career-high 60 yards on six carries. He broke his previous best of 57 yards in 2012, and posted the highest rushing total by a Packers quarterback since Don Majkowski's 88-yard effort in 1990.

97 Kenny Clark, DT, Rookie, UCLA

- Earned third-team All-America honors from *The Associated Press* and first-team All-Pacific-12 recognition from the coaches and media as a junior in 2015.
- Was a team co-captain in '15 and recorded career highs in tackles (75), tackles for a loss (11) and sacks (six). Also ranked third on the team with five pass breakups.
- Was named to the watch lists for the Bednarik Award, Nagurski Trophy, Outland Trophy and Lombardi Award in '15.

• Has made 36 catches of 25-plus yards since 2011, which ranks No. 4 among NFL tight ends over that span.

• Was drafted by the Seahawks in the second round (No. 62 pick) of the 2013 NFL Draft and played for Seattle from 2013-16, also appearing in five games for the Dallas Cowboys in 2015.

2016 SEASON: Played in six games for the Packers, carrying the ball 31 times for 114 yards (3.7 avg.) and a TD...Caught two passes for 11 yards (5.5 avg.) and also returned three kickoffs for 64 yards (21.3 avg.)...Was inactive for Green Bay in Week 11...Was claimed off waivers from Seattle

on Nov. 15...Played in nine games with seven starts this season with the Seahawks, rushing for 469 yards and six TDs on 117 carries (4.0 avg.)... Also had 20 receptions for 96 yards (4.8 avg.) and one TD with Seattle.

• Caught 15 passes for 136 yards (9.1 avg.) and two TDs and posted a 31.1-yard average on seven kickoff returns last season.

• Finished his career at Stanford as the school's all-time leader in kickoff return yards with 2,493, besting Chris Owusu's mark of 2,132 yards from 2008-11.

2016 SEASON: Played in 15 games with six starts (at RB), seeing time on offense and special teams...Led the team with 457 rushing yards and three TDs on just 77 carries (5.9 avg.)...Had 44 catches for 348 yards (7.9 avg.) and 18 kickoff returns for 366 yards (20.3 avg.)...Was one of only two players in the NFL this season with 60-plus rushing attempts, 40-plus receptions and 15-plus kickoff returns (Redskins RB Chris Thompson)... • Started all 13 games at right tackle as a junior and was selected second-team All-Pacific-12 by *Phil Steele's College Football*.

• Played in 14 games with two starts in 2012, joining G Joshua Garnett as the first true freshmen offensive linemen to start at Stanford since 2000.

2016 SEASON: Played in three games, dressed but did not play in another and was inactive for the other 12 contests (healthy scratch)...Also has been inactive for both playoff games.

87 Jordy Nelson, WR, 9th Year, Kansas State

• One of just two players in franchise history (WR Sterling Sharpe, 1992-94) to register three straight seasons with 85-plus receptions (2013-14, 16).

• Is the only player in team annals to have three seasons with 13-plus TD receptions (2011, 2014, 2016).

• Ranks No. 3 in the league with 57 TD receptions since 2011 despite missing the entire 2015 season due to injury.

• Has caught 80-plus passes in each of his last three seasons, joining WR Donald Driver (four straight, 2004-07) and Sharpe (1992-94) as the only players to do so in team annals. Joins Sharpe (three straight, 1992-94) as the only Packers to record back-to-back 90-catch seasons and the only with two 95-catch seasons.

• Ranks No. 4 in franchise history in receptions (497), No. 5 in receiving

yards (7,366) and No. 3 in TD receptions (63) and 100-yard receiving games (25).

• Has registered four 1,000-yard receiving seasons, the fourth most in team annals (Driver, seven; James Lofton and Sharpe, five). His three consecutive 1,000-yard seasons rank tied for No. 2 in franchise history behind only Driver (six). Is tied with Lofton for the most 1,200-yard seasons in team history with four.

• Set a single-season franchise record with 1,519 receiving yards in 2014, topping WR Robert Brooks' mark of 1,497 yards in 1995, on the way to being selected to his first career Pro Bowl and earning second-team All-Pro honors from *The Associated Press*.

2016 SEASON: Started all 16 games and led the team in all three receiving categories with 97 receptions for 1,257 yards (13.0 avg.) and 14 TDs...Led the league in TD catches, ranked No. 5 in receptions and ranked No. 6 in receiving yards...Posted a TD catch in 11 games this season, the most in the NFL, two more than any other player...It also tied Sharpe (1992 and 1994) for the most games with a TD catch in a season in team annals...Was tied for the league lead with three multi-receiving TD games...Led the NFL in red-zone catches (19), red-zone receiving yards (127) and red-zone TD receptions (11), three more TDs than any other player in the league...The 11 red-zone TDs matched the best mark by a Packer since STATS began recording red-zone TDs in 1991 (11 TDs by WR James Jones in 2012 and Sharpe in 1994)...Posted eight games with 90-plus receiving yards, tied for the most in the NFL this season...Led the team and was tied for No. 4 in the NFL with five 100-yard receiving games on the season...Caught six-plus passes in 10 games this season, besting his previous high of nine in 2014...Was tied for No. 6 in the NFL with 62 receiving first downs...Was named first alternate for the Pro Bowl.

►**At Jacksonville (Sept. 11):** After missing the entire 2015 season due to a knee injury, returned to the starting lineup and played 54 snaps, tying for the team lead with six catches for 32 yards (5.3 avg.) and a TD...The TD catch was the 50th of his career and came with just over three minutes remaining in the first half to give the Packers a 14-10 lead as he found an opening in the middle of the end zone...His 118-yard day brought his career total to 6,981 receiving yards as he moved past Boyd Dowler (6,918) for No. 5 in team history.

►**At Minnesota (Sept. 18):** Started and played 68 of 71 snaps, pacing the team with 73 yards receiving and a TD on five catches (14.6 avg.)...Caught a 1-yard TD pass from QB Aaron Rodgers in the first quarter, moving him into sole possession of the No. 6 spot in team history with 51 TD catches...It marked the third time in his career that he had caught at least one TD pass in both of the first two games (also 2011 and 2013)...Made a leaping 39-yard catch down to the Minnesota 4 early in the fourth quarter over CB Trae Waynes that helped set up Rodgers' 10-yard TD run three plays later...Also had a 21-yard grab in the second quarter, hauling in a quick pass over Waynes before taking it down the sideline to the Minnesota 48.

►**Vs. Detroit (Sept. 25):** Started and played 49 of 54 snaps, leading the team with six catches for 101 yards (16.8 avg.) and two TDs, with all of his receptions coming in the first half...It marked the third time in his career that he had posted 100-plus receiving yards in a first half (Weeks 10-11 in 2014)...Joined WR James Jones as the only Packers over the past 15 seasons (2002-16) to register at least one TD grab in each of the first three games of the season...On his first TD, an 8-yard grab late in the first quarter, came out of the slot and went to the middle of the end zone before moving to his right to find an opening for a scrambling Rodgers to get him the ball...Helped set up the score with a 49-yard catch, the longest reception by a Packer in the first three games, as he beat LB Thurston Armbrister over the middle to make a leaping grab in stride before taking it down the sideline to the Detroit 11...Late in the first half, beat CB Darius Slay down the right sideline to catch a perfectly thrown ball from Rodgers over his shoulder for the 17-yard score...His two TD catches gave him 53 for his career, moving him into a tie with WR Greg Jennings for the No. 5 spot in franchise history.

►**Vs. N.Y. Giants (Oct. 9):** Started and played 72 of 80 snaps, finishing with four receptions for 38 yards (9.5 avg.) and a TD with all four catches going for first downs...On Green Bay's opening drive, freed himself from the coverage of CB Eli Apple in the end zone to make a diving grab for a

2-yard TD, making him the first Packer to catch a TD pass in each of the team's first four games since WR Bill Schroeder in 2001.

56 Julius Peppers, LB, 15th Year, North Carolina

• Has been selected to the Pro Bowl nine times during his career, including last season (2004-06, 2008-12, 2015), and has been named first-team All-Pro by *The Associated Press* three times (2004, 2006, 2010). Was named to the NFL's All-Decade Team for the 2000s.

• Has played in 234 games with 227 starts as a pro, appearing in all 16 contests in 13 of his 15 seasons in the NFL. Has missed just two games due to injury during his career.

• Is the only player in NFL history with 100-plus sacks (143.5) and 10-plus interceptions (11).

• Since entering the NFL in 2002, ranks No. 1 in the league in sacks (143.5) and tied for No. 2 in forced fumbles (47). His career sack total ranks No. 5 in NFL history (since 1982), with all four players ahead of him (Bruce Smith, Reggie White, Kevin Greene, Chris Doleman) in the Pro Football Hall of Fame.

• Has posted six-plus sacks each of the last eight seasons (2009-16), the only player in the league to do so over that span.

2016 SEASON: Played in all 16 games with 11 starts and ranked No. 2 on the team with 7.5 sacks...Posted 30 tackles (22 solo), nine tackles for a loss (tied for No. 2 on the team), two forced fumbles, 12 QB hits (No. 5 on the team) and 14 pressures (tied for No. 2 on the team).

• Has posted at least one sack in four of his five career playoff games.

• Has registered at least one two-sack game each of the last four seasons (2013-2016), the only player on the Packers to do so over that span.

2016 SEASON: Played in 14 games with 12 starts and led the team with a career-high 11 sacks (tied for No. 8 in the NFL)...Registered 60 tackles (43 solo) and led the team in tackles for a loss (15) and QB pressures (17)...Ranked No. 2 on the team in QB hits (15)...Also had an interception and four passes defended...Part of a run defense that ranks No. 8 in the league in rushing yards allowed per game (94.7) and No. 7 in runs of 10-plus yards allowed (37).

99 Christian Ringo, DT, 1st Year, Louisiana-Lafayette

• Originally selected by the Packers as their second pick in the sixth round (210th overall) of the 2015 NFL Draft. Was on Green Bay's practice squad for the entire 2015 season.

• Started all 13 games as a senior in 2014, anchoring a defensive line that helped the Ragin' Cajuns lead the Sun Belt in rushing defense while ranking third in sacks.

• Was named the state's Defensive Player of the Year by the Louisiana Sports Writers Association after ranking seventh in the nation in tackles for loss (20) and 12th in the country in sacks (11½). His 11½ sacks tied the school single-season record and he also finished tied for No. 1 in school history with 21.0 career sacks.

• Was tied with CB Damarious Randall (15) for the most games played by a Green Bay rookie in 2015.

• Began his career at Oklahoma as a walk-on and went on to play in 47 games with 17 starts in four seasons.

2016 SEASON: Played in all 16 games with eight starts, seeing time on offense and special teams...Had 34 carries for 150 yards (3.6 avg.) and two TDs and nine catches for 46 yards (5.1 avg.) and a TD...Was one of two players on the team (WR Jeff Janis) with a rushing TD and a receiving TD...Had three tackles on special teams...Was named an alternate for the Pro Bowl.

►**At Jacksonville (Sept. 11):** Played 18 snaps on special teams, tied for the team lead, and eight snaps on offense.

►**At Minnesota (Sept. 18):** Appeared on 19 plays on special teams and two on offense.

►**Vs. Detroit (Sept. 25):** Started his first career game and seemed to be in position for the most significant offensive action of his career, but was limited to just 11 snaps before departing in the second quarter due to a back injury...Was the lead blocker on RB Eddie Lacy's game-long 25-yard

- Ranks No. 1 in NFL history (min. 1,500 attempts) in career passer rating (104.1), interception percentage (1.55) and TD/INT ratio (4.13, 297/72).
- Has posted six seasons (2009, 2011-12, 2014-16) with 500-plus passing attempts and eight or fewer INTs, the most in NFL history ahead of Patriots QB Tom Brady (three seasons) and nine others (one season each).
- Ranks No. 1 in NFL history with seven 100-plus-rating seasons (2009-14, 2016). Is the only quarterback in league history to record a 100-plus passer rating in six consecutive seasons (2009-14), with no other QB doing so in more than four straight years.
- Is one of only four QBs in NFL history (Dan Marino, Peyton Manning, Drew Brees) to have two seasons with 40-plus TD passes.
- Has registered six 4,000-yard passing seasons in his career, the most in team history. His four seasons with 35-plus TD passes are also a franchise record.
- Was named the league's Most Valuable Player by *The Associated Press* in 2014 for the second time in his career (2011), becoming the eighth player in league history to win the honor multiple times.
- Is one of only four quarterbacks in NFL annals with 35,000-plus passing yards and 2,500-plus rushing yards (Fran Tarkenton, John Elway, Donovan McNabb).
- Has posted 10-plus games with zero INTs (min. 15 att.) three times in his career (2009, 2014, 2016). The only other QB in franchise history to have 10-plus zero-INT games in a season was Bart Starr in 1964.
- In 135 career regular-season starts (90-45 record), has posted 49 games with 300-plus passing yards, 80 without an interception (min. 15 attempts) and 74 with a 100-plus passer rating. Has posted 31 career games with 300-plus passing yards, no INTs and a 100-plus rating, No. 4 in NFL history behind Brees (44), Brady (34) and Manning (33).
- Has been selected to the Pro Bowl in six of the last eight seasons (2009, 2011-12, 2014-16).
- Has posted a franchise-record 20 games with four-plus passing TDs, eclipsing Brett Favre's mark of 19,

2016 SEASON: Completed 401 of 610 passes (65.7 percent) for 4,428 yards and 40 TDs with seven INTs for a 104.2 passer rating...Ranked No. 1 in the league in TD passes, the first Green Bay quarterback to do so since Favre in 2003...Set a franchise single-season record for completions... Ranked No. 2 in the NFL in TD percentage (6.6), No. 4 in passer rating, No. 4 in passing yards and No. 3 in TD/INT ratio (5.71)...Was selected to the Pro Bowl for the third straight season and the sixth time in his career... Posted a league-best seven games with three-plus passing TDs and no INTs this season, the second most in a season in team history behind only his eight games in 2014...Had a franchise-record four games with four-plus TD passes and no INTs (tied with Brees for the league lead)... Ranked No. 1 in the NFL in games with multiple passing TDs and no INTs with 10, also the second most in franchise history behind his mark of 11 in 2014...Had a league-high 31 TD passes in the red zone, tied with Favre (1995) for the most by a Green Bay QB since STATS began recording it in 1991...Ranked No. 2 in the NFL with a third-down passer rating of 116.2, completing 101 of 153 passes for 1,391 yards and 16 TDs with five INTs... Over the final seven games of the season, completed 168 of 241 passes (69.7 percent) for 2,018 yards and 18 TDs with no INTs for a 120.0 passer rating...Rushed for a career-high 369 yards and a team-leading four TDs on 67 carries (5.7 avg.), the highest rushing-yardage total by a Green Bay QB since Tobin Rote (398 yards) in 1956...Ranked No. 3 in the NFL among QBs in rushing yards and No. 5 in yards per carry (min. 40 att.)...Was tied for No. 5 among QBs in rushing TDs and ranked No. 4 in rushing first downs (25)...Posted seven games with 25-plus rushing yards, matching his career high set in 2015.

►**At Jacksonville (Sept. 11):** Threw for 199 yards and two TDs on 20-of-34 passing for a 95.1 passer rating...Added a 6-yard rushing TD on Green Bay's opening possession, giving him 11 games with two-plus passing TDs and one-plus rushing TDs since 2008, second most over that span behind only Panthers QB Cam Newton...His TD passes came on back-to-back drives late in the first half...Connected with WR Jordy Nelson for a 6-yard TD pass with just over three minutes remaining in the first half, buying time in the pocket before moving to his right to find Nelson in the middle of the end zone...With CB Jalen Ramsey attempting to pull

him down by the back of his jersey, threw a perfectly placed 29-yard TD pass to WR Davante Adams over CB Davon House in the end zone with 13 seconds remaining in the half.

►**At Minnesota (Sept. 18):** Connected on 20 of 36 passes for 213 yards and a TD with one INT (70.7 passer rating)...Rushed for 29 yards on three carries (9.7 avg.), highlighted by a 10-yard TD run up the middle early in the fourth quarter...It marked just the third time in his career (Weeks 9-10, 2009; Weeks 2-3, 2010) that he had posted a rushing TD in back-to-back games.

►**Vs. Detroit (Sept. 25):** Posted a season-high 129.3 passer rating, connecting on 15 of 24 passes for 205 yards and four TDs with no INTs, with all four of the TD passes coming in the first half...It marked just the second time in his career that he had thrown four-plus TD passes in a first half (six vs. Chicago, Nov. 9, 2014)...His 24 passing attempts were the fewest in his career in a game that he threw four-plus TD passes...Threw two TD passes to Nelson, including a perfectly placed 17-yard pass over Nelson's shoulder late in the first half to put Green Bay up, 31-3...With just under 3:30 remaining and the Packers leading 34-27, scrambled to pick up 11 yards on a third-and-8 that helped seal the win...Finished with 22 yards rushing on five carries (4.4 avg.).

►**Vs. N.Y. Giants (Oct. 9):** Threw for 259 yards and two TDs with two INTs on 23-of-45 passing for a 65.0 passer rating...Threw a 2-yard TD pass to Nelson on the opening drive, his 50th to Nelson in the regular season, the second-most prolific combo in franchise history behind only QB Brett Favre and WR Antonio Freeman (57)...On Green Bay's opening drive, had a key 11-yard run to the Giants' 6 on third-and-10, bouncing around the pocket before taking it down the left sideline for the first down that set up his TD pass to Nelson just two plays later...Midway through the second quarter, perfectly placed a ball over the shoulder of Adams down the right sideline with CB Michael Hunter covering him for a 29-yard score.

►**Vs. Dallas (Oct. 16):** Completed a season-high 31 passes on 42 attempts for a season-best 294 yards and a TD with one INT for a 90.8 passer rating...Completed passes to nine different players, a season high.

►**At Atlanta (Oct. 30):** Threw for 246 yards and four TDs with no INTs on 28-of-38 passing for a 125.5 passer rating...It marked his 18th career game with four-plus TD passes as he moved past Johnny Unitas (17) for No. 6 on the all-time list...All four of his TD passes came to different players, with three of the players (WRs Jeff Janis, Trevor Davis and Geronimo Allison) recording the first regular-season TD catches of their career... Connected with Nelson on a season-long 58-yard pass on Green Bay's opening drive, hitting him perfectly in stride as Nelson took it down the sideline to the Atlanta 7...Posted a career-high 60 rushing yards on just six carries (10.0 avg.), including a 23-yard scamper down the sideline at the end of the first half out to the Green Bay 48 to help set up K Mason Crosby's 29-yard FG as time expired...Dating back to 1960, his rushing total was the second-best mark by a Green Bay QB behind only Don Majkowski's 88-yard outing at Detroit on Sept. 30, 1990...Tied his career high with three runs of 10-plus yards (23, 13, 11)...Joined Panthers QB Cam Newton (Dec. 20, 2015, at N.Y. Giants) as the only QBs over the past four seasons (2013-16) to register four-plus passing TDs and 60-plus rushing yards in a game.

►**Vs. Indianapolis (Nov. 6):** Completed 26 of 43 passes for 297 yards and three TDs with one INT for a 94.8 passer rating...It marked his 50th career regular-season game with three-plus TD passes...Was his third straight game with three-plus TD passes, the only NFL quarterback to accomplish that feat in 2016...Drew the Colts offside on the final play of the first quarter on a third down and found Nelson for a 26-yard jump-ball TD in the end zone...Rushed for 43 yards on six carries (7.2 avg.), the first

time in his career that he had posted 40-plus rushing yards in back-to-back games...Had a 21-yard run down the right sideline late in the fourth quarter to the Indianapolis 16 that helped set up his TD pass to Cobb, giving him a 20-yard run in back-to-back games for the first time in his career.

►**At Tennessee (Nov. 13):** Threw for a season-high 371 yards and two TDs with two INTs on 31-of-51 passing...Had three completions of 35-plus yards, with all three going to Adams (46, 38, 35)...His 35-yard completion down the left sideline to Adams in the third quarter came on fourth-and-5, tying the third-longest completion of his career on fourth down, and set up his own TD run two plays later...Rushed for 27 yards on three carries (9.0 avg.), highlighted by a 20-yard TD run up the middle, the second-longest TD run of his career...It marked his third straight game with a run of 20-plus yards, the first Green Bay QB to do so since Tobin Rote in 1955.

►**At Washington (Nov. 20):** Connected on 26 of 41 passes for 351 yards and three TDs with no INTs for a 115.0 passer rating, his fourth game this season with three-plus passing TDs and no INTs...It marked just the third time in his career (2009, 2011) that he posted back-to-back 350-yard passing games...Averaged 8.56 yards per attempt, a season high...Posted a season-high five completions of 25-plus yards, connecting with TE Jared Cook (47 and 29), Cobb (47) and Adams (37), and RB James Starks (31-yard TD)...Recorded a 151.4 passer rating on third down, completing 9 of 13 attempts for 195 yards and two TDs...The 195 yards passing on third down was the second-highest output of his career behind only his 217 yards at Pittsburgh on Dec. 20, 2009...Went over the 35,000-yard passing mark for his career, reaching it on his 4,446th attempt, the second fastest in NFL history behind only Unitas (4,388 attempts)...Rushed for 33 yards on three carries (11.0 avg.), including a 17-yard scamper to the Washington 6 late in the second quarter that helped set up a 36-yard Mason Crosby FG.

►**At Philadelphia (Nov. 28):** Completed 30 of 39 passes for 313 yards and two TDs with no INTs for a 116.7 passer rating, his first game this season with 30-plus completions and a completion percentage of 75 percent or higher...Posted 300-plus passing yards for the third straight game, tied for the second-longest single-season streak of his career behind only a four-game streak in 2011...Helped the offense convert 10 of 14 third downs, a 71.4 percentage that is the best in the NFL this season and the second-best mark posted by Green Bay under Head Coach Mike McCarthy (13 of 18, 72.2 percent, at Minnesota, Oct. 27, 2013)...Both of his TD passes went to Adams, with the second one a perfectly placed 20-yarder in a tight window that Adams caught in the back of the end zone with CB Nolan Carroll in tight coverage...Completed 9 of 10 passes on third down for 94 yards (105.8 rating)...Also rushed for 26 yards on six carries (4.3 avg.), with three of the runs picking up first downs.

►**Vs. Houston (Dec. 4):** Playing with an injured hamstring, completed 20 of 30 passes for 209 yards and two TDs with no INTs for a 108.9 passer rating, his third straight game with a 100-plus rating...It marked his seventh straight game with two-plus TD passes, tied for the second-longest streak of his career (2012) behind only a 13-game streak in 2011...It also marked his third straight game without an INT...Rolled out to his right and threw across his body to find Cobb in the end zone for a 9-yard TD pass in the second quarter...Led the offense on a 12-play, 98-yard TD drive in the fourth quarter that was capped off with his 32-yard TD pass to a wide-open Nelson in the end zone...The drive was the longest by the Packers since a 99-yarder at Cleveland on Oct. 25, 2009...Later in the quarter, led the offense on an eight-play, 89-yard drive that put the Packers up 21-7...Also had three carries for 16 yards (5.3 avg.), including a key 11-yard scramble early in the fourth quarter on Green Bay's go-ahead drive.

►**Vs. Seattle (Dec. 11):** Completed 18 of 23 passes for 246 yards and three TDs with no INTs for a 150.8 passer rating, the fourth-highest single-game passer rating in his career (min. 15 att.) and his fourth straight game with a 100-plus rating...On the third play from scrimmage, rolled to his right and found Adams deep down the right sideline for a 66-yard TD, his longest completion of the season...Has now thrown at least one TD pass of 65-plus yards in all nine of his seasons as the starter (2008-16), joining Brees as the only NFL quarterbacks to do so over that span...Connected with Nelson on two TD passes (9 and 3 yards), with the second one moving the duo into a tie with Favre/Antonio Freeman for the most productive TD combination in franchise history...Earned NFC Offensive Player of the

Week honors for his performance, the 14th time he has won the award in his career as he extended his franchise record...Ranks No. 1 in the NFL with 14 Player of the Week awards since 2010.

►**At Chicago (Dec. 18):** Despite limited mobility due to a calf injury, completed 19 of 31 passes for 252 yards with no INTs for an 87.0 passer rating...With the game tied at 27 late in the fourth quarter, faced a third-and-11 at the Green Bay 26...Dropped back in the pocket and moved slightly to his left before heaving a deep ball to Nelson down the middle of the field that he hauled in at the Chicago 14 for a 60-yard gain...With no timeouts left, spiked the ball on the next play to stop the block and set up Mason Crosby's 32-yard game-winning FG as time expired...Added 19 yards rushing on three carries (6.3 avg.).

►**Vs. Minnesota (Dec. 24):** Threw for 347 yards and four TDs with no INTs on 28-of-38 passing for a 136.6 rating...Did not throw an interception for the sixth straight game, matching the franchise record (min. 15 att.) set by him in 2014 and 2014-15 and Starr in 1964...Brought his streak of attempts without an INT to 206, the third-best streak in team annals behind Starr's in 1964-65 (294) and his own of 212 in 2014...Threw two TD passes to Nelson as the duo set the franchise record for the most productive TD combination in franchise history (59), surpassing Favre and Freeman's mark of 57...Completed 8 of 9 passes for 79 yards and three TDs on third down for a 142.8 rating...In addition to his four passing TDs, added a 6-yard rushing TD with 24 seconds remaining in the first half to give Green Bay a 28-13 at the break...Took the shotgun snap and then spun away from DE Everson Griffen, running away from him down the sideline before making a move to elude a tackle attempt from CB Xavier Rhodes near the sideline as he took it in for the score...It marked just the second game in his career (vs. Denver, 2011) that he threw for 300-plus yards and four-plus TDs with a rushing TD as he joined Brees (three times) and Peyton Manning (twice) as the only QBs in NFL history to do so...Was named the NFC Offensive Player of the Week further extending his franchise record by winning the award for the 15th time in his career.

►**At Detroit (Jan. 1):** Set a franchise record with his seventh straight zero-INT game, completing 27 of 39 passes for 300 yards and four TDs for a 126.0 passer rating...Became the first QB in team history to register back-to-back games in the same season with 300-plus passing yards, four-plus TDs and no INTs...Brought his streak of passing attempts without an INT to 245, the second-longest mark in franchise history behind only Starr (294) in 1964...It marked his 20th career game with four-plus TD passes as he moved past Favre (19) for the franchise record...Led the Packers to TDs on three of the first four drives in the second half to turn a 14-10 halftime deficit into a 31-17 lead...Found Adams on a pass over the middle for a 3-yard TD on the opening drive of the half...Early in the fourth quarter, spun to his left to avoid pressure, then moved to his left again to avoid DT Khyri Thornton before finding WR Geronimo Allison in the back of the end zone for a 10-yard TD...After a Lions FG narrowed the lead to 23-17 midway through the fourth quarter, led the offense on an 11-play, 75-yard drive that he capped off by lofting a 9-yard TD pass to Adams in the corner of the end zone...Added 42 yards rushing on a season-high 10 attempts (4.2 avg.), including a key 13-yard gain on a bootleg midway through the fourth quarter that converted a third-and-1.

►**Vs. N.Y. Giants (NFC Wild Card, Jan. 8):** Completed 25 of 40 passes for 362 yards and four TDs for a 125.2 rating, his sixth game in 14 postseason starts with a 110-plus rating as he tied Joe Montana (23 starts) and Tom Brady (30 starts) for the most in NFL history...It also marked his fifth playoff game with a 120-plus rating, tied with Montana for the most in league annals...Became just the fourth QB in NFL history to throw for 350-plus yards, four-plus TDs and no INTs in a playoff game (Peyton Manning, Kurt Warner, Alex Smith)...Tied the single-game franchise playoff record with the four TD passes, and became the first QB in team history to record two games with four-plus passing TDs in the postseason (at Arizona, Jan. 10, 2010)...Posted his sixth career playoff game with three-plus TD passes, topping Favre (five) for the franchise mark...Also extended his team playoff record with his fifth career 300-yard game...The 362 yards passing were the third most in a playoff game in team history behind only his 423 yards at Arizona in the 2009 postseason and his 366 at Atlanta in the 2010 playoffs...Is tied for No. 3 in NFL playoff history with three career 360-yard passing games, trailing only Warner (six) and Manning (five)...
